KENTUCKY LOOKS FOR 12TH STRAIGHT NON-SEC WIN AS IT OPENS 2021 SEASON

Kentucky takes Kroger Field for one of the most anticipated seasons in recent memory on Saturday, hosting ULM in the 2021 opener. Game time is noon EDT and it will be televised on the SEC Network.

The Wildcats will unveil a new offense under the guidance of coordinator Liam Coen, who came to Lexington after a successful tenure on the staff of the NFL's Los Angeles Rams. With a deep, veteran offensive line bookended by All-American Darian Kinnard and LSU transfer Dare Rosenthal, the power running of Chris Rodriguez Jr. and a wide receiver corps that features Josh Ali and Wan'Dale Robinson, the Cats are expected to be an explosive group.

Defensively, the Cats will be mixing a youth movement with productive seniors Yusuf Corker, Marquan McCall, Josh Paschal, DeAndre Square and others. The unit has continued to show impressive improvement in recent seasons and is looking to take the next step in its development.

Kroger Field also will look different as it returns to 100 percent capacity after the 2020 campaign saw limited attendance because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

QUICK NOTES

- After an unprecedented 2020 season because of COVID-19, the Kentucky Wildcats are primed and ready for 2021 as they will play host to three home games to open the season.
- Kentucky kicks off its 131st season of intercollegiate football against ULM.
- Coach Mark Stoops begins his ninth season in Lexington. He is 49-50 overall.
- Stoops will reach two milestones in the season opener. His ninth season ties Fran Curci (1973-81) for the most seasons as head coach at Kentucky and his 100th game ties Curci for most games as head coach.
- Stoops is the second-longest tenured coach in the SEC (behind Alabama's Nick Saban) and the 14th-longest nationally.
- Stoops became the first head coach to take UK to five straight bowl games. The previous record was by Rich Brooks in his last four seasons, 2006-09.
- UK is 88-37-5 (.696) all-time in season openers and 5-3 under coach Mark Stoops.
- The Wildcats have won 10 of their past 14 season openers, including three of their last four.

- UK has won 11 straight non-conference
 games, dating back to the 2017 Music City
 Bowl loss to Northwestern.
- The Cats are coming off a 5-6 season that saw them face a 10-game all-Southeastern Conference regular season before defeating No. 23-ranked NC State in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, the program's third consecutive postseason victory.
- Kentucky was predicted to finish third in the SEC Eastern Division by a preseason poll of media covering SEC Media Days.
- Four new assistant coaches were hired following the 2020 season. UK named Liam Coen as the program's new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Dec. 14 and Eric Wolford as the offensive line coach on Dec. 17. John Settle was announced as the new running backs coach/co-special teams coordinator on March 15 and Chris Collins, most recently the safeties coach at Georgia State the last four seasons, was named the defensive backs coach on June 3.
- In all, 52 letter winners and a total of 11 offensive and defensive starters from last year return, including nine "Super Seniors" who are taking advantage of the extra year of eligibility due to a COVID-shortened 2020 season.
- Seven home games at Kroger Field highlight Kentucky's 2021 football schedule, including back to-back weeks against traditional heavyweights Florida and LSU to open the month of October.
- In the past five years, UK has won 37 games (most in a five-season span since 1949-53).
- The Wildcats have gone to five straight bowl games, tying the school record.
- UK has won 20 SEC games, most in a fiveyear span in school history.
- The Wildcats have the third-most wins among SEC East schools from 2016-20 (37). Only Georgia (52) and Florida (42) have more.
- Kentucky has rushed for at least 300 yards in seven of its past 16 games, including four of at least 400 yards. UK ranked third in the SEC in rushing offense (196.2) in 2020.
- UK has allowed 30 or fewer points in 33 of the past 38 games.
- Since 2016, UK is 15-7 in games decided by seven points or less.
- The Wildcats signed their eighth straight top-50 recruiting class under Stoops in 2020.

MILESTONES TO LOOK FOR...

- Head coach **Mark Stoops** has 49 career victories at Kentucky, No. 2 on the school's all-time list. Paul "Bear" Bryant is first with 60.
- Coach Stoops has 24 SEC wins, passing Paul Bryant for the second-most in school history. He needs one more to tie Fran Curci at No. 1 with 25.
- Coach Stoops now holds the record for most total home wins in school history (35).
- Junior **RB Chris Rodriguez Jr.** has 1,361 career rushing yards. He vaulted all the way to 27th place on the school's all-time list. He needs nine yards to move up to No. 26 and 27 more yards to jump two spots and tie Tony Dixon at No. 25 (1,388).
- Senior **WR Josh Ali** has 846 receiving yards, needing 154 to become the 31st player in school history with 1,000 or more yards receiving. He also has 90 career receptions.

SERIES VS. ULM

- Kentucky leads the all-time series 4-1.
- UK won, 48-14, in Lexington on Oct. 11, 2014 the last time the teams met.
- ULM won the first meeting in 1994 and the Cats have claimed the next four, including three in the past 15 seasons (2006, 2009, 2014).
- UK is 6-2 all-time vs. teams from the current alignment of the Sun Belt Conference.
- The Cats have won six straight games against those teams.
- ULM joined the Sun Belt in 2006.

SIMPLY STOOPS-ENDOUS

UK head coach Mark Stoops has proven to be an excellent hire, turning around a struggling program and making him the first UK coach to lead the program to a fifth consecutive bowl appearance. He also has erased a number of the long-standing hurdles and streaks that have plagued the program's history.

SEVEN HOME GAMES HIGHLIGHT 2021 SCHEDULE

- Seven home games at Kroger Field highlight Kentucky's 2021 football schedule, including backto-back weeks against traditional heavyweights Florida and LSU to open the month of October.
- The Wildcats kick off the season on Sept. 4 against the ULM Warhawks, the first of three consecutive home games to open the challenging slate. Missouri arrives in Lexington on Sept. 11 for the first conference game of the year before Chattanooga wraps up the homestand on Sept. 18.
- On Sept. 25 the Cats hit the road for the first time, beginning a stretch of seven consecutive SEC affairs by traveling to South Carolina to face the Gamecocks and new head coach Shane Beamer. A week later, UK coach Mark Stoops and his squad return home, playing host to Florida (Oct. 2) and LSU (Oct. 9) before concluding the three-week gauntlet with a trip to Georgia on Oct. 16.
- After a bye week on Oct. 23, the Cats head south to face Mississippi State in Starkville on Halloween ٠ weekend and Vanderbilt on Nov. 13, with border rival Tennessee sandwiched between those road games on Nov. 6 at Kroger Field.
- UK closes the regular season with a pair of non-conference games, welcoming New Mexico State to Kroger Field, the teams' second all-time meeting in Lexington, before traveling to Louisville on Nov. 27. The Wildcats will be looking for their third straight win over the Cardinals.

COACHING CHANGES; NEW ROLES

- Liam Coen was named Kentucky's new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Dec. 14. Coen spent the last three years with the Los Angeles Rams, 2018 and '19 as the assistant wide receivers coach before being named assistant quarterbacks coach prior to the 2020 season.
- Eric Wolford was named UK's new offensive line coach on Dec. 16, 2020, coming to UK with 25 years of coaching experience at the collegiate and NFL levels. He spent the past four seasons at South Carolina.
- John Settle was announced as UK's new running backs coach/co-special teams coordinator on March 15, 2021. Settle comes to the Bluegrass after 11 overall seasons between two stints at Wisconsin, the second one starting in 2015. Settle will coach the special teams unit with safeties coach Frank Buffano.
- Chris Collins was named Kentucky's new defensive backs coach on June 3, 2021. He comes to Kentucky after four seasons (2017-20) as the safeties coach at Georgia State.
- Jon Sumrall added an additional title to his resume as co-defensive coordinator/inside linebackers coach.
- Assistant strength and conditioning coach Rafael Horton returned to the Bluegrass after two seasons at West Virginia. Horton was previously at UK from 2013-15.

KENTUCKY HONORS LATE OL COACH JOHN SCHLARMAN WITH NO. 65, CHRIS OATS BY ROTATING NO. 22

- Kentucky offensive line coach John Schlarman and an All-SEC offensive lineman during his playing days at UK, died on Nov. 12, 2020 following a two-year battle with cancer. He was 45.
- He was diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma in the summer of 2018 and was an absolute warrior in his two-year fight against cancer, not missing a game through Oct. 17 this season and very few practices along the way.
- To honor his fight, members of the offensive line chose to rotate No. 65 in 2020, the number Schlarman wore as an offensive lineman at Kentucky. They will rotate the number again this season.
- Schlarman was a four-year starter from 1994-97 and was named SEC All-Freshman in 1994, UK's most outstanding lineman in 1995 and '96, and first-team All-SEC in 1997.
- Schlarman was given posthumously the Broyles Lifetime Achievement Award by the Frank & Barbara Broyles Foundation.
- The team also will wear black stickers on their helmets with the initials "JS" in white letters.
- Kentucky also honored senior linebacker Chris Oats in 2020 and will continue to do so in 2021 as he battles a serious medical condition. Each week a different player will wear Oats' jersey No. 22.
- The team also wears #22OATSSTRONG wristbands to show their support and they conclude each team practice with "22!" Members of the team have also created a website www.22OATSSTRONG.COM with a GoFundMe page to help the family with medical bills.

- The six picks are the tied for the fourth-most in school history and the most since 1979 (eight). Five of the six picks were defensive players.

Larry Warford, Football (2009-12)

Earned All-America Third Team honors as a senior from Associated Press and Phil Steele's College Football ... All-SEC First Team as a senior by ESPN.com and CBSsports.com ... All-SEC Second Team as a junior and sophomore ... Named to the Sophomore All-America Team by College Football News ... Freshman All-SEC by league coaches ... Seven-year NFL career with Detroit and New Orleans ... Pro Bowl selection in 2017, 2018 and 2019.

- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships, including 20 of the last 26, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.

UK ALUMNUS TIM COUCH INDUCTED INTO NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL HOF/LISTED ON COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT

- Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch was one of seven athletes inducted into the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) National High School Hall of Fame on July 1 in Orlando. Couch has also been named to the 2022 ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. That announcment will be made in early 2022.
- During his football career at Leslie County High School in Hyden, Kentucky in the mid-1990s, Couch set three national career passing records – 872 completions, 12,104 yards and 133 touchdowns. He helped Leslie County to a 13-1 record as a junior while completing an amazing 75 percent of his passes – a national record that stood for 15 years. As a senior, he passed for 42 touchdowns and led his team to an 11-3 mark, and he was named Gatorade and USA Today National Player of the Year while earning Mr. Football honors in Kentucky. ESPN.com selected Couch the sixth-best high school athlete in history. Couch was equally dominant on the basketball court. He scored 3,023 points in his career, leading the state in scoring as a senior at 37 points per game. He was two-time all-state in basketball. Couch's football prowess continued at the University of Kentucky,

where he passed for 8,159 yards and 73 touchdowns in his final two seasons. He led Kentucky to the Outback Bowl after his junior season and was fourth in the Heisman Trophy voting. Couch was the No. 1 pick in the 1999 NFL draft by the Cleveland Browns and passed for more than 11,000 yards and 64 touchdowns in his five years with the Browns.

OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

- Excitement is in the air as Kentucky awaits to see the Cats' new offense scheme, directed by offensive coordinator Liam Coen. The former quarterbacks coach for the Los Angeles Rams brings that pro-style offense to the Bluegrass and says one of the biggest changes will be in the passing game. UK threw 243 passes for 1,336 yards last season, ranking 14th in the SEC in passing offense.
- UK's offense will be built around a solid group of six offensive starters which includes "super seniors" wide receiver Josh Ali, offensive guard Luke Fortner and tight end Justin Rigg. Also returning is wide receiver DeMarcus Harris, offensive guard Kenneth Horsey and preseason All-America tackle Darian Kinnard.
- Leading returning rusher Chris Rodriguez Jr. is UK's most productive offensive threat from a year ago and looks to be the anchor of the Wildcats' running corps again this season. He finished fifth in the SEC in rushing in 2020 with 119 rushes for 785 yards (87.2 ypg) in just nine games.
- The "Big Blue Wall" returns three starters from 2020 in Darian Kinnard, Kenneth Horsey and Luke Fortner. Combined with key reserves in seniors Austin Dotson and Naasir Watkins, the Wildcats return a combined 59 career starts for 2021.
- Key losses offensively include quarterback Terry Wilson (17-8 as a starter), running back A.J. Rose (106 carries for 666 yards and two touchdowns in 2020), center Drake Jackson (44 straight career starts) and offensive tackle Landon Young (33 career starts at left tackle).
- Kentucky has rushed for at least 300 yards in seven of its past 16 games, including four of at least 400 yards. In 2020, UK ranked third in the SEC and 34th nationally in rushing (196.5 ypg).

- Brother, Jack, is currently a center at Duke
- Played hockey (defense) as a young child until his sophomore year of high school

QUARTERBACKS

- One of the biggest storylines surrounding fall camp involves UK's new offensive scheme and the position battle at guarterback.
- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had eight different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr. and Terry Wilson.
- Kentucky is looking to replace starting quarterback, Terry Wilson, who transferred to New Mexico for his final season of eligibility. Wilson went 17-8 over three seasons as a starter. He became the first player in school history with at least 3,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in his career.
- In total, first-year offensive coordinator Liam Coen has five quarterbacks to work with this fall. Penn State transfer Will Levis arrived during the summer and was announced as the starteron August 15, one day following the first scrimmage.
- In 15 career games at Penn State, Levis completed 61-of-102 passes (59.8) for 644 yards and three scores, with just two interceptions. Often used as a running quarterback, he also had 133 carries for 473 yards and six touchdowns. His 473 career rushing yards rank 10th all-time by a Penn State guarterback.
- Sophomore Beau Allen is the backup. He saw action in two games last season, completing 3-of-7 passes for 40 yards.
- Junior walk-on Patrick Delahunty returns as does sophomore Nik Scalzo who was

injured in 2020. Somerset standout and true freshman **Kaiya Sheron** enters the mix as a mid-year enrollee.

RUNNING BACKS/FULLBACKS

- Veteran running backs coach John Settle was hired in March of 2021 after spending the last six seasons and 11 years total at Wisconsin.
- The running back room goes eight deep and features juniors Chris Rodriguez Jr. and Kavosiey Smoke and sophomores JuTahn McClain and Travis Tisdale. Sophomore Torrance Davis was added to the room after seeing time at linebacker in 2020. After a year at wide receiver, Mike Drennen II has moved to running back. Junior Tyler Markray also looks for playing time as does mid-year enrollee La'Vell Wright. He comes to UK after rushing for 4,396 yards and 56 touchdowns at North Hardin High School.
- Rodriguez was the team's leading rusher in 2020 with 785 yards and 11 touchdowns despite being unavailable for two games due to COVID-19 protocols. He had four 100-yard rushing games, including three of the final four he was available to play. He was named second-team All-America and first-team All-SEC by Pro Football Focus and has earned several preseason accolades for 2021.
- Rodriguez has proven nearly impossible to bring down behind the line of scrimmage, having lost yardage on just five of his 192 career rushing attempts. In 2020, he lost yards on his first attempt of the season before starting a streak of 105 consecutive carries of positive yards.
- Rodriguez has scored a touchdown once every 11.3 rush attempts in his career (17 in 192 attempts). By comparison, UK all-time leading rusher and scorer Benny Snell Jr. hit paydirt once every 15.4 rush attempts.
- Rodriguez rushed for a career-best 133 yards and two scores vs. Ole Miss on Oct. 3, 2020 and then bested that with 149 yards and two scores vs. Vanderbilt on Nov. 14. In that game he became the 39th player in school history to surpass 1,000 career rushing yards.
- Smoke missed three games with a rib injury but returned in a limited capacity vs. Georgia and finished the 2020 season with 229 yards on 47 attempts.
- As a true freshman, McClain earned high praise from the coaching staff and totaled 16 carries for 62 yards in seven games.

- UK has two fullbacks on the roster in senior **Dillon Wheatley** and junior **Jack Varga**.
- Kentucky has rushed for at least 300 yards in seven of its past 16 games, including four of at least 400 yards.

WIDE RECEIVERS

- Kentucky has 19 total wide receivers this fall, and it includes a mix of experience and young talent. Twelve of the 19 are returners, while seven are newcomers to the program.
- The top returning pass catcher, **Josh Ali**, is back for an extra season after taking advantage of the NCAA's blanket eligibility waiver for all 2020 fall student-athletes due to COVID-19.
- Ali has 90 career receptions for 846 yards and five scores. He finished the 2020 season with a team-high 54 catches for 473 yards and a touchdown.
- Senior Isaiah Epps returned midseason from a foot injury that cost him the 2019 season and flashed his potential down the stretch, catching eight passes for 63 yards.
- Senior **Clevan Thomas Jr.** has a ton of experience having played in 29 career games with eight starting nods. Thomas' status is uncertain for the fall as he recovers from a torn ACL suffered in spring practice.
- Sophomore DeMarcus Harris caught 14 passes for 87 yards in 2020.
- Battling for increased action this season are sophomores Tae Tae Crumes and redshirt freshman Earnest Sanders IV.
- Walk-ons Kaleb Cheek, Trey Dennis, Darren Edmond, Luke Leeper and Rahsaan Lewis also add depth. Lewis was impressive in preseason scrimmages and expected to earn playing time.
- A huge addition to the program who figures to make an instant and significant contribution to the offense is Nebraska transfer Wan'Dale Robinson. He brings a wealth of experience after two seasons with the Huskers. In 2020, he led Nebraska with 51 catches and 461 receiving yards despite playing only eight games and splitting duties at running back. As a freshman in 2019, Robinson caught 40 passes for 443 yards and two touchdowns while rushing for 340 yards and three scores. The 40 catches and 443 receiving yards were the most by any true freshman in Nebraska history.
- Another huge transfer (literally) is 6-foot-6 receiver Tre'Von Morgan who spent the

last three seasons at Michigan State. He saw action in three games in 2020 for the Spartans, totaling two catches for 46 yards.

• True freshman Chauncey Magwood looks to get in the mix after enrolling early. In high school, he played wide receiver his first three seasons before switching to quarterback as a senior. Three more highly-touted true freshmen, Dekel Crowdus, Chris Lewis and **Devonte Ross**, will also battle for playing time. Crowdus is a hometown hero who hauled in 91 receptions for 1,505 receiving yards and 22 touchdowns in his prep career at Frederick Douglass High School in Lexington. Lewis hails from Pleasant Grove, Alabama where he finished his senior season with 70 receptions for 1,235 yards and 19 scores. Ross hails from Cartersville, Georgia where he compiled 115 catches, 2,389 receiving yards and 29 touchdowns in his prep career at Cartersville High School.

TIGHT ENDS

- Tight ends coach Vince Marrow has one of the most experienced position groups with all three of his top tight ends returning for 2021.
- The tight ends were key blockers for UK's explosive running game, which averaged nearly 200 yards per game and ranked third in the SEC.
- Senior Justin Rigg is back after taking advantage of the NCAA's blanket eligibility waiver for all 2020 fall student-athletes due to COVID-19. Rigg has 30 career receptions for 358 yards and one score and in 2020, had 12 catches for 145 yards.
- Junior Keaton Upshaw had 16 catches for 198 yards and three TDs in 2020, both leading the tight end corps and ranking second on the team overall. He caught a 12-yard touchdown vs. Mississippi State,

his second career score, a 21-yarder vs. Vanderbilt, and a contested jump ball in the end zone vs. Florida in 2020. He averaged a touchdown every sixth reception. However, he is currently unavailable as he recovers from an injury during fall camp.

- Junior Brenden Bates made his first career catch in the Mississippi State game last season, hauling in a 14-yard pass. He saw action in just six games after being injured in that game.
- New to the tight end room is true freshmen Jordan Dingle and Jai Williams. Dingle was a first-team All-State selection in Kentucky and was named the 2020 4th Region AD Association Player of the Year after catching 41 passes for 515 yards and two scores. Williams, a Lake Forest, Illinois native, was a two-way player at linebacker and tight end in high school and came to Kentucky as a preferred walk-on.
- Another addition to the room is sophomore Izayah Cummings who moved from wide receiver to tight end during fall camp and made an immediate impression at his new position.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- John Schlarman was Kentucky's offensive line coach for eight seasons before passing away on Nov. 12, 2020 after a two-year battle with cancer.
- Eric Wolford was hired to replace Schlarman in December of 2020 after four seasons at South Carolina.
- The O-line, known as the "Big Blue Wall" returns three of five starters from 2020 in Darian Kinnard, Kenneth Horsey and Luke Fortner.
- Combined with key reserves in seniors Austin Dotson and Naasir Watkins, the Wildcats return a combined 59 career starts on the "Big Blue Wall" for 2021.
- The addition of LSU transfer Za'Darius "Dare" Rosenthal in July was a huge boost of depth for the "Big Blue Wall." The 6-foot-7, 327-pound offensive tackle played in 13 career games with eight career starts for the Tigers.
- Two big losses that need replacing in 2021 are All-SEC center Drake Jackson and All-SEC left tackle Landon Young. Jackson started in 44 consecutive games at center, while Young was a starter at left tackle for 24 straight games.

- Kinnard (33 career games, 26 career starts) has been holding down the right tackle position since he entered the starting lineup at the end of the 2018 season but fans could also see him at left tackle this season. He had 47 knockdowns in 2020, grading out at 87.4 percent with 142 blocks at the point of attack. He was named first-team All-America by Pro Football Focus, second-team All-America by CBS/247sports and The Sporting News, third team by AP and fourth team by Phil Steele. He received All-SEC First Team accolades from AP, Phil Steele and PFF and second-team All-SEC honors from the SEC Coaches. He's already been rated by Pro Football Focus as the top returning Power 5 offensive lineman in the country and is listed on two-preseason All-America teams.
- Fortner (42 career games, 23 career starts) is another "super senior" who provided the coaching staff with a late Christmas present when he announced he'd return for the 2021 season. He started in 10 games at right guard in 2020 and graded at 82.9 percent with 26 knockdowns and 146 blocks at the point of attack. Fortner has moved to center and is expected to start at that position.
- Horsey (12 career games, eight career starts) manned the left guard spot last season,

starting in eight games. An interesting note about Horsey - he had open-heart surgery in April of 2018 and was named winner of the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year. He graded at 82.6 percent, had 17 knockdowns and 93 blocks at the point of attack.

- Dotson (27 career games, four career starts) looks for a larger role this season after starting in four games. He can play either guard spot as he served as a backup for Horsey at left guard and Fortner at right guard last season.
- Watkins (25 career games, one career start) has been rehabbing an injured knee and hopes to return to the tackle rotation in 2021.
- Junior **Quintin Wilson** (10 career games) saw action in five games last season at center behind four-year starter Drake Jackson.
- Looking to get added playing time are a number of returning linemen with limited experience to date: senior Matthew Napier (two career games), junior Jake Pope, as well as sophomores Eli Cox (nine career games) and Jeremy Flax (two career games). Also available are redshirt freshmen R.J. Adams, Deondre Buford, Josh Jones and John Young.
- With the move of Fortner to center, Cox has been the starting right guard during preseason practice.
- The "Big Blue Wall" got even deeper this fall with the addition of LSU transfer **Dare Rosenthal**. The 6-7, 327-pound tackle, played in 13 career games for the Tigers and will have three years of eligibility remaining.
- Freshman Wildcats Jager Burton and David Wohlabaugh Jr., graduated high school a semester early and took advantage of being early enrollees. Burton was the winner of the 2020 Paul Hornung Award, chosen by the Louisville Quarterback Club, as the top high school player in Kentucky. He became only the third offensive lineman to win the award. Wohlabaugh is an all-state lineman out of Stow, Ohio. He also lettered two seasons in ice hockey.
- Three more true freshmen add depth to the o-line in Paul Rodriguez of Mason, Ohio, and walk-ons Jonathan Berry (Stamping Ground, Ky.) and Lucas Padgett (son of former UK basketball standout Scott Padgett).
- The "Big Blue Wall", along with UK tight ends, have helped Kentucky post five consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards, with at least one 1,000-yard individual in four of those.

DEFENSIVE PREVIEW

- Defensive coordinator Brad White is entering his third season as the defensive coordinator, his fourth as the outside linebackers coach at UK. Also helping with the coordinator duties is former Wildcat and inside linebackers coach Jon Sumrall. He added co-defensive coordinator title to his resume in 2020.
- Kentucky welcomes back 26 returning letterwinners, including five starters in DE Josh Paschal, WLB DeAndre Square, LB Jordan Wright, DB Tyrell Aijan, and FS Yusuf Corker.
- Several key players will have to be replaced on defense. Gone are leading tackler Jamin Davis, defensive backs Brandin Echols and Kelvin Joseph, nose guard Quinton Bohanna, defensive tackle Phil Hoskins and OLB Jamar "Boogie" Watson.
- UK started 19 different players on defense last season with three

- The good news is that 12 of those 19 players who started at least one game return for the 2021 season.
- The positions where a starter from 2020 does not return are defensive tackle (Hoskins) and outside linebacker (Watson).
- UK ranked fourth in the SEC in total defense (380.7) and fifth in the SEC in scoring defense (25.9) in 2020.
- UK ranked in the top 10 nationally in turnovers gained (22) and was 20th nationally and second in the SEC in red zone defense (.750).
- Kentucky also led the SEC in passing defense (224.6 yards per game) and ranked third in pass efficiency defense.
- UK ranked seventh nationally and led the SEC with three defensive touchdowns (Kelvin Joseph, Jamin Davis and Jordan Wright).
- UK intercepted 16 passes on the season, including three in the Gator Bowl. It led the SEC and ranked third nationally.

DEFENSIVE LINE

- Former Wildcat Anwar Stewart is in his second season coaching the defensive line. His unit should still be a position of strength for UK despite losing two key starters in All-SEC nose guard Quinton Bohanna and defensive tackle Phil Hoskins.
- Returning senior Josh Paschal moved from outside linebacker to defensive end in 2020 and was a shining star in his new role. Paschal had 32 tackles, 6.5 TFL and had a crucial INT vs. Mississippi State that he returned 76 yards to set up a two-yard score on the next play. Paschal enters 2021 with 21.5 career TFL and 8.0 sacks, along with two blocked kicks.
- Another senior who looks to play a major role on the defensive line this season is Marquan "Bully" McCall. He proved to be a mountainous force in the middle last season, finishing with 22 tackles and three starting assignments. Also battling for playing time at nose guard are sophomores Josaih Hayes, Justin Rogers (1.0 sack).
- The future also is bright for these Cats awaiting their turn: seniors Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald and Collin Hartmann, junior walk-ons Alex Bascom and Richard Bascom, sophomores Isaiah Beasley, Isaiah Gibson, and Octavious Oxendine and redshirt freshmen Sam Anaele and

 Bolstering the d-line unit this fall will be incoming freshmen, both standing at 6-foot-5 Jamarius Dinkins (Columbus, Ohio) and Kahlil Saunders (Huntsville, Ala.).

SECONDARY

- The secondary unit is in the hands of two of the most energetic and talented young coaches in Chris Collins and Frank Buffano. Collins, who coaches the defensive backs, was hired in June of 2021 after spending the last four seasons at Georgia State. Buffano enters his second season coaching the safeties, a position he earned in March of 2020.
- UK has ranked in the top four of the SEC in pass defense, including leading the league in both 2019 and 2020, for three straight seasons.
- UK also led the SEC and ranked third nationally in total interceptions (16) in 2020, eight coming from the secondary.
- Returning cornerbacks Cedrick Dort, Jr., and Carrington Valentine have starting experience under their belts.
- Dort (31 career games, 13 career starts) battled through some aches and pains during the 2020 season but remained an excellent player at corner, totaling 10 tackles and breaking up a pair of passes in 10 games. He has 13 career starts under his belt.
- Valentine saw action in 10 games as a true freshman in 2020, earning his first career start at corner in the Gator Bowl.
- Another "super senior" looking to take his game to the next level is corner Quandre Mosely (23 career games, two career starts). He finished the 2020 season with 19.0 tackles and two pass breakups.
- The staff is also excited for the future of redshirt freshman Andru Phillips, who earned valuable playing time in 2020, and true freshmen Adrian Huey from Nashville and Maxwell Hairston of West Bloomfield, Mich.
- At safety, "super senior" Yusuf Corker (37 career games, 24 career starts) once again proved to be one of the SEC's most underrated players as he piled up 77 tackles (second on the team), 2.5 TFL and two INTs. He had a career-high 18 tackles at Missouri on Oct. 24, including 16 solo stops. Those 16 solo tackles tie the single-game school record set by Larry Smith vs. Tulane in 1984 and Jeff Zurcher vs. Georgia in 1998. Corker capped

his season in impressive fashion, picking off a pass in each of the final two games.

- Safety Tyrell Ajian (36 career games, 12 career starts) stepped into a much larger role in 2020, starting in 10 games. He got better as the year went along, finishing with 48 tackles, an interception, a forced fumble, a pass breakup and a blocked kick in 2020.
- Safety Davonte Robinson (37 career games, eight career starts), another "super senior," came back from a quadriceps injury that robbed him of the 2019 season and worked his way into the fold, starting in three of 11 games played. Overall, he totaled 27 tackles and 2.0 tackles for loss. He has 88 career tackles, 5.0 TFL and two fumble recoveries, including the game-sealing one at Florida in 2018 that ended the Cats' losing streak to the Gators. During preseason practice, coaches have noted that he looks like the 2018 version of himself prior to the injury.
- Playing at nickelback will be sophomores
 Vito Tisdale and Joel Williams. Both saw
 action as true freshmen in 2020 as Tisdale
 played in 10 games and charted 20 tackles,
 while Williams saw action in nine games and
 had three tackles.
- Other returnees looking to break into the lineup at safety are sophomores Taj Dodson, Moses Douglass and Jalen Geiger, along with redshirt freshman Ricky Hyatt Jr.
- True freshman Jordan Lovett of Radcliff, Ky., graduated a semester early from North Hardin High School and enrolled at UK in January with hopes of getting a jump start on the playbook.
- Adding depth and experience is "super senior" Zach Johnson at safety and walk-on DBs Zac Berezowitz and Ben Drake.

LINEBACKERS

- Only three letterwinners in sophomores K.D.
 McDaniel and J.J. Weaver and senior Jordan
 Wright return for White's outside linebackers
 group this fall. The staff was pleased to add
 Georgia Tech transfer Justice Dingle who
 enrolled in January to provide more depth.
- Walk-on senior Shawn Lawson, sophomore Jase Bruner and true freshman Conner Long of East Lansing, Mich., also add depth to the OLB unit.
- Gone is Jamar "Boogie" Watson who started in 19 straight games at OLB. He had a strong senior season, leading the team with 10.0 tackles for loss to give him 28.5 in his career,

eighth on UK's all-time list. He also capped his career fifth on the school's all-time sacks list with 18.5.

- Looking to fill those "Boogie" shoes are dominate pass rushers Weaver and Wright.
 Weaver was having a stellar redshirt freshman season before missing the final two games with a torn ACL in his right knee. He ranked second on the team with Paschal with 6.5 tackles for loss. In addition, he had 33 tackles, two quarterback hurries and a pass breakup.
- Wright (33 career games, five career starts) was also impressive in 2020. He finished with 45 tackles (sixth on the team), 5.5 TFL, 3.5 sacks, a team-high four pass breakups, a team-high three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries and an interception.
- Dingle saw action in 19 games in three seasons at Georgia Tech, totaling eight tackles, three fumble recoveries and a tackle for loss. He came to UK in January as a midyear enrollee and benefited tremendously from participating in spring practice.
- **McDaniel** is also poised for productive fall after seeing action in five games in 2020.
- Moving from inside linebacker to outside in 2021 is senior Marquez Bembry. Making his first collegiate start last season, Bembry had his first career double-figure tackle game with 10 stops vs. Vanderbilt. He also started at Alabama. Bembry has seen action in 12 career games in his two seasons at UK after playing one season at Jones County Junior College.
- The inside linebackers are led by lone returning starter **DeAndre Square** (36 career games, 22 career starts). He was UK's secondleading tackler in 2019 (69) and in 2020 he ranked third on the team (60). Square made one of the biggest plays of the season when he broke up a pass late in the fourth quarter of the Gator Bowl win vs. NC State, batting it into the air for Jamin Davis to intercept and help seal the game. Square now has a teambest 164 career tackles.
- Speaking of Davis, it was this junior stud who turned heads thus leading him to forgo his senior season and enter the NFL Draft. The first-round draft pick by Waskington, led the team with 102 tackles (fourth in the SEC) on the season, including seven games of doubledigit tackles in his 10 appearances. He also had 4.0 TFL, 1.5 sacks, three interceptions, two PBU, one QBH, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and a blocked kick. Davis was named first-team All-SEC by Pro Football Focus, second team by Phil Steele and was

also named honorable mention All-America by Phil Steele.

- Also returning after contributing quality snaps last season is sophomore Jared Casey. He played in all 11 games and had 20 tackles, including 2.0 tackles for loss.
- As a true freshman in 2020, D'Eryk Jackson earned praise from the coaching staff after playing in nine games and totaling four tackles and an interception. However, Jackson is battling a torn Achilles tendon and his return in 2021 is TBA.
- Looking to help fill the void of Jackson will be two transfers in senior, Ole Miss transfer Jacquez Jones and sophomore, Michigan State transfer Luke Fulton. Jones was a three-year letterwinner who played in 33 games with 19 starts, totaling 182 tackles in his Ole Miss career. In 2020, he led the Rebels with 75 tackles, while adding 2.5 tackles for loss and three quarterback hurries. Fulton played in just one game in his two seasons with the Spartans but he also benefited from participating in UK's spring practice and learning under inside linebackers coach Jon Sumrall.
- Four walk-ons in senior William Nalty, junior Braxton Eiserman, sophomores
 Cody Goatley and Darren Green, and true freshman Austin Gough bolster the inside linebacker unit.
- Highly-regarded freshmen Martez Thrower (Rochella, Ga.) and Trevin Wallace (Jesup, Ga.) arrived this summer and are ready to showcase why they were two of Georgia's top prep defensive players.
- The linebackers corralled six of UK's 16 interceptions in 2020, led by Davis with three.
- Four of the Cats' six interceptions were by the linebackers in a 24-2 win over Miss. State on Oct. 10, 2020. Davis, Jackson, Watson and Wright each grabbed one.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Special teams will be coached by new running backs coach John Settle and safeties coach Frank Buffano this season. The Wildcats return all but their Australian transplant and 2019 Ray Guy Award winner in punter and holder Max Duffy. He concluded his career as the school's all-time leading punter at 45.96 yards per kick.
- Returning are placekicker Matt Ruffolo, kickoff specialist Chance Poore, long snapper Cade Degraw, punt returner Josh Ali and kick returner Zach Johnson.

H.

- Competing for the punting duties are senior Colin Goodfellow and UK's third straight Aussie transplant Wilson Berry who enrolled in January.
- Goodfellow earned two starts last season, punting three times for a 46.3-yard average against Vandy. He followed that up by averaging 48.3 yards on seven punts vs. Alabama, including a career-long 55-yarder.
- Ruffolo, a "super senior" who took advantage of the NCAA's blanket waiver due to the COVID-19 pandemic, was UK's starting placekicker last season. He made 12-of-14 on FG and 22-of-23 PATs this season. He tied a career-long by drilling a 50-yard FG at Missouri on Oct. 24. For his career, Ruffolo has made 16-of-19 FG and 40-of-43 PAT.
- Poore handles kickoffs for the Wildcats. He also has placekicking experience, as he made 5-of-9 FGs and 24-of-26 PATs last season. He was 1-of-1 on field goals and 5-of-5 on extra points this season.
- Sophomore walk-on Graham Wald is also available for kicking duties. The first-team All-State kicker started three seasons at Henry Clay High School in Lexington.
- Johnson is back as UK's kick returner, while another "super senior" Josh Ali handles punt returns. Ali had six punt returns for a 10.3 average in 2020, while. Johnson averaged 20.7 yards per kick return.
- Degraw enters his second season as UK's long snapper. He's backed up by walk-ons Clay Perry and Jordan Morrow.

KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 312 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 171-137-4 record (.555), 35-21 (.625) under Mark Stoops.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 15 of the last 17 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years. (*Note: Does not include 2020 season due to Covid-19 protocols).
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-ofthe-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as hometeam facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

<u>Seating Capacity:</u> 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites

<u>Playing Field:</u> UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Ole Miss, Mississippi State and Missouri. The end zones and team sideline areas feature a checkerboard pattern in alternating shades of blue. It was designed to mimic the pattern of Secretariat's silks, which has been part of the football uniforms for five seasons. The school's new interlocking "UK" logo is positioned in the center of the field.

<u>Video Boards:</u> Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards. Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and highrange frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.



HEAD COACH MARK STOOPS / NINTH SEASON / IOWA, 1989



When the Kentucky football team took the field for the 2021 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, it made official yet another milestone in the remarkable term of Mark Stoops as the Wildcats' head coach.

Stoops became the first coach in school history to take his team to five consecutive bowl games, adding to his lengthy and growing list of accomplishments during his eight years at UK. As a program, it matched the school record of five straight postseason appearances, accomplished 2006-10 under two head coaches.

Even in the abbreviated 2020 season, Stoops added two more achievements: Kentucky's win at Tennessee was the Wildcats' first victory in Knoxville since 1984; and, the regular-season finale over South Carolina was Stoops' 48th win at Kentucky, moving him into sole possession of second place, behind only the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant. The Gator Bowl improved his total to 49.

A partial accounting of Stoops' exploits also features:

Back-to-back-to-back bowl wins - the 2021 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, 2019 Belk Bowl and the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 – the first time in school history that UK won bowls in three consecutive seasons;

- First New Year's Day Bowl win since • 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)

In addition to the team accomplishments, several of Stoops' players have won All-America accolades, along with awards such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Pop Warner Award, Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last five seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, inheriting a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats



STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final USA Today coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's

top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft - seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football

League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.


