

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

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

TAKE OVER BANKER HERBERT WIGWE

Herbert Wigwe is the Group Managing Director (GMD) and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of one of Africa's leading banks; Access Bank. He is not only an entrepreneur and a businessman, but also a philanthropist. Wigwe has transformed Access bank into one of Nigeria's top five banking institutions because of his dedication, commitment, discipline, and expertise. Accountants of Nigeria (ICAN), and in 1989, he became a Chartered Accountant. As a chartered accountant, he resigned from Coopers **Capital Merchant Bank** as a credit analyst. In 1990, he won the British Council Scholarship to do his masters at North Wales

University (now Bangor University). In 1991, he got his masters in Banking and Finance. After his masters, he came back to Lagos to work with Guaranty Trust Bank – a fast-growing new generation bank. Gradually, he grew through the ranks and became the Executive Director of the Bank at 32 years old. Owing to his hunger for more knowledge in the financial sector, he went for a second master's degree in Financial Economics from the University of London. Herbert Wigwe is also an alumnus of the prestigious Harvard Business School Executive Management Program. In 2002, Herbert and his close friend, Aigboje Aig-Imoukhuede

were presented with a business deal of acquiring a small-scale commercial bank -Access Bank. Access Bank at the time was ranked as the 65th largest bank out of the 89 banks in Nigeria. Notwithstanding, Herbert and his friend Aigboje were ready to risk their blossoming career to revive the bank. They transformed the bank into one of the most successful commercial banks in the world and one of the top five banks in Nigeria. In 2015, The Banker's magazine named Access Bank as one of the top 500 banks in the world. Herbert Wigwe has helped to develop some of Africa's biggest companies in the construction, telecommunications, energy, oil and gas sectors through Access Bank. In 2019, the completion of the merger between Diamond Bank and Access took place. The combined banks retained the Access Bank name led by Wigwe as the CEO. This merger afforded both banks the opportunity of leveraging on their distinct potentials to build a stronger bank. Diamond Bank benefits from Access Bank's strong risk management culture and capital management

expertise while Access Bank benefits from the Diamond Bank's substantial retail banking expertise and strong digital offering which Access Bank has taken advantage of. Together, the two companies have created one of Nigeria's leading banks, with 29 million customers and 32,000 Point of Sale (POS) terminals.



ACTIVIST OMOYELE SOWORE



Omoyele Sowore participated in the student protest of 1989 when the International Monetary Fund (IMF) gave a condition that the Universities in Nigeria should be reduced to just five from twentyeight before they would grant the country a loan of \$120 million. The proposed loan was to be used for an oil pipeline in Nigeria.

At the time, Sowore led a protest that involved 5,100 students against the Nigerian government in 1992. Sowore was not spared as he was arrested and beaten mercilessly by the Police.

Because of his insatiable appetite for social change, the arrest and torture didn't deter him. He still participated in the fight for democratic governance taking over the military rule in Nigeria on the 12th of June 1993. On August 3rd, 2019, Sowore was arrested again for his struggle and belief in

his principles. This time titled "Revolution No". The Nigerian State Security Service's arrest of him was for alleged treason of Sowore after his call for the protest. He was released for a day much to the jubilation of many only for him to be re-arrested in the court premises the next day. This cause public outcry making him more popular than ever before. The, Federal Government, through the AGF. Abubakar Malami, recently ordered for Sowore's release once again.

Amina J. Mohammed was Minister of Environment of the Federal Republic of Nigeria from November 2015 to December 2016, where she steered the country's efforts on climate action, protecting the natural environment and conserving resources for sustainable development. Prior to this, she served as Special Adviser to Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon on Post-2015 Development Planning, where she was instrumental in bringing about the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, including the Sustainable Development Goals. Now the Deputy Secretary General of the United Nations Amina is attempting to meet some of the world's most intractable crises and developmental challenges head on. She has been called one of the world's greatest leaders (Fortune magazine), Diplomat of the Year (Foreign Policy magazine), and Climate Warrior (Vogue). The UN Social 500, praised her for her transparency. On social media she shares her experiences, workload and accomplishments in daily tweets and posts. We commend Amina Mohammed for her unwavering determination that marks her professional trajectory.









RISK TAKER BUSOLA DAKOLO

After years in which silence around rape and sexual harassment have been the norm, Nigeria is finally experiencing a wave of #MeToo proclamations and this is all thanks to Busola Dakolo! The celebrity photographer and wife of popular musician Timi Dakolo, in an interview, accused Biodun Fatoyinbo, head pastor of one of Nigeria's largest Pentecostal churches, the Commonwealth of Zion Assembly (COZA), of raping her when she was a teenager. While more women are towing in her footsteps and bracing the odds to challenge Nigeria's widespread rape culture, it is not without challenges. Dakolo's allegation, for example, earned her a visit from the Nigerian police who claimed she was being investigated in a case of criminal conspiracy. This mother of three had to contend with trolls and negative backlash on social media, telephone threats, and an extremely difficult discussion about the rape saga.

Nigeria is a paradoxical society. It is a country where sexual relationships are front and centre in music and film and advertisements but talking about sex is a taboo

 – a sin almost. It's a country that prioritizes silence over confrontation as proper and wise. They are yet to accept, appreciate and understand the effort it takes to make such a bold step and the positive impact such an action will later have on women in years to come. You can never over estimate how important that there should be growth of awareness of such issues no matter how info over broaching uncomfortable it is to broach such subjects.

Busola Dakolo might not yet have gotten the justice she sought, but she has given a voice to many women who will henceforth say NO to suffering in silence for fear of shame and stigmatization.

Under his leadership role at Afreximbank, Oramah has deployed a series of financial instruments, including letters of credit, commercial guarantees, loans, in support of African economic integration.

Afreximbank has also successfully attracted many new countries to join it as participating states and organized the first Intra-African Trade Fair in Cairo in 2018. It also noted the Bank's record results in 2017 when it attained a net profit of \$220 million. Just over a year ago, Oramah was

decorated Professor of International Trade and Finance by Adeleke University, Nigeria. He currently serves on the Practitioner Advisory Board of the Institute for Trade and Innovation (IfTI) of Offenburg University,

Gengenbach, Germany and is also a Member of the Emerging Markets Advisory Council of the Institute of International Finance; an Executive Committee Member of the Factors Chain International (FCI); a member of the Consultative Board on the World Cocoa Economy of the International Cocoa Organization (ICCO); and a Fellow of

the Institute of Credit Administration. He serves on the Editorial Board of the Journal of African Trade (JAT). Professor Oramah has won several awards, including the Afreximbank Outstanding Staff Award (2010); the 2017 Banker of the Year Award of the African Banker and the Africa House Leadership Award of the New York University (2018). Aside from his intimidating successes, Oramah recently published a book entitled: 'Foundations of Structured Trade Finance', contributed a chapter on Export Credit Arrangements in Capital-Scarce Developing Economies in the Hand Book of Global Trade Policy. He has also authored Chapters in several other books and written over 40 professional/scholarly articles on a wide range of African economic, trade and trade finance issues. He has

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PERFORMER MELE KYARI

President Muhammadu Buhari recently confirmed the appointment of the Group General Manager, Crude Oil Marketing Division (COMD) of the Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC), Mele Kolo Kyari, as the new Group Managing Director of the corporation making him the 19th GMD of the NNPC with a rich profile of professional and service credentials.

A geologist, Kyari is known in the oil industry as a crude oil marketer with outfield pedigree in petroleum economics and crude oil and gas trading. With over 32 years of experience in the oil and gas

industry, his tour of duty traversed the entire value chain of the petroleum industry. Under his watch, the Crude Oil Marketing Division of the NNPC has recorded noticeable transformation in the management and sales of the various Nigeria's crude oil grades via an infusion of transparency and automation of the processes. Kyari vowed to reverse the trend of petroleum products importation in the country by rehabilitating the existing refineries and encouraging private sector investment in the refineries sub-sector to end the trend of fuel importation as an oil producing country. Kyari plans to put in place a project that



will ultimately deliver at least \$20 billion in net revenues to the country, create 10,000 direct jobs and 40,000 indirect jobs. Kyari's plan is to transform Nigeria into a net exporter of petroleum products by 2023. Nigeria LNG Ltd. has decided to proceed with the construction of the country's seventh liquefied natural gas production train, which will boost the company's output by 35%. Train 7 will


increase the company's competitiveness in the global LNG market. The agreement to go ahead with the plant is a show of confidence in the country since Nigeria built its last LNG plant in 2007. The new train, which will take five years to complete, will cost about \$10 billion and will boost LNG output to 30 million tons a year from 22 million tons. Kyari believes this is a gateway to more investment in Nigeria. Kyari says it will take steps to get to Train 12 and there is an opportunity to do this which will in return, make NLNG one of the most successful venture in Nigeria

Kyari insists NNPC will be more transparent in their operations so that everyone can assess their work in time to come. He promises to continue the automation of the petroleum products sale process so that marketers can buy products online.


INSPIRATIONAL PERSON KECHI OKWUCHI

Kechi is a Nigerian-American singer and motivational speaker, she was one of the two survivors in the Sosoliso performed at sporting events, other events throughout Airline Flight 1145 crash on December 10 2005 and a finalist at the 12th season of Americas got talent in 2017.

Okwuchi was one of the two survivors in the crash that claimed 107 lives, 60 of which were her schoolmates. She received third degree burns over 65% of her body and was given a 30% chance of survival. Okwuchi was air-lifted to MilparkHospital in South Africa and later to Shriners Hospitals for Children in Galveston, Texas, United States where she has undergone over a hundred reconstructive surgeries. In 2015, Okwuchi graduated from the University of Saint Thomas, in Houston, Texas, United States, with a First Class Degree. She was the student speaker at the Commencement Ceremony. Okwuchi was a speaker at TedxEuston where she gave a talk titled Girls- know thyself. Kechi later went on to take part in the twelfth season of America's Got Talent in 2017 as a singer, and finished the competition as a finalist. She later participated in America's Got Talent: The Champions in 2019, where Simon Cowell gave her the

golden buzzer, sending her straight to the final. She has

Aliko Dangote has become, without a doubt Africa's leading industrialist and entrepreneur. His success proclaims the new Nigeria of today and tomorrow. It shows that behind all the brouhaha, Nigerians are beginning to take their rightful place as Africa's leading entrepreneurs; thereby proclaiming Nigeria itself as a major frontier market in international relations.

At the age of 21, Aliko Dangote borrowed \$3,000 from his uncle to import and sell agricultural commodities in Nigeria, his native country. His business venture quickly became a success, and as a result, he managed to repay the entire loan within three months of starting operations. For the seventh time in a row, Dangote was the richest man in Africa in 2018, with an estimated net worth of \$14.1 billion. The business empire he began to build more than three decades ago, Dangote Group, is one of the largest

sector employers in Nigeria as well as most valuable conglomerate in West Africa

> The rise in Dangote's fortunes has been meteoric. In his own words: "About 10 years ago, I bought a company for \$4 million. It is worth \$21 billion today." Dangote made his first showing on Forbes list of the world's billionaires in 2008, with a fortune estimated at

\$3.3 billion. By 2011, this had jumped by 400% to \$13.8 billion. By November 2013, his fortune had jumped again to \$20.8 billion, making him by far the richest man in Africa according to Forbes Magazine; and the 43rd richest man in the world.

Today, Dangote Group mills flour, processes salt, produces pasta and fertilizer. Its sugar refinery is the second-largest in the world, producing 800,000 tons annually. It is the main supplier of sugar to Nigeria's soft drinks companies, breweries and confectioners. The Group exports cotton, cashew-nuts, cocoa, sesame seed and ginger to several countries. It also has major investments in real estate, banking, transport, textiles and oil and gas.

But the jewel in the crown of Dangote's business conglomerate is his cement factories. Thanks mainly to Dangote, Nigeria no longer imports cement, but is a major world producer. In 2007, Dangote commissioned a one-billion dollar cement factory in Obajana, Nigeria; the largest in Africa. Dangote Cement now employs 26,000 workers in Nigeria alone. The company is also constructing cement plants in Cameroon, Ethiopia, the Republic of Congo, Senegal, South Africa, Zambia and several other African countries; making him the largest cement manufacturer in Africa. Dangote Cement is now valued at \$20.5 billion, the first Nigerian company to surpass \$20 billion in market capitalization. Indeed, Dangote Cement alone currently accounts for more than one-quarter of the total market capitalization of the Nigerian Stock Exchange.


