KENTUCKY SET FOR ANTICIPATED 2022 SEASON

No.20/21 Kentucky opens one of the most anticipated seasons in school history with an emerging offense and defense and two 10-win campaigns in the past four seasons. The 2022 opener will be the first time since 2016 that the season opener has been played under the lights.

Coach Mark Stoops is on the doorstep of becoming the winningest coach in program history as he looks to continue the Wildcats' ascension. He'll bank on quarterback Will Levis fulfilling the lofty praise he has received and experienced defenders DeAndre Square, J.J. Weaver, Jordan Wright and Jacquez Jones.

Also in the spotlight is running back Chris Rodriguez Jr., who with a big season could surpass Benny Snell Jr. as the program's all-time leading rusher.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky earned four first-place votes and was picked to finish second behind defending national champion Georgia in the SEC East in a vote at Preseason SEC Media Days.
- Last season, Kentucky finished 10-3 and won the Vrbo Citrus Bowl for the second time in the past four seasons, defeating No. 15 Iowa, 20-17, on Jan. 1, 2022.
- It is the second 10-win season in the past four campaigns after having only two in school history prior to that (11 in 1950; 10 in 1977).
- For the first time in school history, Kentucky is ranked in both national preseason polls, coming in at 20 in the Associated Press poll and 21 in the USA TODAY Sports AFCA Coaches Poll.
- When the Wildcats begin the 2022 season, it will be Stoops' 10th year at UK, longer than any coach in school history. He is 59-53 overall, ranking second in school history in victories behind Paul "Bear" Bryant (60).
- Stoops is the second-longest tenured active coach in the SEC (behind Alabama's Nick Saban) and the 11th-longest nationally.
- He recently inked a contract extension that will keep him in Lexington through June 2028 with amended financial terms.
- Stoops started his tenure 12-26 but has gone an impressive 47-27 (.635) since that time, moving over .500 for the first time in his term as head coach.
- Three new assistant coaches were hired following the 2021 season. Mike Stoops, brother of head coach Mark Stoops, was hired in January as the inside linebackers coach to replace Jon Sumrall, now the head coach at Troy University. UK named San Francisco 49ers quarterback coach Rich Scangarello the program's new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in Feburary following the departure of Liam Coen for Super Bowl champion Los Angeles Rams. Zach Yenser also was hired away from the 49ers in February to lead the Big Blue Wall.
- In all, 41 letter winners and 13 starters from last year return. The Cats' roster is also bolstered this season with the addition of 10 newcomers from the transfer portal.
- Offensive starters returning are QB Will Levis, RB Chris Rodriguez Jr., TE Brenden Bates and
 offensive linemen Eli Cox and Kenneth Horsey. Defensively, DBs Tyrell Ajian and Carrington
 Valentine return, along with inside linebackers Jacquez Jones, DeAndre Square and outside
 linebackers J.J. Weaver and Jordan Wright. Kicker Matt Ruffolo and punter Colin Goodfellow

- return for their final seasons in the Blue
- The Wildcats have won 11 of their past 15 season openers, including four of their last five.
- UK has won 16 straight non-conference games, dating back to the 2017 Music City Bowl loss to Northwestern. It is the longest such active streak in FBS.
- UK's 33 victories since the start of the 2018 season rank sixth-most in the SEC ... Those 33 wins rank 12th among Power Five programs.
- Kentucky finished 5-3 in the SEC for second place in the SEC Eastern Division. It marks the first time since the league split into divisions in 1992 that UK ends the season in sole possession of second place of the East. UK also has finished in a tie for second in the division on two other occasions, 2016 and 2018.
- All three second-place East finishes have been in the last six seasons under Mark
- UK's 5-3 record in 2021 was the second time since 1977 that UK posted a winning record in league play (also in 2018).
- UK has multiple wins vs. ranked teams in three of the past four seasons. The Cats had one season (2007) with multiple wins over ranked foes in the previous 40 years.
- The Wildcats have the third-most wins among SEC East schools from 2016-21 (47). Only Georgia (66) and Florida (48)
- Kentucky has 11 players in school history who have rushed for at least 1,900 career yards. Four of those have come during Stoops' tenure: Benny Snell Jr. (3,873), Chris Rodriguez Jr. (2,740), Stanley "Boom" Williams (2,511) and A.J. Rose (1,971).
- Guided by defensive coordinator Brad White, UK has had four top-20 ranked
- UK has allowed 30 or fewer points in 44 of the past 51 games and held its final four opponents to 21 or less.
- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and Will Levis.
- Since 2016, UK is 20-8 (.714) in games decided by seven points or less.
- The Wildcats signed their highest-rated recruiting class in school history in 2022.

SERIES RECORD VS. MIAMI (OHIO)

- Kentucky leads the all-time series against Miami (Ohio) 8-4-1, including a 6-3-1 mark in Lexington.
- The Wildcats have won three straight over the Redhawks, including the last matchup in Lexington in 2013, 41-7.
- · Kentucky won the first five meetings in the series before Miami (Ohio) won four of the next five meetings with the two teams tying in 1917. The series is tied 1-1 in games played in Oxford, Ohio, and UK lead 1-0 in games played in Cincinnati.
- Kentucky is 33-7-1 vs. teams from Miami's Mid-American Conference. The Cats have not lost to a MAC team since falling to Ohio, 28-16, on Oct. 2, 2004 in Lexington. UK is also slated to play MAC opponent Northern Illinois on Saturday, Sept. 24.

KENTUCKY-MIAMI (OHIO) TIES

- Kentucky has 21 players on its 2022 roster from the state of Ohio, while Miami has six players from the Commonwealth on its roster, including one from Lexington in DB Mason Moore (Lexington/Lexington Christian). Moore is the son of former Wildcat great Marty Moore (1990-93). Moore totaled 462 tackles as a linebacker at UK and was the final pick in the 1994 NFL Draft making him "Mr. Irrelevant" as the last pick selected. He went on to play eight seasons in the league, seven for the New England Patriots.
- The others are: DB Eli Blakely (Louisville/DuPont Manual), QB Joseph Humphries (Owensboro/ Daviess County), OL Sam Vaughan (Versailles/Lexington Catholic), OL Ben Jackson (Winchester/ George Rogers Clark) and TE Jack Coldirion (Florence/Covington Catholic).

CATS CLIMBED SEC LADDER IN 2021

- Kentucky finished the 2021 season 10-3 for the first time since 2018 and just the fourth time in school history.

MILESTONES TO LOOK FOR...

- Head coach <u>Mark Stoops</u> has 59 career victories at Kentucky, No. 2 on the school's all-time list. Paul "Bear" Bryant is first with 60.
- Coach Stoops now holds the record for most total home wins in school history (41).
- Junior <u>RB Chris Rodriguez Jr.</u> has 2,740 career rushing yards for sixth place on the school's all-time list and is the 10th player in school history to reach 2,000. He needs 153 more yards to move up to No. 5.
- Rodriguez has 26 career rushing touchdowns, tied for second in UK history with Moe Williams and Sonny Collins. His 29 total touchdowns ranks fourth.
- Rodriguez has 15 career 100-yard rushing games, third-most in school history.
- Rodriguez had 1,379 rushing yards this season, fifth-most in school history. He is the 10th Wildcat to reach 1,000 in a season and the 14th time it has been accomplished.
- Junior <u>RB Kavosiey Smoke</u> has 1,306 career rushing yards. He currently sits at No. 30 and needs seven more to move up to No. 29.
- Senior <u>K Matt Ruffolo</u> set a new single-season record with 54 PATs and currently ranks 11th in career scoring with 172 points.
- Senior <u>LB DeAndre Square</u> has 244 career tackles and needs 56 to become the 19th member of the 300 Tacle Club, and just fourth in the 21st century.

CATS IN THE NATIONAL POLLS

- For the first time in school history, Kentucky is ranked in both national preseason polls, coming in at 20 in the Associated Press poll and 21 in the USA TODAY Sports AFCA Coaches Poll.
- Kentucky ended the 2021 season ranked No. 15 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 18 in the Associated Press poll.
- It marked just the second time since 1984 the Cats were ranked in the AP's final poll of the season. In 2018, the Cats finished 11th.
- The Cats spent nine weeks in the Coaches Poll and eight in the AP Poll in 2021.
- Kentucky entered the AP Top 25 on Oct. 3, coming in at No. 16, advancing to No. 11 after the win over LSU ... It marked he highest AP ranking for UK since Oct. 28, 2018, when the Cats were No. 11 after a 7-1 start. The Cats also have been as high as No. 11 in the USA Today Coaches Poll, their highest ranking since ending the 2018 season at No. 11.

LET'S GO KROGER-ING

- Overall, Kentucky is 177-138-4 (.561) all-time in Kroger Field, inclduing 41-22 (.651) under Mark Stoops.
- Kentucky has won eight of its past nine games at Kroger Field.
- UK is 13-3 in its last 16 home night games.
- Since the beginning of 2018, the Cats have home wins over No. 10 Florida (2021) and No. 14 Mississippi State (2018).

SIMPLY STOOPS-ENDOUS

UK head coach Mark Stoops has proven to be an excellent hire, turning around a struggling program and making him the first UK coach to lead the program to a sixth consecutive bowl appearance. He also has erased a number of the long-standing hurdles and streaks in the program's history. A partial accounting of Stoops' achievements features:

- 33 wins in the last four seasons, ranking 12th among Power Five programs;
- · Winning the season finale (and regular-season finale) four years in a row for the first time since 1898-1901:
 - Since 2016, a 20-8 record (71.4%) in games decided by seven points or less;
- First home win over Florida since 1986, also marking the first win over an Associated Press top 10-ranked opponent since 2010 (2021);
 - First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2020)
 - First New Year's Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
 - First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
 - First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
 - First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
 - First bowl win since 2008 (2018 season)
 - First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
 - First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)
- After two games of the 2016 season, his record was 12-26 but he has gone 47-27 (.635) since. Overall, Stoops is now 59-53 at Kentucky and is nearing Paul "Bear" Bryant's school-record 60 victories.
- Off the field, Stoops is a staunch supporter of the Kentucky Children's Hospital, helping raise more than \$500,000 annually for the kids
- Kentucky's football team has fared well academically under Stoops, as each year UK's football score in the NCAA Academic Progress Rate has been well above the benchmark of 930.

"BIG BLUE WALL"

- The Kentucky offensive line was one of four units named as a finalist for the Joe Moore Award in 2021, recognizing the Most Outstanding Offensive Line Unit in college football.
- It's the fourth consecutive season that the Kentucky offensive line, known as the "Big Blue Wall," has been recognized by the award for its work in the trenches.
- Behind Kentucky's talented "Big Blue Wall," running back Chris Rodriguez Jr. ranked second in the SEC and 12th nationally at 106.1 rushing yards per game. He totaled 1,379 yards and set a school record with nine 100-yard rushing games this season.
- Although it lost key members C Luke Fortner, LT Darian Kinnard to the NFL Draft and RT Dare Rosenthal as well, the unit looks strong again in 2022 with returners OG and All-SEC selection Kenneth Horsey and Outland Trophy Watch Lister Eli Cox.

WILL POWERED

- Quarterback Will Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp after transferring from Penn State in 2021, took the role his role and ran with it.
- In his UK debut, he passed for 367 yards and four scores. List of QBs since 2000 to have at least 350 passing yards with at least 4 passing TDs and at least a 65% completion percentage in a victory in his first career start at an SEC school: J.T. Daniels, Georgia vs. Miss. St. (2020) and Will Levis, vs. ULM (2021).
- Over the summer he was one of the few collegiate passers to participate in the elite Manning Passing Academy camp.
- He has earned publicity as being a potential top 10 overall selection for the 2023 National Football League Draft.
- He was named to the 2022 Davey O'Brien Award and Manning Award watch lists.
- He has three career 300-yard passing games and is tied for the single-game school record for rushing touchdowns and total touchdowns with four.

HOT C-ROD

- Junior RB **Chris Rodriguez Jr.** had 1,379 rushing yards last season and is one of the nation's top running backs. The total ranks fifth on UK's single-season rushing list.
- By surpassing 1,000 rushing yards in 2021 he becomes the 10th Wildcat to have a 1,000yard season. It has only been accomplished 14 times in total in the history of UK Football.
- He was second in the SEC and 12th nationally with 106.1 yards per game and seventh in the SEC in all-purpose yards (110.8).

- He is the leading returning rusher in the SEC.
- His nine 100-yard rushing games in 2021 is a single-season school record.
- He currently has rushed for 100 yards or more in five consecutive games, the second-longest streak in school history.
- He has 2,740 career rushing yards, sixth place in school history and is the 10th player in school history to reach 2,000 career yards. He needs 1,134 to pass Benny Snell Jr. (3,873) and become UK's all-time leading rusher.
- He has 26 career rushing touchdowns, tied for second-most in school history with Moe Williams and Sonny Collins.
- His 29 total touchdowns rank fourth-most.
- He ranks third in yards per carry for his career (min. 200) at 6.57.
- He has 15 career 100-yard rushing games, third-most in school history.
- He has had only 13 of his 417 career carries go for negative yardage, a staggering testament to his ability to hit the hole and grind out yards.

WHITE-OUT

- Fourth-year defensive coordinator Brad White has proven to be an excellent hire after Coach Mark Stoops plucked him from the National Football League. After taking over the defense in 2019, Kentucky has steadily become more stout on that side of the ball and other programs have taken notice, as White has turned down several other coaching opportunities in that time.
- For the first time since 1986-89, UK has allowed 26 or fewer points per game in four straight seasons.
- For the first time since 1959-62 it has yielded 160 rushing yards or fewer per game for four straight seasons. In today's high-scoring offensive game the UK defense has held opponents to 30 or fewer points in 31 of his 37 games as coordinator.

IT'S HIP TO BE SQUARE

• Senior inside linebacker DeAndre Square has been named one of the 51 players on the watch list for the Butkus Award, given to the nation's top linebacker since 1985. The watch list features 51 linebackers, mirroring the legendary "51" pro jersey associated with the award's namesake, Dick Butkus, who was recognized by NFL Films as the best defensive player in football history. The Butkus Award is focused on recognizing linebackers who consistently play off the ball on their feet in a two-point stance in traditional form.

Mark Stoops is the second-longest tenured coach in the SEC behind Alabama's Nick Saban. He is the 11th-longest tenured coach in the nation (see chart above).

- Geiger, a product of Columbia, South Carolina, grew up in a military family as his dad, Tony, was a Chief Warrant Officer (CW3) in the United States Army for 21 years with five combat deployments, while his mom, Ramona, retired as a First Sergeant (E-8) after 25 years of service with three combat deployments in the Army. Due to his parents' military service, Jalen attended six different schools from kindergarten through 12th grade. He knows a thing or two about what it feels like to be the new kid in class and how hard it can be to make new friends. Because of his background, Jalen has a passion for helping elementary school-age kids so they don't feel alone and he uses his platform as a football player to help kids in need. In 2021, he found a mentorship opportunity at Liberty Elementary in Lexington, Kentucky. He visited the school on several occasions, playing with the kids and talking to them about learning and trusting their teachers. He will continue that work in 2022 with plans to talk more to the kids about anti-bullying and being kind to one another
- When asked by the principal about working hard for Coach Stoops, he said, "He (Jalen) works hard because Coach Stoops believes in him and knows what he is capable of accomplishing. He related it back to trusting your teachers and working hard for them because they want you to be your best. Jalen is quiet in nature, but what he says really resonates with my students."
- Other community service events Jalen has volunteered for include: Real Men Read (2021)
- Volunteered to read to a group of first graders at Yates Elementary three times during the season; Citrus Bowl Volunteer Project (2021) Volunteered to mentor children in the Orlando area at an amusement park ... Paired up with one of the students and began a friendship with him and talked to him about the importance of school because he was not doing well in the classroom; God's Pantry (2020) Volunteered to pack food bags for food insecurity elementary students in the Lexington area to take home for the weekends; Lighthouse Ministries (2020) Volunteered to prepare, clean and serve meals to the homeless; Belk Bowl Volunteer Project (2020) Volunteered to pack food bags for people in the Charlotte area with food and/or home insecurities in the community.
- On the field, the 6-foot-1, 197-pounder, played in all 13 games last season with two starting assignments. He totaled 18 tackles, a tackle for loss, a quarterback hurry, a pass breakup and an interception for a touchdown.

J.J. WEAVER IS MAKING AN "IMPACT"

- Junior outside linebacker J.J. Weaver is one of 42 candidates on the 2022 Lott IMPACT Trophy Watch List, the only major college football award that considers character.
- Named after NFL Hall of Famer Ronnie Lott, The Lott Trophy annually goes to the Defensive IMPACT Player of the Year, a player who has had the biggest impact on his team both on and off the field. IMPACT stands for Integrity, Maturity, Performance, Academics, Community and Tenacity, all characteristics exhibited by Lott during his illustrious playing career.



- Last season, Weaver earned six starting assignments and totaled 34 tackles, 10.0 tackles for loss (second on the team), a team-high 6.0 sacks, four quarterback hurries, two interceptions, one forced fumble and one pass breakups. He was named third-team All-SEC by Phil Steele.
- He was having a breakout freshman campaign with 33.5 tackles and 6.5 tackles for a loss through nine games of the 2020 season when he suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee at Florida. Despite missing the final two games, he still earned All-SEC Freshman Team honors. That injury was just one part of a very difficult year for Weaver, who also lost his father to homicide and then in the fall of 2021 lost his beloved high school coach, Rob Reader, to liver cancer. As a result, his challenging off-season included both the rehabilitation of his knee and undergoing counseling to deal with his grief. Both were successful as he returned to the field with a strong knee and a clear mind. He was named the Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award and was a Capital One Orange Bowl Courage Award nominee in 2021 because of his resolve on and off the field.
- Another interesting note about Weaver is that he has polydactyly, a condition in which a person has more than five fingers or toes on one, or on each, hand or foot. Weaver plays with six functioning fingers on his right hand. He now not only uses his platform to speak to elementary school kids on the importance of mental health but also how to embrace being different.

COACHING CHANGES

- Rich Scangarello was named Kentucky's new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Feb. 25. Scangarello coached seven years in the NFL and 15 in the collegiate ranks. He arrived in Kentucky fresh off a run to the NFC Championship game with the San Francisco 49ers. He replaced Liam Coen who left to be the offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams.
- Zach Yenser was named UK's new offensive line coach on Feb. 22. He came to UK after three seasons with the 49ers. Prior to that, he spent three seasons at Kansas (2015-17) as the run game coordinator/offensive line coach and had coaching stints at Southern Methodist (2018), California (2013-14), Louisiana Tech (2010-12), Colquitt County High School (2009) and Henderson State (2008). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Troy University in 2007, working with special teams and the offensive lineman under former Wildcat and beloved UK assistant coach John Schlarman. He replaced Eric Wolford, who left to become the offensive line coach at Alabama.
- Mike Stoops was hired on Jan. 18, 2022 as Kentucky's new inside linebackers coach. He came to UK after spending the 2021 season as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Florida Atlantic. Prior to that he spent two seasons (2019 and 2020) at Alabama as an analyst on Nick Saban's staff, highlighted by the 2020 national championship. He also was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Oklahoma from 2012-18 and was the head coach at Arizona from 2004-11. He had a first term at Oklahoma from 1999-2003, including the 2000 national championship season. He replaced Jon Sumrall, who left to become the head coach at Troy. Mike is the brother of head coach Mark Stoops. They coached together at Arizona as Mark served as defensive coordinator.

CATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

- Kentucky had four selections in the 2022 NFL Draft Wan'Dale Robinson (2nd round, New York Giants, Josh Paschal (2nd, Detroit Lions), Luke Fortner (3rd, Jacksonville Jaguars) and Darian Kinnard (5th, Kansas City Chiefs).
- In total, 22 players have been drafted under head coach Mark Stoops since 2013, including 13 defensive players in Avery Williamson, Bud Dupree, Za'Darius Smith, Josh Forrest, Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson, Mike Edwards, Jamin Davis, Kelvin Joseph, Quinton Bohanna, Brandin Echols and Josh Paschal.
- Kentucky has totaled four or more players selected in the first five rounds three times in school history, including twice in the last four years under Coach Mark Stoops: 2022, 2019, 1966.

Mark Stoops - Head Coach (Cardinal Mooney), Mike Stoops - Inside Linebackers Coach (Cardinal Mooney) Vince Marrow - Recruiting Coord./Tight Ends (Cardinal Mooney), Frank Buffano - Safeties (Cardinal Mooney), Courtney Love - Grad Assistant (Cardinal Mooney), Luke Fulton - Junior, inside linebacker (Cardinal Mooney) and Sean O'Horo - freshman, running back (Boardman).

OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

- The Wildcats' exciting pro-style offense has a new coordinator in Rich Scangarello, who joined the Wildcats from the San Francisco 49ers and whose background in the Mike and Kyle Shanahan/Sean McVay/Liam Coen coaching tree will allow Kentucky to keep running a similar system that set records on the field last year.
- UK football returns two of the most productive offensive players in the country in quarterback Will Levis and running back Chris Rodriguez Jr. Additionally, the elite "Big Blue Wall" offensive line figures to continue to maintain physicality at the line of scrimmage that has defined the "blue collar" identity head coach Mark Stoops has built the recent success of Kentucky football upon.
- Five offensive starters return in 2022 in Levis, Rodriguez Jr., tight end Brenden Bates and offensive linemen Eli Cox and Kenneth Horsey. Other key returning offensive players with starting experience are tight ends Keaton Upshaw (sat out last season with injury) and Izayah Cummings and wide receiver DeMarcus Harris.
- UK averaged 218.6 passing yards and 199.5 rushing yards per game last season. The impressive balance led the unit to average 6.41 yards per play (5,527 in 862 plays) for the season. The number is the second-highest yards per play average for a single-season in school history behind the 6.45 in 1998 with Tim Couch at the helm of Hal Mumme's "Air Raid."
- UK's offense steadily improved throughout the season before exploding in the month of November, averaging 560.8 total yards per game in those four contests. The total was the highest of any Power Five team and second nationally only to Kent State (564.0) for that time period.
- The offense had the highest 4+ yard rushing percentage of any team in nation, a hat tip to the offensive line (source: SportSource Analytics). The Wildcats ranked fourth in the SEC in rushing yards per attempt with a 5.23 average.
- The 32.3 points per game in '21 ranked fourth in school single-season history.

QUARTERBACKS

- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and Will Levis.
- Scangarello, known as the "quarterback guru" by some, will have four quarterbacks to mold this fall. **Levis** is the clear starter after earning the starting spot early in fall camp last season. He had a sensational junior year, completing 233 of 353 passes (66 percent) for 2,837 yards and 24 touchdowns. He ranked sixth in the SEC in passing yards per game (217.5) and seventh in total offense (246.4).


BURTON ELECTED TO UK ATHLETICS HOF

The University of Kentucky Athletics Hall of Fame Class of 2022 was announced in July, with Jim Andrews (men's basketball), Derek Bryant (baseball), Dezerea Bryant (women's track and field), **Keenan Burton (football)**, Mike Lyden (swimming and diving) and Kelsey Nunley-Moore (softball) chosen for induction.

The new Hall of Famers will be inducted during Hall of Fame Weekend on November 10-12.

KEENAN BURTON, FOOTBALL, 2003-07

Great pass receiver and kickoff returner who also won awards for his outstanding character ... Finished his career fourth in school history in pass receptions (189), second in UK history for receiving yardage (2,376) and TD catches (25) ... Three-year All-SEC honoree, including first-team honors as a junior ... Led UK in pass receiving as a junior and senior as the Wildcats posted consecutive wins in the 2006 and '07 Music City Bowls ... Set UK career record for kickoff return average (25.6-yard average, min. 50 returns) ... Named to the UK Athletics Society of Character, the SEC Community Service Team and the SEC Academic Honor Roll ... Played two years in the NFL before sustaining a career-ending injury.



- Redshirt freshman Kaiya Sheron has a year under his belt learning the offense as a redshirt. Sophomore Deuce Hogan enters his first season at Kentucky after transferring from Iowa. Freshman and Tennessee's Mr. Football Destin Wade has arrived and looks to get in the mix.
- Levis finds himself surrounded by a lot of new faces with only three returning starters joining him from last year's offense in running back Chris Rodriguez Jr., and offensive linemen Kenneth Horsey and Eli Cox. Tight end Brenden Bates also has some experience with seven starts, while tight end Izayah Cummings and wide receiver DeMarcus Harris started one game each.



RUNNING BACKS

- Veteran running backs coach John Settle is entering his second season at UK after spending the previous six seasons and 11 years total at Wisconsin.
- The SEC's top returning rusher is senior Chris Rodriguez Jr. Last season, he was named First-Team All-SEC by the Associated Press after totaling 1,379 rushing yards (fifth on UK's single-season list). He ranked second in the SEC and 12th nationally, averaging 106.1 yards per game. He was seventh in the SEC in all-purpose yards (110.8). His nine 100-yard rushing games in 2021 were a single-season school record.
- Rodriguez Jr. currently ranks sixth on UK's alltime rushing list with 2,740 yards. He needs just 1,134 more yards to pass Benny Snell Jr. as UK's all-time leading rusher.
- Rodriguez has proven nearly impossible to bring down behind the line of scrimmage, having lost yardage on just 13 of his 417 career rushing attempts. In 2020, he lost yards on his first attempt of the season before starting a streak of 105 consecutive carries of positive yards.
- Rodriguez has scored a touchdown once every 16.0 rush attempts in his career (26 in 417 attempts). By comparison, UK all-time leading rusher and scorer Benny Snell Jr. hit paydirt once every 15.4 rush attempts.
- Also looking for more reps are senior
 Kavosiey Smoke, junior Mike Drennen, junior
 JuTahn McClain and redshirt freshman La'Vell
 Wright.
- Smoke has played in 34 career games and has 1,306 career yards. He had 81 carries for 416 yards and four scores in 2021, averaging 5.1 per carry. He had a career-high 104 yards in the win over LSU.
- McClain has seen action in 20 career games.
 In 2021, he saw action in nine games and had
 34 rushes for 165 yards (4.8 yards per carry)
 along with six receptions for 42 yards and a score.
- Drennen, who switched from wide receiver to running back during fall camp, saw action in six games in 2021, totaling 21 yards on seven carries.
- Wright played in four games as a true freshman but impressed in his limited playing time. He had four carries for 119 yards and one score, a 41-yard jaunt at Louisville.
- UK has three fullbacks on the roster in seniors Justice Dingle, Dillon Wheatley and Jack Varga. Dingle, who transferred from Georgia Tech in the spring of last year, moved to fullback after playing last season at outside

linebacker. He brings another dimension to the position with his size and bruising north-south style of running.

WIDE RECEIVERS

- Second-year wide receivers coach Scott Woodward has 16 wide receivers, and it includes some experience but is mostly young talent looking for an increased role.
- Gone are Kentucky's two top receivers from last year in Wan'Dale Robinson and Josh Ali. Robinson set single-season school records with 104 catches for 1,334 yards.
- The top returning wide receiver from last season is junior **DeMarcus Harris** who caught 12 passes for 150 yards and one score. Junior **Rahsaan Lewis** saw action in just six games early in the season but missed time due to injury. He had two catches for four yards. Sophomore **Tae Tae Crumes** played in four games and had one catch for 10 yards.
- Woodward has nine new faces in his receivers room this fall. Three players arrived in January as mid-year enrollees in freshman Dane Key, freshman Cole Lanter and senior Virginia Tech transfer Tayvion Robinson.
- **Key**, a four-star prospect, was named the Class 5A Player of the Year after an outstanding senior season at Fredrick Douglass High School in Lexington with 959 receiving yards and nine touchdowns.
- Lanter accepted a preferred walk-on position after a stellar high school career at Boyle County High School. He combined for 2,253 receiving yards and 35 receiving touchdowns, including 78 catches for 1,288 yards and 21 receiving touchdowns as a senior. His 21 receiving touchdowns and 78 receptions led the state and were school records. His 1,288 receiving yards ranked second in the state.
- Robinson comes to the Bluegrass after three seasons and 36 games at Virginia Tech. He compiled 113 receptions for 1,555 yards and nine touchdowns (eight receiving, one punt return TD) in his career as a Hokie.
- Other newcomers are Tennessee transfer Dee Beckwith and true freshmen Jordan Anthony, Barion Brown and Brandon White. Anthony and White are known as two of the fastest high schoolers in the sport of track.
- Redshirting in 2021 and looking to make an impact this season are freshmen **Dekel Crowdus** and **Chris Lewis**.
- Kentucky had 12 different players (wide receivers, running backs and tight ends) catch

two or more passes in 2021 and seven of them return in 2022.

TIGHT ENDS

- Tight ends coach Vince Marrow once again has one of the most experienced and talented groups on the team with Keaton Upshaw, Brenden Bates, Izayah Cummings and Jordan Dingle returning.
- The Wildcats' key loss at tight end was fouryear letter winner Justin Rigg. He played in a school-record 63 career games with 35 starts, including 16 in a row, and had career totals of 50 catches for 547 yards and five scores, 10.9 yards per catch average.
- **Upshaw** returns after sitting out last season with injury. In 2020, he played in all 11 games and had 16 catches for 198 yards and three TDs, both leading the tight end corps and ranking second on the team overall.
- Bates played in all 13 games with six starts in 2021. He totaled 11 receptions for 70 yards and one score.
- Cummings, who moved to tight end from receiver in fall camp last season, still has impressive ball skills from his wide receiver days. He finished his sophomore season with 14 catches for 195 yards, 13.9 yards per catch, and three touchdowns.
- **Dingle** is coming off a redshirt season and the coaches really like his frame and potential. He saw action in four games as a true freshman and had totaled two catches for 54 yards.
- The tight ends were key blockers for UK's explosive running game, which averaged nearly 200 yards per game and ranked fifth in the SEC.

 New to the tight end room is freshman Josh Kattus and preferred walk-on Jack Monday.
 Kattus had 42 catches for 553 yards and one score at Archbishop Moeller in 2021. HIs dad is former Cincinnati Bengals tight end Eric Kattus.
 Monday had 36 catches for 439 yards and eight scores as a senior at Lexington Catholic.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- Zach Yenser, originally from Fort Mitchell, Kentucky, returned to his home state after three seasons with the 49ers. Prior to that, he spent three seasons at Kansas (2015-17) as the run game coordinator/offensive line coach and had coaching stints at Southern Methodist (2018), California (2013-14), Louisiana Tech (2010-12), Colquitt County High School (2009) and Henderson State (2008). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Troy University in 2007, working with special teams and the offensive lineman under former Wildcat and beloved UK assistant coach John Schlarman.
- The O-line, known as the "Big Blue Wall" returns two of its five starters from 2021 in Eli Cox and Kenneth Horsey.
- The three starters lost are All-American right tackle Darian Kinnard, All-SEC center Luke Fortner and All-SEC left tackle Dare Rosenthal. Fortner was drafted by the Jaguars in the third round, while Kinnard was drafted by the Chiefs in the fifth round. Along with Rosenthal, the trio combined for 38 starts on the line for the Wildcats last season.
- Another key loss was backup Austin Dotson. He saw action in 40 career games with eight starts in his four-year career. In 2021, he saw action in all 13 games with four starts at right guard.
- The O-line does return 30 career starts in 2021 in Cox with nine and Horsey 21. Auburn transfer **Tashawn Manning** has experience as well, playing in 30 career games with 21 career starts.
- Horsey has manned the left guard spot for two seasons and is now the Wildcats' most experienced lineman with 25 career games and 21 career starts. An interesting note about Horsey he had open-heart surgery in April of 2018 and was named winner of the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year.
- Cox played at right guard in the first nine games last season before a hand injury sidelined him for the season. Prior to the injury, Cox earned Associated Press and ESPN Midseason All-America honors. He has been

described as, pound-for-pound, perhaps the strongest player on the team and because of that, and with Fortner gone at the center position, look for Cox to be a front runner for that position this year. He's already been listed on the watch list for the Outland Trophy, given to the nation's top interior lineman.

- Also looking to step in starting and supporting roles are senior Quintin Wilson, junior Jeremy Flax, sophomores R.J. Adams, Deondre Buford and John Young and redshirt freshmen Jager Burton, Paul Rodriguez and David Wohlabaugh. Also improving their skills are sophomores Jonathan Berry, Josh Jones and Lucas Padgett.
- In addition to Auburn transfer Tashawn Manning, two mid-year enrollees and Kentucky natives possess the size and athletic ability to make an immediate impact on the "Big Blue Wall." Freshman Kiyaunta Goodwin of Louisville was a five-star signee and the highest-ranked recruit in UK history. Standing at 6-foot-8 and 355 pounds, he was the rated as the nation's No. 25 overall recruit and the No. 4 tackle according to 247Sports. Freshman Grant Bingham, a 6-6, 302-pound lineman, was a four-start recruit and rated as the No. 36 offensive tackle in the country by 247Sports. His athleticism is unique for a lineman as he advanced to the state's regional tennis championship in doubles for Johnson Central High School.
- The "Big Blue Wall," along with UK tight ends, have helped Kentucky post six consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards, with at least one 1,000-yard individual in five of those.

six starters in DB Tyrell Ajian, ILB Jacquez Jones, WLB DeAndre Square, DB Carrington Valentine, OLB J.J. Weaver and LB Jordan Wright.

• Despite injuries to key players on defense throughout the 2021 season, the Wildcats ranked fourth in the SEC in scoring defense (21.7 points per game) and yardage allowed (just 340.7 yards per game). UK's total defense has ranked in the Top 5 of the SEC for three straight seasons.



COUCH ON THE BALLOT

Former Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch has been named to the 2023 ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, the National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame announced. Couch is one of 80 players and nine coaches from the Football Bowl Subdivision and 96 players and 33 coaches from the divisional ranks.

A storied name of the Kentucky program, Couch, was the team's quarterback from 1996-98. After giving up his senior season of eligibility, he was drafted as the No. 1 pick by Cleveland in the 1999 NFL Draft. In 1998, the junior quarterback was named a first-team All-American and consensus Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Couch completed 400 of 553 passes for 4,275 yards and 36 touchdowns and led the nation in pass completions while ranked second in completion percentage, passing yardage and touchdown passes, and fourth in total offense. After guiding the Wildcats to the Outback Bowl, UK's first New Year's Day bowl appearance in 47 years, Couch finished fourth in Heisman Trophy balloting. He was also a finalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award as a junior and sophomore. His breakout sophomore campaign featured 363 of 547 passes completed for 3,884 yards and 37 touchdowns while leading the nation in pass attempts, completions, yardage, and completion percentage. Also during his sophomore year, Couch earned second-team All-SEC honors and finished ninth in Heisman voting. He played in seven games as a true freshman, with two starts. Career wise, Couch completed 795 passes on 1,184 attempts for 8,435 yards and 74 touchdowns. The legend ended his career with seven NCAA records, 14 SEC records, and 26 school records.

Couch, also a standout at Leslie County High School in Hyden, Kentucky, was inducted into the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) National High School Hall of Fame in

• Former Wildcat Anwar Stewart is in his third season coaching the defensive line. Three starters are gone from 2021, including two who are currently on NFL rosters in nose guard Marquan McCall (Panthers) and defensive







end Josh Paschal (Lions). Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald also had nine starts last season and totaled 12 tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss.

- With Paschal drafted in the second round of the NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions, Stewart has now produced three NFL Draft choices in the last three seasons. Quinton Bohanna was a sixith-round pick by the Dallas Cowboys and Phil Hoskins was a seventh-round pick by the Panthers, both of whom earned a spot on their teams in 2021.
- Three key returnees are **Josaih Hayes** (saw action in all 13 games with one start at nose guard), **Octavious Oxendine** (played in six games with three starts at tackle before injury), **Justin Rogers** (played in all 13 games with four starts at nose guard) and **Tre'vonn Rybka** (played in 12 games with one start at defensive end).
- Redshirt freshmen Jamarius Dinkins and Kahlil Saunders are working hard for more playing time this season. Dinkins saw action in three games last season, while Saunders got in four games. Both have the physical attributes to compete in the SEC as Dinkins is 6-foot-5 and 296 pounds and Saunders is 6-5 and 287 pounds.
- Key losses on the defensive line are Paschal and McCall. Paschal totaled 37 career TFL and 13.5 sacks, along with three blocked kicks in his career. He ranks tied for third on the school's all-time TFL list. In 2021, Paschal, who earned second-team All-America and first-team All-SEC honors, led the team in tackles for loss (15.5) and quarterback hurries (8). McCall finished with nine tackles, 3.5 for loss and two QBH in '21. He missed three games because of an ankle injury but returned to be a force in the middle at nose guard.
- Working to see more playing time is sophomore **Sam Anaele** along with senior walk-ons **Alex Bascom**, **Richard Bascom** and junior **Isaiah Beasley.**
- New additions are Ohio State transfer **Darrion Henry-Young** and freshmen **Tomiwa Durojaiye** and **Deone Walker**. Henry-Young was a four-star prospect coming out of high school and went on to play two seasons for the Buckeyes but saw action in just four games at defensive end. Durojaiye has a lot of potential and room for growth. He has drawn some lofty comparisons to former UK All-American and defensive Player of the Year Josh Allen with his size and body frame. Durojaiye was named the 2021 Delaware 3A Defensive Player of the Year. Walker, a four-star prospect, from Detroit, has the size at 6-foot-6, 330-pounds to make an impact immediately.

SECONDARY

- The secondary unit is in the hands of two of the most energetic and talented young coaches in Chris Collins (defensive backs) and Frank Buffano (safeties).
- UK has ranked in the top four of the SEC in pass defense in three of the last four seasons, including leading the league in both 2019 and 2020.
- UK has four key veterans to replace, three who totaled 17 or more starts in their career. They are defensive back Cedrick Dort, Jr. (44 career games, 26 career starts), defensive back Quandre Mosely (36 career games, four career starts), safety Yusuf Corker (49 career games, 36 career starts) and safety Davonte Robinson (49 career games, 17 career starts).
- Another big loss came early in spring practice when junior and top returning nickelback **Vito Tisdale** went down with knee injury. He will miss the entire 2022 season. He played in nine games with two starting nods in '21, totaling 21 tackles and 1.5 tackles for loss. Junior defensive

back Taj Dodson will miss some of spring practice with a shoulder injury.

- Two key starters return in "Super Senior" Tyrell Ajian (48 career games, 23 career starts) and junior Carrington Valentine (started in 12 games in '21). Ajian had 46 tackles, four pass breakups and one interception as a safety in 2021, while Valentine ranked fourth on the team last season with 61 tackles and added five pass breakups, 1.5 tackles for loss and one quarterback hurry.
- Another key returnee is junior Jalen Geiger (13 games and two starts in '21) who made his first career start on Nov. 13, 2021 at Vanderbilt and made it memorable with a 31-yard interception return for a touchdown. He finished the season with 18 tackles, one tackle for loss, one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry.
- Collins and Buffano have a group of young talent to mold and shape in sophomore **Andru** Phillips (9 games with three tackles in '21) and redshirt freshmen Maxwell Hairston and Jordan Lovett.
- Nine new defensive backs will don the Blue and White this fall. True freshmen Alex Afari Jr., Kobi Albert, Elijah Reed and Andre Stewart along with walk-on Brady Pierce will team up with Texas State transfer Zion Childress, Mississippi State transfer Londyn Craft, Livingstone College transfer Jordan Robinson and Ole Miss transfer Keidron Smith. Smith comes with great experience, totaling 224 tackles, five interceptions and five forced fumbles during his time with the Rebels.
- Reed and Robinson have similar stories in that both have only played the DB position for about a year. Reed is a raw talent who opted to reclassify and take an extra year at Pleasure Ridge Park in Louisville. He also opted to change positions, moving from wide receiver to cornerback as a senior at PRP. The position switch paid off and Reed's upside is huge. Robinson also switched to DB his senior year of high school but only played in four games before COVID-19 shut his season down. He played in 10 games as a DB last season at Livingstone College, a Division II school in N.C.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

• Only two letterwinners return for Brad White's outside linebackers group in junior J.J. Weaver and "Super Senior" Jordan Wright but the duo's experience and leadership should make a huge impact on and off the field for

- the defense. Weaver and Wright have played in a combined 66 games with 19 starting assignments between them.
- Wright and Weaver both had outstanding seasons in 2021 -- Wright with 30 tackles, four tackles for loss, six pass breakups and a sack, while Weaver had 34 tackles, 10.0 tackles for loss, a team-high 6.0 sacks, four quarterback hurries, two interceptions, a forced fumble and a pass breakup. Weaver was named one of the three award winners for the 2021 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year, returning to play after sitting out the 2020 season with an ACL injury. He was named third-Team All-SEC by Phil Steele and is an absolute playmaker.
- Wright saw limited action in the spring after undergoing shoulder surgery in January but is ready to go for the fall.
- Sophomore Jai Williams was added to the outside linebackers group after moving from tight end. He's still developing but at 6-foot-5 he has a good frame and he played the position in high school. He's also a tough, hard-nosed player that was a wrestler and played on his high school's rugby team. Williams is the son of James Williams, also known as "Big Cat" who played 12 seasons on the offensive line for the Chicago Bears.
- True freshmen Tyrese Fearbry, Noah Matthews and Keaten Wade are young but have the body frames and potential to make an impact early.

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

- The inside linebackers have a new coach in Mike Stoops. He replaced former Wildcat Jon Sumrall who left UK after three seasons to become the head coach at Troy. Stoops most recently was at Florida Atlantic where he spent the 2021 season as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach. Prior to that he spent two seasons (2019 and 2020) at Alabama as an analyst on Nick Saban's staff, highlighted by the 2020 national championship. He also was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Oklahoma from 2012-18 and was the head coach at Arizona from 2004-11. He had a first term at Oklahoma from 1999-2003, including the 2000 national championship season.
- The inside linebackers are led by two returning "Super Seniors" and starters in Jacquez Jones and DeAndre Square.
- Jones, who transferred last year after three seasons at Ole Miss, started every game for the Wildcats in 2021 and led the team with



86 tackles. He made three huge plays in pass defense -- an interception vs. Missouri, a touchdown-saving pass breakup vs. Chattanooga and game-saving tipped pass to seal the Florida win. He also had a career-high 18 tackles at Mississippi State. All totaled, Jones is on track to reach the 300-tackle club as he has 268 in his career.

- Square (49 career games, 35 career starts) was third-leading tackler in 2021 with 80 tackles, including 9.5 tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks. He also had three quarterback hurries. Square hauled in the game-winning interception in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl vs. Iowa.
- Junior D'Eryk Jackson has an impressive comeback story and looks to be getting even stronger this spring. He suffered a torn Achilles tendon in last year's spring practice and had surgery on April 13, expecting to miss the entire season. Instead, he returned to full practice activity on Oct. 28 and saw his first action of the season at Vanderbilt on Nov. 13. In four games played in '21, he totaled 18 tackles, a quarterback hurry and an interception.
- Sophomores Martez Thrower and Trevin Wallace are also two players to watch. Wallace solidified himself as a breakout candidate last season after helping turn the Florida game when he caught a blocked field goal in midair and raced untouched 76 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. Making his first collegiate start at Mississippi State, he notched 12 tackles and was named SEC Freshman of the Week. For the season, he has played in 12 games, had 32







tackles and was named to the Freshman All-SEC team. Thrower saw action in eight games and had six tackles and a quarterback hurry.

- Junior **Luke Fulton** saw most of his action on special teams last season. He made signficant progress in the spring and provides quality depth.
- Walk-ons Braxton Eiserman and "Super Senior" William Nalty provide depth.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Special teams are coached by running backs coach John Settle and safeties coach Frank Buffano for the second season.
- The Wildcats return all of their key specialists except their return men. They will need to replace punt returner Josh Ali and kickoff returner Zach Johnson. Looking to fill those voids are Tayvion Robinson, Dekel Crowdus, Michael Drennen and JuTahn McClain.
- "Super Senior" **Matt Ruffolo** decided to come back for his sixth and final season of eligibility. After graduating in May with his MBA, he's currently working on a second master's degree in finance. As UK's starting placekicker last season, he made 10-of-13 field goals, with two misses coming on blocked kicks caused by a breakdown in protection. For his career, Ruffolo has made 26-of-32 FG and 94-of-99 PAT. Making 81 percent of his field goals places him third on UK's career list. Ruffolo's 54 PATs in 2021 was a UK single-season record.
- Poore handles kickoffs for the Wildcats. He also has placekicking experience, as he made 8-of-14 FGs and 32-of-34 PATs in his career.
- Freshman Jackson Smith, son of former Wildcat punter Andy Smith, was the top kicker/punter in the 2022 class according to ProKicker. com. He was a three-time National Specialist of the Year and he helped lead Boyle County to an impressive 52-3 overall record in his prep career.
- Competing for the punting duties are senior Colin Goodfellow and Aussie transplant Wilson Berry. Berry started the first two games of last season before being sidelined with a back injury. Goodfellow came in and didn't miss a beat. He emerged as one of the nation's best punters, averaging 45.9 yards per kick, which ranked the second-highest average for a season in school history. He also is on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's top punter. Against Georgia, Goodfellow had a career-long 70-yard punt and an additional 63-yarder. It is the only time in school history a

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KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 319 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 177-138-4 record (.562), 41-22 (.651) under Mark Stoops.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 60,261 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 16 of the last 18 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years.
 *Note: Kroger Field capacity was limited to 12,000 fans per game in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with

UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-ofthe-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as hometeam facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

<u>Seating Capacity:</u> 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites

<u>Playing Field:</u> UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Ole Miss, Mississippi State and Missouri. The end zones and team sideline areas feature a checkerboard pattern in alternating shades of blue. It was designed to mimic the pattern of Secretariat's silks, which has been part of the football uniforms for five seasons. The school's new interlocking "UK" logo is positioned in the center of the field.

<u>Video Boards:</u> Two new 10 mm LED video boards were installed in the summer of 2022 by Formetco Sports. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

<u>Sound System:</u> Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. Therefore, the Cat Walk was moved to Talbott Todd Way. The Cat Walk typically begins outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, and the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House. It was dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65) who passed away from ALS in August of 2017 and was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team walks to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

The Kentucky football program continues to stack an impressive set of milestones under the leadership of Mark Stoops.

On Jan. 1, when Kentucky took the field for the Vrbo Citrus Bowl, it made official a school-record six consecutive bowl games – all under Stoops – surpassing the mark of five straight bowls from 2006-10.

And, when the Wildcats rallied to defeat lowa -- UK's 10th fourth-quarter comeback victory during the last six seasons -- it also marked a school-record fourth-straight bowl win.

The victory over the Hawkeyes was UK's 16th in a row vs. non-conference opponents, the longest active streak in the nation.

Kentucky finished the season with a 10-3 record, only the fourth time in school history (twice in the last four years under Stoops) that the Wildcats have reached double-digit victories. UK began the season with a 6-0 start for the first time since 1950, when the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant patrolled the sidelines in Lexington.

The 2021 campaign featured a 5-3 tally in the Southeastern Conference. UK finished in sole possession of second place in the SEC Eastern Division, the first time the Wildcats were solely in second since the league split into divisions in 1992.

More milestones loom in the near future. When the Wildcats begin the 2022 season, it will be Stoops' 10th year at UK, longer than any coach in school history.

In addition, Stoops has 59 wins in the Blue and White, needing only two more triumphs to surpass the school standard of 60 set by Bryant.

As quickly as the achievements have come recently, Stoops' success has been far from easy.

Inheriting a program that was 2-10 in 2012, the year before he arrived, Stoops' rebuilding efforts took time. Two games into the 2016 season his record was 12-26, but the program took off from there and the coach has engineered a 47-27 (63.5%) mark since.

In addition to the numerous landmarks above, a partial accounting of Stoops' achievements features:







STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

In nine seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's 10 classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Kentucky's Signing Day class for 2022, at the time of this writing, is UK's highest-rated class in the available history of recruiting rankings. (Note: these rankings are based on UK's 20 signees, 19 high school and one junior college, and do not include four-year college transfers Tashawn Manning and Tayvion Robinson.)

In addition to the team accomplishments, several of Stoops' players have won All-America accolades, along with honors such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Jason Witten Man of the Year, Pop Warner Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last six seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, taking over a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in

the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final USA Today coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.



Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State. Mark and Mike have reunited in Lexington, as Mike has joined the UK staff as inside linebackers coach.

Prior to Arizona, Mark Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons,

Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.

VInce Marrow, aka the "Big Dawg," enters his 10th season at Kentucky, currently handling the duties of associate head coach/tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator/NFL liasison.

Marrow's tight ends have been a big factor in UK producing six consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards with at least one 1,000-yard rusher in five of those (Stanley "Boom" Williams -2016; Benny Snell Jr., - 2017, 2018; Lynn Bowden - 2019; Chris Rodriguez Jr. - 2021). Marrow also has been instrumental in UK signing nine straight top-50 recruiting classes, including the highest-rated class in UK history in 2021.

Marrow had a professional playing career as a member of NFL rosters on five teams, including Buffalo, Carolina, New York Jets, Chicago and San Francisco. After his NFL days ended, Marrow played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 1998, earning all-league honors with 32 receptions for 345 yards. He also played for the Orlando Rage in the XFL in 2001.

He began his collegiate playing career at Youngstown State before transferring to Toledo. Marrow played two seasons at Toledo, earning second-team All-MAC honors in 1991 before being drafted by the Bills in 1992.
