QUICK NOTES

- The Wildcats are in their 133rd season in 2023.
- The Wildcats are celebrating their 50th anniversary of the opening of Kroger Field this weekend, which was formerly named Commonwealth Stadium.
 - The Cats are 184-141-4 (.565) all-time in Kroger Field, including 48-25 (.658) under Mark Stoops.
 - The Cats have won 15 of their past 19 games at Kroger Field.
 - The Cats are 16-4 in their last 20 home night games.
- Kentucky defeated Eastern Kentucky, 28-17, at home last Saturday, as quarterback Devin Leary threw a career high-tying four touchdown passes, including two to Tayvion Robinson.
 - UK has opened the season 2-0 six times in the last seven seasons, which is the first time that UK has opened its season 2-0 in six of seven seasons since 1935-41.
- UK was picked to finish fourth in the SEC Eastern Division in a 2023 SEC Preseason Media Poll, behind defending national champion Georgia, then Tennessee and South Carolina.
 - Three Wildcats were named to the 2023 Preseason Media Days All-SEC Teams, including sophomore Deone Walker (Second Team Defense), graduate students Eli Cox (Third Team Offense) and J.J. Weaver (Third Team Defense).
- The Wildcats have won their last 18 straight nonconference games in the **regular season**.
 - That streak is second in the nation behind Georgia (22).

- The Wildcats began the season receiving votes in both the Associated Press Poll and AFCA Coaches Poll, and remain there through Week 3.
 - It marked the second consecutive season UK has been ranked or receiving votes in the preseason edition of both major polls.
 - Three of Kentucky's opponents (Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee) are ranked in the top 15 in the Week 3 polls.
- UK head coach Mark Stoops is in his 11th year at the helm of the program in 2023, the longest in program history, which was an accomplishment he set last season. He also is the second-longest tenured active head coach in the SEC, behind Alabama's Nick Saban, and he is the eighth-longest nationally.
 - In that time, Stoops has accumulated a 68-59 overall record.
 - Stoops became the winningest head coach in program history last season after No. 20/20 Kentucky upset No. 12/19 Florida in Gainesville, 26-16, on Sept. 10, 2022. Stoops passed former UK head coach Bear Bryant (1946-53), who set the previous record at 60.
 - Stoops began his tenure in Lexington 12-26 (.316) (2013 - through first two games of 2016). He has since gone 56-33 (.629) (2016 - present).
 - Stoops has guided UK to three second-place SEC East finishes in the last eight seasons, which are the program's only second-place SEC East finishes in program history.
- Stoops made a couple of changes to his coaching staff in the offseason, including adding Jay Boulware (Running Backs / Special Teams Coordinator) and Liam Coen (Offensive Coordinator).
 - Coen returned for his second stint at Kentucky in the offseason, having served as UK's offensive coordinator in 2021, then the Los Angeles Rams' offensive Coordinator in 2022.
- The Wildcats returned 36 letterwinners, including 13 offensive and defensive starters, in 2023. The Cats also bolstered the roster with the addition of 16 newcomers from the transfer portal.
 - The offensive starters who returned include wide receivers Dane Key and Tayvion Robinson, offensive linemen Jager Burton, Kenneth Horsey, Eli Cox and Jeremy Flax, and tight ends Brenden Bates and Jordan Dingle.
 - The defensive starters who returned include linemen Deone Walker and Tre'vonn Rybka, inside linebacker D'Eryk Jackson, outside linebacker J.J. Weaver, and defensive back Jordan Lovett.
 - The specialty starters who returned include punter Wilson Berry and kickoff man Chance Poore.
- Other updates that occurred during the offseason include the renovation of Nutter Field House, with the help of a lead donation from Brett and Billie Jo Setzer, allowed the playing surface inside the facility to be named Rich and Karen Brooks Field, and a the new turf at Kroger Field.
- In 2022, UK earned a 7-6 record overall and a 3-5 record in the conference, reaching its school-record seventh consecutive bowl game (TransPerfect Music City Bowl).
 - It marked the sixth time in the last seven seasons that UK won at least seven games, with the lone exception being the COVID-shortened season in 2020.
 - In 2022, Kentucky concluded its regular season with a win over in-state rival Louisville, 26-13, which marked the Cats' fourth-straight win over the Cards. It was also the Cats' fifth-straight triumph in the regular-season finale, which marked the first time in program history that has been accomplished.
- Former quarterback Will Levis was selected No. 33 overall in the 2023 NFL Draft, marking the fifth straight season Kentucky has had one or more players selected in the first three rounds.

KENTUCKY-AKRON SERIES

- Kentucky leads the series with Akron, 1-0.
- The last time the two teams met was on Sept. 18, 2010, when the Wildcats defeated the Zips, 47-10, in Lexington.



KENTUCKY-AKRON CONNECTIONS

- Kentucky defensive lineman Ben Christman, who was injured during fall camp and is out for the season, is a native of Akron, Ohio.
- Akron's roster includes one player from the state of Kentucky in running back Blake Hester of Ashland, Kentucky.
 - This season, Hester has returned five kickoffs for a combined 139 yards, including a 47-yard kickoff return against Morgan State on Sept. 9.
- Also on Akron's roster is former UK tight end Nik Ognenovic.
 - He transferred to Akron after two years at UK (2019-2020) where he saw action in two games as a freshman in 2019, including his first career reception against Tennessee-Martin on Nov. 23, 2019.

A UK WIN WOULD...

- Give UK its 23rd nonconference win in its last 24 nonconference games (includes bowl games).
- Give UK its 19th straight nonconference win in the regular season.
- Give UK its 17th straight nonconference win at Kroger Field.
- Extend head coach Mark Stoops' all-time school records for wins to 69 and home wins to 49.

THE HISTORY OF KROGER FIELD

- **1973** - When first constructed in 1973 as Commonwealth Stadium, Kroger Field had a capacity of 57,800 and was completed at a cost of \$12 million by the firm of Huber, Hunt and Nichols. The stadium and parking areas rest on an 86-acre plot that was once part of the UK Experimental Station Farm Grounds. The stadium was officially opened on Sept. 15, 1973, as the Wildcats moved into their new home after spending 48 years at Stoll Field/McLean Stadium across from Memorial Coliseum. Kentucky defeated Virginia Tech in the stadium opener, 31-26, as quarterback Ernie Lewis ran for two touchdowns and threw for another TD to lead the Wildcats.
- **1999** - The stadium was expanded in 1999. Both end zones were enclosed, along with the construction of 40 suites, 10 in each corner of the stadium. The project was handled by HNTB of Kansas City, Mo., and Turner Construction of Cincinnati, Ohio. A total of \$27.6 million was allocated for the expansion, which also included the original Mitsubishi Diamond Vision video boards, new scoreboards and additional restrooms and concession stands. The attendance capacity was 67,942 in 2012.
- **2015** - Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was also handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, while a new multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

SIRI, WHO IS LEARY?

- In four seasons at NC State (2019-22), Devin Leary made 26 starts in 30 games played, connecting on 568 of his 944 passes for 6,807 yards and 62 touchdowns. In that time, he had just 16 interceptions.
 - Between 2021 and 2022, he aided NC State to a 17-4 record, helping him earn ACC Preseason Player of the Year praise in 2022. He got off to a promising start through just six games in 2022, before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury against Florida State.
 - The last time he was healthy for a full season was in 2021, when he threw for 35 touchdowns and just five interceptions. He also added two rushing touchdowns that season. Leary finished that season ranked in the top 25 in the nation in completion percentage, completions per game, passing efficiency, passing touchdowns, passing yards, passing yards per game, total offense, points responsible for and points responsible for per game.
- The signal caller is best known for his timing and precision as a pocket passer, while he also has the ability to break down defenses in play action and can throw the deep ball when needed.
- While his experience combined with his talent is exciting for Big Blue Nation in 2023, it doesn't stop there when you consider what else is around him, including a renovated offensive line, experienced running backs, dangerous pass catchers and a proven offensive coordinator in Liam Coen.

DEVIN LEARY IN BLUE & WHITE

- Following a surgery and almost a year of not playing, Devin Leary has completed 42 of his 69 passing attempts (60.9 percent) for 540 yards, two interceptions, and five touchdowns through two games.
- Leary has thrown for at least 240 yards and at least one touchdown in each of his first two games in Blue and White. The first UK quarterback to do that was Jared Lorenzen in 2000.
 - Leary topped off the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2 connecting on 10 of his last 11 passes in the game.
 - Leary came back the next weekend against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 9 to throw for 299 yards and four touchdowns. Again, he finished strong by completing his last eight passes of the contest.
- Following Week 2, he ranks right in the middle of the conference in completions per game (5th, 21.0), passing touchdowns (5th, 5), passing yards (7th, 540), passing yards per game (270.0), and passing yards per completion (5th, 12.86).
- In his Kentucky debut against Ball State on Sept. 2, he surpassed the 7,000 career yards passing mark.
 - He has the 24th-most career yards passing among active players in the FBS (7,347).

THE RUNNING BACK ROOM

- For the past few years, there has been little doubt as to who would be the featured running back at Kentucky, from Stanley "Boom" Williams to Benny Snell to Chris Rodriguez Jr. However, prior to the start of this season, there was no clear starter to Big Blue Nation. Instead, numerous exciting prospects that are all expected to play a part in 2023.
 - Ray Davis**, a senior transfer from Vanderbilt, already had success at Kroger Field before arriving to UK, when he rushed 129 yards and earned one touchdown there, helping Vanderbilt defeat Kentucky in 2022. He led the Commodores in rushing with 1,042 yards on 232 carries and five touchdowns last season, producing five 100-plus yard games.
 - Ramon Jefferson**, who is in his seventh year of college football, returned for an additional season after suffering an injury to the knee in 2022. He amassed 2,954



yards rushing in his career before the season began, and prior to last season in 2022, was ranked fifth on the Division I active career rushing yards list.

- **JuTahn McClain**, a senior, has gotten better with each season in the Bluegrass, including his most productive season yet in 2022. Then, he was the second leading rusher for Kentucky, racking up 278 yards on 59 attempts.
- **La’Vell Wright**, a sophomore, is young but provides great size at 6-foot, 214 pounds, and is growing in experience after seeing action in all 13 games in 2022, rushing 120 yards on 39 carries.
- **Demie Sumo-Karngbaye**, a junior transfer from NC State, already has a connection with quarterback Devin Leary in Raleigh. Last season, he was the Wolfpack’s second leading rusher thanks to 305 yards on 55 carries and three touchdowns.
- Since the beginning of 2020 (39 games), Kentucky has had 25 individual 100-yard rushing performances, which is tied with Ole Miss for the most in the SEC.
 - Those 25 performances were by six different players, including Chris Rodriguez Jr. (18), A.J. Rose (3), **Ray Davis (1)**, Will Levis (1), Kavosiey Smoke (1) and Terry Wilson (1).

RUN, RAY, RUN

- **Ray Davis** appeared at the top of the first depth chart of the season, and the coaching staff haven’t regretted it since.
 - Through Week 2, he has combined for 26 carries for 164 yards and two touchdowns rushing. That includes his 100+ yard performance in the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 4, which marked his fourth in his last five games.
 - Through Week 2, Davis also has combined for six receptions for 47 yards and one touchdown receiving.
- Following Week 2, he has the seventh-most career yards rushing among active players in the FBS (2,661).

TRIPLE THREAT

- The Wildcats returned one of the most exciting wide receiver corps in the Southeastern Conference in sophomores Barion Brown and Dane Key and redshirt fifth year Tayvion Robinson.
 - In 2022, all three of those guys were new to the program, but you wouldn’t guess it, as the trio combined for 127 catches for 1,644 yards and 13 touchdowns.
- To start this season, the trio is responsible for 41.6 percent of UK’s points so far in 2023.
 - All three wideouts are tied for the team lead with nine receptions apiece.

THE YOUNG ONES: BARION BROWN & DANE KEY

Just one season removed from leading the receiver room in both yards and touchdowns as freshmen, wide receivers and True Freshmen All-Americans Barion Brown and Dane Key returned to the program for anticipated sophomore seasons. BUT WAIT, THERE'S MORE!

- Barion Brown also returned as one of the nation's leaders in kickoff returns.
 - In 2022, he concluded the regular season ranked 31st in the nation and fifth in the Southeastern Conference in kickoff return average at 28.3 yards per runback. He was also ranked 13th in the SEC in all-purpose yards per game (88.17).
 - The rookie was also the only player in the nation with two 80-plus yard kickoff returns (vs. Miami (Ohio), at then-No. 14/11 Ole Miss).
 - He made a stunning debut against Miami (Ohio) on Sept. 3, 2022, taking the opening kick of the second half back 100 yards for a touchdown in the season opener. Brown took the kick, sliced to his left, found open space and then outran everyone down the visiting sideline.
 - It was the first Kentucky kickoff return for a score since Derrick Locke went to the house vs. Louisville (100 yards) in September 2009.
 - Brown was named the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts.
- Well... he did it again. In the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2, Brown took a kickoff return 99 yards back for a touchdown.
 - He became the fourth player in school history with multiple career kickoff return touchdowns, and he became the third player in school history with a kickoff return touchdown in consecutive seasons.
- Through Week 2, Brown is ranked third in the nation in kickoff returns, averaging 45.7 yards per return.

WHAT CAN BROWN DO FOR YOU?

- You already know about wide receiver Barion Brown, but be on the look out for wide receiver Anthony Brown-Stephens.
- The freshman from Springfield, Ohio, received some preseason praise from the coaching staff after fall camp, and it has nothing to do with his famous uncle, John Legend.
 - "He's everything everybody thought of him. He's poised, he's a good route-runner, he's smart. He takes coaching." - Tayvion Robinson
 - "He really took a jump, from the spring, to the summer, to now. Anything you tell AB to do, he's doing it 110%." - Scott Woodward
 - "I thought he's handled this go-around extremely well, in terms of being somebody we can count on to go play, somebody we can be able to push the ball down the field to. Diligent worker, smart kid. Bright future ahead of him." - Liam Coen
- He has played in both games this season, but the freshman had his first reception for six yards and a first down against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 9.



HERE'S TO YOU, MR. ROBINSON

- Tayvion Robinson, a redshirt fifth year, returned to Kentucky for a second season in Lexington in 2023. Last season, he finished second on the team in catches (40) and third on the team in yards receiving (497) and touchdowns receiving (3).
 - Before Kentucky, he spent three seasons at Virginia Tech (2019-21), recording 113 catches for 1,555 yards and eight touchdowns. He also averaged 11.4 yards on punt returns, including a 60-yard touchdown jaunt.
- Despite missing two games in the back half of the schedule due to injury last season in 2022, Robinson had numerous standout performances that revealed his potential here.
 - He began last season with at least six receptions in three of the first four games in 2022. That includes making a career-high seven catches for a career-high 147 yards and a career-high two touchdowns in Kentucky's triumph over Northern Illinois on Sept. 24. In the game, he had a 69-yard catch-and-run in the second quarter, which was the longest play of his college career and his first touchdown in Blue and White.
- Through Week 2, he is leading UK in yards receiving (174) and touchdowns receiving (2).
 - He is coming off a standout performance against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 9, making six catches for 136 yards and two touchdowns.
 - His 136 yards marked the third 100+ yards receiving game of his career (*all three of which came while at Kentucky*).
 - His two touchdowns receiving in the game were a career-high tying.
- Robinson is ranked high on numerous active career leader lists:
 - Tied for the 13th-most career receptions among active players in the FBS (162).
 - Tied for the 10th-most career receiving yards among active players in the FBS (2,226).
 - The 14th-most career receiving yards per game among active players in the FBS (45.4).
 - The 20th-most career all-purpose yards among active players in the FBS (3,199).

BRICK-BY-BRICK

- The Big Blue Wall went under construction in the offseason, and players have referenced its rebuild as a brick-by-brick process.
- The Wildcats brought in veteran transfers Tanner Bowles (*Alabama*), Courtland Ford (*Southern California*), Marques Cox (*Northern Illinois*), Dylan Ray (*West Virginia*) and Ben Christman (*Ohio State*), who is out for the season after suffering an injury in fall camp.
- Those transfers, combined with veterans like Jager Burton, Eli Cox, Kenneth Horsey and Jeremy Flax, UK had one of the most experienced lines in the nation entering the season, ranking in the top 25 in career games played and the top 15 in career games started.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

WHITE-OUT

- Brad White is in his fifth season as the defensive coordinator, and his sixth season overall at Kentucky, since Mark Stoops plucked him from the NFL in 2018. He became defensive coordinator in 2019 and UK has steadily become more stout on that side of the ball.
 - Other programs have taken notice, too, as White has turned down several other coaching opportunities in that time.
- Kentucky's defense has remained constant under White, even through the start of 2023, and that is evident by the benchmarks he continues to reach year-in and year-out.
 - The UK defense has held opponents to 30 or fewer points in 45 of 52 games with White as the defensive coordinator (2019-present).
 - The UK defense has held opponents to 24 or fewer points in 18 of the last 19 games.
 - UK allowed 26 or fewer points per game in four straight seasons (2019-22), the first time that had been accomplished since 1986-89.
 - For the first time since 1959-62 it has yielded 160 rushing yards or fewer per game for four straight seasons (2019-22).

SCOOP-AND-SCORE

- It was a special season opener for defensive back Jalen Geiger, whose season was cut short last season after suffering a knee injury at Florida on Sept. 10, 2022, which required surgery.
- Big Blue Nation welcomed him back to the field in the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2, even more so after he scored his second defensive touchdown of his career.
 - Geiger recovered a fumble at the UK 31 in the second quarter and ran it 69 yards for a touchdown.
 - It marked the first defensive touchdown in a season opener for UK since Sept. 2, 2017 at Southern Miss and it marked the longest fumble returned for a touchdown since CJ Johnson against Tennessee on Oct. 31, 2015 (77 yards).

LOOKIN' BACK

The Wildcats' defense finished last season in the nation's top 10 in two categories and in the nation's top 25 in seven categories at the end of 2022.

RUSHING DEFENSE

- Kentucky is currently ranked 25th in the nation and fourth in the Southeastern Conference in rushing defense, allowing opponents to just 82.0 yards on the run per game in 2023.
 - UK held Ball State to just 72 yards rushing and ECU to just 92 yards rushing, marking the first time since 2017 that it has held the first two opponents to under 100 yards rushing.
- The Wildcats have held their last three opponents to less than 100 yards rushing.

DON'T HIT THE WALL-ACE

- Trevin Wallace, a junior inside linebacker who is on the 2023 Butkus Award Watch List, is currently tied for 33rd in the nation and second in the Southeastern Conference with 9.5 tackles per game.
 - He also is 34th in the nation and third in the SEC with 5.5 solo tackles per game.
- He earned the second SEC Player of the Week honor in his career after the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2, thanks to his career-high tying 12 tackles.
 - He made the initial tackle on a play that became a Ball State fumble that UK returned 69 yards for a touchdown.



- The team captain just eclipsed 100 total tackles in his career after making seven against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 9.
 - He now has 105 total tackles in his career.

LEADERSHIP ON THE DEFENSE

- Despite losing seven of the top players on the defense from 2022, still numerous names returned this season that are primed to bring a unique level of leadership.
 - "It's huge when the older guys take charge because when they do, it shows you that they have assumed ownership. They don't just rely on the coaches to make all the corrections because at that point, they have passed along the ownership to the coaches (that means players think) 'I only worry about myself.'" - Brad White
- The top two leaders in tackles from last season returned in 2023, including middle linebacker D'Eryk Jackson (67 tackles) and free safety Jordan Lovett (62 tackles). Outside linebacker J.J. Weaver, who was the sack leader last season, also is back after deciding not to pursue the 2023 NFL Draft. Inside linebacker Trevin Wallace, who had 54 tackles last season, returned to the Bluegrass, while defensive linemen, both young and old, Deone Walker and Octavious Oxendine are expected to be leaders on this year's defense.
 - "The old guys help correct old guys. Old guys have to correct young guys, then they ask good, quality questions of the coaching staff. Practice would be really hard and dull if the coaches were the only ones coaching." - Brad White

WELCOME, ALEX RAYNOR!

- UK brought in a senior transfer from Georgia Southern to help bring consistency to the program's kicking game, Alex Raynor.
- He shined in his Kentucky debut against Ball State on Sept. 2, connecting on all three of his field goal attempts, all of which were more than 40 yards, and on all five of his extra point attempts.
 - Raynor became the first Kentucky player with three made field goals in their UK debut since Taylor Begley against Louisville on Sept. 1, 2002.
- The Wildcat has made his last nine field goals, a streak dating back to Nov. 5, 2022 during his time at Georgia Southern.

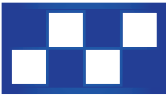

GENERAL NOTES

NONCONFERENCE COMPETITION

- Kentucky has won 22 of its last 23 nonconference games.
That stretch featured 20 straight nonconference wins, including four straight bowl wins. The streak began in the season opener on Sept. 1, 2018 and ended in the Music City Bowl game on Dec. 32, 2022. It was the longest active streak in FBS at the time.
The Wildcats have won their last 18 straight nonconference games in the regular season.
That streak is second in the nation behind Georgia (22).
UK has won 16 straight nonconference games at Kroger Field.

PORTAL PICKUPS

Mark Stoops took advantage of the NCAA Transfer Portal to fulfill needs in key positions in 2023, welcoming 16 new Wildcats to the program.

CATS IN THE NATIONAL POLLS

- Kentucky began the season receiving votes in both the Associated Press poll and AFCA Coaches Poll, and remained there through Week 3.
- Just last season, for the first time in program history, UK was ranked in both preseason polls, checking in at No. 20 in the AP poll and No. 21 in the coaches poll.
 - The Wildcats wound up being ranked for the first nine AP polls in 2022. That stretch included three straight weeks being ranked in the AP Top 10.
- Between the 2021 and 2022 seasons, Kentucky was ranked in one or both of the major polls for 12 straight weeks.
 - It marked the second longest streak in program history, only behind the 21 weeks UK spent in one or both of the major polls between 1949 and 1951.

SIMPLY STOOPS-ENDOUS

UK head coach Mark Stoops has proven to be an excellent hire, turning around a struggling program and making him the first UK coach to lead the program to a seventh consecutive bowl appearance in 2023. He also has erased numerous of the long-standing hurdles and streaks in the program's history. A partial accounting of Stoops' achievements features:

- 42 wins since 2018, which is tied for the fourth-most in the SEC and tied for 17th among Power Five programs
- Winning the regular-season finale five years in a row for the first time in school history (2018-22)
- First top-10 ranking in each the Associated Press poll and the coaches' poll since 2007 (Sept. 11, 2022)
- First consecutive top-10 rankings in each poll since 1977 (Sept. 18, 2022)
- His 61st coaching victory win, breaking the school record held by Paul "Bear" Bryant (Sept. 10, 2022)
- First home win over Florida since 1986, also marking the first win over an Associated Press top 10-ranked opponent since 2010 (2021)
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2020)
- First New Year's Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018 season)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)
- Stoops began his tenure in Lexington 12-26 (.316) (2013 - through first two games of 2016). He has since gone 55-33 (.625) (2016 - present). Overall, Stoops is now 67-58 at Kentucky, surpassing Paul "Bear" Bryant's 60 victories to set a school record.
- Off the field, Stoops is a staunch supporter of the Kentucky Children's Hospital, helping raise more than \$500,000 annually for the kids.
- Kentucky's football team has fared well academically under Stoops, as each year UK's football score in the NCAA Academic Progress Rate has been well above the benchmark of 930.

- A neighbor of Pittsburgh, a.k.a. Steel City USA, Youngstown, Ohio, has a reputation as a blue collar community defined by hard work and relationships forged over generations that are stronger than steel. Kentucky's football program is, in many ways, defined by that bond as it creates a southern alumni club from Youngstown, the hometown of head coach Mark Stoops and his brother Mike Stoops and several other key members of the program. COACHING CHANGES

- **Jay Boulware** was named the running backs coach and special teams coordinator on Dec. 12, 2022. He brings more than 25 years of coaching experience to Lexington after most recently serving as an offensive intern in the National Football League for the Pittsburgh Steelers, working specifically with the running backs, including UK's all-time leading rusher Benny Snell Jr. Before the Steelers, he served as the associate head coach for special teams and tight ends coach at Texas, his alma mater.
- **Liam Coen** returned as Kentucky's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Jan. 10. He previously served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Kentucky in 2021 before spending 2022 as the offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams.
- Stoops also announced during the offseason the hiring of quality control coach for special teams **Mike Priefer Jr.** Priefer's name might be familiar to National Football League aficionados as his father Mike Priefer has almost two decades of pro coaching experience, including the last four as the special teams coordinator for the Cleveland Browns. His grandfather, Chuck Priefer, was a longtime college and NFL coach, including a special teams coach with the San Diego Chargers and Detroit Lions.

TWO WILDCATS WIN SUPER BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP WITH KANSAS CITY CHIEFS

- Two Kentucky Wildcats, defensive lineman Phil Hoskins and offensive lineman Darian Kinnard, earned a Super Bowl ring as the Kansas City Chiefs defeated the Philadelphia Eagles in 2022.
 - Kinnard was on the 53-man roster, while Hoskins was on the practice squad throughout the playoff run.
- Kinnard, who played at Kentucky from 2018-21, was in his rookie season with the Chiefs in 2022-23.
 - During his Wildcat career, the Knoxville, Tennessee, native, played in 46 career games with 39 consecutive starts. He was an essential component for the "Big Blue Wall" which has been under consideration for the Joe Moore Award, given to the nation's top offensive line, four of the last five seasons, including finalists in 2021.
- Hoskins played at Kentucky from 2017-20 and was in his second season in the NFL.
 - The Toledo, Ohio, native played one season with the Carolina Panthers after being drafted in the seventh round by as the 232nd overall pick in the 2021 National Football League Draft. He was picked up by the Chiefs in January of 2023. He saw action in eight games with the Panthers, totaling six tackles and one sack.
- Overall, 16 Wildcats have won a total of 18 Super Bowl championship rings.



CATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

- Kentucky had three selections in the 2023 NFL Draft - Will Levis (2nd Round, Tennessee), Chris Rodriguez Jr. (6th, Washington) and Carrington Valentine (7th, Green Bay). All three have earned a place on opening day NFL rosters.
- In total, 25 players have been drafted under head coach Mark Stoops since 2013, including 14 defensive players in Avery Williamson, Bud Dupree, Za'Darius Smith, Josh Forrest, Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson, Mike Edwards, Jamin Davis, Kelvin Joseph, Quinton Bohanna, Brandin Echols, Josh Paschal and Carrington Valentine.
- Kentucky has totaled four or more players selected in the first five rounds three times in school history, including twice in the last four years under Coach Mark Stoops - 2022, 2019 and 1966.
- Kentucky has had a player selected in the first three rounds in five consecutive drafts.

DID YOU KNOW?

- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** enters his 46th season in that role. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, now marking his 50th year in UK football. He has worked more than 500 consecutive games.
- UK is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship, while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.

KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 325 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. **UK has a 184-141-4 record (.566), 48-25 (.658) under Mark Stoops.**
- 2023 marks the 50th season at the facility.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 60,261 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 16 of the last 18 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years. *Note: Kroger Field capacity was limited to 12,000 fans per game in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions
- The stadium footprint is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner--begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery

Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Ole Miss, Mississippi State and Missouri. The end zones and team sideline areas feature a checkerboard pattern in alternating shades of blue. It was designed to mimic the pattern of Secretariat's silks, which has been part of the football uniforms for five seasons. The school's new interlocking "UK" logo is positioned in the center of the field.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. Therefore, the Cat Walk was moved to Talbott Todd Way. The Cat Walk typically begins outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, and the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House. It was dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65) who passed away from ALS in August of 2017 and was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team walks to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompa-

The 2022 season marked yet another year of achievement for Coach Mark Stoops and the Kentucky football program.

When the Wildcats took on Iowa in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl in December of 2022, it extended a school-record streak of seven-consecutive bowl games, all under Stoops. Kentucky reached the postseason by posting a 7-5 record, the sixth-consecutive season (not including the Covid-shortened 2020 season) that UK has won at least seven games.

Stoops has personal milestones as well as he enters his 11th season at Kentucky, longest term of any coach in school history. The Wildcats' victory at Florida in 2022 was Stoops' 61st win, breaking the school record of 60 held by Paul "Bear" Bryant.

Called "the best program builder in all of college football" a year ago by ESPN analyst Tom Luginbill, Stoops' success hasn't come easily.

Inheriting a program that was 2-10 the year before he arrived, Stoops' rebuilding efforts took time. Two games into the 2016 season his record was 12-26, but the program took off from there and the coach has engineered a 56-33 (.629)mark since.

In addition to this season's achievements, a partial accounting of Stoops' exploits features:

- Four straight bowl wins – the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2022, the 2020 Gator Bowl, the 2019 Belk Bowl and the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 – first time in school history that UK won four straight bowls
- A school-record 20-game win streak against nonconference competition (2018-22), which was the nation's longest active streak at the time.
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2020)
- First New Year's Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)

Mark Stoops has 67 wins in the Blue and White, surpassing the school record of 60 set by Paul "Bear" Bryant.

Under Stoops, 25 players have been drafted in the NFL, including 14 defensive players.



STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

In 10 seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's 11 classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Kentucky's Signing Day class for 2022 was UK's highest-rated class in the available history of recruiting rankings. (Note: these rankings are based on UK's 20 signees, 19 high school and one junior college, and did not include four-year college transfers Tashawn Manning and Tayvion Robinson.)

Several of Stoops' players have also won All-America accolades, along with honors such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Jason Witten Man of the Year, Pop Warner Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

Off the field, Stoops has been active in fundraising and events for the UK Children's Hospital and he was named Honorary Coach of the 2022 National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last seven seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, taking over a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final *USA Today* coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the

final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

Stoops followed with the Covid-shortened 2020 season that was capped by a Gator Bowl win over No. 23 North Carolina State.

The momentum continued in 2021 with another 10-win season -- the second under Stoops and only the fourth in school history -- capped by a dramatic come-from-behind win over Iowa in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game,

and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year. The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year



accolades. During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State. Mark and Mike have reunited in Lexington, as Mike joined the UK staff in 2022 as inside linebackers coach.

Prior to Arizona, Mark Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League ca-

reers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.

VINCE MARROW

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/TIGHT ENDS/RECRUITING COORDINATOR

Vince Marrow, aka the "Big Dawg," enters his 11th season at Kentucky, currently handling the duties of associate head coach/tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator/NFL liaison.

Marrow's tight ends have been a big factor in UK producing six consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards with at least one 1,000-yard rusher in five of those (Stanley "Boom" Williams -2016; Benny Snell Jr., - 2017, 2018; Lynn Bowden - 2019; Chris Rodriguez Jr. - 2021). Marrow also has been instrumental in UK signing 10 straight top-50 recruiting classes, including the highest-rated class in UK history in 2021.

Marrow had a professional playing career as a member of NFL rosters on five teams, including Buffalo, Carolina, New York Jets, Chicago and San Francisco. After his NFL days ended, Marrow played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 1998, earning all-league honors with 32 receptions for 345 yards. He also played for the Orlando Rage in the XFL in 2001.

He began his collegiate playing career at Youngstown State before transferring to Toledo. Marrow played two seasons at Toledo, earning second-team All-MAC honors in 1991 before being drafted by the Bills in 1992.

KENTUCKY 44, BALL STATE 14

SEPT. 2, 2023 • LEXINGTON, KY. KROGER FIELD (58,286)



Kentucky scored touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams on Saturday, beating Ball State 44-14 in the 2023 season opener at Kroger Field.

Quarterback Devin Leary, making his first start for Kentucky, connected on 18 of 31 passing for 241 yards with a touchdown and an interception. Running back Ray Davis, also wearing blue for the first time on Saturday, rushed for 112 yards and a pair of scores for the Cats.

Kentucky (1-0) had 357 yards of total offense in the game compared to just 295 for Ball State. The Cardinals

actually had more first downs than the Cats (18-16) but the Cats took advantage of both BSU turnovers, converting those into 10 points.

The Cats also got a defensive score on a 69-yard fumble recovery and return by Jalen Geiger, as well as a 99-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by Barion Brown.

Defensively, Trevin Wallace led the Cats with 12 tackles, while Alex Afari, Maxwell Hairston and D'Eryk Jackson each had eight stops.

On the first play from scrimmage, Leary connected with Dane Key over the middle for a 44-yard completion, quickly getting the Cats into BSU territory. But the drive stalled and UK settled for a 41-yard field goal from Alex Raynor, which was good, and Kentucky took an early 3-0 lead.

Ball State went three-and-out on its first drive but the Cardinals' punt pinned the Cats at their own six. Kentucky quickly dug itself out of that hole on a 26-yard run by Davis. But Kentucky was forced to punt, giving the ball back to Ball State with 8:40 still to play in the first quarter.

On the ensuing possession, the Cardinals drove into UK territory for the first time. Ball State would march 73 yards in 13 plays, ending with a one-yard quarterback sneak touchdown run by Layne Hatcher. Jackson Courville added the extra point and Ball State led 7-3 with 1:35 to play in the first.

Kentucky wasted little time getting into the Ball State red zone early in the second period. A 27-yard connection from Leary to Key, followed by a 16-yard completion to Tayvion Robinson, got the Cats to the BSU four yard line. A couple of plays later, Davis scored on a two-yard rush, his first touchdown as a Wildcat, to give UK the lead. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 10-7 with 11:31 to play in the half.

Ball State drove into UK territory on its next possession before the UK defense made a big play. Hatcher completed a pass to Tanner Koziol, who was hit by UK's Afari, resulting in a fumble that Geiger scooped up and took 69 yards for a Kentucky touchdown. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky grabbed a 17-7 advantage with 6:58 left in the half.

The UK defense forced another three-and-out on Ball State's next possession, forcing a Cardinals' punt. Kentucky took over at its own 45 with 4:35 to play in the half.

Kentucky would get into Ball State territory but, on fourth and three from the BSU 33, Leary was intercepted by Ball State's Tyler Potts to end the threat and give the Cardinals the ball back with 1:37 left in the half.

The UK defense would make another big play before the end of the half. BSU's Malcolm Gillie caught a pass from Hatcher but was hit by UK's Hairston, causing a fumble that was recovered by Jordan Lovett, giving Kentucky the ball at the BSU 31 with 1:22 left in the half.

Kentucky could do nothing with the ensuing possession, but the Cats got a 46-yard field goal from Raynor with 1:08 to play in the half to make it 20-7 UK.

Ball State got the ball back but Kentucky used its timeouts wisely and forced a Cardinals' punt. The Cats took over on their own 45 with 31 seconds to play. On the second play of the possession, Leary hit Barion Brown for 26 yards, getting the Cats to the BSU 29 with 17 seconds left in the half. On the final play of the half, Raynor connected on a 46-yard field goal, giving Kentucky a 23-7 lead at the half.

The Cardinals got the ball first in the third quarter. BSU got one first down and drove near midfield before being forced to punt. UK took over at its own 11 with 9:29 remaining in the third quarter.

Kentucky took over and put together an impressive scoring drive. The Cats marched 89 yards in seven plays, culminating when Leary found Key in the back of the end zone for a five-yard touchdown pass. Raynor added the point after and Kentucky led 30-7 with 6:43 left in the third.

Ball State answered with a scoring drive of its own. The Cardinals went 75 yards in 10 plays. The drive ended with a touchdown pass from Kaydin Semonza to Ty Robinson. Courville added the PAT to make it 30-14 with less than a minute to play in the third.

On the ensuing kickoff, Brown fielded the ball on the right hash at the one, went up the middle, and was off to the races, covering 99 yards for a kick return touchdown, the second of his young career. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 37-14 with 28 seconds left in the period. That would be the score after three quarters.

In the fourth quarter, Ball State drove deep into Kentucky territory, eventually getting to the UK one yard line. But on fourth and goal, Semonza tried a quarterback sneak and was stuffed by UK's Keaten Wade and Trevin Wallace, foiling the scoring opportunity and giving the ball back to the Cats with 9:57 left in the game.

Kentucky would add a late score when Davis scampered 30 yards for his second touchdown of the game with just six seconds remaining. Raynor added the PAT to provide the final margin of victory.

KENTUCKY 28, EASTERN KENTUCKY 17

SEPT. 9, 2023 • LEXINGTON, KY.
KROGER FIELD (61,876)



Devin Leary threw a career high-tying four touchdown passes, including two to Tayvion Robinson, as Kentucky rallied past Eastern Kentucky 28-17 at Kroger Field.

Leary connected on 24 of 38 through the air for 299 yards and the four scores with an interception. Robinson caught six passes for 136 yards and a pair of scores.

Barion Brown also had a big day for the Cats with 152 yards of all purpose offense and a score. Ray Davis led the Cats with 52 yards rushing on 12 carries. Davis also caught a touchdown pass from Leary.

Andru Phillips and Trevin Wallace led the Cats with seven tackles each, while Jordan Lovett, D'Eryk Jackson and Deone Walker each had five stops.

Kentucky (2-0) got the game's first possession but the Cats were unable to make a first down and were forced to punt. Wilson Berry's kick was blocked by EKU's Cornelius Evans and the Colonels took over on the UK 30 yard line.

The Colonels would take advantage of the short field. After making a first down, EKU got on the board when quarterback Parker McKinney scrambled 14 yards for a touchdown. Patrick Nations added the extra point and Eastern Kentucky led 7-0 with 10:46 left in the first quarter.

On the ensuing possession, Kentucky got three first downs, crossing the 50 into EKU territory. But the drive stalled and, on fourth and nine from the EKU 33, Leary was sacked by the Colonels' Albert Nunes and the Cats turned the ball over on downs with 4:30 to play in the first.

EKU took the ball and got into UK territory before the Kentucky defense forced a punt. The Cats would take over at their own seven yard line with 1:40 remaining in the period. The Colonels would hold a 7-0 lead after one quarter.

Early in the second quarter, Kentucky was forced to punt and EKU took over deep in its own territory. On the second play of the drive, UK linebacker Trevin Wallace hit EKU's Braedon Sloan, causing a fumble that Kentucky's Alex Afari recovered at the EKU 24.

The EKU defense would step up on the drive, as Frank Lee tipped a Leary pass, then intercepted it at the EKU 39. The Colonels took over with 10:39 left in the half.

Again, EKU would get into Kentucky territory, but this drive would be stopped when McKinney's pass over the middle was intercepted by UK's Maxwell Hairston at the UK four yard lin. Kentucky took over with 10:00 left in the half.

Kentucky was able to make a pair of first downs on its next drive, but the Cats would be forced to punt again and EKU took over at its own 13 with 7:17 to play in the half.

EKU took its next possession and again drove into UK territory. But the drive stalled and the Colonels tried a 48-yard field goal. But Nations' kick came up short and the Cats took over at their own 31 with 4:40 to play in the half.

Kentucky would make one first down before being forced to punt again. EKU took over at its own 3 yard line with 3:30 left in the half.

The Colonels punted and Kentucky got a 36-yard return from Barion Brown, giving the Cats the ball at the EKU 24 with 48 seconds left in the half. And the Cats immediately took advantage when Leary hit Tayvion Robinson in the left corner of the end zone for a 24-yard touchdown pass. Alex Raynor added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 42 seconds left in the half.

EKU had the first possession of the second half and the Colonels wasted little time getting into the UK red zone. The Colonels got inside the UK 10 before the Kentucky defense got a stop and forced a 21-yard field goal attempt. Nations would make the kick and the Colonels grabbed a 10-7 lead with 9:41 left in the third quarter.

Kentucky would answer with a scoring drive of its own. UK got a 25-yard pass from Leary to Robinson, followed by a 26-yard run on a reverse from Brown to get inside the EKU 10. Then, on third and goal, Leary connected with Robinson for the duo's second touchdown of the game. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led for the first time, 14-10, with 5:47 left in the third.

On the next possession, EKU would get one first down before being forced to punt. Kentucky would take over at its own 15 yard line with 3:47 to play in the third period. The Cats again would turn to Robinson, this time on a reverse, that the super senior took 56 yards deep into EKU territory. Two plays later, Leary hit

Brown in the corner of the end zone for a touchdown. Raynor added another PAT and Kentucky led 21-10 with 1:47 to play in the third period.

Eastern Kentucky quickly responded. McKinney hit Joshua Carter over the middle for a 39-yard game. McKinney then scrambled for six yards on the final play of the third quarter, getting EKU to the UK 24 yard line. The Colonels would get to the nine and that's when McKinney hit Sloan for a nine-yard touchdown. Nations drilled the PAT and Kentucky's lead was cut to 21-17 with 12:04 to play.

Kentucky responded with an efficient, six-play, 65-yard drive that ended with Leary throwing his fourth touchdown pass of the day, a 24-yard wheel route to Davis, to increase the UK lead. Raynor added another PAT and the Cats led 28-17 with 8:08 to play.

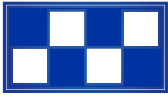

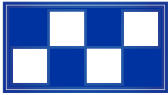
