

- · Coming off a sixth consecutive bowl trip, school-record fourth straight bowl victory and returning many of the star players from a historic 10-win team plus the addition of an elite signing-day class, Kentucky is primed and ready for what's to come in 2022.
- · Entering his school-record 10th season, head coach Mark Stoops will lead the Wildcats in 15 practices, beginning March 8 and ending April 14.
- The 2022 spring roster features 96 players, 83 returning and 13 newcomers.
- A total of 41 letterwinners return in 2022, including 11 starters (five defense and six offense).
- The roster includes nine "super seniors" (seniors who took advantage of the NCAA's blanket eligibility waiver for all 2020 fall studentathletes due to COVID-19). • The Kentucky football team finished the 2021 season with a 10-3 record and a win over Iowa in the Citrus Bowl. The Cats won 10 games for just the fourth time in school history, but the second time in four years.

WINNING STREAK

• The Wildcats enter 2022 on a four-game winning streak. UK also owns a 16-nonconference-game winning streak, dating back to the 2017 Music City Bowl loss to Northwestern. It is the longest such active streak in FBS.

EIGHT HOME GAMES HIGHLIGHT 2022 SCHEDULE

- Kentucky football is slated to play eight homes games this fall. The schedule includes SEC matchups against South Carolina (Oct. 8), Mississippi State (Oct. 15), Vanderbilt (Nov. 12) and defending national champion Georgia (Nov. 19). UK will also host nonconference foes Miami University (Sept. 3), Youngstown State (Sept. 17), Northern Illinois (Sept. 24) and Louisville (Nov. 26).
- Kentucky fans sold out Kroger Field multiple times in 2021, playing an important role in some of the most memorable wins in program history, and energizing the Wildcats to another 10-win season.
- Kentucky is 30-13 at Kroger Field over the last six seasons.
- Mark Stoops has won 41 home games, more than any coach in school history.

COACHING CHANGES

- Rich Scangarello was named Kentucky's new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Feb. 25. Scangarello coached seven years in the NFL and 15 in the collegiate ranks. He arrived in Kentucky fresh off a run to the NFC Championship game with the San Francisco 49ers. He replaced Llam Coen who left to be the offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams.
- Zach Yenser was named UK's new offensive line coach on Feb. 22. He came to UK after three seasons with the 49ers. Prior to that, he spent three seasons at Kansas (2015-17) as the run game coordinator/offensive line coach and had coaching stints at Southern Methodist (2018), California (2013-14), Louisiana Tech (2010-12), Colquitt County High School (2009) and Henderson State (2008). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Troy University in 2007, working with special teams and the offensive lineman under former Wildcat and beloved UK assistant coach John Schlarman. He replaced Eric Wolford who left to become the offensive line coach at Alabama.
- Mike Stoops was hired on Jan. 18, 2022 as Kentucky's new inside linebackers coach. He came to UK after spending the 2021 season as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Florida Atlantic. Prior to that he spent two seasons (2019 and 2020) at Alabama as an analyst on Nick Saban's staff, highlighted by the 2020 national championship. He also was the



assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Oklahoma from 2012-18 and was the head coach at Arizona from 2004-11. He had a first term at Oklahoma from 1999-2003, including the 2000 national championship season. He replaced Jon Sumrall who left to become the head coach at Troy.

SEVEN CATS INVITED TO NFL COMBINE

 Seven Wildcats participated in the 2022 NFL Scouting Combine March 3-6 in Indianapolis. They were safety Yusuf Corker, center Luke Fortner, offensive tackle Darian Kinnard, nose



guard Marquan McCall, defensive end Joshua Paschal, wide receiver Wan'Dale Robinson and offensive tackle Dare Rosenthal.

- UK's seven representatives tied for the second-most in school history. UK also had seven invites in 2021, following the 2020 season. A school-record eight Wildcats were invited in 2019, following the 2018 season. Kentucky ranked 11th nationally this year for most players invited, and among SEC schools, UK ranked sixth behind Georgia (14) and Alabama (11), LSU and Texas A&M (9), Ole Miss (8).
- The Wildcats are looking to have multiple players drafted for the fourth straight year. In 2021, six Wildcats were drafted in Jamin Davis, Kelvin Joseph, Quinton Bohanna, Brandin Echols, Landon Young and Phil Hoskins. It marked the second time in three years the Wildcats had more than five players drafted and the most Wildcats chosen in the draft since 1994. In 2020, Lynn Bowden Jr. and Logan Stenberg were drafted and in 2019, UK had five NFL draft picks in Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson Jr., Mike Edwards, Benny Snell Jr. and George Asafo-Adjei.
- The 2022 NFL Draft is set for April 28-30 in Las Vegas.

OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

- The Wildcats' exciting pro-style offense has a new coordinator in Rich Scangarello, who joined the Wildcats from the San Francisco 49ers and whose background in the Mike and Kyle Shanahan/Sean McVay/Liam Coen coaching tree will allow Kentucky to keep running a similar system that set records on the field last year.
- UK football returns two of the most productive offensive players in the country in quarterback Will Levis and running back Chris Rodriguez Jr. Additionally, the elite "Big Blue Wall" offensive line figures to continue to maintain physicality at the line of scrimmage that has defined the "blue collar" identity head coach Mark Stoops has built the recent success of Kentucky football upon.
- Five offensive starters return in 2022 in Levis, Rodriguez Jr., tight end Brenden Bates and offensive linemen Eli Cox and Kenneth Horsey.
- Other key returning offensive players with starting experience are tight ends Keaton Upshaw (sat out last season with injury) and Izayah Cummings and wide receivers DeMarcus Harris and Clevan Thomas Jr. (sat out last season with injury).
- UK averaged 218.6 passing yards and 199.5 rushing yards per game. The impressive balance hasn't been smoke and mirrors either, as the unit averaged 6.41 yards per play (5,527 in 862 plays) for the season. The number is the second-highest yards per play average for a single-season in school history behind the 6.45 in 1998 with Tim Couch at the helm of Hal Mumme's "Air Raid."
- UK's offense steadily improved throughout the season before exploding in the month of November, averaging 560.8 total yards per game in those four contests. The total was the highest of any Power Five team and second nationally only to Kent State (564.0) for that time period.
- The offense had the highest 4+ yard rushing percentage of any team in nation, a hat tip to the offensive line (source: SportSource Analytics). The Wildcats ranked fourth in the SEC in rushing yards per attempt with a 5.23 average.
- The 32.3 points per game in '21 ranked fourth in school single-season history.

this spring. **Levis** is the clear starter after earning the starting spot early in fall camp last season. He had a sensational junior year, completing 233 of 353 passes (66 percent) for 2,837 yards and 24 touchdowns. He ranked sixth in the SEC in passing yards per game (217.5) and seventh in total offense (246.4).

- Levis finds himself surrounded by a lot of new faces with only three returning starters joining him from last year's offense in running back Chris Rodriguez Jr., and offensive linemen Kenneth Horsey and Eli Cox. Tight end Brenden Bates also has some experience with seven starts, while tight end Izayah Cummings and wide receiver DeMarcus Harris started in one game each.
- Junior **Beau Allen** was the backup to Levis in 2021. He played in three games, completing 8 of 12 passes for 92 yards while also running for a three-yard TD vs. NMSU.
- Redshirt freshman Kaiya Sheron has a year under his belt learning the offense as a redshirt. Sophomore Deuce Hogan enters his first season at Kentucky after transferring from Iowa.
- Veteran running backs coach John Settle is entering his second season at UK after spending the last six seasons and 11 years total at Wisconsin.
- The SEC's top returning rusher is senior Chris Rodriguez Jr. Last season, he was named First-Team All-SEC by the Associated Press after totaling 1,379 rushing yards (fifth on UK's single-season list). He ranked second in the SEC and 12th nationally, averaging 106.1 yards per game. He was seventh in the SEC in all-purpose yards (110.8). His nine 100-yard rushing games in 2021 were a new single-season school record.
- Rodriguez Jr. currently ranks sixth on UK's all-time rushing list with 2,740 yards. He needs just 1,134 more yards to pass Benny Snell Jr. as UK's all-time leading rusher.
- Rodriguez has proven nearly impossible to bring down behind the line of scrimmage, having lost yardage on just 13 of his 417 career rushing attempts. In 2020, he lost yards on his first attempt of the season before starting a streak of 105 consecutive carries of positive yards.
- Rodriguez has scored a touchdown once every 16.0 rush attempts in his career (26 in 417 attempts). By comparison, UK all-time leading rusher and scorer Benny Snell Jr. hit paydirt once every 15.4 rush attempts.
- Also looking for more reps this spring is senior **Kavosiey Smoke**, junior **Mike Drennen**, junior **JuTahn McClain** and redshirt freshman **La'Vell Wright**.
- Smoke has played in 34 career games and has 1,306 career yards. He had 81 carries for 416 yards and four scores in 2021, averaging 5.1 per carry. He had a career-high 104 yards in the win over LSU.
- McClain has seen action in 20 career games. In 2021, he saw action in nine games and had 34 rushes for 165 yards (4.8 yards per carry) along with six receptions for 42 yards and a score.
- Drennen, who switched from wide receiver to running back during fall camp, saw action in six games in 2021, totaling 21 yards on seven carries.
- Wright played in four games as a true freshman but impressed in his limited playing time. He had four carries for 119 yards and one score, a 41-yard jaunt at Louisville.

· Second-year wide receivers coach Scott Woodward has 13 wide receivers this spring, and it includes some experience but is mostly young talent looking for an increased role.

- Gone are Kentucky's two top receivers from last year in Wan'Dale Robinson and Josh Ali. Their departure should lead to good competition at the receiver position in the spring.
- The top returning pass catcher from last season is junior **DeMarcus Harris** who caught 12 passes for 150 yards and one score. Junior Rahsaan Lewis saw action in just six games early in the season but missed time due to injury. He had two catches for four yards. Sophomore Tae Tae Crumes played in four games and had one catch for 10 yards.
- A huge boost for the receiving corps happened when Clevan Thomas Jr., announced he would return as a "Super Senior" after missing last season with a torn ACL. He is the most experienced returner with 29 career games and eight starting nods under his belt.
- Three players arrived in January as mid-year enrollees in freshman Dane Key, freshman Cole Lanter and senior Virginia Tech transfer Tayvion Robinson.
- Key, a four-star prospect, was named the Class 5A Player of the Year after an outstanding senior season at Fredrick Douglass High School in Lexington with 959 receiving yards and nine touchdowns.
- Lanter accepted a preferred walk-on position after a stellar high school career at Boyle County High School. He combined for 2,253 receiving yards and 35 receiving touchdowns, including 78 catches for 1,288 yards and 21 receiving touchdowns as a senior. His 21 receiving touchdowns and 78 receptions led the state and were school records. His 1,288 receiving yards ranked second in the state.
- Robinson comes to the Bluegrass after three seasons and 36 games at Virginia Tech. He compiled 113 receptions for 1,555 yards and nine touchdowns (eight receiving, one punt return TD) in his career as a Hokie.
- Redshirting in 2021 and looking to make an impact this season are freshmen Dekel Crowdus and Chris Lewis. Sophomore Earnest Sanders IV, junior Luke Leeper and sophomore Trey Dennis are also looking to make their marks this spring.
- Kentucky had 12 different players (wide receivers, running backs and tight ends) catch two or more passes in 2021 and eight of them return in 2021.

- Tight ends coach Vince Marrow once again has one of the most experienced and talented groups on the team with Keaton Upshaw, Brenden Bates, Izayah Cummings and Jordan Dingle returning.
- The Wildcats' key loss at tight end was four-year letter winner Justin Rigg. He played in a school-record 63 career games with 35 starts, including 16 in a row, and had career totals of 50 catches for 547 yards and five scores, 10.9 yards per catch average.
- **Upshaw** returns after sitting out last season with injury. In 2020, he played in all 11 games and had 16 catches for 198 yards and three TDs, both leading the tight end corps and ranking second on the team overall.
- Bates played in all 13 games with six starts in 2021. He totaled 11 receptions for 70 yards (5.4) and one score.
- **Cummings,** who moved to tight end from receiver in fall camp last season, still has impressive ball skills from his wide receiver days. He finished his sophomore season with 14 catches for 195 yards and three touchdowns.
- **Dingle** is coming off a redshirt season and the coaches really like his frame and potential. He saw action in four games as a true freshman and had totaled two catches for 54 yards.
- The tight ends were key blockers for UK's explosive running game, which averaged nearly 200 yards per game and ranked fifth in the SEC.
- New to the tight end room this spring is freshman preferred walk-on, **Jack Monday.** He had 36 catches for 439 yards and eight scores as a senior at Lexington Catholic.

- · Zach Yenser, originally from Fort Mitchell, Kentucky, returned to his home state after three seasons with the 49ers. Prior to that, he spent three seasons at Kansas (2015-17) as the run game coordinator/offensive line coach and had coaching stints at Southern Methodist (2018), California (2013-14), Louisiana Tech (2010-12), Colquitt County High School (2009) and Henderson State (2008). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Troy University in 2007, working with special teams and the offensive lineman under former Wildcat and beloved UK assistant coach John Schlarman.
- The O-line, known as the "Big Blue Wall" returns two of its five starters from 2021 in Eli Cox and Kenneth Horsey.
- The three starters lost are All-American right tackle Darian Kinnard, All-SEC center Luke Fortner and All-SEC left tackle Dare Rosenthal. All three were invited to the NFL Combine as projected draft picks. The trio combined for 38 starts on the line for the Wildcats last season.
- · Another key loss was backup Austin Dotson. He saw action in 40 career games with eight starts in his four-year career. In 2021, he saw action in all 13 games with four starts at right guard.
- The O-line does return 30 career starts in 2021 in Cox with nine and Horsey 21. Auburn transfer
- **Tashawn Manning** has experience as well, playing in 30 career games with 21 career starts. • Horsey has manned the left guard spot for two seasons and is now the Wildcats' most experienced lineman with 25 career games and 21 career starts. An interesting note about

Horsey - he had open-heart surgery in April of 2018 and was named winner of the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year.

- Cox played at right guard in the first nine games last season before a hand injury sidelined him for the season. Prior to the injury, Cox earned Associated Press and ESPN Midseason All-America honors. He has been described as, pound-for-pound, perhaps the strongest player on the team and because of that, and with Fortner gone at the center position, look for Cox to be a front runner for that position this year.
- Also looking to step in starting and supporting roles are senior Quintin Wilson, junior Jeremy Flax, sophomores R.J. Adams, Deondre Buford and John Young and redshirt freshmen Jager Burton, Paul Rodriguez and David Wohlabaugh. Also improving their skills are sophomores Jonathan Berry, Josh Jones and Lucas Padgett.
- In addition to Auburn transfer Tashawn Manning, two mid-year enrollees and Kentucky natives possess the size and athletic ability to make an immediate impact on the "Big Blue Wall." Freshman Kiyaunta Goodwin of Louisville was a five-star signee and the highest-ranked recruit in UK history. Standing at 6-foot-8 and 355 pounds, he was the rated as the nation's No. 25 overall recruit and

DEFENSIVE PREVIEW

- Defensive coordinator Brad White is entering his fourth season as the defensive coordinator, his fifth as the outside linebackers coach at UK.
- The Cats will spend quite a bit of time putting various pieces together this spring. Gone are defensive stalwarts Josh Paschal, Marquan McCall, Yusuf Corker and Davonte Robinson.
- However, Kentucky's defense does welcomes back 12 letterwinners in the spring, including six starters in DB Tyrell Aijan, ILB Jacquez Jones, WLB DeAndre Square, DB Carrington Valentine, OLB J.J. Weaver and LB Jordan Wright,
- Despite injuries to key players on defense throughout the 2021 season, the Wildcats ranked fourth in the SEC in scoring defense (21.7 points per game) and yardage allowed (just 340.7 yards per game). UK's total defense has ranked in the Top 5 of the SEC for three straight seasons.

- Former Wildcat Anwar Stewart is in his third season coaching the defensive line. Three starters are gone from 2021, including two who are projected NFL draft picks in nose guard Marquan McCall and defensive end Josh Paschal. Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald had nine starts last season and totaled 12 tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss.
- If McCall and Paschal are drafted, Stewart will have produced four NFL Draft choices in the last two seasons. Quinton Bohanna was a sixith-round pick by the Dallas Cowboys and Phil Hoskins was a seventh-round pick by the Carolina Panthers, both of whom earned a spot on their teams.

- Three key returnees are Josiah Hayes (saw action in all 13 games with one start at nose guard), Octavious Oxendine (played in six games with three starts at tackle before injury), Justin Rogers (played in all 13 games with four starts at nose guard) and Tre'vonn Rybka (played in 12 games with one start at defensive end).
- Redshirt freshmen Jamarius Dinkins and Kahlil Saunders are working hard for more playing time this season. Dinkins saw action in three games last season, while Saunders got in four games. Both have the physical attributes to compete in the SEC as Dinkins is 6-foot-5 and 296 pounds and Saunders is 6-5 and 287 pounds.
- Key losses on the defensive line are Paschal and McCall. Paschal totaled 37 career TFL and 13.5 sacks, along with three blocked kicks in his career. He ranks tied for third on the school's all-time TFL list. In 2021, Paschal, who earned second-team All-America and first-team All-SEC honors, led the team in tackles for loss (15.5) and quarterback hurries (8). McCall finished with nine tackles, 3.5 for loss and two QBH in '21. He missed three games because of an ankle injury but returned to be a force in the middle at nose guard.
- Working to see more playing time is sophomore Sam Anaele along with seniors Alex Bascom, Richard Bascom and junior Isaiah Beasley.
- Spring additions are Ohio State transfer Darrion Henry-Young and freshman Tomiwa Durojaiye. Henry-Young was a four-star prospect coming out of high school and went on to play two seasons for the Buckeyes but saw action in just four games at defensive end. Durojaiye has a lot of potential and room for growth. His he have drawn some lofty comparisons to former UK All-American and fensive Player of the Year Josh Allen with his size and body frame. Durojaiye was named the 2021 Delaware 3A Defensive Player of the Year.

- The secondary unit is in the hands of two of the most energetic and talented young coaches in Chris Collins and Frank Buffano.
- UK has ranked in the top four of the SEC in pass defense in three of the last four seasons, including leading the league in both 2019 and 2020.
- UK has four key veterans to replace, three who totaled 17 or more starts in their career. They are defensive back Cedrick Dort, Jr. (44 career games, 26 career starts), defensive back Quandre Mosely (36 career games, four career starts), safety Yusuf Corker (49 career games, 36 career starts) and safety Davonte Robinson (49 career games, 17 career starts).
- Another big loss came early in spring practice when junior and top returning nickelback **Vito Tisdale** went down with knee injury. He will miss the entire 2022 season. He played in nine games with two starting nods in '21, totaling 21 tackles and 1.5 tackles for loss. Junior defensive back Taj Dodson will miss some of spring practice with a shoulder injury.
- Two key starters return in "Super Senior" **Tyrell Ajian** (48 career games, 23 career starts) and junior **Carrington Valentine** (started in 12 games in '21). Ajian had 46 tackles, four pass breakups and one interception as a safety in 2021, while Valentine ranked fourth on the team last season with 61 tackles and added five pass breakups, 1.5 tackles for loss and one quarterback hurry.
- Another key returnee is junior **Jalen Geiger** (13 games and two starts in '21) who made his first career start on Nov. 13, 2021 at Vanderbilt and made it memorable with a 31-yard interception return for a touchdown. He finished the season with 18 tackles, one tackle for loss, one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry. Junior **Joel Williams** saw action in seven games last season and had two tackles. He runs well and hits hard and more reps in the spring should benefit him greatly.
- Collins and Buffano have a group of young talent to mold and shape this spring in sophomores **Rickey Hyatt Jr.** (2 games in '21) and **Andru Phillips** (9 games with three tackles in '21) and redshirt freshmen **Maxwell Hairston** and **Jordan Lovett.**
- Three mid-year enrollees who were all standout defensive backs and their respective high schools will get a chance to show what they can do this spring. Freshman **Elijah Reed** is a raw

talent who opted to reclassify and take an extra year at Pleasure Ridge Park in Louisville. He also opted to change positions, moving from wide receiver to cornerback as a senior at PRP. The position switch paid off and Reed's upside is huge. Joining him in January was preferred walk-on **Jackson Schulz**, a four-year letter winner at powerhouse Trinity High School in Louisville, Kentucky, and Atlanta native **Andre Stewart**. Stewart totaled 25 tackles, nine pass breakups, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and an interception, helping North Cobb High School win the 2021 7A Region 3 Championship.

- Only two letterwinners return for Brad White's outside linebackers group this spring in junior **J.J. Weaver** and "Super Senior" **Jordan Wright** but the duo's experience and leadership should make a huge impact on and off the field for the defense. Weaver and Wright have played in a combined 66 games with 19 starting assignments between them.
- Wright and Weaver both had outstanding seasons in 2021 -- Wright with 30 tackles, four tackles for loss, six pass breakups and a sack, while Weaver had 34 tackles, 10.0 tackles for loss, a teamhigh 6.0 sacks, four quarterback hurries, two interceptions, a forced fumble and a pass breakup. Weaver was named one of the three award winners for the 2021 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year, returning to play after sitting out the 2020 season with an ACL injury. He was named third-Team All-SEC by Phil Steele and is an absolute playmaker.
- Wright will see limited action in the spring after undergoing shoulder surgery in January.
- Sophomore Jai Williams was added to the outside linebackers group this spring, moving from tight end. He's still developing but at 6-foot-5 he has a good frame and he played the position in high school. He's also a tough, hard-nosed player that was a wrestler and played on his high school's rugby team. Williams is the son of James Williams, also known as "Big Cat" who played 12 seasons on the offensive line for the Chicago Bears.
- Walk-ons **Jase Bruner** and **Connor Long** are both good, heady players who have the ability to help the Wildcats this season.

• The inside linebackers have a new coach in Mike Stoops. He replaced former Wildcat Jon Sumrall who left UK after three seasons to become the head coach at Troy. Stoops most recently

was at Florida Atlantic where he spent the 2021 season as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach. Prior to that he spent two seasons (2019 and 2020) at Alabama as an analyst on Nick Saban's staff, highlighted by the 2020 national championship. He also was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Oklahoma from 2012-18 and was the head coach at Arizona from 2004-11. He had a first term at Oklahoma from 1999-2003, including the 2000 national championship season.

- The inside linebackers are led by two returning "Super Seniors" and starters in Jacquez Jones and DeAndre Square.
- Jones, who transferred last year after three seasons at Ole Miss, started every game for the Wildcats in 2021 and led the team with 86 tackles. He made three huge plays in pass defense -- an interception vs. Missouri, a touchdown-saving pass breakup vs. Chattanooga and game-saving tipped pass to seal the Florida win. He also had a career-high 18 tackles at Mississippi State. All totaled, Jones is on track to reach the 300-tackle club as he has 268 in his career.
- Square (49 career games, 35 career starts) was third-leading tackler in 2021 with 80 tackles, including 9.5 tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks. He also had three quarterback hurries. Square hauled in the game-winning interception in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl vs. lowa.
- Junior **D'Eryk Jackson** has an impressive comeback story and looks to be getting even stronger this spring. He suffered a torn Achilles tendon in last year's spring practice and had surgery on April 13, expecting to miss the entire season. Instead, he returned to full practice activity on Oct. 28 and saw his first action of the season at Vanderbilt on Nov. 13. In four games played in '21, he totaled 18 tackles, a quarterback hurry and an interception.
- Sophomores Martez Thrower and Trevin Wallace are also two players to watch this spring. Wallace solidified himself as a breakout candidate last season after helping turn the Florida game when he caught a blocked field goal in midair and raced untouched 76 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. Making his first collegiate start at Mississippi State, he notched 12 tackles and was named SEC Freshman of the Week. For the season, he has played in 12 games, had 32 tackles and was named to the Freshman All-SEC team. Thrower saw action in eight games and had six tackles and a quarterback hurry.
- Junior Luke Fulton saw most of his action on



special teams last season but is a player with a lot of potential and upside. He has all the tools to take the next step.

• Four walk-ons **Braxton Eiserman, Cody Goatley, Austin Gough** and "Super Senior" **William Nalty** bolster the inside linebacker unit.

- Special teams are coached by running backs coach John Settle and safeties coach Frank Buffano for the second season.
- The Wildcats return all of their key specialists except their return men. They will need to replace punt returner Josh Ali and kickoff returner Zach Johnson. Looking to fill those voids are **Tayvion Robinson**, **Dekel Crowdus**, **Michael Drennen** and **JuTahn McClain**.
- "Super Senior" **Matt Ruffolo** decided to come back for his sixth and final season of eligibility as he is on track to graduate in May with his MBA. As UK's starting placekicker last season, he made 10-of-13 field goals, with two misses coming on blocked kicks caused by a breakdown in protection. For his career, Ruffolo has made 26-of-32 FG and 94-of-99 PAT. Making 81 percent of his field goals places him third on UK's career list. Ruffolo's 54 PATs in 2021 was a UK single-season record.
- Poore handles kickoffs for the Wildcats. He also has placekicking experience, as he made 8-of-14 FGs and 32-of-34 PATs in his career.
- Walk-on Graham Wald is working hard this spring to showcase his talents.

• Competing for the punting duties are senior **Colin Goodfellow** and Aussie transplant **Wilson Berry.** Berry started the first two games of last season before being sidelined with a back injury.

Goodfellow came in and didn't miss a beat. He emerged as one of the nation's best punters, averaging 45.9 yards per kick, which ranked the second-highest average for a season in school history. He also was on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's top punter.

Against Georgia, Goodfellow had a career-long 70-yard punt and an additional 63-yarder. It is the only time in school history a punter has had two punts of 63 yards or longer with one being at least 70 yards. He followed that performance by booming another 70-yard punt vs. Mississippi State, making him the first player in school history to have two punts of 70 or more yards in his career.

The Kentucky football program continues to stack an impressive set of milestones under the leadership of Mark Stoops.

On Jan. 1, when Kentucky took the field for the Vrbo Citrus Bowl, it made official a school-record six consecutive bowl games – all under Stoops – surpassing the mark of five straight bowls from 2006-10.

And, when the Wildcats rallied to defeat lowa -- UK's 10th fourth-quarter comeback victory during the last six seasons -- it also marked a school-record fourth-straight bowl win.

The victory over the Hawkeyes was UK's 16th in a row vs. non-conference opponents, the longest active streak in the nation.

Kentucky finished the season with a 10-3 record, only the fourth time in school history (twice in the last four years under Stoops) that the Wildcats have reached double-digit victories. UK began the season with a 6-0 start for the first time since 1950, when the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant patrolled the sidelines in Lexington.

The 2021 campaign featured a 5-3 tally in the Southeastern Conference. UK finished in sole possession of second place in the SEC Eastern Division, the first time the Wildcats were solely in second since the league split into divisions in 1992.

More milestones loom in the near future. When the Wildcats begin the 2022 season, it will be Stoops' 10th year at UK, longer than any coach in school history.

In addition, Stoops has 59 wins in the Blue and White, needing only two more triumphs to surpass the school standard of 60 set by Bryant.

As quickly as the achievements have come recently, Stoops' success has been far from easy.

Inheriting a program that was 2-10 in 2012, the year before he arrived, Stoops' rebuilding efforts took time. Two games into the 2016 season his record was 12-26, but the program took off from there and the coach has engineered a 47-27 (63.5%) mark since.

In addition to the numerous landmarks above, a partial accounting of Stoops' achievements features:



STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

In nine seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's 10 classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Kentucky's Signing Day class for 2022 is UK's highest-rated class in the available history of recruiting rankings. (Note: these rankings are based on UK's 20 signees, 19 high school and one junior college, and do not include four-year college transfers Javon Baker, Deuce Hogan, Derrion Henry-Young, Tashawn Manning and Tayvion Robinson.)

In addition to the team accomplishments, several of Stoops' players have won All-America accolades, along with honors such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Jason Witten Man of the Year, Pop Warner Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last six seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, taking over a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final USA Today coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game)

and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in guarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State. Mark and Mike have reunited in Lexington, as Mike has joined the UK staff as inside linebackers coach.

Prior to Arizona, Mark Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the

defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.

Vince Marrow, aka the "Big Dawg," enters his 10th season at Kentucky, currently handling the duties of associate head coach/tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator/NFL liasison.

Marrow's tight ends have been a big factor in UK producing six consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards with at least one 1,000-yard rusher in five of those (Stanley "Boom" Williams -2016; Benny Snell Jr., - 2017, 2018; Lynn Bowden - 2019; Chris Rodriguez Jr. - 2021). Marrow also has been instrumental in UK signing nine straight top-50 recruiting classes, including the highest-rated class in UK history in 2021.

Marrow had a professional playing career as a member of NFL rosters on five teams, including Buffalo, Carolina, New York Jets, Chicago and San Francisco. After his NFL days ended, Marrow played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 1998, earning all-league honors with 32 receptions for 345 yards. He also played for the Orlando Rage in the XFL in 2001.

He began his collegiate playing career at Youngstown State before transferring to Toledo. Marrow played two seasons at Toledo, earning second-team All-MAC honors in 1991 before being drafted by the Bills in 1992.







2021 HIGHLIGHTS



- Kentucky won the Vrbo Citrus Bowl for the second time in the past four seasons, defeating No. 15 Iowa, 20-17, on Jan. 1, 2022 to cap a 10-win season.
- It marked the second 10-win season in the past four campaigns after having only two in school history prior to that (11 in 1950; 10 in 1977).
- UK finished the season ranked No. 15 in the USA Today Coaches Poll and No. 18 in the Associated Press Poll.
- Coach Mark Stoops ended his ninth season in Lexington with a 59-53 overall reord. He ranks second in school history in victories behind Paul "Bear" Bryant (60).
- Following the season, Stoops inked a contract extension that will keep him in Lexington through June 2028 with amended financial terms.
- Stoops started his tenure 12-26 but has gone an impressive 47-27 (.635) since that time, moving over .500 for the first time in his term as head coach.
- Kentucky finished 5-3 in the SEC for second place in the SEC Eastern Division. It marks the first time since the league split into divisions in 1992 that UK ends the season in sole possession of second place of the East, UK also has finished in a tie for second in the division on two other occasions, 2016 and 2018.
- All three second-place East finishes have been in the last six seasons under Mark
- For the second time since 1977, UK posted a winning record in league play, 5-3 in 2021 and also in 2018.

- The Wildcats have totaled the third-most wins among SEC East schools from 2016-21 (47). Only Georgia (66) and Florida (48) have more.
- UK's win over No. 15 Iowa was the seventh victory over a ranked team in the past four seasons. The program had seven total wins vs. ranked teams in the previous 19 seasons dating to 1999.
- UK has multiple wins vs. ranked teams in three of the past four seasons. The Cats had one season (2007) with multiple wins over ranked foes in the previous 40 years.
- For just the second time in school history, UK has a 2,000-yard passer (Will Levis), 1,000-yard rusher (Chris Rodriguez Jr.) and 1,000-yard receiver (Wan'Dale Robinson) in a season - 2007 was the only other season (Andre' Woodson, Rafael Little, Steve Johnson).
- Kentucky opened the season 6-0. UK's previous 6-0 starts include 1950 (10-0), 1910 (7-0), 1903 (7-0) and 1898 (7-0).
- Kentucky started 4-0 in the SEC for the fourth time in school history (also 1949, 1950, 1977).
- Quarterback Will Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp after transferring from Penn State and his pass efficiency rating of 148.3 rating points was the highest for a UK starting quarterback since Andre' Woodson in the 2006 season (154.5) and third-highest ever for a single season.
- Levis ranked eighth in the SEC in passing yards per game (217.5), sixth in passing TDs (24) and seventh in the SEC in total offense (246.4 yards per game).









Mark Stoops is the first UK coach to lead the Wildcats to six consecutive bowl games

- RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. finished second in the SEC and 12th nationally with 106.1 rushing yards per game.
- Kentucky has 11 players in school history who have rushed for at least 1,900 career yards. Four of those 11 have come during Stoops' tenure: Benny Snell Jr. (3,873), Chris Rodriguez Jr. (2,740), Stanley "Boom" Williams (2,511) and A.J. Rose (1,971).
- WR Wan'Dale Robinson was second in the SEC and fourth nationally in receptions per game (8.0) and second in the conference, 12th nationally in receiving yards per game (102.6).
- Guided by defensive coordinator Brad White, UK was third in the FBS in fourth down defense (27.8%), 20th in run defense (121.5) and 26th in total defense (340.1).
- Senior defensive end Josh Paschal ranked second in the SEC and 16th nationally with 1.3 tackles for loss per game. He finished with 15.5 total TFL this season. His 37.0 tackles for loss in his career, ranks third in UK history.
- After entering the lineup in the third game
 of the season, senior Colin Goodfellow
 emerged as one of the nation's best
 punters, averaging 45.9 yards per kick, the
 second-highest average for a season in
 school history.
- The Wildcats signed their highest-rated recruiting class in school history in 2022.

CATS CONTINUE TO CLIMB SEC LADDER

- Kentucky finished 10-3 for the first time since 2018 and just the fourth time in school history.
- Kentucky went 5-3 in the SEC and finished in second place in the SEC Eastern Division.
- It marked the first time since the league split into divisions in 1992 that UK ended the season in sole possession of second place of the East. UK also finished in a tie for second in the division on two other occasions, 2016 and 2018.
- All three second-place East finishes have been in the last six seasons under Mark Stoops.
- This is the second time since 1977 that UK has posted a winning record in league play, 5-3 this season and also in 2018.

KENTUCKY IN BOWL GAMES

- The Wildcats own a 12-9 all-time record in bowl games, including a 4-2 record under head coach Mark Stoops.
- UK appeared in its school-record sixth straight bowl game.
- Kentucky has won four straight bowl games which is tied with Texas for the longest active streak in FBS. The Cats defeated Penn State, Virginia Tech, N.C. State and Iowa.
- This was UK's second appearance in the Citrus Bowl during the six-year bowl run.
 The Cats ended their 10-win 2018 season in the VRBO Citrus Bowl in Orlando on Jan.
 1, 2019, defeating Penn State, 27-24.

2021 REVIEW



- after spending time with the NFL's Los Angeles Rams.
- UK averaged 225.7 passing yards and 199.5 rushing yards per game.
- The impressive balance wasn't smoke and mirrors either, as the unit averaged 6.4 yards per play (5,528 in 862 plays) for the season. The number is the second-highest yards per play average for a single-season in school history behind the 6.45 in 1998 with Tim Couch at the helm of Hal Mumme's "Air Raid".
- UK's offense steadily improved throughout the season before exploding in the month of November, averaging 560.8 total yards per game in those four contests. The total was the highest of any Power Five team and second nationally only to Kent State (564.0).
- The offense had the highest 4+ yard rushing percentage of any team in nation, a hat tip to the offensive line (source: SportSource Analytics). The Wildcats ranked fourth in the SEC in rushing yards per attempt with a 5.23 average.
- The 32.3 points per game ranked fourth in school history for a single-season.
- 707 total yards vs. New Mexico State was the second-highest total in school history.
- QB Will Levis (2,827 passing yards),
 RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. (1,379 rushing
 yards) and WR Wan'Dale Robinson
 (1,334 receiving yards) became just
 the second trio in school history to go
 2000/1000/1000 in the same season.
 Andre' Woodson (3,709 passing), Rafael
 Little (1,013 rushing) and Stevie Johnson
 (1,041 receiving) was the other in 2007.
- The explosiveness of the passing game was breathtaking with 37 pass plays of at least 20 yards, eight of which were at least 40 yards. The combined totals from the 2019 and 2020 seasons were 36 pass plays of 20+ yards (four of them 40+ yards).
- Other individual records and accomplishments of note on offense include:
 - >> RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. set the school record with nine 100-yard rushing games. >> WR Wan'Dale Robinson set single-season school records with 104 receptions and 1,334 receiving yards.
 - >> Robinson is the only player in school history to have three games in his career with at least 166 receiving yards and joins Randall Cobb as the only two players in

school history with two games in their career of 12 or more catches. >> K Matt Ruffolo set the single-season school record for PATs with 54.

KINNARD NAMED CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICAN

- Kentucky senior offensive tackle Darian Kinnard was named a 2021 Consensus All-American, becoming the first offensive lineman to receive the honor since All-American Sam Ball in 1965. The Wildcats now have 12 consensus All-Americans in school history a total of 14 times.
- It also marks the third time in the last four years a Wildcat has been named a consensus All-American.
- Kinnard joins Bob Gain (1950), Babe Parilli (1950 and 1951), Lou Michaels (1956 and 1957), Sam Ball (1965), Art Still (1977), Tim Couch (1998), James Whalen (1999), Derek Abney (2002), Josh Allen (2018), Lynn Bowden (2019) and Max Duffy (2019) on the prestigious list.
- To be named to the Consensus team, players have to be listed on the first team for more than half the All-America teams used in the compilation. If no player meets this criterion at a position, a player can be selected if named first team on at least two of the All-America teams. Second and third teams are used to break ties. In the case of a true tie, all players are listed. Five organizations are used to compile the consensus team American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press, Football Writers Association of America, The Sporting News and Walter Camp Foundation.
- Kinnard earned first-team All-America honors from four of the five - FWAA, Walter Camp and the AP. He was a second-team All-American by The Sporting News.

- First UK quarterback with three 350-yard passing games in one season since Patrick Towles in 2014.
- First Wildcat to have at least 15 passing touchdowns and five rushing TDs in one season since Jared Lorenzen in 2003.
- His 66.0 completion percentage is the seventh-highest in a season at UK (min. 100 completions).
- Against LSU, named National Offensive Player of the Week by the Walter Camp Football Foundation after accounting for the first five touchdowns (three passing, two rushing) in the win over the Tigers.
- Against Tennessee, he accounted for 419
 yards total offense and five touchdowns. He
 completed 31 of 49 passes for a careerhigh 372 yards and three touchdowns and,
 despite being sacked three times, rushed 15
 times for a net 47 yards and two TDs.
- His 419 passing yards vs. New Mexico State marked the 12th-highest single-game total in school history. He is the first 400-yard passer since Andre' Woodson threw for 430 vs. Tennessee in 2007.
- Against Louisville, he had four rushing touchdowns, tying the school record and earning national honors from both College Football Performance and Manning Award. He became the ONLY quarterback in the nation to be named The Manning Award Quarterback of the Week twice. He also

- earned the 2021 Howard Schnellenberger MVP Award.
- Named the Connecticut Player of the Year by the Walter Camp Football Foundation.

IT'S A WAN'DERFUL LIFE

- The Cats scored big in the offseason when Nebraska transfer Wan'Dale Robinson, a Frankfort, Kentucky native, transferred back to the Commonwealth.
- His 104 catches set a new Kentucky single-season record. He surpassed James Whalen's 90 (1999).
- His 1,334 receiving yards set a new Kentucky single-season record. He surpassed Craig Yeast's 1,311 (1998).
- Became the sixth player in SEC history to catch at least 100 passes in a season, including Mississippi State's Makai Polk this season.
- Had six 100-yard games, second-most on the UK single-season list.
- Only player in school history to have three games in his career with at least 166 receiving yards and joins Randall Cobb as the only two players in school history with two games in their career of 12 or more catches.
- Named First-Team All-SEC by Pro Football Focus and Phil Steele and Second-Team All-SEC by both the coaches and Associated Press.
- Ranked fourth nationally and second in the SEC with 8.0 rpg.
- Ranked 27th nationally and second in the SEC in receiving yards per game (102.6), and sixth in the SEC in all-purpose yards per game (112.7). He had 13 plays of 30+ yards.

- Had two games with at least 12 receptions, joining Randall Cobb as the only two players in school history to have multiple games in their career with at least 12 receptions.
- Over the final five games of the season, he caught 46 passes for 689 yards and two touchdowns and averaged 137.8 receiving yards per game in that stretch.
- In the VRBO Citrus Bowl, he caught 10
 passes for 170 yards, setting new UK bowl
 game records for both.
- Against Tennessee, he set career highs with 13 receptions for 166 yards. The 13 catches ties for second-most in a game in UK history, most since Lynn Bowden Jr. at Missouri in 2018.
- He became the first UK player with at least nine catches in three straight games since Anthony White in 1998.
- Robinson showed he was worth all the hype in the opener vs. ULM, hauling in a pair of touchdown receptions as he roasted the coverage on his way to 125 yards on five catches.
- With an 111-yard performance in week three, he became the first Wildcat to have three-straight 100-yard receiving games since Derek Abney in 2001 and the first ever to have three-straight 100-yard receiving games to begin a season.
- Against New Mexico State he caught eight passes for a career-best 181 yards. The 181 yards is the fourth-highest singlegame total in school history and most since Craig Yeast's school-record 269 vs. Vanderbilt in 1998.

HOT C-ROD

- Junior RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. had 1,379
 rushing yards, averaged 6.1 yards per carry
 and boasted nine 100-yard rushing games
 in 2021. He returns for his senior season as
 one of the nation's top running backs and
 is on track to become UK's all-time leading
 rusher, needing 1,134 yards to pass Benny
 Snell Jr. (3,873).
- Has 2,740 career rushing yards, sixth place in school history and is the 10th player in school history to reach 2,000 career yards.
- Has 26 career rushing touchdowns, tied for second-most in school history with Moe Williams and Sonny Collins.
- His 29 total touchdowns rank fourth-most in school history.

- His 1,379 yards in 2021 ranked 12th nationally and fifth on UK's single-season rushing list.
- By surpassing 1,000 rushing yards in 2021, he became the 10th Wildcat to have a 1,000-yard season. It has only been accomplished 14 times in total in the history of UK Football.
- Ranked second in the SEC and is 12th nationally with 106.1 yards per game and seventh in the SEC in all-purpose yards (110.8).
- His nine 100-yard rushing games in 2021 set a new single-season school record.

- Has rushed for 100 yards or more in five consecutive games, the second-longest streak in school history.
- Named First-Team All-SEC by the Associated Press and Second-Team Coaches All-SEC.
- Has had only 13 of his 417 career carries go for negative yardage, a staggering testament to his ability to hit the hole and grind out yards.
- Set new career highs with 27 carries for 207 yards vs. Missouri, breaking the UK record for most rushing yards in an SEC opener. He earned Co-SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors.

SIMPLY STOOPS-ENDOUS

UK head coach Mark Stoops has proven to be an excellent hire, turning around a struggling program and making him the first UK coach to lead the program to a sixth consecutive bowl appearance. He also has erased a number of the long-standing hurdles and streaks in the program's history. The accomplishments include, but aren't limited to:

- First New Year's Day bowl win since 1951 (2018)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First winning SEC record since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First ranking in the final AP Poll since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 season (2018)
- First win at Florida since 1979 (2018)
- Ended 31-game losing streak to Florida (2018) and followed up by ending a 35-year home drought against the Gators on Oct. 2, 2021.
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2020)
- Stoops is the first UK coach to defeat Florida and Tennessee both home and away since Fran Curci (1976, 1977).
- Eight-game winning streak (2020-21), fifth-longest in school history and longest in 44 years, since a 10-game streak in the 1977
- Stoops currently holds school records for most games coached (112), most home wins (41), total SEC wins (29).
- Stoops was named one of 16 head coaches named to the Dodd Trophy Midseason Watch List by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation and Peach Bowl. Inc. He also was on the American Heart Association's 2021 Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award watch list.
- After two games of the 2016 season, his record was 12-26 but he has gone 47-27

- (.635) since. Overall, Stoops is now 59-53 at Kentucky and is nearing Paul "Bear" Bryant's school-record 60 victories.
- Off the field, Stoops is a staunch supporter of the Kentucky Children's Hospital, helping raise more than \$500,000 annually for the
- Kentucky's football team has fared well academically under Stoops, as each year UK's football score in the NCAA Academic Progress Rate has been well above the benchmark of 930.
- Stoops is the second-longest tenured coach in the SEC behind Alabama's Nick Saban. He is the 11th-longest tenured coach in the nation (see chart above).

"BIG BLUE WALL" NAMED FINALISTS FOR THE JOE MOORE AWARD: KINNARD WINS JACOBS BLOCKING TROPHY

The Kentucky offensive line was one of four units named as a finalist for the





- Joe Moore Award, recognizing the Most Outstanding Offensive Line Unit in college football.
- It's the fourth consecutive season that the Kentucky offensive line, known as the "Big Blue Wall," has been recognized by the award for its work in the trenches.
- Behind Kentucky's talented "Big Blue Wall," running back Chris Rodriguez
 Jr. ranked second in the Southeastern
 Conference and 12th nationally at 106.1 rushing yards per game. He totaled 1,379 yards and set a school record with nine 100-yard rushing games in 2021.
- UK linemen were chosen SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week five times this season.
- Kinnard earned the SEC's prestigious
 Jacobs Blocking Trophy, just the second
 time a UK player has won the top blocking
 award since its inception in 1935 (also
 Warren Bryant in 1976.). Kinnard also
 was named one of six semifinalists for the
 Outland Trophy, given to the nation's top
 interior lineman.

HORSEY NAMED TO ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Offensive guard Kenneth Horsey was one of 22 student-athletes, including one of just 11 football players from the FBS, to be named to the 2021 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team®. The team honors football players for their dedication to community service and the positive impact they have made on the lives of others.
- Horsey, who also was the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year, has an impressive comeback story that has inspired his community service work for heart health.
- In the spring of 2018, before he was to arrive at Kentucky for his freshman season, he was complaining of a pain in his side.
 His parents rushed him to the emergency room where doctors ultimately found a growth on one of his heart valves. He went through open-heart surgery on April 8, 2018 and was even told by a few doctors that his football career was over. However, Horsey would not be deterred. He came to Kentucky and redshirted the 2018 season with a goal of earning a starting spot on Kentucky's offensive line, affectionately

- known as the "Big Blue Wall." In 2019, he saw action in four games and continued to train and prepare his body for the rigors of the Southeastern Conference. Since his surgery in 2018, he has lost 50 pounds and because of his hard work and dedication, has earned the starting left guard spot on the "Big Blue Wall." He started in eight games played in 2020, helping the Wildcats rank fifth in the Southeastern Conference in rushing offense (187.4) and is the current starter at left guard on the 2021 squad.
- Because of his heart condition and how supported he felt through his surgery and recovery, he began volunteering with the Lexington chapter of the American Heart Association in 2020. In September, Horsey was even awarded the Finn Collier Service Award by the AHA in recognition of his work to support its lifesaving mission – to be a relentless force for a world of longer, healthier lives.
- Horsey coordinated and planned a handsonly CPR training for the UK Football team and staff in the spring of 2021 and helped plan a Hands-Only CPR media availability on June 14 that promoted Hands-Only CPR awareness to the media for CPR Awareness Month.
- Kentucky has the second-most honorees on the national Good Works Team with 17. Horsey is the fifth player under head coach Mark Stoops to be named to the prestigious team, including the third straight - Landon Young, 2019; Luke Fortner, 2020. He's also the third straight offensive lineman named to the team.

WEAVER NAMED MAYO CLINIC COME-BACK PLAYER OF THE YEAR

- Sophomore outside linebacker J.J. Weaver was named one of the three winners of the 2021 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award. Weaver joined Michigan's Aidan Hutchinson and Florida State's McKenzie Milton as the winners.
- It marksed the second straight season
 Kentucky had the Mayo Clinic Comeback
 Player of the Year as offensive guard
 Kenneth Horsey received the honor in
 2020.
- Weaver was having a breakout freshman campaign with 33.5 tackles and 6.5 tackles for a loss through nine games of the 2020 season when he suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee at

- Florida last November. Despite missing the final two games, the redshirt freshman still earned All-SEC Freshman Team honors.
- That injury was just one part of a very difficult year for Weaver, who also lost his father to homicide and then in the fall of 2021 lost his beloved high school coach, Rob Reader, to liver cancer. As a result, his challenging off-season included both the rehabilitation of his knee and undergoing counseling to deal with his grief. Both were successful as he returned to the field with a strong knee and a clear mind for the 2021 season.

PASCHAL NAMED JASON WITTEN MAN OF THE YEAR

- Kentucky senior defensive lineman Josh
 Paschal was named the Jason Witten
 Collegiate Man of the Year Award. He was
 selected among three finalists, including
 Grant Morgan of Arkansas and Patrick
 Fields of Oklahoma, who all demonstrated
 a record of leadership by exhibiting
 exceptional courage, integrity and
 sportsmanship both on and off the field.
- Paschal had a remarkable and inspiring career at Kentucky. The five-year letter winner played in 52 career games with 37 starts and totaled 139 career tackles, 37 tackles for loss, 13.5 sacks, 12 quarterback hurries, three forced fumbles and three blocked kicks. His 37 tackles for loss in his career, ranks tied for third in UK history.
- He became the only three-time full-season team captain in Kentucky football history and was revered by his teammates for his leadership. Since learning he had cancer in the summer of 2018, Paschal has made a significant impact on those of us in the Kentucky Football program and thousands of others.

Will Levis passed for 367 yards and four touchdowns as Kentucky opened its 2021 season with a 45-10 win over Louisiana-Monroe at Kroger Field.

Two Wildcats had more than 100 yards receiving in the game. Senior Josh Ali had five receptions for 136 yards and a touchdown while junior Wan'Dale Robinson had five catches for 125 yards and two scores. Isaiah Epps nearly made it a trio, catching three passes for 83 yards.

On the ground, Chris Rodriguez Jr. went over 100 yards for the seventh time in his career. The junior rushed

19 times for 125 yards and a touchdown.

Kentucky (1-0) had 564 yards of total offense in the first game under new offensive coordinator Liam Coen. UK finished with 419 yards passing and 145 yards on the ground.

Levis became the first UK passer to throw for over 300 yards since Stephen Johnson had 338 against Louisville in 2016.

Meanwhile, the Kentucky defense more than did its job against ULM. The Cats held the Warhawks to 87 total yards (70 passing, 17 rushing) in the game. ULM had 43 yards on its first drive of the game, then 44 yards the rest of the game.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 27 times for 207 yards and three touchdowns as Kentucky won its Southeastern Conference opener over Missouri 35-28 at Kroger Field.

For Rodriguez, both the number of carries and the yards rushing were career highs. The junior from McDonough, Georgia, also caught a pass for a touchdown. His four touchdowns tied a school record.

Will Levis connected on 10 of 18 passing for 179 yards with a touchdown and an interception in the game. Levis' main target was Wan'Dale Robinson, who had a big game

in his own right. The Frankfort native led the Cats with 101 yards receiving on five catches. He also had three carries for 73 yards in the game.

Kentucky (2-0, 1-0 SEC) turned to the ground game in this one, rushing for 341 yards while passing for 179. The Cats ended the game with 520 yards of total offense, compared to just 398 for Missouri.

On defense, safety Tyrell Ajian led the Cats with eight tackles, while J.J. Weaver had another big game with a sack and two tackles for loss.

KENTUCKY 28, CHATTANOOGA 23

Will Levis connected on 23 of 35 passing for 246 yards and two touchdowns as Kentucky overcame a sluggish effort to beat Chattanooga 28-23.

With the Cats clinging to a 21-16 lead in the fourth quarter, Tyrell Ajian made the play that saved the game. Ajian intercepted a Chattanooga pass at the UK five and returned it 95 yards for what turned out to be the game-cliniching touchdown.

Wan'Dale Robinson was Levis' favorite target on Saturday, catching eight passes for 111 yards. He became

the first UK player since Derek Abney in 2001 to have three straight 100-yard receiving games.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with 46 rushing yards, although the Kentucky run game was not as effective as it was last week against Missouri. The Cats had 102 yards rushing on 27 carries in the game.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and methodically marched down the field, using a combination of running and passing. The nine-play drive consisted of five plays and four rushes and ended with an 11-yard touchdown rush by Josh Ali, the first rushing touchdown of his career. Matt Ruffolo added the extra point and the Cats grabbed a 7-0 lead with 10:43 to play in the first quarter.

But the rest of the game was not that easy. The game was tight throughout until Ajian's interception sealed the deal. Still, Chattanooga rallied to cut the UK lead to 28-23, but their onside kick attempt failed and Kentucky hung on to win.

Kentucky returned to action the following week, hitting the road for the first time this season. The Cats visited Williams-Brice Stadium to face South Carolina.

Levis connected on 15 of 22 through the air for 102 yards in the game. Wan'Dale Robinson was his favorite

With Florida holding a 10-7 advantage in the third quarter, Paschal used all of his 6-3 frame to successfully block the 48-yard Jace Christmann attempt. Trevin Wallace then snatched the ball at the Kentucky 24 and rapidly sped down the sideline 76 yards until reaching the end zone, giving UK a lead that it would never surrender.

It was the UK defense and special teams that carried

the team all evening, as Kentucky beat Florida in Lexington for the first time since 1986 and for just the second time in the last 35 meetings.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. carried the offensive load for the Cats with 99 yards and a touchdown in the game. Quarterback Will Levis was six of 15 through the air for 74

DeAndre Square led the defensive attack with 13 tackles, while Jacquez Jones had nine tackles, one tackle for loss and a pass breakup on Florida's final offensive play of the game. Paschal has seven tackles, including two and a half for loss, in addition to the blocked kick, the third of his UK career.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed for 147 yards and quarterback Will Levis accounted for five touchdowns as No. 16/14 Kentucky topped LSU 42-21 at Kroger Field.

With the win, Kentucky moved to 6-0 on the season and 4-0 in the SEC. It's the first time Kentucky has been 6-0 since 1950 and just the fifth time in school history.

Kavosey Smoke also had a big night on the ground for the Cats, amassing 104 yards rushing. UK quarterback Will Levis had 75 yards and two touchdowns on the ground as Kentucky rushed for 330 yards as a team.

Levis hit on 14 of 17 passing for 145 yards and three touchdowns. Wan'Dale Robinson was the favorite target for Levis on this evening, catching eight passes for 60 vards and a score.

LSU (3-3, 1-3) took the opening possession and made a pair of first downs before the UK defense made yet another big play. DeAndre Square sacked LSU quarterback Max Johnson and forced a fumble that was recovered by Josaih Hayes at the

Kentucky would convert the turnover into points. The Cats drove into the LSU red zone and, on fourth-and-goal from the three, Levis connected with Rodriguez on a touchdown pass in the right side of the end zone. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and UK grabbed a 7-0 lead with 6:17 to play in the first quarter.

From there, the Cats would never look back, building the lead as large as 35-7 before settling for the 21-point victory.

Will Levis passed for 198 yards and two scores but it was not enough as No. 11 Kentucky fell at top-ranked Georgia, 30-13.

Levis connected on 32 of his 42 passes, including one-yard touchdown strikes to Justin Rigg and Wan'Dale Robinson in the game. The Cats struggled to run the ball, amassing just 51 yards on the ground against the nation's number one defense.

Kentucky's defense was led by Josh Paschal, who had six tackles, including one for a loss, and Georgia native

Yusuf Corker, who had five tackles, one for a loss and a pass breakup.

The teams were scoreless after one period of play. But early in the second quarter, Georgia took a 7-0 lead. After a Kentucky punt, Georgia would score again, and the Bulldogs led 14-0 in the second quarter.

Kentucky had its best drive of the first half on its next possession. The Cats used a nice mix of running and passing plays, including a hook-and-ladder, to get into the Georgia red zone. Levis connected with Chris Rodriguez Jr. on a swing pass to get the Cats to the UGA one. From there, Levis connected with tight end Justin Rigg for a one-yard touchdown pass. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and Georgia led 14-7 after a 15-play, 75-yard drive.

But the Cats could get no closer.

Kentucky (6-2, 4-2 SEC) had just 66 yards rushing on Saturday, well below the Cats' season average. Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with eight carries for 34 yards.

Wan'Dale Robinson caught nine passes for 79 yards to

lead the Cats in that department. No other Wildcat had more than two catches.

Quarterback Will Levis connected on 31 of 49 through the air for 372 yards and three touchdowns with an interception. Levis also rushed 15 times for 47 yards and two touchdowns.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led the Cats' ground attack with 109 yards on 22 carries. Wide receiver Wan'Dale Robinson caught 13 passes for 166 yards and a score.

Kentucky (8-3) amassed 707 yards of total offense in the game, the second-highest total in school history. Kentucky's only greater output came when the Cats piled up 801 yards against Louisville on Sept. 5, 1998.

Levis connected on 21 of 31 through the air on his way to the most passing yards by a UK quarterback in 14 years (Andre Woodson had 430 against Tennessee in 2007).

Wan'Dale Robinson was on the receiving end of eight of those passes, covering 181 yards. Senior Josh Ali caught seven passes for a career high 164 yards and two touchdowns.

On the ground, Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 16 times for 119 yards and a score, while freshman La'Vell Wright had 75 yards on just six carries.

After falling behind 7-0, Kentucky scored 21 points in a row to take command of the game. The Cats would shut out the Aggies in the second half on their way to the big win.

Kentucky quarterback Will Levis rushed 14 times for 113 yards and four touchdowns as Kentucky thumped archrival Louisville 52-21 at Cardinal Stadium.

Levis was also 14 of 18 through the air for 149 yards in the game.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 16 times for 121 yards and a score, leading a rushing attack that racked up 362 yards on 49 carries in the game. Altogether, Kentucky had 511 yards of offense in the game.

Wan'Dale Robinson caught nine passes for 97 yards,

setting the UK single-season mark for receptions in a season along the way.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and went immediately into attack mode. Levis connected with Robinson for 29 yards on the first play to get into Louisville territory. The Cats would make another first down before facing a third and three from the U of L 29. From there, Levis took off on a designed quarterback run and went virtually untouched into the end zone for the touchdown. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT at the Cats led 7-0 with 12:22 left in the first quarter.

Louisville would tie the game at 7-7 but the Cats would answer with another scoring drive before the end of the quarter. The Cats would march 75 yards in 12 plays, using seven rushes and five passes. At the end of the drive, it was Levis rushing for the score again, this time from seven yards out, giving UK the lead again. Ruffolo added the PAT to make it 14-7 with 1:18 left in the first guarter. That would be the score after 15 minutes of play.

From there, Kentucky would stretch the lead as large as 38 points (45-7 and 52-14) before settling for a 31-point victory.

With the win, the Cats finished the regular season at 9-3.

VRBO CITRUS BOWL JAN. 1, 2022 • ORLANDO, FLA. CAMPING WORLD STADIUM (50,769)



After falling behind in the fourth quarter, No. 22 Kentucky scored with less than two minutes to play then held on to beat No. 15 Iowa 20-17 in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl.

Kentucky went into its high-paced offense with just 3:31 to play in the game. The Cats drove down the field behind the Will Levis-to-Wan'Dale Robinson connection. Perhaps the biggest play came when those two connected on a 52-yard pass play down the left sideline that got UK to the one yard line. After a penalty, UK handed the ball to Chris Rodriguez Jr., who took it in from six yards out for the touchdown. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and UK led 20-17

with 1:48 to play.

lowa would go into its two-minute offense on the ensuing possession and the Hawkeyes were able to get near midfield pretty quickly. But on second and five from the UK 40, Yusuf Corker hit Petras, whose throw went high and was intercepted by DeAndre Square, sealing the victory with just 48 seconds to play.

Levis connected on 17 of 28 through the air for 233 yards and a touchdown, with one interception. His primary target was Robinson, who caught 10 passes for 170 yards, including that crucial 52-yard reception in the fourth quarter that set up the go-ahead score.

Rodriguez Jr. rushed 20 times for 107 yards and a score. C-Rod also caught a touchdown pass in the game.

With the win, Kentucky has now won four consecutive bowl games for the first time in school history.

On defense, Jordan Wright led UK with 10 tackles while Corker had eight.

lowa got the first possession of the game and made one first down before being forced to punt.

Kentucky got the ball on its own 20 and the Cats proceeded to put together a very impressive scoring drive. The Cats covered 80 yards in 13 plays, which included seven rushes and six passes. Levis was six-for-six on the drive for 41 yards, while Rodriguez carried four times for 28 yards. At the end of the drive, those two connected on a five-yard touchdown pass to get UK on the board. Ruffolo added the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 5:32 left in the first quarter.

On its second possession, lowa got another first down before being forced to punt for a second time. However, Kentucky could do nothing with the ensuing possession and was forced to punt for the first time.

Kentucky would lead 7-0 after one period of play.

lowa would get on the board on its next drive. The Hawkeyes drove into the UK red zone before the UK defense held, forcing the Hawkeyes into a 28-yard field goal by Caleb Shudak, which was good, cutting the UK lead to 7-3 with 11:03 left in the half.

The Cats would answer on their next drive. Kentucky would overcome a couple of sacks with a beautiful third-and-26 conversion where Levis connected with Robinson for a 34-yard gain. UK would get inside the lowa five yard line, but was forced to settle for a 21-yard Ruffolo field goal, which was good, extending the Kentucky lead to 10-3 with 2:48 left in the half.

On lowa's next possession, lowa quarterback Spencer Petras tried a pass to the left, but UK's Wright tipped it and linebacker D'Eryk Jackson intercepted the pass, returning it to the lowa 31.

Kentucky got the ball with 2:09 left in the half. UK got a big rush from Ju'Tahn McClain, got a 10-yard penalty on the Hawkeyes, then got a five-yard rush from Rodriguez to get to the Iowa six. But the Hawkeyes defense got a stop and UK settled for a 27-yard field goal from Ruffolo to take a 13-3 advantage with 38 seconds remaining in the half. That would be the score at the break.

In the second half, Kentucky took possession first. After getting two first downs, the Cats were forced to punt.

After taking over, Iowa assembled one of its better drives of the game. The Hawkeyes went 69 plays in seven yards, getting to the UK five. But on fourth-and-one, the UK defense came up with a stop and took over on downs.

Kentucky could do nothing with its next possession and the Cats punted with lowa taking over at midfield. The Hawkeyes would take advantage of the good field position. Iowa would cover 50 yards in six plays, ending with a 20-yard touchdown rush from Arlen Bruce. Shudak added the PAT and the UK lead was cut to 13-10 with 3:21 left in the third quarter. That would be the score after three quarters.

Early in the fourth quarter, Kentucky would punt again. Iowa would waste little time getting into UK territory. The Hawkeyes would take their first lead of the game when Petras connected with tight end Sam LaPorta on a screen pass that LaPorta took down the left sideline for a 36-yard touchdown. Shudak added another extra point and Iowa led 17-13 with 10:54 to play.

Kentucky would take the next possession and get into lowa territory. But on fourth and one from the lowa 35, McClain was stopped and lowa gained possession with 7:13 to play.

The UK defense stood tall on the next Iowa possession. On third-and-one from the Iowa 44, freshman Tre'vonn Rybka stopped Iowa running back Leshon Williams for a one-yard loss, forcing the Hawkeyes into a punt. That would set up the winning drive.

With the win, Kentucky earned 10 wins for the second time in four years and just the fourth time in school history.
