I was very lucky. In 1994, I was diagnosed with AIDS, but that was when the new meds started to come into play. I was very, very lucky to get into those cycles. Each of those meds became available as I needed them.

When I started to feel better, I started volunteering at the task force. I went out to the schools and [taught] HIV 101 in the schools. Not many people were doing that openly at that time. It was a way to keep me active in the community. Being on disability, you don't have a lot of purpose in life. That gave me a lot of purpose.

On Sundays, staff from Prevention Point Pittsburgh offer needle exchange and other services for people who use injection drugs at Allies' offices. Those who come to receive services can also access free HIV, hepatitis C and STI testing from Allies staff at that time.



We come out of the same cultural moment. At the beginning of harm reduction, AIDS activism and harm reduction were one and the same. It was HIV motivating needle exchange.

It's very important for us for consistency. Our population doesn't always have a phone, and they know they can just show up. People definitely care about their health and are doing the best for themselves as they can at any given time. I think that really underlines why it's important not to leave people who use drugs behind. **We're all in this together.**
