

And when the Bluegrass weather is cooperative, the Wildcats do battle at the Dr. H.H. Downing Outdoor Tennis Complex.

The Indoor Center opened in January, 1986, and is a gift from former UK team captain Hilary Boone ('39). A new addition to the center includes a tennis Hall-of-Fame center.

The concrete exterior was made possible by a

\$105,000 grant from the Humana Foundation.
"We hope the concrete exterior promotes the

idea that winning tennis is here to stay at Kentucky," said Wildcats head coach Dennis Emery.

The center is equipped with four courts, an equipment room and bleachers that seat 1,500 people.

"This center is exactly what we needed to compete on the national level. Not only are our teams able to train as we want, but the building allows us to play night matches and attract crowds...something we couldn't do in the past. Thanks to Mr. Boone, our entire tennis program will excel."


The Cats' outdoor facility was named after the "father" of Kentucky tennis, Dr. Downing, who coached the UK team for 29 years, 1922-46 and 1952-57. He coached longer than any other UK coach, with the exception of basketball's Adolph Rupp. Downing's record was 166-104-5 for a winning percentage of 61.3 percent.

The Complex features 18 courts (with varsity courts included) as well as seating for over 1,000 spectators.

1989 Men's Tennis Outlook

The 1989 spring tennis season promises to be one of the most exciting ever as the UK men's team returns seven of it's top eight players while adding three of the nation's top recruits.

Gone from the 1988 Wildcats' sixth-ranked team is four-time All-American Greg Van Emburgh, who was named to the U.S. National Team in May and has since turned toward the professional ranks. Replacing Van Emburgh is no easy task, but seventh-year head coach Dennis Emery feels his early homework has payed off in bringing in top prepsters John Yancey, Andy Potter and Scott Hulse.

"Our recruiting reflects the Wildcats' effort to reach the elite in collegiate tennis, a position we hope to hold with this recruiting effort," said Emery.

The backbone of UK's NCAA quarterfinalist squad returns with All-Americans Mario Rincon (No. 2 in 1988), and Rich Benson (No. 3 in 1988). Junior Adam Malik adds a big serve and volley game for the Wildcats as the SEC Indoor Champion remains a

constant threat indoors. Sophomores Ian Skidmore and Sammy Stinnett will add depth in the middle of the Cats' singles lineup.


The squad will depend heavily on the freshman crop to determine it's placement among the nation's elite.

Yancey is the best known of the trio, having made the U.S. National squad last summer. Being one the nation's top five recruits, Yancey should become an impact player as a freshman.

"John will be a tremendous assett to our squad, as will Andy Potter and Scott Hulse," said Emery. "They should really add depth to our lineup."


Potter, ranked No. 1 in the Intermountain Region the last two years, possesses a strong serve and volley game. Like Yancey, he will see plenty of action, particularly indoors.

Hulse was the nation's No. 41 singles player in the junior ranks and should also press for a spot in the top six.




The Wildcats will depend heavily on their seniors in 1989. (Clockwise) Mario Rincon, Willy Laban, and Rich Benson.





DENNIS EMERY WILDCAT HEAD COACH



Entering his seventh year at UK, Dennis Emery has become one of the nation's most respected college coaches.

In six years at Kentucky, he has twice led the Wildcats to the NCAA Championships, reaching the quarterfinals in 1988. His team also won the 1984 NIT Championship and reached the finals of the NIT in 1983.

"I've had very good material to work with at UK, and with good material, the success comes quicker," said Emery. "We had a very good season last year but we didn't achieve our goal to win the championship," said the enthusiastic coach. "We are striving to win it all this year and I feel we have the talent to do just that."

Emery guided the Wildcats to a 14-4 SEC record over the last two years, including a second-place finish in the dual match, round-robin play in 1988.

"We had a good chance to win the SEC last season and didn't do it," said Emery. "If we play up to our potential this year and get consistent play from Adam Malik and our incoming freshmen, we can become SEC champs."

After a successful college career at Carson-Newman College, where he was All-American Honorable Mention, Emery began his coaching career under the legendary Australian coach Harry Hopman. After five months under Hopman's tutelage, Emery was named the head coach at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn. Emery was at APSU for five years, 1977-82, where in his final team was ranked No. 31 in the nation.

At UK, Emery serves not only as the men's head coach, but is also the Director of Tennis for both the men's and women's programs. He has seen five athletes named to the NCAA All-American team for a total of 14 times.

"Both the men's and women's teams have come a long way here and their success should continue," said Emery. "John Dinneen's experience on various levels of tennis will definitely be a plus for our women's program."

Emery is active in many phases of collegiate tennis. He has served for the last four years as the tournament director for the National Indoor Team Championship which is held each February in Louisville, Ky. He also served from 1985-1987 as chairman of the NCAA Region 3 Tennis Committee after having been a member of the Committee for three seasons.

In 1983, Emery served as a coach for the USTA National Junior Davis Cup Team, which has produced several players currently in the professional ranks, including Ricky Leach, Lawson Duncan, Tim Pawsot, Dan Goldie, Jonathan Canter and Mike Kures.

In addition, Emery serves as camp director for the highly successful Wildcat Tennis Camps held each summer on UK's campus.


Assistant Coach

Gerry Berkheimer begins his second year as an assistant coach with the Wildcats.

Last year he played a large part in the success of All-American Greg Van Emburgh and junior Adam Malik through his one-on-one instructional workouts. Berkheimer is noted for his contributions to players' shot selection and service returns.

Berkheimer played his collegiate tennis with Emery at Carson-Newman, where he played No. 1 singles and doubles and earned All-American honors as a senior. After graduation, he held several teaching jobs in tennis,

including the head professional position at the Veranda in Bradenton, Fla. He has also served as camp director at Camp Vega in Maine.

A great player, Berkheimer won the Kentucky State Indoor in the Open division in April 1988.

Berkheimer is 33 years old and single.




MIKE BENSON


Assistant Coach


"The SEC is one of the top tennis conferences in the nation," said Dinneen. "We set our goals on winning the national championship, but we understand winning the conference would be a major achievement."




"Our recruiting effort is aimed at maintaining a quality program," said Dinneen. "We had a super year last season and we want to build on our progress that we've established.



One of the top young coaches in collegiate tennis, John Dinneen has proven to be a success throughout his tennis career, and is continuing that trend with the Lady Kats tennis team.

Last year, Dinneen helped to lead the women to a No. 6 national ranking, their highest ever. With this year's squad ranked eighth nationally in the preseason poll, Dinneen is confident that the Lady Kats can remain one of the top powers in the country.

"With three newcomers, this year's squad has a different makeup than last season's experienced team," said Dinneen. "However, this squad has the potential to be more explosive than last year's."

Before arriving at Kentucky, Dinneen, 27, served as an assistant at California-Berkeley from 1986-87 and at Harvard, his alma mater, from 1983-86.

At California, the Bears experienced their finest season ever with Dinneen, winning the Pacific 10 Championship, defeating national power Stanford twice, and finishing in the top four of the final ITCA poll.

At Harvard, the Crimson were Ivy League Champs, finished No. 1 in the East, and had a season-ending top 20 rating during Dinneen's tenure. Harvard also participated in the NCAA tournament, a feat it had not previously accomplished.

Dinneen, a New Jersey native, was appointed to the USTA coaching staff for the 1988 National Team, making him one of a select group of coaches responsible for the development of top U.S. amateur women tennis players.


"This monumental undertaking by the USTA is an attempt to bring American tennis back to its elite status that it once so proudly held," Dinneen said.


Assistant Coach Eastern Kentucky, 1988

UK EDUCATES ONE-THIRD OF THE COLLEGE STUDENTS IN KENTUCKY Enrollment on the University's campus in Lexington is more than 22,000, while about 30,000 attend UK's 14 community colleges throughout the Commonwealth. JOE BURCH ACTING DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Joseph T. Burch, the Acting Director of Athletics at the University of Kentucky, has been with the University for more than two decades in student affairs and as an administrator. While he was still a student himself at UK in 1962, he began an impressive career that has introduced him to a kaleidoscope experiences and numerous phases of University operations.

Burch's current assignment as Acting Athletics Director began on Nov. 15, 1988 following the resignation of long-time Athletics Director Cliff Hagan. At the time of his appointment, Burch was Deputy General counsel in the University's legal office, and was a UK representative in the investigation of alleged NCAA violations.

After receiving a degree in economics in 1962, Burch began his career at UK as

Director of Men's Residence Halls. He earned his law degree from UK in 1966. Since then, the Covington native has served in a number of capacities involving student affairs, including Assistant Dean of Men, Assistant to the Vice President for Student Affairs, and, finally, Dean of Students, a position he held from 1974 until 1986. He has also held the title of acting vice chancellor student affairs.

Burch has performed a number of special assignments for the President of the University, including Acting Associate Director for Administration of the UK Tobacco and Health Research Institute.

The 50-year-old Burch has two children and is married to the former Susan Lammi of St. Louis,

DR. DAVID ROSELLE PRESIDENT



Dr. David P. Roselle became the ninth president of the University of Kentucky on July 1, 1987.

In his first year as president he quickly became acquainted with the University's alumni and friends, and thousands of Kentuckians, by traveling the state extensively. He has met with hundreds of clubs and organizations from one end of the Commonwealth to the other.

On campus, he meets frequently with faculty and staff groups, and shortly after assuming the presidency announced a new program of free tuition for University employees.

Dr. Roselle came to UK from Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Va., where he served for four years as provost, the No. 2 administrative position there,

He had a reputation as an innovator at Virginia Tech and has shown the same innovative style at UK.

He has been one of the main participants in the University's efforts to attract adequate public funding of the University, and his leadership was recognized by a top national award from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

Dr. Roselle believes that the new technology in computation and communications is important not only to academia, but also to business, government, and industry. Consistent with that belief, he helped design and implement a strategy at UK to provide wider access to the new technology. As a result, computing and communications are increasingly an important part in the management of the University, in the academic programs, and in the service programs that support all the citizens of the Commonwealth.

Thanks to Dr. Roselle's efforts, UK is one of a small number of universities in the country to have a "supercomputer" operating for the benefit of faculty researchers and students.

Dr. Roselle's announced goal is to make the University of Kentucky recognized nationally for the quality of its scholarship, research, and graduates.

A native of Pennsylvania, Dr. Roselle earned a Ph.D. in mathematics from Duke University. He was a mathematics professor and researcher at the University of Maryland and Louisiana State University before going to Virginia Tech, where he moved up through the administrative ranks.

He is a nationally-known mathematics scholar and editor of two books, and was on the editorial board of a third.

He and his wife, Louise, have two children—a son, Arthur, 17, and a daughter Cynthia, 16. The Roselles live at the traditional home of UK presidents on the UK campus, Maxwell Place.

THE BLUE AND WHITE FUND

Originated in 1973 by athletics director Cliff Hagan, the Blue and White Fund's main purpose is to provide financial assistance to the UK athletics program.

Today, producing and maintaining a quality athletics program is a never-ending process. And for

that reason, the University of Kentucky Athletics Association is renewing its efforts to raise the funds necessary to be competitive on the national level in every sport. The major purpose of the Blue and White Fund is to provide scholarships for UK's student-athletes. Last year, 315 student-athletes received grantsin-aid from the University of Kentucky which allowed them to continue their education.

The Fund also helps underwrite costs associated with the nationally-recognized Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS) located in Memorial Coliseum. In addition, the Fund provides dollars necessary to upgrade the entire athletic physical plant and to plan for the future projects.

Some of the future projects for which the Blue and White Fund would assist include expansion of Commonwealth Stadium from 57,800 to 72,000, the construction of an indoor football practice facility, and the construction of an athletics administration building.

Last year, more than \$800,000 was raised through the Blue and White Fund. Under the direction of assistant athletics director Gene DeFilippo, the goal next year will double as UKAA becomes more aggresive in its fundraising efforts.

Membership in the Blue and White Fund is open to anyone interested in helping the University of Kentucky student-athletes who participate in one or more of the 19 sports for which UK fields a team.



Athletics at Kentucky

Kentucky Athletics—Reaching for the Top The athletics program at the University of Kentucky is reaching for the top.

The goal is near. In the 1987-88 alone, UK's men's and women's sports programs were each the fourth-most successful overall in the extremely competitive Southeastern Conference, the highest finishes ever for UK.

In the men's programs, UK amassed 43 points (based on team standings in each sport) in the race for the Bernie Moore trophy. The women's program tallied 41.5 points.

Eight UK teams advanced to NCAA competition last season. The Wildcat basketball team won its 37th SEC championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the ninth consecutive year. The baseball and tennis teams each finished second in the conference and advanced to NCAA com-

petition, and the men's golf team also competed in the NCAA Championships.

UK's women's volleyball team won another SEC championship, with tennis finishing third in the conference and also advancing to NCAA competition. The Lady Kats golf and gymnastics teams each participated in NCAA Championships.

Academically, Kentucky has distanced itself from the competition through the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS). Last season, 56 UK student-athletes were named to the Academic All-SEC Honor Roll, the most of any school. UK's football graduation rate continues to hover over the 90% mark, one of the best in the nation. And several student-athletes received SEC and NCAA recognitions and scholarships.

In terms of facilities, UK is striving to be second to none. Recently-completed projects include the \$6 million E.J. Nutter Football Training Facility, the Hilary J. Boone indoor Tennis Center, the lighting of the Shively Baseball Field and the resurfacing and seating expansion of the Shively Track and the \$5.5 million Harry C. Lancaster Aquatics Center.
