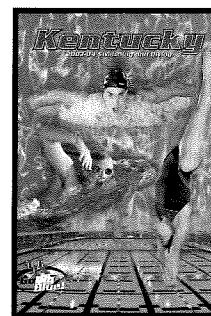

Coaching Staff

Gary Conelly
Head Coach



The 2003-04 season marks the 13th campaign for Gary Conelly as the University of Kentucky head swimming coach. The women's squads have compiled a 74-45 record since Conelly began coaching that squad in 1991-92. The men,

whom he started coaching in 1992-93, have put together a record of 53-58, bringing his overall coaching record to 127-103.

In 2002-03, Conelly led the men's team to its second-highest finish ever in the NCAA championships, a 17th-place showing. Conelly's 2001-02 men's team earned its highest-ever finish at the NCAA, placing 16th. At the Southeastern Conference Championships, the men had the second-highest point total in school history (282), finishing in sixth-place. Competing at the NCAAs for the men were juniors Clayton Moss, Roger Watkins and sophomore Joey Faltraco. Faltraco's 11th-place finish in the 200-yard backstroke earned him honorable mention All-America honors, the first UK athlete to earn the honor in the event, while Moss was an All-American on the one- and three-meter springboards and the platform. The women also competed at the national championships, continuing a string of 10 straight appearances.

During the 2000-01 year, Conelly led the men's team to a NCAA 17th-place finish. UK also achieved its highest SEC finish in 18 years, placing fifth. Five individuals from the men's team competed at the NCAAs, seniors Dave Tweedie, Macon White, Aaron Workman and Shaun Zitani and sophomore Roger Watkins, all five of them earning All-America honorable mention. Conelly also coached the women to the NCAAs, where they placed 39th. Seniors Melissa Olson and Jaime Siegele competed at the championships, with Siegele earning All-America honorable mention in the 50 freestyle.

During the 1999-2000 season, Conelly led the men's team to a top-20 finish and had two men qualify for the NCAA championships, both earning honorable mention All-America honors. Four women qualified for the NCAA Championships. The women comprised the 800 freestyle relay that finished 12th and earned the women

honorable mention All-America honors in addition to competing individually. Following the season, nine Wildcats participated in the 2000 Olympic trials.

In 1998-99, Conelly led both the men's and women's teams to top-25 finishes at the NCAA Championships. The men finished at No. 24, while the women finished 21st, their fifth consecutive top-25 showing. The women's squad had 10 athletes advance to the NCAA meet, the most in school history. Senior diver Paco Rivera finished second in platform diving, becoming the top NCAA finisher in school history.

Conelly led the 1996-97 men's team to a 26th-place NCAA finish and Nat Lewis finished third in the 1,650 freestyle and still ranks as the second-highest NCAA finisher in school history. The women finished in 24th place and had three team members earn All-America honors.

In the 1995-96 season, Conelly led the women's team to a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Championships, the highest finish in school history. In 1994-95, Conelly led the women's team to a fourth-place finish at the SEC Championships and a second straight 19th-place finish at the NCAA Championships. Conelly was named 1995 SEC Women's Coach of the Year for his efforts.

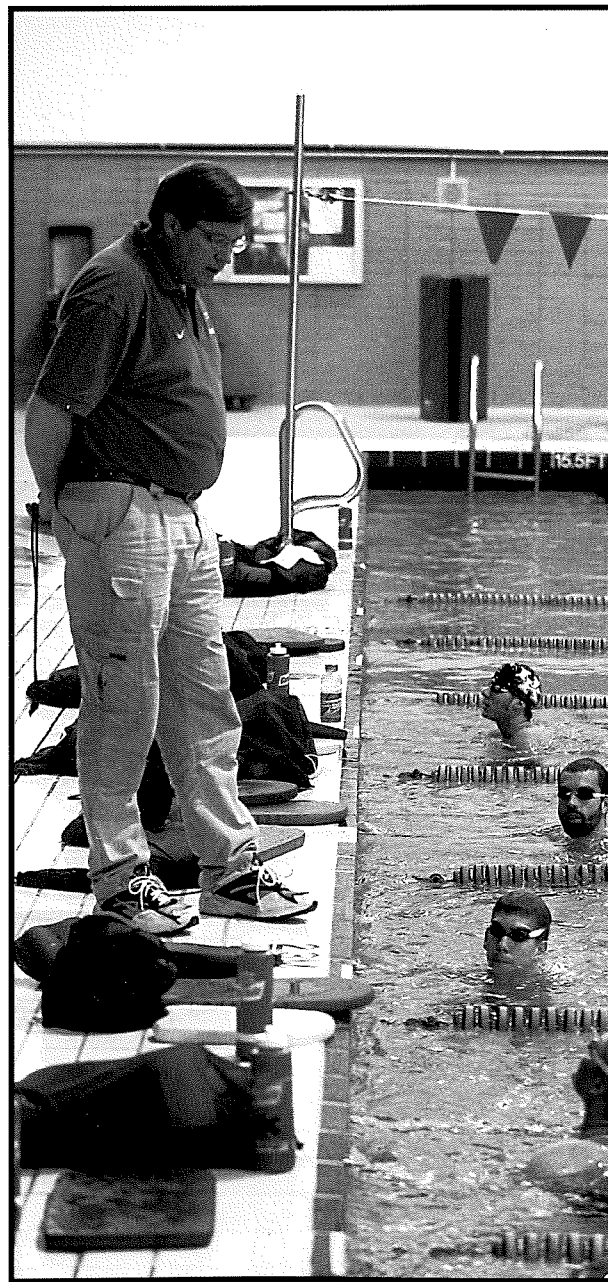
Prior to becoming head coach at Kentucky, Conelly spent three years with UK as a graduate assistant coach. In Conelly's 12 years with UK, the swimming and diving programs have made great strides. In 1990, Conelly coached the team's first female All-American and NCAA finalist, Kellie Moran. Since then, 19 more Wildcat swimmers have garnered All-America accolades under Conelly's tutelage.

Conelly came to the University of Kentucky from the West Florida Lightning Aquatics USS team in Largo, Fla. During his seven years at West Florida, Conelly directed 150 swimmers and produced three Olympic Trial qualifiers, two National Sports Festival team members, and one

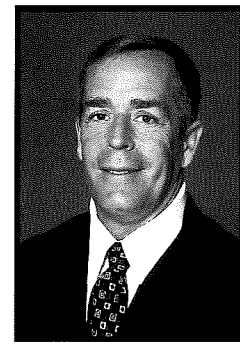
Sports Festival champion in the 100 backstroke.

As a swimmer, Conelly was a member of the 1972 U.S. Olympic Team and he participated on the world record-setting 400-meter freestyle relay team. An Indiana University alumnus, Conelly was a 15-time NCAA All-American and is a member of the Indiana Swimming Hall of Fame. In 1973, Indiana honored him with the Balfour Award for excellence in swimming, leadership, and scholarship.

Conelly is married to Kathleen Healey and has two children, Cody and Emily.



Michael Lyden
Diving Coach



The 2003 Southeastern Conference Men's Diving Coach of the Year, Michael Lyden begins his 11th season as diving coach at the University of Kentucky. Since joining UK in 1993, Lyden has led the Wildcats to diving prominence, coaching UK's first All-American, Tina Johnson, in 1994 on the platform, and the Cats' first single-season three-time All-American, Clayton Moss in 2002 and 2003.

The past three seasons have been productive for Lyden and his divers. Moss ended his brilliant Wildcat career in 2003 with a runner-up finish on the three-meter and third and fourth-place finishes on the one meter and platform, respectively, at the NCAA championships. During the 2001-02 season, he helped Moss successfully defend his SEC one-meter title, the first UK diver to win consecutive titles in an event at the conference championships, and become an All-American on all three boards, as Moss placed second on the one-meter, fifth on the three-meter and sixth on the platform. For all of his accomplishments, Moss was named the SEC Male Diver of the Year, also a first for UK.

Lyden also aided in the success of 2002 senior Aaron Kirkpatrick, who won silver on both the one- and three-meter springboards and placed seventh on the platform at the conference championships.

His run of success with the duo also included the 2000-01 season when Moss became the third UK man to be an SEC Champion, winning the one-meter, and followed it up with a fourth-place finish on the three meter and a 10th-place finish on the platform, earning All-American honors on both. Kirkpatrick also had a successful season under Lyden's tutelage. The junior garnered honorable mention All-American status with a 12th-place finish on the three-meter springboard at the NCAA championships.

Since joining the Wildcats, Lyden has led UK to diving prominence. At the 1994 NCAA Championships, Tina Johnson became UK's first diving All-American on the platform, placing eighth, and Jenny Baker earned honorable mention All-America in two events. In 1995, both

divers earned All-America status, with Baker finishing eighth on the one-meter and Johnson finishing second on the platform. He had a third diver, Beth Leake, qualify for the meet, but Leake tore her medial collateral ligament in a training session prior to the competition.

During the 1999-2000 season, Lyden had junior Carrie Knoeber and freshman Moss qualify for the NCAA Championship meet. Knoeber earned honorable mention All-American honors on the three-meter while Moss earned All-American honors on the one-meter, three-meter, and platform. Moss' honors were the first for a freshman in UK history.

In 1998 Paco Rivera became the first male UK diver to claim a Southeastern Conference title, winning the platform event and garnering All-SEC honors. Rivera advanced to the NCAA Championships, where he was named as an All-American in three events, including a second place finish on the platform.

In 1997, Lyden coached Christy Soulakis to the SEC three-meter springboard championship and SEC Female Diver of the Year honors. Soulakis and Rivera both earned All-America honors.

In 1996, Leake and Soulakis joined Baker and Johnson in earning All-America honors. Leake finished second on the one-meter and fourth on the three-meter, Johnson finished third on the one-meter and platform, and Baker finished seventh on the platform. For his divers' accomplishments, Lyden was honored as the Southeastern Conference and NCAA Women's Diving Coach of the Year.

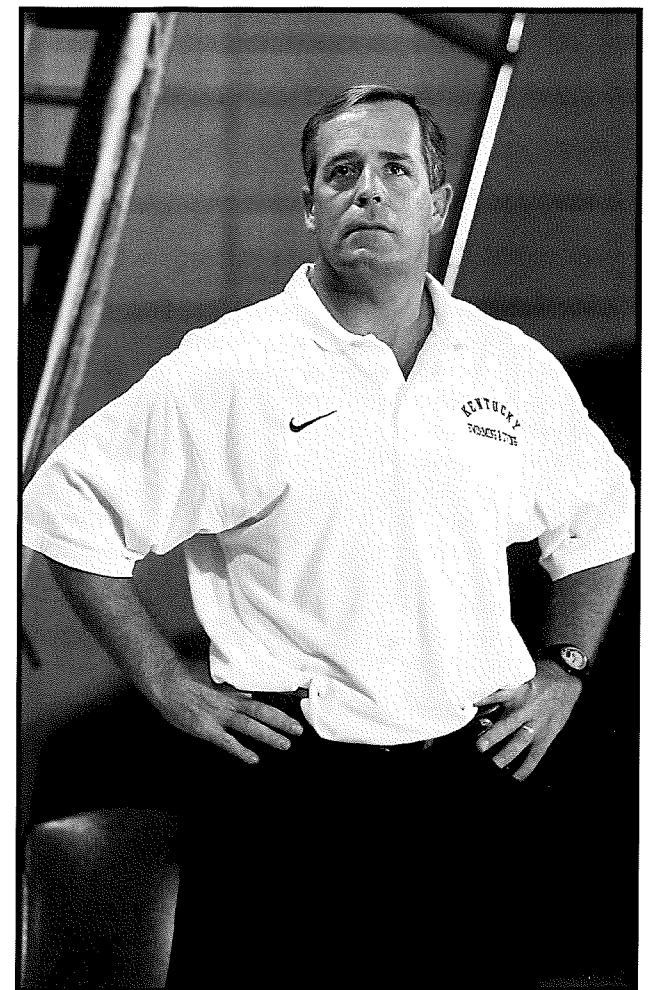
Before arriving at UK, Lyden had spent nine seasons at Eastern Michigan where he was the Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year nine times. He then moved to LSU where he received SEC Women's Coach of the Year four times consecutively and was the 1992 SEC Men's Coach of the Year. During Lyden's tenure at LSU his divers won 15 of 24 possible SEC titles.

Along with his college coaching, Lyden has also

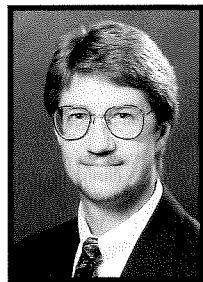
coached U.S. Diving Clubs and has had numerous All-Americans and has coached six age group divers to 17 national championships. He was chosen to coach at the Junior World Diving Championships in the summer of 2002 held in Aachen, Germany. At that event he coached one member to a seventh place finish in the 1-meter and 3-meter boards. Lyden has served as the National Team Coach in 1988-90, 1992, 1994-96, 1998-2000 and has directed divers in competitions in Italy, Austria, Mexico, Canada, Spain, China, France, and Holland.

In addition to coaching, Lyden has been a member of the U.S. Diving Rules Committee, the U.S. Olympic International Diving Committee and is a lifetime member of U.S. Diving. In 1993-94 and 1997-99, Lyden served on the NCAA Rules Committee.

A 1980 graduate of Western Michigan University, Lyden is married to Emily Joan Sullivan of Toledo, Ohio. They have three children — Jessica Ann, John Tyler (Jack) and Brittany Barbara.



Pete Knox
Assistant Coach



Pete Knox enters his 12th year as assistant coach after serving four years as UK's graduate assistant. Often described as a vigorous and intense leader, Knox primarily works as a sprint coach and has developed many Wildcat swimmers, such as 1996 NCAA qualifier Rick Barber and Shaun Zitani. Knox brings his vocal and energetic approach to every practice and has an exceptional ability to motivate his swimmers. With an exercise physiology and research background, Knox specializes in an ongoing weight-training program.

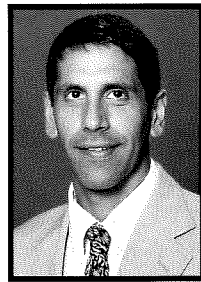
Knox came to Kentucky from Brandon, Fla., where he coached the Brandon High School men's and women's teams from 1980 to 1988. While at Brandon, his teams consistently placed in the top 10 of the Florida High School Championships. Knox also developed two All-America high school swimmers and had several Junior and Senior National qualifiers. An assistant coach with the Brandon Blue Wave USS Team from 1981 to 1988, Knox was selected Hillsborough County Coach of the Year in 1987.

In his tenure at Kentucky, Knox has coached Shaun Zitani to the fastest time in school history in the 50 and 100 freestyle, as well as the school's fastest 100-fly time. He has also coached Roger Watkins to the all-time top position in the record books for the 100- and 200-breaststrokes, while leading Jaime Siegle to the fastest 50-freestyle time.

A native of Norfolk, Va., Knox graduated with honors from the University of Florida in 1978 with a degree in health education and completed his Master's Degree in the spring of 1999. Knox is currently working toward a master's degree in exercise physiology with an emphasis directed toward the application to swimming.

Knox is married to former Wildcat swimming standout Wendy Hipkind.

John Brucato
Assistant Coach



John Brucato is in his fifth season with the UK swimming program. Brucato works primarily with the middle distance group and breaststrokers.

Brucato comes to UK via the USS club team Wildcat Aquatics in Lexington. He is in his 12th season with Wildcat Aquatics. Brucato joined WA in the spring of 1990 and has established himself as a leader in the Kentucky swim coaching community.

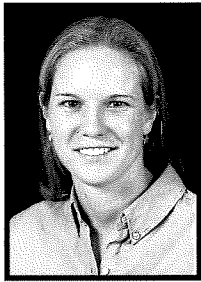
During his tenure with WA, Brucato has produced numerous Top-16 qualifiers, Junior National qualifiers, Junior National Champions, Senior National qualifiers, and an Olympic Gold Medalist. He is a former Kentucky Swimming Coach of the Year, in addition to being a Select Camp Coach and an Olympic Festival Coach.

In 1992, Brucato coached Megan Kleine to a gold medal in the 1992 Olympic Games as part of the United States' 400-meter medley relay. Kleine, who swam for six years under Brucato at WA, won Senior Nationals twice in the 100-meter breaststroke. Kleine went on to swim at the University of Texas at Austin.

A native of Covington, Ky., Brucato began his coaching career at the Covington YMCA and then spent two years with the Covington Clippers Swim Team. In 1985, he took over the helm at the Nashville Aquatic Club where he spent five successful years as the Head Age Group Coach before being hired on as the WA Senior Head Coach.

Brucato is a 1985 graduate of Northern Kentucky University where he received a degree in psychology. He lives in Lexington with his wife Jan, and their daughter, Katie.

Azurdee Engel
Assistant Coach



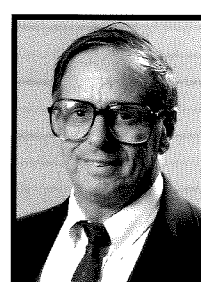
Azurdee Engel begins her second season with the University of Kentucky swimming program. She works primarily with the middle distance and distance swimmers.

Engel, a native of Duluth, Ga., comes to Kentucky from the University of Tennessee, where she swam from 1997-2001. She was captain of the UT swim team from '99-'01 and owns the sixth-fastest 200-freestyle time in school history. Engel graduated from Tennessee in 2002 with a degree in Art History.

Engel gained coaching experience working at the Stanford University swim camps this past summer with Stanford head coach Skip Kenney and coaching the Tennessee Masters swim team last year. She worked with several Ironman Triathletes in her time with the Masters swim team, while also working swimming camps at UT.

Engel, 24, resides in Lexington.

Wynn Paul
Aquatic Director



On Oct. 24, 2003 Wynn Paul became the third person inducted into the University of Kentucky Swimming and Diving Hall of Fame. Paul joins former head coach Algie Reece and former diving coach Brigid DeVries, who is now the Commissioner of the Kentucky High School Athletics Association, in this exclusive membership.

Paul has been a member of the UK staff for almost 40 years, formerly serving as coach of both the men's and women's swimming squads as well as the former water polo program. He relinquished his coaching duties in 1991 to devote his full time to the position of Aquatic Director, overseeing facilities operations and event management at the Lancaster Aquatic Center.

Paul was named UK's men's coach in 1964 and assumed the duties of women's head coach when it became a varsity sport at Kentucky in 1983. During his coaching tenure, Paul compiled an impressive 135-61 dual meet record with the men's program and a 48-30 mark with the women's program.

During his reign as coach of the varsity men's water polo team from 1965-82, Paul amassed a 140-66 record (68 percent) and won the 1977 Midwest Conference Championship before the program was dropped in 1983.

Paul's success as a coach is a testament to his extensive involvement and experience in all aspects of swimming. He has served as meet director for the Southeastern Conference Swimming and Diving Championships, the NCAA Zone "B" Qualifying Meet, the World Games Diving Trials, the Kentucky High School Championships, the Kentucky Special Olympics and the Kentucky USS Championships. He serves as meet director for all UK home meets.

A 1962 Louisville graduate, Paul was captain of his U of L swim team. He was the Cardinals' high point scorer for three years and held 12 varsity records. After graduating from U of L, Paul attended graduate school at UK.

Paul's wife, Helen, is an Assistant Professor of Nursing at Eastern Kentucky University.

Support Staff

Micki King
Assistant Athletics Director/
Senior Women's Administrator



In her 12th year with the UK Athletics Department, Micki King is Assistant Athletics Director and the Senior Women's Administrator.

King, who previously held the title of Special Assistant to the A.D., oversees the sports of women's basketball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, volleyball, rifle, cheerleaders and dance team. For two years, she also managed marketing efforts for the women's basketball team while serving as game director for all home contests.

A native of Pontiac, Mich., King served 26 years in the United States Air Force before retiring with the rank of colonel in 1992. During her years of service, King had assignments in Michigan, Arizona, California, Washington, Colorado, Kentucky, and Germany. In 1973, King was the first woman to teach physical education and coach at a military academy when she served at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs.

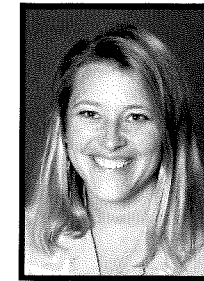
An accomplished diver, King attended the University of Michigan and graduated in 1966.

She won the gold medal for springboard diving in the 1972 Olympic Games. Four years earlier, she just missed a gold medal when a freak accident in the finals of the '68 Olympics dropped her from first to fourth in the standings. During her illustrious career, she also competed in two Pan American Games, won 10 U. S. national championships, and won international diving honors in 15 countries. She is an inductee in seven Halls of Fame, including the prestigious United States Olympic Hall of Fame.

After her diving career, King turned to coaching at the Air Force Academy in 1973-77. After assignments in Arizona and Germany, King returned to the Academy in 1983 and was named assistant athletics director and diving coach. During this stint, she was named NCAA Division II Coach of the Year three times. King's divers won 11 All-America honors and two claimed national titles. In 1988, King traveled to the Seoul Games as a staff member of the U. S. Olympic diving team and served in the same capacity in the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta. She attended the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney on behalf of the U.S. Olympic Committee, her

eighth appearance at the summer games as either a participant or staff member.

Letitia Hollingsworth-Gray
Pool Manager



Letitia Hollingsworth-Gray begins her eighth season as Lancaster Aquatic Center Pool Manager. Prior to her stint as pool manager, Hollingsworth served as the UK swim team's Staff Assistant. At UK home meets she serves as the

technical manager for the electronic timing system and scoreboard.

The UK alumna and Lexington, Ky. native swam for the Wildcats from 1982-86 and was the captain of UK's first varsity women's swim team for three years.

Hollingsworth also teaches courses in CPR, lifeguarding, and coaches' safety training, as well as serving as an aquatic examiner for the Red Cross.

Hollingsworth is married to Steve Gray and the two reside in Lexington. They have a son, one-year-old Cooper.

Margo Lynch
Staff Assistant



UK swimming alumna Margo Lynch re-joined the UK swimming & diving program in Sept. of 2002 as a staff assistant. During home meets, Lynch serves as the scoreboard and timing systems operations manager.

Born in Melbourne, Australia, Lynch came to Kentucky from her family's adopted home of Pittsburgh, Pa. Lynch swam for the Wildcats from 1991-95 and served as the team captain during her junior and senior seasons. Lynch can be found on the all-time top-10 UK lists in three events; 200-freestyle, 500-freestyle and 1650-freestyle.

Prior to returning to her alma mater, Lynch served as a buyer for Phillip Gall's Outdoor & Ski in Lexington.

In her spare time, Lynch enjoys outdoor activities and rooting on her hometown Pittsburgh Steelers.

Women's Outlook

Youthful, yet experienced. That is an appropriate description for the 2003-04 UK women's team. Only three seniors and three juniors are on the 19-member roster, but if experience is an indicator of success, the Wildcats are on their way to bigger and better things – if a lack of depth doesn't sabotage the process.

"We're not going to get beat by teams with higher quality than us; if we get beat, it'll be because of the depth of the opposing team," Coach Gary Conelly said.

Backstroke

Backstroke appears to be the deepest event for the Wildcats. Senior Shawna Sechrist and junior Jessica Siegele lead a talented group of backstrokers.

"Sechrist has the capability of being a sub-two minute backstroker, meaning she is capable of qualifying for the NCAA championships," Conelly said. "Siegele made NCAA 'B' cuts last year, though she didn't qualify for the NCAAs. She's more of a sprinter and she'll help us out a lot."

Jamie Saxe is a solid 200y backstroker, having scored at the 2003 SEC Championships along with Brennan Moore. Joanna McLean also figures to contribute in the backstroke.

Butterfly

Conelly will depend on Siegele to split time in the butterfly event, though her supporting cast has the chance to make quite an impact.

"Siegele is our best sprint butterfly, though her best event is the backstroke. Sunny Gibson came in as a backstroker but has some really nice times in the butterfly."

Junior Marci Vrooman could see action in the butterfly, but that is contingent upon her recovery from off-season shoulder surgery.

"Marci Vrooman is a bit of a wild card," Conelly said. "In the past, she has had really fast butterfly times, but she's just had her shoulder operated on for the second time. Given that the butterfly is really brutal on the shoulders, we're reluctant to use her there right away. But, if everything takes and she does well with her recovery, we might use her in the butterfly."

Breaststroke

The breaststroke event brings about an area of depth for the Wildcats. The trio of senior Kendra Trahan and sophomores Shantel Commander and Laura Graham placed at the prestigious Nike Cup in the 100y-breaststroke event, while Commander and Graham each placed in the 200y-breaststroke event. Commander and Graham each earned NCAA "B" cuts in the event last sea-

son, and Conelly has no reason to expect less in 2004.

"I think there's a really good chance they will make the cuts again this year. They both dropped three seconds off of their 200y times. If they can take a couple of seconds off of their 100y times, all three are strong possibilities to score well at the SEC championships and NCAA qualifying events.

Freestyle

The freestyle event may lack the depth of other areas, but certainly not the quality. Once again, the health of Marci Vrooman goes a long way in determining the depth in the event.

"In her frosh year, Marci swam well in anything from 50 yards up to the mile. Last year, with her shoulder problems, she had a real hard time getting anywhere close to what she's used to.

So we're in a holding pattern. If she can pick up where she was during her freshman year, she can score in the top eight at the conference meet," Conelly said.

Fresh off of a stint at the Pan American Games, freshman Nikia Deveaux comes to Kentucky from the Bahamas.

"Nikia is an interesting prospect. We brought her in as a sprinter, and we're still in the process of figuring out if she will remain in that area. On paper, her best times are in sprint events, though she may turn out better in middle distance events," Conelly said.

Siegele and Joanna McLean look to contribute in the sprint freestyle events.

Sophomore Brennan Moore emerged as a significant threat in the distance events as a freshman. Moore established team highs in four events and

placed at the SEC championships in four events as well.

"Brennan is the backbone of our dual meets, and she will help us out a lot," Conelly said.

Caitlin Muldoon scored as a freshman at the SEC championships two seasons ago and freshman Kelly Cross may see time in the distance events as well. Sophomore Jamie Saxe, bothered by an elbow injury a season ago, could emerge as a significant threat if she can stave off the injury bug.

"Jamie scored at the SEC championships a year ago in the 200 backstroke, but she's good enough that if she gets back to her high school times, she could score in any freestyle event. On paper, she's our most versatile swimmer," Conelly said. Senior Amanda Bourgeois struggled last season with injuries but Conelly likes the odds of success in 2004 for the Spartanburg, S.C. native.

"Amanda had really good freshman and sophomore seasons and had an injury-plagued junior season. Right now, she's 100 percent, and as long as she stays healthy, she's going to help us out a lot," Conelly said.

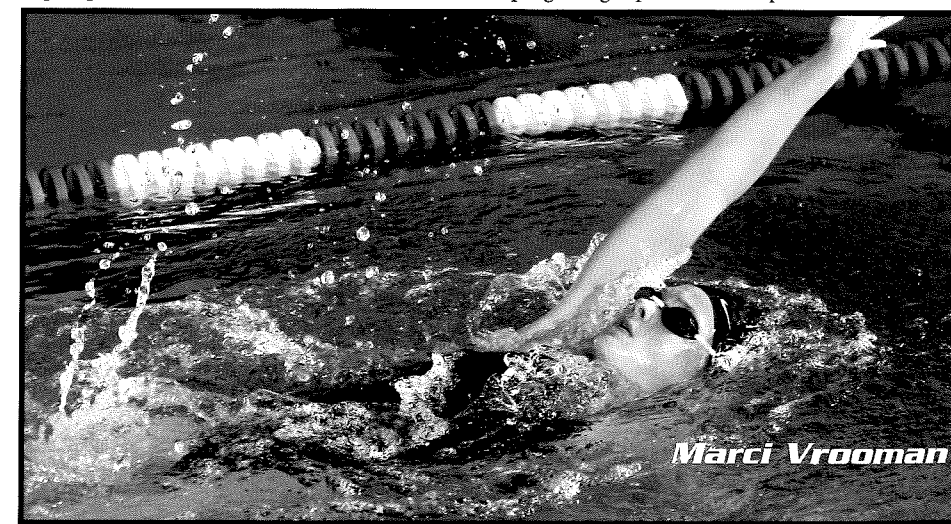
Individual Medley

Schedule

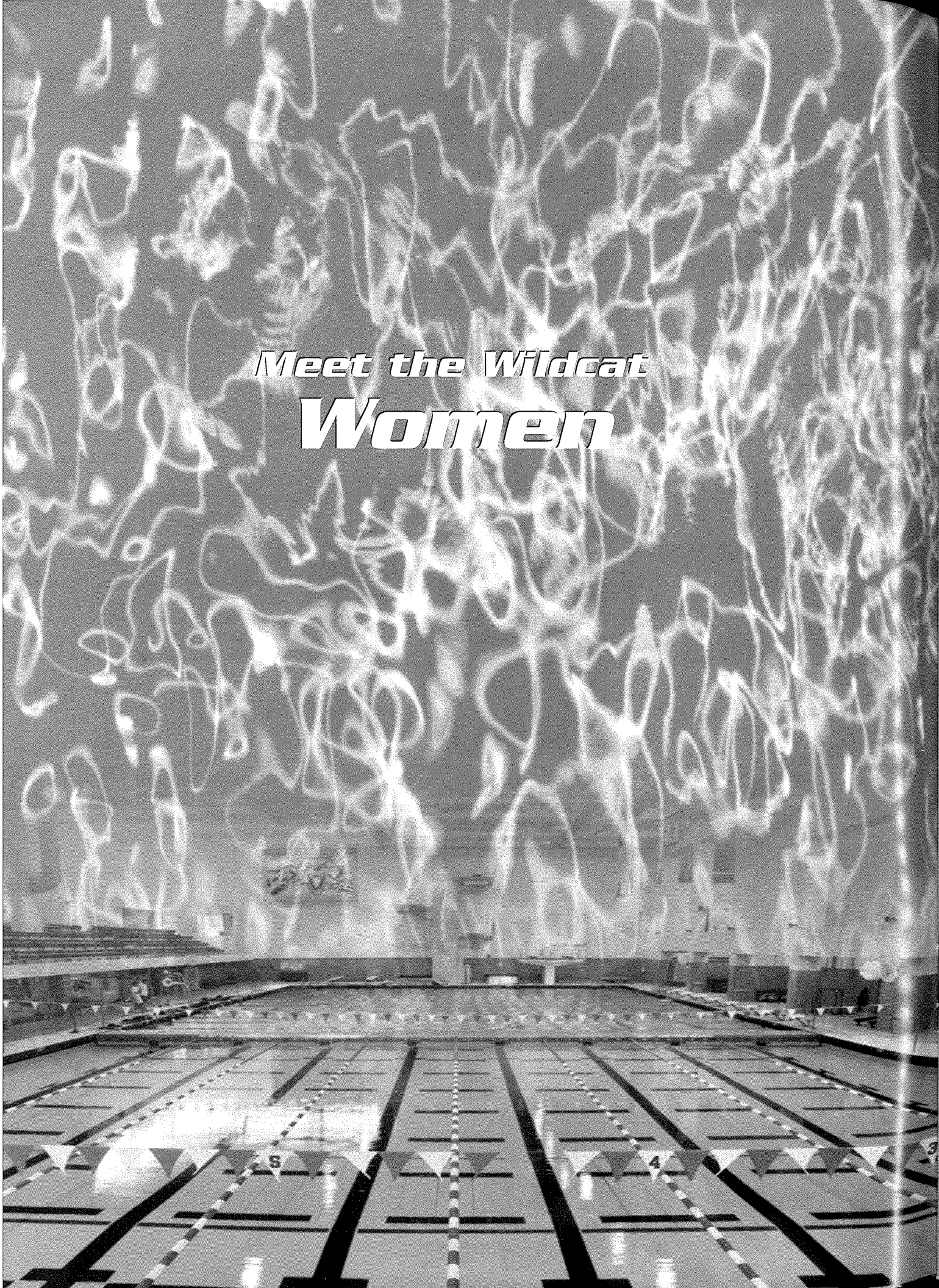

2003-04 Men's Outlook

Though the 2002-03 Kentucky men finished strong in taking 17th place at the 2003 NCAA Swimming & Diving Championships, Coach Gary Conelly believes that members of the 2003-04 squad would be disappointed with such a finish. The '03-04 Wildcats men enter the new season as an experienced and confident blend of student-athletes who have their eyes set on bigger things. Conelly emphasizes the potential of this group.

"I think this might be the best men's team we've ever had," Conelly said.

"There are a couple of key spots that are a little bit troubling, and we have only one diver, which hurts our depth. However, we have guys that aren't talented in just one event or one distance; we have guys that can swim five-to-eight different events. We're really flexible and we're much deeper than we've ever been."

Freestyle

Senior captain Fernando Barros enters 2003-04 with the fifth-fastest Kentucky times in the 50y and 100y-freestyle events.

"Fernando has caught fire during the last two seasons and had NCAA cuts in the 100y butterfly and 100y backstroke. There's no reason why he shouldn't be able to make NCAA cuts," Conelly said.

Sophomore Daniel Farnham made an immediate impact last season, registering the third-best time in Kentucky history in the 100y-freestyle event.

"Daniel had a phenomenal year last season and had enormous time drops in the 50 and 200 freestyles. If he even drops half as much this year as he did last year, he will land in the top eight at the SECs and score at the NCAA championships," Conelly said.

Junior-college transfer Tim Patrick has made waves in his short time as a Wildcat. Patrick's versatility across the board figures to become quite an asset for the 2003-04 Wildcats.

"Tim can compete with anyone in the Southeastern Conference in the 100-yard distance of any stroke," Conelly said. "He could be good in any sport and he'll have a tremendous impact in his first year here."

Rarely does a newcomer make a splash the way Steven Manley did as a freshman in 2003. The Irishman owns the second-fastest Kentucky times in the 200y and 500y-freestyle events. Conelly doesn't expect Manley to remain in second much longer on those lists.

"He'll break the 200 and 500 records this season, and he's also good in the 100 freestyle," Conelly said. Manley has the seventh-fastest 100 freestyle in Kentucky swimming history.

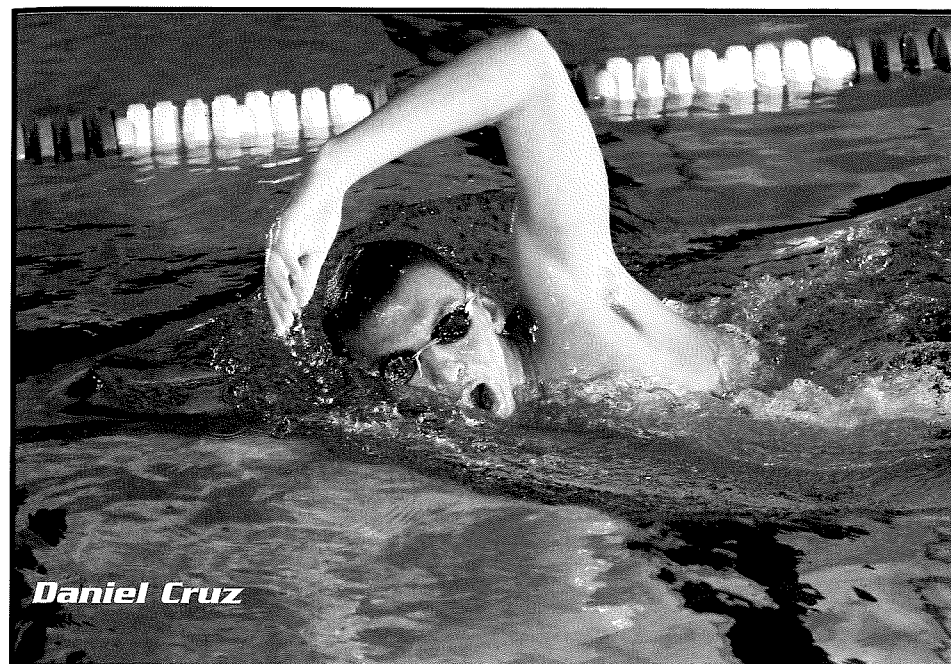
Newcomers Jerram Chudleigh, Mark Doyle and Eric Weber have shown early promise in the freestyle events. The relay events appear particularly strong for Kentucky, as Barros, Cruz, Farnham and Manley each earned honorable mention All-America honors for their performances in the 200y and 800y-freestyle relays.

Backstroke

A select group of Wildcats will help fill the void at backstroke left by the departure of Joey Faltraco. Jerram Chudleigh, a transfer out of Wyoming, has impressed the coaching staff in the 200y backstroke and is likely to see significant time in the event. Senior Darron Berquist will

add support in the backstroke, as will junior Dave Roberts, who has enjoyed significant time drops each season.

Breaststroke

The breaststroke is one of few areas of concern for the 2003-04 UK men.

"The breaststroke is our weak link this season, and it's an area where we really need some people to step up," Conelly said.

Junior Mike Arce returns in the event and Dane Redinger, a solid freestyler, may see more action this season at breaststroke and could be one of the better breaststrokers on the team, Conelly said. Tim Patrick and Drew Goodall should also expect to see time at breaststroke.

Butterfly

The butterfly corps is headed by junior Daniel Cruz, who broke the Kentucky 200y-butterfly record in 1:45.72 last season. Conelly has seen great things from his captain and says Cruz has great things ahead of him.

"Daniel is really training hard in the butterfly already and he'll only get better this year. He's more focused now than I've seen him in his first two years. He's a big believer in himself and he feels that he can compete with the fastest guys out there," Conelly said.

The biggest boost to the butterfly lineup in 2003-04 may come from senior Eddie Clement. The native of Essex, England missed the 2002-03 campaign while serving with the Kentucky

100y butterfly as Tim Patrick, Fernando Barros, Cruz and Evan Morris are each capable of turning in solid times in the event. Chris Collins has trained as more of a butterfly sprinter, though a summer injury may hinder his progress. Billy Nettling will provide support in the 200y butterfly.

Individual Medley

Conelly will depend on the reliable Steven Manley to provide a threat in the individual medley events. But once again, newcomer Patrick may be a formidable force in this event.

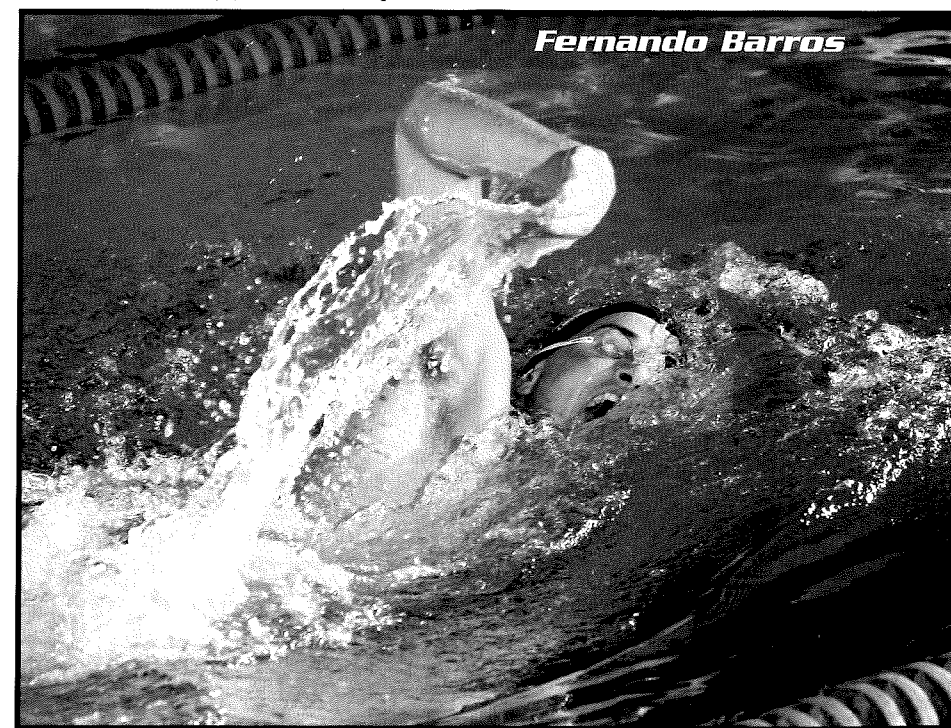
"Steven has been really fast, but the guy that might surprise a lot of people is Tim Patrick. I don't think he has a bad stroke," Conelly said.

Clement, Chudleigh, and Cameron Moore will add depth at the individual medley, and Daniel Cruz may add this event to his repertoire in 2004. Each is expected to pose a formidable threat in this event in dual meets, and potentially, the SEC Championships.

Diving

The graduation of nine-time All-American Clayton Moss leaves the Kentucky diving program with one remaining diver, junior Mario Rodriguez. Kentucky diving coach Mike Lyden looks for great things in 2003-04 from the native of Mexico City.

"Mario is a really good talent and an unbelievable worker. He's a workhorse."

UK Swimmer Serves Army Duty in Bosnia

University of Kentucky swimmer Eddie Clement has lived a lifetime of experiences already.

Clement has lived in four countries, been a collegiate student-athlete, gotten married, and seen the realities of world politics as a soldier in the United States military, all by the age of 24.

A senior on the Kentucky swimming and diving team, Clement recently returned to the United States after year of duty in the Army National Guard. He spent seven months, March through September, in Bosnia as part of the peacekeeping efforts there.

"It's very war-torn," Clement said of Bosnia. "We were trying to keep the peace by keeping different factions at bay."

Clement is an Infantry Specialist in a U. S. National Guard unit based in Ravenna, Ky. He is a member of Charlie Company, First Battalion of the 149th Infantry Brigade.

The majority of the duty was spent in physical training and patrolling various sites. Ironically, one of the areas his unit frequently patrolled was the town of Tuzla - the hometown of current Wildcat football player Sevin Sucurovic. Clement also was involved in dangerous duty of bunker raids and the sobering experience of uncovering a mass gravesite.

"You appreciate what we take for granted every day," Clement said of his time overseas. "Vehicles ... everybody over there is walking. The educational system has severely bad equipment. Medical and dental aid is limited or nonexistent."

While in Bosnia, Clement was able to stay in contact with his wife, April, and keep up with life in the States.

"I was able to call home frequently and we had e-mail access," Clement said. "April was very supportive. She finished her master's degree in May and has been teaching at (Lexington's) Bryan Station High School. Fortunately, she was very busy and that helped her keep her mind off it."

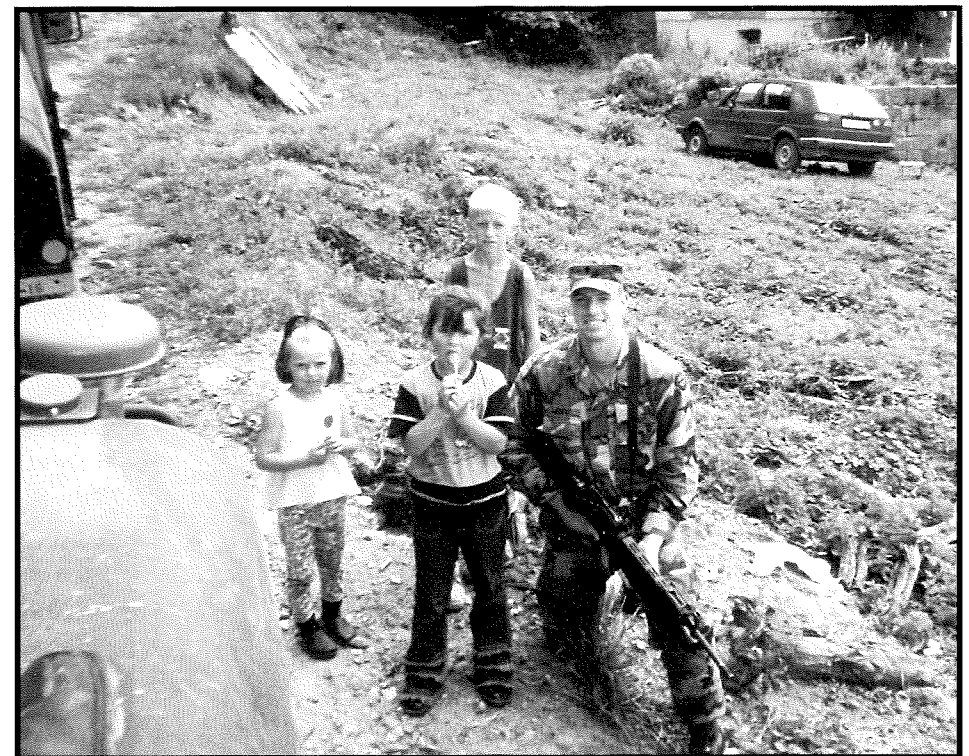
"Three other UK students, Scott Flynn, Jonathan Agnew, and Jeremy Day, were with me and we were able to keep up with the Kentucky teams on the Armed Forces Television Network. We saw some football and basketball games while we were gone."

Still, Clement admits it was a relief when it was time to come home.

"It was an awesome feeling to fly from Bosnia to Bangor, Maine. Being on American soil again was a great uplift, a great feeling."

Those are warm words, indeed, from a man who had only been on American soil since August of 1999.

A native of London, England, Clement was

recruited to the Kentucky swim team by Coach Gary Conelly. As a freshman, he met April Widener, a UK student from Pineville, and they were married in 2001. Contemplating a potential career in the Royal Marines, Clement joined the Army National Guard that year in order to get some military experience. He underwent basic training at Fort Benning, Ga., in the summer of 2002, and was called to active duty in October of '02.

Clement was sent to Fort Riley, Kansas, and was stationed in Germany before arriving in Bosnia in March. Obviously, it was a potential disruption in his academic career, but thanks to his professors, the situation has worked out well.

"I was taking 18 hours (a heavy class load) in the fall semester of 2002, but every one of my teachers allowed me to send in coursework and take exams," Clement explained.

Although he was more than a month behind in school when he returned to Lexington in October, Clement's professors have allowed him to catch up and he will graduate in December with a degree in Secondary English Education. He plans to stay at UK and enroll in a master's program in that field in January.

Clement also has had to play catch-up with his

swimming training, as he has been away from the sport for a year. He participated in his first meet, the Nike Cup, on Nov. 19.

"I have so much thanks to Coach Conelly," said Clement, who swims the 200-meter butterfly and the 200- and 400-meter individual medley events. "He has been a great help, very understanding through the entire process."

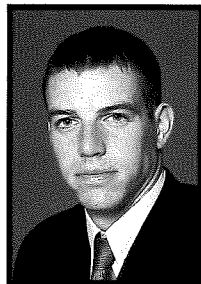
In a fitting tribute for a man who had just returned to Lexington, Clement served as Honorary Captain for the Homecoming football game against Ohio and the members of his National Guard unit were guests of UK Athletics at the Mississippi State game.

Upon finishing his swimming eligibility and his master's degree, Clement will decide whether to teach or go into full-time military service. Regardless of the decision, Eddie and April plan to stay in the United States and he cherishes the experiences gained over the past four years.

"I've learned so much about discipline, respect, integrity, and teamwork," Clement said. "After living here a couple of years, I started feeling like an American. America is the most patriotic country in the world and being a part of that is a great feeling."

UK Swimmer Serves Army Duty in Bosnia

University of Kentucky swimmer Eddie Clement has lived a lifetime of experiences already.

Clement has lived in four countries, been a collegiate student-athlete, gotten married, and seen the realities of world politics as a soldier in the United States military, all by the age of 24.

A senior on the Kentucky swimming and diving team, Clement recently returned to the United States after year of duty in the Army National Guard. He spent seven months, March through September, in Bosnia as part of the peacekeeping efforts there.

"It's very war-torn," Clement said of Bosnia. "We were trying to keep the peace by keeping different factions at bay."

Clement is an Infantry Specialist in a U. S. National Guard unit based in Ravenna, Ky. He is a member of Charlie Company, First Battalion of the 149th Infantry Brigade.

The majority of the duty was spent in physical training and patrolling various sites. Ironically, one of the areas his unit frequently patrolled was the town of Tuzla - the hometown of current Wildcat football player Sevin Sucurovic. Clement also was involved in dangerous duty of bunker raids and the sobering experience of uncovering a mass gravesite.

"You appreciate what we take for granted every day," Clement said of his time overseas. "Vehicles ... everybody over there is walking. The educational system has severely bad equipment. Medical and dental aid is limited or nonexistent."

While in Bosnia, Clement was able to stay in contact with his wife, April, and keep up with life in the States.

"I was able to call home frequently and we had e-mail access," Clement said. "April was very supportive. She finished her master's degree in May and has been teaching at (Lexington's) Bryan Station High School. Fortunately, she was very busy and that helped her keep her mind off it."

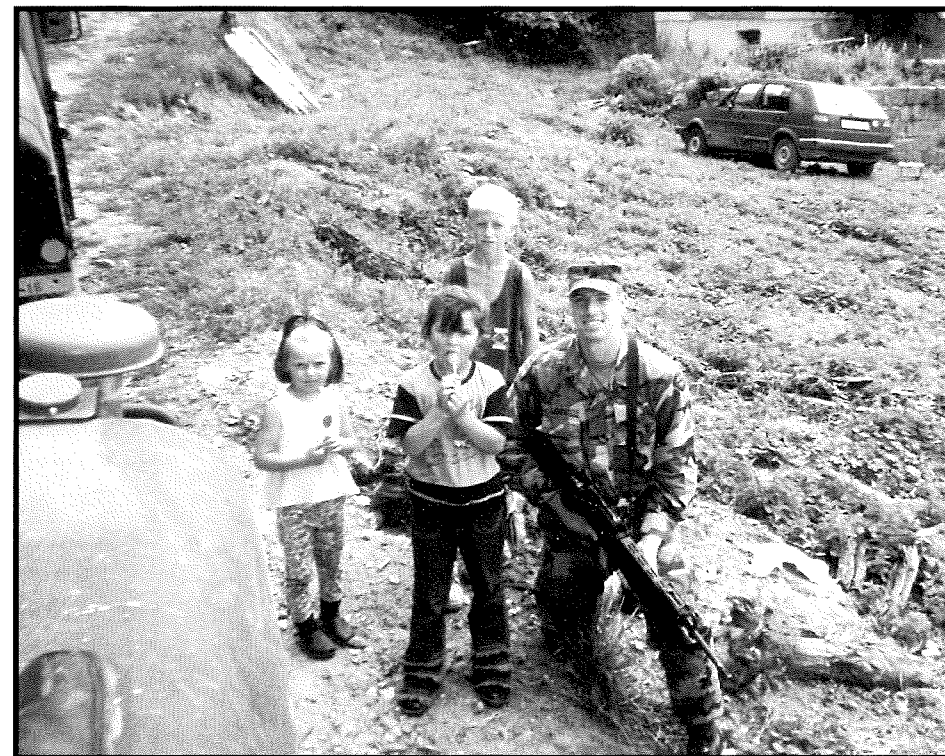
"Three other UK students, Scott Flynn, Jonathan Agnew, and Jeremy Day, were with me and we were able to keep up with the Kentucky teams on the Armed Forces Television Network. We saw some football and basketball games while we were gone."

Still, Clement admits it was a relief when it was time to come home.

"It was an awesome feeling to fly from Bosnia to Bangor, Maine. Being on American soil again was a great uplift, a great feeling."

Those are warm words, indeed, from a man who had only been on American soil since August of 1999.

A native of London, England, Clement was

recruited to the Kentucky swim team by Coach Gary Conelly. As a freshman, he met April Widener, a UK student from Pineville, and they were married in 2001. Contemplating a potential career in the Royal Marines, Clement joined the Army National Guard that year in order to get some military experience. He underwent basic training at Fort Benning, Ga., in the summer of 2002, and was called to active duty in October of '02.

Clement was sent to Fort Riley, Kansas, and was stationed in Germany before arriving in Bosnia in March. Obviously, it was a potential disruption in his academic career, but thanks to his professors, the situation has worked out well. "I was taking 18 hours (a heavy class load) in the fall semester of 2002, but every one of my teachers allowed me to send in coursework and take exams," Clement explained.

Although he was more than a month behind in school when he returned to Lexington in October, Clement's professors have allowed him to catch up and he will graduate in December with a degree in Secondary English Education. He plans to stay at UK and enroll in a master's program in that field in January.

Clement also has had to play catch-up with his

swimming training, as he has been away from the sport for a year. He participated in his first meet, the Nike Cup, on Nov. 19.

"I have so much thanks to Coach Conelly," said Clement, who swims the 200-meter butterfly and the 200- and 400-meter individual medley events. "He has been a great help, very understanding through the entire process."

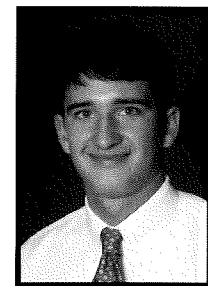
In a fitting tribute for a man who had just returned to Lexington, Clement served as Honorary Captain for the Homecoming football game against Ohio and the members of his National Guard unit were guests of UK Athletics at the Mississippi State game.

Upon finishing his swimming eligibility and his master's degree, Clement will decide whether to teach or go into full-time military service. Regardless of the decision, Eddie and April plan to stay in the United States and he cherishes the experiences gained over the past four years.

"I've learned so much about discipline, respect, integrity, and teamwork," Clement said. "After living here a couple of years, I started feeling like an American. America is the most patriotic country in the world and being a part of that is a great feeling."

A list of Kentucky swimming & diving greats would not be complete without the name Clayton Moss. The Doerun, Ga. native earned 11 All-America selections in his four seasons as a Wildcat. Moss won SEC one-meter diving titles in



2001 and 2002 and added a three-meter title in 2003. In the 2003 NCAA Championships, Moss earned second-place honors in the three meter, third place in the one meter and fourth place on the platform. Moss was named the NCAA Diver of the Year in 2003 and SEC Diver of the Year in 2002 and 2003. Moss recorded nine top-10 NCAA finishes and 10 top-five SEC finishes. Moss owns three Kentucky diving records; the one meter (six dives and 11 dives) and the three meter (11 dives).

Lancaster Aquatic Center

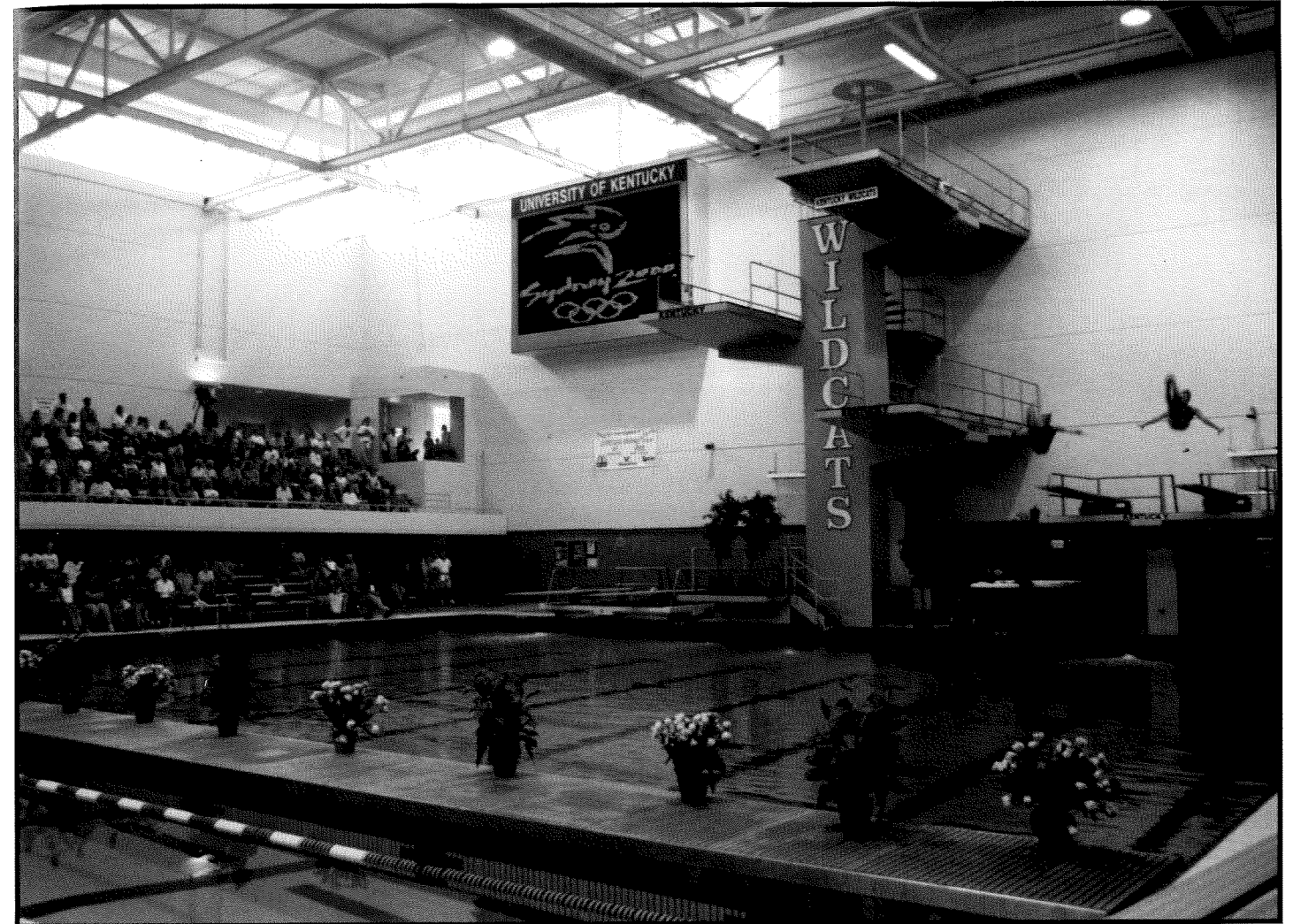


The University of Kentucky's Lancaster Aquatic Center, opened March 29, 1989, represents the finest in collegiate swimming and diving facilities.

The natatorium is named for Harry C. Lancaster, former UK Athletics Director (1968-76) and assistant basketball coach (1946-70) to Kentucky's legendary Adolph Rupp.

The indoor facility is 25 yards by 176 feet with a movable bulkhead that can be set at 25 yards, 25 meters, 50 yards and 50 meters. The movable bulkhead allows the facility to be used for a number of activities other than swim meets and practices, including recreational swimming, aquatic classes, swimming and diving lessons, scuba instruction, handicapped swimming and other aquatic-related activities.

Racing lanes can be set up in five configura-



tions: across-the-pool racing at 25 yards, 25 meters, 50 yards and 50 meters. Two 25-yard courses can be utilized for large swim meets. Eighteen swimming lanes are available while diving events are in progress. Long course racing will have eight full-size lanes for the 50-meter distance.

The swimming tank, which holds 1,025,000 gallons of water, has a raised deck gutter with a large overflow. This gutter design is similar to the Indianapolis Natatorium design. Pool depth varies from 4.3 feet to 6.5 feet at the shallow end, utilizing a movable floor of 35 by 75 feet. Water under the diving boards and tower is 17 feet deep. The natatorium features Daktronic automatic timing for swim meets. A 16-by-23 foot wall-mounted scoreboard allows full display of information for eight-lane and 16-lane swim meets. The scoreboard can also display graphics and animation sequences.

The diving facilities are among the best in the world. The facility has two 1-meter boards and two 3-meter boards set on concrete platforms. Each platform is eight feet wide with lengths from 23 feet to 28 feet.

The facility won the 1990 Association of General Contractors Award for Structures. There is a 40-foot dryland diving area permanently set up with a trampoline, Portapit diving board and two diving/tumbling harnesses for somersaulting and twisting practice.

The Aquatic Center has a full training room equipped with two treatment tables, EGS and ultrasound machine, hydrocollator, and ice machine. There is a trainer on duty at all times.

The Aquatic Center has a weight room for swimmers and divers equipped with Cybex weight training machines. In the adjacent Seaton Physical Education building are exercise physiology labs that are utilized for the testing of swimmers and divers.

The second balcony of the Aquatic Center accommodates up to 750 spectators and has a concession stand area.

On March 14-15, 2002, the Aquatic Center was host to the NCAA Zone B Diving Championships.

In July of 2000, the United States Olympic

Divers put on two exhibitions before embarking upon their trip to Sydney to compete in the 2000 games.

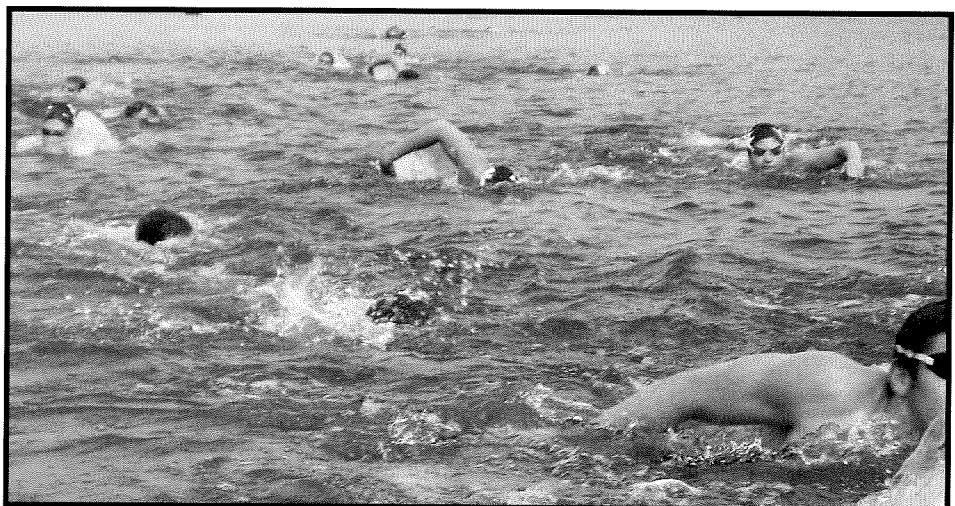
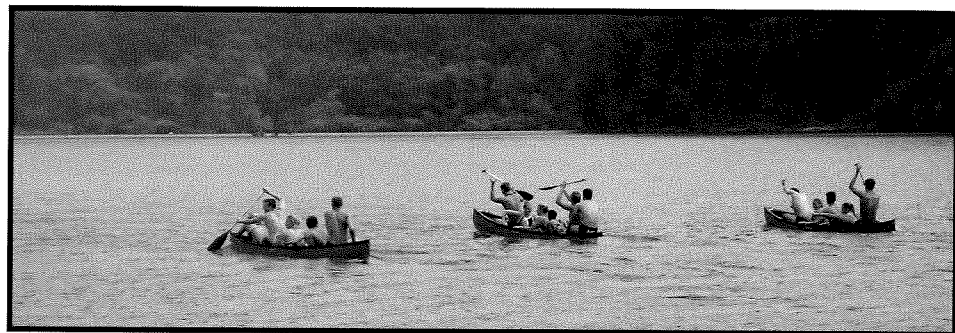
In 1999, UK hosted the Southeastern Conference Swimming and Diving Championships at the Aquatic Center. Pool records fell left and right as some of the nation's most talented divers and fastest swimmers competed at the Aquatic Center, Feb. 17-20.

In addition to hosting the 1996 U.S. Olympic Diving Team, the Aquatic Center annually hosts the premier swimming and diving events in the state of Kentucky. These events include all UK home meets, the Kentucky State High School Championships, the Kentucky USS Championships, Zone and Regional Age Group and Senior Diving meets, Kentucky Special Olympics, and Bluegrass Games Diving meets. Highlights at the Aquatic Center have been the 1991 and 1999 Southeastern Conference Championships, the 1995 Southeastern Conference Diving Championships, the 1995 NCAA Zone B Diving Championships and the 1990 World Games Diving Team Trials.

University of Kentucky

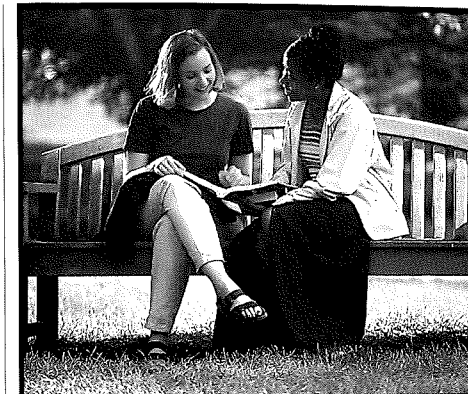
The innovation, creativity, quality teaching, and service underway at the University of Kentucky touches the lives of people throughout the state, the nation, and the world.

UK accomplishes this achievement through ground-breaking research, community outreach, and technological advances that contribute to the betterment of the Commonwealth while also fostering a cultural quality of life through our museums, libraries and special events.

Founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and adjacent to downtown Lexington, UK is nestled in the very heart of the beautiful Kentucky Bluegrass

region. From its early beginnings, with only 190 students and 10 professors, UK's campus now covers more than 700 acres and is home to more than 35,000 students and nearly 12,000 employees.

UK is one of only a few universities in the country with a teaching and research campus, a medical center, and a community college all in one central location. The state's flagship university consists of 15 academic and professional colleges where students can choose from some 200 majors and degree programs. The colleges are Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Business and Economics, Communications and Information Stud-



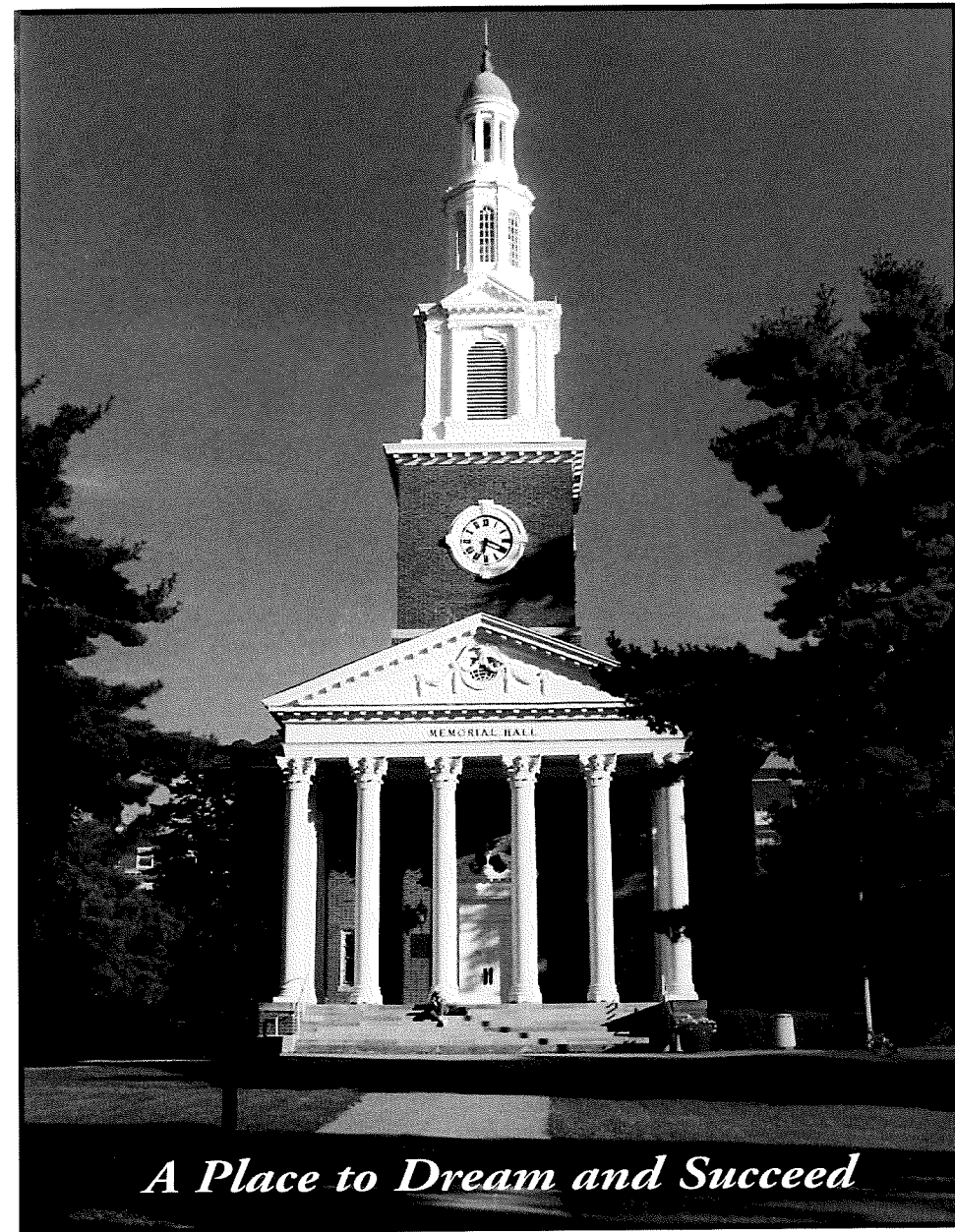
ies, Dentistry, Design, Education, Engineering, Fine Arts, Health Sciences, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Social Work.

Our student body is diverse, representing 117 countries, every state in the nation, and every Kentucky county. Admissions are selective and UK ranks among the top 50 universities in the annual *U.S. News & World Report* survey. The university also attracts excellent students. The average ACT score for first-year students is four points above the national average. In 2003, UK earned a spot among the top 15 public universities in enrolling new freshman National Merit® Scholars, placing the university 35th among both public and private institutions. Meanwhile, students compete successfully for prestigious scholarships and awards, such as the Fulbright, Truman, Goldwater and Marshall. In 2002, UK was selected as one of only 13 universities nationwide to participate in the Beckman Foundation Scholarship program. This program allows UK to award grants of \$17,600 to students to support their own research projects.

Since the mid-1990s, the University has pursued an ambitious goal of becoming a top-20 public research university by the year 2020. UK President Lee T. Todd Jr. has embraced this goal in a way that promises an impact on every Kentucky resident.

"As the state's flagship institution, the University is mindful of its responsibility to help all Kentuckians," Todd says. "UK has an obligation to be inclusive and accessible to all segments of our society by providing scholarships and financial assistance to ease the tuition burden. Through education, Kentucky will move forward."

The university is working aggressively to achieve its top-20 goal. During the last fiscal year, UK faculty received a total of \$212 million in extramural grants and contracts, a 22 percent increase over the previous year. These numbers place the university 52nd on the National Sci-

advancing the economic growth of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Several centers excel in the services offered to the public. The Center for Manufacturing Systems has assisted more than 500 small and mid-sized industrial firms throughout the state. The Gluck Equine Research Center is one of only three facilities of its kind in the world, conducting research into diseases of the horse.

Because UK is one of the few universities in the country with a research and teaching campus and a medical center in one central location, multidisciplinary research is particularly strong. The ASTeCC (Advanced Science and Technology Commercialization Center) building in the center of campus provides lab space for faculty affiliates who represent a variety of colleges and departments and is a hub for multidisciplinary research collaboration and commercialization. UK researchers engage in projects with professors at the University of Louisville, Murray State University, Eastern Kentucky University, and other public and private institutions across Kentucky, in other states and abroad.

The University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center was established on the campus of Kentucky's flagship university in 1957 and is one of the nation's finest academic medical centers. The faculty, students and staff of our young, dynamic Medical Center take pride in achieving excellence in education, patient care, research, and community service. The 473-bed UK Hospital and UK Children's Hospital are supported by more than 500 faculty physicians and dentists, 400 resident physicians, and a staff of 3,200 health professionals committed to high-quality patient care. As the only Level 1 Trauma Center in Central and Eastern Kentucky, UK Hospital and UK Children's Hospital care for the most critically injured and ill patients in this half of Kentucky.

UK has demonstrated its commitment to partnerships with business and other institutions of higher learning. In Lexington, UK is shaping a better relationship with the community by becoming more active in life throughout the city, especially downtown.

But UK contributes far beyond the borders of Fayette County. The university is reaching out to communities across the Commonwealth, sharing knowledge and making a difference in the towns,

cities and lives of all Kentuckians. An example is Health Education through Extension Leadership (HEEL), a new partnership between the College of Medicine, its School of Public Health, the College of Agriculture, and the Cooperative Extension Service. HEEL was created to enhance the Cooperative Extension agents' capacity to deliver valuable health and wellness information throughout the state. UK also received a \$22 million grant from the National Science Foundation to strengthen and reform education in math and science in pre-K through grade 12 in Kentucky. The grant is the largest single grant in the school's history.

UK's agenda is simple. It is to accelerate the movement toward academic excellence and to become known worldwide for the quality of its academic programs, its commitment to undergraduates, its success in building a diverse community, and its engagement with the larger society. 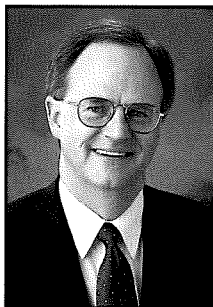




Dr. Lee T. Todd Jr.

University of Kentucky President

Lee T. Todd Jr. became the 11th president of the University of Kentucky on July 1, 2001, after serving as senior vice president of Lotus Development Corp. President Todd is the fourth UK alumnus to hold the presidency and the first to earn an undergraduate degree from UK.



Since assuming the leadership of the university, President Todd has overseen the conversion of the university from a chancellor system to the provost model and has directed the consolidation of several colleges and campus units to eliminate duplication of course studies and improve the overall quality of academics. President Todd has applied his background as a successful, high tech entrepreneur by emphasizing the university's role as an economic engine.

At UK, President Todd's vision for campus growth led to a record enrollment of more than 35,000 students in fall 2003. This class also was the most academically talented group in UK's history. He successfully led the charge to provide scholarships to all Kentucky Governors Scholars and Governor's School for the Arts students and

continues to work on increasing overall scholarship funding.

Through his belief that "the campus of the University of Kentucky is the Commonwealth of Kentucky," President Todd has made community outreach a priority at the university. Under his leadership, UK was awarded a \$22 million grant from the National Science Foundation to improve math and science education in Eastern Kentucky. He also developed the Health Education through Extension Leadership (HEEL) program, a partnership between the College of Medicine and its School of Public Health and the College of Agriculture and its Cooperative Extension Service, to assist in delivering valuable health and wellness information throughout the Commonwealth.

President Todd is noted as an outstanding leader who emphasizes students, strategic planning, and accountability. He has been particularly active and successful in working with student entrepreneurs, starting an e-Club on campus and participating with the Lexington Venture Club.

A native of Earlington, Ky., he earned his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from UK in 1968 and his master's and doctoral degrees in electrical engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1970 and 1973, respectively. While at MIT, he received six patents for high-resolution display technology and proposed using telecommunications and high-resolution displays for data conferencing.

He returned to UK in 1974 as an electrical engineering professor. He won several teaching awards, including the UK Alumni Association Great Teacher Award. He also served on several university panels, including the University Senate for seven years. He was awarded the Outstanding Alumnus of Kentucky Award in 2002 from the Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education.

While at UK, President Todd founded Projectron Inc. in 1981 to make projection cathode ray tubes for flight simulators. He left UK in 1983 to begin product development at a second company, DataBeam Corp., which he had founded in 1976. In 1990, he sold Projectron to Hughes Aircraft Co. and convinced Hughes to move its other CRT operations in California and New York to UK's Coldstream Research Campus. He sold DataBeam, the world's leading provider of real-time collabora-

tion and real-time distance learning software and development platforms, to IBM.

President Todd also co-founded the Kentucky Science and Technology Corp., a not-for-profit organization focused on increasing university research capacity, developing science and technology education (K-12) programs, and encouraging an entrepreneurial economy in Kentucky. He co-authored the initial proposal that resulted in Kentucky being selected as an EPSCoR (Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research) state. This program has resulted in bringing millions of dollars in research and development funds from federal and state matching sources.

President Todd served on the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education. He chaired the Distant Learning Advisory Committee that is responsible for the development of the Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual University and the Commonwealth Virtual Library.

President Todd currently chairs the Southeastern Conference Committee on Academic Initiatives, serves on the American Council of Education Commission on Women in Higher Education, and is involved with the Business Higher Education Forum.

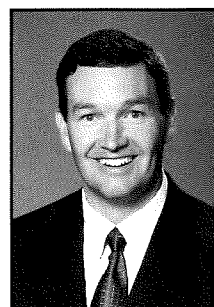
He is married to the former Patricia Brantley, a UK graduate who earned her master's degree from Simmons College in Boston. They have two grown children, Troy and Kathryn.



Mitch Barnhart

Director of Athletics

Now in his second year as Director of Athletics for the University of Kentucky, Mitch Barnhart can reflect on goals met, changes successfully implemented, and an energized staff that has embraced the five-principle philosophy that is at the center of his long-term plan for making Kentucky one of the top athletics programs in the country.



When UK President Lee T. Todd Jr. selected Barnhart to be athletics director on July 15, 2002, Todd proclaimed: "Mitch has deep passion for working with students, and his philosophies are very much in sync with mine on how to run this program. I believe he has a well thought-out vision on how to move our athletics department forward."

And that vision has become a beacon for the coaches, staff and student-athletes who are inspired and motivated by Barnhart's clear direction.

Barnhart has instructed his staff to seek out new revenue streams, and that has resulted in the Athletics Board's approval of fund-raising for a new all-purpose recruiting room that will be

attached to the Nutter Field House and a new basketball practice facility that will be located behind Memorial Coliseum.

Barnhart came to Kentucky from Oregon State, where he served four years (1998-2002) as athletics director. A strong effort in fiscal management helped reduce the Beavers' operating debt from \$12.5 million to \$4.8 million during his tenure. He also raised \$20 million in capital contributions for new baseball and softball stadiums, an indoor practice center and a basketball arena renovation. He developed Beaver Sports Properties, which produced increased revenue for the department through broadcast rights.

And thanks to five new head coaching hires and OSU's best finish in the Sears Directors' Cup standing—the Beaver's annual fund raising jumped from \$800,000 to \$4.5 million in three years.

Under Barnhart's leadership, Oregon State had the highest GPA for student-athletes since tracking began in 1992, which included 2.91 GPA for 520 student-athletes and 3.0 or better for 173 student-athletes. Barnhart has served on several sports and working committees of the Pac-10 Conference, NCAA and NACDA.

His success can be based on a five-principle philosophy that he implemented for the University of Kentucky Athletics Association the day he

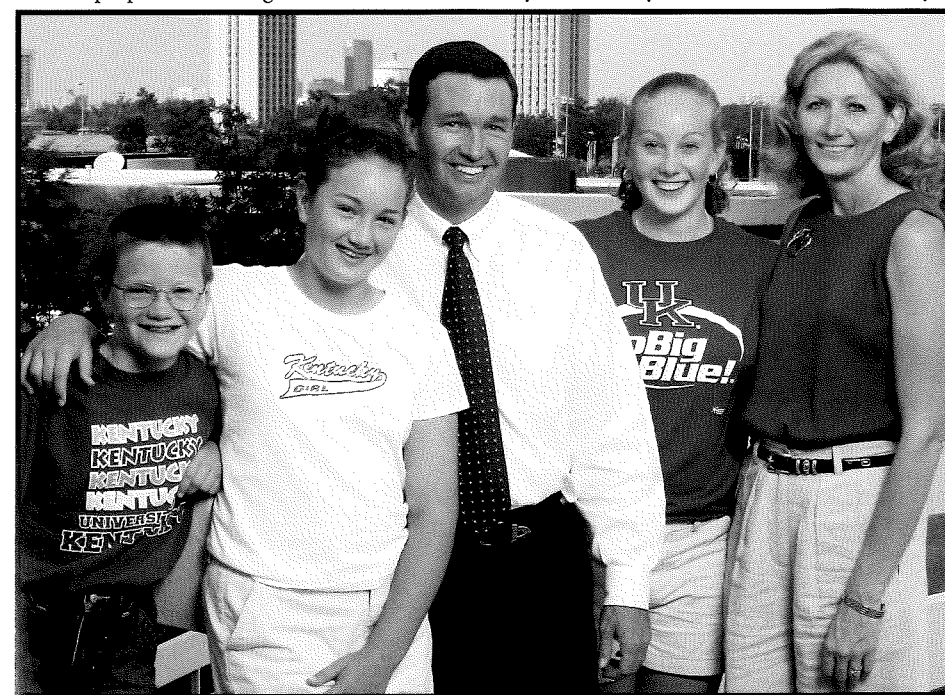

Ohio Casualty Center for Academic & Tutorial Services

The University of Kentucky has made a commitment to put the student-athlete at the heart of the program.

The cornerstone of that commitment lies in the academic success of the University's student-athletes. And at UK, that success stems from the resources within the Ohio Casualty Group's Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS).

The center was constructed in 1981 as the first academic support unit in college athletics. Its mission was simple — to enhance the student-athletes' academic standing, to assist them in meeting their degree requirements and to prepare them for life after college.

Over the past 20 years, the facility's services and needs have continued to grow. As a result, UK opened a new facility in the spring of 1998, thanks to a \$1 million donation from the Ohio Casualty Group.

The \$2.4 million facility, which operates on a \$1 million annual budget, is located in Memorial Coliseum and was dedicated on Sept. 18, 1998. It includes:

- 20,000 square feet of space, more than double the size of the former facility;
- a computer room housing 35 computers;
- a study area which accommodates 90-100 people;
- 24 tutoring rooms;
- a career development and life skills resource center;
- headquarters for a community outreach program;
- offices for an ever-growing staff.

Heading up the Center's staff is Associate Athletics Director for Student Services, Bob Bradley. Bradley was named National Academic Advisor of the Year in 1989 and '92 and the NCAA CHAMPS Life Skills "Coordinator of the Year" in 2001 by the Division IA Athletics Directors' Association.

The full-time staff of 11 people includes Bob, Barb Deniston, director of academic services, Mike Haley, director of advising services, four academic counselors, a community outreach coordinator, a career and personal development coordinator and two staff associates. CATS also employs seven graduate assistants and numerous tutors.

"We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic arena," Bradley said. "The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals, and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our center provides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions. Our goal is to show that we care about the student as well as the athlete."

The academics staff also prepares student-athletes for life after college with the Wildcat Career Development program. The program helps the student-athlete prepare for the future through a step-by-step process that includes:

- mentoring and internships, which help determine career interests;
- career counseling;
- resume writing; and
- forming a career plan.

The program also works closely with the University's Career Planning and Placement Center to provide additional assistance to the student-athletes.



William T. Young Library

\$58 Million Facility Showcases the University's Academic Commitment

In addition to providing the finest in athletic facilities, the University of Kentucky also provides student-athletes with the best in academic facilities. The latest addition to the educational landscape at UK is the \$58 million William T. Young Library, which opened in 1998.

• **Size:** The new library covers 365,350 square feet — more than six football fields. The building is five stories high, plus a basement.

• **Shelf capacity:** If laid end-to-end, the bookshelf space would stretch 198,828 linear feet — that's more than 37 miles of shelf space. The shelves will house 1.2 million books.

• **Seating capacity:** The new library can seat more than 4,000 patrons at one time, a 355 percent increase over the old library. The seating on the fifth floor of the new library equals the capacity of the former library.

• **Computer connections:** Every study table and study carrel in the new library has an electrical outlet and a computer jack connected to the university's computer system.

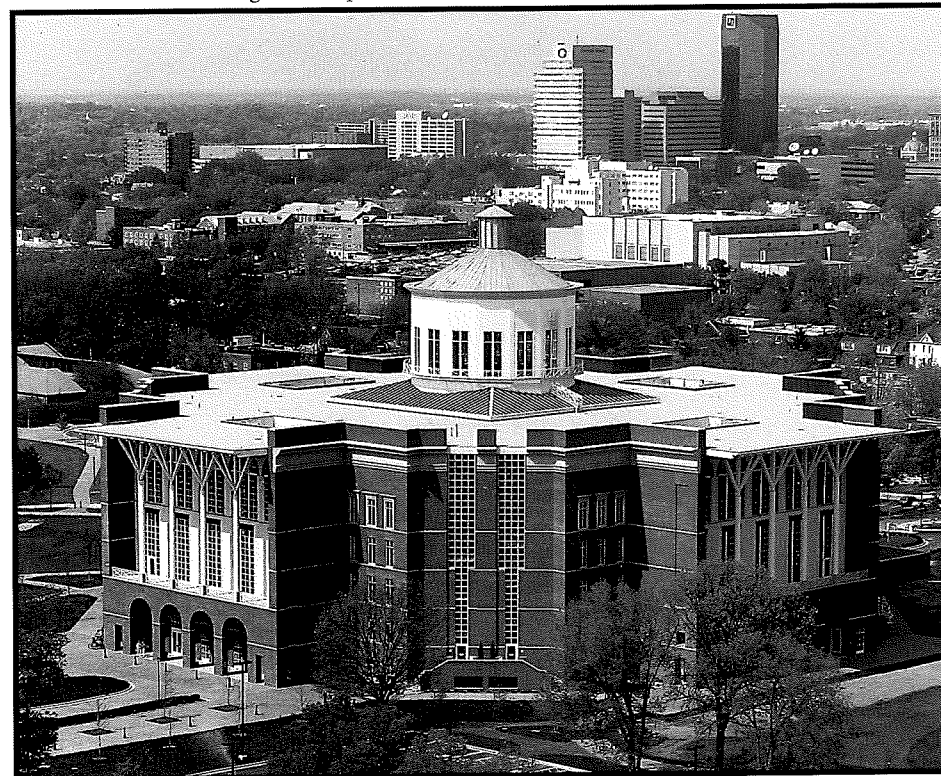
• **Flexibility:** The library has a state-of-the-art electronic infrastructure that will enable UK to take full advantage of current and emerging technology. In addition, the five floors and basement of the structure are designed as open, flexible



spaces, enabling the library to adapt its services and facilities to the future changes in needs of UK students.

• **Endowment:** The UK Library has the nation's largest book endowment among public universities and ranks second only to Harvard.

A total of 24 awards were handed out by presenters that included student-athletes, coaches, administrators and University President Dr. Lee T. 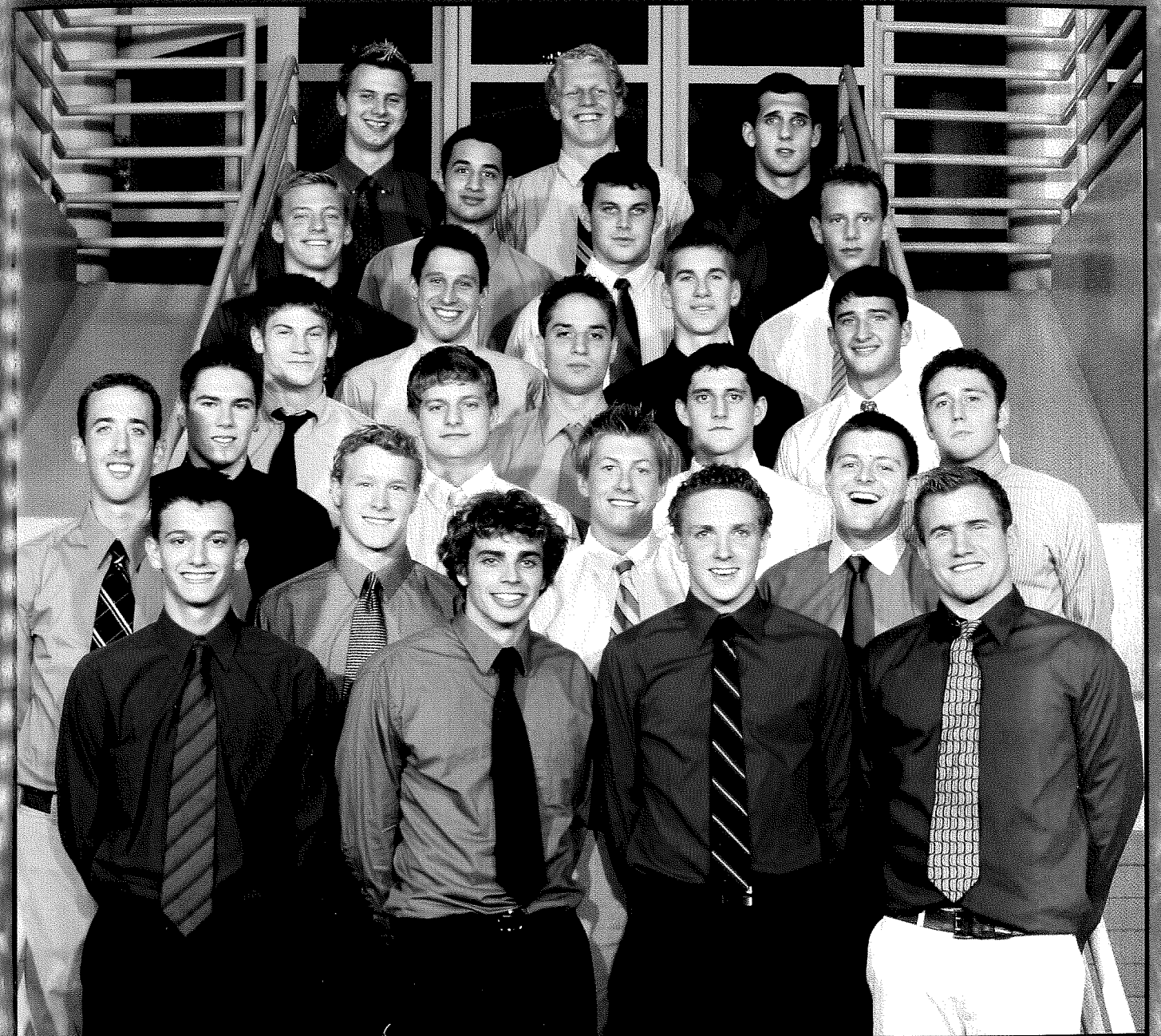
