

We hope to see everyone at the Hilary J. Boone Tennis Complex this spring for what I know will be another unforgettable year.





ormer Kentucky standout and 2005 ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year Carlos Drada begins his first season as head women's tennis coach following four years as the assistant coach to Mark Guilbeau. Drada joined UK's staff following a highly successful career that culminated with a trip to the NCAA Singles Championships were he finished as a runner-up in 2000.

"Carlos is an outstanding young coach and we're happy to be able to have one of our former

student-athletes as head coach," Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart said. "Carlos has been around this team for the past three seasons and has helped them rise to not only the top of the SEC, but helped put UK on the map as one of the premier programs in the country. I'm confident this level of excellence will continue under his guidance."

that he helped coach during one of its most successful runs in school history. During his four-year career as an assistant, the Wildcats went to four straight NCAA tournaments. During those tournaments, the team reached the round of 16 three times and the quarterfinals in 2005. The UK women's tennis team last season won a school-best 26 matches and captured their first SEC Championship.

A native of Cali, Columbia, Drada takes over the reigns of a program

"My goal is to lead this team to a higher level and continue Mark's (Guilbeau) legacy," Drada commented. "Mark did a great job here. I want this team to have a lot of balance and to be an efficient team. We have a lot of special women here and they will be the foundation of this team. I can't wait to go to work."

During the last four years, Drada has unquestionably had a strong impact on the women's team by approaching the job with great enthusiasm and passion. While serving as the assistant coach at UK, the team has one over 20 games twice, including last years school-record 26, and has reached the round of 16 three times in the NCAA Tournament. Along with being named the national assistant coach of the year, Drada was named ITA Southeast Region Assistant Coach of the year for his work with the 2005 SEC regular season champions.

Drada also brings a wealth of experience that comes from playing for an elite tennis program that competed in the SEC and the NCAA Championships. As a coach, Drada is able to relate to student-athletes about what it takes to compete at such a high level.

As a member of the Kentucky men's tennis team, Drada compiled a record of 91-56 in singles competition. He was named All-American in 2000 after making an improbable run to the NCAA singles title match before falling to Stanford's Alex Kim. The unseeded Drada blazed through the competition defeating both the No. 1 seed Jeff Morrison of Florida, who was the defending national singles champion, and No. 3 seed Shuon

It marked the second time Drada had beaten the nation's No. 1 player, accomplishing the same feet in his junior year. That year he defeated topranked James Blake of Harvard.

Drada, 30, made Lexington his permanent home in 2000 after graduating with a degree in finance/marketing. He then accepted a job with Merrill-Lynch as a financial consultant, where he worked for a year, before returning to the sport he loves to begin his coaching career.

Q&A with Coach Drada

How excited are you for your first season as head coach at Kentucky?

"I'm extremely excited to be the head coach. I feel this to be a privilege and a great opportunity to keep Kentucky in the path of excellence that it has achieved the last five to six years."

What has been the biggest adjustment for you moving from assistant coach to head coach?

"The main adjustment has been getting use to the amount of office work. I've always enjoyed coaching tennis and really appreciate the opportunity to work with the women on this team and to help them improve. When you become the head coach there is a lot more administrative responsibilities to take on. The challenge is to keep tennis the No. 1 priority and to also take care of all my other new responsibilities."

What has been the biggest surprise since you have become the head coach at UK?

"I've have been really thankful to find that there are so many people within the athletic department that have been available to help out. The support staff has been excellent in helping me make the adjustment to head coach."

Who has improved the most this fall?

"All the women on our team have improved a lot this fall. Some improved mentally, others have improved physically and others have improved in both aspects. It is really hard to pick one player because all have really improved a lot and I know they still have room to continue to

What does your new assistant David Vest bring to this team?

"David (Vest) brings a lot of experience and structure from his time as being the head coach at Morehead State. He brings a controlled intensity that I think we will really help our team. He is always under control and always is really confident. He is going to be a real source of comfort to our squad because he is really easy to talk to. He also brings a vast amount of knowledge about technique and how to handle different players."

What coaches have had the most effect on you as a coach?

"All the coaches that I have had the privilege to work with have helped me in many ways. The main person that had a great influence on me was my dad. He was my first coach. He knows a lot about how to develop players. One of the players that he coached in Columbia reached the top-70 in the world. He coached Mary Pierce, Tommy Haas and Anna Kournikova. The next important coach I had was Ivan Molina. He still coaches the ITF team in Columbia. He is a great coach and highly respected throughout the world. He taught me a lot about professionalism and high intensity. When I came here to Kentucky, I learned a lot from Coach Dennis Emery. He helped me a lot with doubles strategy and how to adjust to the college game. I also learned a lot from Mark Guilbeau. All the coaches I have had and worked with have been a tremendous influence on me."

What are your thoughts on competing in one of the toughest conferences (the Southeastern Conference) in America?

"It's very exciting, but also a big challenge. I wouldn't want to face any other situation. I'm so excited about this job because I want to be



coaching at the top level of collegiate tennis. I'm grateful everyday that I get to come to the courts and coach at Kentucky and compete in the

What is it like to be the head coach at your alma mater?

"It's awesome. I came to the realization as I was interviewing for different jobs that I wouldn't want to coach anywhere else but at the University of Kentucky. Coaching tennis is great opportunity and you really have to love the place you are working at. For me, there is no place that I love more than UK. Kentucky has really helped me out a lot as a person and I am really excited to be able to contribute back to the university."

How do you think Kim Coventry will adjust moving up to the

"Kim (Coventry) is a great player. She is really strong and explosive on the court. She makes a lot of great shots and has impressive shot selection. She has to know regardless of the situation, she is going to do well because she is a great player. She has the game to be a really successful No. 1. If she continues working a well as she has been, she should have no problem moving up to the No. 1 spot."

What has impressed you the most about this year's squad?

"The thing that impresses me the most about this year's squad has been their resilience. They have proved their resilience the last two years on the courts. They believe in themselves and they know that to go from A to B that they have to work extremely hard. This group of women is very special. They know that tough situations make you stronger and they have gotten stronger as they have faced various obstacles."

What are some of the values you stress in your program?

"We are going to stress the same values that Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart has stated for the athletic department. We want to handle everything in a first-class manner. We want the student-athletes to respect everyone they interact with and also understand they have a huge responsibility and privilege as a student-athlete here at Kentucky. We will also be stressing that to be successful it is going to take a lot of hard work.."

ormer Morehead State head men's and women's tennis coach David Vest begins his first season at Kentucky as the assistant to first-year head coach Carlos Drada.

Vest, the 2002 Ohio Valley Coach of the Year, has spent the last four years at the helm of both men's and women's tennis at his alma mater Morehead State. Over the last two years under Vest's tutelage, his men's teams compiled a 42-13 record. In 2005, Morehead State players totaled three of the six first team All-OVC men's tennis members. This past season Vest also coached the Ohio Valley Conference Men's Tennis Player of the Year, Greg Johnstone, and Women's Freshman of the Year, Yolando Araujo. Overall Vest guided the Eagles' men to a 63-38 record and the women to a 49-45 mark.

At Morehead State, Vest's team also garnered many academic honors. Both his men's and women's teams had the highest team GPAs of any sport at MSU for both 2003-04 and 2004-05. Both of his teams also received ITA Academic All-America Team honors from 2003-05.


"As a program we are very excited to have David Vest join UK's tennis program," Drada said. "David's proven track record and expertise will greatly help the Kentucky tennis team to continue on the path of excellence."


Prior to being named the head coach at MSU, Vest spent two seasons as an assistant at Morehead State after completing his eligibility as a member of the Eagles' tennis team.

"This is a great opportunity for me," Vest said. "I've know Carlos Drada a long time and I'm excited for a chance to work with a strong SEC team that won the conference title and returns a group of talented women."

Vest graduated with a degree in government and history in 1999 and is currently completing his master's degree at MSU in sports administration. In high school, Vest was a four-time team MVP at Morgan County Central High School in West Liberty, Ky. He was named first-team All-State both his junior and senior seasons.

Vest is currently single and resides in Lexington.





2006 Outlook

The success the 2005 Kentucky women's tennis team had on the court as a team and as individuals last season was unmatched in the history of the program. The Cats claimed their first ever Southeastern Conference Championship, as well as collected a school-record 26 wins and reached the NCAA quarterfinals. The team reached its first ever finals in the National Indoor Championships in February and won a school record 15 matches from Feb.-April. At the end of the year, the Cats gained numerous postseason honors including SEC Player of the Year (Aibika Kalsarieva), SEC Coach of the Year (Mark Guilbeau), ITA National Coach of the year (Guilbeau), and ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year (Carlos Drada). The squad also finished with the school's highest ever ranking of No. 4 in the nation.

<u>Kim Coventry</u>

When a program reaches such lofty heights, the challenge to continue the success is great. The challenges ahead as Kentucky begins the defense of their SEC crown, are ones that new head coach Carlos Drada and his team look forward to facing in 2006. The 2005 ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year and former UK standout was elevated to the head job on August 15, 2005, by Kentucky Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart.

Drada brings an infectious passion to the UK program that comes from four years of playing and four years of coaching at Kentucky. The 2000 NCAA finalist will loose three-time All America Aibika Kalsarieva, but knows that this team returns a talented group that was instrumental in last season's success. The talent returning from last year's team Drada promises will continue to push the program to even greater heights.

"Last year was an amazing season," Drada said. "The core of kids that remain worked really hard and were willing to exploit their opponents weaknesses regardless of who they were playing. I really liked how all season long the team took a lot of pride wearing the Kentucky shirt. I hope to use our success from last season as motivation to push our team to contend again this year."

The tone of this year's team as UK looks to defend its SEC title will be set by top returning junior Kim Coventry. The native of Melbourne

Australia, ended last year with the No. 28 singles ranking and teamed with Joelle Schwenk to be the No. 32 doubles team. Coventry won 36 singles matches and 31 doubles matches in 2004-05. The

15th-ranked player in the 2005-06 preseason rankings was stellar in last season's National Team Indoors in February not losing a match until the finals and winning the clinching point in the semifinals against then No. 8 Duke.

"Kim Coventry should be able to improve all aspects of her game," Drada said. "She has a really strong game that is very aggressive. She is going to keep working at exploiting the fact that she is really good at the net. I'm really positive about her outcomes. She will be playing against everyone's best players and I know she will do really well."

After playing at the No. 4 spot most of last season, the aforementioned Schwenk will be one of the many Wildcats who will be counted to overcome the losses of seniors Kalsarieva and Emily Foster. In the junior's first two seasons at UK, the Coconut Creek, Fla., native has won 30 and 27 singles matches respectively.

"Joelle has worked extremely hard," Drada said. She has improved all of her strokes, some of them dramatically. She is going to be mentally stronger and wherever we put her she is going to perform at a high level."


The squad's lone senior, Danielle Petrisko, will also be counted on heavily throughout the year to bring leadership and strong play. Following a knee injury that cost her the spring of 2004, the native of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. returned to claim victory in 24 matches in 2005 and gain All-SEC second team honors after posting a 9-2 conference record.

"Danielle has a tremendous amount of talent and has worked very hard," Drada said. "She has to remember what it has taken over her four-year career to be successful and continue on that path. She is going to be strong at any spot in the lineup."

Junior Lara Maurer also returns and looks to pick up where she left off at the end of last season. The Bay

Village, Ohio, native won five consecutive matches in the postseason, including three in the NCAA Tournament.

"Lara brings a lot of intensity to the court that is really going to help our team," Drada said. "Last year, she helped us get a lot of big wins against major schools like Duke. On a match day against a big school we can always count on Lara Maurer."

Also looking to help Kentucky repeat as SEC Champions will be a pair of juniors, Liis Sober and Caroline Winebrenner, who had successful fall seasons.

Sober, a native of Tallinn, Estonia, won three matches at this season's Kentucky Fall Invitational to win the Flight C backdraw bracket.

"Liis has worked extremely hard this fall," Drada said. "Her work ethic is going to be a great influence on this team and we expect her to be a very solid contributor."

Winebrenner, a native of Louisville, Ky., also had a great fall where she captured the Flight C Singles Flight title at the UK Fall Invitational.

"Caroline is a very smart player who really has great influence on the team," Drada said. "She is going to have a really good year."

Two newcomers to this spring's squad will be freshmen Carolina Escamilla and Jessica Giuggioli. Both are newcomers from overseas and Drada is excited for them to be on campus and to add their talents to the team.


Kentucky once again looks to have a strong group of doubles players. Coventry and Schwenk had a preseason ranking of No. 9 after qualifying for the NCAA Doubles Championships. The duo qualified for three tournaments this fall including the ITA National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships. While Drada will look to fill out the rest of his lineup of return-

ers, he is also extremely excited about how his two newcomers can help the Cats' double teams.

"With our two newcomers (Escamilla and Giuggioli) we are going to have some really good doubles teams," Drada said. "We have been working on a lot of specifics this fall in terms of strategy and this team is doing a good job of implementing those strategies on the court. If we continue to work at our doubles play, the way I have seen them this fall, I think we are going to better than last year."

Kentucky will once again be facing a tough non-conference schedule to go along with its SEC schedule in preparation for the NCAA Championships. The Cats will travel to Madison, Wisc., for the fourth consecutive year for the ITA National Indoor Championships where highly ranked teams such as Stanford, Texas, Georgia Tech, Duke, Northwestern and Baylor will be competing. The non-conference schedule also will include matches against Big 12 power Texas A&M and a trip to Coral Gables, Fla., to take on the nationally-ranked Miami Hurricanes. This year's home SEC schedule features perennial SEC contender Georgia as well as Tennessee, and this year's senior day opponent will be South Carolina. UK will take to the road against NCAA semifinalist Florida and defending SEC West champion Ole Miss.

"A lot of the teams we will face will be improved," Drada said. "We are in a competitive conference and this is a new year. The fact that we did well last year doesn't mean we will be the best again. The fact that we know what it takes to win the conference will help us. We are going to continue to work towards championship excellence."

Shively Strength & Conditioning Facility



The Kentucky women's tennis team calls Shively Training Center its home for strength and conditioning. The 2,000-square foot complex is under the direction of Coach Stephanie Tracey and features a variety of free weight equipment, which complements the training philosophy of the Shively staff.

"Our top goal is to create a comprehensive training program, which encompasses the areas of speed, power, strength, agility, flexibility, balance and nutrition," Tracey said. "Through these avenues, we are providing the athletes with the tools they need to reach their athletic potential while remaining injury-free."

The primary focus of the facility is the development of core strength using ground-based, multi-joint lifting through use of the Olympic lifts. By incorporating this explosive style of lifting, athletes become more powerful, resulting in an increase in speed. The core of the athlete's body also is trained and complemented with a variety of lifts, including squats, lunges, plyometrics, presses, pulls, trunk rotation and abdominal exercise. Through the combination of these exercises, the athletes are better able to reach their goals.

Another major focus of the strength staff is the development of sport-specific speed, agility and conditioning. This facet of training is organized


through different types of footwork patterns, drills and linear fitness. While nearly all of UK's Olympic sports teams train at Shively, they also take part in "Speed School," a twice-weekly, sevenweek training session in Nutter Field House.

With the help of staff nutritionist Jill Kindy, the Shively staff also helps educate the athletes on nutrition and supplement awareness.

Every squad trains together at Shively, promoting team chemistry and teamwork. Through this set-up, teams work on mental toughness, attacking goals and maintaining a positive attitude, keeping everyone moving toward a common goal.

Assistant Strength & Conditioning Coach for Olympic Sports



2005 in Review

he Kentucky women's tennis program had already established itself as one of the best in the nation, but the 2005 squad raised the bar even further with their record-setting performances all season long. The Wildcats led by senior All-American Aibika Kalsarieva, along with a group of talented underclassman and experienced veterans, accomplished many feats that no UK team had ever done, including the team's crowning achievement, winning the 2005 Southeastern Conference Championship.

Along the way to winning the SEC East division title and the conference title for the first time in school history, the Cats also made their mark on the national collegiate tennis scene by making

the finals of the National Team Indoor Championships in February and by recording a school-best 15 match winning streak starting in February and lasting until April. The domination the Cats had in the regular season continued on as they reached their first-ever NCAA Championships quarterfinals match and finished with a school-best No. 4 final national ranking.

"Last year was an amazing season," head coach Carlos Drada said. "The core of kids that remain for this upcoming year, as well as those that left, worked really hard and were will-

ing to exploit their opponents' weaknesses regardless of who they were playing."

The season started off fast with the Cats winning three of their first four matches before playing in the National Team Indoor Championships in Madison, Wisc. Kentucky established itself as a national contender by defeating three top

25 teams, including No. 3 Clemson and No. 8 Duke, on their way to reaching the finals of the Championships for the first time in school history. Even though the Cats would fall to No. 1 Stanford, the match marked the first time Kentucky had

ever appeared as a team in a national title match.

"The National Indoors really started our successful run where we played extremely well," Drada said. "Kim Coventry played so well not losing a match until the finals of the tournament and she won the clinching match against Duke."

On February 13, in Chapel Hill, N.C., Kentucky began its 15-match winning streak with a convincing 7-0 win over Minnesota. The win marked the first of five consecutive victories over Big Ten opponents.

UK opened the SEC portion of its schedule with a convincing 7-0 at home against Mississippi State. Kentucky won all nine matches that the team competed in on that day.

The Cats' SEC title chances picked up full steam after the team's firstever victory against SEC eastern division rival Florida on March 13. Kentucky won five of six singles matches, including the clinching point by native Floridian Danielle Petrisko.

UK continued its strong play winning a share of the SEC title on April 8 at Georgia. The win in Athens was the first for Kentucky since 1988. Two days later on April 10, in Knoville, Tenn., the Cats turned back the Lady Vols 4-3 to earn the school's first ever conference crown.

"Winning the SEC was a testament to our team and their effort all season," Drada said. "It wasn't just one person carrying the team. Everyone was contributing to our success from the sports information director to the trainers, support staff, assistant coaches and head coach. Everyone played a huge part."

Kentucky continued its strong play into the postseason where the Cats reached the finals of the SEC conference tournament and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament before exiting against No. 10 and eventual NCAA runner-up Texas.

The successful play on the court was highlighted all year by Kalsarieva who went 37-6 in singles competition. Kalsariva defeated eight top-50 opponents and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championships for the second straight year. The native of Bishek, Kyrgyzstan, finished the year ranked No. 4 in the country and was named SEC Player of the Year. Kalsarieva also teamed with sophomore Sarah Foster to go 33-9 and finish with the No. 9 doubles ranking. Kalsarieva and Foster both gained All-America honors for their doubles plays. Kalsarieva also gained singles All-America honors for the second consecutive year. She became the fourth player in school history to gain All-America honors in both singles and doubles in the same season.



In one of the biggest victories of the early season Kentucky women's tennis team topped thirdranked Clemson by a 5-2 margin at the ITA National Team Indoor Championships.

Unseeded and 14th-ranked Kentucky's defeat of the second-seeded and third-ranked Tigers marked the Cats' first trip to the quarterfinals of this event since 1989. Clemson, a 2004 NCAA semifinalist, was the highest-seeded team eliminated from the event's opening round. Kentucky becomes the first team to eliminate a No. 2 seed in the opening round of the 18-year history of the ITA Women's National Team Indoor Championships

The Cats captured two out of three doubles matches to record the point and had a impressive

singles showing to defeat the highly ranked Tigers. Kentucky turned back three ranked oppenents in singles competion before Sarah Foster clinched the match by beating Romy Farah 6-3, 6-1.

No. 13 UK defeats No. 25 Texas A&M, 4-3

February 4, 2005 • Madison, Wisc.

After making history on day one of the 2005 USTA/ITA Women's National Team Indoor Championships, No. 14 Kentucky took its historical feat a step further in Saturday's quarterfinals. As a result of Kentucky's dominant 5-2 win over No. 15 North Carolina and UK made its first appearance in the semifinals of the national-championship event, which is considered the indoor equivalent of the NCAA outdoor championships held every May. Kentucky continue its historic run after becoming the first team to ever eliminate the No. 2 seed in the opening round of the tournament by way

of Thursday's 5-2 victory over No. 3 Clemson, a 2004 NCAA semifinalist.





No. 14 UK defeats No. 8 Duke, 4-3

February, 2005 • Madison, Wisc.

Kentucky senior Kim Coventry's hard-fought win at No. 3 singles over Duke's Jenny Zika was the deciding factor in the Cats' thrilling 4-3 semifinal victory over the sixth-seeded Blue Devils at





the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Championships at Wisconsin's Nielsen Tennis Stadium. As a result, unseeded and 14th-ranked Kentucky advanced to ts first appearance in a national-title match Sunday against top-ranked Stanford. The USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Championship serves as the indoor equivalent of the NCAA outdoor championships held every May. Kentucky became one of only eight schools ever to play in the event final.

With Coventry facing Zika's serve and a game point, the Australian saved the point and later another game point to stretch her lead to 5-3. Serving the decisive ninth game, Coventry opened with a forehand winner down the line and benefited from two Zika return errors to assume a 40-love lead. After a pair of errant ground strokes on the fourth and fifth points, Coventry delivered on her 12th match point, as Zika's final forehand sailed out of bounds to preserve the 4-3 Wildcat victory.

No. 1 Stanford defeats No. 14 UK, 4-0

February 6, 2005 • Madison, Wisc.

Kentucky's bid for its first national-tennis title fell shy as top-ranked Stanford, the defend-

ing NCAA outdoor and USTA/ITA indoor team champion, defeated the Cats by a 4-0 count in the finals of the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Championships at Wisconsin's Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The tournament's finals round marked Kentucky's first appearance as a team in a national-title match. Kentucky, the youngest team in the tournament with one senior, one junior and six sophomores, made its run to the finals on the strength of victories over second-seeded Clemson, 15th-ranked North Carolina and sixth-seeded Duke.

No. 6 UK defeats No. 30 South Carolina, 4-3 *March 11, 2005 • Columbia, 5.C.*

In one of the best comebacks of the year, UK senior All-American Aibika Kalsarieva rallied from a one-set deficit to put the finishing touches on a 4-3 come-from-behind Kentucky victory over South Carolina at the Maxcy Gregg Tennis Center in Columbia.

Kentucky (14-3, 3-0) led off the match by sweeping the three doubles matches to extends its doubles-win streak to 12 matches.

In singles action, to defeat the Gamecocks Kalsarieva had to bounce back from dropping her first set at No. 1 singles to USC's Wiggins, 5-7. Kalsarieva rebounded for a 6-4 second-set win to prolong the match. After taking a 4-1 third-set lead, the match was moved indoors due to darkness. Kalsarieva barely flinched, taking the final set, 6-2 to give Kentucky its third-consecutive conference victory.

The Wildcats' win streak extends to eight matches and is their longest such streak since Kentucky captured eight-straight matches two seasons ago.

No. 5 UK defeats No. 2 Florida, 4-0

March 13, 2005 • Lexington

In one of the biggest wins in UK history, native Floridian Danielle Petrisko scored the clinching point at No. 6 singles to give sixth-ranked Kentucky its first-ever victory over second-ranked Florida at UK's Boone Indoor Tennis Center. UK rebounded from a 1-0 deficit to capture five of six singles matches on its way to a resounding 5-2 win, marking Florida's largest margin of defeat in a regular-season match since the Gators dropped a 4-1 decision to Duke four seasons ago.

The Cats won five of the six singles matches to collect the victory including No. 8 Aibika Kalsarieva defeated No. 10 Jennifer Magley 6-3, 6-3, and

No. 33 Kim Coventry who turned back Zerene Reyes 6-2, 6-2. Sarah Foster and Lara Maurer also gained singles victories to help give Kentucky against the perennially highly ranked Gators. The first ever victory against Florida played a key role in hleping the the Cats finish one game ahead for their first ever Southeastern Conference regular season title.

No. 5 UK defeats No. 4 Georgia, 4-3

April 8, 2005 • Athens, Ga.

After picking up its first ever win against Florida earlier in the year, the Cats went to Athens, Ga., and picked up their first win there since 1988. The victory gave Kentucky a share of the Southeastern Conference regular for their first time in school history.

The victory also marked the team's 14th-consecutive victory and extended the longest win streak in the history of the program.


While UK was swept in doubles, the Cats came back to win four out six doubles matches to clinch the victory. 
No. 5 UK defeats No. 23 Tennessee, 4-3

April 10, 2005 • Knoxville, Tenn.

Unsatisfied by merely a share of a Southeastern Conference championship, the Kentucky women's tennis team claimed the title for itself as sophomore Joelle Schwenk rallied from a one-set deficit to provide the title-clinching point in UK's 4-3 win over No. 23 Tennessee in Knoxville. A member of arguably the toughest conference in collegiate tennis, Kentucky collects its first Southeastern Conference and SEC Eastern division titles in women's tennis.

The SEC regular-season title was the first for a University of Kentucky Olympic sport since the school's women's soccer program captured the conference title in 1995. The SEC Eastern-division crown is the first for a UK Olympic sport since the Kentucky softball program won the division title in 2000. The Cats finished conference play 11-1. Kentucky (21-3, 10-0) started off the match by capturing the doubles point for the eighth time in 10 conference matches. Then Maurer and Kalsarieva defeated Ashley Robards and No. 42 Sabita Maharaj respectively to set up Schwenk's game-winning and conference winning match.


my Trefethen and Sarah Witten recorded the most impressive stretch of doubles play in Kentucky tennis history in the 2003 NCAA Women's Tennis Championships in Gainesville, Fla. The pair opened the round of 32 with a 7-6, 6-0 win over Texas Tech's 40thranked Irina Tereschenko and Beverly Dawson. The Kentucky pair made short work of Ziva Grasic and Kendra Strohm the following day, dropping the 22nd-ranked Texas tandem by a 6-3, 6-2 count.

Trefethen and Witten pulled out

an exhilarating 4-6, 6-3, 7-5 victory over the top-ranked pair of Lauren Barnikow and Erin Burdette of Stanford to earn a berth in the NCAA doubles semifinal. Playing against Florida's Jennifer Magley and Zerene Reyes on their homecourts, Trefethen and Witten won the first set via tiebreaker and cruised to a 6-2 second-set win to become the first Kentucky doubles pair to play for a national title. The fourth-ranked California duo of Christina Fusano and Raquel Kops-Jones put a damper on the Cats' title hopes, scoring a 6-1, 6-2 win to deny Kentucky its first-ever national tennis title.

"Sarah and Amy played at a very high level of tennis over the last several days and I am very proud of what they have accomplished, not only today but over their entire careers," UK Coach Mark Guilbeau said. "Both of these women, as well as the other seniors on the team, have been very special to me. Their hard work and dedication to UK women's tennis are what have made it the program it is today."





Wildcat All-Americans

ibika Kalsarieva left a lasting mark on the UK tennis program. In 2004, Kalsarieva became the first Wildcat to become an All-American in her first season of NCAA eligibility. She also went farther than any Wildcat before her had ever gone by reaching the quarterfinals of the 2004 NCAA Singles Championships. In her second year she repeated as a singles All-America and earned All-America doubles honors along with Sarah Foster.

In 2003, Sarah Witten became the first woman in UK women's tennis history to earn three consecutive All-America Team selections. She also became just the second woman in UK history to earn the honor in both singles and doubles in the same year.

Joining Witten on the All-American stage was fellow senior Amy Trefethen who earned her first selection. The tandem posted a 20-5 record after being paired together in February 2003, on their way to reaching the NCAA Women's Doubles Championship Finals, becoming the first women in UK history to achieve such a feat. On the way to the championship match they defeated top-ranked Erin Burdette and Lauren Barnikow of Stanford for the second straight year. They finished the year ranked No. 4 natioally in doubles. The two All-American selections gave Witten four for her career, making her one of the greatest players in UK women's tennis

In 1987, Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi were UK's first All-Americans, claiming doubles honors and finishing the year ranked eighth in the ITA collegiate rankings. Hahn was also a singles All-American in '87, winning the SEC singles title and leading Kentucky to a 21-7 record and second-place finish in the conference. The UK team ended its year ranked 13th nationally.



Hahn and Tagaki claimed both singles and doubles honors in 1988 as they were among the top eight seeds at the NCAA Tournament and finished the year ranked in the Top 10. The UK tandem also advanced to the finals of the Rolex National Indoors in 1988 and won the SEC Indoor. As a squad, UK finished third in the SEC and sixth at the NCAA Championships.

In 1992, Susan Klingenberg received All-



America honors after being seeded among the top 16 players at the NCAA Championships. Klingenberg, then a junior, was Kentucky's third woman to gain All-America status. She finished the year ranked 22nd in the ITA collegiate rankings before missing most of her senior year due to injury.

Klingenberg, Hahn and Tagaki are all members of the UK Tennis Hall of Fame.

he University of Kentucky and the Southeastern Conference have rich tennis traditions. UK women's tennis has boasted 17 All-SEC performers since 1983, some going on to earn All-America status. Given that the SEC finds itself among the nation's premier tennis conferences annually, earning All-SEC honors is undoubtedly one of the biggest accomplishments a collegiate tennis player can receive.

In 2005, Aibika Kalsarieva became UK's first SEC Women's Tennis Player of the Year, while also garning All-SEC for her singles and doubles play. Also receiving All-SEC honors was Sarah Foster for her doubles play and Danielle Petrisko earned second team honors.

In 2004, Kalsarieva made an immediate splash in conference action, scoring an All-SEC at-large selection in her first season of NCAA tennis.

Sarah Witten proved her worth as one of Kentucky's most versatile women's tennis players by becoming the first Wildcat to earn All-SEC singles and doubles honors in the same season. In 2001, senior Brooke Skeen and junior Lauren

Rookledge racked up All-SEC team honors with their outstanding 26-6 doubles record. Skeen and Rookledge were the first Wildcats to be named All-SEC since Kelly Brown and Massoumeh Emami did it 1998. The duo was able to accomplish the impressive achievement in just their first season as a doubles team.

More impressive than seeing two Wildcats on the All-SEC team is finding three on the prestigious list. This remarkable feat has happened twice: first in 1984 when Clare Kuhlman, Jamie Plummer and Missy Reed all received the distinction and again in 1986 when Sonia Hahn, Tamaka Takagi and Chris Karges were all honored. Hahn and Takagi still remain UK's only three-time All-SEC performers.

The 1992 season also was a solid year for the UK women's tennis program as it saw both Bethany Avington and Susan Klingenberg make All-SEC First Team.

Hahn, Takagi and Klingenberg were each named All-Americans in the same season they earned All-SEC honors.







SEC Men's Tennis

The Southeastern Conference men's tennis programs are among the nation's leaders on the collegiate hardcourt. That trend continued as the conference made another strong national showing in 2005.

In team competition, the SEC shined with both Florida and Ole Miss reaching the semifinals of the NCAA tournament.

In singles action, three players reached the quarterfinals, including Kentucky's Jesse Witten.

The 2005 national doubles championship was captured by Georgia's John Isner and Antonio Ruiz. The Bulldogs' duo defeated LSU's Mark Growcott and Ken Skupski in the finals.

Overall, the SEC has 16 NCA singles champions in men's tennis dating back to 1930. Eight of those singles titles have come since 1984. Prior to Matias Boeker's repeat in 2002, Florida's Jeff Morrison won the title in 1999.

Six of the nine doubles titles have come since 1993. Florida won in 1993 with the doubles tandem of David Blair and partner, singles champion Merklein. Mississippi State followed in 1994 with Laurent Miquelard and Joc Simmons, and the Ole Miss duo Mahesh Bhupathi and Ali Hamadeh captured the doubles title in 1995. In 2001, Matias Boeker and Travis Parrott of Georgia took home the title.






Hilary J. Boone Varsity Tennis Complex

The University of Kentucky men's and women's tennis programs hold a competitive advantage over much of their competition thanks in large part to the fabulous amenities provided by the Hilary J. Boone Varsity Tennis Complex, which celebrated its 21st anniversary in January 2006.

The summer of 1997 marked a significant expansion of the Boone Tennis Complex with the construction and dedication of the \$1.5 million Hilary J. Boone Varsity Tennis Center. The facility features a 1,500-seat stadium for its two center courts with four additional hard courts. Funding was generated for the project through private donations as well as exhibitions featuring top tennis professionals Martina Navratilova, Jennifer Capriati, Jim Courier and John McEnroe.

In addition to the exhibitions, a bulk of the private donations were derived from the Ryan C. Holder Memorial Tennis Fund. Holder, a 16-




year-old Lexington Dunbar High School student, was killed in an automobile accident. Because of his love for the sport and desire to play collegiate tennis, a group of friends raised \$425,000 to complete the funding necessary to construct the stadium which houses the Ryan C. Holder Center Courts. The center courts were dedicated in Holder's memory on Aug. 3, 1997.

In 1993, renovations were finished as a complete weight room and locker room facilities were installed. A meeting room and office space for Emery were completed as well.

The University of Kentucky tennis facilities are a major reason for the great success of both the men's and women's squads. In addition to the new courts, the Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center and the adjacent H.H. Downing Recreation Tennis Courts have also played a key role in helping the Kentucky tennis teams become collegiate powers. The indoor center also was a gift from Boone.

The Boone Indoor Center, which opened in January 1986, is equipped with four courts and has seating for 1,000 people. A UK Tennis Hall of Fame has also been added and contains trophies and pictures depicting Kentucky's storied tradition. During the spring of 1989, the Indoor Center hosted the SEC Indoor Championships, the Hilary J. Boone Invitational and the McDonald's Classic.

"This center has given us exactly what our teams need to compete on the national level," Emery said. "Not only are our teams able to train as we want, but the building allows us to play night matches and attract crowds, something we couldn't do in the past."

The recreation courts were named after the "father" of Kentucky tennis, Dr. H.H. Downing, who coached the UK men's team for 29 years (1922-46 and '52-'57). He coached longer than any other UK coach, with the exception of basketball coach Adolph Rupp, compiling a 174-110-5 record.

The complex features 18 courts, including eight recently resurfaced courts, with seating for more than 1,000 spectators. "We had the courts resurfaced and they are in top condition," Emery said. "In 1993, we hosted the USTA Segment III professional tournament, and it was a tremendous success. We're looking forward to hosting more events in the future."

In addition to the Fifth-Third Championships and the annual spring home slate against



the best that the SEC and the nation have to offer, the Boone Tennis Complex plans to host a variety of events throughout the year. For three of the past four years, UK has sponsored the Charles Fluitt Fall Invitational in memory of the late Charles Fluitt who was a victim of the 1996 Value-Jet plane crash in the Florida Everglades. He was the father of former UK tennis star Marcus Fluitt. To honor this fallen friend of UK ten-

nis, Court No. 4 of the Boone Varsity Tennis Center was dedicated as the Charles Fluitt Memorial Court.

With much attention traditionally given to football and basketball in collegiate athletics, UK realizes that all of its student-athletes should play in the very best facilities possible. The Hilary J. Boone Varsity Tennis Complex is one such facility.



hrough education, cultural stimulation and economic development, the University of Kentucky's impact can be felt across all 120 Kentucky counties. Blending creative teaching and instruction methods with innovative research, medical care and community service, it is no wonder that UK is The University of Kentucky.

History

Founded in 1865 as a landgrant institution adjacent to downtown Lexington, UK is nestled in the scenic heart of the unique Bluegrass region of Kentucky. From its early beginnings, with only 190 students and 10 professors, UK's campus now covers more than 687

acres and is home to over 26,000 students and nearly 11,000 employees.

Mission

Since the mid-1990s, UK has pursued an ambitious goal set by the State Legislature to become a top-20 public research university by 2020. UK President Lee T. Todd Jr. has embraced this goal in a way that promises an impact on every Kentucky resident.

"As the state's flagship institution, the university is mindful of its responsibility to help all Kentuckians," Todd says. "Our land-grant mission calls on us to make a positive impact across the state. We need to be an educational leader, while remaining accessible to all Kentuckians. We need to be a cultural leader, sharing new ideas and opportunities across the state. And we need to be leading Kentucky's charge into the new economy. We are the catalyst for a new Commonwealth."

Students

UK's diverse student population represents 117 countries, every state in the nation, and every Kentucky county. The average ACT score for its first-year students is four points above the national average. UK students compete successfully for the most prestigious scholarships and awards, such as the Fulbright, Truman, Goldwater and Marshall. UK was selected as one of only 13 universities nationwide to participate in the Beckman Foundation


Scholarship program in 2002 and the grant was renewed

in 2005. This prominent program allows UK to award grants of \$17,600 to students to support their own research projects. UK had its 12th Truman Scholar named this past year.


Outreach

The university is committed to strong public service, reaching out to communities across the Commonwealth, sharing knowledge and making a difference in the towns, cities and lives of all Kentuckians. An example is Health Education through Extension Leadership, an ever-expanding Cooperative Extension Service initiative to enhance extension agents' capacity to deliver research conducted on campus throughout the state.

In 2000, officials launched The Campaign for the University of Kentucky, a \$600 million fund-raising effort - the largest in state history to enhance facilities, academic programs, public service and scholarships. After soaring past that goal, UK set a new mark of \$1 billion. UK is well on our way, having brought in more than \$757 million.



Students can choose from some 200 majors and degree programs in 16 academic and professional colleges: Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Business and Economics, Communications and Information Studies, Dentistry, Design, Education, Engineering, Fine Arts, Health Sciences, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Public Health, and Social Work.



The university is working aggressively to achieve its top-20 research goal. During fiscal year 2004, UK faculty received a record-breaking total of \$238 million in extramural funding for grants and contracts. The achievement marked the third year in a row UK exceeded the \$200 million level in sponsored project awards. In federal expenditures, UK is ranked 28th among all public universities.

Research at UK is a dynamic enterprise encompassing both traditional scholarship and emerging technologies. In April 2005 the university opened the \$74 million Biomedical Biological Sciences Research Building, affectionately known as the BBSRB. The BBSRB - UK's largest research facility - features an "open-format" design that encourages collaborative research across disciplines.

Medical Center

The UK Chandler Medical Center, opened in 1960, is considered one of the nation's finest academic medical centers. The faculty, students and staff of our young, dynamic Medical Center take pride in achieving excellence in education, patient care, research, and community service. As one of two Level 1 Trauma Centers in Kentucky, UK cares for the most critically injured and ill patients in the region. The 473-bed UK Hospital and UK Children's Hospital are supported by more than 500 faculty physicians and dentists, 400 resident physicians, and a staff of 3,200 health professionals committed to highquality patient care.

With its well-manicured landscape and landmark buildings, UK's campus offers great facilities that advance the scholarship of its students and the research endeavors of its faculty. The William T. Young Library is among the world's leading research libraries; its book endowment is the largest among public universities and ranks second only to Harvard University among all universities. Its broad scope of technology offers

Dr. Lee T. Todd Jr., President

ee T. Todd Jr. became the 11th president of the University of Kentucky on July 1, 2001. A native of Earlington, Ky. and a graduate of UK and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, President Todd is the fourth UK alumnus to hold the presidency and the first to earn an undergraduate degree from UK. He is a former

UK engineering professor; a successful businessman who launched two worldwide technology companies, both based in Kentucky; and a public advocate for research, technology and an entrepreneurial economy in the Commonwealth. President Todd is noted as an out-

standing leader who emphasizes students, strategic planning, and accountability. In July 2003, he developed, and the UK Board of Trustees approved, the University of Kentucky's three-year strategic plan, "The Dream & the Challenge," designed to focus the efforts of administrators, faculty and staff on meeting student needs while advancing

ty by 2020. The plan's success in improving the quality of life across the state of Kentucky relies on the active participation of all university units. The plan lays out six goals: Reach for National Prominence; Attract and Graduate Outstanding Students; Attract, Develop and Retain a Distinguished Faculty; Discover, Share and Apply Knowledge; Nurture Diversity of Thought, Gender and Ethnicity; and Elevate the Quality of Life for Kentuckians.

President Todd currently chairs the Southeastern Conference Committee on Academic Initiatives, serves on the American Council of Education Commission on Women in Higher Education, is involved with the Business Higher Education Forum, and is a member of the Council on Competitiveness. He chairs the Commission on Outreach and Technology Transfer for the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges (NASULGC), and is also a member of the Science and Mathematics Education Task Force, a national committee that reports to the Secretary of Energy.

Dr. Todd is married to the former Patricia Brantley, a UK graduate who earned her master's degree from Simmons College in Boston. They have two grown children, Troy and Kathryn, both graduates of UK.

itch Barnhart is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics for the University of Kentucky, having set a clear course for making Kentucky one of the top athletics programs in the country.

Hired July 15, 2002, Barnhart has made the desire for overall excellence the cornerstone of Wildcat Athletics. His decision to fully fund all 22 varsity sports helped produce a schoolrecord four conference championships during the 2004-05 school year, while also allowing UK to achieve its highest NACDA Directors' Cup finish (35th) in seven years.

Barnhart instructed his staff to seek out new revenue streams, and that resulted in a record \$80 million multimedia rights agreement with Host Communications. The additional resources allow UK to continue its commitment to its student-athletes, a commitment Barnhart takes personally. Athletics spends \$1.5 million annually on its nationallyrenowned CATS Academic Center and each spring hosts the CATSPYs, an awards program designed to recognize the very best in UK Athletics.

Other initiatives begun under Barnhart's leadership include the Big Blue Caravan, which connects UK to its vast fan base each spring, a revamping of UK's donor program that has resulted in record K Fund dollars, and a 10-year, \$10-million commitment to help fund the University's general scholarship program. UK has also received approval for a \$30 million expansion of Memorial Coliseum that includes new practice and office space for a variety of sports.

Barnhart's success is based on a five-principle philosophy that he implemented for the University of Kentucky Athletics the day he was hired:

- Operate in a first-class manner
- Possess great integrity
- Keep the focus on the student-athletes
- Provide sound fiscal management
- Compete for championships in all sports

Barnhart's connection to UK's student-athlete is evident by his personal interaction and commitment to provide all support services necessary to meet the needs of these students.

Barnhart came to Kentucky from Oregon State, where he served four years (1998-2002) as athletics director. A strong effort in fiscal management helped reduce the Beavers' operating debt from \$12.5 million to \$4.8 million during his tenure.

He also raised \$20 million in capital contributions for new baseball and softball stadiums, an indoor practice center and a basketball arena renovation. Before his tenure at OSU, he worked at Tennessee for 12 years (1986-98), the last four as Senior Associate Athletics Director, Prior to UT, Barnhart served as assistant executive director of the Mustang Club at Southern Methodist University from 1983 to 1986; regional director for the Duck Athletic Fund at University of Oregon in 1983; and was an intern for the Aztec Athletic Foundation at San Diego State University in 1982-1983.

Barnhart, 45, is a native of Kansas City, Kan. He received his bachelor of arts degree from Ottawa University (Kansas) in 1981 and a master of science degree in sports administration from Ohio University in 1982. He and his wife, the former Connie Brown, have three children, Kirby, 17, Blaire, 14, and Scott, 11.

entucky set a school record with four conference championships in 2004-05, including Southeastern Conference regular-season titles in men's basketball and women's tennis, the SEC Tournament title in men's golf, and the Mid-American Conference regular-season crown in men's soccer.

Men's Basketball

Kentucky won its first nine league games and finished with a 14-2 conference mark en route to its fifth Southeastern Conference regular-season crown under head coach Tubby Smith and its

43rd overall—more than any of the other 11 schools combined. The Wildcats advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight and posted a 28-6 overall record. The Cats finished the season ranked No. 7 by the Associated Press and No. 5 by the ESPN/USA Today.

Women's Tennis

The Wildcats clinched their first ever Southeastern Conference regular season championship with a 4-3 comeback victory over Tennessee in Knoxville April 10. Kentucky finished league play with a 10-1 record and completed the sea-



son with a 26-6 mark overall. The Cats advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals in Athens, Ga., and Coaches Mark Guilbeau and Carlos Drada were named national coach-of-the-year and national assistant coach-of-the year, respectively.

Men's Golf

Kentucky claimed its first-ever Southeastern Conference men's golf championship after shooting a three-over-par 283, to finish with a threeround total of 875. Senior standout John Holmes led the Cats with a third-place finish of 215.

The Wildcats made their third NCAA Championship appearance in four years, finishing seventh at the NCAA Championship after posting a furious comeback on day three of the

Men's Soccer

Kentucky won its second consecutive Mid-American Conference title and its fourth in five years with a 4-1-1 record in league action. The Wildcats finished their season with an 11-5-3 record overall, falling in the semifinals of the MAC Tournament. Senior Jamal Shteiwi was named the MAC Player of the Year for the second consecutive season as one of seven Wildcats named All-MAC. The Cats reached the 10-win plateau for the eighth year in a row.



K Fund

The University of Kentucky Blue & White Fund was established in 1973 to provide a funding resource for student-athlete scholarships and a means to build and upgrade athletics facilities. In September 2002, UK Athletics began the process of evaluating the Blue & White Fund. The goal was to develop a new funding resource to replace the Blue & White Fund. This new resource should ensure fairness and equity in the season ticket allocation process, keep up with the rising cost of our student-athletes' tuition and maintain a competitive advantage against other SEC and NCAA schools. The product of this process is called the K Fund. Just as the Blue & White Fund provided student-athlete scholar-

ships, the K Fund will do that and more. Our goal is to provide support to the more than 450 Wildcat student-athletes and to ensure their academic and athletic success. Donations given to the K Fund will be used for:

- Student-Athlete Scholarships tuition, room, board and books
- Academic Support and Career Development
- Athletics Facilities Maintenance
- Administrative Support

In order to adhere to a level of integrity that we are constantly striving to maintain at the University of Kentucky, we have put into practice several new procedures that will help us in

our quest to be the best in the nation. It is imperative that we stay competitive with other schools in the SEC and in the NCAA in terms of both athletics and fund-raising.

Giving to the K Fund enhances success for UK's sports programs and its student-athletes on the playing fields and in the classrooms.










ne of the cornerstones in the philosophy of University of Kentucky Athletics is a commitment to academic success. Much of the credit for UK's academic success goes to the Athletics Association's academic support system - the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services, or simply, "CATS."

UK opened CATS in 1981, the nation's first academic center dedicated exclusively to student-athletes. Over the years, as the services offered by CATS have grown, so did the need for additional space.

As a result, UK has built a new facility - the Ohio Casualty Center for Academic and Tutorial Services, thanks to a one-million dollar grant from the Ohio Casualty Insurance Group. The new Ohio Casualty Center opened in 1998 at a total cost of \$2.4 million.

Much of the credit for UK's academic success goes to the Athletics Association's academic support system - the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services, or simply, "CATS."

The new CATS, constructed in Memorial Coliseum, includes:

- 20,000 square feet of space more than double the size of the former CATS facility;
- a computer room housing 35 computers;
- a study area which accommodates 90-100 people;
- 24 tutoring rooms;
- a career development and life skills resource
- · a community outreach office; and
- offices for the staff,

Certainly, a facility is a good start, but any program - especially in academics - is only as good as the people who run it. And UK is fortunate to have outstanding leaders in its academics support system.

Bob Bradley, Associate Athletics Director for Student Services, oversees the CATS program. Bradley was named National Academic Advisor of the Year in 1989 and 1992. In 2000 he was selected as the CHAMPS Life Skills Coordinator of the Year by the NCAA Division I-A Athletic Directors Association.

CATS has a full-time

staff of 11. In addition to Bradley, they are:

CATS also employs six graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and the surrounding community. UK has budgeted more than \$1,000,000 for the operation of CATS in the coming year.

"We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic arena," Bradley says. "The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals, and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our center provides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions. Our goal is to show that we care about the student as well as the athlete."

For the CATS staff, showing you care means more than helping athletes maintain eligibility, graduate, or win awards. The academics staff also prepares student-athletes for life after college with the Wildcat Career Development Program.

The Career Development Program helps student-athletes look to the future through a stepby-step process which includes:

- · Mentoring and internships, which help determine career interests;
 - career counseling;
 - resume writing; and
 - forming a career plan.

The Wildcat Career Development Program works closely with the University's Career Planning and Placement Center in order to provide additional assistance when needed.



The William T. Young Library

KENTUCKY WOMEN'S TENNISH

n addition to providing the finest in athletic facilities, the University of Kentucky also provides student-athletes with the best in academic facilities. One of the most recent additions to the educational landscape at UK is the \$58 million William T. Young Library.

- Size: The library covers 365,350 square feet more than six football fields. The building is five stories high, plus a basement.
- Shelf capacity: If laid end-to-end, the bookshelf space would stretch 198,828 linear feet - that's more than 37 miles of shelf space. The shelves will house 1.2 million books.
- Seating capacity: The library can seat more than 4,000 patrons at one time, a 355 percent increase over the old library. The seating on the fifth floor of the new library equals the capacity of the former library.
- Computer connections: Every study table and study carrel in the library has an electrical outlet and a computer jack connected to the university's computer system. Virtually the entire library has wireless coverage.
- Flexibility: The library has a state-of-the-art electronic infrastructure that will enable UK to take full advantage of current and emerging technology.


In addition, the five floors and basement of the structure are designed as open, flexible spaces, enabling the library to adapt its services and facilities to the future changes in needs of UK students.


• Endowment: The UK Library has the nation's largest book endowment among public universities and ranks second only to Harvard.

Live Mascot

The University of Kentucky adopted blue and white as its official colors in 1892.

Blue & White

Originally, however, UK students had decided on blue and light yellow prior to the Kentucky-Centre College football game on December 19, 1891.

The shade of blue, which is close to a royal blue, was chosen when a student asked the question, "What color blue?"

At the time, Richard C. Stoll (who lettered in football at UK in 1889-94) pulled off his necktie and held it up. The students then adopted that particular shade of blue.

A year later, UK students officially dropped the light yellow color for white.

Wildcats Nickname

The official nickname for the University of Kentucky's athletics teams is "Wildcats." The nickname became synonymous with UK shortly after a 6-2 football victory over Illinois on Oct. 9, 1909, on the road.

Commandant Carbusier, then head of the military department at old State University (UK), told a group of students in a chapel service following the game that the Kentucky football team had "fought like Wildcats."

> Later the name Wildcats became more and more popular among UK followers as well as with members of the media. As a result, the nickname was adopted by the University.


Wildcat Mascot


The Wildcat mascot originated during the 1976-77 academic year at UK. Gary Tanner was the original Wildcat dancing and entertaining thousands of UK fans at Commonwealth Stadium and Rupp Arena during athletic events.

A few years later, he was joined by another Cat walking on stilts -


who made his appearance during UK's twin tower era of Melvin Turpin and Sam Bowie. Even today, the original mascot is joined by Scratch, who's a more child-friendly mascot and serves as the host of UK's official Kids Club.

Today, both mascots attend each football and basketball game, several academic functions and generally serve as friendly ambassadors for the University.




