


FACILITIES

MILTON BRAGA



GARY CONELLY

After a successful 7-3 inaugural season as UK's head women's coach in 1991-92, Gary Conelly returns, this time taking over the reins of UK's men's swim team as well. Overall, this will be Conelly's fifth year associated with the Katfish. Prior to the '91-'92 season, Conelly served three years as Graduate Assistant Coach of UK's men's and women's teams. During that time, Conelly worked primarily with the sprint and middle distance freestylers, including Kellie Moran, UK's first ever female All-American and NCAA finalist.

Conelly came to Kentucky from the head coaching position with the West Florida Lightning Aquatics USS team in Largo, Fla. During seven years there, Conelly directed 150 swimmers and produced three Olympic trial qualifiers, one Senior Nationals finalist, four Senior Nationals qualifiers, two National Sports Festival team members, and one Sports Festival champion.

In 1987-88, Conelly became the first swim team coach at St. Petersburg Junior College. He took the men's and women's team to seventh-place finishes at the Junior College Nationals with two

swimmers earning All-America honors. He has coached at the Charleston Swim Association in South Carolina and was head coach of the Union Deportivo swim team in Las Palmos, Spain.

Conelly's swimming career accomplishments are numerous. At Indiana University, Conelly was an NCAA All-American 15 times (five individual, 10 relays). As a member of the 1972 U.S. Olympic Team, he was a participant of the world-record setting 400 meter freestyle relay team. Conelly, who is a member of the Indiana Swimming Hall of Fame, received the 1973 Balfour Award for excellence in swimming, leadership, and scholarship.

Conelly has an extensive knowledge of a total season plan and how to approach the taper-phase. He combines vast technical knowledge with a low key approach to get his points across to the team.

Conelly graduated from IU in 1973 with a Degree in English. While in college, he was named to the Dean's List seven times.

He is married to Kathleen Healey and has two children, Cody and Emily.

Milton Braga begins his second season as Head Diving Coach after serving two years as a UK assistant. Braga has great technical knowledge, particularly in dealing with body motion in the air, arm and head position, kickouts and entries.

Braga has coached tumbling, trampoline and gymnastics, and works with all divers on the trampoline and dryland boards. His extensive knowledge in plyrometrics has made UK's divers very strong contenders.

Prior to his arrival at Kentucky, Braga spent seven years as diving coach at the Woodlands Athletic Center in Woodlands, Texas. At the Woodlands, Braga developed several top age-group divers and National Junior Olympic divers while instructing gymnastics and tumbling as well. His success as a diving coach: was recognized when he was selected as the head coach for the 1988 U.S. Canamex Diving Meet.

A native of Rio De Janeiro, Braga represented Brazil in the diving competition at the 1976 and 1980 Olympic Games. Braga finished fifth in his specialty, the 10-meter platform, in 1980. He was

undefeated as the diving champion of South America from 1974 to 1980, winning 10 South American Championships and earning a spot on Brazil's World Championship Diving Team three times.

Braga graduated with a Degree in Physical Education and a minor in Physical Therapy from Rio De Janeiro State in 1978. He is currently working on his master's degree in Physical Education at UK. He is also a consultant to the Biodynamics Laboratory / Health, Phys. Ed. and Recreation Department at UK on all diving research with the diving tower force plate and high speed video taping. Braga served as the 1991 Regional Representative for U.S. Diving in Kentucky. He is also the head coach of Wildcat Diving, a U.S. Diving Club.

Braga is married to the former Amanda Hall. They enjoy soccer, running, and playing Trivial Pursuit games.

ASSISTANT COACHES



MARY ELLEN WYDAN Assistant Coach

The newest member of the Katfish coaching staff is Mary Ellen Wydan. Wydan has 10 years of collegiate swimming experience, including six years of NCAA Division I experience with both men's and women's teams.

Wydan came to Kentucky from the University of Maryland, where she was the assistant men's and women's swimming coach for the 1991-92 season. Wydan was in charge of recruiting, supervising and training approximately 50 swimmers, including the design and implementation of workouts specific to individual events. She also planned and coordinated team travel arrangements.

From 1987 to 1990, Wydan was the assistant at Purdue University, qualifying both men and women for the NCAA Division I Championships all four years, as well as the 1988 Olympic Trials. In 1989, the women's team was recognized for attaining the highest G.P.A. among Division I schools. She has also coached at Oakland University in Rochester, MI. and the University of North Carolina

in Chapel Hill. At Oakland she was head women's coach and was honored as Midwest Independent Coach of the Year in 1986. At UNC, where she was men's and women's assistant, the women's team finished third at the NCAA Championships in 1982.

Wydan is certified in the American Red Cross for Safety Training for Swim Coaches as well as the American Swimming Coaches Association where she is a member. She is also affiliated with United States Swimming, and College Swimming Coaches of America, Inc., where she was on the Board of Directors in 1986.

Wydan received her B.S. in Health and Physical Education in 1981 from the University of Delaware and her master's in Phys. Ed. from the University of North Carolina in 1989, specializing in Sports Administration.



PETE KNOX Assistant Coach

Pete Knox enters his first season as Assistant Coach after serving the last four as the Katfish Graduate Assistant. Often described as a vigorous and intense leader, Knox primarily works with the butterfly and backstroke swimmers. Knox brings his vocal approach and seemingly boundless energy to every practice and has the ability to get everyone fired up. He specializes in the ongoing weight training program with the Exercise Physiology and research background he has gained through past experiences.

Knox came to Kentucky from Brandon, Fla., where from 1980-1988 he coached the Brandon High School men's and women's swim teams. While at Brandon High, the team consistently placed in the top 10 of the Four-A Florida High School meet with its best finish being fourth place. Knox also developed two All- American high school swimmers and had several Junior and Senior National qualifiers. He was also an assistant coach with the Brandon Blue Wave USS Team from 1981-1988

and was selected Hillsborough County Coach of the Year in 1987.

A native of Norfolk, Va., Knox graduated with honors from the University of Florida in 1978 with a Degree in Health Education. He was an AAU and high school swimmer for eight years before he began studying Shotokan karate. In 1979, Knox earned his first degree blackbelt and his second degree in 1986.

Knox is currently working towards a master's degree in Exercise Physiology and Sports Medicine with a special emphasis directed towards the application to swimming and diving.

Besides practicing karate and coaching, Knox enjoys water skiing, hiking, swimming weight training, reading and participating in outdoor activities.

SUPPORT STAFF



WYNN PAUL Director of Aquatics

Wynn Paul has been a member of the UK staff for more than 23 years. He was named UK's men's coach in 1964 and assumed the duties of women's head coach in 1983 when it became a varsity sport at Kentucky. During his coaching tenure, Paul compiled an immpressive 135-61 dual meet record with the men's program, and a 48-30 mark with the women's program. Before the beginning of the 1991-92 season, Paul stepped down from his coaching position and was appointed Director of Aquatics.

Paul was also the men's varsity water polo coach at UK from 1965 to 1982. His water polo teams had an outstanding 140-66 record, including the 1977 Midwest Conference Championship, before the program was terminated in 1982.

Paul's success as a coach is a testament to his extensive involvement in all aspects of swimming. Paul has served as meet director for the Southeastern Conference Swimming and Diving

Championships, the Kentucky Special Olympics, the Kentucky State Championships and the Kentucky State USS Championships. He founded the Greater Lexington Swimming Association, which, under Paul's guidance, produced four national AAU senior long distance champions, eight AAU All-American senior swimmers, 28 nationally-ranked swimmers, 15 national AAU records, 25 Kentucky state high school champions and five college All-Americans. Paul, a 1962 graduate fo the University of Louisville, was captian of his U of L swim team. He was the Cardinals' high-point scorer for three years and holder of 12 varsity records. After graduating from U of L, Paul attended graduate school at UK, beginning what has been long, beneficial friendship for both Paul and the University. Had Coach Paul not come to Lexington, the Katfish would likely not be where they are today: on firm footing and headed in the right direction.

Paul is married to the former Helen Pennington, who teaches nursing at Eastern Kentucky University. Among their hobbies are traveling, flying model airplanes and restoring Corvettes.



Colonel Micki King Hogue Special Assistant to A.D.


Colonel Micki King Hogue, the 1972 springboard gold medalist, was named Special Assistant to the Athletics Director at the University of Kentucky on October 1, 1992. Her primary responsibilities include working with Assistant Athletics Director Kathy DeBoer in the area of individual and selected team sports, as well as and administrative liaison for UK's men's and women's swimming and diving teams.

Colonel Hogue was the commander of the University of Kentucky's AFROTC (Det 290) from July, 1989, through September, 1992, at which time she retired after 26 years of active Air Force duty. She is beginning her second two-year term as President of United States Diving, Inc., the national governing body responsible for Olympic diving in this country.

The native of Pontiac, Mich., graduated from the University of Michigan in 1966 where she was coached by five-time U.S. Olympic coach Dick Kimball. Under the tutelage of Kimball, Hogue competed in two Olympic Games, two Pan American Games, and won international diving honors in 15 countries. She is an inductee in five Hall of Fames, including the prestigious United States Olympic Hall of Fame.

During her first coaching stint at the Air Force Academy (1973-77) she became the first woman to coach a male to an NCAA championship (in any sport) and still holds that distinction today. She returned to the Academy in 1983 to become the Assistant Athletics Director, while once again, coaching. She was named NCAA Division II coach of the year three times and coached 11 All-Americans, including two women cadets who won three national titles between them. In 1988, she attended he third Olympics, this time as a staff member of the U.S. diving team in Seoul, Korea. She recently attended the '92 Games in Barcelona, Spain, as a diving representative of U.S. Diving.

Colonel Hogue and her husband, Jim Hogue, have two children, Michelle and Kevin.

1991-92 RECAP

With a newly organized swimming and diving program, few knew what to expect from the 1991-92 Katfish. Under the new arrangement, three head coaches tried their hand at guiding UK's swimmers and divers.

Jeff Bush, a former UK standout swimmer and longtime assistant coach, took over the men's program. Gary Conelly, also a former assistant, took over the women's program. And the divers were placed under the instruction of former South American champion, Milton Braga.

With only the Blue-White intrasquad meet under their belts, the Katfish dove immediately into tough SEC competition, opening the season against LSU Oct. 19 at Lancaster Aquatic Center. Both men's and women's team fell to the Tigers 152.20-91 (men) and 152-92 (women). but several UK swimmers delivered encouraging performances. For the men, freshman Andrew Aitken made quite a debut as a Wildcat. Aitken, a native of Scotland, won the 200-meter backstroke and placed second in 800-meter freestyle. Junior diver Jamie Smawley also made an impressive showing, finishing second in both the one-meter and three-meter diving. For the women, the most impressive performances came from two freshmen and a junior. Wendy Hipskind, a junior from Palmyra, Va., won both the 200 IM and 200 butterfly. Freshman Margo Lynch finished second in both the 800-meter and 400-meter freestyle, and Kellie Heath, also a freshman, won the 200-meter freestyle and finished second in the 100-meter freestyle.

The Katfish bounced back from the LSU loss with three straight wins for both the men and women. The first of these wins came over in-state rival Louisville 130-98 (men) and 141-77 (women) Oct. 25. The next came Oct. 30 over Transylvania 119-99 (men) and 142.5-78.5 (women), and the streak streched to three with UK's Nov. 1 win over Ohio. The men won 151-89 and the women narrowly triumphed 128-115.

With both the men and women sporting 3-1 records, the Katfish returned to SEC competition, this time against Florida and Tennessee in Knoxville, Tenn. The women, despite a couple of promising individual performances, lost to Tennessee 173-70 and to Florida 197-48. The men, who faced the Volunteers, lost 145-87.

Next for the Katfish was Southern Illinois in Carbondale, Ill. While the break from SEC competition brought relief for the women, it brought further frustration for the men who lost 133-102. The women, thanks to first-place efforts by Lynch, Hipskind, and divers Heather Pollard and Julie Robbins, came away with a 128.5-113.5 victory.

Having suffered two consecutive losses, the men got back on the winning track with a 128-115 win over Miami (Ohio) Nov. 22 in Lancaster Aquatic Center. Aiken, Maurice Stewart, Peter Gerard, Smawley and Andrew Cummings all turned in first-place finishes for UK in the meet.

The next stop for the Katfish was the Indiana-Purdue Inviational, which proved to be the high point of the season. With three winning individual performances from the men and 10 from the women, both UK teams came away from Indianapolis with first-place honors. For the women, Hipskind won four events.

Fresh off their impressive performances at the IU-Purdue meet, the Katfish carried 4-3 records and a renewed sense of confidence into their final dual meets of the season.

The men closed out their regular season with two consecutive wins. The first came Jan. 2 over Dennison in Orlando, Fla., 80-56 and the second on Jan. 17 over Cincinnati, 123-118, in Lancaster Aquatic Center. The women closed their regular season with an 82-47 win over Dennison, followed by two wins at home over Cincinnati, 135-98, and Vanderbilt, 135-92.

While the Katfish compiled respectable regular-season records of

6-3 (men) and 7-3 (women), they still faced a formidable task at the SEC Championships in Tuscaloosa, Ala. SEC schools boast some of the strongest swim programs in the nation. Facing some competition proved a bit out of the young UK teams' league. The men and women both finished ninth with 202 and 171 points, respectively. Hipskind once again provided a bright spot for UK, placing second in the 200 butterfly and fourth in the 100 butterfly. Her times of 2:16.50 (200 fly) and 1:02.82 (100 fly) were fast enough to qualify her for the Olympic Trials and NCAA Championships. While she failed to place at either competition,

Hipskind's 1991-92 performance bodes well for the '92-93 season.

Coach Braga's divers should also shine in 1992-93. During the 1991-92 campaign, six divers scored high enough in dual-meet competition to qualify for the NCAA Zone Meet, which serves as a qualifying step for the NCAA Championships. Sophomores Noel Pieratt, Michelle Parsons and Pollard, and juniors Julie Robbins, Ted Waldeyer and Jamie Smawley competed in the Zone Meet March 12-14 in Tallahassee, Fla. Although they failed to qualify for the NCAA Championships, the divers are expected to challenge for postseason honors again this season.



WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

1992-93 WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

The 1992-93 UK women's swimming team members have fire in their eyes — the fire of competition.

"They would like to move up at least two notches in the Southeastern Conference," said head coach Gary Conelly.

One aspect that will help in moving closer to this goal is the improvement of both the swimming and diving teams. "The diving team is going to be a huge asset to us, especially with the return of senior Julie Robbins."

Comparing this year's team to last season's, Conelly said that this year the team is "swimming way above last year's feats."

Conelly attributes this huge improvement to the group as a whole. "They are all doing real well and are already swimming a lot of lifetime bests."

Conelly said the season will be a year of growth and that the team wants to take it one goal at a time. "We need to end up at the end of the year feeling that we reached our potential. That is all I can ask for as a coach."

SPRINT FREESTYLE

Stacy Fingalson is coming off of a year with sickness and is now coming up with good swims, according to Conelly. A sophomore from Knoxville, Tenn., Fingalson will be the primary swimmer in sprints and could approach the team records.

Other good swims from sophomore Kelly Heath and seniors Jennifer McAnany and Wendy Hipskind will be factors in the success of this event. "Jennifer McAnany is the key," said Conelly, "If she can do her top races, we are going to have a real good showing at the SEC Championships."

Heath, who returns for her sophomore year, was the top finisher for the women in the 100 Free at last year's SEC's. She also set varsity long course records in the 50 Free (27.88), 100 Free (1:00.29), and the 200 Free (2:02.86).

MIDDLE FREESTYLE

The middle distance freestyle should be strong with Stacy Fingalson and Allison McAllen. Sophomore Margo Lynch returns after a strong freshman campaign. She placed in the top 16 at the SECs last year in the 400 Free as, well as setting long course records in the 400 Free (4:28.08) and the 800 Free (9:22.12). Only time will tell with McAllen, a Texas state finalist in the 500 Free the past three years.

DISTANCE FREESTYLE

"Allison McAllen has had to step up into the limelight," said Conelly. "She is

starting to adjust well and I think she's going to do real well because she is a very tough competitor, which makes her train hard."

Lynch, who placed in the top 16 in the 1500 Free at the SECs last year, has a year of experience under her belt and should move up in the SEC. Her third varsity long course record was in the 1500 Free (17:43.63).

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

The individual medley is stocked with experience that Conelly will look to for leadership in and out of the water. Seniors Wendy Hipskind and Margarat Boliver have proven their value to the team. With newcomer Betsy Powell, the event should be an exciting one. Hipskind, who holds varsity records in the short course 200 IM (2:04.37), and long course records in the 200 IM (2:22.19) 10 and the 400 IM (5:00.56), placed sixth at the SECs last year in the 200 IM and Boliver broke the top 15 in the 400 IM. "Wendy truly has the capability of being in the top four at the SEC Championships in February," Conelly said.

Hipskind placed sixth at the SECs last year in the 200 IM and Boliver was in the top 15 in the 400 IM.

BUTTERFLY

"The women's real strength is in the butterfly," Conelly said. Stacy Fingalson and Wendy Hipskind both finished in the top eight last year at the SEC Championships in the butterfly and both went on to qualify for the Olympic trials, with Hipskind qualifying for the NCAA's as well. Conelly said this will push Hipskind even further this year. "If nothing else drives her this year, that will," he said.

Hipskind, who placed second in the 200 Fly at last year's SECs, will be looking to win it this year. "But Stacy will be right with her," says Conelly.

Newcomer Courtney Waid gives a whole new dimension of flexibility in the 200, according to Conelly.

BACKSTROKE

The backstroke has "always been a fairly good event for us," Conelly said. Senior Margie Boliver holds not one, but two school records in the backstroke and is expected to surpass these results this season. Conelly also said that junior Jodi Schwab "seems to be more focused than ever before." This new outlook will also give her the chance to go under record times and to be in the top six at the SEC Championships.

Conelly is also optimistic about

freshman Randi Gerencser. Gerencser, who joined the team as a walk-on, has a lot of talent and is starting to develop.

BREASTSTROKE

The breaststroke is probably the weakest event for this year's team, according to Conelly. However, there is a bright spot in Tricia Zelin. Zelin, a sophomore from Valparison, Indiana, is adjusting well to a new system and might have a breakthrough this season. Conelly expects her "to break into the SEC Championships."

Betsy Powell and Kelly Heath will also be looked to in this event. Overall, Coach Conelly said the breaststroke is on the upswing, though still is the squad's weak event.

FREESTYLE RELAY

Any combination of Jennifer McAnany, Stacy Fingalson, Wendy Hipskind, Kelly Heath or Stephanie Thornburgh should give the women a fast team. Conelly says they all have a lot of flexibility and speed.

The success of this event will be determined by how well each girl develops. With Hipskind and Fingalson swimming in the Flys, much of what happens at the SECs will be determined by their stamina.

MEDLEY RELAY

This could prove to be a strong event for the women if, again, their stamina holds up. The final makeup of the SEC team will be determined later in the year based on the dual meet performances. With the combination of old and new, it should prove interesting for Conelly's girls.

DIVING

This could be one of the women's strongest points. Senior Julie Robbins and juniors Heather Pollard and Noel Pieratt will bring leadership necessary to groom a strong freshman class. Newcomers Tina Johnson, Michelle Rivera, and Jenny Baker makeup the future of the women in this event.

Johnson, the most touted of the freshmen, was a three-time Minnesota State Champion on the one-meter board. She will make an immediate impact and should turn some heads at the SECs. Much depends on her adjustment to college competiton, especially the tough SEC.

Robbins returns as the team's top scorer. With three years behind her, Robbins' experience will help her when it comes to the big meets. Her strongest event may not be witnessed until the SECs, when she steps on the platform. Last year she placed ninth in that event.

1992-93 MEN'S OUTLOOK

A season of change. A season of hope. A season of progress.

A season when the University of Kentucky men's swimmming team can prove to its tough competition that it belongs both as a team and as individuals.

"I want to see them swim their best races against other top teams in the Southeastern Conference," said Coach Gary Conelly. "I expect this team to do real well and we could see a lot of lifetime best performances."

High expectations have been set for the 1992-93 team. With only 10 experienced returners, there is no doubt that freshmen and transfer newcomers must add a big boost in order for Kentucky to turn competitors' heads, especially in the tough SEC. "We are in a very tough conference, but are still very competitive in the conference and nationally," Conelly said.

SPRINT FREESTYLE

Senior Maurice Stewart will take over as the team's top sprinter. After a good junior year, "Mo" will be expected to score high and often this year. He, along with newcomers Chris Carmicle and Chris McCabe will make up the bulk of sprint activities. Others to watch for will be freshman Chris Stephens and junior John Boyd, who will add the needed depth. Overall, this will be an event that will get better for the men as the year progresses.

MIDDLE FREESTYLE

"I think the middle freestyle will be a question of stepping up in distance races," said Coach Conelly. Conelly expects freshman Greg Robinson to fill the void left by Eddie Ware and Sean Weddell, but expects the biggest surprise to come from newcomer McCabe. McCabe, is a "real late bloomer, but by the time the SEC comes around should be able to be a real factor," the coach said.

Chad Cummins returns as the top swimmer in this category along with Andrew Aitken. Both should move up in the SECs.

DISTANCE FREESTYLE

Coach Conelly calls Brian Delisle "an incredibly hard worker in the water who is putting the pieces together." Delisle, a freshman from Ormond Beach, Florida, will be a major asset in the distance freestyle, along with

returners Steve Grimes, a junior from Cincinnati, and Cummins, a sophomore from Louisville.

Cummins, who holds the varsity long course record in the 1500 Free (16:24.11), placed in the top 15 last season at the SECs. Conelly is expecting him to improve tremendously due to his great work ethic.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

In the individual medley, Coach Conelly will look for leadership in junior college transfer Tom Moses. Another key role will be played by Michael Tucker, another Juco transfer. Grimes, is also expected to be a factor.

BUTTERFLY

MEN'S OUTLOOK

With the return of the best scorer in the butterfly from last season, Michael Collins, and the addition of Chris Carmicle, Coach Conelly is very hopeful for big results in the butterfly. Collins, just a sophomore, holds the varsity record in long course 200 Fly (2:06.31) and has great experience from last season. "Carmicle is just starting to blossom as a swimmer," Conelly says.

The men will also rely heavily upon Stewart, who holds the varsity record in both the short course (49.96) and long course (56.63) 100 Fly. He placed in the top ten last year at the SECs and with hard work, should improve.

BACKSTROKE

"Our real strength in backstroke is Andrew Aitken," Conelly said, "I think he is now starting to understand how to get out faster." Aitken, a sophomore from Cleveland, England, will be joined in the backstroke by Chris McCabe and Chris Stephens. Conelly said he expects Stephens to surprise a lot of people. But Aitken will carry most of the load. "I would certainly think that by the end of the year, he would be near the NCAA cuts," Conelly said.

BREASTSTROKE

Coach Conelly predicts that the breaststroke is going to be the most solid event this year. Michael Tucker, Tom Moses and Tanner Cork should carry the event and Conelly said he will not be surprised if records are broken.

Tucker, who hails from Sault Ste. Marie Ontario, Canada, was a member of the Canadian World Cup team and is the NJCAA national record holder in the 200 Breast.

FREESTYLE RELAY

The relays are lacking an emergence of sprinters. The 800 relay should be the strongest, with much depending on the development of the newcomers. Other than Stewart, there is no one with real relay experience. Aitken, who was a member of the 800 Free relay at the SECs last year, should help out again this year.

MEDLEY RELAY

Stewart and Aitken will prove to be the base of this event. With the addition of Tucker and Moses, as well as McCabe, this team will get only better as the season unfolds. If they swim up to their potential, they could surprise many people at this year's SECs.

DIVING

Jamie Smawley returns for his senior year and has high expectations of himself as well as the team. His fifth place on the one-meter board at last year's SECs was the best showing of any of the men in any event. He will be the "go to" guy in the big meets and should help the newcomers through the tough SEC season.

One of the newcomers is Tom Tretter. The freshman from St. Louis, Mo., placed second at the Missouri State Championships on the one meter. He also placed eighth on the one meter and 16th on the three meter at the Junior Nationals this past year. He will be expected to step in and take the place of Ted Waldeyer, who is no longer with the team.

Another diver to watch is senior Robert Taylor. Like the women's Julie Robbins, Taylor's best performance may not come until the SECs, when he dives from the platform. Last year he placed 12th, but the coaches expect a better performance this year.

Diving will be one of the stronger events of the year and should prove to be a major factor in the dual meets.

The University of Kentucky's Lancaster Aquatic Center, which opened March 29, 1989, with its diving tower being completed in October of 1990, represents the finest in collegiate swimming and diving facilities.

The natatorium is named for Harry C. Lancaster, former UK Athletics Director (1968-76) and assistant basketball coach (1946-70) to Kentucky's legendary Adolph Rupp.

The indoor facility is 25 yards by 175 feet with a movable bulkhead which can be set at 25 yards, 25 meters, 50 yards, and 50 meters. The movable bulkhead allows the facility to be used for a number of activities other than swim meets and practices, including recreational swimming, classwork, swimming and diving lessons, SCUBA instruction, handicapped swimming, and other aquatic-related activities.

Racing lanes can be set up in any of five configurations: across-the-pool racing (25 yard short course for NCAA's or USS) and length-of-pool racing at 25 yards, 25 meters, 50 yards, and 50 meters. Two 25-yard courses can be utilized simultaneously for large swim meets. Eighteen swimming lanes are available while diving events are in progress. Long-course racing will have eight full-size lanes for the 50-meter distance.

The swimming pool, which holds 1,025,000 gallons of water, has a

raised deck gutter with a large overflow. This gutter design is simular to the Indianapolis Natatorium design. Pool depth varies from 4.3 feet to 6.5 at the shallow end with movable floor. Water under the diving boards and tower is 17 feet deep. Built-in wiring for both long and short courses will accomodate automatic timing and scoreboard display.

The diving facilities are among the best in the world. The facility has two one-meter boards and two three-meter boards, set on concrete platforms. The diving tower features one, five, 7.5, and 10 meter platforms. Each platform is eight feet wide with lengths from 23(1m) to 28 feet(10m). Winner of the 1990 Association of General Contractors Award for Structures, the tower also has the only operating "force plate" in the world on the 10-meter level. This electronically measures the force exerted by the divers as they leave the platform. The University and U.S. Diving Inc. conduct research utilizing the force plate.

There is a 40-foot dry land diving area permanently set up with a trampoline, Portapit diving board and a diving/tumbling harness with somersaulting and twisting belts. There is also a gymnastics facility adjacent to Lancaster Aquatic Center with all collegiate equipment for use by the divers.

The Aquatic Center has a full training room equipped with two treatment tables, EGS and ultrasound machine, hydrocollater, ice machine, and stationary bikes. There is a graduate assistant trainer on duty at all times during practices.

The Aquatic Center has a large weight room for the swimmers and divers equipped with several Cybex weight training machines, as well as free weights and other weight training machines specifically designed for swimming and diving. In the adjacent Seaton Physical Education building are exercise physiology labs which will be utilized for the testing of swimmers.

The second level balcony of the Aquatic Center accommodates up to 750 specatators, as well as a concession stand.

The Aquatic Center annually hosts the premier swimming and diving events in the state of Kentucky, including all UK home dual meets, the Kentucky State High School championships, the Kentucky USS championships, the Blugrass Games Diving, Kentucky Special Olympics, and the Kentucky Masters Championships. Other highlights were the World Games Diving Team Trials in November of 89 as well as the U.S. Diving Senior Nationals pre-qual meet this past summer.

For that reason, the University of Kentucky opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is known as the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services or simply "CATS."

CATS is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a large general study area along with numerous smaller rooms used for tutoring. CATS expanded during the past academic year and added a language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

Currently, the UKAA budgets close to \$500,000 per year for the CATS Center.

"Academically," says UK Basketball Coach Rick Pitino, "we hope to make our players overachieve in the classroom the same way they do on the basketball court, so that if they don't make it in the NBA, they can leave their college life with the beginning of a great career. That's why we believe CATS is so important to our program."

While Pitino's views on academics are echoed throughout the athletics department, former UK Football Coach Jerry Claiborne put the importance of the CATS Center in perspective when he said:

"There's no question, the CATS Center is a very important part of not only the UK football program, but the entire UK athletics program. Academic pursuits come first at Kentucky."

Indeed, academics do come first. The combination of the CATS Center and Claiborne, who retired after the 1989 football season and has since been replaced by Bill Curry, brought a national championship to UK in 1989. The UK football program was awarded the 1989 College Football Association's Academic Achievement Award for the nation's highest graduation rate for its 1983 freshman class. UK's achievement marked the first time since the inception of the award that a team other than Duke, Virginia or Notre Dame had won the award.

The significance has not been lost on Coach Curry.


"Our CATS Center is one of the best academic services in the land and that's based on results. For Kentucky to be up there with Duke and Virginia and Notre Dame is a real tribute to first, the student-athletes, but also to our academic support staff headed by Bob Bradley."

Bradley, Assistant Athletics Director for Academics, supervises the CATS Center. Bradley is assisted by Barbara Deniston, Director of Student Development, and Mike Jenkins, Academic Counselor. The CATS Center also employs four graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and surrounding community.

"CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete over another without an academic center," Bradley says. "This is a medium which the student-athlete can get any question about his or her academic endeavors answered." Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics. "Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job at helping their student-athletes," Bradley said. "I have been blessed at Kentucky."



The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has classified UK as a "Research University of the First Class," the only such institution in Kentucky and one of only 45 in the nation.

Thanks to a \$4.9 million gift from the IBM Corporation, UK continues its role as one of

the leading computing universities in the nation. The fit helped UK upgrade its IBM Supercomputer that is now being used at UK by both faculty and students. UK ranks in the top tier of public universities in the nation in computing capacity.

UK FACULTY WIN AWARDS AND HONORS IN MANY FIELDS

Some examples: GUY DAVENPORT, English, was a 1990 recipient of the prestigious MacArthur Fellowship. JOHN N. WALTER, Agricultural Engineering, is president of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. CARY CROMWELL, Animal Science is president of the American Society of Animal Science. JOHN R. VAN NAGELL, Obstetrics and Gynecology, was selected as one of the outstanding medical specialists in the country by Town and Country magazine. LINDA CHEN, Nutrition and Food Science. won the Borden Award for exceptional research in nutrition. RAMONA RUSH, Communications, was named the outstanding woman in the field by the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication's status of women

UK FACULTY BRING \$70 MILLION IN GRANTS, CONTRACTS AND **GIFTS**

UK faculty brought in some \$70 million in grants, contracts and gifts from outside sources in the 1989-90 academic year. The record amount was 17% greater than the year before and marked a 70% increase in the past five years. As further indication of UK's faculty expertise, 98% of them have the highest degree attainable in their fields.

UK STUDENTS WIN MANY PRESTIGIOUS AWARDS AND **HONORS**

The debate team took second-place in the nation's largest invitational collegiate debate tournament in 1990. For three years in a row, the College of Law moot court team has been in the national finals of the intercollegiate moot court competition. A UK nursing student was one of 121 U.S. collegians chosen for the USA Today All-USA College Academic Team. UK's cheerleaders squad captured its fourth national championship in 1991 - most in the nation. UK was national champion in 1985, '87, '88 and '91. The UK yearbook won first place nationally in competitions sponsored by the Associated Collegiate Press and the National Scholastic Press Association. UK's student newspaper received the All-America honor rating five marks of distinction, placing it in the top third of the nation's best student newspapers. The UK Jazz Ensemble was voted most outstanding among 14 student combos or big bands invited to perform at the Notre Dame College Jazz Festival, the most prestigious event of its kind in the nation.

ADMINISTRATION



CHARLES T. WETHINGTON **PRESIDENT**

Charles T. Wethington Jr. was named the University of

Kentucky's 10th president on September 18, 1990 after serving as interim president for nine months. Prior to assuming the post, he served as Chancellor of the UK Community College System since 1982.

Wethington began his career in higher education in 1965 as an educational psychology instructor on the Lexington campus of the University and entered administration two years later when he was named director of Maysville Community College. In 1971 he moved to the system office in Lexington as assistant vice president, and became vice president of the Community College System in 1981.

In the University reorganization of 1982 he was named chancellor of the UK system, one of the three major sectors of UK.

Under his leadership the Community College System has set enrollment records and added an entire new college at Owenshoro.

Wethington earned his master's and doctorate degrees at UK after completing his undergraduate work at Eastern Kentucky University.

The Casey County native has been active on the national higher education scene, serving as legislation committee chairman of the National Council of State Directors of Community and Junior Colleges before moving to the chairmanship in 1985.

He has been vice chairman of the Executive Council of the Southern Association of College and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and was a member of the search committee for the executive director of the Commission.

Wethington, born Jan. 2, 1936, in Merrimac, Ky., is married to the former Judy Woodrow, a Danville native. They have a son, Kennan, 22, and a daughter, Lisa, 25.



C.M. NEWTON DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

When Charles Martin (C.M.) Newton became the University of

Kentucky's seventh Director of Athletics on April 1, 1989, he hit the ground running.

Newton's first order of business was to bring respectability back to a basketball program hit hard by an NCAA investigation. He did so by hiring New York Knickerbockers head man Rick Pitino to coach the Wildcats. A few months later, Newton was faced with the task of hiring a football coach to replace the retiring Jerry Claiborne. Newton again rose to the occasion, luring Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year Bill Curry from the University of Alabama to lead the UK program.

Newton recently scored once again with the UK fans when it was announced that UK's football and basketball games will once again be carried on Louisville's clear-channel, 50,000-watt WHAS Radio. for the first time since 1986.

After little more than a year on the job, Newton has become one of the most popular public figures in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In addition to a lengthy, impressive list of credentials, Newton brought to Kentucky a sparkling reputation at a crucial time in the history of UK Athletics. In accepting the position at his alma mater, Newton summarized his goals and objectives by saying, "I have a resolve to try very hard to continue that great tradition, and at the same time, to totally do it within the NCAA and SEC rules and not sacrifice the academic integrity of this University."

Newton capped an illustrious basketball coaching career by leading his final Vanderbilt University team to a 19-14 record, a second-place SEC finish and its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance during the 1988-89 season. He was named SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and also received the Kodak NABC District IV Coach of the Year award. Newton served as head basketball coach and associate athletics director at the Nashville school since 1982, compiling a 129-115 record. In 32

years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama and Vanderbilt, Newton compiled a 509-375 record overall, ranking among the top 10 active coaches in the game in terms of total victories.

Perhaps more impressive, however, was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team, over 50 percent more than any other league school.

Newton is highly regarded on the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He also worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chairman of that elite group for five of those years.

Newton began his coaching career at Transylvania College (now Transylvania University) in Lexington. Recommended for the job by Coach Rupp, Newton guided Transy to a 169-137 record in his 12 years at the helm.

In 1969, once again with the backing of Rupp, Newton answered a call from Paul "Bear" Bryant to take on the challenge of building the downtrodden Alabama basketball program. During his 12-year tenure. Newton orchestrated a complete turnaround in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortunes, compiling a sparkling 211-123 record.

In addition to three SEC championships, Newton guided the Tide to two trips to the NCAA Tournament and four berths in the NIT.

With few horizons left to conquer at Alabama, Newton resigned at the end of the 1980 season to accept a job as assistant commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. A year later, when Vanderbilt athletics director Roy Kramer was searching for a coach of national stature to head the Commodores basketball program, Newton was the obvious man for the job.

Newton is married to the former Evelyn Davis of Ft. Lauderdale. The Newtons have three grown children daughters Deborah and Mrs. Tracy Thompson and son Martin.

Movie theaters, international restaurants, coffee-houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, thoroughbred and harness racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds, and streams, and the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park, all in easy distance of the UK campus, are just a few attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.

A recent statewide poll indicated that the Lexington area is the most popular place to live, work and play in Kentucky, and it's an area most residents would not seriously consider leaving. Lexington, Kentucky — one beauty of a city.

If asked to describe Kentucky, the first word to come to mind would probably


