CATS, DAWGS: WINNER TAKE ALL FOR SEC EAST CROWN

After a comeback for the ages, Kentucky returns to Kroger Field this week with an SEC East crown and trip to the SEC Championship Game on the line. Georgia and the Cats come in with identical records and everything on the line. Kickoff is 3:30 p.m. ET and the game will air on CBS Sports.

Junior running back Benny Snell Jr. has continued his assault on the record books this season, piling up 935 yards with nine scores. The Maxwell Award semifinalist owns the school record with 41 career touchdowns and has moved into second place UK's career rushing list (3,359) and career 100-yard games (16).

The UK defense, led by senior pass rusher extraordinaire Josh Allen, has a league-high 10.0 sacks and 14.5 TFL this season. His defensive unit leads the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 13.0 points per game, including four games of yielding 10 points or less. Allen has been named a semfinalist for the Chuck Badnarik Award and the Butkus Award and was recently awarded the Walter Camp Defensive Player of the Week as well as the SEC Defensive Player of the Week for the fourth time this season.

QUICK NOTES

- UK is 7-1, UK's best eight-game start of a season since 1977, when the Cats went 10-1.
- UK is bowl-eligible for the third straight season.
- This is the second-earliest date in school history that UK won its sixth game. The quickest season to six wins came on Oct. 13, 2007.
- At 5-1, UK has clinched a winning record in the SEC for the first time since 1977.
- UK has four SEC wins in three straight seasons for the first time in school history.
- UK will finish .500 or better in the SEC for three straight seasons, first time that has been accomplished since 1953-56.
- UK has 13 SEC wins over the last three seasons, tying the school record for most conference victories over a three-year period.
- UK is 5-0 at home this season for just the fifth time in Kroger Field/Commonwealth Stadium history, also 1977, 1987, 2007 and 2014.
- The Cats lead the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 13.0 points per game. They also rank 10th nationally and second in the SEC in total defense yards per game (295.3), 12th nationally in team passing efficiency defense (105.67), 17th in rushing defense (108.5).
- UK has allowed 104 points this season, fewest in the first eight games of a season since 1987 (98).
- UK has allowed just 74 points in SEC play this season, fewest in first six SEC games since 1979 (64).
- UK has allowed 20 points or less in all eight games this season, first time since 1950 that UK has held the first eight opponents to 20 or less.
- UK is the only FBS school that has not allowed more than 20 points in a game this season.
- UK ranks fifth nationally and tops in the SEC in red zone defense (0.684).
- The Cats have rushed for an average of 214.0 yards per game, third in the SEC and 31st in the nation in that category.
- Kentucky is the only program in the nation to defeat a current top-13 team on the road this season (Florida).
- UK is 16-6 in its last 22 regular-season games, best 22-game regular-season stretch since Nov. 13, 1976 to Nov. 11, 1978 (15-5-1).
- UK is 12-7 in its last 19 SEC games, the best 19-game stretch since Nov. 20, 1976 to Nov. 24, 1979 (12-7).
- Mark Stoops has 33 wins at Kentucky, moving past Harry Gamage (1927-33) for sixth place in school history.

- Four Wildcats were named midseason All-Americans by various media outlets: LB Josh Allen, RB Benny Snell Jr., OG Bunchy Stallings and S Darius West.
- Allen was named a semifinalist for the Chuck Bednarik Award which recognizes college football's
 most outstanding defensive player and the Butkus Award which is given annually to college
 football's top linebacker.
- Snell was named a semifinalist for the Maxwell Trophy awarded to the Collegiate Player of the Year
- Snell Jr. leads the SEC and ranks 10th nationally in rushing yards per game (116.9). He is eighth in the nation in total rushing yards (935).
- Snell ranks fifth among active FBS players in career rushing yards with 3,359. He currently ranks second all-time at UK. To become UK's all-time leading rusher, Snell needs 477 yards to break Sonny Collins' (3,835/1972-75).
- Allen has been a pass rush terror so far this season. He is third in the nation and leads the SEC with 14.5 tackles for loss. His 10.0 quarterback sacks ranks second nationally. Nine of Allen's 10 sacks on the season have come in the second half, including six in the fourth quarter and three in the third.
- Sophomore QB Terry Wilson was the first quarterback to begin his UK career 5-0 as the starting quarterback since Bill Ransdell in the first five games of the 1984 season. He set career highs last week in the win over Missouri, completing 22 of 31 passes for 267 yards. He also hit C.J. Conrad with a two-yard touchdown pass on the final play of the game.
- The 28-7 win over Mississippi State was UK's largest margin of victory vs. a ranked team since 1993 (Ole Miss, 21-0), the fewest points allowed vs. a ranked opponent and fewest yards allowed to a ranked team since that same game.
- Kentucky ended a 31-game drought against Florida with its 27-16 win in Gainesville on Sept. 8. UK's last win in Gainesville had been in 1979.
- This is Coach Mark Stoops' sixth season in Lexington and the Wildcats have either matched or exceeded the previous season's win total in all six. UK is the only school in the nation that has tied or improved its win total every year since 2013.
- Since 2016, UK has a 10-5 record in close games -- i.e., games decided by one possession (eight points or less). That's been a key factor in spurring the Wildcats to three-straight seasons of bowl eligibility.
- Last season, the Wildcats finished 7-6, overall 4-4 in the SEC. It marked the first time in 40 years that UK has won at least seven games and finished at least .500 in the SEC in back-to-back seasons. It was UK's second consecutive 4-4 league mark, the first time the Wildcats have achieved that since 1998-99.
- UK finished third in the SEC Eastern Division in 2017 and second in 2016, marking UK's highest finishes since the league split into division in 1992.
- The Cats have appeared in back-to-back bowl games for the first time since 2009 and 2010.
- Five Wildcats have received preseason all-conference recognition, led by the sturdy legs of junior running back Benny Snell Jr. and the explosive playmaking of senior tight end C.J. Conrad on offense as well as the dynamic pass rushing of senior linebacker Josh Allen and Mr. Consistency senior safety Mike Edwards on defense. Sophomore all-purpose player Lynn Bowden Jr., has also been recognized as a receiver and return specialist.
- Six Wildcats are on national award watch lists. <u>Josh Allen</u> Bednarik Award and Butkus Award; <u>Lynn Bowden Jr.</u> Paul Hornung Award; <u>C.J. Conrad</u> Allstate FCA Good Works Team, Mackey Award; Wuerffel Trophy; <u>Mike Edwards</u> Bednarik Award, Thorpe Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy; <u>Benny Snell Jr.</u> Doak Walker Award, Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Player of the Year; <u>Max Duffy</u> Ray Guy Award
- UK had a new starting quarterback in the opener for the fourth consecutive season (2015 Patrick Towles, 2016 Drew Barker, 2017 Stephen Johnson, 2018 Terry Wilson) and eighth time in the past nine years (2010 Mike Hartline, 2011 Morgan Newton, 2012 Maxwell Smith, 2013 Jalen Whitlow.

SCOUTING GEORGIA

- Georgia is 7-1 on the season overall and 5-1 in SEC play.
- The Bulldogs are coming off a 36-17 victory over Florida in their annual showdown in Jacksonville.
- Georgia takes advantage of the deep talent pool in the Peach State, with 84 players on its roster from inside state borders.
- After playing in the national championship game last season, Georgia is once again thriving despite losing its top two tailbacks and best defensive player.
- The Bulldogs ranked in the top 30 nationally in both total offense (28) and defense (14).
- Quarterback Jake Fromm is completing 67 percent of his passes and has 16 touchdowns to just four interceptions.

- The one-two running punch of Elijah Holyfield and D'Andre Swift has combined to pile up over 1,000 yards and nine touchdowns.
- Georgia has one of the best pass defenses in the country and is aided by it pass rush, which is led by linebacker D'Andre Walker. He has 6.5 tackles for loss and five sacks.

SERIES VS. GEORGIA

- Georgia leads the all-time series 57-12-2, including 27-7 in Lexington.
- UK is looking to snap an eight-game losing skid to Georgia. The Cats' last win came in 2009 (34-27) in Athens.
- Georgia escaped Lexington with a 27-24 win in 2016 as Rodrigo Blankenship kicked a gamewinning 25-yard field goal as time expired after the Cats had tied the game with 2:47 remaining.
- The Cats got off to a good start in last season's game but the Bulldogs ultimately took control with its vaunted rushing attack and piled up 381 yards on the ground.
- Georgia has won 24 of the past 27 meetings with the UK victories coming in 1996, 2006 and 2009.
- The two teams played nine times from 1939-49, and after a six-year lull, have played annually since 1956. The Wildcats won that initial game 13-6.
- Biggest UK win: 33 (33-0) in 1977 in Athens
- Biggest Georgia win: 45 (62-17) in 2004 in Lexington
- Games decided by 7 points or less: Georgia leads 17-8-2
- Benny Snell Jr. has rushed for 208 yards and three scores in two games against Georgia.
- Josh Allen picked off a pass on Georgia's first possession last season, leading to a UK field goal. It remains the only interception of Allen's illustrious career.

KENTUCKY-GEORGIA CONNECTIONS

- Kentucky has had great recruiting success in Georgia and currently has 12 players from the state
 on its roster: LS Blake Best (Duluth), DE T.J. Carter (Mableton), S Yusuf Corker (McDonough), LB
 Jamin Davis (Ludowici), S Jordan Griffin (Riverdale), RB Sihiem King (Colquitt), DE Shawn Lawson
 (Jonesboro), DL Jerquavion Mahone (Jordan City), OT E.J. Price (Lawrenceville), RB Christopher
 Rodriguez Jr. (McDonough), DE Calvin Taylor Jr. (Augusta) and LS Tristan Yeomans (Waycross).
- Georgia does not have a player from the Commonwealth.
- UK head coach Mark Stoops and offensive coordinator Eddie Gran and Georgia co-offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach James Coley all know each other quite well from their time at Florida State. Coley and Gran worked hand-in-hand on the Seminoles' offense as Stoops ran the defense.
- UGA offensive coordinator/tight ends coach Jim Chaney was the OC and interim head coach at Tennessee in 2012. UK co-OC and quarterbacks coach Darin Hinshaw was the wide receivers coach on that staff with Chaney.

MILESTONES TO WATCH

- Junior RB <u>Benny Snell Jr.</u> has 3,359 career rushing yards and is second all-time on Kentucky's career rushing list. He needs 476 yards to tie Sonny Collins (3,835 from 1972-75) for first.
- Snell has 16 career 100-yard rushing games, which is second on UK's career chart. He needs two more to tie Sonny Collins (1972-75).
- Snell now has 41 career touchdowns, surpassing Randall Cobb (37) to become UK's all-time leader in career touchdowns.
- Snell ranks third on UK's career scoring list with 248 points. He needs 58 points to move past Lones Seiber (305) for second place.
- Senior WR <u>Dorian Baker</u> has 98 career receptions and needs just two more to become the 16th player to reach 100 for his UK career. He needs 31 to crack UK's career top 10 list.
- Baker has 1,123 career receiving yards, ranking 25th in school history. He needs 77 yards to tie Steve Johnson (1,200 from 2006-07) for 24th.
- Senior TE <u>C.J. Conrad</u> counts 10 touchdowns among his 68 career receptions, giving him a scoring grab once in every 6.8 catches.
- Senior S <u>Mike Edwards</u> has nine career interceptions. With one more he'd move into a tie for fourth with Larry Carter (1977-79), Buzz Burnam (1970-72) and Marcus McClinton (2004-08).
- Edwards has 282 career tackles and needs 18 to join the UK 300-tackle club. He would be the 19th member of that exclusive club.
- Senior LB <u>Josh Allen</u> has 24.5 career sacks, moving him into second place on UK's all-time list. He needs 1.5 sacks to tie Oliver Barnett for most in UK history.
- Senior CB <u>Derrick Baity Jr.</u> has 24 career pass breakups and needs two more to match Leonard Burress (2000-03), Eric Kelly (1997-2000) and Van Hiles (1993-96) for third on UK's career list.
- The Cats are 4-4 against ranked teams since 2015. The wins were over No. 14 Mississippi State and No. 25 Florida (2018), No. 11 Louisville (2016) and No. 25 Missouri (2015).
- Georgia is the third ranked opponent for the Cats this season after wins over Florida and Mississippi State. It marked the first consecutive wins over ranked foes since the 1976 and 1977 teams combined to defeat five ranked opponents in a row.
- Georgia leads the series with Kentucky 29-3 when the Bulldogs are ranked.
- The Cats' last win over a ranked Georgia team was in 1988 vs. the 11th-ranked Bulldogs in Lexington, 16-10.
- The Cats' last win over a top-10 ranked team was No. 10 South Carolina in 2010 at home.

- Be the Cats' first win on CBS since knocking off No. 1 LSU 43-37 in three overtimes on Oct. 13, 2007.
- Give the Cats their third win over a ranked team this season (also defeated No. 25 Florida and No. 14 Mississippi State).
- Give the Cats their first win over a ranked Georgia team since upsetting the 11th-ranked Bulldogs in Lexington in 1988, 16-10.
- Give the Cats their first win over a top-10 team since defeating No. 10 South Carolina in Lexington in 2010, 31-28.

- UK has been ranked six consecutive weeks for the first time since the 2007 team appeared in the
 polls for six consecutive weeks from Sept. 16 to Oct. 21.

ALLEN NAMED WALTER CAMP NATIONAL DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK; SEC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK; SEMIFINALIST FOR CHUCK BEDNARIK AWARD AND BUTKUS AWARD

- Kentucky senior linebacker Josh Allen was named Football Bowl Subdivision National Defensive Player of the Week by the Walter Camp Football Foundation and presented by Generation UCAN, SEC Defensive Player of the Week and a semifinalist for both the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Butkus Award this week.
- Allen recorded 11 tackles (nine solo), including a pair of quarterback sacks, both of which
 caused fumbles, in No. 12 Kentucky's 15-14 win over Missouri on Saturday. With the win, the
 Wildcats improved to 7-1 overall, 5-1 in the Southeastern Conference, and clinched their first
 winning league record since 1977.
- Allen has been a terror on defense the entire season as he leads the Southeastern Conference and ranks second nationally in sacks (10.0) and leads the SEC and ranks third nationally in tackles for loss (14.5). He also ranks second nationally in forced fumbles (five).
- With 10 sacks on the season, Allen has the most sacks since Dean Wells had 10 sacks in 1992 and is tied for the third-most in a season.
- Nine of Allen's 10 sacks this season have come in the second half, including six in the fourth quarter and three in the third.
- Allen is just the fourth player in school history to record 10 or more sacks in a season, and the first since Dennis Johnson in 2001.
- Allen is the only player in the FBS since 2000 to have at least 56 tackles, 14.5 tackles for loss, 10 sacks, five forced fumbles and four passes defended in his team's first eight games of a season
- His 24.5 career sacks and 34.0 TFLs rank second on UK's career lists.
- Allen has earned first-team midseason All-America honors from the Associated Press, ESPN. com, Pro Football Focus, CBS Sports and The Athletic, and been named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week three times.
- Allen, the first UK player to earn Walter Camp National Player of the Week since 2004, is on the watch lists for the Lott IMPACT Trophy, the Bednarik Award and the Butkus Award.

IN OUR LAST GAME...

- It took 60 minutes and an untimed down but the Cats scored on the final play of the game to escape Missouri with a 15-14 victory over the Tigers.
- Quarterback Terry Wilson found tight end C.J. Conrad in the end zone with no time on the clock, completing an unlikely comeback.
- It was the ninth win for the Cats since 2014 when trailing by 10 points in the game.
- Trailing 14-3 and with the offense sputtering, Lynn Bowden Jr. sparked the comeback with a 67-yard punt return for a score that pulled UK within 14-9 with 5:18 remaining in the fourth quarter.
- Bowden also hauled in a career-high 13 passes for 166 yards.
- Wilson drove the Cats 81 yards in 84 seconds to score the game-winning touchdown and secure a fourth-straight win over Missouri.
- The UK defense was bonkers yet again, not allowing a single first down to MIzzou's high-powered offense in the second half, a span of eight possessions.
- Allen continued to be nearly unblockable, registering a pair of strip sacks in the game.

CATS CAN COME FROM BEHIND, WIN AT THE WIRE

- Based in the Horse Capital of the World, everyone here knows a great horse is one that can come from behind or win at the wire. The Kentucky football team has had those characteristics under Coach Mark Stoops.
- Since the beginning of the 2016 season, UK has shown it can win at the wire with a 10-5 record (66.7 percent) in games decided by eight points -- i.e., one possession -- or less. UK was 4-1 in such games in 2016, 4-3 last year and 2-1 this year.
- The Wildcats also have been able to come from behind. Since Mark Stoops took over as head coach in 2013, UK has come from behind and won nine times when trailing by 10 or more points at some point of the game, including wins this season over Central Michigan (behind by 10) and Missouri (behind by 11). That's the most 10-point comebacks for any coach in school history, surpassing eight such games by Rich Brooks from 2003-09.

FOUR WILDCATS EARN MIDSEASON ALL-AMERICA HONORS

- Senior linebacker Josh Allen, junior running back Benny Snell Jr., senior offensive guard Bunchy Stallings and senior safety Darius West earned midseason All-America honors from various media outlets.
- Allen earned first-team honors from the Associated Press, ESPN.com, Pro Football Focus and The Athletic.
- Snell earned second-team honors from the AP and The Athletic.
- Stallings earned second-team honors by ESPN and The Athletic.
- West was a second-team midseason All-America choice by The Athletic.

OFFENSE NOTES

- "Balance" has been the hallmark of the Kentucky offense the last two seasons under Eddie Gran, UK assistant head coach for offense.
- The Wildcats have rushed for more than 2,000 yards and passed for more than 2,000 yards in each of the previous two campaigns, the first time in school history that UK has done so in back-to-back seasons.

BIG PLAYS SPUR KENTUCKY OFFENSE

- Before the season, UK assistant head coach for offense Eddie Gran noted the need for more big plays, and to this point, the Wildcats have done just that.
- In the first eight games of the 2017 season, UK had eight offensive touchdown plays of at least 20 yards in length. This year, the Cats struck for 13 TDs of at least 20 yards in six games.
- When you move the benchmark to 25-yard touchdowns, the contrast increases significantly. In the first eight games of 2017, UK had just three touchdown plays of at least 25 yards in length. In 2018, the Cats had eight TDs of 25+ yards.

REACHING THE CENTURY MARK, TIMES TWO

- Kentucky is one of just nine teams in FBS to have a pair of 100-yard rushers in two separate games this season.
- Against Florida, Benny Snell Jr. (175) and Terry Wilson (105) each topped the century mark, while Snell (125) and A.J. Rose (104) did so against Central Michigan.
- The other eight schools to accomplish the feat include Mississippi State (three times), Arizona (2), Boston College (2), Connecticut (2), Louisiana (2), Maryland (2), Oregon (2) and Troy (2).

Quarterbacks

- Starting the season, quarterbacks coach Darin Hinshaw had a big challenge, as no quarterback on the roster had thrown a pass in a major-college game.
- Junior-college transfer Terry Wilson (sophomore eligibility) won the starting job and has started every game this season, completing 64.9 percent of his passes for 988 yards and five touchdowns. He's also dangerous as a runner with 406 yards and three TDs. Wilson, who redshirted as a freshman at Oregon, threw for 2,133 yards and 26 touchdowns last season in juco.
- Wilson was the "Manning Quarterback of the Week" after accounting for 256 yards total offense and three touchdowns (one rushing, two passing) in the win at Florida.
- Sophomore Gunnar Hoak saw his first UK action vs. Central Michigan, entering the game in the second quarter and directing a touchdown drive just before halftime, capped by his 24-yard TD toss to David Bouvier. He also threw a touchdown pass in the win over Murray State.
- Redshirt freshman Danny Clark displayed a strong arm in practice last season and scored a twoyard rushing touchdown on his first career rushing attempt in the Murray State game.
- The quarterbacks were forced to replace Stephen Johnson, a tenacious leader who posted a 14-10 record as the primary QB and led UK to two bowl games in the last two seasons.
- Among Power 5 schools, Terry Wilson and Benny Snell Jr., have the fifth-most combined rushing yards for a quarterback/running back duo this season:





and then 161.7 yards per game last season. Those numbers are significant in that only twice in the previous 20 seasons had a UK offense rushed for more than 162 yards per game (2015 and 2009) and not for more than 200 per game since 1993 (210.5).

- Gran has mentored the likes of Benny Snell Jr. and Stanley "Boom" Williams at Kentucky, Chris Thompson, Devonta Freeman and James Wilder Jr. (Florida State), Montario Hardesty (Tennessee), Carnell Williams, Ronnie Brown, Kenny Irons and Rudi Johnson (Auburn) and Deuce McAllister (Ole Miss). During his 23 seasons as a running backs coach he's spent 20 of those against top-shelf competition in the SEC and Atlantic Coast Conference, making the numbers even more impressive.
- Some of the more compelling stats from Gran's 23 seasons at Ole Miss (1995-98), Auburn (1999-2008), Tennessee (2009), Florida State (2010-12), Cincinnati (2013-15) and Kentucky:
- 17 seasons averaging at least 150.0 rushing yards per game
- 10 seasons averaging at least 172.0 rushing yards per game
- 10 individual 1,000-yard rushers
- Eight seasons with a running back who scored at least 10 rushing touchdowns
- Three seasons averaging at least 200.0 rushing yards per game
- Only once has his running attack averaged less than 100.0 yards per game
- Only twice has his running attack averaged less than 125.0 yards per game

Running Backs

- The UK backfield is headlined by Benny Snell Jr., but goes much deeper than UK's All-SEC ballcarrier.
- Snell is averaging 116.9 yards per game, which leads the SEC and is 10th in the nation.
- Snell (125 yards) and sophomore A.J. Rose (104) each surpassed the century mark and scored





two touchdowns vs. Central Michigan. It was a career-high performance for Rose, who scored from 55 yards away on his first carry of the season. Rose has run for 265 yards this season with four touchdowns and is averaging 5.8 yards per carry.

- Snell (175) and QB Terry Wilson (105) each surpassed the century mark at Florida, giving UK back -to-back games with 100-yard rushers for the first time since 1979.
- Snell is the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons.
 He is already second in school history with 3,359 career yards and owns the school record for rushing TDs and total touchdowns with 41.

Tight Ends

- UK returns a mixture of talent at the tight end spot in 2018, highlighted by All-SEC tight end C.J. Conrad. He is second on the team this season with 18 receptions. He has now totaled 68 receptions for 823 yards and 10 TDs in his three-year career.
- Conrad is joined by junior Justin Rigg (6-6, 257), who has been an excellent blocker and also is a pass-catching threat.

Wide Receivers

- The Kentucky wide receivers are somewhat younger this season after the departure of four key contributors, but a pair of veterans and several gifted youngsters give UK the ability to have a capable receiving corps.
- It was bad news at the time, of course, but senior Dorian Baker's season-ending injury in August, 2017, has enabled him to return for a fifth year. Baker has caught 98 passes for 1,123 yards and six touchdowns during his
- Sophomore Lynn Bowden leads the team in catches, ranking fourth in the SEC in receptions per game. He has a pair of careerlong 54-yard scoring strikes, on the road at Florida and Texas A&M.
- David Bouvier, a fifth-year senior who had caught only one pass entering this season, has emerged as a clutch receiver. Averaging 19.4 per catch, he had key TD receptions in the wins over Central Michigan and Florida, then had two vital catches on the gamewinning drive at Missouri.
- Sophomore receivers Josh Ali and Isaiah Epps have seen action in all eight games and have caught seven and two passes, respectively.
- Sophomore Zy'Aire Hughes scored a 49-yard touchdown on his first career offensive touch, ironically not being credited with a catch on the play after Benny Snell Jr. took the direct snap, passed to quarterback Terry Wilson, who latereled to Hughes.

Offensive Line

Offensive line coach John Schlarman is in his

- sixth season at Kentucky and once again his line is ready and able. The line boasts four returning starters who has helped Benny Snell Jr., become the first player in school history with 1,000 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons.
- Sophomore Drake Jackson, out of Woodford County High School, took over the center position midway in the 2017 season and has been a fixture ever since.
- Senior Bunchy Stallings is a two-year starter in the offensive line, currently stationed at right guard. He was named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week after the wins against Florida and Mississippi State.
- Senior George Asafo-Adjei (6-5, 315) has started every game at right tackle and was named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week after the wins over South Carolina and Vanderbilt.
- The Wildcats got a bad break during August practice when junior Landon Young, a returning starter at left tackle, sustained a knee injury and is out for the season. Redshirt freshman Naasir Watkins and sophomore E.J. Price are sharing the position. It is Price's first action at UK after sitting out a year via transfer from Southern California. Watkins is currently out indefinitely after sustaining a sprained knee vs. South Carolina.
- Junior Logan Stenberg (6-6, 320) is in his second season as the starter at left guard.
- Sophomores Mason Wolfe and Luke Fortner have provided the reserve help at the center/ guard positions.

UK OFFENSIVE LINE RECOGNIZED BY JOE MOORE AWARD

- The offensive line has been named a member of the midseason honor roll for the Joe Moore Award
- This season the Wildcats' running game is averaging a 214.0 yards per game, good for fourth in the SEC and 31st nationally. Junior running back Benny Snell Jr. continues to rewrite the record book and now sits third on UK's all-time rushing list with 3,359 yards. This season, he has rushed for 935 yards and nine touchdowns in seven games for a 116.9 yards-per-game average (10th nationally). The Cats have twice had two 100-yard rushers in a single game, just one of just nine schools to accomplish that this season along with Arizona, Louisiana, Troy, Mississippi State, Oregon, Maryland, Boston College and UConn.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

- Special teams coordinator Dean Hood brings a wealth of knowledge to the program as he is in his 31st year of college coaching.
- Special teams played a huge role in the win at Missouri. Darius West blocked a field

- in the first quarter. In the fourth quarter, Lynn Bowden's 67-yard punt return for a touchdown sparked UK's comeback win. It was Bowden's first collegiate punt return.
- Senior kicker Miles Butler as made 3 of 7 field goals this season and all 25 extra points.
- True freshman Chance Poore as shown a long-distance leg and connected on his first career field goal attempt with a 31-yarder at Missouri on Oct. 27. He was the No. 1 punter/kicker in the 2018 class by ProKicker. com.
- For the second-consecutive season, UK has an Australian transplant handling the punting duties. Max Duffy has done very well, ranking sixth in the SEC and 17th nationally with a 44.8-yard average. Nearly half of his punts, 18 of 38, have been within the opponent 20-yard line, yet he also has only two touchbacks. He arrived in the United States as an early enrollee in January and used the off-season to learn American football rules, how to say "ya'll" and how to put on his pads correctly. Another Aussie, Matt Panton, was UK's punter in 2017. Duffy is currently on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award given annually to the nation's top punter.
- Hood's special teams blocked three kicks in 2017, two of which were crucial plays in Wildcat wins. UK special teams did not allow any blocked kicks nor allow a punt or kickoff return for a touchdown.
- Junior Grant McKinniss, the starting punter in 2016, handles the kickoff duties.
- Senior Tristan Yeomans returns to handle the long snapping for punts, while junior Blake Best is the snapper for field goals and PATs.
- The kickoff return specialist, Lynn Bowden
 Jr., set UK records last season for most
 kickoff returns in a season (37), game (7 vs.
 Louisville) and most kickoff yards in a season
 (869). His 869 kickoff return yards ranked
 eighth most in SEC history. He is averaging
 20.7 yards per return this season.
- Bowden returned a 67-yard punt for a TD vs. Missouri, his first punt return of his career.
- Senior David Bouvier has also been handling punt returns and is averaging 5.8 per return.

DUFFY IS SPECIAL

- First-year punter Max Duffy has been sensational this season, setting two school records and remaining on pace to set a third.
- Through eight games, the Australian punter is averaging 44.76 yards per punt, which ranks 17th nationally and fifth in the SEC. If he continues on this pace he has a chance to set the UK single-season record for best average yards per punt. He has already met the minimum number requirement of 30 punts:

Linebackers

- First-year outside linebackers coach Brad
 White inherited one of the nation's top pass
 rushers, Josh Allen, when he came on board
 in the spring.
- Allen has been a force on the outside, improving his numbers each season even as he sees more and more attention from opponents. The senior could have left for the NFL Draft but decided to come back for his final year, giving the Cats one of scariest pass rushers in the country.
- Allen has begun his senior year with a bang, totaling 56 tackles, 14.5 for loss, 10.0 sacks, and he caused a fumble that UK returned for a touchdown to clinch the win over Florida. He also caused a fumble on Vanderbilt's final possession to preserve the win over the Commodores.
- Weakside linebacker Jordan Jones has 46 tackles, including 3.5 for loss, and had four pass breakups vs. Murray State. He missed four games last season due to injury but is looking to return to his 2016 form when he totaled 109 tackles and earned All-SEC honors.
- Sophomore Jamar "Boogie" Watson started the opener at strongside linebacker and had a career-high six tackles, along with a pass breakup. He has four sacks on the season.
- Junior middle linebacker Kash Daniel is the successor to the graduated Courtney Love after a two-year apprenticeship. Daniel has 55 tackles, including a career-high 11 in wins over Central Michigan, Florida and Vanderbilt.
- Seeing significant reserve action at the inside linebacker posts are redshirt freshman Jamin Davis (seven tackles, one interception) and true freshmen DeAndre Square (18 tackles) and Chris Oats (11 tackles).
- Oats made his first career start at Texas A&M, notching his first career sack in the process.


Secondary








- Sophomore Davonte Robinson is a backup safety. He has 16 tackles this season and, on the final play of the game, returned a fumble 30 yards for a touchdown at Florida. He had a career-high tackles with seven against Vanderbilt.
- Seniors Derrick Baity Jr. and Chris Westry are back together for a final season as two of the most experienced players in the SEC. The two have played in 90 combined games with 69 starts and snatched nine interceptions. Both players have more than 100 career tackles and at least 13 pass breakups. Baity was named SEC co-Defensive Player of the Week after having a hand in three turnovers in the second half of the Cats' 23-13 road win at South Carolina last season.
- Junior Jordan Griffin has been a luxury for the Cats the past two seasons, a player capable of starting who gave the defense four legitimate SEC cornerbacks against offenses increasingly deploying more receivers. Griffin has two pass breakups this season.
- Junior college transfer Lonnie Johnson Jr. showed big-time playmaking ability at cornerback in his first season at UK with 41 total tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack and five pass breakups. He also blocked an extra point against Eastern Kentucky and started the final five games of the season. With a year of experience he is considered an important piece of the defensive puzzle in 2018.
- Freshman Tyrell Ajian has seen action as a sixth defensive back and had a crucial interception and pass breakup in the win over Mississippi State.

Defensive Line

In his second season on the UK staff defensive line, coach Derrick LeBlanc likes what he sees this season. Despite not having a senior starter in 2017 the Cats held six

opponents to less than 100 yards rushing, the first time a UK defense had done that since 1949.

- UK has played eight down linemen so far this season, the best depth the Wildcats have had on the front line in many years.
- Senior Adrian Middleton is in his third season as the starting defensive tackle. He has 74 tackles, including 11.0 for loss, during his career.
- Junior T.J. Carter really came on the second half of the 2017 season with three tackles for loss and three sacks over the final five games of the regular season. The defensive end started 12 games and recorded 18.0 tackles to go along with the tackles for loss and sacks. He also had two quarterback hurries and a pass breakup.
- UK was hit with heartbreaking news in fall camp when sophomore defensive end Josh Paschal was diagnosed with melanoma in his right foot. Paschal is undergoing treatment and his return is uncertain. Last season, he showed flashes of brilliance with 4.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks and had bulked up to 278 pounds in the offseason. He had a critical blocked punt in the win over Eastern Michigan and was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week.
- The towering presence on the UK defensive line is Calvin Taylor Jr., who stands 6-foot-9. The junior earned his first start against Northwestern in the Music City Bowl and finished the 2017 season with 22 tackles, 1.0 tackle for loss and 1.0 sack.
- Senior Tymere Dubose is part of the Youngstown-Lexington pipeline and as emerged as a starter during his senior season. In 26 career games he has 18 tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss and a sack.

BENNY IN THE RECORD BOOKS

- Benny Snell Jr., has earned a reputation as one of the nation's fiercest runners, flashing the speed to take it the house but also an ability and willingness to run through defenders for the touch yardage that moves the chains. The proof is in the YAC (yards after contact):
- Snell accumulated 897 rushing yards after contact in his his first two seasons, which includes yardage lost on negative rush plays.

SNAP TO IT

- Kentucky entered the season without any quarterback on its roster having ever stepped on the playing field during a game, as none of the Cats' top four projected quarterbacks have taken an FBS snap. Furthermore, this as the first time since 2000 that the Cats open a season without a quarterback having thrown a single pass.
- The Cats are one of the few programs in the country in that position this season, with Minnesota and Nebraska also opening the year without any experience. For Kentucky, returnees Danny Clark, Gunnar Hoak and Walker Wood all watched the 2017 season, while signee Terry Wilson came from junior college after a redshirt season at Oregon. Nebraska will have a transfer with FBS experience on its roster but he is sitting out as a transfer, while Minnesota has only freshmen and redshirt freshmen.

- Butler earned a full scholarship from head coach Mark Stoops during fall camp for his work ethic on and off the field during his four-year career as a Wildcat.
- Butler excels in the classroom and in leadership roles. He is on track to graduate in December with a perfect 4.0 grade point average and will earn two degrees in finance and accounting, along with a minor in economics. He is a three-time SEC Honor Roll member and has been named to the Dean's List seven semesters. This summer, Butler completed an internship with Financial Intern, Ullico in Washington, D.C.
- Butler is a Beta Alpha Psi Business/Accounting fraternity member and the coordinator/ tutor for the LEAP Tutoring Lab where he was selected as the student coordinator in the summer of 2017. He oversees all tutors, coordinates schedules, attends meetings with faculty to help improve accounting curriculum across the college of business. He also serves as the team liaison with the athletic ticket office and serves as a recruitment liaison by hosting, meeting with, and giving tours to potential special team recruits and their families.



THE STREAK IS BROKEN ...

On Sept. 8, Kentucky ended a 31-game drought against the Florida Gators.

- Was UK's first win in Gainesville since 1979 and first time UK has defeated a ranked UF team in Gainesville.
- Was UK's first win over a ranked Florida team since 1976, when UF was ranked No. 15.
- Moved the Cats to 2-0 for the second straight season and fourth time in the past five years.
- Won SEC opener for the second year in a row. first time that has been accomplished since
- Won SEC road opener for the second year in a row, first time that has been accomplished since 1983-84.
- Was Kentucky's first win over a ranked opponent since winning at No. 11 Louisville in 2016.
- Was UK's first win over a ranked SEC opponent since No. 25 Missouri in 2015.
- Was UK's first road win over a ranked SEC opponent since 1998 at No. 21 LSU.







- Was UK's largest margin of victory in a road win vs. a ranked SEC opponent (11 points) since October 15th, 1977 at LSU (20 points)
- The 16 points scored by Florida was the second-lowest total for the Gators in the series since 1986. The Gators scored 14 in 2015 in a 14-9 win in Lexington.
- Kentucky was the first school to rush for at least 300 yards against Florida since 2002 (Miami (FL), September 7, 2002).
- · Benny Snell Jr. was the fourth SEC player since 2000 to rush for 175+ yards at Florida (Travis Stephens, Marcus Lattimore, Trent Richardson).

- Klausing was named the newest member the Kentucky football team during an inspirational Team IMPACT Signing Day celebration at Kroger Field. The event was sponsored by Vertex Pharmaceuticals.
- Klausing is one of 30,000 patients in the United States living courageously with cystic fibrosis (CF), a disease predominantly diagnosed in children by the age of 2. He was diagnosed at five days old. By sponsoring Signing Days of children with CF, Vertex Pharmaceuticals helps spread awareness for the disease—and the life-long, positive effects Team IMPACT has on these children.
- Team IMPACT is a national nonprofit that connects children facing serious and chronic illnesses with local college athletic teams, forming lifelong bonds and life-changing outcomes. - This is the 128th season of intercollegiate football for Kentucky.
- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager Tom Kalinowski is in his 41st season in that role. A group of former players, staff members and current UK coaches pitched in during the summer of 2017 to surprise him with a new Ford Escape.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 23 national cheerleading championships, including 19 of the last 23, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.
- Kentucky is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.

RICH BROOKS NAMED UK'S LEGEND

- Former UK head coach Rich Brooks was named to the 2018 AT&T SEC Football Legends class, an assemblage of former football standouts who will be honored at events surrounding the SEC Football Championship Game in Atlanta in December.
- Rich Brooks guided the Kentucky football fortunes for seven years from 2003-09 and is the only head coach in UK history to guide the Wildcats to postseason bowl games in four consecutive years and win three straight bowls. The streak began in 2006 with a stunning upset of Clemson in the Music City Bowl. The 2007 season was highlighted by a Top-10 ranking, a victory over No. 1 (and eventual national champion) LSU and was capped by a bowl victory over Florida State. Following the 2008 season, UK defeated East Carolina in the Liberty Bowl. In his final season in 2009, Brooks was named SEC Coach of the Year by CollegeFootballNews.com. With the Wildcats reflecting the toughness shown by their head coach, in his last four seasons he led UK to 12 fourth-quarter comeback wins. Prior to joining Kentucky, Brooks served as



COUCH NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT

Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch has been named to the 2019 ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, the National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame announced. Couch is one of 76 players and six coaches from the Football Bowl Subdivision and 100 players and 32 coaches from the divisional ranks.

- A storied name of the Kentucky program, Couch, was the team's quarterback from 1996-98. After giving up his senior season of eligibility, he was drafted as the No. 1 pick by Cleveland in the 1999 NFL Draft. In 1998, the junior quarterback was named a first-team All-American and consensus Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Couch completed 400 of 553 passes for 4,275 yards and 36 touchdowns and led the nation in pass completions while ranked second in completion percentage, passing yardage and touchdown passes, and fourth in total offense. After guiding the Wildcats to the Outback Bowl, UK's first New Year's Day bowl appearance in 47 years, Couch finished fourth in Heisman Trophy balloting. He was also a finalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award as a junior and sophomore. His breakout sophomore campaign featured 363 of 547 passes completed for 3,884 yards and 37 touchdowns while leading the nation in pass attempts, completions, yardage, and completion percentage. Also during his sophomore year, Couch earned second-team All-SEC honors and finished ninth in Heisman voting. He played in seven games as a true freshman, with two starts. Career wise, Couch completed 795 passes on 1,184 attempts for 8,435 yards and 74 touchdowns. The legend ended his career with seven NCAA records, 14 SEC records, and 26 school records

head coach for the St. Louis Rams of the NFL and the University of Oregon.








KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 295 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 161-132-4 record (.549), 25-16 under Mark Stoops.
- UK had its first sellout of the season with 63,081 -- third-largest since the 2015 renovation -- for the South Carolina game.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 14 of the last 16 season. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years.
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement-which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-- begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and

Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics. Kroger Field was transformed into a state-ofthe-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

<u>Seating Capacity:</u> 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites. New bench-back seating has been installed in the South upper level of Kroger Field.

<u>Playing Field:</u> UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Mississippi State, Missouri and Vanderbilt.

<u>Video Boards:</u> Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

<u>Sound System:</u> Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team roceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Pregame concerts: The Kentucky Football Pregame Concert Series has returned for the 2018 season. Concerts will begin on the stage outside Gate 12 immediately following the Cat Walk and last until 30 minutes prior to kickoff. The Cat Walk takes place two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff.

<u>Coca Cola Fan Zone</u>: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Fan Zone located in Nutter Field House. It will have inflatable games, free posters, face tattoos and more, available two hours before kickoff.

HEAD COACH MARK STOOPS / SIXTH SEASON / IOWA, 1989



Mark Stoops likes to challenge his team to do things that have never been done at the University of Kentucky, or, haven't been done in a long time. His Wildcats are responding nicely to that challenge.

Since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK is the only school in the nation that has tied or improved its win total in each of the last five seasons.

That steady progression has culminated in multiple achievements:

- In 2016 and '17, UK posted consecutive seven-win seasons, along with 4-4 records in the Southeastern Conference. It's the first time UK has won seven games and finished at least .500 in the league in back-to-back seasons in 40 years.
- The Wildcats placed third in the SEC Eastern Division in 2017 and second in 2016, the team's best back-to-back finishes since the league split into divisions in 1992.
- UK's 2016-17 bowl appearances mark only the fifth time in school history that the school has earned bowl bids in at least two consecutive seasons.
- UK won three road games last season, the first time that has happened since 2009.
- Since 2016, the Wildcats are 10-5 in games decided by eight points.

The methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops' ability to adjust when necessary shone its brightest at the beginning of the 2016 season. After losing the first two games of the schedule, and seeing his starting quarterback out for the season with an injury, and seeing his defense struggle in the early stages, Stoops didn't retreat. The Wildcat coach chose determination over despair and went back to work.

Stoops re-tooled the offense with then-backup quarterback Stephen Johnson, going to a more physical, ground-based attack. With a history of success as a defensive coordinator, Stoops returned to his roots by becoming more involved with the planning and play-calling on that side of the ball.

The results? The Wildcats went 7-3 in the last 10 regular-season games, topped by a win at No. 11-ranked Louisville and their inaugural appearance in the TaxSlayer Bowl. Stoops was named SEC Coach of the Year runner-up by Athlon Sports.

Returning the Wildcats to the bowl scene again last season, Stoops' progress at Kentucky continues his history of coaching success.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in

STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

In just five seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's five classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's

records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, retired in 2017 after 18 years as the Sooners' head coach. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is special teams coordinator at Youngstown State.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Looking ripe for an upset because it kept coughing up the football, Kentucky eventually tightened its grip on it as well as Central Michigan.

The Wildcats' depth on both sides of the ball also helped them avoid a potential disaster.

A.J. Rose and Benny Snell, Jr. each rushed for two touchdowns, Gunnar Hoak came off the bench to throw the go-ahead TD pass and Kentucky overcame four first-half turnovers to beat Central Michigan 35-20 in its season opener.

For a while the upset-minded Chippewas seemed poised to make the Wildcats their third Power Five victim in as many

seasons by building a 17-7, second-quarter lead and scoring all their points off two interceptions and two fumbles. Kentucky rallied with two TDs over the final four minutes of the half, including Hoak's 24-yard scoring pass to David Bouvier for a 21-20 edge with 14 seconds remaining.

Kentucky shut out CMU from there, limiting the Mid-American Conference team to 97 second-half yards while outgaining them 427-255 overall to improve to 7-0 in the series.

The Wildcats' offense in particular used strength in numbers to overcome those self-inflicted setbacks.

Snell had TD runs of 52 and 11 yards to finish with 125 yards rushing on 20 attempts. Rose, a sophomore, rushed for TDs of 55 and 4 yards on the way to 104 on eight carries and his first career 100-yard game as Kentucky dominated the ground game 299-118.

Hoak meanwhile demonstrated why it's good to have an able backup with a gutsy bailout after starter Terry Wilson left the game with a shoulder injury sustained while throwing his second interception. The sophomore led Kentucky 71 yards in 41 seconds and hit Bouvier down the middle for his first career TD that shifted momentum for good.

Stoops sidestepped a question about using both QBs next week at Florida but stressed the importance of having them ready after seeing it pay off when Kentucky needed it.

Benny Snell, Jr. rushed for 175 yards as Kentucky ended a 31-year losing streak against Florida, topping the Gators 27-16 in Gainesville.

Quarterback Terry Wilson completed 11 of 16 passes for 151 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while also rushing for 105 vards and a score.

The win was Kentucky's first over Florida since 1986, and the Cats' first win in Gainesville since 1979.

After the Kentucky defense forced Florida to punt on the opening possession of the game, the Wildcats got on the board. The Cats covered 91 yards in nine plays, capped by a

29-vard touchdown pass from Wilson to David Bouvier, Miles Butler nailed the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 5:07 left in the first quarter.

Florida answered with a scoring drive of its own, but the UK defense kept the Gators out of the end zone. Florida was on the UK three-yard line, but a sack by Phil Hoskins and a third-down stop forced the Gators to attempt a 29-yard field goal, which Evan McPherson converted, cutting the UK lead to 7-3.

After Kentucky was forced to punt, Florida went 63 yards in just four plays, scoring on an 18-yard pass from Feleipe Franks to Moral Stephens, giving the Gators a 10-7 lead.

Kentucky would get into Florida territory twice more in the first half, but both drives ended in turnovers. The Cats defense would hold on both occasions, and the Gators held a 10-7 halftime lead.

The Cats took the second-half kickoff and put together an impressive scoring drive. Leaning on Snell, Kentucky drove 90 yards in 10 plays, with Snell covering 36 of those yards. Wilson had a pair of big plays in the drive, with a 19-yard run on third down, and the drive capper, a 24-yard designed run for a touchdown. Butler's PAT was good and Kentucky led 14-10 with 9:49 left in the third quarter.

After a Florida punt, Kentucky struck again. This time, the Cats went 78 yards in just five plays, with Wilson connecting with Lynn Bowden, Jr. for a 54-yard touchdown. The PAT was good and Kentucky led 21-10 with 4:11 left in the third quarter.

Late in the fourth quarter, Franks hit Freddie Swain with a touchdown pass to cut Kentucky's lead to 21-16, after a two-point conversion failed.

The scoring ended when Davonte Robinson recovered a fumble and returned it 30 vards for a score on the game's final play.

Kentucky football coach Mark Stoops wasn't worried about his team overlooking Murray State following a 27-16 win at Florida.

Despite a slow start, the Wildcats (3-0) outscored the Racers 31-7 in the second half and rolled to a 48-10 victory Saturday. Murray had trouble stopping Kentucky quarterback Terry Wilson, who threw for 163 yards and rushed for 80 more to keep the Wildcats perfect on the season.

Coming off an 11-point victory over the Gators that ended a 31-game losing streak in their Southeastern Conference opener, the Wildcats (3-0) showed no signs of a letdown and

overwhelmed the Racers from start to finish. Leading 17-3 at the break, Kentucky pulled way in the second half.

Traditionally the Wildcats have struggled against FCS opponents and needed overtime to fend off Ohio Valley Conference member Eastern Kentucky in a 34-27 win in 2015. The task was much easier this time for Kentucky.

Paced by Wilson, the Wildcats used a balanced offense to defeat the Racers, amassing 528 yards of offense, including 245 on the ground. Wilson targeted nine different receivers, mainly Lynn Bowden, Jr., who caught eight passes for 89 yards. Wilson and backup Gunnar Hoak threw for 240 yards and one touchdown.

Benny Snell, Jr. collected 75 yards on 15 carries and added a score. In limited action in the second half, Snell had just four carries as A.J. Rose and Sihiem King collected a bulk of the carries in the second half.

In a surprise trick play, Snell completed a shovel pass to Wilson, who then handed the ball off to Zy'Aire Hughes for a 49-yard score to end the third quarter. Snell's block downfield created a wide-open path to the end zone for Hughes in his first career touchdown.

Murray avoided the shutout on Gabrie Vicente's 29-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Racers quarterback Drew Anderson competed 15-of-32 passes for 118 yards. Backup signal caller Preston Rice scored Murray's lone touchdown with a 21-yard run with 30 seconds remaining.

Overall, Stoops was pleased with the win and likes the where his team stands following the first three weeks of the regular season.

Benny Snell, Jr. rushed for four touchdowns to break a Kentucky career record, including two in the fourth quarter, and the Wildcats held No. 14 Mississippi State to 56 yards rushing for a 28-7 upset Saturday night.

After Tyrell Ajian's 35-yard interception return to the Bulldogs 36, Snell broke left and down the left sideline for his third score with 8 minutes remaining to break Randall Cobb's previous mark of 37 total touchdowns.

The junior wasn't done and added a 23-yard TD run on the next possession for 21-point cushion the Wildcats (4-0, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) preserved for their second win over

a ranked school this month. Kentucky beat then-No. 25 Florida two weeks ago to break a 31-game losing streak to the Gators.

Snell also had TD runs of 1 and 2 yards to finish with 165 on 25 carries, his 15th career 100-yard game. His four rushing TDs also matched a school record he shares with Don Phelps. Kentucky rushed for 229 overall and outgained the Bulldogs 300-201 under a steady drizzle.

MSU (3-1, 0-1) was held nearly 256 rushing yards below its SEC-leading average of 311.7 coming in. The Bulldogs only managed Nick Fitzgerald's 1-yard TD run midway through the second quarter.

For one half, No. 17 Kentucky's offense showed the intensity that helped earn its first Top 25 in nearly 11 years. When things sputtered afterward against South Carolina, the Wildcats' defense rose to the challenge with clutch plays to ensure their new-found status ended on a high note.

Their strong start was certainly critical, too.

Benny Snell, Jr. ran for 99 yards and one of Kentucky's three consecutive first-half touchdowns and the Wildcats held on for a 24-10 victory over South Carolina on Saturday night.

Kentucky (5-0, 3-0 Southeastern Conference) quashed initial concerns about a letdown following their first ranking

since November 2007 by scoring on four straight drives to lead 24-3 at halftime. The Wildcats ended up needing that cushion to offset a scoreless second half and Jake Bentley's 58-yard, third quarter TD pass to Deebo Samuel that kept the Gamecocks (2-2, 1-2) within striking distance.

Mike Edwards' interception with 3:47 remaining snuffed one chance by the Gamecocks before they turned the ball over on downs in the final minute. Those defensive stands sealed Kentucky's fifth consecutive series win and continued its best SEC start since 1977.

The Wildcats registered four turnovers, including interceptions by Derrick Baity, Darius West and Edwards. They scored 10 points off a fumble and interception before West and Edwards picked off Bentley and preserved a second consecutive SEC win by double digits.

And it's still a work in progress.

Snell's rushing yardage on 28 carries also made him the third Wildcat to break 3,000 in a career. His 4-yard score with 4:53 remaining in the second quarter extended his TD record to 40. Quarterback Terry Wilson and A.J. Rose ran for TDs from 1 and 24 yards as Kentucky edged South Carolina 327-321 in yardage.

Despite a valiant effort by its defense, No. 13 Kentucky suffered its first loss of the season on Saturday night, falling 20-14 to Texas A&M in overtime at Kyle Field.

The Wildcats' offense struggled all night against a stout Aggies' defense. Kentucky managed just 178 yards of total offense, with star running back Benny Snell, Jr. held to a season-low 60 yards rushing. Quarterback Terry Wilson passed for 108 yards and a touchdown in the game.

But it was the defense that allowed Kentucky to stay close. Darius West had a huge game with 10 tackles, an interception and a fumble recovery for a 40-yard touchdown that tied the game late in regulation. Mike Edwards had nine tackles, including three

tackles for loss.

The game was scoreless until late in the first quarter, when Kentucky got the scoring going. Wilson connected with Lynn Bowden, Jr. on a 54-yard touchdown toss/pass and Miles Butler's extra point gave the Cats a 7-0 lead with 1:10 left in the period. That would be the score after one quarter of play.

It stayed that way until just before halftime, when Texas A&M drove 70 yards in 13 plays, finishing with a three-yard touchdown pass from Kellen Mond to Quartney Davis, tying the game at 7-7 with 1:14 to go in the half. The game would be tied at that score at the break.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but in the fourth period, momentum seemed to shift in Kentucky's favor. An interception by West gave Kentucky the ball near midfield, setting the Cats up for a potential go-ahead score. But Kentucky went three-and-out, and Rashad Hall returned the ensuing punt to the Kentucky 46, giving A&M the momentum back.

The Aggies took immediate advantage, with the help of a lucky bounce. On the second play after the punt return, Mond's pass, intended for Camron Buckley, glanced off of Buckley's hands and into the arms of Jace Sternberger, who took it 46 yards for a touchdown, giving A&M a 14-7 lead with 10:13 to play in the game.

Inside the final five minutes of regulation, A&M appeared to be ready to put the game away. On a third down and one, Derrick Baity, Jr. forced a Mond fumble, which was recovered by West, who returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. Butler's PAT tied the game at 14-14 with 4:17 to play in regulation.

The teams would be tied 14-14 at the end of regulation, forcing overtime. Kentucky's offensive possession stalled, and Butler's 43-yard field goal hit the crossbar, coming up just short. A&M would need just four plays to score, capped by a Trayveon Williams 10-yard touchdown run to win the game.

Kentucky has next weekend off before returning to SEC action on October 20 by hosting Vanderbilt at Kroger Field.

Kentucky's hope of winning with style coming out of an off week quickly evolved into doing whatever it could to get past Vanderbilt.

The No. 14 Wildcats eventually succeeded behind the reliable combination of running back Benny Snell, Jr. and a fierce, opportunistic defense that wouldn't break.

Snell rushed for 169 yards, including the go-ahead 7-yard run with 8:04 remaining that helped Kentucky pull away for a 14-7 victory over Vanderbilt.

The Wildcats clinched bowl eligibility for a third consecutive season and stayed in contention in the East division

with their third straight victory over the Commodores (3-5, 0-4). But it took nose guard Quinton Bohanna to force Jamauri Wakefield's fourth-down fumble that he recovered at the 20 midway through the fourth quarter to jump-start Kentucky from game-long inconsistency.

Snell took control from there, rushing 10 times for 74 yards on the drive that ended with his ninth TD run. The junior rushed 32 times for his 16th career 100-yard game on a blustery night that Kentucky had to work hard to outgain Vanderbilt 298-284.

The SEC's rushing leader also factored big in Kentucky's game-tying scoring drive by carrying eight times for 39 yards, including a 3-yard run to the Commodores' 5. Quarterback Terry Wilson capped it with a short TD pass to Lynn Bowden on the next play, but Snell set the tone.

Bohanna's play was one of four forced four fumbles with two recoveries, the second by Mike Edwards with 1:04 left that sealed the outcome. The Wildcats also recorded four sacks.

"We pride ourselves on being the best team out there and making big plays," said linebacker Josh Allen, who had two sacks among eight tackles.

Vanderbilt played without leading rusher Ke'Shawn Vaughn, who did not make the trip after getting hurt last week against Florida. The Commodores converted a first-quarter takeaway into Kyle Shurmur's 29-yard TD pass to C.J. Bolar, but that was their only lead as they rushed for just 68 yards.

Vanderbilt coach Derek Mason said his decision to go for the first down instead of kicking a field goal in the fourth quarter was based on an earlier missed kick.

It was the third failed fourth-down conversion of the game for the Wildcats. But a few minutes later, Bowden returned the punt for a touchdown and the comeback was on.
