CATS HOST EASTERN MICHIGAN SEEKING 12TH WIN IN LAST 15 GAMES

Kentucky will look to continue its winning ways this Saturday when Eastern Michigan arrives at Kroger Field, with the Wildcats seeking a 12th win in the last 15 games. The game is set for a 7:30 p.m. ET kickoff and will air on the SEC Network Alternate.

Having dispatched of Mid-American Conference preseason favorite Toledo in the opener, the Cats enter week two with only Alabama having a better record over the past 14 games amongst Southeastern Conference teams. Last Saturday, UK erased an early 14-7 deficit and powered past a fiery Rockets squad 38-24 to get the 2019 season off to a strong start.

The Cats displayed a balanced offensive attack in the opener, unleashing a triple threat look in the running game to go along with an improved Terry Wilson in his second year as the starting quarterback and a deeper well of talent in the receiving corps.

Despite having to replace all-everything star Josh Allen and the entire secondary, the UK defense rebounded from an uneven first few possessions in the opener to impose its will on a quality Toledo offensive attack and deliver yet another strong effort.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky kicked off its 129th season of intercollegiate football against Toledo with a 38-24 victory at Kroger Field last Saturday, outscoring the Rockets 24-10 in the second half.
- The Cats now are 11-3 over their past 14 games. The record is tied for the second-best in the SEC over that span behind only Alabama (13-1).
- This is coach Mark Stoops' seventh season in Lexington and the Wildcats have either matched or exceeded the previous season's win total in each of the past six seasons, making them the only program in FBS to accomplish that feat.
- Stoops' "recruit and develop" mentality culminated in 2018 with a 10-3 record, UK's best season in 41 years and only the third 10-win season in school history.
- UK's 5-3 SEC record also was the team's first winning league mark since 1977. The Cats finished second in the SEC Eastern Division.
- Since the start of the 2018 season, UK leads all FBS schools in fewest games allowing more than 24 points (one).
- UK has allowed 24 points or less in 14 of its last 15 games. That is the best such stretch since October 14, 1978 to Sept. 6, 1980. UK allowed 24 points or less in 18 of 19 games in that stretch.
- UK has scored at least 38 points in a game in every season since 1997.
- UK has had consecutive season-opening wins by at least 14 points for the first time since 2007-2009 (three seasons).
- UK has made 116 consecutive extra points, the eighth-longest active streak in the nation.
- What production returns for the 2019 season? Forty-one letterwinners are back, including 10 starters: Logan Stenberg (LG), Drake Jackson (C), Lynn Bowden Jr. (WR), Terry Wilson (QB), Calvin Taylor Jr. (DE), Quinton Bohanna (NG), Jamar "Boogie" Watson (SLB), Kash Daniel (MLB), Blake Best (SNAP) and Max Duffy (P). The Cats also welcome the return of junior offensive tackle Landon Young who missed the 2018 season with a knee injury and sophomore defensive end Joshua Paschal who has been battling melanoma and only saw limited action in the final three games last season. Young played in all 13 games as a sophomore, starting in six at left tackle.
- Twenty redshirt freshmen, 18 true freshmen and three junior college transfers are primed and ready to make their mark in 2019.
- The pregame Catwalk presented by Chevy had a new addition this year. A partnership between Kentucky Children's Hospital, Kentucky College of Engineering and Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky created a new and specially built pushcart vehicle that will provide a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and

attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient will be chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

- Highlights of 2018 included ending a 31-game losing streak vs. Florida with a 27-16 win in The Swamp; a miraculous comeback win at Missouri; a 56-10 win at Louisville that is the largest margin of victory in the Governor's Cup series; and the season was topped by a 27-24 win over No. 12 Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl.
- A rock-ribbed defense was led by linebacker Josh Allen, who broke the single-season and school records for quarterback sacks en route to winning the Bednarik Award, Nagurski Award and Lott Trophy as the National Defensive Player of the Year. He was UK's first unanimous first-team All-American since Art Still in 1977. Running back Benny Snell Jr., had three straight 1,000-yard seasons, breaking UK career records with 3,873 rushing yards and 48 touchdowns. He was a second-team All-American.
- UK's five NFL draft picks (Allen, Lonnie Johnson Jr., Mike Edwards, Snell, George Asafo-Adjei) were the most since eight players (James Ramsey, Jim Kovach, Kelly Kirchbaum, Rod Stewart, Bob Winkel, Robert Hawkins, Dan Fowler and David Stephens) were chosen in 1979.

GAME PROMOTIONS / EASTERN MICHIGAN

- Saturday's honorary game captain is former Wildcat Chris Chenault (1985-88), UK's No. 2 all-time leading tackler (482).
- Saturday is Heroes' Day at Kroger Field when UK Athletics is proud to honor all active and reserve members of the armed forces along with police, firefighters and first responders.
- One complimentary game ticket to each hero. New in 2019, Heroes' Day tickets will be available through GovX instead of in person as in previous seasons.
- This offer is exclusively available online through GovX in advance of game day. UK Athletics will continue to honor these groups throughout the 2019 season by extending specially priced ticket offers through GovX to all home football games, while supplies last.
- Among the tentative plans for Heroes' Day are a football-field sized American flag for the national anthem, which will be presented by the UK Air Force ROTC and UK Army ROTC, recognition of personnel throughout the game and military VIPs in attendance.
- It is Scout Day and High School Band Day as well.

SCOUTING EASTERN MICHIGAN

- EMU coach Chris Creighton is in his sixth season at the school and faced UK in 2017, a 24-20 loss in Lexington.
- The Eagles scored a 30-23 road victory over Coastal Carolina to open the season, rallying from a 13-7 halftime deficit with a 16-point third quarter to turn the tide.
- EMU quarterback Mike Glass was nearly perfect, completing 20-of-22 passes for 188 yards and three touchdowns. He also rushed for a score.
- Running back Shaq Vann was effective on the ground, churning out 108 yards rushing on 22 carries while adding two catches for 13 yards.
- Wide receiver Dylan Drummond hauled in a pair of touchdown catches as part of an afternoon where he caught five passes for 52 yards.
- The Eagles were excellent in pass defense, picking off four passes on the afternoon
- In 2018, EMU finished 7-6 overall and 5-3 in MAC play.
- The Eagles earned a berth in the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl against Georgia Southern, dropping a 23-21 decision on a field goal as time expired.
- Despite that defeat, the season was a success as EMU posted its first winning conference record since 1995 and first US bowl appearance in 31 years.

SERIES VS. EASTERN MICHIGAN

- This is the second meeting between the two programs.
- The teams met on Sept. 30, 2017 with UK winning 24-20 in Lexington.
- Benny Snell Jr. rushed for 75 yards and a game-sealing touchdown in that game while the Cats' defense registered six sacks and three turnovers.
- UK is 21-3 all-time vs. teams from the current alignment of the Mid-American Conference.
- The Cats have won 11 straight games vs. schools from the MAC.

KENTUCKY-EMU CONNECTIONS

- Kentucky has three players from the state of Michigan: DT Marquan McCall and LB DeAndre Square both hail from Detroit and RB Tyler Markray is from West Bloomfield.
- Eastern Michigan has one player from the Commonwealth on its roster: DB Russell Vaden IV (Louisville)
- UK defensive backs coach Steve Clinkscale spent three seasons in the MAC at Toledo, helping lead the Rockets to bowl games in 2010 and 2011.

- UK special teams coordinator and safeties coach Dean Hood coached in the MAC at Ohio in 1999 and 2000.

A UK WIN WOULD...

- Give UK its 12th consecutive win over a MAC team, dating back to 2006.
- Improve UK's record to 22-3 vs. teams from the MAC.
- Give Kentucky its seventh straight non-conference win.
- Push the Cats' record over the last 15 games to 12-3, second-best in the SEC.
- Improve UK's overall record at Kroger Field to 164-133-4 (.552).
- Improve coach Mark Stoops' record at home to 28-17 overall and 17-4 vs. non-SEC foes.

LAST SATURDAY

- UK knocked off MAC preseason favorite Toledo, 38-24, at Kroger Field.
- The Cats trailed 14-7 in the second quarter before outscoring the Rockets 31-3 until a touchdown in the closing moments made the final margin of victory 14 points.
- It was UK's sixth consecutive non-conference victory and 11th overall win in the past 14 games.
- Junior quarterback Terry Wilson now is 11-3 as the Cats' starter. He completed 19-of-26 passes for 246 yards and two scores.
- Junior wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. caught six passes for 77 yards and became the 30th player in school history to surpass 1,000 career receiving yards.
- Redshirt freshman wide receiver Bryce Oliver hauled in a 32-yard scoring grab over a Toledo defender to secure his first career touchdown.
- Redshirt freshman tight end Keaton Upshaw caught the first two passes of his career.
- Redshirt freshman running back Kavosiey Smoke delivered 78 rushing yards and a score on just seven carries, including a breath-taking 40-yard scamper for a touchdown.
- The UK defense allowed 174 yards on Toledo's first three drives and then limited the Rockets to 173 yards in their last 12 drives.
- Sophomore linebacker DeAndre Square had a breakout game, recording 11 tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss, 0.5 sack and an interception. On the pick he broke up the short pass, tipping the football into the air and then snatching it over top the receiver for the turnover.
- For his efforts, Square earned Pro Football Focus National Defensive Team of the Week honors.
- Sophomore safety Yusuf Corker contributed seven tackles and a fumble recovery in his first career start.
- Sophomore outside linebacker Josh Paschal continued his triumphant return from cancer, tallying four tackles, a sack and a forced fumble. The sack and forced fumble came on back-to-back possessions at the beginning of the second half as the Cats took control of the game.
- CB Brandin Echols, in his first game as a junior college transfer, was credited with three PBUs.
- Junior punter Max Duffy was the most dominant player in the game, booting six kicks for an average of 54.0 yards a punt. He had a long of 61 and routinely flipped the field for the Cats. It is the second best average yards per punt by a UK player in a single game (min. 5 punts) and it was the best mark since Bill Hawk vs. Tennessee on Nov. 23, 1991 (56.5 yards per punt).
- Redshirt freshman kicker Chance Poore connected on a career-long 46-yard field goal.
- Players making their first collegiate starts included OG Luke Fortner, WR Josh Ali, WR Ahmad Wagner, RB A.J. Rose, CB Cedrick Dort, CB Jamari Brown and S Yusuf Corker.
- True freshmen who made their collegiate debut included: S Taj Dodson, WR DeMarcus Harris and LB Tra Wilkins.

MILESTONES TO WATCH

- Junior WR **Lynn Bowden Jr.** has 90 career receptions and needs 10 more to become the 17th Wildcat player to catch at least 100 passes in his career.
- Bowden became the 30th player in school history to reach 1,000 career receiving yards when his 77 yards in the season opener pushed him to 1,032 in his career. He needs 20 more to move up to No. 26 with Derek Homer (1997-2000).
- Bowden has returned two punts for a touchdown in his career, both coming during the 2018 season. With one more return to the house he would join Dicky Lyons Sr. (1966-68) and Larry Carter (1976-79) in a tie for second on the career list with three punt return touchdowns. Derek Abney (2000-03) holds the school record with six.
- Bowden has 1,450 kickoff return yards in his career, which ranks sixth on UK's all-time list. He needs 15 to surpass Derrick Locke for fifth. Derek Abney holds the record with 2,315.
- With 92 more kickoff return yards and 45 more receiving yards Bowden will become just the third player in school history to have at least 1,500 career kickoff return yards and 1,000 career receiving yards (Derek Abney and Keenan Burton).
- Junior P **Max Duffy** has averaged 45.62 yards per punt for his career on 66 punts, which would be the highest average in school history once he reaches the minimum of 75 punts. The current high-water career mark is Glenn Pakulak's 44.43 from 2000-02 (134 punts).
- Head coach **Mark Stoops** has 37 career victories at Kentucky. He needs two more to tie Rich Brooks (2003-09) for fifth on the school's all-time list.

AHMAD FLAG-NER

- Kentucky's secret weapon on offense might just be the presence of Ahmad Wagner, a.k.a. "Ahmad Flag-ner" (h/t Curtis Burch).
- What's interesting to note about Wagner is that in 2018, he was thrown four passes, three of which drew a pass interference call on the defense. Wagner, a 6-foot-5, 238-pound receiver, is in his final year of eligibility after transferring from Iowa where he played three seasons on the basketball team.
- The knack for drawing pass interference calls carried over into UK's opener, when he was targeted five times, catching three passes and drawing flags on the other two. He now has been targeted nine times in his career, with three catches for 57 yards and five pass interference penalties drawn.
- Of course, the most important such flag was at Missouri when Terry Wilson lofted a ball into the end zone on the final play of the game and the Cats needing a touchdown. Wagner drew pass interference and on the ensuing untimed snap Wilson hit C.J. Conrad for the game-winning touchdown pass.

OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

- "Balance" has been the hallmark of the Kentucky offense under Eddie Gran, UK assistant head coach for offense. The Wildcats have totaled more than 2,000 rushing yards and 2,000 passing yards in all three seasons that Gran has been here. Prior to Gran's arrival, this had been accomplished in only two seasons total in school history.
- The Cats have averaged at least 25.5 points per game in all three seasons, only the third time in school history UK averaged at least 25.5 in three straight years.
- In the Gran era, UK has rushed for 7,738 yards, best three-year total since the 1970s, when Kentucky ran the ball almost exclusively.
- UK has had a 1,000-yard rusher in three straight seasons (Boom Williams, Benny Snell Jr.); prior to this, UK had never had 1,000-yard rushers in back-to-back seasons, let alone three straight seasons.
- Despite having starting quarterbacks who had never played in a major-college game in 2016 (Stephen Johnson) and 2018 (Terry Wilson), UK won 24 games over three seasons and went to three straight bowl games.
- Two wide receivers (Garrett Johnson and Dorian Baker) and one tight end (C.J. Conrad) became 1,000-yard career receivers during the last three seasons.
- UK has won 24 games in three seasons, the most in school history since 1949-51.
- The Wildcats were picked fifth in the 2018 SEC East preseason polls by the media but finished tied for second with a 5-3 record. It tied UK's highest finish (also 2016) since the league split into divisions in 1992.

Quarterbacks

2018 Starters Returning/Lost: 1/0

2018 Letterwinners Returning/Lost: 1/1

- Junior Terry Wilson won the starting job at the start of the 2018 season and led the Wildcats to their first 10-win season since 1977. The 10 wins are the most for a first-year starting QB in school history.
- Nicknamed "Terry Touchdown" in high school, the signal caller completed 67.2 percent of his passes for 1,889 yards and 11 touchdowns. He was also a dangerous runner as he compiled 547 net rushing yards and four TDs. Wilson, who redshirted as a freshman at Oregon, threw for 2,133 yards and 26 touchdowns in one junior college season.
- Wilson ranked 13th nationally in completion percentage.
- Wilson was the "Manning Quarterback of the Week" after accounting for 256 yards total offense and three touchdowns (one rushing, two passing) in the win at Florida last season.
- Sophomores and Kentucky natives Walker Wood (Lexington) and Kolbe Langhi (Hopkinsville) will also compete for playing time along with freshmen signal callers Amani Gilmore (Amite, La.) and Troy transfer, Sawyer Smith, a junior from Cantonment, Fla.
- True freshman Nik Scalzo (Fort Lauderdale, Fla.) is out for the season after suffering a torn ACL in preseason camp.
- Smith played in all 13 games last season for Troy, starting the final seven games for coach Neal Brown, a former Kentucky wide receiver and offensive coordinator. Smith went 5-2 as the starter, completing 144-of-229 passes for 1,669 yards and 14 touchdowns. He also rushed for 191 yards and a score. The 6-foot-3, 219-pounder graduated from Troy in July 2019 with a degree in social science and is working on a master's degree in sport leadership at UK.

Running Backs

2018 Starters Returning/Lost: 0/1

- The biggest question mark of the 2019 season is who will succeed UK's all-time leading rusher and All-American Benny Snell Jr.? Before foregoing his senior season and declaring for the NFL Draft, Snell set just about every rushing record at UK, including becoming the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards or more in three straight seasons. Ready to fill those shoes is junior A.J. Rose. The Eagle Scout totaled 72 carries for 442 yards and five touchdowns last season, finishing third on the team in rushing behind Snell and Wilson (QB). Despite just 72 carriers, he still averaged 6.2 yards per rush, highest on the team with at least 70 attempts.
- Also looking to make names for themselves after redshirting last season are Christopher Rodriguez and Kavosiey Smoke. Rodriguez appeared in three games last season and Smoke played in two. Both have received praise from running backs coach Eddie Gran as they strive to be the heir apparent to Snell.
- Redshirt freshman Tyler Markray got reps in spring practice, his first action since a knee injury sidelined him after playing in just five games as a senior in high school.
- True freshman Travis Tisdale of Valdosta, Ga., was ranked the nation's No. 18 running back by ESPN and the No. 11 all-purpose back nationally out of high school. He posted impressive numbers at Lowndes High School, rushing for 1,903 yards and 21 touchdowns.
- In 2018, the Cats rushed for 2,592 yards and 27 rushing touchdowns (tied for third in school history).

- Wide receivers coach Michael Smith is in his second season with the Wildcats and will have to rely on a plethora of young talent as five of UK's top seven receivers are gone from last season (C.J. Conrad, Snell, David Bouvier, Dorian Baker and Tavin Richardson).
- Smith's meeting room goes 15 deep and includes Lynn Bowden Jr., whose speed and elusiveness make him a breakaway threat anytime he has the ball. Last season, he set the UK record for most pass receptions by a sophomore with 67 catches. He also led the team with 745 receiving yards, averaging 11.1 yards per catch.
- Kentucky had 15 different players catch passes last season and nine of them return in 2018, including six wideouts (Bowden, Josh Ali, Isaiah Epps, Clevon Thomas Jr., Allen Dailey Jr. and Akeem Hayes).
- Letter winners Josh Ali (10 catches for 115 yards and one TD in 2018), Allen Dailey (2 catches for 38 yards and one TD in 2018), Isaiah Epps (8 catches for 76 yards in 2018) and Ahmad Wagner are back and looking to make an impact.
- Redshirt freshmen B.J. Alexander, Akeem Hayes, and Bryce Oliver are also emerging pass catchers.
- Mid-year enrollee and true freshman DeMarcus Harris of Vero Beach, Florida said he enrolled early to get a jump-start as a college athlete and to learn from Coach Smith. After becoming the Treasure Coast's career record holder for receiving yards (2,864), he's looking to pick up where he left off last season. Louisville native Tae Tae Crumes is another true freshman looking to make an impact. He caught 42 passes for 877 yards as a senior at Butler in 2018.

Tight Ends

- Saying that three-year starter and three-time Mackey Award Watch List member C.J. Conrad will be tough to replace is an understatement. Conrad was second on the team in receptions (30 catches for 318 yards and three scores) and ended his illustrious career at No. 29 on UK's career receiving yards chart. He is currently on the practice squad with the N.Y. Giants. However, tight ends coach Vince Marrow thinks he has just the right players to fill the void of Conrad.
- The front-runner is junior Justin Rigg who played in all 13 games last season and caught four passes for 45 yards. He scored his first collegiate touchdown on a fumble recovery in the end zone on the first play of the second quarter last week vs. Toledo.
- Redshirt freshmen Brenden Bates and Keaton Upshaw were highly touted out of high school and both used a redshirt last season. Upshaw sat out last season due to a season-ending knee injury and was healthy during fall camp. Bates played in two games last season and is looking for an opportunity to show what he can do. True freshman Nik Ogenovic of Fort Lauderdale, is 6-foot-5 and a gifted athlete who caught 11 passes for 170 yards and a touchdown in helping Cardinal Gibbons win the program's first state title in Class 5A.

Offensive Line

2018 Starters Returning/Lost: 3/3

2018 Letterwinners Returning/Lost: 8/2

- Offensive line coach John Schlarman can be described in one word - tough. The 2018 Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award nominee was diagnosed with an undisclosed cancer in the summer of 2018. Despite his health issues, he has coached through countless chemotherapy treatments and has not missed a practice or a game.
- Schlarman was a four-year starter with the Wildcats from 1994-97. He is entering his seventh season at UK.
- The O-line boasts three returning starters (which includes Landon Young) who helped Benny Snell Jr., become the first player in school history with 1,000 rushing yards in three consecutive seasons.
- The O-line returns 49 career starts, including 29 from 2018.
- At left tackle, the biggest story line is the return of junior Landon Young who sat out the entire 2018 season with a knee injury. As a sophomore, he started six games and has looked poised to regain his starting spot.
- The graduation of George Asafo-Adjei, selected in the seventh round of the NFL Draft by the N.Y. Giants, freed up the right tackle spot. Sophomores Darian Kinnard and Naasir Watkins, who both saw significant action last season, look to battle for the starting job.
- At left guard, three-year starter Logan Stenberg deciding to come back for his senior season was a big boost. He's a preseason second-team All-American by *Sporting News* and will provide leadership and experience on the line. Junior Luke Fortner provides depth in that spot and true



freshman Eli Cox is looking for a spot in the rotation.

- Another one of those big question marks is who will replace First Team All-American and All-SEC performer Bunchy Stallings at right guard? Senior Mason Wolfe has the most experience after seeing action in 12 games last season. Also battling for the spot are sophomore Austin Dotson and redshirt freshman Kenneth Horsey. An interesting note about Horsey - he had open-heart surgery in April of 2018.
- The center spot looks to be locked up by junior Drake Jackson who has 20 consecutive starts under his belt. Redshirt freshman Quintin Wilson is an additional option as well as walk on Tyler Couch.

SPECIAL TEAMS PREVIEW

- Special teams coordinator Dean Hood brings a wealth of knowledge to the program as he enters his 32nd year of college coaching.
- Graduating senior Miles Butler made 7 of 11 field goals in 2018 and all 40 extra points. Looking to replace his production is redshirt freshman Chance Poore. He made 2-of-4 field goal attempts and all three extra-point tries in three games last season. He was the No. 1 punter/kicker in the 2018 class by ProKicker.com.
- Australian transplant Max Duffy will once again handle the punting duties. Duffy ranked sixth in the SEC and 14th nationally with a 44.8-yard average in 2018. Half of his punts, 30 of 60, were within the opponent 20-yard line, yet he also had only two touchbacks. He arrived in the United States as an early enrollee in January of 2018.
- Senior Grant McKinniss handled the kickoff duties and had 31 touchbacks last season.
- Senior Blake Best is the snapper for punts, field goals and PATs. He has handled FG/PATs the last three seasons and is adding punt snaps this year.
- Kickoff return specialist, Lynn Bowden Jr., returned 25 kickoffs for an average of 21.6 yards in 2018. He had two punt returns for TDs on just five total returns, a 58-yard punt return for a TD vs. Penn State and 67-yarder at Missouri. Bowden was one of just three players nationally with two punt returns for a TD.

DOMINANT DUFFY

- UK punter Max Duffy continues to be an absolute weapon for the Cats, dominating the field position game with his booming and accurate leg. The Australian punter remains on pace to average the most yards per punt for his career once he reaches the 75-punt threshold. He currently is average 45.62 on 66 kicks, well above the current high-water career mark - Glenn Pakulak's 44.43 from 2000-02 (134 punts).
- Duffy made a huge impact in Kentucky's win over Toledo.
- Punted six times for a 54-yard average, the second-highest single-game average in school history (min. 5 punts).
- He became the fifth different SEC punter since 2000 to average at least 54 yards per punt in a single game (min. six punts), and the first to do so since Florida's Johnny Townsend vs. Georgia on Oct. 28, 2017.
- Every punt was at least 53 yards, other than a 46-yarder that was downed on the 3-yard line.
- Toledo did not score on those possessions and UK scored 24 points on subsequent possessions.
- Punt chart and results:

DEFENSIVE PREVIEW

- Kentucky has a new defensive coordinator in Brad White, who joined the staff in 2018 as outside linebackers coach. White was promoted after Matt House accepted the linebackers position with the Kansas City Chiefs.
- White welcomes back 19 returning letterwinners, including four starters.
- UK started 19 different players on defense last season and five (OLB Josh Allen, DT Adrian Middleton, SS Mike Edwards, CB Derrick Baity and CB Lonnie Johnson Jr.) started in all 13 games.
- The good news is that 11 of those 19 players who started at least one game, return for the 2019 season.
- Also, of a possible 143 total starts (13 games, 11 starts per game), 66 total starts return on defense in 2019.
- Last season, UK ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 16.8 points per game. The defense also ranked 23rd nationally and fourth in the SEC in total defense yards per game (338.2), 18th in passing yards allowed (188.3) and 36th nationally in team passing efficiency defense (119.06 rating points).
- The 16.8 points per game in 2018 was the best since the 1979 defense allowed 13 points per contest.
- The positions where a starter from 2018 does not return are outside linebacker (Josh Allen), two cornerback spots (Derrick Baity and Lonnie Johnson Jr.), strong safety (Mike Edwards), free safety Darius West, weakside linebacker (Jordan Jones) and defensive tackle (Adrian Middleton).

Linebackers

2018 Starters Returning/Lost: 2/2

2018 Letterwinners Returning/Lost: 7/2

- Who will replace national defensive player of the year, First-Team All-American and first-round draft pick Josh Allen? That is the million dollar question. After compiling these impressive numbers in 2018 - team-high 88 tackles, 21 TFL, 17 sacks, 7 QBH, 5 FF, 4 QBH, 2 FR and 1 blocked kick - Allen's absence will surely be felt. However, Coach White is confident players such as junior outside linebackers Josh Paschal and Jamar "Boogie" Watson along with sophomore outside linebacker Jordan Wright have the tools to replace his production.
- Paschal, who played in all 13 games as a true freshman in 2017, redshirted last season due to battling melanoma in his right foot. He saw action in three games last season, playing vs. Middle Tennessee, Louisville and Penn State. As a freshman, he totaled 17 tackles, 4.5 TFL, 3.5 sacks, 3 QBH and 1 blocked kick.
- Watson saw action 12 of 13 games in 2018 with seven starting assignments, totaling 24 tackles, 5.0 sacks, 5.0 tackles for loss, three PBUs and one forced fumble. Wright saw action in nine games, totaling four tackles.
- The linebacking unit runs 13 deep and senior middle linebacker Kash Daniel is the team's lone returning captain and the team's leading returning tackler from 2018. He had 75 tackles along with 7.5 TFL and five QBH, despite playing most of the season with a broken left hand.
- Backing up Daniel is sophomore Jamin Davis, who impressed the coaching staff during spring practice with his speed and athleticism.
- Two super sophomores are interchangeable at the Will linebacker spot in Chris Oats and Deandre Square. Both shined as true freshman in 2018 as Oats earned his first career start at Texas A&M, while Square received a starting nod in the Citrus Bowl vs. Penn State. Square was eighth overall on the team in tackles with 35 along with 3.5 TFL and 1.0 sack. Oats was ninth in tackles with 27 and had 3.0 TFL and 2.0 sacks.
- Looking to contribute quality minutes at Sam linebacker behind Watson is sophomore Alex King. He saw playing time in nine games last season on special teams. Mid-year true freshman

Defensive Line

- Defensive line coach Derrick LeBlanc, a former defensive lineman at Northwestern State known for his toughness, is in his third season at Kentucky. His line features seven returning letter winners, including two starters in nose guard Quinton Bohanna (17 tackles, 4.0 TFL, 1.0 sacks, 1 FF, 1 FR) and 6-foot-9 defensive end Calvin Taylor Jr. (26 tackles, 6.0 TFL, 1.0 sacks, 1 PBU, 1 FR). Taylor also could see some time at tackle as well.
- Because of Kentucky's platoon system and improved depth in the down lineman positions, significant contributors are returning with experience. They should help make up for the loss of tackle Adrian Middleton (starter in all 13 games last season) and reserve noseguard Tymere Dubose to graduation. Those returners are senior T.J. Carter (16 tackles, 2.5 TFL, 1.0 sack, 4 QBH, 3 PBU) and junior Kordell Looney (15 tackles, 1.0 TFL) at defensive end, senior Phil Hoskins (21 tackles, 3.5 TFL, 3.0 sacks, 1 QBH, 1 FF) at tackle, and sophomore Marquan McCall (5 tackles) at noseguard.
- Two reserve nose guards, sophomore Abule Abade-Fitzgerald and redshirt freshman Qua Mahone, are sure to also be a productive part of the defense in 2019.
- Three players looking to earn a spot in the rotation are sophomore Davaon Hawkins at end and true freshmen Cavan Butler and Isaiah Gibson at tackle. Gibson was a mid-year enrollee and participated in spring practice.

- Coach Steve Clinkscale might have one of the hardest jobs this offseason as he replaces five talented defensive backs, including all four starters, from 2018. Gone are safeties Mike Edwards, now with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, and Darius West as well as cornerbacks Derrick Baity, a free agent with the Houston Texans, Lonnie Johnson Jr., selected in the second round of the NFL Draft by the Houston Texans and Chris Westry, a free agent with the Dallas Cowboys. The five combined for 161 career starts, 853 tackles, 77 PBUs and 24 interceptions.
- UK opponents completed just 57.4 percent of their passes in 2018 and the Wildcats ranked fourth in the SEC in pass defense, allowing just 186.3 yards per game in the air. UK ranked seventh in the SEC and 36th in the nation in pass efficiency defense.
- Kentucky received a big blow in late July when junior and Lexington native Davonte Robinson suffered an injury to his right quadriceps muscle that will require surgery and force him to miss the season. The safety played in all 13 games last season with three starting assignments. He showed big-play potential last season, charting 42 tackles (sixth on the team) and, on the final play of the game at Florida, returned a fumble 30 yards for a touchdown.
- Senior Jordan Griffin has played in 33 career games with five starting assignments at safety, totaling 41 tackles and six PBUs. He is primed for the starting spot at strong safety with sophomore Tyrell

- Behind Robinson at free safety is sophomore Yusuf Corker, who saw action in eight games last season and true freshman Moses Douglass, son of former Wildcat Maurice Douglass.
- Also looking to make immediate impacts at cornerback are redshirt sophomore Cedric Dort Jr., redshirt freshmen Stanley Garner and Jamari Brown. Mid-year enrollees - junior college transfers Brandin Echols and Quandre Mosley and true freshman Taj Dodson were able to showcase their talent in spring drills, while true freshmen M.J. Devonshire and Jalen Geiger are anxious to learn the ropes.

UK ADEPT AT HOLDING THIRD-QUARTER LEADS

- Kentucky has won 39 of its past 41 games when staked to a lead at the end of the third quarter, dating back to a 2008 loss vs. South Carolina.
- UK is 22-2 in the Mark Stoops era when holding a third-quarter lead. The only losses were in 2016 vs. Georgia and 2017 vs. Florida.

DOUBLE DIPPING

- Heading into the 2019 season there are only five schools in FBS/Division I that maintain at least three straight seasons of playing in a bowl game and the basketball program earning a bid to the NCAA men's basketball tournament. Kentucky has done so in three consecutive years after making the TaxSlayer Bowl, Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl and VRBO Citrus Bowl:

HERE, THERE, EVERYWHERE

- While most college football programs recruit regionally, Kentucky has expanded its reach as far west as Colorado, east to Maryland, north to Michigan and south to Florida. Furthermore, the Cats have a second kicker/punter from Australia, tapping into the ranks of young men who have a history with Australian rules football.
- The Cats' geographic roster breaks down in 15 different states and Australia: Kentucky (23), Ohio (21), Florida (18), Georgia (16), Tennessee (4), Maryland (3), Oklahoma (3), Alabama (3), Michigan (3), Louisiana (2), South Carolina (2), Colorado (1), Mississippi (1), Pennsylvania (1), and Australia (1).

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

- UK's uniform preparers have a little extra work to do this season and a little less space with which to do it. The Cats have six players whose names have "Jr." in it, two that are hyphenated and two others that could stump even the top finishers in the National Spelling Bee.
- The six players who are a "Jr." include: Lynn Bowden Jr., Allen Dailey Jr., Christopher Rodriguez Jr., Cedrick Dort Jr., Calvin Taylor Jr., and Clevon Thomas Jr.
- The Cats also have Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald, who has 15 characters in his last name, as well as Shawn'Kel Knight-Goff, Zac Berezowitz and Nik Ogrenovic.

CATS TIE/IMPROVE WIN TOTAL SIX STRAIGHT SEASONS

WOODSON ELECTED TO UK ATHLETICS HOF

The University of Kentucky Athletics Hall of Fame Class of 2019 has been announced, with DeMarcus Cousins (men's basketball), Henri Junghanel (rifle), A'dia Mathies (women's basketball), Vic Nelson (cross country/track and field), Don Weber (cross country/track and field) and Andre' Woodson (football) set to be inducted during Hall of Fame Weekend, Sept. 13-14, in conjunction with the football home game vs. Florida.

Andre' Woodson, Football (2004-07)

Kentucky's Most Valuable Player in 2006 and '07, leading the Wildcats to a pair of eight-win seasons and victories in the Music City Bowls ... Also MVP of both bowl wins ... Led UK to six fourth-quarter/overtime come-from-behind wins as a junior and senior, including victories over No. 9 Louisville and No. 1 LSU ... Threw for 9,360 yards and 79 touchdowns in his career ... Magnificent senior season, completing 63 percent of his passes for 3,709 yards and 40 TDs ... Set NCAA record for most consecutive passes without an interception ... Set SEC record for most TD passes in a season (40) and lowest interception ratio in a career ... All totaled, set two NCAA records, four SEC records and three UK records.



LIFT THEM UP

A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital will bring special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy this season as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field.

A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle will provide a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient will be chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

Offensive tackle and College of Engineering junior Luke Fortner (Sylvania, Ohio) and a team of TMMK engineers have worked for months



to design, test and manufacture the device through a project called "Lift Them Up."

The vehicle made its first appearance at the Cat Walk before Kentucky's season opener vs. Toledo.

The vehicle was inspired by themes of the design of the Kentucky Children's Hospital. Hospital patients are asked to contribute to the vehicle's constantly changing paint scheme by submitting drawings that could become new additions.

STOOPS NAMED SEC COACH OF THE YEAR

- Head coach Mark Stoops was named SEC Coach of the Year by the AP and Coaches, becoming the first UK coach to earn Coach of the Year honors since Jerry Claiborne in 1983.
- Stoops was named the No. 1 coaching performance in the 2018 college football season by CollegeFootballNews.com.
- The Cats won 10 games for the first time in 41 years, including seven over bowl-eligible teams and five over squads that won eight or more.
- UK's 5-3 mark in SEC play also was the team's first winning league record since 1977.
- The Cats won at Florida, ending a three-decade-old dry spell against the Gators, and then recorded the most-lopsided win in the history of the Governor's Cup series against Louisville.
- Stoops was a semifinalist for the George Munger Coach of the Year and was on the watch list for the Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year.

CATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

The 2019 NFL Draft was one for the history books as Kentucky saw five of its players, Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson Jr., Mike Edwards, Benny Snell Jr., and George Asafo-Adjei selected. UK had a player chosen in each of the first four rounds, a UK first. The only other schools to accomplish that feat in this year's draft were Alabama, Ohio State and Oklahoma.

- UK's five draft picks were the most since eight players (James Ramsey, Jim Kovach, Kelly Kirchbaum, Rod Stewart, Bob Winkel, Robert Hawkins, Dan Fowler and David Stephens) were chosen in 1979
- Josh Allen, selected as the seventh overall pick by the Jacksonville Jaguars, was the 17th player in UK history selected in the first round.
- Allen was UK's highest draft pick since Dewayne Robertson was selected as the fourth pick by the Jets in 2003.
- Allen was the 11th player in UK history chosen in the top 10 and the first since Dewayne Robertson was selected as the fourth pick by the Jets in 2003.
- Allen was the sixth player drafted under head coach Mark Stoops at Kentucky and the second first-round pick, joining Bud Dupree (Pittsburgh Steelers) in 2015.
- Since 2001, Coach Stoops has recruited and developed 12 first-round draft picks.
- Kentucky has had a linebacker drafted in five of the last six NFL drafts (2019 - Josh Allen, 2016 - Josh Forrest, 2015 - Bud Dupree, 2015 - Za'Darius Smith, 2014 - Avery Williamson).
- UK is the only school in the nation to have first-round picks in the 2019 NFL, MLB, and NBA Draft.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- Kentucky currently has five players on its roster who have already earned their undergraduate degrees and are in graduate school or will work on a second degree. They are Blake Best (master's degree in finance), Logan Stenberg (second degree in communication), Calvin Taylor Jr. (second degree in communication) and Mason Wolfe (master's degree in sport leadership). Troy transfer Sawyer Smith graduated in July and is now pursuing a master's degree at UK in sport leadership.
- Eight Wildcats are on track to graduate in December. They are Elijah Barnett, Kash Daniel, Max Duffy, Luke Fortner, Jordan Griffin, Phil Hoskins, Drake Jackson and Grant McKinniss.
- Seven Wildcats were named to the First Year SEC Academic Honor Roll: Brenden Bates - Marketing; Zachary Berezowitz - Economics; Tyler Couch - Sociology; Max Duffy - Psychology; Collin Hartmann

**THREE WILDCATS TO ETHIOPIA**

- In May of 2019, three Wildcats, defensive end Calvin Taylor Jr., offensive tackle Landon Young and linebacker Jamar "Boogie" Watson, were chosen by the athletic department to participate in a service/educational trip to the Ethiopia. During the week-long trip, they delivered essential nutrition, supplies, hope and love to families living in Korah, a slum made up of all the trash accumulated in Addis Ababa. With the care packages delivered, it could prevent them from digging for two weeks to a month; visited an orphanage with approximately 80 children; took teenagers from Korah to play arcade games and see the Avengers movie; paired with a feeding program that supplies meals to government schools in Cherkos, a poorer region in Addis Ababa. The program began as a result of kids fainting and lack of focus in the classroom due to malnutrition at home, often missing breakfast in the morning and at night only leaving them with one meal per day.
- UK has taken football student-athletes to Ethiopia on a service trip since 2011. Due to the state department's travel ban to Ethiopia in 2017, the Cats visited the DR.

#BRINGIT

- #BringIt is UK's mantra for the 2019 season. It originated from the VRBO Citrus Bowl win over Penn State, when the Nittany Lions unsuccessfully tried a fourth-down fake punt on the game's first possession. Coach Mark Stoops was seen on the sideline shouting, "Bring it on!" The inspirational moment helped spark the Wildcats toward the upset victory.

COACHING CHANGES

- UK defensive coordinator, Matt House, was hired to be the linebackers coach for the Kansas City Chiefs in February of 2019. That move prompted head coach Mark Stoops to promote outside linebackers coach Brad White to defensive coordinator and hire a former Wildcat, Jon Sumrall, to coach the inside linebackers.

CATS WELCOME TEN MID-YEAR ENROLLEES

- Kentucky welcomed 10 mid-year enrollees to the program in January. Seven (Jared Casey, Eli Cox, Taj Dodson, Moses Douglass, Isaiah Gibson, DeMarcus Harris, Tra Wilkins), are high school standouts who graduated in December, while Marquez Bembry (not participating in spring practice due to a knee injury), Brandin Echols, Quandre Mosely are junior college transfers.
- Bembry will have three years of eligibility, while Echols and Mosely will have two years.

**COUCH NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT**

Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch has been named to the ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, the National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame. Couch is one of 76 players and five coaches from the Football Bowl Subdivision and 101 players and 33 coaches from the divisional ranks.

A storied name of the Kentucky program, Couch, was the team's quarterback from 1996-98. After giving up his senior season of eligibility, he was drafted as the No. 1 pick by Cleveland in the 1999 NFL Draft. In 1998, the junior quarterback was named a first-team All-American and consensus Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Couch completed 400 of 553 passes for 4,275 yards and 36 touchdowns and led the nation in pass completions while ranked second in completion percentage, passing yardage and touchdown passes, and fourth in total offense. After guiding the Wildcats to the Outback Bowl, UK's first New Year's Day bowl appearance in 47 years, Couch finished fourth in Heisman Trophy balloting. He was also a finalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award as a junior and sophomore. His breakout sophomore campaign featured 363 of 547 passes completed for 3,884 yards and 37 touchdowns while leading the nation in pass attempts, completions, yardage, and completion percentage. Also during his sophomore year, Couch earned second-team All-SEC honors and finished ninth in Heisman voting. He played in seven games as a true freshman, with two starts. Career wise, Couch completed 795 passes on 1,184 attempts for 8,435 yards and 74 touchdowns. The legend ended his career with seven NCAA records, 14 SEC records, and 26 school records.

The announcement of the 2020 Class will be made in January 2020 in the days leading up to the College Football Playoff (CFP) National Championship in New Orleans. The 2020 College Football Hall of Fame Class will officially be inducted during the 63rd NFF Annual Awards Dinner on Dec. 8, 2020, at the New York Hilton Midtown. They will also be honored at their respective schools with an NFF Hall of Fame On-Campus Salute, presented by Fidelity Investments, during the 2020 season.

PASCHAL BATTLED CANCER, RETURNS TO THE FIELD

- In July of 2018, defensive lineman Josh Paschal was diagnosed with malignant melanoma on the bottom of his right foot. He underwent three surgeries, and followed that by ongoing monthly immunotherapy treatments. His final treatment was Aug. 7, 2019.
- In an extremely emotional moment for everyone associated with Kentucky football, Paschal returned to action against Middle Tennessee on Nov. 17, 2018.
- He started the game and saw occasional action throughout.
- In the second quarter, he made a tackle on a third down play that forced a punt. When his name was called as the tackler, the Kroger Field crowd gave him a roar of approval and rousing ovation.
- Teammate Kash Daniel offered this unique perspective of what Paschal means to the Cats: *"You ever like look at a living room and you look at one piece of furniture, like a carpet, and you're like, 'Wow, that really ties the room together.' That's what Josh does to this team, and Josh ties this team together. It's a funny way to put it, but seriously, that guy's the heartbeat of this team."*

KENTUCKY'S YOUNGSTOWN BOYS

As a neighbor of Pittsburgh, a.k.a. Steel City USA, Youngstown, Ohio has a reputation as a blue collar community defined by hard work and relationships forged over generations that are stronger than steel. Kentucky's football program is, in many ways, defined by that bond as it creates a southern alumni club from Youngstown, the hometown of head coach Mark Stoops and several other key members of the program. - Kentucky was the only school in the nation to have first-round picks in the 2019 NFL (Josh Allen), MLB (Zack Thompson), and NBA (PJ Washington, Tyler Herro, Keldon Johnson) drafts.
- This is the 129th season of intercollegiate football for Kentucky.
- Kentucky is in its seventh season under head coach **Mark Stoops**, who has energized the UK fan base with record-setting recruiting classes, facility upgrades and an influx in talent.
- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** is in his 42nd season in that role. A group of former players, staff members and current UK coaches pitched in during the summer of 2017 to surprise him with a new Ford Escape. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, giving him 46 years in UK football.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships, including 20 of the last 24, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.
- Kentucky is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.

KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 300 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 163-133-4 record (.551), 27-17 under Mark Stoops.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 14 of the last 16 seasons.
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-- begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics. Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015

season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites. New bench-back seating has been installed in the South upper level of Kroger Field.

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Mississippi State, Missouri and Vanderbilt.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Pregame concerts: The Kentucky Football Pregame Concert Series has returned for the 2018 season. Concerts will begin on the stage outside Gate 12 immediately following the Cat Walk and last until 30 minutes prior to kickoff. The Cat Walk takes place two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff.

Coca Cola Fan Zone: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Fan Zone located in Nutter Field House. It will have inflatable games, free posters, face tattoos and more, available two hours before kickoff.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy this season as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

No. 1, Mark Stoops, Kentucky

Kentucky might have gone bowling last year [2017], but absolutely no one outside of the biggest blue die-hards could've seen what was coming ... Stoops put together a masterpiece. Ten wins, a victory over Florida for the first time since 1986, a 46-point blowout over Louisville, and a Citrus Bowl win over Penn State – it was a special coaching job.

So wrote Pete Fiutak of CollegeFootballNews.com, who put Mark Stoops atop his list of the nation's best coaching performances of the 2018 season.

Early on, one could sense that the '18 campaign could be special when Stoops' troops won at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America.

Kentucky went on to win five Southeastern Conference games, including a 28-7 win over No. 14-ranked Mississippi State and a miraculous comeback at Missouri, as Stoops posted UK's first winning SEC record in 41 years.

The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

A season that featured five victories considered upsets by the experts was fittingly finished with the finale -- a 27-24 triumph over favored, No. 12-ranked Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl.

All totaled, the 10-3 record was Kentucky's best season since 1977 and only the third 10-win season in school history. UK was No. 11 in the final *USA Today* coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984.

Stoops was well-recognized for Kentucky's breakthrough season. In addition to the No. 1 listing from CollegeFootballNews.com, he was named SEC Coach of the Year by the league coaches, Athlon Sports and The Associated Press. His name also appeared on watch lists for National Coach of the Year honors.

Stoops' individual accolades also extended to his players. Linebacker Josh Allen earned three National Defensive Player of the Year Awards and was a unanimous first-team All-American.

**STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING**

In six seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's seven classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Offensive guard Bunchy Stallings also was a first-team All-American and running back Benny Snell earned second-team All-America while becoming UK's all-time leading rusher.

The 2018 season continued a remarkable trend – since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK is the only school in the nation that has tied or improved its win total in each of the last six seasons.

That steady progression has culminated in multiple achievements:

- From 2016-18, UK won at least seven games and finished at least .500 in the Southeastern Conference each season. It's the first time UK won seven games and finished at least .500 in the league in three consecutive seasons since 1949-51.
- The Wildcats placed second in the SEC Eastern Division in 2016 and 2018, the team's best finishes since the league split into divisions in 1992.
- UK's 2016-17-18 bowl appearances are only the third time in school history that the Cats have advanced to a bowl in at least three consecutive seasons.
- UK won three road games in both 2017 and '18. It's the first time UK has won

three road games in back-to-back seasons since 1949-50.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops' ability to adjust when necessary shone its brightest at the beginning of the 2016 season. After losing the first two games of the schedule, *and* seeing his starting quarterback out for the season with an injury, *and* seeing his defense struggle in the early stages, Stoops didn't retreat. The Wildcat coach chose determination over despair and went back to work, revising the offense for a new QB while becoming more involved in helping coach the defense.

The results? The Wildcats went 7-3 in the last 10 regular-season games, topped by a win at No. 11-ranked Louisville. Stoops was named 2016 SEC Coach of the Year runner-up by Athlon Sports. That was the beginning of a turnaround which resulted in three straight bowl games and culminated in the VRBO

Citrus Bowl victory – representing UK's first New Year's Day bowl game in 20 years.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornelius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the



team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who retired in 2017 after 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is special teams coordinator at Youngstown State.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two sea-

sons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Mark and his wife, Chantel, have two sons, Will and Zack.
