THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

— A Continuing Commitment to Excellence

From its modest beginnings in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nation's most outstanding institutions of higher learning.

As a comprehensive, land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the Commonwealth. In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that await students at UK.

At Kentucky, the emphasis is on excellence. Did you know that:

- **UK EDUCATES ONE-THIRD OF THE COLLEGE STUDENTS IN KENTUCKY**

Enrollment on the University's campus in Lexington is 21,000, while 29,300 attend UK's 14 Community Colleges throughout the Commonwealth. That represents about one-third of all students attending public or private colleges, business schools and universities.

- **INCOMING FRESHMEN ARE BEST IN STATE**

The average ACT score of enrolled freshmen in the fall of 1987 was 22.4, the highest for any public university in the state and three points higher than the national average.

- **FRESHMAN CLASS INCLUDES MERIT SCHOLARS AND VALEDICTORIANS**

The 1987 freshman class includes twelve National Merit Scholars and 72 high school valedictorians. The class also includes eleven Singletary Scholars, whose average ACT score is 31.3 and one of whom had a 34 on the ACT. There are 384 freshmen this year who have ACT scores of 27 or higher — ranking them among the top 10 percent of freshmen in the nation.

- **UK STUDENTS ARE WINNING NATIONAL HONORS**

UK debaters won the 1986 national championship. The student newspaper, The Kentucky Kernel, was voted one of the top four collegiate newspapers in the nation. Two architecture students placed first and second in a national design competition sponsored by the Institute for Architecture Education. These are just a few of the many areas in which UK students are excelling.

- **ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM IS GROWING**

The University's academic scholarship program has grown from \$70,000 a year in 1983 to an amazing \$850,000 in 1987.

- **UK HAS REACHED TOP CATEGORY OF RESEARCH UNIVERSITIES**

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching classifies UK as a "Research I" institution, the only such institution in Kentucky and one of only 45 in the nation.

- **UK HAS ENTERED THE WORLD OF SUPERCOMPUTERS**

The University is now one of only 17 universities in the nation to acquire a "supercomputer." UK's IBM 300E supercomputer should be operational in early 1988. The new equipment, which will attract much more research funding and grants, will also be made available to undergraduate students, a rarity at any university.

- **UK FEATURES SOME OF THE BEST FACULTY IN NATION**

Some examples:

DAVID KAO, a member of the Civil Engineering faculty, was recently named one of the nation's Top 100 researchers by Science Digest Magazine.

JACQUELINE NOONAN, a pediatrician, was selected by a national publication as one of the country's foremost physicians.

JOSEPH KUC, a member of the plant pathology faculty, is

internationally known for his highly promising work in the immunization of plants against disease.

GUY DAVENPORT, an English professor who is a Rhodes Scholar and the author of many scholarly books, has been called, "the smartest man in the world today," by a newspaper columnist.

GLENN COLLINS, a member of the Agronomy faculty, is the winner of the top award presented by the Crop Science Society of America for his work in plant genetics.

- **THE FACULTY AT UK ARE AN IMPORTANT STATE "INDUSTRY"**

UK faculty brought to the University and the state last year more than \$51 million in research grants and sponsored programs — a valuable resource to the economic development of the Commonwealth. UK ranks among the Top 100 research universities in federal research funding, the only one so-ranked in the state.

- **UK HAS SOME OF THE MOST OUTSTANDING PROGRAMS IN THE NATION**

- The sociology department received the American Sociological Association's annual award for teaching, the first time this prize has gone to an entire department.

- The College of Education's reading program faculty was judged one of the nation's ten best.

- The cancer research program at UK has been further enhanced by two new modern facilities for treatment and research.

- The Equine Research program, for a long time a research hallmark at UK, has one of the top research facilities in the world, the new Maxwell Gluck Equine Research Center.

- The College of Agriculture is noted world-wide for its development of burley tobacco varieties resistant to the five major diseases affecting that crop, for its research in no-till farming and just recently for the development of Johnstone Fescue, a grass that may save farmers hundreds of millions of dollars annually.

- **UK HAS IMPRESSIVE LIST OF ALUMNI**

Included in The University of Kentucky's long list of 106,000 alumni are seven governors, two Nobel Prize winners, one astronaut and several Chief Executive Officers of national corporations.



CENTER for ACADEMIC & TUTORIAL SERVICES

The University of Kentucky is proud to be the first university in the nation to open an academic center for student-athletes. We call it CATS — Center for Academic and Tutorial Services.

We, like all universities, tell parents and recruits that the student-athletes education is of utmost importance. The difference is that at the University of Kentucky, we have made a sincere effort to provide the best possible educational environment, one that is conducive to academic success.

Those efforts have paid off. The Wildcat football team has led the Southeastern Conference for three straight years in the number of players named to the league's Academic Honor Roll. In all sports combined, UK placed more student-athletes on the SEC's Academic Honor Rolls in 1986-87 THAN ANY OTHER SCHOOL. The Wildcat basketball program boasts an 80 percent graduation rate, one of the best in the country.

As a result, our CATS program is a model that other universities have used as a blueprint in forming their own programs. We are one of the few schools in the country to have an assistant athletics director for Academics, Bob Bradley, who is president-elect of the NCAA's National Association of Academics Advisors for Athletics (N4A).

Plans are on the drawing boards for an expansion of our CATS facility, which will include a language laboratory, additional tutoring rooms, an expanded computer facility and a media center.

Annually, the University of Kentucky Athletics Association budgets nearly a half-million dollars to maintain CATS — the premier athletic counseling center in the country.

CATS provides our student-athletes with many advantages over the student-athletes at other universities. Examine the list below:

1. ADVISING — It is not unusual for freshman student-athletes to be confused about courses, campus, or any number of academic procedures. In addition to our study center, the CATS facility houses the office of the Assistant Affairs, a full-time assistant, a Reading Coordinator and four Academic Graduate Assistants (AGA's). These trained staff members are there for one purpose — to help the student-athlete mature academically. Our goal is to help student-athletes be successful out of the arena of athletic competition.

2. STUDY SKILLS — CATS provides us with an area where we can conduct organized weekly study skills classes. Many schools give their student-athletes a crash course in study skills. This is not enough. We have a Freshman Orientation Handbook and Study Skills workbook that each freshman student-athlete receives. The student-athletes attend organized classes in CATS, where they learn to utilize proven classroom study skills and university resources.

3. STUDY HALL — Most major colleges have required study hall for their freshmen student-athletes. These study halls are almost always in the evening after practice and are held in a cam-

pus facility borrowed by the Athletics Association. This is probably the time period least conducive to study or meeting with tutors.

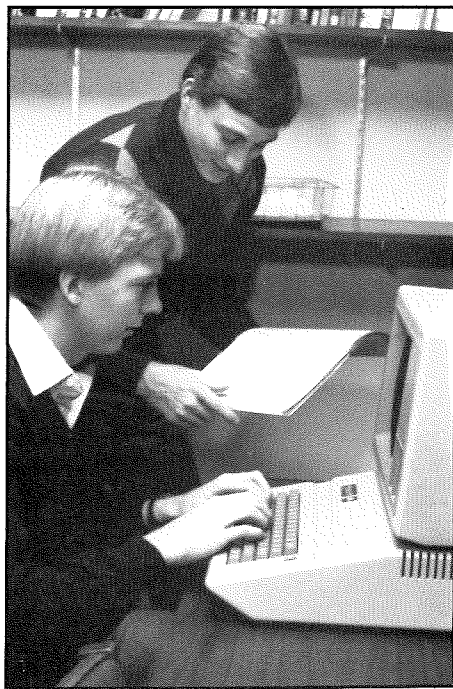
NOT AT KENTUCKY!

The CATS facility not only provides us with our own large area for quiet study but is also equipped with tutoring and small group rooms. Our center was specifically designed to meet the study needs of student-athletes.

The CATS Center is open all day and until 10:00 each night. This means that student-athletes at Kentucky are not restricted to attending required study hall virtually any time of day. Research has shown that the best time to study is immediately after class. Our center provides the student-athletes the opportunity to study at that time. This is definitely a CATS advantage.

4. TUTORING — We have tutors available for any subject. Our tutors come from the University and the community. We utilize the services of professors, graduate students and graduates who are well qualified. We screen our tutors and although we hire many more than we need, we develop a core list of those most effective with our students. This core group works closely with us and thus we are able to monitor the progress of the student-athletes more closely. CATS Provides the proper atmosphere for tutoring. Sound proof rooms are available where the student and the tutor can meet. They don't have to worry about being bothered by others or bothering others while discussing important concepts. Our system is most conducive to learning.

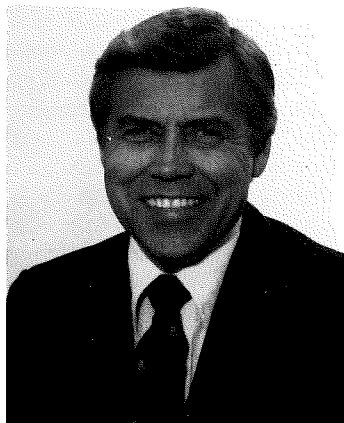
5. READING COMPONENT — The reading program at CATS is designed to meet the needs of all student-athletes. Upon entering the University each student-athlete is given a reading test that measures that individual's strengths and weaknesses. Based upon and weaknesses. Based upon the results, a student-athlete may be encouraged to participate in the reading program, which provides both individual and small-group tutoring in a variety of areas such as reading improvement and advanced vocabulary development. It is the goal of the reading program to provide student-athletes with tools necessary to become more effective readers and studiers.



WHY CATS?

All major colleges spend a lot of time, effort and money recruiting student-athletes. All coaches and athletics administrations express concern for the recruit's education. Most schools use athletic funds freely to build better athletic facilities to attract better athletes. The problem is that those same schools would find it unbearable to spend those same large sums on an academic facility. Our philosophy at the University of Kentucky is that colleges should be willing to provide funds not only to recruit the athletes and develop their physical talents, but also to afford the student-athlete every opportunity to succeed academically.

Director of Athletics
CLIFF HAGAN



As Cliff Hagan enters his 12th year as its director, the University of Kentucky Athletics Association is undergoing an era of unprecedented growth.

Recently-completed projects include the \$6 million E.J. Nutter Football Training Facility, the Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center, the lighting of the Shively Baseball Field and the resurfacing and seating expansion of the Shively Track. In addition, the \$5.5 million Harry C. Lancaster Aquatics Center is nearing completion, bringing the total expenditures in capital expansion projects to nearly \$15 million.

This past July, the UK Athletics Association Board of Directors approved a record \$9.3 million budget for the 1987-88 fiscal year. In a time when many athletic departments are facing budget crises, UKAA continues to be totally self-supporting, with no tax dollars from the University's general funds.

Hagan, a native of Owensboro, replaced the late Harry C. Lancaster as athletics director on July 1, 1975. Since then, UK athletics has enjoyed a tremendous amount of success, both on the playing field and in the classroom.

Hagan has seen UK basketball teams win an NCAA championship, an NIT championship and make another appearance in the Final Four. The football Wildcats have appeared in three bowl games. Last season, six UK teams appeared in their respective NCAA championship events.

Academically, Hagan helped establish the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS). The University of Kentucky was the first university in the nation to open an academic center for student-athletes. The efforts have paid off, as UK led the Southeastern Conference last year in the number of student-athletes named to the league's various Academic Honor Rolls.

Hagan's involvement in college athletics extends beyond the University of Kentucky. He serves on the Executive Committee of the

Southeastern Conference and is also on the Executive Committee of the NCAA Division 1A Athletics Directors Association.

A two-time All-American basketball center at UK (1952, 54), Hagan helped the Wildcats win 86 of 91 games during his career. Included in his career is a 1951 national championship under legendary coach Adolph Rupp.

As a senior, Hagan helped lead UK to a perfect 25-0 record and the Southeastern Conference title. That season, Hagan averaged 29 points per game and led the nation in rebounding (13.5 rpg).

After graduating from UK in 1954 and serving two years at Andrews Air Force Base as a commissioned officer, Hagan began a highly successful National Basketball Association career with the St. Louis Hawks. In 10 seasons, he posted 12,433 career points in 672 games (18.5 ppg) and played in five NBA All-Star games.

Hagan played on St. Louis teams which claimed six division titles. In 1958, Hagan helped lead the Hawks to the World Championship by defeating the Boston Celtics. He also set a NBA single game record for most field goals in a quarter (12). Hagan was voted All-Pro from 1957-62.

Between basketball seasons at St. Louis, Hagan earned his M.S. degree from Washington University in 1958.

He also had a stint as player-coach of the Dallas Chapparals during his professional basketball days. In fact, Hagan was chosen as the Texas Professional Coach of the Year in 1968. His record at Dallas was 109-90. In 1975, Hagan was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame. Three years later, he became the first UK player inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children — Mrs. Lisa Thaxton, Mrs. Laurie Hill, Mrs. Amy Burdette and Kip, a recent graduate of Transylvania University.

DAVID P. ROSELLE



Dr. David P. Roselle was named the ninth president of the University of Kentucky in March 1987.

Dr. Roselle comes to UK from Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Va., where he served as provost four years. The position of provost at Virginia Tech is the number two administrative position at the university, which has more than 22,000 students.

A native of Pennsylvania, Dr. Roselle has a Ph.D. in mathematics from Duke University. He has been a mathematics professor and researcher at the University of Maryland and Louisiana State University. He became a professor of mathematics at Virginia Tech in 1974 and held that faculty appointment during his entire tenure there.

He also served as dean of Virginia Tech's graduate school and dean of research and graduate studies.

Dr. Roselle is known as an innovator. At Virginia Tech he implemented a university-wide core curriculum, helped secure increased support for sponsored research and was recognized nationally for his initiatives in computing and information systems.

In 1978, he was recognized by Virginia Tech for his teaching excellence.

Dr. Roselle has held a variety of leadership positions in national mathematics organizations and served as executive secretary of the Mathematical Association of America for nine years.

He has made numerous invited addresses in his field and is widely published as a mathematics scholar. He has been editor of two books and was on the editorial board of a third.

Dr. Roselle is married to the former Louise Dowling of Manhasset, N.Y., and they have a son, Arthur, 16, and a daughter, Cynthia, 15.

1986-87 Men's Review

The 1986-87 season was the best ever in University of Kentucky men's tennis history. Under the guidance of head coach Dennis Emery, the Wildcats finished 21-9 overall and ranked 16th nationally. Included in the 21 wins were impressive victories over second ranked Southern Methodist, sixth ranked Stanford and ninth ranked South Carolina. The Wildcats also picked up victories over five other squads ranked in the Top 25, Alabama, Southwestern Louisiana, Florida, Auburn and Minnesota.

Individually, UK picked up its first All-American selections last season. In doubles play, Richard Benson and Greg Van Emburgh were named to the NCAA All-American squad. Van Emburgh also garnered All-American honors in singles play. In Southeastern Conference play, Andrew Varga downed Mike Morrison of Georgia to capture the number four outdoor singles' title. And last January, Adam Malik won the SEC Indoor title at number four singles.

1987-88 Men's Outlook

Kentucky tennis coach Dennis Emery thinks his 1987-88 Wildcat netters may be the best since his arrival over five years ago. "Indeed, this is our best team we've had on paper," Emery says. All-Americans Richard Benson and Greg Van Emburgh return this season with hopes of improving on UK's 21-9 record of last year, which included a 6-3 record in Southeastern Conference play. Also, Kentucky returns SEC Indoor champion (singles #4) Adam Malik. "I feel we have the right combination of youth and experience to contend for the (SEC) championship and possibly national honors," Emery said. "I look for (Mario) Rincon and (Adam) Malik to press for

our top two spots in singles play." The Wildcats lost four regulars to graduation last season — Steve Denney, Andrew Varga, David Keevins and Keith Cook. To compensate, Emery brought to UK junior college transfers Mario Rincon and Willie Laban, as well as prepsters Sammy Stinnett and Ian Skidmore. Rincon defeated Laban in the National Junior College Championship match at number one singles last season. Rincon continued on a torrid pace following his national juco title during the summer, earning a world ranking of 395 and defeating NCAA semifinalist Mark Kaplen of Cal-Irvine. "Despite our graduation losses, I'm really excited and anxious for the season to begin," Emery said.

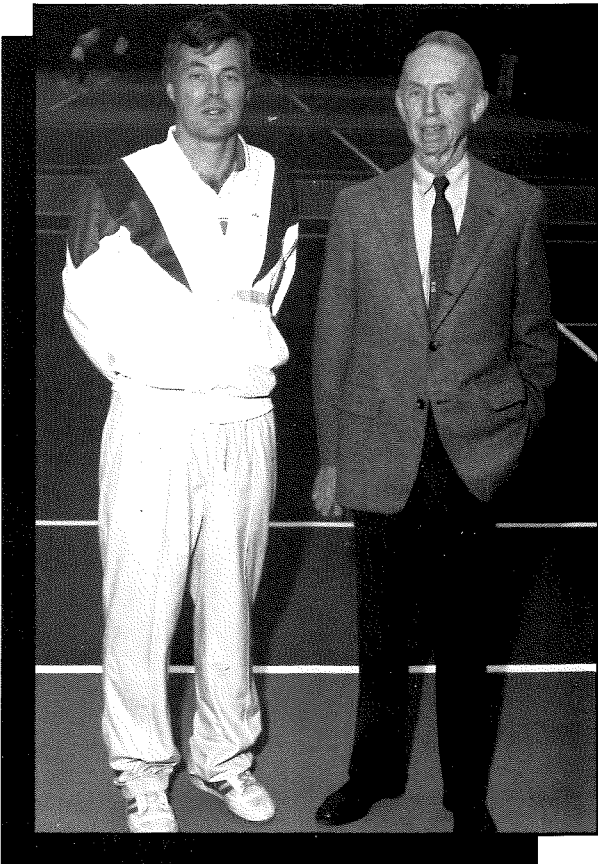
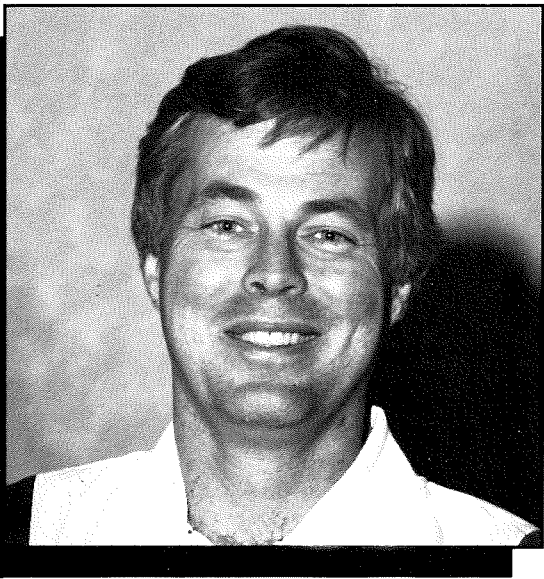

Dennis Emery Head Coach

Dennis Emery begins his sixth season as head coach for the Kentucky men's tennis team. Emery, in just five short years, has taken the Wildcat tennis program to new heights. Last season's 21-9 record helped UK earned its first NCAA Championship berth in school history. Also, Kentucky posted a .500-or-better record in Southeastern Conference play for the third consecutive season, only the third time that has happened in Wildcat tennis. In five years at UK, Emery is 108-63 overall for an impressive winning percentage of .632. Before his stint at Kentucky, Emery was 87-66 in five seasons as head coach at Austin Peay. His career-record (10 sea-

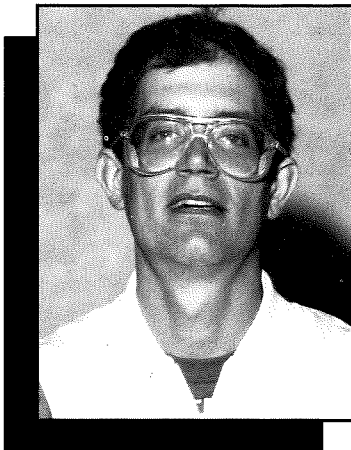
sons) is a sparkling 195-129 (.600 pct.). Emery played collegiately at Carson-Newman College in Jefferson City, Tenn. As a senior, Emery was selected to the NAIA Honorable-Mention All-American team. Emery began his coaching career in 1978 at Austin Peay. At Austin Peay, Emery helped lead the Governors to a pair of Ohio Valley Conference regular season titles. Emery owns a bachelor's degree from Carson-Newman and a master's from Austin Peay. He is married to the former Brenda Wild of Riverview, Fla., and has two sons, Matthew and Andrew.

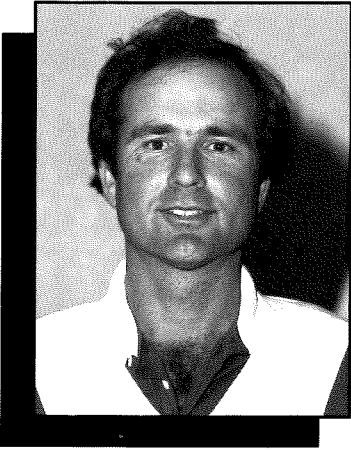
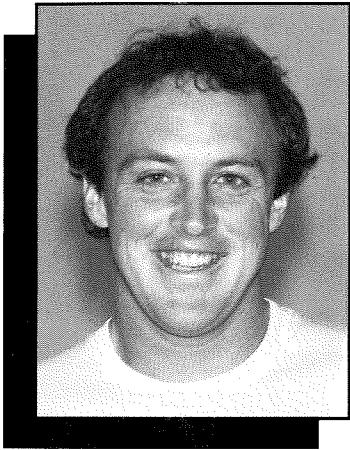

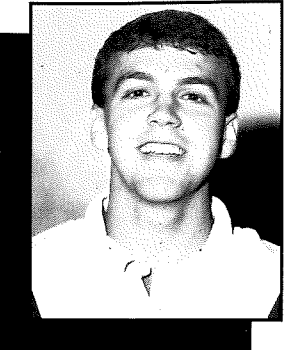
Emery on BENSON — "Besides being a great coach with a high level of professional playing experience, Mike is a genuinely nice person and a good friend to our players."

1986-87 Women's Review

The Kentucky Lady Kats posted a school-best 21-7 record and a spot in the NCAA Championships under first-year head coach Susan Rudd a year ago. Led by All-Americans Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi, the Lady Kats knocked off Top Twenty squads Texas Christian, U.S. International, Clemson, Georgia (NCAA runnerup), Duke, North Carolina, Texas and Indiana. Hahn, who ended the 1986-87 season nationally ranked (7th in singles and 8th in doubles), shattered the UK season record for victories in singles' play with 55. Along the way, Hahn became the first player in UK history to capture a national title, which she did at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Hahn also claimed titles at both the Southeastern Conference Indoor and Outdoor Championships, the SUnity Life Tennis Classic, and the Southern Intercollegiate Tennis Championships. Hahn,

a native of Carrollton, Ga., finished runnerup at the Milwaukee Tennis Classic and the National Clay Courts in Bradenton, Fla. Takagi, a native of Fukuoka, Japan, was named All-SEC for the third consecutive year and helped lead the Lady Kats to a second-place finish in the always-tough SEC. Beckwith Archer was solid at number three singles, posting a 23-16 record over the course of the 1986-87 season. Two of Archer's more notable victories last season came against Kelly Mulvihill of Indiana and Robyn Field of Texas. Sophomores Caroline Knudten and Chris Karges successfully defended their SEC crowns at number four and five singles, respectively. Juniors Helene LeBeller and Sarah Swan posted an overall record of 22-17 at the number six position.

1987-88 Women's Outlook

Kentucky returns all seven lettermen from a year ago as head coach Susan Rudd hopes the Lady Kats can improve on a 21-7 finish. The Lady Kats, led by All-Americans Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi, ended the 1986-87 season ranked 13th in the nation. All things considered, Kentucky may be one of the nation's 10-best teams in 1987-88. "I feel like we have the ingredients to be a Top 10 team this year," Rudd says. "We have a lot of talent and the girls react well with each other, myself, and assistant coach John Dinneen. If we get credible performances down the line and our top girls continue to develop, I feel we have a shot at winning the SEC Tournament."

And on the south by mountains.*

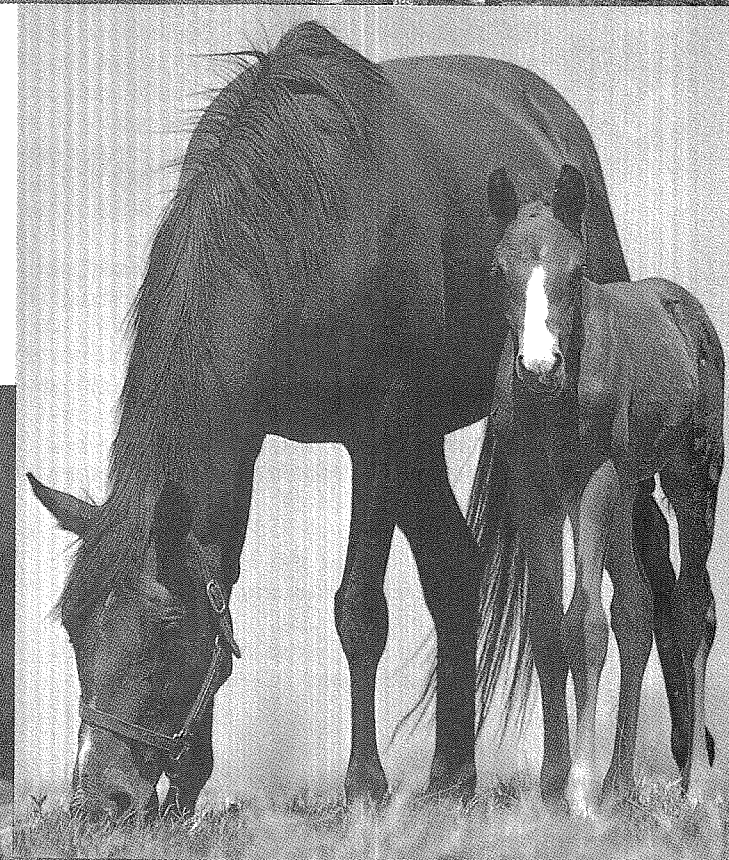
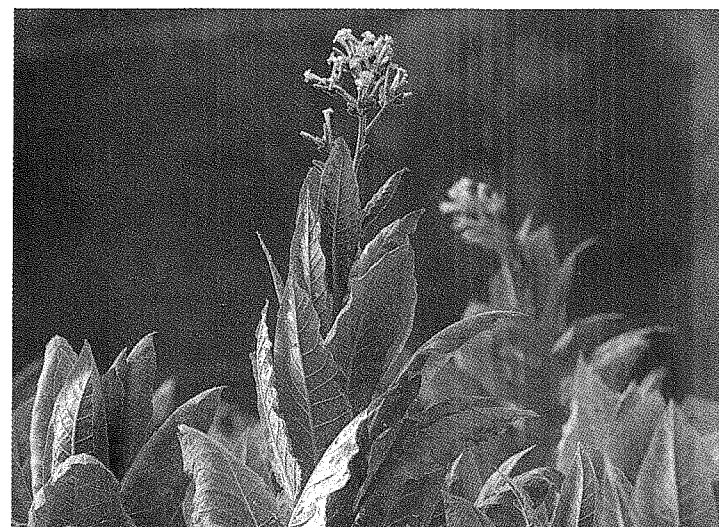
*Only one boundary line is not a natural one,

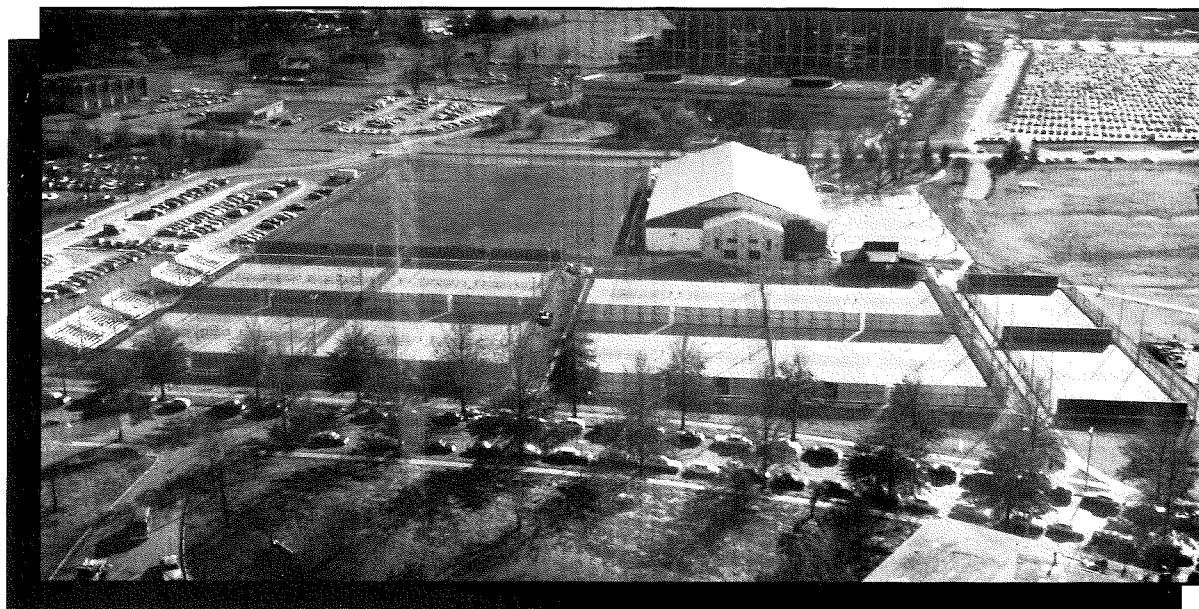

THE WILDCAT LAIR

**Hilary J. Boone
Indoor Tennis Center**


The indoor home of the Kentucky Wildcats tennis team is the Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center. When the building is totally completed in January 1989 it may be regarded as the finest on-campus indoor facility in the country. The indoor center opened in January 1986 and is a gift of former UK team captain Hilary Boone ('39). New additions to the building which will be completed in time for the 87-88 season are the concrete exterior and the indoor bleachers.

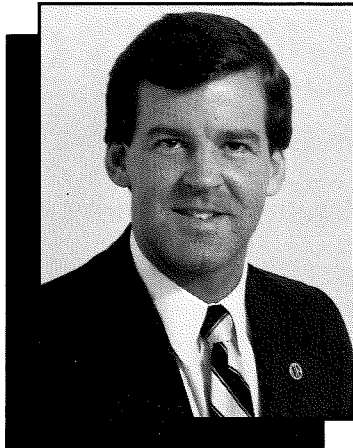
The concrete exterior was made possible by a \$105,000 grant from the Humana Foundation. "We hope the concrete exterior promotes the idea that the Boone Center and winning tennis are here to stay at UK," said Wildcat head coach Dennis Emery.

The bleacher seating is something unique in indoor facilities. The Boone Center will seat between 1,200-1,500 people with the permanent structure. The seating guarantees season tickets for all home matches, rain or shine. Emery feels the building will help Kentucky compete on the national level. "This

center is exactly what we needed to compete on the national level. Not only are our teams able to train as we want but the building allows us to play night matches and attract crowds, something we couldn't do in the past. Hilary Boone has taken us to the forefront of college tennis with his gift."

UK plays its outdoor matches at the Dr. H.H. Downing Outdoor Tennis Complex. Named after the father of Kentucky tennis, the complex features 18 courts (with varsity courts included) as well as seating for over 1,000 spectators. Eight featured courts have been dug up and resurfaced in anticipation of the 1988 SEC Outdoor Championships at UK, this spring.

Last year the outdoor center was named in honor of Dr. Downing, who coached the UK team for 29 years (1922-1946 and 1952-1957), longer than any other UK coach with the exception of basketball's Adolph F. Rupp. Downing's record was 166-104-5 for a winning percentage of 61.3%.

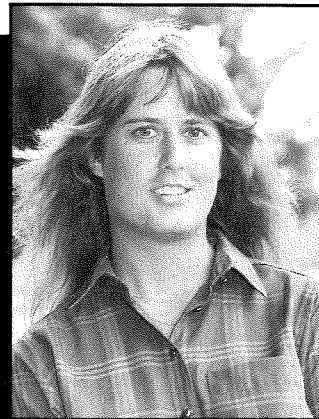
**BRAD DAVIS**

Brad and Ruth Davis have three children: Stephen, Andrea and Caroline.

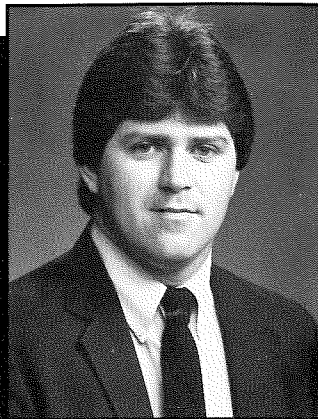
**RENA VICINI**

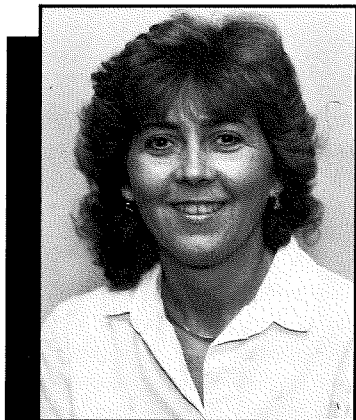

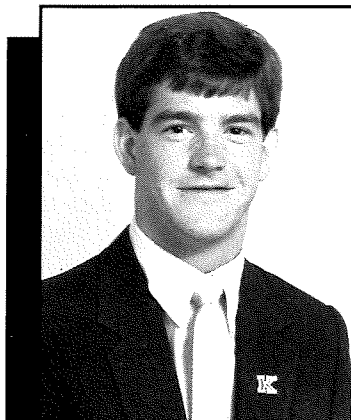

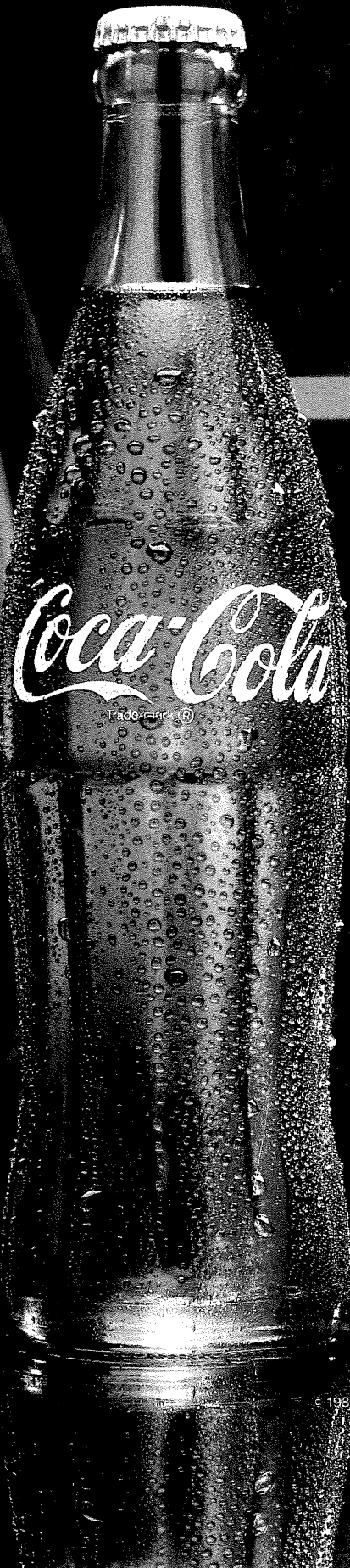
