FIRST AND 10

- For the fourth consecutive game, UCF will play a first-time opponent, as the Colorado Buffaloes head to Orlando this weekend. Saturday's game is slated for a 3:30 p.m. kickoff from FBC Mortgage Stadium. The game will air live on FOX with Kevin Kugler as play-by-play, Brock Huard analyst and Allison Williams sideline reporter.
- FOX also announced Sunday that its popular pregame show will be broadcasting live from UCF's campus at 10 a.m. Saturday (Memory Mall). It marks the first time in program history that the star-studded show will be broadcasting from Orlando. The two-hour pregame show will be hosted by Rob Stone and analysts Mark Ingram II, Matt Leinart, Urban Meyer and Brady Quinn along with reporters Bruce Feldman and Tom Rinaldi and wagering expert, Chris 'The Bear' Fallica.
- In its last time out, UCF rallied from a 21-point deficit to earn a 35-34 victory at TCU on Saturday, Sept. 14, to open Big 12 Conference play with a win for the first time. The 21-point comeback win is tied for the largest in program history along with the 2013 Louisville and 2021 Boise State games.
- The Knights' balanced approach against the Horned Frogs featured 289 rushing yards and 230 passing to surpass 500 yards of total offense for the third time in as many games. The Knights' high-powered offense ranks third in the country with 570.7 yards per game, the only team in the Big 12 averaging better than 500.
- UCF has now rushed for 1,127 yards with 13 touchdowns on the ground through the first three games of the season. The Knights lead the nation with 375.7 rushing yards per game, which is nearly 100 more than the next-closest Power Four Conference team (Tennessee 290.0). UCF has ranked among the nation's top 10 in rushing offense each of the past two seasons.
- UCF is the only team in the nation that has rushed for at least 140 yards in each of the last 16 games, dating back to last season. During that span, the Knights have rushed for 200 or more yards 12 times and 250 plus six times.
- After earning Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week honors on Monday, Sept. 16, UCF running back RJ Harvey was selected as the Doak Walker Award National Running Back of the Week on Tuesday, Sept. 17. Last season, Harvey was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award, presented annually to the nation's top running back, and was on the 2024 preseason watch list. Harvey's standout performance helped lead UCF to a win in its conference opener at TCU, as he rushed for 180 yards on 29 carries with two touchdowns in the Knights' 35-34 win against the Horned Frogs in Fort Worth, Texas. Orlando's Hometown Hero also scored his second career receiving touchdown to end the day with 209 all-purpose yards and three total touchdowns.
- In contrast, UCF's defense has been stout against the run, allowing just 64.0 rushing yards per game. That mark leads the Big 12 and is the fifth-fewest nationally. The Black and Gold have not allowed more than 67 rushing yards in its first three games and have not allowed a rushing touchdown, one of only seven FBS teams to accomplish the feat.
- Since the start of the 2017 season, UCF has accumulated 68 wins, the ninth-most wins by an FBS program. The Knights went 13-0 in 2017, 12-1 in 2018, 10-3 in 2019, 6-4 in the Covid-shortened 2020 season, 9-4 in 2021, 9-5 in 2022 and 6-7 last season. The Knights join Alabama, Georgia, Clemson, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Notre Dame, Michigan and Appalachian State as the only programs to win at least 67 games since 2017.
- UCF earned its 200th victory as an FBS program (since 1996) in the win against Sam Houston, as the Knights are the youngest Power Four Conference program with the University founded in 1963.

THE OPPONENT

• Colorado owns a 3-1 record heading into Saturday's Big 12 Conference matchup against UCF. The Buffaloes rallied to defeat Baylor, 38-31, on Saturday, after a last-second Hail Mary forced the game into overtime.

• Now in his second season with the program, head coach Deion Sanders has a 7-9 record at CU and a 33-15 overall record in his fifth season as a head coach. Sanders makes his return to the Sunshine State, where he was an All-American at Florida State.

• Buffs two-way player Travis Hunter was voted the Preseason Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and was recently named the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week on Monday, Sept. 16.

• Colorado is averaging 26.8 points per game, while opponents have scored 23.5 ppg. Quarterback Shedeur Sanders leads the offense passing for 335 yards per game and has thrown 11 touchdowns with only two interceptions. Hunter, who plays wide receiver and defensive back, leads the Big 12 with 9.25 receptions per game and 118 receiving yards per contest.

KNIGHT NOTES

He had seven rushes of 10 or more yards in the win, headlined by a 27-yard rushing TD in the fourth quarter, which was the longest rush for either team in the game.

Harvey has now rushed for more than 100 yards in his last five games dating back to 2023, scoring 11 TDs during that span.

HISTORIC COMEBACK

Trailing 21-7 at halftime and 28-7 following the first drive of the second half, UCF was unfazed in its win at comeback win at TCU, as the Knight chipped away at the deficit. The Knights outscored TCU 13-10 in the third quarter and 15-3 in the fourth quarter to open Big 12 play with a win.

The comeback win ties the Boise State game from 2021 and the Louisville game from 2013, head coach Gus Malzahn's first game leading the Knights, for the largest come-from-behind win in program history. In just four seasons, Malzahn has guided his teams to two of the largest comeback wins in program history.

GARNERING ATTENTION

Following UCF's 3-0 start to the season, the Knights received 35 votes in this week's American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Top 25 Poll to sit five spots shy of No. 25. Additionally, the Black and Gold earned three votes in the latest Associated Press (AP) Poll.

HUGE GAME FOR HUDSON

Wide receiver Kobe Hudson turned in one of his best games of his career in the win at TCU, as the fifth year tallied six catches for 145 yards with a pair of touchdown grabs, including the game-winner with 36 seconds remaining.

The 145 yards are just two shy of his career high 147, achieved in the Villanova win last season. For his performance, Hudson was named to the Pro Football Focus (PFF) Big 12 Team of the Week and was also tabbed the Reese's Senior Bowl Stock Up Player of the Week.

CLUTCH WHEN IT COUNTS

After helping lead UCF to a 35-34 comeback win at TCU, quarterback KJ Jefferson was selected to the Davey O'Brien Great 8 List and a Manning Award Star of the Week on Tuesday, Sept. 17. Jefferson spearheaded a second-half rally for the Knights, as the Black and Gold overcame a 21-point deficit to defeat the Horned Frogs in the Big 12 Conference opener for both teams.


Hailing from Sardis, Mississippi, Jefferson finished the game 13-of-22 for 230 yards passing with three touchdowns and contributed 46 yards rushing to end the game with 276 total yards. He was at his best in the second half, as he was 9-of-11 for 166 yards with two touchdowns.

Jefferson had a 191.9 quarterback rating for the game, connecting on nine of his last 11 passes, including his first five passes of the second half. On UCF's game-winning drive, he was 4-of-5 for 54 yards and found wide receiver Kobe Hudson across the middle on a post route to knot the score at 34-34 before Colton Boomer's extra point split the uprights to give UCF the one-point victory.

HALFTIME ADJUSTMENTS

The Knights have scored more points (55) in the third quarters of games this season than any other quarter and have held opponents to just 10 points, tied for the fewest in any quarter. The 45-point difference is also the largest delta in any quarter this year.

UCF has executed its gameplan coming out of the halftime intermission, making the necessary adjustments to continue its success.

RUNNING WILD

After ranking among the nation's top 10 in rushing offense the past two seasons, the UCF football program is poised to have another strong year on the ground in 2024. UCF has now rushed for 1,127 yards with 13 touchdowns on the ground through the first three games of the season.

The Knights lead the nation with 375.7 rushing yards per game, which is nearly 100 more than the next-closest Power Four Conference team (Tennessee 290.0). UCF has ranked among the nation's top 10 in rushing offense each of the past two seasons.

The Black and Gold rushed for 454 yards in the season opener against New Hampshire, the second most in program history. Additionally, UCF's 8.4 rushing yards per carry were the second most in a single game in program history.

The Knights were fourth nationally in rushing offense with 228.2 rushing yards per game last season. UCF rushed for 200 or more yards in nine of its 13 games in 2023 and has picked up where it left off to start the 2024 season.

ONE OF ONE

UCF is the only team in the nation that has rushed for at least 140 yards in each of the last 16 games, dating back to last season. During that span, the Knights have rushed for 200 or more yards 12 times and 250 plus six times.

HARVEY CLIMBING THE PROGRAM RECORD BOOKS

UCF running back RJ Harvey tied the program record and set a career high with four rushing touchdowns in the Knights' 45-14 victory against Sam Houston on Sept. 7 and has continued to etch his name in the Knights' record books. The Orlando native finished with 126 rushing yards on 19 carries, finding the end zone four times – the first UCF player to do so since Isaiah Bowser in 2021.

After scored two rushing touchdowns at TCU, Harvey is now tied for fourth on UCF's career list with Greg McCrae. UCF Hall of Famer Latavius Murray is third on the list with 37.

In addition, Harvey has 2,663 career rushing yards to rank fourth all-time behind Willie English with 3,131.

FAMILIAR FACES

Several UCF players will recognize one of Colorado's starting wide receivers, as Jimmy Horn Jr. attended nearby Seminole High School in Sanford, Florida, where Knight players Ja'Cari and Demari Henderson, Chasen Johnson, Kam Moore and Jordan Davis attended.

Also, Horn played in FBC Mortgage Stadium in 2021 when he was at South Florida.

UCF, CU BOULDER JOIN FORCES FOR NASA MOON MISSION

UCF and CU Boulder researchers are partners on a NASA mission to send a robotic lander and rover to a previously unexplored part of the moon. The area, known for its unusual volcanic domes, may hold clues to the history of lunar volcanic activity and offer potential resources for future space exploration.

UCF's Kerri Donaldson Hanna and Adrienne Dove (a CU Boulder alum) are leading the Lunar-VISE (Lunar Vulkan Imaging and Spectroscopy Explorer) mission, scheduled to launch in late 2028.

CU Boulder's Paul Hayne, Margaret Landis and Lena Heffern from the Laboratory for Atmospheric and Space Physics will help operate the instruments and process the science data.

THAT'S NEW

The Black and Gold's first four opponents of 2024 (New Hampshire, Sam Houston, TCU and Colorado) are all first-time opponents. Additionally, UCF head coach Gus Malzahn is also facing those four opponents for the first time in his 13-year head coaching tenure. In total, the Knights' 2024 slate features seven first-time opponents (Iowa State, Arizona and Utah).

NEW LOOK SCHEDULE

Despite being in its second year in the Big 12 Conference, UCF only plays two opponents that it played in 2023 – Cincinnati and West Virginia. That mark is tied with BYU (Kansas and Oklahoma State) for the fewest among returning Big 12 teams.

ALL OF THE NEWCOMERS

UCF is the only team in the Big 12 that will play each of the four newcomers to the league. The Knights host Colorado (Sept. 28), Arizona (Nov. 2) and Utah (Nov. 29), while traveling to Arizona State on Nov. 9.

VETERAN EXPERIENCE



The Lake Mary, Florida, native now owns three field goals of at least 50 yards in his career to tie Ed O'Brien (1984-87) for the second most in program history. Only UCF Hall of Famer ('02) Scott Ryerson has more with seven.

After a successful spring game, which featured pediatric patients from the hospital creating their own UCF helmet logos for the game, the helmets helped showcase the brave patients once again during Childhood Cancer Awareness Month as they continue in the fight for their lives. The football team donned specially designed logos on each side of their helmets.



UCF IN SEASON OPENERS

UCF now owns a 35-10 all-time mark in season openers and has won the first game of the season in each of the last nine years dating back to the 2016 season with last Thursday's victory against New Hampshire.

MALZAHN IN SEASON OPENERS

In 13 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Gus Malzahn has compiled a 12-1 record in the opening game of the year with his program. He's 4-0 as the head coach of the Knights and has won his last nine season openers dating back to the 2016 season at Auburn. His UCF teams have outscored opponents 205-50 in season openers.

OFFENSIVE GURU

Known as one of the best offensive minds in college football, not only have UCF offenses ranked among the nation's best each season under head coach Gus Malzahn, but also several of the nation's other top offenses have connections to Malzahn.

North Carolina, which ranked seventh nationally in total offense (491.2) last season, is led by offensive coordinator Chip Lindsey, who spent the 2022 season as UCF's offensive coordinator and also worked under Malzahn at Auburn. Texas State head coach GJ Kinne had the Bobcats ranked 15th in total offense last year. Kinne accepted the head coaching job after spending the 2021 season as the Knights' offensive coordinator.

SMU, which was 16th in the nation in total offense in 2023, is coached by Rhett Lashlee, who Malzahn coached at Springdale High School in Arkansas and then later hired at Auburn.

ELITE TERRITORY

UCF head coach Gus Malzahn is the only coach to ever win 100 career games as a high school coach and 100 career games at the FBS level as a collegiate head coach. Malzahn was the head coach at Hughes High School from 1992-1995, Shiloh Christian High School from 1996-2000 and Springdale High School from 2001-05 with all three located in the state of Arkansas.

Malzahn's first collegiate head coaching job was at Arkansas State in 2012, before spending the next eight seasons at Auburn and then taking

over at UCF.

UCF CONSISTENTLY AMONG NCAA STAT LEADERS

UCF finished the 2023 season ranked among the top 10 in two major offensive categories: eighth nationally in total offense (487.0 yards per game) and fourth in rushing offense (228.2).

Gus Malzahn was named the ninth head coach in UCF football history on Feb. 15, 2021. He has long been known as one of college football's great offensive innovators, and over his 18 seasons as a coordinator and head coach at the collegiate level, he has the resume to prove it.

Malzahn, now 104-54 (.658) in 13 seasons overall as a head coach, has guided his teams to eight conference championship game appearances, including a pair of SEC Championships at Auburn (2010, 2013) and a Sun Belt Championship at Arkansas State in 2012.

He was the first head coach to implement the "Hurry-Up, No Huddle" offense in the SEC at Auburn in 2009, and his offensive philosophy and strategies have since been implemented by most collegiate programs, in addition to several NFL teams.

In nine of Malzahn's 18 seasons as a head coach or coordinator, his teams have been ranked in the Top 20 in total offense and/or rushing offense, including seven seasons in the Top 10. His 2022 and 2023 UCF teams finished the season ninth and fifth, respectively, in rushing offense, including eighth overall in total offense last season. Malzahn has produced 16 1,000-yard rushers in his career, including RJ Harvey in 2023, Tre Mason (1,816) and Nick Marshall (1,068) in 2013 and Cameron-Artis Payne (1,608) in 2014. Malzahn's Auburn teams still hold SEC Championship game records for points scored (59), total offense (677 yards), rushing yards (545), individual rushing yards (304), individual rushing TDs (4), individual receiving yds (217) and largest margin of victory (39).

Malzahn's first three seasons as UCF head football coach in 2021, 2022 and 2023 have featured three consecutive postseason bowl invitations (now 12 straight for teams coached by Malzahn and eight straight for UCF), overall nine-win marks in 2021 and 2022—plus a 2022 conference title-game qualification—as his Knight teams have injected themselves onto the list of elite collegiate programs.

Malzahn, who spent one year as a head coach in the Sun Belt Conference, eight years in the high-powered Southeastern Conference and two years in the American Athletic Conference, coached his first season in the Big 12 Conference in 2023.

Highlighted by a 45-3 late-season triumph over 15th-ranked Oklahoma State, Malzahn's Knights defeated two teams that played in 2023 conference championship games—the Cowboys (Big 12) and Boise State (Mountain West). UCF's initial year in the Big 12 saw them qualify for a Gasparilla Bowl matchup with Georgia Tech.

His UCF crew in 2023 ranked among the nation's top offensive units—standing fourth in the country in rushing (233.2 yards

per game) and seventh in total offense (492.2). In addition, the Knights allowed the fewest passing yards in the Big 12—with Knight players pacing the league in receiving yards per game (Javon Baker) and tackles for loss (Tre'mon Morris-Brash). UCF also ranked sixth in the country in third-down conversions at 50 percent and 10th in yards per pass completion (14.67).

Baker and Morris-Brash received first-team All-Big 12 recognition in voting by league coaches—while senior linebacker Jason Johnson made the second team after his third straight season with 100-plus tackles and Harvey (1,296 regular-season yards and 16 rushing touchdowns) became a Doak Walker Award semifinalist.

UCF's impressive win against Big 12 runner-up Oklahoma State marked the 100th by Malzahn while coaching FBS programs—making him the first coach in college football history to win 100-plus games at both the high school level as well as while coaching at FBS institutions.

His 2022 squad produced significant regular-season victories over ranked Cincinnati and Tulane squads—followed by an appearance in the AAC Championship Game for the first time since 2018. In 2021 Malzahn's unit finished with six wins in the Knights' final seven games, a 29-17 Gasparilla Bowl triumph over Florida, a perfect 7-0 home record—and an eye-opening response to a parade of injuries to key personnel.

The Knights in 2022 excelled on both sides of the line of scrimmage. UCF finished among the national leaders on offense while also leading the nation in red-zone defense much of the season. Malzahn's team also ranked 11th in first downs, 13th in fumbles recovered to pace the league.

In 2022 UCF ranked second in the AAC in total offense and rushing. The improved Knight attack jumped 50 spots in the NCAA rankings in total offense, 19 in rushing, 34 in passing and six in scoring. The Knights also had 14 All-AAC first- or second-team selections while cornerback Davonte Brown was named the AAC Cornerback of the Year by Pro Football Network.

Malzahn's Knights began the 2021 season by recording the largest comeback victory in UCF history in a 36-31 triumph over Boise State. His first team in Orlando prospered by pulling out three other wins by four-point margins and playing six games overall decided by a touchdown or less—with two UCF defeats coming by a combined 11 points. In recognition of his efforts, Malzahn was named one of three finalists for the Steve Spurrier Award presented by the Football Writers Association of America to the best head coach in his first year at a school.

That season UCF ranked seventh nationally in team pass efficiency defense (after ranking 104th in that NCAA statistical



category the previous year), while also showing dramatic improvement in several other statistical categories:

- An upgrade of 86 slots in passing yards allowed compared to 2020, while permitting 89.1 fewer passing yards in 2021
- An improvement of 70 slots in total defense, while allowing 122.5 fewer yards per game compared to the previous season

In eight years as head football coach at Auburn, Malzahn led the Tigers to an SEC Championship, two SEC West Division titles and six New Year's Day bowl selections to go with those eight postseason appearances.

The 2013 Bear Bryant, Bobby Bowden, Eddie Robinson, Home Depot, Sporting News, SB Nation, Liberty Mutual and Associated Press National Coach of the Year, Malzahn earned SEC Coach-of-the-Year honors that season after guiding Auburn to the biggest turnaround in SEC history. He led the Tigers to a 12-2 record and one of the most memorable seasons in school history in 2013, with historic wins over Georgia and top-ranked Alabama and a record-setting SEC Championship Game win over fifth-ranked Missouri. He became just the third coach in SEC history to win an SEC title in his first year at a school.

The 34-28 victory over top-rated Alabama in 2013 came on a memorable 100-yard "Kick-6" return of a Tide missed field goal on the final play of the game. Malzahn's Tiger squads also defeated seventh-ranked Texas A&M in 2013, seventh-rated Ole Miss in 2014, second-ranked Georgia and top-rated Alabama in 2017 and fifth-ranked Alabama in 2019.

After his eight seasons at Auburn, Malzahn qualified as the second-longest tenured head coach at one school in the SEC and he remains one of only a handful of active FBS head coaches to take a team to a national championship game. During his time with the Tigers, Auburn was one of only three SEC schools to play in multiple SEC Championships games and play for a national championship.

Malzahn has produced 16 1,000-yard rushers in 18 seasons as a college coach, including Harvey in 2023 for UCF, Heisman Trophy finalist Tre Mason (1,816) and Nick Marshall (1,068) in 2013 and Cameron-Artis Payne (1,608) in 2014. Kamryn Pettway ran for 1,123 yards in 2016 (despite missing significant time with injuries) and Kerryon Johnson led the SEC with 1,320 yards in 2017.

On three occasions, Malzahn has had two 1,000-yard rushers in the same season: 2013 and 2010 (both Auburn) and 2006 (Arkansas). Malzahn has also coached five 1,000-yard receivers and three 3,000-yard passers. His 2007 Tulsa team had three 1,000-yard receivers.

During Malzahn's eight years at Auburn, the Tigers had the top rushing offense in the SEC, averaging 228.6 yards per game. In 2013, Auburn led the nation in rushing at 328.3 yards per game, the first SEC team to do so. Three of the top six team rushing totals in SEC history (2010, 2013, 2016) came under Malzahn's leadership. Auburn became just the second team in SEC history to gain more than 7,000 yards of total offense in a season in 2013, finishing the year with 7,018 yards (also Texas A&M in 2012).

The Tigers set a school record with 48 rushing TDs in 2013 and set a school record against SEC opponents with 677 yards of total offense versus Missouri in the 2013 SEC Championship Game.

Mason, the 2013 SEC Player of the Year, ranked

third in the nation with 23 TDs and sixth with 169.57 all-purpose yards per game. He also set Auburn single-season records for rushing yards and all-purpose yards (2,374).

In Malzahn's eight seasons at Auburn 32 players were selected in the National Football League Draft while 14 of his players were named All-Americans.

The Tigers faced the nation's most difficult schedule collectively during Malzahn's eight years at Auburn, facing 38 ranked opponents, including 21 in the top 10. Auburn was the nation's only program in 2016 to face both the No. 1- and No. 2-ranked programs and in 2017 it faced three of the four College Football Playoff semifinalists a total of four times, earning two wins.

Malzahn, who won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2010 while helping the Tigers to the national title, returned to Auburn after serving as the head coach at Arkansas State in 2012 when he led the program to a 9-3 regular-season mark and the Sun Belt Conference title. In that role he worked hand in hand with current UCF vice president and director of athletics Terry Mohajir who was named the Red Wolves' vice chancellor and director of athletics in the middle of that 2012 season and remained in that role until coming to UCF in early 2021.

As offensive coordinator, Malzahn made an immediate impact during his tenure at Auburn, highlighted by a record-setting offense in 2010 when the Tigers finished 14-0 and claimed the school's first national title since 1957. Malzahn's arrival in 2009 and style of offense marked a drastic turnaround from the 2008 season when Auburn struggled offensively. In a two-year period, the Tigers improved from a tie for 110th to seventh in the nation in scoring offense (from 17.3 to 41.2) and from 104th to seventh in total offense.

The 2010 Auburn offense set nine school records while leading the SEC and finishing in the top 10 nationally in six statistical categories. Malzahn coached Heisman Trophy winner Cam Newton, who had one of the best single-season performances at the position in college football history. Newton threw for 2,908 yards and 30 TDs, while rushing for 1,586 yards and 20 TDs. Newton, the number-one overall selection in the 2011 NFL Draft, also won the Davey O'Brien, Manning and Maxwell awards.

During two seasons (2007-08) as assistant head coach and co-offensive coordinator at Tulsa, Malzahn's offenses were among the nation's finest, ranking first nationally in total offense. Tulsa's offense in 2007 established nine team and 12 individual school records. The 2008 Tulsa offense averaged 569.9 yards per game and was second nationally, averaging 47.2 points per games. Malzahn in 2006 spent one season at Arkansas as offensive coordinator, coaching Heisman Trophy runner-up Darren McFadden and helping the SEC West champion Razorbacks finish fourth nationally in rushing.

Malzahn's coaching career began in his home state of Arkansas at the high school level. In 14 seasons as a high school head coach, Malzahn led seven teams to the state championship game and won three titles. In July 2013, he was inducted into the Arkansas High School Sports Hall of Fame. After one year as defensive coordinator in 1991 he spent four years (1992-95) as head coach at Hughes (Arkansas) High School, five years in 1996-2000 as head coach at Shiloh (Arkansas) High School and five years (2001-05) as head coach at Springdale

PRODUCTIVE OFFENSES

Gus Malzahn was responsible for two of the four most productive offenses in SEC history: Auburn in 2013 (7,018 yards of total offense and Auburn in 2010 (6,989 yards of total offense).

50-POINT GAMES

Since the year 2000, in the eight years Malzahn was at Auburn, the Tigers posted 25 50-point games. In the 10 seasons without Malzahn, Auburn recorded just seven 50-point games. The Tigers recorded three 50-point games in a season four times with Malzahn as head coach (2013, 2016, 2018, 2019)

MALZAHN AT HOME

Malzahn now holds a record of 62-16 (.795) at home as a collegiate head coach. He was 5-1 in 2012 at Arkansas State, at Auburn went 8-0 in 2013, 6-1 in 2014, 3-4 in 2015, 6-2 in 2016, 7-0 in 2017, 5-2 in 2018, 6-1 in 2019 and 4-1 in 2020, finished 2021 with UCF 7-0, 5-2 in 2022, 4-2 in 2023 and 2-0 this season. He started his tenure at Auburn with 13 consecutive home victories.

NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Gus Malzahn earned multiple national coach of the year awards in 2013, including the Eddie Robinson Award, the Bobby Bowden Award, and the Bear Bryant Award, as well as national coach of the year honors from Home Depot, the Associated Press, Liberty Mutual, Sporting News, SB Nation, and USSA Amos Alonzo Stagg.

His overall record as a high school head coach was 144-36-1 (.798). He won two Arkansas 2A titles at Shiloh Christian (15-0 in both 1998 and 1999) and one 5A crown at Springdale (14-0 in 2005).

Born in Irving, Texas, Malzahn graduated from high school in Fort Smith, Arkansas, and played football at Arkansas (wide receiver in 1984-85) and Henderson State (receiver and punter in 1988-89), earning his bachelor's degree from Henderson State in 1990. As a player he helped the Razorbacks to the 1984 Liberty Bowl and the 1985 Holiday Bowl (a win over Arizona State).

Malzahn and his wife Kristi (Otwell) are parents of two daughters, Kylie (Collin) Peek and Kenzie (Charl) Stander.

ORLANDO – After ranking among the nation’s top 10 in rushing offense the past two seasons, the UCF football program is poised to have another strong year on the ground in 2024. The Knights rushed for 454 yards, the second most in program history, Thursday night en route to a 57-3 victory against New Hampshire in the season opener at FBC Mortgage Stadium.

Additionally, UCF’s 8.4 rushing yards per carry are the second most in a single game in program history. The Black and Gold had eight different players carry the football in the contest with five Knights rushing for at least 40 yards. UCF had 14 rushes of 10 yards or more, headlined by a 60-yard rush from running back RJ Harvey.

“I’m proud of our team,” said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. “Taking care of business with a convincing win. Looking at the game, I just told the players the thing that stood out to me is only three penalties. We’ve been really focused on not beating ourselves.

“Defensively, we played a big-time game. I think [Deshawn] Pace’s Interception, that was the one that really turned the game into being able to breathe a little bit. [Ladarius] Tennison had the block punt right there. I mean, he was one of the better special teams players in college football last year, and it showed. Xavier Townsend was big time in the return game.”

In addition to the offense, the Knights’ defense was stellar throughout the contest limiting the Wildcats to just nine first downs. UCF’s aggressive defense forced two interceptions, as linebacker Deshawn Pace swung the momentum in the Knights’ favor early in the second quarter when he jumped in front of Seth Morgan’s pass for his sixth career pick.

Following a pair of Colton Boomer field goals in the first half, Pace nearly recorded a pick six as he was knocked out of bounds at the three-yard line after a 37-yard return. One play later, quarterback KJ Jefferson found the end zone for the Knights’ first touchdown of the season to give UCF a 13-0 lead.

Tabbed as one of the top special teams players in the country by College Football Network last season, Ladarius Tennison raced through the middle of the UNH punt unit to block the attempt and it was recovered by the Wildcats in the endzone for a safety.

From there, the Black and Gold scored 23 points in the second quarter to own a 29-3 lead at halftime behind a pair of rushing TDs from Harvey. The 2024 Doak Walker Award Preseason Watch List selection surpassed 100 yards rushing for the third consecutive game dating back to last season and the ninth time in his career. The Orlando native finished with 11 carries for 142 yards, averaging 12.9 yards per rush – second most by an individual in program history.

Following the intermission, UCF forced four consecutive punts to pull away from the Wildcats with 28 points in the third quarter. Making his debut in the Black and Gold, Myles Montgomery notched his first career receiving touchdown on a 49-yard catch from KJ Jefferson. His backfield mate, Peny Boone found the endzone a few minutes with a 59-yard scamper to push the Knights’ advantage to 43-3.

Boone had seven rushes for 81 yards and Montgomery logged 77 yards on eight rushes. Johnny Richardson pitched in with 40 rushing yards and a 22-yard touchdown reception.

Sophomore Antione Jackson came up with the Knights’ second interception of the day and Montgomery quickly turned it into six points for UCF, scoring from 25 yards out. It marked the first time he’s scored a touchdown on the ground and receiving in the same game in his career. Pace led the defense with five tackles, including three solo, while Braeden Marshall had a great game with four tackles, including two tackles for loss and a pass breakup. Mac McWilliams notched four tackles with a TFL.

ORLANDO – Saturday’s game was delayed 30 minutes due to lightning in the area, but that didn’t have any impact on a hot start for UCF, as the Knights scored on six of their first seven drives to earn a 45-14 victory against Sam Houston at FBC Mortgage Stadium.

For the second consecutive game, the Black and Gold compiled more than 550 yards of total offense, including 384 rushing yards. Defensively, UCF forced two turnovers and held Sam Houston to just 67 rushing yards.

“I’m real proud of our team, we earned a convincing win against a quality opponent,” said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. “They’ve got good players and that’s a Hall of Fame Coach. He’s won two national championships. It was a good measuring stick for our guys.”

UCF has now opened the season with a 2-0 record in three of Malzahn’s four seasons in Orlando. Saturday’s game also marked the 200th FBS win for the Knights as a program since making the transition from FCS in 1996.

Knights running back RJ Harvey tied the program record and set a career high with four rushing touchdowns, while surpassing 100 yards rushing for the 10th time in his career. The Orlando native finished with 126 rushing yards on 19 carries, finding the end zone four times – the first player to do so since Isaiah Bowser in 2021.

The preseason Doak Walker Award Watch List honoree recorded the first two touchdowns of the game, scoring from 19 yards out and on a two-yard rush to cap 80-yard and 76-yard drives, respectively.

“It feels great to score four times,” said Harvey. “All praise goes to the offensive line. Without them, that wouldn’t have been possible. So, I’m just super blessed for them to have done their job tonight to allow me to have success.”

For the third time in his career, UCF kicker Colton Boomer booted a 50-yard field goal as he split the uprights to extend the Knights’ early advantage to 17-0 in the second quarter. The Lake Mary native had a pair of 50-yarders in the Boise State game last season, including the game-winner.

KJ Jefferson led the offense from his quarterback position, going 12-for-15 passing for 169 yards. He also rushed for 50 yards on nine attempts. Wide receiver Kobe Hudson reeled in 104 of those, eclipsing the 100-yard receiving mark for the sixth time in his career.

Defensively, the Black and Gold were dominant throughout the game, limiting the Bearkats to 118 yards and just 16 rushing at halftime. In comparison, UCF had already rushed for 243 yards and Harvey accounted for 115 yards on 16 carries with three rushing touchdowns in the first 30 minutes.

The Knights tallied two interceptions for the second straight game, as Mac McWilliams and Sheldon Arnold each came down with their first interceptions in a UCF uniform.

Quadric Bullard, Nyjalik Kelly and Xe’ree Alexander led the defensive effort each with six tackles. Kelly notched the Knights’ first sack of the season, forced a fumble and had a pass breakup.

UCF returns to action next weekend when the Knights travel to TCU to open Big 12 Conference play. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. ET on FOX from Amon G. Carter Stadium.

FORT WORTH, Texas – Winning is an attitude.

That's the motto for UCF's athletics teams this season coined by vice president and director of athletics Terry Mohajir and the football team epitomized that mindset Saturday evening, rallying from a 21-point deficit to earn a 35-34 win against TCU in its Big 12 Conference opener at Amon G. Carter Stadium.

Trailing 21-7 at halftime and 28-7 following the first drive of the second half, the Knights regrouped and were the better team for the remainder of the contest. UCF (3-0, 1-0 Big 12) outscored TCU (2-1, 0-1) 13-10 in the third quarter and 15-3 in the fourth quarter to open Big 12 play with a win.

With 3:14 seconds left on the clock, the Black and Gold put together a 10-play, 72-yard drive to score the game-winner with 36 seconds remaining in the contest. On a first and 10 play from the 20-yard line, quarterback KJ Jefferson found wide receiver Kobe Hudson across the middle on a post route to knot the score at 34-34 and Colton Boomer's extra point split the uprights to give UCF the one-point victory.

The 21-point comeback win ties the Boise State game from 2021, head coach Gus Malzahn's first game leading the Knights, for the largest come-from-behind win in program history. It marked the largest blown lead in a loss for TCU at Amon G. Carter Stadium since joining the Big 12.

"I'm extremely proud of our team," said Malzahn. "They're a really good team and very well-coached. We simplified things on offense in the second half, making a commitment to running it downhill and it opened up the pass.

"Our guys found a way to win the game, we overcame. There are a lot of areas that we need to improve on, but I think we have the makings of a good team, finding a way to win on the road."

It was a tale of two halves for the Knights, scoring 28 points in the second half as opposed to seven in the first half. Four of UCF's five drives following the intermission ended in a touchdown.

Jefferson was 9-of-11 for 166 yards with two touchdowns in the second half and the Black and Gold ran for another 144 yards to compile 310 yards in the last two quarters. The Sardis, Mississippi, native finished the game 13-of-22 for 230 yards with three touchdowns and he rushed nine times for 46 yards.

Hudson accounted for 145 of Jefferson's passing yards, as the fifth-year senior reeled in six passes and found the end zone twice, including the game-winning score late in the fourth quarter. It marked the second consecutive game and seventh in his career surpassing 100 yards receiving.

One of the nation's most talented running backs, RJ Harvey continued his scorching hot start to the season rushing for 180 yards on 29 carries with two touchdowns on the ground. The Hometown Hero also scored his second career receiving touchdown to end the day with 209 all-purpose yards and three total touchdowns. Harvey has now rushed for more than 100 yards in his last five games dating back to 2023, scoring 11 TDs during that span.

Defensively, linebacker Deshawn Pace was all over the field to lead the Knights with 11 tackles, including eight solo, to finish one shy of matching his career high. He had two big stops on TCU's second to last drive, which resulted in a punt to give UCF the ball back with 3:14 remaining.

The Knights' defense limited the Horned Frogs to just 58 yards rushing, but they threw for 402 yards. UCF's approach was balanced with 289 yards rushing and 230 passing yards.
