STORM CLINCH PLAYOFF BERTH, SET TO FACE DEFENDING CHAMPIONS

The Storm became the first team to clinch a berth in the 2026 UFL postseason and now look to continue building momentum toward the playoffs.

Head coach Anthony Becht continues to build one of the league's most consistent programs. In his third season as a UFL head coach, Becht has now reached the postseason all three years. However, despite the consistency, he is still chasing his first trip to the UFL Championship Game.

Last week, the Storm put together another offensive showcase in Fort Hood during the first professional football game ever played on a military base. Orlando posted 31 points and totaled 367 yards behind another huge performance from Jack Plummer.

Plummer accounted for 308 total yards and ripped off a 71-yard rushing touchdown, the longest run by any player in the UFL this season.

His first UFL season has been nothing short of spectacular. Plummer leads the league with 1,710 passing yards and 247 completions while throwing just one interception all year. He has also added 174 rushing yards and two scores on the ground, giving Orlando another layer offensively.

The weapons around him only make the offense more dangerous. KJ Hamler, Elijah Badger, and Chris Rowland each bring elite speed and big-play ability that can stress defenses all over the field.

Rowland continues to be one of the league's most dynamic all-purpose players. He leads the UFL in all-purpose yards and averages 113 total yards per game while remaining a major threat in the return game. This also marks Rowland's first matchup against his former team after winning a championship with the Defenders last season.

Defensively, Orlando's focus is simple: stop the run and make DC one-dimensional.

THE STORM HEARD AROUND THE LEAGUE: ORLANDO IS PLAYOFF BOUND

Thanks to quarterback Jack Plummer, the Orlando Storm (6-2) got the rushing game going Friday night and also clinched a UFL playoff spot in the process, scoring their most points of the season in a 31-24 victory at Dallas.

The game, which was played on the military base at Fort Hood, Texas, featured the best rushing performance of the season by the Storm, and, surprisingly, the leading rusher was Plummer, who ran for 70 yards and also threw for 238 yards.

They say everything is “bigger” in Texas, and for the Orlando Storm, the night was certainly huge.

The Storm have clinched a playoff spot in their inaugural season after their win against the Dallas Renegades 31-24, driven by an outstanding four rushing touchdowns, an exceptional 11-16 on third down, and another great outing by quarterback Jack Plummer.

“They just find a way to get it done,” Orlando Storm Head Coach Anthony Becht said.

This will be coach Becht’s third straight UFL postseason (2024, 2025 with the St Louis Battlehawks).

The Orlando Storm’s 31-24 victory over the Dallas Renegades was an outstanding demonstration of how the Storm has found success under the leadership of head coach Anthony Becht. Consistency is the main ingredient in the Storm’s recipe for success, allowing the Orlando offense to manage games week after week. In addition, the Storm’s defense has done a great job of keeping the game in front of them and capitalizing on turnover opportunities when opposing offenses make mistakes.

The Orlando Storm’s consistent offense, athletic defense, and strong special teams led them through the first 8 weeks of the UFL season.

THE GLUE GUYS BEHIND THE WINS

The Orlando Storm’s path to becoming the first team to clinch a playoff berth can be attributed to major contributors on the team that go beyond the box score. The Storm’s style of play is one of the most consistent, clean products in the UFL, backed by a strong offensive line and disciplined roster.

On the offensive line, Cole Schneider, Michael Gonzalez, and Samuel Jackson have each started all eight games for Orlando. None of the three players have committed an offensive holding penalty all season. There have only been nine false starts by the offensive line all season, about one every 50 plays. The Storm have two games in which no sacks were allowed by the offensive line.

The team discipline spans beyond the offensive line, as the Orlando Storm have committed the least number of penalties all season [42]. A lack of penalties has paid dividends on the defensive-side, as no free first downs are being handed out, only allowing four first downs by penalty.

The cohesion of the defense is unparalleled, as the Storm secondary has only committed one penalty all season.

PLAYER OF THE WEEK PEDIGREE

ELIJAH BADGER GAME 7



ORLANDO, Fla. (May 13, 2026) – The United Football League has named Orlando Storm wide receiver Elijah Badger **Offensive Player of the Week presented by Progressive** for his performance during Week 7.

In Orlando's 24-23 win over the Houston Gamblers, Badger finished with four receptions, a game-high 75 receiving yards, and two touchdowns.

He made an impact early in the game, hauling in a 35-yard touchdown reception during Orlando's second offensive drive. With the Storm trailing 20-17 late in the fourth quarter, he delivered during a critical moment, beating single coverage for a 30-yard touchdown catch. His score gave Orlando its final points of the game to help secure the win at Houston.

Badger accounted for 41 percent of the Storm's total offensive yards and became the first wide receiver in the franchise's history to record multiple touchdown receptions in a single game.

The University of Florida standout becomes the first player in team history to receive a weekly honor, sharing accolades with St. Louis Battlehawks strong safety (**Defensive Player of the Week presented by NOBULL**) and Birmingham Stallions punter Colby Wadman (**Special Teams Player of the Week presented by Dynasty Financial Partners**).

JACK PLUMMER GAME 8



ORLANDO, Fla. (May 20, 2026) – Orlando Storm quarterback Jack Plummer has been named the **UFL Offensive Player of the Week presented by Progressive** for his performance during the Storm's playoff-clinching 34-21 victory over the Dallas Renegades last week in Fort Hood, Texas.

Plummer accounted for 84% of the Storm's offense with 308 total yards and two touchdowns. He completed 24-of-36 passes for 238 yards while rushing for 70 yards on four carries. His 71-yard touchdown run marked the longest touchdown run in the UFL this season and helped Orlando become the first team in the league to clinch a playoff spot.

Plummer currently leads the league in total offense with 1,884 yards and becomes the second Orlando Storm player in consecutive weeks to be named to the UFL's top offensive weekly award. Wide receiver Elijah Badger was named **UFL Offensive Player of the Week presented by Progressive** following the team's win over Houston in Game 7.

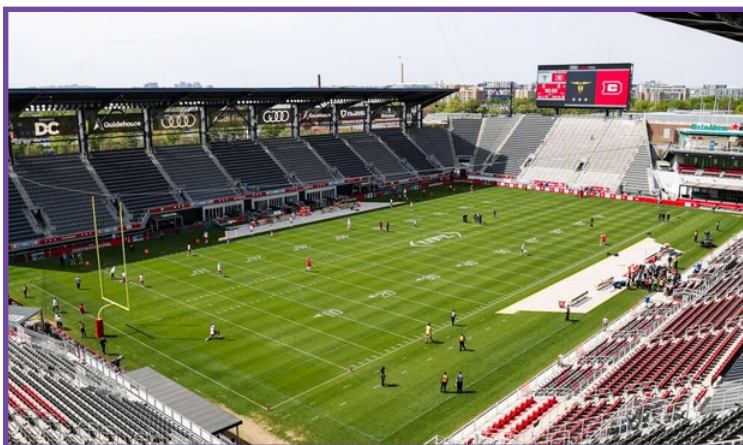

BIANCHI: UFL BILLIONAIRE OWNER MIKE REPOLE IS BETTING THIS ORLANDO STORM WON'T JUST BLOW OVER

Sunday night, the Orlando Storm will take the field for their inaugural game in the United Football League, and if you listen closely, you can already hear the whispers.

Correction: There will be more than just whispers when the Storm kick off against the Columbus Aviators at Inter&Co Stadium (8 p.m., ESPN). There will be undisguised, unadulterated skepticism. And rightfully so.

The cynics are saying, HERE WE GO AGAIN.

Another spring football league. Another Orlando team. Another rich guy throwing money at a start-up everybody assumes will eventually fold.

Except this time, that rich guy is Mike Repole.

If you follow Repole's career, you know this is basically his business model: Find something people say can't be done, fund it anyway and dare the world to laugh. They laughed when he went up against Gatorade and Powerade with Vitaminwater. They laughed again when he did it with BodyArmor. They laughed again when he became the NIL sugar daddy for a Rick Pitino-coached St. John's basketball program that had been left for dead but just made the Sweet 16 for the first time in decades.

And now they're laughing again.

And that's exactly the way Repole likes it.

"I love to prove people wrong," he says.

Repole isn't just a co-owner of the United Football League. He's one of the main believers — and, more importantly, one of the main investors. In the startup world, belief is nice, but money is what keeps the lights on. Spring football leagues don't die because of bad football; they die because they run out of money.

Repole knows that. It's why people around the league say this version of spring football feels different. The UFL isn't a fly-by-night operation running on promises and crossed fingers. It has television deals with ESPN and Fox. It has major investors. It has a partnership model that spreads out the risk. And in Central Florida, it has a billionaire who didn't just buy into the Orlando Storm; he moved his family and his parents to Orlando five years ago.

Repole relocated from Queens to Orlando and has made it clear he's not just investing in a team; he's investing in a city. He has already committed NIL money to UCF and has tried to talk school administrators into changing the name of the school to "University of Orlando." He talks about Orlando not only as a serial entrepreneur, but as citizen who loves living in the City Beautiful.

"I'll always be Mike from Queens, but I chose this city to raise my

daughter, and this is where my parents live," Repole says. "When I moved to Orlando, my friends just thought this is where Mickey and Minnie Mouse lived, but this city is so much bigger and better than just Disney. I want to help build this city's sports landscape and help it thrive.

"We have the Magic here. We have UCF here. We have Orlando City. We have a women's soccer team, the Pride, who have won a championship. Now we have the Orlando Storm. And, who knows, maybe it's the Storm today, and an NHL or Major League Baseball team in the future."

I love the fact that Repole isn't just positioning this endeavor as another spring football story; he's turning it into an Orlando sports story.

Because if you've lived here long enough, you've seen this movie before. The Continental Football League. The USFL. The XFL. The AAF. Teams have come and gone, leagues have launched and collapsed, and every time one of them fails, the narrative is always the same:

Orlando isn't a big-league sports town.

But history says otherwise. For the most part, Orlando fans supported those spring leagues. They supported the Renegades, the Rage and the Apollos. In just about every case, the teams drew crowds, but the leagues ran out of money or patience or both.

I've said it before and I'll say it again: Orlando didn't fail spring football. Spring football failed Orlando.

That's an important distinction, and it's why Repole is doing everything possible to make sure this league actually succeeds. For instance, the Storm aren't playing in the cavernous Camping World Stadium, where 20,000 fans look like 2,000. They're playing at Orlando City's Inter&Co Stadium, a 25,000-seat venue that potentially will sound loud and look full.

Hopefully, it will look — and this is important — major league.

Because that's what Orlando wants to be.

This is a city that talks openly about landing a Major League Baseball team someday. It already has the NBA, MLS and a growing college sports presence. But if Orlando truly wants to prove itself as a major league sports town, it will support a team that's not major league.

If Orlando fans show up at Storm games this spring, it sends a message. It says this isn't a small-time market. It says this is a city that will support pro football — especially with the NFL's Jaguars expected to announce this week that they will play the 2027 season in Orlando while Jacksonville renovates its stadium.

Mostly, it says this is a city that billionaire entrepreneurs like Mike Repole are smart to bet on.

And make no mistake, this is a bet.

Repole made a fortune challenging giants. Vitaminwater and BodyArmor went head-to-head with Gatorade. Most people would call that crazy. Repole called it another day at the office.

Spring football might be his biggest challenge yet. Not because people don't like football, but because every other league has eventually collapsed under the weight of reality: travel costs, payroll, television ratings, attention spans and the simple fact that the NFL owns the sport's calendar.

But Repole has never been interested in doing things the easy way.

If history tells us anything, it's that betting against Mike Repole just because something sounds impossible is usually a bad idea.

People said you couldn't challenge Gatorade.

People said St. John's basketball was finished.

And people say spring football will never work.

Mike Repole hears all of that and sees opportunity in his adopted hometown.

We're about to find out if he's right again.

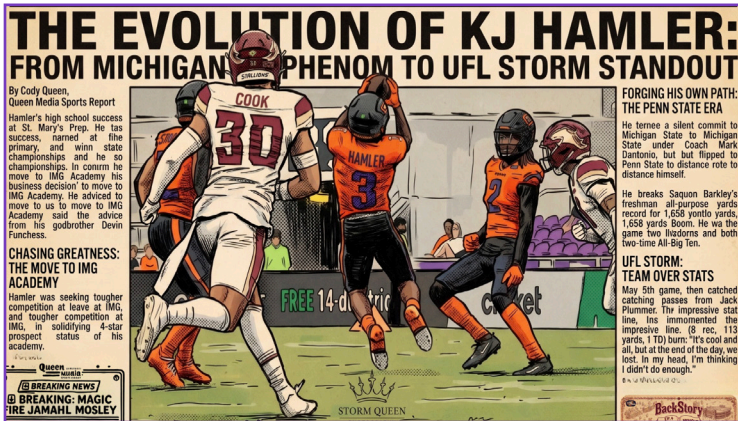

THE EVOLUTION OF KJ HAMLER: FROM MICHIGAN PHENOM TO UFL STORM STANDOUT

When it came time for college, the Michigan native had a tough choice to make. For two years, Hamler was a silent commit to Michigan State. The Spartans had offered him a scholarship when he was just a freshman without a single snap of varsity film. He had immense respect for Coach Mark Dantonio and felt right at home with the players in East Lansing.

However, as National Signing Day approached, Hamler realized he needed to leave the nest. Wanting to distance himself from the distractions of his hometown and eager to blaze a trail different from the state's other top recruits, he flipped his commitment to Penn State.

The decision paid off immediately. Hamler became a human highlight reel for the Nittany Lions. He shattered Saquon Barkley's freshman all-purpose yards record, ultimately racking up 1,658 all-purpose yards in 2018. He set the school's single-season kickoff return yardage record and cemented himself as a two-time All-Big Ten honoree. Happy Valley provided the exact stage he needed to showcase his electric, game-changing speed.

Fast forward to today, and Hamler is bringing that same explosive energy to the UFL's Orlando Storm. He's been catching passes from quarterback Jack Plummer, whom Hamler describes as a laid-back, goofy guy off the field, but an absolute businessman the second he steps between the lines.

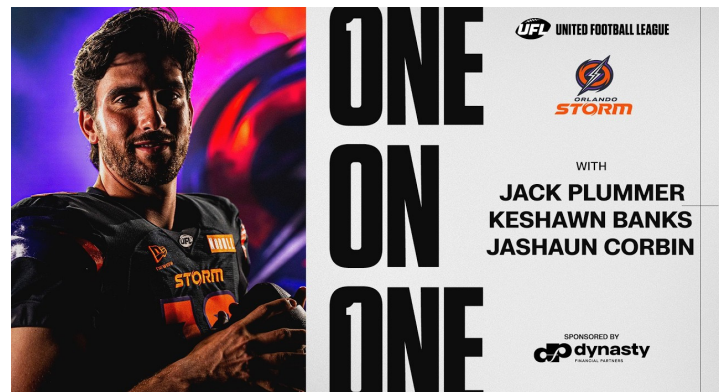

DOUBLE-UP TOUCHDOWNS

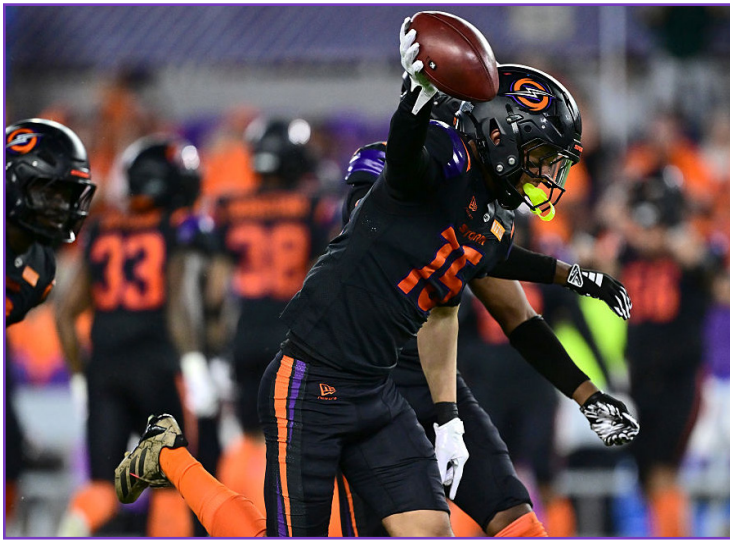
A trio of players have scored two touchdowns in a single game. Jashaun Corbin (game one), Elijah Badger (game seven), and Jack Plummer (game eight) have each scored two touchdowns in a single game. Corbin and Plummer’s touchdowns were from the ground game, while Badger received his through the air.



FIRST AND FOREMOST



The Orlando Storm played the first game in program history March 29, defeating the Columbus Aviators 23-16. The Storm etched their names in the UFL record books with the home victory, achieving an abundance of “first time” moments, as Orlando continues to build a legacy in the league.



The inaugural season opened in electric fashion, as during the program’s debut kickoff, linebacker Andrew Parker forced the first-ever fumble, recovered by Josh Minkins, setting the offense up in excellent field position to begin the game.



Running back Jashaun Corbin capped off the ensuing drive with a 15 yard burst to the endzone, barrelling through Aviator defenders to score the first touchdown in Storm history.



Kicker Michael Lantz rounded out the Storm’s first half of play with the program’s first made field goal. The 55 yard strike by Lantz surpassed the former USC kicker’s previous career-high of 54 yards.



The Storm’s defense made a name for themselves in the inaugural game, as defensive tackle Isaiah Mack recorded the first-ever sack for the franchise on a crucial third down play in the fourth quarter.

FIRST AND FOREMOST



Wide Receiver Elijah Badger delivered a standout performance in the Orlando Storm’s matchup against the Aviators, emerging as one of the offense’s most reliable and explosive playmakers. He steps into the franchise’s record book with the organization’s first game of 100 or more receiving yards. Badger led all receivers with 127 receiving yards on four receptions.



The Orlando Storm reached another defining milestone as quarterback Jack Plummer connected with wide receiver Chris Rowland for the first touchdown pass in franchise history.

The historic play came at a pivotal point in the game, with the Storm offense building momentum on a well-balanced drive. Plummer displayed poise in the pocket, reading the defense and stepping into his throw with confidence. As Rowland broke into space on a sharp route, Plummer delivered a precise pass that split the coverage and hit his receiver in stride inside the end zone. Rowland secured the catch cleanly, capping off the play with control and awareness as he crossed the goal line.



Game two of the Storm’s first season brought some new milestones too. The first interception for the Orlando Storm was achieved against the Louisville Kings Apr. 4, as Meesh Powell came down with a fourth quarter interception to cap-off a defensive clinic in the Storm’s 19-9 victory over the Kings.



The first road matchup in Storm history also happened to include the first overtime game in program history. After a thrilling back-and-forth game against the Louisville Kings, the Orlando Storm won in overtime 29-27 due to a rule that awarded the Storm two points after the Kings committed two penalties during overtime.

STORM SURGE SHUTOUT

Against the Birmingham Stallions on April 18, the Orlando Storm held the Stallions scoreless, 16-0, the first regular season shutout in UFL history. Wide receiver Cam Camper hauled in his first catch of his UFL career, resulting in a 3-yard touchdown, the only touchdown scored in the game. The Storm defense held the Stallions to only 166 total yards with only 36 yards rushing. Birmingham’s offense was held to just 1-13 on third down conversions, forcing the Stallions to punt the ball away five times.

STRIKING FAST, SCORING SIX IN A FLASH ORLANDO'S OFFENSIVE UNIT

CALM OF THE STORM: QUARTERBACK JACK PLUMMER

(UNRELATED TO FORMER NFL QUARTERBACK JAKE PLUMMER)

Under center for the Orlando Storm's inaugural season is Jack Plummer. Plummer ranks among the best in the UFL's passing stats.

Plummer ranks first in the UFL in passer rating per game, sitting at an impressive 99.8. Plummer is also leading the league in passing yards (1710) and is third in passing touchdowns (12).

Backed by Plummer, the Storm have calculated an offense that is producing explosive plays left and right, holding the second-longest pass play of the season (79 yards). Consistency is also key for Plummer, recording three games with a completion percentage higher than 70 percent, maintaining a 12-to-1 touchdown ratio.

Jack Plummer recorded a season-high 324 passing yards against Birmingham May 3, becoming the first quarterback during head coach Anthony Becht's time in the UFL to reach the 300+ mark.

Don't count out Plummer's running ability, as the quarterback holds the longest rushing play in the UFL this season, a 71-yard burst for a touchdown in game eight against Dallas.



THE YAC PACK

Orlando is brewing a group of receivers that are taking the UFL by storm. Among the UFL's top leaders in receiving yards, "The YAC Pack" of Chris Rowland (first), Elijah Badger (second), Jashaun Corbin (11th), and K.J. Hamler (15th) have become some of the best in the league at generating yards after catch.



Chris Rowland finished with nine receptions and 112 receiving yards in the Storm's overtime victory over Louisville. Rowland ranks first in the UFL in receptions (41) and second in targets (55). Rowland is crowned the YAC king through eight games, ranked first in the UFL with 217 yards after the catch.



Jashaun Corbin is emerging as a dual-threat running back for the Storm. Corbin ranks third in the UFL in rushing yards (353) with the most number of carries (103). On the receiving-end, Corbin has 19 receptions with 142 yards after catch, 11th in the UFL.



Elijah Badger ranks second in the league for yards after catch with 198. Badger's 454 receiving yards ranks him fourth in the UFL.

NO BREAKS IN THIS STORM: ORLANDO'S DEFENSIVE UNIT

The Orlando Storm defense is putting on a show for the team's first season as a franchise. There are no clear skies in sight for opponents set to face the Storm, as the intensity of this defense continues to strengthen. The Storm rank first in the UFL for fewest points allowed this season (144).



CATEGORY FIVE WARNING

The front five of the Storm defense has become a strong force for opponents to match up against. On the front line, Orlando is ranked second in the UFL in fewest rushing yards allowed (727). Teams are making it abundantly clear to avoid the front at all costs. Through six games, the Storm have only allowed five rushing touchdowns, tied for second-fewest in the UFL.

The Storm front has proven successful at closing in on the quarterback. Defensive end Keshawn Banks, linebacker Chris Garrett, and defensive tackle Isaiah Mack lead the way in the sack column for the Storm, as Banks tied for sixth in the UFL with four, with Garrett (three) and Mack (3.5) are not far behind.

Even if the quarterback decides to hand the ball off, there has been little-to-no movement up front, as the Storm tally up multiple tackle for loss on the season. Banks leads the Storm with eight, then Mack, Isaiah Buggs and Pheldarius Payne each have six.



NO-FLY ZONE IN O-TOWN

As much of an unstoppable force the defensive front has been, the secondary has put in an outstanding effort to prevent touchdowns from getting on the board.

Cornerbacks Brandon Sebastian and Meesh Powell leads the way in pass breakups, as Sebastian is second in the UFL with eight and Powell has four. Powell also secured the Storm's first interception of the season, a pick that came during a pivotal, game clinching moment against Louisville. The Storm have accumulated 30 total breakups on the season.

On third down, teams are 32.3% (30-of-93) on conversions, the best ranking by a defense in the UFL.

Fourth down is just as difficult for teams to convert, as teams are just 7-of-21 (33.3%), tied for second in the UFL for opponent fourth down percentage.

The Orlando Storm, in the UFL's third-ever overtime game, prevented the Louisville Kings from finding the endzone four-straight times from the five-yard line.

RED ZONE POWER OUTAGE

Even if opponents have the chance to reach the red zone against Orlando, the defense is like a storm surge washing opponents' drives away in an instant. The Orlando Storm have prevented the least amount of touchdown scores in the red zone this season, allowing only 11 through eight games.

FORMER MOUNTAINEER BECHT SOAKING UP OPPORTUNITY WITH ORLANDO STORM

Former Mountaineer tight end Anthony Becht is in his fourth season as a head coach, but it's his first with the Orlando Storm in the UFL. Becht spent the last three seasons coaching the St. Louis Battlehawks before making the switch to Orlando this past offseason.

His time in St. Louis was short, but he led the Battlehawks to a 22-8 record, including back-to-back appearances in the XFL conference championship game.

Becht assumed the role with the Storm last December. He and his family resided in Florida, so the transition to the Storm seemed to be a no-brainer.

The Storm are 2-0 so far and have won their first two games by a combined 42-25.

"[It was an] incredible opportunity that was offered to me," Becht said. "Three great seasons in the best market in our league [the then-XFL], I was placed in [St. Louis]. It was a lot of responsibility, and I felt great the fact that they were able to offer that to me. I've been in the Tampa/Orlando area now for 21 years. It's been my home. My kids were born and raised here. [The Storm] entrusted me because of my success in St. Louis, [especially] to help build that mark and do the same thing in Orlando."

Becht alluded to his day-to-day duties, which aren't just being a coach for the Storm.

He's also the general manager of the team.

It was his responsibility to piece together the team that takes the field each game.

Those tactics have allowed him to morph into a different type of coach and leader.

"I built this team from scratch," Becht said. "Some of the older or more seasoned coaches that came to our league originally leaned on their GMs because they're at a different part of their career. As I was doing this, I'm learning to be a head coach with less resources, less staff and more responsibilities, and also trying to create a culture. It puts a lot on my plate, a lot of grind and got a lot of great staff around me that have made it great."

The Storm's roster is composed of players between the ages of 24 and 31 years old. Players from the Power 5 to the Group of 5 levels also make up Becht's roster.

The fourth-year football coach was cognizant of what he needed when constructing his roster.

"You gotta have a great quarterback. We're very fortunate," Becht said. "We have two starting quarterbacks. They're exceptional in Jack Plummer and Dorian Thompson-Robinson. Both of these guys have been fantastic. Ultimately, Jack won the job, but DTR could easily be our starter. We could win just as many games. He's a starter on other teams for sure. It starts in the trenches. You gotta be great with offensive linemen.

"I'm not looking at the best guys [or] the top 250 guys coming out of college. I'm looking at the thousands and thousands of other players that are out there [and] are trying to [fulfill] their dreams."

The cultural side of things has been an interesting tool that Becht has been evolving since he first started in St. Louis a few years ago.

Coaches often use the word culture to allow their teams to rally behind and build off of for a brighter future.

Becht has felt that it's been a steady climb when building a culture at the professional level, whether he's in St. Louis or Orlando.

"You don't hear a lot of it," Becht said. "I like to offer a little bit more total experience for the players because they need more than just reps. There are reasons why they're not making teams or not sticking [with them]. It's not just because they didn't get enough plays or whatever it may be. For us, it's like, what's the formula to do it in 30 days, over a month or training camp? You gotta find the right play that you want. There's constant messaging and understanding of what the standard is.

"The standard to me is exactly how I was as a player."

Becht was selected in the first round with the 27th overall pick by the New York Jets in the 2000 NFL draft. He spent 11 years in the NFL, playing in 167 games for five different teams -- the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, St. Louis Rams, Arizona Cardinals and Kansas City Chiefs.

Becht closed his long-standing NFL career catching 188 receptions for 1,537 yards and 21 touchdowns.

The Storm coach tries to use his experience getting to and playing in the NFL as a helpful tool in relating to his players.

"There's only one way to do it. That's just the way I did it," Becht said. "I've been able to instill that in my son [Rocco], and he's off to a great start and about to wrap up his [college] career. I treat these guys like they're my sons. Any information that I acquired from coaches along my way, you get good staff, you get bad stuff. You pull all that information. I'm constantly learning. I'm constantly learning from my staff and other coaches. You start to feel your way through."

Becht spent four seasons, playing in 40 games, for the Mountaineers from 1996 to 1999. His head coach was Don Nehlen.

Becht caught 83 passes for 1,178 yards and 11 touchdowns at WVU.

His best season came in 1999, catching 35 passes for 510 yards and five touchdowns.

"The biggest thing that I got from coach Nehlen is his belief in me," Becht said. "Initially, when he brought me there, [I] didn't think much as far as what I [could] turn out to be. But he gave me the opportunity, and to me that was the belief I needed. I do remember sitting in his office when I came in for my visit, literally 10 days before signing day. The tight end they really wanted backed out, and they were looking to get one more guy.


"He told me, 'Hey, listen, we're gonna offer you, but maybe your junior or senior year, you'll provide us some special teams support and you'll develop and grow.' From there, they just gave me the chance."

Anthony Becht was born in Drexel Hill, Pennsylvania, a suburb of Philadelphia known for its deep-rooted sports culture. Growing up in a football-centric region, Becht was immersed in the game early. He attended Monsignor Bonner High School, where he began to distinguish himself as a physically imposing and versatile athlete. While he would later become known primarily as a tight end, his early playing days showcased his ability to contribute in multiple roles, including linebacker.

Even at a young age, Becht displayed the traits that would define his football career: toughness, football IQ, and a willingness to do the less glamorous work required to help a team succeed. Anthony Becht's football journey is notable not just for its longevity but for its breadth. Few individuals experience the game as a player, analyst, and head coach at a high level. Each phase of his career has contributed to his understanding of football and his ability to impact others within the sport.

From his early days in Pennsylvania to his collegiate success at West Virginia, his years in the NFL, and his current role in the UFL, Becht has consistently demonstrated resilience and adaptability.

His story also reflects the evolving nature of football careers. While not every player transitions successfully into coaching or media, Becht has managed to carve out a multifaceted career that continues to grow.

Beyond football, Anthony Becht has been involved in various charitable and community initiatives. He has worked to support youth development programs and has remained connected to the communities that shaped his career.

Family has also played a central role in his life. Becht is known for emphasizing the importance of balance between professional commitments and personal responsibilities, a perspective that has informed both his playing and coaching careers.





Becht's collegiate career at West Virginia University marked the beginning of his national recognition. Playing for the Mountaineers from 1996 to 1999, he developed into one of the most reliable and well-rounded tight ends in college football.

Under head coach Don Nehlen, West Virginia emphasized a balanced offensive attack, and Becht became a crucial component of that system. He was not only a dependable target in the passing game but also an effective blocker in both run and pass protection schemes. His ability to contribute in multiple facets of the game made him invaluable.

Over the course of his college career, Becht recorded 83 receptions for 1,173 yards and 11 touchdowns ranking second on the all-time list among tight ends. While those numbers may not jump off the page compared to modern pass-heavy offenses, they were significant for a tight end in that era, particularly one who was heavily involved in blocking responsibilities.

Becht's senior season in 1999 was especially noteworthy. He earned First-Team All-Big East honors and was recognized as one of the top tight ends in the nation. His performance that year showcased his complete skill set—strong hands, precise route running, and a physical edge that allowed him to dominate at the line of scrimmage.

Anthony Becht entered the 2000 NFL Draft as one of the top tight end prospects available. His combination of size, strength, and versatility made him particularly appealing to teams looking for a traditional, in-line tight end capable of contributing immediately.

He was selected in the first round (27th overall) by the New York Jets, a franchise seeking to bolster its offense with a reliable and physical presence at the tight end position. Being a first-round pick came with expectations, and Becht stepped into a system where his role would emphasize both blocking and receiving.

During his rookie season, Becht made an immediate impact, appearing in all 16 games and starting several. He recorded 16 receptions for 144 yards and two touchdowns—solid numbers for a rookie tight end adjusting to the professional level. More importantly, he demonstrated his ability to handle the physical demands of the NFL.

Over the next several seasons with the New York Jets, Becht developed into a dependable contributor. While he was never the focal point of the passing game, his value extended beyond statistics. He was known for his blocking ability, particularly in the run game, where he helped open lanes for running backs and provided additional protection for quarterbacks.

Becht's best statistical season with the Jets came in 2001, when he recorded 36 receptions for 321 yards and five touchdowns. That year highlighted his capability as a red-zone target, using his size and physicality to create mismatches against defenders.

Throughout his tenure with the Jets (2000–2004), Becht became known as a team-first player. He embraced the gritty aspects of the tight end position—blocking defensive ends, chipping linebackers, and doing the work that often goes unnoticed but is essential to offensive success.

During his tenure with the Jets, Becht appeared in 78 games (63 starts) and totaled 133 receptions for 1,164 yards and 17 touchdowns. His most productive season came in 2001, when he recorded 36 catches for 446 yards and five touchdowns, showcasing his ability to capitalize on scoring opportunities. Beyond the raw numbers, his contributions in pass protection and run blocking were critical to the team's offensive balance, often freeing up opportunities for skill-position teammates.

These statistics only tell part of the story—Becht's value to the Jets extended to his physical presence at the line of scrimmage and his reliability in key situations. Coaches trusted him to execute assignments that didn't always show up on the stat sheet but were essential to sustaining drives and protecting the quarterback.

After his time in New York, Becht's career transitioned into that of a veteran presence across multiple teams. He played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, St. Louis Rams, Arizona Cardinals, and Kansas City Chiefs.

Each stop reflected a different phase of his career. With the Buccaneers, Becht continued to contribute as a blocking tight end while also providing occasional production in the passing game. His experience and knowledge of offensive schemes made him a valuable asset in the locker room.

His time with the Rams and Cardinals further cemented his reputation as a reliable veteran who could be counted on in critical situations. Though his role evolved over time, Becht remained consistent in his approach—physical, disciplined, and team-oriented.

By the time he reached the latter stages of his NFL career, Becht had embraced a mentorship role. Younger players often looked to him for guidance on preparation, film study, and the mental aspects of the game. His longevity in the league—spanning over a decade—was a testament to his professionalism and adaptability.

Anthony Becht’s career reflects the blueprint of a traditional tight end. At a time when the position required a balance of blocking and receiving, he excelled in both areas. His physicality made him effective in the trenches, while his hands and awareness allowed him to contribute as a receiver when called upon.

He finished his NFL career with 188 receptions for 1,537 yards and 21 touchdowns, numbers that reflect his role as a premier and versatile player. However, those statistics only partially capture his impact. Coaches relied on him for his consistency, intelligence, and willingness to handle the toughest assignments.



After concluding his playing career in the National Football League, Becht stepped into broadcasting with a clear advantage: he had played in multiple offensive systems, under different coaching philosophies, and alongside a wide range of teammates. That experience gave him a broad perspective on the game, something that quickly became evident in his analysis.

Unlike some former players who rely heavily on personality alone, Becht approached broadcasting with the same preparation and discipline that defined his playing days. He studied rosters, schemes, and tendencies, ensuring that his commentary was not only engaging but also informative. His goal was to help viewers understand why things were happening on the field—not just what was happening.

One of Becht’s most prominent roles came with ESPN, where he served as a college football analyst. In this role, he covered games across the country, breaking down matchups and providing insight into player development and team strategy. Becht’s background as a tight end proved particularly valuable in analyzing offensive schemes.

He was able to explain blocking assignments, route combinations, and quarterback reads in a way that resonated with both casual fans and more knowledgeable viewers. His commentary often highlighted the “hidden” aspects of football—the small details that can determine the outcome of a play.

Working at ESPN also gave Becht a national platform, allowing him to build credibility as a broadcaster. He became known for his balanced approach: enthusiastic without being overbearing, critical without being unfair, and always grounded in his firsthand experience.

Anthony Becht has built a career that spans every layer of football, from standout college player to first-round NFL draft pick, veteran leader, broadcaster, and head coach. His time with teams like the New York Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, St. Louis Rams, Arizona Cardinals, and Kansas City Chiefs illustrates both his durability and adaptability.

Now leading in the United Football League, Becht continues to shape the game from the sidelines. His journey reflects not just a long career, but a deep and evolving relationship with football—one built on toughness, intelligence, and an unwavering commitment to the team.

Donnie Abraham has built a football life defined by instinct, production, and a seamless transition from elite playmaker to respected coach. Now serving as Defensive Coordinator for the Orlando Storm in the United Football League, Abraham brings decades of high-level experience to the sideline, blending his NFL pedigree with a passion for player development and defensive excellence.

Abraham grew up in one of the most talent-rich football regions in the country. His early exposure to competitive football helped shape the instincts and awareness that would later define his career. He attended Pine Forest High School before continuing his playing career at East Tennessee State University.

As Defensive Coordinator, he is responsible for implementing the team’s defensive identity, developing game plans, and making in-game adjustments. His defenses reflect the same traits that defined his playing career—instinctive, aggressive, and fundamentally sound.

A central focus of Abraham’s defensive philosophy is creating turnovers. Drawing from his success as an NFL cornerback, he emphasizes ball awareness, anticipation, and disciplined aggression. At East Tennessee State, Abraham quickly emerged as a defensive standout. Despite playing at a smaller program, he made a major impact with his ability to read quarterbacks and generate turnovers.

He finished his college career with 14 interceptions, tying a school record, and earned All-Southern Conference honors. His combination of ball skills, anticipation, and football intelligence made him one of the most intriguing defensive back prospects entering the professional ranks.

Abraham was selected in the third round of the 1996 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, where he became a key piece of one of the league’s most dominant defenses of the late 1990s and early 2000s.

With Tampa Bay, Abraham developed into one of the NFL’s premier ball-hawking cornerbacks. Playing alongside defensive stars like Derrick Brooks and Warren Sapp, he thrived in a fast, aggressive defensive system.

During his six seasons with the Buccaneers, Abraham appeared in 82 games (77 starts), recording 31 interceptions and three defensive touchdowns. His standout season came in 1999, when he intercepted seven passes, earning both Pro Bowl and First-Team All-Pro honors.

Abraham’s ability to anticipate routes and capitalize on mistakes made him a constant threat to opposing quarterbacks. His production consistently ranked among the league’s best, and he became known for his knack for game-changing plays.

Abraham later joined the New York Jets, where he continued to be a productive and reliable presence in the secondary.

Over three seasons with the Jets, he played in 42 games (41 starts), recording 10 interceptions and over 200 tackles. Though injuries occasionally limited his time on the field, he remained an effective cover corner with strong leadership qualities.

His experience and understanding of defensive schemes made him a stabilizing force for the Jets’ defense, particularly in high-pressure situations.

Across nine NFL seasons, Abraham totaled 38 interceptions, three returned for touchdowns, and more than 500 tackles. His career was defined by consistency, intelligence, and a unique ability to generate turnovers.



Rather than relying solely on athleticism, Abraham built his success on preparation and awareness. He excelled in reading offensive formations and anticipating quarterback decisions, making him one of the more instinctive defensive backs of his era.

Donnie Abraham's playing style reflected a deep understanding of the game. He excelled in zone coverage, where his vision and anticipation allowed him to jump routes and create takeaways. His hands and timing were elite, turning pass breakups into interceptions.

He was also a disciplined tackler and contributed in run support, demonstrating the complete skill set required of a top-tier cornerback. These traits would later become central to his coaching philosophy.

Abraham's reputation as a developer of defensive backs led to opportunities in the state of Florida at some of the most reputable high school programs in the Southeast including stops as an assistant at East Lake High and Gibbs before becoming head coach at Clearwater.

In 2015, Abraham was named defensive coordinator at IMG Academy, one of the most prestigious training environments in the country.

At IMG, the level of competition and expectation rises significantly. The academy attracts elite prospects from across the nation and internationally, many of whom are already among the top recruits in their class. Coaching in that environment requires not only technical expertise but also the ability to manage high expectations and intense competition. Abraham's role focused heavily on the defensive unit and his influence extended across the program.

Abraham's entry into professional coaching included time with the Tampa Bay Storm of the Arena Football League. Coaching in the arena game presented a unique challenge compared to traditional outdoor football.

The arena format, with its smaller field and faster pace, places a premium on quick decision-making, coverage discipline, and adaptability. For a defensive coach, it requires

a different approach—less space to operate, more one-on-one matchups, and constant pressure on the secondary. Donnie Abraham brought a veteran presence, technical expertise, and a proven playmaker's mindset to his role as Defensive Coordinator for the St. Louis Battlehawks. Drawing from a successful NFL career and years of coaching experience across multiple levels, Abraham helped shape a defensive unit built on discipline, awareness, and the ability to create game-changing plays in the United Football League.

When Abraham took over as Defensive Coordinator, he entered a situation that demanded both structure and adaptability. The Battlehawks, already one of the most visible franchises in spring football, required a defensive identity that could match their offensive consistency and the energy of their passionate fan base.

Working alongside head coach Anthony Becht, Abraham assumed responsibility for the entire defensive operation. His role included designing schemes, developing players, managing game plans, and making real-time adjustments during games. It was a position that required not just knowledge of the game, but leadership and communication—areas where Abraham's experience proved invaluable.

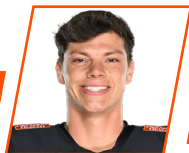

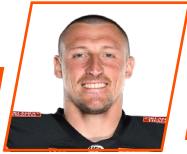
