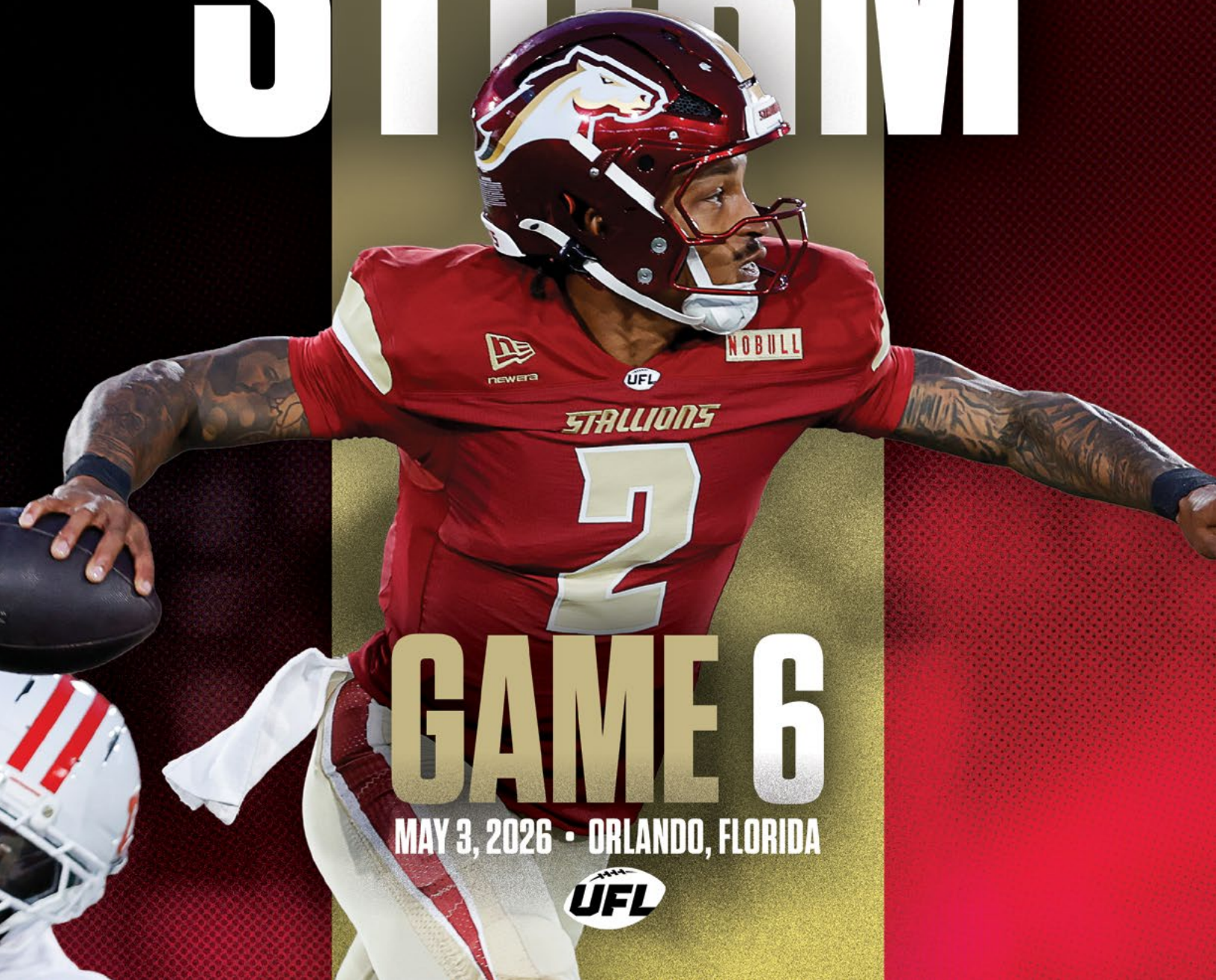

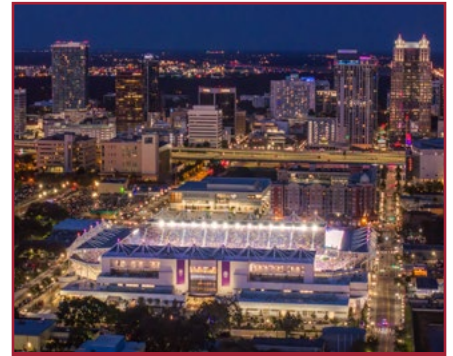

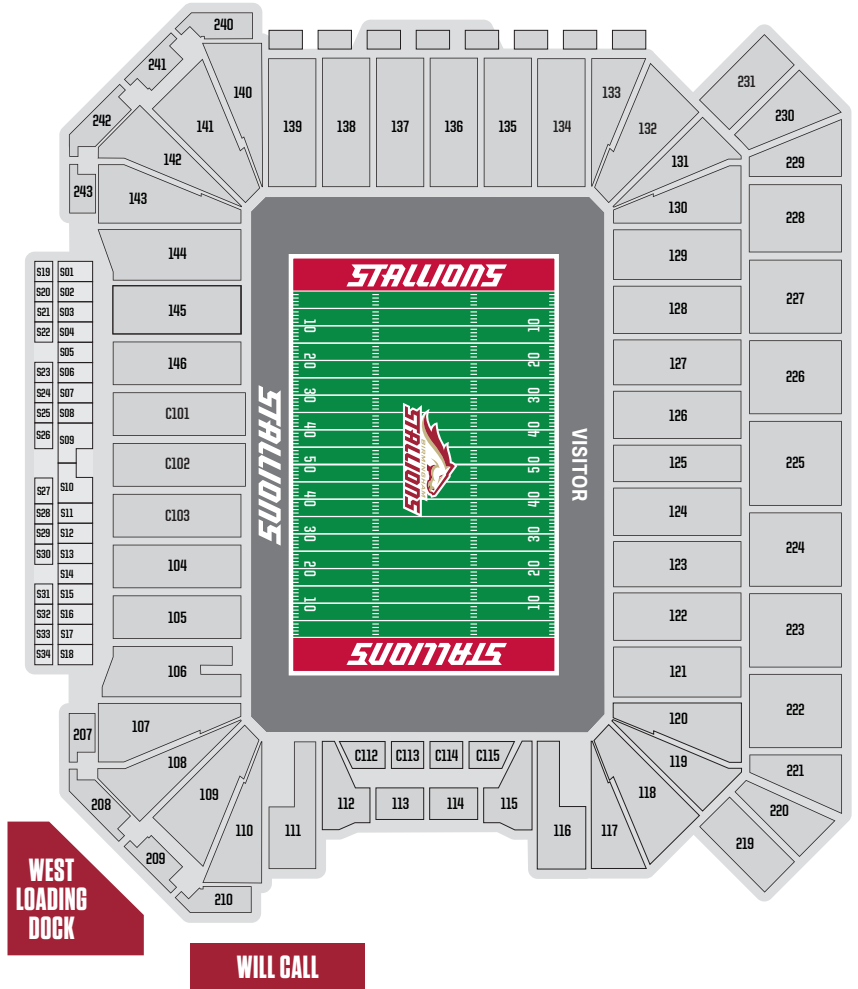

PROTECTIVE STADIUM MEDIA WORK AREAS

Media Entrance: All media must pick up their credentials at will call located on the south west corner of the stadium, then enter west loading dock. Protective Stadium event staff will ensure that you enter the stadium at the correct entrance. Once in the stadium, you can take the stairs or elevator to floor six (press level). The press box for the print media is located in the last room at the end of the hallway on the sixth floor.

Broadcast Booth: The broadcast booth is located on the sixth floor (press level), near the press box.

Digital Media Work Room: Photographers and videographers have access to the main press conference room and the media auxiliary room on the ground floor. The press conference room is near the east tunnel, across from the visitor's locker room. The auxiliary room is between the press conference and visitor's locker rooms. Credentialed media members with field access must pick up and wear vests while working at Protective Stadium. Vests must be returned to the press conference room at the end of the game. Any unreturned vests will result in the revoking of any future Stallions credentials.

Limited parking for credentialed media members is available in the Red Lot (see map) adjacent to the Westin Hotel in Uptown. Parking is very limited and not always available.

THREE STALLIONS TO WATCH ON OFFENSE

Dorian Thompson-Robinson: It wasn't flawless but the former Cleveland Browns quarterback put together an impressive debut for the Stallions. The 6-foot-1, 206-pound UCLA product was 28-for-43 passing for 313 yards with two touchdowns and a pair of interceptions in the 45-28 loss to the DC Defenders. He also rushed for 43 yards on four carries and scored on a 12-yard touchdown run. It was his first start in the UFL. Now he turns his attention toward his former team. Thompson-Robinson served as the Orlando Storm backup for the first four weeks before getting traded to the Stallions for quarterback Matt Corral and defensive end Armani Bledsoe.

Tyrion Davis-Price: The 6-foot, 219-pound running back from LSU flashed during his limited opportunity in the loss to DC. Davis-Price stepped in with Anthony McFarland Jr. sidelined and had one carry for seven yards and three catches for 30 yards. His role could grow as the season continues. On the season, Davis-Price had 27 yards on 10 carries and seven catches for 58 yards. Davis-Price was a third-round pick by the San Francisco 49ers in the 2022 NFL Draft, and he won a Super Bowl ring with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Daewood Davis: Injury slowed Davis early in the season but he showed last week that he is ready to play the role expected of him after signing with the Stallions. Davis had three catches for 57 yards, including a 41-yard reception that set up a Stallions touchdown on the opening drive of the second half in the loss to DC. The 6-foot, 196-pound Davis had two catches for 10 yards prior to last week's game. He is ready to play a bigger role alongside Jaydon Mickens and Deon Cain and the rest of a loaded wide receiver group. The former All-UFL wide receiver for the Memphis Showboats set an UFL record last season for the longest TD reception with his 82-yard catch against the Panthers.

THREE STALLIONS TO WATCH ON DEFENSE

Kobe Jones: The 6-foot-3, 259-pound outside linebacker from Mississippi State has made an impact thus far while playing in all five games. He has 16 tackles, two tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks. Jones had six tackles, one tackle for loss and one of the team's two sacks last week against Orlando. He is an important part of the equation to replace the edge production of Armani Bledsoe, who is now with the Orlando Storm. Jones has been part of six NFL organizations but his lone regular season experience came with the Green Bay Packers. He had 27 tackles, six tackles for loss, three sacks, one pass breakup, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries while playing with the San Antonio Brahmas in the UFL last season.

JoJo Tillery: The Stallions veteran played a limited role at safety to this point of the season. He was active in last week's game against Orlando, contributing

five tackles and just missing an end zone interception. Despite fighting injuries every season, the 5-foot-11, 206-pound former Furman safety has been a standout for the Stallions since they returned to the field in 2022. His spring league numbers, which include two seasons in the UFL, include 135 tackles and a pair of interceptions. He had 12 tackles and a strip sack in the 2023 USFL Championship game win over the Pittsburgh Maulers.

Tae Crowder: Returned to the field last week after sitting out in the loss to Orlando the previous week. It wasn't surprising that he led the team with 10 tackles in his return. Crowder is one of the most active linebackers in the UFL. Despite missing a game, Crowder leads the Stallions with 38 tackles, which is two more than fellow linebacker Kyahva Tezino has in five games. The 6-foot-1, 236-pound Crowder was the final pick of the 2020 NFL Draft and spent his first three NFL seasons with the New York Giants.

AVENGING REGULAR SEASON LOSSES

The Stallions have the chance to get some revenge from two of the team's four losses thus far, beginning on Sunday in Orlando. The Storm shut out the Stallions 16-0 on April 18 at Protective Stadium. The other shot at some revenge comes on May 30 when the Stallions play host to a Houston Gamblers team that beat the Stallions, 22-20, in the second game of the season. The Stallions' losses to the St. Louis Battlehawks and DC Defenders came against teams that they don't play again in the regular season. Birmingham lost just seven regular season games in the four seasons prior to 2026. The Stallions were able to avenge four of those losses that same season.

2022: Lost to the Houston Gamblers, 17-15, on June 11. The Stallions didn't get a shot at revenge but did beat the Gamblers, 33-28, earlier that season.

2023: Lost to the New Orleans Breakers, 45-31, on April 29. The Stallions actually got a double shot of revenge for this one, beginning with a 24-20 regular season win over the Breakers nearly a month later in the regular season. The teams met again in the South Division playoff semifinals and the Stallions whipped the Breakers, 47-22.

Lost to the Houston Gamblers, 27-20, on May 13. The Stallions came back nearly a month later and beat the Gamblers, 38-15, in a game played in Memphis.

2024: Lost to the San Antonio Brahmas, 18-9, on May 25. The Stallions met San Antonio in the UFL Championship Game and won 25-0.

2025: Lost to the DC Defenders, 18-11, and the St. Louis Battlehawks, 29-28, but did not get a chance at a rematch. Lost to the Memphis Showboats, 24-20, in overtime. The Stallions came back to rout the Showboats, 46-9, in the regular season finale.

STALLIONS WEEK 1 REVIEW - STALLIONS 15, KINGS 13

CORRAL LEADS GAME-WINNING DRIVE, STALLIONS DETHRONE KINGS IN SEASON OPENER

Matt Corral put together his most impressive drive late in the fourth quarter leading the Stallions to victory in front of a sell-out crowd in Louisville's franchise opener. Birmingham's defense additionally shined, forcing three turnovers, including the game-sealing interception, to lock up their first win of the season.

The vibes were at an all-time high at Lynn Family Field in the first-ever Louisville Kings football game. However, Birmingham stole the spotlight using a game-winning drive to down Louisville, as head coach AJ McCarron's fourth quarter game management stood out as an x-factor.

Birmingham's defense created chaos from the opening kick, taking advantage of a juggled ball for an interception in Louisville's first possession. Dyontae Johnson swallowed up the tipped ball and recorded the season's first takeaway. The Stallions capitalized with a 43-yard drive capped by a Snoop Conner five-yard rushing touchdown. Jaydon Mickens had the highlight of the drive, reeling in a 28-yard reception from Matt Corral. The Stallions failed to convert the point after, so the score remained 6-0.

Jason Bean wiped away the first-drive blemish and put together a remarkable second drive, connecting with Lucky Jackson four times for a total of 50 yards and punched in the first touchdown in Louisville Kings history, giving Louisville their first-ever lead at 7-6.

The Stallions responded and took the lead on a 31-yard field goal from Jonathan Garibay. Corral led a 13-play, 66-yard drive with the help of veteran Jaydon Mickens, who reeled in two critical first-down pickups. A 19-yard rush from Conner set Garibay up to give Birmingham a 9-7 lead.

As the half wound down, Louisville was developing its most efficient drive of the game. Whether it was Bean through the air or on the ground, he produced for the Kings, running for 27 of Louisville's 42 rushing yards in the first half. On fourth down, he connected with Isaiah Winstead for 25 yards to extend the drive. However, Kyahva Tezino punched the ball loose from Ian Wheeler at the goal line, forcing Birmingham's second turnover of the half and keeping the Stallions in the lead heading into halftime.

Birmingham began with the ball out of the half, but the offense remained out of sync. On third and long, Eric Garror delivered a massive blow to Corral, forcing

the ball loose, and Louisville took over shortly after.

Bean came out firing on his first drive of the half, quickly delivering a 44-yard pass to Tarik Black. Tanner Brown capitalized with a 37-yard field goal to restore Louisville's lead, 10-9.

As the game progressed, the Stallions were lifted by their third-down efficiency, finishing 10-for-16. Jaydon Mickens' number was called repeatedly in those moments, and he delivered. Corral connected with him on back-to-back third downs, but Louisville's defense responded, as Cameron Dantzler and Deantre Prince combined for key stops to earn the Kings the ball back with the lead.

The Kings' first fourth-quarter drive began with a huge catch-and-run from Isaiah Winstead, who reached over a defender and broke free for 35 yards. Jackson added a 21-yard reception, and Louisville was in position to extend its lead.

On fourth-and-goal from the three-yard line, head coach Chris Redman elected to take the points. Brown split the uprights, extending the Louisville lead to 13-9.

With under nine minutes remaining, Matt Corral came through in the clutch. He led a 13-play, 66-yard drive and found the end zone with under two minutes remaining. Corral and the Stallions ran a perfectly executed run-pass option, and he found Justyn Ross wide open for the game-winning score, his first-ever UFL touchdown. It was a defining sequence for Corral, head coach AJ McCarron, and offensive coordinator Tyler Siskey.

Things got interesting after Garibay failed to convert the point after, leaving Birmingham with a narrow 15-13 lead.

With the game on the line, Bean aired out an ill-advised throw downfield that was intercepted by Hudson Clark to seal the deal. It marked the third turnover of the game for Louisville, ultimately telling the story in the season opener.

Despite the loss, Jason Bean posted a strong performance in his Kings debut, totaling 247 yards. However, the difference-maker was Jaydon Mickens, who finished with nine receptions for 103 yards. And, Corral completed 70 percent of his passes for 208 yards.

The win marks the first of AJ McCarron's head coaching career, a milestone moment in his debut on the sideline.

STALLIONS WEEK 2 REVIEW - GAMBLERS 22, STALLIONS 20

STALLIONS FALL IN FINAL SECONDS TO DROP TO 1-1

Houston Gamblers kicker John Hoyland capped off a five-field goal night with a successful 50-yarder that provided the winning points in a 22-20 UFL victory over the Birmingham Stallions on Sunday at Shell Energy Stadium. For the Stallions, it was a particularly frustrating ending after failing to get off the field when they had the opportunity on the final drive.

“Tough loss,” Stallions head coach AJ McCarron said after his team fell to 1-1 on the season. “Too many self-inflicted wounds. (Quarterback Matt Corral) knows he’s got to take care of the ball, we can’t hurt ourselves. And then penalties on our part when it comes to critical times. We stop them on fourth (down), it would have been a holding and then we get a horse collar over there. Then the pass interference that they challenged on (Steven Gilmore). It’s on us, we got to clean those up.”

The game-winning drive came after the Stallions strung together a clutch drive that ended with a 1-yard touchdown run by Anthony McFarland with 2:02 left in the game to give Birmingham a 20-19 lead. The 59-yard drive featured 51 yards passing by Corral on four completions. The touchdown was set up on a pass interference call in the end zone to place the ball at the 1-yard line. The Stallions attempted a two-point conversion pass but it sailed wide, leaving Birmingham with the one-point lead.

Houston’s ensuing possession looked to be over after four plays when quarterback Nolan Henderson threw an incompleteness on 4th-and-6. However, the play was negated by a holding call on Houston and a horse collar penalty on Stallions linebacker Dyontae Johnson as Henderson was throwing the pass. Henderson ran for 14 yards on the following play but the play was overturned by a successful challenge from McCarron on a holding call forced by Stallions defensive lineman Amani Bledsoe. That set up a 4th-and-16 and Houston converted on a 29-yard pass from Henderson to Armani Rogers, giving the Gamblers a first down at the Stallions 47-yard line.

Once again, the Stallions forced another fourth down and they appeared to get off the field by forcing an incompleteness. But Houston head coach Kevin Sumlin challenged that Gilmore interfered on the play. Sumlin won the challenge and the Gamblers (1-1) had a first down at the Stallions 38-yard line. After a 6-yard run, Hoyland came on to win the game.

It was an up-and-down game for Corral. The Stallions quarterback was 21-of-27 for 226 yards with touchdown passes to Deon Cain and Jaydon Mickens, but also threw two key INTs. Cain, Mickens and Justyn Ross had five catches each.

Linebacker Tae Crowder led the defense with 11 tackles, Alex Cook had nine tackles, one tackle for loss and one pass breakup, Kyahva Tezino had seven tackles and forced a fumble in the red zone for the second consecutive game and Tre Norwood had eight tackles and the fumble recovery.

Notes

- The Stallions forced a turnover on the opening series for the second consecutive game. It was also the second game in a row that Kyahva Tezino forced a red zone fumble that was recovered by a teammate. This time it was Tezino ending a promising opening drive for Houston by popping the ball free. Tre Norwood recovered at the Stallions 4-yard line.
- The Stallions are 2-for-5 on fourth down plays over the first two weeks. The Stallions were 1-for-2 on fourth down on Sunday.
- Matt Corral’s first interception of the season came with 13:03 left in the second quarter. Kerry Vincent intercepted Corral’s pass, marking the Stallions first giveaway of the season.
- Matt Corral has more passing yards (433) in the first two games than any Birmingham quarterback since the Stallions began play in the spring league in 2022. J’Mar Smith had the previous high with 385 yards in the first two games of the 2022 season.
- Starting tackle Armani Taylor-Pringleau was hurt on the Stallions first drive of the game and did not return to the game. Taylor-Pringleau suffered a concussion. Noah Henderson took over at left tackle.



STALLIONS WEEK 3 REVIEW - BATTLEHAWKS 34, STALLIONS 30

ST. LOUIS MAKES DRAMATIC FOURTH QUARTER COMEBACK TO DOWN STALLIONS IN THRILLER

The Birmingham Stallions saw a 10-point fourth quarter lead slip away in yet another heartbreaking loss early in the UFL season. This time the winning touchdown came with less than two minutes left in what was ultimately a 34-30 victory for the St. Louis Battlehawks over the Stallions on Sunday afternoon at The Dome at America's Center.

"I thought the guys fought hard," said Stallions head coach AJ McCarron after his team fell to 1-2 on the season. "I thought we did a better job of not hurting ourselves defensively with penalties and extending drives. But, still, 8 for 77 yards is too many. Two weeks in a row we've lost the penalty battle. And then it's plain and simple, you can't turn the ball over."

Just like last week, in a 22-20 loss at Houston Gamblers, the Stallions put themselves in position to win the game. But, again just like last week, it was a backup quarterback leading the way on a game-winning drive. This time it was Harrison Frost, who had not played in the first two weeks, providing the game-winning points by connecting with Tyler Neville on a 12-yard scoring pass with 1:52 left in the game to give the Battlehawks their first lead since 11:22 left in the second half.

Birmingham's final opportunity began with a 22-yard pass from Matt Corral to Jaydon Mickens that put the ball at the Stallions 49-yard line. After three consecutive incompletions, Birmingham needed 10 yards to extend the possession. Deon Cain looked to have separation on a stop pattern just pass the first down marker but former Stallions cornerback Nevelle Clark got a nice break on the ball throw by Corral and knocked it down with his left hand. It was the end to an up-and-down day for Corral, who was 16-of-33 for 252 yards.

"I'm not going to lie, that was the look we wanted," said Cain, who had three catches for 116 yards, including a 67-yard touchdown. "Hats off to Nevelle Clark, he just made a great play."

The incompleting was a frustrating end to a game that would have been even more frustrating throughout if it wasn't for the play of the defense over the first three quarters. It was the defense that stepped up and made big plays in a first half that included three Stallions turnovers that led directly to ten Battlehawk points. But the Stallions allowed just 13 first half points, partly thanks to an interception by Tae Crowder and a goal line stand that featured

a fourth down tackle by Crowder. Crowder's interception and 35-yard return also set up Birmingham's lone touchdown of the first half. On the following play, Corral hit Jordan Thomas on a deep pass and the big tight end worked his way into the end zone. At halftime, the Battlehawks led 13-7.

The Stallions opened the second half with a seven-play drive culminating with a 34-yard field goal by Jonathan Garibay. Then the defense took over. Cornerback Mario Goodrich stepped in front of a Frost pass on the first play of the next possession and returned his interception 40 yards for a touchdown. Garibay missed the extra point but the Stallions still led 16-13.

Safety Lukas Denis then came up with another interception on the third play of the next possession to give the Stallions the ball back at the Battlehawks' 41-yard line. Six plays later, Anthony McFarland bulled in his way from a yard out. His touchdown came after his 17-yard run gave the Stallions a first down. McFarland fumbled on the play but the ball rolled out of the end zone. By rule, the ball came back to the 1-yard line with the Stallions still in possession. McFarland scored on the next play and Garibay followed the touchdown with an extra point to build the advantage to 23-13.

St. Louis cut into the deficit with a 2-yard TD pass from Frost to Steven McBride early in the fourth quarter. But the Stallions countered quickly when Cain and Corral combined on 67-yard touchdown to once again build the lead back to 10 points with 12:23 left. That lead lasted for less than a minute before Hakeem Butler got loose on the sideline with a double move and grabbed a 64-yard touchdown pass from Frost.

"We just got beat on a double move," McCarron said. "We just relayed to them that they're going to come out and do double moves because we just got two interceptions by making good breaks on the ball and jumping it."

The Battlehawks then won it with the late touchdown drive that culminated with Harrison Frost and Tyler Neville connecting on an 11-yard touchdown pass. Tucker McCann's extra point gave St. Louis the 34-30 lead.

"Listen, we're 1-2, it is what it is," McCarron said. "But five of our last seven are at home. We just got to control what we can control and that's watching this film and moving on to Orlando."

STALLIONS WEEK 4 REVIEW - STORM 16, STALLIONS 0

STORM HOLD STALLIONS SCORELESS FOR FIRST SHUTOUT IN FRANCHISE HISTORY

Despite a record crowd for a UFL game in Birmingham, the Stallions made some unwanted history on Saturday afternoon in a 16-0 UFL loss to the Orlando Storm in the Stallions home opener at Protective Stadium. Saturday's loss marked the first time that a UFL team was shut out in the regular season.

A frustrated and angry Birmingham coach AJ McCarron left no doubt about his feelings in the postgame press conference.

"I'll keep it short and sweet," McCarron said after his team fell to 1-3 overall. "Embarrassing. Simple as that."

A couple of minutes later, he elaborated after asking about the crowd on an afternoon when there were 18,340 fans in the stand.

"Yeah, I'm sorry," McCarron said. "It won't happen again. Listen, I come from this state. I know what football means. That's why I said embarrassing. I don't think I've ever been shut out in my life. So it's all me. I'm the head coach. But I appreciate everybody. It truly means a lot, coming out the way we did as a state, not just Birmingham, but there's people from all over. And it's very much appreciated. We'll get this thing going in the right way."

The problem on Saturday stemmed from the quarterback position, according to McCarron. Birmingham starter Matt Corral was 13-for-20 for 83 yards before being pulled with 6:37 left in the third quarter. Michael Hiers got his first UFL action and was 7-for-15 for 60 yards. Neither one threw an interception, partly because Orlando defenders dropped several wayward passes.

The Stallions managed just 166 yards and were a combined 3-for-18 on conversion downs. They were 1-for-13 on third down.

"Well, yeah, I mean, you're third and manageable, just trying to think back on multiple times, you get false start penalties," McCarron said. "Attention to detail. And then we're passing up open receivers to try to throw it to somebody else. I can't tell you why. So we got to be better on third down. There'll be a long staff meet tomorrow to go through this."

The first half ended with the Storm holding a 13-0 lead. The lone touchdown came on a 3-yard pass from Jack Plummer to Cam Camper. It came at the end of a 13-play, 66-yard drive that featured four third down conversions, including the touchdown play. The other points came on field goals of 19 and 46 yards by Michael Lantz. The second field goal came with two seconds left in the half and was six plays after Anders Carlson missed a 46-yard field goal attempt.

The Stallions regrouped at halftime but continued to struggle offensively. It would have been more lopsided without a strong effort from the defense, particularly in the red zone, to keep the Stallions in the game. Kyahva Tezino had a team-high 12 tackles and Izayah Green-May had a pair of sacks. "I have zero issues with the defense whatsoever," McCarron said. "I thought they played their tails off, and I was super proud of them."



STALLIONS WEEK 5 REVIEW - DEFENDERS 45, STALLIONS 28

OFFENSIVE IMPROVEMENT OVERSHADOWED AS DEFENDERS RUN AWAY FROM STALLIONS

DC stayed red hot in Birmingham, once again showcasing their nuclear offense en route to a fourth consecutive victory. Jordan Ta'amu delivered another masterclass, posting a 150.6 quarterback rating with 275 yards, four touchdowns, and zero turnovers as the Defenders piled up 395 total yards.

DC received the ball first and immediately flipped the field. Erik Ezukanma sparked the momentum with a 68-yard kick return to set up the offense in prime position. Ta'amu wasted no time capitalizing, dropping a perfect ball to Javon Antonio in the back corner of the end zone for a 13-yard score. It marked Antonio's first reception of the season and capped a quick opening drive.

Then, the Dorian Thompson-Robinson era officially began in Birmingham. DTR moved the ball quickly, leaning on his legs with back-to-back first down runs to push the Stallions into the red zone. But DC's ballhawking defense struck. Bryce Thompson got a hand on a pass at the line, and Deontay Anderson came down with a diving interception, just the beginning of a big night for DC's defensive unit.

Birmingham's defense responded by flipping field position, as TJ Carter sacked Ta'amu at the one-yard line. The Stallions took over at the DC 24 and capitalized just four plays later. DTR fired a hitch to Deon Cain, who turned the corner, delivered a stiff arm, and walked into the end zone for his third touchdown of the season, injecting life into the Stallions.

They got another chance after Matt McCrane misfired from 62 yards out, a mark that would've broken his own UFL season-long, but couldn't capitalize and handed the ball right back.

However, on 4th-and-21, Joe Wallace got home with a sack on DTR, setting up the Defenders at the Birmingham 33. This time, Ta'amu and the offense cashed in. After a quick connection with Briley Moore and a 13-yard scramble by Ta'amu, Xazavian Valladay punched it in from two yards out to extend the lead to 14-6. The Defenders defense struck again on the next drive. Gabe Taylor chased down Jaydon Mickens from behind and punched the ball loose, with Micah Baskerville jumping on it to give DC possession.

Offensive coordinator Fred Kaiss then reached deep into his bag of tricks, calling a triple option with a pass element. Ta'amu kept it and flipped it outside to Ty Scott, who followed a key block from Cornell Powell and raced 45 yards

down the sideline for the score, pushing the lead to 21-6.

Despite the deficit, Birmingham responded before the half. DTR led an 11-play, 80-yard drive in under four minutes, highlighted by a 29-yard strike to Tyrion Davis-Price. He later found Mickens to set up a one-yard touchdown catch by Jordan Thomas, trimming the lead to 21-13.

DC had one last chance before halftime, and Ta'amu nearly made it count. Starting at their own 40 with 24 seconds left, he connected with Ezukanma for 42 yards, his third completion of 40+ yards in the half. But a rare miss from McCrane from 36 yards kept the score at 21-13 at the break.

The Stallions came out firing in the second half. After a 19-yard run by Snoop Conner, DTR connected with Daewood Davis for 41 yards. Conner capped the drive with a one-yard touchdown, cutting the deficit to 21-19, but that would be as close as Birmingham would get. From there, it was all DC.

Ta'amu led an eight-play, 69-yard drive, hitting Cornell Powell on consecutive plays before finding Ty Scott wide open downfield for a 37-yard touchdown, his second of the night and Ta'amu's third.

Gareon Conley then delivered one of the plays of the night, blitzing off the edge, tipping a pass, intercepting it, and returning it into Stallions territory. McCrane followed with a 47-yard field goal to extend the lead to 31-19. DC kept pouring it on. Valladay broke loose for 37 yards on the next drive, and Ta'amu added a highlight of his own, scrambling, breaking a tackle, and hurdling a defender to the one-yard line.

Valladay finished it off from a yard out, stretching the lead to 38-19. He led the ground game with 50 yards and two touchdowns. Ta'amu later added his fourth touchdown pass of the night, hitting Briley Moore and pushing DC past the 45-point mark for the second time this season.

DTR added a late score with his legs, punching it in from 12 yards out and converting the three-point try. In his first start, Dorian Thompson-Robinson showed flashes of promise. With just five days in the system, he threw for 313 yards and accounted for three total touchdowns.

Jaydon Mickens was a bright spot for Birmingham, hauling in nine receptions for 107 yards, his second 100-yard game of the season, while Tae Crowder led all defenders with 10 tackles.

UFL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Continuously striving to deliver a more exciting, fast-paced game on the field, the UFL will revolutionize the game by introducing the four-point field goal for attempts made from 60 yards and beyond and banning the Tush Push.

In addition, the UFL will feature one foot inbounds and no punts within the opponent's 50-yard line rules, as well as revolutionary overtime guidelines.

FOUR-POINT FIELD GOAL

Any successful field goal kick from 60 yards or further will be worth four points.

ONE FOOT IN BOUNDS

The UFL will require only one foot in bounds for a legal catch, adopting NCAA rules to increase passing and scoring and potentially enhance player safety.

RED ZONE PENALTIES

The UFL will reinstitute the rule of half the distance to the goal for penalties committed in the Red Zone, which reverts back to current NFL rules.

ELIMINATION OF TUSH PUSH

The league has eliminated the Tush Push, a play in which after the quarterback takes the snap, he immediately drives forward as the offensive line surges and is assisted by additional players behind him who physically push him forward into the surging offensive line.

NO PUNTING INSIDE THE 50-YARD LINE

No punts will be allowed from anywhere inside the 50-yard line (+49-yard line and in). This rule does not apply after the two-minute warning of either half. Once the ball is made ready for play inside the 50-yard line, a team cannot punt even if a subsequent penalty or loss of yardage moves the ball behind the 50. If the ball is on the 50-yard line, a team may punt the ball.

OVERTIME: THREE ATTEMPTS PER TEAM

Teams will alternate attempts from the five-yard line. If after three attempts for each team the tie has not been broken, the teams will alternate attempts until there is a winner. The home team will have the choice to go on offense or defense first. A coin toss will be implemented in lieu of home team choice.

THREE PAT OPTIONS

Teams will have three scrimmage play options to elect their point-after-touch-down attempt, plus a new one-point kick option:

One-Point Conversion: 33-yard field goal

Two-Point Conversion: Ball placed at the two-yard line.

Three-Point Conversion: Ball placed at the eight-yard line.

COIN TOSS

The league will use a standard coin toss before the start of the game and prior to overtime. The visiting team will have the opportunity to call heads or tails and the winning team based on the outcome will then get the first choice. In previous seasons, the home team made the decision.

NEW KICKOFF RULES

Kickoff Line: The ball will be kicked off from the 30-yard line.

Kickoff Team: The 10 remaining players on the kickoff team will line up at the receiving team's 45-yard line (Previously, the 40-yard line).

Receiving Team Zone: The receiving team's setup zone will stretch from its 40-yard line to the 35-yard line and must have at least nine players in that zone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line to the 30-yard line.)

Landing Zone: The landing zone will be from the receiving team's 20-yard line to the goal line. The ball must reach the landing zone or it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.

Out of Bounds: If the ball travels out of bounds, it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.

Touchback Spots: There will be two touchback spots – the 40-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone, and the 20-yard-line for balls that hit in the landing zone and then enter the end zone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone).

VP of Officiating and Playing Rules Innovation

Blandino currently serves as the UFL's Vice President of Officiating and Playing Rules Innovation. A staple of FOX Sports' UFL, NFL and college football coverage, Dean Blandino offers viewers insight into plays, calls and circumstances that warrant rules interpretation or explanation. He also serves as the National Coordinator of Instant Replay for the NCAA. Blandino's NFL career included a stint as an Instant Replay Official (1999-03) and he was selected to work two Super Bowls and two conference championships. He ended his NFL tenure as Vice President of Officiating and is held in high regard for crucial input on system upgrades and an early tech adoption.

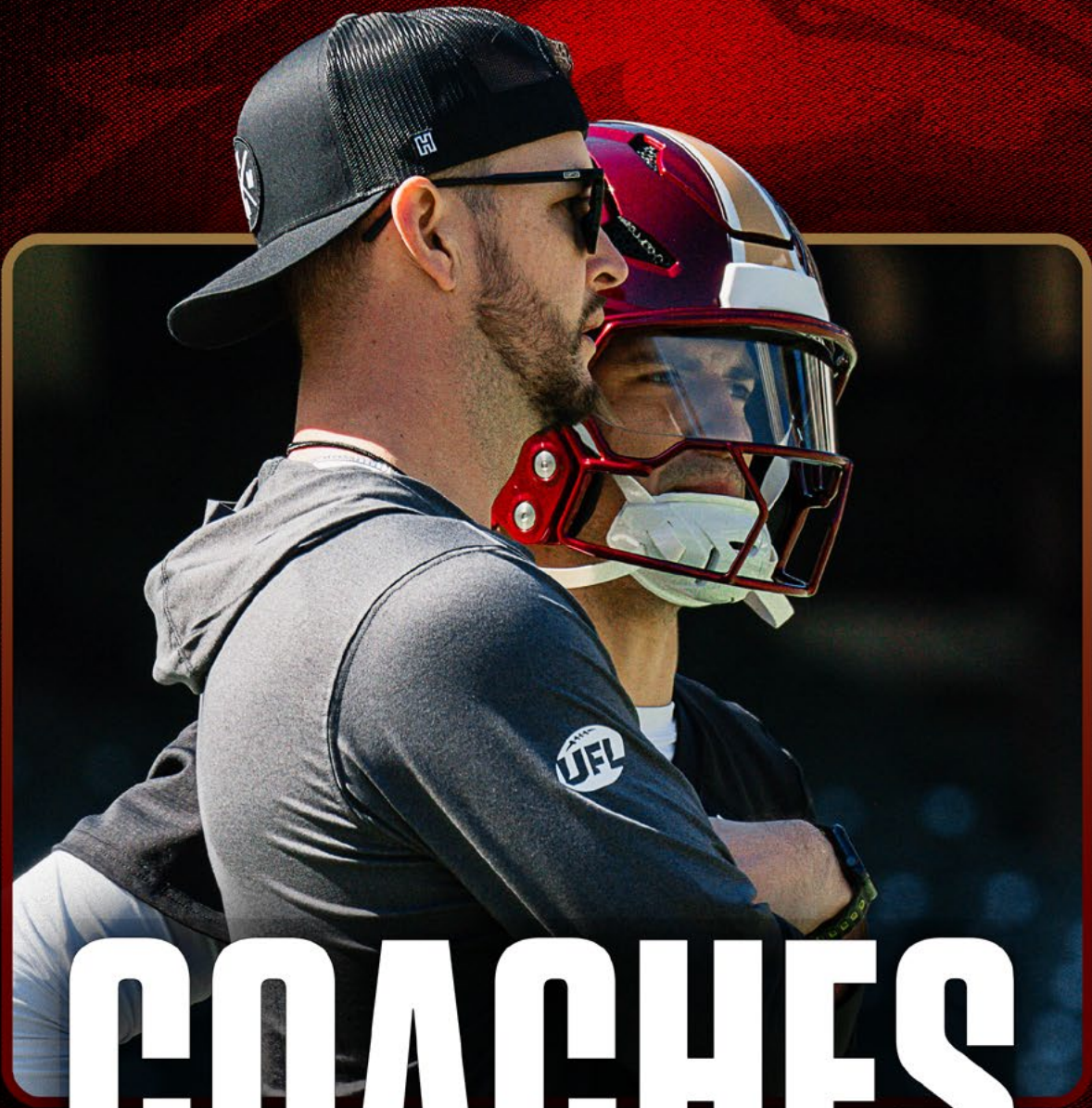


MIKE PEREIRA

Head of Officiating

Mike Pereira is the Head of Officiating for the UFL, overseeing rules, regulations and game officials. He is involved in TV broadcasts, providing viewers with clarity and information on the rules and regulations of UFL games. Pereira served as the VP of Officiating for the NFL, transitioning from on-the-field officiating after 14 years (1996-2010). Pereira spent 14 years officiating college football, nine years in the Big West Conference (1982-90) and five years in the WAC (1991-95). In 1998, he was promoted to NFL supervisor of officiating before becoming Director of Officiating for the NFL, and eventually Vice President of Officiating in 2004. Pereira retired from the NFL after the 2009 season.

AJ McCARRON | HEAD COACH BIRMINGHAM STALLIONS

AJ McCarron enters his role as head coach of the Birmingham Stallions with a résumé shaped by championship pedigree and a reputation for poise in the game's biggest moments.

A native of Mobile, Alabama, McCarron starred at quarterback for the Alabama Crimson Tide under legendary coach Nick Saban. McCarron became one of the most iconic players in the program's illustrious history, leading Alabama to back-to-back BCS National Championships in 2011 and 2012 and finishing his career with a 36–4 record as a starter. Known for his command of the offense, accuracy, and decision-making, McCarron was a Heisman Trophy finalist in 2013 and twice earned All-SEC honors. His experience operating under the pressure of championship expectations laid the foundation for his transition into leadership roles at the professional level.

Selected by the Cincinnati Bengals in the fifth round of the 2014 NFL Draft, McCarron spent time with multiple organizations, including the Buffalo Bills, Oakland Raiders, Houston Texans, and Atlanta Falcons. Across his NFL tenure, he gained valuable insight into a variety of offensive systems and coaching philosophies while earning respect as a prepared and steady presence in the quarterback room. His impact in spring football further cemented his credentials as an elite signal caller for the St. Louis Battlehawks of the XFL and UFL.

Now transitioning to the sideline, McCarron brings a quarterback's perspective to the entire operation—emphasizing efficiency, situational awareness, and accountability. His experience playing for one of the sport's most demanding coaches, combined with a career built on winning and preparation, positions him to lead the Stallions with credibility and purpose in a new era of professional football.





TYLER SISKEY

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Tyler Siskey enters his first season as offensive coordinator, bringing decades of experience across the college and high school ranks, including roles at Troy, Northwestern State, Arkansas State, Ole Miss, Alabama, and South Alabama. Known for his offensive expertise and national media presence through the McCready and Siskey podcast, he has helped produce record-setting offenses, top-ranked recruiting classes—including Alabama's No. 1 signing class—and coached future stars such as AJ McCarron.

WIDE RECEIVERS/TIGHT ENDS

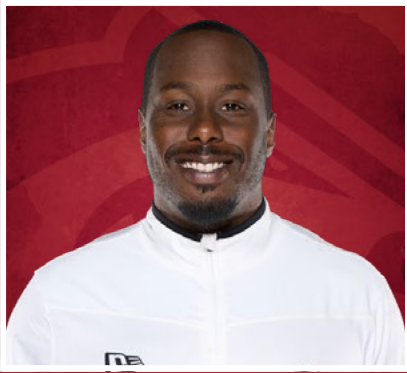

2024 UFL CHAMPIONS



The Birmingham Stallions' 2024 season was a seamless transition into the United Football League (UFL), culminating in their third consecutive spring championship title. Under the leadership of head coach Skip Holtz, the Stallions continued their dominance from the USFL, finishing with nine wins in ten games leading to the USFL Conference title and a spot in the inaugural UFL Championship Game.

The UFL Championship Game pitted the Stallions against the San Antonio Brahmas, where Birmingham achieved the first and only shutout of the UFL season, winning 25-0. Led by UFL MVP Adrian Martinez, the Stallions' top-rated offense found its rhythm late in the second quarter, scoring on three consecutive possessions leading to the dominant win. This victory not only secured Birmingham's first UFL championship but also solidified their status as a football dynasty with three consecutive spring football championships.

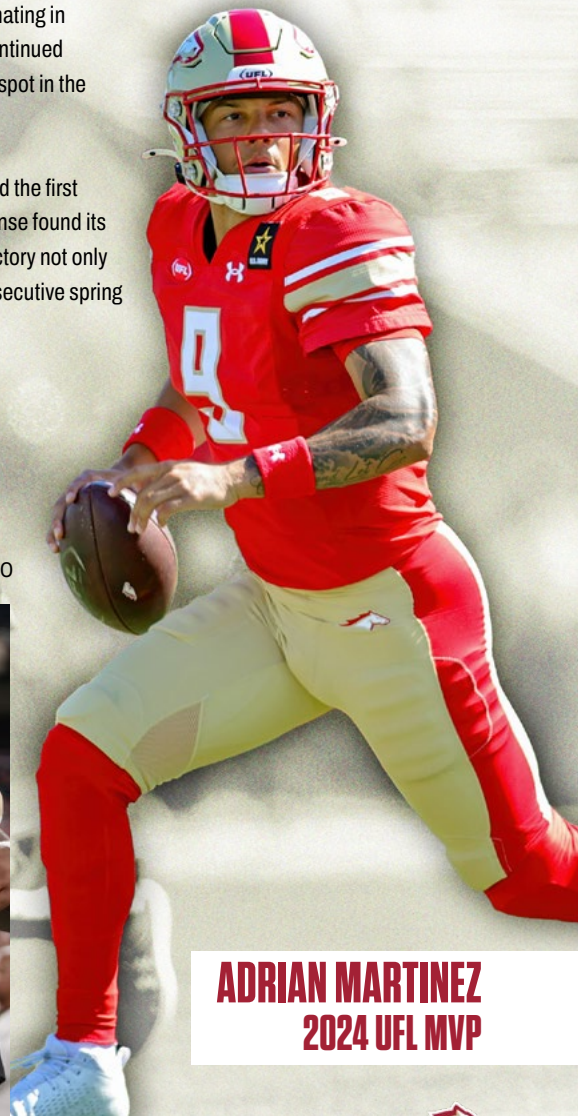

In their second USFL season, the Birmingham Stallions successfully defended their championship title and established themselves as the league's dominant team. Under head coach Skip Holtz, the Stallions finished the regular season with an 8-2 record, securing the top spot in the South Division. Driven by a balanced offensive attack with quarterback Alex McGough at the helm, the Stallions showcased a strong rushing game and a resilient defense throughout the regular and post seasons. McGough's ability to extend plays and make clutch throws was a key factor in the team's consistent success, earning him the league's MVP Award.

In the postseason, their dominance continued as the Stallions defeated the New Orleans Breakers in the South Division Championship before facing the Pittsburgh Maulers in the USFL Championship Game. The Stallions controlled the title game from start to finish, winning 28-12 to clinch their second consecutive USFL championship with McGough being named Championship Game MVP. With back-to-back title wins, Birmingham further solidified itself as the premier franchise in the USFL.

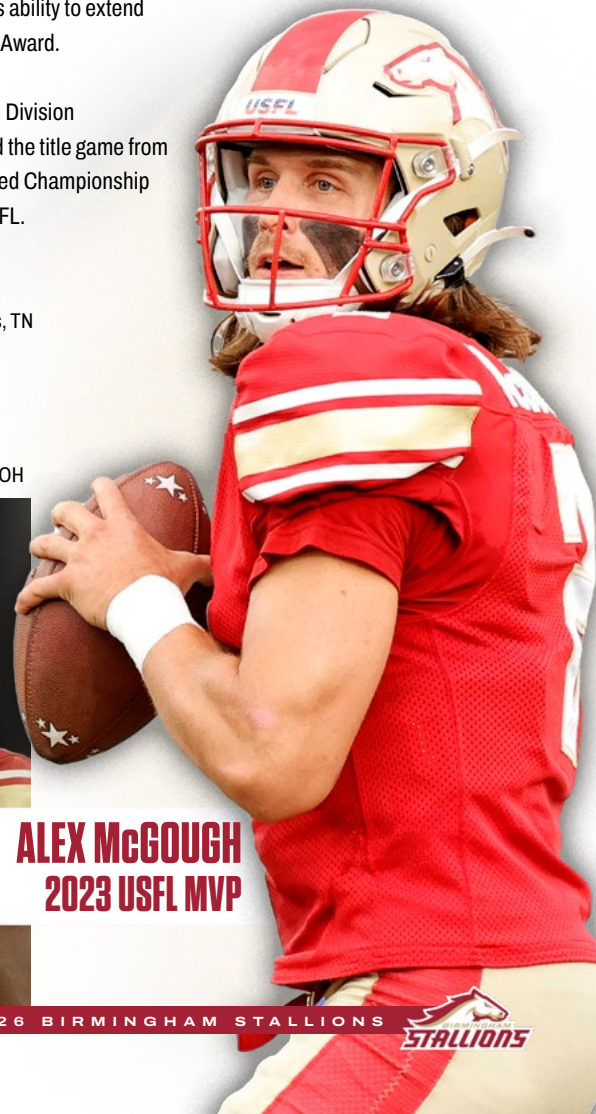

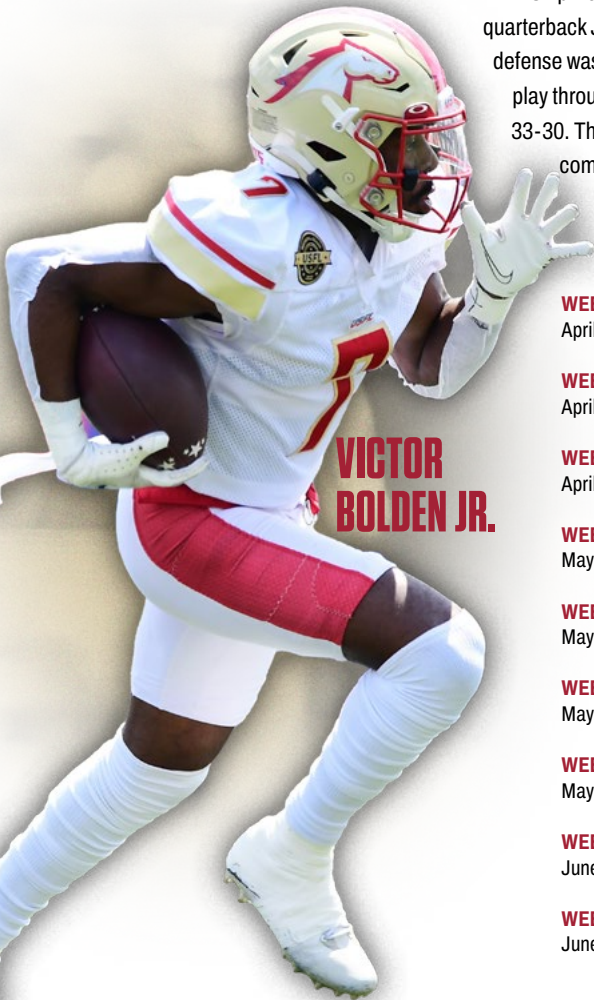

USFL 2022 USFL CHAMPIONS



The Birmingham Stallions were the story of the 2022 revival season of the United States Football League (USFL), finishing with a 9-1 regular season record, the best in the league, and serving as the host hub for all eight teams. Lead by head coach Skip Holtz, the Stallions excelled on both offense and defense throughout the season. The team was led on the field by quarterback J'Mar Smith and playmakers like wide receiver Marlon Williams and runningback Bo Scarbrough. The Stallions' defense was a force, led by standout performances from linebackers Scooby Wright and DeMarquis Gates. Their dominant play throughout the season earned them a spot in the USFL Championship Game where they beat the Philadelphia Stars 33-30. The win was the first milestone in a spring football dynasty. The game was marked by an electrifying fourth-quarter comeback, with J'Mar Smith leading the way in a crucial drive that sealed their victory. The Stallions' resilience and ability to execute in high-pressure moments highlighted their season-long strength and solidified their place as the premier team in the inaugural USFL season, catapulting them as the face of the revived USFL.
