HEAD COACH JOHAN CEDERGRÉN



In his first 11 months on the job, Kentucky men's soccer head coach Johan Cedergren – who enters his second season in 2013 – directed the Wildcats to their first NCAA Tournament berth since 2003 and its best team GPA in the history of the program.

Cedergren took over the Kentucky program in December of 2011 as the third head coach in the history of the program. His 2012 season saw the Wildcats post one of their best seasons in school annals, as UK hosted

the first round of the NCAA Tournament after ending the regular season sporting a top-25 NCAA RPI.

The Wildcats excelled under Cedergren's aggressive attacking style of play in 2012. Kentucky's offensive attack was spearheaded by goal-scoring threats Matt Lodge and Tyler Riggs, as UK finished with the 10th most points in single-season annals, ranking fourth in corner kicks.

Cedergren's first-year impact could be seen directly in the offense churned out from Lodge and Riggs, who combined for 14 goals and seven assists. Lodge set program records in shots in a season and career, while Riggs continued to set his sights on UK scoring records. Lodge, Riggs and defender Steven Perinovic each earned All-Conference USA accolades, with Lodge and Perinovic each earning all-region honors.

The Wildcats opened the Cedergren era with a grueling slate, which led to an 0-3 record and a 1-3 start, facing three top-25 teams to open the year. UK then rebounded, starting with a 1-0 win at No. 18 Louisville, kicking off a 9-4-2 record over its last 15 games. The Wildcats set a new program record for games played and wins against top-25 foes, also sporting its best road record since 1995 (6-2). UK entered the 2012 NCAA Tournament hosting berth against Xavier sporting the final regular-season RPI (No. 25) in the modern-era history of the program (2003-present).

Following the season, Wilder – an All-Conference USA midfielder in 2012 – was drafted in the Major League Soccer Supplemental Draft by FC Dallas. UK senior midfielder Charley Pettys was also inked to his first professional contract with the Los Angeles Blues in the USL. UK senior forward Gabriel Conelian also signed with the Portland Timbers of MLS, with Conelian playing on the U-23 development team.

UK's 2012 success was not limited to on the pitch, as UK compiled a 3.35 team GPA during the spring semester, the highest team GPA since the program started keeping records in 2001.

A native of Sölvesborg, Sweden, Cedergren came to UK after spending five years with Dartmouth, leading the Big Green to the NCAA Tournament in each season, an impressive feat at an Ivy League program without athletic scholarships and significant academic requirements.

A former standout player at the University of Cincinnati, Cedergren helped pace Dartmouth to the Sweet 16 in two of the five years, including two Ivy League Championships.

The 2010 National Soccer Coaches Association of America Northeast Region Assistant Coach of the Year, Cedergren helped lead the Big Green to a 52-30-12 overall record, including a 22-9-3 mark in Ivy League play, with NCAA Tournament appearances from 2007-11. Dartmouth is one of just 10 programs to play in five consecutive NCAA Tournaments, the eighth-longest streak in the nation, winning the Ivy League title in 2008 and 2011.

Highly committed to the student-athlete experience and success on the field and in the classroom, Cedergren's Dartmouth teams won the NSCAA Team Academic Award for five consecutive seasons. In 2009, Dartmouth's team 3.46 GPA was the highest in the nation, with Dartmouth boasting three Scholar-Athlete All-America honorees.

Cedergren's impact on Dartmouth could be seen directly in the individual achievements of its student-athletes, guiding two players to All-America accolades, two Hermann Trophy candidates, Ivy League Player and Rookie of

the Year honorees and 28 All-Ivy League selections. In addition, Dartmouth players earned an invite to the Major League Soccer Player Combine in four consecutive seasons.

Former Dartmouth head coach Jeff Cook – who coached Cedergren at Cincinnati – has been enrolled in the demanding UEFA Pro License coaching course throughout the 2011 year, requiring Cedergren to take on an enhanced role with the program, including coaching the team independently at times during spring games and preseason training sessions.

Highly active in recruiting the Dartmouth roster, Cedergren found success coaching international talents, with the 2011 Dartmouth roster featuring six international players from five different countries. UK's 2012 roster featured 10 international players.

Cedergren played for Cook at Cincinnati, after playing at the highest youth level in Sweden for Kalmar FF, also participating in the national development program. At UC, Cedergren was a three-year letterwinner and an All-Conference USA honoree. A former team captain, Cedergren helped lead UC to its first ever NCAA Tournament appearance in 1998 and a final-season top-20 ranking.

After concluding his playing career with a business-finance degree, Cedergren attained his master's in business administration from Xavier University, while also working full time in finance. Before beginning his coaching career, Cedergren spent eight years working in business, including time spent with U.S. Bank (2004-07) and the Johnson Investment Counsel (2001-04). While in Cincinnati, Cedergren coached with the Cincinnati Classics Soccer Club.

Cedergren is currently working on his EFA B Badge and has completed the NSCAA Premier, Advanced National and National certifications.

Cedergren, 38, is married to the former Julia Greenwald, a native of Cincinnati. The couple has two children, Gavin (seven) and Abigail (two).

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING ABOUT JOHAN

"It is really exciting. We couldn't get happier for him and his family. I am just delighted for him moving forward in his career, but also because I feel like Kentucky is the type of institution that we would hope our assistants move into when they have jobs. It is a great position to leave Dartmouth for. Of course we are sad to see Johan go, this is the right opportunity for him and his career."

"Johan was a seriously competitive player and one of the best players I have ever coached in my over 20 years of being involved in college soccer. His passion for the game was very evident, even when he was playing. He was a bit older when I recruited him to the University of Cincinnati, so his final year in school, he was no longer eligible because of his age, so he took his senior year as a student-assistant coach. That was the first time that I saw his real interest in team organization, in putting real thought into building a team and the process, team management, all of those things that go along with coaching. That is when we knew he was going to be a really good coach."

"I have said this to a few people. I believe that his experience outside of the game, ironically, has really set him up well in terms of his professionalism, the fact that he has done his MBA, he has worked in the business world for a time. That helps him. I think he does a great job with preparation. That stands out to me. He is very current, up-to-date on sports science, conditioning and coaching. He is a passionate man. He wants to gain knowledge; he wants to see how he can be a better coach. For me that is one of the things that when you look across all sports and you see the top coaches, it is those that are always trying to get better. As a coach, once you start to think you have figured it all out, you are in trouble. He is so knowledgeable about the game. And our players really respect him and wanted to play for him. I feel that he was able to work with our student-athletes in the right way so that they knew that he could really help them become better players in college soccer."

"Johan is a great hire for Kentucky. He was huge for me and Dartmouth during his time there. He really helped us jump the program to the next level. I had the chance to work with him after the season to get ready for the MLS Combine last year and he was huge for me there. He was that one missing link that we had as far as bringing his ideas and coaching ability that kind of brought us from being a competitive team to being a team that expected to win on the national stage. He is an important person and a lifelong friend in my life and I am just so excited that he has gotten the opportunity to coach Kentucky."

ASSISTANT COACH DAVID CASPER



Assistant coach David Casper is in his second year as an assistant coach for the Wildcats and his sixth season overall in collegiate coaching.

In 2012, Casper, who is the responsible for the goalkeepers on the Kentucky roster, helped lead the UK netminders to the 11th best goals against average (1.21) as well as a tie for the 10th-most shutouts (six) in school annals.

Senior Jack Van Arsdale was a major benefactor of the tutelage of Casper as he posted 11th best goals against average (1.10) and shutouts (five) in school history while helping the Wildcats reach their first postseason berth since 2003. Under Casper, Van Arsdale also garnered All-Conference USA honors (2nd team) as well as being named C-USA Player of the Week and College Soccer News National Team of the Week after his six-save shutout against No. 18 Louisville in Louisville.

Casper comes to Kentucky after three successful seasons as the top assistant coach and goalkeeping coach for Division I Saint Francis University (Loretto, Pa.). During his time at St. Francis, Casper helped guide the club to back-to-back 10-win seasons for the first time in school history. While working with the keepers, Casper helped set the school record for shutouts in a season (11), ranking third in the NCAA in shutout percentage (0.61), sixth in save percentage (.864) and 11th in goals-against average (0.65).

Casper arrived at St. Francis in 2009, helping the club post a win over the seventh-ranked team in the nation. After a year of working with the team, St. Francis had a breakout season in 2010, winning as school-record 11 games and six in conference play. The team finished with a No. 2 final NSCAA North Atlantic Region ranking and the highest RPI in school annals.

While at St. Francis, Casper worked directly with the goalkeepers, in addition to assisting in all aspects of planning and conducting training sessions, game analysis, scouting, recruiting, team travel, fundraising, equipment management, community relations and academic monitoring.

Before coming to St. Francis, Casper coached as the primary assistant and goalkeepers coach at William Paterson University (Wayne, N.J.). He assisted in planning and conducting training and assisting with the day-to-day management of the program.

In 2008, William Paterson collected 13 wins, including five in conference play to finish the season ranked No. 22 in the NSCAA national poll. William Paterson finished third in the NSCAA Metro Region, winning the ECAC Metro Region Championship. William Paterson won its first post-season championship since 1975 and set a school-record with nine shutouts in 2008.

Casper spent two seasons (2004-05) working as the assistant coach and head junior varsity coach at Timothy Christian High School in Piscataway, N.J., where he was responsible for on-field coaching, planning and conducting training sessions. In 2003, he was the head coach at Somerset Christian Academy in Zarephath, N.J.

He has additional experience as a trainer for the N.Y. Red Bulls Regional Development School (2006-08), where he worked with under-14 field players and goalkeepers. In 2008, he was the trainer for Competitive Goalkeeping in Bridgewater, N.J., training a variety of different ages and levels of keepers.

Casper has a variety of experience in summer camps, coaching at St. Francis, Notre Dame, Navy, Michigan State, Rhode Island and Victory Sports Camps.

Casper had a standout player career as a goalkeeper at Wheaton College (Ill.) and Messiah College (Pa.). While at Wheaton, he had a 0.63 goals-against average in 2001, with five shutouts. After transferring to Messiah College, he served as the starter on the 2002 Division III National Champions, totaling a 0.40 goals-against average and a school-record 16.5 shutouts. In 2006-07, he served as the starting keeper for William Paterson, posting eight shutouts. Following his collegiate career, Casper had a trial with Independiente de Medellin, in the Colombia First Division.





ASSISTANT COACH ERIK IMLER



Former University of Virginia three-time NCAA Champion and United States Olympic veteran Erik Imler is in his second year as an assistant coach at UK.

In 2012, Imler transformed a backline which started at times two freshmen and two upperclassmen into a solid wall in front of the keeper. Under Imler's tutelage Kentucky reached the postseason for the first time since 2003. The backline was key for the Wildcats as

the squad posted the fourthbest goals against average in the Conference USA as well as posting the second-fewest goals allowed in the league.

The anchor of the backline, senior centerback Steven Perinovic started all 21 games in the Kentucky kit in 2012 and with Imler's guidance produced his finest year to date by being selected first-team All C-USA as well as earning C-USA All-Tournament team honors.

One of the more decorated players in Virginia school history, Imler won three national championships at Virginia (1989, 1991, 1992) as a star midfielder and defender. Soccer America honored Imler's playing career as a member of the Team of the Century and on the 1990's Team of the Decade. A two-time All-American at Virginia, Imler was a ParadeMagazine High School All-American during his prep career.

Imler is also a veteran of the United States Olympic (1991-92; Barcelona, Spain) and National Teams (1991-93), in addition to two years on the U.S. Youth National Team (1985-87). Imler notched a full international cap with the U.S.A. National Team in 1993. In the 1992 Olympic Games, Imler started all six games and scored a goal and added an assist vs. Poland, who won the Silver Medal.

Following his career at UVA, Imler embarked on a successful professional soccer career, playing a year with the United Soccer League (Delaware Wizards and Raleigh Flyers). He also played for the D.C. United and the New England Revolution in Major League Soccer from 1996-97, before playing in the A-League for the Charleston Battery and the Lehigh Valley Steam. Imler helped lead D.C. United to the MLS Championship in 1996. Imler was drafted in the third round (30th overall) in the 1996 MLS Inaugural Player Draft, playing in 19 games while helping lead D.C. United to the title.

After his standout playing career on the collegiate and professional level, Imler began an assistant coaching career with a season at his alma mater, coaching at Virginia in 1993. He then moved to The Citadel in Charleston, S.C. (1998-99), before taking the head coaching job with the Belmont Abbey women's soccer program in 2009-10.

During his season as the head coach of Belmont Abbey College, Imler led the team to a 17-3-3 record, before becoming an assistant coach with the U.S.A. men's national under-17 team.

Imler comes to Kentucky after a two-year stint as an assistant coach from the United States U17 Men's National Team. He was charged with training the reserve players when the first team was traveling domestically and internationally. He played a major role with younger group of residency players and assisted the head coach in younger group residency players in an international tournament in Montaigu, France. He was highly active in coordinating, planning and executing the training of the team, in addition to scheduling all local games and scrimmages for the first and second teams. He helped track the progress of all current cycle age group players for consideration in the next residency program cycle. He was highly active in scouting USYSA National Events, US Soccer National League events and US Soccer Developmental Academy events.

In addition to his role as an assistant coach with the U.S. U18 Men's

National Team, Imler has served as technical advisor for the U.S. Soccer Development Academy (Great Lakes Territory). In that role, he scouted all youth players in the Great Lakes territory (Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Western Pennsylvania, Northern Kentucky and Colorado).

In 2005, Imler founded the Boot Room Soccer School in Waxhaw, N.C., a soccer training resource that was focused on developing innovative training programs for all ages and skill levels. He worked directly in developing mentoring and coaching programs for all college bound student-athletes and was charged with managing all financial aspects of the business. In 2008, he was a presenter at the NSCAA Convention in Baltimore, Md.

A native of Bowie, Md., Imler earned his bachelor of science in education from the University of Virginia in 1993. Imler has his USSF "A" Coaching License in 2010 and is an accredited trainer in certified speed, agility and quickness by the National Endurance Sports Trainers Association.

Imler is married to the former Claudine Maas and the couple have a 13-year old daughter named Jordan and an eight-year old son, Evan.

As the baseball and soccer contact, Ingram coordinates all media requests, in addition to writing and editing Kentucky media guides, game notes and press releases, also maintaining and editing all social media website presences, with UK ranking No. 18 in the NCAA with its @UKbaseball account and No. 5 with its @UKmensSoccer account. Ingram also serves as the media coordinator and official scorer during home baseball and men's soccer contests, in addition to his day-to-day responsibilities in the media relations office and the management of UK's entire 22-sport intercollegiate athletic program.

In seven previous years working with the UK baseball program, Ingram has successfully promoted a school-record four All-America selections, including a program-first two honorees in 2008. In addition during Ingram's seven-years with UK baseball, a school-record 58 players have been picked in the MLB Draft or signed free agent professional contracts, including 15 players drafted in the top 10 rounds since 2008. Pitching stars James Paxton (2009) and Alex Meyer (2011) became the third and fourth UK players picked in the first-round picks in the 48-year history of UK in the MLB Draft, with Meyer going 23rd overall in the 2011 MLB Draft to the Washington Nationals. UK currently has Collin Cowgill in the big leagues for a third season, lefty Scott Downs as one of the top relievers in the game and former UK stars Chris Rusin and Andrew Albers advancing to MLB in 2013.

During a historic 2012 UK baseball season, the Wildcats shattered nearly every school record and boasted some of the top individual players in program annals, including consensus freshman All-America selections Austin Cousino and A.J. Reed, with Gary Henderson named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year. After the year, a school-record nine players were drafted, second-most of any school in the nation. The Wildcats soared to a No. 1 national ranking for the first time in program history and shattered a bevy of school records during the best campaign in the 107-year history of the program.

During his time with men's soccer, several UK stars have earned accolades, including the first two freshman All-America honorees in program history in back-to-back seasons (Dylan Asher; 2010, Matt Lodge; 2009) and defender Barry Rice was named the third and fourth All-America selection (2007,2008) in school annals. Ingram has helped transform the men's soccer program into a digital age, as UK provides arguably the only consistent interactive live blog in the NCAA for all of its road contests and have debuted technological innovations including live video streaming for home contests and a comprehensive men's soccer interactive website geared towards attracting recruits.

Ingram graduated in December of 2006 from the University of Kentucky with a degree in communication. He began his career in sports information as an intern for the Kentucky High School Athletic Association from 2000-2006, under KHSAA veterans Butch Cope, Julian Tackett and Marilyn Mitchell, and began working as a student assistant in the UKMR office during the summer of 2004. As a student assistant in 2006, Ingram worked as the secondary contact for the baseball program under primary contact Scott Dean, with the Wildcats completing a worst-to-first turnaround in claiming the SEC Championship and hosting the first NCAA Regional in program history.

He spent the 2006-07 school year working as the media relations assistant at UK, handling baseball, rifle and assisting the football program under long-time UK football SID Tony Neely. In addition to his time at Kentucky, he has worked conference and NCAA championship events



ranging from baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, softball, volleyball and track and field. Ingram also served as the official scorer for the 2009 and 2010 SEC Baseball Tournament and as the official scorer for the 2011 Lexington Softball NCAA Super Regional.

He is a member of the College Sports Information Directors Association of American (CoSIDA) and the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA). Annually, UKMR and Ingram's publications are listed among the tops in the nation by CoSIDA, including the 2009 Baseball Media Guide, which finished first in the district. In 2010-11, the UK baseball poster – conceptualized by marketing director Nathan Schwake and creative director Kim Troxall – was named as the best poster among all of the NCAA's spring sports.

Ingram, 30, is a native of Gainesville, Fla., and the son of Dr. Dewayne and Pat Ingram. He is single and has a sister, Trisha Ingram Layow. Trisha and her husband Matt Layow, has three children, Cole Thomas (three) and twins Scarlett and Savannah (four months).

Former Dartmouth all-conference standout Lucas Richardson has joined the Kentucky men's soccer staff as its volunteer assistant coach for the 2013 season.

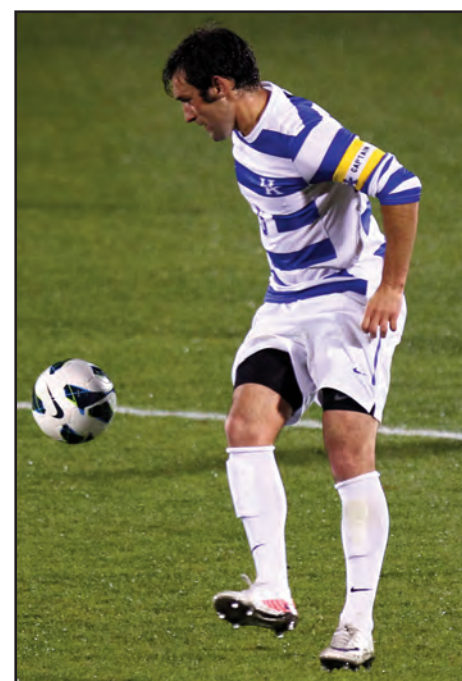

HISTORY OF UK SOCCER



One of the biggest wins in program history came in 2007, when UK posted a 2-1 comeback win over No. 1 SMU.

The University of Kentucky men's soccer program has steadily climbed to the level of the nation's elite since it was established on June 1, 1991.

Before joining one of the nation's top soccer conferences in Conference USA in 2005, Kentucky spent a decade in the Mid-American Conference, where it dominated the opposition. In that span, Kentucky won four conference championships and advanced to the finals or semifinals of the league tournament every season.

The program has continued to grow over time, drawing a school-record 3,327 fans for its 1-0 win over Louisville in 2005 and ranking 21st in the nation in attendance during that season. In 2008, UK led the conference in attendance for the second time in the past three years.

Through the years, UK's soccer program has produced highlight after highlight, from its 1995 1-0 win over Indiana in Bloomington to its 2-1 win over MAC rival Bowling Green in 1997 in front of 3,003 screaming Wildcats fans at the UK Soccer Complex.

The 2008 highlight came when the Wildcats upended No. 1 SMU at the UK Soccer Complex, UK's first win over a top-ranked foe in program history.

When UK soccer became a varsity sport on June 1, 1991, Lexington native Sam Wooten took the helm. He had served as the Kentucky coach during UK's club soccer days, and he was the natural choice to lead the new varsity team.

Known for his big, physical squads, Wooten racked up a 28-25-7 record in three seasons at the reins.

From 1991 to 1996, the Wildcats called The Cage home. The Cage Soccer Field, which stood where UK's Boone Tennis Center now stands, placed fans just feet from the pitch and the UK fans gave Kentucky a tremendous home-field advantage. In its five-and-a-half seasons at The Cage, UK posted an impressive 34-17-8 home mark.

In 1994, Ian Collins was brought in by then-UK Athletics Director C.M. Newton to lead the UK Soccer Wildcats. Under Collins, the Wildcats were consistent conference title contenders in both the MAC and C-USA. The Wildcats won the MAC Tournament title three straight years from 1999-2001 and regular-season championships in 2000, 2001, 2003 and 2004. In 2001, the Wildcats ran through the league with a perfect 6-0-0 record. UK repeated the feat in 2003 and became the first team in conference history to go through the regular season without relinquishing a goal.

Since joining C-USA, UK has made all but one conference tournament, with UK ranking only behind Tulsa for the most wins in the conference during that span.

The UK Soccer Complex ushered in a new era of UK soccer. Opened on Oct. 24, 1996, the complex houses a playing field, a practice field, team lounge and locker rooms. Before the 2011

season, UK invested \$100,000 on a state-of-the-art playing surface, designed to prevent injuries and provide a better all-weather surface. In addition, UK installed a tower at the complex, allowing coaches to get a tremendous view of the action for postgame video.

Flash forward to the 2012 season and an exciting addition of head coach Johan Cedergren to guide the program led to a historic inaugural campaign. Cedergren's new attacking system paced the Wildcats to its first NCAA Tournament berth since 2003, with UK tabbed to host Xavier at the UK Soccer Complex.

After the season, the Wildcats announced the construction of a sparkling new facility that will provide the program one of the top stadiums in college soccer. The \$9 million facility is scheduled to be completed during the 2013 season. With the addition of a video tower, a \$100,000 perfect playing surface, a video board and now state-of-the-art facilities for games and training, UK's program will be spurred by one of the top facilities in the NCAA.

In addition to its successful teams, the UK soccer program has also been successful academically. Four times since 2000 the program has won an NSCAA Team Academic Award and has produced five Boyd McWhorter Scholarship nominees in that same span. In 2006, 2007 and 2008, the soccer team was named the UK Male Academic Team of the Year at the CATSPY Awards.



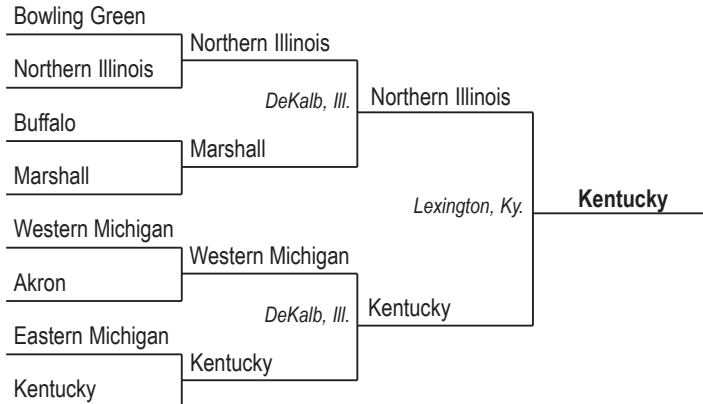

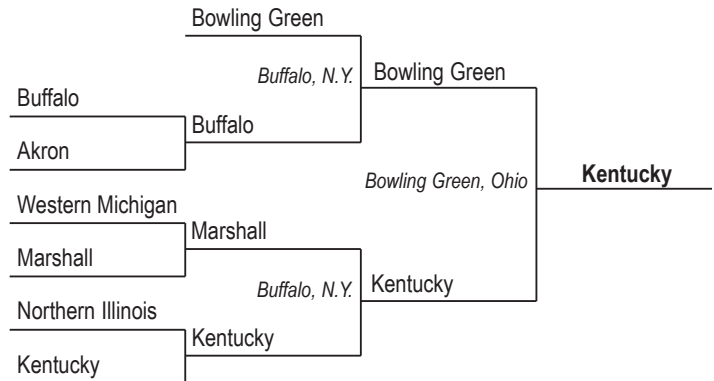
CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS

1999 MAC Tournament Champs

The 1999 Mid-American Conference Tournament began a three-year championship run for the Wildcats. The second-seeded Wildcats marched through Eastern and Western Michigan before avenging a regular-season loss to Northern Illinois with a 2-1 victory to win the title. Jason Bell scored both goals in the final en route to All-Tournament Team honors. He was joined on the team by Giovanni Fernandes, Chris McAlpine and goalkeeper Brian O'Leary, who pitched two shutouts. The championship sealed Kentucky's first NCAA Tournament appearance.

2000 MAC Champs

After three straight second-place finishes, Kentucky finally broke through and won a share of the Mid-American Conference title in 2000. It would be the beginning of a MAC dynasty as the Wildcats took home at least a share of the championship in four of five seasons. 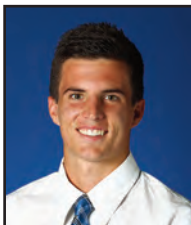
