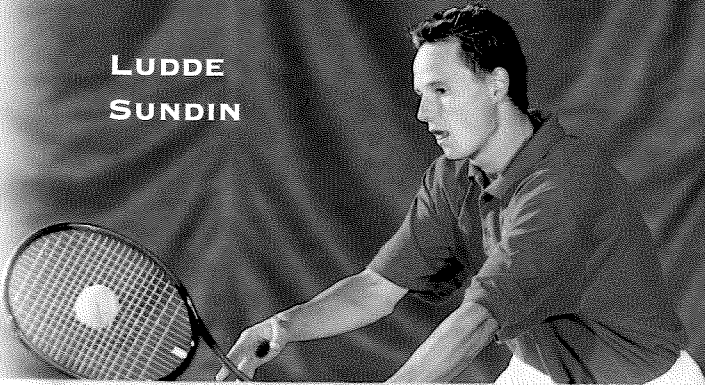

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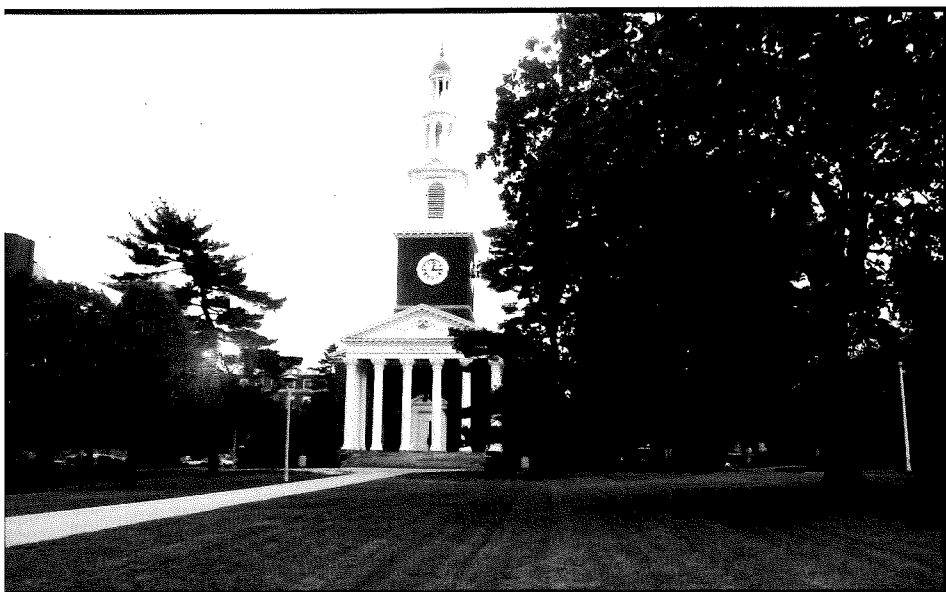
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FROM ITS MODEST BEGINNINGS IN 1865, WHEN IT WAS KNOWN AS STATE COLLEGE, THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY HAS GROWN INTO ONE OF THE NATION'S MOST OUTSTANDING INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING. AS A COMPREHENSIVE LAND-GRANT UNIVERSITY, UK OFFERS AN EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE THAT CANNOT BE MATCHED ANYWHERE IN THE COMMONWEALTH. IN FACT, ONLY A SMALL NUMBER OF INSTITUTIONS ACROSS THE NATION CAN OFFER THE WEALTH OF OPPORTUNITIES THAT AWAITS STUDENTS AT UK. AT KENTUCKY, THERE IS A TRADITION OF VALUE.

HISTORY

UK was founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and the present name dates to 1916. The Lexington campus has 673 acres. Dr. Charles T. Wethington Jr., is UK's 10th president.

STUDENTS

The University of Kentucky now has more than 70,000 students, with 24,000 on the Lexington campus and 46,000 at the 14 community colleges across the state. UK now educates 40 percent of all the students in Kentucky attending a public or private college or university. There are 5,077 students now enrolled in graduate school with 95 master's and 57 doctoral programs offered.

FACULTY

There are 1,720 full-time faculty on the Lexington campus and 1,125 faculty in the community colleges. Faculty brought in more than \$100 million in grants, contracts, and gifts to the University during the last academic year.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Currently, there are 16 academic colleges and a graduate school. Students have a choice of 108 undergraduate majors from which to choose. The University is recommended in a number of publications for its value in providing higher education.

RESEARCH



UK ranks among the Top 100 research institutions in the nation, and is one of only 59 public universities in the United States - the only one in Kentucky - to be classified as a Research University of The First Class.

MEDICAL CENTER

The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, including a 473-bed hospital, is located on the Lexington campus. More than 2,800 students are enrolled in its five colleges - medicine, dentistry, nursing, pharmacy, and allied health professions.

LIBRARY

The UK Library System contains more than two million volumes and is interconnected by computer with each of the 14 community colleges. The library is ranked 34th among the 108 top university research libraries in North America based upon the number of volumes held. The University has begun construction of a new \$58 million state-of-the-art library.

SPORTS



The current number of UK sports on the varsity level is 21 - 10 men's sports, 10 women's sports, and 1 coed sport. The men's sports are football, basketball, baseball, cross country, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, swimming, golf, and soccer. For the women, UK sponsors basketball, volleyball, swimming, golf, tennis, gymnastics, cross country, indoor and outdoor track, and soccer on the varsity level. The single coed sport is rifle.

The UK men's basketball team has been prominent nationally for 50 years under the leadership of four coaches, Adolph Rupp, Joe B. Hall, Eddie Sutton and Rick Pitino. The UK football program also offers the excitement of top-level competition in the Southeastern Conference and is headed by Coach Bill Curry.

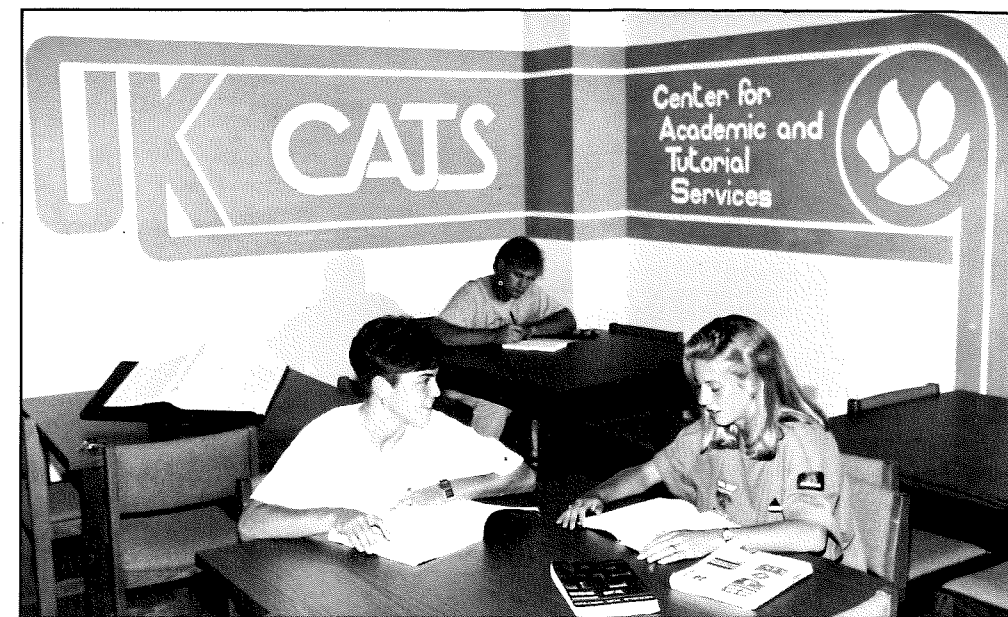
The University of Kentucky continues to keep the term "student-athlete" in the proper perspective — student first, athlete second. The University of Kentucky opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is known as the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS).

CATS is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a large general study area along with numerous smaller rooms used for tutoring. CATS expanded in 1994 and added a language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

"I have always contended that the University of Kentucky has the finest support groups for its student-athletes of any Division I University," said women's Coach John Dinneen. "CATS, guided by Bob Bradley and his magnificent staff, leads the way here at UK. We are very lucky to have them and we all prosper because of their hard work and expertise."

Men's coach Dennis Emery concurs with Dinneen. "The academic support the CATS center gives is one of the best in the country," said Emery. "It is an invaluable tool for our student-athletes."

While Emery and Dinneen's views on academics are echoed throughout the athletics department, former UK Football Coach Jerry Claiborne also put the importance of the CATS Center in perspective when he said: "There is no question, the CATS Center is a very important part of not only the UK Football



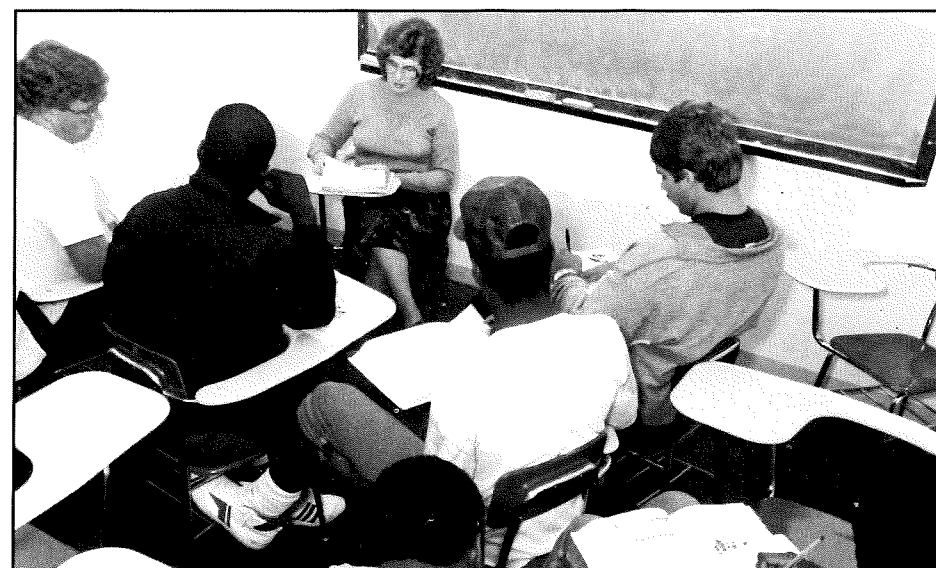
program, but the entire athletics program. Academic pursuits come first at Kentucky."

Bob Bradley, Assistant A.D. for Academics, supervises CATS and is assisted by Barbara Deniston, Mike Haley, Sheila Breeding, and Darren Bilberry. The CATS Center also employs five graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and the Lexington community.

"CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete," Bradley says. Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics.

"Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job at helping their student-athletes," Bradley said. "I have been blessed at Kentucky."

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: *colleges should be able to afford the student-athlete with every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well.* Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

Where downtown skyscrapers overlook thousands of acres of lush pastures, home to Kentucky's most loved resource - the horse.

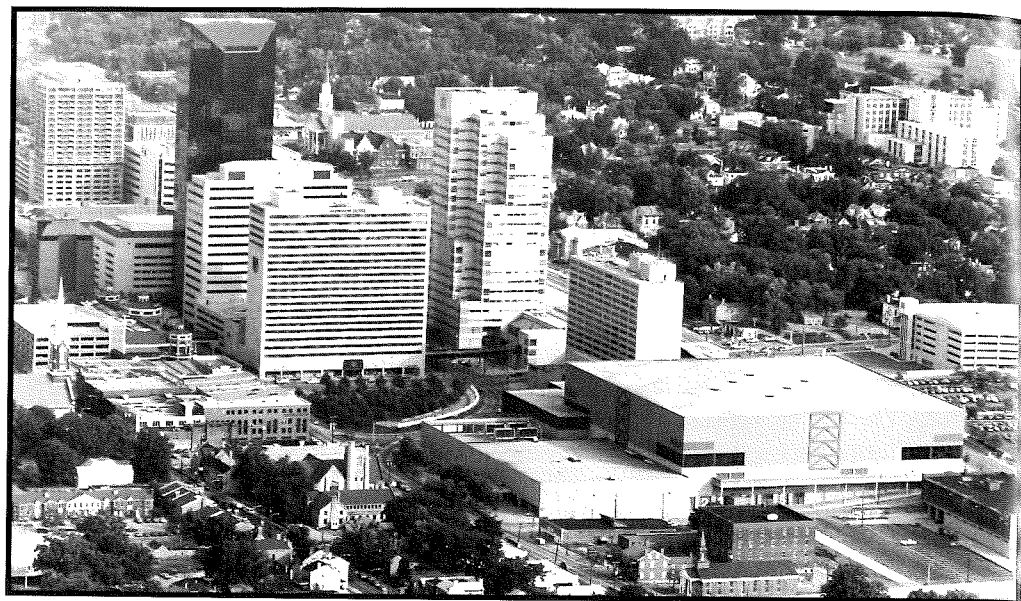
This is Lexington, home of the University of Kentucky. Lexington is a beautiful city. John O. Simonds, a nationally-known landscape architect and the author of several books on land use, calls the Bluegrass area a "national treasure, the bluegrass area is superlative countryside." Lexington is the heart of the Bluegrass, the metropolitan shopping, commercial and entertainment hub of eastern Kentucky.

Lexington has all the attractive qualities of a major metropolitan area, but it is small...and there is an overlay of what can be described as Blue Grass. In addition to go along with such major companies as Lexmark, Ashland Oil (Valvoline), Long John Silver's, Toyota and many other nationally known firms that have major plants or headquarters in the area.

With a population of around 225,000 Lexington is small enough to provide the perfect college atmosphere for the University of Kentucky. But it is also large enough to offer the cultural opportunities usually reserved for larger cities.

The city offers UK students much in the way of entertainment: a Philharmonic Orchestra, Chamber Music Society, the Lexington Singers, a Council of the Arts, and a local Ballet Company. Movie theaters, international restaurants, coffee houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena, the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, thoroughbred and harness racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds, and streams, and the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park, all in easy distance of the UK campus, are just a few attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.

A recent statewide poll indicated that the Lexington area is the most popular place to live, work and play in Kentucky.

Though the above words were written by one of Kentucky's favorite sons, any one of the millions of visitors to the Bluegrass State each year might nod in agreement.

Kentucky embodies the very essence of America, from majestic mountains and forests to vast sparkling lakes, from rolling acres of farm and pastureland to the hustle and bustle of metropolitan centers. And around every turn in the road, Kentucky's colorful past, which helped shape our country's character, is preserved and maintained for all to enjoy. The result is a state so diverse in travel and recreational opportunities that one is hard pressed to name its equal.

If asked to describe Kentucky, the first word to come to mind would probably be horses. The Bluegrass region of central Kentucky is internationally recognized as the Horse Capital of the World.

Lexington, in the heart of the Bluegrass, preserves the romantic tradition of the horse farms and is the hub of the multi-billion dollar horse industry.

Kentucky is also a land steeped in the rich history of our nation. Legendary pioneer Daniel Boone laid out Kentucky's second settlement at Fort Boonesborough, and nearby, a hundred years later, the Shaker religious sect prospered at picturesque Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill.

Abraham Lincoln was born in Hodgenville (the one-room cabin is part of a National Historic Site). The plantation home that inspired Stephen Foster to write "My Old Kentucky Home" still stands at a state park of the same name. And the

region that 200 years ago gave birth to one of Kentucky's most famous exports — bourbon whiskey — is dotted with world-famous distilleries.

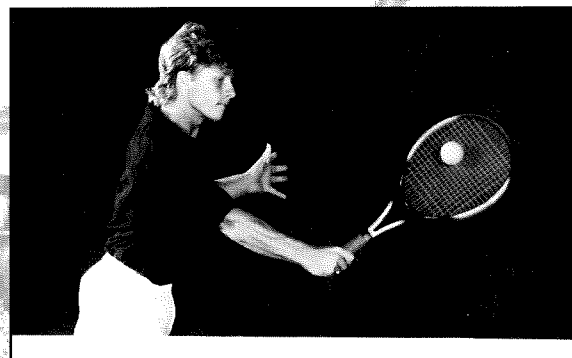
OUTLOOK

THE 1996 KENTUCKY MEN'S TENNIS TEAM APPEARS TO HAVE ALL THE INGREDIENTS TO FIELD A STRONG TEAM THAT CAN CHALLENGE FOR THE CONFERENCE CROWN.

Despite having only one senior, the Wildcats are a mature team according to coach Dennis Emery. Last year, three freshmen gained a lot of valuable match experience and performed well in their first seasons. They should only get better this year. In addition, junior Ludde Sundin will anchor the team from the first or second singles position and from an upperclassman's leadership perspective.

The addition of five freshmen, four of whom are expected to make an immediate impact, will keep the competition for line-up spots lively.

"This is about as competitive a group as you could have and that's what I like the most about them," head coach Dennis Emery said. "My most successful teams have been very competitive, so

this should be a fun group to work with."

Along with Sundin, sophomore Cedric Kauffmann will lead the Wildcats from one of the first two singles positions. He also will play first or second doubles.

Kauffmann was one of the top freshmen in the country last season, finishing his first season ranked among the nation's top 50 singles players. Finishing with a 29-19 record, Kauffmann won two matches in the NCAA Regional. In the fall season, No. 34-ranked Kauffmann defeated seven ranked opponents, including three in the top 21.

Sundin was Kentucky's lone singles representative in the NCAA Championships last season. Despite mid-season injury problems, Sundin finished the season ranked No. 31 in singles after being ranked 26th in the preseason. Sundin's 29-20 singles record last season included a 13-match winning streak. He was undefeated in the month of February.

Sundin also played well this summer, beating former UK All-Americans Adam Malik and Michael Hopkinson in the RCA Qualifier in Indianapolis, Ind.

Sophomore Marcus Fluitt has the early lead on the No. 3 singles position. Fluitt ended his first year 29-16.

"Marcus has the tendency to play the big match very well," Emery said. "He had a tremendous Team Indoor in Louisville, and he played well in the second doubles spot."

Fluitt won all three of his matches at the USTA/ITA Men's National Indoor Intercollegiate Team Championships in Louisville. Fluitt also will contribute in the No. 1 or No. 2 doubles position.

Sophomore Daniel Spaner returns to bolster the singles and doubles lineups. Spaner, who was ranked as high as No. 75 in last season's singles rankings, will fit into the lower half of the starting singles line-up. He also will play doubles. Emery said Spaner's game has improved a lot after a summer of extensive weight training.

The freshman class is large and talented. Patrik Johansson, a friend of Sundin's from Sweden, is a hard worker who Emery believes will add depth to the squad. Emery said Johansson's strengths are his ability to play on all surfaces and his big forehand. Emery expects Johansson to fit in at the No. 4 singles position and at one of the doubles positions.

"Patrik should have no trouble adjusting to American hard court tennis," Emery said.

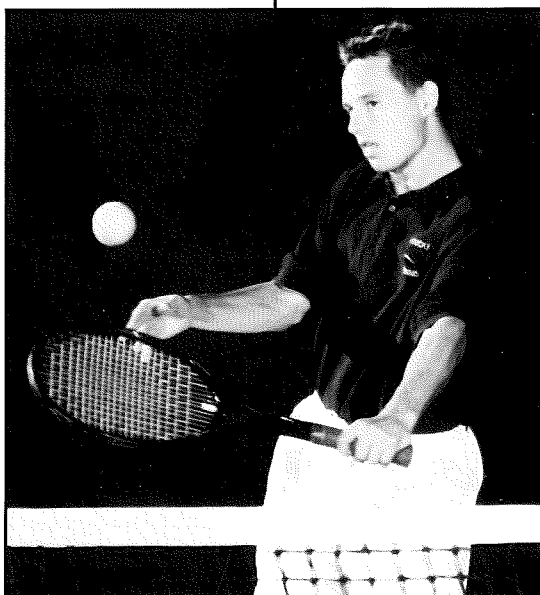

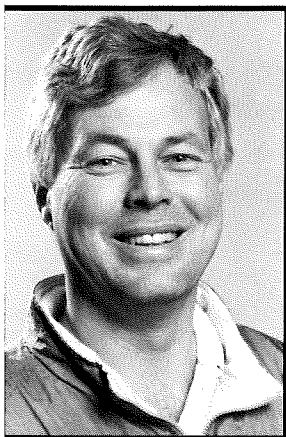
"He needs to work on his ability to hold serve," Emery said. "But when he learns to do that on the collegiate level, he will be a nightmare for people to play."

Keith Mauriello and Brad Jackson are both talented players who will add much-needed depth to the Kentucky program. Last season, Emery said the team lacked depth. This season, people will be pushing up from the bottom to create a more competitive atmosphere and a stronger team.

Emery called last season a rebuilding year, but UK still finished 16th in the nation. This season, the team is stronger.

"This is the type of team that will get much better during the year," Emery said. "The SEC is the nation's toughest conference, but we'd like to win it this year. There is no reason we can't challenge Ole Miss and Georgia for the title."





DENNIS EMERY

CARSON NEWMAN, 1978

THIS SEASON MARKS DENNIS EMERY'S 14TH YEAR LEADING THE KENTUCKY MEN'S TENNIS PROGRAM. WHEN EMERY BEGAN HIS COACHING CAREER AT UK, HE WANTED TO BUILD A CONSISTENT WINNER AND A NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP CALIBER TEAM.

Emery has accomplished both goals with the program becoming a consistent winner and a consistent top 20 team. The Cats have been ranked in the preseason top 20 each of the past nine years.

When Emery took over in 1983, the Kentucky program had finished last in the SEC two of the three previous years. They had finished in the top half of the 10-team conference only five times since 1944.

Nine years later, Emery led UK to its first SEC regular-season championship and its first SEC tournament and overall crowns.

Kentucky has now become one of the nation's strongest programs by claiming top-10 finishes four of the past six seasons. In the last seven years, the Wildcats have captured one title, finished second twice, and finished third once in the SEC — the country's top tennis conference. In 1992, Emery was named SEC coach of the Year and was a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors.

The Wildcats began a run in 1987 which has landed them in the NCAA Team Championships seven of the last nine seasons, including two quarterfinal losses to top-seeded Stanford and USC in close matches. Each year since 1987, individuals have competed in the singles and doubles fields as well.

The Wildcats have been ranked in the Top-25 of the final ITA poll every year since 1984.

As UK coach, Emery has seen 10 male players earn All-America honors a total of 19 times. The Wildcats

have had an All-America doubles team in seven of the past eight seasons.

In 1993, Emery picked up his 200th Kentucky career victory as the Wildcats upset No. 6 Notre Dame 4-3 in Lexington on February 9. Emery joined an elite group of 25 active collegiate coaches when he gained his 300th career win in 1994.

In addition to serving as men's head coach, Emery serves as UK's director of tennis. A high point in his career came in 1988, when both UK programs were ranked among the nation's top six squads. The only other program to have achieved this status is Stanford.

Emery began his coaching career after earning Honorable Mention All-America honors at Carson-Newman College in 1977. After competing briefly on the satellite tour, Emery began working for Australian legend Harry Hopman.

"Mr. Hopman took a personal interest in my career and in my growth as a coach," Emery said. "I owe a lot of my philosophy as a coach to the time I spent with him."

In 1978, Emery began his collegiate coaching career at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn. Emery took over a mediocre program that had only five players that fall. When he was named head coach, Emery was only 22 years old, which remains the NCAA record for the youngest head coach at a Division I institution.

During his five years at APSU, Emery turned a dormant program into a dominating powerhouse that was undefeated in the OVC for his last two-and-a-half years. The team posted wins over SEC schools such as Kentucky, Ole Miss and Vanderbilt. In 1981, his squad was ranked No. 31 in the nation.

Emery is a member of the ITA Board of Directors for collegiate tennis and has served as tournament director for the ITA-USTA National Indoor Team Championships for 10 consecutive years. He was chairman of the Region III Tennis Committee from 1985-1987 and has served as associate coach for the U.S. Junior Davis Cup team.

Emery has also served as coach to retired professional Susan Sloane-Lundy of Lexington. Sloane climbed from No. 133 to No. 18 in the WTA rankings during her career. Emery currently coaches several junior players.

The 41-year-old Emery has played an instrumental role in the fundraising effort for UK's planned outdoor tennis stadium and complex.

Emery is married to the former Brenda Wild of Tampa, Fla. They have four children: Matthew, Johnny, Andrew and Meritt.

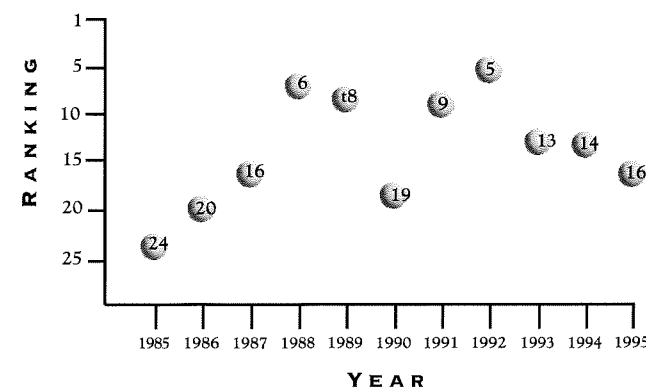

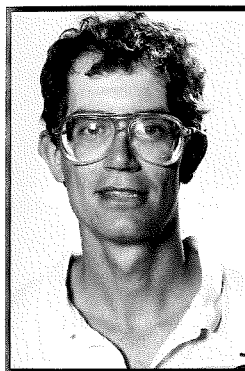

Hill graduated with an accounting and business administration degree from Union, and plans on entering UK's business education program in January.

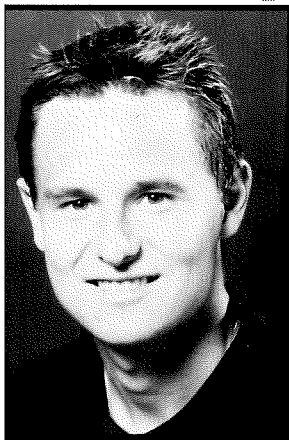

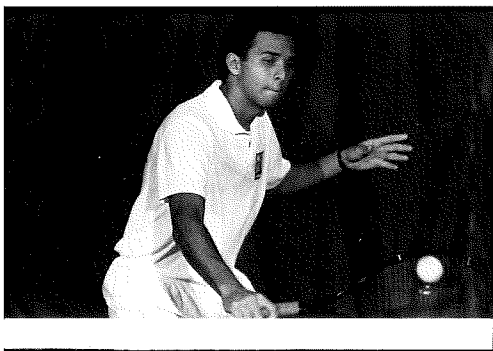
The Louisville Tennis Club, located on Herr Lane, has 12 hard-surface courts. This year, the field consists of 16 teams playing a three-day tournament in which each team is guaranteed three matches. Previously, the tournament field consisted of 20 teams playing a five-day tournament.

"The Team Indoor is probably the most exciting event of the year as it is the first big team event," said UK coach Dennis Emery. "It's early in the year, before teams carry the baggage of losses. It has been the site of some of the best dual matches in college tennis history. We are extremely fortunate to have hosted this event for the past 10 years."

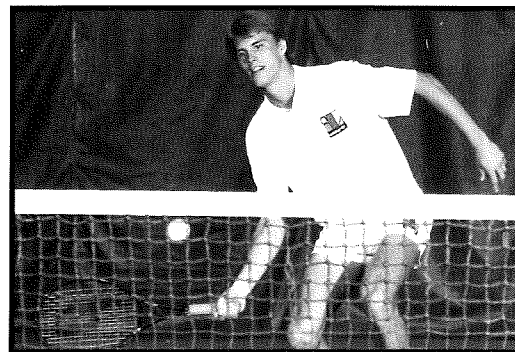
The Wildcats have competed in the tournament for nine consecutive years. Last year, UK lost three tough matches to UCLA (3-4), Florida (3-4), and Notre Dame (3-4) to finish 16th. The Stanford Cardinal captured the tournament crown for the second straight year.

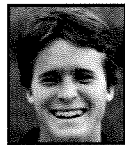

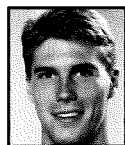

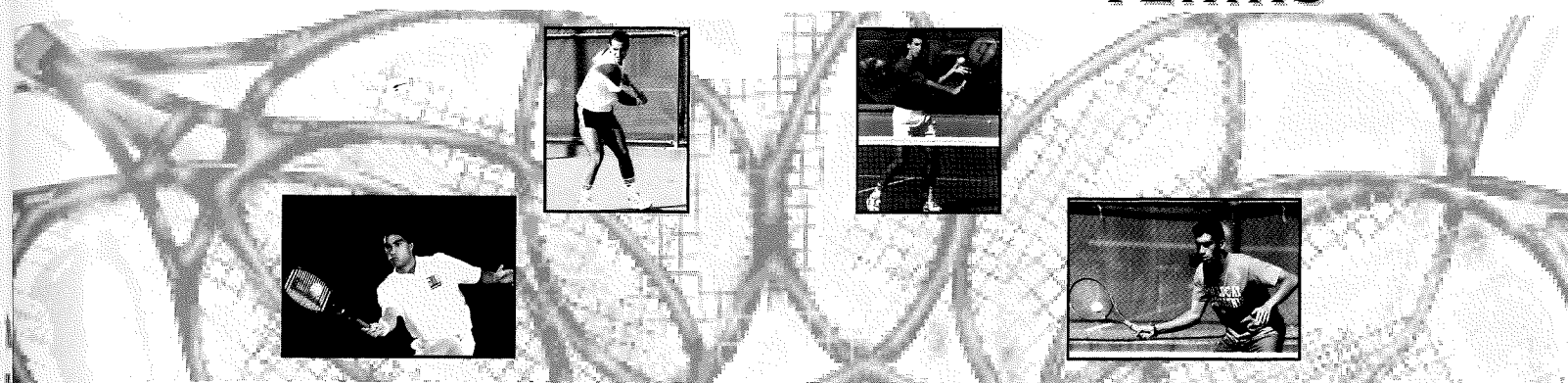

TOP VICTORIES



1988: KENTUCKY 5, UCLA 2 LOS ANGELES, CALIF.:

Less than 16 hours after completing its victory over Pepperdine, the Cats downed the No. 8-ranked UCLA Bruins 5-2 at the Olympic Tennis Stadium. It was UCLA's first loss ever at the stadium.

Greg Van Emburgh and Richard Benson defeated Pat Galbraith and Brian Garow 6-3, 6-1 at No. 1 doubles. Galbraith has since ranked as high as No. 2 in the world in doubles.

"The win at UCLA so soon after beating Pepperdine established our reputation as a national power and a contender for the NCAA Championship for the first time," Coach Dennis Emery said.

1988: KENTUCKY 5, PEPPERDINE 4 LOS ANGELES, CALIF.:

The Wildcats were in the middle of a West Coast road trip that included matches with Pepperdine and UCLA. Pepperdine was led by the nation's top two collegiate players.

UK's win was paced by Mario Rincon's upset of Andrew Sznader, the No. 1-ranked player in the U.S. Other singles winners included Richard Benson and Jeremy Stinnett. When Greg Van Emburgh and Benson won at No. 1 doubles, it came down to the Cats' fabulous No. 3 doubles team of Ian Skidmore and Willy Laban to clinch the victory.

The victory was UK's first road win over a top 5 team.

1987: KENTUCKY 5, SMU 4, BLUE GREY TENNIS CLASSIC, MONTGOMERY, ALA.:

SMU had a lineup which included future pro stars Richey Reneberg, John Ross, Stefan Kruger and Brian Devening.

The Wildcats Andrew Varga and Steve Denney clinched the Wildcats victory. Former U.S. Davis Cup coach Dennis Ralston coached the Mustangs and their No. 1 player, Richey Reneberg — a future Grand Slam champion.

Varga, the match's MVP, put the Cats up 4-2 in an exciting 3-set singles win over Brian Devening. Varga rallied from a 3-1, 40-Love deficit in the third set to win. His comeback was made more amazing due to the fact that he broke four strings and had to play with a teammates racket.

Varga and Denney clinched the match with a victory at No. 2 doubles. SMU Coach Ralston called it "one of the greatest upsets I've ever seen."

1989: KENTUCKY 5, STANFORD 3 NATIONAL TEAM INDOOR, LOUISVILLE, KY.:

When Kentucky met Stanford at the National Indoors, the Cardinal were once again defending national champions. UK wins came at No. 2 singles where Adam Malik defeated future NCAA Champion Alex O'Brien and at No. 3 singles where Richard Benson defeated Martin Blackman.

Adam Malik and Benson won at No. 1 doubles, and John Yancey and Andy Potter clinched the match at No. 2 doubles with a victory over Cathrall and Deus, 7-6 (9), 6-2.

"This may have been our most satisfying win ever due to the quality of both teams and the importance of the situation," Emery said. "The victory gave UK its first ever berth in the final four of a national team tournament."

1986: UK 5, GEORGIA 4, LEXINGTON, KY.:

UK's first modern era win over Georgia came before a packed house at home. With the team score locked at 4-4, UK's No. 1 doubles tandem of Greg Van Emburgh and Pat McGee forced Phillip Johnson and Steve Enochs into a third set tiebreaker. Kentucky fought off seven match points before winning the breaker, 15-13.

The largest crowd ever to witness a UK match (1200) supplied all the excitement that the UK players needed to pull off the upset.

"This was our first big, break through win in the SEC," Emery said. "Georgia had won 11 of the past 14 SEC Championships and was the defending NCAA Champion."

1992: UK 5, LSU 2 AT SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS, NASHVILLE, TENN.:

The UK victory over the Tigers clinched UK's first SEC title and wrapped up the fifth seed at the NCAA Championships.

Kentucky got off to a great start when Andy Potter, playing at No. 4 singles, defeated No. 19 Juha Pesola and Scott Hulse, playing at No. 3 singles, defeated No. 14 Tamer El Sawey, 6-4, 6-4.

Sophomore Mahyar Goodarz won at No. 2 singles, and freshman David Cully, who was playing with a stress fracture in his hand and a bone spur in his right foot, rallied from one set down to defeat No. 60 Michael Westbrook to give the Wildcats a 4-2 lead. Cully and Jason Yeager clinched the match with an easy win at No. 3 doubles.

"I was so proud of this win," Emery said. "It was the culmination of a great season for the four seniors. Cully's doubles performance under such adverse circumstances was as strong a performance as we've ever had."

1992: KENTUCKY 5, MISSISSIPPI STATE 4 STARKVILLE, MISS.:

The victory over No. 6 Mississippi State was a solid win for the Wildcats. Kentucky got key wins from Scott Hulse at the No. 3 singles position and David Cully at the No. 4 singles slot.

When senior John Yancey defeated the nation's top singles player Daniel Courcol 6-4, 3-7, 7-6, the Wildcats evened the match at 3-3. Andy Potter and Hulse got Kentucky its fourth win and set up the deciding match at No. 1 doubles.

With a huge, raucous crowd cheering for the Bulldogs, Yancey and sophomore Mike Hopkinson clinched the match at No. 1 doubles by ousting the No. 4-ranked doubles tandem of Damians and Lagloire 7-6, 6-7, 6-4.

"John Yancey had some great days and some great wins for us over the years, but I never saw him play better and with more poise than he did that day," Emery said. "He handled the crowd and the whole situation so well."

1994: KENTUCKY 4, USC 2 NATIONAL TEAM INDOOR, LOUISVILLE, KY.:

Southern Cal entered the match as the defending NCAA Champion and the No. 2 seed in the tournament. Kentucky lost the doubles to go down 1-0 before its depth at singles came into play.

UK swept the bottom three singles in straight sets as Jason Yeager (No. 4), Ford Lankford (No. 5) and Jason Thompson (No. 6) played exceptionally.

No. 2 singles player Mahyar Goodarz, coming off wrist surgery, downed 13th-ranked Jonathan Leach, 6-4, 7-5, to clinch the win over the eventual NCAA Champions. The victory for the Wildcats was USC's only loss that season. The Trojans finished the year 25-1.

"This win was certainly one of our proudest moments not only because of who we beat and what they went on to accomplish, but also due to the fact that two Kentucky natives — Jason Yeager and Ford Lankford — led the way," Emery said.

1989: KENTUCKY 5, GEORGIA 4 AT ATHENS, GA.:

The nation's featured pitted two outstanding teams against each other. The two teams traded blows until Adam Malik won in straight sets over No. 1-ranked Al Parker to lead the Wildcats to a 5-4 upset in Athens. It was one of Parker's only losses at home all season.

Andy Potter and Sammy Stinnett picked up wins at the bottom lineup spots, and Adam Malik and Richard Benson won at No. 1 doubles to clinch the win.

The victory remains UK's only win at Georgia.

1988: KENTUCKY 5, CLEMSON 2, NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS, ATHENS, GA.:

Kentucky was seeded No. 6 while Clemson was seeded No. 9 in this round of 16 matchup at the 1988 NCAA Championships.

The key victory for UK came at No. 5 as Willy Laban defeated John Sullivan after being down a set. The win put the Wildcats up 4-2. Other singles winners included Greg Van Emburgh, Richard Benson and Mario Rincon.

Kentucky's No. 1 doubles team of Van Emburgh and Benson rolled over Sullivan and Brian Page. The victory advanced UK to a round of eight showdown with eventual NCAA Champion Stanford.

KENTUCKY TENNIS

1994: KENTUCKY 4, DUKE 3 NATIONAL TEAM INDOOR, LOUISVILLE, KY.:

The Wildcats upset fifth-seeded and No. 5-ranked Duke one night after downing USC. The stars of the show were Kentucky's fourth, fifth, and sixth singles players.

Local stars Jason Yeager and Ford Lankford won at number four and five singles, and Mahyar Goodarz topped Peter Ayers at No. 2 singles to knot the score at 3-3.

Freshman Jason Thompson, playing at No. 6 singles, split tiebreakers with Hong Kond Davis Cupper Sven Koehler to send the match into a third and deciding set. Thompson and Koehler again went to a tiebreaker, with Thompson pulling out a 7-5 victory.

The victory moved UK into its second appearance in the final four at the National Indoor and catapulted the Wildcats to a No. 3 national ranking, the school's highest ever ranking.

1992: KENTUCKY 5, FLORIDA 0 NCAA ROUND OF 16, ATHENS, GA.:

Kentucky swept a strong Florida (No. 11) team in the NCAA Round of 16 in Athens, Ga. Sophomore Mahyar Goodarz, No. 2 singles, beat arch rival Bruce Haddad to lead the way. Other Kentucky winners included Scott Hulse, David Cully, Andy Potter, and Stephen Mather.

Florida had beaten UK in the final SEC regular season match, 5-4. The victory put Kentucky in the NCAA quarterfinals for the second time in school history.

1987: KENTUCKY 5, STANFORD 4, NATIONAL INDOOR LOUISVILLE, KY.:

Kentucky defeated defending national champion and sixth-ranked Stanford. The victory was clinched at No. 3 doubles by Steve Denney and Keith Cook. They did not lose a single point on serve after taking a 2-1 lead in the first set.

"Anytime you can beat the Cardinal its special. But, this was very special because it was our first victory over Stanford, and it was our first big win at the National Indoor in Louisville."

1992: KENTUCKY 7, PEPPERDINE 2 LEXINGTON, KY.:

Under the leadership of legendary coach Allen Fox, Pepperdine brought a No. 6 national ranking into Lexington for this February encounter. Pepperdine was coming off an upset victory over No. 1 UCLA.

Senior captain Scott Hulse keyed the victory by beating Howard Joffe at the No. 1 singles position. The win was significant because of the statement Hulse's play made about player development at UK. Hulse had walked-on at Kentucky and went on to earn All-American status.

1989: KENTUCKY 5, CAL-IRVINE 4 LEXINGTON, KY.:

Coach Greg Patton brought the No. 4-ranked Cal-Irvine Anteaters into the Boone Indoor Center for a pre-National Indoor test.

A crowd of nearly 1,000 people spurred Adam Malik to an upset victory of future pro star Mark Kaplan at No. 1 singles, and Richard Benson to a win over Trevor Kroneman.

"The crowd really helped me and hurt Kroneman," Benson said after the victory. One week later, Irvine reached the finals of the National Indoor and UK reached the semifinals. The combination of the semifinal berth and the victory over the Anteaters moved Kentucky up to a No. 3 national ranking.

1989: KENTUCKY 5, USC 4 LEXINGTON, KY.:

Kentucky defeated defending NCAA Champion Southern Cal with the help of No. 1 singles player Adam Malik's victory over future ATP star Byron Black in three sets. The victory was one of a 17-straight winning streak for Malik.

The victory was clinched in doubles by Willy Laban and Ian Skidmore. An 800 person crowd witnessed Kentucky's biggest victory ever at the Boone Indoor Center.

"To be a great program, you have to have someone step up their game to another level," Emery said. "Adam had one of the best runs we've ever had. We rode his broad shoulders in this match."

KENTUCKY TENNIS

Ten men have been named All-Americans a total of 18 times over the past nine years for the UK Wildcats tennis squad.

A program that prides itself in the strength of its doubles, UK's men's squad has produced doubles All-Americans seven of the past nine years. The latest entry was Mahyar Goodarz and Michael Hopkinson, who comprised the No. 2 seed at the 1993 NCAA Doubles Championships.

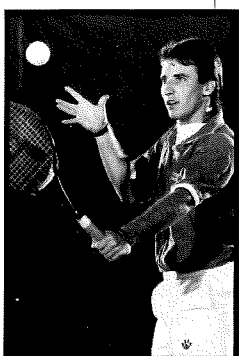
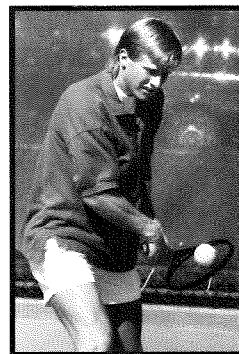
In 1992, Andy Potter and Scott Hulse earned All-America status after being seeded among the top eight doubles teams in the NCAA Championships. The UK tandem was 23-6 overall and played primarily at No. 2 for the Wildcats. They were members of the 1992 UK squad that went 24-5 and were SEC Champions as well as NCAA quarterfinalists.

UK's first doubles All-Americans were Greg Van Emburgh and Richard Benson in 1987. That UK tandem advanced to the semifinals at the men's NCAA tournaments and was awarded All-America honors for its achievement. Van Emburgh won singles honors that year and repeated his performance in 1988, earning both singles and doubles All-America status.

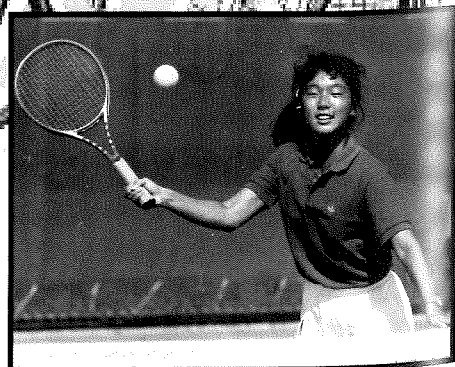
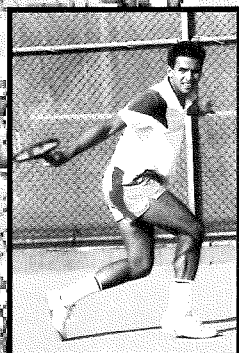
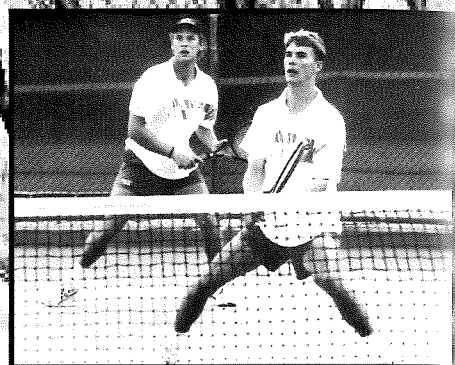
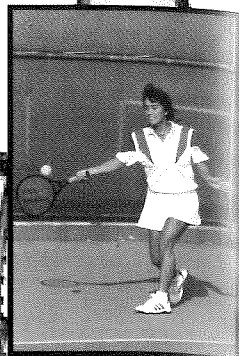
In 1989, Benson became the first player in UK history to receive All-America status three times, as he paired with Adam Malik in doubles to claim his prize. The Wildcats tandem compiled an 18-6 record, finishing the season ranked fourth nationally. They were also seeded fifth in doubles at the 1989 NCAA Championships. Malik, who turned pro after his junior year, was also named singles All-American after finishing the season 32-17 and capturing the SEC singles title.

In 1990, the successful doubles tradition continued. John Yancey and Ian Skidmore completed the season with a 14-12 record and a No. 9 ranking. The following year, the UK tandem completed a 25-12 slate and was seeded among the top eight duos at the NCAA championships, qualifying them for All-America honors for the second consecutive year.

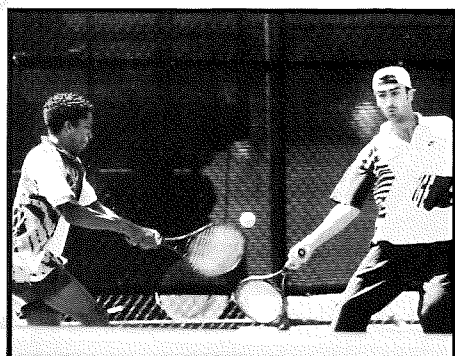
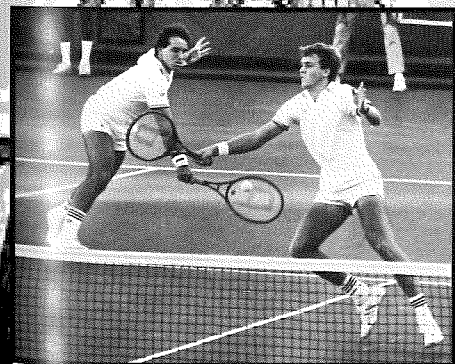
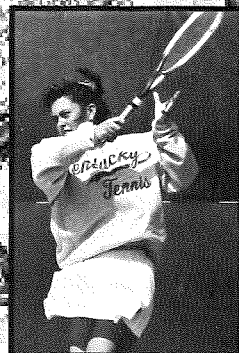
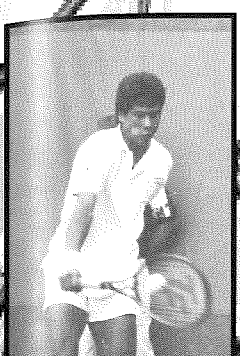

KENTUCKY TENNIS

Three individuals have earned All-America honors eight times, four as doubles All-Americans and three as singles All-Americans for the Kentucky women's tennis program.

In 1987, Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi were named doubles All-Americans after advancing to the quarterfinal round of the 1987 NCAA Women's Championship and finishing the season ranked No. 8 in the ITCA's Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings. Hahn was also an All-American in singles in 1987. After winning the SEC singles title at No. 1, Hahn led her Kentucky squad to a 21-7 finish and second place slot in the SEC. The UK team ended its year at the No. 13 spot nationally.

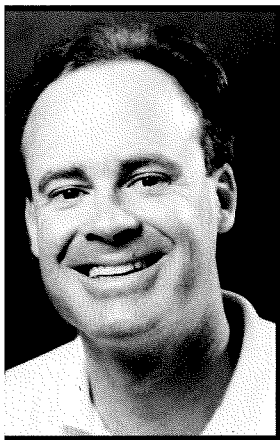
Hahn and Takagi claimed both singles and doubles honors in 1988 as they were among the top eight seeds at the NCAA tournament and finished the year in the top 10 in the rankings. The UK tandem had advanced to the finals of the Rolex National Indoor earlier in 1988 and won the SEC Indoor. As a squad, UK finished the season at 21-5, third in the SEC and sixth at the NCAA Championships.

Hahn, a three-time All-SEC performer (1986, 1987, 1988), finished 47-8 in 1987, while Takagi, from Tokyo, Japan, was an All-SEC performer for three consecutive seasons — 1985, 1986 and 1987.

In 1992, Susan Klingenberg, a product of Hampstead, Md., claimed All-America honors after being seeded among the top 16 players at the NCAA Women's Individual Tennis Championships at Stanford. Klingenberg, then a junior, was Kentucky's third female to gain All-America status. She finished the year ranked 22nd in the final ITCA Volvo Tennis Collegiate Rankings. She sat out most of her senior year with an injury to her hand.

All three Kentucky All-Americans are members of the UK Tennis Hall of Fame.

TRADITION-BUILDING WAS IN JOHN DINNEEN'S GAME PLAN WHEN HE BECAME THE COACH OF THE KENTUCKY WOMEN'S TENNIS SQUAD IN 1989. SO FAR, HE'S AHEAD OF THE GAME. IN SEVEN SEASONS AT THE HELM OF ONE OF THE NATION'S PREMIER PROGRAMS, DINNEEN HAS LED TEAMS TO THE NCAA TOURNAMENT FOUR TIMES, AS WELL AS GUIDING THE SQUAD INTO THE TOP HALF OF THE NATION'S TOUGHEST COLLEGIATE CONFERENCE.

Dinneen has directed three players to All-America status in his coaching career. In 1987 and 1988, Sonia Hahn and Tamaka Takagi were named doubles All-Americans and individually, both earned singles All-American (Hahn — 1987, 1988, and Takagi — 1988). In 1992, Susan Klingenberg was named singles All-American.

Dinneen, 35, served as assistant at California University (1986-87) and at his alma mater, Harvard, (1983-85). During his stint at California, Dinneen helped lead the Golden Bears to their finest season, winning the PAC-10

title, defeating national power Stanford twice, and finishing fourth in the final ITCA poll.

At Harvard, the Crimson were Ivy League champions, finished No. 1 in the East and had a season-ending top-20 ranking during Dinneen's tenure. Harvard also participated in the NCAA championships — a first for the school.

In addition to his full-time duties with the Kentucky women's squad, Dinneen has spent the last eight summers as a coach for the U.S. National Team. Director of Coaching Stan Smith, former Davis Cup, Wimbledon, and U.S. Champion, remarked, "John has been with us since the beginning and has provided much stability, expertise and continuity to the USTA Player Development program."

Dinneen's responsibilities have been geared towards working with the United States' most promising female players and his travels with the team have taken him to the Italian, French and U.S. Opens as well as to Wimbledon and other European and domestic Virginia Slims events. Among the professionals with whom he has worked are Jennifer Capriati, Meredith McGrath, Lindsay Davenport, Chanda Rubin, Carrie Cunningham and Ginger Helgeson, as well as current top American juniors Amanda Basica, Janet Lee, Stephanie Nickitas, Cristina Moros, and 1994 U.S. Open and National Champion, Melien Tu.

U.S. National Coach in charge of women's tennis Lynne Rolley says, "J.D. has been a right-hand man for me the last seven years. Our players

love working with him and there is little doubt that their results and improvement have reflected his hard work and commitment to our program."

Dinneen relishes the opportunity to work with top collegiate players at Kentucky and the future great pros from the U.S. National Team.

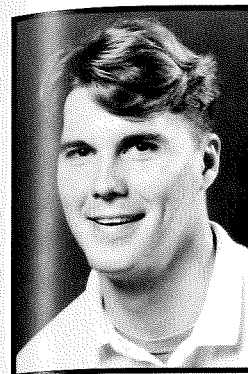
"The double duties are certainly time-consuming, but the rewards and experiences far-and-away exceed the demands on my time," he says. "I feel very fortunate to be able to work with both programs."

Dinneen, who has eight siblings, graduated from Harvard with a degree in Economics in 1983. He lettered in tennis and squash and was the Ivy League MVP and Harvard's team captain his senior season.

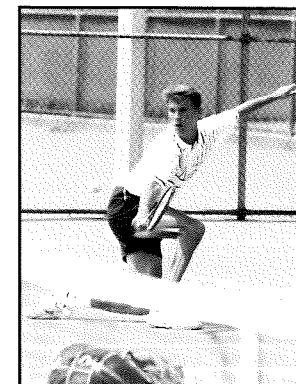

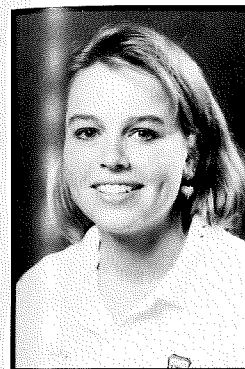
John Yancey, a former Kentucky player, begins his first season as a volunteer coach for the Kentucky women's team and his second year with the women's program.

"There's a lot of unpredictability in having so many newcomers, but youth is not a disadvantage in tennis," Dinneen said. "Tennis is not based on physical maturity like football or basketball. The freshmen can step in and play with the best in the country."

Because seven of the nine players are new to the program, Dinneen does not have a set line-up in mind. Whoever plays the best — even if it's a freshman — will win the No. 1 spot, he said.

"There is no hierarchy," Dinneen said. "Any player can take advantage of this. It will provide incentive and make for a very competitive program. By the time February rolls around, the line-up should be more clear. By April, it should be very clear."

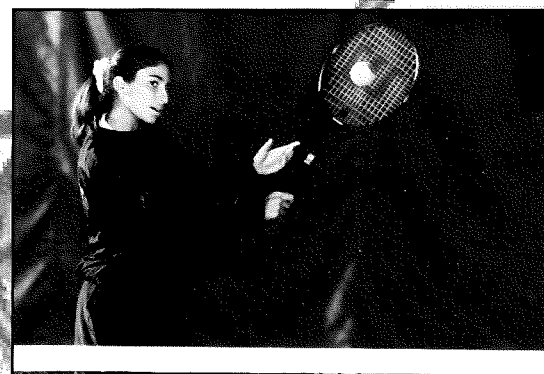

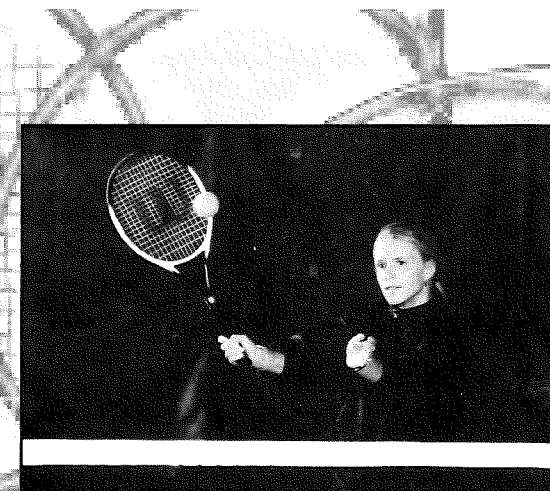

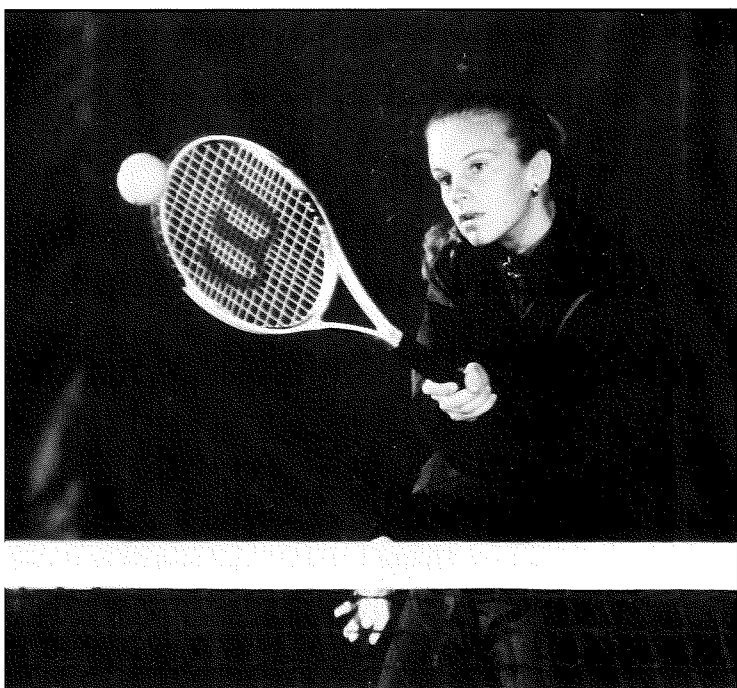

Allen, the team captain, will be counted on to show her leadership abilities on the court, off the court, and in the classroom. Dinneen describes Allen as a "tremendous" competitor.

"She has to step up her leadership this season without sacrificing her own game," Dinneen said. "Her record is not fantastic, but that has been due to her style of play. She'll round into form on the court this year and provide stability to the team."

After not playing her freshman season, Lyons stepped in to provide significant minutes last season. She overcame several nagging injuries to contribute, and Dinneen is expecting her to show vast improvement this season.

Two transfers bring collegiate experience to the group of newcomers. Courtney Roberts, who will be a junior, returns to collegiate tennis after a two-year absence. The Lexington native started her collegiate career at Auburn

Sophomore Kathy Herring comes to Kentucky after an outstanding freshman season at Indiana University. The left-hander was 25-9 last season, including an impressive 10-1 in Big Ten matches. She closed the season with an 11-match winning streak.

"She's a strong lefty; she'll add a great deal to the team," Dinneen said.

The rest of the squad will be made up of a talented and deep freshman class. Kelly Brown could make a significant contribution in both singles and doubles for the Wildcats. Brown, an aggressive, all-court type player, needs only to gain confidence that she can play at the collegiate level in order to help the team. She

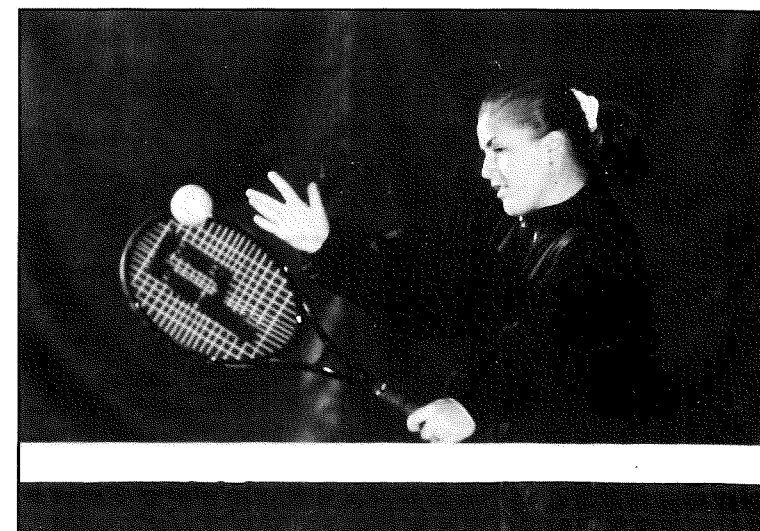
has already had a solid junior career, and Dinneen said her style of game sets up well for college tennis.

Massoumeh Emami is Kentucky's top freshman, according to record and national ranking. She had a very successful junior career making it to the quarterfinals at the National Indoor Championships in Detroit. Emami's strengths are her accuracy, her foot speed and her intelligence on the court. Although she is not a hard hitter, Dinneen said she will not be intimidated by college tennis.

Dinneen describes Caroline Kirk, a Lexington native, as a late-bloomer with a good ability to strike the ball. Although she does not have the national experience that the other freshmen have, Dinneen said she can hit the ball as well as anyone and has a big upside. Dinneen will concentrate on working with her conditioning and movement as the year progresses.

Andrea Nathan comes to the women's program out of Nick Bollettieri's Bradenton Tennis Academy. Dinneen describes Nathan as well-trained and

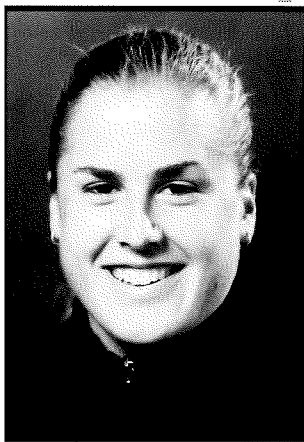

Sigurski, who was an outstanding soccer goalie and cross country runner in high school, will have the chance to develop her tennis game by playing tougher competition. Although the team is young, Dinneen is expecting good things to come quickly. The team will use the fall season to adjust to college tennis, and Dinneen said he hopes UK will be prepared to make a run at the upper third of the SEC by tournament time.

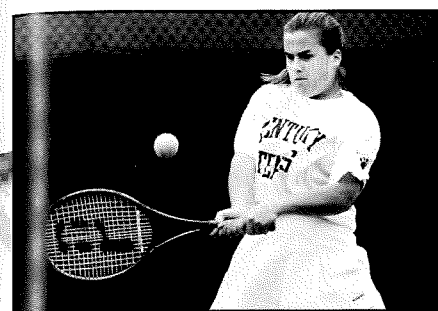
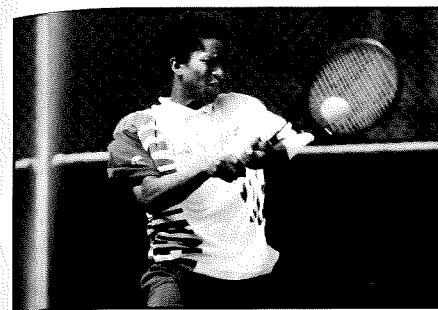


THE HILARY J. BOONE INDOOR TENNIS CENTER

The Boone Indoor Center was a gift from 1939 team captain Hilary Boone. The Center, which opened in January 1986, is equipped with 18 courts and has seating for 1,500 people. The Center is also the home of the Kentucky Tennis Hall of Fame and contains many trophies and pictures depicting Kentucky's

THE DR. W.H.H. DOWNING OUTDOOR TENNIS COMPLEX

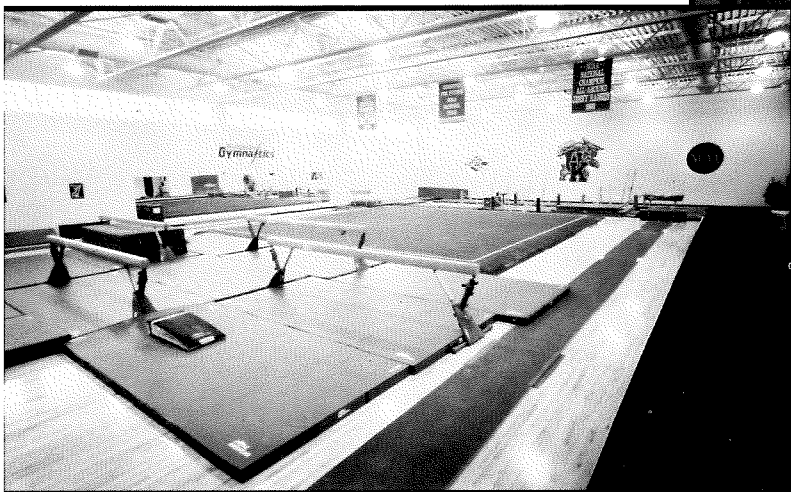
storing tradition. During the spring of 1989, the Indoor Center hosted the SEC Indoor Championships, the Hilary J. Boone Invitational (in which Southern Cal and Cal-Irvine participated) and the annual McDonald's Classic, which involved professionals Susan Sloane-Lundy, Kathy Rinaldi and JoAnne Russell, as well as several UK players.

"This Center has given us exactly what we need to compete on the national level," Wildcats coach Dennis Emery said. "Not only are our teams able to train as we want, but the building allows us to play night matches and attract crowds, something we couldn't do in the past."

The Wildcats' outdoor facility was named after the "father" of Kentucky tennis, Dr. Downing, who coached the UK men's team for 29 years, 1922-46 and 1952-57. He coached longer than any other UK coach, with the exception of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. Downing's record was 166-104-5 for a winning percentage of 61.3 percent.

The complex features 18 courts, including eight recently resurfaced varsity courts, with seating for more than 1,000 spectators. "We had the varsity courts resurfaced and they are in top condition," said Emery. "In 1993, we hosted the USTA Segment III professional tournament and it was a success. We're looking forward to hosting events in the future."

In 1993, renovations were finished as a complete weight room and lockerroom facilities were installed. A meeting room and office space were completed as well.



NUTTER FIELD HOUSE

The University of Kentucky Athletics Department has moved to the forefront in terms of indoor practice facilities. The multi-purpose Nutter Field House is an asset to both the University and the athletics department. Furthermore, the facility is a drawing point in recruiting for several sports.

The state-of-the-art field house was modeled after the standout facility at Kent. It includes a six-lane, 317-yard track (290 meters), areas for track and field events (high jump, pole vault, shot put), a full-size artificial turf football field, a computerized netting system that allows for several sports to practice at the same time, a gymnastics room with 9,000 square feet, lockerrooms and office space.

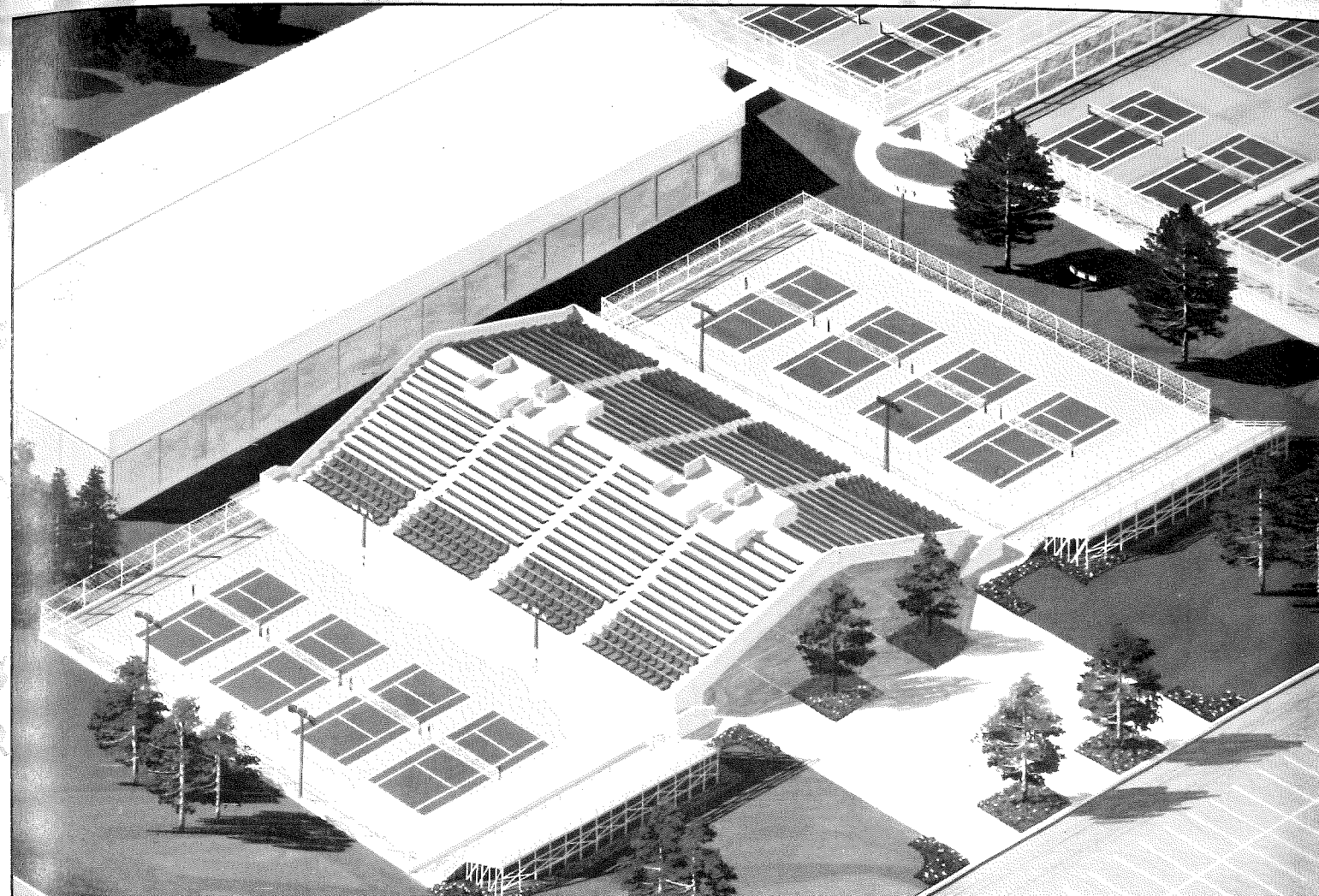
All UK athletes — as well as students, faculty and staff — have the opportunity to practice through hot, cold, and humid weather in a facility designed specifically for their events.

The facility is located in the southeast portion of the UK campus, adjacent to Commonwealth Stadium.

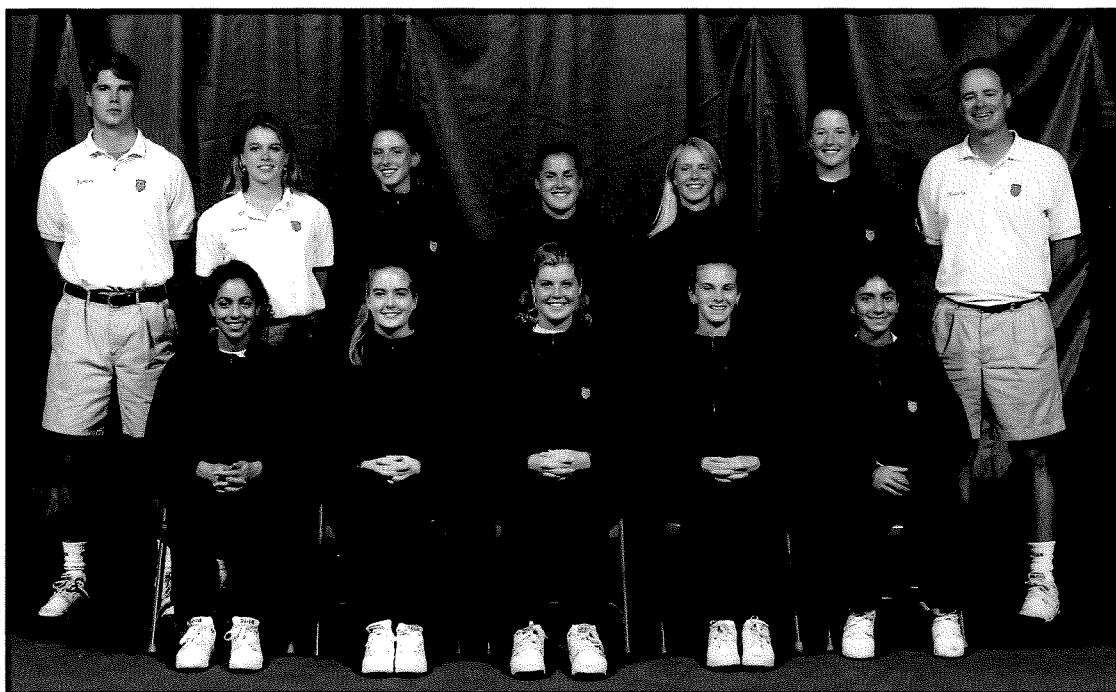


UK'S PROJECTED \$1 MILLION TENNIS STADIUM

Fundraising efforts are well underway for the proposed Hilary J. Boone Outdoor Tennis Stadium. As part of the varsity tennis complex, the \$1 million project will feature a 9,000-seat stadium and six hard courts. UK has generated funding for the project through private donations, as well as tennis exhibitions featuring professional tennis players Martina Navratilova and Jennifer Capriati (December 5, 1992) and Jim Courier and John McEnroe (Feb. 4, 1993). The proposed site for the stadium is adjacent to the existing Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center.

In addition to the exhibitions and individual private donations, the Ryan C. Holder Memorial Tennis Fund also has been started to raise money for the project. Holder, a 16-year-old Dunbar High School student, was killed in an automobile accident. Because of his love for the sport and his aspirations to play collegiate tennis, a group of friends began the memorial fund in hopes of raising \$425,000 to complete the funding for the stadium. When the stadium is completed, center court will be dedicated in Holder's memory.

The proposed stadium will complement the recently renovated Boone Indoor Center, the Nutter Field House and the Nutter Training Facility, all on UK's South Campus. The Boone Indoor Center has four hard courts, lockerroom facilities for men and women, a complete fitness and conditioning area, meeting room and tennis offices. Also located in the Boone Tennis Center is the UK Tennis Hall of Fame, where accomplished teams and individuals in UK tennis history have been honored.
