CATS RETURN HOME FOR PIVOTAL SEC EAST FIGHT VS. MISSOURI

After a soggy slugfest between the hedges at Georgia last Saturday, Kentucky returns to the friendly confines of Kroger Field for an SEC East matchup with Missouri on Saturday night. The game is set for a 7:30 p.m. ET kickoff and will air on the SEC Network.

The Cats are seeking to go into their second bye week of the 2019 season with a win, which would be their fifth straight over the Tigers. Both teams will be breathing fire after tough losses last week. UK stood toe-to-toe with 10th-ranked Georgia for much of a rain-soaked night but couldn't generate enough offense, while Missouri had a close loss at Vanderbilt.

Should junior athlete Lynn Bowden Jr. draw his third straight start at quarterback, he will be looking to continue what has been a brilliant effort at the position thus far. In two starts there he has registered 295 rushing yards and fell just a single yard shy of recording back-to-back 100-yard ground games.

The UK defense also has shown stark improvement and continues to give the team a chance to win despite its inexperience on that side of the ball, particularly in the secondary. It allowed just 270 total yards to Georgia last weekend.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky is 3-4 on the season and 1-4 in SEC play.
- Lynn Bowden Jr. has turned in impressive effort since shifting over to play quarterback due to injuries, delivering a virtuoso performance with 196 rushing yards and two touchdowns to go along with 78 passing yards and his first career passing touchdown against Arkansas two weeks ago. With 99 rushing yards vs. Georgia he now has 295 in two games as the QB.
- Bowden, a Paul Hornung Award nominee for the nation's most versatile athlete, ranks 10th nationally and leads the SEC in all-purpose yards, averaging 142.1 yards per game.
- His 196 rushing yards vs. Arkansas are the second-most for a quarterback in UK history.
- Bowden reached 1,000 career receiving yards in the season opener and 100 career receptions vs. Florida. He had 210 all-purpose yards vs. Mississippi State.
- Against South Carolina, Bowden became the second FBS player since 2000 to have at least six rushing attempts, three receptions, three kickoff returns, and two passing completions in a single game (also Kalen Ballage, Arizona State vs. Oregon, Oct. 29, 2016).
- Junior punter Max Duffy has been sensational, ranking fourth in FBS in punting at 48.2 yards per kick. He was named the Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week for his performance at South Carolina on Sept. 28.
- Duffy is the school's all-time leading punter at 46.0 yards per kick.
- With Duffy's punting and hustling coverage by the punt team, UK leads the nation with 45.3 net yards per punt.
- WR Ahmad Wagner is averaging 20.7 yards per reception.
- Since 2016, UK is 12-5 in games decided by seven points or less.
- The Cats now are 13-7 over their past 20 games.
- UK has allowed 24 points or less in 19 of its last 22 games. That is the best such stretch since October 14, 1978 to Sept. 6, 1980. UK allowed 24 points or less in 18 of 19 games in that stretch.
- Kentucky has allowed 34 points or less in 21 straight games, the longest active streak in the nation. The 21 straight games at 34 points or less is the longest for Kentucky since a 45-game streak from 1976-80.
- Last weekend, Georgia's longest pass play was 22 yards. Kentucky entered the game as one of

only seven FBS teams that have not allowed a pass play of 40 yards this season.

- Since the start of the 2018 season, UK and Washington are tied for the fewest pass plays of 40+ yards (four) among FBS teams.
- Kentucky did not give up a touchdown pass at Georgia and is tied for first among FBS teams with the fewest touchdown passes allowed, three.
- UK has made 129 consecutive extra points, the sixth-longest active streak in the nation.
- UK is now 9-5 in its last 14 SEC home games, best since a 9-5 stretch from 1953-57.
- This is coach Mark Stoops' seventh season in Lexington and the Wildcats have either matched or exceeded the previous season's win total in each of the past six seasons, making them the only program in FBS to accomplish that feat.
- Kentucky has played five true freshmen (M.J. Devonshire, Taj Dodson, Moses Douglass, DeMarcus Harris and Tra Wilkins) and 14 redshirt freshmen in at least one game this season.
- Stoops has 39 wins during his tenure, tied with Rich Brooks for the fifth-most in school history. Stoops also has 29 wins at Kroger Field, tied for the second-most wins in the current stadium.
- Stoops' "recruit and develop" mentality culminated in 2018 with a 10-3 record, UK's best season in 41 years and only the third 10-win season in school history.
- UK's 5-3 SEC record also was the team's first winning league mark since 1977. The Cats finished second in the SEC Eastern Division.

- Saturday's game captain is former quarterback Bill Ransdell (1983-86). He set Wildcat season records for most offensive plays, total offense, pass attempts, pass completions, passing yardage, completion percentage and consecutive passes without an interception. He held single-game UK records for total plays, pass attempts, completions and completion percentage and notched then-school career records for total offense (5,456 yards), total offensive plays (996), pass attempts (816), completions (460), passing yardage (5,564) and completion percentage (.575). Ransdell also helped lead the Wildcats to a 9-3 record and Hall of Fame Bowl victory in 1984 and went on to a two-year career in the NFL.
- Representing Kentucky Children's Hospital, the "Lift Them Up" Kid of the Game is Taytum Jackson from London, Kentucky. She was born 13 weeks early and weighed only 1lb, 9oz and spent the first five months of her life in the Kentucky Children's Hospital Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Today, however, she is a thriving 7-year-old who enjoys playing Xbox with her little brother, dancing, swimming, and pretending to be a baby doctor.

SCOUTING MISSOURI

- Missouri is 5-2 on the season, including a 2-1 start in league play.
- The Tigers are coming off a 21-14 loss at Vanderbilt in their first SEC defeat of the season.
- The Tigers have shown an explosive offense this season and the defense has really shined, allowing only 270 yards per game. That total is good for seventh in the nation in overall defense.
- Mizzou also is excellent in holding opponents in the red zone, ranking seventh nationally in red zone defense.
- Quarterback Kelly Bryant is a graduate transfer from Clemson, where he had an accomplished career. Bryant has completed better than 63 percent of his passes for 13 touchdowns against just five interceptions and 245.0 yards per game. He also has rushed for 209 yards and a score.
- Running back Larry Rountree is averaging 83.0 yards per game and has eight touchdowns on the ground.
- Missouri has 13 sacks on the season, paced by four from Kobie Whiteside. Mizzou has 47 tackles for loss, including eight by Jordan Elliott.

MISSOURI

SERIES VS. MISSOURI

- Kentucky leads the all-time series 6-3, including 3-1 in Lexington.
- The SEC East rivals have met every year since 2012 with Mizzou winning the first three meetings and UK the past four.
- Only one of the past four meetings have been decided by more than a possession, UK's 35-21 win at Missouri in 2016.
- Each of the past two games came down to the closing minutes - even final play, with UK winning 40-34 in 2017 and 15-14 last season on one final untimed down.
- Biggest UK win: 14 (35-21) in 2016 in Columbia.
- Biggest Mizzou win: 31 (48-17) in 2013 in Lexington.
- Games decided by eight points or less: UK leads 5-0.
- Last season's meeting was an instant classic, as Terry Wilson connected with C.J. Conrad for a touchdown on the final play of the game to give the Cats the victory.
- UK trailed 14-3 with under six minutes remaining when the comeback started with Lynn Bowden Jr. returning a punt 67 yards for a score to cut the deficit to 14-9.
- The Cats got the ball back on their own 19-yard line with 1:24 remaining and quickly made their way down the field. With four seconds left, Wilson lofted a pass to the back corner of the end zone where Ahmad Wagner caught it but couldn't stay in bounds. However, Missouri was flagged for pass interference, setting up the final untimed down.
- UK dominated the yardage, out-gaining Mizzou 385 to 249 for the game.
- Bowden set career-bests with 13 receptions for 166 yards in the game.
- UK coach Mark Stoops is 4-2 vs. Missouri during his tenure.

KENTUCKY-MISSOURI CONNECTIONS

- Neither program has a player from the other state.
- UK offensive coordinator Eddie Gran spent a season at Southeast Missouri State in 1989, his third year of coaching.
- Defensive line coach Derrick LeBlanc spent two seasons at Missouri State (2006-07).
- UK co-offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Darin Hinshaw spent three years (2010-12) on Mizzou offensive coordinator Derek Dooley's staff while he was head coach at Tennessee.

MILESTONES TO WATCH

- Junior WR **Lynn Bowden Jr.** has 114 career receptions and is the 17th Wildcat player to catch at least 100 passes in his career. He ranks 13th on the school's all-time list and needs 17 more to break into UK's top 10 list and tie Rafael Little at No. 10 with 131 (2004-07).
- Bowden became the 30th player in school history to reach 1,000 career receiving in the season opener and now has 1,303 in his career. He needs 22 more to move past James Whalen (1997-99) into 17th place on all-time UK list.
- Bowden has returned two punts for a touchdown in his career, both coming during the 2018 season. With one more return to the house he would join Dicky Lyons Sr. (1966-68) and Larry Carter (1976-79) in a tie for second on the career list with three punt return touchdowns. Derek Abney (2000-03) holds the school record with six.
- Bowden has 1,608 kickoff return yards in his career, which ranks fourth on UK's all-time list. Derek Abney holds the record with 2,315. He needs 61 more to move up to No. 3 with Kio Sanford (1,669 - 1994-97).
- Bowden is just the third player in school history to have at least 1,500 career kickoff return yards and 1,000 career receiving yards (Derek Abney and Keenan Burton).
- Senior RB **A.J. Rose** needs 64 yards to become the 37th member of UK's 1,000-yard rushing club.
- Head coach **Mark Stoops** has 39 career victories at Kentucky. He needs two more to tie Blanton Collier (1954-61) and Jerry Claiborne (1982-89) for third on the school's all-time list.

- It is the most rushing yards for a Wildcat vs. an SEC opponent since Rafael Little ran for 198 yards at Vanderbilt in 2005.
- It is the second-most for a UK quarterback in school history. Mike Fanuzzi ran for 208 yards vs. Miami (Ohio) in 1974.
- Bowden is the first UK quarterback to rush for 100 yards since Terry Wilson in last season's win at Florida.
- He completed 7 of 11 passes for 78 yards and his first collegiate TD pass.
- Because of his dominant performance, Bowden earned SEC Co-Offensive Player of the Week, his second Paul Hornung Award Weekly Honor Roll honor and the Manning Award National Quarterback of the Week.
- He is the first UK quarterback with two rushing and one passing touchdown in a game since Patrick Towles vs. Mississippi State in 2014.
- Bowden ranks tenth nationally at 142.1 all-purpose yards per game.
- FBS players since 2000 to have at least 20 rushing attempts, 10 passing attempts, and a punt return in the same game: Antwaan Randle El (Indiana), Julian Edelman (Kent State), Bowden.
- Bowden was a First-Team Midseason All-America selection as an all-purpose player by ESPN and the Associated Press.

DOMINANT DUFFY

- UK punter Max Duffy continues to be an absolute weapon for the Cats, dominating the field position game with his booming and accurate leg. The Australian punter and Ray Guy Award candidate has the UK career record, averaging 46.0 on 93 kicks.
- Duffy was named the Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week for week five after setting two school records in the Sept. 28 game against South Carolina: He broke his own single-game school record (min. 8 punts), averaging 51.1 yards on nine kicks...For the game, had four punts inside the 20 with no touchbacks and his net average was 51.3 yards per punt...Created a turnover as he had one punt that hit a South Carolina player and was recovered by the Wildcats...All five punts that originated from at least the UK 27-yard line ended up inside the Gamecock 20 ... During that game he also became UK's career punting average leader.
- For the season, he is averaging 46 yards per punt, good for fourth in the nation. UK leads the nation with a team net of 45.27 yards.
- Duffy was a First-Team Midseason All-America choice by ESPN and The Sporting News and Second-Team Midseason All-America selection by the Associated Press.

BOWDEN, DUFFY NAMED MIDSEASON ALL-AMERICANS

Kentucky juniors Lynn Bowden Jr. and Max Duffy have been named midseason All-Americans by The Associated Press and ESPN. On the AP team, Bowden was named to the first team as an all-purpose player, while Duffy earned second-team honors as a punter. Duffy was also named a midseason All-American by Sporting News.

- Bowden currently leads the SEC and ranks 10th nationally in all-purpose yards, averaging 142.14 per game.
- Earned several honors after his thrilling performance vs. Arkansas, including All-SEC Co-Offensive Player of the Week, Paul Hornung Honor Roll and a Manning Award "Star of the Week"
- Accounted for 274 yards of total offense and all three touchdowns in his first collegiate start as a quarterback ... Connected on 7 of 11 passes for 78 yards and his first career scoring pass, and also rushed a career-high 24 times for 196 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-winning 24-yard touchdown scamper in the fourth quarter
- His 196 rushing yards were the most for a Wildcat against an SEC foe in 14 years. It was the second-most rushing yards for a Kentucky quarterback in school history.
- Bowden is UK's leading receiver with 30 catches for 348 yards and one TD this season
- Currently ranks 13th on UK's career receptions list and is 18th on the career receiving yards list with 1,303 yards
- Leads the team in kick returns with eight for 200 yards (25.0) and punt returns with four for 53 yards (13.2)
- Duffy ranks fourth nationally in punting at 48.2 yards per punt.
- Has been consistently dominant and earned Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week for week five vs. South Carolina when he broke his own single-game record (min. eight punts) by averaging 51.1 yards on nine kicks.

LAST SATURDAY

- Kentucky fell to Georgia, 21-0, in Athens.
- The game was played in a steady rain from start to finish with wind from a tropical storm that had made its way across the south picking up in the second half.
- The conditions made throwing the football nearly impossible, as the two teams combined for a total of 52 yards through the air.
- The game was scoreless at halftime. Ultimately, the Bulldogs took control after a pair of UK miscues: a 15-yard punt and a fumble, both deep in Wildcats' territory.
- Kentucky limited Georgia to 270 offensive yards, the fewest the Wildcats have allowed this season.
- Kentucky limited Georgia to 35 passing yards, fewest since limiting Austin Peay to 27 passing yards in 2016.
- Kentucky has allowed 34 points or less in 21 straight games, the longest active streak in the nation. The 21 straight games at 34 points or less is the longest for Kentucky since a 45-game streak from 1976-80.
- Georgia's longest pass play was 22 yards. Kentucky entered the game as one of only seven FBS teams that have not allowed a pass play of 40 yards this season.
- Since the start of the 2018 season, UK and Washington are tied for the fewest pass plays of 40+ yards (four) among FBS teams.
- UK did not give up a touchdown pass and is tied for first among FBS teams with the fewest touchdown passes allowed, three.
- The last time UK held an opponent scoreless in the first half was vs. Ohio in 2014.
- The last time UK held an SEC opponent scoreless in the first half was vs. Tennessee in 2011.
- The last time both teams were scoreless in the half was 1996 vs. Indiana.
- Junior athlete Lynn Bowden Jr. made his second collegiate start at quarterback. He rushed 17 times for 99 yards.

- Sophomore safety Yusuf Corker had a career-high 11 tackles. It is the fourth consecutive game he has tied or broken his career high in stops, totaling 7, 9, 9 and 11 tackles in successive games.
- Sophomore linebacker DeAndre Square had nine tackles, including a seven-yard tackle for loss.
- Senior kickoff returner Zach Johnson had a 58-yard return, the longest of his career.

PASCHAL NAMED NOMINEE FOR MAYO CLINIC COMEBACK PLAYER OF THE YEAR AND CAPITAL ONE ORANGE BOWL-FWAA COURAGE AWARD

- Joshua Paschal, a sophomore outside linebacker, has made an inspiring return to the football field after overcoming a malignant melanoma that appeared on the bottom of his right foot just before training camp was to open in July of 2018. He underwent three surgeries and monthly immunotherapy treatments for more than a year before being cleared in August. His final treatment was Aug. 7, 2019. He's now a nominee for both the Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award and the Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award.
- He battled back to return on a limited basis for the final three games of the 2018 season and has made an immediate impact this season. Paschal, who was voted a team captain by his peers, has started in all seven games for the Wildcats this season. He has totaled 23 tackles, 5.0 tackles for loss, one sack, a pass breakup and a forced fumble in his return.

WILSON OUT FOR SEASON

- Junior quarterback Terry Wilson will miss the remainder of the 2019 season because of a torn patellar tendon in his left knee that will require surgery.
- Wilson was injured late in the third quarter of UK's win over Eastern Michigan. In two games this season, Wilson completed 33 of 52 passes (63.5 percent) for 360 yards and two touchdowns. He also had 44 net rushing yards and a TD. In the 2018 season, he completed 67.2 percent of his passes for 1,889 yards and 11 touchdowns, also running for 547 net yards and four TDs.
- The junior from Oklahoma City, Okla., started all 15 games since his arrival last season. He has led Kentucky to a 12-3 record, including UK's first winning Southeastern Conference mark since 1977 and a VRBO Citrus Bowl championship. He is one of the most historically significant quarterbacks in Kentucky annals. Official starting lineups are available since 1993, however it is likely that Wilson's 12-3 record in his first 15 starts is matched only by College Football Hall of Famer Vito "Babe" Parilli. As Kentucky's quarterback in 1949-51, Parilli likely led his Wildcats to a 12-3 record in his first 15 starts – a 9-3 record in 1949 and a 3-0 mark to begin the 1950 season.

PETERS GRANTED ELIGIBILITY

- Outside linebacker Xavier Peters was granted immediate eligibility for the 2019 season after transferring into the program this summer. He will have four seasons of eligibility remaining.
- The 6-foot-4, 235-pounder from Middletown, Ohio redshirted the 2018 season while at Florida State, appearing in two games but preserving his season of eligibility under NCAA rules. He recorded a solo tackle and pass breakup in a win over Wake Forest and also saw action against eventual national champion Clemson.
- Peters was a consensus four-star prospect in the class of 2018 and ranked as the No. 5 overall prospect in the talent-rich state of Ohio. He also was the No. 15 outside linebacker in the nation according to 247Sports and honored as an Under Armour All-American.

YOUNG NAMED TO ALLSTATE AFCA NATIONAL GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Junior offensive tackle has been selected to the 2019 Allstate AFCA (American Football Coaches Association) Good Works Team®, an annual award given to college football players for the impact they make off the field. His one of just 11 players from the FBS named to the team.
- His numerous community service projects include volunteering at a local nursing home, speaking to youth organizations, volunteering at Habitat for Humanity and traveling to Ethiopia for a one-week service trip to help the people of Addis Abab and Korah

OFFENSE

- "Balance" has been the hallmark of the Kentucky offense under Eddie Gran, UK assistant head coach for offense. The Wildcats have totaled more than 2,000 rushing yards and 2,000 passing yards in all three seasons that Gran has been here. Prior to Gran's arrival, this had been accomplished in only two seasons total in school history.
- The Cats have averaged at least 25.5 points per game in all three seasons, only the third time in school history UK averaged at least 25.5 in three straight years.



- In the Gran era, UK has rushed for 7,738 yards, best three-year total since the 1970s, when Kentucky ran the ball almost exclusively.
- UK has had a 1,000-yard rusher in three straight seasons (Boom Williams, Benny Snell Jr.); prior to this, UK had never had 1,000-yard rushers in back-to-back seasons, let alone three straight seasons.
- Despite having starting quarterbacks who had never played in a major-college game in 2016 (Stephen Johnson) and 2018 (Terry Wilson), UK won 24 games over three seasons and went to three straight bowl games.
- Two wide receivers (Garrett Johnson and Dorian Baker) and one tight end (C.J. Conrad) became 1,000-yard career receivers during the last three seasons.
- UK has won 24 games in three seasons (2016-18), the most in school history since 1949-51.

Quarterbacks

- Junior Terry Wilson won the starting job at the start of the 2018 season and led the Wildcats to their first 10-win season since 1977. The 10 wins are the most for a first-year starting QB in school history.
- Troy transfer Sawyer Smith stepped in for Wilson at the start of the fourth quarter vs. Eastern Michigan and completed 5 of 9 passes for 76 and two touchdowns. In his first career start vs. Florida, Smith going 23-of-35 for 267 yards and two touchdowns.
- Smith played in all 13 games last season for Troy, starting the final seven games for coach Neal Brown, a former Kentucky wide receiver and offensive coordinator. Smith went 5-2 as the starter, completing 144-of-229 passes for 1,669 yards and 14 touchdowns. He also rushed for 191 yards and a score. The 6-foot-3, 219-pounder graduated from Troy in July 2019 with a degree in social science and is working on a master's degree in sport leadership at UK.
- Sophomores and Kentucky natives Walker Wood (Lexington) and Kolbe Langhi (Hopkinsville) backup Smith, along with freshman signal caller Amani Gilmore (Amite, La.).
- Junior wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr., who played quarterback in high school, made his first career start against Arkansas and delivered a brilliant performance that resulted in him winning SEC Player of the Week, Manning Quarterback Player of the Week and other national honors after rushing for 196 yards and two scores as part of his night.
- True freshman Nik Scalzo (Fort Lauderdale, Fla.) is out for the season after suffering a torn ACL in preseason camp.

Running Backs

- The biggest question mark entering the 2019 season was who would succeed UK's all-time leading rusher and All-American Benny Snell Jr.? Before foregoing his senior season and declaring for the NFL Draft, Snell set just about every rushing record at UK, including becoming the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards or more in three straight seasons.
- Junior A.J. Rose has earned the starting nod and has rushed for 457 yards and two scores on 91 carries this season. He is averaging 5.0 yards per carry and 65.3 yards per game.
- Rose is tied for 22nd nationally and tied for second in the SEC in carries of at least 20 yards this season (six).
- Rose and Bowden each have at least six carries of at least 20 yards so far this season. Kentucky is one of five FBS schools to have at least two players with at least five carries of at least 20 yards along with Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Ole Miss and Toledo.
- Also making names for themselves after redshirting last season are Christopher Rodriguez and Kavosiey Smoke. Smoke has proven to be a big-play threat with touchdown runs of 40 and 32 yards already this season. He's the first back in UK history to have scoring runs of at least 32 yards in each of the first two games of a season. In seven games, Smoke has 58 rushes for 333 yards and a team-high three touchdowns.
- Rodriguez had six carries for a career-high 65 yards and a score vs. South Carolina. For the season, he is averaging 6.9 yards per attempt.

Wide Receivers

- Wide receivers coach Michael Smith is in his second season with the Wildcats and is having to rely on a plethora of young talent as three of the top four wideouts from last season are gone.
- UK's top target has been Lynn Bowden Jr., whose speed and elusiveness make him a breakaway threat anytime he has the ball. He is among the SEC leaders in receiving with 30 catches for 348 yards and one touchdown.
- Last season, Bowden set the UK record for most pass receptions by a sophomore with 67 catches. He also led the team with 745 receiving yards, averaging 11.1 yards per catch.

- Former Iowa basketball player Ahmad Wagner has proven to be a difficult cover (see note below) and is second on the team in catches and yards. He ranks among the nation's best in yards per catch.
- UK is currently missing the services of junior Isaiah Epps, who has been out since the summer with a foot fracture.

AHMAD FLAG-NER

- Kentucky's secret weapon on offense might just be the presence of senior Ahmad Wagner, a.k.a. "Ahmad Flag-ner" (h/t Curtis Burch). Wagner, a 6-foot-5, 238-pound receiver, is in his final year of eligibility after transferring from Iowa where he played three seasons on the basketball team.
- Wagner now has been targeted 35 times in his career, with 12 catches for 248 yards and 11 pass interference penalties drawn (one catch and PI occurred on the same play).
- It's interesting to note that, of his 22 possessions that had a completion or pass interference, 15 of them eventually scored a touchdown or field goal.

Tight Ends

- Justin Rigg and Keaton Upshaw have had the unenviable task of replacing four-year starter C.J. Conrad. The duo has given UK size and speed at the position and combined for 15 receptions for 177 yards through the first seven games.
- Upshaw sat out last season due to a season-ending knee injury has been impressive with six catches for 70 yards and a touchdown catch vs. the Gators. Rigg has seven catches for 64 yards.
- Senior Drew Schlegel and redshirt freshman Brenden Bates also see action, primarily in blocking situations.

Offensive Line

- Offensive line coach John Schlarman can be described in one word - tough. The 2018 Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award nominee was diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma in July of 2018. Despite his health issues, he has coached through countless chemotherapy treatments and has not missed a practice or a game.
- Schlarman was a four-year starter with the Wildcats from 1994-97. He is in his seventh season at UK.
- The O-line boasts three returning starters in center Drake Jackson, left guard Logan Stenberg and left tackle Landon Young who helped Benny Snell Jr., become the first player in school history with 1,000 rushing yards in three consecutive seasons.
- Young is in his second season as a starter. He sat out the entire 2018 season with a knee injury. His backup is sophomore Naasir Watkins who saw significant action last season.
- The graduation of George Asafo-Adjei, selected in the seventh round of the NFL Draft by the N.Y. Giants, freed up the right tackle spot. Sophomores Darian Kinnard and Naasir Watkins, who both saw significant action last season, are stepping in nicely at that position.
- At left guard, three-year starter Logan Stenberg deciding to come back for his senior season

- Replacing 2018 First Team All-American and All-SEC performer Bunchy Stallings at right guard is junior Luke Fortner, who started every game at that spot. Junior Luke Fortner has started in all seven games at that spot, while senior Mason Wolfe is the backup.
- The center spot is locked up by junior Drake Jackson who has a current streak of 26 consecutive starts under his belt. Redshirt freshman Quintin Wilson is an additional option as well.

OFFENSIVE LINE RECOGNIZED BY JOE MOORE AWARD

The Kentucky offensive line has been named a member of the midseason honor roll for the Joe Moore Award, recognizing the Most Outstanding Offensive Line Unit in college football.

Three players have rushed for more than 300 yards (A.J. Rose, Lynn Bowden Jr., and Kavosiey Smoke) and the team is on pace for a fourth consecutive season of more than 2,000 rushing yards.

The Wildcats have done this despite missing three departed starting linemen from a year ago, the school's all-time leading rusher from last season, and this year's top three quarterbacks are all injured – two are out for the season – and the current starting QB is a converted wide receiver.

The Wildcats' running game is averaging a 192.3 yards per game, good for sixth in the Southeastern Conference.

What The Committee Is Saying: "You can tell this is a coachable bunch. They all do a very good job of working their feet into position to get blocks sealed and hand placement has clearly been drilled into them because they are good at it."

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Special teams coordinator Dean Hood brings a wealth of knowledge to the program as he is in his 32nd year of college coaching.
- Looking to replace the production of 2018 senior kicker Miles Butler, is redshirt freshman Chance Poore and junior Matt Ruffolo. Poore is 3-of-7 this season with a long of 46 and 14-of-14 extra points. Ruffolo hit his first career field goal at Mississippi State before drilling a career-long 50-yarder in the win over Arkansas.
- Australian transplant Max Duffy once again handles the punting duties. For the season, he is averaging 46 yards per punt, good for fourth in the nation. UK leads the nation with a team net of 45.27 yards. The 26-year-old arrived in the United States as an early enrollee in January of 2018. See more notes on Duffy below.
- Senior Grant McKinniss handles the kickoff duties and has 20 touchbacks so far this season.
- Senior Blake Best is the snapper for punts, field goals and PATs. He has handled FG/PATs the last three seasons and has added punt snaps this year.
- Lynn Bowden Jr. has handled punt and kickoff returns this season. He is averaging 13.2 yards on punt returns and hopes to add to his two punt return TDs from last season (at Missouri and vs. Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl). He is averaging 25 yards on kickoff returns.

DOMINANT DUFFY

- UK punter Max Duffy continues to be an absolute weapon for the Cats, dominating the field position game with his booming and accurate leg. The Australian punter and Ray Guy Award




candidate has the UK career record, averaging 46.0 on 93 kicks.

- Duffy was named the Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week for week five after setting two school records in the Sept. 28 game against South Carolina: He broke his own single-game school record (min. 8 punts), averaging 51.1 yards on nine kicks...For the game, had four punts inside the 20 with no touchbacks and his net average was 51.3 yards per punt...Created a turnover as he had one punt that hit a South Carolina player and was recovered by the Wildcats...All five punts that originated from at least the UK 27-yard line ended up inside the Gamecock 20 ... During that game he also became UK's career punting average leader.
- Duffy made a huge impact in Kentucky's win over Toledo ... Punted six times for a 54-yard average, the second-highest single-game average in school history (min. 5 punts) ... Became the fifth different SEC punter since 2000 to average at least 54 yards per punt in a single game (min. six punts), and the first to do so since Florida's Johnny Townsend vs. Georgia on Oct. 28, 2017 ... Every punt was at least 53 yards, other than a 46-yarder that was downed on the 3-yard line ... Toledo did not score on those possessions and UK scored 24 points on subsequent possessions.
- His punting also made a huge impact in Kentucky's win over EMU ... Punted three times, with the three punts forcing Eastern Michigan to start on its own 8, 11 and 13-yard lines ... Average starting field position for EMU after Duffy's punts was inside its own 11-yard line ... EMU did not score following any of his punts, helping set up UK touchdowns on both of its subsequent possessions (a third EMU possession ended the half).
- Against Florida, he had two punts for 109 yards, including a season-long 63-yarder. Both were inside the 20-yard line.
- For the season, he is averaging 46 yards per punt, good for fourth in the nation. UK leads the nation with a team net of 45.27 yards.
- Duffy was a First-Team Midseason All-America choice by ESPN and The Sporting News and Second-Team Midseason All-America selection by the Associated Press.

DEFENSE

- Kentucky has a new defensive coordinator in Brad White, who joined the staff in 2018 as outside linebackers coach. White was promoted after Matt House accepted the linebackers position with the Kansas City Chiefs.
- White has significant rebuilding on defense with only four starters returning from 2018.
- Kentucky is one of seven FBS schools to not allow a passing play of at least 40 yards so far this season.
- Since the start of last season, Kentucky and Washington are tied for the fewest passing plays of at least 40 yards allowed among FBS schools (four).
- Kentucky is tied for first nationally in fewest passing touchdowns allowed (three).
- Last season, UK ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 16.8 points per game. The defense also ranked 23rd nationally and fourth in the SEC in total defense yards per game (338.2), 18th in passing yards allowed (188.3) and 36th nationally in team passing efficiency defense (119.06 rating points).
- The 16.8 points per game in 2018 was the best since the 1979 defense allowed 13 points per contest.
- The positions where a starter from 2018 does not return are outside linebacker (Josh Allen), two cornerback spots (Derrick Baity and Lonnie Johnson Jr.), strong safety (Mike Edwards), free safety Darius West, weakside linebacker (Jordan Jones) and defensive tackle (Adrian Middleton).

WOODSON ELECTED TO UK ATHLETICS HOF

The University of Kentucky Athletics Hall of Fame Class of 2019 consisting of DeMarcus Cousins (men's basketball), Henri Junghanel (rifle), A'dia Mathies (women's basketball), Vic Nelson (cross country/track and field), Don Weber (cross country/track and field and Andre' Woodson (football), were inducted during Hall of Fame Weekend, Sept. 13-14, in conjunction with the football home game vs. Florida.

Andre' Woodson, Football (2004-07)

Kentucky's Most Valuable Player in 2006 and '07, leading the Wildcats to a pair of eight-win seasons and victories in the Music City Bowls ... Also MVP of both bowl wins ... Led UK to six fourth-quarter/overtime come-from-behind wins as a junior and senior, including victories over No. 9 Louisville and No. 1 LSU ... Threw for 9,360 yards and 79 touchdowns in his career ... Magnificent senior season, completing 63 percent of his passes for 3,709 yards and 40 TDs ... Set NCAA record for most consecutive passes without an interception ... Set SEC record for most TD passes in a season (40) and lowest interception ratio in a career ... All totaled, set two NCAA records, four SEC records and three UK records.

- UK has allowed 24 points or less in 19 of its last 22 games. That is the best such stretch since October 14, 1978 to Sept. 6, 1980. UK allowed 24 points or less in 18 of 19 games in that stretch.
- Kentucky has allowed 34 points or less in 21 straight games, the longest active streak in the nation. The 21 straight games at 34 points or less is the longest for Kentucky since a 45-game streak from 1976-80.
- Kentucky's defense recorded an interception in each of the first four games of a season for the first time since 2007.

Linebackers

- The biggest task on defense has been replacing outside linebacker Josh Allen, who was National Defensive Player of the Year and first-team All-American last season after compiling these impressive numbers in 2018 - team-high 88 tackles, 21 TFL, 17 sacks, 7 QBH, 5 FF, 4 QBH, 2 FR and 1 blocked kick. However, junior outside linebackers Josh Paschal and Jamar "Boogie" Watson along with sophomore outside linebacker Jordan Wright are narrowing the gap.
- Watson leads the team with 5.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 quarterback sacks and six QB hurries.
- Paschal, who played in all 13 games as a true freshman in 2017, redshirted last season due to battling melanoma in his right foot. He is second on the team in tackles for loss with 5.0 and his sixth in total tackles with 23.
- Senior middle linebacker Kash Daniel is the team's leading returning tackler from 2018. He had 75 tackles along with 7.5 TFL and five QBH,



despite playing most of the season with a broken left hand. He's currently the team's No. 3 tackler with 35 and has added 4.0 TFL, an interception, three PBU and two QBH.

- Backing up Daniel is sophomore Chris Oats who has 27 tackles.
- Sophomore DeAndre Square has emerged as a big-play performer this season. He is currently UK's second-leading tackler with 49 and has 4.0 TFL, 1.5 sacks, one interception and three QBH.

Defensive Line

- Defensive line coach Derrick LeBlanc, a former defensive lineman at Northwestern State known for his toughness, is in his third season at Kentucky. His line features seven returning letter winners, including two returning starters in nose guard Quinton Bohanna and 6-foot-9 defensive end/tackle Calvin Taylor Jr. Taylor leads the down linemen with 21 tackles, including four for loss and three sacks. Bohanna has 13 tackles and a sack.
- End T.J. Carter is having his best year as a senior with 14 tackles, including three for loss.
- Noseguard Marquan McCall (12 tackles, one TFL), end Kordell Looney (six tackles), and Abule Abad-Fitzgerald (three tackles) have provided quality depth.
- UK has missed the services of senior tackle Phil Hoskins, a fine pass rusher, who is out indefinitely because of a knee injury.

Secondary

- Coach Steve Clinkscale might have one of the hardest jobs as he has had to replace five talented defensive backs, including all four starters, from 2018. Gone are safeties Mike Edwards, now with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, and Darius West as well as cornerbacks Derrick Baity, Lonnie Johnson Jr., now the Houston Texans' starting corner, and Chris Westry. The five combined for 161 career starts, 853 tackles, 77 PBUs and 24 interceptions.
- Kentucky received a big blow in late July when junior and Lexington native Davonte Robinson suffered an injury to his right quadriceps muscle that will require surgery and force him to miss the season. The safety played in all 13 games last season with three starting assignments. He showed big-play potential last season, charting 42 tackles (sixth on the team) and, on the final play of the game at Florida, returned a fumble 30 yards for a touchdown.
- At strong safety, Jordan Griffin, who has played in 39 career games with nine starting assignments, is the lone senior in the secondary. In six games played this season, he has 12 tackles, 1.0 TFL/sack, one INT and two PBUs. Griffin missed most of the last two games because of injury, with junior college transfer Quandre Mosely starting in his place. Mosely had an interception in his first at Mississippi State.
- Sophomore Tyrell Ajian is the starter in the nickel package. He has 10 tackles in six games with his first career INT coming against No. 9 Florida.
- Sophomore free safety Yusuf Corker, who saw action in eight games last season, is the team's leading tackler in 2019 with 51. He also has three PBUs and one fumble recovery. He recorded a career-high nine tackles in back-to-back games vs. South Carolina and Arkansas. Corker was forced to miss the second half of the Florida game after a targeting penalty.
- Junior college transfer Brandin Echols is the starter at one cornerback spot and has shined with 34 tackles (fourth on the team) and a team-high seven PBUs. True freshmen M.J. Devonshire serves as his backup.
- The other cornerback starter is sophomore Cedric Dort Jr., who is backed up by redshirt freshmen Jamari Brown.

DOUBLE DIPPING

- There are only five schools in FBS/Division I that maintain at least three straight seasons of playing in a bowl game and the basketball

- While most college football programs recruit regionally, Kentucky has expanded its reach as far west as Colorado, east to Maryland, north to Michigan and south to Florida. Furthermore, the Cats have a second kicker/punter from Australia, tapping into the ranks of young men who have a history with Australian rules football.



- The Cats' geographic roster breaks down in 15 different states and Australia: Kentucky (22), Ohio (21), Florida (18), Georgia (16), Tennessee (4), Maryland (3), Oklahoma (3), Alabama (3), Michigan (3), Louisiana (2), South Carolina (2), Colorado (1), Mississippi (1), Pennsylvania (1), and Australia (1).

LIFT THEM UP

A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital will bring special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy this season as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field.

A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle will provide a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient will be chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

Offensive tackle and College of Engineering junior Luke Fortner (Sylvania, Ohio) and a team of TMMK engineers have worked for months to design, test and manufacture the device through a project called "Lift Them Up."


The vehicle made its first appearance at the Cat Walk before Kentucky's season opener vs. Toledo.

The vehicle was inspired by themes of the design of the Kentucky Children's Hospital. Hospital patients are asked to contribute to the vehicle's constantly changing paint scheme by submitting drawings that could become new additions.

CATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

The 2019 NFL Draft was one for the history books as Kentucky saw five of its players, Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson Jr., Mike Edwards, Benny Snell Jr., and George Asafo-Adjei selected. UK had a player chosen in each of the first four rounds, a UK first. The only other schools to accomplish that feat in this year's draft were Alabama, Ohio State and Oklahoma.

- UK's five draft picks were the most since eight players (James Ramsey, Jim Kovach, Kelly Kirchbaum, Rod Stewart, Bob Winkel, Robert Hawkins, Dan Fowler and David Stephens) were chosen in 1979
- Josh Allen, selected as the seventh overall pick by the Jacksonville Jaguars, was the 17th player in UK history selected in the first round.
- Allen was UK's highest draft pick since Dewayne Robertson was selected as the fourth pick by the Jets in 2003.
- Allen was the 11th player in UK history chosen in the top 10 and the first since Dewayne Robertson was selected as the fourth pick by the Jets in 2003.
- Allen was the sixth player drafted under head coach Mark Stoops at Kentucky and the second first-round pick, joining Bud Dupree (Pittsburgh Steelers) in 2015.
- Since 2001, Coach Stoops has recruited and developed 12 first-round draft picks.



COUCH NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT

Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch has been named to the ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, the National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame. Couch is one of 76 players and five coaches from the Football Bowl Subdivision and 101 players and 33 coaches from the divisional ranks.

A storied name of the Kentucky program, Couch, was the team's quarterback from 1996-98. After giving up his senior season of eligibility, he was drafted as the No. 1 pick by Cleveland in the 1999 NFL Draft. In 1998, the junior quarterback was named a first-team All-American and consensus Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Couch completed 400 of 553 passes for 4,275 yards and 36 touchdowns and led the nation in pass completions while ranked second in completion percentage, passing yardage and touchdown passes, and fourth in total offense. After guiding the Wildcats to the Outback Bowl, UK's first New Year's Day bowl appearance in 47 years, Couch finished fourth in Heisman Trophy balloting. He was also a finalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award as a junior and sophomore. His breakout sophomore campaign featured 363 of 547 passes completed for 3,884 yards and 37 touchdowns while leading the nation in pass attempts, completions, yardage, and completion percentage. Also during his sophomore year, Couch earned second-team All-SEC honors and finished ninth in Heisman voting. He played in seven games as a true freshman, with two starts. Career wise, Couch completed 795 passes on 1,184 attempts for 8,435 yards and 74 touchdowns. The legend ended his career with seven NCAA records, 14 SEC records, and 26 school records.

The announcement of the 2020 Class will be made in January 2020 in the days leading up to the College Football Playoff (CFP) National Championship in New Orleans. The 2020 College Football Hall of Fame Class will officially be inducted during the 63rd NFF Annual Awards Dinner on Dec. 8, 2020, at the New York Hilton Midtown. They will also be honored at their respective schools with an NFF Hall of Fame On-Campus Salute, presented by Fidelity Investments, during the 2020 season.

- Kentucky has had a linebacker drafted in five of the last six NFL drafts (2019 - Josh Allen, 2016 - Josh Forrest, 2015 - Bud Dupree, 2015 - Za'Darius Smith, 2014 - Avery Williamson).
- UK is the only school in the nation to have first-round picks in the 2019 NFL (Josh Allen, Mike Edwards, Lonnie Johnson Jr., Benny Snell Jr., George Asafo-Adjei), MLB (Zack Thompson), and NBA Draft (P.J. Washington, Tyler Herro and Keldon Johnson).



ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- Kentucky currently has five players on its roster who have already earned their undergraduate degrees and are in graduate school or will work on a second degree. They are Blake Best (master's degree in finance), Logan Stenberg (second degree in communication), Calvin Taylor Jr. (second degree in communication) and Mason Wolfe (master's degree in sport leadership). Troy transfer Sawyer Smith graduated in July and is now pursuing a master's degree at UK in sport leadership.
- Eight Wildcats are on track to graduate in December. They are Elijah Barnett, Kash Daniel, Max Duffy, Luke Fortner, Jordan Griffin, Phil Hoskins, Drake Jackson and Grant McKinniss.
- Seven Wildcats were named to the First Year SEC Academic Honor Roll: Brenden Bates – Marketing; Zachary Berezowitz – Economics; Tyler Couch – Sociology; Max Duffy – Psychology; Collin Hartmann – Management; Shawn Lawson – Undeclared; Quintin Wilson – Management

THREE WILDCATS TO ETHIOPIA

- In May of 2019, three Wildcats, defensive end Calvin Taylor Jr., offensive tackle Landon Young and linebacker Jamar "Boogie" Watson, were chosen by the athletic department to participate in a service/educational trip to the Ethiopia. During the week-long trip, they delivered essential nutrition, supplies, hope and love to families living in Korah, a slum made up of all the trash accumulated in Addis Ababa. With the care packages delivered, it could prevent them from digging for two weeks to a month; visited an orphanage with approximately 80 children; took teenagers from Korah to play arcade games and see the Avengers movie; paired with a feeding program that supplies meals to government schools in Cherkos, a poorer region in Addis Ababa. The program began as a result of kids fainting and lack of focus in the classroom due to malnutrition at home, often missing breakfast in the morning and at night only leaving them with one meal per day.
- UK has taken football student-athletes to Ethiopia on a service trip since 2011. Due to the state department's travel ban to Ethiopia in 2017, the Cats visited the DR.

#BRINGIT

- #BringIt is UK's mantra for the 2019 season. It originated from the VRBO Citrus Bowl win over Penn State, when the Nittany Lions unsuccessfully tried a fourth-down fake punt on the game's first possession. Coach Mark Stoops was seen on the sideline shouting, "Bring it on!" The inspirational moment helped spark the Wildcats toward the upset victory.

COACHING CHANGES

- UK defensive coordinator, Matt House, was hired to be the linebackers coach for the Kansas City Chiefs in February of 2019. That move prompted head coach Mark Stoops to promote outside linebackers coach Brad White to defensive coordinator and hire a former Wildcat, Jon Sumrall, to coach the inside linebackers.

TEN MID-YEAR ENROLLEES

- Kentucky welcomed 10 mid-year enrollees to the program in January. Seven (Jared Casey, Eli Cox, Taj Dodson, Moses Douglass, Isaiah Gibson, DeMarcus Harris, Tra Wilkins), are high school standouts who graduated in December, while Marquez Bembry (not participating in spring practice due to a knee injury), Brandin Echols, Quandre Mosely are junior college transfers.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Kentucky was the only school in the nation to have first-round picks in the 2019 NFL (Josh Allen), MLB (Zack Thompson), and NBA (PJ Washington, Tyler Herro, Keldon Johnson) drafts.
- This is the 129th season of intercollegiate football for Kentucky.
- Kentucky is in its seventh season under head coach **Mark Stoops**, who has energized the UK fan base with record-setting recruiting classes, facility upgrades and an influx in talent.
- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** is in his 42nd season in that role. A group of former players, staff members and current UK coaches pitched in during the summer of 2017 to surprise him with a new Ford Escape. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, giving him 46 years in UK football.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships, including 20 of the last 24, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.
- UK is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.



KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 301 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 165-134-4 record (.552), 29-18 under Mark Stoops.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 14 of the last 16 seasons.
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner--begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015

season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites. New bench-back seating has been installed in the South upper level of Kroger Field.

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Mississippi State, Missouri and Vanderbilt.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Pregame concerts: The Kentucky Football Pregame Concert Series has returned for the 2018 season. Concerts will begin on the stage outside Gate 12 immediately following the Cat Walk and last until 30 minutes prior to kickoff. The Cat Walk takes place two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff.

Coca Cola Fan Zone: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Fan Zone located in Nutter Field House. It will have inflatable games, free posters, face tattoos and more, available two hours before kickoff.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy this season as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.



Terry Wilson threw two touchdown passes, Asim Rose and Kavosiey Smoke each ran for TDs and Kentucky overcame Toledo to pull away 38-24 in the season opener for both schools.

The Wildcats rallied twice against the Rockets to enter the break tied at 14 before taking control in the second half. A third-quarter fumble recovery led to Chance Poore's 46-yard, go-ahead field goal before Bryce Oliver's leaping grab of Wilson's 32-yard TD pass provided a 10-point lead.

Smoke's 40-yard TD run down the left side midway through the fourth made it 31-17. Kentucky then converted DeAndre Square's interception into Wilson's 2-yard TD pass to Josh Ali to clinch the first meeting between the schools.

Wilson completed 19 of 26 passes for 246 yards. Justin Rigg recovered Chris Rodriguez's goal-line fumble in the end zone for Kentucky's first TD and A.J. Rose (16 carries, 64 yards) ran for an 11-yard score. Smoke had 78 yards rushing on seven carries as the Wildcats outgained Toledo 422-347.

Toledo led twice on first-half TD runs of 5 yards by former Kentucky running back Bryant Koback and 21 by quarterback Mitchell Guadagni.

Guadagni left the game in third after his helmet was knocked off after being tackled by Chris Oats, who was ejected for targeting. Replacement Carter Bradley ran for a 7-yard TD with 1:02 remaining.



Backup quarterback Sawyer Smith threw two touchdown passes in relief of injured Terry Wilson, who rushed for a TD before hurting his left leg, and Kentucky rolled past Eastern Michigan 38-17 in Kroger Field.

Wilson's 2-yard TD run in the third quarter put the Wildcats up 24-3 before he was carted off later with the injury following a horse-collar tackle by EMU defensive lineman Turan Rush, who was flagged on a play with offsetting penalties. Wilson exited to cheers after teammates offered supportive handshakes.

Smith, a junior transfer from Troy, came in and hit Ahmad Wagner for a 54-yard touchdown and Lynn Bowden for the final 2-yard TD with 54 seconds remaining. Asim Rose and Kavosiey Smoke rushed for TDs of 8 and 32 yards, respectively, in a game the Wildcats led throughout.

Kentucky outgained the Eagles (1-1) 461-386, including a 239-49 rushing edge. But the Wildcats committed seven penalties for 84 yards, several of which snuffed first-half chances to put the game out of reach.

Eagles quarterback Mike Glass III threw TD passes of 26 and 7 yards and completed 34 of 53 attempts for 337 yards.



In his first start at quarterback for Kentucky, Sawyer Smith passed for 251 yards and two touchdowns, but the Cats suffered their first loss of the season, falling to No. 8 Florida 29-21 at Kroger Field.

The game was evenly played throughout before the Gators put it away late. Florida had 438 yards of total offense, while Kentucky had 407. The Cats had 27 first downs, compared to just 21 for the Gators.

The Gators got on the board first, when Feleipe Franks connected with Freddie Swain on a 15-yard touchdown pass, giving them a 7-0 lead with 6:27 left in the first quarter.

Early in the second, UK evened the score when Smith connected with Ahmad Wagner on a spectacular, acrobatic 26-yard TD score.

On UF's next possession, Franks was sacked by Kordell Looney, who forced a fumble that was recovered by UK's Taj Dodson at the UK 46 yard line. From there, the Cats drove and eventually took the lead on a one-yard TD run by Smith with 7:46 left in the first half.

Florida's next drive appeared to be one that would tie the game. However, the Gators' march stalled inside Kentucky territory, and McPherson's 27-yard field goal attempt missed to the right, keeping the score 14-7. That would be the score at halftime.

On the first drive of the second half, Kentucky appeared ready to stretch its lead until Smith was intercepted by Shawn Davis, who returned the pick to the Kentucky 21-yard line. The Gators got to the UK 12-yard line before a penalty backed them up. Eventually, McPherson convert, a 32-yard field goal attempt, cutting Kentucky's lead to 14-10. U K had the answer, marching 75 yards in just six plays, culminating with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Smith to Keaton Upshaw, the first of Upshaw's career. Poore's PAT gave the Cats a 21-10 lead with 5:39 to play in the third quarter. The key play in the drive was an athletic catch by Wagner for 21 yards, which was compounded by a 15-yard penalty on the Gators.

Florida, with backup Kyle Trask playing QB in place of the injured Franks, proceeded to march 62 yards in six plays, and cut into Kentucky's lead when Lamical Perine scored on an eight-yard run. Florida's two-point conversion try was no good, and the Gators trailed 21-16 with 12:41 to play.

After a Smith interception, Florida would re-take the lead with a four-play, 66-yard scoring drive, capped by Trask's four-yard touchdown run. The two-point try failed again, and the Gators led 22-21 with 4:11 to play.

That set the stage for Kentucky's final drive, when the Cats drove deep into Florida territory with less than a minute to play. With 58 seconds left in the game, Poore tried a 35-yard field goal, but missed right.

On Florida's next possession, as the Gators were running out the clock, Josh Hammond broke free and scampered 76 yards for a touchdown to put the game away.



Lynn Bowden Jr. caught seven passes for 129 yards, and A.J. Rose carried nine times for 105 yards, but Kentucky lost at Mississippi State 28-13 on Saturday at Davis Wade Stadium.

Quarterback Sawyer Smith connected on 15 of 41 passing for 232 yards, but no touchdowns. Josh Ali caught a career-high five passes for 61 yards in the game.

Kentucky got the ball to begin the game and after Rose earned a first down on the ground, Smith was intercepted by Willie Gay, who returned the pick 52 yards for a touchdown. Jace Christmann added the PAT and the Bulldogs grabbed a 7-0 lead just 1:25 into the game.

After the teams exchanged punts, Kentucky mounted its first big drive of the game. The Cats went 10 plays, covering 58 yards, and UK got on the board when Chance Poore nailed a 40-yard field goal, cutting the MSU lead to 7-3 with 2:49 remaining in the first quarter. That would be the score after the first 15 minutes of play.

MSU had the answer, marching 75 yards in nine plays, capped by a Kylin Hill nine-yard touchdown rush early in the second quarter. The PAT was good, and the Bulldogs led 14-3 with 13:24 left in the first half.

After another Kentucky punt, MSU drove 80 yards in 10 plays and Hill scored again, this time from two yards out. Christmann's extra point made it 21-3 with 4:45 left in the first half.

Late in the first half, MSU appeared to be ready to add to the lead, but Quandre Moseley intercepted the first pass of his UK career and returned it 39 yards to the MSU 49 yard line with 48 seconds left in the half. But the Cats settled for a 47-yard field goal try that Poore missed to the left, and the teams went to the locker room with the Bulldogs leading 21-3.

Mississippi State took the second half kickoff and immediately drove into Kentucky territory. But Brandin Echols, who led Kentucky with 10 tackles on the day, forced a fumble, which was recovered by UK's Jamari Brown at the UK 20. The Cats took advantage of the turnover, going 80 yards in 11 plays, finishing with a Kavosiey Smoke two-yard touchdown rush. Poore's PAT made it 21-10 MSU with 5:30 left in the third quarter.

After MSU was forced to punt, Kentucky mounted another drive, getting deep inside Bulldog territory early in the fourth quarter. But the Cats could not punch it in, and Poore missed a 26-yard field goal with 12:15 to play.

Kentucky's final points of the game came later in the fourth quarter when Matt Ruffolo attempted, and made, his first career field goal. The 29-yarder cut the MSU lead to 21-13, but the Bulldogs added a late touchdown to provide the final margin of victory.

Christopher Rodriguez Jr. rushed for a career-high 65 yards and his first career touchdown, but Kentucky lost at South Carolina 24-7 at Williams-Brice Stadium.

Kentucky had its struggles on offense all night. Other than Rodriguez, one of the bright spots was Lynn Bowden Jr. who was seemingly all over the field. Bowden had six carries for 44 yards, caught three passes for 18 yards, completed both of his passes for seven yards and returned three kickoffs for 84 yards in the game.

On defense, Jamar Watson led the way with a pair of sacks, while Yusuf Corker had nine tackles and Chris Oats had eight.

South Carolina took the opening kickoff and marched 75 yards in 11 plays, culminating with a Tavien Feaster two-yard touchdown rush. Parker White added the point after and the Gamecocks grabbed a 7-0 lead with 11:09 remaining in the first period.

Kentucky got a first down on its first possession before Sawyer Smith was intercepted near midfield. But the Cats' defense held, forcing a punt. Kentucky punted on its next possession, but the Cats got a break when the punt hit a South Carolina player and was recovered by Brett Slusher at the Gamecock 39. However, the Cats could not convert, giving the ball back to South Carolina.

The teams would then exchange punts near the end of the first quarter, which would end with South Carolina leading 7-0.

Early in the second quarter, South Carolina drove deep into Kentucky territory, but the UK defense stood tall again, forcing a 26-yard field goal that White converted, giving the Gamecocks a 10-0 lead with 11:43 left in the first half. Neither team would score for the rest of the half, and South Carolina took a 10-point lead into the break.

Kentucky received the second-half kickoff, but the Cats turned the ball over, and South Carolina struck immediately, with a 30-yard touchdown rush from Rico Dowdle. The PAT gave the Gamecocks a 17-0 lead with 13:59 left in the third quarter. The Gamecocks added a fourth-quarter touchdown to lead 24-0 before Rodriguez's late touchdown got the Cats on the board.



Lynn Bowden Jr. accounted for three touchdowns in his first start at quarterback, including the go-ahead 24-yard scoring run with 6:53 remaining, to rally Kentucky past Arkansas 24-20 to end a three-game losing streak.

Emotions ran high for the entirety of Jared Lorenzen Day at Kroger Field. Lorenzen's family and teammates were on the field for a pregame ceremony and Wilson led the crowd in 22 seconds of noise in lieu of a moment of silence. The evening ended just as Lorenzen would have wanted: with a dramatic 24-20 win over Arkansas in comeback fashion on the strength of a total team effort.

The Wildcats' top receiver took first-team snaps during the bye while banged-up Sawyer Smith recovered and was announced as the starter before the game. Trailing 13-0, the junior led Kentucky back from a sluggish offensive start with a 3-yard run late in the first half before eventually seizing the lead with a 10-yard TD pass to Clevan Thomas late in the third.

Bowden then directed a 75-yard drive ending with his second TD run and sealed the close victory with a 51-yard run in the final minutes. He finished with a career-best 196 yards rushing on 24 carries and completed 7 of 11 passes for 78 yards.

A.J. Rose added 90 yards rushing on 16 carries as the Wildcats outrushed the Razorbacks (2-4, 0-3) 330-183 and outgained them 418-305 overall.

Rakeem Boyd rushed for 134 yards and two touchdowns, including a 74-yard TD run on the game's second play, as Arkansas took a 13-0 lead. His 2-yard TD put the Razorbacks ahead 20-17 but they ended up losing their 14th consecutive SEC game and third close contest in a row.

"Well, really proud that we got win for in Jared's memory and for his family," Stoops said. "And proud of our team by the way they played and hopefully they kept him in the back of their mind because that's how Jared played. He really laid it on the line for his team each and every week and I was proud of our group tonight in his memory."

Playing in a downpour that created a slick playing surface, Kentucky fell to No. 10 Georgia 21-0 at Sanford Stadium.

Lynn Bowden Jr. rushed for 99 yards in the slippery conditions, while Asim Rose rushed for 37 yards. Bowden, playing quarterback once again in place of the injured Sawyer Smith, completed just two passes in the game for 15 yards through the air.

The Kentucky defense more than held its own against the powerful Georgia offense. The Bulldogs had just 270 yards of total offense in the game, including just 35 yards passing. Yusuf Corker led the Cats with 11 tackles, while DeAndre Square had nine and Chris Oats, playing for the injured Kash Daniel, had seven stops.

Kentucky was shut out for the first time since Nov. 12, 2012, a stretch of 83 games in which the Cats had scored.

The teams were unable to mount much offense in the first quarter. Each team had three possessions in the period, with each possession ending with a punt.

After each team punted to start the second quarter, Georgia had possession and elected to go for it on fourth down and one from the 50 yard line. But the Kentucky defense stood tall, forcing a turnover on downs and giving the Cats the ball in good field position. But Kentucky was unable to convert, and the Cats punted once again.

The teams would go scoreless in the first half, with neither team seriously threatening to score. Georgia had six first downs in the first half to Kentucky's two. The Bulldogs out-gained the Cats 123-52 in total yards in the first half, with all of Kentucky's yards coming on the ground.

Kentucky took the second half kickoff and immediately marched into Georgia territory, largely on the legs of Bowden. The Cats got inside the Georgia 30, but were stifled by a key holding penalty on a third down and were forced to punt.

After the teams exchanged punts again, Georgia broke the scoring drought with a 39-yard rushing touchdown from D'Andre Swift. Rodrigo Blankenship added the PAT to give the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead with 6:20 remaining in the third quarter.

On its next possession, facing a third down and four, Bowden fumbled and Georgia took over at the Kentucky 31. And once again, the Bulldogs took advantage, as Brian Herrien scored on an eight-yard run. Blankenship's PAT was good, and Georgia led 14-0 with 1:54 left in the third period.

On the ensuing kickoff, Kentucky got a 58-yard kickoff return from Zach Johnson, giving the Cats the ball at the Georgia 40. The Cats would drive into the Georgia red zone as the third quarter came to a close. But as the final stanza began, Kentucky was not able to convert on fourth and goal from the eight yard line as Bowden's pass intended for Josh Ali was incomplete.

UGA added another Swift touchdown later in the fourth quarter to close the scoring.

No. 1, Mark Stoops, Kentucky

Kentucky might have gone bowling last year [2017], but absolutely no one outside of the biggest blue die-hards could've seen what was coming ... Stoops put together a masterpiece. Ten wins, a victory over Florida for the first time since 1986, a 46-point blowout over Louisville, and a Citrus Bowl win over Penn State – it was a special coaching job.

So wrote Pete Fiutak of CollegeFootball-News.com, who put Mark Stoops atop his list of the nation's best coaching performances of the 2018 season.

Early on, one could sense that the '18 campaign could be special when Stoops' troops won at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America.

Kentucky went on to win five Southeastern Conference games, including a 28-7 win over No. 14-ranked Mississippi State and a miraculous comeback at Missouri, as Stoops posted UK's first winning SEC record in 41 years.

The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

A season that featured five victories considered upsets by the experts was fittingly finished with the finale -- a 27-24 triumph over favored, No. 12-ranked Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl.

All totaled, the 10-3 record was Kentucky's best season since 1977 and only the third 10-win season in school history. UK was No. 11 in the final *USA Today* coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984.

Stoops was well-recognized for Kentucky's breakthrough season. In addition to the No. 1 listing from CollegeFootballNews.com, he was named SEC Coach of the Year by the league coaches, Athlon Sports and The Associated Press. His name also appeared on watch lists for National Coach of the Year honors.

Stoops' individual accolades also extended to his players. Linebacker Josh Allen earned three National Defensive Player of the Year Awards and was a unanimous first-team All-American.



STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

In six seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's seven classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Offensive guard Bunchy Stallings also was a first-team All-American and running back Benny Snell earned second-team All-America while becoming UK's all-time leading rusher.

The 2018 season continued a remarkable trend – since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK is the only school in the nation that has tied or improved its win total in each of the last six seasons.

That steady progression has culminated in multiple achievements:

- From 2016-18, UK won at least seven games and finished at least .500 in the Southeastern Conference each season. It's the first time UK won seven games and finished at least .500 in the league in three consecutive seasons since 1949-51.
- The Wildcats placed second in the SEC Eastern Division in 2016 and 2018, the team's best finishes since the league split into divisions in 1992.
- UK's 2016-17-18 bowl appearances are only the third time in school history that the Cats have advanced to a bowl in at least three consecutive seasons.
- UK won three road games in both 2017 and '18. It's the first time UK has won

three road games in back-to-back seasons since 1949-50.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops' ability to adjust when necessary shone its brightest at the beginning of the 2016 season. After losing the first two games of the schedule, and seeing his starting quarterback out for the season with an injury, and seeing his defense struggle in the early stages, Stoops didn't retreat. The Wildcat coach chose determination over despair and went back to work, revising the offense for a new QB while becoming more involved in helping coach the defense.

The results? The Wildcats went 7-3 in the last 10 regular-season games, topped by a win at No. 11-ranked Louisville. Stoops was named 2016 SEC Coach of the Year runner-up by Athlon Sports. That was the beginning of a turnaround which resulted in three straight bowl games and culminated in the VRBO

Citrus Bowl victory – representing UK's first New Year's Day bowl game in 20 years.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornelius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the

team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who retired in 2017 after 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is special teams coordinator at Youngstown State.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two sea-

sons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.
