THE STORYLINE

- Florida hosts Kentucky in Gainesville for the 35th time in the 73rd all-time meeting between the two programs.
- The Gators are 53-19 against the Wildcats including a 29-5 mark at home.
- UF has won 33 of the last 35 meetings in the series including wins in 20 of the last 21 home matchups in The Swamp.
- The Gators are 7-2 against Kentucky since HC Mark Stoops took over in 2013, with the only losses coming in 2018 (home) and 2021 (away). Those are UF's only losses in the head-to-head series dating back through 1987.
 - » Florida's 2021 loss in Lexington snapped a 35-game road winning streak (since 1986) against the Wildcats.
- » The Gators committed 15 penalties for a total of 115 yards in last year's 20-13 defeat despite out-gaining UK, 382-224.
- Since 2013, UF has outscored UK, 239-158 (+81 pts / 9.0 PPG), and out-gained UK, 3,736 to 2,659 (+1,077 yds / 119.7 YPG).
- This is the first meeting between UF's **Billy Napier** and UK's Mark Stoops as head coaches.
 - » The two previously met in 2013 and 2016, when Napier was the WRs Coach at Alabama. A No.1-ranked Alabama team won both matchups over Stoops' Wildcats, 48-7 (2013) and 34-6 (2016).
- This is UF's first time playing a ranked UK team since Oct. 20, 2007, when No. 14 UF topped No. 8 UK, 45-37, in Lexington.
- UF is playing a ranked UK team for the fourth time overall, owning a 2-1 record in such games (1977, 1998, 2007).
- Florida is coming off a 29-26 upset of No. 7 Utah, which tied for UF's highest-ranked victory in a season opener in program history (Florida 59, No. 7 Houston 34 - Sept. 20, 1969).
- » Week 1's attendance of 90,799 was the 10th-largest in program history and UF's largest crowd for a home opener.
- » The Gators improved to 3-0 against ranked opponents in The Swamp in season openers.
- UF HC **Billy Napier** is the first UF HC to defeat a ranked opponent in his first game at the helm.
 - » Napier is now looking to improve to 2-0 against ranked opponents in his first-two games.
 - » 1982 is the only season that the Gators have beaten two ranked opponents in the first two games of the season.
- » UF defeated No. 15 Miami, 17-14, before taking down No. 10 USC, 17-9, in Week 2, Both games were played in The Swamp with Florida being the lower-ranked team.
- New UF head coaches are 10-6 in their SEC openers including a 3-0 mark vs. ranked opponents in such games.
- Florida rushed for 283 yards as a team in Week 1, which ranks 14th in the FBS and eighth in the P5 in rushing YPG.
- Florida is one of 14 Power Five programs and five SEC schools averaging 450-plus YPG and 250-plus rushing YPG.
- Florida boasts a 351-111-13 (.753) all-time record at The Swamp, holding the second-highest home winning percentage in the nation since 1990 with a 170-32 (.842) record.
 - » The Gators have outscored opponents, 7,632 to 3,230 in 202 games since 1990 inside The Swamp, putting the average outcome at 37.8 to 16.0 (21.8 points).
- Florida's 2022 opponents went a combined 87-68 (.561) last year, which is .99 points higher than one year ago, when Florida's 2021 schedule posted a .462 winning percentage the year prior.
- » This is despite having two 2022 opponents that went 2-10 in 2021 in USF and Vanderbilt.
- » UF has four opponents coming off 10-win seasons (Utah, Kentucky, EWU, Georgia) while nine went bowling.
- Florida has scored in 424-consecutive games dating back to 1988 -- an NCAA record and 56 games longer than any other college football team in the history of the sport.

ANTHONY RICHARDSON'S BIG WEEK 1

- QB **Anthony Richardson** set a new career high with three rushing touchdowns in a single game, becoming the first UF QB to rush for three-plus TDs in a contest since Emory Jones accomplished the feat vs. Vanderbilt on Nov. 9, 2019.
 - » Richardson is the first FBS QB to rush for three touchdowns in a game this season.
 - » Richardson is one of three UF QBs since 1996 to rush for three touchdowns and pass for 150-plus vards in the same game, joining Jesse Palmer and Tim Tebow (twice).
 - » Richardson is one of five UF QBs to rush for three touchdowns in a game since 1996 (Jeff Driskel, Emory Jones, Jesse Palmer, Tim Tebow - twice)
 - » Richardson now owns six-career rushing TDs.
- Richardson set a new career high in single-game passing yards with 168, topping his previous best of 167 at LSU on Oct. 16. 2021.
- Through one game, Richardson has completed 70.8% of his passes (17-for-24) for 168 yards while adding 11 carries for 106 yards and three touchdowns.
- Richardson scored his first touchdown of the season in the form of a two-yard TD rush on Florida's last drive of the first quarter.
- Richardson later erupted for a 45-yard touchdown rush.
- Of Richardson's 13-career touchdowns (7 passing, 6 rushing), he has:
 - » Three 45-plus yard touchdown rushes and two 70-plus yard touchdown rushes
 - » Seven scores of 25-plus yards
 - » Five scores of 40-plus yards and three scores of 70-plus yards
- That means over half of Richardson's career touchdowns have been scored from outside the red zone.
- Richardson rushed for 100-plus yards for the third time in his career and for the second-straight season opener.

NEW FACES IN THE RB ROOM EXCEL EARLY

- Freshman RB **Trevor Etienne** rushed for 64 yards on five carries (12.8 YPC) while catching both of his two targets for nine yards in his collegiate debut.
- Etienne's 12.8 YPC ranks eighth in the FBS, fifth in the Power Five and second among P5 running backs.
- Etienne saw three-straight touches to open Florida's second drive of the game at 11:16.
- Etienne's first-career carry was a 19-yard rush for a first down, followed by a carry of three yards and subsequently his first-career reception – a two-yard catch on 2nd and 7.
- Transfer RB Montrell Johnson Jr. scored his first touchdown as a Gator in the form of a go-ahead, 14-yard touchdown rush in the fourth quarter.
- Johnson Jr. totaled 75 yards and one TD on 12 carries (6.2 YPC) while catching his lone target for 14 yards.
- Etienne and Johnson Jr. accounted for 63.0% of UF's RB carries and for 43.6% of carries overall.
- Etienne and Johnson Jr. combined for 139 yards on 17 carries, equating to 49.1% of UF's rushing yardage.

PEARSALL & TORRENCE PROVIDE IMMEDIATE BOOST

- Transfer WR **Ricky Pearsall** started and caught four (of five targets) passes for 67 yards in his Gators debut, leading all UF receivers in yardage.
 - » Pearsall's second-career reception came in the form of a 23-yard catch to the UT35-yard line to convert on 3rd and 15 on UF's third drive of the game
 - » Pearsall now owns seven catches for 106 yards vs. Utah.
- Transfer OL O'Cyrus Torrence started at RG in his first game in Orange & Blue.
 - » Torrence did not allow a sack or QB hurry vs. Utah. He has never allowed a sack in his college career.

- In 2021, Florida averaged over 425 YPG for the third time in the last-four seasons.
- In 2020, Florida logged the 10th season in school history in which it averaged 300-plus passing yards per game (2019, 2001, 2000, 1998, 1996, 1995, 1994, 1993, 1991).

RICHARDSON'S TIME CAPSULE

- Quarterback Anthony Richardson enters 2022 as a projected first-round pick (13th) by ESPN's Mel Kiper, having completed 59.4% of his passes for 529 yards and six touchdowns (five interceptions) last season.
- Richardson also rushed 51 times for 401 yards and three touchdowns, averaging 7.9 YPC and 50.1 YPG.
 - » Richardson's 7.9 YPC ranked 4th in the FBS among QBs with 50-plus carries last season.
- Richardson also ranked t-9th among FBS quarterbacks with 57.3 rushing yards per game in 2021.
- With 115 yards rushing and 152 yards passing (3-for-3) vs. USF in Week 2, Richardson became the first FBS player in the last 25 seasons to rush for 100+ yards, pass for 150+ yards and complete every pass he threw in a game.
- Richardson's 80-yard touchdown rush in the fourth quarter vs. USF in Week 2 tied for the ninth-longest touchdown rush in Florida football history. It was also the longest rush by a UF quarterback in the last 25 years.
 - » Richardson also had a 73-yard TD run in Week 1 and a 75-yard TD pass in the first guarter in Week 2.
- Richardson became the first FBS player to record an 80-plus yard rush and 75-plus yard pass in the same game since Taylor Martinez (Nebraska) in 2010 and is one of three FBS players to accomplish the feat dating back to 1996.
- In fact, Richardson became one of three FBS players (Max Duggan, TCU; Haaziq Daniels, Air Force) with an 80-plus yard touchdown rush and 75-plus yard touchdown pass in the same season over the last two years.
- Richardson was the first Gator with an 80-plus yard touchdown rush and 75-plus yard touchdown pass in the same season in the last 25 years.
- Richardson's 80-yard TD rush tied for the third-longest rush and third-longest touchdown rush by an FBS quarterback in 2021 (longest in the Power 5) and also tied for the 24th-longest run overall in 2021.
- In Week 7 at LSU, Richardson threw three touchdown passes for the first time in his career and set career highs with four total touchdowns (one rushing) and 167 yards passing.

GATORS' GROUND DOMINANCE SPILLS OVER TO 2022

- Florida averaged 5.5 yards per rush attempt in 2021, which was the fourth-highest mark in program history and ranked fourth in the FBS. Meanwhile, UF averaged 208.7 rushing yards per game, which was the 11th-highest mark in program history.
- The Gators rushed for 283 yards on 39 carries in Week 1, ranking 14th in the FBS with 283.0 rush YPG.
- Florida's 7.3 YPC ranks 10th in the FBS and T-sixth in the Power Five.
- In Week 1, UF posted its seventh game of 200-plus rushing yards in the last 14 contests.
- Florida has eclipsed 200 rushing yards in two-straight season openers and four of the last five after rushing for 400 yards against FAU in 2021.
- This marked Florida's 20th 200-plus vard rushing game in its last 52 games.

OFFENSIVE GRAB BAG

- Florida has out-gained its opponents in 12 of 14 games dating back to last season (South Carolina, UCF).
- In Week 1 vs. Utah, Florida amassed 400-plus total yards for the 18th time in its last 24 games including 31 of the last 43. This was Florida's fifth-straight season opener with 400-plus yards.
- Florida wrapped up the 2021 season with 11 100-plus yard rushing games, six 200-plus yard rushing games, four 290-plus yard passing games, 12 350-plus total yardage games, seven 400-plus total yardage games, four 500-plus total yardage games and two 600-plus yardage games.
- Over the last-four seasons, the Gators rank eighth in the Power Five with 456.3 scrimmage yards per game and 10th in the Power Five with 34.5 points per game.
 - » Those totals rank third and fourth in the SEC, respectively.
- Since 2018, UF ranks fifth in the P5 in passing efficiency (156.3) and 10th in TD-INT ratio (3.05).
- The Gators have had 500-plus yards in 12 of their last 27 games.
- UF has 18 games of 500-plus total yards in its last 52 games.
- Florida rushed for 200-plus vards 19 times in its last 52 games including seven times since 2021.
- The Gators also rushed for 100-plus yards in 41 of the team's last 52 games.
- Florida scored 40 points in four games in 2021 and 19 times total since 2018, which is seven more 40-point games than the Gators accumulated from the 2010-17 seasons combined (101 games).
- The Gators scored 30-plus points 32 times in 52 games since 2018, including scoring 30-plus in 19 of the team's last 28 games.



COLLEGIATE / GATORS DEBUTS APPLENTY ON OFFENSE

- RB Thai Chiaokhiao-Bowman. TE Noah Keeter and Etienne made their collegiate debuts.
- Johnson Jr., Pearsall, Torrence and OL Kamrvn Waites made their Gators debuts.
- RB Nay'Quan Wright and TE Dante Zanders made their first-career starts.

2021 OFFENSIVE SNAPSHOT

- The Gators posted two of the top-six single-game performances in terms of total yardage in program history in 2021, erupting for 717 yards vs. Samford on Nov. 13 (second all-time) and 666 yards at USF on Sept. 11 (sixth all-time).
- In the season opener vs. FAU, Florida rushed for a season-high 400 yards, which ranks third all-time in school history and set a program record for season openers.
- In Week 11 vs. Samford, Florida scored its most points (70) since Nov. 22, 2008 vs. Citadel (70), while the combined total of 122 points in the game was the most in the history of The Swamp and second-most all-time in a UF football game (Florida 144, Florida Southerm 0 Oct. 6, 1913).
- Florida was one of seven teams in the FBS and one of four Power Five schools to average over 460 YPG and 200 rushing YPG.
- UF ranked 15th in the FBS with 462.8 scrimmage YPG and 23rd in the FBS with 208.7 rush YPG.
 - » The Gators ranked fourth in the SEC in total scrimmage YPG and rushing YPG.
- Florida's 208.7 rushing YPG represented an increase of 77.4 rushing YPG from 2020's mark of 131.3 YPG.
- UF ranked ninth in the Power Five in scrimmage YPG and 13th in the Power Five in rushing YPG.
- The Florida offensive line surrendered just 14 sacks all year, which tied for the fifth fewest in the FBS and ranked first in the SEC -- earning the UF OL a spot on the Joe Moore Award Mid-Season Honor Roll for the first time.
 - » Offensive linemen **Kingsley Eguakun, Richard Gouraige, Ethan White** and **Josh Braun** all return in 2022 having started a combined 39 games last season.
 - » That group is joined by Louisiana transfer **O'Cyrus Torrence**, who started 35 games for the Cajuns from 2019-21.

DEFENSIVE TRENDS

- Florida ranks second in the SEC and tied fourth nationally in sacks since the 2018 season with 157 trailing only Clemson (190), Pittsburgh (186), Alabama (168).
- Florida's defense has produced 80 turnovers since 2018, which ranks tied-for-third in the conference and tied-for-27th in the FBS.
- Florida has out-sacked its opponents by a plus-23 margin since the start of the 2021 season.

UF DEFENSE DEBUTS

- Six Florida defensive players LB Shemar James, DL Chris McClellan, S Miguel Mitchell, CB Devin Moore, DL Tyreak Sapp and S Kamari Wilson - all made their collegiate debuts in the season opener vs. Utah.
 - » James started at linebacker, becoming the first Gator true freshman to start a season opener since Marco Wilson vs. Michigan in 2017.
 - » James totaled four tackles and a quarterback hurry.
 - » Sapp (3), Wilson (2) and Moore (1) all recorded their first-career tackles.
- Georgia transfer **DB Jalen Kimber** made his UF debut and finished with two tackles.
- Florida's newcomers combined for 12 of the 82 tackles, with James pacing the group at four.

DEFENSIVE VETERANS PAVE WAY IN SEASON OPENER

- The Gators defense held Utah to 39 total yards of offense in the first quarter of the 2022 season opener, including seven rushing yards.
- Florida limited the Utes to 134 total yards in the first half, which was the same amount the Gators held FAU to in the 2021 opener.
- In his 46th career game in the Orange and Blue, LB Amari Burney sealed the 29-26 victory with his third-career interception, which came in the end zone with 0:17 remaining in the fourth quarter.
 - » His last interception was in 2020 vs. Georgia.
 - » Burney added seven tackles, marking his fourth game with seven-plus tackles in a game.
- DB Trey Dean III and JACK Brenton Cox Jr. paced UF in tackles as both set new career highs with 12 and 10, respectively.



- » In 26 career games with the Gators, he has produced 31 QBHs and 24.5 TFLs.
- Dean III sits at 190 career tackles, as his 12 vs. the Utes was his fourth double-digit performance in his career, including three games of 11 tackles last season against Tennessee, Georgia and at South Carolina.
 - » The 12 total tackles are tied for fifth most in the SEC and 36th nationally.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Florida kicker Adam Mihalek made his collegiate debut, handling all in-game kicking duties.
 - » He averaged 61.0 yards per kickoff with three touchbacks in five kicks.
 - » Mihalek converted successfully on all three extra-point attempts.
- 2021 Freshman All-SEC punter **Jeremy Crawshaw** punted three times totaling an average of 40 yards.
 - » He knocked two inside Utah's own 20-vard line.

NFL DRAFT RADAR

- At present, Pro Football Focus has six Gators on its 2023 NFL Draft Big Board: DL Gervon Dexter (No. 34 overall, No. 4 IDL), Rashad Torrence II (No. 50 overall, No. 4 S), EDGE Brenton Cox (No. 58 overall, No. 8 EDGE), QB Anthony Richardson (No. 72 overall, No. 9 QB), OL O'Cyrus Torrence (No. 106 overall, No. 8 G) and DE Princely Umanmielen (No. 113 overall, No. 15 EDGE).
- All six of those Gators also received top-200 recognition from NFL Draft Buzz, in addition to LB Ventrell
 Miller, who was listed at the No. 128 overall prospect for 2023.

ADDITIONAL ACTIVE / HISTORICAL STREAKS

- UF has scored in 424-consecutive games dating back to 1988 -- which is an NCAA record. The Gators broke
 Michigan's record of 365-consecutive games (1984-2014) against LSU on Oct. 7, 2017. The next-closest active
 streak belongs to TCU at 368 games. That means Florida has posted a scoring streak 56 games longer than
 any other college football team in the history of the sport.
- UF has had fewer than 10 penalties in 43 of its last 46 games and had zero penalties for the first time in program history in Week 7 at LSU during the 2021 season.
- Since 2008, Florida and Alabama are the only FBS teams that have not lost to a team which finished the regular season with a losing record. Florida's last such loss was against Mississippi State (3-9) in 2004.

- The Florida offensive line stood stout against No. 7 Utah, refusing to allow a sack in the season-opener on Anthony Richardson while Kentucky allowed four sacks to Miami (OH) in their season-opening win.
- A consistent, dominant rushing attack for the Gators led the team to 283 yards on the ground and the 14th-best rushing offense in the nation.
- Anthony Richardson was precise in his decision making through the air, as the QB had no passes broken up or interceptions thrown in just his second-career start.

CROSSING PATHS

- Head coach Billy Napier faced off against Kentucky twice as the WRs Coach at Alabama, helping the Crimson Tide go undefeated (2-0) during his tenure. The Alabama offense averaged 41.0 points across the two wins. WR Calvin Ridley accounted for two touchdowns, 11 receptions and 174 yards to lead Napier's receiving corps in Alabama's 34-6 win over Kentucky in 2016.
- Gators outside linebacker David Reese and Kentucky wide receiver DeMarcus Harris played together at Vero Beach High School in Vero Beach, Fla. They helped lead the Fighting Indians to an 11-1 record and an appearance in the 2017 FHSAA Class 8A Football Region Semifinals.
- Florida offensive lineman Nicolas Flynn and Kentucky outside linebacker Jai Williams were teammates at Lake Forest High School in Lake Forest, III.
- While the Gators have zero players on their roster from the state of Kentucky, the Wildcats have seven players from the state of Florida: wide receiver DeMarcus Harris (Vero Beach, Fla.), offensive guard Kenneth Horsey (Sanford, Fla.), wide receiver Rahsaan Lewis (Orlando, Fla.), offensive lineman Tashawn Manning (Apopka, Fla.), defensive back Jarard Mosely (West Palm Beach, Fla.), defensive back Keidron Smith (West Palm Beach, Fla.) and outside linebacker Jordan Wright (Fort Lauderdale, Fla.).

HEAD COACH BILLY NAPIER

Napier hired as the 28th head coach in Florida football history

ollowing a late-morning flight from Louisiana and a police escort from the Gainesville Air Center, Billy Napier planted his feet on the University of Florida campus at 12:12 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 5.

That's the time Napier stepped from a van that carried his wife, their three kids and his mother, and into a throng of cheering fans ready to welcome him to Gator Nation. Napier arrived to similar fanfare at the airport when he was met by the UF band and cheerleaders.

"Let's go Napier!" yelled a young man as soon as Napier appeared from behind the van's sliding door.

"We love you Napier family," another young man screamed.

Napier flashed a big grin, did a Gator Chomp and then wiggled his way through the crowd — stopping for a few selfies along the way — toward the Heavener Football Complex to begin a day full of first-day-on-the-job tasks, including an introductory press conference.

"Well, back to finals," one of the young men said as Napier passed.

Much like finals week for UF students, it's been whirlwind week for Napier since he was announced as Florida's head coach a week ago.

Napier concluded his four seasons as head coach at Louisiana Lafayette on Saturday, Dec. 4, with a 24-16 win over Appalachian State in the Sun Belt Conference Championship Game. He said he slept about six hours before packing up the family for the trip to Florida.

"We made a great memory there, so I slept a lot better after we took care of business," Napier said minutes after his first visit to the Gators' locker room. "It was a great week. I don't think we could have drawn up a better ending, just so happy for the players. Four years of work kind of culminated there at Cajun Field. To see them be rewarded was a pretty awesome experience."

Prior to Dec. 5, the 42-year-old Napier said the last time he touched down at UF was in 2011 as an offensive analyst for Alabama when the Crimson Tide rolled into town. While he took care of unfinished business at Louisiana and did not visit campus before accepting an offer from UF Athletic Director Scott Stricklin to take over the program, Napier has a past relationship with the Gators.

He can thank his late father, Bill Napier, for that.

The elder Napier was a longtime high school head coach in north Georgia and is the all-time winningest coach at Murray County High in Chatsworth, the same school Billy Napier played quarterback. Bill Napier started to root for the Gators in the early 1990s when Steve Spurrier was UF's head coach and found inspiration for his Murray County Indians from the Gators.

The memory brought a smile to Bill's son on Sunday. They used to watch Spurrier's Gators play on TV together when Billy was growing up. Bill Napier died in 2017 from Lou Gehrig's Disease.

"He was a big Spurrier, Gators fan," Billy said. "I grew up watching Danny Wuerffel, all the greats. It probably wouldn't be right for me to mention more and then miss a few. My dad actually was at the same school for 23 years. Eventually, he got the head coaching job and he changed the uniforms at the school to be exactly like Florida's."

"It's humbling. That's all I can say," he said. "I am just thankful. A lot of people contributed to me being here. This is certainly not about me. I just want everybody to know how humbled I am to have this opportunity to lead at the University of Florida. I look forward to taking great pride in representing this university, this community, all the people that came before me.

"I'm going to work and be relentless in our approach here. There's no question that we've got work to do and we look forward to the challenge."

Napier finished 40-12 at Louisiana and returns to the Southeastern Conference, where he spent a season as an Alabama offensive analyst in 2011 and then four seasons coaching receivers from 2013-16.

Napier's deep roots in the game include stints on both Clemson coach Dabo

Swinney's staff and five seasons overall under Nick Saban at Alabama. After multiple offers to leave Louisiana the past couple of seasons, Napier finally decided the time was right when the Gators called.

"I think it was time for the next challenge," he said. "I think it's a unique time at the University of Florida, relative to the investment the administration was willing to make. The great opportunity that we have moving into the new facility this summer, and the history and the tradition, the iconic players and coaches that have competed here. I think this is a unique place at a unique time and I'm looking forward to the challenge of leading here."

In a short period of time since his arrival in Gainesville, Napier made an unprecedented impact on the Gators Football program. Within the first 60 days, he built a top-notch football staff—both on and off the field—and signed a recruiting class that ranked among the top 20 in the nation.

Louisiana (2018-21)

Napier spent four seasons at Louisiana-Lafayette and finished with a career record of 40-12, a perfect 16-0 mark against members of the Sun Belt West Division, four consecutive West Division titles, four straight bowl appearances, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Champions.

A two-time Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year (2019 & 2021), Napier took the Ragin' Cajuns to unprecedented heights when the team broke into the national rankings in 2020 for the first time in the modern era. The team finished the campaign ranked No. 15 in the AP Top-25, No. 16 in the USA Today/Amway Coaches Poll and No. 19 in the College Football Playoff, Louisiana's highest rankings in all three polls.

In 2021, he led the program to their first conference championship title since 2005 and only the second time in program history. Napier concluded his final season with a 12-1 record, the most single-season wins in school history after setting it with 11 in his second year. The 12 straight wins also set the program record for consecutive victories, as the previous record was eight in 1976.

Napier led Louisiana to its fourth straight Sun Belt Conference Championship game with a 24-16 victory over Appalachian State to finish with a career record of 28-7 against conference opponents. Louisiana became the first team in conference history to make all four conference championship games.

Napier's Louisiana team produced two 2022 NFL Draft picks in safety Percy Butler and tackle Max Mitchell, who were both drafted in the fourth round by the Washington Commanders and the New York Jets, respectively.

The 2020 Louisiana Sports Writer Association Coach of the Year, Napier navigated Louisiana through a season heavily impacted by COVID-19 and claimed a share of the Sun Belt

Conference Championship, its third-straight West Division title and its second-straight bowl victory, a 31-24 win over UTSA in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. The Ragin' Cajuns also advanced to its third consecutive Sun Belt Championship game, but was canceled due to COVID-19.

Napier's team broke into the national rankings for the first time in the modern era following its week one upset at No. 23 lowa State, marking the first win over a ranked opponent on the road and only the second time in program history. He concluded non-conference matchups at Louisiana with a record of 13-5, as three of the losses came against ranked opponents - No.1 Alabama, No. 16 Mississippi State and No. 19 Texas.

Both the offense and defense continued to flourish in 2020 under Napier's watch. Offensively, the team ranked 29th nationally in scoring offense (33.6) and 43rd nationally in total offense (421.5), while the defense ranked 31st in scoring defense (22.0) and 33rd in total defense (355.4).

Napier coached Louisiana to 14 Sun Belt All-Conference selections, led by First Team selections Elijah Mitchell and Chris Smith. Mitchell wrapped up his stellar career ranking fifth in career scoring (276), fifth in career rushing touchdowns (41) and sixth in career rushing yards (3,267) before being drafted in the sixth round by the San Francisco 49ers.

Smith additionally earned First Team All-America honors from CBSSports/247Sports, Pro Football Focus and Second Team All-America honors from the FWAA, marking the second consecutive season that a Ragin' Cajun earned All-America honors under Napier.

In just the second season (2019) under Napier, the program set the all-time single season victories (11) at the time and second-straight trip to the Sun Belt Championship Game after clinching the league's West Division title with a 53-3 victory over Troy. The 11 victories also marked the first double-digit win season in program history and the first of three consecutive 10-plus win years by Napier. He was voted the program's first Sun Belt Coach of the Year, becoming the third Louisiana coach to earn the distinction of top coach and the first since 1993 in their respective conference.

Napier coached three 2020 NFL Draft picks in Raymond Calais (RB), Kevin Dotson (G) and Robert Hunt (G), tying the

program record for draft selections in a year. Hunt became the third-highest pick in team history as he was selected 39th overall by the Miami Dolphins. A First Team All-American selection by the Associated Press, USA Today, Sports Illustrated, Pro Football Focus and a Second Team All-American by Sporting News, Dotson was drafted in the fourth round by the Pittsburgh Steelers. Calais was tabbed by the reigning Super Bowl Champions, Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the seventh round.

In Napier's first season at the helm, the Ragin' Cajuns (7-7, 5-3) won the 2018 Sun Belt Conference West Division Championship, advancing to the inaugural conference championship game. Louisiana accepted an invitation to the AutoNation Cure Bowl, its first bowl trip since 2016.

Arizona State (2017)

Prior to his stint at Louisiana, Napier was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Arizona State in 2017.

Napier guided the Sun Devils' offense to the 14th highest-graded offense in the FBS according to Pro Football Focus - including the 10th highest-graded passing attack in the nation. ASU was ranked 54th in the nation in total offense last season and 86th in the passing game the season prior. The offensive turnaround (+40 positions) was the eighth-largest in the FBS and ASU was one of just three programs to move from outside the Top-50 to inside of it in just one season. The 76-spot swing in the passing game rankings was the third highest in all of the FBS.

ASU developed one of the elite red zone scoring teams in the nation under Napier, tied for first nationally in converting on 95.83 percent of its red zone appearances (46-of-48) with the only two "blemishes" against the Sun Devils coming when the team took a knee late in the fourth quarter. ASU was 11th nationally in red zone touchdown scoring rate with 36 touchdowns on those 48 attempts (75.00).

Ball security was another notable facet of Napier's offense. The Sun Devils turned the ball over just 11 times in 2017, which ranked 12th nationally after finishing 82nd in the country a year ago with 21 turnovers.

Alabama (2011, 2013-16)

Napier's first experience in the SEC came at Alabama in 2011 and he later returned to Crimson Tide from 2013-17 as the wide receivers coach.

He was instrumental in helping Nick Saban and Alabama achieve a 63-7 record in five seasons (2011, 2013-2016), two National Championships (2011 & 2015) and was part of the great run of 26 consecutive wins from 2015-2016. In 70 games at Alabama, the Crimson Tide offense averaged 6.27 yards per play and 36.4 points per game. Napier coached three first round draft picks in Amari Copper, Jerry Jeudy, Amari Copper and Calvin Ridley while in Tuscaloosa.

In 2016, Napier's wide receiver corps were led by junior ArDarius Stewart, a third-round pick by the New York Jets in 2017 and Ridley. Stewart snagged in a team-leading eight touchdowns and 864 yards while Ridley totaled a team-high 72 receptions. Napier also helped develop wide outs Gehrig Dieter (Kansas City) and Cam Sims (Washington), both who were NFL free agent signees.

After recruiting Ridley to sign with the Crimson Tide, Napier coached him to a freshman-record and team-leading 89 catches for 1,045 yards and seven touchdowns in 2015 along with being named a USA Today Freshman All-American.

Napier played a vital role in Cooper's historical campaign in the 2014 season. He became Alabama's first Biletnikoff Award winner and caught a school- and SEC-record 124 passes for a UA-record 1,727 receiving yards and 16 touchdowns. Cooper led the country in receptions (124), was second nationally in receiving yards (1,727), receiving touchdowns (16) and catches per game (8.9) while ranking third in yards per game (123.4). A Heisman Trophy finalist and unanimous first team All-American, Cooper smashed all of the Tide's career receiving marks with 228 receptions, 3,463 yards and tied the SEC record with 31 receiving touchdowns.

In his first season as the Crimson Tide's receivers coach in 2013, Napier built a deep and talented group of wide outs. Alabama had four players with at least 32 receptions, led by Cooper's 45 catches for 736 yards.

The 2011 season marked the first year for Napier

on the Alabama staff as he served as an offensive analyst, helping the Crimson Tide win the 2011 BCS national championship. The Tide ranked 16th in scoring offense, 30th in total offense and 17th in rushing offense in 2011.

Colorado State (2012)

After a year at Alabama, Napier served as the assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach at Colorado State in 2012 for former Florida head coach Jim McFlwain.

Injuries forced Napier to go deep down the bench looking for quarterbacks during his one season in Fort Collins. The Rams saw three quarterbacks play significant snaps as the starter with Garrett Grayson going down early in the season and M.J. McPeek followed two weeks later, forcing redshirt freshman Conner Smith into action. The trio combined to throw for 2,520 yards and 17 touchdowns in 2012 as Colorado State won three of its final five games.

Clemson (2003-04, 2006-10)

Before his first stretch at Alabama, Napier spent seven years in two different stints at Clemson. During Napier's final two seasons at Clemson he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.





At the age of 29, he became the youngest coordinator in the nation and in Clemson history. In his first season as Clemson's coordinator, the 2009 Tigers scored a school-record 436 points and collected 54 touchdowns (third-most in school history), averaged 5.73 yards per play (fourth best) and finished as the ACC Atlantic Division champions. Quarterback Kyle Parker was named a Freshman All-American and nine players Napier coached from 2009-10 went on to have careers in the NFL.

He also served as Clemson's recruiting coordinator from 2006-08. In those three seasons, he compiled two top-25 recruiting classes, according to Rivals.com, and in 2008, his class was tabbed as the second-best in the nation by ESPN.com. Known to his peers as a top recruiter, Napier signed several players who went on to the NFL, including Kavell Conner, Crezdon Butler, Brandon Thompson and Marcus Gilchrist.

Napier was the 2007-08 tight ends coach at Clemson, helping lead the Tigers to two bowl games and a prolific offense.

The 2007 season featured a 9-4 record and the ACC's highest-scoring offense. In his first year back with Clemson (2006), Napier worked primarily with the Tigers' tight ends but also was responsible for the punt team and assisted in several special-teams capacities. The 2006 Tigers led the ACC in total offense, rushing and scoring offense, advancing to the Music City Bowl.

Clemson averaged 410.9 yards per game and

32.7 points, more than doubling its opponent's totals. Tight end Hunter Thomas started all 11 games for the Tigers, averaging 19.1 yards per reception. Michael Palmer, who Napier coached for three seasons, went on to the NFL. He also worked with the special teams units, helping develop the 2009 ACC Player of the Year and a unanimous All-American, C.J. Spiller.

He began his coaching career as an offensive graduate assistant at Clemson in 2003-04. The Tigers won nine games, including the Peach Bowl against Tennessee. The following season, Napier was a graduate assistant on defense, and gained his first experience with recruiting off the field.

Background

As a player, Napier was a four-year letterwinner and two-time All-Southern Conference selection as the starting quarterback at Furman. The Paladins won two conference championships and in 2001, Napier's junior year, advanced to the Division I-AA national championship game, losing to Montana.

He completed 64.8-percent of his career passes, setting a school record. As the team captain during a record-setting senior season, Napier amassed 2,475 passing yards, also a Furman record, and was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding FCS offensive player.

Napier grew up in Chatsworth, Georgia, and graduated from Murray County High School in

1998. He is married to the former Ali Gunn and the couple has a daughter, Annie, and sons, Sammy Nelson and Charlie. He earned his Bachelor's degree in health & exercise science from Furman in 2002.

Rob Sale enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's offensive coordinator/offensive line coach prior to the 2022 season.

Sale joined the Gators after serving as the New York Giants' offensive line coach in 2021.

A 14-year collegiate coaching veteran, Sale spent three seasons at Louisiana (2018-20) as the Ragin' Cajuns offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Napier.

Sale's unit produced three NFL Draft picks out of Louisiana, including Robert Hunt and Kevin Dotson in 2020. and Max Mitchell in 2022.

In 2020, the Ragin' Cajuns offense ranked third in the Sun Belt Conference in points per game (33.6), fifth in yards per game (421.5), third in yards per play (6.3) and fourth in rushing yards per game (213.0).

In 2019, Sale's offense set numerous school records, including total yards (6,918), touchdowns (69), rushing yards (3,604), rushing touchdowns (42) and passing touchdowns (27).

In his first season coaching the Louisiana offense, three players rushed for more than 700 yards each. Trey Ragas logged 1,149 yards and nine touchdowns, Elijah Mitchell led the Sun Belt with 16 touchdowns and ran for 985 yards of his own, while Raymond Calais tallied 754 yards and seven scores.

ROB SALE OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR / OFFENSIVE LINE

Prior to Louisiana, Sale was the offensive line coach/running game coordinator at Arizona State in 2017, when the Sun Devils averaged 31.9 points, 427.6 total yards and 179.9 rushing yards a game.

In 2016, Sale served as the offensive line coach at the University of Louisiana Monroe. That season, the Warhawks ranked third in the Sun Belt with 181.3 rushing yards per game and allowed just 19 sacks.

Prior to ULM, Sale was the offensive line coach at Georgia in 2015, when the Bulldogs averaged 375 yards a game. The offensive line – led by All-SEC first-team offensive tackle John Theus – helped the team rush for more than 190 rushing yards per game.

Sale spent three seasons at McNeese State serving as the offensive line coach for the Cowboys from 2012-13 before being elevated to co-offensive co-ordinator in 2014. In his final season, the Cowboys offense averaged 32.4 points, 396.5 total yards and 221.9 rushing yards a game.

From 2007-11, Sale gained his first college coaching experience as a strength and conditioning assistant and offensive analyst at Alabama. He began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Catholic High of Pointe Coupee in New Roads, La. in 2006.

Sale played in 35 games with 25 starts, including 13 at right guard as a senior in 2002, at LSU. As a junior, he started at both center and guard when the Tigers won the SEC title. During his sophomore season, he started the final five games of the regular season and the Peach Bowl at left guard.

Sale is a native of Monroe, La. He and his wife Amanda have two sons, Tripp and Briggs.

Patrick Toney enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's co-defensive coordinator/safeties coach.

Patrick Toney spent four seasons at the University of Louisiana on Napier's staff, where he served as the Ragin' Cajuns defensive coordinator (2020-21) in addition to coaching safeties (2018-2020) and outside linebackers (2021).

During his two seasons as defensive coordinator at Louisiana, Toney helped the Ragin Cajun to two Sun Belt Championships.

In year one under Toney's guidance the Louisiana defense set the tone, ranking fourth in the Sun Belt and 31st nationally in scoring defense (22.0), while also ranking fourth in the league and 33rd nationally in total defense (355.4).

In 2021, Toney's defense finished first in the conference in scoring defense (18.3), and tied-for-ninth nationally, while ranking fourth in passing defense in the league (2,589).

During his time at Louisiana, Toney coached Percy Butler who was selected by the Washington Commanders in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Before arriving at Louisiana, Toney spent two seasons as the safeties coach at UTSA. In 2017, the Roadrunners' defense ranked seventh amongst FBS programs, allowing 287.8 yards per game. The team finished eighth in scoring defense (17.0 PPG), second in first downs defense (166) and 19th in pass efficiency defense (112.19).

In his first year in San Antonio, he helped lead the

Prior to UTSA, Toney spent the 2015 season as the secondary coach at Sam Houston State, helping the Bearkats to an 11-4 record and a run to the semifinals of the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs.

Before joining Sam Houston State, Toney spent three seasons at Southeastern Louisiana. He was the safeties coach and special teams coordinator in 2014 after serving as a defensive assistant working with the secondary the previous two seasons.

During his time at Southeastern Louisiana, the Lions ranked first in the FCS in pass efficiency defense, second in interceptions, fifth in red zone defense, seventh in total defense and eighth in scoring defense.

His special teams topped the nation in kickoff return average, sixth in blocked kicks and 13th in kickoff return defense.

Toney coached two NFL Draft picks at Southeastern Louisiana, including Robert Alford (2013) and Harlan Miller (2016).

A native of Poway, Calif., Toney is a 2012 graduate of South Eastern Louisiana and is married to Courtney Toney.

Sean Spencer enters his first season with the Gators after being named co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach prior to the 2022 season.

A veteran of more than 20 years at the collegiate and professional levels, Spencer joined the Gators after spending two seasons (2020-21) as the New York Giants defensive line coach.

Spencer made an immediate impact to the Giants defense during his first season in 2020. That year, the defensive front registered 40 sacks, the most sacks since the 2014 season when they tallied 47.

Under Spencer's guidance, the line helped the defense rank 12th in the NFL, allowing 349.3 yards per game in 2020. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards per game. The Giants' rushing defense ranked 10th, allowing 111.4 yards per game, also their best figures since 2016 when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards per game.

Prior to the Giants, Spencer spent six seasons (2014-19) at Penn State, where he was also associate head coach and run game coordinator his final two years (2018-19).

The Nittany Lions' line was traditionally one of the best in the nation under Spencer. In 2019, Penn State had 45 sacks, the seventh-highest total in the country and third-highest in the Big Ten. It was Penn State's fifth consecutive season with at least 40 sacks, the first such streak for the Nittany Lions since team sacks were recorded in

That season, Spencer's linemen were also significant contributors to Penn State's run defense, which finished first in the nation by allowing only

2.6 yards per carry. The Nittany Lions also finished fifth in the country and first in the conference in yards per game with 95.0 in 2019.

In 2015 and 2018, Penn State led the nation in sacks, first with 50 and then with 47. Additionally, the Nittany Lions ranked fourth in the country with 8.2 tackles for loss a game in 2018. That year, the defense was a frequent fixture in the opposition's backfield, leading the country in sacks (3.62) for the second time in four years and ranking fourth in tackles for loss (8.2).

In 2017, the line helped the defense finish in the top 25 in FBS in scoring defense (7th; 16.5), sacks (7th; 3.23), rushing defense (14th; 118.0), total defense (17th; 329.5), takeaways (23rd; 25) and tackles for loss (25th; 7.2).

The line played a pivotal role in Penn State's Big Ten Championship run in 2016, when the defense finished seventh in FBS in tackles for loss (8.1) and 19th in sacks (2.86).

In 2015, the defensive line not only paced a unit that led the FBS in sacks (3.54 a game) but was sixth in tackles for loss (8.2) and 14th in total defense (324.5).

Spencer led a unit that in 2014 helped Penn State finish third in the FBS rushing defense (100.5) and second in total defense (278.7).

Prior to Penn State, Spence spent three seasons (2011-13) at Vanderbilt. During his tenure, the defensive lines helped the Commodores finish in the top 25 in the nation in total defense all three years. Vanderbilt recorded 28, 31 and 28 sacks under Spencer, with the defensive line posting 42.5

tackles for loss in 2013.

Spencer coached the Bowling Green defensive line in 2009-10 and had two stints at Massachusetts, also coaching the defensive front in 2001-03 and in 2007-08. He also has coached at Hofstra (2006), Villanova (2005), Holy Cross (2004), Trinity College (1998-2000), Shippensburg (1996-97) and Weslevan (1995).

Spencer was a three-year starter at safety at Clarion (Pa.) University where he earned a bachelor's degree in political science in 1995.

Spencer is a native of Hartford, Conn. He and his wife Allyson have a daughter, Alysia.

Jabbar Juluke enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's associate head coach - offense/running backs.

Juluke spent the last four years (2018-21) on Head Coach Billy Napier's staff at Louisiana, which included four straight Sun Belt West Division titles, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Championship.

Juluke coached two running backs that were drafted in back-to-back years (2020-21). Eli Mitchel by the San Francisco 49ers and Raymond Calais by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Mitchel was named First Team All-Sun Belt in 2020 and led Louisiana in rushing, with 141 carries for 878 vards and eight touchdowns. His vardage total was third in the league and 23rd nationally, while his eight rushing scores were the fifth most in the Sun Belt and tied for 41st nationally. Mitchel finished his career ranked fifth in career rushing touchdowns (41) and sixth in career rushing yards (3,267) and set the program record for most rushing yards in a bowl game after tallying 127 yards and a touchdown in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

The 2019 FootballScoop Running Backs Coach of the Year, Juluke led the Ragin' Cajuns to its best rushing season in program history in 2019, setting school records in total rushing yards (3,604) and rushing touchdowns (42). Louisiana finished the season ranked third nationally in yards per rush (6.28), rushing touchdowns (42) and sixth in total rushing yards.

Prior to a season at Texas Tech (2017), he was the running backs coach at LSU in 2016. Juluke tutored one of the nations top running backs

in Leonard Fournette who was the No. 5 overall selection in the 2017 NFL Draft. He also worked with Derrius Guice that season, pushing the sophomore to 1,428 yards and 11 touchdowns while being named to the All-SEC First Team with Fournette.

He began his collegiate coaching career at Louisiana Tech, where he spent two seasons (2014-15) as the running backs coach. Juluke helped the Bulldogs win the Conference USA West Division title in 2014. He also heavily involved in recurring efforts and helped land three 2017 NFL Draft picks in wide receivers Carlos Henderson (Denver Broncos), Trent Tyalor (San Francisco 49ers) and safety Xavier Woods (Dallas Cowboys).

Juluke arrived at Louisiana Tech following nine years as the head coach at Edna Karr High School in New Orleans. Juluke was regarded as one of Louisiana's top high school coaches during that time as he compiled an 80-39 record that was capped by a perfect 14-0 mark and a Class 4A state title in 2012.

Juluke guided Edna Karr to seven district titles and two state runner-up finishes during his tenure. He boasted a 49-8 record over his final four seasons alone which featured three appearances in the state championship game. Most impressively, Juluke helped over 70 of his players earn college football scholarships during his head coaching career.

Prior to his stint at Edna Karr, Juluke served as the defesinve back coach and special teams coordinator at O.P. Walker High school for one season (2002). Juluke coached linebackers at St. Augustine High School in 2000 and 2001 after serving as the wide receivers coach for Brother Martin High School in 1999.

Juluke began his coaching career as the defensive coordinator for Frederick Douglas High School from 1996-98.

As a player, Juluke helped guide Southern University to an 11-1 record and a Black National Championship in 1993. In addition to his time as a standout safety for the Jaguars, Juluke also lettered one season with the men's basketball program during the 1994-95 campaign. He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Southern in 1999.

Juluke is a native of New Orleans. He and his wife, Denise, are parents to three children – Jahmad, Jamari and Dyrius Smith.

Corey Raymond enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's assistant head coach - defense/cornerbacks.

Corey Raymond, who played six years in the NFL, spent 10 seasons at LSU where he coached defensive backs (2012-17) and cornerbacks (2018-21) prior to Florida.

Raymond's secondary produced seven first team All-Americans during his time at LSU, and a Jim Thorpe Award winner in Grant Delpit in 2019.

Under Raymond, 15 Tigers were picked in the NFL Draft, including four first rounders – Derek Stingley Jr. (2022), Jamal Adams and Tre'Davious White (2017), and Eric Reid (2013), along with five second round picks that include Grant Delpit (2020), Kristen Fulton (2020), Donte Jackson (2019), Greedy Williams (2018) and Jalen Collins (2015).

In 2020, LSU ranked No. 2 in the SEC in interceptions with 13 with true freshman Eli Ricks ranking No. 2 in the conference with four to his credit.

During LSU's national championship season in 2019, Stingley Jr. led the SEC in interceptions with six and earned SEC Newcomer of the Year honors to go with his first team All-America awards.

In 2019, the Tigers, for the second straight season, led the SEC in interceptions with 17 and LSU ranked No. 2 in the league in pass efficiency defense, allowing opponents to complete just 50.7 percent of its passes – the best percentage in the league.

In 2018, LSU led the SEC interceptions with 17 and ranked second in the league in pass defense efficiency in that year.

In 2017, LSU allowed only 11 passing touchdowns, which was the second-lowest total in the SEC, and the Tigers were No. 2 in the league in pass efficiency defense.

In 2016, Raymond's secondary allowed only nine passing touchdowns all season and ranked No. 3 in the Southeastern Conference in yards per game at 197.2.

LSU's 2015 secondary featured Jalen Mills, a first team All-America selection. Mills was joined in the secondary by White and Adams, who were both second team All-

SEC selections. Adams led all Tiger defensive backs with 67 tackles and four interceptions.

In 2014, LSU's secondary led the SEC in total defense (316.8 yards per game), pass defense (164.2 yards per game) and pass efficiency defense (101.6 rating). LSU allowed an SEC-best 10 passing touchdowns in that year.

LSU ranked No. 4 in the SEC in pass defense in 2013, allowing 197.5 yards per game. The Tigers limited opponents to 15 touchdown passes and ranked second in the league in yards allowed per attempt (6.4) and third in the conference in completion percentage at 56.0 percent.

In his first year back with the Tigers in 2012, Raymond coached safety Reid to first team All-America honors, and who was later chosen No. 18 overall in the NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Meanwhile, cornerback Tharold Simon was picked in the fifth round by the Seattle Seahawks.

As a unit in 2012, LSU's secondary combined for 15 interceptions and helped the Tigers rank No. 11 nationally in pass efficiency defense.

Raymond spent 2011 season as the secondary coach at Nebraska. In his one season with the Cornhuskers, Raymond coached a Nebraska secondary that featured the 2011 Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year in Alfonzo Dennard. Raymond's secondary helped Nebraska rank No. 18 in the nation in pass defense in 2011.

Prior to Nebraska, Raymond served as the cornerbacks coach for two seasons at Utah State. Raymond coached Curtis Marsh, who earned All-WAC honors and later went on to become a third-round pick in the NFL Draft.

Raymond served on the LSU staff for three years from 2006-08 before taking the job at Utah State.

During his three years on the LSU staff from 2006-08, Raymond was part of two BCS bowl victories, including a 38-24 win over Ohio State in the BCS National Championship. LSU's defense ranked No. 3 nationally in both 2006 and 2007 as the Tigers combined to post a 23-4 record during that span.

Prior to joining the LSU staff in 2006, Raymond coached at the high school level for three years in his hometown of New Iberia. Raymond was the defensive coordinator at New Iberia High School in 2003 and then held the same position at Westgate High School in 2004-05.

Raymond was a three-year starter in the secondary for the Tigers from 1989-91. He capped his LSU career with 185 tackles and eight interceptions. Following his career with the Tigers, Raymond spent six seasons in the NFL – three with the New York Giants and three with the Detroit Lions. In 90 games in the NFL, Raymond started 60 times and intercepted 11 passes to go with 258 tackles.

Raymond, who earned his undergraduate degree from LSU in 1993, is a native of New Iberia, La. He has four children – Cody, Ariel, Christopher and Madison.

Jay Bateman enters his first season with the Gators after being hired at as an assistant, coaching the inside linebackers.

A 24-year coaching veteran, Bateman arrived in Gainesville after spending three seasons as North Carolina's co-defensive coordinator and safeties coach (2019-21).

Upon his arrival in Carolina in 2019, Bateman helped engineer major improvements in the Tar Heel defense, which was one of the nation's top five most improved units in total defense, scoring defense and rushing defense that year.

Bateman's aggressive style was evident in the 36 sacks the team produced in 2020, the most for a Carolina defense since 2000 and tied for fifth nationally. The scoring defense, total defense and rushing defense all ranked in the Top 35 nationally of teams that played at least 10 games that season. The unit produced a first-team All-America in linebacker Chazz Surratt.

During his time with the Tar Heels, Bateman helped develop two NFL Draft picks, including Surrat who was picked in the third round by the Minnesota Vikings in 2021, along with Jason Strowbridge who was selected in the fifth round by the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

Prior to UNC, Bateman spent five seasons (2014-18) as Army's defensive coordinator.

JAY BATEMAN INSIDE LINEBACKERS

Army won 29 games during Bateman's tenure, including three bowl games during his last three seasons, which included two Top-10 finishes in total defense. Bateman was one of five finalists for the 2018 Broyles Award and a semifinalist in 2016.

In 2018, Bateman led Army's defense to finish eighth nationally in total defense (295.5 ypg) and 10th in scoring defense (17.7 ppg).

The Black Knights finished third in the nation in red zone defense and 14th in passing defense in 2017.

In 2016, Bateman guided a defense that ranked fourth nationally in total defense (291.5 ypg), sixth in passing defense (170.2 ypg) and 18th in rushing defense (121.2 ypg). The Army defensive unit also ranked 16th in scoring defense, allowing 19 points per game, while increasing its interception total from six in 2015 to 17 in 2016.

Prior to Army, Bateman spent three seasons as the defensive coordinator at Ball State (2011-13). His 2013 defensive unit ranked ninth nationally in turnovers gained with 31 and 12th in turnover margin at +0.9.

Bateman's defensive unit at Ball State produced an NFL Draft selection in Jonathan Newsome, who was selected in the fifth round by the Indianapolis Colts in 2015.

Bateman spent five seasons as the defensive

coordinator and linebackers coach at Elon (2006-10) prior to Ball State. At Elon, Bateman coached Chad Nkang who was drafted by the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2007

He also made stops at Lehigh (2005) and Richmond (2004). Bateman gained head-coaching experience at Siena College. He led the program from 2000-03 after spending one season as an assistant coach on staff.

Bateman began his coaching career in 1997, spending two years on staff at Hampden-Sydney. Bateman is a 1995 graduate of Randolph-Macon.

Bateman is a native of Richmond, Va. He and his wife Heather have two children, Bea and CJ.

Keary Colbert enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's assistant coach / wide receivers prior to the 2022 season.

Colbert arrived in The Swamp after spending the previous six seasons at his alma mater, USC, in roles of offensive analyst (2016-17), tight ends (2018) and wide receivers coach (2019-21).

He coached five NFL draft picks on the offensive side of the ball, including Drake London, Jordan Cameron, Michael Pittman Jr, Amon Ra St. Brown and Robert Davis.

He developed Pittman Jr. into finishing top-20 nationally in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns while being a finalist for the Biletnikoff and Witten awards in 2019.

During the 2021 NFL season, St. Brown locked up the all-time Detroit Lion's record for rookie receiving yards with 912 yards, while also notching a team-leading 5 touchdowns.

Meanwhile, Pittman led the Colts in receiving yards and receiving touchdowns and receiving touchdowns during the 2021 regular season. He was also named a NFL Pro Bowl Alternate.

Colbert worked with Florida Head Coach Billy Napier from 2014-15 as an offensive analyst at Alabama when the Tide won the National Championship in 2015 and went a combined 26-3.

Prior to his stint with Alabama, he was the wide receivers coach at Georgia State in 2013 and worked with Albert Wilson to a 1,000 yard pass

catcher that year. Colbert arrived at GSU after serving as volunteer coach (2012) at Pace Academy in Atlanta.

A four-year starter at wide receiver at USC, he broke the program all-time receptions record (207) while gaining 2,964 receiving yards and 19 touchdown passes in his career.

Colbert was a team captain his senior year when the Trojans captured the 2003 National Championship and was a two-time All Pac-10 second-team selection (2002-03).

Colbert was drafted in the second round of the 2004 NFL draft by the Carolina Panthers and spent four seasons (2004-07) in Carolina where he set rookie season records for receptions (47), receiving yards (754) and receiving touchdowns (5). He also spent time with the Denver Broncos (2008), Seattle Seahawks (2008), Detroit Lions (2008-09) and Kansas City Chiefs (2011).

He started his coaching career with the USC staff in 2010 as a graduate assistant working with the tight ends.

An Oxnard, Calif., native, Colbert received his bachelor's degree in sociology from USC in 2006.

He and his wife, Safiya, have two sons; Kaden and Khari.

William Peagler enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's tight ends coach prior to the 2022 season.

Peagler arrives in Gainesville after spending two seasons as Michigan State's running backs coach, helping the Spartans finish the 2021 regular season with a 10-2 record and reach their third New Year's Six Bowl. Peagler and MSU defeated Pittsburgh in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl on Dec. 30 with a score of 31-21.

Peagler was awarded the 2021 FootballScoop Running Backs Coach of the Year, after coaching running back Kenneth Walker III to the Doak Walker award. Walker III is the first Spartan to win the award after rushing for 1,636 yards and 18 touchdowns on 263 carries.

During his time at Michigan State, Peagler coached Kenneth Walker III who was selected by the Seattle Seahawks in the second round of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Prior to Michigan State, Peagler was the director of quality control for the offense in 2019 at Colorado.

Peagler spent the 2018 season as Louisiana's director of player personnel and quality control coordinator, helping the Ragin' Cajuns recruit the No. 1 class in the Sun Belt Conference that year.

WILLIAM PEAGLER TIGHT ENDS

Prior to Louisiana, he served as a graduate assistant at Georgia during the Bulldogs' run to the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2017. Peagler worked with NFL first-rounder Isaiah Wynn, who earned first-team All-SEC honors as an offensive tackle that year.

In Athens, Peagler was also part of the staff that signed the nation's consensus top recruiting class for 2018.

Peagler spent the 2016 season at Minnesota, where he served as an assistant in quality control for the offense. Prior to that, he was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Olive Branch High School in Mississippi in 2015, and the run game coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Coffeyville Community College in 2014.

Peagler spent the 2011-13 seasons at Louisiana. He initially joined the Ragin' Cajuns staff as an offensive quality control assistant and then was an offensive graduate assistant coach in his final two years there. UL won the New Orleans Bowl all three seasons he was on the staff.

A 2010 Clemson graduate, Peagler began his coaching career as student assistant for the Tigers from 2006-09 and later as the tight ends coach at Valdosta State for the 2010 season.

Peagler is a native of Santee, S.C.

Mike Peterson enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's outside linebackers coach/alumni liaison prior to the 2022 season.

Peterson spent the six previous seasons (2016-21) at South Carolina as an outside linebackers / defensive ends coach.

During his time with the Gamecocks, Peterson developed two NFL Draft picks in Kingsley Enagbare (fifth round, 2022) and D.J. Wonnum (fourth round, 2020).

In 2020, he coached Enagbare to a first-team All-SEC selection and the conference leader in sacks and forced fumbles.

While under Peterson's tutelage, Wonnum wrapped up his Gamecock career ranked ninth with 29.5 tackles for loss. He was a second-team All-SEC selection in 2019.

Peterson is credited with the development of Bryson Allen-Williams, who logged 10 tackles for loss in 2018 despite playing in just nine games, and finished his career 10th on the school's all-time list with 27.5 tackles for loss.

In 2017, Peterson was instrumental in the development of Wonnum, who ranked tied for seventh in the SEC in tackles for loss with 13.0, while leading the team with 6.0 sacks.

With Peterson's mentoring, Darius English turned in his finest season in South Carolina in 2016, garnering 9.0 sacks to move him into both the single-season and career (15.0) sacks top-10 lists in school history while earning second-team All-SFC accolades.

A member of the Florida 1996 National Championship team, he played linebacker for Steve Spurrier from 1995-98. His senior year, he served as a team captain and earned First-Team All-SEC and All-America honors. Peterson was inducted into the University of Florida Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011.

He was selected in the second-round (36th pick overall) in the 1999 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts. Peterson earned second-team All-Pro honors in 2005 and finished his career with 883 tackles, 21.5 sacks and 19 interceptions in 196 career games. A graduate of Santa Fe High School, he played 14 years in the NFL with the Colts (1999-02), Jacksonville Jaguars (2003-08) and Atlanta Falcons (2009-12).

After retiring from the NFL, he returned to Florida in 2013 where he finished his degree while working as undergraduate assistant coach on the strength and conditioning staff. Upon graduation, he was named to a full-time position as a strength and condition coordinator.

Peterson and his wife established the Mike Peterson Foundation in 2004. The foundation was

constituted in an attempt to support and benefit under-served youth and socio-economically challenged families in Peterson's hometown of Alachua and his NFL cities of Jacksonville and Atlanta.

Since its inception, the Mike Peterson Foundation has already served over 50,000 youth and families through several community events and programs, most notably the Top Dog Readers Club literacy program at the Grove Park Elementary School in Atlanta.

A Gainesville native, Peterson attended Santa Fe High School in Alachua.

Peterson and his wife, Chantal, have two sons; Mike Jr. and Gavin.

Peterson is the older brother of former Chicago Bears running back Adrian Peterson.

Darnell Stapleton enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's assistant coach/offensive line.

Stapleton joined the Gators staff after spending the 2021 the season with Napier at Louisiana, where he helped the Ragin' Cajuns to a Sun Belt Conference championship.

Stapleton's unit blocked for 2021 Sun Belt Conference Championship Game MVP Levi Lewis, who compiled 2,646 yards of passing, the second-best in the league, threw the third-most touchdowns in the conference (19) and ranked fifth with 203.5 passing yards per game through 13 games.

On the ground, Louisiana's offensive line helped the Ragin' Cajuns to 31 rushing touchdowns and 2,496 rushing yards, ranking 14th and 24th respectively in the nation, while placing second and third in the conference in 13 games.

Prior to Louisiana, Stapleton spent four seasons at Sam Houston State, where he was the offensive line coach and the run game coordinator from 2017-20. In 2019, the Bearkat offensive line produced a pair of All-Southland Conference selections in first teamer Colby Thomas and third teamer Tyler Edwards, who help running back Donovan Williams finish second in the Southland in rushing with 925 yards and 14 touchdowns.

From 2014-17, he served at the offensive line coach at Bucknell University.

DARNELL STAPLETON OFFENSIVE LINE

In 2016, Stapleton coached Julién Davenport, who captured First Team All-America honors from the Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp Foundation and STATS. Also a four-time All-Patriot League selection, Davenport became Bucknell's first NFL Draft pick since 1969 when he was taken in the fourth round by the Houston Texans.

The offensive line coach at Pace University for six months prior to joining the Bucknell staff, Stapleton completed two years as a graduate assistant at Rutgers, working closely with an offensive line that ranked in the top 10 nationally in fewest sacks allowed in 2012. The Scarlet Knights went to two bowl games during Stapleton's tenure, which also included a Big East title.

Stapleton joined the Rutgers program in 2005 after two playing years at Hudson Valley Community College. He started all 25 games at center during his two years at Rutgers, earning recognition as a finalist for the Rimington Trophy as a senior. Stapleton anchored an offensive line that blocked for future NFL Pro Bowl running back Ray Rice.

Stapleton graduated from Rutgers in 2007 with a degree in business and labor relations.

Stapleton was a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2007 to 2010 and was on the squad that won Super Bowl XLIII at the conclusion of the 2008 campaign. He started 18 games on the offensive line during his time in Pittsburgh, includ-

ing the Super Bowl. Overall, he played in 26 career games with the Steelers.

Stapleton's coaching career started in 2011 with the New York Sharks, a women's professional football team. He followed that stint with one season coaching both the offensive and defensive lines at Montclair Kimberly Academy. The squad posted a 9-2 mark, surpassing the program record for wins by three.

Stapleton has coached two NFL Draft selections in Max Mitchell (2022, Louisiana) and Julien Davenport (2017, Bucknell).

Stapleton is a native of Union Township, NJ.

Mark Hocke enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's Associate Head Coach/Director of Football Strength and Conditioning ahead of the 2022 season.

Hocke (Pronounced: "Hockey") spent all four seasons (2018-21) at Louisiana with Napier, which included four straight Sun Belt West Division titles, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Champions.

Prior to Louisiana, Hocke spent the 2017 season at Texas A&M where he served as the Football Strength and Conditioning.

Prior to Texas A&M, Hocke spent one season as the co-associate head football strength and conditioning coach at Florida State where he served under head football coach Jimbo Fisher and strength coach Vic Viloria. WHAT HAPPENED: Senior linebacker Amari Burney's diving interception of red-hot Cameron Rising's pass into the end zone with just 17 seconds remaining preserved a pulsating victory for the host Gators over the seventh-ranked Utes in what was a classic of a 2022 season opener Saturday night at Spurrier/Florida Field. The game marked the debut of Coach Billy Napier, who became the first coach in UF history to knock off a ranked opponent in his first game with the Gators. It wasn't easy, but against the defending Pac-12 champion Utes it wasn't supposed to be, either. Florida had to come from behind four times and had the will, firepower and weapon to do it behind sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson. The 6-foot-4, 235-pound Richardson lived up to his preseason Heisman Trophy hype by passing for 168 yards and rushing for 106 and a career-best three touchdowns, including the go-ahead score with 1:25 to go that capped a clutch and poised drive of 14 plays and 75 yards over 4:57. He gave the Gators their three-point margin, but still left plenty of time for Rising, a junior and veteran, to give his team a chance. And he did. Rising (216 yards and 1 TD passing, 115 yards and 1 TD rushing) moved the Utes from their 25, with the big play his 29-yard run to the UF 19 on third-and-7. Three plays later, Rising faced a second-and-goal from the 6 and looked to force a low throw into traffic. Burney was part of that traffic and took a nose dive to cradle the ball, secure the victory and send the "Swamp" into hysterics. Richardson scored on runs of 2, 45 and the game-winning 2 yards. The Gators also got 76 yards and a touchdown from tailback Montrell Johnson, the sophomore who came to UF with Napier from the University of Louisiana. Johnson more than made up for an opening-drive fumble (his team's only turnover of the night) that set up a Utah touchdown and early 7-0 lead. From there, the game became a back-and-forth affair with seven lead changes. Both teams finished with well over 400 yards of total offense, with Utah getting 115 yards and a score from tailback Tayion Thomas and nine catches for 105 yards and a score from tight end Brant Kuithe. Of Florida's 451 total yards, 283 came on the ground, while the Gators converted seven of 13 third downs and scored touchdowns on all three red zone possessions.

WHAT IT MEANS: Napier went 40-12 and won the 2021 Sun Belt Conference championship at Louisiana. He inherited a team that went 6-7 last season, but now has expectations after beating a ranked opponent in an opener for only the third time program history and for the first time since 1982. Meanwhile, the Gators extended their FBS-record streak of season-opening home wins to 33, but it's who they beat that made the feat all the more impressive and almost certainly will vault UF into next week's Associated Press Top 25 just in time for another big-time challenge that will have bigger-picture ramifications in the Southeastern Conference.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: The 2022 Gators were always going to be about Richardson and nothing occurred Saturday night to think otherwise. He had some fabulous moments (without a turnover, no less) and will have plenty more, as the UF coaching staff continues to open things up for him and let him play.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The highest-ranked team Florida had ever defeated in an opener was No. 7 in Houston back in 1969 (the first year of Reaves-to-Alvarez). Openers over the last 30-plus years had been against overmatched directional schools. As for a showdown like this one, basically 53 years in the making, ask the largest opening-day crowd (90,799) in Florida history of it was worth the wait.

UP NEXT: The Gators (1-0) will ride this high into next week's start to the SEC schedule when Eastern Division foe and 20th-ranked Kentucky (1-0), which handled Miami-Ohio 37-13 in its opener, rolls into town. The Wildcats, under Coach Mark Stoops, return a boatload of players from the program's second 10-win team over the last four seasons, which happen to be UK's only double-digit victory campaigns of the last 4y years. Kentucky has beaten UF two of the last four meetings, including last year's 20-13 win at Lexington, after losing 31 straight in the series from 1987-2017. The 1-2 start to the Florida season very likely is the most difficult first two games for any team in FBS classification.

GatorMade Program Aims For Holistic Development

Developing Gators far beyond the football field

When Gators head football coach Billy Napier arrived in Gainesville, he made clear that player development was going to be a priority at Florida. Shortly after taking over the program, he introduced GatorMade, a player-focused and purpose-driven initiative that seeks to develop Gators beyond the football field by providing them with the necessary skills to succeed in life. The program was part of Napier's master plan when he got a job at a school with the resources to support his vision.

Led by Senior Director of Player Relations and Gator-Made Savannah Bailey, GatorMade holistically develops each football scholar-athlete within UF's football program. The initiative not only addresses the needs of scholar-athletes, but also empowers them with opportunities to learn, serve, and lead. GatorMade translates the skills of football into personal and professional contexts, instilling independence in the schol ar-athletes to be agents change their


teams. homes. communities, and world. "GatorMade provides opportunities in financial literacy, micro-internships, networking, mentorship, agent education, NIL, business weekend trips and even service abroad," Napier said. "We want to have a place where we work toward having a life-changing impact as a person, as a student and as a player. And GatorMade provides the building blocks." In Summer 2022, the program kicked off its first annual Service Abroad Trip, Sixteen scholar-athletes across seven different sports traveled to Greece for a 10-day service trip, logging more than 600 hours of community service. "It's a different perspective.

I think it helps people grow their understanding of the world and understanding of themselves," Bailey said on the importance of facilitating abroad opportunities. "I think that brings home the message that anyone can serve anywhere, so whether it's across the world, in your hometown. or right here in Gainesville, there's always going to be someone who needs help." Earlier in the year, GatorMade also hosted a business trip to Atlanta for nine football scholar-athletes over spring break. The group met with the Atlanta Gator Club and nine different companies, an opportunity for the players to explore future options and network with Gator Nation.

The GatorMade staff includes former UF player Vernell Brown Jr., who serves as senior director of student-athlete development and alumni relations and Marcus Castro-Walker, director of player engagement and NIL. Diane Lebon, another staff member with experience at UF, serves as football business manager and GatorMade coordinator. "We are just in the beginning stages. This is a comprehensive vear-round curriculum and series of experiences that a player has," Napier said. "What I've seen is that these experiences change the perspective of the player. and then all of sudden, when they go to class, or they go to Hawkins Center, or they're

living life, they're visualizing what they want to do or who they want to become. One of the ways you change people is that you expose them to different people and different events. That's what we want to do with GatorMade. "We're hopeful that this becomes the absolute best player-development gram in the entire country. This is an area where people can invest in the player. And at the University of Florida. with the alumni network that we have and the topfive university education that we offer, there's no reason we can't do just that."

STEVE SPURRIER - FLORIDA

June 9, 1992. Once The Gainesville Sun hit newstands that Tuesday, Ben Hill Griffin Stadium's fitting nickname came to life.

Steve Spurrier, entering season three as Gators head coach, called writer Mike Bianchi the day prior and pitched him the storyline. It was seven months after the Gators ended the 1991 regular season with consecutive wins over Kentucky (which clinched an undefeated SEC record and the first league title in school history) and a thrilling 14-9 defeat of No. 3 Florida State, snapping a four-game losing streak to the Seminoles. It also gave UF a perfect 12-0 home record under Spurrier.

"The 'Swamp' is where Gators live." Spurrier told Bianchi. "We feel comfortable there, but we hope our opponents feel tentative. A swamp is hot and sticky and can be dangerous."

Initially, the UF athletic department didn't embrace the nickname. No posters, bumper stickers or marketing campaigns were put together right away. But Spurrier continued to use it. Then he and then-UF communications director Norm Carlson did some research. Turns out, in 1930, UF President John J. Tigert selected the location for the school's football stadium and described the area as a "swampy depression." The school hired engineers to drain the area and install pipes that funneled water down the hill along North-South Drive and dumped it into what is now known as Graham Pond.

Needless to say, the nickname caught on, and Spurrier delivered the perfect quote for the athletic department to utilize once it eventually did embrace the moniker: "The 'Swamp' is a place where only Gators get out alive."

- Since 1990, Florida has outscored opponents 7,632 to 3,230 in 202 games inside The Swamp, putting the average outcome at 37.8 to 16.0 (21.8 points).
- The Gators had two significant win streaks in The Swamp in the 1990s: a 23game run from 1990-93, and a school-record 30-game streak from 1994-99.
- In 202 home games from 1990 through today, the Gators have...

Scored 50+ points.....52 times Scored 40+ points.....86 times Scored 30+ points......135 times Shut Out Opponents......17 times Allowed 3 points or less......32 times Allowed 14 points or less......109 times

- Florida's school-record crowd of 90,916 on Nov. 28, 2015 marked the largest crowd ever to watch a football game in the state of Florida. The state has hosted 16 Super Bowls, four BCS National Championship Games and the 2017 and 2021 College Football Playoff National Championship Game.
- The largest crowd for a home opener was 90,707 (Sept. 3, 2005 Wyoming). The 2009 opener (90,621) remains the second-largest.
