he 2002 UK women's tennis team reflects on last season's "missed opportunities" and has emerged more determined than ever to win crucial matches and complete its journey to establish the program as one of the best in the country. This season, the Wildcats return seven upperclassmen — three seniors and four juniors — from 2001 and will benefit greatly from the wealth of skills and experience they bring. In the midst of heightened self-expectations, the daunting challenge of one of the nation's toughest schedules has this season's squad focused and prepared to compete at the highest level.

"We are all very anxious and excited for the dual match season to begin," Guilbeau said. "We will truly find out what we are made of this sea-

Junior Leigh Bradwell will team up with senior Lauren Rookledge to form a nationally ranked doubles pair while also solidifying the No. 5 singles spot. son. With all the positives surrounding this team, I feel confident that we will be pleased with the results we produce."

The Wildcats return two All-Americans and one All-Southeastern Conference performer to the 2002 roster and boast three individuals who made a total of seven appearances in Intercollegiate Tennis Association Grand Slam events in 2001.


"The individual achievements by our players both on and off the court over the past year have been phenomenal," Guilbeau said. "We want to manufacture that same kind of success as a team. Our goal of becoming a Top 16 team is very much within our grasp. I really believe that if we continue to improve in this way, 2002 will be a break-through year for Kentucky women's tennis."


In the fall of 2001, the Wildcats emerged as one of the nation's premier programs with their most successful season in many years. The fall season concluded with six singles players recording 10

or more wins and three doubles teams with records of 14-3, 11-3 and 11-3 respectively. The Cats' efforts did not go unnoticed. The fall ITA/NCAA rankings awarded three UK women with a spot in the Top 100 (Carolina Mayorga, #30; Sarah Witten, #53; Amy Trefethen, #92) and three doubles teams in the Top 50 (Mayorga/Witten, #7; Trefethen/Jill Buckley, #27; Lauren Rookledge/Leigh Bradwell, #49). Based on the individual rankings and actual fall results, UK is undoubtedly among the elite teams in the country.

"The rankings are a great reward for our individual players," Guilbeau said. "More importantly, the work and level of play that has gone into achieving these rankings is what will eventually lead our team to produce great results dur-

ing the spring season."

In dual match play, there will be an obvious void left by All-SEC performer Brooke Skeen. The nation's 71st-ranked singles player and 27th-ranked doubles player graduated, leaving a vacancy at the top of both lineups that will need to be filled for the Cats to be successful.

"Brooke was a very reliable player for our team," Guilbeau said. "She led us in many ways, especially as a very consistent singles player and perhaps our best doubles player."

Fortunately, the UK women have other players ready to step up. Returning seniors Mayorga and Rookledge have shown continued progress and will anchor the Cats' solid and reliable group at the top of the lineup. Mayorga, an All-American in 2001, brings national rankings (paired with junior Sarah Witten) to top positions of the Cats' lineup. The Bogotá, Columbia, native will look to continue her success on the court while assuming the duty of the team's captain. Rookledge, a Cape Town, South Africa native, was able to capture All-SEC honors with partner Brooke Skeen in 2001 with their remarkable 26-6 doubles record. Her progress in both singles and doubles will enable her to successfully move up in the lineup with similar results.

Also returning to help UK reach its lofty goals will be juniors Witten and Trefethen. Witten, a 2001 All-American, will use the strong finish of her fall season to gain momentum into the dual match schedule at one of the Cats' top positions. Witten's participation in both the ITA All-American Championships and the ITA National Indoor Championship will give her the needed experience to battle in competitive SEC matches. Trefethen catapulted into both the singles and doubles rankings with her fall performance and will look to solidify the Cats' lineup.

Shannon Stafford, Bradwell and Buckley will round out a very solid group of returning players. If a healthy Stafford can shake off a recurring shoulder injury, the Gainesville, Fla., native will prove to be a valuable and experienced competitor for the Wildcats. Juniors Bradwell and Buckley both earned doubles rankings with their respective partners and promise to produce big results in doubles competition as well as in singles action.

"The commitment that this team has made during the off-season will be a great benefit to them as the season unfolds," Guilbeau said. "We are excited about the potential achievements of every one of our returning players. They are physically stronger and mentally prepared to take their games to the next level."

Stepping into the program to help UK reach its pinnacle will be freshmen Danielle Petrisko and Ola Luczak. Petrisko, a Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., native, competed well during a competitive fall

season, while Luczak, from Melbourne, Australia, joined the Cats in January.

With all the tools to make a winner, the UK women's tennis team is eager to begin another successful and rewarding season.

"A great tradition has been established by

the UK women's tennis program – both on and off the court," Guilbeau said. "We are so proud of the success these young ladies have accomplished academically, athletically, socially and throughout the community. UK is a great place to be a collegiate tennis player."

Markfullbeau

ark Guilbeau enters his sixth season as head coach of the UK women's tennis team. Guilbeau hopes to build on the Cats' accomplishments in 2001 by reaching the lofty goals he has set for the season. He strongly believes that UK tennis can achieve a new standard in 2002.

"The experience that this team was able to take away from last season will be invaluable this

year," Guilbeau said. "We enter this season with many improved skills and, more importantly, an intense focus on accomplishing the goals we have set as individuals and as a team. With a competitive schedule and emphasis on a high level of play, this looks to be a break-through year for our program."

Reflecting on five rewarding years in Lexington, Guilbeau foresees a strong future for the UK women's tennis program.

"We have established an exciting atmosphere here," Guilbeau said. "The University of Kentucky is a great place to play tennis. We have a strong program and we have a good time playing.

"The entire experience of college tennis should be fun, exciting, and challenging, something that all members of the program will always remember with great joy and pride," Guilbeau continued. "This sounds like a given. Unfortunately, with the demands placed on student-athletes to win at all costs, the philosophy of enjoying the sport is often lost."

Guilbeau says that the University of Kentucky women's tennis program provides its student-athletes with the opportunity to become the best tennis player possible, achieve academic success, experience a complete collegiate life, and most importantly, grow as a person while enjoying many fulfilling experiences.

"Achieving success is measured by much more than wins and losses," Guilbeau said. "All student-athletes should know that everything they accomplish at UK will be a result of commitment, desire, determination, discipline, hard work and a love for the process. Then, when the experience comes to an end, every member of the program can look back with pride and satisfaction."

Guilbeau is no stranger to hard work. As an assistant with the women's tennis team at Georgia, he helped lead the Bulldogs to a national championship in 1994. He continued to strive for success in his first year as UK head coach, guiding his young team to a 12-13 record in 1997. In 1998, the Cats continued to improve, finishing 15-9 with a national ranking of 24th.

Guilbeau took the Cats to new levels in 1999, guiding them as high as 18th in the ITA rankings



before finishing the season at 22nd. UK finished in a tie for fourth place in the Southeastern Conference, its highest finish since 1994. The Cats came up one win shy of a trip to Gainesville, Fla., for the Sweet 16, but the experience gained by the team was invaluable.

"When you are competing in the strongest tennis conference in the country, it is important that goals are set with the intention of working

extremely hard and making a complete commitment to development and progress," Guilbeau said.

The 2000 squad was young and some referred to the season as a rebuilding year, but the Cats again reached the NCAA team tournament in 2000 and achieved a season-high ranking of No. 22. The success was accomplished despite the loss of the team's top three players and team leaders from the 1999 squad. Clearly, a pattern of success has been established by UK women's tennis.

In 2001, Guilbeau continued to lead the UK women's tennis program to new heights. The squad finished 14-11 while advancing to the quarterfinals of the SEC tournament and picking up an opening-round win over Virginia at the NCAA Championships. His team also produced two All-Americans and two All-SEC performers.

Guilbeau feels that day-to-day instruction and workouts are a very inspiring and rewarding part of the job. While he believes strongly in spending time to improve each player's weak areas, at least 50 percent of court time is spent focusing on strengths and weapons, and additional time is devoted to physical conditioning and strength development.

"A promise I make to each athlete is that she will develop a confident game style centered around her individual strengths, and that she will reach the highest fitness level of her life," Guilbeau said.

The idea of giving 100 percent every day is the heart of Guilbeau's coaching philosophy. He firmly believes that both progress and

enjoyment come from that type of work ethic.

"Success must be earned...it does not come from luck.," Guilbeau said. "You have to work hard and take care of all the details."

Not only does Guilbeau demand a great deal from his team, he demands a lot from himself as well.

"If the players know that you have their best interests in mind and you are willing to do whatever it takes to help them achieve their goals," Guilbeau said, "you will find that they will work very hard for the coaching staff and the team."

Guilbeau came to UK from Athens, Ga., where he was the women's tennis assistant coach for five seasons. He also served as the Head Tennis Professional at Jennings Mill Country Club in Athens for four years. In addition to the 1994 NCAA Championship team, Guilbeau also assisted teams that won the 1994 and 1995 ITA National Indoor Team Championships.

While at Georgia, Guilbeau helped coach eight All-Americans, four national tournament doubles champions and one NCAA singles champion. During his five years at UGA, every one of the Bulldog teams finished the season ranked in the nation's top five.

"The years in Athens were very valuable to me as a coach and teacher," Guilbeau said. "The experience I gained at the University of Georgia has helped me greatly in my coaching role. The people at Georgia and Jennings Mill Country Club were extremely kind and supportive. I was very fortunate to have such a great opportunity."

Guilbeau has traveled as a coach to the 1992 Australian Open and has worked with players at the USTA Satellite and WTA Tour level.

A native of Lafayette, La., Guilbeau played collegiate tennis at Spring Hill College in Mobile, Ala. He finished his undergraduate degree at Southwestern Louisiana in 1988. He served as a graduate teaching instructor at Southwestern Louisiana and at Georgia before completing a master's degree in Health Promotion and Behavior at Georgia in 1992.

Guilbeau has run seven marathons and has a personal best of 2:40:00. Most recently, Guilbeau completed the 2001 Boston Marathon. He also helped raise more than \$50,000 for the American Cancer Society by playing a doubles tennis marathon in 1991. Along with three others, Guilbeau set a Guinness Book World Record by playing doubles for 125 consecutive hours. He lives in Lexington.

arlos Drada is in his first season with the UK women's tennis team. Drada compiled a very successful career as a men's tennis player at UK, which culminated with a trip to the NCAA Singles Championship where he finished as runner-up in 2000. After four successful years as a student-athlete, Drada is familiar with the commitment necessary to be a

successful part of the UK tennis program. Drada's presence has already had a tremendous impact on the women's team by approaching his job with enthusiasm and passion.

"The UK women's tennis program is very fortunate to have Carlos Drada as a member of its coaching staff," Guilbeau said. "Carlos has had an immediate and positive impact on our team in every aspect."

A native of Cali, Colombia, Drada made Lexington his permanent home in 2000 after graduating with a degree in finance/marketing. He then accepted a job with Merrill-Lynch as a financial consultant, where he worked for a year. Drada then made the decision to return to the sport he loved and begin his coaching career.

After playing tennis for Kentucky from 1997 to 2000, Drada has a wealth of knowledge to draw from while instructing players. Drawing on his competitive career in the tough Southeastern Conference, Drada will be able to effectively relate to the team as a former student-athlete who has been through the rigors of playing for an eminent tennis program.

As a Wildcat, Drada was named All-America in 2000 after making an improbable run to the NCAA title match. The unseeded Drada blazed through the competition defeating both the



No. 1 and No. 3 seeds during his run. The Wildcat standout was able to upset the nation's No. 1 player both as a junior and a senior. In 1999, then a junior, Drada defeated top-ranked James Blake of Harvard. The next sea-

son, the nation's topranked player,


Jeff Morrison of Florida, finished his season with only five losses; Drada was the victor in two of those matches, including a defeat of Morrison in the semifinals of the NCAAs.

Captain Brooke Skeen led the Wildcats to a 14-11 record and their fifth straight NCAA appearance last season while earning All-SEC honors.

he UK women's tennis team achieved several team and individual awards both on and off the court throughout its 2000-01 campaign. After returning every player from the previous year, the Wildcats were both physically and mentally prepared to compete in the ultra-competitive Southeastern Conference.

The 2000-01 Cats were able to produce a number of quality wins during the season. Convincing wins over Mississippi, LSU, Arkansas, Alabama, Auburn and Virginia led to a solid dual match season; a season in which the Cats came one step closer to becoming a top 16 team. UK ended its successful season with a 14-11 record en route to a second-round finish at the 2001 National Championships and its third top 25 final ranking in five years. And though it was another solid performance, the team was very close to achieving much, much more.

The Cats just missed upsetting both third-

ranked Vanderbilt and fourth-ranked Tennessee. Both the Commodores and the Volunteers slipped by the Wildcats in 4-3 matches. UK also lost a tough match in the round of 32 at the 2001 NCAA Championship to No. 9 Northwestern. The Cats quickly gained the advantage by taking the doubles point before falling to highly ranked Northwestern in singles competition.

Individually, the Cats reached several highs in the spring. Junior Carolina Mayorga and sophomore Sarah Witten reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship defeating both the sixth and 10th-ranked teams in the nation to earn All-America honors. Mayorga also qualified for the NCAA singles championship and finished the year ranked No. 46 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association. Senior Brooke Skeen and junior Lauren Rookledge were named to the All-SEC team in doubles and

competed in the NCAA Doubles Championship, losing a close contest to the eventual champions.

Off the court, the Wildcats acquired many great honors. Mayorga received the prestigious ITA/Tennis Magazine Arthur Ashe, Jr. Sportsmanship and Leadership Award, given to the one player throughout the country who represents sportsmanship, leadership and humanitarian service. Along with the national honor, Mayorga was also named SEC Player of the Week in April.

As a team, the Cats excelled in the class-room, averaging over a 3.5 grade point average for the year. UK was also the only squad in the SEC to land every member of the team on the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

In 2001 it became very clear that UK women's tennis is moving toward achieving all of its goals. For women's tennis at the University of Kentucky, the time is now.



the Fifth-Third Bank Tennis Championships includes both men's and women's Challenger Status (\$50,000 each) draws. The tournament provides Wildcat tennis players the unique opportunity to compete against a predominantly professional field in singles and doubles action. Although UK student-athletes cannot take home the purse, which has swelled to a total of \$100,000, the experience they gain from playing professional-caliber opponents is immeasurable.

Lleyton Hewitt and Tommy Haas are just two of the players who have used their showing at the Fifth-Third to catapult them through the professional rankings. Hewitt claimed the 1998 doubles title, while Haas grabbed one of the first big wins of his career with his defeat of No. 1 seed Grant Stafford in 1996.

The future looks bright for the Fifth-Third Bank Tennis Championships and its competitors. As for Lexington, which annually transforms itself from basketball land to tennis paradise, the opportunity to conduct this firstclass event is nothing short of a dream.

All-Americans

unior Carolina Mayorga and sophomore Sarah Witten were the first Wildcats in almost a decade to earn All-America honors. Mayorga and Witten were the first to garner the honor since Susan Klingenberg in 1992.

The 2001 All-Americans earned the prestigious distinction through hard work and effort. The opportunistic duo made the most of its chance at the NCAA Doubles Championship by advancing to the quarterfinals after moving from first alternate to competitors when a team pulled out of the championships



the day of the opening round. The pair tallied wins over the nation's sixth-ranked and 10th-ranked doubles teams to assure All-America honors.

Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll

The University of Kentucky has always made a firm commitment to the academic achievement of its student-athletes. This dedication has never been more evident than in the accomplishments of the 2000-01 women's tennis team.

The unyielding work ethic of the Wildcats on the court was mirrored inside the classroom last season as every member of




the women's tennis team was honored on the Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll. Among other things, the distinction requires the athlete to maintain a 3.0 career grade point average while managing the rigorous schedule of being a student-athlete. The UK women's tennis team has compiled a team grade point average of greater than 3.5 each of the past 10 semesters. Every player at UK who has completed their eligibility with the women's tennis program has also earned their undergraduate degree from UK.

Mayorga Racks Up Extraordinary Credits

The 2001 season saw the UK women's tennis team produce several impressive honors. Along with two All-Americans and two All-SEC performers, one Cat performer brought two other major accolades to the women's tennis program.

All-American Carolina Mayorga earned



further national recognition when she received the Arthur Ashe, Jr. Leadership and Sportsmanship Award. The award, which is presented annually by Tennis Magazine and the Intercollegiate Tennis Association, is given to an athlete who exemplifies the character of the late Ashe with respect to leadership, scholarship and humanitarian service. Mayorga was presented with the award at the 2001 U.S. Open.

Along with national acknowledgments, Mayorga was the recipient of regional honors. On the week of April 18, the Bogotá, Colombia native was named Southeastern Conference Player of the Week. Due to the intense competition of SEC tennis, Mayorga is only the second Wildcat in history to be named Player of the Week. Former teammate Brooke Skeen was the first, bringing the honor to Lexington just one year earlier.


ITF Kentucky International Junior Tennis Derby



Junior Carolina Mayorga defeated No. 23
Julie DeRoo for the first time in her career with a three-set victory at No. 1 singles to set the pace for the Wildcats' win. Sophomore Leigh Bradwell and junior Lauren Rookledge both turned in impressive performances to rout No. 53 Mira Radu and No. 90 Karem Harboe respectively. Sarah Witten battled back from being down 4-1 in the opening set to dominate Alesya Ignatieva in a straight-set win for the Cats. Amy Trefethen scored the final singles win for the Cats when she cruised past Audra Adams.

Doubles action was much of the same as the Wildcats were able to sweep all three doubles courts to set the tone for the match.

"This win was a good step in the right direction," Coach Mark Guilbeau said. "Leigh played her best match yet for UK while Carolina and Sarah showed great effort and composure in their performances. Our team was extremely impressive today and that is good news for our upcoming matches."

No. 25 UK Defeats No. 24 LSU. 6-1

March 25, 2001 Lexington, Ky.

he Wildcats scored another impressive SEC victory when they defeated 24th-ranked LSU by a count of 6-1.

The Cats grabbed a 1-0 lead after taking two of three doubles matches. Senior Brooke Skeen and junior Lauren Rookledge cruised past Fernanda Tsucamoto and Amy McIlhaney 8-0 to notch one doubles win while junior Carolina Mayorga and sophomore Sarah Witten defeated 20th-ranked Bruna Colosio and Rocio Fantilli to give UK the early 1-0 lead.

In singles action, Skeen and Rookledge continued their stellar play as they quickly tallied two more points for the Cats. Witten and fellow sophomores Leigh Bradwell and Amy Trefethen all added straight-set victories to complete the victory for the Cats. The win



placed the Wildcats in a prime position entering the last month of the season.

The Wildcats took the early lead by cruising to doubles victories on Courts 1 and

2 to take control of the match. Senior Brooke Skeen and junior Lauren Rookledge had little trouble with 30th-ranked Kim Gates and Vilmarie Castellvi, winning 8-3. No. 25 UK Defeats No. 37 Arkansas, 4-1

April 19, 2001 Opening Round of SEC Tournament

The Wildcats advanced in the Southeastern Conference Championships after scoring an impressive 4-1 win over Arkansas in the opening round of the tournament in Starkville, Miss. UK claimed the opening point of the contest by winning two out of three doubles matches and cruised to three quick singles wins, clinching the victory over the 37th-ranked Razorbacks.

The nation's 29th-ranked doubles team of Carolina Mayorga and Sarah Witten defeated Arkansas' Tara Reid and Megan Ferreria 8-2, while Amy Trefethen and Jill Buckley had little problem besting Julie Boyadjieva and Adriana Lopez 8-0.

Singles action was much of the same as the Cats received victories from Brooke Skeen, Lauren Rookledge and Shannon Stafford to be the first team to advance in the 2001 SEC Tournament. Rookledge and Stafford rolled to straight-set wins. Stafford downed Ferreria 6-4, 6-3, while Rookledge refused to surrender a game in her 6-0, 6-0 defeat of Reid. Skeen clinched the match for UK with her three-set win over Boyadjieva, 2-6, 6-1, 6-3.

With the win, the Cats moved on to battle third-ranked Vanderbilt in the quarterfinals of the 2001 SEC Tournament.

No. 3 Vanderbilt Defeats No. 25 UK, 4-3

April 20, 2001 Quarterfinals of SEC Tournament

he UK women's tennis team fell just short in its attempt to avenge an early season loss to third-ranked Vanderbilt in the quarterfinals of the Southeastern Conference tournament. The Cats fell to the highly seeded Commodres 4-3 at the A.J. Pitts Tennis Center in Starkville, Miss.

The Wildcats battled back from a 3-0 deficit to knot the match at three before coming up short of the upset. Juniors Carolina Mayorga and Lauren Rookledge, along with sophomore Sarah Witten, all claimed victories in the UK loss.

Mayorga extended her winning streak over opponents ranked in the Top 50 to three with her win over 16th-ranked Julie Ditty in straight sets, 6-3, 7-6. Witten notched an impressive straight sets victory over 39th-ranked Sarah Riske, while Lauren Rookledge remained solid at

the No. 5 position, besting 97th-ranked Aleke Tsoubanos 7-6, 6-4.

"We played well enough to win this match today," Coach Mark Guilbeau said. "I really feel that this performance will give us the confidence we need going into the NCAA Championships. Physically and mentally, we are playing the toughest we have all year."

No. 25 UK Defeats No. 42 Virginia, 4-0

May 12, 2001 NCAA Championships

the Wildcats advanced to the round of 32 in the NCAA Championships with an impressive 4-0 win over the Virginia Cavaliers at the Vandy Christie Tennis Center on the campus of Northwestern University. UK improved to 14-10 on the season.

The Cats took the match's first point and continued to dominate as they rolled into the second round of the tournament. Junior Carolina Mayorga and sophomore Sarah Witten

cruised to the Cats' first doubles win with an 8-0 rout of Christine Kim and Amy O'Donnell. Senior Brooke Skeen and junior Lauren Rookledge claimed the doubles point for the UK with their 8-3 win over Hjenriette Williams and Christie Schweer.

Rookledge, Skeen and sophomore Leigh Bradwell all grabbed singles wins to close out the Wildcat victory. Rookledge breezed past Laura James, 6-2, 6-0, while Skeen had little difficulty defeating Schweer, 6-3, 6-2. Bradwell clinched the match for UK by overpowering Jennifer Tuchband 6-4, 6-1. Sophomore Shannon Stafford was also on the verge of finishing her straight-set win over Kelly Weaver with the score tallying 6-4,, 5-3 in favor of Stafford when the match was abandoned.

"This was a very good match for the entire team," Coach Mark Guilbeau said. "I am really happy for this team to experience an NCAA Tournament win. I was extremely impressed with how we handled our nerves and the competitiveness of the situation.

"Brooke earned a big win today and it was great to see Leigh clinch the match for us. We have now put ourselves in a position that we have planned to be in all year. This entire team is confident that we can reach our goals."

or the first time in almost a decade the University of Kentucky women's tennis team was represented on the All-America team. After advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament with wins over two Top 10 teams, the doubles team of junior Carolina Mayorga and sophomore Sarah Witten found themselves among the nation's elite as they were named All-Americans.


The duo reached as high as No. 10 in 2001, finishing out the season with 26 wins while playing at the top of the lineup for the Wildcats. With both Mayorga and Witten earning the prestigious honor, UK now claims five All-Americans since 1987.


In 1987, Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi were UK's first All-Americans, claiming doubles honors and finishing the year ranked 8th in the ITA collegiate rankings. Hahn was also a singles All-American in 1987, winning the SEC singles title and leading Kentucky to a

21-7 record and second-place finish in the conference. The UK team ended its year ranked 13th nationally. Hahn and Takagi claimed both singles and doubles honors in 1988 as they were among the top eight seeds at the NCAA Tournament and finished the year ranked in the Top 10. The UK tandem also advanced to the finals of the Rolex National Indoors in 1988 and won the SEC Indoor. As a squad, UK finished third in the SEC and sixth at the NCAA Championships.

In 1992, Susan Klingenberg received All-American honors after being seeded among the top 16 players at the NCAA Championships. Klingenberg, then a junior, was Kentucky's third female to gain All-America status. She finished the year ranked 22nd in the ITA collegiate rankings before missing most of her senior year due to injury.

Klingenberg, Hahn and Takagi are all members of the UK Tennis Hall of Fame.

he University of Kentucky and the Southeastern Conference have rich tennis traditions. UK women's tennis has boasted 13 All-SEC performers since 1983, some going on to earn All-America status. Since the SEC is arguably the best conference in collegiate tennis, earning All-SEC honors is undoubtedly one of the biggest accomplishments a collegiate tennis player can receive.

In 2001, senior Brooke Skeen and junior Lauren Rookledge racked up All-SEC Team honors with their outstanding 26-6 record.

Skeen and Rookledge were the first Wildcats to be named All-SEC since Kelly Brown and Massoumeh Emami did it 1998. The duo was able to accomplish the impressive achievement in just their first season as a doubles team.

More impressive than seeing two Wildcats on the All-SEC team is finding three on the prestigious list. This remarkable feat has happened twice: first in 1984 when Clare Kuhlman, Jamie Plummer and Missy Reed all received the distinction and again in 1986 when Sonia Hahn, Tamaka Takagi and Chris Karges were all honored. Hahn and Takagi still remain UK's only three-time All-SEC performers.

1992 was also a solid year for the UK women's tennis program as it saw both Bethany Avington and Susan Klingenberg make All-SEC First Team.

Sonia Hahn, Tamaka Takagi and Susan Klingenberg were all three able to advance to the next step and also claim All-America honors the same season they were named All-SEC.

THE SOUTH NEED

he Southeastern Conference sets the standard of excellence in college tennis. Its teams are annually among the nation's best and its student-athletes often claim national titles. In 2001, the SEC paced all other conferences with 11 NCAA Tournament bids, with three of those schools reaching the women's tennis Final Four. The 2001 Championship was the sixthstraight year that the SEC was represented in the final match. In all, 11 SEC schools finished in the nation's Top 40.

SEC women's tennis has been dominant in recent history. With Florida advancing to every championship match from 1996-99, Georgia's National Championship in 2000 and Vanderbilt battling Stanford for the championship in 2001, the SEC looks to continue its dominance into the future. SEC teams have claimed five national titles since 1992 with Florida winning three and Georgia taking two.


In singles competition, the SEC placed 15 players in the ITA's Top 50 and 13 claimed All-American honors in 2001. Doubles competition has been no different, as the league has garnered five NCAA doubles titles since 1989, including 2001 Champions Whitney Laiho and Jessica Lehnhoff of Florida. The SEC landed 15 doubles teams in the ITA's Top 50 in 2001.

The 2002 season should feature much of the same, with many of the nation's top teams battling for the SEC crown in Columbia, S.C.,

Hilary J. Boone Tennis Complex

he summer of 1997 marked the completion of the UK Tennis Facility with the construction of the \$1.5 million Hilary J. Boone Varsity Tennis Center. The facility features a 1,500-seat stadium for its two center courts with an additional four hard courts. Funding was generated for the project through private donations as well as exhibitions featuring top tennis professionals Martina Navratilova, Jennifer Capriati, Jim Courier and John McEnroe. In addition to the exhibitions, a bulk of the private donations were derived from the Ryan C. Holder Memorial Tennis Fund. Holder, a 16- year-old Dunbar High School student, was killed in an automobile accident. Because of his love for the sport and desire to play collegiate tennis, a group of friends raised \$425,000 to complete the funding necessary to construct the stadium. On August 3, 1997, the center courts were dedicated in Holder's memory.

"The fundraising efforts of (men's tennis coach) Dennis Emery and other local tennis families is greatly appreciated," Coach Mark Guilbeau said. "The money they have collected and donated has gone to great use. With their continued support and with the help of the UK Athletic Department, we will always be able to keep our facilities at the highest level."

The University of Kentucky tennis facilities are a major reason for the great success of the women's squad. In addition to the new courts, the Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center and the H.H. Downing Recreational Tennis Courts have also played a key role in helping the Kentucky tennis team become a collegiate power.

The Indoor Center was also a gift from Hilary J. Boone. The Center, which opened in January 1986, is equipped with four courts and has seating for 1,000 people. A Tennis Hall of Fame has also been added and contains trophies and pictures depicting Kentucky's storied tradition.

The recreation courts were named after the "father" of Kentucky tennis, Dr. H.H. Downing, who coached the UK men's team for 29 years, longer than any other UK coach with the exception of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. Downing posted a record of 166-104-5.

"The support we receive from Hilary Boone, our UK tennis boosters and fans is tremendous," Guilbeau said. "We are very fortunate to have such a great group of supporters and friends surrounding this program."

In 1993, renovations were finished as a complete weight room and locker room facilities were installed. A meeting room and offices were added as well.

The fall of 1999 saw the installation of championship lighting on the stadium's four-court grandstand, which will allow the UK team to play night matches and attract even more fans to the Tennis Complex.

With most attention traditionally given to football and basketball in collegiate athletics, UK realizes that all its student-athletes should play in the very best facilities possible. The Hilary J. Boone Varsity Tennis Complex is a never-ending step in that direction.





ondly, I want them to be in a position to compete physically at that highest level. Obviously, these two goals work hand-in-hand."




Hammer Strength and Nautilus equipment, stationary bikes, treadmills and stair machines.

Boyd and his staff chart every workout for each athlete to monitor performance levels on a daily basis.


UK head coach Mark Guilbeau believes the strength and conditioning program helps UK athletes give a championship effort in every match.

Over the years, the services offered by CATS have grown, and so has the need for additional space. The UKAA has responded by constructing a new CATS area, which opened in January 1998. The new facility is called the Ohio Casualty Center for Academic and Tutorial Services, thanks to a one million dollar grant from the Ohio Casulty Insurance Group.

The new Ohio Casualty Center cost a total of \$2.4 million and covers aproximately 20,000 square feet. It features a computer room which houses approximately 40 computers, a study area which accomodates 90-100 people, 25 tutoring rooms, a career development library, a community outreach office and staff offices.

UK is fortunate to have outstanding leaders in its academics support system. Associate Athletics Director for Student Services Bob Bradley, who oversees the CATS program, is known nationally for his expertise in academics support services.

"CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete," Bradley says. "We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic arena. The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our Center provides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions. Our goal is to show that we care about the student as well as the athlete."


Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics.

"I have been blessed at Kentucky," Bradley said.

CATS is also instrumental in preparing student-athletes for future careers. The Career Development Program helps student-athletes look at the future through a step-by-step process which includes:

- shadowing and internships which help determine career interests
- career counseling
- resume writing
- career plan development.

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to provide the student-athlete with every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well. Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, it is clear that Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

- UK has been ranked among the Top 50 national schools for quality and value by U.S. News and World Report.
- Over 30 UK academic programs are nationally ranked for quality education by prestigious publications and organizations such as *U.S. News and World Report*, the National Institute of Health and the National Science Foundation.
- UK has been ranked as one of the nation's Top 100 schools for African-American students.
- Students have a wide range of study with 200 majors from which to choose.
- 98% of faculty have the highest degree attainable in their field.
- UK is among the nation's top 20 schools in the recruitment of National Merit Scholars.
- In the past year, UK has tripled its number of endowed professorships, coveted faculty positions that attract world-class scholars.

The University of Kentucky

he University of Kentucky was founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and the present name dates to 1916.

The campus in Lexington has 687 acres and is located just south of downtown. It consists of a graduate school, the University of Kentucky Hospital, UK Children's Hospital and 16 colleges. The colleges are agriculture, allied health professions, architecture, arts and sciences, business and economics, communications and information studies, dentistry, education, engineering, fine arts, human environmental sciences, law, medicine, nursing, pharmacy and social work. The graduate school offers 94 master's degree programs, three specialists degrees and 56 doctoral programs.

Enrollment is more than 32,000 and includes students from every Kentucky county, every state and 115 countries. Full-time faculty number 1,889. Approximately 98 percent of the full-time faculty hold the highest possible degrees in their fields. UK's faculty and staff attract more than \$160 million annually in grants, gifts and contracts.

The University attracts excellent students. The average ACT score for first-year students is four points above the national average. Meanwhile, UK students compete successfully for prestigious scholarships, such as the \$30,000 Truman Scholarships.

Since the mid-1990s, the University has pursued an ambitious goal to become a top-20 public university by the year 2020. UK's new president, Dr. Lee T. Todd Jr., has embraced this goal in a way that promises an impact on every Kentucky resident.

"The campus of the University of Kentucky encompasses the area within the boundaries of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. We have a responsibility as a land-grant university to help this state move forward," Todd says.

The University is taking aggressive steps to fulfill its top-20 goal. To date, UK boasts 60 national rankings for quality education and research. Last year, officials launched The Campaign for the University of Kentucky, a \$600 million fund-raising effort to enhance faculty, students, facilities, academic programs and public service. The campaign, the largest in state history, expects to reach its goal by June 2003. As of June 2001, UK has raised more than \$400 million.

UK also offers great facilities to advance the scholarship of its students and the endeavors of its scientists. The William T. Young Library, only three years old, already has assumed a position among the world's leading research libraries; its book endowment is the largest among public universities, and ranks second only to Harvard's. Its broad scope of technology offers students, faculty and Kentucky residents special access to the most up-to-date information from online journals, government publications and private studies, as well as more traditional materials.



For a decade, UK has ranked among America's leaders in supercomputing and in sharing its capacity with researchers across the nation. The campus' current supercomputer can process more than 100 billion calculations per second. Advances will place UK third among the world's research university supercomputers this fall.

Meanwhile, UK maintains 24 research centers that conduct applied research in areas as diverse as tobacco and health, aging, cancer, toxicology, equine health, mineral production, manufacturing systems and public policy.

Several centers excel in the services offered to the public. The Center for Manufacturing Systems has helped more than 500 small and mid-sized industrial firms in Kentucky. The Gluck Equine Research Center is one of only three of its kind in the world, offering research into diseases of the horse. The UK College of Medicine is consistently ranked among the top schools nationally in the quality of primary-care training. The UK College of Pharmacy

is ranked third in the country by *U.S. News & World Report* and is one of the few pharmacy schools in the country with the capability of developing a drug "from bench to bedside."

The University has demonstrated its commitment to partnerships with business, evidenced in part by its Coldstream Research Campus. This 750-acre complex provides space and buildings for production facilities of private companies, including some of the nation's leading high-tech firms. Seven companies currently operate commercial facilities at the campus, which also offers an advantageous location for distribution of products to dozens of states.

University of Kentucky scholars – students, faculty and alumni – have been honored by Nobel, Pulitzer, Rhodes, Fulbright, Guggenheim, Grammy, Metropolitan Opera and other prestigious panels. Mindful of their responsibility to the world, they are guiding citizens and nations through the challenges of this new century.

\$58 Million Facility Showcases the University's Academic Commitment

n addition to providing the finest in athletic facilities, the University of Kentucky also provides student-athletes with the best in academic facilities. The latest addition to the educational landscape at UK is the \$58 million William T. Young Library, which opened in 1998.

- *Size:* The new library covers 365,350 square feet more than six football fields. The building is five stories high, plus a basement.
- Shelf capacity: If laid end-to-end, the bookshelf space would stretch 198,828 linear feet that's more than 37 miles of shelf space. The shelves will house 1.2 million books.
- Seating capacity: The new library can seat more than 4,000 patrons at one time, a 355 percent increase over the old library. The seating on the fifth floor of the new library equals the capacity of the former library.
- Computer connections: Every study table and study carrel in the new library has an electrical outlet and a computer jack connected to the university's computer system.
- Flexibility: The library has a state-of-the-art electronic infrastructure that will enable UK to take full advantage of current and emerging technology. In addition, the five floors and basement of the structure are designed as open, flexible spaces, enabling the library to








adapt its services and facilities to the future changes in needs of UK students.

• Financing: The athletics department has its own special investment in the new library. UK Athletics is providing \$3,200,000 each year to pay for the \$58 million building.









nanimously voted president-elect of the University of Kentucky on Jan. 23, 2001, Dr. Lee T. Todd Jr. officially began his term as UK's 11th President on July 1, 2001.

Dr. Todd was formerly Senior

Vice President of Lotus Development, where he led the Messaging and Collaboration Business Unit, one of three business units at Lotus. In this capacity, he was responsible for the traditional Lotus Products such as Notes, Domino, Smart-Suite, and related products. In addition, he oversaw the new collaborative offerings such as Sametime and QuickPlace.

Dr. Todd received his Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering from the University of Kentucky and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in electrical engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. While a graduate student at MIT, he received six U.S. patents in the area of high-resolution display technology. It was during that time that he began proposing the application of telecommunications and high-resolution displays for data conferencing.

Dr. Todd began his career in 1974 as a University of Kentucky professor in the electrical engineering department, where he taught for nine years. During that time, he published numerous research articles, gave many conference presentations and won several teaching awards, including the UK Alumni Association Great Teacher Award. He holds eight U.S. patents in the area of large-screen displays.

Dr. Todd founded Projectron, Inc., in 1981 to manufacture projection cathode ray tubes for the flight-simulation industry. In 1990, Projectron was sold to Hughes Aircraft Company. Dr. Todd was able to convince Hughes to move its CRT operations to Kentucky and worked with the University of Kentucky and government officials to

start the University's Coldstream Research Campus. Hughes was the first tenant on this campus.

Dr. Todd also founded DataBeam Corporation. Since its founding in 1983, DataBeam has been the world's leading provider of real-time collaboration and real-time distant learning software and development platforms. DataBeam was acquired by IBM in 1998, and now reports into Lotus Development Company.

Dr. Todd speaks fre-

quently about the benefits of technology in economic development and education. He founded the Kentucky Science and Technology Corporation, a not-for-profit organization focused on increasing university research capacity, developing science and technology education (K-12) programs, and encouraging an

entrepreneurial economy in Kentucky. Various Kentucky governors have appointed him to statewide committees related to education and economic development.

He was formerly on the Council on Postsecondary Education that oversees operations of all Kentucky universities, community colleges, and vocational schools. He also chaired the Distant Learning Advisory Committee that is responsible for the development of the Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual University and the Commonwealth Virtual Library. KCVU went "on-line" in the fall semester of 1999 and presently has the largest enrollment

of any similar institution in the country. He previously chaired the Technology and Workforce Committees of the Governor's Quality and Efficiency Task Force that resulted in the initiation of the Kentucky Information Highway and the formation of the CIO position in state government.

Dr. Todd serves on the board of several organizations, is Chairman of the Kentucky Science and Technology Council, and an advisory board member of Louisville Gas & Electric Corporation.

Dr. Todd has received numerous awards and recognitions, including Junior Achievement Business Laureate, Lane Report Leadership in Science and Technology, UK Engineering Hall of Distinction, Beta Gamma Sigma Outstanding Business Leader of the Year, Phi Delta Kappa Service to Education Award, Telecon Magazine Hall of Fame, Industrial Science Award from the Kentucky Society of Professional Engineers, and the Governor's

New Product Award.

Dr. Todd is married to the former Patricia
Brantley and they have two children, Troy
and Kathryn.

arry W. Ivy is in his second year as Athletics Director at the University of Kentucky, his 33rd year at the school where he has earned widespread recognition as one of the top administrators in collegiate athletics.

When C.M. Newton announced in December 1999 that he would retire as the UK Athletics Director after ushering the department through its most successful decade in school history, the comment "hard act to follow" resonated throughout the collegiate sports landscape. But when an advisory committee began reviewing potential candidates for Newton's replacement, the mere mention of Larry Ivy prompted enthusiastic endorsements from athletics administrators, coaches, private industry leaders, media and seemingly everyone who had an opinion to voice.

In an instant, "hard act to follow" was replaced by "perfect choice."

On March 20, 2000, the University of Kentucky Athletics Board unanimously approved then-UK President Charles T. Wethington's recommendation that Ivy become UK's new Athletics Director. On April 4, the University's Board of Trustees approved Ivy's appointment, and he took the reins on July 1, 2000.

Ivy came to UK in 1969 at the age of 25 as the nation's youngest director of housing. In 1976, he joined the UKAA as an assistant athletics director, overseeing the association's fiscal affairs. When

Newton joined UK as Athletics Director in 1989, he promoted Ivy to associate athletics director for

internal affairs, making Ivy the top assistant to the AD. Ivy was promoted in 1993 to senior associate athletics director. His responsibilities included overseeing day-to-day operations of the association in the absence of the director, handling operations and serving as game management director for the men's basketball and football teams, and coordinating facilities, maintenance, grounds, tickets, accounting, purchasing and data processing.

Ivy has been a major contributor to the phenomenal growth of the University of Kentucky Athletics Association in his 25 years as an administrator. Since he joined the UKAA in 1976:

- The budget has increased from \$3 million in 1976-77 to \$40 million in fiscal year 2001;
- From nine men's sports to 22 varsity sports today, including the addition of women's sports into UK Athletics;
 - From 40 full-time employees to 150.

In the competitive arena, the Wildcats have won three NCAA Men's Basketball Championships, appeared in six NCAA Final Fours and played in six college football bowl games, among numerous other accomplishments.


Larry Ivy has been the one administrative

presence throughout this era of tremendous growth and success.

Τ h Huntsville, Ala., native quickly established himself as one of the most knowledgeable college administrators in the nation. A master organizer, Ivy has served as tournament manager for nine rounds of the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament held in Lexington - including

the 1985 Final Four - and for three Southeastern Conference Men's Basketball Tournaments. Ivy has served on numerous committees for the SEC, and

currently is chairman of the SEC Men's Basketball Tournament Ticket Committee.



A defining moment for Ivy occurred at the 1995 NCAA Convention, when he was recognized as the 1994 NCAA Business Manager of the Year by the College Athletic Business Managers of America (CABMA), the highest honor given by the group. The national award recognized Ivy's

outstanding achievement in managing the finances of the UK Athletics Association. He is an honorary member of Omicron Delta Kappa, an honor society that emphasizes academics and leadership. He is also an honorary member of the K-Association, the UKAA letterwinners organization.

Ivy, a UK Fellow, earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Alabama in 1967 and a master's in business administration from there in 1968.

He and his wife Dorene are very active in the Central Kentucky community. While Ivy serves on the YMCA, Lexington Sports Commission and UK Basketball Museum boards, Dorene is on the board of the American Heart Association. Last year, the pair served as chairpersons for the annual Heart Association walk. They have two children, Kim Ivy and Rob Manchester.
