

THE UNIVERSITY

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

From its modest beginning in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nations's most outstanding institutions of higher learning. As a comprehensive land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the Commonwealth.

In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that awaits students at UK. At Kentucky, there is a tradition of value.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY FACTS

History

UK was founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and the present name dates to 1916. The Lexington campus has 673 acres. Dr. Charles T. Wethington, Jr., is UK's 10th president.

Students

The University of Kentucky now has more than 70,000 students with 24,000 on the Lexington campus and 46,000 at the 14 community colleges across the state. UK now educates 38 percent of all students in Kentucky attending a public or private college or university. There are 5,000 students now enrolled in graduate school with 92 master's and 57 doctoral program offered.

Faculty

There are 1,566 full-time faculty on the Lexington campus and another 1,050 faculty in the community colleges. Faculty brought in more than \$80 million in grants, contracts and gifts to the University during the last academic year, a 15 percent increase over the previous year.

Academic Programs

Currently, there are 17 academic colleges and a graduate school. Students have a choice of 108 undergraduate majors from which to choose. The University is recommended in five publications for its value in providing higher education.

Research

UK ranks among the Top 100 research institutions in the nation, and is one of only 45 public universities in the United States - the only one in Kentucky - to be classified as a Research University of the First Class.

Medical Center

The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, including a 461-bed hospital, is located on the Lexington campus. Over 2,700 students are enrolled in its five colleges - medicine, dentistry, nursing, pharmacy, and allied health professions.

Library

The UK Library System contains more than two million volumes and is inter-connected by computer with each of the 14 community colleges. The library is ranked 53rd among all university research libraries in the U.S. and the University has announced a fund-raising campaign to build a new \$58 million state-of-the-art library.

Sports

With the addition of men's and women's soccer last year, the current number of UK sports on the varsity level is 19 — 9 men's sports, 9 women's sports and 1 coed sport. The men's sports consist of football, basketball, baseball, cross country, indoor/outdoor track, tennis, swimming, golf, and soccer. For the women, UK sponsors basketball, volleyball, swimming, golf, tennis, gymnastics, cross country, indoor/outdoor track, and soccer on the varsity level. The single coed sport is rifle.

The UK's men basketball team has been prominent nationally for 50 years under the leadership of four coaches, ranging from Adolph Rupp to Rick Pitino. The UK football program also

offers the excitement of top-level competition in the Southeastern Conference and is headed by Coach Bill Curry.

CATS

The University of Kentucky continues to keep the term "student-athlete" in the proper perspective — student first, athlete second.

For that reason, UK opened one of the nation's first academic centers for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is known as the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services — "CATS" for short.

Located in Memorial Coliseum, the center is specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind. Recently enlarged, CATS contains a large general study area along with numberous smaller rooms for individual tutoring. The expansion added a language library, tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

"Academically," UK basketball coach Rick Pitino says, "we hope to make our players overachieve in the classroom the same way they do on the basketball court, so that if they don't make it in the NBA, they can leave their college life with the beginning of a great career."

Bob Bradley, Assistant Athletics Director for Student Services and Academics, supervises CATS. Bradley is assisted

by Barbara Deniston, Director of Student
Development, Academic Counselors Mike Jenkins
and Mike Haley, Academic Skills Coordinator
Sheila Breeding, and Staff Assistant Ann Sampson.
CATS also employs numerous grad assistants and
tutors, both from the University and surrounding
community. The UKAA budgets approximately
\$500,000 per year for CATS.


"We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic area," Bradley says. "The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals and develop strategies to attain tose goals. Our Center provides our

student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions. Our goal is to show that we care about the student as well as the athlete."

As illustrated by the chart on the facing page, CATS pays off. The University of Kentucky led all Southeastern Conference institutions in the number of Academic All-SEC selections for the 1991-92 year.

The philosophy at the university of Kentucky is simple — colleges should be able to offer the student-athlete every opportunity to succeed, not only in athletics, but in academic life as well. Judging from recent statistics, Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

"The CATS Center is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete over another without an academic center," Bradley says. "This is a forum in which the student-athlete can get any questions about his or her academic endeavors answered."



THE HILARY J. BOONE INDOOR TENNIS CENTER THE DR. H.H. DOWNING OUTDOOR TENNIS COMPLEX

The University of Kentucky tennis facilities are a major reason for the great success of both the men's and women's teams. With the Hilary J. Boone Indoor Center and the Dr. H.H. Downing Outdoor Complex, both Kentucky tennis teams have become powers in the collegiate ranks.

The Boone Indoor Center was a gift from former 1939 team captain Hilary J. Boone. The center opened in January 1986 and is equipped with four courts and has seating for 1,500 people. A tennis Hall-of-Fame center has also been added and contains trophies and pictures depicting Kentucky's storied tradition. During the spring of 1989, the Indoor Center hosted the SEC Indoor Championship, the Hilary J. Boone Invitational (in which Southern Cal and Cal-Irvine participated) and the annual McDonald's Classic, which involved professionals Susan Sloane, Kathy Rinaldi and IoAnne Russell, as well as UK players.

"This center has given us exactly what we need to compete on the national level," Wildcats Coach Dennis Emery said. "Not only are our teams able to train as we want, but the building allows us to play night matches and attract crowds, something we couldn't do in the past."


The Wildcats' outdoor facility was recently named after the "father" of Kentucky tennis, Dr. Downing, who coached the UK men's team for 29 years, 1922-46 and 1952-57. He coached longer than any other UK coach, with the exception of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. Downing's record was 166-104-5 for a winning percentage of 61.3 percent.

The complex features 18 courts, including eight varsity courts, with seating for more than 1,000 spectators.

"We had the varsity courts resurfaced two years ago and they are in top condition," said Emery. "In 1988, we hosted the men's SEC Outdoor tournament, which was very successful."

Last spring, renovations were completed as a complete weight room and lockerroom facilities were installed. A meeting room and office space were completed as well.

Plans are now in the making for a permanent seating structure to be added to the Complex as well as new lockerroom facilities.

Top Insert: The Joe B. Hall Wildcat Lodge, located on the north side of campus adjacent to Memorial Coliseum.







THE BLUE AND WHITE FUND

Originated in 1973 by former Athletics Director Cliff Hagan, the Blue and White Fund's main purpose is to provide financial assistance to the UK Athletics program, for scholarships for for more than 300 student-athletes.

The Fund also helps underwrite costs associated with the nationally recognized Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS). In addition, the Fund provides dollars necessary to upgrade the entire athletics physical plant and to plan for future projects.

Some of the future projects for which the Blue and White Fund would assist include the expansion of Commonwelath Stadium from 57,800 to 72,000; the construction of the indoor practice facility, and the construction of the new athletics ticket office.

Last year, more than \$2.2 million was raised through the Blue and White Fund, under the direction of Associate Athletics Director Gene DeFilippo.

THE AREA

LEXINGTON

This is a place where the past and present meet and mesh gracefully.

Where downtown skyscrapers overlook thousands of acres of lush pastures, home to Kentucky's most famous resident - the horse.

This is Lexington, home of the University of Kentucky.

The city offers UK students much in the way of entertainment: a Philharmonic Orchestra, Chamber Music Society, the Lexington Singers, a Council of the Arts, and a local Ballet Company. Movie theaters, international restaurants, coffee-houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, thoroughbred and harness racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds, and streams, and the

internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park, all in easy distance of the UK campus, are just a few attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.

A recent statewide poll indicated that the Lexington area is the most popular place to live, work and play in Kentucky, and it's an area most residents would not seriously consider leaving.

Though the above words were written by one of Kentucky's favorite sons, any one of the millions of visitors to the Bluegrass State each year might nod in agreement.

Kentucky embodies the very essence of America, from majestic mountains and forests to vast sparkling lakes, from rolling acres of farm and pastureland to the hustle and bustle of major metropolitan centers. And around every turn in the road, Kentucky's colorful past, which helped shape our country's character is preserved and maintained for all to enjoy. The result is a state so diverse in travel and recreational opportunities that one is hard pressed to name its equal.

If asked to describe Kentucky, the first word to come to mind would probably be horses. And the description would be accurate, since the Bluegrass region of central Kentucky is internationally recognized as the horse capital of the world. Lexington, in the heart of the Bluegrass, preserves the romantic tradition of the horse farms and is the hub of the multi-billion dollars horse industry.

Kentucky is also a land steeped in the rich history of our nation. Legendary pioneer Daniel Boone laid out Kentucky's second settlement at Fort Boonesborough, and nearby, a hundred years later, the Shaker religious sect prospered at picturesque Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill.

The plantation home that inspired Stephen Foster to write "My Old Kentucky Home" still stands at a state park of the same name. And the region that 200 years ago gave birth to one of Kentucky's most famous exports — bourbon whiskey — is dotted with world-famous distilleries.







Glance at John Dinneen's resume and you will see that his coaching career has been a successful one. In only four years as the Kentucky women's coach, Dinneen has led teams to the NCAA Tournament three times and to the top half of the nation's toughest collegiate conference with his 1992 squad posting a 19th-place NCAA finish and tie for fifth in the SEC.

"Ours is a system based on hard work and competitiveness," said Dinneen. "The groundwork is firmly in place to build a strong tradition."

That system includes a comprehensive strength training and conditioning program as well as access to a sports psychologist. Team practices and competitions as well as extensive individual instruction are emphasized at Kentucky. And it is a philosophy that works in the nation's toughest tennis conference.

Prior to donning UK's blue and white, the 32-year-old Dinneen served as an assistant at California University (1986-87) and at his alma mater 1983-85. During his stint at California, the Golden Bears experienced their

finest season, winning the PAC-10 title, defeating national power Stanford twice, and finishing fourth in the final ITCA poll.



Newton and the entire athletic department has provided all the necessary ingredients for us to win. All we (the players and coaching staff) have to do is work hard and we'll get the job done. UK is a fantastic place to coach; I can't imagine anywhere else having more to offer. I love it here!"

At Harvard, the Crimson was Ivy League champions, finished No. 1 in the East and had a season-ending top-20 ranking during Dinneen's tenure. Harvard also participated in the NCAA tournament, a first for the school.

Dinneen has spent the last six years as a coach of the U.S. National team.







Young attended West Texas State University, where she was No. 1 in the conference and held the No. 2 spot among the nation's best Division II players. She played high school tennis at Waggoner High School in Louisville, Ky. Young was No. 1 in the state in singles and doubles her senior year at Waggoneer.

She is currently completing her bachelor's degree in Philosophy and Psychology.

Young is single.

"I look forward to many successful seasons with the Lady Kats. Working in such an outstanding program is a super opportunity for any young coach like myself."

RECAP

Susan Klingenberg was named All-America and the Lady Kats returned to NCAA competition as the UK women's tennis squad exceeded many expectations for 1992.

Klingenberg became UK's third women's tennis All-America after being seeded among the top 16 players in the 64-player singles draw at the 1992 NCAA Championships in Stanford, Calif. The junior from Hampstead, Md., completed a 27-12 slate while finishing the season ranked 12th among the nation's top 100 collegiate singles players. She was undefeated in the month of March in singles and doubles and won 11 in a row from February 24 through April 3. She lost only one match during a two-month period in February and March.

Coach John Dinneen's squad finished 1992 with a 14-12 record and 19th-place finish among the Top 20 elite as ranked by the ITA's Volvo Tennis Collegiate Rankings. Kentucky played a schedule as tough as anyone this year as the Lady Kats had a stretch of 15 straight matches against teams that were in the Top 25 or that had received votes. Susan Klingenberg was undefeated in March during the midst of that streak to move into the Top 10 in singles.

"All season the team worked very hard to achieve," said Dinneen. "I'm very proud of what they've accomplished."

"It's exciting that next year we'll return everyone and we should be even stronger."

The Lady Kats jumped out to a 5-0 start with wins over four Top 25 teams in the first two weeks of the spring season. Opening with Vanderbilt, UK won 6-3 before facing new SEC foe South Carolina. Freshmen Susan Bartl and Lora Suttile pulled out a three-set victory at No. 3 doubles to clinch a 5-4 win over the Lady Gamecocks in Lexington. UK went on to win eight of its next 12 matches before traveling to California for spring break.

The Lady Kats dropped three of four spring break matches. UK picked up its first victory over No. 14-ranked USC in Los Angeles in a 6-3 upset. After locking the match at 3-3, Kentucky won at No. 1 and No. 3 doubles to claim the 6-3 victory. Dinneen called the victory a "monumental win for Kentucky women's tennis."

Freshman Bethany Avington paired with Klingenberg at No. 1 doubles at the USC match and vaulted into the Volvo Rankings at No. 10. The tandem rose to No. 6 before falling to No. 18 in

the final poll of the season and finishing with an 8-2 slate.


The latter half of the season, the Lady Kats were 4-5 while competing in a tough SEC schedule. UK picked up victories over Mississippi State and beat the Lady Tigers 5-4 at Auburn before competing in the Southeastern Conference Tournament.

UK won its first round match over Arkansas, blanking the Lady 'Backs 6-0. Then, No. 21 Ole Miss won a hard-fought 5-4 battle. UK finished tied for ninth after the SEC tournament.

The Lady Kats returned to the NCAA field, competing for the fifth time in six years. UK was the 19th seed in the 20-team field. USC avenged its 5-4 loss to the Lady Kats by ousting UK 5-2 in the first round.

Kentucky's Klingenberg was among the top 16 players seeded in the singles championship, but was upset by Arizona State's Meredith Geiger 7-6,6-3 in the opening round. Klingenberg and Avington lost to eventual doubles champions Ceniza and McCalla of UCLA 6-1, 6-4 in the first round of doubles competion to end the year ranked 18th.





OUTLOOK

Anytime a team returns all of its players from an NCAA qualifying season, the outlook for the upcoming campaign should be bright. This is the scenario Kentucky coach John Dinneen will be facing when his 17th-ranked Lady Kats tennis team takes the courts against Purdue February 12, 1993.

"Of course I'm optimistic," said Dinneen. "Why shouldn't I be? We return everybody from a team that knocked off perennial tennis power USC and SEC rival Mississippi while bolstering our squad with newcomers Sheri Bash and Kirsten Burrows. We should definitely be a force once again in tennis's deepest conference, the SEC, and nationally as well. Anything shy of an NCAA bid will be disappointing."

Only two things could cloud the potentially bright season for the Kats: injuries and the nation's most diverse and competitive schedule.

"We'll definitely need to stay away from the injury bug," Dinneen cautions. "We are strong with everyone intact but we're not overpowering enough to tackle our schedule if we have too many bodies on the sidelines. We play 17 top 25 teams, many of them on the road, and we can't afford to have any lapses during the difficult spring grind."

Look for this veteran crew to respond well to the challenges ahead and ultimately be a team to be reckoned with come NCAA tournament time.

The 1993 Lady Kats tennis squad has an excellent make-up. As with any good team, an outstanding No. 1 player is a must. Kentucky has one in senior All-American Susan Klingenberg. Klingenberg finished 1992 with a 27-12 record and was a quarterfinalist at two Grand Slams — the Dupont Clay Courts and Riviera All-American.

"Anytime you have a top-five player at the top of your lineup, you are in the match against anybody. And what compliments this is we also have Klingenberg's leadership."

Lora Suttile and Susan Bartl return after successful freshman years. Their fall campaigns have been equally impressive with Suttile already defeating two of the best seniors in the collegiate game, Tennessee's Michelle McMillen and Indiana's Deborah Edelman. Both play No. 1 for their top 12 teams and will undoubtedly be

NCAA championship contenders. (Unfortunately, Lora broke her wrist after these two victories, but she will be ready to go again February 12.)

Susan returned to Lexington after a semifinal performance at the U.S. National Amateur Championship, strong and ready to bring her game to the next level. "She is more committed than ever," says Dinneen, "and the results show. Beating Samara this fall was certainly sweet revenge and bodes well for the upcoming season."

In addition, the Kats return senior Chris Yario, junior Marina Sansostri and sophomore Bethany Avington. "All three are outstanding players and will provide the depth and balance necessary for us to once again reach the NCAA Championships."

Yario, in particular, had a successful fall with a "big-time" win over Georgia's Lisa Salvatierra (who had recorded a win over NCAA singles champion Lisa Raymond last spring). Sansostri's singles play and Avington's

doubles prowess really are needed to contribute to this year's success.

Finally, the freshmen, Bash and Burrows. Both come to Kentucky with stellar junior records and will be counted on to contribute immediately. Their left-handed styles will add great variety to the team and could create confusion for their opponents. Bash likes to attack while Burrows is a crafty baseliner. Look for them to provide the final pieces to a winning puzzle.

The outlook is bright for Dinneen's fifth season. Hard work, togetherness, aggressive doubles and a never-say-die competitiveness are essential. The ability is there; now all that is needed is for the job to be done on the court. If it is, look for the 1993 Lady Kats to be Kentucky's seventh NCAA qualifying team.

And with a little luck, a top 15 finish is a realistic goal.







NATIONAL TEAM INDOOR

The University of Kentucky has served as host to the USTA/ITCA Men's National Team Indoor Intercollegiate Championship for the past nine years. The Team Indoor, which is essentially the NCAA Indoor Championship, is held each February at the Louisville Tennis Club in Louisville, Ky.

The Team Indoor is a five-day tournament with a 20-team field. The Louisville Tennis Club, located on Herr Lane, has 12 hard-surfaced courts. Each team is guaranteed three matches.

"The USTA/ITA National Indoor Team Championship is probably the most exciting event of the year as it is the first big team event, " said UK Coach Dennis Emery. "And it's early in the year before teams carry the baggage of some losses. It has been the site of some of the best dual matches in college tennis history. We are extremely fortunate to have hosted this event for the past nine years."

The Team Indoor Intercollegiate Championships were created in 1973 and were played at the Nielsen Tennis Stadium in Madison, Wisc., for six years, growing in quality and prestige every year. Princeton served as host in 1980, which was to be the last indoor tournament for the next five years, as Cal-Berkely defeated Stanford in a thrilling 5-4 final. After a year layoff, the tournament was moved to UCLA where Pepperdine won the title that season and Georgia finished second. UCLA continued to host the tournament until it was moved to Louisville, where Stanford defeated USC in an exciting final televised nationally on PBS through an underwriting grant from Rolex.

The tournament has remained in Louisville since that time.

This year, an experimental format will be used in the competition. Doubles will be played first and the team to win two out of three will receive one point. Singles will be awarded one point for each match and the team to accumulate four points will win the match. The format has been adopted in order to shorten match time as the tournament traditionally extends into the early morning hours.

The Wildcats are one of seven teams that have competed in the event the last seven consecutive years. Only one other school east of the Mississippi can claim such an achievement (Georgia). Most recently the Wildcats finished 9th in 1992. UK lost to TCU in the first round, the went on to defeat Florida and Tennessee.



DENNIS EMERY

Eleven years ago Wildcats coach Dennis Emery took over a UK program that finished last in the SEC two of the three previous years and had only finished in the top half of the 10-team SEC five times since 1944. Emery began a long term process that culminated with UK's first SEC regular-season championship, but more importantly, its first SEC tournament and overall championship. Kentucky has become one of the nation's dominant programs (top 10 finish four of the last five years) while competing in the SEC, which is considered to be the nation's top tennis conference. In the last five years, UK has won one conference title, finished second twice, and third once in the league. For his efforts he was named 1992 SEC Coach of the Year and was a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors.

Beginning in 1987, the Wildcats began a run which has landed them in the NCAAs five of the last six seasons, including two quarterfinal losses to top seeds Stanford and USC in close matchups. The Wildcats have been ranked among the nation's elite in the final rankings for nine consecutive years. UK has been ranked in the Top 25 nationally in the

final ranking every year since ending the 1984 season at No. 21.

While at UK, Emery has seen eight male players named All-American a total of 16 times. In fact, the Wildcats have had a doubles team named All-America each of the last six seasons. In addition to the men's coaching duties, Emery serves as UK director of tennis. A high point in his career came in 1988 when both UK programs were ranked among the nation's top six squads. The only other program to be achieve this status was Stanford.


Emery began his coaching career after being named All-American Honorable Mention at Carson-Newman College in 1977. After competing briefly on the satellite tour, Emery began working for Australian legend Harry Hopman. "Mr. Hopman took a personal interest in my career and in my growth as a coach. I owe a lot of my philosophy as a coach to the time I spent with him."

In 1978, Emery began his college career at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn. Emery took over a mediocre program that had only five players that fall. When he was named head coach in September of 1977, he was only 22 year old, which stands as

the NCAA record for the youngest men's head coach at a Division I institution. During his five years at APSU, Emery turned a dormant program into a program that was undefeated in the OVC for his last two-and-a-half years and posted wins over SEC schools such as Kentucky, Ole Miss and Vanderbilt. In 1981, his squad was ranked No. 31 in the nation.

Emery is a member of the ITA Board of Directors for college tennis. He has served as tournament director for the USTA National Indoor Team championships for eight consecutive years. He was chairman of the Region III Tennis Committee from 1985-1987. In addition, he served as associate coach for the U.S. Junior Davis Cup team.

Emery has also served as coach to Susan Sloane of Lexington. Under Emery's tutelage, Sloan climbed from No. 133 to No. 18 in the WTA rankings during her career. Emery also coaches several other junior players.

Emery is married to the former Brenda Wild of Tampa, Fla. They have three children, Matthew, Andrew and Meritt.

Don Carbone begins his eighth season with the Kentucky tennis program.


After joining the Wildcats in 1983, Carbone coached the Lady Kats tennis squad for two years. He compiled a record of 32-25, with a fourth-place finish in the Southeastern Conference in 1984.

In 1985, he became a full-time assistant to Coach Dennis Emery. The Worcester, Mass., native played collegiate tennis under Emery at Austin Peay. At the end of his college career, Carbone became head pro at the Shrewsbury Tennis Club in Massachusetts before coming to Kentucky in 1983. Carbone completed

his undergraduate work at UK in

Carbone, 35, serves as the head tennis pro at the Lexington Country Club during the summers. He is married to the former Linda Koch of Clarksville, Tenn. They have two daughters.

His one-on-one work with players as well as his perceptions of what they need with their games, is the backbone around which our program is built."

Lundy, a 1991 graduate of Eastern Kentucky University, begins his second season at UK. He holds records in career wins at No. 1 singles for the Colonels and has been an instructor for the Wildcats tennis camp for the past seven years.

The 25-year-old Wilmington, Ohio, native is married to the former Susan Sloane of Lexington.

Emery on Lundy: "I feel Duane is one of the bright, young faces on the coaching scene. Because of that, I have entrusted him with the physical training aspect of our program and have been very happy with the results. In addition, through his travels with his wife, Susan Sloane, he has picked up a real feel for the strategy aspect of the game."

OUTLOOK

After completing its most successful year in school history the University of Kentucky men's tennis squad is preparing to rebuild for the battle in 1993.

That rebuilding is centered around two juniors and a strong recruiting class that must fill the void left by the graduation of All-Americans John Yancey, Andy Potter, Scott Hulse and the loss of David Culley, last year's sure point at No. 4.

Juniors Mike Hopkinson, Mahyar Goodarz and senior Stephen Mather are returners to the 24-5 squad from 1992. Goodarz, a junior from Melbourne, Australia, is the top returner, splitting time at the No. 1 and No. 2 spots last year. He closed fast wins over Holtari, Ekerot, Haddad and Heggard in the SEC and NCAA to finish the year ranked No. 52 in the nation. His preseason ranking is No. 24. At the 1992 NCAA singles, he led No. 3 seed Brian McPhie by a break in the third set before losing the match which would have given him All-America status.

Hopkinson, a junior from Indianapolis, is a talented player whom, Emery says, has just come into his own. He has had an extremely successful fall campaign, posting doubles wins with Goodarz over Patel-Cocotas of Stanford (No. 6) and Blair-Merklein of Florida (No. 3) as well as Craig Baskin from Georgia in singles.

"I feel these two players — Hopkinson and Goodarz — in terms of raw talent, are the best talent we've ever had in the same recruiting year, and I look eagerly forward to seeing how they develop as juniors and seniors," Emery said.

Also returning for Kentucky are sophomore Jason Yeager and senior Stephen Mather. Yeager, from Edgewood, Ky., qualified for NCAAs last year in doubles with David Culley and had a good summer on the Mexican sattelite, picking up 1 ATP point in singles and seven points in doubles. Mather, a senior from Louisville, has been a solid performer for three seasons in the bottom half of the lineup.


After losing six of its first 10 players from last year's squad, Kentucky may rely heavily on its solid recruiting class to keep it in the hunt for the SEC Championship. Top recruit Tad Berkowitz from Wesley Chapel, Fla., is expected to have a rewarding freshman year after placing among the top 10 finishers in U.S. Juniors and qualifying for the U.S. Open Junior Championship.

Another newcomer is Lexington native Ford Lankford who transferred home after a solid freshman campaign at Florida State, where he played No. 5 and No. 6 due to injuries. Lankford is a hard worker who will add a lot to what Emery calls "the intangible category" in UK tennis. A talented freshman who joins the team in January is Australian Brad Sceney. The highlight of the 18-year-old Sceney's junior career came in January, 1992 when he teamed with countryman Grant Doyle to defeat Americans Jason Thompson and Lex Carrington to win the Australian Open Junior Doubles title. Sceney is a talented all-court player.

Other freshmen to watch are Kentucky high school champion Scott Treibly and Lexington's Brian Sackmann.

RECAP

After bringing home UK's first SEC tennis title and having two players receive All-America honors, the 1992 Wildcats tennis squad finished its best season since tennis became a varsity sport in 1923. The 1984 squad had 24 wins, while only the 1989 Wildcats achieved a No. 6 ranking in the ITA's Volvo Tennis Collegiate Rankings. The Wildcats completed a 24-5 slate, ending the year as the nation's sixth-ranked squad. Dennis Emery's squad tied with Georgia, LSU and Mississippi State for the regular season title, but won the conference tournament and brought home the overall title.

The Wildcats won 15 of its first 16 matches, compiling a nine-match win streak during February and March. Only one team defeated the Wildcats in March as the then-sixth-ranked Georgia Bulldogs upset the then-third-ranked Wildcats 5-2 in Lexington March 28. The Wildcats stayed in the Top Five for most of the season, achieving a No. 3 ranking in the April 21 poll.

The Wildcats had a big win at home over then-No. 5 Pepperdine. Pepperdine came to Lexington after upsetting No. 1 UCLA at home. The Wildcats won 7-2 with Scott Hulse leading the way at No.1 with a big win over Howard Joffe at No. 3.

Kentucky finished tied for ninth at the USTA/ITCA National Team Indoor, losing to eventual champion TCU in the first round 4-2, then going on to beat conference rivals Tennessee 5-3 and Florida 6-0 in the consolation bracket.

After finishing the indoor season with one loss, the Wildcats swung into the conference season, picking up road wins at Arkansas, Auburn, Mississippi State, and Tennessee before dropping a 5-4 decision at Florida.

UK entered the SEC tournament with a 20-4 record, facing Tennessee for the fourth time in one season. The Wildcats beat the Vols 5-1 to advance to a rematch with Ole Miss. UK won 5-0 picking up its second win in three days over the Rebels.

Kentucky met LSU in the championship and led 4-1 before the rain began in Nashville and play was moved indoors. Freshmen jason Yeager and David Culley clinched the 5-2 win by capturing a 6-0, 6-4 victory over LSU's Michael Wesbrooks and Marcelo Achondo.


Kentucky coach Dennis Emery received SEC Coach of the Year honors following UK's championship victory. UK is on the only team ever to win the SEC championship without any players being named to the All-Conference team.

The Wildcats entered the NCAA Championship as the No. 5 seed and faced Florida in the second round. Kentucky avenged its 5-4 loss in Gainesville with a 5-0 rout of the Gators. The Wildcats met No. 1 ranked and top-seeded USC in the quarterfinal. UK locked the match at 3-3 after singles but couldn't hold on and lost 5-3 after the Trojans won at No. 1 and No. 3 doubles.

In the individual competition Kentucky had more players than any other team among the competitors in the doubles and singles championships. A record seven players were in the tournament field. John Yancey, Scott Hulse and Mahyar Goodarz were among the 64 singles players, while all three UK doubles tandems were entered in the 32-draw doubles field.

UK's Andy Potter and Scott Hulse were seeded among the top eight doubles tandems thereby earning All-America honors. Potter and Hulse were upset in the first round by Clemson's Seilkop and Lampert 6-4, 6-4.

Yancey and Mike Hopkinson lost to second-seeded Dan Krounage and Paul Kruse of Ball State 6-1, 6-2 and freshmen Jason Yeager and David Culley fell to San Diego State's Belloli and Numbers 6-2, 7-5 in the first round. In singles, Yancey advanced to the second round by defeating Krounage in 3-6,6-1,6-4 decision, but fell to seeded Matt Lucena from California 6-1, 6-3 in the second round. UK's Scott Hulse grinded from a 6-3, 5-0 deficit to beat Lindsay Rawstorne from Utah 3-6, 7-5,6-4 in the opening round, but fell to Tennessee's Chris Woodruff 6-3, 7-6 in the second round. Mahyar Goodarz, a sophomore from Melbourne, Australia drew fourth-seeded Brian MacPhie in the first round and lost 6-3,3-6,6-3.



SEC CHAMPIONS

The 1992 year capped UK's finest season in UK's tennis history, which dates back to 1923. The team finished the year as SEC Champions, SEC Tournament champions and SEC regular-season co-champions. After reaching as high as No. 3 in the nation, UK reached the NCAA quarterfinals and were ranked No. 6 in the nation in the final ITA poll. Overall, Kentucky was 24-5 and 12-2 in the nation's toughest tennis conference.

Kentucky showed early it could be a team to be reckoned with when, after winning its first four matches, the Wildcats met the No. 12-ranked Tennessee Volunteers in Knoxville. The Cats escaped with a 5-4 win when Scott Hulse and Andy Potter rallied from down a set to post the clinching fifth point. The Cats followed this with a big home win at the Boone Center over No. 6-ranked Pepperdine, 7-2. Pepperdine had defeated No. 1 UCLA one week earlier, but Kentucky, led by senior Scott Hulse's win at No. 1 over Howard Joffee 7-6, 6-3, had its way.

The Wildcats' only loss indoors came at a bad time, as TCU upset UK 4-2 in the National Team Indoors in Louisville. UK had high hopes of winning the tournament, but TCU advanced to the final, where it lost to Stanford. UK rebounded by defeating Tennessee 5-3 and No. 5 Florida 6-0. Andy Potter keyed the Florida win by beating Florida's No. 1 player Mark Merklein in an exciting three-set battle. After several more wins, UK finished the first half of its schedule 13-1.

To open SEC play Kentucky had to face No. 15 Arkansas in Fayetteville. Arkansas, fresh off an upset of No. 3 Georgia, provided the Wildcats stiff



competition before falling 5-3. The key point came from No. 6 Jason Yeager as he saved three match points in posting his victory. After defeating Alabama 6-0 in Tuscaloosa, UK came home for its first SEC showdown of the year, with No. 3 Georgia. Kentucky did not play well, and Georgia, behind eventual NCAA singles finalist Wade McGuire's three-set win over John Yancey, beat UK 5-2.

UK rebounded at No. 7 Mississippi State the next weekend by defeating the Bulldogs 5-4. Senior John Yancey was "all-world" as he defeated No. 6-ranked Daniel Courcol 6-3,5-7,7-6 (7-5) in singles and teamed with Mike Hopkinson to upset Christophe Damiens and Jean Francois LaGloire (ranked No. 8). This road win really brought UK together as a team and they defeated No. 9 LSU 5-1 at home the next weekend. This brought UK's record to 19-2 as it faced No. 12 Florida in Gainesville.

Kentucky needed to win at Gainesville to win the SEC outright with a 10-1 record. Florida and Kentucky have always had an intense rivalry and this match proved to be no exception to that rule as UK battled from a 4-2 deficit in singles to tie the match at 4-4. When the solid team of Culley and Yeager served for the team match at 5-4 in the third set at No. 3 doubles, it appeared UK would wrap up the win. But the Gators rallied to win 7-6 in the third and UK was forced to accept a four-way tie for the regular-season championship.

At the SEC tournament, UK opened by beating Tennessee 5-1 for the fourth time in 1992. In the semifinals, the Wildcats took out No. 15-ranked Ole Miss who had upset Mississippi State in the quarterfinal round. Kentucky bested a drained Rebels squad 5-0 and prepared to meet LSU for the Championship. LSU jumped on Georgia in the other semifinal for a 5-1 victory.


In an exciting final played at Vanderbilt, Kentucky defeated LSU 5-2. As was the case all year, Kentucky received solid, inspiring performances from Scott Hulse and David Culley (nicknamed "the Rock" by associate coach Don Carbone). Culley did what he had done all year — found a way to win. After losing the first set 6-1, Culley, playing with a stone bruise on his foot and a stress fracture in his hand, rallied from a 3-1 third set deficit to win 6-4 and put UK up 4-2 in matches. He then teamed with Jason


Yeager to win the No. 3 doubles 6-0, 6-4 to wrap up the championship.

In the NCAA tournament, UK was seeded fifth and received a first-round bye. The Cats then blasted No. 12 Florida 5-0. UK was led by Mahyar Goodarz, who upended Bruce Haddad at No. 2 6-1, 6-0. This set the stage for a quarterfinal showdown with top seed and defending champion Southern Cal. UK went ahead 3-2 behind wins by Goodarz (over Ekerot), Hulse (over Leach), and Mather (over Whitesell) and had a chance to go up 4-2 when Potter led Kent Seaton by a break in the third set. Potter lost the third set 6-4 and USC ended Kentucky's hopes with great doubles play in a 5-3 win.

Individually, UK had great success as an NCAA record seven players were chosen to participate at the NCAA Individual Championships, including all three doubles teams. Andy Potter and Scott Hulse were named All-Americans for their outstanding performance. John Yancey was the Region III senior Player of the Year as well as a finalist for the John Van Nostrand Award.

"As a coach, the exciting thing for me to see was how all of our first eight players stepped up to be heroes and contribute to our championship. Never before had an SEC team won the title without one player being named to the postseason All-SEC squad."

Eleven individuals in the last six years have claimed All-America status for the University of Kentucky tennis programs. While nine players have been named Doubles All-Americans 12 times, five Wildcats claimed singles honors a total of eight times.

A program that prides itself in the strength of its doubles, UK's men's squad has produced doubles All-Americans in each of the past six years. The latest entry was Andy Potter and Scott Hulse from the 1992 men's squad that went 24-5 and were SEC Champions as well as NCAA quarterfinalists.


Potter and Hulse were named All-Americans after being seeded among the top eight doubles teams in the NCAA Championships. The UK tandem was 23-6 overall and played primarily at No. 2 for the Wildcats.

Last season, Susan Klingenberg became the third women's player and second singles player to be awarded All-America status. Klingenberg, then a junior from Hampstead, Md., finished the season ranked 12th and was seeded among the top 16 singles competitors at the NCAA Women's Individual Championships.

In women's tennis, three players have claimed honors eight times. In 1987, Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi were named doubles All-Americans after advancing to the quarterfinal round of the 1987 NCAA Women's Championship and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the ITCA's Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings.

Hahn was also an All-American in singles in 1987.

That same year, Greg Van Emburgh and Richard Benson advanced to the semifinals on the men's NCAA Tournament and were awarded All-America honors for their achievement. In 1988, Hahn, Takagi, Van Emburgh and




Richard Benson & Greg Van Emburgh

Benson were in the spotlight again, as all but Benson received singles and doubles honors. Mario Rincon, a product of Bogota, Colombia, took his spot among the singles All-Americans in 1988. Van Emburgh advanced to the quarterfinals of the 1988 NCAA tournament.

In 1989, Benson became the first player in UK history to receive All-America honors three times, as he paired with Adam Malik in doubles. The Wildcats tandem compiled an 18-6 record, finishing the season ranked fourth nationally. They were also seeded fifth in doubles at the 1989 NCAA tournament. Malik, who turned pro after his junior year, was also named singles All-American after finishing the season 32-17 and capturing the SEC singles title.

In 1990, the successful doubles tradition continued. John Yancey and lan Skidmore completed the season with a 14-12 record and a No. 9 ranking. The following year, the UK tandem finished 25-12 and were seeded among the top eight duos at the NCAA championships, qualifying them for All-America honors for the second consecutive year.






