KENTUCKY HITS THE ROAD FOR FIRST TIME, TRAVELS TO SOUTH CAROLINA

Kentucky will travel to unfriendly confines for the first time this season when it takes on South Carolina at Williams-Brice Stadium on Saturday. Game time is 7 p.m. EDT and it will air on ESPN2.

The Cats will be seeking a 2-0 start to conference play for just the second time since 1977 (also 2018).

The Wildcats' new offense is under the guidance of coordinator Liam Coen, who came to Lexington after a successful tenure on the staff of the NFL's Los Angeles Rams, piled up more than 500 total yards in each of the first two games of the season for the first time in school history and ranks 27th nationally. With a deep, veteran offensive line bookended by All-American Darian Kinnard and LSU transfer Dare Rosenthal, the power running of Chris Rodriguez Jr. and a wide receiver corps that features Josh Ali and Wan'Dale Robinson, the Cats showed the hallmarks of an explosive group.

Defensively, the Cats are mixing a youth movement with productive seniors Yusuf Corker, Marquan McCall, Josh Paschal, DeAndre Square and others. The unit ranks 21st nationally through three weeks and has shown a knack for coming up with critical plays with the game in the balance.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky took care of business on its three-game homestand to open the season and now heads to South Carolina looking for a 2-0 start to SEC play for just the second time since 1977
- UK has won six of the past seven meetings in the series with the Gamecocks.
- UK is 3-0 for the third time under Coach Mark Stoops, also 2017 and 2018.
- UK's 26 victories since the start of the 2018 season rank sixth-most in the SEC.
- The new-look offense piled up over 500 total yards in each of the first two games for the first time in school history. Against ULM it was via the pass (419 yards) and against Missouri it game on the ground (340 yards).
- UK has won 13 straight non-conference games, dating back to the 2017 Music City Bowl loss to Northwestern. It is the third-longest such streak in FBS (see page 3).
- Coach Mark Stoops is his ninth season in Lexington. He is 52-50 overall.
- Stoops started his tenure 12-26 but has gone an astounding 40-24 since that time, moving over .500 for the first time in his term as head coach.

- Stoops has reached two milestones this season. His ninth season ties Fran Curci (1973-81) for the most seasons as head coach at Kentucky and his 102 games has passed Curci (100 games) for most games as head coach.
- Stoops is the second-longest tenured coach in the SEC (behind Alabama's Nick Saban) and the 14th-longest nationally.
- Stoops became the first head coach to take UK to five straight bowl games. The previous record was by Rich Brooks in his last four seasons, 2006-09.
- After three weeks, the Cats rank among the nation's best on both sides of the football. UK ranks 21st nationally in total defense and 27th in total offense.
- The new-look offense ranks 11th nationally in yards per completion (15.49) and saw two receivers hit the 100-yard receiving mark in the same game for the first time since 2011 in the opener. The Cats are 22nd in passing efficiency.
- RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. leads the SEC and ranks eighth nationally with 126 rushing yards per game.
- Rodriguez was named Co-SEC Offensive Player of the Week after producing a career-high 207 rushing yards vs. Missouri.
- "Super Senior" Luke Fortner was named co-Offensive Lineman of the Week for his work at center in the season opener.
- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and now Will Levis.
- Will Levis was named one of eight "Stars of the Week" by The Manning Award after his record-breaking debut in blue vs. ULM.
- Kentucky was predicted to finish third in the SEC Eastern Division by a preseason poll of media covering SEC Media Days.
- Four new assistant coaches were hired following the 2020 season. UK named Liam Coen as the program's new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Dec. 14 and Eric Wolford as the offensive line coach on Dec. 17. John Settle was announced as the new running backs coach/co-special teams coordinator on March 15 and Chris Collins, most recently the safeties coach at Georgia State the last four seasons, was named the defensive backs coach on June 3.

MILESTONES TO LOOK FOR...

- Head coach **Mark Stoops** has 52 career victories at Kentucky, No. 2 on the school's all-time list. Paul "Bear" Bryant is first with 60.
- Coach Stoops has 25 SEC wins and now is tied with Fran Curci for the most in school history.
- Coach Stoops now holds the record for most total home wins in school history (38).
- Junior **RB Chris Rodriguez Jr.** has 1,739 career rushing yards to move into 14th place on the school's all-time list. He needs 232 yards to move into the top 10.
- Rodriguez has 20 career rushing touchdowns and needs five to tie for fourth in UK history.
- Senior **WR Josh Ali** recently became the 31st player in school history with 1,000 or more yards receiving (1,065). He also has 102 career receptions, becoming the 18th Wildcat to reach the century mark in catches.
- Junior **RB Kavosiey Smoke** has 982 career rushing yards and needs 18 more to become the 41st player to join the 1,000-yard club.
- In all, 52 letter winners and a total of 11 offensive and defensive starters from last year return, including nine "Super Seniors" who are taking advantage of the extra year of eligibility due to a COVID-shortened 2020 season.
- From 2016-20, UK won 37 games (most in a five-season span since 1949-53). UK won 20 SEC games during that time, most in a five-year span in school history.
- The Wildcats had the third-most wins among SEC East schools from 2016-20 (37). Only Georgia (52) and Florida (42) had more.
- The Wildcats have gone to five straight bowl games, tying the school record.
- UK has allowed 30 or fewer points in 36 of the past 41 games.
- Since 2016, UK is 17-7 in games decided by seven points or less and has won the last four decided by that margin.
- UK has 12 comeback victories under Mark Stoops after having trailed by 10+ points.
- The Wildcats signed their eighth straight top-50 recruiting class under Stoops in 2020.
- Fourteen made their collegiate debut in the opener: DL Sam Anaele, P Wilson Berry, OL Jager Burton, TE Jordan Dingle, WR Chris Lewis, DB Jordan Lovett, WR Chauncey Magwood, LS Clay Perry, DL Kahlil Saunders, DL Jamarius Dinkins, LB Martez Thrower, LB Trevin Wallace, OL David Wohlabough Jr. and RB La'Ve'll Wright.

SERIES VS. SOUTH CAROLINA

- South Carolina leads the all-time series 18-13-1.
- The Gamecocks own a 9-5-1 edge in Columbia but Kentucky has won two of the last three matchups there, the last one coming in 2017 (23-13).
- Overall, UK has won six of the past seven meetings in the series.
- The series has been defined by extended winning streaks, one from each team. South Carolina won 10 straight from 2000-09 before UK's five-year run from 2014-18.
- The Cats have eclipsed 200 rushing yards four times in the past seven meetings, including 291 with five rushing touchdowns in 2020.
- The teams first met in 1937, a 27-7 UK win, and then not again until 1978. They have met annually since 1992 when the Gamecocks joined the SEC.
- UK coach Mark Stoops in 6-2 vs. the Gamecocks.
- Biggest UK win: 23 (41-18 in 2020)
- Biggest South Carolina win: 51 (54-3 in 2011)
- Games decided by eight points or less: Tied 8-8-1

A UK WIN WOULD...

- Move UK to 2-0 in SEC play for the first time since 2018 and just the second time since 1977.
- Give head coach Mark Stoops 26 SEC victories at UK, breaking the school record of 25 league wins by Fran Curci.
- Give Stoops 53 career victories at UK, putting him just seven wins shy of tying Paul "Bear" Bryant for the school's all-time winning coach.

- Give UK three straight SEC wins, including consecutive wins over South Carolina.
- Push Stoops' record vs. South Carolina to 7-2.
- Be UK's seventh in the past eight games in the series.
- Improve UK's record vs. SEC East foes Missouri, South Carolina and Vanderbilt to 19-7 under coach Mark Stoops.

KENTUCKY-SOUTH CAROLINA CONNECTIONS

- UK offensive line coach Eric Wolford spent the past four seasons in the same position at South Carolina before arriving in Lexington. He also coached there in 2009.
- Kentucky has three players from the state of South Carolina: PK Chance Poore (Anderson), DB Andru Phillips (Mauldin) and DB Jalen Geiger (Columbia).
- South Carolina does not have a player on its roster from Kentucky.
- Geiger was teammates with South Carolina P/K Alex Herrera and LS Hunter Rogers at Spring Valley High School.

LAST MEETING VS. SOUTH CAROLINA

- Kentucky closed out the truncated 2020 regular season by defeating South Carolina, 41-18, in Lexington, the Cats' sixth win in the last seven meetings between the SEC East rivals.
- The margin of victory was Kentucky's largest in the series.
- The Cats took an early lead, pushed it to 27-3 at halftime and cruised to the win.
- RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed for a then-career high 139 yards, including a 79-yard jaunt to close out the game. He scored three times on the ground.
- RB A.J. Rose also collected 101 yards on the ground as part of the Cats' 291 total rushing yards.
- LB Jamin Davis had 10 tackles and a 1.5 tackles for loss as part of his breakout season.
- LB Jamar "Boogie" Watson forced two fumbles and had 2.5 tackles for loss.

WILL LEVIS GOES BANANAS IN SEASON-OPENING WIN

- Quarterback Will Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp and was sensational in his UK debut, passing for 367 yards and four scores.
- Marked the most passing yards for a Kentucky player in his first game as a Wildcat.
- Marked the most passing yards for a UK quarterback since Patrick Towles threw for 390 in 2014 vs. Mississippi State.
- Became the first 300-yard passer in a season opener since Drew Barker, 323 vs. Southern Mississippi in 2016.
- Marked the most passing TDs since Drew Barker threw four vs. Southern Mississippi in 2016.
- His 58-yard touchdown pass to Josh Ali is the longest in a season opener since 2016 vs. Southern Mississippi (72 yards, Barker to Jeff Badet).

IT'S A WAN'DERFUL LIFE

- The Cats scored big in the offseason when Nebraska transfer **Wan'Dale Robinson**, a Frankfort, Kentucky native, transferred back to the Commonwealth.
- Robinson showed he was worth all the hype in the opener, hauling in a pair of touchdown receptions as he roasted the coverage on his way to 125 yards on five catches.
- In week two, he set the tone with a 64-yard run on the second play from scrimmage to set up a touchdown and later hauled in a pair of deep bombs, including one on a critical third down late in the game.
- With an 111-yard performance in week three, he became the first Wildcat to have three-straight 100-yard receiving games since Derek Abney in 2001 and the first ever to have three-straight 100-yard receiving games to begin a season.
- Through three games the home run hitter ranks 16th nationally and second in the SEC in receiving yards per game (112.3), 14th nationally and second in the SEC in all-purpose yards per game (141.0). He currently has six plays of 30+ yards.
- He brings a wealth of experience after two seasons with the Huskers. In 2020, he led Nebraska with 51 catches and 461 receiving yards despite playing only eight games and splitting duties at running back. As a freshman in 2019, Robinson caught 40 passes for 443 yards and two touchdowns while rushing for 340 yards and three scores. The 40 catches and 443 receiving yards were the most by any true freshman in Nebraska history.

HOT ROD

- Junior RB **Chris Rodriguez Jr.** continues to bulldoze his way through opponents and the record books, now doing so as the Cats' feature back.
- He has 378 rushing yards this season and set a school record for a UK player in the first two games of a season (332).
- He leads the SEC in total rushing yards (378), is second in rushing yards per game (126.0) and third in all-purpose yards (131.0)
- He has 1,739 career rushing yards, 14th place in school history.
- Rodriguez rushed for a touchdown in five consecutive games, second-longest streak in school history, before seeing it end vs. Chattanooga.
- He is the 10th player in school history with at least 20 rushing touchdowns.
- He ranks second only to Lynn Bowden Jr. in yards per carry (min. 200) at 6.93.
- He has had only six of his 251 career carries go for negative yardage, a staggering testament to his ability to hit the hole and grind out yards.
- He set new career highs with 27 carries for 207 yards vs. Missouri. The 207 rushing yards are the most for a UK player vs. Missouri and broke the UK record for most rushing yards in an SEC opener. He earned Co-SEC Player of the Week honors.

Larry Warford, Football (2009-12)

One of the greatest offensive linemen in Kentucky history went on to an outstanding career in the NFL ... Helped UK to two bowl games ... Did not allow a quarterback sack and graded over 90% during his senior year ... Earned all-star recognition all four years at UK ... Earned All-America Third Team honors as a senior from Associated Press and Phil Steele's College Football ... All-SEC First Team as a senior by ESPN.com and CBSsports.com ... All-SEC Second Team as a junior and sophomore ... Named to the Sophomore All-America Team by College Football News ... Freshman All-SEC by league coaches ... Seven-year NFL career with Detroit and New Orleans ... Pro Bowl selection in 2017, 2018 and 2019.

KENTUCKY HONORS LATE OL COACH JOHN SCHLARMAN WITH NO. 65, CHRIS OATS BY ROTATING NO. 22

- Kentucky offensive line coach John Schlarman and an All-SEC offensive lineman during his playing days at UK, died on Nov. 12, 2020 following a two-year battle with cancer. He was 45.
- He was diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma in the summer of 2018 and was an absolute warrior in his two-year fight against cancer, not missing a game through Oct. 17, 2020, and very few practices along the way.
- To honor his fight, members of the offensive line chose to rotate No. 65 in 2020, the number Schlarman wore as an offensive lineman at Kentucky. They will rotate the number again this season.
- Schlarman was a four-year starter from 1994-97 and was named SEC All-Freshman in 1994, UK's most outstanding lineman in 1995 and '96, and first-team All-SEC in 1997.
- Schlarman was given posthumously the Broyles Lifetime Achievement Award by the Frank & Barbara Broyles Foundation.
- The team also will wear black stickers on their helmets with the initials "JS" in white letters.
- Kentucky also honored senior linebacker Chris Oats in 2020 and will continue to do so in 2021 as he battles a serious medical condition. Each week a different player will wear Oats' jersey No. 22.
- In the 2021 season opener, Luke Fortner wore No. 65 and DeAndre Square wore No. 22. In week two, Darian Kinnard wore No. 65 and Yusuf Corker wore No. 22, while Kavosiey Smoke (No. 22) and Austin Dotson (No. 65) did so in week three.
- The team also wears #22OATSSTRONG wristbands to show their support and they conclude each team practice with "22!" Members of the team have also created a website www.22OATSSTRONG.COM with a GoFundMe page to help the family with medical bills.

DID YOU KNOW?

- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** enters his 44th season in that role. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, marking his 48th year in UK football. He has worked more than 500 consecutive games.
- UK is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships, including 20 of the last 26, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.

UK ALUMNUS TIM COUCH INDUCTED INTO NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL HOF/LISTED ON COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT

- Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch was one of seven athletes inducted into the

National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) National High School Hall of Fame on July 1 in Orlando. Couch has also been named to the 2022 ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. That announcement will be made in early 2022.

- During his football career at Leslie County High School in Hyden, Kentucky in the mid-1990s, Couch set three national career passing records – 872 completions, 12,104 yards and 133 touchdowns. He helped Leslie County to a 13-1 record as a junior while completing an amazing 75 percent of his passes – a national record that stood for 15 years. As a senior, he passed for 42 touchdowns and led his team to an 11-3 mark, and he was named Gatorade and USA Today National Player of the Year while earning Mr. Football honors in Kentucky. ESPN.com selected Couch the sixth-best high school athlete in history. Couch was equally dominant on the basketball court. He scored 3,023 points in his career, leading the state in scoring as a senior at 37 points per game. He was two-time all-state in basketball. Couch's football prowess continued at the University of Kentucky, where he passed for 8,159 yards and 73 touchdowns in his final two seasons. He led Kentucky to the Outback Bowl after his junior season and was fourth in the Heisman Trophy voting. Couch was the No. 1 pick in the 1999 NFL draft by the Cleveland Browns and passed for more than 11,000 yards and 64 touchdowns in his five years with the Browns.

OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

- Excitement is in the air as the Cats' new offense scheme, directed by offensive coordinator Liam Coen, takes shape this season. The former quarterbacks coach for the Los Angeles Rams brings a pro-style offense to the Bluegrass and it's a welcomed change. UK threw just 243 passes for 1,336 yards last season, ranking 14th in the SEC in passing offense.
- Through three games, the Wildcats are averaging 36 points and 480 yards per game -- 284 passing yards and 196 rushing yards per game.
- UK's offense is built around a solid group of six offensive starters which includes "super seniors" wide receiver Josh Ali, offensive guard Luke Fortner and tight end

- Leading returning rusher Chris Rodriguez Jr. is UK's most productive offensive threat from a year ago. He finished fifth in the SEC in rushing in 2020 with 119 rushes for 785 yards (87.2 ypg) in just nine games.
- The "Big Blue Wall" returns three starters from 2020 in Darian Kinnard, Kenneth Horsey and Luke Fortner. Combined with key reserves in seniors Austin Dotson and Naasir Watkins, the Wildcats return a combined 59 career starts for 2021.

QUARTERBACKS

- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and now Will Levis.
- Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp and was sensational in his UK debut, passing for 367 yards and four scores. It was the most passing yards for a Wildcat in his debut and the most for any UK quarterback since Drew Barker in 2016.
- Through three games he ranks seventh nationally in yards per completion and is 17th in passing TDs (7). He's 19th in pass efficiency.
- Sophomore **Beau Allen** is the backup. He saw action vs. ULM, completing 4-of-7 passes for 52 yards.

RUNNING BACKS/FULLBACKS

- Veteran running backs coach John Settle was hired in March of 2021 after spending the last six seasons and 11 years total at

- The running back room goes eight deep and features juniors **Chris Rodriguez Jr.** and **Kavosiey Smoke** and sophomores **JuTahn McClain** and **Travis Tisdale**. Sophomore **Torrance Davis** was added to the room after seeing time at linebacker in 2020. After a year at wide receiver, **Mike Drennen II** has moved to running back. Junior **Tyler Markray** also looks for playing time as does mid-year enrollee **La'Veil Wright**. He comes to UK after rushing for 4,396 yards and 56 touchdowns at North Hardin High School.
- Rodriguez was the team's leading rusher in 2020 with 785 yards and 11 touchdowns despite being unavailable for two games due to COVID-19 protocols. He had four 100-yard rushing games, including three of the final four he was available to play. He was named second-team All-America and first-team All-SEC by Pro Football Focus and has earned several preseason accolades for 2021.
- Rodriguez got off to a great start with 125 yards and a touchdown in the season opener vs. ULM, his seventh career 100-yard game.
- He was even better in the SEC opener vs. Missouri, setting new career highs with 207 yards on 27 attempts and two touchdowns.
- Rodriguez now ranks 14th in school history with 1,739 rushing yards.
- Rodriguez has proven nearly impossible to bring down behind the line of scrimmage, having lost yardage on just six of his 251 career rushing attempts. In 2020, he lost yards on his first attempt of the season before starting a streak of 105 consecutive carries of positive yards.
- Rodriguez has scored a touchdown once every 12.6 rush attempts in his career (20 in 251 attempts). By comparison, UK all-time leading rusher and scorer Benny Snell Jr. hit paydirt once every 15.4 rush attempts.
- Smoke has played in 25 career games and nears 1,000 rushing yards with 982. He currently averages 5.7 per carry.
- Kentucky has rushed for at least 300 yards in eight of its past 18 games, including four of at least 400 yards.

WIDE RECEIVERS

- Kentucky has 19 total wide receivers this fall, and it includes a mix of experience and young talent. Twelve of the 19 are returners, while seven are newcomers to

the program.

- Three players had a 50+ yard reception vs. ULM in Josh Ali, Isaiah Epps and Wan'Dale Robinson). The last time UK had three different players with a 50+ yard reception in the same game was October 25, 2014 vs. Mississippi State (Javess Blue, Demarco Robinson and Ryan Timmons).
- UK had two 100-yard receivers against ULM, the first time that's happened since 2011 vs. Ole Miss (La'Rod King and Matt Roark).
- The top returning pass catcher from last season is **Josh Ali**. He currently has 102 career receptions for 1,065 yards and six scores.
- He was a blur in the opener, going over 100 yards for the first time in his career while hauling in five balls for 136 yards and a score.
- Wan'Dale Robinson has proven to be every bit the home run threat the Cats thought they were getting when he transferred back home from Nebraska. He ranks as one of the nation's most explosive playmakers.
- Wan'Dale Robinson has gone over 100 receiving yards in each of the first three games and has 73 yards on three rushes.
- Senior **Isaiah Epps** returned midseason from a foot injury that cost him the 2019 season and flashed his potential down the stretch,

catching eight passes for 63 yards. That continued in the 2021 opener with three grabs for a career-best 83 yards and followed that up with his first career scoring catch in the win over Chattanooga, a 20-yarder.

TIGHT ENDS

- The tight ends have played a role in the growth of the passing game this season. In the first two games, all four have at least one catch and they have combined for six catches for 90 yards (15.0 average) and one touchdown.
- The tight ends were key blockers for UK's explosive running game last season, which averaged nearly 200 yards per game and ranked third in the SEC.
- Senior **Justin Rigg** is back after taking advantage of the NCAA's blanket eligibility waiver for all 2020 fall student-athletes due to COVID-19. Rigg has 34 career receptions for 404 yards and one score.
- UK received a huge blow when it was announced that junior **Keaton Upshaw** would possibly miss the season due to injury. Upshaw had 16 catches for 198 yards and three TDs in 2020, both leading the tight end corps and ranking second on the team overall.
- In spring practice and preseason camp, coaches spoke very highly about junior **Brenden Bates** and he made them look prophetic as he caught his first UK touchdown with a four-yard score vs. ULM.
- New to the tight end room is true freshmen **Jordan Dingle** and **Jai Williams**. Dingle was a first-team All-State selection in Kentucky and was named the 2020 4th Region AD Association Player of the Year after catching 41 passes for 515 yards and two scores. Williams, a Lake Forest, Illinois native, was a two-way player at linebacker and tight end in high school and came to Kentucky as a preferred walk-on.
- Another addition to the room is sophomore **Izayah Cummings** who moved from wide receiver to tight end during fall camp and made an immediate impression at his new position, catching his first touchdown pass in the win over Chattanooga (31 yards).

OFFENSIVE LINE

- John Schlarman was Kentucky's offensive line coach for eight seasons before passing away on Nov. 12, 2020 after a two-year battle with cancer.
- Eric Wolford was hired to replace Schlarman in December of 2020 after four seasons at South Carolina.
- The O-line, known as the "Big Blue Wall" returns three of five starters from 2020 in **Darian Kinnard**, **Kenneth Horsey** and **Luke Fortner**.
- The addition of LSU transfer **Za'Darius "Dare" Rosenthal** in July was a huge boost of depth for the "Big Blue Wall." The 6-foot-7, 327-pound offensive tackle played in 13 career games with eight career starts for the Tigers.
- Two big losses that need replacing in 2021 are All-SEC center Drake Jackson and All-SEC left tackle Landon Young. Jackson started in 44 consecutive games at center, while Young was a starter at left tackle for 24 straight games.
- Kinnard (36 career games, 29 career starts) has been holding down the right tackle position since he entered the starting lineup at the end of the 2018 season but fans could also see him at left tackle this season. He had 47 knockdowns in 2020, grading out at 87.4 percent with 142

blocks at the point of attack. He was named first-team All-America by Pro Football Focus, second-team All-America by CBS/247sports and The Sporting News, third team by AP and fourth team by Phil Steele. He received All-SEC First Team accolades from AP, Phil Steele and PFF and second-team All-SEC honors from the SEC Coaches. He's already been rated by Pro Football Focus as the top returning Power 5 offensive lineman in the country and is listed on two-preseason All-America teams.

- Fortner (45 career games, 26 career starts) is another "super senior" who provided the coaching staff with a late Christmas present when he announced he'd return for the 2021 season. He started in 10 games at right guard in 2020 and graded at 82.9 percent with 26 knockdowns and 146 blocks at the point of attack. Fortner has moved to center and is starting at that position.
- Horsey (15 career games, 11 career starts) manned the left guard spot last season, starting in eight games. An interesting note about Horsey - he had open-heart surgery in April of 2018 and was named winner of the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year. He graded at 82.6 percent, had 17 knockdowns and 93 blocks at the point of attack.
- Sophomore **Eli Cox** has emerged at right guard. He has been described as, pound-for-pound, perhaps the strongest player on the team. He made first collegiate start in the opener vs. ULM. Against Missouri, he scored the game-winning touchdown by recovering a fumble in the end zone.
- The "Big Blue Wall", along with UK tight ends, have helped Kentucky post five consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards, with at least one 1,000-yard individual in four of those.

DEFENSIVE PREVIEW

- Defensive coordinator Brad White is in his third season as the defensive coordinator, his fourth as the outside linebackers coach at UK. Also helping with the coordinator duties is former Wildcat and inside linebackers coach Jon Sumrall. He added co-defensive

coordinator title to his resume in 2020.

- Kentucky welcomes back 26 returning letterwinners, including five starters in **DE Josh Paschal, WLB DeAndre Square, LB Jordan Wright, DB Tyrell Aijan, and FS Yusuf Corker**.
- The depth and experience was on display in the opener as:
- The Kentucky defense limited ULM to 87 total yards. That's the fewest in a game in 33 years, since holding Central Michigan to 78 total yards in the 1988 season opener.
- UK held ULM to 17 net rushing yards, fewest since Eastern Michigan had 13 rushing yards in 2017.
- UK held ULM to 70 passing yards, fewest since Georgia had 35 passing yards in 2019.
- 10 seniors started on defense against ULM. With starting lineups available since 1993, it is the most seniors starting on offense or defense in a season opener since that time.
- UK had 14 tackles for loss, including six quarterback sacks.
- Several key players will have to be replaced on defense. Gone are leading tackler Jamin Davis, defensive backs Brandin Echols and Kelvin Joseph, nose guard Quinton Bohanna, defensive tackle Phil Hoskins and OLB Jamar "Boogie" Watson.
- UK started 19 different players on defense last season with three (Corker, Hoskins and Watson) starting in all 11 games.
- The good news is that 12 of those 19 players who started at least one game return for the 2021 season.

DEFENSIVE LINE

- Former Wildcat Anwar Stewart is in his second season coaching the defensive line. His unit should still be a position of strength for UK despite losing two key starters in All-SEC nose guard Quinton Bohanna and defensive tackle Phil Hoskins.
- Returning senior **Josh Paschal** moved from outside linebacker to defensive end in 2020 and was a shining star in his new role. Paschal had 32 tackles, 6.5 TFL and had a crucial INT vs. Mississippi State that he returned 76 yards to set up a two-yard score on the next play. Paschal entered 2021 with 21.5 career TFL and 8.0 sacks, along with two blocked kicks.
- Paschal had a huge game in the opener with a team-high eight tackles, featuring 2.5 tackles for loss that included 1.5 quarterback

sacks. He's totaled 12 tackles this season, four for loss and leads the team in QB hurries with five.

- Another senior who looks to play a major role on the defensive line this season is **Marquan "Bully" McCall**. He proved to be a mountainous force in the middle last season, finishing with 22 tackles and three starting assignments.
- Also battling for playing time at nose guard are sophomores **Josaih Hayes, Justin Rogers** (1.0 sack).
- Oxendine (five tackles) and Abadi-Fitzgerald (three) combined for eight tackles in the ULM opener.

SECONDARY

- The secondary unit is in the hands of two of the most energetic and talented young coaches in Chris Collins and Frank Buffano. Collins, who coaches the defensive backs, was hired in June of 2021 after spending the last four seasons at Georgia State. Buffano enters his second season coaching the safeties, a position he earned in March of 2020.
- UK has ranked in the top four of the SEC in pass defense, including leading the league in both 2019 and 2020, for three straight seasons.
- UK also led the SEC and ranked third nationally in total interceptions (16) in 2020, eight coming from the secondary.
- Returning cornerbacks Cedrick Dort, Jr., and Carrington Valentine have starting experience under their belts.
- **Dort** (34 career games, 16 career starts) battled through some aches and pains during the 2020 season but remained an excellent player at corner, totaling 10 tackles and breaking up a pair of passes in 10 games.
- **Valentine** saw action in 10 games as a true freshman in 2020, earning his first career start at corner in the Gator Bowl. He has started the first two games and holds the distinction of being the only non-senior starter on defense.
- Another "super senior" looking to take his game to the next level is corner **Quandre Mosely** (26 career games, two career starts). He finished the 2020 season with 19.0 tackles and two pass breakups.
- At safety, "super senior" **Yusuf Corker** (39 career games, 26 career starts) once again proved to be one of the SEC's most



- underrated players as he piled up 77 tackles (second on the team), 2.5 TFL and two INTs. He had a career-high 18 tackles at Missouri on Oct. 24, including 16 solo stops. Those 16 solo tackles tie the single-game school record set by Larry Smith vs. Tulane in 1984 and Jeff Zurcher vs. Georgia in 1998. Corker capped his season in impressive fashion, picking off a pass in each of the final two games.
- Corker picked up where he left off in the opener with five tackles, including a quarterback sack and two pass breakups. For the season, he leads the SEC in PBU with five.
 - Safety **Tyrell Ajian** (38 career games, 14 career starts) stepped into a much larger role in 2020, starting in 10 games. He led UK in the win over Missouri with a career-high eight tackles and sealed the Chattanooga win with a 95-yard interception return for a score in the fourth quarter.
 - Safety **Davonte Robinson** (39 career games, nine career starts), another “super senior,” came back from a quadriceps injury that robbed him of the 2019 season and worked his way into the fold, starting in three of 11 games played.

LINEBACKERS

- Only three letterwinners in sophomores **K.D. McDaniel** and **J.J. Weaver** and senior **Jordan Wright** return for White’s outside linebackers group this fall. The staff was pleased to add Georgia Tech transfer Justice Dingle who enrolled in January to provide more depth.
- Gone is Jamar “Boogie” Watson who started in 19 straight games at OLB. He had a strong senior season, leading the team with 10.0 tackles for loss to give him 28.5 in his career, eighth on UK’s all-time list. He also capped his career fifth on the school’s all-time sacks list with 18.5.
- Looking to fill those “Boogie” shoes are dominate pass rushers Weaver and Wright. **Weaver** was having a stellar redshirt freshman season before missing the final two games with a torn ACL in his right knee. He ranked second on the team with Paschal with 6.5 tackles for loss. In addition, he had 33 tackles, two quarterback hurries and a pass breakup.
- Wright and Weaver got off to good starts -- Wright with six tackles, two TFL, a sack and a pass breakup while Weaver had 1.5 sacks in the opener. Weaver had a huge defensive play vs. Missouri with an eight-yard sack on the Tigers’ final possession. He leads the

team in sacks with 2.5.

- **Dingle** saw action in 19 games in three seasons at Georgia Tech, totaling eight tackles, three fumble recoveries and a tackle for loss. He came to UK in January as a mid-year enrollee and benefited tremendously from participating in spring practice.
- The inside linebackers are led by lone returning starter **DeAndre Square** (39 career games, 25 career starts). He was UK’s second-leading tackler in 2019 (69) and in 2020 he ranked third on the team (60). Square made one of the biggest plays of the season when he broke up a pass late in the fourth quarter of the Gator Bowl win vs. NC State, batting it into the air for Jamin Davis to intercept and help seal the game. Square now has a team-best 164 career tackles.
- As a true freshman in 2020, **D’Eryk Jackson** earned praise from the coaching staff after playing in nine games and totaling four tackles and an interception. However, a torn Achilles tendon has him sidelined this season.
- Looking to help fill the void of Jackson will be two transfers in senior, Ole Miss transfer **Jacquez Jones** and sophomore, Michigan State transfer **Luke Fulton**. **Jones** was a three-year letterwinner who played in 33 games with 19 starts, totaling 182 tackles in his Ole Miss career. In 2020, he led the Rebels with 75 tackles, while adding 2.5 tackles for loss and three quarterback hurries. **Fulton** played in just one game in his two seasons with the Spartans but he also benefited from participating in UK’s spring practice and learning under inside linebackers coach Jon Sumrall.
- Jones has started all three games and leads the team in tackles with 20. He has made two huge plays in pass defense -- an interception vs. Missouri and a touchdown-saving pass breakup vs. Chattanooga.
- Highly-regarded freshmen **Martez Thrower** (Rochella, Ga.) and **Trevin Wallace** (Jesup, Ga.) arrived this summer and are ready to showcase why they were two of Georgia’s top prep defensive players.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Special teams will be coached by new running backs coach John Settle and safeties coach Frank Buffano this season. The Wildcats return all but their Australian transplant and 2019 Ray Guy Award winner in punter and holder Max Duffy. He concluded his career

as the school’s all-time leading punter at 45.96 yards per kick.

- Returning are placekicker **Matt Ruffolo**, kickoff specialist **Chance Poore**, long snapper **Cade Degraw**, punt returner **Josh Ali** and kick returner **Zach Johnson**.
- Aussie transplant **Wilson Berry** replaces fellow Aussie Max Duffy, as the primary punter. He punted the first two games but didn’t see action vs. UTC dealing with an injury. He’s averaging 37 yards per kick.
- Senior **Colin Goodfellow** filled in for Berry against Chattanooga and averaged 50.5 yards on four punts, two of which were inside the 20. He’s currently on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award, given to the nation’s top punter.
- Ruffolo, a “super senior” who took advantage of the NCAA’s blanket waiver due to the COVID-19 pandemic, was UK’s starting placekicker last season. He made 12-of-14 on FG and 22-of-23 PATs this season. He tied a career-long by drilling a 50-yard FG at Missouri on Oct. 24. For his career, Ruffolo has made 17-of-21 FG and 55-of-59 PAT.
- Poore handles kickoffs for the Wildcats. He also has placekicking experience, as he made 5-of-9 FGs and 24-of-26 PATs last season. He was 1-of-1 on field goals and 5-of-5 on extra points this season.
- **Degraw** enters his second season as UK’s long snapper. He’s backed up by walk-ons **Clay Perry** and **Jordan Morrow**.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The “Cat Walk” on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children’s Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children’s Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children’s Hospital each week to participate.

- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 314 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 174-137-4 record (.559), 38-21 (.644) under Mark Stoops.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation’s top 30 teams in attendance in 15 of the last 17 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years. (*Note: Does not include 2020 season due to Covid-19 protocols).
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics. Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Ole Miss, Mississippi State and Missouri. The end zones and team sideline areas feature a checkerboard pattern in alternating shades of blue. It was designed to mimic the pattern of Secretariat’s silks, which has been part of the football uniforms for five seasons. The school’s new interlocking “UK” logo is positioned in the center of the field.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation’s leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement—which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK’s multimedia rights partner—begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger

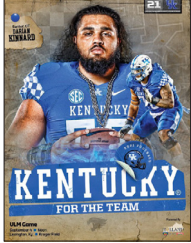

KENTUCKY 45, ULM 10

Will Levis passed for 367 yards and four touchdowns as Kentucky opened its 2021 season with a 45-10 win over Louisiana-Monroe at Kroger Field.

Two Wildcats had more than 100 yards receiving in the game. Senior Josh Ali had five receptions for 136 yards and a touchdown while junior Wan'Dale Robinson had five catches for 125 yards and two scores. Isaiah Epps nearly made it a trio, catching three passes for 83 yards.

On the ground, Chris Rodriguez Jr. went over 100 yards for the seventh time in his career. The junior rushed 19 times for 125 yards and a touchdown.

Kentucky had 564 yards of total offense in the first game under new offensive coordinator Liam Coen. UK finished with 419 yards passing and 145 yards on the ground.

Levis became the first UK passer to throw for over 300 yards since Stephen Johnson had 338 against Louisville in 2016.

Meanwhile, the Kentucky defense more than did its job against ULM. The Cats held the Warhawks to 87 total yards (70 passing, 17 rushing) in the game. ULM had 43 yards on its first drive of the game, then 44 yards the rest of the game.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and got one first down. But the Cats turned it over on a Levis interception, giving ULM the ball at the UK 43 yard line.

The Warhawks would take the ball into Kentucky territory but the drive would stall, and ULM would try a field goal. It was good but UK was penalized on the play and the Warhawks took three points off the board in hopes of getting more.

That decision paid off as ULM drove inside the UK five yard line and punched it in the end zone on a three-yard touchdown rush by Kadyn Roach. Calum Sutherland added the extra point and the Warhawks led 7-0 with 8:53 to play in the first quarter.

Kentucky answered on its next drive. The Cats went 84 yards in just five plays, finishing with a 33-yard Levis touchdown pass to Wan'dale Robinson in the left corner of the end zone. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 6:13 left in the first.

After at ULM punt, Kentucky took the lead. And quickly. On the first play of the drive, Levis connected with Ali on a 58-yard touchdown bomb. Ruffolo added the point after and the Cats led 14-7 with 4:20 still left in the first. That would be the score at the end of the period.

In the second quarter, the Cats extended their advantage. UK methodically marched down the field, largely on the legs of Rodriguez. Kentucky used 14 plays to cover 84 yards, with Rodriguez covering the final 27 yards himself. The scoring play was a two-yard rush by the senior and when Ruffolo added the PAT, Kentucky led 21-7 with 10:40 left in the half.

After another ULM punt, Kentucky went to the air again. Levis connected with Robinson for 62 yards, getting the Cats to the ULM 18 yard line. Those two would connect again, on a 13-yard scoring strike, to extend the UK lead. Ruffolo's PAT made it 28-7 with 5:44 left in the first half. That would be the halftime score.

The first four possessions of the second half resulted in punts, two by each team. But on its third possession of the half, Kentucky got deep into ULM territory. The big play was a 57-yard pass from Levis to Epps, getting UK to the ULM 19. But a bad snap and a sack forced UK into a 45-yard field goal attempt from Ruffolo, which he made, giving the Cats a 31-7 lead with 3:54 left in the third quarter. UK would hold the same advantage as the quarter came to an end.

Early in the fourth quarter, Kentucky scored again. This time, it was Levis connecting with tight end Brendan Bates for a four-yard touchdown pass. It was the first career touchdown for Bates. Ruffolo's PAT made it 38-7 with 13:07 to play.

Louisiana-Monroe would add a field goal in the fourth quarter to cut the UK lead to 38-10. Kentucky would finish the scoring with a four-yard touchdown rush from Michael Drennen II with 1:00 left to play. Ruffolo's PAT made it 45-10, which would be the final score.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 27 times for 206 yards and three touchdowns as Kentucky won its Southeastern Conference opener over Missouri at Kroger Field.

For Rodriguez, both the number of carries and the yards rushing were career highs. The junior from McDonough, Georgia, also caught a pass for a touchdown.

Will Levis connected on 10 of 18 passing for 179 yards with a touchdown and an interception in the game. Levis' main target was Wan'Dale Robinson, who had a big game in his own right. The Frankfort native led the Cats with 101 yards receiving on five catches. He also had three carries for 73 yards in the game.

Kentucky (2-0, 1-0 SEC) turned to the ground game in this one, rushing for 341 yards while passing for 179. The Cats ended the game with 520 yards of total offense, compared to just 398 for Missouri.

On defense, safety Tyrell Ajian led the Cats with eight tackles, while J.J. Weaver had another big game with a sack and two tackles for loss.

Kentucky took the ball first and, on the second play from scrimmage, Robinson took the jet sweep for 64 yards to the Missouri eight yard line. From there, it was a five-yard touchdown pass from Levis to Rodriguez for a touchdown. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and Kentucky grabbed an early 7-0 lead with 12:52 still left in the first period.

After a Missouri punt, Kentucky put together its second scoring drive of the game. The Cats marched down the field, using a nice balance of rushing and passing to cover 80 yards in 12 plays, while taking more than five minutes off the clock. The drive ended on a two-yard rushing touchdown from Rodriguez, followed by a Ruffolo PAT, giving the Cats a 14-0 lead with 5:13 left in the first quarter.

Missouri would answer with a long, sustained drive of its own. The Tigers used 10 plays to cover 75 yards, ending with a six-yard touchdown pass from Connor Bazalak to Daniel Parker, Jr. The PAT by Harrison Mevis was good and the UK lead

was trimmed to 14-7 with 27 seconds left in the first period. That would be the score after 15 minutes of play.

After another Missouri punt, the Cats went on the march again. Kentucky got a couple of first downs before the biggest play of the drive, a 49-yard completion from Levis to Robinson, getting UK inside the Missouri 10. From there, it took just two plays for the Cats to hit pay dirt, this time on a three-yard rush by Levis. Ruffolo added the point after and the Cats grabbed a 21-7 lead with 9:26 left in the half.

Missouri would punt again with its next possession and Kentucky once again drove down the field. The Cats appeared to be going in for yet another touchdown but Rodriguez fumbled at the goal line and Missouri recovered in the end zone for a touchback with 1:41 left in the half.

The Tigers would take advantage of the miscue. Missouri went into two-minute mode and got into scoring territory fairly quickly. MU covered 80 yards in nine plays and just 1:37 off the clock, culminating in a 17-yard touchdown pass from Bazelak to Keke Chism with just four seconds left in the half. Mevis added the PAT at the Kentucky lead was cut to 21-14. That would be the halftime score.

Missouri took the opening possession of the second half and, on the second play from scrimmage, Bazelak was intercepted by UK linebacker Jacquéz Jones, giving the Cats the ball at the MU 38.

On UK's second play from scrimmage on the ensuing drive, Rodriguez scampered 31 yards down the left sideline to the Missouri three yard line. Rodriguez then finished it off himself, scoring from three yards out to extend the UK lead. Ruffolo's PAT was good and the Cats led 28-14 with 13:19 to play in the third.

Once again, Missouri had an answer. The Tigers took the ensuing kickoff and went 75 yards in 10 plays, getting into the end zone on a Bazelak-to-Parker six-yard touchdown pass. Mevis added the point after and it was 28-21 with 9:15 left in the third.

The next three possessions ended in punts before Missouri put together a good drive near the end of the third quarter. As the period expired, MU appeared to be on its way to scoring. As the fourth quarter began, the Tigers got inside the UK red zone. But, facing third-and-14 from the 17, the drive appeared to stall. That's when Bazelak hit Tyler Badie on a screen pass that went for a score. Mevis made the extra point to tie the game at 28-28 with 13:11 to play.

Kentucky got the ball back and quickly moved into Missouri territory. After an 11-yard completion from Levis to Robinson, Rodriguez rushed up the middle for 28 yards, eclipsing his career high in both carries and yards rushing on the same play. Levis then connected with tight end Justin Rigg for a 28-yard completion, getting the ball to the MU eight. From there, Rodriguez scored for the fourth time on the night, on an eight-yard rush, with 11:28 to play. Ruffolo's PAT was good and the Cats had a 35-28 lead.

Leading by seven in the fourth quarter, it appeared that Kentucky was going in for a game-clinching score. But the drive stalled and Ruffolo's 37-yard field goal was blocked, giving Missouri the ball at their own 45 with 2:07 to play.

Missouri took possession hoping to drive for a tying score. But after getting one first down, the MU drive stalled and on fourth and 13 from the UK 45, Bazelak's pass fell incomplete, giving Kentucky possession.

Levis would take a knee on three straight plays to seal the game

Will Levis connected on 23 of 35 passing for 246 yards and two touchdowns as Kentucky overcame a sluggish effort to beat Chattanooga 28-23.

With the Cats clinging to a 21-16 lead in the fourth quarter, Tyrell Aijan made the play that saved the game. Aijan intercepted a Chattanooga pass at the UK five and returned it 95 yards for what turned out to be the game-clinching touchdown.

Wan'Dale Robinson was Levis' favorite target on Saturday, catching eight passes for 111 yards. He became the first UK player since Derek Abney in 2001 to have three straight 100-yard receiving games.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with 46 rushing yards, although the Kentucky run game was not as effective as it was last week against Missouri. The Cats had 102 yards rushing on 27 carries in the game.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and methodically marched down the field, using a combination of running and passing. The nine-play drive consisted of five plays and four rushes and ended with an 11-yard touchdown rush by Josh Ali, the first rushing touchdown of his career. Matt Ruffolo added the extra point and the Cats grabbed a 7-0 lead with 10:43 to play in the first quarter.

Chattanooga was able to match UK's early score. The Mocs went 75 yards themselves, aided by a Ailym Ford 48-yard rush. The Mocs would tie the score on a 12-yard touchdown pass from Cole Copeland to Reginald Henderson. Aaron Sears added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 6:56 left in the first.

The teams would exchange punts. But Kentucky's next possession, which covered the end of the first quarter and beginning of the second, ended with a score. The Cats marched 68 yards in seven plays, ending with a 20-yard touchdown pass from Levis to Isaiah Epps, the first touchdown of Epps' career. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats took a 14-7 lead with 13:29 left in the half.

After a Chattanooga punt, the Cats took over at their own 14 yard line. On third down, Levis was intercepted by Chattanooga's CaMiron Smith, who returned it to the UK 15 yard line. The Mocs did not do much with the ensuing possession, but Sears converted a 27-yard field goal to cut the UK lead to 14-10 with 8:47 left in the half.

The teams would exchange punts before Kentucky drove into Chattanooga territory with its next possession. But on fourth-and-five from the Chattanooga 30, Levis fumbled and the Mocs recovered at their own 38. However, UTC went three-and-out and was forced to punt.

Neither team would score the remained of the half and the Cats took a 14-10 lead into the break.

The Mocs took the first possession of the second half and drove into Kentucky territory. But the drive stalled and the Mocs settled for a 43-yard field goal by Sears that cut the UK lead to 14-13 with 10:43 left in the third period.

Later in the third, Levis was intercepted again, this time on a diving effort by Rashun Freeman, giving Chattanooga the ball at their own 34 yard line. The Mocs would have possession as the third quarter ended, trailing the Cats 14-13.

The Mocs would take that possession into Kentucky territory before the drive stalled inside the red zone. Sears would make a 30-yard field goal to give Chattanooga a 16-14 lead with 13:26 to play.

Kentucky answered immediately with an impressive scoring drive. The Cats covered 77 yards in seven plays and took the lead back on a 31-yard touchdown pass from Levis to Isaiah Cummings, the first touchdown for the Louisville native. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats took a 21-16 advantage with 10:18 to play.

On the ensuing drive, Chattanooga again drove into Kentucky territory. But this time, the Cats had the answer. Copeland was intercepted by Ajian, who picked it at his own five yard line and returned it 95 yards for a touchdown. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats extended the lead to 28-16 with 7:40 to play.

Chattanooga would not go away quietly. The Mocs drove into the UK red zone and, on third-and-goal, Copeland rushed around right end for a touchdown. Sears added the PAT and the UK lead was cut to 28-23 with 1:20 to play.

The Mocs tried an onside kick, but Ali recovered at the UK 43. After the Cats took a pair of knees, the game was over.

When the Kentucky football team took the field for the 2021 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, it made official yet another milestone in the remarkable term of Mark Stoops as the Wildcats’ head coach.

Stoops became the first coach in school history to take his team to five consecutive bowl games, adding to his lengthy and growing list of accomplishments during his eight years at UK. As a program, it matched the school record of five straight postseason appearances, accomplished 2006-10 under two head coaches.

Even in the abbreviated 2020 season, Stoops added two more achievements: Kentucky’s win at Tennessee was the Wildcats’ first victory in Knoxville since 1984; and, the regular-season finale over South Carolina was Stoops’ 48th win at Kentucky, moving him into sole possession of second place, behind only the legendary Paul “Bear” Bryant. The Gator Bowl improved his total to 49.

A partial accounting of Stoops’ exploits also features:

- Back-to-back-to-back bowl wins – the 2021 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, 2019 Belk Bowl and the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 – the first time in school history that UK won bowls in three consecutive seasons;
- First New Year’s Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)

In addition to the team accomplishments, several of Stoops’ players have won All-America accolades, along with awards such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Pop Warner Award, Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last five seasons, but the harvest didn’t come easily. Arriving in 2013, inheriting a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats

overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final USA Today coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when

Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game)

and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's



top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football

League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.

Vince Marrow, aka the "Big Dawg", enters his ninth season as associate head coach/tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator/NFL liaison.

Marrow's tight ends have been a big factor in UK producing five consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards with at least one 1,000-yard rusher in four of those (Stanley "Boom" Williams -2016; Benny Snell Jr., - 2017, 2018; Lynn Bowden - 2019). Marrow also has been instrumental in UK signing eight straight top-50 recruiting classes.

Marrow had a professional playing career as a member of NFL rosters on five teams, including Buffalo, Carolina, New York Jets, Chicago and San Francisco. After his NFL days ended, Marrow played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 1998, earning all-league honors with 32 receptions for 345 yards. He also played for the Orlando Rage in the XFL in 2001.

He began his collegiate playing career at Youngstown State before transferring to Toledo. Marrow played two seasons at Toledo, earning second-team All-MAC honors in 1991 before being drafted by the Bills in 1992.
