

# LADY KATS RECAP

### 1990 Women's Tennis

Kentucky cruised through the 1990 season with an overall mark of 16-9, exceeding expectations. The Lady Kats had lost three of their top four singles players to graduation. Then, in the fall, top player Jane Yates was dismissed from the team and freshman Jenny Karges left school.

When many teams would have collapsed, the Lady Kats jelled. This was a team that consisted of only one senior, three juniors (two who were transfers), one sophomore and one freshman. They rallied to finish

third in the Southeastern Conference with an 8-3 league mark. Coach John Dinneen, in only his second season, took his team against 12 ranked opponents and recorded four victories.

Senior Lene Holm Larson teamed with freshman Susan Klingenberg to win three national doubles titles and provide the spark the Kats needed. The UK tandem finished with a Volvo ranking of 14th after recording a 31-13 overall mark and finished in the final round of 16 at the NCAA Championships.

Klingenberg was also a welcome surprise in singles. While sharing the No. 1 singles position with junior Melissa Nelson, Klingenberg's powerful serve and forehand volley gave her a 9-2 mark at No. 1 singles and a 9-4 mark at No. 2. Both Nelson and Klingenberg qualified for the NCAA singles Championships but both exited in the first round.

After beginning the year with a 3-2 record, the Lady Kats turned the season on end with "Spring Break Tour '90", a five-match swing during March through Texas and Louisiana where they earned four victories.

The Lady Kats began by defeating No. 21 Texas A&M before losing to seventh-ranked Texas 6-3. But the Kats wouldn't give up, defeating SMU, LSU and Trinity before returning home.

"That trip was a major turning point for our team," Dinneen said. "It gave our girls the confidence that they could play well, no matter what the circumstances, and win."

The strangest match of the season occurred in the SEC Championships. The Kats' match with Ole Miss began in Starkville, Miss., at 11:30 a.m., before rain set in with UK leading 3-2. After traveling to the University of Alabama's new Indoor facility, the Kats won 5-2. Total time span: eight hours. The victory exemplified the Kats' effort throughout 1990.

Kentucky achieved its goal, reaching the 20-team field at the NCAA Championships. The Kats were the No. 19 seed. Kentucky faced 14th-ranked San Diego in the opening round. The Torreras proved to be a notch above the Kats, recording a 5-4 victory in one of the best matches of the tournament.

The loss ended a season full of excitement, thrills and accomplishments for a team with relatively no expectations. But it proved that determination and will power can lead a team to the NCAAs.

# LADY KATS OUTLOOK

### A Sixth Straight Year

The 1991 University of Kentucky women's tennis team will be vying for their sixth consecutive NCAA appearance during the 1991 spring season. Only seven teams have qualified for each of the last five NCAA's, and the Lady Kats are the only school east of the Mississippi River that falls into that elite category.

This year, the outlook is again good. Coach John Dinneen's squad returns five of its top six from last year's third-place SEC squad. In addition, the recruiting class is one that provides depth and stability with newcomers Marina Sansostri, Nicki Wangsgard and Chris Yario.

UK's Melissa Nelson returns for her senior season and will play at either the No. 1 or No. 2 spot in the lineup. Nelson had a successful fall season, claiming her spot in the National Individual Indoor in February by capturing the Rolex Southern Collegiate Singles Championship in November at Knoxville, Tenn. The Joliet, Ill., senior is ranked No. 10 in the first ITCA coaches poll of the season.


Also returning is Susan Klingenberg, a Hampstead, Md., product who will share the No. 1 and No. 2 spots with Nelson. The Lady Kats sophomore was ranked 21st in the first ITCA rankings of the 1991 season. Klingenberg, an All-America canididate, also had a successful individual season, finishing in the semifinals of the Rolex Southern Collegiate Cahnmopionships and posting wins over several ranked players. She was seeded seventh in the prestigious Riviera All-American Championships held in Palo Alto, Calif., in October. Klingenberg was upset in the second round by Oklahoma State's Christina Sirianni.

"Melissa and Susan have established themselves as two of the top players in collegiate tennis," said UK coach John Dinneen. "They are both on their way to an outstanding season." "The experience they gained last year playing No. 1 and No.2 has helped them this year. They should turn into a great doubles team after they gain more experience playing together."

Kentucky faces 17 of the top-25 colleges in the nation in a schedule that includes Florida, Tennessee, Stanford, Pepperdine, Cal-Irvine, and Georgia.

"We are an aggressive, take charge-type team," said Dinneen, in his third year at the helm of the Lady Kats program. "Our doubles team should be a strength as we have excellent athletes top to bottom in our lineup." The doubles team of Nelson and Antionette Grech was ranked preseason No. 20 by the ITCA coaches poll. Grech has been hampered by back injuries during the fall season, forcing Nelson to pair with Klingenberg. The UK tandem completed a 4-3 doubles mark in the fall that included a third-round appearance in the SEC Coaches Indoor Championships in November.


"This squad is a very hard working group," said Dinneen. "We are fortunate to have excellent athletes top to bottom."

The program is headed by former tennis great Stan Smith and is flourishing. This past summer, U.S. National Team members reached the finals or won every major junior singles and doubles competition in which they participated both domestically and internationally, as well as compiling a long list of impressive profes-

Dinneen has also worked with both the U.S. Junior Federation Cup and Junior Wightman Cup teams, formerly the top two programs for amateur players in the US.

Dinneen, one of six children, is a 1983 Harvard graduate, where he was named MVP of the Ivy League as team captain his

Two NCAA appearances, a third-place SEC finish and his fourth year as coach of the women's junior Amateur team are just a few credentials that dot Kentucky coach John Dinneen's resume. Dinneen begins his third year at the helm of the UK women's tennis program with an impressive record.

"Our system is based on hard work and competitiveness," said Dinneen. "The groundwork is firmly in place to build a strong

Prior to donning UK's blue and white, the 30-year-old Dinneen served as an assistant at California University (1986-87) and at his alma mater, Harvard, (1983-85).

During his stint at California, the Golden Bears experienced their finest season, winning the PAC-10 title, defeating national power Stanford twice, and finishing fourth in the final ITCA poll.

At Harvard, the Crimson were Ivy League champions, finishing No. 1 in the East and had a season-ending top-20 ranking during Dinneen's tenure. Harvard also participated in the NCAA tournament—also a first.

Dinneen has spent the last few summers as coach of the U.S. National team. The team, comprised of the nation's top junior girls, travels to Wimbledon, the Italian Open, the French Open, The U.S. Open, Continental Cup, the Orange Bowl and U.S. 18and-under National championships.

"Our biggest obstacle this season is the incredibly difficult schedule we are facing. We are very optimistic for a successful spring."


A: It may sound cliche, but good kids who are hard-working and dedicated are obviously of great value to our program. Beyond that, it is very important that they are able to compete relentlessly and never give in to the inevitable frustrations that occur when competing against the best players and teams in the country. This ability to compete will also serve them well into the classroom.

> How has your involvement coaching the U.S. national team aided in the development of your program here at UK?

- O: What has enabled Kentucky to A: Development is the key word here. By traveling with the U.S.'s most promising young players (Jennifer Capriati, Meredith McGrath, Carrie Cunningham and current U.S. 18and-under champion Lisa Raymond) to the top tournaments worldwide, I have learned what it takes to develop and nurture the talent of even the most accomplished performers. This obviously carries over to my coaching responsibilities here at Kentucky. But what makes the knowledge even more valuable to the program is the fact that I have three of the finest assistant coaches in the country to help me implement these ideas and strategies.



landolo served as an assistant coach at UCLA from 1986-87 and the UC-Berkeley team during the 1985-86 season. He also coached at San Diego State University for two years.


landolo was a finalist in the Mission Conference Singles Tournament, while also being named to the All-Mission Conference and All-Southern Cal Junior College squads.

A USPTR certified professional, landolo is single.



# THE WILDCATS' DEN

he University of Kentucky tennis facilities are a major reason for the great success of both the men's and women's teams. With the Hilary J. Boone Indoor Center and the Dr. H.H. Downing Outdoor Complex, both Kentucky tennis teams have become national powers.

The Boone Indoor Center was a gift from 1939 team captain Hilary J. Boone. The center opened in January 1986 and is equipped with four courts and seating for 1,500 people. A tennis Hall-of-Fame center contains trophies and pictures depicting Kentucky's storied tradition.


During the spring of 1989, the Indoor Center hosted the SEC Indoor Championship, the Hilary J. Boone Invitational (in which Southern Cal and Cal-Irvine participated) and the annual McDonald's Classic, which involved professionals Susan Sloane, Kathy Rinaldi and JoAnne Russell, as well as UK players.


"This center has given us exactly what we need to compete on the national level," Wildcats coach Dennis Emery said. "Not only are our teams able to train as we want, but the building allows us to play night matches and attract crowds, something we couldn't do in the past."

The Wildcats' outdoor facility was recently named after the "father" of Kentucky tennis, Dr. Downing, who coached the UK men's team for 29 years, 1922-46 and 1952-57. He coached longer than any other UK coach, with the exception of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. Downing's record was 166-104-5, for a winning percentage of 61.3 percent.

The complex features 18 courts, including eight varsity courts, and seating for more than 1,000 spectators. "We had the varsity courts resurfaced recently and they are in top condition," said Emery. "In 1988, we hosted the men's SEC Outdoor tournament, which was very successful."

Plans are now being developed for a permanent seating structure as well as new lockerroom facilities.





# KENTUCKY'S ALL-AMERICAN PERFORMERS

A program that prides itself in the strength of doubles, Kentucky has had eight players named All-American a total of 19 times. Twelve of those were doubles honors. The latest entry are current Wildcats John Yancey and lan Skidmore.

Kentucky's first All-Americans were named after the 1987 season when four players won their spots among the nation's elite. Sonia Hahn and Greg Van Emburgh were both singles and doubles All-Americans. Hahn and teammate Tamaka Takagi were named doubles All-Americans after advancing to the quarterfinal round of the 1987 NCAA Women's Championships and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the ITCA Volvo Tennis rankings.

Van Emburgh paired with sophomore Rich Benson, a native of Ogden, Utah. Van Emburgh and Benson claimed All-America honors after advancing to the semifinals of the Men's NCAA tournament

In 1988, Hahn and Takagi — as well as Benson and Van Emburgh — once again claimed All-America honors. Mario Rincon, a Bogota, Colombia native, claimed a spot among the singles All-Americans. Van Emburgh advanced to the quarterfinals of the 1988 NCAA tournament and was also named singles All-American. Hahn and Takagi also won individual honors in 1988.

That same year, Benson once again claimed doubles All-American honors, pairing with Adam Malik. The Kentucky tandem compiled an 18-6 record, finishing the season ranked fourth nationally. They were also seeded fifth in doubles at the 1989 NCAA Tournament. Malik, who turned pro after his junior season, was also named singles All-American after finishing the season 32-17 and capturing the SEC singles championship. He was one of only four players that season to be named All-American in both singles and doubles.

In 1990, the successful doubles tradition continued. Yancey and Skidmore completed a 14-2 mark, ending the season ranked ninth. This season, the duo is ranked No. 8 in the first ITCA Volvo rankings.


# WILDCATS RECAP



### 1990 Men's Tennis

The 1990 Kentucky men's tennis season will be remembered by most as a time of rebuilding. But coach Dennis Emery viewed it as a time of "building" his Wildcats program. The team had lost four of its top six from the previous season and saw team captain Sammy Stinnett redshirted after a severe hip injury.

With no seniors, one junior, three sophomores and four freshmen, Emery set the Wildcats' sights on their fourth consecutive NCAA Tournment.

"With such a young team, we just want to improve with each outing," Emery said at the beginning of the year. "We want to get better and better and qualify for the NCAA Tournament."

Kentucky began the dual match season with a thunderous start. Of the Cats' first eight outings, they lost only one match — a 5-3 decision to a Tennessee squad that finished the season No. 2 in the nation.

Then Kentucky was put to the test. In the second round of the USTA/ITCA National Team Indoor in Louisville, the Cats faced Stanford. Kentucky dropped all six singles matches to the nation's top squad and eventual NCAA Champion. But the Wildcats bounced back to defeat Southern Cal in the back draw before losing 5-2 to Harvard.

The Cats won four of their next five matches to stand at 11-3 on the year, the only loss in that stretch coming to fifth-ranked Pepperdine on the road.

Then came the worst Kentucky losing streak in modern history. The Wildcats fell 5-1 to Ball State at home, then defeated East Tennessee State 8-1. Then the conference race began. In a league where Kentucky had finished runner-up the last two seasons, the Cats stood at 1-6. Kentucky had fallen from 11-3 to 13-3 in the span of one month.

A loss to LSU marked the first time the Wildcats had suffered a defeat in their Indoor Tennis Center since its opening in 1988.

The Wildcats regrouped against eighth-ranked South Carolina. Down 4-2 after singles, Kentucky swept doubles for a 5-4 win. The Gamecock victory was Kentucky's fourth over a top-10 opponent in 1990.

Kentucky finished the regular season with losses on the road against Ole Miss (5-1) and Auburn (5-4).

The Cats then had to face Ole Miss again in the first round of the SEC Championships in Knoxville, Tenn. Kentucky was down 3-0 in singles but bounced back to even the score at 3-3 entering doubles. But the Rebels' doubles teams outlasted the Wildcats, winning at the No. 2 and No. 3 spots to take the match 5-4. Kentucky's SEC finish was its worst since 1981.

The No. 1 doubles team of sophomore John Yancey and junior Ian Skidmore, however, finished 16-4 and ninth nationally and became the fourth doubles team in four years at UK to be named All-American.

# WILDCATS OUTLOOK

### 1991 MEN'S TENNIS OUTLOOK

After finishing the 1990 season at 14-14, Kentucky men's tennis suffered its worst record in five years. But Coach Dennis Emery has high expectations for a 1991 Wildcats team which promises to be one of the nation's most experienced. No less than six players have won gold balls emblematic of a national singles or doubles championship. The Wildcats return seven of their first eight players from last year's squad and have added five players through various means.

The most promising newcomer would appear to be powerful Australian Mahyar Goodarz. With his size and game style, he should push for a top five lineup spot. Western closed champion Mike Hopkinson will compete with two-time state high school champion Jason Yeager and transfer Mike Miringoff for top six spots in singles and doubles. In addition, team captain Sammy Stinnett returns for his junior year after redshirting with a stress fracture. Stinnett's steady leadership and wins were sorely missed last year.

The top two spots shape up as a battle between juniors John Yancey and Andy Potter. Yancey has the inside track after Potter missed much of the fall with injuries. All-American senior Ian Skidmore played No. 3 last year and will battle both Scott Hulse and sophomore Steve Mather for middle lineup spots. Mather who played No. 8 as a freshman was the surprise of the fall, placing second in the first series of challenges, losing only to Yancey, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4.


The strength of this team clearly lies in doubles, as two teams return intact. Kentucky's nationally-ranked tandem of Yancey and Skidmore should play No. 1 after being named All-Americans last year. They hold the No. 8 spot among the nation's elite in the first ITCA Coaches poll of the season.

Sophomore Jon Venison transferred after the 1990 fall semester, leaving a question mark at No. 3 doubles.

Kentucky faces 14 top-20 teams this season, playing all but two of those nationally-ranked squads on the UK campus. Key early season matches are No. 6 South Carolina and No. 24 Clemson on the road and No. 4 Tennessee at home.

For the sixth year, UK will host the National Team Indoor Championships in Louisville, Ky., February 20-24.

In the spring, key home matches are No. 8 Miami, No. 21 Ole Miss, No. 25 Alabama and an unranked but underated Florida squad. To compete for the SEC


championship, UK will need wins on the road against No. 5 Georgia and No. 13 LSU.

In 1989, Kentucky beat eventual national runner-up Georgia in Athens and dumped No. 12 Tennessee in Knoxville, but a narrow 5-4 loss at LSU placed the Cats second instead of first in league regular season play.

Kentucky should be an exciting, talented team in 1991, Emery says. "For us to be as good as we feel we have to be, we need for someone to step up and perform above expectations," Emery said. "Every good top 10 team we've had has had that happen. In 1988, it was Van Emburgh and Stinnett. In 1989, Adam Malik surfaced as the SEC champion and an All-American after being projected as No. 4 on the depth chart."

# WILDCATS HEAD COACH

### **DENNIS EMERY** Carson-Newman, 1977



As Dennis Emery begins his ninth season at the helm of the Wildcats tennis team, he has built a tradition of winning at Kentucky, a tradition unrivaled since the program's creation in 1916.

In his eight-year stay in the Blue Grass, Emery has led his Wildcats to a 1984 NIT Championship, an NIT runner-up finish and three straight trips to the NCAA Championships. He has had 20 wins or more in six of his eight seasons at UK, while averaging 21 wins a year.

"We've been on the threshhold of being a top caliber team," said Emery, whose Wildcats are ranked No. 18 in the ITCA Coaches preseason poll. "I've been lucky to have a great school and great support throughout my seven years here."

"We have had the talent to beat any team in the nation," said Emery, 35. "We proved that by defeating 12 of the nation's top 25 teams last season, including NCAA champion Stanford and runner-up Georgia."

Along with his coaching duties, Emery serves as Director of Tennis at Kentucky, where he oversees the Lady Kats tennis program as well as the Wildcats. During his tenure, he has seen eight athletes named to the All-America team a total of 19 times.

Emery also stays busy with collegiate tennis outside of the University of Kentucky. For the past six seasons he has served as tournament director for the USTA/ITCA National Team Indoor Championship held each February in Louisville. He has also served as chairman of the NCAA Region III Tennis Committee from 1985-87 after serving three years on the committee. In 1983,

Emery served as one of a select group of coaches for the USTA National Junior Davis Cup Team.

In addition, Emery runs the successful Wildcats Tennis Camp each summer on the UK campus.

After making the All-America Honorable Mention team at Carson-Newman College, Emery began his coaching career under the legendary Australian coach Harry Hopman. Emery coached five months under Hopman before being named coach at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn. Emery guided the Governors to an 87-66 record during his five-year tenure. He turned a dormant program into Ohio Valley Conference champions by his last season.

Emery is married to Brenda Wild of Tampa, Fla. They have three children, Matthew, Andrew and Meritt.




Emery instructs UK All-American John Yancey between points.






Don Carbone begins his eighth season with the Kentucky tennis program.


Hultquist is a 1986 graduate of Penn State, where he played from 1983-86 and served as team captain. He participated


As an assistant for the Wildcats, Hultquist acts as tournament director for the National Team Indoor Championship as well as developing marketing and promotions for the tennis program.

Hultquist is single.




Yancey returns to lead the Wildcats at No. 1 singles.

rom its modest beginnings in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nation's most outstanding institutions of higher learning. As a comprehensive land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the

Commonwealth. In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that awaits students at UK. At Kentucky, there is a tradition of value.

### UK EDUCATES 37% OF THE COLLEGE STUDENTS IN KENTUCKY

With more than 63,000 students – 23,000 on the Lexington campus and 40,000 at the community colleges across the state – the University of Kentucky now educates 37% of all students in Kentucky attending a public or private college or university.

### UK HAS 26 NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARS IN FRESHMAN CLASS

There are 26 National Merit Scholars in the Fall 1990 freshman class on the Lexington Campus, an all-time record. They come from all sections of the Commonwealth including Lexington, Louisville, Pine Knot, Perryville, Murray, Beaver Dam and Hopkinsville. There are 77 high school valedictorians and 99 Governor's Scholars in the 1990 freshman class.

### UK TAKING INITIATIVE TO ATTRACT MINORITY STUDENTS AND FACULTY

Thanks to initiatives in minority affairs, there were 10 new minority faculty at the University as it opened in Fall 1990, including the first Afro-American dean (College of Education) at UK.

### UK NOW GIVING \$1.7 MILLION IN MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships to UK students based on merit now total some \$1.7 million a year. The most prestigious is the Singletary Scholarships which provide students four years of college at no cost. In the 1990-91 academic year there are 24 Singletary Scholars – 22 in the freshman class and two transfers from the UK community colleges.

### UK HAS REACHED THE TOP CATEGORY OF RESEARCH UNIVERSITIES

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has classified UK as a "Research University of the First Class," the only such institution in Kentucky and one of only 45 in the nation

### UK AMONG NATION'S TOP UNIVERSITIES IN COMPUTING

Thanks to a \$4.9 million gift from the IBM Corporation, Uk continues its role as one of the leading computing universities in the nation. The fit helped UK upgrade its IBM

Supercomputer that is now being used at UK by both faculty and students. UK ranks in the top tier of public universities in the nation in computing capacity.

### UK FACULTY WIN AWARDS AND HONORS IN MANY FIELDS

Some examples: GUY DAVENPORT, English, was a 1990 recipient of the prestigious MacArthur Fellowship. JOHN N. WALTER, Agricultural Engineering, is president of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. GARY CROMWELL, Animal Science, is president of the American Society of Animal Science. JOHN R. VAN NAGELL, Obstetrics and Gynecology, was selected as one of the outstanding medical specialists in the country by Town and Country magazine. LINDA CHEN, Nutrition and Food Science, won the Borden Award for exceptional research in nutrition. RAMONA RUSH, Communications, was named the outstanding woman in the field by the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication's status of women committee.

### UK FACULTY BRING \$70 MILLION IN GRANTS, CONTRACT AND GIFTS

UK's faculty brought in some \$70 million in grants, contracts and gifts from outside sources in the 1989-90 academic year. The record amount was 17% greater than the year before and marked a 70% increase in the past five years. As further indication of UK's faculty expertise, 98% of them have the highest degree attainable in their fields.

# UK STUDENTS WIN MANY PRESTIGIOUS AWARDS AND HONORS The debate team took second-place in the

nation's largest invitational collegiate debate tournament in 1990. For three years in a row, the College of Law moot court team has been in the national finals of the intercollegiate moot court competition. A UK nursing student was one of 121 U.S. collegians chosen for the USA Today All-USA College Academic Team. UK's cheerleaders finished second in 1990 for the second straight year in the College Cheerleading Championships. UK was national champion in 1985, '87 and '88. The UK yearbook won first place nationally in competitions sponsored by the Associated Collegiate Press and the National Scholastic Press Association. UK's student newspaper received the All-America honor rating five marks of distinction, l placing it in the top third of the nation's best student newspapers.

The UK Jazz Ensemble was voted most outstanding among 14 student combos or big bands invited to perform at the Notre Dame College Jazz Festival, the most prestigious event of its kind in the nation.

# UK Administration



### CHARLES T. WETHINGTON, JR. PRESIDENT

Charles T.
Wethington, Jr. was
named the University of
Kentucky's 10th
president on September

18, 1990 after serving as interim president for nine months. Prior to assuming the post, he served as Chancellor of the UK Community College System since 1982.

Wethington began his career in higher education in 1965 as an educational psychology instructor on the Lexington campus of the University and entered administration two years later when he was named director of Maysville Community College. In 1971 he moved to the system office in Lexington as assistant vice president, and became vice president of the Community College System in 1981.

In the University reorganization in 1982 he was named chancellor of the UK system, one of the three major sectors of UK.

Under his leadership in the Community College System, he has set enrollment records and added an entire new college at Owensboro.

Wethington earned his master's and doctorate degrees at UK after completing his undergraduate work at Eastern Kentucky University.

The Casey County native has been active on the national higher education scene, serving as legislation committee chairman of the National Council of State Directors of Community and Junior Colleges before moving to the chairmanship in 1985.

He has been vice chairman of the Executive Council of the Southern Association of College and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and was a member of the search committee for the executive director of the Commission.

Wethington, born Jan. 2, 1936, in Merrimac, Ky., is married to the former Judy Woodrow, a Danville native. They have a son, Kennan, 21, and a daughter, Lisa, 24.



### C.M. NEWTON - DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

When Charles Martin (C.M.) Newton became the University of Kentucky's seventh

Director of Athletics on April 1, 1989, he hit the ground running.

Newton's first order of business was to bring respectability back to a basketball program hit hard by an NCAA investigation. He did so by hiring New York Knickerbockers head man Rick Pitino to coach the Wildcats. A few months later, Newton was faced with the task of hiring a football coach to replace the retiring Jerry Claiborne. Newton again rose to the occasion, luring Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year Bill Curry from the University of Alabama to lead the UK program.

Newton recently scored once again with the UK fans when it was announced that UK's football and basketball games will once again be carried on Louisville's clear-channel, 50,000-watt WHAS Radio, for the first time since 1986.

After little more than a year on the job, Newton has become one of the most popular public figures in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

In addition to a lengthy, impressive list of credentials, Newton brought to Kentucky a sparkling reputation at a crucial time in the history of UK Athletics. In accepting the position at his alma mater, Newton summarized his goals and objectives by saying, "I have a resolve to try very hard to continue that great tradition, and at the same time, to totally do it within the NCAA and SEC rules and not sacrifice the academic integrity of this University."

Newton capped an illustrious basketball coaching career by leading his final Vanderbilt University team to a 19-14 record, a second-place SEC finish and its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance during the 1988-89 season. He was named SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and also received the Kodak NABC District IV Coach of the Year award. Newton served as head basketball coach and associate athletics director at the Nashville school since 1982,

compiling a 129-115 record. In 32 years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama and Vanderbilt, Newton compiled a 509- 375 record overall, ranking among the top 10 active coaches in the game in terms of total victories.

Perhaps more impressive, however, was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team, over 50 percent more than any other league school.

Newton is highly regarded on the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He also worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chairman of that elite group for five of those years.

Newton began his coaching career at Transylvania College (now Transylvania University) in Lexington. Recommended for the job by Coach Rupp, Newton guided Transy to a 169-137 record in his 12 years at the helm.

In 1969, once again with the backing of Rupp, Newton answered a call from Paul "Bear" Bryant to take on the challenge of building the downtrodden Alabama basketball program. During his 12-year tenure, Newton orchestrated a complete turnaround in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortunes, compiling a sparkling 211-123 record.

In addition to three SEC championships, Newton guided the Tide to two trips to the NCAA Tournament and four berths in the NIT.

With few horizons left to conquer at Alabama, Newton resigned at the end of the 1980 season to accept a job as assistant commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. A year later, when Vanderbilt athletics director Roy Kramer was searching for a coach of national stature to head the Commodores basketball program, Newton was the obvious man for the job.

Newton is married to the former Evelyn Davis of Ft. Lauderdale. The Newtons have three grown children — daughters Deborah and Mrs. Tracy Thompson and son Martin.

# CATS- CENTER

he University of Kentucky continues to keep the term "student-athlete" in the proper perspective student first, athlete second.

For that reason, the University of Kentucky opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is

known as the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services or simply "CATS."

CATS is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a large general study area along with numerous smaller rooms used for tutoring. CATS expanded during the past academic year and added a language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

Currently, the UKAA budgets close to \$500,000 per year for the CATS Center.

"Academically," says UK Basketball Coach Rick Pitino, "we hope to make our players overachieve in the classroom." the same way they do on the basketball court, so that if they

don't make it in the NBA, they can leave their college life with the beginning of a great career. That's why we believe CATS is so important to our program."

While Pitino's views on academics are echoed throughout the athletics department, former UK Football Coach Jerry Claiborne put the importance of the **CATS** Center is perspective when he said:

"There's no question, the CATS Center is a very important part of not only

the UK football program, but the entire UK athletics program. Academic pursuits come first at Kentucky."

Indeed, academics do come first. The combination of the CATS Center and Claiborne, who retired after the 1989 football season and has since been replaced by Bill Curry, brought a national championship to UK in 1989. The UK football program was awarded the 1989 College Football Association's Academic Achievement Award for the nation's highest graduation rate for its 1983 freshman class.

UK's achievement marked the first time since the inception of the award that a team other than Duke, Virginia or Notre Dame had won the award.

The significance has not been lost on Coach Curry.

"Our CATS Center is one of the best academic services in the land and that's based on results. For Kentucky to be up there with Duke, Virginia and Notre Dame is a real tribute to first, the student-athletes, but also to our academic support staff headed by Bob Bradley."

Bradley, Assistant Athletics Director for Academics. supervises the CATS Center. Bradley is assisted by Barbara Deniston, Director of Student Development, and Mike Jenkins, Academic Counselor. The CATS Center also employs four graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and surrounding community.

"CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete over another without an academic center," Bradley says. "This is a medium which the student-athlete can get any question about his or her academic endeavors answered."

> Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics. "Many supports systems across the nation do an excellent job at helping their studentathletes," Bradley said. "I have been blessed at Kentucky."

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to afford the student-athlete with every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in

academics as well. Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.



### THE BLUE AND WHITE FUND

Originated in 1973 by former athletics director Cliff Hagan, the Blue and White Fund's main purpose is to provide financial assistance to the UK athletics program.

Today, producing and maintaining a quality athletics program is a never-ending process. And for that reason, the University of Kentucky Athletics Association is renewing its efforts to raise the funds necessary to be competitive on the national level in every

The major purpose of the Blue and White Fund is to provide scholarships for UK's student-athletes. Last year, 320 student-athletes received grants-in-aid from the University of

Kentucky which allowed them to continue their education.

The Fund also helps underwrite costs associated with the nationally-recognized Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS) located in Memorial Coliseum. In addition, the Fund provides dollars necessary to upgrade the entire athletic physical plant and to plan for the future projects.

Some of the future projects for which the Blue and White Fund would assist include expansion of Commonwealth Stadium from 57,800 to 72,000 and the construction of an indoor football practice facility.

Last year, more than \$2.2 million was

raised through the Blue and White, up from \$800,000 the year before. Under the direction of associate athletics director Gene De-Filippo, the goal next year will double as UKAA becomes more aggresive in its fundraising efforts.

Membership in the Blue and White Fund is open to anyone interested in helping the University of Kentucky student-athletes who participate in one or more of the 19 sports for which UK fields a team.
