WILDCATS RETURN TO ACTION SEEKING SIXTH VICTORY

Refreshed and ready to go, No. 14/17 Kentucky returns to action Saturday night when it hosts longtime rival Vanderbilt at Kroger Field. The Cats can become bowl eligible with a win and ensure at third consecutive season of finishing at least .500 in Southeastern Conference play by moving to 4-1 in the league. Kickoff is 7:30 p.m. ET and the game will air on the SEC Network.

Junior running back Benny Snell Jr. has continued his assault on the record books this season, piling up 699 yards with eight scores. He owns the school record with 40 career touchdowns and has moved into third place on the school's career rushing list while ranking second with 15 career 100-yard games.

The UK defense, led by senior pass rusher extraordinaire Josh Allen (6.0 sacks, 10.5 TFL), ranks among the nation's best units and has allowed just 13.3 points per game in league play, which includes an overtime game in its last outing at Texas A&M.

QUICK NOTES

- This is the 103rd anniversary of UK's first Homecoming game. For more on Homecoming, see page five of this release.
- UK is 7-3 in its last 10 SEC home games, tying its best 10-game home stretch in the history of Kroger Field/Commonwealth Stadium, going 7-3 from Nov. 9, 1974 to Nov. 19, 1977.
- UK has its most SEC wins over three seasons (11) since 1977-79 (11).
- UK is 14-6 in its last 20 regular season games. That's the best 20-game regular-season stretch since Sept. 8, 1984 to Nov. 2, 1985 (14-6).
- The Cats are currently No. 4 nationally in scoring defense (13.8 points per game) and No. 11 in total defense (303.2) yards per game.
- UK also ranks eighth in team passing efficiency defense (99.50), 26th in rushing defense (117.7).
- UK has allowed 83 points this season, fewest in the first six games of a season since 2008.
- UK has allowed just 53 points in SEC play this season, fewest in first three SEC games since 1977.
- UK has allowed 16 points or fewer in its first three SEC games for the first time since 1977.
- UK has allowed 20 points or less in all six games this season, first time since 1975 that UK has held six straight opponents to 20 or less.
- The Cats have rushed for an average of 223.5 yards per game, third in the SEC and 23rd in the nation in that category.
- Junior RB Benny Snell Jr. is third in the SEC and ranks ninth nationally in rushing yards per game (117.5). He is 11th in the nation in total rushing yards (699).
- Snell ranks seventh among active FBS players in career rushing yards with 3,123. He currently ranks third all-time at UK. To become UK's all-time leading rusher, Snell needs 713 yards to break Sonny Collins' (3,835/1972-75).
- Senior linebacker Josh Allen has been a pass rush terror so far this season. He is 10th in the nation with 10.5 tackles for loss. His six quarterback sacks also ranks 10th nationally. Allen was named to the midseason All-America teams by ESPN and Sporting News.
- Senior OG Bunchy Stallings was also named to the midseason All-America team by ESPN.
- With pickoffs in the last two games and a total of three for the season, senior safety Darius West is tied for the SEC lead in that category and is ninth nationally.
- Sophomore punter Max Duffy ranks second in the SEC and fifth nationally in punting at 46.8 yards per kick.
- Sophomore QB Terry Wilson is the first quarterback to begin his UK career 5-0 as the starting quarterback since Bill Ransdell in the first five games of the 1984 season.

- The 28-7 win over Mississippi State was UK's largest margin of victory vs. a ranked team since 1993 (Ole Miss, 21-0), the fewest points allowed vs. a ranked opponent and fewest yards allowed to a ranked team since that same game.
- Kentucky ended a 31-game drought against Florida with its 27-16 win in Gainesville on Sept. 8. UK's last win in Gainesville had been in 1979.
- This is Coach Mark Stoops' sixth season in Lexington and the Wildcats have either matched or exceeded the previous season's win total in each of the past five seasons.
- UK is one of only two schools in the nation that has tied or improved its win total in each of the last five seasons. The other is New Mexico State.
- Last season, the Wildcats finished 7-6, overall 4-4 in the SEC. It marked the first time in 40 years that UK has won at least seven games and finished at least .500 in the SEC in back-to-back seasons. It was UK's second consecutive 4-4 league mark, the first time the Wildcats have achieved that since 1998-99.
- UK finished third in the SEC Eastern Division in 2017 and second in 2016, marking UK's highest finishes since the league split into division in 1992.
- The Cats have appeared in back-to-back bowl games for the first time since 2009 and 2010.
- Five Wildcats have received preseason all-conference recognition, led by the sturdy legs of junior running back Benny Snell Jr. and the explosive playmaking of senior tight end C.J. Conrad on offense as well as the dynamic pass rushing of senior linebacker Josh Allen and Mr. Consistency senior safety Mike Edwards on defense. Sophomore all-purpose player Lynn Bowden Jr., has also been recognized as a receiver and return specialist.
- Six Wildcats are on national award watch lists. Josh Allen - Bednarik Award and Butkus Award; Lynn Bowden Jr. - Paul Hornung Award; C.J. Conrad - Allstate FCA Good Works Team, Mackey Award; Wuerffel Trophy; Mike Edwards - Bednarik Award, Thorpe Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy; Benny Snell Jr. - Doak Walker Award, Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Player of the Year; Max Duffy - Ray Guy Award
- UK had a new starting quarterback in the opener for the fourth consecutive season (2015 - Patrick Towles, 2016 - Drew Barker, 2017 - Stephen Johnson, 2018 - Terry Wilson) and eighth time in the past nine years (2010 - Mike Hartline, 2011 - Morgan Newton, 2012 Maxwell Smith, 2013 Jalen Whitlow).

CATS RANKED IN NATIONAL POLLS; FIRST TIME SINCE 2007

- Kentucky entered the national polls on Sept. 23 after defeating Mississippi State. It is the first time the Cats have been ranked since the 2007 season.
- The Cats now are No. 14 in the Associated Press poll and No. 17 in the coaches' poll.
- UK has been ranked three consecutive weeks for the first time since the 2007 team appeared in the polls for six consecutive weeks from Sept. 16 to Oct. 21.

GAME PROMOTIONS / VANDERBILT

- This is the 103rd anniversary of UK's first Homecoming game. The first one occurred on Nov. 25, 1915, as Kentucky defeated Tennessee 6-0. Early records are incomplete, but UK has hosted a Homecoming game every year since 1946 and owns a 51-21 record in those contests.
- During this weekend, Homecoming, Ag Roundup, Family Weekend, the Golden Wildcat Reunion, several college reunions and Alumni Band Reunion will take place. A complete listing of details and information are available at <http://www.ukalumni.net/homecoming>.
- A Homecoming King and Queen will be crowned at halftime of the game.
- Saturday's honorary captain is former LB/RB Wilbur Hackett (1968-70) - Hackett served as a pioneer of integration in SEC football, becoming the first African-American team captain in SEC history in 1969 ... Began his career playing with the freshman team, and later served as a three-year varsity starter, earning sophomore All-SEC honors in 1968 ... Was also named UK's co-Most Valuable Player as a senior and later served as a graduate assistant coach for two seasons ... Inducted into the UK Athletics Hall of Fame in 2009.
- The Cat Walk presented by Chevy is slated for 5:15 p.m. ET and will last until 30 minutes prior to the game's 7:30 p.m. ET kickoff. During the concert, the members of the team will make their way from the JCTF through Gate 12 and into the stadium. Fans are welcome to cheer the Wildcats as they enter Kroger Field.

SCOUTING VANDERBILT

- Vanderbilt is 3-4 on the season and 0-3 in league play. The Commodores are coming off a 37-27 loss at home vs. Florida.
- Vanderbilt is averaging 389.7 yards per game and has an accomplished passing attack that features quarterback Kyle Shurmer, who has 11 touchdown passes. The 'Dores average 238.1 yards per game through the air.

- Vanderbilt receiver Kalija Lipscomb is one of the SEC's best, having caught 49 passes for 560 yards and six scores already this season. He is second in the league in receptions and receiving TDs.
• Running back Ke'Shawn Vaughn has rushed for 495 yards and five touchdowns while averaging 6.9 yards per carry.
• Senior linebacker Jordan Griffin is second in the SEC in tackles with 68 stops.

SERIES VS. VANDERBILT

- Kentucky leads the all-time series 44-42-4, including 24-15-2 in Lexington.
• UK has won six of the past eight meetings that have taken place in Lexington.
• UK is riding back-to-back wins over the Commodores, including a 44-21 victory in Nashville last November.
• UK has held Vanderbilt to 22 points or less in each of the past five meetings.
• The first meeting between the schools came in 1896, a 6-0 Vanderbilt win in Nashville. Of SEC teams, only the Tennessee series dates back further (1893).
• Throughout the series' history it has typically featured close outcomes. Thirty-six meetings have been decided by a touchdown or less in the series.
• The Cats rushed for 232 yards last season and held Vanderbilt to just 60.
• With 258 yards on the ground in 2016, UK is averaging 245.0 rushing yards in the past two games vs. Vanderbilt.
• Benny Snell Jr. had 116 yards and three touchdowns rushing on 17 carries vs. Vanderbilt last season.

- Kentucky has three players from the state of Tennessee on its roster: DL Quinton Bohanna (Cordova) and OL Darian Kinnard and DB Domonique Williams (Knoxville).
• Vanderbilt has one player from Kentucky: OL Saige Young (Versailles).

- Kentucky would be 6-1, their best seven-game start to a season since 2007 (also 6-1)
• Kentucky would be 4-1 in SEC play, their best five-game SEC start to a season since 1977 (5-0)
• Mark Stoops would tie Rich Brooks for the third most wins at Kroger Field by a Kentucky head coach (25)
• Mark Stoops would tie Harry Gamage for sixth place on Kentucky's career wins list (32)

MILESTONES TO WATCH

- Junior RB **Benny Snell Jr.** has 3,123 career rushing yards and is third all-time on Kentucky's career rushing list. He needs 210 yards to tie Moe Williams (3,333 from 1993-95) for second.
- Snell has 15 career 100-yard rushing games, which is second on UK's career chart. He needs three more to tie Sonny Collins (1972-75).
- Snell now has 40 career touchdowns, surpassing Randall Cobb (37) to become UK's all-time leader in career touchdowns.
- Snell ranks fourth on UK's career scoring list with 242 points. He needs one more touchdown to move past Joey Worley (246) for third place.
- Senior WR **Dorian Baker** has 97 career receptions and needs just three more to become the 16th player to reach 100 for his UK career. He needs 32 to crack UK's career top 10 list.
- Baker has 1,115 career receiving yards, ranking 25th in school history. He needs 85 yards to tie Steve Johnson (1,200 from 2006-07) for 24th.
- Senior TE **C.J. Conrad** counts nine touchdowns among his 66 career receptions, giving him a scoring grab once in every 7.3 catches.
- Senior S **Mike Edwards** has nine career interceptions. With one more he'd move into a tie for fourth with Larry Carter (1977-79), Buzz Burnam (1970-72) and Marcus McClinton (2004-08).
- Edwards has 269 career tackles and needs 31 to join the UK 300-tackle club. He would be the 19th member of that exclusive club.
- Senior LB **Josh Allen** has 20.5 career sacks, moving him into third place on UK's all-time list. He needs three sacks to tie Bud Dupree for second place in UK history.
- Senior CB **Derrick Baity Jr.** has 22 career pass breakups and needs four more to match Leonard Burress (2000-03), Eric Kelly (1997-2000) and Van Hiles (1993-96) for third on UK's career list.

- Kentucky would win their first five home games in a season for the first time since 2014 and the fifth time in Kroger Field history (1977, 1987, 2007, 2014)
- Give UK three straight wins over Vanderbilt.
- Give UK three straight home wins over Vanderbilt.
- Make the Cats bowl eligible for the third consecutive season.
- Make it three consecutive wins at home over SEC opponents and 5-1 over the past six league games at Kroger Field.

IN OUR LAST GAME...

- Kentucky's defense did everything anyone could have expected of it. Then the Wildcats did more but Texas A&M prevailed in overtime on Oct. 6 in College Station, 20-14.
- In spite of being on the field for 75 plays and nearly 35 minutes, the defense kept the Cats in it at Texas A&M. Then, Derrick Baity forced a fumble and Darius West picked it up for a game-tying touchdown late in the fourth quarter.
- The first and only overtime period brought a sack on third-and-two and an ensuing missed field goal, while A&M ran four straight times for a touchdown.
- Record-setting running back Benny Snell Jr. was held to 60 yards on 13 carries, while quarterback Terry Wilson was sacked six times and completed 13-of-20 passes for 108 yards.
- Senior safety Darius West had a magnificent game, scoring a touchdown on a 40-yard fumble return, grabbing an interception, and leading the Wildcats with 10 tackles. He collected his third interception of the year early in the fourth quarter.
- Senior safety Mike Edwards had nine tackles, including three for loss.

OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

- "Balance" has been the hallmark of the Kentucky offense the last two seasons under Eddie Gran, UK assistant head coach for offense.
- The Wildcats have rushed for more than 2,000 yards and passed for more than 2,000 yards in each of the previous two campaigns, the first time in school history that UK has done so in back-to-back seasons.

BIG PLAYS SPUR KENTUCKY OFFENSE

- Before the season, UK assistant head coach for offense Eddie Gran noted the need for more big plays, and to this point, the Wildcats have done just that.
- In the first six games of the 2017 season, UK had eight offensive touchdown plays of at least 20 yards in length. This year, the Cats have already struck for 13 TDs of at least 20 yards.
- When you move the benchmark to 25-yard touchdowns, the contrast increases significantly. In the first six games of 2017, UK had just three touchdown plays of at least 25 yards in length. In 2018, the Cats have already struck for eight TDs of 25+ yards.

REACHING THE CENTURY MARK, TIMES TWO

- Kentucky is one of just six teams in FBS to have a pair of 100-yard rushers in two separate games this season.
- Against Florida, Benny Snell Jr. (175) and Terry Wilson (105) each topped the century mark, while Snell (125) and A.J. Rose (104) did so against Central Michigan.
- The other five schools to accomplish the feat include Mississippi State (three times), Louisiana (2), Maryland (2), Oregon (2) and Troy (2).

Quarterbacks

- Starting the season, quarterbacks coach Darin Hinshaw had a big challenge, as no quarterback on the roster had thrown a pass in a major-college game.
- Junior-college transfer Terry Wilson (sophomore eligibility) won the starting job and has started every game this season, completing 66.4 percent of his passes for 703 yards and three touchdowns. He's also dangerous as a runner with 304 yards and three TDs. Wilson, who redshirted as a freshman at Oregon, threw for 2,133 yards and 26 touchdowns last season in juco.
- Wilson was the "Manning Quarterback of the Week" after accounting for 256 yards total offense and three touchdowns (one rushing, two passing) in the win at Florida.
- Sophomore Gunnar Hoak saw his first UK action vs. Central Michigan, entering the game in the second quarter and directing a touchdown drive just before halftime, capped by his 24-yard TD toss to David Bouvier. He also threw a touchdown pass in the win over Murray State.
- Redshirt freshman Danny Clark displayed a strong arm in practice last season and scored a two-yard rushing touchdown on his first career rushing attempt in the Murray State game.
- The quarterbacks were forced to replace Stephen Johnson, a tenacious leader who posted a 14-10 record as the primary QB and led UK to two bowl games in the last two seasons.
- Among Power 5 schools, Terry Wilson and Benny Snell Jr., have the fifth-most combined rushing yards for a quarterback/running back duo this season:

PART OF THE GRAN-D DESIGN

- Since taking over the Kentucky running game upon his arrival in 2016, Eddie Gran has fashioned the Cats into one of the more physical and prolific rushing attacks not only in the SEC, but in the country. The Cats averaged 234.2 rushing yards per game in 2016, Gran's first in Lexington and then 161.7 yards per game last season. Those numbers are significant in that only twice in the previous 20 seasons had a UK offense rushed for more than 162 yards per game (2015 and 2009) and not for more than 200 per game since 1993 (210.5).
- Gran has mentored the likes of Benny Snell Jr. and Stanley "Boom" Williams at Kentucky, Chris Thompson, Devonta Freeman and James Wilder Jr. (Florida State), Montario Hardesty (Tennessee), Carnell Williams, Ronnie Brown, Kenny Irons and Rudi Johnson (Auburn) and





Deuce McAllister (Ole Miss). During his 23 seasons as a running backs coach he's spent 20 of those against top-shelf competition in the SEC and Atlantic Coast Conference, making the numbers even more impressive.

- Some of the more compelling stats from Gran's 23 seasons at Ole Miss (1995-98), Auburn (1999-2008), Tennessee (2009), Florida State (2010-12), Cincinnati (2013-15) and Kentucky:
- 17 seasons averaging at least 150.0 rushing yards per game
- 10 seasons averaging at least 172.0 rushing yards per game
- 10 individual 1,000-yard rushers
- Eight seasons with a running back who scored at least 10 rushing touchdowns
- Three seasons averaging at least 200.0 rushing yards per game
- Only once has his running attack averaged less than 100.0 yards per game
- Only twice has his running attack averaged less than 125.0 yards per game

Running Backs

- The UK backfield is headlined by Benny Snell Jr., but goes much deeper than UK's All-SEC ballcarrier.
- Snell is averaging 116.5 yards per game, which leads the SEC and is eighth in the nation.
- Snell (125 yards) and sophomore A.J. Rose (104) each surpassed the century mark and scored two touchdowns vs. Central Michigan. It was a career-high performance for Rose, who scored from 55 yards away on his first carry of the season. Rose has run for 237 yards this season with three touchdowns and is averaging 6.6 yards per carry.
- Snell (175) and QB Terry Wilson (105) each surpassed the century mark at Florida, giving UK back-to-back games with 100-yard rushers for the first time since 1979.
- Snell is the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons. He is already third in school history with 3,063 career yards and owns the school record for rushing TDs and total touchdowns with 40.

Tight Ends

- Kentucky returns a mixture of talent at the tight end spot in 2018, highlighted by All-SEC tight end C.J. Conrad. He is second on the team this season with 16 receptions. He has now totaled 66 receptions for 811 yards and nine TDs in his three-year career.
- Conrad is joined by junior Justin Rigg (6-6, 257), who has been an excellent blocker and also is a pass-catching threat.

Wide Receivers

- The Kentucky wide receivers are somewhat younger this season after the departure of four key contributors, but a pair of veterans and several gifted youngsters give UK the ability to have a capable receiving corps.
- It was bad news at the time, of course, but senior Dorian Baker's season-ending injury in August, 2017, has enabled him to return for a fifth year. Baker has caught 97 passes for 1,115 yards and six touchdowns during his career.
- Sophomore Lynn Bowden leads the team in catches, ranking eighth in the SEC in receptions per game. He has a pair of career-long 54-yard scoring strikes, on the road at Florida and Texas A&M.
- David Bouvier, a fifth-year senior who had caught only one pass entering this season, has emerged as a dependable receiver. He has six catches, two for touchdowns, and averages 18.7 per catch.
- Sophomore receivers Josh Ali and Isaiah Epps have seen action in all six games and have caught five and two passes, respectively.
- Sophomore Zy'Aire Hughes scored a 49-yard touchdown on his first career offensive touch, ironically not being credited with a catch on the play after Benny Snell Jr. took the direct snap, passed to quarterback Terry Wilson, who latered to Hughes.
- Freshman Allen Dailey Jr. (2 catches, 38 yards) scored his first career touchdown on an impressive 23-yard run and catch vs. Murray State.

Offensive Line

- Offensive line coach John Schlarman is in his sixth season at Kentucky and once again his line is ready and able. The line boasts four returning starters who has helped Benny Snell Jr., become the first player in school history with 1,000 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons.
- Sophomore Drake Jackson, out of Woodford County High School, took over the center position midway in the 2017 season and has been a fixture ever since.
- Senior Bunchy Stallings is a two-year starter in the offensive line, currently stationed at right guard. He was named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week after the wins against Florida and Mississippi State.
- Senior George Asafo-Adjei (6-5, 315) has started every game at right tackle and was named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week after the win over South Carolina.

- The Wildcats got a bad break during August practice when junior Landon Young, a returning starter at left tackle, sustained a knee injury and is out for the season. Redshirt freshman Naasir Watkins and sophomore E.J. Price are sharing the position. It is Price's first action at UK after sitting out a year via transfer from Southern California. Watkins is currently out indefinitely after sustaining a sprained knee vs. South Carolina.
- Junior Logan Stenberg (6-6, 320) is in his second season as the starter at left guard.
- Sophomores Mason Wolfe and Luke Fortner have provided the reserve help at the center/guard positions.

SPECIAL TEAMS PREVIEW

- Special teams coordinator Dean Hood brings a wealth of knowledge to the program as he is in his 31st year of college coaching.
- Senior kicker Miles Butler as made 3 of 6 field goals this season and all 23 extra points. He is succeeding four-year starter Austin MacGinnis (2014-17), UK's all-time scoring leader with 359 points.
- True freshman Chance Poore as shown a long-distance leg and could be called upon for long field goals. He was the No. 1 punter/kicker in the 2018 class by ProKicker.com.
- For the second-consecutive season, UK has an Australian transplant handling the punting duties. Max Duffy has done very well, ranking second in the SEC and fifth nationally with a 46.8-yard average. Half of his punts, 14 of 28, have been within the opponent 20-yard line, yet he also has only one touchback. He arrived in the United States as an early enrollee in January and used the off-season to learn American football rules, how to say "ya'll" and how to put on his pads correctly. Another Aussie, Matt Panton, was UK's punter in 2017. Duffy is currently on the watch





list for the Ray Guy Award given annually to the nation's top punter.

- Hood's special teams blocked three kicks in 2017, two of which were crucial plays in Wildcat wins. UK special teams did not allow any blocked kicks nor allow a punt or kickoff return for a touchdown.
- Junior Grant McKinniss, the starting punter in 2016, is handling the kickoff duties this season.
- Senior Tristan Yeomans returns to handle the long snapping for punts, while junior Blake Best is the snapper for field goals and PATs.
- The kickoff return specialist, Lynn Bowden Jr., set UK records last season for most kickoff returns in a season (37), game (7 vs. Louisville) and most kickoff yards in a season (869). His 869 kickoff return yards ranked eighth most in SEC history. He is averaging 20.2 yards per return this season.
- Senior David Bouvier has been handling punt returns and is averaging 6.4 per return.

THREE-AND-OUT THREAT

- In the first six games of the season the Kentucky defense has forced 28 three-and-outs by opposing offenses.
- The Cats are among the national leaders in average three-and-outs forced per game at 4.67/game, which currently ranks 19th nationally. Appalachian State ads the way at 6.4/game.
- UK is forcing a three-and-out on 41.2 percent of its defensive series.

DEFENSIVE PREVIEW

- The Kentucky defense will be one of the most experienced in the Southeastern Conference and the nation this season, with depth and size at each level of the unit. Seniors Josh Allen, Derrick Baity Jr., Mike Edwards, Jordan Jones, Adrian Middleton, Darius West and Chris Westry all have extensive resumes of quality play and give UK a chance to continue building on last season's successes.

Linebackers

- First-year outside linebackers coach Brad White inherited one of the nation's top pass rushers, Josh Allen, when he came on board in the spring.
- Allen has been a force on the outside, improving his numbers each season even as he sees more and more attention from opponents. The senior could have left for the NFL Draft but decided to come back for his final year, giving the Cats one of scariest pass rushers in the country.
- Allen has begun his senior year with a bang, totaling 37 tackles, 10.5 for loss, 6.0 sacks, and he caused a fumble that UK returned for a touchdown to clinch the win over Florida.
- Weakside linebacker Jordan Jones has 31 tackles, including 3.5 for loss, and had four



pass breakups vs. Murray State. He missed four games last season due to injury but is looking to return to his 2016 form when he totaled 109 tackles and earned All-SEC honors.

- Sophomore Jamar "Boogie" Watson started the opener at strongside linebacker and had a career-high six tackles, along with a pass breakup. He has three sacks on the season.
- Junior middle linebacker Kash Daniel is the successor to the graduated Courtney Love after a two-year apprenticeship. Daniel ranks second on the team with 41 tackles.
- Seeing significant reserve action at the inside linebacker posts are redshirt freshman Jamin Davis (seven tackles, one interception) and true freshmen DeAndre Square (14 tackles) and Chris Oats (10 tackles).
- Oats made his first career start at Texas A&M, notching his first career sack in the process.

Secondary

- Coach Steve Clinkscale is in his third season as the secondary coach and is joined by Dean Hood, who is sliding from linebackers to work with the defensive backs. The pair has nine experienced players to utilize, which gives UK one of the deepest units in the SEC at cornerback and safety.
- UK opponents have completed only 52 percent of their passes this season and the Wildcats rank eighth in the nation in pass efficiency defense.
- Senior safety Mike Edwards has earned a reputation as one of the league's top defensive backs. He was first-team All-SEC as a junior and second-team All-SEC as a sophomore. He flirted with declaring for the NFL Draft a year early but returned in 2018.
- Edwards has nine career interceptions, one this season.

- Senior Darius West is second for the SEC lead in total passes defended with seven, five pass breakups and three interceptions.
- West leads for the team lead in tackles with 47 and had a game-tying 40-yard fumble return for a touchdown in the closing minutes of regulation at Texas A&M. He also had an interception in that game.
- Sophomore Davonte Robinson is a backup safety. He has nine tackles this season and, on the final play of the game, returned a fumble 30 yards for a touchdown at Florida.
- Seniors Derrick Baity Jr. and Chris Westry are back together for a final season as two of the most experienced players in the SEC. The two have played in 86 combined games with 67 starts and snatched nine interceptions. Both players have more than 100 career tackles and at least 13 pass breakups. Baity was named SEC co-Defensive Player of the Week after having a hand in three turnovers in the second half of the Cats' 23-13 road win at South Carolina last season.
- Junior Jordan Griffin has been a luxury for the Cats the past two seasons, a player capable of starting who gave the defense three legitimate SEC cornerbacks against offenses increasingly deploying more receivers. Griffin picked off his first pass in a win over Vanderbilt and made 22 tackles in 13 games last season.
- Junior college transfer Lonnie Johnson Jr. showed big-time playmaking ability at

cornerback in his first season at UK with 41 total tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack and five pass breakups. He also blocked an extra point against Eastern Kentucky and started the final five games of the season. With a year of experience he is considered an important piece of the defensive puzzle in 2018.

- Freshman Tyrell Ajian has seen action as a sixth defensive back and had a crucial interception and pass breakup in the win over Mississippi State.

Defensive Line

- In his second season on the UK staff defensive line, coach Derrick LeBlanc likes what he sees this season. Despite not having a senior starter in 2017 the Cats held six opponents to less than 100 yards rushing, the first time a UK defense had done that since 1949.
- UK has played eight down linemen so far this season, the best depth the Wildcats have had on the front line in many years.
- Senior Adrian Middleton is in his third season as the starting defensive tackle. He has 72 tackles, including 10.0 for loss, during his career.
- Junior T.J. Carter really came on the second half of the 2017 season with three tackles for loss and three sacks over the final five games of the regular season. The defensive end started 12 games and recorded 18.0 tackles to go along with the tackles for loss and sacks. He also had two quarterback hurries and a pass breakup.
- UK was hit with heartbreaking news in fall camp when sophomore defensive end Josh Paschal was diagnosed with melanoma in his right foot. Paschal is undergoing treatment and his return is uncertain. Last season, he showed flashes of brilliance with 4.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks and had bulked up to 278 pounds in the offseason. He had a critical

blocked punt in the win over Eastern Michigan and was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week.

- The towering presence on the UK defensive line is Calvin Taylor Jr., who stands 6-foot-9. The junior earned his first start against Northwestern in the Music City Bowl and finished the 2017 season with 22 tackles, 1.0 tackle for loss and 1.0 sack.
- Senior Tymere Dubose is part of the Youngstown-Lexington pipeline and should see significant time at tackle this season. In 25 career games he has 17 tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss and a sack.
- Sophomore nose guard Quinton Bohanna opened some eyes in 2017 as a true freshman, stepping in and playing very well without having any collegiate experience. The 340-pounder started the final five games of the season and was credited with 14 tackles on the year.
- Junior Phil Hoskins and sophomore Kordell Looney showed flashes in 2017 and will provide much-needed depth on the interior of the line. Hoskins has sacks on the road at Florida and Texas A&M..

DEPTH CHARGE IN THE D-LINE

- A key factor of the Kentucky defense this season has been the improved depth in the down lineman positions – noseguard, tackle and end -- in UK's 3-4 defense.
- Eight Wildcats have seen significant action this season in the D-Line – noseguards Quinton Bohanna, Tymere Dubose and Marquan McCall; tackles Adrian Middleton and Phil Hoskins; and ends Calvin Taylor, Kordell Looney and T.J. Carter. A year ago, UK used fewer players and the starters played significantly more snaps.
- The ability to keep a fresher rotation in the game is paying off significantly. This year's D-Line has combined for 7.0 tackles for loss,

including 4.5 quarterback sacks, to this point of the season. For the entire season last year, the interior linemen had 11 TFL and five sacks.

LIVING ON THE EDGE

- Kentucky pass rushing aficionado Josh Allen has taken up residence in opposing quarterbacks' minds for several years but now has a young protege who is looking to be the Cats' next great edge rusher.
- Allen has 20.5 sacks and 29.0 tackles for loss in 44 career games. He also has forced eight fumbles, picked off a pass and registered 12 quarterback hurries.
- Through six games this season, Allen has totaled 37 tackles, 10.5 tackles for loss (46 yards), six sacks (35 yards), five QB hurries, two forced fumbles and three pass break-ups. He leads the SEC in sacks and TFL per game.

ALLEN'S SACKS SET THE TONE

- Josh Allen's sacks so far this season have set the tone for the defense. Of the opponents' six offensive drives in which Josh Allen has registered a sack, the opponents have had a total of 40 plays run for 114 yards of total offense, just 2.85 yards per play. Those six drives resulted in zero points scored, three punts, and three turnovers. Here's a breakdown:

BENNY IN THE RECORD BOOKS

Throughout his career, Benny Snell Jr. has continued to etch his name into the Kentucky record books. Here's a snapshot of his records in each of his three seasons:

FRESHMAN:

- In 2016, earned All-SEC Freshman honors after rushing a team-high 186 times for 1,091 yards and 13 touchdowns, averaging 5.9 yards per carry
- The 1,091 rushing yards is a school record for most rushing yards by a freshman, besting Moe Williams who had 928 rushing yards as a freshman in 1993
- Had 13 rushing touchdowns, breaking Randall Cobb (2008)'s record for most rushing TDs by a UK freshman (7) and most total touchdowns (9)
- Had the most rushing TDs in a single season (13) since Artose Pinner had 13 in 2002
- With 152 yards against Austin Peay, he eclipsed 100 yards on the ground for the fifth time, setting the school's freshman record for most 100-yard rushing games in a season
- First UK player with a rushing touchdown in three consecutive games since Derrick Locke in 2010 and first freshman with a rushing touchdown in three consecutive games since Randall Cobb in 2008
- First freshman in school history to have 100 rushing yards and a rushing touchdown in three consecutive games
- His career-high 192 yards rushing vs. Mizzou set a school record for most rushing yards by a freshman in a single game ... Previous high was Derick Logan's 186 yards against Mississippi State on Nov. 9, 1996
- The 192 rushing yards tied for the ninth most in a single game in school history and the most since Rafael Little rushed for 198 yards vs. Vanderbilt on Nov. 12, 2005
- His 38 carries vs. Mizzou were the most since Derick Logan had 41 attempts vs. Mississippi State in 1996
- His five rushing TDs in the first four games of 2016 were the most by a UK player in his first four games of his freshman season in school history
- Had one of the best rushing touchdown-to-carry ratios by any Kentucky player since rushing TDs were tracked at UK beginning in 1949 (min. 100 career carries)
- Finished ninth in the SEC in total rushing yards per game (83.9)

SOPHOMORE:

- In 2017, earned All-SEC First Team honors after totaling 1,333 total rushing yards and 19 TDs
- Set the UK career record for rushing TDs (32)
- Became the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons

SNAP TO IT

- Kentucky entered the season without any quarterback on its roster having ever stepped on the playing field during a game, as none of the Cats' top four projected quarterbacks have taken an FBS snap. Furthermore, this is the first time since 2000 that the Cats open a season without a quarterback having thrown a single pass.
- The Cats are one of the few programs in the country in that position this season, with Minnesota and Nebraska also opening the year without any experience. For Kentucky, returnees Danny Clark, Gunnar Hoak and Walker Wood all watched the 2017 season, while signee Terry Wilson came from junior college after a redshirt season at Oregon. Nebraska will have a transfer with FBS experience on its roster but he is sitting out as a transfer, while Minnesota has only freshmen and redshirt freshmen.

- Senior kicker Miles Butler has been named a semifinalist for the prestigious 2018 Campbell Award which recognizes the nation's best football scholar-athlete.
- Butler earned a full scholarship from head coach Mark Stoops during fall camp for his work ethic on and off the field during his four-year career as a Wildcat.
- Butler excels in the classroom and in leadership roles. He is on track to graduate in December with a perfect 4.0 grade point average and will earn two degrees in finance and accounting, along with a minor in economics. He is a three-time SEC Honor Roll member and has been named to the Dean's List seven semesters. This summer, Butler completed an internship with Financial Intern, Ullico in Washington, D.C.
- Butler is a Beta Alpha Psi Business/Accounting fraternity member and the coordinator/tutor for the LEAP Tutoring Lab where he was selected as the student coordinator in the summer of 2017. He oversees all tutors, coordinates schedules, attends meetings with faculty to help improve accounting curriculum across the college of business. He also serves as the team liaison with the athletic ticket office and serves as a recruitment liaison by hosting, meeting with, and giving tours to potential special team recruits and their families.
- He's also been active in community service projects, working with the Special Olympics, serving food to homeless people for Lighthouse Ministries, volunteering at the Indian Summer Camp for children's cancer survivors and participating in food packing and delivery for God's Pantry.

EARNED NOT GIVEN

three kicks, with all three punts being placed within the 20-yard line. In 2015, he made all four of his field goal attempts and 11 of 12 PATs. His career long field goal is 46 yards. The 5-foot-9, 165-pounder has been named to the Dean's List for seven semesters and earned SEC Academic Honor Roll for 2015-17.

- Johnson (Cincinnati, Ohio) is in his third season with the program after opting to walk on out of Colerain High School. The 5-foot-10, 185-pound back saw action in eight games last season on special teams and returned a pair of kickoffs for 35 yards.

HERE, THERE, EVERYWHERE

- While most college football programs recruit regionally, Kentucky has expanded its reach as far west as Colorado, east to New Jersey, north to Michigan and south to Florida. Furthermore, the Cats have a second punter/kicker in as many years from Australia, tapping into the ranks of young men who have a history with Australian rules football.
- The Cats' geographic roster breaks down in 17 different states and Australia: Ohio (28), Kentucky (27), Florida (19), Georgia (11), Maryland (3), Oklahoma (3), Tennessee (3), Alabama (3), Louisiana (2), Michigan (2), Colorado (1), Indiana (1), Mississippi (1), New Jersey (1), North Carolina (1), Virginia (1), South Carolina (1) and Australia (1).

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

- UK's uniform preparers have a little extra work to do this season and a little less space with which to do it. The Cats have 10 players whose names have "Jr." in it, two that are hyphenated and three that could stump even the top finishers in the National Spelling Bee.
- The 10 players who are a "Jr." include: Derrick Baity Jr., Lynn Bowden Jr., Allen Dailey Jr., Christopher Rodriguez Jr., Cedrick Dort Jr., Lonnie Johnson Jr., E.J. Price (Edward Junior), Benny Snell Jr., Calvin Taylor Jr., and Clevan Thomas Jr.
- The Cats also have Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald, who has 16 characters in his last name, as well as George Asafo-Adjei and three Berezowitz brothers (Brayden, Bryan and Zac).

HANGING WITH THE HOME-IES

- When Kentucky broke through under former coach Rich Brooks from 2006-09 it was done in large part because of a home-grown nucleus led by quarterback Andre' Woodson (Radcliff), wide receiver Keenan Burton (Louisville), tight end Jacob Tamme (Danville), defensive tackle Corey Peters (Louisville) and others.
- It's notable that the team once again has a strong group of young men from the Commonwealth.
- The offensive line that has paved the way for 223.5 rushing yards per game is coached



by home-grown John Schlarman and piloted by center Drake Jackson (Versailles). The team's leader in touchdown receptions in Lexington's David Bouvier, the second-leading tackler is Kash Daniel (Paintsville) and the game-clinching defensive score vs. Florida came from Davonte Robinson (Lexington).



ROSE IS AN EAGLE

- Junior RB A.J. Rose earned an Eagle Scout, the highest achievement or rank attainable in the Boy Scouting program of the Boy Scouts of America
- Only four percent of Boy Scouts are granted this rank after a lengthy review process

THE STREAK IS BROKEN ...

- On Sept. 8, Kentucky ended a 31-game drought against the Florida Gators.
- Was UK's first win in Gainesville since 1979 and first time UK has defeated a ranked UF team in Gainesville.
 - Was UK's first win over a ranked Florida team since 1976, when UF was ranked No. 15.
 - Moved the Cats to 2-0 for the second straight season and fourth time in the past five years.
 - Won SEC opener for the second year in a row, first time that has been accomplished since 2006-07.
 - Won SEC road opener for the second year in a row, first time that has been accomplished since 1983-84.



COUCH NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT

Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch has been named to the 2019 ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, the National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame announced. Couch is one of 76 players and six coaches from the Football Bowl Subdivision and 100 players and 32 coaches from the divisional ranks.

- A storied name of the Kentucky program, Couch, was the team's quarterback from 1996-98. After giving up his senior season of eligibility, he was drafted as the No. 1 pick by Cleveland in the 1999 NFL Draft. In 1998, the junior quarterback was named a first-team All-American and consensus Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Couch completed 400 of 553 passes for 4,275 yards and 36 touchdowns and led the nation in pass completions while ranked second in completion percentage, passing yardage and touchdown passes, and fourth in total offense. After guiding the Wildcats to the Outback Bowl, UK's first New Year's Day bowl appearance in 47 years, Couch finished fourth in Heisman Trophy balloting. He was also a finalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award as a junior and sophomore. His breakout sophomore campaign featured 363 of 547 passes completed for 3,884 yards and 37 touchdowns while leading the nation in pass attempts, completions, yardage, and completion percentage. Also during his sophomore year, Couch earned second-team All-SEC honors and finished ninth in Heisman voting. He played in seven games as a true freshman, with two starts. Career wise, Couch completed 795 passes on 1,184 attempts for 8,435 yards and 74 touchdowns. The legend ended his career with seven NCAA records, 14 SEC records, and 26 school records.
- The announcement of the 2019 Class will be made Monday, Jan. 7, 2019, in Santa Clara, Calif. The city is serving as the host for the CFP National Championship, which will be played later that day at Levi's Stadium.

- Was Kentucky's first win over a ranked opponent since winning at No. 11 Louisville in 2016.
- Was UK's first win over a ranked SEC opponent since No. 25 Missouri in 2015.
- Was UK's first road win over a ranked SEC opponent since 1998 at No. 21 LSU.
- Was UK's largest margin of victory in a road win vs. a ranked SEC opponent (11 points) since October 15th, 1977 at LSU (20 points)
- The 16 points scored by Florida was the second-lowest total for the Gators in the series since 1986. The Gators scored 14 in 2015 in a 14-9 win in Lexington.
- Kentucky was the first school to rush for at least 300 yards against Florida since 2002 (Miami (FL), September 7, 2002).
- Benny Snell was the fourth SEC player since 2000 to rush for 175+ yards at Florida (Travis Stephens, Marcus Lattimore, Trent Richardson).
- Terry Wilson is the only player since 2000 to have at least 150 passing yards and 100 rushing yards in a single game against Florida.
- Game balls were awarded to offensive line coach John Schlarman, who is battling serious illness, and sophomore defensive end Josh Paschal, who is currently out of action while receiving treatment for a malignant melanoma on his foot.
- Kentucky earned Reveal Suits National Team of the Week as selected by the Football Writers Association of America.

UK ADEPT AT HOLDING THIRD-QUARTER LEADS

- Kentucky has won 42 of its past 44 games when staked to a lead at the end of the third quarter, dating back to a 2008 loss vs. South Carolina.
- UK is 25-2 in the Mark Stoops era when holding a third-quarter lead. The only losses were in 2016 vs. Georgia and 2017 vs. Florida. The Cats avenged the 2017 Florida defeat in 2018 by ending a 31-game losing streak to the Gators.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- Kentucky currently has two players on its roster who have already earned their undergraduate degrees in David Bouvier and Adrian Middleton.
- Twelve Wildcats (**George Asafo-Adjei, Dorian Baker, Blake Best, Miles Butler, C.J. Conrad, Tymere Dubose, Mike Edwards, Lonnie Johnson, Bunchy Stallings, Calvin Taylor, Darius West and Tristan Yeomans**) are all expected to graduate in December with their undergraduate degrees
- Last season, Kentucky had 20 total graduates, including three who earned a master's degree (Dylan Greenberg, Jacob Hyde, Austin MacGinnis).
- Last season, UK had 27 players on the 2017 SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll.
- Several players have strong cume GPAs over their academic careers, including Miles Butler (4.0), Brayden Berezowitz (4.0), Bryan Berezowitz (4.0), Luke Fortner (3.965), Brett Slusher (3.881), Donald Smith (3.690) and David Bouvier (3.564).



THREE WILDCATS DO SERVICE WORK IN ETHIOPIA

- In May of 2018, three Wildcats, offensive tackle George Asafo-Adjei, offensive guard Bunchy Stallings and long snapper Tristan Yeomans, were chosen by the athletic department to participate in a service/educational trip to the Ethiopia. During the week-long trip, they interacted with residents of impoverished communities, visited and helped paint a preschool, constructed wooden shoe-shining boxes, delivered blankets to widows.
- UK has taken football student-athletes to Ethiopia on a service trip since 2011. Due to the state department's travel ban to Ethiopia in 2017, the Cats visited the Dominican Republic.

- Klausing was named the newest member the Kentucky football team during an inspirational Team IMPACT Signing Day celebration at Kroger Field. The event was sponsored by Vertex Pharmaceuticals.
- Klausing is one of 30,000 patients in the United States living courageously with cystic fibrosis (CF), a disease predominantly diagnosed in children by the age of 2. He was diagnosed at five days old. By sponsoring Signing Days of children with CF, Vertex Pharmaceuticals helps spread awareness

DID YOU KNOW?

- This is the 128th season of intercollegiate football for Kentucky.
- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** is in his 41st season in that role. A group of former players, staff members and current UK coaches pitched in during the summer of 2017 to surprise him with a new Ford Escape.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 23 national cheerleading championships, including 19 of the last 23, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.
- Kentucky is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.

RICH BROOKS NAMED UK'S LEGEND

- Former UK head coach Rich Brooks was named to the 2018 AT&T SEC Football Legends class, an assemblage of former football standouts who will be honored at events surrounding the SEC Football Championship Game in Atlanta in December.
- Rich Brooks guided the Kentucky football fortunes for seven years from 2003-09 and is the only head coach in UK history to guide the Wildcats to postseason bowl games in four consecutive years and win three straight

bowls. The streak began in 2006 with a stunning upset of Clemson in the Music City Bowl. The 2007 season was highlighted by a Top-10 ranking, a victory over No. 1 (and eventual national champion) LSU and was capped by a bowl victory over Florida State. Following the 2008 season, UK defeated East Carolina in the Liberty Bowl. In his final season in 2009, Brooks was named SEC Coach of the Year by CollegeFootballNews.com. With the Wildcats reflecting the toughness shown by their head coach, in his last four seasons he led UK to 12 fourth-quarter comeback wins. Prior to joining Kentucky, Brooks served as head coach for the St. Louis Rams of the NFL and the University of Oregon.

- The class will be honored at the 2018 SEC Football "Weekend of Champions" Nov. 30-Dec. 1 in Atlanta, Ga, highlighted by the annual SEC Legends Dinner presented by AT&T on Fri., Nov. 30 at the Hyatt Regency in Atlanta. The group will also be recognized prior to the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be held at the new Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Sat., Dec. 1.





KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 295 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 160-132-4 record (.547), 24-16 under Mark Stoops.
- UK had its first sellout of the season with 63,081 -- third-largest since the 2015 renovation -- for the South Carolina game.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 14 of the last 16 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years.
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-- begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and

Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites. New bench-back seating has been installed in the South upper level of Kroger Field.

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Mississippi State, Missouri and Vanderbilt.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Pregame concerts: The Kentucky Football Pregame Concert Series has returned for the 2018 season. Concerts will begin on the stage outside Gate 12 immediately following the Cat Walk and last until 30 minutes prior to kickoff. The Cat Walk takes place two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff.

Coca Cola Fan Zone: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Fan Zone located in Nutter Field House. It will have inflatable games, free posters, face tattoos and more, available two hours before kickoff.

HEAD COACH MARK STOOPS / SIXTH SEASON / IOWA, 1989



Mark Stoops likes to challenge his team to do things that have never been done at the University of Kentucky, or, haven't been done in a long time. His Wildcats are responding nicely to that challenge.

Since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK is one of only two schools in the nation that has tied or improved its win total in each of the last five seasons.

That steady progression has culminated in multiple achievements:

- In 2016 and '17, UK posted consecutive seven-win seasons, along with 4-4 records in the Southeastern Conference. It's the first time UK has won seven games and finished at least .500 in the league in back-to-back seasons in 40 years.
- The Wildcats placed third in the SEC Eastern Division in 2017 and second in 2016, the team's best back-to-back finishes since the league split into divisions in 1992.
- UK's 2016-17 bowl appearances mark only the fifth time in school history that the school has earned bowl bids in at least two consecutive seasons.
- UK won three road games last season, the first time that has happened since 2009.
- The Wildcats are 8-4 in games decided by seven points or less over the past two seasons.

The methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops' ability to adjust when necessary shone its brightest at the beginning of the 2016 season. After losing the first two games of the schedule, *and* seeing his starting quarterback out for the season with an injury, *and* seeing his defense struggle in the early stages, Stoops didn't retreat. The Wildcat coach chose determination over despair and went back to work.

Stoops re-tooled the offense with then-backup quarterback Stephen Johnson, going to a more physical, ground-based attack. With a history of success as a defensive coordinator, Stoops returned to his roots by becoming more involved with the planning and play-calling on that side of the ball.

The results? The Wildcats went 7-3 in the last 10 regular-season games, topped by a win at No. 11-ranked Louisville and their inaugural appearance in the TaxSlayer Bowl. Stoops was named SEC Coach of the Year runner-up by Athlon Sports.

Returning the Wildcats to the bowl scene again last season, Stoops' progress at Kentucky continues his history of coaching success.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run

and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game).

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the

Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, retired in 2017 after 18 years as the Sooners' head coach.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft - seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweath-

er, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Mark and his wife, Chantel, have two sons, Will and Zack.

Looking ripe for an upset because it kept coughing up the football, Kentucky eventually tightened its grip on it as well as Central Michigan.

The Wildcats' depth on both sides of the ball also helped them avoid a potential disaster.

A.J. Rose and Benny Snell, Jr. each rushed for two touchdowns, Gunnar Hoak came off the bench to throw the go-ahead TD pass and Kentucky overcame four first-half turnovers to beat Central Michigan 35-20 in its season opener.

For a while the upset-minded Chippewas seemed poised to make the Wildcats their third Power Five victim in as many

seasons by building a 17-7, second-quarter lead and scoring all their points off two interceptions and two fumbles. Kentucky rallied with two TDs over the final four minutes of the half, including Hoak's 24-yard scoring pass to David Bouvier for a 21-20 edge with 14 seconds remaining.

Kentucky shut out CMU from there, limiting the Mid-American Conference team to 97 second-half yards while outgaining them 427-255 overall to improve to 7-0 in the series.

The Wildcats' offense in particular used strength in numbers to overcome those self-inflicted setbacks.

Snell had TD runs of 52 and 11 yards to finish with 125 yards rushing on 20 attempts. Rose, a sophomore, rushed for TDs of 55 and 4 yards on the way to 104 on eight carries and his first career 100-yard game as Kentucky dominated the ground game 299-118.

Hoak meanwhile demonstrated why it's good to have an able backup with a gutsy bailout after starter Terry Wilson left the game with a shoulder injury sustained while throwing his second interception. The sophomore led Kentucky 71 yards in 41 seconds and hit Bouvier down the middle for his first career TD that shifted momentum for good.

Stoops sidestepped a question about using both QBs next week at Florida but stressed the importance of having them ready after seeing it pay off when Kentucky needed it.

Benny Snell, Jr. rushed for 175 yards as Kentucky ended a 31-year losing streak against Florida, topping the Gators 27-16 in Gainesville.

Quarterback Terry Wilson completed 11 of 16 passes for 151 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while also rushing for 105 yards and a score.

The win was Kentucky's first over Florida since 1986, and the Cats' first win in Gainesville since 1979.

After the Kentucky defense forced Florida to punt on the opening possession of the game, the Wildcats got on the board. The Cats covered 91 yards in nine plays, capped by a 29-yard touchdown pass from Wilson to David Bouvier. Miles Butler nailed the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 5:07 left in the first quarter.

Florida answered with a scoring drive of its own, but the UK defense kept the Gators out of the end zone. Florida was on the UK three-yard line, but a sack by Phil Hoskins and a third-down stop forced the Gators to attempt a 29-yard field goal, which Evan McPherson converted, cutting the UK lead to 7-3.

After Kentucky was forced to punt, Florida went 63 yards in just four plays, scoring on an 18-yard pass from Feleipe Franks to Moral Stephens, giving the Gators a 10-7 lead.

Kentucky would get into Florida territory twice more in the first half, but both drives ended in turnovers. The Cats defense would hold on both occasions, and the Gators held a 10-7 halftime lead.

The Cats took the second-half kickoff and put together an impressive scoring drive. Leaning on Snell, Kentucky drove 90 yards in 10 plays, with Snell covering 36 of those yards. Wilson had a pair of big plays in the drive, with a 19-yard run on third down, and the drive capper, a 24-yard designed run for a touchdown. Butler's PAT was good and Kentucky led 14-10 with 9:49 left in the third quarter.

After a Florida punt, Kentucky struck again. This time, the Cats went 78 yards in just five plays, with Wilson connecting with Lynn Bowden, Jr. for a 54-yard touchdown. The PAT was good and Kentucky led 21-10 with 4:11 left in the third quarter.

Late in the fourth quarter, Franks hit Freddie Swain with a touchdown pass to cut Kentucky's lead to 21-16, after a two-point conversion failed.

The scoring ended when Davonte Robinson recovered a fumble and returned it 30 yards for a score on the game's final play.

Kentucky football coach Mark Stoops wasn't worried about his team overlooking Murray State following a 27-16 win at Florida.

Despite a slow start, the Wildcats (3-0) outscored the Racers 31-7 in the second half and rolled to a 48-10 victory Saturday. Murray had trouble stopping Kentucky quarterback Terry Wilson, who threw for 163 yards and rushed for 80 more to keep the Wildcats perfect on the season.

Coming off an 11-point victory over the Gators that ended a 31-game losing streak in their Southeastern Conference opener, the Wildcats (3-0) showed no signs of a letdown and

overwhelmed the Racers from start to finish. Leading 17-3 at the break, Kentucky pulled way in the second half.

Traditionally the Wildcats have struggled against FCS opponents and needed overtime to fend off Ohio Valley Conference member Eastern Kentucky in a 34-27 win in 2015. The task was much easier this time for Kentucky.

Paced by Wilson, the Wildcats used a balanced offense to defeat the Racers, amassing 528 yards of offense, including 245 on the ground. Wilson targeted nine different receivers, mainly Lynn Bowden, Jr., who caught eight passes for 89 yards. Wilson and backup Gunnar Hoak threw for 240 yards and one touchdown.

Benny Snell, Jr. collected 75 yards on 15 carries and added a score. In limited action in the second half, Snell had just four carries as A.J. Rose and Sihem King collected a bulk of the carries in the second half.

In a surprise trick play, Snell completed a shovel pass to Wilson, who then handed the ball off to Zy'Aire Hughes for a 49-yard score to end the third quarter. Snell's block downfield created a wide-open path to the end zone for Hughes in his first career touchdown.

Murray avoided the shutdown on Gabriele Vicente's 29-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Racers quarterback Drew Anderson competed 15-of-32 passes for 118 yards. Backup signal caller Preston Rice scored Murray's lone touchdown with a 21-yard run with 30 seconds remaining.

Overall, Stoops was pleased with the win and likes the where his team stands following the first three weeks of the regular season.

Benny Snell, Jr. rushed for four touchdowns to break a Kentucky career record, including two in the fourth quarter, and the Wildcats held No. 14 Mississippi State to 56 yards rushing for a 28-7 upset Saturday night.

After Tyrell Ajian's 35-yard interception return to the Bulldogs 36, Snell broke left and down the left sideline for his third score with 8 minutes remaining to break Randall Cobb's previous mark of 37 total touchdowns.

The junior wasn't done and added a 23-yard TD run on the next possession for 21-point cushion the Wildcats (4-0, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) preserved for their second win over

a ranked school this month. Kentucky beat then-No. 25 Florida two weeks ago to break a 31-game losing streak to the Gators.

Snell also had TD runs of 1 and 2 yards to finish with 165 on 25 carries, his 15th career 100-yard game. His four rushing TDs also matched a school record he shares with Don Phelps. Kentucky rushed for 229 overall and outgained the Bulldogs 300-201 under a steady drizzle.

MSU (3-1, 0-1) was held nearly 256 rushing yards below its SEC-leading average of 311.7 coming in. The Bulldogs only managed Nick Fitzgerald's 1-yard TD run midway through the second quarter.

For one half, No. 17 Kentucky's offense showed the intensity that helped earn its first Top 25 in nearly 11 years. When things sputtered afterward against South Carolina, the Wildcats' defense rose to the challenge with clutch plays to ensure their new-found status ended on a high note.

Their strong start was certainly critical, too.

Benny Snell, Jr. ran for 99 yards and one of Kentucky's three consecutive first-half touchdowns and the Wildcats held on for a 24-10 victory over South Carolina on Saturday night.

Kentucky (5-0, 3-0 Southeastern Conference) quashed initial concerns about a letdown following their first ranking

since November 2007 by scoring on four straight drives to lead 24-3 at halftime. The Wildcats ended up needing that cushion to offset a scoreless second half and Jake Bentley's 58-yard, third quarter TD pass to Deebo Samuel that kept the Gamecocks (2-2, 1-2) within striking distance.

Mike Edwards' interception with 3:47 remaining snuffed one chance by the Gamecocks before they turned the ball over on downs in the final minute. Those defensive stands sealed Kentucky's fifth consecutive series win and continued its best SEC start since 1977.

The Wildcats registered four turnovers, including interceptions by Derrick Baity, Darius West and Edwards. They scored 10 points off a fumble and interception before West and Edwards picked off Bentley and preserved a second consecutive SEC win by double digits.

And it's still a work in progress.

Snell's rushing yardage on 28 carries also made him the third Wildcat to break 3,000 in a career. His 4-yard score with 4:53 remaining in the second quarter extended his TD record to 40. Quarterback Terry Wilson and A.J. Rose ran for TDs from 1 and 24 yards as Kentucky edged South Carolina 327-321 in yardage.

The Wildcats' offense struggled all night against a stout Aggies' defense. Kentucky managed just 178 yards of total offense, with star running back Benny Snell, Jr. held to a season-low 60 yards rushing. Quarterback Terry Wilson passed for 108 yards and a touchdown in the game.

But it was the defense that allowed Kentucky to stay close. Darius West had a huge game with 10 tackles, an interception and a fumble recovery for a 40-yard touchdown that tied the game late in regulation. Mike Edwards had nine tackles, including three

tackles for loss.

The game was scoreless until late in the first quarter, when Kentucky got the scoring going. Wilson connected with Lynn Bowden, Jr. on a 54-yard touchdown toss/pass and Miles Butler's extra point gave the Cats a 7-0 lead with 1:10 left in the period. That would be the score after one quarter of play.

It stayed that way until just before halftime, when Texas A&M drove 70 yards in 13 plays, finishing with a three-yard touchdown pass from Kellen Mond to Quartney Davis, tying the game at 7-7 with 1:14 to go in the half. The game would be tied at that score at the break.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but in the fourth period, momentum seemed to shift in Kentucky's favor. An interception by West gave Kentucky the ball near midfield, setting the Cats up for a potential go-ahead score. But Kentucky went three-and-out, and Rashad Hall returned the ensuing punt to the Kentucky 46, giving A&M the momentum back.

The Aggies took immediate advantage, with the help of a lucky bounce. On the second play after the punt return, Mond's pass, intended for Camron Buckley, glanced off of Buckley's hands and into the arms of Jace Sternberger, who took it 46 yards for a touchdown, giving A&M a 14-7 lead with 10:13 to play in the game.

Inside the final five minutes of regulation, A&M appeared to be ready to put the game away. On a third down and one, Derrick Baity, Jr. forced a Mond fumble, which was recovered by West, who returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. Butler's PAT tied the game at 14-14 with 4:17 to play in regulation.

The teams would be tied 14-14 at the end of regulation, forcing overtime. Kentucky's offensive possession stalled, and Butler's 43-yard field goal hit the crossbar, coming up just short. A&M would need just four plays to score, capped by a Trayveon Williams 10-yard touchdown run to win the game.

Kentucky has next weekend off before returning to SEC action on October 20 by hosting Vanderbilt at Kroger Field.
