Coming into Eucus

The UK women's tennis team enters the 2000-01 season with a greater focus than ever before. With all eight players returning from last year's squad, the UK women have a clear understanding of what it takes to reach their goals. A year of experience may have never been so valuable to a team. The 1999-2000 Cats were extremely young, fielding four freshmen, three sophomores and one junior. For many, this was reason enough for the Wildcats to have a difficult rebuilding year. Not a theory that Head Coach Mark Guilbeau buys into.

"Despite having a very young team, and despite graduating our top three players from the 1998-99 season, our expectations remained high," Guilbeau said. "Certainly, we respect the

cycles that teams must go through as experienced players graduate and are replaced with younger players. We lost a tremendous part of our program... our top three players, No. 1 doubles team and one half of our No. 2 doubles team. These were leaders in every area, athletically, academically, socially and emotionally. Regardless, I know that our talent level was extremely strong last season. I expected us to continue to contend for a top sixteen NCAA position and to continue to build on what our previous teams had already accomplished."

Do not be misled, the 2000 Cats produced another successful season, qualifying for the NCAA Tournament for the fourth consecutive year and reaching a season-high national ranking of No. 22. The UK women's tennis team finished with a record of 12-11 and earned seven clutch wins by a 5-4 score. Still, it was a season that

could have seen the Cats accomplish much more with their outstanding talent level.


"The team competed very well. They put forth a tremendous physical effort and remained tough during many challenging matches," Guilbeau said. "The missing ingredient was an intense focus dayin and day-out. I believe we allowed many issues to detract from our focus. Our primary goal for the upcoming season is to improve our focus and to have increased concentration on the specific skills and strategies needed to play at our highest level."


The experience gained through a demanding season of practice and training, as well as directly through competing in many close matches will serve the Cats well in 2000-2001.

"We are all very excited about the upcoming

season," Guilbeau points out. "I know that we learned a great deal last season. Maybe it's a different outlook, but I think the best way to evaluate our level of accomplishment from last year is through the progress and level we can reach this season. With a young group, it often takes more than one year for the rewards of hard work and training to show up. I believe our team and individual players will realize this throughout this season and will experience great success."

The UK women's tennis program will have one new face for the upcoming season. Kathy Herring returns to the Wildcats as the new assistant coach for the team. Herring graduated from UK in 1999 and was a top player for the Wildcats during her three seasons.

Herring is not new to the coaching ranks, the former Wildcat served as a volunteer assistant for UK during the 1998-99 season. Guilbeau and the entire team are very excited to have Herring back. The Chattanooga, Tenn., native returns to Lexington after a short stint as the teaching professional at the Four Seasons Sports Country Club in Crestview Hills, Ky.

On the courts, the Cats will again be led by the squad's lone senior Brooke Skeen. Skeen was the team's Most Valuable Player in 1999-00. The North Carolina native recorded a team best 25-13 record, mostly at No. 2 singles. Skeen enters this season with an Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) ranking of No. 84 in singles and No. 45 in doubles (paired with sophomore Leigh Bradwell).

"Brooke is a real fighter on the court for us," Guilbeau said. "She is great under pressure and, hopefully, that will rub off on the rest of the team."

Juniors Lauren Rookledge and Carolina Mayorga are also expected to be top players for the Cats. Rookledge, the team's Most Improved Player in 2000, moved from outside the singles line-up as a freshman to a top-player for the Wildcats. She posted a 25-16 record in 2000 and was one of the Cats' strongest performers. Mayorga, the Cats' No. 1 singles and doubles player (paired with sophomore Sarah Witten) is ranked No. 96 in the ITA rankings in singles and No. 11 in the doubles rankings.

Junior Shannon Stafford returns to the UK line-up with three years of eligibility remaining. Stafford, a major part of the Cats' singles line-up as a freshman, received a medical redshirt during the 1999-2000 season due to shoulder surgery. The Gainesville, Fla., native has fully recovered and will be a great addition both on and off the court.

The women's tennis team also returns a very strong sophomore class. Leigh Bradwell, Jill Buckley, Amy Trefethen and Sarah Witten all return after a year of valuable experience. Each of the four competed in the singles and doubles line-ups throughout last season. Witten (paired with Mayorga) enters the 2001 season ranked No. 11 in the ITA doubles standings. Bradwell (along with

Skeen) is ranked No. 45 in doubles by the ITA.

"Without question, an improved focus will benefit our program in so many ways," Guilbeau said. "I believe the players will develop a stronger commitment to the game and a better understanding of their strengths as a player. "This team has displayed

an improved ability to communicate with each other and the coaching staff. All of these characteristics will lead to a higher level of play on a consistent basis and a very enjoyable season." We have a very strong team and many strengths to build on. It will be a great year for UK women's tennis."

Marks

ark Guilbeau enters his fifth season as head coach of the University of Kentucky women's tennis team. With every member of last year's team returning, Guilbeau is very excited about the opportunity for the UK women to achieve a new standard during the 2000-2001 season.

"Rarely does a team have the opportunity to remain completely intact for more than one year in

collegiate sports," Guilbeau said. "The experience gained from last season, both on the practice court and in matches, as well as the maturity we gained as people, will certainly help us throughout this season. We enter the 2000-2001 season with many improved tennis skills. More importantly, I believe each member of the team is more keenly aware of the need for a very intense focus on a daily basis. We have expressed with great emphasis the need for a very high level of concentration and attention throughout practices and competitive matches. I am excited to see improvement in these areas from a more experienced and mature group."

Reflecting on four rewarding years in Lexington, Guilbeau foresees only more excitement and fulfillment as coach of the UK women's tennis program.

"We have established an exciting atmosphere here," Guilbeau said. "The University of Kentucky is a great place to play tennis. We have a strong program and we have a good time playing.

"The entire experience of college tennis should be fun, exciting, and challenging, something that all members of the program will always remember with great joy and pride," Guilbeau continued. "This sounds like a given. Unfortunately, with the demands placed on student-athletes to win at all costs, the philosophy of enjoying the sport is often lost."

Guilbeau says that the University of Kentucky women's tennis program provides its student-athletes with the opportunity to become the best tennis player possible, achieve academic success, experience a complete collegiate life, and most importantly, grow as a person while enjoying many fulfilling experiences.

"Achieving success is measured by much more than wins and losses," Guilbeau said. "All student-athletes should know that everything they accomplish at UK will be a result of commitment, desire, determination, discipline, hard work and a love for the process. Then, when the experience comes to an end, every member of the program can look back with pride and satisfaction."

Guilbeau is no stranger to hard work. As an assistant with the women's tennis team at Georgia, he helped lead the Bulldogs to a national champi-



onship in 1994. He continued to strive for success in his first year as UK head coach, guiding his young team to a 12-13 record in 1997. In 1998, the Cats continued to improve, finishing 15-9 with a national ranking of 24th.

Guilbeau took the Cats to new levels in 1999, guiding them as high as 18th in the ITA rankings before finishing the season at 22nd. UK finished in a tie for fourth

place in the Southeastern Conference, its highest finish since 1994. The Cats came up one win shy of a trip to Gainesville, Fla., for the Sweet 16, but the experience gained by the team was invaluable.

"When you are competing in the strongest tennis conference in the country, it is important that goals are set with the intention of working extremely hard and making a complete commitment to development and progress," Guilbeau said.

The 2000 squad was young and some referred to the season as a rebuilding year, but the Cats again reached the NCAA team tournament in 2000 and achieved a season-high ranking of No. 22. The success was accomplished despite the loss of the team's top three players and team leaders from the 1999 squad. Clearly, a pattern of success has been established by UK women's tennis.

Day-to-day instruction and workouts are a very inspiring and rewarding part of the job, Guilbeau said. While he believes strongly in spending time to improve each player's weak areas, at least 50 percent of court time is spent focusing on strengths and weapons, and additional time is devoted to physical conditioning and strength development.

"A promise I make to each athlete is that she will develop a confident game style centered

around her individual strengths, and that she will reach the highest fitness level of her life," Guilbeau said.

The idea of giving 100 percent every day is the heart of Guilbeau's coaching philosophy. He firmly believes that both progress and enjoyment come from that type of work ethic.

"Success must be earned...it does not come from luck," Guilbeau said. "You have to work hard and take care of all the details."

Not only does Guilbeau demand a great deal from his team, he demands a lot from himself as well.

"If the players know that you have their best interests in mind and you are willing to do whatever it takes to help them achieve their goals," Guilbeau said, "you will find that they will work very hard for the coaching staff and the team."

Guilbeau came to UK from Athens, Ga., where he was the women's tennis assistant coach for five seasons. He also served as the Head Tennis Professional at Jennings Mill Country Club in Athens for four years. In addition to the 1994 NCAA Championship team, Guilbeau also assisted teams that won the 1994 and 1995 ITA National Indoor Team Championships.

While at Georgia, Guilbeau helped coach eight All-Americans, four national tournament doubles champions and one NCAA singles champion. During his five years at UGA, every one of the Bulldog teams finished the season ranked in the nation's top five.

"The years in Athens were very valuable to me as a coach and teacher," Guilbeau said. "The experience I gained at the University of Georgia has helped me greatly in my coaching role. The people at Georgia and Jennings Mill Country Club were extremely kind and supportive. I was very fortunate to have such a great opportunity."


Guilbeau has traveled as a coach to the 1992 Australian Open and has worked with players at the USTA Satellite and WTA Tour level.

A native of Lafayette, La., Guilbeau played collegiate tennis at Spring Hill College in Mobile, Ala. He finished his undergraduate degree at Southwestern Louisiana in 1988. He served as a graduate teaching instructor at Southwestern Louisiana and at Georgia before completing a master's degree in Health Promotion and Behav-

ior at Georgia in 1992.

Guilbeau has run six marathons and has a personal best of 2:40:00. He also helped with raising more than \$50,000 for the American Cancer Society by playing in a doubles tennis marathon at Jennings Mill Country Club in 1991. Along with three others, Guilbeau set a Guinness Book World Record by playing doubles for 125 consecutive hours.

Guilbeau enjoys fishing, golf and everything about the sport of tennis. He lives in Lexington.

athy Herring begins her first season as assistant women's tennis coach at Kentucky. Herring, a former UK tennis player, returns to Kentucky after spending a year as a teaching professional at the Four Seasons Sports Country Club in Crestview Hills, Ky.

A 1999 graduate of UK, Herring played three seasons in the Bluegrass after transferring from Indiana. During the 1998-99 sea-

son, Herring served as a UK graduate assistant. The Chattanooga, Tenn., native brings a great deal of experience to UK's rising tennis program and is looking forward to a promising season.

"I am truly excited about my opportunity to be the assistant coach at UK," Herring said. "Coming back to Lexington and representing my alma mater is absolutely thrilling."

Coach Mark Guilbeau is also excited to have Herring on staff. He expects her to bring the relentless work ethic to the team that she showed as a player.

"I can tell you that I have rarely seen a player give the consistent effort match after match that



Kathy did," Guilbeau said. "She was determined on the court. Kathy expected a great deal from herself as a player and has shown the same intensity as a coach. She is going to be a very positive influence."

Herring is not only excited to return to UK, but is also looking forward to again working

with her former coach.

"I could not have asked for more as a first-year coach," Herring said. "Mark is a wonderful mentor and role model from whom I learn every day."

Guilbeau and Herring both enter with the season with great optimism. With the return of every player from last season, the coaching staff is looking forward to a successful 2000-01 season.

"The athletes on this team are enthusiastic, hard workers, which makes working to be a better team fun and exciting."

When she is not involved with tennis, Herring enjoys kick boxing, walking with friends and watching movies. She resides in Lexington.

he University of Kentucky women's tennis program was undoubtedly looking at a rebuilding year when they assembled to begin the 1999-2000 season. With the loss of three key seniors — Kelly Brown, Massoumeh Emami and Christy Sigurski — Coach Mark Guilbeau was left with a team that boasted only one upperclassman. Guilbeau refused to see the season as one of adjustment; his expectations remained high.

With four freshmen, three sophomores and one junior, the youthful Cats finished the regular season with a 12-11 record despite playing in the Southeastern Conference, arguably the nation's best tennis conference. The Wildcats' 9-1 non-conference record elevated them into the top 25 for most of the season. UK's lone non-conference loss came at the hands of 13th-ranked Notre Dame.

The UK dual-match schedule, comprised of 17 top-50 opponents, began in February and did not allow much rest. The Cats breezed through regional rivals Louisville and Miami (Ohio) before their home opener against the 1999 NCAA runner-up Florida Gators. This Florida contest would mark the beginning of a string of five matches

against ranked opponents for the Wildcats.

Within that string of ranked competitors UK came up with two big wins. The Cats pulled out a tough win over 27th-ranked North Carolina by handing UNC losses in two of three doubles matches to get the 5-4 victory. UK defeated the 66th-ranked Michigan Wolverines in four singles contests and two of three doubles matches.

Throughout the season, close victories became common. The Cats cut through the pressure to come up with seven 5-4 victories. UK notched one of those 5-4 wins over 22nd-ranked Arkansas on the road in a pivotal SEC contest. The Cats also showed they could hold onto a lead when they took four out of six singles matches en route to a victory over Big 10 Champion Ohio State.

· UK would also end its season with a streak of seven ranked opponents. The Cats came up with back-to-back road wins at 35th-ranked Tulane and 33rd-ranked Indiana. The Wildcats' regular season finale brought the Mississippi State Bulldogs to Lexington for a crucial SEC match-up. The Cats found themselves down 4-2 at the end of singles competition. With their backs against the wall, UK's top three doubles teams pulled out wins to take the contest 5-4.

The Wildcats finished eighth in the SEC and

grabbed an at-large bid to the 2000 NCAA Tournament. It was the fourth trip to the tournament for UK since Guilbeau arrived in the Bluegrass in 1996. The Cats received a two-seed and traveled to Berkeley, Calif., to compete against the Texas A&M Aggies. UK was downed by the Aggies in a hard fought 5-4 match. It was the Cats' first 5-4 loss of the season.


The year 2000 also brought a women's tennis "first" to the commonwealth. Junior Brooke Skeen was named SEC Player of the Week on Feb. 22, making her UK's first female tennis player to win the honor.

The SEC also recognized the Wildcats' academic achievement. Skeen, Carolina Mayorga, Lauren Rookledge and Shannon Stafford were all named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll. To be eligible, a student-athlete must have a 3.0 grade point average, be classified academically as a sophomore and have 24 credit hours countable towards a degree. All four Cats who were eligible were named to the elite group.

With a year of experience, the Cats have placed high expectations on themselves for a great 2001.





All-Americans

n 1987, Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi were UK's first All-Americans, claiming doubles honors after advancing to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Championships and finishing the year ranked No. 8 in the ITA collegiate rankings. Hahn was also a singles All-American in 1987, winning the SEC singles title and leading the Kentucky squad to a 21-7 record and second place finish in the SEC. The UK team ended its year

ranked 13th nationally.

Hahn and Takagi claimed both singles and doubles honors in 1988 as they were among the top eight seeds at the NCAA Tournament and finished the year ranked in the top 10. The UK tandem also advanced to the finals of the Rolex National Indoor in 1988 and won the SEC Indoor. As a squad, UK finished the season at 21-5, third in the SEC and sixth at the NCAA Championships.

Hahn and Takagi were both three-time All-SEC performers, as Hahn was recognized in 1986, 1987 and 1988, and Takagi in 1985, 1986 and 1987.

In 1992, Susan Klingenberg claimed All-America honors after being seeded among the top 16 players at the NCAA Tennis Championships. Klingenberg, then a junior, was Kentucky's third female to gain All-America status. She finished the year ranked 22nd in the ITA collegiate rankings before sitting out most of her senior year with a hand injury.

All three All-Americans are members of the UK Tennis Hall of Fame.





Tennis

he Southeastern Conference sets the standard of excellence in college tennis. Its teams are annually among the nation's best and its student-athletes regularly claim national titles.

The 2000 season was no different, as the SEC paced all conferences with 10 NCAA Tournament bids. The SEC champion Georgia Bulldogs continued their stellar play into the post-season winning the NCAA championship and making it the fifth straight year the SEC has been represented in the championship match. In all, 10 SEC schools finished in the nation's top 50.

SEC women's tennis was dominant throughout the '90s. With Florida advancing to every championship match from 1996-99 and Georgia's 2000 performance, the SEC looks to continue its dominance into the new millennium. SEC teams have claimed five national titles since 1992 with Florida winning three and Georgia taking two.

In individual competition, the SEC placed 17 players in the ITA's top 50 and nine players claimed All-America honors in 2000.


Four of the last nine women's NCAA singles championships belong to SEC players, bringing the SEC's NCAA singles title total to six. Since 1990, the SEC has had 60 women's singles players earn ITA All-America honors.

Doubles competition has been no different, as the league has garnered four NCAA women's doubles titles since 1989, including 2000 Cham-

pions Marrisa Catlin and Lori Grey of Georgia. In addition, the SEC has produced 69 Doubles All-Americans over the last decade.

The 2001 season should feature much of the same, with many of the nation's top teams battling for the SEC crown in Starkville, Miss., before heading to Stone Mountain Ga., for the 2001 NCAA Championships.

"The SEC is the best tennis conference in the country," Coach Mark Guilbeau said. "Programs are judged by the company they keep, and we're among some very elite company in the SEC. It gives our players a chance to compete against the nation's very best college tennis players."





\$58 Million Facility Showcases the University's Academic Commitment


n addition to providing the finest in athletic facilities, the University of Kentucky also provides student-athletes with the best in academic facilities. The latest addition to the educational landscape at UK is the \$58 million William T. Young Library, which opened in 1998.


- *Size:* The new library covers 365,350 square feet more than six football fields. The building is five stories high, plus a basement.
- *Shelf capacity:* If laid end-to-end, the bookshelf space would stretch 198,828 linear feet that's more than 37 miles of shelf space. The shelves will house 1.2 million books.
- Seating capacity: The new library can seat more than 4,000 patrons at one time, a 355 percent increase over the old library. The seating on the fifth floor of the new library equals the capacity of the former library.
- Computer connections: Every study table and study carrel in the new library has an electrical outlet and a computer jack connected to the university's computer system.
- Flexibility: The library has a state-of-the-art electronic infrastructure that will enable UK to take full advantage of current and emerging technology. In addition, the five floors and basement of the structure are designed as open, flexible spaces, enabling the library to




adapt its services and facilities to the future changes in needs of UK students.


• *Financing:* The athletics department has its own special investment in the new library. UK Athletics is providing \$3,200,000 each year to pay for the \$58 million building.











he University of Kentucky opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The Ohio Casualty Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS) is located inside Memorial Coliseum.

Over the years, the services offered by CATS have grown, and so has the need for additional space. The UKAA has responded by constructing a new CATS area, which opened in January 1998. The new facility is called the Ohio Casualty Center for Academic and Tutorial Services, thanks to a one million dollar grant from the Ohio Casualty Insurance Group.

The new Ohio Casualty Center cost a total of \$2.4 million and covers aproximately 20,000 square feet. It features a computer room which houses approximately 40 computers, a study area which accomodates 90-100 people, 25 tutoring rooms, a career development library, a community outreach office and staff offices.

UK is fortunate to have outstanding leaders in its academics support system. Associate Athletics Director for Student Services Bob Bradley, who oversees the CATS program, is known nationally for his expertise in academics support services.

"CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete," Bradley says. "We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic arena. The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our Center provides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions. Our goal is to show that we care about the student as well as the athlete."


Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics.

"I have been blessed at Kentucky," Bradley said.

CATS is also instrumental in preparing student-athletes for future careers. The Career Development Program helps student-athletes look at the future through a step-by-step process which includes:

- shadowing and internships which help determine career interests
- career counseling
- resume writing
- career plan development.

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to provide the student-athlete with every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well. Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, it is clear that Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

America's Next Great University

he University of Kentucky was founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and the present name dates to 1916.

The campus in Lexington has 673 acres and is located just south of downtown. It consists of a graduate school, the University hospital and 16 colleges. The colleges are: allied health professions, architecture, arts and sciences, agriculture, business and economics, communications and information studies, dentistry, engineering, education, fine arts, human environmental sciences, law, medicine, nursing, pharmacy and social work. The graduate school offers 96 master's degree programs and 60 doctoral programs.

Enrollment on the campus in Lexington is more than 30,000 and includes students from every Kentucky county, every state, and more than 100 foreign countries. Full-time faculty numbers 1,833. Approximately 98 percent of the full-time faculty hold the highest possible degrees in their field. UK's faculty and staff attract more than \$130 million annually in grants, gifts and contracts; and the University has been designated a Research University I by the Carnegie Foundation — one of just 59 such public universities in the country.

The University attracts excellent students. The average ACT score for first-year students is four points above the national average.

The number of UK alumni is more than 160,000. Private support from alumni and friends of the University exceeds \$45 million annually.


The new William T. Young Library is a library of tomorrow for Kentuckians of today. The \$58 million structure is a repository of knowledge as well as a symbol of the University's commitment to academic excellence. It is a building that appeals to the eye and the intellect.

"Public buildings, especially libraries, should be something above the ordinary," says President Charles T. Wethington Jr. "We wanted this building to make a statement about the importance of a library. I feel we have done that."

This library, he adds, is a symbol to our students and faculty, now and later, and to all Kentuckians that academic excellence is our top priority, and that we "are committed to becoming one of the nation's top 20 public research universities."

In addition, UK maintains 23 research centers which conduct applied research in areas as diverse as tobacco and health, aging, cancer, toxicology, equine health, mineral production, manufacturing systems, and public policy.

Several excel in the services offered to the public. The Center for Manufacturing Systems has assisted more than 500 small and mid-sized industrial firms in Kentucky. The Gluck Equine



Research Center is recognized as one of only three of its kind in the world, offering continuing research into diseases of the horse.

The UK College of Medicine is consistently ranked among the top schools nationally in the quality of primary care training. The UK College of Pharmacy is ranked third in the country by *U.S. News and World Report* and is one of the few pharmacy schools in the country with the capability of

developing a drug "from bench to bedside" because of its drug product evaluation unit.

The University is in the process of developing the Coldstream Research Campus, a 750-acre complex designed to attract high-tech companies desiring ties to the University. Negotiations are under way to execute leases with developers to construct several new commercial facilities on the research campus.




