- 1** Head coach Kirk Ferentz is one bowl win shy of tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 9-9 bowl record with the nine bowl victories tying Barry Alvarez for the second-most in league history.
- 2** LB Jack Campbell is the recipient of the 2022 William V. Campbell Trophy, an award that recognizes an individual as the absolute best in the nation for their combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership. He is the first Hawkeye to receive the honor and the seventh player to be a NFF National Scholar Athlete.
- 3** The nation's top linebacker. LB Jack Campbell is the first Hawkeye to receive the Butkus Award, which is presented to the nation's top linebacker. The Cedar Falls, Iowa, native had a team-high 118 tackles in 2022, his second straight 100+ tackle season (261 over last two seasons). Campbell was also the Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year in 2022.
- 4** TE Sam LaPorta is the second Hawkeye to earn the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year Award and he was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award, which is given to the nation's top tight end.
- 5** RB Kaleb Johnson, an honorable mention Freshman All-American and honorable mention All-Big Ten selection, has three 100-yard games this season – the most by a Hawkeye freshman running back in program history. Johnson has a freshman record 762 yards on 142 attempts this season with a team-high six touchdowns to go along with a team-best 1,114 all-purpose yards.
- 6** A stout defense. The Hawkeyes held eight opponents at 10 or fewer points during the regular season – a first for the program since 1929. Iowa is limiting opponents to 277.9 yards and 14.4 points per game. Nine Hawkeye defenders earned All-Big Ten recognition.
- 7** Campbell is the 29th Hawkeye to earn consensus All-America honors and the 13th to be a unanimous consensus first-team All-American. It is the fourth straight year Iowa has had a consensus All-American. Under Kirk Ferentz, 26 players have earned first-team All-America status.
- 8** New Hawkeye QB... With starting QB Spencer Petras injured and QB Alex Padilla in the transfer portal, the Hawkeyes will turn to QBs Joe Labas or Carson May in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl. Labas is a 6-foot-4 redshirt freshman from Brecksville, Ohio, while May is a 6-4 true freshman from Jones, Oklahoma.
- 9** Dynamic Duo... LBs Jack Campbell and Seth Benson have combined for 206 tackles this season. The two All-Big Ten linebackers have combined for 546 tackles in their Hawkeye careers; Campbell is 19th all-time with 295 and Benson is 34th with 251.
- 10** K Drew Stevens has made 16-of-18 field goal attempts this season, which are the most by a Hawkeye freshman in program history. Stevens, who earned College Football News second-team All-America honors, is 6-for-8 from 40+ this season, including 2-for-2 from beyond 50. The South Carolina native is leading the team with 69 points.

IOWA TO MEET KENTUCKY AT TRANSPERFECT MUSIC CITY BOWL

The University of Iowa football team will face Kentucky in the 2022 TransPerfect Music City Bowl on Dec. 31 in Nashville, Tennessee. Kickoff is set for 11 a.m. (CT) from Nissan Stadium and the game will be televised on ABC.

- The Hawkeyes will be making their 35th bowl game appearance and their first Music City Bowl appearance. Iowa accepted a bid to play in the bowl in 2020 against Missouri, but it was cancelled because of COVID.
The Hawkeyes are facing Kentucky for a second straight season as the Wildcats edged Iowa, 20-17, in the 2022 Vrbo Citrus Bowl. Iowa is 6-6 all-time in bowl games against current Southeastern Conference opponents.
The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 21 times in the last 22 seasons. Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz is one bowl win shy of tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 9-9 bowl record with his nine wins tying Barry Alvarez for second-most in Big Ten history.
Eighteen coaches have won 10 or more bowl games in their career. Among active coaches, only Nick Saban (18), Mack Brown (14), Kyle Whittingham (11), Mike Gundy (11) and Dabo Swinney (11) have more bowl wins than Ferentz.
Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (12) and Wisconsin (11), within the Big Ten, have more bowl wins (including FCS Playoffs and the BCS championship game), than Iowa. Iowa is 17-16-1 all-time in bowl games.

THE SERIES

- The Hawkeyes are 0-1 all-time against Kentucky, falling 20-17 to the Wildcats in the 2022 Vrbo Citrus Bowl in Orlando.
Iowa is 6-6 all-time against opponents from the Southeastern Conference in bowl games.

2022 VRBO CITRUS BOWL RECAP

No. 22 Kentucky's Chris Rodriguez scored the go-ahead touchdown with 1:48 remaining and the Wildcats had the game-clinching interception with 48 seconds to play to down the Hawkeyes, 20-17, at the 2022 Vrbo Citrus Bowl in Orlando. QB Spencer Petras completed 19-of-30 attempts for 211 yards and one touchdown, but he was intercepted three times. RBs Gavin and Leshon Williams combined for 140 yards on 26 attempts and TE Sam LaPorta had seven catches for 122 yards and one touchdown. LBs Jack Campbell (14) and Seth Benson (10) combined for 24 tackles in the contest.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,293 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 683-571-39 (.543). That includes a 424-227-16 (.648) record in home games, a 259-344-23 (.432) record in games away from Iowa City, a 353-389-25 (.477) mark in Big Ten games and a 308-192-15 (.613) record in Kinnick Stadium.

TROPHY COLLECTION

- Iowa is 2-2 in trophy games this season. The Hawkeyes fell 10-7 to Iowa State in their first trophy game of the 2022 season - the team's first loss to the Cyclones since 2014. Iowa reclaimed the Heartland Trophy on Nov. 12, downing Wisconsin, 24-10, in Kinnick Stadium and defeated Minnesota for the eighth straight time, winning 13-10, to retain the Floyd of Rosedale trophy. Nebraska downed Iowa, 24-17, in the regular season finale to claim the Heroes Trophy for the first time since 2013.
Iowa is 27-9 in its last 36 trophy games (includes bowl games and conference championships). The Hawkeyes are 24-8 in their last 32 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin).

HEAD COACH KIRK FERENTZ

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) is in his 24th season as Moon Family Head Football Coach at Iowa. He is the dean of NCAA Division I football coaches and is Iowa's all-time winningest coach, surpassing Hayden Fry in 2019. His contract runs through the 2029 season.



- Named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times in his career (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015). Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year awards.
- Guided Iowa to Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, and Big Ten West Division titles in 2015 and 2021.
- Named Woody Hayes, Eddie Robinson, and Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year in 2015. Was a finalist for the Maxwell Football Club, Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year award.
- Ferentz is fourth all-time with 185 overall wins as a member of the Big Ten. He has 115 Big Ten wins, which ties for third all-time.
- Named the 2002 Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year.
- Iowa has made two BCS bowl appearances, including a 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, and one CFP Bowl (2016).
- Iowa has played in 12 January bowl games with five January bowl victories (2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl, 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl).
- Iowa has posted a 176-94 (.652) overall mark and a 111-69 (.617) Big Ten record since 2001. Ferentz has placed in the top one-half of the conference 16 times, including Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, a second-place finish in 2009, and West Division titles in 2015 and 2021.
- At Iowa, Ferentz holds an overall record of 185-115 (.617) and a 115-83 (.581) mark in Big Ten games. He is Iowa's all-time winningest football coach with 185 wins. In 26 seasons as a college head coach, he holds a career mark of 197-136 (.592), giving him the fourth most wins among active head coaches.
- The only Division I head coach to coach three sons at the same college. Brian, an assistant coach since 2012 and Iowa's offensive coordinator, was a Hawkeye letterman from 2003-05. James was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line before graduating in May, 2013. Steven was a senior offensive lineman in 2016.

FERENTZ AMONG BIG TEN'S BEST

Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz has 115 Big Ten wins as Iowa's head coach, tied for the third most of any coach in Big Ten Conference history. The Hawkeyes defeated Penn State, 41-21, on Nov. 21, 2020, to earn Ferentz' 100th conference win.

- Ferentz' 185 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference rank fourth all-time in league history. He is one of five coaches in Big Ten Conference history to win at least 150 games as a member of the Big Ten Conference. The top five include Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonzo Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Ferentz (184) and Joe Paterno (162).
- Ferentz (185-115) became Iowa's all-time winningest coach on Sept. 1, 2018. The Hawkeyes defeated Northern Illinois, 33-7. It was Ferentz's 144th win as Iowa's head coach, one more than his predecessor, Hayden Fry (143-89-6). Fry coached Iowa for 20 years (1979-98).
- Ferentz has 115 Big Ten victories, which are tied with Amos Alonzo Stagg for third place on the league's all-time conference wins list.
- Both Ferentz (185, 115) and Fry (143, 96) rank in the top 10 in overall wins and Big Ten wins. Only Iowa and Michigan have two coaches ranked in the top 10 of both win categories (Bo Schembechler 194, 143; and Lloyd Carr 122, 81).
- Ferentz is fourth among active coaches with 197 career victories.
- Iowa is the only school in the country to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

FERENTZ TOPS IN LONGEVITY

Kirk Ferentz is in his 24th season as Iowa's head football coach. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football. Ferentz was named Iowa head coach on Dec. 2, 1998. Among Big Ten coaches, only Pat Fitzgerald (2006) has been at his current school for 10 seasons or more.

- Defensive coordinator Phil Parker has been with Ferentz throughout his tenure, as he is in his 24th season on Iowa's staff, including his 11th as defensive coordinator. He is the longest tenured defensive coordinator in FBS.
- Ferentz is the only Division I coach to coach three sons. Brian Ferentz, a former Hawkeye letterman and captain (2003-05), is in his 11th season on Iowa's coaching staff. James Ferentz was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line and a team captain before graduating in 2013. Steven was an offensive lineman and letterwinner in 2015 and 2016. James Ferentz is currently a member of the NFL's New England Patriots, while Steven Ferentz is on the coaching staff of the NFL's Miami Dolphins.

LONGTIME ASSISTANTS

Iowa's coaching staff boasts some of the top longevity in the nation with its assistant coaches. The Hawkeyes are one of five schools nationally with a minimum of five assistants that are entering their seventh-plus year of full-time coaching at the school in 2022.

CAMPBELL IS THE ACADEMIC HEISMAN

Senior LB Jack Campbell is the recipient of the 2022 William V. Campbell Trophy, while also being member of the National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete class. The award is presented to an individual as the absolute best in the nation for their combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.

- Campbell is the first Hawkeye football player to earn the honor and he was the seventh Hawkeye to be named a NFF National Scholar-Athlete.

THE NATION'S BEST LINEBACKER

Senior LB Jack Campbell is the first Hawkeye to win the Butkus Award, which is presented annually to the nation's best linebacker. The Cedar Falls, Iowa, native finished the regular season with 118 tackles – his second straight 100+ tackle season.

- Campbell was also named the Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, the Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year and the Associated Press Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year in 2022. He is the fourth Hawkeye to be named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, joining Leroy Smith (1991), Josey Jewell (2017) and Daviyon Nixon (2020). Iowa has won two of the last three top defensive honors.
- Campbell is the second Hawkeye to take home the Big Ten's top linebacker honors, joining Jewell in 2017.
- Campbell was also a semifinalist for the Bednarik and Rotary Lombardi Awards.
- Head coach Kirk Ferentz has now coached 11 players to 13 national awards during his Hawkeye tenure.

UNANIMOUS CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICAN

Senior LB Jack Campbell is a unanimous consensus All-American, earning first-team honors by Walter Camp, FWAA, Associated Press, Sporting News and AFCA. He is the 13th Hawkeye to be a unanimous consensus All-American (10th under head coach Kirk Ferentz) and the 29th consensus All-American all-time (14 under Ferentz). The program now has 31 consensus All-Americans.

- Iowa has had a consensus All-American in four consecutive seasons for the first time in program history and a unanimous consensus All-America in three straight years.
- Under Ferentz, 26 players have earned first-team All-America status on at least one team.

ALL-AMERICA NODS

Along with Campbell, the Hawkeyes had four additional players garner All-America distinction.

- Junior P Tory Taylor earned first-team All-America by the FWAA and second-team honors by The Associated Press and CBSsports.com/247Sports.com. The Australian averaged 45.1 yards on 74 punts and opponents are averaging just 3.7 yards on 18 returns.

- Senior DB Kaevon Merriweather garnered first-team All-America honors by the AP and CBS Sports/247Sports.com and second-team by Sporting News. The Michigan native had three interceptions and 47 tackles in 2022.
- Freshman K Drew Stevens and RB Kaleb Johnson were honored by the College Football News as Freshman All-Americans. Stevens was named to the second-team after kicking an Iowa freshman record 16 field goals and scoring a team-best 69 points in 2022. Johnson was an honorable mention selection after rushing for a freshman record 762 rushing yards and scoring six touchdowns, including three 100-yard games.

THE BIG TEN'S BEST TIGHT END IS A MACKAY FINALIST

Senior TE Sam LaPorta was named the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year for the 2022 season. The Edwardsville, Illinois, native is the second Hawkeye to earn the distinction, joining T.J. Hockenson in 2018.

- LaPorta is leading the team with 53 receptions for 601 yards and one touchdown in 2022. It is the second straight year LaPorta has led the Hawkeyes in catches and receiving yards.
- LaPorta was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award, which is presented to the nation's top tight end, along with Notre Dame's Michael Mayer and Georgia's Brock Bowers.

BIG TEN ALL-CONFERENCE HONOREES

Fifteen University of Iowa football student-athletes garnered All-Big Ten recognition for the 2022 season. Five Hawkeyes – LB Jack Campbell, DB Riley Moss, DB Cooper DeJean, TE Sam LaPorta and P Tory Taylor – earned first-team honors by either the coaches or media.

- Campbell was a first-team selection by both the coaches and media, while Moss earned first-team honors by the coaches and DeJean by the media. (Moss was a second-team selection by media; DeJean was second team by coaches.)
- LB Seth Benson and DL Lukas Van Ness earned second-team honors on both teams, while DL Joe Evans was a second-team selection by the media and honorable mention by the coaches. DLs Logan Lee and Noah Shannon and DB Kaevon Merriweather also earned honorable mention honors on both teams.
- Offensively, LaPorta earned first-team All-Big Ten honors by both the coaches and media. RB Kaleb Johnson earned honorable mention recognition by the coaches and media and OL Mason Richman was an honorable mention selection by the coaches.
- Taylor was a first-team All-Big Ten selection by the media and third team by the coaches, while K Drew Stevens earned second-team honors from the media and was a third teamer by the coaches.
- Merriweather was also tabbed as Iowa's Big Ten Sportsmanship Award honoree.

AP ALL-BIG

Nine Hawkeyes earned All-Big Ten recognition by The Associated Press and LB Jack Campbell was named the AP Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year. Campbell and TE Sam LaPorta were named first-team All-Big Ten, while K Drew Stevens, DL Lukas Van Ness, L Seth Benson, DB Riley Moss, DB Cooper DeJean, DB Kaevon Merriweather and P Tory Taylor were second-team honorees.

MERRIWEATHER OPTS OUT TO PREPARE FOR NFL DRAFT

DB Kaevon Merriweather announced Dec. 17 that he was opting out of the 2022 TransPerfect Music City Bowl to prepare for the 2023 NFL Draft. The Michigan native earned first-team All-America honors by the AP and CBS Sports/247Sports.com in 2022. Merriweather appeared in 45 career games as a Hawkeye with 27 starts, where he had 118 tackles and four interceptions.

MEET THE (NEW) QBs

With three-year starting QB Spencer Petras injured and QB Alex Padilla in the transfer portal, the Hawkeyes will turn to a pair of underclassmen under center. Neither have taken a snap in 2022.

- QB Joe Labas is a redshirt freshman from Brecksville, Ohio, where he was a two-time Suburban League National Conference Co-Offensive Player of the Year. As a senior, Labas passed for 2,349 yards and 16 touchdowns.
- QB Carson May is a true freshman from Jones, Oklahoma. The 6-foot-4, 221-pounder was a NewsOK Super 30 senior, while earning all-state honors as a senior and he was the Oklahoma Class 2A Player of the Year. May passed for 8,549 yards and 107 touchdowns during his prep career, which included completing 198-of-308 attempts for 3,082 yards and 37 touchdowns as a senior.

ONE OF THE BEST HAWKEYE D'S

Iowa's defense is limiting opponents to 277.9 yards and 14.4 points through 12 games.

- The 273.3 yards would be the lowest allowed by a Hawkeye defense since 2009 (276.5).
- The 14.4 points would be the lowest since 2019 (14.0).

COOP DOES IT ALL

DB Cooper DeJean was a one-man wrecking crew in Iowa's 24-10 win over Wisconsin. The Odebolt, Iowa, native had a 32-yard interception return for a touchdown – his second pick six of the season – and he had 10 tackles for his second double-digit tackle game this season.

- On special teams, DeJean downed a punt at the one to flip field position and he followed with a career-long 41-yard punt return to set up a Hawkeye touchdown. He had a career-high four returns for 82 yards in the game.

LAPORTA BREAKS TIGHT END MARK

Senior TE Sam LaPorta became Iowa's career receptions leader amongst tight ends during Iowa's road game at No. 2 Ohio State when he totaled six catches for 55 yards. The Illinois native moved past the 1,500 career receiving yards mark against Northwestern; he has 148 receptions for 1,730 yards. LaPorta is 15th in program history in receiving yards and ranks second all-time amongst Hawkeye tight ends, just 95 yards behind Hawkeye All-American Marv Cook.

- LaPorta was targeted 16 times at Illinois on Oct. 8 and finished with a career-high nine receptions for 101 yards and he finished with three receptions for 71 yards and one touchdown – his first of the season – in the road win at Purdue. He had a career-long 58-yard reception on Iowa's first offensive play in the win at Minnesota and had four catches for 95 yards before leaving the game because of injury late in the first quarter. LaPorta missed Iowa's regular season finale against Nebraska because of injury.

- LaPorta is leading Big Ten tight ends in both receptions and receiving yards this season, as he has 53 receptions for 601 yards and one touchdown. His reception total is fourth-most nationally amongst tight ends and he is fifth in receiving yards.
- He is the first Hawkeye tight end to lead the team in receptions and receiving yards in consecutive seasons.

- LaPorta has had at least one reception in 14 straight games in which he has played and in 23 of his last 24 contests. He has been Iowa's top receiver in nine of 12 games in 2022.
- LaPorta led the team in receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns (tied) in 2021 when he had 53 catches for 670 yards and three touchdowns. He led Big Ten tight ends in receptions, yards, yards after catch (299), yards after contact (206) and catches of 15+ yards (18) in 2021.

- Prior to 2022, Iowa has been ranked in the AP Top 25 at least once in each of the last seven seasons, the third-longest streak in school history.
- Iowa finished the 2021 season ranked 23rd in the coaches' poll and 23rd in the AP poll. It marked the 26th time in program history that Iowa finished the season ranked in the top 25. Iowa has finished ranked 15th or better in the AP poll six times in 23 completed seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

THE NUMBERS BEHIND THE WINNING STREAK

- The Hawkeyes averaged 23.5 points during their four-game winning streak. Offensively, Iowa averaged 300 yards in the four games with the rushing attack averaging 105.8 yards per game.
- Iowa put together its two best offensive performances in consecutive weeks, finishing with a season-high 33 points and 398 yards total offense against Northwestern and 376 yards total offense at Purdue.
- The team’s rushing attack churned out 178 yards against the Wildcats and a season-high 184 yards in West Lafayette.
- The 398 yards against Northwestern were the most for the team since gaining 428 yards at Maryland (W, 51-14) in 2021.
- Iowa had a season-long 91-yard scoring drive at Purdue, which was capped by Sam LaPorta’s first touchdown reception of the season.
- The Hawkeyes scored on their first four offensive possessions to start the game (FG, TD, FG, TD) against Northwestern and on seven of their eight offensive possessions. (Iowa scored on nine straight offensive possessions at Maryland in 2021).

KJ2 = RECORD

Freshman RB Kaleb Johnson is leading the team with 762 rushing yards on 142 carries, which are the most rushing yards by a Hawkeye freshman in program history (passing Tyler Goodson’s 638 yards, 2019). Johnson has three 100-yard games and a team-high six touchdowns.

- Johnson had his first career 200-yard game (second career 100-yard game), finishing with 200 yards on 22 attempts with one touchdown – his fourth of the season – in the road win at Purdue. The yardage and attempts were both career highs.
- The 200 rushing yards are the 18th-most in a single game in program history and the second-most by a Hawkeye freshman all-time (Marcus Coker, 219 vs. Missouri, Insight Bowl). He is the first Hawkeye to rush for 200 yards in a game since 2015.
- Johnson tallied his third 100-yard game, rushing for 109 yards on 16 attempts with one touchdown against Nebraska. He had a 44-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, tying his third longest rush of the season. Johnson is the first Hawkeye with three 100+ yard rushing games in a single season.
- Johnson had a career-long 75-yard touchdown run on the second play of the third quarter at Purdue. It is Iowa’s longest rush since Tyler Goodson’s 80-yard touchdown run against Wisconsin in 2020.
- Johnson rushed for his first 100-yard game in his third career contest, finishing with 103 yards on seven carries and scoring two touchdowns against Nevada on Sept. 17. The Ohio native had touchdown runs of 40 and 55 yards to become the first Hawkeye in at least the last 20 years to have two rushing touchdowns of 40+ yards in a single game.
- Johnson is the first Iowa freshman to eclipse 100 yards since Tyler Goodson (13-116-1 TD) at Nebraska in 2019. Johnson is also the first Iowa freshman with 100+ yards and two touchdowns in a game since Coker in the 2010 Insight Bowl.
- Johnson has a team-high 1,114 all-purpose yards, averaging 92.8 yards per game. He is averaging 25 yards per kickoff return.

TURNOVER FREE

The Hawkeyes posted a 5-1 record during the regular season when they didn’t commit a turnover. The lone loss was the 27-14 home loss to No. 4 Michigan on Oct. 1.

IOWA’S DEFENSE..

- is No. 1 in FBS, allowing 4.10 yards per play.
- has given up 200 or fewer yards in five games.
- has held opponents to 13 or fewer points in nine of 12 games, eight opponents at 10 or fewer points and three at three or fewer points. It is the first time since 1929 that the defense has allowed 10 or fewer points in eight games. The 1929 team gave up 28 points the entire eight-game season.
- has held eight opponents under 100 yards rushing. Iowa limited Northwestern to 18 yards on Oct. 29 – the fewest since holding Northern Iowa to six yards in 2018. They were the sixth-fewest rushing yards allowed in the Kirk Ferentz era and the fewest allowed against a Big Ten foe since limiting Minnesota to seven yards in 2008.
- has held 10 opponents below their season scoring average and all 12 opponents below their season total offense average.
- kept Purdue out of the end zone, allowing only a second quarter field goal. It was the first time in 62 games (dating back to 2017) that the Boilermakers didn’t score a touchdown.

- is second in defensive touchdowns (4), fourth in total defense (277.9), sixth in scoring defense (14.4), seventh in team passing efficiency defense (108.96), ninth in passing yards allowed (173.8), 11th in first downs defense (193), 13th in rushing defense (104.1), 20th in interceptions (13), 21st in third-down conversion defense (.325) and 25th in turnovers gained (21).

SACK YOU VERY MUCH

Iowa registered a season-high seven sacks against Northwestern, with all seven sacks coming from different Hawkeyes – DL Lukas Van Ness, DL Deontae Craig, DL Ethan Hurkett, DL Logan Lee, DL Noah Shannon, LB Seth Benson and DL Joe Evans. The seven sacks are the most for the program against a Big Ten team since tallying seven sacks against Northwestern in 2000. (Iowa had seven sacks last season against Kent State.)

- Iowa also had 10 tackles for loss against Northwestern – its second game with 10+ TFL this season. Van Ness leads the team with 9.5 TFL.

DYNAMO DREW

True freshman walk-on K Drew Stevens is 16-for-18 on field goal attempts this season – the most field goals by a Hawkeye freshman all-time (passing Mike Meyer and Nate Kaeding). The South Carolina native is 7-for-7 from 20-29 yards, 3-for-3 from 30-39 yards, 4-of-6 from 40-49 and 2-2 from 50+. Stevens is tops in the Big Ten and 14th nationally with an .889 field goal percentage and third in the Big Ten in field goals per game (1.33).

- Stevens was one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza National Collegiate Place-Kicker Award.
- Stevens made a career-long 54-yard field goal in Iowa's 33-13 win over Northwestern. It was one of a career-high four field goal makes against the Wildcats, which led to him earning Big Ten Freshman of the Week and Groza Stars of the Week honors on Oct. 31. The 54-yarder is tied for the seventh-longest in program history and it is the longest by a Hawkeye since Marshall Koehn drilled a 57-yarder in 2015.
- He made two field goals at Minnesota – from 38 and 21 yards. The 21-yard field goal was a game-winner with 28 seconds remaining in the game.
- Stevens had his string of seven straight makes snapped at Purdue when he missed a 44-yarder in the 20+ mph windy conditions (hit the left upright).
- Stevens also drilled a 51-yarder on the road at Rutgers, which was tied for the 11th-longest all-time, and he converted from 49 yards at Ohio State.
- He is leading the team with 69 points via 16 field goals and 21 extra points. Stevens is Iowa's first true freshman kicker since Keith Duncan in 2016.
- On the year, Iowa's placekickers have made 17-for-21 field goals. Sophomore Aaron Blom made 1-of-3 attempts in the first two games with a make from 46 yards.
- Stevens also handles kickoff duties, where he has 29 touchbacks in 51 kickoffs.

TRUE FRESHMAN STARTER

RB Kaleb Johnson became the 32nd freshman of the Kirk Ferentz era to start a game when he was in the starting lineup at No. 2 Ohio State on Oct. 22. Johnson, who has started five games, is the sixth Hawkeye running back to start as a freshman under Ferentz, joining Brandon Wegher (2009), Marcus Coker (2010), Jordan Canzeri (2011), Greg Garmon (2012) and Tyler Goodson (2019).

LACHEY’S CAREER DAY

Sophomore Luke Lachey filled in as tight end No. 1 in the season finale against Nebraska and he enjoyed a career day. The Ohio native had a career-high seven receptions for 89 yards with one touchdown filling in for the injured Sam LaPorta. It came on the heels of a five catch, 77-yard game in the road win at Minnesota, where he had a key 33-yard reception in the seam to set up Iowa’s game-winning field goal.

- Lachey had four receptions for 84 yards against Michigan on Oct. 1, which included a 5-yard touchdown catch for his first career score. In consecutive games against Rutgers and Michigan, Lachey had six catches for 121 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-long 37-yard reception against the Scarlet Knights on Sept. 24.
- Lachey is third on the team with 25 receptions for 362 yards and a team-high three receiving touchdowns in 2022.

DEFENSIVE SCORING

Iowa’s defense extended its pick six streak to 15 consecutive years at Rutgers when sophomore DB Cooper DeJean made an over the shoulder catch and returned the interception 45 yards for his first career touchdown. It was the 30th longest interception return for a touchdown in school history and the 50th all-time.

- Iowa leads the Big Ten and ranks third nationally with four defensive touchdowns (two interceptions, two fumble returns). Western Kentucky has a nation-best six defensive touchdowns.
- Iowa’s defense found the end zone a second time in Piscataway when DB Kaevon Merriweather scooped up a Rutgers fumble (forced on a hit by DB Sebastian Castro) and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown. It was the eighth fumble return for a touchdown in school history and the fifth longest in the record books.
- The Hawkeye defense scored its third touchdown at No. 2 Ohio State when DL Joe Evans sacked C.J. Stroud to force a fumble, recovered and returned it 11 yards for his first career touchdown. The score gave Iowa a 7-3 lead in Columbus.
- Iowa had its second pick six of the season against Wisconsin when DeJean picked off Graham Mertz and returned it 32 yards for the touchdown.
- Iowa’s defense has scored 28 points this season via four touchdowns and two safeties.

MIGHTY D

- The Hawkeyes gave up 59 points (9.8 per game) in the first six games. It was the lowest point total for the program through six games since 1956.
- The unit gave up just 20 points in the first four games -- the fewest points allowed for the program in 66 years.
- Iowa held Purdue to season lows in points (3) and total yards (255), 189.6 below its season average (444.6). The unit held Purdue QB Aidan O’Connell to a season-low 168 yards and to a 46.5 completion percentage – his lowest of the season. Purdue was just 2-of-16 on third down.
- Iowa held Wisconsin to 10 points and just 51 rushing yards. The 10 points tied a season low and it was just the second time this season the Badgers didn’t rush for 100+ yards.
- The Hawkeyes gave up 360 total yards and 66 rushing yards to No. 2 Ohio State, an offense that was averaging 543.7 yards and 228.0 rushing yards per game.

- Iowa gave up 151 yards of total offense to a Nevada offense that was averaging 336.3 yards per game. It was the second time this season Iowa allowed 151 yards or fewer (120 vs. South Dakota State). It was the first time since 1986 that Iowa’s defense has given up 160 or fewer (125 at Iowa State, 159 vs. NIU, 150 vs. UTEP) in the team’s first three games.
- Iowa’s passing defense held the Wolfpack to 82 yards, tied for the 13th fewest in a game in the Kirk Ferentz era. The Hawkeyes have held three opponents under 100 yards passing (87 vs. South Dakota State, 87 at Minnesota).

HEY, COOP

Sophomore DB Cooper DeJean has started all 12 games – nine at defensive back and three at the CASH position. DeJean recorded an interception in three consecutive games (vs. Iowa State, vs. Nevada, at Rutgers) – a first by a Hawkeye since junior DB Jermari Harris in 2021 season (at Nebraska, vs. Michigan, vs. Kentucky) – and he had a pick six for his fourth interception against Wisconsin.

- DeJean had a career-high 11 tackles, recorded his first career interception and had two pass breakups against Iowa State on Sept. 10. He had the pick six and 10 tackles against Wisconsin on Nov. 12.
- In 12 games, the Odebolt, Iowa, native is fourth on the team with 68 tackles, has a team-high four interceptions and has seven pass breakups. He is fourth in the Big Ten and tied for 25th nationally in interceptions.

JACK ATTACK

Butkus Award winner Jack Campbell had a team-high 118 tackles – 9.8 per game – during the regular season, which ranks second in the Big Ten and 14th nationally. The Cedar Falls, Iowa, native has had eight or more tackles in 11 of Iowa’s 12 games (12, 9, 10, 8, 11, 13, 9, 11, 7, 11, 10, 8) and he had 10+ stops in seven contests, including a season-high 13 tackles at Illinois.

- Campbell had his first interception of the season (and fourth of his career) against No. 2 Ohio State on Oct. 22 and he had a key fourth quarter pick (and 30-yard return) to set up Iowa’s game-winning field goal in the road win at Minnesota. Campbell also had 10 tackles and a fourth quarter forced fumble of Mohamed Ibrahim with the Gophers deep in the red zone, which led to him being named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the week on Nov. 21.
- He was selected as the Butkus Player of the Month for November after helping Iowa to a 3-1 record with wins over Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. He had 36 tackles, including 20 solo stops, a forced fumble and an interception in the four contests.
- Campbell had 11 tackles against Wisconsin, to reach 100 tackles for the season. It is the second straight year he has reached the 100-tackle mark as he finished with 143 tackles in 2021. He is the first Hawkeye since Josey Jewell (three straight 100+ tackle seasons) to have 100 or more tackles in consecutive years.
- Campbell has 12 career games with 10 or more tackles, which are the most on the team. His 12 double-digit tackle games came against: vs. Kent State (11), vs. Colorado State (18), vs. Minnesota (17), at Nebraska (16), vs. Kentucky (14), vs. South Dakota State (12), vs. Nevada (10), vs. Michigan (11), at Illinois (13), vs. Northwestern (11), vs. Wisconsin (11) and at Minnesota (10).
- Campbell surpassed the 200-career tackle mark in Iowa’s 27-0 victory over Nevada on Sept. 17. He currently has 295 career tackles, which is 19th all-time in program history.
- His 118 tackles this season are the 35th most in program history. An 11-tackle bowl game would catapult Campbell into the top-20 in single-season tackles in the record books for the second time in as many seasons.

A MARATHON W

Iowa's 27-0 victory over Nevada kicked off at 6:40 p.m. (CT) on Sept. 17 inside Kinnick Stadium and ended at 1:39 a.m. early Sunday morning. There were three weather delays lasting 236 minutes and the game spanned 6:59 minutes from start to finish.

- It was the second weather delay in Kinnick Stadium history. Iowa's game against Tennessee Tech was delayed 84 minutes in 2011. Iowa's last game affected by a delay came at Iowa State in 2019. Iowa won both of those contests.

THE SHUUUUUUUUUUUUUOUT

Iowa's defense recorded its first shutout since 2019 with its 27-0 victory over Nevada on Sept. 17. Iowa posted two shutouts in 2019, a road win at Northwestern (20-0) and a home win over Rutgers (30-0). The shutout of Nevada was Iowa's 13th under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

- Iowa has six shutouts since 2016, which are tied with Penn State, UAB and Virginia Tech for fourth most in the country over that span.

DON'T BEAT YOURSELF

Iowa ranks in the top nine in the nation as one of the least penalized teams. The Hawkeyes haven't been penalized for more than 50 yards in eight of their 12 games.

- The team is sixth in the nation in fewest penalty yards (415), seventh in fewest penalties (51) and fewest penalty yards per game (34.58) and ninth in fewest penalties per game (4.25).
- Iowa had just two penalties for 15 yards in the season-opening win over South Dakota State and had two penalties for 18 yards against Northwestern. Iowa has had three or fewer penalties in four games.
- During the road win at Minnesota, neither Iowa nor the Gophers were flagged for a penalty. It was the first time Iowa hasn't committed a penalty since 2019 (vs. Mississippi State) and it was the first time since 1986 (Army vs. Navy) that neither team was flagged in an FBS contest.

SCORING EARLY

The Hawkeyes allowed their first points in the first quarter of the season when Rutgers drove for a game-opening field goal on Sept. 24. Iowa is outscoring its opponents, 61-42, in the opening quarter this season.

BLOCK THAT PUNT

DL Lukas Van Ness tied a single-game school record, blocking a pair of punts against Iowa State on Sept. 10. It is the sixth time a Hawkeye has had multiple blocks in a single game and Van Ness is the fifth Hawkeye to accomplish the feat.

- Ken Iwebema had two blocks against Syracuse in 2007 and against Illinois in 2005.
- Van Ness tied the school record for blocked punts in a game with two inside Iowa State territory. The only other Hawkeye to block two punts in the same game was Sean Considine at Iowa State in 2003.
- Van Ness' first block of the game set up the Hawkeyes' touchdown. It was Iowa's first punt block of the season and first since the 2021 regular season finale at Nebraska (Henry Marchese).
- Van Ness blocked his second punt in the third quarter, giving Iowa possession at the Iowa State 20. The possession ended with an Iowa turnover at the goal line.
- DL Deontae Craig notched Iowa's third blocked punt of the season in the second quarter against Wisconsin, setting up Iowa's first touchdown. It was Craig's first career blocked punt.
- Iowa is second in the Big Ten and 19th nationally in blocked kicks, while Van Ness is second in the Big Ten and fifth nationally.

CREATIVE SCORING

Senior LB Jack Campbell has found ways to put points on the scoreboard for the Iowa football team. In his Hawkeye career, Campbell has scored via a safety (vs. South Dakota State, 2022), interception return for a touchdown (vs. Illinois, 2021) and a fumble return for a touchdown (at Iowa State, 2021). What appeared to be a pick-six at Minnesota was called back when it was ruled he stepped out of bounds.

2 X 2

Iowa took the unconventional path to seven points via a field goal and two second-half safeties during the 7-3 victory over South Dakota State on Sept. 3. Following Tory Taylor’s punt that pinned the Jacks at the 1, Jack Campbell’s tackle for loss gave the Hawkeyes a 5-3 third-quarter lead. Taylor pinned SD State deep again in the fourth quarter and Joe Evans’ sack accounted for Iowa’s final two points.

- It was the first time since 2018 at Penn State that the Hawkeyes had two safeties in the same game.

UNCONVENTIONAL 7 WAS ENOUGH

- The Hawkeyes’ seven points are the fewest for a Big Ten team in a win since Iowa’s 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.
- Iowa is the first Big Ten team to win a game without scoring a touchdown since Nebraska in 2018 (beat Michigan State, 9-6). The Hawkeyes’ last such win? The 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.

FRESHMAN PT TRACKER

Iowa has had eight true freshmen play through 12 games. The list includes: DB Koen Entringer (3), DL Aaron Graves (11), DB TJ Hall (12), RB Kaleb Johnson (12), DB Xavier Nwankpa (12), TE Addison Ostrenga (12), RB Jaziun Patterson (2) and K Drew Stevens (12).

OH MY TORY

Junior Tory Taylor is averaging 45.1 yards on 74 punts in 12 games. The Australia native has 22 punts of 50+ yards and 32 punts have been downed inside the 20-yard line. His 45.1 average is third in the Big Ten and 15th nationally.

- Taylor punted a career-high 10 times for 479 yards, averaging 47.9 yards per attempt, against South Dakota State on Sept. 3. Taylor had punts downed at the 1, 2, 6, 8, 8 and 12-yard lines and seven of his punts were inside the 20.
- Taylor was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week and to the Rays 8 List on Sept. 5 for his efforts. It is his second career Big Ten weekly honor as he earned his first distinction last season following Iowa’s 27-17 win at No. 9 Iowa State.
- He was also named to the Ray’s 8 List following Week 3.
- Taylor was also named Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week following Iowa’s win at Rutgers, where he averaged 42.6 yards on five punts, with four of the five being downed inside the 20. He had a long of 51 yards and Rutgers had just one return for negative two yards.
- Taylor has punted eight or more times in four games this season. He had a career-long 70-yard punt at Purdue in a game where he punted eight times for 414 yards (51.8 avg.). He had five punts at Minnesota with four being downed inside the 20.

THE CALIFORNIA KID

- Spencer Petras owns a 20-11 record (.645) as Iowa’s starting quarterback. Iowa has scored 22.68 points per game in Petras’ 31 starts.
- Petras left the regular season finale against Nebraska in the first quarter because of injury and he didn’t return. The California native

- Petras completed 15-of-24 attempts for 221 yards – his second most yards this season – at Minnesota. He had a season high two touchdowns after completing 13-of-23 attempts for 192 yards in the road win at Purdue on Nov. 5. It came on the heels of a 220-yard output against Northwestern, where he completed 21-of-30 passes with one touchdown.
- For the season, Petras is 157-of-281 for 1,725 yards with five touchdowns (and five interceptions). He currently is 10th in program history with 5,199 yards.
- Petras led Iowa to 12 consecutive victories from 2020-21, winning the final six games of 2020 and the first six games of 2021. He went 194-of-324 for 2,226 yards with 17 touchdown passes, four interceptions during the winning streak.
- He started 17 straight games from the 2020 season through Week 9 of 2021 before missing the Nov. 13 game against Minnesota because of injury in 2021.
- The Hawkeyes averaged 31.8 points per game in 2020, Petras’ first year as the starting quarterback. It marked Iowa’s highest point per game total since 2002 (36.5). The Hawkeyes won their final six games in 2020, outscoring their opposition, 214-83.
- Petras matched his career high with three touchdown passes and set a career high with two rushing touchdowns Week 5 at Maryland last season. He became the first Iowa quarterback with multiple passing touchdowns and multiple rushing touchdowns in a game since Brad Banks at Minnesota in 2002.

THE MAN IN THE MIDDLE

Senior linebacker Jack Campbell returned as the anchor of the Iowa defense after earning second-team All-America honors by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) and Phil Steele in 2021. The Cedar Falls, Iowa, native led the country with 143 tackles, including 57 solo and 86 assists. The total ranks fifth in a single season in school history and were the most by a Hawkeye since Pat Angerer had 145 in 2009.

- Campbell was the first Hawkeye to record 100 tackles in a single season since Josey Jewell, who had 100+ tackles each year from 2015-17. He posted five double-digit tackle performances (11, 18, 17, 16, 14) in 2021. Campbell has a team-high 118 tackles and 3.5 TFL through 12 games this season. He was named the Lott IMPACT Player of the week for his efforts against South Dakota State.

TATUM-WOODSON BIG TEN DB OF THE YEAR RETURNS

Senior Riley Moss returned for his final season as a Hawkeye after earning second-team All-America honors by the Football Writers Association of America and third-team All-America honors by the AP.

- The Ankeny, Iowa, native was also named the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year in 2021 after finishing with 39 tackles and four interceptions in 11 games.
- Moss was the first Big Ten player since Iowa’s Desmond King to return to school the season after winning the Tatum-Woodson Defensive Back of the Year honor.
 - Moss tied for 14th in the country and fourth in the Big Ten with four interceptions in 2021. Moss had two interception returns for touchdowns in Iowa’s opening win over Indiana. He is tied for ninth in career interceptions (11-239-3 TDs), is one of three players in program history with three interception returns for touchdowns and ranks second in career interception return yards.

BALL HAWKS

- Iowa led the country with a school-record 25 interceptions in 2021. The Hawkeyes have 102 interceptions since 2017, more than any team in the country.
- Seven Hawkeyes have interceptions this season. DB/CASH Cooper DeJean recorded an interception in three consecutive games and he added his fourth pick against Wisconsin on Nov. 12. He has a team-best four interceptions. His pick against Iowa State was his first career interception. Senior Terry Roberts had a third-quarter pick against Iowa State (his second career interception) and he had an interception return for a touchdown wiped off the board against Nevada because of a penalty.
- Both DeJean and Kaevon Merriweather had interceptions at Rutgers, Iowa's fourth and fifth picks this season. DeJean returned his interception 45 yards for a pick six. Quinn Schulte had Iowa's sixth interception (his second career pick) at Illinois on Oct. 8 and Jack Campbell had his first pick (fourth career) at No. 2 Ohio State. Merriweather notched his second and third picks in consecutive wins against Northwestern and Purdue and LB Seth Benson had his first INT of the season (second of his career) against the Boilermakers.
- Iowa had two more INTs against Wisconsin. DeJean had a 32-yard pick six and DB Riley Moss notched his first interception of the season and the 11th of his career, which are tied for the ninth-most all-time.
- Campbell had his second INT this season (and he returned it 30 yards) with two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter in the road win at Minnesota. His pick set up Iowa's game-winning field goal.
- Iowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 15 seasons and 20 of the last 22.

A SPECIAL SPECIAL TEAMER

Melbourne, Australia, native Tory Taylor returned for his third season as Iowa's punter after ranking fourth in the Big Ten, averaging 46.1 yards per punt in 2021. The two-time Ray Guy Award semifinalist led the Big Ten and ranked second nationally with 80 punts. He had 27 punts of 50 or more yards, including a career-long 69-yard punt at Iowa State in Week 2. Thirty-nine of his punts were downed inside the 20.

- Taylor was a preseason All-American by Athlon Sports and a Ray Guy Award Watch List honoree leading into the 2022 season and he was named to two midseason All-America teams.
- Last season, Iowa owned the field position battle in each of its 10 wins. The Hawkeyes averaged 20-plus yards better in field position three times (+20 vs. Penn State; +22 at Maryland; +22 at Iowa State).
- Taylor recorded three of the top nine single-game punting averages in the Ferentz era. Iowa's Week 2 punting average of 51.1 ranked No. 3 all-time in the Ferentz era. Its Week 1 punting average of 49.5 ranked No. 7 and the 49.0 average Week 8 tied for ninth.
- Taylor was Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week following Iowa's win at Iowa State. He averaged 51.1 yards on eight punts. Five of his punts were downed inside the 20, while Iowa State had just one punt return. His 45.6 average in 2022 is second in the Big Ten and ranks ninth nationally.
- In Iowa's 23-20 win over No. 4 Penn State, Taylor punted nine times, dropping six inside the 20, five inside the 10 and three punts inside the five.

BIG TEN PERFECTION

University of Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz has twice navigated the Big Ten regular season schedule with an undefeated record. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2002 and shared the Big Ten championship with Ohio State. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2015, winning the Big Ten West Division title.

- Since 1954, when the conference schedule expanded to seven games, only six Big Ten coaches, including Ferentz, have multiple undefeated Big Ten seasons.

BIG TEN BOWL GAMES SINCE 2001

- The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 21 times in the last 22 seasons. Iowa accepted an invitation to the 2020 Music City Bowl, but the game was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz is one bowl win shy of tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 9-9 bowl record. His nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history.
- Seventeen coaches have won 10 or more bowl games in their career. Among active coaches, only Nick Saban (17), Mack Brown (14), Kyle Whittingham (11), Mike Gundy (11) and Dabo Swinney (11) have more bowl wins than Ferentz.
- Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (12) and Wisconsin (11) have more bowl wins (including FCS Playoffs and the BCS championship game), than Iowa. Iowa is 17-16-1 all-time in bowl games. The following are the records for Big Ten teams in bowl games since 2001:

BACK ON CAMPUS

- Seven former players are on the University of Iowa football staff in 2022.
- Brian Ferentz, a three-year letterman from 2003-05, is in his 11th year on staff, his sixth as offensive coordinator and first as quarterbacks coach.
 - LeVar Woods, a three-year letterman from 1998-2000, is in his 15th season on the Iowa staff. Woods was named special teams coordinator in 2017. He coached tight ends from 2015-17 and linebackers from 2012-14. He rejoined the program as an administrative assistant in 2008.
 - Kelvin Bell joined the Iowa program as a defensive lineman in 2000, but had his career cut short due to injury. He returned to the program as a graduate assistant and served as director of on-campus recruiting from 2012-13. He was named recruiting coordinator and defensive assistant coach in February, 2016 and was named defensive line coach in 2019.
 - Ladell Betts joined the Iowa coaching staff as running backs coach in 2021. Betts is the second leading rushing in Iowa football history, rushing for 3,686 yards from 1998-2001. He is the only running back in school history to lead the team in rushing four straight years.



- Abdul Hodge joined the staff as tight end/fullback coach in 2022. The three-time All-Big Ten linebacker lettered for the Hawkeyes from 2002-05, leading the team to 38 wins, two Big Ten titles and four straight January bowl games. Hodge ranks third all-time in career tackles (453).
- Former Hawkeyes Jason Manson and Sam Brincks lead Iowa’s player development unit. Manson, the Hawkeyes’ director of player development, was a two-year letterman as a quarterback and wide receiver in 2005 and 2006. Brincks is the assistant director of player development and a 2018 Iowa graduate. He played defensive tackle for the Hawkeyes from 2015-18.

HAWKEYE GRADUATES

Iowa has six student-athletes on its current roster that have earned their degrees prior to the 2022 fall semester. The graduates include: Matt Fagan (Public Health), Riley Moss (Sport and Recreation Management), Turner Pallissard (Business), Spencer Petras (Interdepartmental Studies), Nico Ragaini (Sport and Recreation Management) and Steven Stilianos (Lafayette, Engineering).

Junior defensive lineman Logan Lee proposed to longtime girlfriend Tori Verbeck on Dec. 30 at a Citrus Bowl event in Orlando, Florida. The couple were married on July 3 in Geneseo, Illinois.

HAWKEYE LEGACIES

- Iowa has five players on its 2022 roster whose father played for the Hawkeyes: LB Eric Epenesa (Epenesa, 1997), DE Joe Evans (Spence, 1989), DB Thomas Hartlieb (Jim, 1989-92), (John, 1985), LB Jayden Montgomery (Jerry, 1998-02) and LS Liam Reardon (Bill).
- Epenesa is one of two players whose brothers played at Iowa: Eric (A.J. 2017-19) and FB Johnny Plewa (Macon in 2013-15).
- RB Max White is the great, great grandson of Max Hawkins, a member of University of Iowa’s famed ‘Ironmen’ team in 1939 that included Iowa Heisman Trophy winner Nile Kinnick.

2022 PLAYER COUNCIL

Twenty-three players -- 12 seniors, six juniors and five sophomores -- are on the 2022 Player Council. The purpose of the group is to assist in formulating policies and being involved in team decision-making throughout the year. Players were selected following coaching staff and player input.

The 12 seniors include Seth Benson, Jack Campbell, Joe Evans, Sam LaPorta, Kaevon Merriweather, Riley Moss, Spencer Petras, Monte Pottebaum, Nico Ragaini, Terry Roberts, Noah Shannon and John Waggoner. Junior members of the group include Kyler Fisher, Jermari Harris, Jay Higgins, Logan Lee, Alex Padilla and Tory Taylor. Sophomore members are Arland Bruce, IV, Connor Colby, Cooper DeJean, Mason Richman and Gavin Williams.

IOWA FOOTBALL AND THE NFL

- The Hawkeyes have had 206 former players in the NFL since 1999, Kirk Ferentz’s first year as head coach (81 draft picks/125 free agents).
- Iowa and Florida lead all schools with five offensive tackles currently active in the NFL.
- Iowa is tied with Miami, Florida, Notre Dame, Penn State and Stanford with the most tight ends active in the NFL (4).
- At least one Iowa Hawkeye has been selected in every NFL Draft since 1978 (44 consecutive years).
- Iowa has had 11 First Round NFL Draft picks under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

- OT Tristan Wirfs earned first-team All-Pro and was a Pro Bowl selection in 2021.
- TE T.J. Hockenson (eighth overall, Detroit) and TE Noah Fant (20th overall, Denver) became the first tight ends from the same school to be drafted in the first round of a single NFL Draft (2019).
- OL Brandon Scherff (Washington) was named first-team All-Pro in 2020. TE T.J. Hockenson (Detroit), TE George Kittle (San Francisco) and Scherff (Washington) were named to the 2020 Pro Bowl.
- TE George Kittle (San Francisco) was a first-team All-Pro in 2019. OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) was named second-team All-Pro that same season.
- DB Desmond King (Los Angeles Chargers), LS Casey Kreiter (Denver), TE George Kittle (San Francisco), and OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) were named All-Pro in 2018.
- Over the past 23 years, 199-of-238 (84 percent) of Iowa's senior starters have been drafted in the NFL or signed NFL free agent contracts.
- Over the past 14 years, Iowa has had 53 NFL Draft picks, the third most in the Big Ten -- Ohio State (83), Michigan (63), Wisconsin (52).
- Iowa has had eight first round picks in the last 12 NFL drafts -- OL Bryan Bulaga, 2010; DE Adrian Clayborn, 2011; OL Riley Reiff, 2012; OL Brandon Scherff, 2015, TE T.J. Hockenson, TE Noah Fant, 2019; OL Tristan Wirfs, 2020; OL Tyler Linderbaum, 2022.
- Iowa had six players drafted in the 2012 NFL Draft, which tied for the most in the Big Ten and tied for fourth in the country.
- Former Hawkeye Marshal Yanda (Baltimore OL) was an eight-time Pro-Bowler (2011-16, 2018, 2019) and was named NFL All-Pro in 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019. He retired following the 2019 season.
- In NFL 2011 regular season statistics, former Hawkeye linebackers Chad Greenway (Minnesota) and Pat Angerer (Indianapolis) finished third and fourth, respectively, in tackles. Greenway was named to the Pro Bowl in 2012 and 2013.
- Three former Hawkeyes were involved in the 2012 Super Bowl. DB Tyler Sash played for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants, while LB Jeff Tarpinian was on the injured reserve roster of the New England Patriots. Former Iowa center Brian Ferentz, now is his 11th year on staff and sixth as Iowa's offensive coordinator, was New England's tight ends coach.
- Former Iowa DB Sean Considine and OL Marshal Yanda won Super Bowl rings with the 2012 Baltimore Ravens in the 2013 Super Bowl.
- Former Iowa LB James Morris (injured reserve) earned a Super Bowl ring with the New England Patriots in 2015. Former TE Tony Moeaki played for the Seattle Seahawks in the same game.
- Former center James Ferentz was a member of the 2016 Super Bowl champion Denver Broncos.
- Former DT Jonathan Babineaux played for the Atlanta Falcons in Super Bowl LI. Former DE Adrian Clayborn and former DB Charles Godfrey were on the Atlanta injured reserve roster.
- Former OL Cole Croston was on the New England Patriots roster in Super Bowl LII. Former C James Ferentz and WR Riley McCarron were on the Patriots practice squad.
- Former DL Adrian Clayborn (active), OL James Ferentz, WR Riley McCarron (injured reserve), and OL Cole Croston (practice squad) earned Super Bowl rings as members of the New England Patriots in Super Bowl LIII.
- Former LB Anthony Hitchens and LB Ben Niemann played for the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs in 2020. Former QB C.J. Beathard, TE George Kittle, and OL Ross Reynolds were on the NFC Champion San Francisco 49ers.

- Former OL Tristan Wirfs was the starting right tackle as a rookie for the 2021 Super Bowl champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Former DL Anthony Nelson was a reserve defensive end for the Bucs. Former LB Ben Niemann and LB Anthony Hitchens were on the AFC Champion Kansas City Chiefs.
- Entering the 2022 season, every Iowa senior starting tight end (16) under Kirk Ferentz has been drafted in the NFL or signed by an NFL team. The NFL has employed 18 Iowa tight ends since 1999 (11 drafted/7 free agents).
- All 11 members of Iowa’s starting defensive unit in 2008 were either drafted or signed to NFL free agent contracts following the draft.

IOWA PROGRAM NOTES

- The Hawkeyes earned bowl eligibility in 21 of the last 22 seasons. Iowa is 9-9 in bowl games since 2001. Only Ohio State (12) and Wisconsin (11) have more bowl wins among Big Ten teams since 2001. The Hawkeyes are 17-16-1 in 34 bowl games. Iowa has won five January bowl games under Ferentz.
- Iowa is the only school to have two head football coaches since 1979. Hayden Fry took over prior to the 1979 season and coached through the 1998 season, posting a record of 143-89-6. Current coach Kirk Ferentz (185-115) replaced Fry and is in his 24th season. Ferentz also served as Iowa’s offensive line coach from 1981-89 under Fry.
- Iowa won the Big Ten West Division title in 2021 and made its second appearance in the Big Ten Championship game. The Hawkeyes played in the Big Ten title game for the first time in program history on Dec. 5, 2015. Iowa earned Big Ten Conference championships in 2002 and 2004 and placed second in 2009. Iowa (8-0, 2002; 8-0, 2015) is one of three Big Ten teams to post a perfect mark in conference play since 1998 (BCS era), joining Michigan State (1) and Ohio State (5).
- Iowa has ranked in the top 10 in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today coaches polls five times since 2002, including a ranking of seventh in both polls at the conclusion of the 2009 season. Iowa ranked eighth in 2002, 2003 and 2004. The Hawkeyes finished 2015 ranked ninth in the AP poll and 10th in the USA Today Coaches Poll. In the Big Ten, only Ohio State has more top 10 finishes since 2002.
- Since 1936 when the first AP poll was released, Iowa has appeared in the poll 354 times, the fifth highest total in the Big Ten (Ohio State, Michigan, Wisconsin, and MSU). Iowa has been the top-ranked team in the country 11 times.
- Iowa set a school record with 12 wins in 2015. The Hawkeyes won 11 games in 2002 (11-2), and 2009 (11-2). In 2009, Iowa started 9-0 and won 10 regular season games for just the fourth time in school history.
- Iowa won 10 or more games in three consecutive years (2002-04) for the first time in school history.
- Kirk Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015) and was named National Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2015. Only Michigan’s Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year honors. Iowa’s Hayden Fry and Penn State’s Joe Paterno both won the award three times.
- Iowa has had 13 individual national award winners under head coach Kirk Ferentz. They include Brad Banks (2002 Davey O’Brien, Top Quarterback; 2002 Associated Press National Player of the Year); Dallas Clark (2002 Mackey, Top Tight End); Nate Kaeding (2002 Groza, Top Kicker); Robert Gallery (2003 Outland, Top Lineman); Shonn Greene (2008 Doak Walker, Top Running Back); Brandon Scherff (2014 Outland, Top Lineman), Desmond King (2015 Jim Thorpe), Josey Jewell (2017 Lott IMPACT), T.J. Hockenson (2018, Mackey, Top Tight End), Tyler Linderbaum, (Rimington, Top Center), Jack Campbell (Campbell Trophy, Butkus Award).
- Iowa’s offensive line earned the Joe Moore Award in 2016, an honor bestowed upon the top offensive line unit in the country.
- Iowa’s football record in the 2000 decade was 80-45 (.640), a record that ranks as the best decade in Iowa football history, based on total wins. Iowa posted a record of 77-40-4 (.652) during the 1980’s and the Hawkeyes were 62-53-2 (.538) in the 1990’s. Iowa was 81-49 (.623) from 2010-19.
- Iowa had 47 wins from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in school history.

IOWA NOTES

- The Hawkeyes' seven points are the fewest for a Big Ten team in a win since Iowa's 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- LB Jack Campbell had a team high 12 tackles (4 solo, 8 assists). It is his sixth career game with 10 or more tackles, which are tied for the most on the team. Campbell now has 189 career tackles.
- Iowa finished with four sacks in the game. DE Joe Evans tied a career high with two sacks and DT Logan Lee had a career-best 1.5 sacks.
- DB Cooper DeJean finished with a career high four tackles in his first career start; DB Quinn Schulte had a career-high four pass breakups in his first career start.
- RB Leshun Williams had career-highs in carries (24) and yards (72).
- WR Arland Bruce VI had five catches for a career-high 68 yards. Bruce had a team-high 96 all-purpose yards.
- P Tory Taylor had punts downed at the 1, 2, 6, 8, 8 and 12 yard lines. Taylor had a career-high 10 punts for 479 yards, averaging 47.9 yards per punt. Seven of his 10 punts were downed inside the 20-yard line and three went 50 or more yards.
- K Aaron Blom connected on 1-of-2 field goal attempts (good from 46, miss from 40) for his first career points.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Iowa's defense scored four points on two safeties – Jack Campbell had a 1-yard tackle for loss on Isaiah Davis in the third quarter and Joe Evans' sack accounted for the game's final points on a safety in the fourth quarter.
- The Hawkeyes have three safeties in their last two regular season games -- (Lukas Van Ness sack on an intentional grounding at Nebraska, 11/26/21).
- Iowa's defense allowed 120 total yards, which are the fewest in a season-opening game since 2004 (110 vs. Kent State). The 120 yards are the fewest surrendered by the Hawkeye defense since 2018 against Maryland (115 yards).
- Iowa is the first Big Ten team to win a game without scoring a touchdown since Nebraska in 2018 (beat Michigan State, 9-6). The Hawkeyes' last such win? The 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.
- Iowa had seven first-time starters in the game: Offense: Logan Jones (OL), Beau Stephens (OL), Alec Wick (WR), Leshun Williams (RB); Defense: Cooper DeJean (DB), Joe Evans (DL), Quinn Schulte (DB).
- Five true freshmen saw the first action of their careers. They include: T.J. Hall (DB), Kaleb Johnson (RB), Xavier Nwankpa (DB), Addison Ostrenga (TE) and Drew Stevens (K).
- Iowa is 99-33-2 in season-opening games, including an 20-4 mark under coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Iowa won the toss and elected to receive. The Hawkeyes have played 289 games under head coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has opened the game on offense 215 times (137-78). The Hawkeyes have opened the game on defense 74 times (42-32).

IOWA NOTES

- The Hawkeyes attempted a game-tying field goal as time expired, but the kick hooked left, giving Iowa State its first win in the series since 2015. Iowa had won six straight in the series; Iowa State's last three wins over the Hawkeyes have all come by a field goal.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- DE Lukas Van Ness blocked two Iowa State punts, tying a school record. It is the sixth time a Hawkeye has had multiple blocks in a single game and Van Ness is the fifth Hawkeye to accomplish the feat. Ken Iwebema had two blocks against Syracuse in 2007 and against Illinois in 2005.
- Van Ness tied the school record for blocked punts in a game with two inside Iowa State territory. The only other Hawkeye to block two punts in the same game was Sean Considine at Iowa State in 2003.
- His first block of the game set up the Hawkeyes' first touchdown. It was Iowa's first punt block of the season and first since the 2021 regular season finale at Nebraska (Henry Marchese).
- Van Ness blocked his second punt in the third quarter, giving Iowa possession at the Iowa State 20. The possession ended with an Iowa turnover at the goal line.
- RB Leshon Williams had a 9-yard touchdown run in the first quarter for his first career touchdown. Williams led the Hawkeye rushing attack with 34 yards on 14 attempts.
- DB Cooper DeJean had his first career interception in the second quarter. The interception occurred in the end zone and was downed for a touchback. DeJean had a career high 11 tackles (six solo), one interception and two pass break-ups.
- DB Terry Roberts had his first interception of the season (second of his career) on Iowa State's opening drive of the second half.
- LB Seth Benson finished with 10 tackles – second most on the team. It was his seventh career game with 10 or more tackles.
- DB Quinn Schulte (9), DT Logan Lee (8) and DB Terry Roberts (6) each tallied career highs in tackles. DB Riley Moss tied a career high with nine tackles. LB Jack Campbell also had nine tackles, moving his career total to 198.
- TE Sam LaPorta's 2-yard catch in the second quarter was the 100th of his career. He had a career-high eight receptions for 55 yards.
- WR Alec Wick had his first career reception for 14 yards on the game's final drive.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Iowa scored on its first offensive possession, going 16 yards on two plays following the first blocked punt. It was the first game since last season against Minnesota (10 plays, 39 yards, FG) that the Hawkeyes scored on their first possession of the game.
- Iowa's defense forced three turnovers – two interceptions, one forced fumble.
- The defense notched its first turnover of the season in the second quarter with a forced fumble at its own goal line. DB Kaevon Merriweather had his first career forced fumble, jarring the ball loose from ISU RB Jirehl Brock. LB Logan Klemp recovered in the end zone for the touchback.
- Iowa had interceptions on consecutive possessions in the second and third quarter. Cooper DeJean had an interception in the end zone with 57 seconds left in the first half. Terry Roberts intercepted Dekkers at midfield on the first possession of the second half.
- Iowa State had three possessions in the red zone (0, 4, 12) in the first half, but came away with just a field goal. The Hawkeye defense did not allow a touchdown in the first seven quarters of the season.
- Freshman Aaron Graves became the sixth Hawkeye freshman to see action this season. He joins a list that includes: T.J. Hall (DB), Kaleb Johnson (RB), Xavier Nwankpa (DB), Addison Ostrenga (TE) and Drew Stevens (K).
- Iowa won the toss and elected to defer. The Hawkeyes have played 290 games under head coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has opened the game on offense 215 times (137-78). The Hawkeyes have opened the game on defense 75 times (42-33).

The game started at 6:40 p.m. (CT) on Saturday and ended at 1:39 a.m. Sunday. There were three weather delays lasting 236 minutes in the contest that spanned 6:59 minutes from start to finish.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- RB Kaleb Johnson tallied his first career 100-yard game, finishing with 103 yards and two touchdowns on seven attempts for a 14.7 yard average. He scored his first career touchdown from 40 yards out on his first carry of the game and he had a 55-yarder in the fourth quarter.
- Johnson is the first Hawkeye freshman to rush for 100 yards in a game since Tyler Goodson (13-116-1 TD) at Nebraska in 2019.
- QB Spencer Petras completed 14-of-26 attempts for a season-high 175 yards and one touchdown. Petras moved into 12th place on the Iowa career passing yards list with 3,850 yards.
- WR Arland Bruce IV caught a 21-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter for his second career receiving touchdown (fifth TD overall). Bruce IV had a team-high three catches for 50 yards.
- WR Nico Ragaini and WR Keagan Johnson made their season debuts after missing the first two games because of injury. Ragaini had two catches for 56 yards, including a 46-yarder in the third quarter. Johnson had one catch for seven yards and was targeted five times.
- RB Jaziun Patterson became the seventh true freshman to see action this season. He rushed six times for 20 yards.
- DB Cooper DeJean intercepted a pass in the first quarter for his second interception in as many games and second of his career. DeJean also had two tackles and two pass breakups.
- LB Jack Campbell had a game high 10 tackles. It is his second game this season and seventh career contest with 10 or more tackles. Campbell surpassed the 200-career tackle mark in the game; he now has 208 tackles, which puts him in 68th in program history. He moved past the likes of Leroy Smith, Ben Niemann and Ed Miles.
- DL Lukas Van Ness had a career-high eight tackles and DL John Waggoner had a career-high six tackles. Van Ness also had 2.5 TFL and 1.5 sacks, giving him nine career sacks.
- DL Aaron Graves had his first career sack in the third quarter. Graves finished with a career-high four tackles and 1.5 TFL in the game.
- K Drew Stevens went 2-for-2 on field goal attempts in the first two attempts of his career. He made a 43-yard field goal on his first attempt in the second quarter and connected on a 32-yarder in the third quarter.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Saturday's game included three weather delays -- 80-minutes (8:36 p.m. to 9:56 p.m.), 110 minutes (10:05 p.m. to 11:55 p.m.) and 46 minutes (11:57 p.m. to 12:43 a.m.) -- for a total of 3:56.
- It is the second weather delay in Kinnick Stadium tory. Iowa's game against Tennessee Tech was delayed 84 minutes on Sept. 3, 2011.
- Iowa's last game that included a weather delay came on Sept. 14, 2019, at Iowa State. There was a 2:55 delay at Jack Trice Stadium in Ames, Iowa.
- Iowa had a season-high 337 yards of total offense, rushing for a season-high 162 yards on 35 attempts, averaging 4.6 yards per carry. Seven different receivers caught a pass in the game and the passing attack had a season-high 175 yards and one touchdown.
- Iowa's defense posted its first shutout since 2019 -- a 20-0 win at Northwestern (10/26/19). It was the Hawkeyes' first shutout in Kinnick Stadium since defeating Rutgers, 30-0, on Sept. 7, 2019.
- The Hawkeye defense limited Nevada to 151 yards of total offense. The Wolfpack entered the game averaging 336.3 yards.
- Iowa has limited two of its first three opponents to 151 yards or less. (South Dakota State, 120 yards; Nevada, 151 yards). It is the first time since 1986 that the Hawkeye defense has held two of the first three opponents to 160 yards or fewer (125 at Iowa State; 159 vs. NIU; 150 at UTEP).
- Iowa improves to 14-7 all-time in night games at Kinnick Stadium.

- The Hawkeyes have won eight of their last 11 Big Ten openers. Iowa is now 3-0 all-time against Rutgers.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- DB Cooper DeJean intercepted a pass for a third straight game and returned it 45 yards for his first career touchdown. The 45-yard touchdown return is the 30th longest in school history and it is the 50th pick six in school history.
- Iowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 15 seasons and 20 of the last 22.
- The last Hawkeye to have an interception in three straight games was Jermari Harris in 2021 (at Nebraska, vs. Michigan, vs. Kentucky).

- RB Leshon Williams had a 2-yard touchdown run in the third quarter to cap a nine play, 75-yard scoring drive – the team's longest of the season. Williams had 40 yards rushing on the scoring drive.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a career long 42-yard reception on Iowa's final drive of the first half. He finished with a team-high four catches for 77 yards.
- K Drew Stevens converted a 25-yard field goal in the second quarter and a career-long 51 yarder in the fourth quarter. The 51-yarder is tied for the 11th longest in school history. Stevens is now 4-for-4 on field goal attempts this season.

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

- Iowa's defense has allowed 23 points in the first four games of the season, the fewest points allowed in the last 66 years. The Hawkeyes gave up 20 points in the first four games in 1956.
- Iowa's defense scored two touchdowns against Rutgers via a Cooper DeJean pick six in the first quarter and a Kaevon Merriweather scoop and score in the second quarter. It is the first time since the 2021 season opener against Indiana that Iowa's defense has scored two touchdowns in the same game (Riley Moss, two INTs for TDs).
- With the two defensive touchdowns, the Hawkeye defense has now scored 16 points this season via two touchdowns and two safeties.
- Iowa didn't commit a turnover for a second straight game. The Hawkeyes were +3 in the turnover battle, converting the Rutgers miscues into 14 points. For the season, the Hawkeyes are +2 in turnover margin and they have a 21-10 advantage in points off turnovers.
- The Hawkeyes have two games with multiple interceptions and have all five picks have come in the last three games.
- Iowa led 7-3 at the end of the first quarters. Rutgers field goal was the first points allowed in the first quarter this season by the Iowa defense. The Hawkeyes are outscoring their opponents, 31-3, in the opening quarter and 12-0 in the third quarter.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- RB Kaleb Johnson rushed for a team-high 93 yards on 14 attempts, averaging 7.2 yards per carry. It is the second time Johnson has led the team in rushing this season.
- QB Spencer Petras completed 21-of-30 passes for 220 yards and one touchdown – his third of the season. The 220 yards are his second-most this season.
- Petras also had a 1-yard touchdown run in the first quarter – his first of the season and ninth of his career.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a team-high five receptions for 53 yards, moving him past the 1,500-yard mark into the top 20 in program history in career receiving yards. He has 136 receptions for 1,516 yards.
- TE Luke Lachey had a 6-yard touchdown reception late in the second quarter. It was his second career touchdown catch.
- WR Arland Bruce IV had a career-high 27 rushing yards, including a 23-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. It was a career-long rush and his fourth career rushing touchdown.
- LB Jay Higgins had a career-high 11 tackles, including six solo stops (also a career-high). Higgins is the fourth player this season to have 10 or more tackles (Seth Benson, Jack Campbell, Cooper DeJean). The four players have nine 10+ tackle games.
- LB Jack Campbell finished with 11 tackles, his fifth game with 10+ tackles this season (10th of his career). He has had eight or more tackles in all eight games. He is now 31st in program history with 259 career tackles.
- DB Kaevon Merriweather had his second interception of the season (third of his career) on the final play of the first half. It was Iowa's eighth interception this season.
- K Drew Stevens made a career-high four field goals, connecting from 29, 24, 54 and 25 yards. The 54-yarder is tied for the seventh-longest in program history and is the longest by a Hawkeye since 2015 (Marshall Koehn, 57 yards).
- Stevens is 11-of-12 on field goal attempts this season, the most field goals by a true freshman kicker since Mike Meyer in 2010 (14 FG).

MISCELLANEOUS

- The Hawkeyes scored a season-high 33 points and finished with a season-high 398 yards of total offense. Iowa had a season-high 178 rushing yards and 220 passing yards – second-most this season.
 - The 398 yards of total offense are the most since gaining 428 yards at Maryland (W, 51-14) in 2021.
- Iowa scored on its opening drive for the third time this season, going 63 yards over nine plays to start the game. K Drew Stevens connected on a 29-yard field goal, giving Iowa a 3-0 lead.
- The Hawkeyes scored on their first four possessions to start the game (FG, TD, FG, TD). It is the first time since the game at Maryland during the 2021 season that Iowa has scored on four straight possessions. (Iowa scored on nine straight possessions in College Park.)
 - Iowa drove 85 yards on 15 plays before Stevens made a 24-yard field goal to make the score 13-0. The 15-play drive was the longest of the season, while the 85 yards were second-most.
- Iowa did not commit a turnover for the fourth game this season. The Hawkeyes are 3-1 when they don't commit a turnover.
- The Hawkeyes limited Northwestern to 177 yards of total offense. Iowa's defense has held three opponents under 200 yards this season.
- Iowa's defense allowed 13 points. The Hawkeyes have allowed 13 or fewer points in six games.
- Iowa registered a season-high seven sacks (by Lukas Van Ness, Deontae Craig, Ethan Hurkett, Logan Lee, Noah Shannon, Seth Benson and Joe Evans.)
 - The seven sacks are the most against a Big Ten team since tallying seven sacks against Northwestern in 2000. Iowa also had seven sacks last season against Kent State.
- The Hawkeyes finished with 10 tackles for loss – its second game with 10+ TFL (11 vs. Nevada). Craig led the team with 2.0 TFL.

- RB Kaleb Johnson had his first career 200-yard game (second career 100-yard game), finishing with 200 yards on 22 attempts with one touchdown – his fourth of the season. The yardage and attempts were both career highs.

- o The 200 rushing yards are the 18th-most in a single game in program history and the second-most by a Hawkeye freshman all-time (Marcus Coker, 219 vs. Missouri, Insight Bowl).

- o It was Iowa's first 200-yard game since Akrum Wadley (26-204) at Northwestern in 2015.

- o Johnson is the first Hawkeye freshman since Coker in 2010 to have two 100-yard rushing games (129 vs. Indiana; 219 vs. Missouri).

- o Johnson had a career-long 75-yard touchdown run on the second play of the second half. It is Iowa's longest rush since Tyler Goodson's 80-yard touchdown run against Wisconsin in 2020.

- o Johnson also had a career-best two receptions for 17 yards.

- QB Spencer Petras completed 13-of-23 passes for 192 yards and a season-high two touchdowns. It was his sixth career game with two or more touchdown passes.

- TE Sam LaPorta had a 16-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter – his first TD reception of the season and fifth of his career – to give the Hawkeyes a 7-0 lead. LaPorta had 71 yards receiving (on three receptions) during Iowa's nine-play, 91-yard scoring drive.

- WR Nico Ragaini had a 29-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter to give Iowa a 14-0 lead. It was his first touchdown of the season and fifth receiving touchdown of his career. He finished with three receptions for 56 yards.

- DB Kaevon Merriweather had his third interception of the season (and second in as many games) in the second quarter. It was Merriweather's fourth career pick. He also had four tackles in the game.

- LB Seth Benson had his first interception of the season (second of his career) in the second quarter.

- K Drew Stevens was 1-for-2 on field goal attempts with a make from 26 yards. He is 12-of-14 this season with the 12 makes being the most by a Hawkeye freshman since Mike Meyer in 2010 (14).

- P Tory Taylor had a career-long 70-yard punt in the fourth quarter. Taylor had eight punts for 414 yards (51.8 avg.) in the game. Three punts were downed inside the 20 and five went 50+ yards.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Iowa's 91-yard (nine-play) scoring drive spanning the first and second quarters was a season long.

- Iowa had a season-high 184 rushing yards – the most since the regular season finale at Nebraska in 2021.

- The Hawkeyes had their ninth and 10th interceptions of the season in the second quarter. Iowa turned the turnovers into 10 points, giving them a 41-27 advantage in points off turnovers this season.

- o It is Iowa's third game this season with two interceptions in 2022.

- Iowa's defense held Purdue to season lows in points (3) and total yards (255), 189.6 below its season average (444.6).

- o The Boilermakers finished 2-of-16 on third down.

- The Hawkeyes earned their sixth win of the season to become bowl eligible for the 21st time in the last 22 seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Iowa's victory is head coach Kirk Ferentz's 114th career Big Ten victory. Ferentz is one victory shy of tying Amos Alonzo Stagg (115) for third place on the league's all-time conference wins list.
- The Hawkeyes have won 13 straight games in November dating back to the 2019 season.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- RB Kaleb Johnson had a 4-yard touchdown run in the second quarter to give Iowa a 7-3 lead. It was Johnson's second straight game with a touchdown run and team-leading fifth of the season.

o Johnson had a team-high 57 rushing yards. It is the fourth game this season he has led the team in rushing.

• QB Spencer Petras had a 1-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter – his second rushing touchdown of the season and 10th of his career. Petras finished 14-of-23 for 94 yards through the air.

• TE Sam LaPorta had a team-high five catches for 48 yards. LaPorta has had at least one reception in 13 straight games and in 22 of his last 23 contests. He has been Iowa's top receiver in nine of 10 games this season.

• DB Cooper DeJean had a 32-yard pick six in the second quarter, giving Iowa a 14-3 lead. It was DeJean's fourth interception of the season and second touchdown (45-yard INT at Rutgers).

o DeJean also had 10 tackles, his second career game with double-digit tackles.

o He had a team-best 114 all-purpose yards in the game.

• DB Riley Moss had his first interception of the season, corralling a Kaevon Merriweather pass breakup on Wisconsin's first drive of the second half.

• It is Moss' 11th career interception, 11th-most in school history.

• Campbell finished with 11 tackles, his sixth 10+ tackle game this season and 11th of his career.

• Campbell now has 100 tackles this season, moving over the century mark for a second straight season. He is the first Hawkeye since Josey Jewell to have 100 or more tackles in consecutive season (Jewell had three straight from 2015-17).

o Campbell moved into 20th place on Iowa's all-time tackles list with 277.

- DL Deonte Craig blocked a Wisconsin punt in the second quarter – his first career block – and LB Jay Higgins returned it 3 yards to the UW 17 to set up Iowa's first touchdown. It was the team's third block of the season.

o Craig tied a career-high with five tackles and had a career-high 1.5 sacks.

• DL Joe Evans had sack and forced fumble in the fourth quarter. It is his second forced fumble (at Ohio State) of the season.

o Evans has had at least one sack in Iowa's last four games. He has six sacks, which are second-most on the team.

• K Drew Stevens made a 44-yard field goal in the fourth quarter – his fifth make from 40 or more yards this season. Stevens is 13-of-15 in field goal attempts this season – the most makes by a freshman since Mike Meyer's 14 in 2010.

• Freshman Koen Entringer made his season debut. He is the eighth true freshman to play this season.

- Campbell had his third career forced fumble, jarring the ball loose from Mohamed Ibrahim in the fourth quarter with the Gophers driving in the red zone. DL Deontae Craig recovered at the Iowa 9 for his first career fumble recovery.
- Campbell finished with 10 tackles – his seventh 10+ tackle game this season and 12th of his career.
 - Campbell is now 20th in school history with 287 career tackles.
- QB Spencer Petras had a 1-yard touchdown in the first quarter. It is his second straight game with a touchdown, his third of the season and 12th of his career.
 - Petras finished 15-of-24 for 221 yards, completing 63 percent of his attempts. The 221 yards are his second-most this season (246 vs. Michigan).
- TE Sam LaPorta had a career-long 58-yard reception on Iowa's first offensive play of the game. LaPorta finished the game with four catches for 95 yards before leaving the game with an injury in the first half.
- TE Luke Lachey had a career-high five receptions to finish with 77 yards. His 33-yard reception in the fourth quarter was the second-longest of his career.
 - Iowa's tight ends – LaPorta (4-95), Lachey (5-77) and Addison Ostrenga (1-6) – combined for 10 catches for 178 yards.
- RB Kaleb Johnson had a team-high 43 yards on eight attempts to pass Tyler Goodson for Iowa's freshman rushing record with 653 yards. It is the fifth game this season he has led the team in rushing.
- K Drew Stevens made a 38-yard field goal in the first quarter and the go-ahead 21-yard field goal with 31 seconds remaining. Stevens is 15-of-17 in field goal attempts this season. His 15 field goals are the most by a Hawkeye freshman in program history, moving past Mike Meyer and Nate Kaeding.
- Redshirt freshman FB Eli Miller made his Hawkeye debut in the game.

- The temperature at kickoff was 17 degrees at Huntington Bank Stadium, which is the second coldest temperature in stadium history.
- Iowa forced two or more turnovers for the third straight game. The defense has forced two or more turnovers in seven games this season. Iowa has scored 51 points off 20 opponent turnovers.
- The Hawkeyes limited Minnesota to 87 passing yards. It is the third time this season an opponent's passing attack hasn't reached 100 yards (South Dakota State, Nevada).

- Iowa limited Nebraska to 51 rushing yards in the game. It was the eighth time this season the team has allowed fewer than 100 yards on the ground.
- The Hawkeyes committed four turnovers, which led to 17 Husker points – tied for the most this season.
