YOU CAN FIND ME IN ST. LOUIE

The St. Louis Battlehawks return home after a three game road trip where they went 2-1. The Battlehawks are 2-0 at home this season, with wins coming against the DC Defenders in Week 1 and the Birmingham Stallions in Week 3. The Battlehawks play three of their four remaining games this season at home.

COME FLY WITH ME

The St. Louis Battlehawks and Columbus Aviators meet for the first and only time during the 2026 regular season, marking the first matchup in franchise history as Columbus plays its inaugural campaign.

The Aviators enter at 2-4, with victories over the Dallas Renegades and Houston Gamblers, both at home, while going 0-3 on the road. Columbus is coming off a win over Houston, while St. Louis enters following a road victory against the Louisville Kings.

Battlehawks head coach Ricky Proehl coached Columbus head coach Ted Ginn Jr. during their time with the Carolina Panthers, where Proehl served as wide receivers coach and Ginn produced one of the most productive seasons of his career, posting a career-high 10 touchdown receptions in 2015. Both are now in their first season as UFL head coaches.

The matchup also features regional ties on both rosters, as Columbus cornerback D.J. Miller Jr. is an O'Fallon, Missouri native and graduate of John Burroughs School, while Battlehawks cornerback Luq Barcoo was born in Cleveland before later moving to Jamaica and growing up in California.

THOSE WHO STAY...

The Battlehawks return 14 players from their 2025 roster, highlighted by All-UFL selections C Mike Panasiuk and OLB Pita Taumoeopenu, along with established playmakers WR Hakeem Butler and OLB Travis Feeney.

RB Jarveon Howard also returns to assume the starting role. Howard leads the Battlehawks and the UFL with 297 rushing yards this season. Additional returners include RB Kevon Latulas, WRs Frank Darby, Blake Jackson and Jahcour Pearson, and QB Brandon Silvers.

THE NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK

St. Louis enters 2026 with 36 new players, headlined by MLB Jordan Williams (third in the UFL in tackles in 2025), DB Jordan Mosley (tied for league lead in forced fumbles) and DB A.J. Thomas (seven interceptions, 17th in total tackles). The roster is complemented by a new coaching staff led by head coach Ricky Proehl, whose staff brings experience across the NFL, UFL, CFL and collegiate levels.

UNSTOPPABLE FORCE MEETS IMMOVABLE OBJECT

Friday's Week Seven matchup features two of the UFL's top-performing units on both sides of the ball.

The St. Louis Battlehawks defense has set the league standard against the run, allowing a UFL-best 433 rushing yards (72.2 per game), while also surrendering the league's second-fewest passing yards (1,038).

The Columbus Aviators counter with the league's top rushing offense, averaging 142.0 rushing yards per game (852 total), while their defense leads the UFL in pass defense with just 803 passing yards allowed.

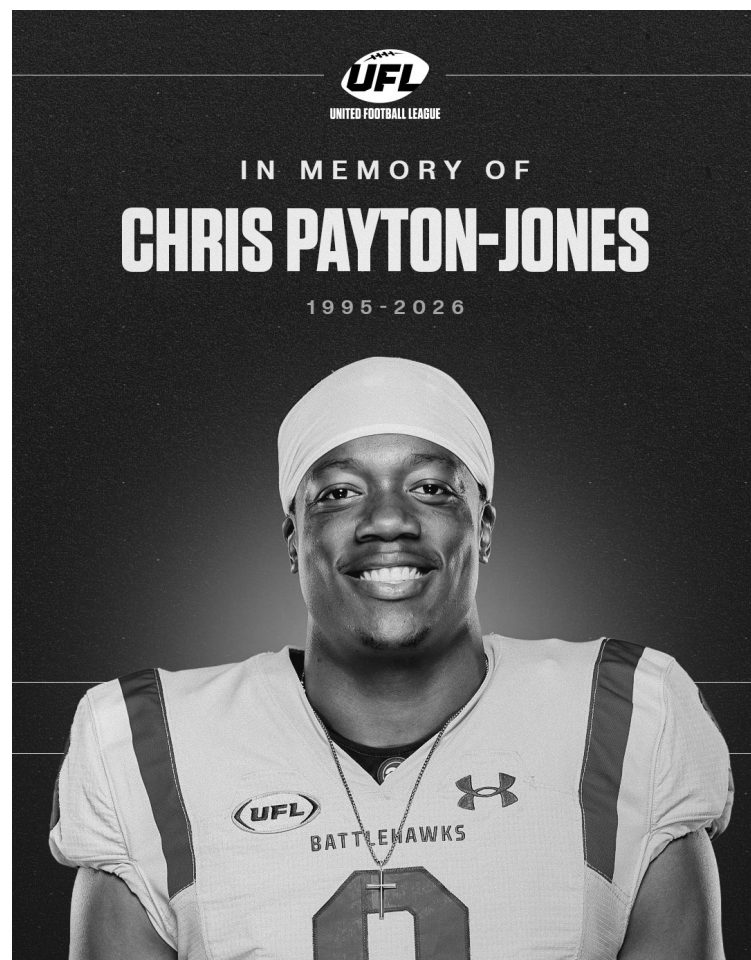
Columbus quarterback Jalan McClendon enters as one of the league's most efficient passers, leading the UFL with a 69.3 completion percentage while ranking second with 166 pass attempts. Battlehawks quarterback Harrison Frost has thrown seven touchdown passes this season, fourth-most in the league, while McClendon's six touchdown passes rank fifth.

REMEMBERING OUR BROTHER

Chris Payton-Jones, who spent two seasons with the St. Louis Battlehawks, is being remembered across the United Football League as a beloved teammate, leader, and competitor. "CPJ" brought energy, resilience, and authenticity to the game, while his impact off the field—from community engagements to his own content creation and openness to share the highs and lows of his personal journey—reflected the same humility and integrity that defined his career.

This past week, the Battlehawks honored his memory by wearing "CPJ" helmet decals, which will remain in place throughout the season.

A proud father and respected voice among his peers, Payton-Jones' legacy endures in the bond of brotherhood—built on love and forged through the blood, sweat, and tears of team.



PEREZ SET FOR DEBUT

Quarterback Luis Perez will make his first start for the Battlehawks after being acquired in a trade with Dallas on April 21 in exchange for offensive tackle Corey Stewart. Perez had not appeared in a UFL game this season prior to joining St. Louis.

A veteran of eight spring football seasons, Perez — whose memoir is titled King of Spring — has led his league in passing yards in each of the past two seasons and helped guide Arlington to a championship following a midseason trade in 2023. Last season, he completed 224 of 313 passes (71.6%) for a league-best 2,294 yards with nine touchdowns and five interceptions over 10 games.

Perez began his spring football career with Birmingham of the AAF and has also spent time in the XFL with Los Angeles, New York, Vegas and Arlington, the USFL with New Jersey, and The Spring League with the Jousts. He has additionally participated in NFL training camps with the Los Angeles Rams, Philadelphia Eagles, Detroit Lions and Los Angeles Chargers.

BACK TO THE BEECH

Offensive guard Abdul Beecham returns to St. Louis after signing with the Battlehawks as a free agent this week. He started three games at right guard for the Battlehawks in 2025 before being placed on injured reserve. Beecham spent the 2025 season with St. Louis after originally joining the team in 2024. He was selected by the Dallas Renegades in the 2026 UFL Draft and released during training camp before rejoining the Battlehawks.

CAUSE YOU'RE SO SMOOTH

Carlos Davis has recorded at least 0.5 sack in five of six games this season, including a sack in Week 6 against the Louisville Kings. He leads the St. Louis Battlehawks and is tied for second in the UFL with 4.5 sacks, while adding 16 total tackles.

An All-UFL selection in 2024, Davis helped Birmingham capture the league championship that season and has appeared in 12 NFL games. The Blue Springs, Missouri native continues to be one of the league's most disruptive interior defenders in 2026.

ST. LOUIS AND CLARKE

Cornerback Nevelle Clarke recorded his team-leading second interception of the season in Week 6 against the Louisville Kings, while also adding two tackles and a pass breakup.

The interception marked Clarke's second takeaway of the year, with his first coming against the Birmingham Stallions in Week 3. He is the only St. Louis Battlehawks defender with multiple interceptions this season.



THE UNITED BOWL

Last week, the United Football League announced that Audi Field, home of the league's defending champion DC Defenders, will host The 2026 United Bowl airing on ABC on Saturday, June 13, at 3:00 p.m. ET. This season marks the debut of the "United Bowl" as the league's championship game, a name that embodies the UFL's identity and mission to bring fans, players, and communities together through a shared love of football.

Representing the game's power to unite people, the United Bowl will invite everyone into the huddle, celebrating a year defined by connection, innovation, and unity. United Bowl performers, giveaways, and events surrounding the championship game will be announced in the near future.

Tickets to The 2026 United Bowl will be available through Ticketmaster and will go on sale to the general public starting Friday, May 1 at 11:00 a.m. ET.

UFL TO NFL

The United Football League continues to serve as a proven pathway to the NFL, with 66 players from the past two UFL seasons—along with alumni from the modern spring football era (2020–present)—earning spots on NFL 53-man rosters or practice squads during the 2025 season. The St. Louis Battlehawks were represented by four alumni:

LaCale London, DT – Atlanta Falcons

Recorded 30 tackles (17 solo), 5.0 sacks, and a forced fumble across 13 games. London signed with Atlanta following his 2023 season in St. Louis, where he totaled 33 tackles (5 TFL), three sacks, and two fumble recoveries in 10 games.

Jacob Saylor, RB – Detroit Lions

Despite missing Week 10, Saylor ranked ninth in the NFL with 897 kick return yards and added eight special teams tackles.

A back-to-back All-UFL selection (2024–25), Saylor is the Battlehawks' all-time leader in rushing (207 carries, 996 yards) and touchdowns (13).

Andre Szmyt, K – Cleveland Browns

Converted 24-of-27 field goals, including 5-of-6 from 50+ yards. Earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors (Week 3) after a 55-yard walk-off field goal.

Szmyt spent time on Cleveland's practice squad in 2024 after leading the UFL in field goal percentage (19-of-21) with St. Louis. He also holds the Battlehawks' franchise record with a 61-yard field goal (Week 7, 2024).

Nick Whiteside II, CB – Detroit Lions

Appeared in nine games, recording two tackles, with a standout performance in Week 7 on Monday Night Football (three pass breakups, two tackles).

Whiteside II started the final four games for St. Louis in 2025, finishing with 24 tackles (6 solo) and a fumble recovery across 10 games.

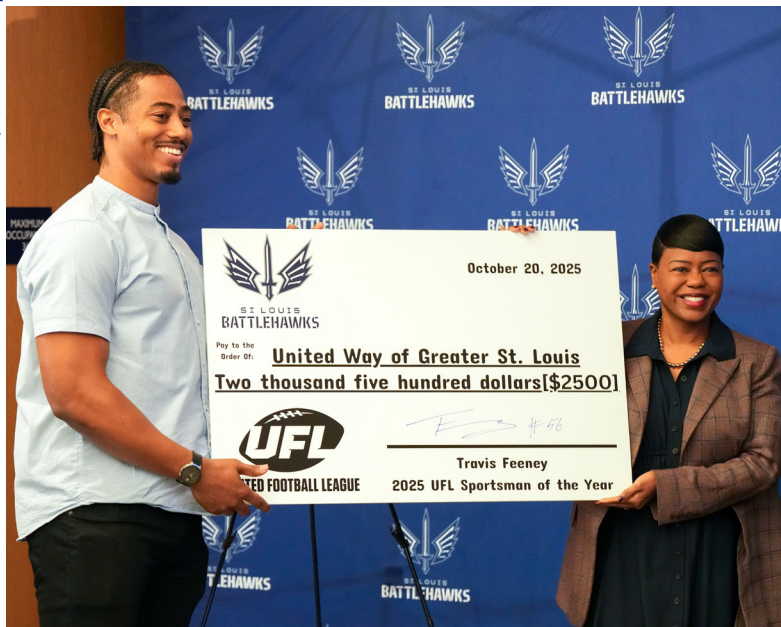


THE MAN OF THE PEOPLE

St. Louis Battlehawks LB Travis Feeney was named the 2025 UFL Sportsman of the Year, recognizing exceptional leadership, integrity, and impact on the field and in the community. The award was selected by a panel of league and team executives, coaches, and players from all eight teams.

Feeney has been active in community efforts in both St. Louis and Arlington, with a focus on animal welfare, veterans, and local outreach. His work includes involvement with CARE STL Adoption Center, SPCA, the Adaptive Training Foundation, and the American Cancer Society. He later directed the charitable portion of the award to the United Way of Greater St. Louis.

The award was presented at the 2025 UFL Championship Game on June 14 at The Dome at America's Center.



REIGNING AND DEFENDING

LB Pita Taumoepenu was named the 2025 UFL Defensive Player of the Year after leading the league with a franchise-record 7.5 sacks for a Battlehawks defense that allowed a league-best 16.3 points per game. He added 26 tackles, five tackles for loss, and three forced fumbles.

An All-UFL selection, Taumoepenu earned Defensive Player of the Week honors in Week 7 after recording two sacks, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery vs. Memphis. He was previously named the XFL's top defender in 2023.

INNOVATION AND SPORT

The UFL is enhancing the fan experience and game execution with significant technology upgrades:

Real-Time Player Data: The UFL is the first American professional sports league to deliver real-time player data insights live in all stadiums using Sportable player sensors, highlighting ball carrier speed, ball distance, and ball velocity.

Advanced Game-Day Systems: The league features the most advanced game day communications and coach-to-player system in professional sports, with 16 players per team utilizing in-helmet GSC receivers.

Sideline Video: Wireless sideline video solutions have been upgraded to include 16 iPads per team for live coverage across all 43 games.

Broadcast Enhancements: Fox broadcasts will use drone cams to bring fans closer to the live game action. Additionally, all 43 games will feature enhanced TrU Line virtual line to gain executions with a new video animation.

On-Field View: ESPN-designated games will integrate Povora (formerly JockeyCam) CapCam technology on officials and coaches for live broadcast.

Unprecedented Transparency

The 2026 season delivers full access to game operations and decision-making:

Officiating Decision Process: Dean Blandino and Mike Pereira from the UFL Rules Command Center will bring fans at home and in venues directly into the officiating decision process. This includes live audio and full visibility to the tools and video used to make the final call on the field.

Full Access: The UFL will deliver full access via more mics on players, coaches, and officials, with coverage extending from the field to the coach booths and into the locker rooms.



BATTLEHAWKS OUTLAST DEFENDERS IN GRITTY VICTORY, 16-10

WEEK ONE

MARCH 28, 2026

ST. LOUIS, Missouri - The St. Louis Battlehawks kicked off the 2026 season with a statement 16-10 victory over the reigning UFL champion DC Defenders at The Dome at America's Center on Saturday. Kicker Tucker McCann made three of four field goals en route to a Battlehawks win.

The Battlehawks' defense made a strong showing at the home opener, recording seven sacks and two interceptions, holding the Defenders to just 153 yards of total offense, and holding the Defenders scoreless in the second half. Reigning UFL Defensive Player of the Year Pita Taumoeopenu racked up 2.5 sacks and 6 total tackles.

DC struck first with 9:08 remaining in the first quarter with a league milestone. Defenders kicker Matt McCrane recorded the league's first four-point field goal, earned only on kicks of 60 yards or more. Not to be outdone, McCann notched one from 58 less than four minutes later to make the score 4-3.

DC found the endzone with a minute to go in the first as running back Deon Jackson's one-yard rush capped a 71-yard scoring drive for the Defenders. The two-point conversion attempt failed as quarterback Jordan Ta'amu's pass intended for wide receiver Seth Williams was incomplete. The quarter ended 10-3 in favor of the Defenders, but it would be the last time DC put points on the board.

Safety Jordan Mosley had a key interception with 12:59 remaining in the 2nd quarter, picking off Ta'amu on the STL 30-yard line. A pass interference call against cornerback Michael Ojemudia would have negated the pick, but St. Louis successfully used their only challenge of the game to reverse the call. Mosley also had a fumble recovery overturned in the first quarter.

A 64-yard pass to wide receiver Gary Jennings Jr. set up McCann for a 27-yard field goal, ending the half with a score of 10-6.

The St. Louis defense came out buzzing to start the second half. Cornerback Myles Sims picked off Ta'amu on the third play of the half. On the next DC drive, the Battlehawks forced a punt from DC's own 7-yard line. Sean Fresch's punt return set the Battlehawks up from DC's 46, and two plays later, quarterback Brandon Silvers found running back Kevon Latulas for a 43-yard gain.

With 8:08 to go in the third, Silvers connected on a ten-yard pass to tight end Tyler Neville, who dove into the endzone for the Battlehawks' first touchdown of the game. The extra point gave St. Louis a 13-10 lead. McCann extended that lead with his third field goal three minutes into the fourth, making it a 16-10 ball game.

The rest of the fourth quarter was a back-and-forth affair. The Battlehawks' defense stifled DC, once again forcing them to punt from deep within their own zone. St. Louis had a 2nd and eight on the DC 11 when DC committed two costly neutral zone infractions, which allowed St. Louis to ride out the clock.

Silvers was 16-28 in the win, throwing for 198 yards and a touchdown. Running back Jarveon Howard was the game's leading rusher with 45 yards on 11 carries. Jennings Jr. led the team in both receiving and all-purpose yards, with a 64-yard reception and a 26-yard kickoff return. Rah-jai Harris had two kickoff returns for 65 total yards.

The Battlehawks return to action on Tuesday, April 7 against the Dallas Renegades at Toyota Stadium.



BATTLEHAWKS FALL 31-15 TO THE RENEGADES

WEEK TWO
APRIL 7, 2026
TOYOTA STADIUM

FRISCO, Texas - Despite a late comeback attempt, the St. Louis Battlehawks came up short in a 31-15 loss against the Dallas Renegades at Toyota Stadium on Tuesday night. Though the Battlehawks rallied in the fourth, it wasn't enough to match the Renegades, who had 327 total yards on offense.

The Dallas offense got things started early, opening the game with a 68-yard scoring drive. Quarterback Austin Reed found wide receiver Tyler Vaughns three times on the drive, including on an 8-yard pass for the touchdown. The Renegades got on the board again in the first quarter after a 48-yard field goal from kicker Colton Theaker, putting Dallas up 9-0.

Quarterback Brandon Silvers' 38-yard pass to wide receiver Hakeem Butler set the Battlehawks up on the Dallas five-yard line, but they were unable to convert for the touchdown. Kicker Tucker McCann kicked his first field goal of the game for 20 yards to make the score 9-3 in favor of Dallas to end the first.

It was all Dallas in the second quarter. Defensive tackle Taylor Stallworth tipped Theaker's 52-yard field goal attempt, but the Renegades answered on their next drive. Running back Dae Dae Hunter broke off a fifty-yard rush, which set up Reed for a 12-yard pass to wide receiver Greg Ward Jr. The two-point conversion put the Renegades up 17-3 at the half.

The Battlehawks were the only team to put points on the board in the third quarter. After a big interception by A.J. Thomas, McCann's 45-yard field goal brought the score to 17-6.

After a 76-yard drive, Reed found Vaughn again to open up the fourth quarter on another 8-yard touchdown pass, giving the Renegades the 24-6 lead.

After driving down the field deep into Dallas territory, the Battlehawks elected to go for it on 4th and 10. Tight end Tyler Neville, who scored the only touchdown in the Battlehawks Week 1 victory, delivered again against the Renegades, catching a short pass and diving into the end zone for a ten-yard score. On the three-point conversion, Butler caught the pass from Silvers, making it a 24-15 game with seven minutes remaining.

The Battlehawks' defense forced a punt, but the offense was unable to convert and turned the ball over on downs. On the next drive, Reed found Vaughns for his third touchdown of the game, putting the Renegades up 31-15 and sealing the win.

The Battlehawks return home to the Dome at America's Center on Sunday, April 12, to face the Birmingham Stallions.



BATTLEHAWKS RALLY TO DEFEAT STALLIONS IN THRILLING 34-30 WIN

WEEK THREE

APRIL 12, 2026

ST. LOUIS, Missouri -The St. Louis Battlehawks stormed back from two 10-point deficits to defeat the Birmingham Stallions 34-30 on Sunday afternoon at The Dome at America's Center. Wide receiver Hakeem Butler had 146 yards on 4 receptions and a touchdown in the win. Quarterback Harrison Frost went 9 for 15 for 148 yards and 3 touchdowns in his Battlehawks debut.

The Battlehawks' defense dominated the first quarter. Linebacker Jordan Williams picked off quarterback Matt Corral's first pass attempt for a 10-yard touchdown return and the first Battlehawks pick-six at the Dome since Callahan O'Reilly in Week 8 of the 2025 season. After forcing the Stallions to punt on the second drive, they followed it up with another interception, this time at the hands of cornerback Nevelle Clarke. Kicker Tucker McCann made the 54-yard field goal to put the Battlehawks up 10-0 in the first.

The momentum shifted in the second quarter, when QB Brandon Silvers threw an interception that linebacker Tae Crowder returned for 35 yards. On the next play, Corral found tight end Jordan Thomas for a 35-yard touchdown, bringing the Stallions within three.

St. Louis stuttered in the red zone, turning the ball over on downs. The Battlehawks' defense came up clutch as linebacker Lavonta Bentley recovered a fumble from running back Snoop Connor. Tucker McCann was good from 40 yards to extend the Battlehawks lead to 13-7.

Frost came in to replace Silvers at the end of the first half. Frost struggled in the third quarter, throwing a 40-yard touchdown return to defensive back Mario Goodrich. The pick-six and a 34-yard field goal from kicker Jonathan Garibay gave the Stallions their first lead of the game and made it a 16-13 ball game. On the next drive, Frost was intercepted again, and the ensuing Birmingham drive resulted in a one-yard rushing touchdown for running back Anthony McFarland Jr and a 23-13 score.

A 31-yard deep ball to wide receiver Hakeem Butler set the Battlehawks up on the one-yard line. Frost found wide receiver Steven McBride for a snag in the end zone to bring the Battlehawks within three and mark Frost and McBride's first UFL score.

The Stallions fired right back, as Corral found wide receiver Deon Cain deep for a 67-yard touchdown to put Birmingham up 30-20.

Not to be outdone, Frost found Butler for his first touchdown of the season on a 64-yard bomb down the left sideline, bringing the Battlehawks back within three. The Battlehawks' defense stepped up big on the next Birmingham drive, with defensive tackle Carlos Davis' sack forcing the punt.

The Battlehawks' offense took advantage, ripping off a 75-yard scoring drive. Tight end Tyler Neville bullied his way into the endzone for his third touchdown in as many games, this time an 11-yard score to give the Battlehawks their first lead since the third quarter and make it a 34-30 ball game with 1:52 to play. The Stallions turned the ball over on downs to seal the comeback victory for the Battlehawks.

The Battlehawks go on the road for the DC Defenders rematch at Audi Field on Saturday, April 18.



BATTLEHAWKS CAN'T FINISH COMEBACK IN 28-22 LOSS TO DEFENDERS

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Battlehawks couldn't create any last-minute magic on Saturday afternoon at Audi Field, falling 28-22 to the defending UFL champions. Quarterback Harrison Frost went 6-21 for 144 yards, a touchdown, and an interception in his first start for the Battlehawks.

St. Louis got on the board on their first drive of the game after a 51-yard field goal from kicker Tucker McCann, taking an early 3-0 lead. However, the Defenders marched down the field on a nearly six-minute scoring drive to answer. Quarterback Jordan Ta'amu found wide receiver Keke Coutee for a 14-yard touchdown and a 7-3 lead that would last through the first.

Wide receiver Hakeem Butler opened up the second quarter by turning a short pass from Frost into a massive 75-yard touchdown, giving St. Louis their last lead of the game and making it 9-7 after McCann missed the extra point.

A couple of costly penalties gave the Defenders a chance to extend their lead. Ta'amu found wide receiver Ty Scott for a touchdown, making it a 17-9 ball game. A pass interference call against the Defenders allowed the Battlehawks to try to set up a final scoring attempt of the game. Frost found Butler in between four defenders for a gain of 34. Instead of the clock running out before the Battlehawks could spike it, a defensive offsides allowed McCann to kick the 26-yard field goal and bring the Battlehawks within five points at the half.



A crucial sack from cornerback Nevelle Clarke forced the Defenders to settle for a field goal at the end of a long drive to start the third quarter, and kicker Matt McCrane put the Defenders up 20-12. The Battlehawks were unable to take advantage, as DC sacked Frost in the endzone for a safety, building a ten-point lead for DC.

No one got back on the board until the fourth quarter, where McCrane added another field goal to his tally, making it 25-12 DC.

The Battlehawks responded with a 65-yard scoring drive. After two back-to-back plays from running back Jarveon Howard, running back Kevon Latulas stiff-armed his defender to stomp into the endzone for a seven-yard score, his first of the season. The touchdown brought the Battlehawks within six and made it a 25-19 game.

DC and St. Louis would both add back-to-back field goals on the next two drives, keeping the difference at six points, now 28-22. It would prove to be the final score of the game.

The Battlehawks defense forced DC to punt the ball back, but the St. Louis offense couldn't convert on their final drive. Frost was sacked for 11 yards and threw an interception to safety Sam Kidd on 3rd and 21 to seal the victory for DC.

Butler followed up his Week Three Offensive Player of the Week performance with two catches for 109 yards and a touchdown, but was held without a reception in the second half. Howard had eight rushes for 85 yards, his longest being a 51-yard rush.

The Battlehawks stay on the road in Week Five, heading to Orlando to take on the Storm on April 25th at Inter&Co Stadium.



BATTLEHAWKS WEATHER THE STORM IN 25-17 WIN OVER ORLANDO

ORLANDO, Florida – The St. Louis Battlehawks held down a second-half comeback to defeat the Orlando Storm 25-17 on Saturday night at Inter&Co Stadium in Orlando.

The Battlehawks started the game hot, scoring on their first drive. A pass deep middle to tight end Tyler Neville set St. Louis up on the 1-yard line. Running back Kylin James was able to punch it in for his first touchdown of the season and to put the Battlehawks up 6-0.

The Battlehawks' defense was lights out, turning Orlando over on downs twice in the first quarter and setting the offense up for their next scoring drive to start the second. Quarterback Harrison Frost found tight end James Bostic III, who made a leaping catch in the back of the end zone for his first touchdown of the season, doubling the Battlehawks' lead.

The dominant St. Louis defense took control of the second quarter. After Bostic's touchdown, Orlando's three possessions ended in two punts and a fumble recovered by safety Trey Dean II.

Punter Ryan Sanborn filled in for kicker Tucker McCann, who aggravated a quadriceps injury during pre-game warmups. He missed two PATs, but booted a pair of field goals in the first half, one from 36 and one from 40, which gave the Battlehawks the 18-0 lead heading into halftime.

The Battlehawks once again were the first team on the board in the second half. After another turnover on downs from Orlando, running back Jarveon Howard broke off a 31-yard rush to put St. Louis back in the red zone. Frost took it himself for a 4-yard rushing touchdown, Sanborn connected on the point after for a 25-0 lead for St. Louis.

Orlando remained shutout through the third quarter, but after the Frost touchdown, Storm quarterback Jack Plummer led his team down the field for an 80-yard scoring drive. He found wide receiver Elijah Badger twice on that drive, once for a gain of 13, and for the 4-yard score. The extra point was good and Orlando now trailed 25-7.

After failing to convert on third down, St. Louis opted to punt. Orlando was flagged on the play, and the Battlehawks opted to punt again. This time, Sanborn's punt was blocked by tight end Konner Fox, which gave the Storm the ball on the Battlehawks one-yard line. Running back Elijah Dotson ran it in for the 1-yard touchdown. Orlando kicked the extra point to narrow the score to 25-14.

The Storm didn't let up in the fourth, going on a 59-yard and seven-minute drive, bringing the score to 25-17 after a 26-yard field goal from kicker Michael Lantz. The Storm elected for the alternative kickoff, converting the 4th and 12 from their own 28. After two first downs, the Battlehawks forced Plummer into three incompletions, turning the ball over on downs.

Harrison Frost finished 185 yards passing after completing 20 of 31 passes to go with his touchdown and two interceptions. Wide receiver Steven McBride was the Battlehawks' leading receiver with 4 receptions for 53 yards, while Jarveon Howard with 59 yards rushing on 12 carries. Linebacker Jordan Williams led the defense with six tackles, including one tackle for loss, and a pass broken up.

The Battlehawks close out their three-game road trip in Louisville on Thursday, April 30th at Lynn Family Stadium.



BATTLEHAWKS SLUG KINGS IN 16-3 VICTORY OVER LOUISVILLE

LYNN FAMILY STADIUM

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky – The St. Louis Battlehawks controlled the game defensively, winning 16-3 over the Louisville Kings on Thursday night at Lynn Family Stadium.

Louisville opened the scoring with a 40-yard field goal from Tanner Brown on its first possession. It proved to be the Kings' only points of the night.

St. Louis answered in the first quarter after a turnover on downs near midfield. A 25-yard reception by Ha-keem Butler set up Ramiz Ahmed, who converted from 42 yards in his Battlehawks debut to tie the game at 3-3.

Louisville threatened on the ensuing drive with a 51-yard kickoff return, but the drive stalled after a sack by Taylor Stallworth. Brown missed a 53-yard field goal attempt.

The Battlehawks took the lead late in the second quarter. A 33-yard reception by Blake Jackson set up a short field, and after penalties moved the ball inside the 10, quarterback Harrison Frost connected with Gary Jennings Jr. for a 4-yard touchdown and a 9-3 halftime lead.

St. Louis extended the margin in the third quarter. A 26-yard run by Jarveon Howard set up a scoring opportunity, and Frost found Steven McBride in the end zone for a 12-yard touchdown to make it 16-3.

The Battlehawks' defense closed it out in the fourth. Louisville managed just one first down before Nev-elle Clarke intercepted Chandler Rogers, ending the Kings' best remaining opportunity. A turnover on downs on the next possession sealed the result.

St. Louis held Louisville to 12 rushing yards. Pita Tau-moepenu recorded two sacks, while Travis Feeney and Carlos Davis each added one. Jordan Williams and Michael Barrett each contributed half a sack.

Frost finished 22-of-40 for 242 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. Butler led the team with 47 receiving yards, and Howard paced the ground game with 56 yards on 16 carries.

The Battlehawks return home to face the Columbus Aviators on Friday, May 8 at The Dome at America's Center.



A NEW ERA BEGINS

Ricky Proehl enters his first season as head coach, becoming the third head coach in St. Louis franchise history after serving as the Battlehawks' wide receivers coach in 2023. A St. Louis Rams legend and member of the "Greatest Show on Turf," Proehl's connection to the city is highlighted by his game-winning touchdown reception in the 1999 NFC Championship that propelled the Rams to a Super Bowl XXXIV title.

A 17-year NFL veteran and two-time Super Bowl champion, Proehl transitions to the sideline following previous coaching experience with the Carolina Panthers, where he helped guide the team to Super Bowl 50. He replaces Anthony Becht, who was named head coach of the Orlando Storm.

The 2026 roster reflects a blend of continuity and change, featuring 14 returnees from last season's St. Louis squad alongside 36 new additions as the franchise enters a new chapter under Proehl's leadership.

THEY GOT THE WHOLE UFL TALKING

The Battlehawks had seven players earn All-UFL honors in 2025, tied for most in the league.

Those include running back Jacob Saylor, center Mike Panasiuk, guard Steven Gonzalez, outside linebacker Pita Taumoepeu, linebacker Willie Harvey, kicker Rodrigo Blankenship, and long snapper Alexander Matheson.

OUR HOUSE, OUR RULES

HOUSE

The Battlehawks will hold their five home games at The Dome at America's Center. The facility recently renovated in 2025 to include LED lighting and a new \$1 million turf system that is lighter and rolls up quicker.

The Dome was constructed in 1995 and hosted NFL games from 1995-2015. The Battlehawks are 17-4 in franchise history at The Dome, including postseason games. They also hold the top 12 attendance marks in modern professional spring football history, highlighted by a record 40,317 fans at their 2024 home opener April 6 in a 27-24 win over the Arlington Renegades. St. Louis led the way in attendance in both the XFL in 2023 and UFL in 2024, averaging more than 34,000 fans per game each year. The Battlehawks led the UFL in attendance once again in 2025, with four of their six home games garnering more than 30,000 fans. The Battlehawks averaged 16,000 more attendees than the second place team last season.

The Dome hosted the 2024 and 2025 Conference Championships and UFL Championships.

A multi-purpose facility that has hosted a wide variety of events in its nearly three decades, The Dome also hosted the Battlehawks during the 2020 season. The team won both of its home games that season.

RULES

UFL RULES - HIGHLIGHTS

The United Football League (UFL) has adopted a number of innovative rules from both previous leagues to deliver an exciting, fast-paced game with plenty of action.

Four-Point Field Goal

Field goals of 60 yards or longer are worth four points instead of three.

Points After Touchdown (PAT) Options

- 1 point: 33-yard field goal
- 2 points: Run/pass from the 2-yard line
- 3 points: Run/pass from the 8-yard line

One Foot In Bounds

Only one foot in bounds is required for a legal catch (NCAA-style rule).

Half-Distance Penalties

Red Zone penalties will be enforced as half the distance to the goal, consistent with NFL standards.

Elimination of the Tush Push

The "Tush Push" quarterback sneak — where teammates push the QB forward immediately after the snap — is not allowed.

No Punting Inside the 50

- Teams cannot punt once the ball is inside the opponent's 49-yard line or closer.
- If the ball is made ready inside the 50, a later penalty cannot restore punting eligibility.
- Teams may punt at exactly the 50-yard line.
- This restriction does not apply after the two-minute warning of either half.

Overtime Format

- Teams alternate plays from the 5-yard line.
- Each team gets three attempts.
- If still tied, alternating attempts continue until a winner is decided.
- A coin toss determines first choice (offense or defense).

Coin Toss Procedure

- Used at the start of the game and before overtime.
- The visiting team calls heads or tails.
- The winner chooses possession or direction.

New Kickoff Rules

- Kickoff Line: The ball will be kicked off from the 30-yard line.
- Kickoff Team: The 10 remaining players on the kickoff team will line up at the receiving team's 45-yard line (Previously, the kickoff team lined up at the 40-yard line).
- Receiving Team Zone: The receiving team's set up zone will stretch from its 40-yard line to the 35-yard line and must have at least nine players in that zone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line to the 30-yard line.)
- Landing Zone: The landing zone will be from the receiving team's 20-yard line to the goal line. The ball must reach the landing zone or it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.
- Out of Bounds: If the ball travels out of bounds, it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.
- Touchback Spots: There will be two touchback spots — the 40-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone, and the 20-yard-line for balls that hit in the landing zone and then enter the endzone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone).



HEAD COACH RICKY PROEHL

On December 29th, 2025, the St. Louis Battlehawks announced that Ricky Proehl would be the head coach for the 2026 season following the departure of previous head coach, Anthony Becht. Proehl joins the Battlehawks as a man known for his clutch postseason performances and long-term consistency.

Proehl played 17 seasons at wide receiver in the NFL. Selected 58th by the Arizona Cardinals in the 1990 NFL Draft, he went on to also play for the Seattle Seahawks, Chicago Bears, St. Louis Rams, Carolina Panthers and Indianapolis Colts. During his time in the league, he appeared in four Super Bowls and won two: XXXIV with the St. Louis Rams and XLI with the Indianapolis Colts.

Proehl was a key contributor to the Rams "Greatest Show on Turf" era. He caught the game winning touchdown in the 1999 NFC Championship Game for the St. Louis Rams, which many consider to be the greatest catch in team history.

Following his playing career, Proehl joined the coaching staff for the Carolina Panthers as an offensive assistant, later becoming a wide receiver coach. He was with the Panthers through their Super Bowl Run. This is Proehl's second stint with the Battlehawks, as he served as the Wide Receivers coach during the 2023 season.

A graduate of Wake Forest, Proehl was a four year letterman and the school's leader all-time in receiving yards (2,949). In 1989, he was named First-Team All-ACC.
