FIRST ROAD TRIP TAKES KENTUCKY TO COWBELL COUNTRY

Kentucky hits the road for the first time this season, traveling to Mississippi State on Saturday looking to get back on track. The game is set for a 4 p.m. ET kickoff and will air on the SEC Network.

The Wildcats are coming off a tough loss to No. 9 Florida, leading for much of the game before the Gators mounted a fourth quarter rally and survived after UK missed a potential game-winning field goal in the final minute. The defeat ending a five-game winning streak for UK.

The trip to Starkville will be headlined by quarterback Sawyer Smith, who was mostly excellent in his first start for the Cats last weekend, throwing for 267 yards and two touchdowns while routinely making strong throws to his stable of receivers. The Cats also continue to run the ball effectively behind a veteran, talented offensive line.

A defense looking for new stars to emerge after the departure of Josh Allen and the entire secondary has been solid as it incorporates a youth movement. The front seven has been very good against the run and kept Florida's speed in check despite a long scoring run in the closing seconds.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky is 2-1 on the season and 0-1 in SEC play, dispatching of a pair of Mid-American Conference foes that included Western Division preseason favorite Toledo, as well as Eastern Michigan, before falling to No. 9 Florida last Saturday.
- The Cats now are 12-4 over their past 16 games. The .750 winning percentage is the fifth-best in the SEC since the start of the 2018 season, behind Alabama, Georgia, Florida and LSU.
- This is coach Mark Stoops' seventh season in Lexington and the Wildcats have either matched or exceeded the previous season's win total in each of the past six seasons, making them the only program in FBS to accomplish that feat.
- Stoops' "recruit and develop" mentality culminated in 2018 with a 10-3 record, UK's best season in 41 years and only the third 10-win season in school history.
- UK's 5-3 SEC record also was the team's first winning league mark since 1977. The Cats finished second in the SEC Eastern Division.
- UK has posted winning records in away games (3-2; does not include neutral sites) each of the last two seasons, the first time that has been accomplished since 1952 and '53.
- UK has allowed 24 points or less in 15 of its last 17 games. That is the best such stretch since October 14, 1978 to Sept. 6, 1980. UK allowed 24 points or less in 18 of 19 games in that stretch.
- UK has scored at least 38 points in a game in every season since 1997.
- UK has made 124 consecutive extra points, the eighth-longest active streak in the nation.
- UK scored 38 points in each of the first two games, first time that has happened since 2007.
- The UK offense already has delivered four scoring drives of at least 90 yards this season. UK has already matched the team total of four 90+ yard scoring drives from last season.
- WR Lynn Bowden Jr. reached 1,000 career receiving yards in the season opener and 100 career receptions last Saturday vs. Florida.
- Bowden currently ranks second in the SEC with 6.7 catches per game.
- Junior punter Max Duffy has been sensational, leading FBS in punting at 51.2 yards per kick.
- What production returns for the 2019 season? Forty-one letterwinners are back, including 10 starters: Logan Stenberg (LG), Drake Jackson (C), Lynn Bowden Jr. (WR), Terry Wilson (QB), Calvin Taylor Jr. (DE), Quinton Bohanna (NG), Jamar "Boogie Watson (SLB), Kash Daniel (MLB), Blake Best (SNAP) and Max Duffy (P). The Cats also welcome the return of junior offensive tackle Landon Young who missed the 2018 season with a knee injury and sophomore defensive end Joshua Paschal who has been battling melanoma and only saw limited action in the final three games last season. Young played in all 13 games as a sophomore, starting in six at left tackle.
- In addition, 20 redshirt freshmen, 18 true freshmen, three junior college transfers and a transfer from Florida State are primed and ready to make their mark in 2019.

- Junior transfer quarterback Sawyer Smith made his first start for UK vs. Florida after transferring from Troy over the summer as a graduate transfer. He passed for 267 yards and two scores.
Smith entered the Eastern Michigan game for an injured Terry Wilson in the third quarter and connected with Ahmad Wagner for a 54-yard scoring strike on his first pass attempt as a Wildcat.
Wagner ranks 21st nationally in yards per catch at 22.0 per reception.
Senior defensive lineman T.J. Carter was flagged for targeting in the second half of the Florida game and by rule must sit out the first half of this week's game at Mississippi State.
The pregame Catwalk presented by Chevy had a new addition this year. A partnership between Kentucky Children's Hospital, Kentucky College of Engineering and Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky created a new and specially built pushcart vehicle that will provide a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field.
UK's five 2019 NFL draft picks (Allen, Lonnie Johnson Jr., Mike Edwards, Snell, George Asafo-Adjei) were the most since eight players (James Ramsey, Jim Kovach, Kelly Kirchbaum, Rod Stewart, Bob Winkel, Robert Hawkins, Dan Fowler and David Stephens) were chosen in 1979.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

- One of the hallmarks of the last two seasons under Coach Mark Stoops has been the team's ability to win on the road.
In each of the past two seasons, Kentucky has posted a 3-2 record in away games at the opponent stadium (does not include neutral site games). Not including neutral site games, it is the first time UK had a winning away record in consecutive years since 1952 and 1953, when the Wildcats went 3-2-1 and 2-1-1, respectively, in those two seasons.
Kentucky also has a chance to make a bit of history this week at Mississippi State. If the Wildcats can win, it would be the third straight season that UK has won its away opener, also 2017 at Southern Mississippi and 2018 at Florida. Not including neutral site games, the last time UK won its away openers in three straight years was 1940-42 with triumphs at Xavier in 1940, at Washington and Lee in 1941, and at Xavier in '42.

SCOUTING MISSISSIPPI STATE

- Mississippi State coach Joe Moorhead is in his second season at Mississippi State.
The Bulldogs are 2-1 on the season and 10-6 during Moorhead's time as head coach.
Moorhead won 38 games in four seasons as a head coach at Fordham, leading the Rams to their first winning season in five years and FCS playoff berths each of his final three seasons.
More than half of the Mississippi State roster is homegrown.
The Bulldogs suffered their first loss of the season last week, dropping a 31-24 decision to Kansas State in Starkville in a tightly contested affair.
The Bulldogs held K-State to just 269 total offensive yards and significantly outgained them but a 100-yard kickoff return for a score tied the game in the fourth quarter and helped allow the Wildcats to escape with a win.
Starting QB Tommy Stevens had to leave the game and freshman Garrett Shrader entered, rushing for 82 yards and a score on 10 carries. He completed 4-of-12 passes for 51 yards.
Running back Kylin Hill has churned out 431 rushing yards and six touchdowns through three games. He leads the SEC by a wide margin with 143.7 yards per game on the ground, 30 more than the next best average in the conference.
Receiver Osirus Mitchell leads the Bulldogs with 13 receptions for 208 yards and three scores.
State is averaging 224.0 yards rushing on the season.
Safety Brian Cole II has been excellent in pressuring the football, leading State with 5.5 tackles for loss and two sacks.
The Bulldogs have forced 10 turnovers (three INT, seven fumbles) in three games.

SERIES VS. MISSISSIPPI STATE

- The all-time series is tied at 23 victories apiece.
The Cats have won two of the past three meetings after a seven-game losing streak in the series.
Mississippi State leads 14-7 in games played in Starkville, including the last four dating to 2010.
Kentucky won 28-7 in Lexington last season.
It was UK's first win over a ranked Mississippi State team since 1953.
UK coach Mark Stoops is 2-4 vs. the Bulldogs during his tenure.
The teams met for the first time in 1914 and have squared off each of the past 29 seasons.
Mississippi State is UK's permanent crossover foe from the SEC West.
The Wildcats won eight straight matchups from 1958 to 1990.
Only two of the previous eight meetings have been decided by a touchdown or less with the average margin of victory being 16.5 points.
In last season's win, UK rushed for 229 yards and four scores while holding Mississippi State to 56 yards on the ground. Benny Snell Jr. rang up 165 yards and all four rushing touchdowns on 25 carries, while A.J. Rose added 47 yards and nine attempts.
Linebacker Boogie Watson and defensive end Calvin Taylor Jr. each had a sack in the game.

KENTUCKY-MISSISSIPPI STATE CONNECTIONS

- Kentucky has one player from the state of Mississippi: CB Brandin Echols of Southaven.
- Mississippi State does not have a player on its roster from Kentucky.
- Mississippi State cornerbacks coach Terrell Buckley was on the Florida State staff at the same time as Mark Stoops, serving a role with the weight room staff in 2010 and 2011.
- MSU athletics director John Cohen was the head baseball coach at Kentucky from 2004-08.

A UK WIN WOULD...

- Give the Wildcats their second-straight win over the Bulldogs and three wins in the past four years over their permanent SEC West rival.
- Be the Cats' first win in Starkville since 2008, a 14-13 victory.
- Make UK 6-4 in its past ten SEC games.
- Push the Cats' record over the last 17 games to 13-4.
- Improve UK's record in August and September over the past six seasons to 20-6.
- Give UK its third-straight win in its first away game of the season. The last time UK won three straight away game openers (not including neutral sites) was 1940-42.

LAST SATURDAY

- UK suffered a heartbreaking 29-21 defeat to No. 9 Florida to fall to 2-1 overall this season and 0-1 in Southeastern Conference play.
- The Cats were outscored 19-0 in the fourth quarter, an uncharacteristic turn of events for a team that entered the game 23-2 in the Mark Stoops era when holding a third quarter lead.
- A pivotal targeting call on UK defensive lineman T.J. Carter extended Florida's go-ahead scoring drive in the fourth quarter. Carter will miss the first half of this week's game as a result.
- A look at the box score belied the final score as UK had more first downs, more rushing yards, nine minutes more time of possession and converted 53 percent of third down attempts.
- Florida came into the game with the nation's best pass rush yet were only able to muster one sack and three tackles for loss against UK's veteran offensive line.
- Junior quarterback Sawyer Smith made his first start at Kentucky. He went 23-of-35 for 267 yards and two touchdowns. Smith did throw three interceptions, although one was a desperation Hail Mary on the game's final play.
- Smith completed his first nine passes of the game before his first incomplection with 1:59 remaining in the second quarter.
- He is the second UK quarterback since 1993 with two passing touchdowns and a rushing touchdown in his first career start. The other to accomplish that was Jared Lorenzen vs. Louisville in 2000.
- His 267 passing yards are the most for a UK quarterback in his first career start since Patrick Towles vs. UT Martin in 2014 (377).
- Junior athlete Lynn Bowden Jr. caught seven passes for 70 yards.
- Bowden now has 104 catches in his career, becoming the 17th player in Kentucky history with at least 100 receptions in his career.
- He has 1,156 career receiving yards, moving past Dorian Baker for 25th place on the UK career receiving yardage list.
- He is the first UK player with at least six receptions in each of the first three games since James Whalen in 1999 and has caught a pass in 17 consecutive games.
- Bowden is the third quickest to 100 career receptions in terms of games played (29 games). Anthony White accomplished the feat in 21 games and Derek Abney did it in 22 games.
- Senior wide receiver Ahmad Wagner caught three passes for 70 yards and a touchdown.

MILESTONES TO WATCH

- Junior WR Lynn Bowden Jr. has 104 career receptions and is the 17th Wildcat player to catch at least 100 passes in his career. Bowden became the 30th player in school history to reach 1,000 career receiving in the season opener...

- Redshirt freshman running back Kavosiey Smoke rushed a game-high 16 times for 81 yards. Junior running back A.J. Rose rushed 14 times for 46 yards. Senior tight end Justin Rigg had five receptions for 50 yards, both career highs.

PASCHAL BATTLED CANCER, RETURNS TO THE FIELD; NOMINATED FOR MAYO CLINIC COMEBACK PLAYER OF THE YEAR

- In July of 2018, defensive lineman Josh Paschal was diagnosed with malignant melanoma on the bottom of his right foot. He underwent three surgeries, and followed that by ongoing monthly immunotherapy treatments. His final treatment was Aug. 7, 2019. In an extremely emotional moment for everyone associated with Kentucky football, Paschal returned to action against Middle Tennessee on Nov. 17, 2018.

WILSON OUT FOR SEASON

- Junior quarterback Terry Wilson will miss the remainder of the 2019 season because of a torn patellar tendon in his left knee that will require surgery. Wilson was injured late in the third quarter of UK's win over Eastern Michigan. In two games this season, Wilson completed 33 of 52 passes (63.5 percent) for 360 yards and two touchdowns.

PETERS GRANTED ELIGIBILITY

- Outside linebacker Xavier Peters was granted immediate eligibility last week for the 2019 season after transferring into the program this summer. He will have four seasons of eligibility remaining.

- The 6-foot-4, 235-pounder from Middletown, Ohio redshirted the 2018 season while at Florida State, appearing in two games but preserving his season of eligibility under NCAA rules. He recorded a solo tackle and pass breakup in a win over Wake Forest and also saw action against eventual national champion Clemson.
- Peters was a consensus four-star prospect in the class of 2018 and ranked as the No. 5 overall prospect in the talent-rich state of Ohio. He also was the No. 15 outside linebacker in the nation according to 247Sports and honored as an Under Armour All-American.

YOUNG NAMED TO ALLSTATE AFCA NATIONAL GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Junior offensive tackle has been selected to the 2019 Allstate AFCA (American Football Coaches Association) Good Works Team®, an annual award given to college football players for the impact they make off the field. His one of just 11 players from the FBS named to the team.
- His numerous community service projects include volunteering at a local nursing home, speaking to youth organizations, volunteering at Habitat for Humanity and traveling to Ethiopia for a one-week service trip to help the people of Addis Abab and Korah

OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

- “Balance” has been the hallmark of the Kentucky offense under Eddie Gran, UK assistant head coach for offense. The Wildcats have totaled more than 2,000 rushing yards and 2,000 passing yards in all three seasons that Gran has been here. Prior to Gran’s arrival, this had been accomplished in only two seasons total in school history.
- The Cats have averaged at least 25.5 points per game in all three seasons, only the third time in school history UK averaged at least 25.5 in three straight years.
- In the Gran era, UK has rushed for 7,738 yards, best three-year total since the 1970s, when Kentucky ran the ball almost exclusively.
- UK has had a 1,000-yard rusher in three straight seasons (Boom Williams, Benny Snell Jr.); prior to this, UK had never had 1,000-yard rushers in back-to-back seasons, let alone three straight seasons.
- Despite having starting quarterbacks who had never played in a major-college game in 2016 (Stephen Johnson) and 2018 (Terry Wilson), UK won 24 games over three seasons and went to three straight bowl games.
- Two wide receivers (Garrett Johnson and Dorian Baker) and one tight end (C.J. Conrad) became 1,000-yard career receivers during the last three seasons.
- UK has won 24 games in three seasons, the most in school history since 1949-51.
- The Wildcats were picked fifth in the 2018 SEC East preseason polls by the media but finished tied for second with a 5-3 record. It tied UK’s highest finish (also 2016) since the league split into divisions in 1992.

Quarterbacks

- Junior Terry Wilson won the starting job at the start of the 2018 season and led the Wildcats to their first 10-win season since 1977. The 10 wins are the most for a first-year starting QB in school history.
- Nicknamed “Terry Touchdown” in high school, the signal caller completed 67.2 percent of his passes for 1,889 yards and 11 touchdowns. He was also a dangerous runner as he compiled 547 net rushing yards and four TDs. Wilson, who redshirted as a freshman at Oregon, threw for 2,133 yards and 26 touchdowns in one junior college season.
- Wilson suffered a torn patellar tendon injury in the second half vs. Eastern Michigan.
- Troy transfer Sawyer Smith stepped in for Wilson at the start of the fourth quarter and completed, 5 of 9 passes for 76 and two touchdowns. In his first career start vs. Florida, Smith going 23-of-35 for 267 yards, two touchdowns and three INTs.
- Smith played in all 13 games last season for Troy, starting the final seven games for coach Neal

Brown, a former Kentucky wide receiver and offensive coordinator. Smith went 5-2 as the starter, completing 144-of-229 passes for 1,669 yards and 14 touchdowns. He also rushed for 191 yards and a score. The 6-foot-3, 219-pounder graduated from Troy in July 2019 with a degree in social science and is working on a master's degree in sport leadership at UK.

- Sophomores and Kentucky natives Walker Wood (Lexington) and Kolbe Langhi (Hopkinsville) backup Smith along with freshman signal caller Amani Gilmore (Amite, La.).
- True freshman Nik Scalzo (Fort Lauderdale, Fla.) is out for the season after suffering a torn ACL in preseason camp.

Running Backs

- The biggest question mark of the 2019 season has been who will succeed UK's all-time leading rusher and All-American Benny Snell Jr.? Before foregoing his senior season and declaring for the NFL Draft, Snell set just about every rushing record at UK, including becoming the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards or more in three straight seasons.
- Ready to fill those shoes is junior A.J. Rose. The Eagle Scout totaled 72 carries for 442 yards and five touchdowns last season, finishing third on the team in rushing behind Snell and Wilson (QB). Despite just 72 carries, he still averaged 6.2 yards per rush, highest on the team with at least 70 attempts.
- Also looking to make names for themselves after redshirting last season are Christopher Rodriguez and Kavosiey Smoke. Rodriguez appeared in three games last season and Smoke played in two. Both have received praise from running backs coach Eddie Gran as they strive to be the heir apparent to Snell.
- Redshirt freshman Tyler Markray got reps in spring practice, his first action since a knee injury sidelined him after playing in just five games as a senior in high school.
- True freshman Travis Tisdale of Valdosta, Ga., was ranked the nation's No. 18 running back by ESPN and the No. 11 all-purpose back nationally out of high school. He posted impressive numbers at Lowndes High School, rushing for 1,903 yards and 21 touchdowns.
- In 2018, the Cats rushed for 2,592 yards and 27 rushing touchdowns (tied for third in school history).

Wide Receivers

- Wide receivers coach Michael Smith is in his second season with the Wildcats and is having to rely on a plethora of young talent as five of UK's top seven receivers are gone from last season (C.J. Conrad, Snell, David Bouvier, Dorian Baker and Tavin Richardson).
- Smith's meeting room goes 15 deep and includes Lynn Bowden Jr., whose speed and elusiveness make him a breakaway threat anytime he has the ball. Last season, he set the UK record for most pass receptions by a sophomore with 67 catches. He also led the team with 745 receiving yards, averaging 11.1 yards per catch.
- Kentucky had 15 different players catch passes last season and nine of them return in 2018, including six wideouts (Bowden, Josh Ali, Isaiah Epps, Clevan Thomas Jr., Allen Dailey Jr. and Akeem Hayes).
- Redshirt freshmen B.J. Alexander, Akeem Hayes (must sit the first four games), and Bryce Oliver are looking to emerge as pass catchers.
- Mid-year enrollee and true freshman DeMarcus Harris of Vero Beach, Florida said he enrolled early to get a jump-start as a college athlete and to learn from Coach Smith. After becoming the Treasure Coast's career record holder for receiving yards (2,864), he's looking to pick up where he left off last season. Louisville native Tae Tae Crumes is another true freshman looking to make an impact. He caught 42 passes for 877 yards as a senior at Butler in 2018.

AHMAD FLAG-NER

- Kentucky's secret weapon on offense might just be the presence of senior Ahmad Wagner, a.k.a. "Ahmad Flag-ner" (h/t Curtis Burch). Wagner, a 6-foot-5, 238-pound receiver, is in his final year of eligibility after transferring from Iowa where he played three seasons on the basketball team.
- Wagner now has been targeted 20 times in his career, with nine catches for 198 yards and nine pass interference penalties drawn (one catch and PI occurred on the same play).
- It's interesting to note that, of his 18 receptions/pass interference plays, 12 of them have occurred on Kentucky touchdown drives.
- He enters the Mississippi State game with a streak of 12 straight plays which have been either a reception or pass interference.

Tight Ends

- Saying that three-year starter and three-time Mackey Award Watch List member C.J. Conrad will be tough to replace is an understatement. Conrad was second on the team in receptions (30 catches for 318 yards and three scores) and ended his illustrious career at No. 29 on UK's career receiving yards chart. He is currently on the practice squad with the N.Y. Giants. However, tight ends coach Vince Marrow thinks he has just the right players to fill the void of Conrad.
- The front-runner has been junior Justin Rigg who played in all 13 games last season and caught four passes for 45 yards. He leads the tight ends this season with six catches for 59 yards.
- Redshirt freshmen Brenden Bates and Keaton Upshaw were highly touted out of high school and both used a redshirt last season.
- Upshaw sat out last season due to a season-ending knee injury has been impressive through three games with five catches for 51 yards and a touchdown catch vs. the Gators.
- Bates played in two games last season and is looking for an opportunity to show what he can do. True freshman Nik Ognenovic of Fort Lauderdale, is 6-foot-5 and a gifted athlete who caught 11 passes for 170 yards and a touchdown in helping Cardinal Gibbons win the program's first state title in Class 5A.

Offensive Line

- Offensive line coach John Schlarman can be described in one word - tough. The 2018 Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award nominee was diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma in July of 2018. Despite his health issues, he has coached through countless chemotherapy treatments and has not missed a practice or a game.
- Schlarman was a four-year starter with the Wildcats from 1994-97. He is in his seventh season at UK.
- The O-line boasts three returning starters in Drake Jackson, Logan Stenberg and Landon Young who helped Benny Snell Jr., become the first player in school history with 1,000 rushing yards in three consecutive seasons.
- The O-line returns 49 career starts, including 29 from 2018.
- At left tackle, the biggest story line is the return of junior Landon Young who sat out the entire 2018 season with a knee injury. His backup is sophomore Naasir Watkins who saw significant action last season.
- The graduation of George Asafo-Adjei, selected in the seventh round of the NFL Draft by the N.Y. Giants, freed up the right tackle spot. Sophomores Darian Kinnard and Naasir Watkins, who both saw significant action last season, are stepping in nicely at that position.
- At left guard, three-year starter Logan Stenberg deciding to come back for his senior season was a big boost. He's a preseason second-team All-American by *Sporting News* and provides leadership and experience on the line. He's backed up by redshirt freshman Kenneth Horsey. An interesting note about Horsey - he had open-heart surgery in April of 2018.
- Another one of those big question marks was who will replace First Team All-American and All-SEC performer Bunchy Stallings at right guard? Junior Luke Fortner has started in all three games at that spot, while senior Mason Wolfe, who saw action in 12 games last season, is the backup.
- The center spot is locked up by junior Drake Jackson who has a current streak of 23 consecutive starts under his belt. Redshirt freshman Quintin Wilson is an additional option as well as walk on Tyler Couch.

SPECIAL TEAMS PREVIEW

- Special teams coordinator Dean Hood brings a wealth of knowledge to the program as he is in his 32nd year of college coaching.
- Looking to replace the production of graduating senior kicker Miles Butler, is redshirt freshman Chance Poore, who was ranked the No. 1 punter/kicker in the 2018 class by ProKicker.com. In 2018, he made 2-of-4 field goal attempts and all three extra-point tries in three games. This season he is 2-of-4 with a long of 46.
- Australian transplant Max Duffy once again handles the punting duties. Duffy currently leads the nation in punting with a 51.2 average and seven 50-plus-yard punts. The 26 year old arrived in the United States as an early enrollee in January of 2018.
- Senior Grant McKinniss handles the kickoff duties and has 15 touchbacks so far this season.
- Senior Blake Best is the snapper for punts, field goals and PATs. He has handled FG/PATs the last three seasons and has added punt snaps this year.
- Kickoff return specialist, Lynn Bowden Jr., returned 25 kickoffs for an average of 21.6 yards in 2018. He had two punt returns for TDs on just five total returns, a 58-yard punt return for a TD vs. Penn State and 67-yarder at Missouri. Bowden was one of just three players nationally with two punt returns for a TD. This season, he has two punt returns for 28 yards (14.0) and four kickoff returns for 97 yards (24.2).

position game with his booming and accurate leg. The Australian punter and Ray Guy Award candidate remains on pace to average the most yards per punt for his career once he reaches the 75-punt threshold. He currently is average 45.52 on 69 kicks, well above the current high-water career mark - Glenn Pakulak's 44.43 from 2000-02 (134 punts).

- Duffy made a huge impact in Kentucky's win over Toledo ... Punted six times for a 54-yard average, the second-highest single-game average in school history (min. 5 punts) ... Became the fifth different SEC punter since 2000 to average at least 54 yards per punt in a single game (min. six punts), and the first to do so since Florida's Johnny Townsend vs. Georgia on Oct. 28, 2017 ... Every punt was at least 53 yards, other than a 46-yarder that was downed on the 3-yard line ... Toledo did not score on those possessions and UK scored 24 points on subsequent possessions.
- His punting also made a huge impact in Kentucky's win over EMU ... Punted three times, with the three punts forcing Eastern Michigan to start on its own 8, 11 and 13-yard lines ... Average starting field position for EMU after Duffy's punts was inside its own 11-yard line ... EMU did not score following any of his punts, helping set up UK touchdowns on both of its subsequent possessions (a third EMU possession ended the half).
- Against Florida, he had two punts for 109 yards, including a season-high 63-yarder. Both were inside the 20-yard line.
- For the season, he is averaging a nation-high 51.2 yards per punt with a team net of 50.6 yards.

CONSECUTIVE PAT KICKS MADE

- Kentucky currently has the eighth-longest active streak of consecutive PAT kicks. Three kickers have contributed to the streak in Austin MacGinnis, Miles Butler, Chance Poore.

DEFENSIVE PREVIEW

- Kentucky has a new defensive coordinator in Brad White, who joined the staff in 2018 as outside linebackers coach. White was promoted after Matt House accepted the linebackers position with the Kansas City Chiefs.
- White has 19 returning letterwinners, including four starters.
- UK started 19 different players on defense last season and five (OLB Josh Allen, DT Adrian Middleton, SS Mike Edwards, CB Derrick Baity and CB Lonnie Johnson Jr.) started in all 13 games.
- The good news is that 11 of those 19 players who started at least one game, return for the 2019 season.
- Also, of a possible 143 total starts (13 games, 11 starts per game), 66 total starts return on defense in 2019.
- Last season, UK ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 16.8 points per game. The defense also ranked 23rd nationally and fourth in the SEC in total defense yards per game (338.2), 18th in passing yards allowed (188.3) and 36th nationally in team passing efficiency defense (119.06 rating points).
- The 16.8 points per game in 2018 was the best since the 1979 defense allowed 13 points per contest.

- The positions where a starter from 2018 does not return are outside linebacker (Josh Allen), two cornerback spots (Derrick Baity and Lonnie Johnson Jr.), strong safety (Mike Edwards), free safety Darius West, weakside linebacker (Jordan Jones) and defensive tackle (Adrian Middleton).

Linebackers

- Who will replace national defensive player of the year, First-Team All-American and first-round draft pick Josh Allen? That has been the million dollar question. After compiling these impressive numbers in 2018 - team-high 88 tackles, 21 TFL, 17 sacks, 7 QBH, 5 FF, 4 QBH, 2 FR and 1 blocked kick - Allen's absence has been felt. However, junior outside linebackers Josh Paschal and Jamar "Boogie" Watson along with sophomore outside linebacker Jordan Wright are narrowing the gap. Watson saw action 12 of 13 games in 2018 with seven starting assignments, totaling 24 tackles, 5.0 sacks, 5.0 tackles for loss, three PBUs and one forced fumble. Wright saw action in nine games, totaling four tackles.
- Paschal, who played in all 13 games as a true freshman in 2017, redshirted last season due to battling melanoma in his right foot. He saw action in three games last season, playing vs. Middle Tennessee, Louisville and Penn State. As a freshman, he totaled 17 tackles, 4.5 TFL, 3.5 sacks, 3 QBH and 1 blocked kick. He currently leads the team in tackles for loss with 3.0 and his fifth in tackles with 10. Wright is right behind him with nine tackles and 2.0 TFL, while Watson has six tackles, 1.05 TFL and a team-best three quarterback hurries.
- The linebacking unit runs 13 deep and senior middle linebacker Kash Daniel is the team's lone returning captain and the team's leading returning tackler from 2018. He had 75 tackles along with 7.5 TFL and five QBH, despite playing most of the season with a broken left hand. He's currently the team's No. 2 tackler with 19 and has added 2.0 TFL, an interception, a PBU and QBH.
- Backing up Daniel is sophomore Jamin Davis, who impressed the coaching staff during spring practice with his speed and athleticism.
- Two super sophomores are interchangeable at the Will linebacker spot in Chris Oats and Deandre Square. Both shined as true freshman in 2018 and are shining again in 2019. Square is currently UK's leading tackler with 22 and has 1.5 TFL, one interception and two QBH. Oats has six tackles.

Defensive Line

- Defensive line coach Derrick LeBlanc, a former defensive lineman at Northwestern State known for his toughness, is in his third season at Kentucky. His line features seven returning letter winners, including two starters in nose guard Quinton Bohanna and 6-foot-9 defensive end Calvin Taylor Jr.
- Because of Kentucky's platoon system and improved depth in the down lineman positions, significant contributors are returning with experience. They help make up for the loss of tackle Adrian Middleton (starter in all 13 games last season) and reserve noseguard Tymere Dubose to graduation. Those returners are senior T.J. Carter and junior Kordell Looney at defensive end, senior Phil Hoskins at tackle. Hoskins did not play in the first two games due to an academic issue and was injured during pre-game warmups vs. Florida. He is listed as questionable for the Miss. State game. Backing up Bohanna at nose is sophomore Marquan McCall, while sophomore defensive tackle Abule Abade-Fitzgerald is running No. 2 behind Watson at tackle in Hoskin's absence.
- Earning time in the rotation are sophomore Davoan Hawkins at end and true freshmen Cavan Butler and Isaiah Gibson at tackle. Gibson was a mid-year enrollee and participated in spring practice.

Secondary

- Coach Steve Clinkscale might have one of the hardest jobs as he has had to replace five talented defensive backs, including all four starters, from 2018. Gone are safeties Mike Edwards, now with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, and Darius West as well as cornerbacks Derrick Baity, Lonnie Johnson Jr., who just earned his first career start with the Houston Texans and Chris Westry, a free agent with the Dallas Cowboys. The five combined for 161 career starts, 853 tackles, 77 PBUs and 24 interceptions.
- UK opponents completed just 57.4 percent of their passes in 2018 and the Wildcats ranked fourth in the SEC in pass defense, allowing just 186.3 yards per game in the air. UK ranked seventh in the SEC and 36th in the nation in pass efficiency defense.
- Kentucky received a big blow in late July when junior and Lexington native Davonte Robinson suffered an injury to his right quadriceps muscle that will require surgery and force him to miss the season. The safety played in all 13 games last season with three starting assignments. He showed big-play potential last season, charting 42 tackles (sixth on the team) and, on the final play of the game at Florida, returned a fumble 30 yards for a touchdown.
- At strong safety, Jordan Griffin, who has played in 36 career games with eight starting assignments, is the lone senior in the secondary. In three games this season, he has eight tackles, 1.0 TFL/sack, one INT and two PBUs.
- Sophomore Tyrell Ajian is the starter in the nickel package. He has five tackles in three games with his first career INT coming against No. 9 Florida.
- Sophomore free safety Yusuf Corker, who saw action in eight games last season, is the team's third-leading tackler in 2019 with 15. He also has one fumble recovery. Corker was forced to miss the second half of the Florida game after a targeting penalty.
- Junior college transfer Brandin Echols is the starter at one cornerback spot and has shined through three games with 15 tackles and a team-high three PBUs. True freshmen M.J. Devonshire serves as his backup.
- The other cornerback starter is sophomore Cedric Dort Jr., who is backed up by redshirt freshmen Jamari Brown. True freshman Moses Douglass looks to be in the mix as well.

DOUBLE DIPPING

- Heading into the 2019 season there are only five schools in FBS/Division I that maintain at least three straight seasons of playing in a bowl game and the basketball program earning a bid to the NCAA men's basketball tournament. Kentucky has done so in three consecutive years after making the TaxSlayer Bowl, Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl and VRBO Citrus Bowl:

- While most college football programs recruit regionally, Kentucky has expanded its reach as far west as Colorado, east to Maryland, north to Michigan and south to Florida. Furthermore, the Cats have a second kicker/punter from Australia, tapping into the ranks of young men who have a history with Australian rules football.
- The Cats' geographic roster breaks down in 15 different states and Australia: Kentucky (23), Ohio (21), Florida (18), Georgia (16), Tennessee (4), Maryland (3), Oklahoma (3), Alabama (3), Michigan (3), Louisiana (2), South Carolina (2), Colorado (1), Mississippi (1), Pennsylvania (1), and Australia (1).

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

- UK's uniform preparers have a little extra work to do this season and a little less space with which to do it. The Cats have six players whose

LIFT THEM UP

A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital will bring special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy this season as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field.

A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle will provide a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new



patient will be chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

Offensive tackle and College of Engineering junior Luke Fortner (Sylvania, Ohio) and a team of TMMK engineers have worked for months to design, test and manufacture the device through a project called "Lift Them Up."

The vehicle made its first appearance at the Cat Walk before Kentucky's season opener vs. Toledo.

The vehicle was inspired by themes of the design of the Kentucky Children's Hospital. Hospital patients are asked to contribute to the vehicle's constantly changing paint scheme by submitting drawings that could become new additions.

STOOPS NAMED SEC COACH OF THE YEAR

- Head coach Mark Stoops was named SEC Coach of the Year by the AP and Coaches, becoming the first UK coach to earn Coach of the Year honors since Jerry Claiborne in 1983.
- Stoops was named the No. 1 coaching performance in the 2018 college football season by CollegeFootballNews.com.
- The Cats won 10 games for the first time in 41 years, including seven over bowl-eligible teams and five over squads that won eight or more.
- UK's 5-3 mark in SEC play also was the team's first winning league record since 1977.
- The Cats won at Florida, ending a three-decade-old dry spell against the Gators, and then recorded the most-lopsided win in the history of the Governor's Cup series against Louisville.
- Stoops was a semifinalist for the George Munger Coach of the Year and was on the watch list for the Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year.

CATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

The 2019 NFL Draft was one for the history books as Kentucky saw five of its players, Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson Jr., Mike Edwards, Benny Snell Jr., and George Asafo-Adjei selected. UK had a player chosen in each of the first four rounds, a UK first. The only other schools to accomplish that feat in this year's draft were Alabama, Ohio State and Oklahoma.

- UK's five draft picks were the most since eight players (James Ramsey, Jim Kovach, Kelly Kirchbaum, Rod Stewart, Bob Winkel, Robert Hawkins, Dan Fowler and David Stephens) were chosen in 1979
- Josh Allen, selected as the seventh overall pick by the Jacksonville Jaguars, was the 17th player in UK history selected in the first round.
- Allen was UK's highest draft pick since Dewayne Robertson was selected as the fourth pick by the Jets in 2003.
- Allen was the 11th player in UK history chosen in the top 10 and the first since Dewayne Robertson was selected as the fourth pick by the Jets in 2003.
- Allen was the sixth player drafted under head coach Mark Stoops at Kentucky and the second first-round pick, joining Bud Dupree (Pittsburgh Steelers) in 2015.
- Since 2001, Coach Stoops has recruited and developed 12 first-round draft picks.
- Kentucky has had a linebacker drafted in five of the last six NFL drafts (2019 - Josh Allen, 2016 - Josh Forrest, 2015 - Bud Dupree, 2015 - Za'Darius Smith, 2014 - Avery Williamson).
- UK is the only school in the nation to have first-round picks in the 2019 NFL, MLB, and NBA Draft.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- Kentucky currently has five players on its roster who have already earned their undergraduate degrees and are in graduate school or will work on a second degree. They are Blake Best (master's degree in finance), Logan Stenberg (second degree in communication), Calvin Taylor Jr. (second degree in communication) and Mason Wolfe (master's degree in sport leadership). Troy transfer Sawyer Smith graduated in July and is now pursuing a master's degree at UK in sport leadership.

THREE WILDCATS TO ETHIOPIA

- In May of 2019, three Wildcats, defensive end Calvin Taylor Jr., offensive tackle Landon Young and linebacker Jamar “Boogie” Watson, were chosen by the athletic department to participate in a service/educational trip to the Ethiopia. During the week-long trip, they delivered essential nutrition, supplies, hope and love to families living in Korah, a slum made up of all the trash accumulated in Addis Ababa. With the care packages delivered, it could prevent them from digging for two weeks to a month; visited an orphanage with approximately 80 children; took teenagers from Korah to play arcade games and see the Avengers movie; paired with a feeding program that supplies meals to government schools in Cherkos, a poorer region in Addis Ababa. The program began as a result of kids fainting and lack of focus in the classroom due to malnutrition at home, often missing breakfast in the morning and at night only leaving them with one meal per day.
- UK has taken football student-athletes to Ethiopia on a service trip since 2011. Due to the state department’s travel ban to Ethiopia in 2017, the Cats visited the DR.

Coach Mark Stoops was seen on the sideline shouting, “Bring it on!” The inspirational moment helped spark the Wildcats toward the upset victory.

COACHING CHANGES

- UK defensive coordinator, Matt House, was hired to be the linebackers coach for the Kansas City Chiefs in February of 2019. That move prompted head coach Mark Stoops to promote outside linebackers coach Brad White to defensive coordinator and hire a former Wildcat, Jon Sumrall, to coach the inside linebackers.

COUCH NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT

Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch has been named to the ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, the National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame. Couch is one of 76 players and five coaches from the Football Bowl Subdivision and 101 players and 33 coaches from the divisional ranks.

A storied name of the Kentucky program, Couch, was the team’s quarterback from 1996-98. After giving up his senior season of eligibility, he was drafted as the No. 1 pick by Cleveland in the 1999 NFL Draft. In 1998, the junior quarterback was named a first-team All-American and consensus Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Couch completed 400 of 553 passes for 4,275 yards and 36 touchdowns and led the nation in pass completions while ranked second in completion percentage, passing yardage and touchdown passes, and fourth in total offense. After guiding the Wildcats to the Outback Bowl, UK’s first New Year’s Day bowl appearance in 47 years, Couch finished fourth in Heisman Trophy balloting. He was also a finalist for the Davey O’Brien National Quarterback Award as a junior and sophomore. His breakout sophomore campaign featured 363 of 547 passes completed for 3,884 yards and 37 touchdowns while leading the nation in pass attempts, completions, yardage, and completion percentage. Also during his sophomore year, Couch earned second-team All-SEC honors and finished ninth in Heisman voting. He played in seven games as a true freshman, with two starts. Career wise, Couch completed 795 passes on 1,184 attempts for 8,435 yards and 74 touchdowns. The legend ended his career with seven NCAA records, 14 SEC records, and 26 school records.

The announcement of the 2020 Class will be made in January 2020 in the days leading up to the College Football Playoff (CFP) National Championship in New Orleans. The 2020 College Football Hall of Fame Class will officially be inducted during the 63rd NFF Annual Awards Dinner on Dec. 8, 2020, at the New York Hilton Midtown. They will also be honored at their respective schools with an NFF Hall of Fame On-Campus Salute, presented by Fidelity Investments, during the 2020 season.

- Kentucky was the only school in the nation to have first-round picks in the 2019 NFL (Josh Allen), MLB (Zack Thompson), and NBA (PJ Washington, Tyler Herro, Keldon Johnson) drafts.
- This is the 129th season of intercollegiate football for Kentucky.
- Kentucky is in its seventh season under head coach **Mark Stoops**, who has energized the UK fan base with record-setting recruiting classes, facility upgrades and an influx in talent.
- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** is in his 42nd season in that role. A group of former players, staff members and current UK coaches pitched in during the summer of 2017 to surprise him with a new Ford Escape. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, giving him 46 years in UK football.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships, including 20 of the last 24, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.

KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 301 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 164-134-4 record (.550), 28-18 under Mark Stoops.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 14 of the last 16 seasons.
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-- begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics. Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015

season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites. New bench-back seating has been installed in the South upper level of Kroger Field.

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Mississippi State, Missouri and Vanderbilt.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Pregame concerts: The Kentucky Football Pregame Concert Series has returned for the 2018 season. Concerts will begin on the stage outside Gate 12 immediately following the Cat Walk and last until 30 minutes prior to kickoff. The Cat Walk takes place two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff.

Coca Cola Fan Zone: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Fan Zone located in Nutter Field House. It will have inflatable games, free posters, face tattoos and more, available two hours before kickoff.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy this season as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

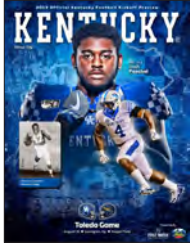

Terry Wilson threw two touchdown passes, Asim Rose and Kavosiey Smoke each ran for TDs and Kentucky overcame Toledo to pull away 38-24 in the season opener for both schools.

The Wildcats rallied twice against the Rockets to enter the break tied at 14 before taking control in the second half. A third-quarter fumble recovery led to Chance Poore's 46-yard, go-ahead field goal before Bryce Oliver's leaping grab of Wilson's 32-yard TD pass provided a 10-point lead.

Smoke's 40-yard TD run down the left side midway through the fourth made it 31-17. Kentucky then converted DeAndre Square's interception into Wilson's 2-yard TD pass to Josh Ali to clinch the first meeting between the schools.

Wilson completed 19 of 26 passes for 246 yards. Justin Rigg recovered Chris Rodriguez's goal-line fumble in the end zone for Kentucky's first TD and A.J. Rose (16 carries, 64 yards) ran for an 11-yard score. Smoke had 78 yards rushing on seven carries as the Wildcats outgained Toledo 422-347.

Toledo led twice on first-half TD runs of 5 yards by former Kentucky running back Bryant Koback and 21 by quarterback Mitchell Guadagni.

Guadagni left the game in third after his helmet was knocked off after being tackled by Chris Oats, who was ejected for targeting. Replacement Carter Bradley ran for a 7-yard TD with 1:02 remaining.

Backup quarterback Sawyer Smith threw two touchdown passes in relief of injured Terry Wilson, who rushed for a TD before hurting his left leg, and Kentucky rolled past Eastern Michigan 38-17 in Kroger Field.

Wilson's 2-yard TD run in the third quarter put the Wildcats up 24-3 before he was carted off later with the injury following a horse-collar tackle by EMU defensive lineman Turan Rush, who was flagged on a play with offsetting penalties. Wilson exited to cheers after teammates offered supportive handshakes.

Smith, a junior transfer from Troy, came in and hit Ahmad Wagner for a 54-yard touchdown and Lynn Bowden for the final 2-yard TD with 54 seconds remaining. Asim Rose and Kavosiey Smoke rushed for TDs of 8 and 32 yards, respectively, in a game the Wildcats led throughout.

Kentucky outgained the Eagles (1-1) 461-386, including a 239-49 rushing edge. But the Wildcats committed seven penalties for 84 yards, several of which snuffed first-half chances to put the game out of reach.

Eagles quarterback Mike Glass III threw TD passes of 26 and 7 yards and completed 34 of 53 attempts for 337 yards.

KROGER FIELD (63,076)

In his first start at quarterback for Kentucky, Sawyer Smith passed for 251 yards and two touchdowns, but the Cats suffered their first loss of the season, falling to No. 8 Florida 29-21 at Kroger Field.

The game was evenly played throughout before the Gators put it away late. Florida had 438 yards of total offense, while Kentucky had 407. The Cats had 27 first downs, compared to just 21 for the Gators.

The Gators got on the board first, when Feleipe Franks connected with Freddie Swain on a 15-yard touchdown pass, giving them a 7-0 lead with 6:27 left in the first quarter.

Early in the second, UK evened the score when Smith connected with Ahmad Wagner on a spectacular, acrobatic 26-yard TD score.

On UF's next possession, Franks was sacked by Kordell Looney, who forced a fumble that was recovered by UK's Taj Dodson at the UK 46 yard line. From there, the Cats drove and eventually took the lead on a one-yard TD run by Smith with 7:46 left in the first half.

Florida's next drive appeared to be one that would tie the game. However, the Gators' march stalled inside Kentucky territory, and McPherson's 27-yard field goal attempt missed to the right, keeping the score 14-7. That would be the score at halftime.

On the first drive of the second half, Kentucky appeared ready to stretch its lead until Smith was intercepted by Shawn Davis, who returned the pick to the Kentucky 21-yard line. The Gators got to the UK 12-yard line before a penalty backed them up. Eventually, McPherson convert, a 32-yard field goal attempt, cutting Kentucky's lead to 14-10.

UK had the answer, marching 75 yards in just six plays, culminating with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Smith to Keaton Upshaw, the first of Upshaw's career. Poore's PAT gave the Cats a 21-10 lead with 5:39 to play in the third quarter. The key play in the drive was an athletic catch by Wagner for 21 yards, which was compounded by a 15-yard penalty on the Gators.

Florida, with backup Kyle Trask playing QB in place of the injured Franks, proceeded to march 62 yards in six plays, and cut into Kentucky's lead when Lamical Perine scored on an eight-yard run. Florida's two-point conversion try was no good, and the Gators trailed 21-16 with 12:41 to play.

After a Smith interception, Florida would re-take the lead with a four-play, 66-yard scoring drive, capped by Trask's four-yard touchdown run. The two-point try failed again, and the Gators led 22-21 with 4:11 to play.

That set the stage for Kentucky's final drive, when the Cats drove deep into Florida territory with less than a minute to play. With 58 seconds left in the game, Poore tried a 35-yard field goal, but missed right.

On Florida's next possession, as the Gators were running out the clock, Josh Hammond broke free and scampered 76 yards for a touchdown to put the game away.

No. 1, Mark Stoops, Kentucky

Kentucky might have gone bowling last year [2017], but absolutely no one outside of the biggest blue die-hards could've seen what was coming ... Stoops put together a masterpiece. Ten wins, a victory over Florida for the first time since 1986, a 46-point blowout over Louisville, and a Citrus Bowl win over Penn State – it was a special coaching job.

So wrote Pete Fiutak of CollegeFootballNews.com, who put Mark Stoops atop his list of the nation's best coaching performances of the 2018 season.

Early on, one could sense that the '18 campaign could be special when Stoops' troops won at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America.

Kentucky went on to win five Southeastern Conference games, including a 28-7 win over No. 14-ranked Mississippi State and a miraculous comeback at Missouri, as Stoops posted UK's first winning SEC record in 41 years.

The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

A season that featured five victories considered upsets by the experts was fittingly finished with the finale -- a 27-24 triumph over favored, No. 12-ranked Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl.

All totaled, the 10-3 record was Kentucky's best season since 1977 and only the third 10-win season in school history. UK was No. 11 in the final *USA Today* coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984.

Stoops was well-recognized for Kentucky's breakthrough season. In addition to the No. 1 listing from CollegeFootballNews.com, he was named SEC Coach of the Year by the league coaches, Athlon Sports and The Associated Press. His name also appeared on watch lists for National Coach of the Year honors.

Stoops' individual accolades also extended to his players. Linebacker Josh Allen earned three National Defensive Player of the Year Awards and was a unanimous first-team All-American.





STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

In six seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's seven classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Offensive guard Bunchy Stallings also was a first-team All-American and running back Benny Snell earned second-team All-America while becoming UK's all-time leading rusher.

The 2018 season continued a remarkable trend – since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK is the only school in the nation that has tied or improved its win total in each of the last six seasons.

That steady progression has culminated in multiple achievements:

- From 2016-18, UK won at least seven games and finished at least .500 in the Southeastern Conference each season. It's the first time UK won seven games and finished at least .500 in the league in three consecutive seasons since 1949-51.
- The Wildcats placed second in the SEC Eastern Division in 2016 and 2018, the team's best finishes since the league split into divisions in 1992.
- UK's 2016-17-18 bowl appearances are only the third time in school history that the Cats have advanced to a bowl in at least three consecutive seasons.
- UK won three road games in both 2017 and '18. It's the first time UK has won

three road games in back-to-back seasons since 1949-50.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops' ability to adjust when necessary shone its brightest at the beginning of the 2016 season. After losing the first two games of the schedule, and seeing his starting quarterback out for the season with an injury, and seeing his defense struggle in the early stages, Stoops didn't retreat. The Wildcat coach chose determination over despair and went back to work, revising the offense for a new QB while becoming more involved in helping coach the defense.

The results? The Wildcats went 7-3 in the last 10 regular-season games, topped by a win at No. 11-ranked Louisville. Stoops was named 2016 SEC Coach of the Year runner-up by Athlon Sports. That was the beginning of a turnaround which resulted in three straight bowl games and culminated in the VRBO

Citrus Bowl victory – representing UK's first New Year's Day bowl game in 20 years.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornelius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the



team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who retired in 2017 after 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is special teams coordinator at Youngstown State.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two sea-

sons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Mark and his wife, Chantel, have two sons, Will and Zack.
