**Series Notes:** Louisville and D.C. met twice during the regular season, with the Kings sweeping the defending champions in back-to-back weeks.

Louisville won the first meeting, 30-13, at Audi Field on May 9, then followed with a 33-30 win at Lynn Family Stadium on May 16. The common thread was takeaways and pressure. The Kings forced four D.C. turnovers in each game and sacked Defenders quarterbacks four times in each meeting, turning both games with field position, short fields and defensive disruption.

## AUDI FIELD

Audi Field, located in Washington, D.C.'s Buzzard Point neighborhood, opened in 2018 as the home of D.C. United of the MLS and has quickly become one of the nation's most recognizable mid-sized outdoor venues. The 20,000-seat stadium sits just blocks from the Anacostia River. The venue has hosted the NWSL Championship, the MLS All-Star Game and a growing list of major soccer and entertainment events. On Saturday, it adds the UFL's biggest stage to that list.

## STADIUM ACCESS AND GAME DAY INFORMATION

Audi Field is located at **100 Potomac Ave. SW** in Washington, D.C.'s Buzzard Point neighborhood, just south of Nationals Park and near the Anacostia River waterfront.

Credentialed media should plan for increased event-day traffic around Buzzard Point, Nationals Park and the surrounding Navy Yard area. Because parking is limited around the stadium, media members driving to the game are encouraged to secure parking in advance and allow extra time for arrival and screening.

Audi Field is accessible by Metro, rideshare, bike, car and water taxi. The closest Metro options are Navy Yard-Ballpark and Waterfront on the Green Line, with the venue recommending Navy Yard-Ballpark as the primary transit option because of added capacity and more commercial activity along the walk to the stadium.

## CREDENTIALS / MEDIA ACCESS

**The press box is located on the east side of Audi Field.** Upon arrival, credentialed media should follow UFL media operations instructions for credential pickup, stadium entry, press box access and postgame interview procedures.

Media members are encouraged to monitor league communications for any United Bowl-specific changes to credential pickup, field access, photo work areas or postgame availability. Media credential requests for UFL games should be directed to [credentials@theufl.com](mailto:credentials@theufl.com). Approved media should follow credential pickup and media entrance instructions provided directly by UFL Communications.

# UNITED BOWL PREVIEW

## THREE KINGS TO WATCH ON OFFENSE:

**QB Chandler Rogers:** Rogers is the face of Louisville's turnaround. He finished the regular season completing 62.3 percent of his passes for 1,119 yards, with five touchdowns, and has given the Kings enough efficiency to pair with a physical run game and opportunistic defense. Against D.C. in the regular season, Rogers threw for 201 yards and two touchdowns in the first meeting, and helped Louisville finish the sweep a week later.

**WR Isaiah Winstead:** Winstead gives Louisville its best downfield-playmaking threat. He led the Kings with 474 receiving yards during the regular season, averaged 16.3 yards per catch and added a 52-yard touchdown in the playoff win at St. Louis. He was also a major problem for D.C. in the second regular-season meeting, catching five passes for 92 yards and a touchdown.

**RB James Robinson:** Robinson has become a tone-setter late in the year, and he opened the semifinal win over St. Louis with a 53-yard touchdown run. He averaged 50.0 rushing yards per game in the regular season and gives Louisville a downhill complement to Ian Wheeler's big-play ability.

## THREE KINGS TO WATCH ON DEFENSE

**OLB Cam Gill:** Gill is the headliner of the Louisville defense and one of the league's most disruptive players. He led the UFL during the regular season with 10 sacks and 12 tackles for loss, then added another sack in the semifinal win over St. Louis. Against a D.C. offense that found rhythm on third down in the playoff win over Orlando, Gill's ability to affect Jason Bean without needing heavy blitz help is one of the biggest keys in the game.

**LB Jaheim Thomas:** Thomas led Louisville with 65 tackles during the regular season and followed with nine tackles and a pass breakup in the semifinal. He gives the Kings a steady middle-of-the-field presence against a D.C. offense that wants to use Jason Bean's legs to stay ahead of the chains.

**DB Corey Mayfield Jr.:** Mayfield is the turnover-margin piece. He tied for the league lead with four interceptions during the regular season and finished with 10 passes defended. Louisville forced eight D.C. turnovers in two regular-season games, and Mayfield is the kind of ballhawk who can make that trend carry into the championship game.

## SCOUTING THE DEFENDERS

D.C. enters as the defending champion, but also as a team that had to reset itself in the postseason. The Defenders had dropped four straight games before their semifinal win over Orlando, then flipped the script with a physical, controlled offensive performance. Former King, Jason Bean led a 405-yard

effort, D.C. ran for 172 yards, converted 10-of-16 third downs and held Orlando to 282 total yards in a 28-22 win.

Offensively, the Defenders are most dangerous when Bean is using both his arm and legs. He threw for 233 yards and added 40 rushing yards in the semifinal, while Abram Smith and Deon Jackson each scored rushing touchdowns. D.C. also has enough perimeter talent to punish coverage, with Briley Moore, Cornell Powell, Erik Ezukanma and others giving Bean multiple options. Powell had 109 receiving yards against Louisville in the first meeting.

Defensively, Derick Roberson is the name to know off the edge after producing seven regular-season sacks and making a key fourth-down sack in the semifinal. The Defenders also have a kicking weapon in Matt McCrane, who hit a 61-yard four-point field goal against Orlando and finished the regular season second in the league in scoring behind Tanner Brown.

## KINGS KLIPS

**From 0-3 to the 'Ship:** Louisville opened its inaugural season with three straight losses, but has won five straight and seven of its last eight. The Kings are now one win away from a championship in year one.

**A weapon, not just a kicker:** Tanner Brown led the UFL in scoring during the regular season with 99 points, went 25-of-28 on field goals and then became the first UFL kicker to make two four-point field goals in one game during the semifinal win over St. Louis. Makes from 60 and 63 yards changed the game.

**Sack King:** Cam Gill has been the league's premier pass rusher. Gill led the UFL with 10 regular-season sacks, added another in the postseason and enters the United Bowl with 11 total sacks on the year.

**TO Kings:** Louisville's turnover edge has been the driving force behind the teams turnaround. The Kings led the league with 13 interceptions and were first in turnover margin at plus-7. They were even better against D.C., forcing eight turnovers in two games while committing only two.

**Gameplan Variety:** Against D.C. the first time, Louisville won despite being outgained by 91 yards. In the rematch, the Kings controlled the run game and third down. In the semifinal, they hit three plays of 50-plus yards and still leaned on a defense that held St. Louis to 4-of-15 on third down.

**Former Teammates Now Opponents:** Jason Bean began the season with Louisville before moving to D.C., while Chandler Rogers became the quarterback of the Kings' late-season surge. Now the former teammates meet for a championship, with both sharing the added backstory of having attended Lake Ridge High School in Mansfield, Texas. Both quarterbacks also had collegiate stints at the University of North Texas.

# KINGS WEEK 1 REVIEW - STALLIONS 15, KINGS 13

## STALLIONS RALLY IN FOURTH, KINGS FALL IN OPENER

The Louisville Kings came up just short in their inaugural United Football League game Friday night, falling to the Birmingham Stallions 15-13 in front of a near capacity crowd of 14,034 at frigid Lynn Family Stadium, where the wind chill slipped to 32 at the end of the game. Birmingham quarterback Matt Corral threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to Justyn Ross with 1:55 remaining to wipe out a 13-9 Louisville lead, and the Kings comeback in the final minute came up short.

Louisville led 10-9 after a Tanner Brown 20-yard field goal with 8:37 remaining, only to have the visiting Stallions drive 66 yards in 13 plays, taking 6:42 off the clock before the winning TD pass. The Kings had two chances in the final minute. After taking over at midfield following the ensuing kickoff after a nice return by Jaden Shirden, Louisville quarterback Jason Bean threw an interception inside Birmingham 15 with 1:27 left. After forcing a three and out, the Kings got the ball back at the Louisville 43 with just 24 seconds left, but on first down Bean was sacked for a 7-yard loss and on the final play of the game the Kings tried a hook and ladder, but it only gained five yards,

The two key statistics that definitively determined the outcome of the game were turnovers and time of possession – the Kings had three turnovers while the Stallions did not commit any. The other stat of note was Birmingham dominated ball control, having it for more than 38 minutes compared to just under 22 minutes for the Kings. The three turnovers really hurt the Kings, who were driving in the final minute of the first half, only to lose a fumble inside the 1-yard line. Birmingham held a narrow 9-7 lead at the intermission.

Bean threw a couple of interceptions, including one when he was under pressure with 1:27 left that was picked off at the Birmingham 12 as the Kings were trying to drive for a potential game-winning score. However, despite the

tough loss, Kings head coach and Louisville native Chris Redman had a lot of positives to take away.

“First of all, it was an incredible atmosphere, the fans showed up and the city did its part,” Redman said. “These guys fought really hard and it’s hard to do when you have some turnovers and we could not get off the field on third down.” Birmingham converted 63 percent on third down, going 10 of 16, which extended drives, but until the final two minutes, the Kings made big plays like blocking a field goal and forcing the Stallions kicker into missing a couple of extra points.

The Kings offense got a sterling performance from wide receiver Lucky Jackson, a Kentucky native from Lexington, who was a standout at Western Kentucky. Jackson caught six passes for 73 yards, and scored the Kings only touchdown when he caught a 12-yard TD pass from Bean late in the first quarter to Louisville a 7-6 lead.

When asked about returning to play professionally back in his home state, Jackson said. “I probably had 20-30 people here tonight, and for the fans to show out and make that much noise like they did, any good team wants to see an atmosphere like that.”

## GAME NOTES:

- A couple of Kings left in the fourth quarter with injuries. Wide receiver Isaiah Winstead, who had two big receptions for 60 yards, left the game early in the 4th quarter with a head injury, while defensive back Kenny Robinson Jr. left late in the fourth quarter with a neck injury.
- Bean finished the game with 227 yards passing and a TD while leading the team in rushing with 27 yards.
- The Kings played almost penalty free, with just one penalty for five yards.



# KINGS WEEK 2 REVIEW - STORM 19, KINGS 9

## THE KINGS FALL AT ORLANDO IN ROAD OPENER 19-9

ORLANDO, FLA. – The Louisville Kings were there until the very end, but came up short for the second straight week, losing to the Orlando Storm 19-9 in their first road game of the season. Louisville rode a strong defensive performance, but it was not enough as Kings fell to 0-2.

Former University of Louisville quarterback Jack Plummer led Orlando passing for 182 yards and two touchdowns as the Storm used big passing plays on offense and a smothering defense to advance to 2-0 in their inaugural season.

"I thought it was a really good and competitive game, our guys played hard with a lot of effort, and we have a chance to play this team again at our place," said Louisville first-year coach Chris Redman. "We have some things to work on offensively and clean some things up, run the ball better, but I still have a lot of confidence in this team. There is a lot of talent and good players in that locker room."

The game was a battle of field goals until Plummer, who was knocked out of the game earlier on the drive, scrambled out of the pocket and connected with wide receiver K.J. Hamler on a 41-yard TD pass with just 24 seconds left before halftime, giving Orlando a 12-9 lead, one they would not relinquish.

In the second half, the Storm defense dominated, limiting the Kings to a pair of first downs. Orlando extended their lead as Plummer connected with receiver Elijah Badger on a 39-yard scoring pass to give the Storm its final TD and a 19-9 win as the Storm held the Kings to just 27 yards rushing and 216 total.

Backup quarterback Chandler Rogers came in for the Kings for the third series of the game, and led the Louisville offense to a couple of scoring drives, which gave the Kings a 9-6 lead until late in the first half. Rogers completed 13-20 passes for 151 yards and he had an interception to lead the Kings offense. Redman liked what he saw from Rogers, who played most of the second half in relief of starter Jason Bean.

"For his first game in professional football, I thought Chandler played great. I have a lot of confidence in him, as I do with both of our quarterbacks," Redman said. "I also thought our defense was amazing. They played with a lot of heart, they were on the field too much in the second half."

Louisville kicker Tanner Brown was on his game for the second straight week, connecting for three field goals from 42, 41, and 32 yards. Brown is not 5-5 on the season.

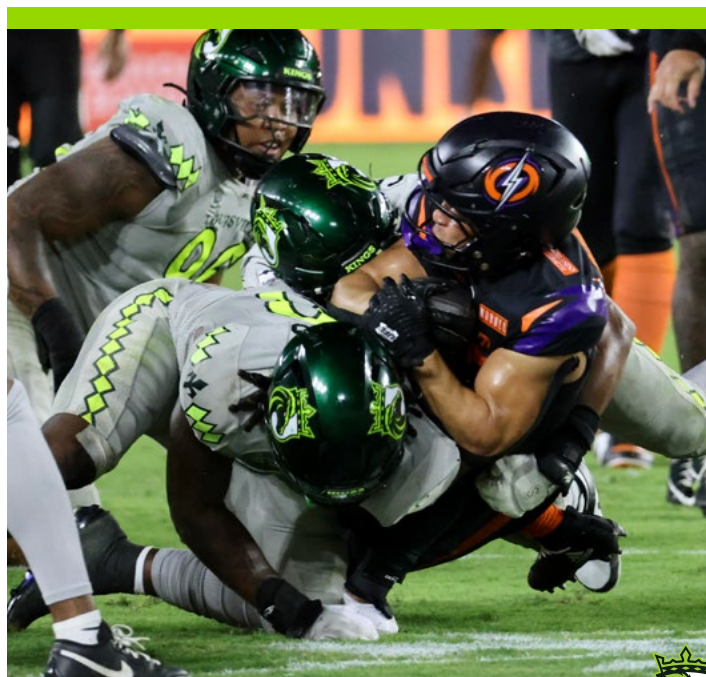
The Kings defense did get its first turnover of the season when cornerback Deantre Prince intercepted a pass by Plummer in the end zone late in the fourth quarter and returned it 47 yards. Defensive end Cam Gill was a force the entire game, collecting six total tackles, including three tackles for loss and two sacks. Linebacker Jaheim Thomas led the Kings with 12 total tackles, including 10 solo stops.

"I think it is unique that we are turning around and playing this team again next week, but I am looking forward to going back and playing in Louisville," Plummer added.

The Kings and Storm will see each other again in less than a week as the teams battle in Louisville next Friday, April 10 at Lynn Family Stadium. Game time is at 8:00pm ET and it will be televised nationally on FS1.

## GAME NOTES

- After committing just one penalty in the season opener against Birmingham, the Kings had nine penalties for 45 yards on Friday.
- The Kings enjoyed a time of possession advantage of more than three minutes in the first half, but ended up losing that battle by 10 minutes in the second half and for the game, Orlando had the ball for 33:29 to 26:31 for Louisville.
- Nine different receivers caught passes for the Kings, led by WR Kaden Prather, who had four catches for 38 yards and tight end Tre'McKitty, who caught two for 39 yards.



# KINGS WEEK 3 REVIEW - STORM 29, KINGS 27

## KINGS FALL IN OVERTIME TO UNBEATEN ORLANDO

LOUISVILLE, KY. – The Louisville Kings left it all on the line Friday night, but came up just short against unbeaten Orlando, falling 29-27 in overtime before a boisterous crowd of 11,082 at Lynn Family Stadium.

Quarterbacks Jason Bean and Jack Plummer both put on a show under the lights on Friday Night Football, delivering their best performances of the season. In the end, it was Plummer and the Storm who walked it off in sudden death, keeping Orlando unbeaten.

The game ended after both teams did not score in their guaranteed three chances from the 5-yard line, and then on the fourth possession, after the Kings were stopped, the defense committed back to back interference penalties, which by league rule rewards the offensive team, thus giving the visiting Storm a two-point win to improve to 3-0.

The Kings had a lot of good things happen, especially on offense, but lost their second straight home game by two points to fall to 0-3 in their inaugural season. Quarterback Jason Bean had the best game of his Kings career, passing for a season-high 352 yards and three touchdowns to boost the Kings offense, which gained a season-high 438 yards. The Kings also rushed for a season-best 63 yards, with 50 coming from former University of Kentucky standout Benny Snell.

“This was an exciting game and I am so proud of our guys and how hard they played. I’m excited about these guys and proud of them, but just so disappointed for them to lose this way,” said Kings head coach Chris Redman. “It was definitely an interesting finish, but that is the rule, but I am also excited because our running game was better and you can stay in contention when you play like this.”

Louisville (0-3) trailed 10-6 at halftime, and had its final drive of the half end at the Orlando 3-yard line after three straight incompletions, but after going the first 10 quarters of the season with just one touchdown, the Kings found the end zone three times in the second half, including a game-tying 6-yard TD pass from Bean to tight end Zach Davidson with just 1:06 left in the game to force the infamous overtime. The TD pass from Bean to Davidson was the second time they connected in the game for a score.

Bean completed passes to eight different receivers, led by WR Isaiah Winstead, who hauled in seven catches for 114 yards with 14 targets. Lucky Jackson, who caught his second TD pass of the season in the third

quarter, had six receptions for 78 yards, including is 13-yard scoring catch. Davidson finished with four catches for 79 yards and fellow tight end Tre’ McKitty also had a pair of catches for 44 yards.

“As a team we had a good week of practice and it was good for us to finish some drives and getting touchdowns instead of field goals,” Bean said.

“This is not how we wanted the game to end, but we need to get ready for next Thursday.”

Louisville also got another outstanding effort from kicker Tanner Brown, who continued his hot start to the 2026 season. Brown made both of his field goal attempts, including a season long 51-yarder to open the scoring in the first quarter. Brown now is 7-7 in field goals and he also made all three of his PATs.

The Kings are on the road in Texas the next two weeks, starting with a game at Houston on Thursday, April 16 against the Gamblers. Game time is 8:00pm ET and it will be televised on the NFL Network.



# KINGS WEEK 4 REVIEW - KINGS 24, GAMBLERS 22

## KINGS CAPTURE FIRST-EVER UFL WIN; KNOCK OFF HOUSTON IN OVERTIME 24-22

HOUSTON, TX – After a couple of tough losses at home, the Louisville Kings made history on Thursday night in Houston, capturing the franchise's first-ever United Football League win by beating the host Gamblers 24-22 in overtime. It marked the second straight week the Kings played extra football following last Friday's tough 29-27 loss to Orlando at Lynn Family Stadium.

Kings first-year head coach Chris Redman, a Louisville native and former University of Louisville standout and NFL quarterback, understood what the win meant. "I know this meant a lot to the city of Louisville and to me, this is a special night," he said. "I want to thank all the coaches, players, administrators, fans, and everyone who has worked so hard. It is special to get the first win, and I know it will not be our last."

The game itself had a little bit of everything, and besides the victorious ending in overtime for the Kings, the league's top two kickers had a huge hand, or should we say, leg in the outcome. After Louisville kicker Tanner Brown, who tied a UFL record with five field goals in the game, evened the score at 22-22 on a 48-yard field goal with 10:05 left in the fourth quarter, both teams squandered drives before Houston intercepted a pass from Kings' quarterback Jason Bean at the Gamblers 45-yard line with less than three minutes remaining. Houston picked up a couple first downs, and then with 57 seconds remaining, Gamblers' kicker John Hoyland missed his first field goal of the season, a 38-yarder, sending the game to overtime.

After losing in the fourth round of overtime last week on a defensive penalty in the end zone, a rule that has now been modified by the UFL where a game cannot end on a penalty, but only on a scoring play, the Kings tallied the only score in the second round of OT as Bean connected with tight end Tre' McKitty on a 5-yard pass, and the Louisville defense forced two holding penalties on Houston to end it.

"I am so proud of these guys, they have worked so hard all year," Redman said. "It wasn't pretty at times, but they didn't give up, and maybe the football gods were with us tonight. I also want to give credit to our kicker. Tanner is a great player, and he kept us in it the whole night, and I am happy for him."

Louisville controlled the first half and led 16-6 at halftime and could have had a lot more, but settled for three Brown field goals. Houston (1-3) came

out of the locker room, led by backup QB Taulia Tagovailoa, and dominated the third quarter, scoring on the first play after halftime on a 68-yard TD run by running back Marcus Yarns, who rushed for 111 yards on only eight carries. The Gamblers scored on all three possessions in the third quarter, two TDs and a field goal, to take a 22-16 lead into the fourth before the Louisville defense tightened and Brown tied the game with a couple of long field goals.

The two kickers combined for eight field goals in 10 tries and they set a new UFL record with each kicking three field goals of 50 yards or longer. Brown had field goals of 59, a career-best, 58 and 52 yards to lead the Kings offense. Bean passed for 192 yards and connected with nine different receivers, including McKitty, whose catch in the back of the end zone won it for the Kings OT.

Louisville's lone touchdown of the game came on the first play of the second quarter as new running back and former NFL regular James Robinson scored from the 1-yard line on fourth down on the opening play of the second quarter. It is the Kings first rushing TD of the season.

"It was an up and down game, but the guys stayed in the fight, and we got the win," Bean added.



# KINGS WEEK 5 REVIEW - KINGS 47, RENEGADES 25

## HUGE GAMES FROM THE DEFENSE, WHEELER LEAD LOUISVILLE TO 47-25 UPSET OVER DALLAS

FRISCO, TX – The Chandler Rogers era in Louisville couldn't have started much better. The Kings posted the highest-scoring performance of the UFL season, and their defense was at the center of it all, forcing four takeaways and turning them into 27 points, including multiple pick-sixes en route to a 47-25 win over the Dallas Renegades.

Wheeler totaled four touchdowns, the first player this season to achieve that total in a single-game.

Dallas opened with the ball but was forced off the field quickly, a sign of what was to come. Louisville, with Rogers making his professional debut, struck first. He broke the ice with a 10-yard completion to Tarik Black on his first snap, setting the tone early.

Tanner Brown, coming off a career outing with three 50+ yarders, knocked through a 38-yard field goal to give the Kings the early lead. It was more of the same for Dallas on their second drive. Drops stalled the offense again, leading to another turnover on downs and giving Louisville great field position for the second straight possession.

Dallas' defense responded with its first big moment. Darrius Moragne, Willie Taylor, and Tashawn Bower all got home, sacking Rogers on both third and fourth down to flip the field. But Louisville's defense found lightning.

Deep in Louisville territory, Bryce Hall jumped a pass from Austin Reed and took it 83 yards the other way for a pick-six, Louisville's first defensive touchdown of the season and a 10-0 lead.

On Reed's very next throw, it happened again. Corey Mayfield Jr. picked off an underthrown ball, and suddenly the Kings were in complete control. Reed had thrown just two interceptions all season, he had two in the first half.

Ian Wheeler made Dallas pay, walking in from a yard out to cap the short field. His first touchdown of the season pushed the lead to 16-0 after a missed extra point.

To their credit, the Renegades responded. Reed led a 14-play, 68-yard drive, with Ellis Merriweather accounting for 34 yards before punching it in from a yard out for his first rushing touchdown of the season.

Rogers answered late in the half with an impressive two-minute drive. It started with a 16-yard run from James Robinson, and as the ground game got going, so did Rogers.

He delivered a strike to Tarik Black, who made multiple defenders miss before being brought down at the one-yard line. Black capped a strong first half with four receptions for 53 yards.

Brown added a 19-yard field goal, sending Louisville into the locker room with a 19-7 lead. Dallas came out of the half with momentum. Willie Taylor came up with a fourth down sack to flip the field, and Reed capitalized, connecting with Curtis Hodges down the seam for a 25-yard score, trimming the deficit. Louisville answered right back.

Rogers looked as sharp as he had all day, going 5-of-6 for 56 yards on the drive. He connected with James Robinson for 18 yards and hit Lucky Jackson on gains of 12 and 13 before Ian Wheeler finished it off with a 7-yard touchdown, his second of the game. Then the turnovers returned.

Reed threw his third interception of the game on the next drive, with Mayfield Jr. coming up with his second pick. Wheeler punched in his third touchdown from 12 yards out, pushing Louisville past the 30-point mark, 20 of those coming off turnovers.

And the defense still wasn't done. Antonio Grier jumped a pass, picked it off, and cruised 46 yards for another pick-six as Louisville hit the 40-point mark in dominant fashion. Dallas kept fighting. Reed connected with Hodges for 63 yards to set up a goal-to-go, and Merriweather added his second touchdown. But a failed three-point try kept it a two-possession game.

Wheeler put it away with his fourth touchdown of the night, wrapping a career game. Louisville, which had averaged just 40 rushing yards per game, erupted for 150 in a complete performance.

With the win, the Kings face a short turnaround with the Derby Classic set for Thursday. They'll look to make it three straight against St. Louis at 8:00 PM ET on FS1.



# KINGS WEEK 6 REVIEW - BATTLEHAWKS 16, KINGS 3

## BATTLEHAWKS DEFENSE SLOWS DOWN KINGS OFFENSE IN FIRST DERBY CLASSIC

LOUISVILLE, KY – April 30, 2026 – The Battlehawks (4-2) left the Kings (2-5) in the dust in the Derby Classic. Their defense completely took over with six sacks, nine tackles for loss, and just 166 yards allowed. There was no need for a photo finish, it was a clear-cut 16-3 victory for St. Louis.

There was no shortage of energy inside Lynn Family Stadium as the Battlehawks and Kings kicked off Derby weekend in Kentucky.

The Kings came out of the gates with the ball and wasted no time putting points on the board. Chandler Rogers faced a third-and-10, and the Louisville signal caller delivered a strike to Lucky Jackson, who broke free in stride for 25 yards. Tanner Brown capped the drive with his 15th field goal of the season, this one from 40 yards out.

St. Louis turned it over on its first drive, but the defense quickly bailed them out. Louisville's defense, fresh off a four-turnover performance, struck again early.

Frost threw a backward pass that was scooped up by one of the league's top defenders, Cam Gill. However, Carlos Davis came through with a huge sack that ultimately forced a Kings punt.

For the first time this season, the Battlehawks were shut out in the first quarter. However, they got on the board in the second.

After a 24-yard completion to Hakeem Butler, Ramiz Ahmed drilled a 42-yard field goal in his first game with the Battlehawks to level things at 3-3.

St. Louis got back on the board again late in the second quarter. On the first play of the drive, Frost linked up with Blake Jackson for 33 yards. Gary Jennings then took a touch pass untouched into the end zone on an incredible play design, helped by a series of perfect blocks.

The Louisville offense faded down the stretch of the first half and was held in check by the heavyweight Battlehawks defense. Pita Taumoepeu seized the reins with two first-half sacks.

St. Louis had another shot to score before halftime, but Corey Mayfield Jr. intercepted Frost as the clock struck triple zeros. That marked his third pick in the last two games and St. Louis took a 9-3 lead into the half.

It was evident Louisville needed to keep pace in the second half after totaling just 105 yards in the opening two quarters. However, the narrative remained the same coming out of the locker room.

St. Louis' dominant defense forced Louisville into its third straight three-and-out.

The Battlehawks began to create separation around the third-quarter turn. After a 27-yard screen pass to Jarveon Howard, Frost perfectly high-pointed the ball to Steven McBride for an 11-yard touchdown. McBride's second score of the season charged the Battlehawks ahead 16-3.

With time running out on the Kings, Rogers threw a shoe. Nevelle Clark picked him off for St. Louis' second takeaway of the game, further emphasizing the defensive dominance.

However, the Kings found late life after a missed 63-yard field goal, potentially reopening the gates. Louisville's defense kept them in the race, but the effort was not enough.

The story remained the same. St. Louis held Louisville to 2-of-14 on third down and 0-of-2 on fourth down. After the opening-drive field goal, life was slowly sucked out of the Kings.

Frost had an efficient outing with 242 yards and two touchdown passes, while Howard led the rushing attack with 56 hard-earned yards.



# KINGS WEEK 7 REVIEW - KINGS 30, DEFENDERS 13

## KINGS DOWN DEFENDERS IN DC WITH STRONG PERFORMANCES IN ALL PHASES

WASHINGTON, DC – May 9, 2026 – The Louisville Kings (4-3) upset the league-leading D.C. Defenders (5-2) 30-13 behind complete performances in all three phases, keeping their playoff hopes alive. Kings QB Chandler Rogers led the charge, and the game flipped after he absorbed a massive hit late in the first half.

For the first time this season, the Defenders were kept off the board on their opening drive. Josiah Bronson sacked Jordan Ta'amu on third down and pushed DC out of field goal range.

The Kings offense opened fast behind the shiftiness and burst of former 1,000-yard NFL rusher James Robinson. Robinson ripped into the secondary on back-to-back runs of 19 and 21 yards, and Louisville looked ready to strike first. But the Defenders, as they have all season, got into the backfield and caused chaos. Brandon Smith and Curtis Jacobs swarmed Robinson for a big loss on the handoff, then Boogie Basham exploded off the edge and dropped Rogers. That sequence led to a missed field goal from Tanner Brown, and minutes later Matt McCrane missed one of his own, both from well within range.

After an unexpected scoreless first quarter, Louisville finally broke through. Rogers stayed sharp early, hitting Tarik Black for 16 yards before finding Jaden Shirden on a screen that picked up 15 more. Brown redeemed himself with a 48-yard kick to give the Kings a 3-0 lead. DC answered quickly.

On 3rd-and-10, Ta'amu escaped pressure and stepped into a deep shot. Javon Antonio hauled in the bomb and raced the rest of the way for an 81-yard touchdown. It was DC's longest play from scrimmage this season, and the longest touchdown by any team this year. The missed two-point try left it 6-3.

Ta'amu then orchestrated his best drive of the half as the clock wound down. He rolled away from pressure and found Mason Fairchild on the sideline for a key conversion, then fired a strike to Cornell Powell on 3rd-and-11 for 16 yards. He capped it with a perfect throw to Ty Scott, who adjusted beautifully on a jump ball and came down with a 20-yard touchdown in single coverage.

Ta'amu went five-for-six for 68 yards and a touchdown on that drive alone. But the Kings had an answer before halftime. Rogers opened the drive with a dart to Isaiah Winstead for 32 yards. Then came the turning point. Derrick Roberson absolutely leveled Rogers, but lowered the crown of his helmet and drew a 15-yard penalty. Everything changed after that.

Rogers responded with a perfect corner throw to Black for a nine-yard touchdown, pulling Louisville within three.

DC still had 38 seconds and no timeouts. Ta'amu hit Powell for 54 yards and had the Defenders in position to answer, but a sack by Cam Gill and Nick Kubitz let the final seconds expire. DC led 13-10 at the break.

Louisville opened the second half with the ball and quickly tied it. Rogers stayed efficient, with Winstead hauling in another 32-yard gain before Brown drilled a 49-yard field goal to make it 13-13. Then came the momentum swing. On the kickoff, Jalen Wydermyer delivered a perfect peanut punch to force a fumble and hand Louisville a short field. Ian Wheeler ripped off 22 yards, Robinson added 18 more, and Rogers found Black again in the end zone for the go-ahead score. Kings led 20-13.

After a sharp first half offensively, the Defenders slammed into a wall in the second half. They ran just six plays and punted twice. Ta'amu then surrendered a crucial turnover early in the fourth. Backed up deep in his own territory, he was intercepted by Keaton Ellis, who read the throw the whole way. Rogers capitalized immediately, hitting Lucky Jackson for 22 yards down to the goal line. Robinson punched in the one-yard score two plays later.

After a dropped touchdown that would have cut the deficit to one possession, Ta'amu was intercepted again, this time by Cam Dantzler in the end zone on a deep ball.

Louisville then marched down and settled for another Brown field goal from 49 yards, stretching the lead to 30-13 with under five minutes left. The Kings drained 5:15 off the fourth-quarter clock in the process, fueled by a stunning rushing performance.

Corey Mayfield later jarred the ball loose from Cornell Powell and recovered it himself. Louisville forced turnovers on DC's final three possessions and blanked the Defenders in the second half. The Kings closed the game on a 27-0 run after the unnecessary roughness penalty on Roberson late in the second quarter.

Louisville dominated on the ground with 145 rushing yards, paired with Rogers' efficient 201 passing yards and two touchdowns. The Kings never turned it over, while their defense forced four takeaways. Mekhi Garner led Louisville with eight tackles and two pass breakups. Tarik Black paced the offense with five catches for 49 yards and two touchdowns. Ta'amu threw for a season-high 353 yards in the loss.



# KINGS WEEK 8 REVIEW - KINGS 33, DEFENDERS 30

## KINGS DROP DEFENDERS FOR FIRST WIN IN LOUISVILLE

LOUISVILLE, KY – May 16, 2026 – The Kings pulled off another upset over the Defenders for the second straight week, keeping their playoff hopes alive while earning their first win at Lynn Family Stadium. Louisville (4-4) beat D.C. (5-3) in a thrilling 33-30 game that featured fireworks from start to finish.

Due to inclement weather, kickoff was delayed 36 minutes. Once it started, though, chaos arrived immediately. Xazavian Valladay opened the game with a 54-yard kickoff return into Louisville territory. One play later, Ta'amu connected with Ty Scott, who made a defender miss and raced home for a 41-yard touchdown. Just like that, DC led 7-0.

And just as quickly, Louisville answered. Tyler Hudson took the ensuing kickoff 92 yards to the house, marking just the second kick return touchdown in the league this season. Thirty-one seconds into the game, it was already tied 7-7. The first quarter only got wilder from there. Corey Mayfield Jr. intercepted Ta'amu on DC's next drive, his league-leading fourth interception of the season. Shortly after, Tanner Brown drilled a 39-yard field goal to give Louisville a 10-7 lead. Louisville's defense then unleashed a dominant series.

Steele Chambers stopped Abram Smith for a loss, Jaylon Allen recorded a sack, and Mekhi Garner came away with an interception off a dropped pass. DC's defense responded with a stand of its own, forcing another field goal attempt that Brown converted from short range. Then came the biggest moment of the half. Ta'amu exited with injury after a rush attempt, forcing Spencer Sanders into action. Ta'amu would miss the remainder of the game.

The Defenders later turned the ball over on downs, giving Louisville possession at the DC 39-yard line, but DC's defense answered again. Bryce Thompson intercepted Chandler Rogers in the red zone to keep it a one-score game. The opening half was pure mayhem: five turnovers, six sacks, nine tackles for loss, and 12 penalties.

Before halftime, Rogers finally found breathing room. Backed up deep in his own territory, he delivered a perfect strike to Isaiah Winstead for 45 yards, setting up Brown for history.

Brown blasted a 60-yard four-point field goal through the uprights, the first in Louisville history, extending the Kings lead to 17-7. He became just the second kicker this season to hit from 60+, joining Matt McCrane on the opposite sideline.

Then the turnovers returned. Travis Bell stripped Deon Jackson and recovered the fumble, only for Derick Roberson to force a Rogers fumble moments later that Curtis Jacobs recovered.

DC capitalized with a 51-yard McCrane field goal before Sanders engineered a late scoring drive. Smith capped it with a 21-yard touchdown run, spinning into the end zone to tie the game 17-17 entering halftime.

Louisville opened the second half with another strong drive. Rogers connected with Winstead for 16 yards and Lucky Jackson for 20 more, leading to Brown's fourth field goal of the night. Brown tied the UFL single-season field goal record with his 22nd made field goal, accomplishing the feat in just Week Eight.

Sanders answered with arguably his best drive of the game. Keke Coutee and Cornell Powell both hauled in key first downs before Valladay took over on the ground. After a 15-yard burst into the red zone, he punched in a 13-yard rushing touchdown to give DC a 24-20 lead. Facing adversity again, the Kings answered with their best drive of the night. Rogers orchestrated a grinding 16-play, 81-yard scoring march to retake the lead.

Ian Wheeler sparked the drive with a 20-yard rush before James Robinson powered Louisville downfield with multiple tough runs, including a 12-yard burst. Robinson eventually punched in the go-ahead touchdown from one yard out, though the extra point was blocked, leaving Louisville ahead 26-24.

The Kings defense delivered the next huge stop. Nick Kubitz sacked Sanders to force a punt, and Rogers immediately made DC pay. He attacked over the top and found Winstead for a 24-yard touchdown, pushing Louisville's lead to 33-24 with under eight minutes remaining. Louisville's defense continued to slam the door shut. Chambers intercepted Sanders, setting the Kings up to drain more clock.

DC still had one final push left. Sanders led a late touchdown drive capped by a three-yard Deon Jackson rushing score, but the Defenders failed on the three-point conversion attempt and later came up short on their 4th-and-12 attempt to retain possession. Rogers and the Kings kneeled out the clock to secure another statement victory. Louisville finished with 134 rushing yards, while Jaheim Thomas led the defense with seven tackles and half a sack.

Valladay paced DC's ground attack with 107 rushing yards as the Defenders totaled 218 on the ground, but they struggled badly on third down, converting just once in seven attempts.



# KINGS WEEK 9 REVIEW - KINGS 37, RENEGADES 23

## KINGS RIDE OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION, 37-23 WIN OVER DALLAS INTO PLAYOFF POSITION

LOUISVILLE, KY – May 24, 2026 – Chandler Rogers led a dominant offensive performance as the Kings (5-4) piled up 457 total yards in a decisive 37-23 victory over Dallas (3-6). Rogers accounted for three total touchdowns, posted a 149.4 quarterback rating, and helped Louisville rush for a season-high 192 yards. The win marked Louisville's third straight victory and moved the Kings into a playoff spot entering the final week of the regular season. Meanwhile, Dallas dropped its sixth consecutive game.

Dallas opened with the football and immediately found success on the ground. Ellis Merriweather ripped off a physical 20-yard run on the first play from scrimmage. A few plays later, Austin Reed helped found Tyler Vaughns in stride for a 36-yard touchdown. The score marked Vaughns' UFL-leading sixth touchdown reception of the season and gave Dallas an early spark.

Louisville looked ready to answer after driving inside the five-yard line, but Dallas flipped the momentum. Qwynnterio Cole came from behind and punched the ball loose from James Robinson, and Antwan Jackson Jr. recovered the fumble to give the Renegades a massive early takeaway. The Kings defense quickly responded with a three-and-out. Lucky Jackson then appeared to tie the game with a 63-yard punt return touchdown, but a successful super challenge from Rick Neuheisel overturned the score because of an illegal block during the return.

Louisville still managed to capitalize. Tanner Brown drilled a 45-yard field goal through the wet conditions, giving him his 23rd made field goal of the season and setting a new UFL single-season record. Dallas answered with help from a 44-yard defensive pass interference penalty on a deep shot intended for Emanuel Butler. Colton Theaker connected from 49 yards to extend the Renegades lead to 10-3.

Then the Kings offense began to heat up. Rogers delivered a beautiful 33-yard strike to Tarik Black before converting a third-and-12 with a 28-yard completion to Kaden Prather. That set Louisville up at the one-yard line, where Rogers maneuvered through traffic for the game-tying rushing touchdown.

The Kings added more before halftime. With under two minutes remaining, Rogers engineered another quick scoring drive with back-to-back chunk plays, a 24-yard completion to Zach Davidson followed by a 31-yard strike to Lucky Jackson. Brown converted his 24th field goal of the season to give Louisville a 13-10 halftime lead.

The Louisville defense dominated Austin Reed throughout the first half, limiting him to just one completion on eight attempts after the opening touchdown drive. Meanwhile, Rogers finished the half 11-for-12 with 164 passing yards.

Brown stayed hot coming out of halftime, drilling a 54-yard field goal to stretch the lead to 16-10. Reed finally completed his first pass since the opening quarter with a conversion to Lorenzo Lingard, but the Dallas offense continued to sputter. The Renegades failed to convert a third down for the eighth straight time, and Theaker missed a 40-yard field goal attempt that proved costly.

Dallas finally broke through in the fourth quarter behind its tight ends. Curtis Hodges opened the drive with a 27-yard reception, and Seth Green added a 17-yard gain to keep the momentum rolling. Hodges eventually capped the drive with a 12-yard touchdown catch after Reed escaped pressure and improvised outside the pocket. Following a 15-yard penalty, Theaker converted the long extra point and Dallas reclaimed a 17-16 lead early in the fourth quarter.

The advantage did not last long. After James Robinson powered through the defense for gains of 11 and nine yards on consecutive plays, Rogers struck again. He found Isaiah Winstead over the middle, and the receiver accelerated away from the defense for a 40-yard go-ahead touchdown.

Louisville converted the two-point attempt as Robinson stretched across the goal line on a catch out of the backfield, pushing the lead to 24-17 with just over 12 minutes remaining. Momentum completely swung moments later when Eric Garror intercepted Reed. After picking him off four times back in Week Five, the Kings secondary once again haunted the Dallas quarterback.

From there, Louisville's rushing attack took over against a worn-down Renegades defense. Rogers kept a critical drive alive with a scramble on third-and-11 before Ian Wheeler took control. Wheeler first moved the chains with a ten-yard run, then burst loose for 35 yards before fumbling through the back of the end zone. By rule, Louisville retained possession at the one-yard line.

Wheeler immediately redeemed himself on the next snap with a one-yard touchdown plunge. It marked his fifth touchdown of the season, all five coming against Dallas, and gave Louisville a two-possession lead. Rogers delivered the dagger late in the fourth quarter. He uncorked a perfect throw to Tarik Black, who hauled in an incredible 22-yard touchdown catch in the end zone.

The Kings improved above .500 for the first time in franchise history with their third straight win, while Dallas fell to 3-6 on the season.



# KINGS WEEK 10 REVIEW - KINGS 42, AVIATORS 27

## KINGS RUN INTO UFL PLAYOFFS WITH FOURTH STRAIGHT WIN, BEAT AVIATORS 42-27

COLUMBUS, OH – May 31, 2026 – The Kings stayed hot Sunday afternoon and continued their late season surge with a 42-27 win over the Aviators while giving some key starters rest. Already locked into a playoff berth, Louisville (6-4) relied on another dominant rushing performance to put away Columbus (3-7), and finish the regular season on a four-game winning streak.

Louisville piled up 205 rushing yards for the second consecutive week and scored 40+ points for the second time this season as it carried its momentum straight into the UFL Playoffs, and now turn their attention toward next week's showdown with the St. Louis Battlehawks.

The Kings entered the regular season finale with their playoff spot already secured, but there were no signs of taking their foot off the gas. On the very first play from scrimmage, Eric Garrow jumped Jalen Morton's pass and raced to the end zone for a pick-six. The takeaway marked Louisville's league-leading 13th interception and third defensive touchdown of the season. The Kings led 7-0, but Columbus would answer quickly.

Columbus moved into field goal range and Jonah Dalmas drilled a 58-yard field goal to get the Aviators on the board. On the ensuing kickoff, Xavier Benson delivered a hit on Tyler Hudson to force a fumble. Columbus recovered and had another short field to work with. Morton wasted no time taking advantage. Rolling to his right, he delivered a 23-yard touchdown strike to Keke Chism and following the extra point the Aviators led 10-7.

Louisville's offense finally took the field for the first time with 8:18 remaining in the opening quarter. After a blocked 53-yard field goal attempt, an offsides penalty negated the play and kept Louisville's drive alive. Chandler Rogers would keep it himself on a run-pass option for a 16-yard touchdown, restoring the Kings' lead at 14-10.

A post play altercation followed the touchdown, resulting in the ejection of the Kings' Cameron Dantzler. Following the altercation, Dalmas made UFL history with a 61 yard four-point field goal. The kick marked the longest field goal of the UFL season and tied the game at 14.

The Kings elected to sit Rogers for the remainder of the game and N'Kosi Perry took over under center. He led Louisville on a methodical scoring drive late in the first half, marching 51 yards in 12 plays, before Ian Wheeler scored from three yards out for his sixth rushing touchdown of the season.

Columbus would answer with a one yard Toa Taua touchdown run, knotting the game at 21-21. But Louisville had one more answer before halftime. Facing third-and-15, Perry completed a 48-yard pass to Isaiah Winstead in double coverage. Two plays later, Winstead made an incredible one-handed touchdown reception in the back of the end zone. Louisville took a 28-21 lead into halftime in what was the Kings' highest-scoring first half of the season. Columbus scored first after halftime when Dalmas continued his outstanding day by connecting from 49 yards out to cut the deficit to four. Late in the third quarter, Dalmas hit another field goal from 51 yards away, his fourth make of the afternoon, trimming Louisville's lead to 28-27 entering the final quarter. Dalmas later had a chance to give Columbus the lead with a kick from 60 yards out, but his first miss of the game allowed Louisville to maintain its one-point advantage.

The Kings finally delivered the knockout punch when Mike DiLiello took over at quarterback and engineered Louisville's first scoring drive of the second half. He completed all three of his passes on the possession before Jaden Shirden rushed for a 17-yard touchdown. The score pushed Louisville's lead to 35-27 midway through the fourth quarter.

After Louisville's defense forced a turnover on downs, the Kings put the game away. Ian Wheeler sliced through the Aviators' defense for a 61-yard run, setting up another Shirden touchdown to seal the victory.

The Kings finished with 42 points, marking their second 40-point performance of the season and fourth consecutive game with at least 30 points scored. Louisville became just the second team in UFL history to score 30 or more points in four straight games, joining the 2024 Birmingham Stallions. With their fourth straight victory, Louisville closed its inaugural regular season with a 6-4 record and enter the postseason as one of the league's hottest teams. The Kings will travel to St. Louis next Sunday for a playoff showdown with the Battlehawks.



# KINGS WEEK 11 REVIEW - KINGS 29, BATTLEHAWKS 20

## KINGS RUN INTO UFL PLAYOFFS WITH FOURTH STRAIGHT WIN, BEAT AVIATORS 42-27

ST. LOUIS, MO – June 7, 2026 – The Louisville Kings (7-4) took down the St. Louis Battlehawks (6-5) 29-20 at the Dome at America's Center on Sunday, winning their fifth straight game, and seventh in their last eight, to punch their ticket to the United Bowl in their inaugural season.

The Kings trailed 20-18 entering the fourth quarter before scoring the final 11 points of the game to rally for the road victory. Ian Wheeler gave Louisville the lead with a 51-yard touchdown run, and Tanner Brown added a 63-yard field goal to extend the advantage to nine.

Brown became the first kicker in UFL history to make two four-point field goals in a single game. He connected from 60 yards in the first quarter and from 63 yards in the fourth quarter.

Louisville opened the scoring in the first quarter after an early defensive stop. James Robinson broke free for a 53-yard touchdown run to give the Kings a 7-0 lead. St. Louis answered with a 37-yard field goal from Ramiz Ahmed, but Brown's 60-yard field goal pushed Louisville's lead to 11-3 late in the first quarter.

St. Louis took control in the second quarter with 14 unanswered points. Jarveon Howard capped a 10-play, 67-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run, and Luis Perez later connected with Blake Jackson for a 12-yard touchdown to give the Battlehawks a 17-11 lead at halftime.

Louisville responded in the third quarter after forcing a punt on the opening possession of the half. Chandler Rogers found Isaiah Winstead for a 52-yard catch-and-run to move the Kings into scoring position, then connected with Winstead again for a nine-yard touchdown. The score gave Louisville an 18-17 lead.

The Battlehawks moved back in front late in the third quarter on Ahmed's 45-yard field goal, but Louisville held St. Louis scoreless the rest of the way. Wheeler's 51-yard touchdown run with 11:46 remaining gave Louisville a 25-20 lead. After the Kings defense forced a turnover on downs near midfield, Brown made his second four-point field goal of the game to make it 29-20 with 4:41 left.

St. Louis reached the red zone on its final possession, but Louisville ended the threat with a defensive stand. Cam Gill and Lonnie Phelps recorded sacks on

the drive before Steele Chambers intercepted Perez in the end zone to seal the win.

Louisville finished with 321 total yards, including 168 rushing yards. Wheeler led the Kings with seven carries for 89 yards and a touchdown, while Robinson added 51 rushing yards and a touchdown on seven carries. Rogers completed 12-of-20 passes for 162 yards and a touchdown. Winstead led the receiving group with three catches for 66 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, Jaheim Thomas led Louisville with nine tackles. Gill finished with six tackles, one sack and one tackle for loss, giving him 11 sacks on the season.

Perez completed 25-of-40 passes for 218 yards, two touchdowns and one interception for St. Louis. Howard finished with 120 yards from scrimmage and one rushing touchdown, while Steven McBride led the Battlehawks with six catches for 84 yards.

The Kings will face the DC Defenders in the United Bowl on Saturday, June 13, at Audi Field in Washington, D.C. Kickoff is scheduled for 3 p.m. ET on ABC.



# UFL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Continuously striving to deliver a more exciting, fast-paced game on the field, the UFL will revolutionize the game by introducing the four-point field goal for attempts made from 60 yards and beyond and banning the Tush Push.

In addition, the UFL will feature one foot in bounds and no punts within the opponent's 50-yard line rules, as well as revolutionary overtime guidelines.

## FOUR-POINT FIELD GOAL

Any successful field goal kick from 60 yards or further will be worth four points.

## ONE FOOT IN BOUNDS

The UFL will require only one foot in bounds for a legal catch, adopting NCAA rules to increase passing and scoring and potentially enhance player safety.

## RED ZONE PENALTIES

The UFL will reinstitute the rule of half the distance to the goal for penalties committed in the Red Zone, which reverts back to current NFL rules.

## ELIMINATION OF TUSH PUSH

The league has eliminated the Tush Push, a play in which after the quarterback takes the snap, he immediately drives forward as the offensive line surges and is assisted by additional players behind him who physically push him forward into the surging offensive line.

## NO PUNTING INSIDE THE 50-YARD LINE

No punts will be allowed from anywhere inside the 50-yard line (+49-yard line and in). This rule does not apply after the two-minute warning of either half. Once the ball is made ready for play inside the 50-yard line, a team cannot punt even if a subsequent penalty or loss of yardage moves the ball behind the 50. If the ball is on the 50-yard line, a team may punt the ball.

## OVERTIME: THREE ATTEMPTS PER TEAM

Teams will alternate attempts from the five-yard line. If after three attempts for each team the tie has not been broken, the teams will alternate attempts until there is a winner. The home team will have the choice to go on offense or defense first. A coin toss will be implemented in lieu of home team choice.

## THREE PAT OPTIONS

Teams will have three scrimmage play options to elect their point-after-touchdown attempt, plus a new one-point kick option:

**One-Point Conversion:** 33-yard field goal

**Two-Point Conversion:** Ball placed at the two-yard line.

**Three-Point Conversion:** Ball placed at the eight-yard line.

## COIN TOSS

The league will use a standard coin toss before the start of the game and prior to overtime. The visiting team will have the opportunity to call heads or tails and the winning team based on the outcome will then get the first choice. In previous seasons, the home team made the decision.

## NEW KICKOFF RULES

**Kickoff Line:** The ball will be kicked off from the 30-yard line.

**Kickoff Team:** The 10 remaining players on the kickoff team will line up at the receiving team's 45-yard line (Previously, the 40-yard line).

**Receiving Team Zone:** The receiving team's setup zone will stretch from its 40-yard line to the 35-yard line and must have at least nine players in that zone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line to the 30-yard line.)

**Landing Zone:** The landing zone will be from the receiving team's 20-yard line to the goal line. The ball must reach the landing zone or it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.

**Out of Bounds:** If the ball travels out of bounds, it will be spotted at the 40-yard line.

**Touchback Spots:** There will be two touchback spots – the 40-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone, and the 20-yard-line for balls that hit in the landing zone and then enter the end zone. (Previously, it was the 35-yard line for balls kicked into the end zone).

### DEAN BLANDINO

#### VP of Officiating and Playing Rules Innovation

Blandino currently serves as the UFL's Vice President of Officiating and Playing Rules Innovation. A staple of FOX Sports' UFL, NFL and college football coverage, Dean Blandino offers viewers insight into plays, calls and circumstances that warrant rules interpretation or explanation. He also serves as the National Coordinator of Instant Replay for the NCAA. Blandino's NFL career included a stint as an Instant Replay Official (1999-03) and he was selected to work two Super Bowls and two conference championships. He ended his NFL tenure as Vice President of Officiating and is held in high regard for crucial input on system upgrades and an early tech adoption.



### MIKE PEREIRA

#### Head of Officiating

Mike Pereira is the Head of Officiating for the UFL, overseeing rules, regulations and game officials. He is involved in TV broadcasts, providing viewers with clarity and information on the rules and regulations of UFL games. Pereira served as the VP of Officiating for the NFL, transitioning from on-the-field officiating after 14 years (1996-2010). Pereira spent 14 years officiating college football, nine years in the Big West Conference (1982-90) and five years in the WAC (1991-95). In 1998, he was promoted to NFL supervisor of officiating before becoming Director of Officiating for the NFL, and eventually Vice President of Officiating in 2004. Pereira retired from the NFL after the 2009 season.

The most well-known member on the Kings with Kentucky roots is head coach Chris Redman, who was born and raised in Louisville. He was a high school All-American at Louisville Male High School, where he played for his father and Hall of Fame coach Bob Redman. He went on to star at the University of Louisville, where he set school records for passing yards and TD passes after he graduated. He was a third round draft pick of the Baltimore Ravens and enjoyed a nine-year NFL career with three different teams.





# COACHES

LOUISVILLE KINGS





## CHRIS REDMAN | HEAD COACH LOUISVILLE KINGS

Chris Redman is Louisville through and through. A Louisville native, Louisville Male standout, University of Louisville Hall of Famer and Super Bowl champion, Redman brings a deep connection to the city and a résumé that speaks for itself. He starred at Louisville Male, where he helped lead the Bulldogs to a state championship in 1993 and put together one of the most decorated high school careers in the country. He was a two-time All-State selection, National Player of the Year and set national records for touchdown passes in a season and in a half.

He stayed home to play for the Cardinals and became one of the most accomplished quarterbacks in school history. Over four seasons, Redman rewrote the Louisville record book and helped elevate the program during a pivotal stretch. He finished his college career with 12,746 passing yards, became the first quarterback in Division I history to complete more than 1,000 career passes, won the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and earned Conference USA Offensive Player of the Year honors. He still holds or shares nearly every major passing record at Louisville and was inducted into the Louisville Athletics Hall of Fame in 2014.

Redman was selected by the Baltimore Ravens in the third round of the 2000 NFL Draft and spent seven seasons in the NFL. He earned a Super Bowl XXXV ring with the Ravens and later had a memorable stretch with the Atlanta Falcons, including a four-touchdown game in 2007 that earned him NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.

After his playing career, Redman stayed close to the game and close to home, investing in young athletes and serving the Louisville community through coaching and mentorship. Now, he brings that experience, credibility and hometown pride to the Kings as the franchise's first head coach.





## STEVE LOGAN

### OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

**STEVE LOGAN** will enter his first season as offensive coordinator for the Louisville Kings in 2026. Born on February 3, 1953, in Lawton, Oklahoma, Logan attended Broken Arrow High School, where he lettered in football, basketball, and track. Logan played one season of college football at Emporia State before transferring to Tulsa to finish his studies. Logan's coaching career began in 1975 and spans almost every level of football. Logan's coaching career began at Union High School in Oklahoma. Other assistant coaching jobs he has held include Oklahoma State, Tulsa, Colorado, Mississippi State, East Carolina, Berlin Thunder (NFL Europe), Rhein Fire (NFL Europe), Boston College, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, San Francisco 49ers, and, most recently, the Birmingham Iron of the AAF.

Logan has been a head coach twice in his coaching career, at Hutchinson Community College in the early 1980s and at East Carolina from 1992 to 2002. While he was coaching at Hutchinson, he was named the 1982 KJCCC Coach of the Year. Logan and his wife, Laura, have two sons, Vince and Nate.



## TONY BANKS

### WIDE RECEIVERS

Tony Banks will enter his first season as the wide receivers coach for the Louisville Kings in 2026. Born on April 5, 1973, in San Diego, California, Banks attended Herbert Hoover High School, where he earned varsity letters in football, basketball, and baseball. Before enrolling at San Diego Mesa College, Banks played for the Minnesota Twins' Single-A team in Ft. Myers, Florida. After playing there for two years, he transferred to Michigan State for the 1994 and 1995 seasons. Banks ranks sixth in passing completion percentage, tenth in career passing yards, and tenth in passing touchdowns in MSU football history. His senior season in 1995 was Nick Saban's first year as head coach for the Spartans. That same season, he was named a second-team All-Big Ten member.

Banks was selected with the 42nd overall pick in the second round of the 1996 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams. Banks was the first quarterback drafted that season, started as a rookie, and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team after the 1996 season. Altogether, Banks played 10 years in the NFL. After three seasons in St. Louis, he was traded to the Baltimore Ravens, where he found himself teammates with Chris Redman, as the pair helped the Ravens win Super Bowl XXXV. Banks played a few more seasons in the NFL with the Dallas Cowboys, Washington Redskins, and the Houston Texans before calling it a career. Banks started 78 of his 96 career games played in the NFL, completing 1,278-of-2,356 passes for 15,315 yards and 77 touchdowns. Banks began his coaching career at the Greenhill School, a private K-12 school in Addison, Texas. The school announced in 2020 that it was hiring Banks as its head football coach. He had previously served as an assistant coach at the school. This season will be Banks' first at the professional level as a coach. Banks is the father of one son, Anthony Banks Jr.





## JEFF JAGODZINSKI

### TIGHT ENDS

Jeff Jagodzinski will enter his first season as the tight ends coach for the Louisville Kings in 2026. Born on October 12, 1963, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Jagodzinski was an all-conference selection at West Allis Central High School. Jagodzinski elected to stay in-state for college and attended Wisconsin-Whitewater, where he played fullback and started for three seasons. Jagodzinski went undrafted upon graduation and immediately transitioned to coaching in 1985 as the running backs coach at Wisconsin-Whitewater. For the next two decades, Jagodzinski continued to refine his coaching résumé. He served as an assistant coach at Northern Illinois, LSU, East Carolina, Boston College, the Green Bay Packers, and the Atlanta Falcons before getting his first head coaching position at Boston College in 2007. He only coached for two seasons as the head man at BC, but compiled an overall record of 20-8, and a win over Michigan State in the 2007 Champ Sports Bowl, and back-to-back ACC Atlantic Division titles.

Other assistant coaching positions he has held include the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Ave Maria, Georgia State, Notre Dame High School (Tennessee), Dallas Renegades, Panthers Wrocław, and the Philadelphia Stars. His only other head coaching job was in 2010 with the Omaha Nighthawks. In 2020, John Schlarman was hired by Kentucky to serve as the offensive line coach after the passing of the late John Schlarman. This will be Jagodzinski's first time coaching primarily tight ends since 2004, when he was with the Falcons. Jagodzinski and his wife, Lisa, have five children: Josh, JoAnne, Jessica, Jacqueline, and Jennifer.



## CHARLIE EGER

### OFFENSIVE LINE

Charlie Eger is in his first season coaching the offensive line for the Kings. Eger, a veteran offensive coach, comes to the Kings from the University of Alabama at Birmingham, where he served as the offensive quality control coach for the UAB Blazers this spring.

Prior to his stint at UAB, Eger was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach for the Raiders Tirol in the European League of Football in 2024 and 2025. Before coaching in Munich, Germany, he was the tight ends and special teams coach for the Vegas Vipers of the XFL in 2023.

Eger returned to professional football in 2020 when he became the running backs coach for the Ottawa RedBlacks in the Canadian Football League where he spent the 2020 and 2021 seasons.

A veteran college coach, he began his college career at his alma mater, Central Connecticut State, where he was wide receivers coach from 2006-09 before going to Widener University as offensive coordinator from 2010-12, and then to Seton Hill University as recruiting coordinator, offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 2013-19. His final college stop was at Clarion University in 2019.

Eger graduated from Central Connecticut State, where he earned both a bachelor's and master's degree. Eger is also a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and a Certified USA Weightlifting Coach.





## JAMIE SHARPER

### DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Jamie Sharper enters his first season as defensive coordinator for the Louisville Kings in 2026. A Richmond, Virginia native, Sharper starred at the University of Virginia from 1992–96, earning first-team All-ACC honors in 1996 after a second-team selection in 1994. He helped lead the Cavaliers to a 9–4 record, a share of the ACC title, and a Peach Bowl victory in 1995, including a landmark win over No. 2 Florida State.

Sharper was selected in the second round (34th overall) of the 1997 NFL Draft by the Baltimore Ravens and played a key role in the franchise's Super Bowl XXXV championship. He later became a cornerstone of the Houston Texans after being selected in the 2002 Expansion Draft, leading the NFL with 166 tackles in 2003. Sharper closed his career with Seattle in 2005, helping the Seahawks reach their first Super Bowl.

Over nine NFL seasons, Sharper played in 136 games with 135 starts, totaling 879 tackles, 25.5 sacks, and 13 forced fumbles. He missed just eight games in his career and appeared in 136 straight contests before his final season.

Sharper began his coaching career in 2016 at St. Augustine High School (La.) before moving to Georgetown, where he coached linebackers (2018–20) and defensive line (2021–22). He entered spring professional football in 2023 with the DC Defenders, serving as linebackers coach and special teams coordinator and contributing to a UFL championship.



## BRAD JACKSON

### LINEBACKERS

Brad Jackson will enter his first season as linebackers coach for the Louisville Kings in 2026. Born on January 11, 1975, in Canton, Ohio, the 2026 season will be Jackson's first year of coaching. Jackson attended Firestone High School in Akron, Ohio. He chose to stay in-state for his collegiate experience, attending the University of Cincinnati to play both football and basketball for the Bearcats. Jackson had a great collegiate career as a two-sport athlete, playing for Bob Huggins on the hardwood and becoming the program's third all-time leader in total tackles. Upon entering his name into the NFL Draft in 1998, Jackson was selected with the 79th overall pick in the third round of the 1998 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins. Jackson found himself on three different teams as a rookie (the Dolphins, the Tennessee Oilers, and the Baltimore Ravens). Still, he found a home in Baltimore for three seasons and helped the Ravens win Super Bowl XXXV in January of 2001.

Jackson returned to the league for one year after winning the Super Bowl, spending the 2002 season with the Carolina Panthers before retiring. Jackson finished his NFL career with 54 total tackles, three pass deflections, one forced fumble, and four fumble recoveries. Before transitioning to coaching, Jackson had a notable career in broadcasting, serving as a studio analyst for the Baltimore Ravens' pregame and postgame shows.





## CHRIS McALISTER

### DEFENSIVE BACKS

Chris McAlister enters his first season as defensive backs coach for the Louisville Kings in 2026. A Pasadena, California native, McAlister was a standout multi-sport athlete at Pasadena High School, excelling in football, basketball, and track. A dynamic two-way player, he earned Conference Player of the Year and California MVP honors, and his No. 9 jersey was later retired.

McAlister began his college career at Mt. San Antonio College before transferring to the University of Arizona, where he starred from 1996–98. A unanimous first-team All-American and three-time first-team All-Pac-10 selection, he became just the seventh player in college football history to record kickoff, punt, and interception returns for touchdowns in the same season. He finished his career with 18 interceptions, third-most in program history, and had his No. 11 jersey retired.

Selected ninth overall in the 1999 NFL Draft by the Baltimore Ravens, McAlister played 10 seasons in Baltimore and was a key contributor to the franchise's Super Bowl XXXV championship. He concluded his career with the New Orleans Saints in 2009.

Over 11 NFL seasons, McAlister appeared in 137 games, totaling 431 tackles, 26 interceptions, and five defensive touchdowns. In postseason play, he added 28 tackles and three interceptions across eight games.

The 2026 season marks McAlister's first coaching role. He is the son of former NFL running back James McAlister.



## KYLE WILLIAMS

### SAFETIES

Kyle Williams is in his first season with the Louisville Kings, where he coaches the safeties. Williams brings a track record across multiple levels. Most recently, Williams served as Defensive Coordinator for the Mississippi Valley State Delta Devils. Prior to that stop he was the Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator at Texas A&M-Commerce, where his 2023 unit ranked among the national leaders, finishing second in interceptions, first in interception return yards, fourth in takeaways, and top 20 in sacks. The defense produced three first-team all-conference players, including two All-Americans, and saw Levi Drake Rodriguez selected in the 2024 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings.

Williams played a key role in the program's transition to Division I, leading a 2022 defense that ranked in the top 15 nationally in multiple categories, including pass defense, total defense, and scoring defense. He previously coached the secondary during a dominant 2021 Division II season, when the unit ranked among the nation's best in total defense, pass defense, and scoring, while producing multiple all-conference players and an All-American defensive back who advanced to the NFL.

Prior to A&M-Commerce, Williams was defensive coordinator at Sul Ross State, where his defenses forced 102 takeaways over four seasons and consistently ranked among the national leaders in turnovers and disruptive plays. He also served as passing game coordinator and secondary coach at UT Permian Basin, significantly improving the program's pass defense and scoring metrics.

Williams began his coaching career with roles at University of Southern California, Evangel University, and Kansas State University, where he worked under Bill Snyder.



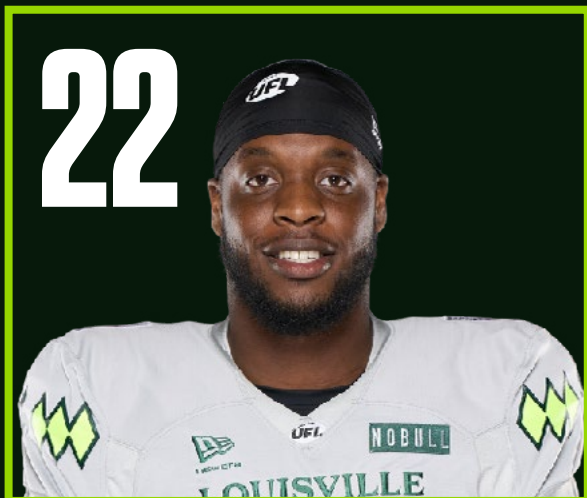

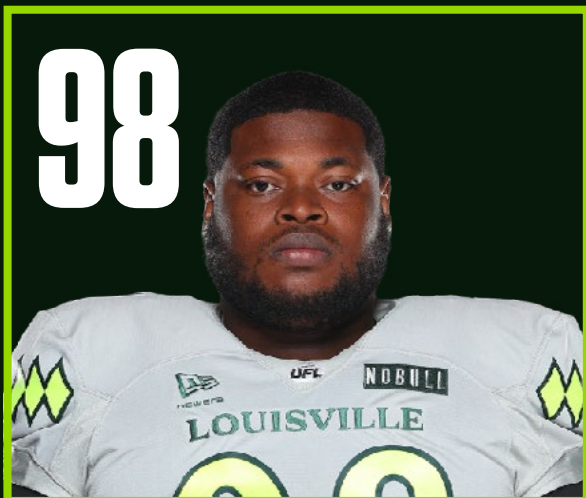

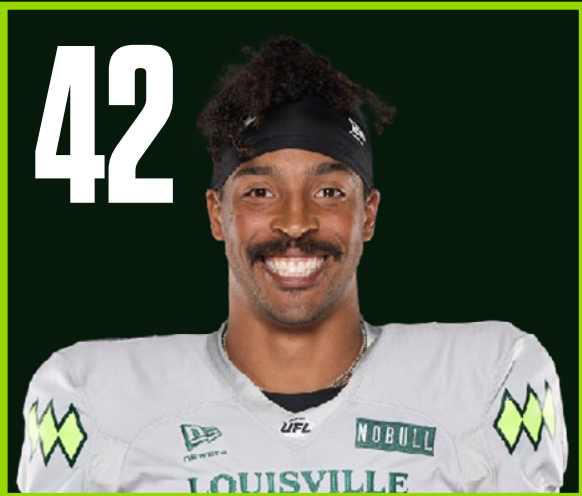

For a true taste of the city, try the Hot Brown at the Brown Hotel, where the famous open-faced turkey sandwich was created in 1926, then enjoy an Old Fashioned, Louisville's official cocktail, along the Urban Bourbon Trail.

Top landmarks include Old Louisville, the nation's largest Victorian architecture district, Central Park, the historic Belle of Louisville steamboat and the Big Four Pedestrian Bridge, which links Louisville's waterfront to Jeffersonville, Indiana, with sweeping river views and colorful nighttime lights.

## LYNN FAMILY STADIUM

Lynn Family Stadium was built as the largest soccer-specific stadium in the region with seating locations for 11,600 fans and a capacity of 15,304. Home to the UFL's Louisville Kings, Louisville City FC of the USL Championship and the NWSL's Racing Louisville FC, the stadium boasts 18 luxury suites, premium seating amenities like club and loge seats along with ledge tables, and a massive safe-standing supporter section. The venue also hosts concerts, festivals, and community events throughout the year.





# UFL TO NFL PIPELINE

The UFL's impact on the NFL kept showing up all over the field in 2025. From All-Pro honors to walk-off kicks to breakout defensive production, former spring football standouts continued to prove the league is a real pipeline to the highest level of the game. Brandon Aubrey and KaVontae Turpin earned NFL All-Pro Second Team honors in Dallas. Harrison Mevis delivered in big moments for the Rams. Jalen Redmond became a key piece of the Vikings' defensive front. Jake Bates and Andre Szmyt gave Detroit and Cleveland steady production and clutch kicks.

Altogether, 66 players from the past two UFL seasons and the modern era of spring football earned spots on NFL 53-man rosters or practice squads during the 2025 season, further strengthening the UFL's reputation as a proving ground for NFL talent.



## BRANDON AUBREY

All-Pro again. Big leg. Big moments. The former Stallions kicker continued his rise with the Cowboys, hitting 36 field goals, drilling a 64-yard go for overtime against the Giants, and making NFL history with three field goals of 60-plus yards in a season.



## KAVONTAE TURPIN

One of the most dangerous return men in football. Turpin earned All-Pro honors after leading the NFL in kickoff return yards with 1,814 and added big-play value on offense, including an 86-yard touchdown on Christmas Day.



## HARRISON MEVIS

"The Thicker Kicker" came through when it mattered. After earning the Rams' starting job in Week 10, Mevis went 39-for-39 on extra points and delivered the overtime game-winner in the NFC Divisional Round.



## JALEN REDMOND

A breakout year in Minnesota. The former Arlington Renegades standout started 15 games and gave the Vikings strong interior production with 62 tackles, six sacks, two fumble recoveries, and five passes defended.



## JAKE BATES

Steady and clutch for Detroit. Bates scored 135 points, hit four field goals from 50-plus yards, and ended Week 18 with a walk-off kick against Chicago.



## ANDRE SZMYT

A strong rookie season in Cleveland. Szmyt started all 17 games, hit 24 of 27 field goals, and closed the year with a game-winning 49-yarder against Cincinnati.
