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

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

From its modest beginnings in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nation's most outstanding institutions of higher learning. As a comprehensive land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the Commonwealth. In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that awaits students at UK. At Kentucky, there is a tradition of value

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY FACTS

History

UK was founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and the present name dates to 1916. The Lexington campus has 673 acres. Dr. Charles T. Wethington, Jr., is UK's 10th president.

Students

The University of Kentucky now has more than 72,000 students with 24,000 on the Lexington campus and 48,000 at the 14 community colleges across the state. UK now educates 38 percent of all students in Kentucky attending a public or private college or university. There are 5,100 students now enrolled in graduate school with 95 master's and 59 doctoral programs offered.

Faculty

There are 1,643 full-time faculty on the Lexington campus and 1,096 faculty in the community colleges. Faculty brought in more than \$100 million in grants, contracts and gifts to the University during the last academic year.

Academic Programs

Currently, there are 17 academic colleges and a graduate school. Students have a choice of 108 undergraduate majors from which to choose. The University is recommended in seven publications for its value in providing higher education.

Research

UK ranks among the Top 100 research institutions in the nation, and is one of only 45 public universities in the United States—the only one in Kentucky—to be classified as a Research University of First Class.

Medical Center

The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, including a 461-bed hospital, is located on the Lexington campus. Over 3,500 students are enrolled in its five colleges—medicine, dentistry, nursing, pharmacy, and allied health professions.

Library

The UK Library System contains more than two million volumes and is inter-connected by computer with each of the 14 community colleges. The library is ranked 34th among the 108 top university research libraries in North America based upon the number of volumes held. The University has raised \$18 million in private funds toward the construction of a new \$58 million state-of-the-art library.

Sports

The current number of UK sports on the varsity level is 21—10 men's sports, 10 women's sports, and 1 coed sport. The men's sports consist of football, basketball, baseball, cross country, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, swimming, golf, and soccer. For the women, UK sponsors basketball, volleyball, swimming, golf, tennis, gymnastics, cross country, indoor and outdoor track, and soccer on the varsity level. The single coed sport is rifle.

The UK men's basketball team has been prominent nationally for 50 years under the leadership of four coaches, ranging from Adolph Rupp to Rick Pitino. The UK football program also offers the excitement of top-level competition in the Southeastern Conference and is headed by Coach Bill Curry.

This is Lexington, home of the University of Kentucky.



With a population of around 225,000, Lexington is small enough to provide the perfect college atmosphere for the University of Kentucky. But is is also large enough to offer the cultural opportunities usually reserved for larger cities.

KENTUCKY

If these United States can be called a body... then Kentucky can be called its heart. —Jesse Stuart. Though the above words were written by one of Kentucky's favorite sons, any one of the millions of visitors to the Bluegrass State each year might nod in agreement.

Kentucky embodies the very essence of America, from majestic mountains and forests to vast sparkling lakes, from rolling acres of farm and pastureland to the hustle and bustle of major metropolitan centers. And around every turn in the road, Kentucky's colorful past, which helped shape our country's character, is preserved and maintained for all to enjoy. The result is a state so diverse in travel and recreational opportunities that one is hard pressed to name its equal.

If asked to describe Kentucky, the first word to come to mind would probably be horses. And the description would be accurate, since the Bluegrass region of central Kentucky is internationally recognized as the Horse Capital of the World. Lexington, the heart of the Bluegrass, preserves the romantic tradition of the horse farms and is the hub of the multi-billion dollar horse industry.

Kentucky is also a land steeped in the rich history of our nation. Legendary pioneer Daniel Boone laid out Kentucky's second settlement at Fort Boonesborough, and nearby, a hundred years later, the Shaker religious sect prospered at picturesque Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill.

Abraham Lincoln was born in Hodgenville, the one-room cabin is part of a National Historic Site. The plantation home that inspired Stephen Foster to write "My Old Kentucky Home" still stands at a state park of the same name. 
With a Fall Ranking of No. 15 in the ITA's Rolex poll, UK coach Dennis Emery has his guns reloaded and aimed at an SEC title for 1994. The return of five starters from 1993 and the addition of a strong recruiting class leaves Emery with much optimism for the upcoming season.

Emery's big guns from 1993, Mahyar Goodarz and Michael Hopkinson, return for '94. Goodarz has singles and doubles All-America honors under his belt, while Hopkinson earned All-America status in doubles.

Goodarz, a 1993 singles and doubles All-America, returns at No. 1 to lead the Cats to their second SEC title in the school's history. Goodarz, a senior from Melbourne,

Hopkinson, a 1993 Doubles All-America, sat out the fall season, but returns this spring. He finished 1993 with a 26-17 singles slate and was an NCAA qualifier in singles.

The middle lineup spots will most likely be filled

Australia, was 22-16 and was among the top 16 seeds at the NCAA championships. Goodarz, who was hampered by a wrist injury, was upset in the first round by Notre Dames's Chuck Coleman. He sat out this fall after having surgery on his right wrist and is expected to return at full strength in the spring.

by a pair of juniors, Ford Lankford and Jason Yeager. Lankford, who transferred from Florida State in 1992, finished last season with a 22-18 record playing primarily at No. 3 and No. 4. Lankford is a Lexington product. Yeager, a junior from Edgewood, Ky., finished 1992 one match below .500 at 18-19 and has been hampered this fall

with nagging back problems. Sophomore Scott Treibly from Louisville, Ky., held off Alabama's Marco Mazota in the final of the Southern Collegiate Tennis Championships to take home his first collegiate tournament title in September. Freshmen Jason Thompson, Pablo Fernandez, Ludde Sundin and Chris Tapernoux, along with walk-on Matt Walters, add muchneeded depth to the Kentucky Lineup.



Junior Jason Yeager sat out most of the fall season due to injury, but returns full-force this spring.

Thompson, a freshman from Salem, Oregon, is a two-time National Team member. He has won 11 national junior titles, including the 18-and-under USTA International singles and the USTA Clay Courts doubles crowns. He was a quarterfinalist at the Italian and U.S. Open Junior Doubles Championships in 1992 and was ranked No. 1 in 18-and-under doubles during 1992. He played only two years of high school tennis while traveling with the junior national team during his sophomore and junior years. He was undefeated in the state of Oregon and played No. 1 for Sprague High School.

Tapernoux, from Quito, Equador, is a strong player who will contend for a middle lineup position. He finished the fall at 3-5.

Another promising freshman is Ludde Sundin, from Torup, Sweden. He is ranked 27 in the Rolex Collegiate Rankings fall poll. He was a finalist at the Swedish Championship U-21 and also played soccer in high school. Sundin advanced to the

semifinals of the Southern Collegiate Tennis Championships. Pablo Fernandez, a freshman from Lima, Peru, advanced through pre-qualifying at the SkyTel National Clay Court Championships and lost in the qualifier final.

Matt Walters, a walk-on from Versailles, Ky., was the MVP at Woodford County High School. He is a transfer from Transylvania College in Lexington, where he was All-District and received the Freshman Award.

Kentucky finished the 1993 season with a 6-7 record in the SEC (13-12 overall) and seventh-place in the league. The Wildcats lost in the first round of the SEC tournament to top-ranked Georgia, which went on to win the championship by defeating Mississippi State in the final.

The Wildcats have been ranked among the nation's elite in the final rankings for 10 consecutive seasons. UK has been ranked in the Top 25 nationally in the final ITA poll every year since ending the 1984 season at No. 21.

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When Dennis Emery began his University of Kentucky coaching career 12 years ago, he had aspirations of winning a national championship and building one of the top programs in the nation. Those goals have not changed, and Emery's aspirations are becoming realities.


In each of the past seven years, Kentucky has been ranked in the preseason top 20. This year the Cats began at the No. 13 spot in the preseason and are 15th in the Fall Rankings. Coupled with a run that began in 1987 that landed the Cats in the NCAA Team Championships

five of the last six seasons, (including quarterfinal losses to Stanford and USC in close matches) Kentucky has taken its place among collegiate tennis' elite.

Emery took over a UK program in 1983 that finished last in the SEC two of the three previous years and had only finished in the top half of the 10-team SEC five times since 1944. Emery began a long-term process that culminated nine years later in 1992 with UK's first SEC regular-season championship, and more importantly, the school's first SEC tournament and overall crowns. Kentucky has become one of the nation's dominant programs by claiming top-10 finishes four of the past five seasons while competing in the Southeastern Conference — which is considered to be the nation's top tennis league. Emery was named 1992 SEC Coach of the Year and was a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors.

Last year, Emery picked up his 200th Kentucky career victory as the Wildcats upset then-No. 6 Notre Dame, 4-3 in Lexington on Feb. 9.

While at UK, Emery has seen 10 male players earn All- America honors a total of 18 times. The Wildcats have had a doubles team named All-America each of the past seven seasons. In addition to coaching UK's men's squad, Emery serves as UK's Director of Tennis. A high point in his career came in 1988 when both UK programs (men's and women's), were ranked among the nation's top six squads. The only other program to ever achieve this status is Stanford.

Emery began his coaching career after earning Honorable Mention All-America honors at Carson-Newman College in 1977. After competing briefly on the satellite tour, Emery began working for Australian legend Harry Hopman

"Mr. Hopman took a personal interest in my career and in my growth as a coach," Emery said. "I owe a lot of my philosophy as a coach to the time I spent with him."

In 1978, Emery began his collegiate career at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn. Emery took

over a mediocre program that had only five players that fall. When he was named head coach in September of 1977, he was only 22 years old, which stands as the NCAA record for the youngest head coach at a Division I institution. During his five years at APSU, Emery turned a dormant program into an undefeated dominating powerhouse that didn't drop a match in the OVC during his last two-and-a-half years and posted wins over SEC schools such as Kentucky, Ole Miss and Vanderbilt. In 1981, his squad was ranked No. 31 in the nation.

Emery is a member of the ITA Board of Directors for collegiate tennis and has served as tournament director of the ITA-USTA National Team Indoor Championship for nine consecutive years. He was chairman of the Region III Tennis Committee from 1985-1987 and has served as associate coach for the U.S. Junior Davis Cup team.

Emery has also served as coach to retired professional Susan Sloane-Lundy of Lexington. Sloane climbed from No. 122 to 18th in the WTA rankings during her career. Emery also coaches several other junior players.

The 39-year-old has played an instrumental role in the fundraising effort for UK's planned \$1 million outdoor tennis stadium and complex project.

Emery is married to the former Brenda Wild of Tampa, Fla. They have three children: Matthew, Andrew and Meritt.





Don Carbone begins his ninth season with the Kentucky tennis program.



The University of Kentucky has served as host to the USTA/ITCA Men's National Team Indoor Intercollegiate Championship for the past nine years. The Team Indoor, which is essentially the NCAA Indoor Championship, is held each February at the Louisville Tennis Club in Louisville, Ky.

The Team Indoor is a five-day tournament with a 20-team field. The Louisville Tennis Club, located on Herr Lane, has 12 hard-surfaced courts. Each team is guaranteed three matches.

"The USTA/ITA National Indoor Team Championship is probably the most exciting event of the year as it is the first big team event, "said UK Coach Dennis Emery. "And it's early in the year before teams carry the baggage of some losses. It has been the site of some of the best dual matches in college tennis history. We are extremely fortunate to have hosted this event for the past nine years."

The Team Indoor Intercollegiate Championships were created in 1973 and were played at the Nielsen Tennis Stadium in Madison, Wisc., for six years, growing in quality and prestige every year. Princeton served as host in 1980, which was to be the last indoor tournament for the next five

years, as Cal-Berkely defeated Stanford in a thrilling 5-4 final. After a year layoff, the tournament was moved to UCLA where Pepperdine won the title that season and Georgia finished second. UCLA continued to host the tournament until it was moved to Louisville, where Stanford defeated USC in an exciting final televised nationally on PBS through an underwriting grant from Rolex.


The tournament has remained in Louisville since that time.

This year, an experimental format will be used in the competition. Doubles will be played first and the team to win two out of three will receive one point. Singles will be awarded one point for each match and the team to accumulate four points will win the match. The format has been adopted in order to shorten match time as the tournament traditionally extends into the early morning hours.

The Wildcats are one of seven teams that have competed in the event the last seven consecutive years. Only one other school east of the Mississippi can claim such an achievement (Georgia). Most recently the Wildcats finished 9th in 1992. UK lost to TCU in the first round, the went on to defeat Florida and Tennessee.



Ten men have been named All-Americans a total of 18 times over the past seven years for the UK Wildcats tennis squad.

A program that prides itself in the strength of its doubles, UK's men's squad has produced doubles All-Americans in each of the past seven years. The latest entry was Mahyar Goodarz and Michael Hopkinson, who comprised the No. 2 seed at the 1993 NCAA Doubles Championships.


In 1992, Andy Potter and Scott Hulse earned All-America status after being seeded among the top eight doubles teams in the NCAA Championships. The UK tandem was 23-6 overall and played primarily at No. 2 for the Wildcats. They were members of the 1992 UK squad that went 24-5 and were SEC Champions as well as NCAA quarterfinalists.

UK's first doubles All-Americans were Greg Van Emburgh and Richard Benson in 1987. That UK tandem advanced to the semifinals at the men's NCAA tournaments and was awarded All-America honors for its achievement. Van Emburgh won singles honors that year and repeated his performance in 1988, earning both singles and doubles All-America status.

In 1989, Benson became the first player in UK history to receive All-America status three times, as he paired with Adam Malik in doubles to claim his prize. The Wildcatstandem compiled an 18-6 record, finishing the season ranked fourth nationally. They were also seeded fifth in doubles at the 1989 NCAA Championships. Malik, who turned pro after his junior year, was also named singles All-American after finishing the season 32-17 and capturing the SEC singles title.


In 1990, the successful doubles tradition continued. John Yancey and Ian Skidmore completed the season with a 14-12 record and a No. 9 ranking. The following year, the UK tandem completed a 25-12 slate and was seeded among the top eight duos at the NCAA championships, qualifying for All-America honors for the second consecutive year.

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
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

Three individuals have earned All-America status eight times, four as Doubles All-Americans and three as singles titlists for the Kentucky women's tennis program.

In 1987, Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi were named doubles All-Americans after advancing to the quarterfinal round of the 1987 NCAA Women's Championship and finishing the season ranked No. 8 in the ITCA's Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings. Hahn was also an All-American in singles in 1987. After winning the SEC singles title at No. 1, she helped lead a Kentucky squad to a 21-7 finish and second place in the SEC. The UK team ended its year at the No. 13 spot nationally.


Hahn and Takagi claimed both singles and doubles honors in 1988 as they were among the top eight seeds at the NCAA tournament and finished the year in the top 10 in the rankings. The UK tandem had advanced to the finals of the Rolex National Indoor earlier in 1988 and won the SEC Indoor. As a squad, UK finished the season at 21-5, third in the SEC and sixth at the NCAA Championships.

Hahn, a and three-time All-SEC performer (1986, 1987, 1988), finished 47-8 in 1987, while Takagi, from Tokyo, Japan, was an All-SEC performer for theree consecutive seasons — 1985, 1986 and 1987.


In 1992, Susan Klingenberg, a product of Hampstead, Md., claimed All-America honors after being seeded among the top 16 players at the NCAA Women's Individual Tennis Championships at Stanford. Klingenberg, then a junior, was Kentucky's third female to gain All-America status. She finished the year ranked 22nd in the final ITCA Volvo Tennis Collegiate Rankings. She sat out most of her senior year with an injury.

All three Kentucky All-Americans are members of the UK Tennis Hall of Fame.






Tradition-building was in John Dinneen's game plan when he became the coach of the Kentucky women's tennis squad five years ago. So far, he's ahead of the game. In only five seasons at the helm of one of the nation's premier programs, Dinneen has led teams to the NCAA tournament three times and to the top half of the nation's toughest collegiate conference. His 1992 squad posted a 19th-place NCAA finish and tied for fifth in the SEC.

Dinneen directed Susan Klingenberg to All-America status in 1992, the same year Klingenberg and then-freshman

Bethany Avington earned All-Southeastern Conference honors.

Helping the student-athlete stay in top mental and physical condition is a priority to Dinneen and an integral part of his competitive philosophy. A comprehensive strength training and conditioning program, as well as access to a sports psychologist, combined with an award-winning academic support system in CATS, contribute to the Kentucky winning tradition.

"The ability to compete relentlessly and never give in to the inevitable frustrations that occur when competing against the best players and teams

in the country will also serve them well in the classroom," Dinneen says. "The far-reaching support from all areas of the University and its Athletics Department have been an integral part of our success."

Dinneen, 33, served as assistant at California University (1986-87) and at his alma mater, Harvard, (1983-85). During his stint at California, Dinneen led the Golden Bears to their finest season, winning the PAC-10 title, defeating national power Stanford twice, and finishing fourth in the final ITCA poll.

At Harvard, the Crimson

were Ivy League champions, finished No. 1 in the East and had a season-ending top-20 ranking during Dinneen's tenure. Harvard also participated in the NCAA tournament — a first for the school.

In addition to his full-time duties with the Wildcats, Dinneen has spent the past six summers as a coach for the U.S. National Team. Director of Coaching Stan Smith, former Davis Cup, Wimbledon, and U.S. Champion, remarked, "John has been with us since the beginning and has provided much stability, expertise and continuity to the US-TA Player Development program."

Dinneen's responsibilities have been geared to-

wards working with the United States' most promising female players and his travels with the team have taken him to the Italian, French and U.S. Opens as well as to Wimbledon and other European and domestic Virginia Slims events. Among the professionals with whom he has worked are Jennifer Capriati, Meredith McGrath, Lindsay Davenport, Chanda Rubin, Carrie Cunningham* and Ginger Helgeson, as well as current top American juniors Amanda Besica, Janet Lee, Stephanie Nickilas, and Cristina Moros.

U.S. National Coach in charge of women's tennis Lynne Rolley says, "J.D. has been a right-hand man for me the last six years. Our players love working with him and there is little doubt that their results and improvement have reflected his hard work and commitment to our program."

Dinneen relishes the opportunity to work with top collegiate players at Kentucky and the future great pros from the U.S. National Team.

"The double duties are certainly time-consum-


ing, but the rewards and experiences far-and-away exceed the demands on my time," he says. "I feel very fortunate to be able to work with both programs."

Dinneen, from a family of eight, graduated from Harvard with a degree in Economics in 1983. He lettered in tennis and squash and was the Ivy League MVP and Harvard's team captain his senior season.

Six players return to join four promising newcomers to provide the Wildcats with experience, depth and talent. Leading the Wildcats will be senior Marina Sansostri and junior Bethany Avington, Susan Bartl and Lora Suttile. Although Sansostri has been in-


jured all fall, Dinneen is confident Marina will be 100 percent by the spring.

Bartl and Suttile will once again be vital contrib-




Lora Suttile advanced to the finals of the Rolex Southeast Region.

Bartl has already recorded wins over Michelle Anderson of Georgia, Monica Mraz of Duke and Dana Evans of Wake Forest. Suttile has been even more spectacular as she has played in both Grand Slams this fall — the Skytel Clay Court Championships and the Riviera All-American Championships. She also reached


"If Sheri and Kirsten can remain healthy, their abilities on the court will take over and make this a much better team," Dinneen said.

Courtney Allen of Louisville, Erica Gianci of Braintree, Mass., Amy Lyons of Centerville, Ohio and Khristen Pietrucha of Boca Raton, Fla., have added youthful enthusiasm to the squad.

Gianci (10-4 fall record) and Pietrucha (11-2 fall record) have already make their presence felt. Allen and Lyons have battled some injuries but are expected to make an impact this spring.

The injury bug plagued Kentucky's experienced squad in 1993. When All-American Susan Klingenberg injured her hand in UK's match at Duke in March, UK was without its top gun. Then-sophomore Lora Suttile stepped in and ended her season with a 12-14 slate and No. 12 ranking in the Southeast Region. Suttile was coming off an injury of her own after breaking her wrist in doubles at the South Carolina Invitational in October, 1992. The Cats advanced to the quarterfinals of the SEC tournament after avenging a regular-season loss just two days earlier to LSU. Suttile and Bartl overcame a 6-2, 4-2 deficit at No. 1 doubles against LSU's Chambers and Stewart to clinch UK's 5-4 win. Top-ranked Florida upended the Cats 5-0 the following day.

Despite the injuries and 7-16 record, Kentucky gained much-needed experience to vault them into 1994 with a vengeance — a vengeance abundantly apparent as evidenced by the individual successes in fall competition.



Betbany Avington earned All-SEC Doubles bonors in 1992 and returns for the '94 season.



Dreyer participated in three NCAA singles championships and was a member of the Bruin squads that advanced to two semifinal and two NCAA final rounds during 1988-91.


"We're very lucky to have a person of Kirsten's caliber on our coaching staff," said Dinneen. "She will certainly be a big boost to the program."

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The University of Kentucky continues to keep the term "student-athlete" in the proper prospective — student first, athlete second.

For that reason, the University of Kentucky opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is known as the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services—"CATS" for short.

Located in Memorial Coliseum, the center is specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind. Recently enlarged, CATS contains a large general study area along with numerous smaller rooms for individual tutoring. The expansion added language library, tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

"Academically," UK basketball coach Rick Pitino says, "we hope to make our players overachieve in the classroom the same way they do on the basketball court, so that if they don't make it in the NBA, they can leave their college life with the beginning of a great career."

Bob Bradley, Assistant Athletics Director for Student Services and Academics, supervises CATS. Bradley is assisted by Barbara Deniston, Director of Student Development, Academic Counselors Mike Jenkins and Mike Haley, Academic Skills Coor-


dinator Sheila Breeding, and Staff Assistant Ann Sampson. CATS also employs numerous grad assistants and tutors, both from the University and surrounding community. The UKAA budgets approximately \$500,000 per year for CATS.

"We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic area," Bradley says. "The accomplished in the academic area," Bradley says. "The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each studentathlete's individual needs, set goals and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our Center provides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions. Our goal is to show that we care about the student as well as the athlete."

As illustrated by the chart on the facing page, CATS pays off. The University of Kentucky finished in the tip four of all Southeastern Conference institutions in the number of Academic All-SEC selections for the 1992-93 year.

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is simple-colleges should be able to offer the student-athlete every opportunity to succeed, not only in athletics, but in academic life as well. Judging from recent statistics, Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

"The CATS Center is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete over another student-athlete without an academic center," Bradley says. "This is a forum in which the student-athlete can get any questions about his or her academic endeavors answered."



THE HILARY J. BOONE INDOOR TENNIS CENTER THE DR. H.H. DOWNING OUTDOOR TENNIS COMPLEX

The University of Kentucky tennis facilities are a major reason for the great success of both the men's and women's teams. With the Hilary J. Boone Indoor Center and the Dr. H.H. Downing Outdoor Complex, both Kentucky tennis teams have become powers in the collegiate ranks.

The Boone Indoor Center was a gift from former 1939 team captain Hilary J. Boone. The center opened in January 1986 and is equipped with four courts and has seating for 1,500 people. A tennis Hall-of-Fame center has also been added and contains trophies and pictures depicting Kentucky's storied tradition. During the spring of 1989, the Indoor Center hosted the SEC Indoor Championship, the Hilary J. Boone Invitational (in which Southern Cal and Cal-Irvine participated) and the annual McDonald's Classic, which involved professionals Susan Sloane, Kathy Rinaldi and Joanne Russell, as well as UK players.

"This center has given us exactly what we need to compete on the national level," Wildcats Coach Dennis Emery said. "Not only are our teams able to train as we want, but the building allows us to play night matches and attract crowds, something we couldn't do in the past."


The Wildcats' outdoor facility was recently named after the "father" of Kentucky tennis, Dr. Downing, who coached the UK men's team for 29 years, 1922-46 and 1952-57. He coached longer than any other UK coach, with the exception of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. Downing's record was 166-104-5 for a winning percentage of 61.3 percent.

The complex features 18 courts, including eight varsity courts, with seating for more than 1,000 spectators.

"We had the varsity courts resurfaced and they are in top condition," said Emery. "In 1988, we hosted the men's SEC Outdoor tournament, which was very successful."

Last spring, renovations were completed as a complete weight room and lockerroom facilities were installed. A meeting room and office space were completed as well.

Plans are now in the making for a permanent seating structure to be added to the Complex.







THE BLUE AND WHITE FUND

Originated in 1973 by former Athletics Director Cliff Hagan, the Blue and White Fund's main purpose is to provide financial assistance to the UK Athletics program, for scholarships for for more than 300 student-athletes.

The Fund also helps underwrite costs associated with the nationally recognized Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS). In addition, the Fund provides dollars necessary to upgrade the entire athletics physical plant and to plan for future projects.

Some of the future projects for which the Blue and White Fund would assist include the expansion of Commonwelath Stadium from 57,800 to 72,000; the construction of the indoor practice facility, and the construction of the new athletics ticket office.

Last year, more than \$2.2 million was raised through the Blue and White Fund, under the direction of Associate Athletics Director Gene DeFilippo. Membership is open to anyone interested in helping UK student-athletes.

University of Kentucky Field House STATE-OF-THE-ART

The University of Kentucky Athletics Department has moved to the forefront in terms of indoor practice facilities. The multi-purpose field house is an asset to both the University and the athletics department. Furthermore, the facility is expected to become a drawing point in recruiting for several sports—including the track & field program.

Kentucky now joins the ranks of the few who have an indoor practice facility. The state-of-the art field house was modeled after the standout facility at Kent State. It includes a six-lane, 317-yard track (290 meters), areas for track and field events (high jump, pole vault, shot put), a full-size artificial turf football field, a computerized netting system that will allow for several sports to practice at the same time, a gymnastics room with 9,000 square feet, lockerrooms and office space.


The facility provides an immediate

enhancement for UK's track & field program, which is making its way into the national spotlight. For many years, UK was recognized mainly for its distance program. Now, however, the program is on its way to becoming competitive in all facets of track & field. For the first time in the history of the program, UK's track and field teams have the opportunity to practice through hot, cold and humid weather in a facility designed specifically for their events. The program, which is beginning to draw attention from nationally-ranked sprint and multi-event competitors, should benefit from the field house in terms of recruiting and training.

The facility will also be utilized by football, golf, gymnastics, baseball and other programs. It is located in the southeast section of the UK campus, adjacent to Commonwealth Stadium.

"The Nutter Field House has complemented our other great facilities in grand fashion. With the new NCAA practice regulations, we are able to utilize this wonderful facility to belp our conditioning and cross training goals."

UK's projected \$1 million Tennis Stadium

Fundraising efforts are underway for the proposed Hilary J. Boone Outdoor Tennis Stadium. The \$1 million dollar project features a 3,500 seat stadium and eight hard courts. UK has generated the funding for the project through private donations as well as tennis exhibitions featuring professional tennis players Martina Navratilova and Jennifer Capriati (December 5, 1992) and Jim Courier and John McEnroe (scheduled for Feb. 4, 1993). The proposed site for the stadium is adjacent to the existing Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center.

The proposed stadium will complement the recently renovated Boone Indoor Center, the Nutter Field House and the Nutter Training Facility, all on UK's South Campus. The Boone Indoor Center has four hard courts, lockerroom facilities for men and women, a complete fitness and conditioning area, meeting room and tennis offices. Also located in the Boone Tennis Center is the UK Tennis Hall of Fame where teams and individuals in UK tennis history have been honored.
