CARDS FACE RIVAL KENTUCKY IN FINALE

■ Louisville (6-5, 5-3 ACC) closes the 2015 regular season with a short trip up I-64 to face intra-state rival Kentucky on Saturday, Nov. 28 at Commonwealth Stadium. Kickoff is slated for noon and will be televised by the SEC Network.

■ The Cardinals saw their four-game winning streak snapped with a 45-34 loss at Pitt on Saturday. The Cardinals surrendered 42 first-half points, but held the Panthers to a second-half field goal

■ The Cardinals, who qualified for a bowl for the 16th time in 18 years versus Virginia on Nov. 14, saw their streak of winning nine or more games in a season halted at three. It's also the first time in six seasons at Louisville that head coach Bobby Petrino won't secure nine wins in a season.

■ The Cardinals will be looking for their fourth-straight win over Kentucky, and are looking to post their sixth-straight winning season.

■ Kentucky stopped its slide with a 58-10 win over Charlotte on Saturday at Commonwealth Stadium. The Wildcats rushed for 415 yards and had two 100-yard rushers in the win.

■ Junior wide receiver **Jamari Staples** caught nine passes for a career-high 194 yards and a touchdown in the loss to Pitt. The receiving yards was tied for the sixth-highest in school history and was his second 100-yard receiving game this season.

■ Junior linebacker **Devonte Fields** recorded two sacks versus Pitt increasing his total to five sacks in the last five games. He has 5.5 sacks this season.

THE STORYLINES

■ Freshman **Lamar Jackson** entered the game versus Pitt in the late in the first half and led the Cardinals back from a 42-24 half-time deficit. Jackson went 9-for-17 for 141 yards and one touchdown — hitting **Jamari Staples** with a 49-yard touchdown with three seconds left in the second quarter. Jackson also rushed for a touchdown, and leads the team with seven rushing scores and nine passing touchdowns.

■ Linebacker **Keith Kelsey** totaled 12 tackles in the loss to Pitt on Saturday, which was his second-straight double-digit tackle game. The Gainesville, Fla., product leads the team with a career-best 98 tackles. It was the fifth time this season and the seventh time in his career that he finished with 10 or more tackles in a game during his career.

■ Tight end **Cole Hikutini** has become a weapon over the last three games, catching nine passes for 148 and three touchdowns. He caught two passes for a career-best 61 yards in the loss to Pitt on Saturday. The other tight end, **Keith Towbridge** has also caught seven passes for 116 yards and his first two touchdown passes of his career over the last three contests. He scored on a 29-yard touchdown receptions versus the Panthers on Saturday.

Junior wide receiver **Jamari Staples** leads the ACC with 599 yards in conference games only. All of Staples' 35 receptions for 599 yards have come in ACC play after missing the first four games with an injury.

The Cardinals threw for 355 yards in the loss to Pitt, the second-highest total in a game this season. Louisville is averaging 253.1 yards through the air after 11 games.

LOUISVILLE HEAD COACH BOBBY PETRINO

The architect of one of the greatest runs in school history from 2003-06 returned last season to take over the program he helped build during his first head coaching stint.

Leading the Cardinals from Conference USA to the BIG EAST, Petrino guided the Cardinals to a 41-9 overall record, two conference titles, and the school's first BCS Bowl appearance during that four-year stretch.

In 2014, Petrino, who returned to the Derby City after an eight-year absence, was faced with a bigger challenge of taking the Cardinals into the Atlantic Coast Conference.

As had been the case in his first four years, Petrino took the challenge head on and guided the Cardinals to their fifth-straight nine-win season.

The Cardinals went 9-4 overall, 5-3 in the ACC, with a big win over Miami in the inaugural ACC game, and wins at Boston College and Notre Dame, and closing the year with a come-from-behind victory over Kentucky. Louisville advanced to its fifth-straight bowl appearance and the fifth overall under Petrino.

After an eight-year hiatus from Louisville, University of Louisville Vice President/Director of Athletics Tom Jurich announced on Jan. 9, 2014. Bobby Petrino as the Cardinals' football coach for the second time in his career. The Cardinals' head coach from 2003-06, Petrino led UofL to unprecedented success in four seasons on the sidelines.

However, during his return this time, the Cardinals made a step up, joining the Atlantic Coast Conference. That didn't matter to Petrino, directing his team to a 9-4 overall record and a 5-3 mark in the ACC. The three losses came by a total of 19 points and to a pair of ranked foes in No. 25 Clemson and No. 2 Florida State.

Petrino, who owns a 56-17 mark overall at Louisville and a 98-38 record all-time as a collegiate coach, directed the Cardinals to their fifth-straight bowl appearance and a post-season berth in his first five seasons as the leader of the Cardinals.

During his first stint at Louisville, Petrino directed the program to a bowl game each year, but more significantly, guided the school to its first BCS victory - a 24-13 win over Wake Forest in the FedEx Orange Bowl. The 41 wins over that four-year span were the most in school history and featured an average margin of victory of 26.0.

He also showed the ability to develop players, as Petrino had 14 selected in the NFL Draft, including

Amobi Okoye, who was the 10th overall selection in 2007 by the Houston Texans. Eric Wood, who was recruited by Petrino, was the 28th selection by the Buffalo Bills in 2009. Michael Bush, a fourth-round pick by the Oakland Raiders, amassed 2,514 rushing yards in three-plus seasons with the Cardinals.

Coupling his success at Louisville and Arkansas, Petrino has led his teams to eight bowl games in 10 years, including both Louisville's and Arkansas' first BCS bowl games. His programs have achieved four 10-win seasons along with top-10 finishes nationally three times. His 2006 Louisville squad and 2011 Arkansas team concluded with No. 5 rankings in the Associated Press polls.

Petrino directed the Cardinals to their first BIG EAST title in 2006, Louisville's second year in the league. He guided that squad to a 12-1 record, which tied the 2013 squad for the most wins in school history. The Cardinals ended the year with their highest national ranking in school history, finishing No. 5 in the Associated Press poll and sixth in the USA Today poll. The Cardinals opened the year going 8-0, including a win over third-ranked West Virginia, and catapulted to as high as No. 3 in the nation.

Hired for the first time at Louisville in 2003, Petrino took the reins of a program that finished 7-6 a year prior and drove the school to a 9-4 mark that resulted in an appearance in the GMAC Bowl. Petrino became the first Louisville head coach to win nine games in their first season.

By the end of his first year, Petrino's team led the league and ranked among the nation's best in total offense, rushing, and scoring. The Cardinals ranked fifth in the nation in total offense (488.9), 10th in rushing (228.2), and 15th in scoring offense (34.6). Louisville set six Conference USA records, including the mark for total yards after the Cardinals racked up 779 yards, including 445 rushing yards, in a 66-45 win over Houston.

The 2004 campaign was one of the best in school history, with Petrino leading the Cardinals to an 11-1 record that culminated in a Conference USA title and a 44-40 Liberty Bowl over 10th-ranked Boise State. The Cardinals led the nation in total offense (539.0) and scoring offense (49.8), scored 50 or more points seven times and set an NCAA record by scoring 55 or more points in five straight games.

After a 9-3 season in 2005, Petrino took Louisville to an unprecedented level the following season, finishing with a 12-1 record and a 24-13 victory over

THE GOVERNOR'S CUP

■ The Governor's Cup was created in 1994 as the trophy for the winner of the Louisville-Kentucky game. Donated by The Kroger Company at a cost of \$23,000, the Governor's Cup stands 33 inches tall and weighs 110 pounds. The trophy's base and upright columns are hand-milled black marble. The glass components are optic-grade crystal. All metal parts are 23-karat, gold-plated brass. The cup itself is made of pewter with a 23- karat gold-plated finish.

■ The cup was designed by Kendall Costner and sculpted by James Corcoran of Bruce Fox, Inc. The Kroger Company also is involved in supporting academic pursuits at the schools. Kroger is donating \$10,000 to each school for each year the game is played. Kroger's donations now total \$420,000 - \$210,000 to each school.

SERIES RECORD VS. LOUISVILLE

■ Saturday's game will be the 28th all-time meeting between the schools with the Wildcats leading the series 14-13, with the series deadlocked at 8-8 in games played in Lexington.

■ Louisville has won the last four meetings dating back to 2011 and has defeated the Wildcats in its last two visit to Commonwealth Stadium. The Cards defeated UK 27-13 in 2013 and 24-17 in 2011 at Commonwealth Stadium.

■ The two teams first met in 1912 and have met annually since 1994. Kentucky won the first seven meetings in the series.

■ This is the second time the teams have played in the regular-season finale, with the Cardinals winning the first match-up 44-40 last season at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.

■ This is the second time that Mark Stoops and Bobby Petrino have met as head coaches in this series. Petrino coached at WKU in 2013 and earned a victory over the Wildcats. Petrino is 6-1 all-time versus Kentucky, including 5-0 as head coach of the Cardinals/

■ Biggest UK win: 73 (73-0) in 1922 in Lexington

■ Biggest Louisville win: 31 (59-28) in 2006 in Louisville

■ Games decided by 7 points or less: Series tied 5-5.

LAST TIME VERSUS KENTUCKY

■ Brandon Radcliff ran for a 4-yard touchdown with 2:47 remaining and safety Gerod Holliman sealed it with an NCAA record-tying 14th interception with 35 seconds left, helping the Cardinals earn a wild 44-40 victory.

■ Louisville senior wide receiver DeVante Parker caught six passes for 180 yards and three TDs from redshirt freshman quarterback Kyle Bolin, a Lexington native who relieved injured freshman Reggie Bonnafon in the second quarter. Surprisingly left 1 on 1 in most situations, Parker ended up tying Ibn Green for the school record in TDs (33).

■ Radcliff rushed for two TDs and Michael Dyer one in a game that the Cardinals (9-3) mounted four comebacks. Two of them came in an incredible final period that featured four lead changes alone. The Cardinals ultimately taking the last one by driving 81 yards for the go-ahead score.

■ But no advantage was safe and Louisville was prepared for Kentucky (5-7) to mount one final comeback attempt with time to move downfield. But the Wildcats' last possession ended with Holliman picking off Patrick Towles and returning it 65 yards to the 2 before Louisville ran out the clock and spark a celebration of 55,118 mostly red-clad Cardinals fans.

■ Holliman's interception and return clinched the fourth straight Governor's Cup win for Louisville, which has won eight of its past 12 against Kentucky and trails the series 14-13.

LOUISVILLE-KENTUCKY TIES

■ Louisville will close the 2015 regular season with a pair of road games versus Pittsburgh (Nov. 21) and at Kentucky (Nov. 28). It will be the first time the Cardinals closed the season with a pair of road contests since the 2011 season when the Cardinals won a pair of road contests at Connecticut 34-20 and South Florida 24-24.

■ This is the 16th time in school history that the Cardinals will end the year with consecutive road games (2001, 1997, 1996, 1993, 1992, 1991, 1987, 1975, 1969, 1965, 1963, 1961, 1940, 1938).

■ The Cards are 10-20 in the two road contests that close the regular season, but have won three of the last four games.

EXPERIENCE...

■ Four out-going seniors will conclude their home season having played at least 40 games during their Louisville careers. Kicker John Wallace, linebacker James Burgess defensive end Sheldon Rankins and defensive back Jermaine Reve all played 40 or more games during their UofL careers.

■ Wallace will appear in his team-leading 51st game of his career on Saturday, while Burgess will play in his 47th game at Louisville. Rankins will make his 45th appearance and Reve will play in his 43rd career game.

■ Burgess will likely make his team-high 41st career start in the game versus Kentucky on Saturday.

CARDS TIE MARK FOR ACC WINS

■ Louisville finished it's second season in the ACC with a record identical to its 2014 mark. The Cardinals finished 5-3 for the second-straight season after falling 45-34 to Pittsburgh on Saturday.

■ The Cardinals are 10-6 in two seasons since joining the conference in 2014. Louisville closed the season by winning four of its five conference games.

STREAK STOPPED

■ With wins in their final three games, the Cardinals had an opportunity to win at least nine games for the fourth-consecutive year, but that streak was stopped with their 45-34 loss to Pittsburgh last Saturday. Louisville had 11 wins in 2012, 12 in 2013 and nine last season

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino's streak of winning at least nine games at Louisville was also halted at five. Petrino's team won nine games in 2003, 2005 and 2014, while tallying 11 victories in 2004 and 12 win in 2006.

PETRINO MOVES INTO SECOND PLACE

■ Sixth-year Louisville head coach Bobby Petrino owns an 56-18 (.757) record as head coach of the Cardinals. His .757 winning percentage currently ranks first at Louisville. He won his 55th game at Louisville on Nov. 14, against Syracuse to move into second place all-time in victories in school history (record: Frank Camp, 118). Petrino won his 98th career game as a head coach last week versus Virginia.

■ His career record stands at 98-42 (.705) in his 11th season. Of his 11 seasons as a head coach, Petrino has won at least six games in 10 of those years.

■ Petrino needs two wins to become the 20th-active head coach to post 100 career wins.

■ Prior to Petrino's head coaching tenure that began in 2003, the Cardinals had never recorded an 11-win season. Under Petrino, Louisville has won 11 games two times in 2004 and 2006.

■ Petrino is one of just three Louisville head coaches to coach in at least 70 games at Louisville (Frank Camp and Howard Schnellenberger).

■ Petrino is the fifth-longest tenured coach in the ACC (Frank Beamer (29), Dabo Swinney (8), David Cutcliffe (8), Jimbo Fisher (6) and Mike London(6).

■ Petrino's six-game bowl streak at Louisville is the longest at the school.

■ Petrino's .715 winning percentage (98-39) ranks 11th among active head coaches for career winning percentage.

■ Petrino needs two wins to become the 21st head coach to post at least eight wins to open a coaching tenure at a Power-5 school.

STAFF SNAPSHOT

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino returned his entire staff in 2015. Offensive coordinator Garrick McGee and offensive line coach Chris Klenakis followed Petrino from their days together at Arkansas, while wide receivers coach Lamar Thomas, running backs coach Kolby Smith and defensive line coach came to Louisville from Western Kentucky.

■ Defensive coordinator Todd Grantham, linebacker coach Tony Grantham, safeties coach Greg Brown and cornerbacks coach Terrell Buckley didn't have previous coaching ties with Petrino.

■ Louisville's staff includes two former Cardinals players: running backs coach Kolby Smith and defensive line coach L.D. Scott.

ROAD KILL

■ Despite , the Cardinals have played very well on the road in recent years. Since the 2010 season, the Cardinals are 22-9 in true road games and have won four of the last six games away from home.

■ Louisville is 2-2 on the road with both losses to teams (Florida State and Pittsburgh) with a combined record of 17-5. In those two losses, however, the Cards are giving up an average of 43.0 points per game after the 41-21 loss to the Seminoles and the 45-34 defeat against Pittsburgh last weekend.

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino's teams are 25-10 at Louisville in road games, going 6-4 over the last two seasons since he returned to the Derby City.

ONE OF THE BEST IN ACC

■ While the Cardinals have only been in the ACC for the last two seasons, it hasn't stopped them from being one of the winningest teams in the conference since 2010. Louisville has posted a 52-23 record over the last six seasons, which is third-best among ACC teams next to Florida State (66-13) and Clemson (59-17).

SCORING BARRAGE

■ After averaging just 24.3 points per game in the first eight contests of the season, the Cardinals have returned to the days when Bobby Petrino's teams lit up the scoreboard. In the last three games, a 45-34 loss to Pitt, and victories over Virginia (38-31) and Syracuse (41-17) the Cardinals are averaging 37.7 points per game in those three contests.

■ It's the first time the Cardinals scored 30 or more points in three-straight games since the Cardinals closed the 2014 regular season with wins over Boston College, Notre Dame and Kentucky.

FIX THE BULBS IN NOVEMBER

■ There is something about the month of November that makes the Louisville offense more explosive with head coach Bobby Petrino on the sidelines, Not only does the sixth-year coach at Louisville own a 17-4 record during that month, the Cardinals show a propensity to light up the scoreboard.

■ In 21 career November games under Petrino, the Cardinals are averaging 42.9 points per game. Petrino's teams have scored 40 or more points seven times, 50 points three times and 60 three times.

■ Louisville has won five of its last six November games and are averaging 37.7 points per game during that span.

A TOUGH SLATE

■ Louisville's schedule is rated the 12th-most difficult in the country by Sagarin. Louisville's five losses this season have come from teams with a combined record of 43-11 (Houston 10-1; Clemson 11-0; Florida State 9-2 , Pittsburgh 8-3 and Auburn 6-5).

■ Louisville's 2015 schedule features seven teams who played in bowl games a year ago as Auburn played in the Outback Bowl (L, 34-31 to Wisconsin); Florida State played in the Rose Bowl (L, 59-20 to Oregon); NC State appeared in the St. Petersburg Bowl (W, 34-27 over UCF); Boston College played in the Pinstripe Bowl (L, 31-30 to Penn State); Clemson competed in the Russell Athletic Bowl (W, 40-6 over Oklahoma); Houston and Pittsburgh played in the Armed Forces Bowl, with the Cougars winning 35-34.

■ The 2015 schedule features three opponents who are currently ranked in the Top 25 nationally — Clemson, Florida State and Houston. Auburn began the season ranked sixth in the country.

■ The Cardinals played Samford for the first time in school history and will also make their first trip to BB&T Field in Winston-Salem on Oct. 30.

ROSTER NOTES

■ The Cardinals' roster features players from 16 states and a set of brothers who were born in Japan. There are 30 native Kentuckians on the squad, followed by 23 Florida natives and 14 from Georgia.

■ Louisville features 64 underclassmen, including 33 freshmen and 31 sophomore. The upperclassmen totals 32 junior and 14 seniors.

■ Five Cardinals will serve as captains for the 2015 season. The group includes two players on offense (offensive tackle Aaron Epps and running back Brandon Radcliff) and three on defense (linebackers James Burgess and Keith Kelsey and defensive end Sheldon Rankins).

■ True freshman **Geron Christian** is the brother of former UofL tight end and seventh-round draft pick of the Arizona Cardinal Gerald Christian.

■ Prior to the end of camp, head coach Bobby Petrino surprised seven walk-ons with full scholarships for the 2015 season. Wide receiver **Dontez Byrd**, offensive lineman **Toriano Roundtree**, running back **Malin Jones**, defensive lineman **Aaron Ahner**, fullback **Griffin Uhl**, running back **Darius Skinner** and long snapper **Colin Holba** were awarded scholarships by Petrino in late August.

ACADEMIC NOTES

■ Five Cardinals are playing this season as graduate assistants. Linebackers James Burgess and Keith Brown, while offensive tackles Aaron Epps and Kelby Johnson, and kicker John Wallace.

■ The team recorded a 2.83 grade-point average for the spring semester, the highest registered GPA in the program's history. Overall, the Cardinals had one perfect 4.0 GPA, and saw 36 student-athletes post a 3.0 or higher and 70 athletes over a 2.5 GPA. For the year, the Cardinals had 24 student-athletes receive their degrees.

ONE-POINT WINS

■ The Cardinals evened their record with a 20-19 win over Wake Forest on Oct. 30. It was the first one-point win for the Cardinals since 2009 when UofL defeated Syracuse 10-9 at home on Nov. 14.

■ The one-point victory over Wake Forest was the smallest margin of victory in Petrino's career at Louisville. His previous mark came last week in the 17-14 win over Boston College. He had four-points wins over Kentucky last season and Boise State in the 2004 Liberty Bowl.

■ The 20 points was the second-lowest scoring total in a win under Bobby Petrino. The lowest scoring output in a win came versus Boston College on Oct. 24 in the 17-14 win.

■ The Cardinals are 14-23 all-time in one-point games during their history.

EXPERIENCE & FRESHMEN STARTERS

■ Louisville had a strong 2015 recruiting class and many of the newcomers wasted little time making an impact during preseason camp. Eleven true or red-shirt freshmen are listed on the depth chart heading into the Kentucky contest.

■ The Cardinals ended up with three freshmen starters in their opening lineup versus Auburn: TE **Micky Crum**, QB **Lamar Jackson** and OT **Geron Christian**.

■ Freshmen continue to make an impact as Lamar Jackson has started six games at quarterback. He leads the team in rushing with 548 yards and a team-high seven touchdowns, while also passing for 1,483 yards and nine touchdowns. He became the third (Chris Redman and Kyle Bolin) freshmen to pass for 300 yards in a game when he passed for 307 yards versus Florida State. Jackson set the school record for most total offense by a freshman when he totaled 396 yards versus Samford on Sept. 26.

■ Louisville might not have one of the youngest teams in the nation, but most of its contributors are youngster leading the offense. The Cardinals have

played nine true freshmen and four redshirt freshmen through the first 11 games, but nine of the rookies have appeared in games on the offensive side of the ball.

■ Against Florida State, the Cardinals started five freshmen on the offensive side of the football. Jaylen Smith, a true freshman, is third on the team with 18 receptions for 252 yards, while Traveon Samuel, another rookie, is sixth with 15 catches for 139 yards.

BOBBY PETRINO VS. THE ACC

■ Louisville coach Bobby Petrino is 18-7 against ACC teams (all games) since taking over for the Cardinals in 2003.

■ Petrino was 8-1 against current ACC teams from when he coached the Cardinals from 2003-06.

■ In two seasons in the ACC, Petrino is 6-3 in ACC home games and 4-4 on the road in the league.

LOOKING BACK AT PITTSBURGH

■ The Cardinals finished with 355 yards passing versus Pitt, their second highest total of the season through the air.

■ Wide receiver **Jamari Staples** had nine catches for a career-best 194 yards, tied for the sixth most receiving yards in a single game in Louisville history equaling the total accomplished three previous times, the most recent of which was in 2000 by Deion Branch.

■ Staples caught a career-long 57-yard reception to set up the Cards' second touchdown and then added his third touchdown of the season just before halftime. He recorded a career-high 155 yards receiving on six catches in the first half.

■ Junior tight end **Keith Towbridge** scored on a 29-yard touchdown reception, the second of his career – both coming this season.

■ Freshman quarterback **Lamar Jackson** directed a 2-play, 75-yard drive before the half for Louisville's third touchdown.

■ Jackson threw his team-leading ninth touchdown of the season finding Staples for a 49-yard score just before halftime.

■ Jackson also ran for his team-high seventh rushing touchdown, a two-yard score in the fourth quarter.

■ Wide receiver **Traveon Samuel** caught his first career touchdown reception on an 18-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter from **Kyle Bolin**.

■ Bolin was 10-of-20 for 175 yards passing and two touchdowns through the air in the first half. He has thrown six touchdown passes in the last three games.

■ Junior tight end **Cole Hikutini** had a career best 61 yards receiving on two catches versus Pitt.

■ Junior linebacker **Keith Kelsey** led the Cardinals with 12 tackles versus Pitt, the fifth time this season he has finished with 10 or more tackles in a game.

■ Kelsey had one tackle-for-loss giving him 11.0 TFLs this season.

■ Sophomore safety **Chucky Williams** finished with a career-high 11 tackles, including seven solo stops. His previous high for tackles was eight against Syracuse earlier this season.

■ Junior linebacker Devonte Fields recorded two

sacks versus Pitt increasing his total to five sacks in the last five games. He has 5.5 sacks this season.

- The Cardinals were credited with at least one sack for the 10th consecutive game this season.
- Kicker **John Wallace** kicked two field goals to extend his school record of career field goals made to 65. Wallace has connected on seven-straight field goal attempts.
- Samuel registered the second-longest kick return of his career with a 41-yarder in the first quarter.

OFFENSE NOTES

- With the 38 points scored versus Virginia, the Cardinals have won 28-straight games when tallying 38 or more points in a game. The last game the Cards lost when scoring 38 or more points was a 46-44 triple-overtime loss to West Virginia during the 2005 season.
- The Cardinals were held to -1 yards rushing in the loss to Pittsburgh last Saturday, the lowest output under head coach Bobby Petrino and their lowest total since being held to -26 yards in a loss to TCU on Oct. 19, 2002. The Cardinals were limited to 12 yards last season in a win over FIU and 19 yards in a loss to Clemson earlier this year.
- With three touchdown throws against Pitt, the Cardinals have tossed 10 touchdown passes in their last four contests.
- Freshman quarterback **Lamar Jackson** threw a touchdown pass and ran for one in the 45-34 loss to Pitt on Saturday. It marked the fourth time this year that Jackson has accounted for a passing and rushing touchdown in the same game.
- Wide receiver **Jamari Staples** leads the team in receiving with 35 receptions for 599 yards and three touchdowns in only seven games after missing the first four games due to injury.
- In ACC play, Staples leads the league in receiving yards in conference games with 599 yards, as all his catches this year have come in ACC action. He totaled nine receptions for 194 yards and one score last week versus Pitt and totaled a career-high 10 receptions for 133 yards and one score in a win over Wake Forest on Oct. 30.
- The Cardinals scored with three seconds remaining last Saturday versus Pittsburgh, marking the seventh time this season the Cardinals tallied a field goal or touchdown in the final 1:30 prior to halftime.
- The Cardinals have thrown 18 touchdown passes to nine different players this season. Wide receiver **Traveon Samuel** caught his first career touchdown reception last week versus Pittsburgh.
- The Cardinals threw for a 355 yards in the loss to Pitt, the second-highest total of the season. Louisville is averaging 292.0 yards passing in its last three games.

DEFENSE NOTES

- Despite giving up 476 yards to Pitt, Louisville remained in the top 20 of the nation in total defense limiting opponents to 326.4 yards of total offense this season.
- The Cardinals have had interceptions from eight different players this season.
- After yielding an average of 55.5 yards rushing in the four previous games, the Cardinals yielded a

season-high 244 yards in the loss to Pittsburgh. It was the third time this season that the Cards have yielded 200 or more yards on the ground. Houston rushed for 226 yards and Clemson added 202 yards.

- Junior linebacker **Devonte Fields** recorded two sacks versus Pitt, increasing his total to five sacks in the last five games. He has 5.5 sacks this season, which ties him with **Sheldon Rankins** for the second-most on the team.
 - Louisville is 10th in the nation with 15 interceptions after recording two against Syracuse on Nov. 7 and being shutout last week versus Virginia. The defense has registered multiple interceptions five times this year and have six picks in the last three wins.
 - With two sacks versus Pitt on Saturday, the Cardinals have totaled at least one sack in 35-straight games dating back to the 2013 campaign. The last time the Cardinals didn't record a sack came versus Auburn in the 2015 season opener.
 - After giving up 326 yards of total offense and 42 points in the first half versus Pitt, the Cards held the Panthers 150 yards and just a fourth-quarter field goal.
 - Senior linebacker **Keith Kelsey** surpassed his career total for tackles in a season. Kelsey has 98 tackles, which is just two of becoming the first Cardinal to record 100 tackles since Preston Brown tallied 109 in 2012. With 12 tackles versus Pitt, Kelsey raced past his career-high of 87 set last season as a sophomore. Kelsey ranks 35th nationally and third in the ACC with an average of 8.9 tackles per game.
 - After totaling 71 tackles in each of the last two seasons, senior linebacker **James Burgess** has posted a career-best 85 tackles this season.
 - Sophomore safety **Chucky Williams** finished with a career-high 11 tackles, including seven solo stops. His previous high for tackles was eight against Syracuse earlier this season. He is fifth on the team with a career-high 49 tackles.
- CARDS OWN BIG ADVANTAGE AT HOME**
- Louisville has rewarded the loyalty of its fans with great success at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.
 - Louisville has won at least five home games in 10 of the past 19 seasons.
 - The Cardinals are 308-186-6 (.620) all-time at home and are 85-29 (.741) all-time at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.
 - Louisville's most recent perfect home season occurred in 2006.
 - Head coach Bobby Petrino is 31-4 all-time at home and have out-scored those opponents 1,449-664 (41.4-18.9 average). He won 22-straight games at home since a 37-7 loss to Memphis in 2003 to the 42-31 defeat against Florida State in 2014.
 - Louisville is 6-2 in ACC play at home under Petrino after the 38-31 win over Virginia on Nov. 14.

■ The Cardinals' 10 players selected were the second-most in the ACC and nationally behind Florida State's 11 selections.

■ Since Bobby Petrino's arrival in 2003, 23 Cardinals have been selected in the NFL Draft.

■ Four Cardinals have been selected in the first round since 2007.

CARDS ON THE ROAD

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino hasn't lost many games during his career, and his teams have been especially tough on the road going 25-10 during his six years at Louisville.

■ The Cardinals have currently won four of their last six games on the road, beating Wake Forest (20-19) on Oct. 30, NC State (20-13) on Oct. 3, and Boston College (38-19) and Notre Dame (31-28) last season.

■ Louisville has won 12 of its last 16 games on the road with Petrino on the sidelines, which dates back to the 2005 season. The Cardinals have won 19 of the last 26 games on the road dating back to 2011.

BOBBY PETRINO IN NOVEMBER

■ Louisville is 17-3 in games played in November under Bobby Petrino during his six seasons with the Cardinals. Petrino's teams have won seven of the last eight games in November after dropping a 45-34 decision to Pitt on Saturday.

■ Louisville is 2-1 in November this season and won all three games last season.

■ Overall, Louisville is 13-1 in November home games under Petrino during his six seasons with the Cardinals, and have won 13-straight home games under Petrino during the calendar's 11th month. The lone loss came to Memphis 37-7 on Nov. 15, 2003.

■ The Cardinals have won nine of their last 10

during the month of November dating back to the 2012 season after Saturday's loss to Pitt.

TRUE FRESHMEN UNDER BOBBY PETRINO

■ Louisville coach Bobby Petrino has never shied away from playing true freshmen, and this year is no exception as six different freshmen have started games this season.

■ In his six years with the Cardinals, a total of 39 true freshmen have seen action for Louisville, including nine in 2015. Of the 39 true freshmen who have played under Petrino, 16 have started at least once during their freshman season after Jaire Alexander became the sixth different true freshmen to start a game in 2015.

 ■ Freshman quarterback **Lamar Jackson** has been responsible for 27 explosive plays, throwing the football on 22 and running on 5, including long runs of 73, 68, 45 and 31yards. Six of those plays have gone for touchdowns.

JACKSON SHOWING SOME SERIOUS LEGS

■ **Lamar Jackson** came to Louisville ranked as the No. 8 dual-threat quarterback in the nation and seen as one of the top athletes in Florida by the recruiting services. The freshman has quickly shown why in 2015, making plays with his legs and showing the diversity he brings to the Cardinals' spread attack.
 ■ His 548 yards rushing (54.8 ypg) already rank as the most ever by a UofL quarterback and are the most since Stefan LeFors rushed for 405 yards in 2003.
 ■ Ranks 14th in the conference with 548 yards rushing and eighth in the conference with seven rushing touchdowns. The Pompano Beach, Fla., native ranks 11th in the ACC by averaging 4.4 yards per carry.
 ■ Ran for a Louisville record 184 yards yards (10.2 ypc) and 2 touchdowns in a win over Samford, the most rushing yards by an FBS QB on the season so far. He had a 73-yard run against Samford and a 68-yard run for a touchdown against NC State.
 ■ Has posted a school record three 100-yard rushing games by a quarterback and his rushing totals in those game are three of the four highest single-game rushing totals by a quarterback.
 ■ The talented signal-caller has five runs of 20+ yards, which is second on the team.
 ■ Rushed for 106 yards in his first game against Auburn in the 2015 season.
 ■ His seven rushing touchdowns lead the team.
 ■ Stands third all-time in school history with 584 career rushing yards and his seven rushing scores are the sixth-most in a career at UofL.

FINDING THE TIGHT END

■ The tight ends have always been big in Bobby Petrino's offense, and its starting to show in the last four games. Junior **Cole Hikutini** caught his third touchdown pass in the last three weeks and finished with career-highs in receiving yards (59) and receptions (4) in the 38-31 win over Virginia on Nov.

■ Towbridge, who caught two passes in the first eight games, has caught seven passes for 116 yards and two touchdowns in the last three games. He had one of the biggest plays of the game versus Syracuse on Nov. 7 when he recorded a 32-yard pass play on a fourth down play.

GO FOR IT

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino loves make the tough call, and it shows by his propensity to go for it on fourth down. Petrino dialed the perfect play call on fourth and two when he connected with **Keith Towbridge** for 32 yards. The conversion made the Cardinals 7-for-12 on fourth down this season, which ranks fourth in the ACC and 32nd nationally.

■ Last season, the Cardinals were 11-of-21 on fourth down calls.

SENIOR CLASS

■ The Cardinals have one of the smallest senior classes in the country with just 13 players playing their fourth year in the program. Here is the list of seniors who played their final home game for the Cardinals last weekend: **Corvin Lamb, James Burgess, Jermaine Reve, Darius Skinner, George Clements, Josh Appleby, John Wallace, Aaron Ahner, Kelby Johnson, Aaron Epps, Sheldon Rankins, Pio Vatuvei and Jon Brown.**

■ The senior class owns a combined record of 38-12 during their time at Louisville with three-straight bowl appearances. The seniors were a part of a 12-1 team in 2013 and 11-2 squad, which ended with a win over fourth-ranked Florida in the Sugar Bowl during the 2012 season.

CARDS TO PLAY ALABAMA IN 2018

■ The University of Louisville and the University of Alabama will open the 2018 season in the Orlando Citrus Bowl as part of an annual series of Orlando Kickoff games.

■ The 2018 match-up, announced Thursday, is the second publicized game in a multi-year agreement between Florida Citrus Sports (FCSports) and ESPN Events, a division of ESPN, to host major neutral-site, regular-season college football games in the Orlando Citrus Bowl. The Orlando Citrus Bowl is already home to the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl, Russell Athletic Bowl, and Florida Blue Florida Classic games. Neither school has played in the stadium since its near-complete reconstruction a year ago.

■ The Cardinals and Crimson Tide have met just three previous times on the gridiron, with Alabama holding a 2-1 series advantage. In the last meeting in 1991, the Cardinals defeated the No. 25 Crimson Tide 34-7 in the 1991 Fiesta Bowl.

SCORE FIRST=WINS

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino likes to take the ball first, and with good reason. Louisville has won five of its last six games when scoring first and eight of the last 10 contests after losing to Pitt on Saturday. Louisville took a 3-0 on Saturday before the Panthers won 45-34.

■ Petrino's team are 39-8 at Louisville when scoring first in a game and are 36-5 when leading after the first quarter. Louisville led Syracuse 7-0 on Nov. 7 en route to the 41-17 win over the Orange.

■ Heading into the half, Petrino's teams are just as invincible. Louisville is 54-7 when leading at the half and are 50-5 when leading after three quarters. Louisville held a 21-10 lead against Syracuse on Nov. 7.

QUICK LOOKS TO TOP TOTALS

■ Junior **James Quick** missed two games due to injury, but it hasn't stopped the Louisville native from nearly matching his career-best totals from a year ago. Quick has caught 31 passes for 457 yards and a career-high four touchdowns, which leads the team. He is second on the squad in receptions and yards.

■ Ranks 19th in the ACC in receptions at 3.4 per game, having caught at least one pass in eight of the nine games this season.

■ Stands 12th in yards (50.8 ypg) and 13th in the league in touchdowns (4).

■ Has caught a season-high five passes three times (Florida State, Wake Forest and Syracuse), and added 130 yards and a career-high three touchdowns in the loss to Florida State on Oct. 17.

■ Owns six games during his career where he has caught five or more passes.

■ Talled his career-high last season when he caught seven passes for 174 yards and two scores at FIU last season.

■ In 30 career games, Quick has caught 73 passes for 1,096 yards and seven touchdowns.

SUPER STAPLES

■ Junior **Jamari Staples** had one of the best games in school history last Saturday versus Pitt. In the 45-34 loss, Staples had nine catches for a career-best 194 yards, tied for the sixth most receiving yards in a single game in Louisville history equaling the total accomplished three previous times, the most recent of which was in 2000 by Deion Branch.

■ His 194 receiving yards versus Pitt were the 20th-highest total in the nation this season.

■ Leads the ACC with 599 receiving yards in conference games this season, with all his statistics coming in league contests.

■ Ranks 45th nationally in yards per catch as Staples has nine receptions of 20 or more yards this season, including the 49-yard touchdown reception in the loss to Pitt.

■ Has caught two or more passes in all seven games, including 10 versus Wake Forest and nine last week against Pitt.

■ Leads the team with two 100-yard receiving games with 133 yards versus Wake Forest and the 194 yards against Pitt.

■ Would rank 27th nationally in receiving yards per game at 85.4 yards per game, but hasn't played

■ After missing the first four games of the season, Staples made his Louisville debut in the 20-13 win over NC State on Oct. 3. Hurting his knee on Sept. 2 in practice before the season opener against Auburn, Staples, a transfer from UAB, caught two passes for 22 yards against the Wolfpack. He came back on Oct. 17 against the Seminoles to total four receptions for 56 yards, which are all highs in his Louisville career.

■ In two seasons with the Blazers, Staples caught 40 passes for 648 yards and five touchdowns. Staples was slowed by injuries in 2014, holding him to nine receptions for 190 yards and a score. His best season came in 2013 when he caught 31 passes for 458 yards and four scores.

TELLING IN WINS

■ The Cardinals opened the season with three-straight losses, but the have responded with four-straight wins. When you look at the stats, it's easy to see why the Cardinals have turned their season around. The Cardinals have shown improvement on both sides of the football. The Cardinals are averaging 30.2 points and 196.2 yards on the ground in their six wins, including 229.5 yards passing and 425.7 yards of total offense. On defense, the Cardinals are allowing 16.2 points per game and 56.3 yards per game on the ground.

■ On the flip side, in the losses, the Cardinals were only averaging 25.4 points per game and were allowing 34.2 points per game. On the ground, Louisville averaged 85.0 yards on the ground and were allowing 199.0 yards. Louisville was held to less than 100 yards rushing in three of the losses — rushing for 70 yards versus Houston, 19 against Clemson and 99 versus Florida State.

PETRINO 31-4 AT HOME

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino improved to 31-4 at home after the 38-31 win over Virginia last weekend.

■ Petrino's teams had won 22 straight games at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium before losing to Florida State on Oct. 30, 2014.

■ Of those 31 wins, the Cardinals have scored 60 or more points six times, 50-plus points four times and 40 points 10 times.

■ During the previous 22-game home streak, the Cardinals had recorded wins of 20 or more points 17 times.

■ The lowest output during this span came in the 17-14 win over Boston College on Oct. 24. The 17 points scored on Sept. 17 versus Clemson and Boston College are the lowest output at home under Petrino.

WINNING CLOSE GAMES

■ The Cardinals are 11-10 in one-possession games in head coach Bobby Petrino's six seasons at the helm of the UofL football program. With the 38-31 win over Virginia on Nov. 14, Louisville is 4-3 in one-possession games this season after the win over the Cavaliers. The Cardinals had a 17-14 victory over Boston College on Oct. 24 and with a 20-13 win over NC State on Oct. 3.

■ The Cards had close losses this season to Auburn (31-24), Houston (34-31) and Clemson (20-17).

ON THE ROAD IN THE ACC

■ The Cardinals are 4-4 in the ACC on the road since joining their new league in 2014, with identical 2-2 records in the first two seasons in the league. The Cardinals defeated Wake Forest 20-19 on Oct. 30 and won their ACC road opener 20-13 at NC State on Oct. 3. Louisville dropped a 41-21 decision at Florida State on Oct. 17 and last week's 45-34 loss to Pitt.

■ Last season, the Cardinals picked up road wins at Syracuse and Boston College, while dropping decisions at Virginia and Clemson.

■ Louisville's dropped two of the three games by less than a touchdown on the road, falling to Virginia 21-23 and 17-23 to Clemson. The average margin of defeat on the road in the ACC is 9.3 points per game.

CLOSING THE SEASON

■ For the second-straight season, the Cardinals will close the season against their intra-state rival Kentucky. The Cardinals will be looking for their sixth-straight win in their regular-season finale after winning their final game from 2010-14. The last loss came when the Cards fell 34-14 at home to Rutgers in 2009.

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino is 5-0 in games to close the regular season as the head coach at Louisville.

■ Senior punter **Josh Appleby** has embraced the role of the starting punter. After three years as a reserve, Appleby has flourished as senior. In a starting role, he has punted 58 times for a 40.5 per punt average, with 10 punts of 50 or more yards and has placed 23 punts inside the 20-yard line. ■ The Phenix City, Ala., product also has rushed four times for 63 yards, an average of 15.8 yards a rush.

■ Samuel has made a big impact in the return game, averaging a team-high 31.9 yards a return. Last season, the Cards had just two returns of over 20 yards. This season, the Cards have 10 returns of over 20 yards, including four by Samuel, which included a 100-yard return for a touchdown against Clemson. Samuel had a 41-yard return last week against Pitt.

40 IS THE NUMBER

■ The Cardinals scored 41 points in the win over Syracuse on Nov. 7 — the second time this season scoring 40 or more points this season (45 vs. Samford).

■ It marked the 32nd time in 72 games that the Cardinals score 40 or more points with Petrino on the sidelines.

■ Louisville is 31-1 when scoring 40 or more points with Petrino as head coach and have won 14-straight games when hitting that number.

RADCLIFF GOES BACK-TO-BACK

■ Running back **Brandon** led the Cardinals in rushing last season with 737 yards and 12 touchdowns, but has been limited this season until his recent explosion. Radcliff posted his second-straight 100-yard rushing game with a career-high 146 yards on 21 carries in the win over Virginia.

■ The 146 yards versus Virginia was the fifth 100-yard rushing game of his career — the 10th-most in school history. Radcliff has rushed for 1,352 yards during his first three seasons with the Cards after his -1 yards versus Pitt.

■ The Cardinals are 5-0 in games where Radcliff rushes for 100, and Petrino's teams are 28-5 at Louisville when a back runs for over 100 yards in a game.

■ Radcliff equaled his career-high with two touchdown runs to give him five touchdowns this season and 18 in his career, which ranks 14th all-time in Louisville history.

■ Radcliff is the first running back run for 100 yards in consecutive games since Michael Dyer ran for 134 yards versus Florida State and 173 yards against NC State last season.

■ Radcliff is second on the team with 525 yards rushing and leads the team with a 4.6 per carry average. The native of Miami, Fla., leads the team with six

runs of 20 or more yards this year.

JACKSON'S TOTAL OFFENSE

■ Freshman quarterback **Lamar Jackson** has enjoyed a solid freshman campaign. He leads the team in rushing (548) and passing (1,483). He leads the team in total offense with 2,031 yards and 203.1 yards per game.

■ Jackson's 2,031 yards of total offense ranks second in school history for a freshman, trailing only (Teddy Bridgewater (2,195 in 2011). Jackson needs only 165 yards to break Teddy Bridgewater's school record of 2,195 yards.

■ Jackson ranks 73rd nationally in total offense and seventh in the ACC at 203.1 yards per game.

RARE FRESHMAN 300-YARD GAME

■ **Lamar Jackson** is one of three freshmen at Louisville to pass for 300 yards in a game, joining only Chris Redman and Kyle Bolin to accomplish the feat. Jackson completed 20-of-35 passes for a career-high 307 yards and three touchdowns in the loss to Florida State on Oct. 17. Jackson's 307 yards passing ranks as the fourth-highest passing total by a freshman.

■ Redman threw for 400 yards against Southern Mississippi in and 325 against Michigan State in 1996, while Bolin passed for 381 versus Kentucky and 300 versus Georgia.

■ Jackson's 1,483 yards passing total is now third in freshman passing yards at UofL, trailing Teddy Bridgewater's total of 2,129 yards in 2011 and Redman's 1,773 yards in 1996.

RUSHING=SUCCESS

■ It's no secret head coach Bobby Petrino's success is predicated on his team's ability to run the football, and the team's success this season seems to be dictated on the number of rushing attempts the Cardinals get during the game. In Louisville's five losses, they have averaged only 30.2 rushing attempts. Not including the opening loss to Auburn where the Cards rushed the football 48 times, the Cardinals failed garner more than 31 rush attempts in those contests. Louisville totaled 28 versus Houston, 26 against Clemson and 24 last week versus Pitt.

■ Louisville has averaged 41.5 rushing attempts in its six wins, including over 40 attempts in wins over Samford, NC State, Boston College and Wake Forest. Louisville had 37 rushes in the win over Virginia on Nov. 14.

SCORING 30

■ Louisville has made scoring 30 points seem quite easy under Bobby Petrino. The squad has done so 50 times in the 74 games with head coach Bobby Petrino at the helm of the Cardinals. Over that span, the Cardinals are 45-5 when tallying more than 30 points in a game after last week's 45-34 loss to Pitt. Louisville went 7-1 last year when scoring better than 30 points in a game, but did fall 34-31 to Houston on Sept. 12 prior to the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26.

■ The Cardinals have lost only four games at home during his tenure at Louisville, but two of his three losses have come when the Cards have scored more than 30 points. Louisville had won 22 straight



games when scoring 30 or more points before losses to Florida State last season and Houston on Sept. 12. The Cardinals are 22-2 at home when scoring 30 or more points under Petrino.

■ For comparison's sake, Louisville scored 30 or more points just 33 times over the seven years that Petrino wasn't coaching the Cardinals' program.

NO COMBINATION LOCK

■ A year after fielding the same offensive line for most of the year, the Cardinals have seen a different starting combination in five of the 11 games this season.

■ The only constant has been true freshman **Geron Christian**, who has started all 11 games this season in his rookie season. Another true freshman, **Kenny Thomas** has started four games before missing the last three games, while redshirt freshman **Lukayus McNeil** has made eight-straight starts.

■ **Tobijah Hughley**, who has started nine games this season, is the most the experienced player on the offensive line with 21 starts.

■ Through 11 games, the Cardinals have started at least 10 different offensive linemen this year. Christian is the only player who has started all eight games this year. Other players who have started this season are: Hughley, **T.C. Klusman**, McNeil, **Skylar Lacy**, **Pedro Sibiea**, Thomas, **Aaron Epps**, **Kiola Mahoni** and **Kelby Johnson**.

DRAMA KINGS

■ Since 2008, Louisville is 21-19 in games decided by seven points or less, and the Cardinals have lost three games by a total of 13 points to start the season. It's marks the first time since 2007 that the Cardinals have dropped two straight games by 10 points or less when they fell 40-34 to Kentucky and 38-35 to Syracuse.

■ Head coach Bobby Petrino is 10-10 at Louisville in games decided by seven points or less and 24-18 during his coaching career after the 38-31 win over Virginia last week.

■ The Cardinals are 5-5 all-time in overtime

games since the NCAA instituted the rule in 1996. Petrino is 0-2 in overtime games at Louisville.

TARGET PRACTICE

■ In all, 15 different players have caught a pass for Louisville this season: 8 wide receivers (**James Quick**, **Jamari Staples**, **Jaylen Smith**, **Traveon Samuel**, **Ja'Quay Savage**, **Devante Peete**, **Javonte Bagley**, **Emonee Spence**; 4 tight ends (**Micky Crum**, **Cole Hikutini**, **Keith Towbridge**, **Charles Standberry**; 4 running backs (**Reggie Bonnafon**, **L.J. Scott**, **Brandon Radcliff**, **Jeremy Smith**).

■ The freshmen class has been leading the way this season, totaling 68 receptions for 856 and five touchdowns. **Jaylen Smith** is leading the way with 26 receptions for 366 yards and caught his first touchdown pass versus Virginia. **Traveon Samuel** has 17 receptions for 162 yards and caught his first career touchdown pass last week versus Pitt, while Devante Peete has one of the five touchdown receptions from the freshmen class, while tight end Micky Crum has the other two touchdown receptions.

■ Redshirt freshman **Micky Crum** is one of the top tight end with 13 receptions for 161 yards and a pair of scores. He recorded his first reception versus Auburn when he caught two passes for 19 yards, and had his biggest game with a 103-yard performance and six catches versus Houston.

BONNAFON PERFECT

■ Sophomore athlete **Reggie Bonnafon** is the jack-of-all-trades. After starting the year as the starting quarterback, Bonnafon was moved to a role to showcase his versatility. In his last two games, Bonnafon is 2-for-2 for 59 yards and a touchdown.

■ He tossed his sixth career touchdown pass and the first touchdown pass since the win over Samford this year when he threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to **Jaylen Smith** in the win over Virginia on Nov. 14. It was the first touchdown pass from a non-quarterback since wide receiver Patrick Carter hit running back Anthony Allen in the 2007 Orange Bowl win over Wake Forest. He also completed a 39-yard pass to **Cole Hikutini** on Saturday versus Pitt.

■ He had his best in his new role in the 17-14 win over Boston College, carrying 10 times for a team-high 56 yards and also catching two passes for 18 yards. Seeing extensive action at running back versus Florida State, Bonnafon's production was evident. In the 41-21 loss to Florida State, Bonnafon carried three times for 20 yards, including a run for nine yards. Out of the backfield, he caught a career-high three passes for 31 yards, including a career-best 23-

yard reception.

■ Bonnafon is the fourth-leading rusher with 161 yards and has caught nine passes for 98 yards this year.

■ The Louisville native has completed 14-of-24 passes for 192 yards and two scores this year from the quarterback position.

JACKSON SHATTERING RUSHING MARKS

■ Freshman quarterback **Lamar Jackson** was born to run to steal a phrase from Bruce Springsteen. Jackson owns three of the top 10 school marks for rushing games by a quarterback, tallying a school-best 184 yards versus Samford. He also owns the third-best mark with 121 yards against NC State and 106 yards versus Auburn, which is fifth-best.

■ A native of Pompano Beach, Fla., Jackson holds the school record for rushing yards in a season with 529 and needs just 228 yards to break the school's career mark of 756 set by Stefan Lefors (2001-04).

■ There is a telling stat that has shown up in wins and losses for the Cardinals, and it surrounds the running talent of freshman quarterback Lamar Jackson. The native of Pompano Beach, Fla., has been productive running the ball in the four wins, and not so in the four losses. Jackson is averaging 80.5 yards in the four wins this year, totaling 184 yards versus Samford and 121 against NC State. In those four victories, Jackson is averaging 5.3 yards per carry, including a 73-yard run versus Samford.

■ In the four losses this year, Jackson has been stymied in the running game. He is averaging 40.5 yards per game in those contests, being held to 16 yards against Houston, eight versus Clemson and 32 on Oct. 17 against Florida State. He is averaging just 3.2 yards per carry in the four losses.

RADCLIFF MONEY ON THIRD DOWN

■ If you need a big play on third down, give the ball to running back **Brandon Radcliff**. The Miami native, who is second on the team in rushing leads the way in rushing on third-down plays. Radcliff has rushed 18 times on third down and has converted 10 times. However, more importantly, he is averaging 6.5 yards on the “money” down. The 5-foot-9 power back is also 2-for-2 on fourth-down conversions.

■ In the passing game, wide receivers **Jamari Staples** and **Jaylen Smith** are key on third down, with both tying for the team lead with six third-down receptions. Staples has caught nine passes on third down, while Smith has recorded seven receptions.

■ Quarterback **Kyle Bolin** is 14-of-26 on third down for a completion percentage of 53.8 percent, while freshman **Lamar Jackson** is completing 58.2 percent of his throws on third down and two touchdowns.

14 NEW OFFENSIVE STARTERS

■ The Cardinals lost a lot of talent on offense in wide receiver DeVante Parker, offensive linemen John Miller, Jamon Brown and Jake Smith, and running backs Dominique Brown and Michael Dyer.

■ Louisville had five new offensive starters on Sept. 5 versus Auburn and added another versus Houston. True freshman Lamar Jackson started in the backfield, while wide receiver Ja’Quay Savage, tight end Micky Crum and offensive linemen Pedro Sibiea and Geron Christian also started upfront. Wide receiver Traveon Samuel was a new starter on offense versus Houston.

■ In the win over Samford on Sept. 26, the Cardinals added four new offensive personnel in running back Jeremy Smith, offensive guard Lukayus McNeil, center T.C. Klusman and offensive tackle Kelby Johnson. Offensive tackle Kenny Thomas started for the first time versus NC State on Oct. 3.

■ Three new offensive starters made their first starts of the season versus Florida State on Oct. 17 in tight end Cole Hikutini, wide receiver Jamari Staples and guard Kiola Mahoni. Wide receiver Javonte Bag-

ley made his first career start against Wake Forest.

HIKUTINI STEPS UP

■ Junior tight end **Cole Hikutini** has been a great find by the coaching staff. Coming out of the City College of San Francisco, Hikutini was a late find by the Cardinals, and it’s been a good fit. Hikutini is the top tight end on the team with 15 receptions for 241 yards and three touchdowns. Hikutini, who has four receptions of 20 or more yards, is averaging 16.1 yards per catch after catching a career-long pass of 39 yards versus Pitt.

■ After being slowed by injuries to start the season, Hikutini didn’t have a catch in the first three games before recording two receptions for 25 yards against Samford.

■ Hikutini has been solid in the last three games, catching nine passes for 148 yards and three touchdowns. He caught a career-high four passes for 59 yards and a score versus Virginia and registered a career-best 61 yards last week against Pitt.

NEED TO RUSH FOR 200

■ It’s no secret head coach Bobby Petrino wants his offense to be balanced, but he emphasizes his team’s ability to run the football.

■ The Cardinals rushed for 266 yards in the win over Virginia on Saturday, marking the second-straight 200-yard performance and the fifth this season. It’s the first time the Cards have rushed for 200 yards in consecutive games since 2013 when they ran for 242 yards against Kentucky and 210 versus FIU.

■ Entering his sixth season as head coach of the Cardinals, Petrino’s teams are an incredible 34-3 when his teams rush for over 200 yards in a game after rushing for 266 yards versus Virginia on Nov. 14, 217 yards against Syracuse (Nov. 7) and 203 yards in the win over NC State (Oct. 3). The Cards rushed for a season-high 288 yards versus Samford, which were the most rushing yards since UofL tallied 325 yards last year in the win over Murray State. The Cardinals were 6-1 in 2003 during Petrino’s first season when rushing for over 200 yards in a game, with the only loss coming to Miami (Ohio) in the GMAC Bowl. The only other loss was a 41-38 loss at third-ranked in 2004.

■ The Cardinals have won 24 of their last 25 games when they rush for over 200 yards under Petrino with the only loss coming to Auburn on Sept. 5. The Cardinals won their last six games that season when rushing over 200 yards, and went 6-0 in 2005, 5-0 in 2006 and 3-0 last year.

■ On the flip side, the Cardinals are 4-8 when they fail to rush for over 100 yards as a team, including 1-3 this season after being held to 68 last week against Florida State. Louisville was held to 70 yards in the loss to Houston on Sept. 12 and 19 yards versus Clemson.

CARDS REACHES SEASON-HIGH

■ The Cardinals’ offense got back on track versus Syracuse last Saturday at Papa John’s Cardinal Stadium. Louisville totaled a season-high 579 yards in the 41-17 win over the Orange. It was the most versus an FBS team since recording 615 yards of offense versus Ohio in 2013 and the most versus a

Power 5 Conference team since tallying 628 yards in a loss to Syracuse in 2007. The Cardinals have won 11-straight games when amassing over 500 yards of total offense in a game, with the last coming in 2008 — a 26-20 loss to Connecticut.

■ The Cardinals totaled a season-high 562 yards of total offense in the 45-3 win over the Bulldogs. It was only the second time in the last 17 games that the Cardinals recorded over 500 yards of total offense — the last was against Murray State last season when the Cardinals totaled 603 yards of total offense.

■ During Petrino’s tenure with the Cardinals, his teams are 24-2 when his offense totals more than 500 yards of total offense on a game.

STAPLES NOTCHES SECOND 100-YARD GAME

■ Looks like wide receiver **Jamari Staples** is all the way back after his best performance since joining the program this season. Staples had his biggest game in a UofL uniform in the win over Wake Forest on Oct. 30. He caught a career-high 10 passes for 133 yards and his first two touchdowns. He scored on a 14-yard reception and added a 22-yarder right before the half to trim Wake’s lead to 19-17.

■ Staples recorded his first 100-yard receiving game at Louisville and the second of his career — recorded 103 yards versus Tulsa in 2013. The Lineville, Ala., product totaled just the fourth 100-yard receiving game by a Louisville receiver after his 194-yard performance versus Pitt, joining James Quick and Micky Crum. Quick totaled 130 yards versus Florida State and Crum added 103 against Houston.

BOLIN LOVES THE STARTS

■ Sophomore **Kyle Bolin** has shown that he loves the starting role. Making his fifth-career start last Saturday against Pitt, Bolin, who was 10-of-20 for 175 yards and two scores versus Pitt, moved to 2-3 as a starter. He picked up his second-straight win despite completing just 10-of-21 passes for a career-low 139 yards and one score in the 38-31 win. He has thrown for 1,109 yards and seven scores this year, while completing 57.6 percent of his throws.

■ The Lexington, Ky., native was 24-of-35 for 362 yards and tied a career-high with three touchdown passes in the win over Syracuse on Nov. 7 — all going to the tight end. He threw two touchdown passes to tight end **Cole Hikutini** of 13 and 10 yards and also hit **Keith Towbridge** with a 12-yarder.

■ Bolin set a career high for completions (24) and 362 yards were second highest passing total for Bolin behind only the 381 yards against Kentucky in 2014.

■ The former Lexington Catholic standout picked up his first win as a starter after dropping his first two starts. He was the starter for the first time in the 2014 Belk Bowl versus Georgia and also made a start in the ACC opener in 2015 versus Clemson.

■ In only his second year receiving playing time, Bolin has thrown for 1,825 yards and 11 touchdowns, while completing 121-210 (57.7) passes with seven interceptions.

NEED TO KEEP SACKS DOWN

■ The Cardinals have a problem — sacks. Louisville ranks 127th out of 127 teams in sacks allowed in the country, allowing 3.91 per game. Through the first 10 games of the year, the Cardinals have been sacked four or more times in seven different games, including a season-high seven versus Boston College and Pitt. They were also sacked four of more times versus Auburn, Clemson, NC State, Florida State and Wake Forest.

■ The Cardinals did a great job protecting the passer versus Syracuse, holding the Orange to just one sack.

■ Last year, the Cardinals were sacked 3.0 times a game en route to a 9-4 mark. In those four losses, the Cardinals were sacks 12 times including four in the loss to Georgia in the Belk Bowl loss.

RANKINS NOT JUST RECORDING SACKS

■ Senior defensive end **Sheldon Rankins** has been the Cardinals' most prolific pass rushers over the last two seasons. However, the 6-foot-2, 300-pounder has showed an ability to make big plays. Rankins picked up a fumble and raced 46 yards for his first career touchdown in the win over Boston College on Oct. 24.

■ Last season, Rankins recorded his first two interceptions, picking off passes versus Wake Forest in the 20-10 win and also had another one in the 38-19 victory over Boston College on the road.

WASHINGTON SECOND IN PICKS

■ Sophomore **Trumaine Washinton** has made a major leap from his freshman to sophomore season. Appearing in eight games last season as a rookie, Washington registered just 18 tackles. In his sophomore season, Washington is seventh on the team in tackles and is leading the squad with four interceptions, which also ranks fourth in the ACC. His three forced fumbles also ties him for third in the league and his nine passes defended ties him for eighth in the ACC.

■ Washington, who was named the Bednarik Player of the Week and the ACC Defensive Back of the Week against Syracuse, posted a career-best game that week. He totaled a career-best 12 tackles, 4.0 tackles for loss, a sack and returned an interception 39 yards for a touchdown to put the Cards ahead 14-10 in the second quarter.

■ The Miami, Fla., native has six games of four or more tackles and owns a pair of sacks from his cornerback position.

CARDS ON TWO-YEAR STREAK

■ The Cardinals have been one of the best teams over the last two seasons at recording interceptions. Louisville has registered 41 interceptions over 24 games, which is the best in the country.

■ In the 41-17 win over Syracuse on Nov. 7, the Cardinals totaled a pair to give them 15 on the season. **Trumaine Washington** recorded his team-leading fourth versus Syracuse on Nov. 7 and **Trevon Young** recorded one from his defensive end position. Louisville is ranked 10th nationally in interceptions.

■ The Cardinals had a season-best four interceptions, all in the second half by four different players (UofL had three picks vs. Auburn and Samford). Freshman safety **Dee Smith** had his first career interception in the third quarter, the Cardinals' first pick in three games. It was the first four-interception game since Louisville totaled four last year in a 38-19 win over the Eagles.

■ Eight different players have registered interceptions this season.

TOUGH AGAINST THE RUN

■ Despite giving up 244 yards versus Pitt, defensive coordinator **Todd Grantham** prides himself in his teams being able to stop the run, and that's exactly what his teams have done through his two seasons as the defensive coordinator. Louisville limited Virginia to 94 yards rushing on Nov. 14 — the fifth time this season have held an opponent to less than 100 yards on the ground and 12th time in the last two seasons.

Louisville's defense ranks 17th nationally in yards per game (121.2) and 12th in yards per carry (3.3).

■ The Cardinals are facing plenty of opportunities as opponents are averaging 36.5 rushing attempts per game.

■ Louisville is tied for 10th nationally having allowed only eight rushing touchdowns this season and are tied for 16th in the country having yielded only nine runs of over 20 yards (the long is 54). After giving up a pair of rushing scores in the season-opening loss to Auburn on Sept. 5, the Cardinals have allowed six rushing touchdowns over the next 10 contests.

■ The Cardinals completely shut down the Boston College running game as the Eagles were held to -14 yards on 30 carries and Wake Forest, who was held to 40 yards rushing on 32 carries. NC State was limited to 45 yards. Samford was limited to 71 yards in Louisville's 45-3 win on Sept. 26.

■ The -14 yards rushing was the seventh-fewest total in school history and was the lowest since holding Wake Forest to -22 yards rushing in last season's 20-10 win over the Demon Deacons.

INTENSE PRESSURE

■ With 24 sacks over the last seven games, the Cardinals are rounding into form that saw them as one of the top teams at pressuring the quarterback.

■ The Cardinals got off to a slow start with six sacks in their first four games, but have responded over the last six contests, where they recorded a season-best eight in the win over Boston College. It was the biggest total since registering eight last season versus Wake Forest.

■ The Cardinals registered four sacks versus Wake Forest and a pair of sacks versus Florida State and four in the win on the road against NC State on Oct. 3.

■ Junior **Trevon Young** has been dominating over the last six games, recording 8.5 sacks. He entered the season with 1.0 sack, but has totaled 8.5 in the last four contests. He was credited with 3.0 sacks on Oct. 30 against Wake Forest and Boston College, while being credited with two in the loss to Florida State on Oct. 17.

■ Senior **Sheldon Rankins** and juniors **Devonte Fields** are tied for second on the team with 5.5 sacks.

■ Over the last two seasons, the Cardinals are 10-2 when recording three or more sacks in a game.

BURGESS TOTALS NEW CAREER-HIGH

■ Senior linebacker James Burgess has been a steady force in the middle of the defense for the last three seasons. Appearing in 45 games, including 40 starts, the native of Homestead, Fla., has 250 career tackles during that span after having 14 stops versus Houston on Sept. 12 and 10 in the win over Boston College on Oct. 24. He tallied eight more versus Clemson and Samford. He is second on the team with a career-high 85 tackles after the first 11 games of the season and ranks 11th in the ACC with 7.8 tackles per game.

■ He totaled his fifth double-digit tackle game against the Boston College, totaling 10 stops, but his career-high came this year versus Houston when he registered 14. His previous high was 11 last season in a 23-17 loss to Clemson last season and also was credited with 10 stops versus Georgia in the Belk Bowl.

■ Burgess totaled 71 tackles in 2013 and 2014, finishing third on the team in tackles with 71. He recorded five or more tackles in seven games last season.

■ He led the linebackers in tackles for loss with 10.0 and recorded three interceptions.

■ Burgess owns seven career interceptions after recording a pick in the 20-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 17.

KELSEY THIRD IN THE ACC

■ Junior linebacker **Keith Kelsey** has developed into a leader as was evident by being named one of the team's captains, and the Gainesville product is coming off the biggest game of his career. Kelsey just missed matching his career-high for tackles in a game when he registered 14 stops versus Virginia on Nov. 14. He totaled a career-high 15 tackles and registered two sacks and four tackles for loss in the 34-31 loss to Houston on Sept. 12. He followed that up with his second consecutive double-digit tackle

game versus Clemson, recording 10 tackles in the 20-17 loss on Sept. 17.

- Kelsey leads the team in tackles with 98 and ranks 35th in the nation and is third in the ACC.
- In his first year as a starter in 2014, Kelsey, who started all 13 games last year, finished second on the team in tackles with 87, ranking 17th in the ACC. He totaled eight stops in the loss to Auburn on Sept. 5.
- Kelsey has led the team in tackles in four games this season, with 12 versus Pitt, 14 against Virginia, 15 versus Houston and 10 against Clemson.
- The 14 stops versus Virginia marked the fifth time this season and the seventh time in the last two seasons that he recorded 10 or more tackles in a game.

GRANTHAM TEACHES TAKEAWAYS

- Under the direction of defensive coordinator Todd Grantham, the Cardinals' defense has been very opportunistic through his first two seasons leading the defense. The defense has forced 53 turnovers over the last 24 games with Grantham leading the defense.
- Louisville finished first in the ACC in turnovers forced in 2014 with 30 and have already forced 18 this year. The 30 turnovers forced were the most since 2001 when that team forced 2001 miscues en route to an 11-2 record and a Conference USA title.
- Louisville has forced multiple turnovers in 18 of the last 24 games dating back to last season, including a season-high five versus Wake Forest on Oct. 30.
- Louisville held a +5 turnover margin in its nine wins last season and are +4 in the six victories this season.

NEW SECONDARY STEPS UP

- Heading into last season, the Cardinals had to replace both starting safeties in Calvin Pryor and Ha-keem Smith, and were still able to excel. This year, the Cardinals have to replace the entire secondary as all four starters, who were in NFL training camps, need to be replaced in Charles Gaines and Terrell Floyd at cornerback and James Sample and Gerod Holliman at safety.
- The Cardinals lost a lot of production as 21 of the 26 interceptions are gone off the roster. Holliman led the nation with 14 and Sample totaled four.
- The Cardinals, who entered the year with zero career starts in the secondary, saw **Shaq Wiggins** and **Trumaine Washington** start at cornerback, while **Josh Harvey-Clemons** and **Chucky Williams** started at safety in each of the 11 games this season.
- The four players have totaled 11 interceptions in the first 11 games, with Washington leading the team with four picks.

BELOW THE 300-YARD MARK

- The Louisville defense is starting to round into form from the 2014 season when it was sixth in the country in total defense. The Cardinals have played their best defense last four games of the season, holding Boston College to 79 yards of total offense, Wake Forest to 266 yards and Syracuse to 286, which has elevated the Cardinals to 14th in the nation in total defense allowing 311.4 yards per game.
- The 79 yards of total offense versus Boston Col-

lege was the fourth-lowest total in school history and the fewest yards allowed since Wake Forest was limited to 100 yards in last season's win over the Demon Deacons.

- Louisville held Boston College to -14 yards rushing, which was the seventh-lowest total in school history and the lowest since Wake Forest rushed for -22 yards last season.
- The Cardinals played outstanding defense in six of their last seven games, with the lone exception being Florida State, who scored the most points since the 'Noles scored 42 in last season's win.
- After holding its first seven opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense last season, the Cardinals allowed each of their first three opponents to break the 300-yard plateau, coincidentally losing all three games. Since those losses, the Cardinals are allowing 256.8 yards of total offense in the last six games.
- Over the last two seasons, the Cardinals are 13-2 when the defense holds opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense.
- The Cardinals gave up a season-high 510 yards in the loss to Florida State, only the second time under Todd Grantham that the Cards had given up more than 500 yards of total offense in the last two seasons (505 vs. Georgia).

CARDS MOVE UP THE SACKS LADDER

- One of the reasons why the Cardinals were so productive on defense last year was because of the pressure they put on the quarterback. Louisville finished 12th in the country in sacks averaging 3.15 per game.
- However, this season the Cardinals' got off to a slow start, but have started to rack up the sacks in the last five games. Louisville stands 19th in the nation with a 2.80 average, but have averaged 4.0 sacks in its last five contests.
- The Cardinals totaled only three sacks in the first three games, but the Cardinals have totaled 20 sacks in the last five games, including eight versus Boston College on Oct. 24. Louisville totaled three sacks in the 45-3 win over Samford on Sept. 26 and four in the 20-13 victory over NC State on Oct. 3.
- Over the last two seasons, the Cardinals are 10-2 when recording three or more sacks in a game.

FIELDS MAKING A MOVE

- The Cardinals added a big-play defender when they signed outside linebacker **DeVonte' Fields** in February. After 11 games, Fields is rounding into form and has put together four solid games. He has totaled 25 tackles, five sacks and 10.5 tackles for loss in the last five contests.
- The native of Fort Worth, Texas, leads the team with 15.0 tackles for loss and is second on the squad with 5.5 sacks. Fields is fourth on the team in tackles with 50 through 11 games at outside linebacker. He had his best game versus Virginia, recording five tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss and one sack.
- He made his first career start for the Cardinals in the loss to Auburn on Sept. 5. Fields totaled five tackles and 0.5 tackles for loss from his outside linebacker position as the Cardinals fell 31-24.
- Fields had his best game as a Cardinal with



eight total tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss in the 20-19 win over Wake Forest and totaled seven tackles and one tackle for loss versus Syracuse. He had six stops and a tackle for loss against Clemson. He totaled his first full sack last week in the win over Boston College.

- He started collegiate career at TCU, where he was selected as the AP Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and Defensive Newcomer of the Year in 2012.
- Fields was voted by conference coaches as the Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year, where he posted 53 tackles, including 34 solo stops. He led the team with 18.5 tackles for loss and 10 sacks... was first in the Big 12 at 1.42 tackles for loss per game and third in the league with 0.77 sacks per game. His 10 sacks tied for the fourth-most in a season in TCU history and were the most by a freshman.

WHAT BROWN DOES FOR YOU

- Junior defensive tackle DeAngelo Brown has emerged as a big-time run stopper during the 2015 season. The native of Savannah, Ga., has recorded a career-high 36 tackles this season, which bests his previous high of 20 he recored a year ago.
- Brown tallied six tackles in the season opener versus Auburn and tallied four tackles in four other games during the season. The 308-pounder, who entered the year with 3.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks, has tallied a career-best 5.5 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks.

ATLANTA- Will Muschamp's defense made a couple of huge plays early for No. 6 Auburn to offset three interceptions by Jeremy Johnson, and the Tigers held off Louisville and surprise quarterback Lamar Jackson for a 31-24 victory.

The Tigers' first touchdown in the season opener was set up by an interception. Justin Garrett returned a fumble 82 yards to make it 14-0.

Not that it was smooth sailing for the Tigers, who led 17-0 at halftime and seemed to be up comfortably 31-10 after a touchdown with just over 10 minutes remaining.

Jackson, a freshman who got the bulk of the playing time over three more experienced quarterbacks, led the Cardinals to a couple of late touchdowns that made Auburn sweat it out.

Bonnafon played into the second quarter before giving way to Jackson for good. The freshman was 9 of 20 passing for 100 yards. He also led the Cardinals in rushing with 106 yards on 16 carries, including a 10-yard touchdown late in the third quarter for Louisville's first TD.

The biggest play came midway through the second quarter when Louisville was driving. Bonnafon fumbled an attempted handoff, Garrett scooped it up at the 18, and off he went the other way for the touchdown, Muschamp running with him nearly stride for stride along the sideline.

Johnson was picked off twice in the first half by former Georgia safety Josh Harvey-Clemons, who sat out last season after transferring to Louisville. The Auburn quarterback was also intercepted by Trumaine Washington in the third quarter, foolishly trying to force a pass into coverage. That led to Jackson's TD run that made it 24-10.

The odds don't look great with No. 12 Clemson coming in Thursday, especially for an 0-2 team struggling on both sides of the ball after Saturday's 34-31 loss to Houston.

This latest loss ended with sophomore Kyle Bolin at quarterback after starting the fourth quarter in relief of struggling freshman Lamar Jackson. Bolin did his best in rallying the Cardinals twice with fourth-quarter scoring drives including his 29-yard scoring pass to Micky Crum with 6:25 remaining. They allowed a game-tying 100-yard kickoff return touchdown to Brandon Wilson right after John Wallace's 36-yard field goal seemed to swing momentum their way.

LOUISVILLE- Deshaun Watson threw two touchdown passes, Wayne Gallman ran for 139 yards and No. 11 Clemson held off Louisville 20-17 on in the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both schools.

Despite ragged stretches including two interceptions by Watson, Clemson followed up routs of Wofford and Appalachian State with a solid conference win. The sophomore was spot on when needed, finding Hunter Renfrow and Jordan Leggett wide open down the middle for TD passes of 32 and 25 yards, respectively.

Watson eventually settled down from a slow start that included James Burgess' one-handed interception of his first-quarter pass to direct Clemson's first touchdown drive early in the second. He had plenty of time to find Renfrow for the 36-yard strike with 13:12 remaining for a 7-0 lead.

Louisville's only first-half answer was John Wallace's 26-yard field goal set up by Bolin's 55-yard pass to Jalen Smith, a play that comprised nearly half of its 117 yards in the first 30 minutes. It also summed up the Cardinals' offensive struggle whether Bolin, Jackson or Bonnafon was on the field.

The Cardinals remained within reach and got to 20-17 in the fourth quarter on Traveon Samuel's 100-yard kickoff return touchdown with 9:41 left. Wallace's 38-yard attempt sailed wide left with 2:28 left, but Louisville still positioned itself to go for the win before Bolin's pass was picked off.

Jackson finished with 184 yards rushing, a school-record for a quarterback. He scored on keepers of 14 and 13 yards in the first six minutes of the game. His 73-yard run set up Brandon Radcliff's 2-yard touchdown run to make it 21-0. Jackson finished 15 of 22 for 212 yards passing, including a 36-yard touchdown to James Quick.

Louisville (1-3) used two early turnovers to setup scores. Cornerback Trumaine Washington forced a fumble on the second play from scrimmage and Jackson ran for a score two plays later. John Wallace kicked a 50-yard field goal to give Louisville a 24-3 lead with 6:15 left in the first half.

Jackson broke the previous quarterback rushing mark set by Jim Wagoner's 162 yards in 1974. But an interception on the first play of the second quarter, and a fumble showed it wasn't a perfect night for Jackson.

Louisville had started a different quarterback in each of its first three games, the only team in the country to do so. Jackson started Louisville's second game after rushing for 106 yards and a touchdown against Auburn in relief of Reggie Bonnafon.

RALEIGH - Lamar Jackson ran and threw for touchdowns to help Louisville beat North Carolina State 20-13.

Jackson ran for 121 yards, including a 68-yard scoring sprint in the opening quarter, to lead a strong ground attack for the Cardinals (2-3, 1-1 Atlantic Coast Conference). He also threw for a 20-yard touchdown to Devante Peete in the second, giving the Cards a 14-0 lead on a day when they remained in firm control from the start.

The freshman quarterback completed just 10 of 27 passes, but the Cardinals ran for 203 yards against a defense that came in ranked third nationally by allowing just 205.8 yards.

Jacoby Brissett threw for a touchdown and Matt Dayes ran for one to lead the Wolfpack (4-1, 0-1), who managed just 228 yards and spent the entire game fighting uphill.

Louisville started 0-3 before last week's romp against Samford, with Jackson setting a school record for rushing yards (184) by a quarterback. Now the Cardinals have won two straight to build some momentum.

N.C. State carried plenty of impressive stats into its ACC opener, though playing four overmatched opponents - two picked sixth or lower in the Sun Belt, another picked next to last in its Conference USA division and a Championship Subdivision opponent - didn't reveal a lot about whether the team could make good on its goal of contending in the Atlantic Division.

The Wolfpack had a bumpy week, too, when coach Dave Doeren had to dismiss last year's leading rusher Shadrach Thornton from the team following another round of legal trouble with a midweek arrest.

N.C. State committed two big turnovers, the biggest coming in the opening quarter when Jumichael Ramos made a 48-yard catch and dragged a defender inside the 10 only to lose a fumble as he fell to the ground. Dayes also lost a fumble near midfield that the Cardinals converted into a field goal in the third.

The Wolfpack had committed one turnover through the first four games.

TALLAHASSEE - For the second straight season, Florida State is proving that it is a strong second-half team.

Trailing at halftime, the Seminoles broke open the game against Louisville with three third-quarter touchdowns in a 41-21 victory at Doak Campbell Stadium.

Everett Golson, who passed for 372 yards and three touchdowns, gave the Seminoles the lead for good with 8:05 remaining in the third quarter as he connected with Kermit Whitfield for a 70-yard touchdown up the right sideline. It is the eighth 300-yard passing game of Golson's career and his second since transferring to Florida State earlier this summer.

Golson completed passes to seven players. Whitfield set career highs for receptions (nine) and yards (172).

Dalvin Cook had his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 163 yards on 22 carries and a pair of touchdowns. Cook's 54-yard touchdown, where he broke four Louisville tackles, gave the Seminoles a 13-7 lead early in the third quarter and marked his fourth score of 50-plus yards this season.

LOUISVILLE - Louisville's defense had something to prove.

Still stewing from allowing 510 yards at No. 9 Florida State and somewhat overshadowed by Boston College and its top-ranked defense, the Cardinals showed their stinginess early, often and particularly the Eagles' final possession. A drive in which BC hoped would at least provide an opportunity to tie went backward and ended with Trevon Young's fourth-down sack of quarterback Troy Flutie for a 4-yard loss that preserved a hard-fought 17-14 victory on Saturday.

"(Defensive coordinator Todd) Grantham kept saying all week, 'the No. 1 defense is coming and we have to outplay them,'" Cardinals linebacker Keith Kelsey said. "We've got to out-physical them and outhustle them."

The Cardinals (3-4, 2-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) did that and more.

That final stand and sack capped a dominant defensive effort for the Cardinals, who recorded a season-high eight sacks and held the Eagles to just 79 yards including minus-14 rushing. Louisville tied for the eighth-lowest yardage allowed since 1962 and provided the last word in the expected defensive battle.

Sheldon Rankins helped the effort with 46-yard fumble return in the second quarter for Louisville's second TD. The 303-pound defensive end looked pretty nimble when he scooped up Jeff Smith's fumble after being sacked by Trumaine Washington, leaping a defender as he raced down the left sideline.

Louisville allowed just one third-down conversion in 14 chances and tied their highest sack total since making eight against Wake Forest last season.

The performance offset a scoreless second half by Louisville, which gained 365 yards but allowed seven sacks and committed four turnovers. Harold Landry returned a third-quarter fumble 34 yards to set Jeff Smith's 8-yard touchdown, and Elijah Robinson's 12-yard touchdown return of a blocked punt proved BC's first TD.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Lamar Jackson threw two touchdown passes and Louisville forced five turnovers in the second half in a 20-19 victory over Wake Forest.

Jackson was 19 of 26 for 207 yards with scoring throws covering 14 and 22 yards to Jamari Staples for the Cardinals.

John Wolford was 6 of 19 for 131 yards with a 58-yard touchdown pass to Tabari Hines for the Demon Deacons (3-6, 1-5), but he threw three of his team's four second-half interceptions.

John Wallace kicked field goals of 37 and 39 yards, the latter coming after Chucky Williams' serpentine interception return and giving Louisville a one-point lead with 1:25 left in the third.

Wake Forest's Tylor Harris blocked Wallace's 36-yarder with 5:22 left and recovered at the Louisville 45, but Shaq Wiggins intercepted Wolford's deep pass for K.J. Brent with 3:31 to play.

The Demon Deacons forced a punt with 1:42 remaining but lost 13 yards in four plays. Trevon Young stripped the ball from Kendall Hinton, Devonte' Fields recovered at the Wake Forest 5 and the Cardinals ran out the clock.

Hinton finished 3 of 11 for 95 yards with an interception and a 78-yard catch-and-run touchdown throw to Cortez Lewis - Wake Forest's longest completion since 2011.

Staples had 10 catches for 133 yards for the Cardinals, who gained 317 total yards and held the Demon Deacons to 266 - 40 yards on the ground - in winning their second straight and fourth in five games.

They led 10-0 early and were up 19-17 after the opening half ended with three scores in the final 2:15.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Another dose of defense helped spur Louisville to the offensive explosion it has sought all season.

Kyle Bolin threw for a season-high 362 yards and three touchdowns, and Louisville gained a season-high 579 yards to rout Syracuse 41-17 for its third straight victory.

Starting in place of injured freshman Lamar Jackson, the sophomore used his first start since Clemson to complete 24 of 35 passes with an interception for the Cardinals (5-4, 4-2 Atlantic Coast Conference), who have won five of six.

Brandon Radcliff added a season-high 117 yards rushing on 10 carries while Jeremy Smith had 71 and a 4-yard touchdown on 13 attempts.

Louisville's defense meanwhile continued its recent stinginess, holding Syracuse (3-6, 1-4 ACC), which lost its sixth straight, to 286 yards and forcing three turnovers including two interceptions. Trumaine Washington returned one pickoff 39 yards for a 14-10 lead in the second quarter, and the Cardinals poured it on in outscoring the Orange 34-7 over the final three quarters.

John Wallace kicked two field goals to become Louisville's career leader with 62.

Bolin hit eight receivers with James Quick and Jamari Staples combining for nine receptions for 151 yards.

Syracuse's highlights were Ervin Phillips' 10-yard touchdown run set up by Cordell Hudson's interception, and Steve Ishmael's late 9-yard TD pass from Zack Mahoney. Starter Eric Dungey was 15 of 30 for 158 yards and two interceptions and rushed 13 times for 45 yards.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Brandon Radcliff rushed for 146 yards and two touchdowns as Louisville beat Virginia 38-31.

The Cardinals broke open a 24-24 tie game with two fourth-quarter touchdowns. James Quick forced Virginia's Olanide Zacheaus to fumble on a punt return, setting up L.J. Scott's 1-yard score with 8:30 remaining.

Radcliff's 36-yard touchdown run capped a 96-yard drive with 2:57 left for a 38-24 lead.

Virginia tried to rally as Matt Johns threw his fourth touchdown pass with 1:16 remaining to cut the lead to 38-31. The Cavaliers then recovered the onside kick but were flagged for illegal formation, allowing Louisville to run out the clock.

Louisville rushed for 266 yards - its fifth 200-yard rushing performance of the season - and is now bowl eligible for the sixth year in a row.

The Cardinals' fourth-straight win continues the turnaround following an 0-3 start and avenged last year's 23-21 loss in Charlottesville.

Louisville quarterback Kyle Bolin finished 10 of 21 with 139 yards passing. Former quarterback Reggie Bonnafon completed his only attempt for a touchdown, a 20-yard halfback pass to Jaylen Smith.

Tight end Cole Hikutini led Cardinals' receivers with four catches for 59 yards.

Matt Johns completed 25 of 41 for 260 yards and four TDs. Canaan Severin caught eight passes for 116 yards and three TDs. Running back Taquen "Smoke" Mizzell caught nine passes for 89 yards and rushed 14 times for 40 yards.

Louisville's last chance ended when Jackson threw incomplete on fourth down near midfield with 4:20 left. The Panthers took over and ran out the remaining time, Narduzzi and his resilient team spilling onto the field as time ran out.

Louisville came in arguably the hottest team in the ACC outside of Clemson and North Carolina. The Cardinals had won six of seven thanks in part to a defense that founds its legs while Bobby Petrino's offense sorted itself out.
