THE SEASON'S SLATE

The DC Defenders will play 10 regular season games during the 2026 UFL season. The team will play against St. Louis (2x), Columbus, Houston, Birmingham, Dallas, Louisville (2x) and Orlando (2x). Below are a few scheduling nuggets:

- DC will take part in home openers during Week 1 (at St. Louis) and Week 2 (at Columbus).
- Six of the team's 10 games will be played in the eastern time zone.
- DC's last four regular season games will be back-to-back matchups with Louisville and Orlando.
- Despite training in Texas, the team does not have a game in the Lone Star State this season.

This season marks the debut of the "United Bowl" as the league's championship game, a name that embodies the UFL's identity and mission to bring fans, players, and communities together through a shared love of football. Representing the game's power to unite people, the United Bowl will invite everyone into the huddle, celebrating a year defined by connection, innovation, and unity. United Bowl performers, giveaways, and events surrounding the championship game will be announced in the near future. Tickets to The 2026 United Bowl will be available through Ticketmaster and will go on sale to the general public starting Friday, May 1 at 11:00 a.m. ET.

The United Football League (UFL) is the premier professional spring football league, powered by the visionary leadership and investment of Mike Repole and Impact Capital, RedBird Capital Partners, FOX, Dany Garcia, Dwayne Johnson, and ESPN. Built on innovation, accessibility, and competitive excellence, the UFL delivers the most engaging professional football experience in the world—for both players and fans. The league features eight teams: the Birmingham Stallions, Columbus Aviators, Dallas Renegades, DC Defenders, Houston Gamblers, Louisville Kings, Orlando Storm, and St. Louis Battlehawks.

UFL RULES - HIGHLIGHTS

The United Football League (UFL) has adopted a number of innovative rules from both previous leagues to deliver an exciting, fast-paced game with plenty of action.

Four-Point Field Goal

Field goals of 60 yards or longer are worth four points instead of three.

Points After Touchdown (PAT) Options

- 1 point: 33-yard field goal
- 2 points: Run/pass from the 2-yard line
- 3 points: Run/pass from the 8-yard line

One Foot In Bounds

Only one foot in bounds is required for a legal catch (NCAA-style rule).

Half-Distance Penalties

Red Zone penalties will be enforced as half the distance to the goal, consistent with NFL standards.

Elimination of the Tush Push

The "Tush Push" quarterback sneak — where teammates push the QB forward immediately after the snap — is not allowed.

No Punting Inside the 50

- Teams cannot punt once the ball is inside the opponent's 49-yard line or closer.
- If the ball is made ready inside the 50, a later penalty cannot restore punting eligibility.
- Teams may punt at exactly the 50-yard line.
- This restriction does not apply after the two-minute warning of either half.

Overtime Format

- Teams alternate plays from the 5-yard line.
- Each team gets three attempts.
- If still tied, alternating attempts continue until a winner is decided.
- A coin toss determines first choice (offense or defense).

Coin Toss Procedure

- Used at the start of the game and before overtime.
- The visiting team calls heads or tails.
- The winner chooses possession or direction.

New Kickoff Rules

- **Kickoff Line:** The ball will be kicked off from the 30-yard line.
- **Kickoff Team:** The 10 remaining players on the kickoff team will line up at the receiving team's 45-yard line (Previously, the kickoff team lined up at the 40-yard line).
- **Receiving Team Zone:** The receiving team's setup zone will stretch from its 40-yard line to the 35-yard line and must have at least nine players in that zone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line to the 30-yard line.)
- **Landing Zone:** The landing zone will be from the receiving team's 20-yard line to the goal line. The ball must reach the landing zone or it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.
- **Out of Bounds:** If the ball travels out of bounds, it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.
- **Touchback Spots:** There will be two touchback spots – the 40-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone, and the 20-yard-line for balls that hit in the landing zone and then enter the endzone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone).



ON AND OFF THE FIELD SUCCESS

UFL-TO-NFL SUCCESS STORIES

Overall, 65 players from the past two United Football League seasons, along with alumni from the modern era of spring football (2020–present), earned spots on NFL 53-man rosters or were added to practice squads during the 2025 NFL season. The continued presence of spring football talent at the next level highlights the UFL’s growing role as a legitimate developmental pathway to the NFL.

Among those success stories, UFL kickers have been particularly impactful, translating their spring league opportunities into standout performances on NFL special teams units. Several have quickly established themselves as reliable options at the professional level, with a few even emerging as breakout contributors for their teams. Those standout kickers are highlighted below:

BRANDON AUBREY



Aubrey connected on 36-of-42 field goal attempts this past season and was 11-of-17 from 50+ yards, which was tied for the most in the league.

Aubrey made NFL history in Week Seven, connecting on a 61-yard field goal to become the first player with five made field goals of 60-plus-yards. In Week Two, he became the first kicker in NFL history to convert a game-tying field goal with no time remaining and a game-winning field goal with no time remaining in over-time in the same game.

JAKE BATES



Bates connected on 27-of-34 field goal attempts this past season and converted 54-of-56 extra point attempts, totaling 135 points in 17 games. His 59-yard field goal marked his longest of the season.

Bates also showed his range throughout the season, converting 4-of-9 attempts from 50+ yards while remaining perfect on all kicks under 40 yards.

HARRISON MEVIS



Mevis was promoted from the Rams’ practice squad for Weeks 10 and 11 before earning a spot on the active roster in Week 12. He made an immediate impact, hitting field goals from 52 and 40 yards. Through nine NFL games, he has successfully converted all 39 of his extra-point attempts and has gone 12-for-13 on field goals.

ANDRE SZMYT



Szmyt converted on 24-of-27 field goal attempts (5-of-6 from 50-plus yards) this season. He earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors in Week Three after hitting a 55-yard walk-off field goal, then closed the season by converting a game-winning 49-yard kick as time expired in the Browns win last week.

Szmyt still holds the Battlehawks record with a 61-yard field goal, which he booted in Week Seven against the Birmingham Stallions in 2024.

DEFENDERS IN THE COMMUNITY



2025 ALL-UFL RETURNERS

The Defenders return four All-UFL players from last season.

Derick Roberson – DE

- Tied for third in the league with 5.5 sacks last season and totaled 27 tackles in nine games.

Joe Wallace – DT

- Finished with 38 total tackles (10 for loss) and 4.5 sacks which ranked sixth in the league over 10 games last season.

Deandre Baker – CB

- A two-time All-UFL selection, recorded a career-high two interceptions in 10 games played, tied for second-most in the UFL. Totaled 10 pass breakups which ranked third in the league.

Yasir Durant – T

- Started every game at left tackle and allowed just one sack and eight pressures. Anchored an offensive line that allowed the fewest sacks in the league last year (10).

LAST TIME OUT

The Defenders defeated the Dallas Renegades at home for a 24-6 victory, their fifth-straight win.

- Quarterback Jordan Ta'amu completed 20 of his 28 passes for 227 yards and recorded three touchdowns.
- Tight end Briley Moore led DC's receiving corps with 59 yards on three catches, including a 51-yard reception,
- Wide receiver Cornell Powell recorded his first receiving touchdown of the season and finished the day with 44 receiving yards.
- Linebacker Micah Baskerville and safety Deontay Anderson shared the team lead for tackles with seven on Saturday. This was Baskerville's second game leading the team in tackles in 2026.
- Deandre Baker posted his first interception of the year since week eight against Dallas in 2025.
- Kicker Matt McCrane legged out a 56-yard field goal last week and has now tallied a 55+ yard field goal in three of his last four games.

DMV TIES

The DC Defenders have a few players who hail from the DMV area or have played college football nearby: Safety Sam Kidd (Reston, Va), Guard Johari Branch (Maryland football) and Tackle Jaelyn Duncan (Maryland football). Cornerback Gabriel Taylor is the younger brother of the late Washington Redskin Sean Taylor, who was named to two pro bowls.

SERIES HISTORY

This will be the first ever matchup between DC and Louisville.

DEFENDERS TIES TO LOUISVILLE

- Quarterback Jason Bean played for Louisville in four games this season before he was traded to DC on April 19.
- Ta'amu and wide receiver Braylon Sanders were college teammates with Kings punter Mac Brown at Ole Miss.
- Linebackers Curtis Jacobs and Brandon Smith were college teammates with Kings safety Keaton Ellis at Penn State.
- Bean and tight end Mason Fairchild were college teammates with Kings defensive end Lonnie Phelps at Kansas.
- Cornerback Willie Drew Jr. and Kings tight end Chris Pierce Jr. were high school football teammates in Smithfield, VA. Drew was Pierce's quarterback at Smithfield High School.

KINGS TIES TO DMV

- Kings quarterback Mike DiLiello played for the DC Defenders in 2024-2026 before he was traded to Louisville on April 19.
- Kings running back Ian Wheeler played collegiately at Howard.
- Kings wide receiver Kaden Prather is from Montgomery Village, Maryland and played with the Terps in college.
- Kings cornerback Bryce Hall played collegiately at Virginia.

Shannon Harris: Maintaining The Terror

It was an unforgettable journey, but one that got off to a shaky start. A little bit of advice and it went a long way. In the case of the DC Defenders, it took them all the way to the 2025 UFL Championship.

A few days before DC's season opener against the defending UFL Champion Birmingham Stallions, Head Coach Reggie Barlow left the team to take up the head coaching reins at Tennessee State. The Defenders had to find an interim head coach and fast. Enter Shannon Harris.

An 18-year veteran coach at the collegiate level who had joined the DC coaching staff in 2023, Harris would be making his head coaching debut in the 2025 season opener. Instead of rocking the boat by introducing a new philosophy and a new playbook, Harris decided to stay the course by adopting the advice of his friend and mentor Barlow.

"Reggie used to say to the team, 'We must maintain the terror or the empire is doomed,'" recalled Harris. "It was pretty much our theme coming into the season and we just maintained it. I told the team to not lose focus on what we've started and what we've created and keep that same fire and burning desire."

In his head coaching debut, Harris shocked the spring football world by directing DC to a surprising 18-11 win over the three-time champion Stallions in front of a home crowd at Audi Field.

"The system was already set and the biggest part of stepping in as interim coach was making sure we maintained the things that we've been doing up until that point," said Harris. "Let's not stray away from that, let's build off of it."

The Defenders went on a strong run to begin the 2025 season with four wins through their first five games. During that stretch, Harris emphasized the team's grit and resilience that played a major role in the victories.

"The resiliency of the entire team was what stuck out to me most," said Harris. "We lost our offensive line coach on Day One of camp and then we lost Coach Barlow. Next, we lost our defensive coordinator after Week Two. The grit and resiliency of the entire team – the players, the coaches, and the support staff – kept us locked in."

The motto rang true in Week Seven when the Defenders spread the wealth and crafted some trickery to cement their 32-24 win over the San Antonio Brahmas. Leading 25-24 with less than two minutes left in the game, quarterback Jordan Ta'amu lofted a floater to offensive tackle, Gunner Britton, who made a one-handed grab in the endzone. Britton celebrated the score with a choreographed dance that was weeks in the making, according to Harris.

"They couldn't wait to run it because they had been practicing that dance for weeks and were waiting for that play to get called to see the big man celebration," said Harris.

As the Defenders maintained the terror, the good times rolled the following week when they hosted the Arlington Renegades at Audi Field with a chance to clinch a playoff berth. Holding a slim 33-30 lead with six seconds left in the game, Renegades quarterback Luis Perez threw a pass towards DC's sideline, but defensive back Deandre Baker snagged the ball for an interception to end the game and send the team to the playoffs.

"I was yelling to the players to guard the sideline as he was going underneath the center," said Harris about the nail-biting moment. "It's Luis Perez, man. He'll try anything."

With the team playoff bound, the Defenders had to square off against the St.



Louis Battlehawks for the XFL Conference Championship in St. Louis. While it seemed like a disadvantage playing away from the hometown crowd at Audi Field, Harris turned the narrative on its head with two words: "Audi West."

"We've had a lot of success out there in St. Louis so anytime you have success on the road, you kind of get comfortable," said Harris. "Throughout the course of the week on our itineraries, we had 'Audi West' and they bought into it. The team started to feel comfortable. They started believing in all the things that we were saying so that's kind of how it came to be."

The result was that DC entered The Dome at America's Center with a chip on their shoulders and finished with a 36-18 win to advance to the 2025 UFL Championship Game at the same stadium six days later. One of the strongest performers during the XFL Conference Championship was running back Deon Jackson, who finished with a career-high 110 rushing yards on 21 carries and added two touchdowns.

"Throughout the course of the year, you saw big run after big run every week so having him here this year was huge for us and we were very grateful to get him" said Harris.

Prior to the UFL Championship, Harris was recognized with the UFL Coach of the Year Award for a season, which at the start of the season seemed impossible.

"It's such a blessing to hear how appreciative the players, the coaches, support staff and our fans were of me being there," said Harris. "I can't thank everyone enough for all of that."

With one final game of the season, Harris coached opposite Michigan Panthers Head Coach Mike Nolan, who coached the San Francisco 49ers, a team that Harris was a fan of. After toe met leather, the Panthers gained an early 13-0 advantage but Harris kept a cool head and gave a simple message to the team: don't press.

"Let's not press in this moment," recalled Harris telling the players after the Panthers took the quick lead. "I told them to just do their assignments, do their job right and let everything else take care of itself."

DC's offense soon went into overdrive as Ta'amu had his best game of the season, finishing 21-for-29 with 390 yards, five touchdowns (four pass, one rush) to lead DC to a 58-34 victory. His standout performance led him to being named the UFL Championship Game MVP.

"Over the past three years, our relationship has grown tremendously," said Harris about his star quarterback. "I was telling Jordan all the time, 'It's going to be a huge year for us' and it turned out to be just that."

During a season that began with question marks, Harris maintained the terror and ended it with an exclamation point...and a UFL Championship.

"We did it, we did it right, and we did it our way," said the proud coach. "We busted our butts and worked so hard to get to that moment and see the fruits of our labor come into existence and to see so many people happy and excited. That's the part for me where I was most proud of. It was the excitement that I saw on everyone else's face."

Hail to the Defenders...and Hail to Coach Harris.

SHANNON HARRIS

Head Coach

Tennessee State
Defenders: 4th year

Shannon Harris, the recipient of the 2025 UFL Buddy Teevens Coach of the Year Award, was promoted to head coach last July after serving as the interim head coach for the 2025 season. In Harris' first season guiding DC, the Defenders improved from a 4-6 record in 2024 to 6-4 in 2025 before going on to a 36-18 victory over the St. Louis Battlehawks in the 2025 XFL Conference Championship Game and then to a 58-34 win over the Michigan Panthers in the 2025 UFL Championship.

In his second season as the quarterbacks coach in 2024, Harris oversaw the development of Jordan Ta'amu, who ranked second in the UFL in total yards (1,845), passing touchdowns (15) and third in completions (161). Harris had continued success with Ta'amu in 2023 as the Ole Miss product won XFL's Offensive Player of the Year, passing for 1,878 yards, 14 touchdowns and three rushing touchdowns.

Prior to the DC Defenders, he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Virginia State University beginning in 2021. During the 2022 season, he oversaw an offense that averaged 30.5 points and 212.4 rushing yards per game throughout their 6-4 season.

Before coaching for the Trojans, he served as offensive coordinator for the 2019 season at Tennessee State University after spending a year as offensive analyst for the Tigers in 2018. Previously, Harris coached for 16 years in Division 1, including a three-year stint as wide receiver coach and passing game coordinator at Alcorn State University from 2015-17.

In 2017, Alcorn led the SWAC in both total offense with 461.3 yards per game and first downs with 241. Harris developed wide receiver Norlando Veals who ranked first in the SWAC in both receiving yards with 901 and receiving yards per game with 81.9. For his efforts, Veals finished as an All-Conference FirstTeam selection and was named HBCU All-America Honorable Mention.

He also spent time with the Tennessee Titans in 2014 during summer camp and for their first two preseason games as an intern and was responsible for breaking down film. Harris returned to the Titans in 2015 to serve as an intern for the Titans summer mini-camp, working with the wide receivers.

Harris earned his Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Tennessee State University in May of 2004. As a student-athlete, Harris started at quarterback for the Tigers, earning the role of team captain and Team Most Valuable Player. As a senior, he was a member of the Walter Payton Award Ballot in 2001.

FRED KAISS

Offensive Coordinator

The 2025 UFL Assistant Coach of the Year, Kaiss, who helped lead the DC Defenders to the 2025 UFL Championship, returns as the team's offensive coordinator, a role that he has held since 2023.

During his coaching career, he has served on the offensive side of the ball in various coaching positions with Alcorn State University (2015-17), Alabama State University (2011-14), Tennessee State University (2006-09), Hampton University (2001-05), Alabama A&M University (2000), Tennessee State University (1997-99), and Southern University (1993-95).

BLAKE WILLIAMS

Defensive Coordinator

Princeton
Defenders: 2nd Year

A graduate of Princeton University where he was four-year letterman at defensive back, Williams returns as defensive coordinator for the DC Defenders after helping to lead the team to the 2025 UFL Championship. Prior to being named defensive coordinator, Williams was the team's interim defensive coordinator.

The son of former NFL Head Coach Gregg Williams, he was a defensive assistant for the NFL's New York Jets (2019-20) and a defensive coach for Cleveland Browns (2017-18). In 2012, he served as the defensive coordinator for the St. Louis Rams (2012). Williams was also on the defensive staffs for the New Orleans Saints (2009-11), Jacksonville Jaguars (2008) and Washington Redskins (2006-07). With the Saints in 2009, he contributed to the team's Super Bowl XLIV championship.

BRIAN BRASWELL

Offensive Line/Tight Ends

Braswell is an experienced Offensive Line Coach currently leading the front line for the DC Defenders in the UFL.

With a coaching career spanning over 15 years, he has established a reputation for developing elite talent across the NFL, XFL, and collegiate levels, most notably during a successful four-year stint at the University of Maryland.

His professional resume includes five seasons in the NFL with the Cincinnati Bengals and Cleveland Browns, as well as specialized work with the St. Louis Battlehawks.

A former standout lineman at Hampton University, Braswell is widely recognized for his technical expertise in pass protection and his ability to mentor prospects into NFL-caliber starters.

With over two decades of experience spanning the NFL, NCAA, and NAIA levels, Kruse's career highlights include a tenure as the Head Coach at William Jewell College—where he was named the 2014 GLVC Coach of the Year—and coaching roles with the Kansas City Chiefs and Cleveland Browns.

In addition to his on-field leadership, he has influenced the sport digitally as a scheme consultant for the EA Sports Madden and College Football franchises.



Jordan Ta'amu: The Winning Recipe

It was a blessing in disguise.

After establishing a league-high 17 passing touchdowns and setting a career-high 2,155 passing yards, the DC Defenders were sure that their quarterback Jordan Ta'amu would be named the UFL Most Valuable Player for the 2025 season, but when Michigan Panthers quarterback Bryce Perkins' name was called at the UFL Award Ceremony the night before the championship game between DC and Michigan, it proved to be the winning recipe for what DC needed.

"I attribute that success to the coaches and to everyone being bought in since Day One," Ta'amu said. "We didn't have a great season (in 2024) and everyone came back hungrier this season."

Despite the gaudy numbers, Ta'amu's name wasn't called when UFL Regular Season MVP Award was announced one day before the UFL Championship Game in St. Louis. But his – and the team's – initial disappointment quickly turned into motivation ahead of the title game. Defenders tight end Briley Moore was the first player to contact Ta'amu after the MVP announcement and sent a message that proved prophetic just 24 hours later.

"Our tight end Briley Moore sent me a text that said, 'When you're holding up that championship trophy on stage tomorrow night, I'm gonna be chanting MVP,'" Ta'amu recalled after the disappointment of not receiving the league's top honor. "It fired everybody up, not just myself, but everybody on the offense and defense."

With a chip on their shoulders, the Defenders and Ta'amu entered The Dome at America's Center in St. Louis laser-focused on the UFL Championship Trophy. Ta'amu's only obstacle was the Michigan Panthers defense, which held Ta'amu and the Defenders to just 14 points in a 38-14 loss in Detroit in Week Six.

"We beat ourselves the first time we played them," Ta'amu said. "This time, we wanted to show them that we were the better team."

Ta'amu kickstarted DC's offense early in the game when he found a wide open Jaydon Mickens for a 26-yard touchdown to tie the game 6-6 midway through the first quarter. Following that early success, Ta'amu proceeded to dissect Michigan's defense in the first half with a whopping 320 passing yards and four total touchdowns.

"I think everything was just clicking," Ta'amu said. "Michigan didn't change their defense much from the first time we played them. Having that experience against that team the first time and then going back to watching game film and realizing all the different things that we missed, all those worked in the championship game."

Leading 37-19 at halftime, the Defenders rolled to a 58-34 victory and their first championship. DC's 58 points were the most ever scored in a UFL game and the most scored in the modern era of spring football. This victory was even sweeter to Ta'amu because his family traveled from Pearl City, Hawaii to St. Louis to watch him win his first-ever championship.

"Just having them out there meant a lot," he said. "Taking the time to do that and come watch me play, their support is unconditional. Having them there made my heart at ease, so it was awesome."

In the fourth championship game appearance of his career and the second in spring football, Ta'amu finally emerged victorious and earned a second reward as the unanimous UFL Championship Game MVP after finishing with 390 passing yards and five total touchdowns, the most ever for both categories in a UFL game. As he stepped onto the stage with his coaches and teammates to hoist the UFL Championship trophy, Ta'amu savored every moment.

"I remember that I had my money lei around my neck that my family gave me," he recalled. "UFL Owner Dany Garcia and Coach Shannon Harris were next to me and I was thinking to myself, 'This is such a cool moment that I'll never forget.'"

With time to reflect on the best season he's had as a professional, Ta'amu believes he grew immeasurably on and off the field throughout the 2025 season.

"This season helped me become a leader on the field and helped me raise my voice a little bit," he said. "It's not only being the leader on the field, but also off the field in gathering your teammates and rallying guys up to support one goal. When you do that, you can go a long way in life."
