KENTUCKY PLAYS HOST TO TENNESSEE IN ANNUAL BORDER BATTLE

After an open date, the University of Kentucky football team will play host to No. 21/20 Tennessee on Saturday, Oct. 28 under the lights of Kroger Field on ESPN. It's been three years since the Wildcats have beaten the Volunteers, but a win Saturday would split the record, 2-2, over their last four meetings.

Senior running back Ray Davis spearheads the Kentucky offense, leading the SEC in rushing (111.6 yards per game), all-purpose yardage (139.1 ypg), touchdowns (13) and scoring (11.1 points per game). Senior quarterback Devin Leary has thrown for 1,377 yards and 14 touchdowns.

The UK defense has been led by cornerback Maxwell Hairston, who leads the SEC in pass interceptions with five, two of which have been returned for touchdowns. He shares the team lead in tackles with linebacker D'Eryk Jackson, each with 44 stops.

QUICK NOTES

- The Wildcats are celebrating their 50th anniversary of the opening of Kroger Field this season, which was formerly named Commonwealth Stadium (1973-2016).
 - The Cats have won 17 of their past 22 games at Kroger Field.
 - The Cats are 17-5 in their last 22 home night games, including 1-1 in 2023.
- Ray Davis was recently named to the Maxwell Award Watch List, The Sporting News Midseason All-America Team and Reese's Senior Bowl Midseason All-America Team, while he and Maxwell Hairston were named to the AP Midseason All-America Second Team.
 - J.J. Weaver was named a semifinalist for Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award, while Devin Leary was named to the Comeback Player of the Year Watch List, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Top 25 and the Maxwell Award Watch List.
- Kentucky has found success running its rushing offense through running back Ray Davis.
 - Through Week 8, he leads the Southeastern Conference and ranks among the top 10 in the nation in all-purpose yards (139.14), rushing yards per carry (7.04), rushing yards per game (111.6), scoring (11.1) and total touchdowns (13).
 - The running back has a touchdown in each of Kentucky's first seven games of the season, the first Wildcat to accomplish that feat through the first six games in program history.
- The Wildcat defense is second in the league and 12 defense (95.7), holding six of their last eight opponents to less than 100 yards rushing (dating back to 2022).
- Kicker Alex Raynor has made 12 straight field goals, including 6-of-6 this season.

Wireless Internet access through campus requires a unique username and password to log onto our ATHMEDIA wifi. If this is your first game to cover this season, you will receive a username and password prior to game day that allows a calendar year of access to the ATHMEDIA network. How to log in with your username and password? When you arrive at Kroger Field, connect to the ATHMEDIA network. If your Internet browser does not open automatically, open your pre-ferred Internet browser, go to www.uky.edu and type in your unique username and password to connect. This username and password can connect up to three devices. For more information, see a member of UK's Athletics Communication and PR office.

MEDIA PARKING

All media parking this season will be distributed electronically. You will have to setup a myUK Ticketmaster account to accept the parking pass if you don't already have an account. Instructions for how to access your parking is available at ukathletics.com/mobiletickets. It is recommended that you do this before game day and save the pass to your Apple/Google Play wallet. Please make sure the email address for the attendee is accurate in SportsSystems. If you have not received an email to access your parking by Friday morning, please email wecran2@uky.edu. Please ignore the row/seat on the parking pass, that is for internal use only.

MEDIA SHUTTLE

A media shuttle will be provided to working media 3 hours prior to kickoff from Parking Structure 1 (Yellow Y permit) to Gate 11 and 3 hours after the conclusion of the game from Gate 11 back to PS1. The shuttle will pick up/drop off from the entrance of the parking structure, which is the side facing the hospital.

MEDIA FIELD ACCESS

- Media are NOT allowed field level access pregame or in-game unless approved an on-field green background credential by the ACPR office for the game. Scouts will be provided pregame field access.
- Media are allowed field access through Field Gate 12 for the final five minutes of the game. Field access is available for photo/scout through Field Gate 12 pregame and in-game only.
- Postgame, all media/photo/scout should exit through Field Gate 1, which is closest to the UK postgame media room.
- AT NO TIME SHOULD ANY MEDIA MEMBER GO THROUGH THE KENTUCKY TUNNEL TO GET TO THE UK POSTGAME MEDIA ROOM.
- Due to the presence of prospective student-athletes on the field pregame, media/photo are required to stay in the west endzone (between Field Gate 9 and Field Gate 4) to the start of the UK and visiting team bench areas. NFL scouts are allowed access to the full exterior of the field pregame. The Kentucky and visiting team bench areas and the east endzone are not available to media pregame. A map showing the pregame media/photo area is on the back.

FIELD PHOTO AREA TO SERVICE PHOTOGRAPHERS

The field-level photo area is located inside Gate 11 at Ramp 28/29. There will be box lunches and water served in the room. Flip cards will be available. Space is limited. Security has been positioned outside the room to keep equipment safe during the game. If you wish to just store your equipment, please store it on the floor and not on table tops.

KENTUCKY IN THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Wildcats have a 192-403-12 (.322) all-time record in Southeastern Conference games.
 - UK head coach Mark Stoops has a 34-52 (.395) all-time record in SEC games.

KENTUCKY-TENNESSEE SERIES

- Saturday marks the 119th meeting between the border rivals.
- The two teams have met annually since 1919, except for 1943, when Kentucky did not field a team. The 119 all-time meetings are the most for UK vs. any one opponent.
- Kentucky trails in the all-time series against Tennessee, 83-26-9.
 - The Wildcats also trail the series in Lexington, 39-15-3.
- UT has won the last two straight meetings, and four of the last six meetings.
 - The last time UK defeated UT was in 2020, 34-7, in Knoxville.
 - The last time UK defeated UT at home was in 2017, 29-26.
 - Biggest UK win: 56 (56-0) in 1893 in Knoxville (first-ever meeting)
 - Biggest Tennessee win: 52 (52-0) in 1994 in Knoxville

KENTUCKY-TENNESSEE CONNECTIONS

- Kentucky has six players from the state of Tennessee on its roster, including:
 - Wide receivers Barion Brown (Nashville) and Shamar Porter (Nashville), quarterback Destin Wade (Spring Hill), outside linebacker Keaten Wade (Spring Hill) and defensive linemen Tre'vonn Rybka (Dickson) and Edric Simmons (Nashville)
- Tennessee has two players from the state of Kentucky on its roster, including:
 - Linebacker Kalib Perry (Georgetown) and defensive back Cristian Conyer (Bowling Green)
- Eddie Gran, special assistant to head coach Mark Stoops, served as a running backs coach at Tennessee in 2009.
- Mitch Barnhart, who is in his 22nd year as UK's Director of Athletics, held several positions at Tennessee Athletics from 1986-98.

KENTUCKY VS. THE RANKED

- Kentucky has played 267 ranked teams in the Associated Press poll in its history, while the Wildcats are 51-211-5 in those games.
 - UK is 1-1 against ranked teams this season, defeating then-No. 22/23 Florida at home on Sept. 30 and falling to then-No. 1/1 Georgia in Athens on Oct. 7.
 - Please note, Missouri was ranked No. 25 in the Coaches Poll when the two teams met on Oct. 14, but unranked in the AP poll.*
- UK is 4-35-1 in all-time games against a ranked-UT team.
 - The last time Kentucky defeated a ranked-Tennessee team was in 2020, when the Cats defeated the then-No. 18 Vols, 34-7, in Knoxville.
 - That also was the last time an unranked Kentucky defeated a ranked Tennessee.
- The Wildcats went 2-3 against ranked teams last season in 2022, defeating then-No. 12/19 Florida on the road and then-No. 16/17 Mississippi State at home.
 - The Cats fell to then-No. 14/11 Ole Miss in Oxford, Mississippi, in a heartbreaking, 22-19, loss and it lost to then-No. 3/3 Tennessee on the road, 44-6. The Cats played top-ranked Georgia tough before falling, 16-6.
- Since 2018, the Wildcats are 10-12 against AP ranked teams.
 - Kentucky has won six of its last 11 ranked meetings, including victories vs. No. 23 NC State in 2020; No. 10 Florida and No. 17 Iowa in 2021; No. 12 Florida and No. 16 Mississippi State in 2022; and No. 22 Florida in 2023.

A UK WIN WOULD...

- Make UK bowl-eligible for a school-record eighth straight season.
- Improve UK to 6-2 overall and 3-2 in the Southeastern Conference.
- Improve UK to 2-1 against Associated Press ranked teams this season.
- Help an unranked-UK team to its second win over a ranked-UT team since 2020.
 - Help UK improve to a 5-35-1 all-time record against ranked-UT teams.



- Help UK to an 11-12 record against ranked teams since 2018.
- Help UK win 18 of their past 23 games at Kroger Field.
 - Help UK to an 18-5 record in their last 23 home night games, including 2-1 in 2023.
- Help UK improve to a 27-83-9 all-time record against UT.
 - Help UK improve to a 16-39-3 record against UT in Lexington.
 - Help UK to two wins in its past four meetings with UT.
- Extend head coach Mark Stoops' all-time school records for wins to 72, SEC wins to 35, wins over ranked opponents to 13 and home wins to 51.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

SIRI, WHO IS LEARY?

- In four seasons at NC State (2019-22), quarterback Devin Leary made 26 starts in 30 games played, connecting on 568 of his 944 passes for 6,807 yards and 62 touchdowns. In that time, he had just 16 interceptions.
 - Between 2021 and 2022, he aided NC State to a 17-4 record, helping him earn ACC Preseason Player of the Year praise in 2022. He got off to a promising start through just six games in 2022, before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury against Florida State.
 - The last time he was healthy for a full season was in 2021, when he threw for 35 touchdowns and just five interceptions. He also added two rushing touchdowns that season. Leary finished that season ranked in the top 25 in the nation in completion percentage, completions per game, passing efficiency, passing touchdowns, passing yards, passing yards per game, total offense, points responsible for and points responsible for per game.
- The signal caller is best known for his timing and precision as a pocket passer, while he also has the ability to break down defenses in play action and can throw the deep ball when needed.
- While his experience combined with his talent is exciting for Big Blue Nation in 2023, it doesn't stop there when you consider what else is around him, including a renovated offensive line, experienced running backs, dangerous pass catchers and a proven offensive coordinator in Liam Coen.

DEVIN LEARY IN BLUE & WHITE

- Following a surgery and almost a year of not playing, Devin Leary has completed 106 of his 195 passing attempts (54.4 percent) for 1,377 yards, 14 touchdowns and just seven interceptions through seven games. He ranks third in the SEC in TD passes.
 - He is coming off his first touchdown rushing of 2023, and the sixth of his career, on a 13-yard scamper up the middle on Kentucky's second possession of the game against RV/No. 25 Missouri on Oct. 14.
- Leary threw for at least 240 yards and at least one touchdown in each of his first three games in Blue and White. He became the first quarterback to do that in at least two-and-a-half decades.
 - Leary topped off the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2 connecting on 10 of his last 11 passes in the game.
 - Leary came back the next weekend against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 9 to throw for 299 yards and four touchdowns. Again, he finished strong by completing his last eight passes of the contest.
 - The next weekend, he connected on 16 of his 25 pass attempts for 315 yards and three touchdowns against Akron on Sept. 16. It marked the ninth game of his career with at least 300 yards, while he became just the 15th quarterback in school history to throw for at least 300 yards.
 - He also became the first UK signal caller to have at least three touchdown passes in consecutive games since Mike Hartline against South Carolina and Georgia in 2010.

- In his Kentucky debut against Ball State on Sept. 2, he surpassed the 7,000 career yards passing mark. He eclipsed 8,000 yards at Georgia on Oct. 7.
 - He currently has the 26th-most career yards passing among active players in the FBS (8,184).

"SWEET BABY RAY"

- Through Week 8, which includes a bye week for the Wildcats, Ray Davis leads the Southeastern Conference and ranks among the top 13 in the nation in rushing yards per game (111.6), all-purpose yardage per game, scoring (11.1 points per game), total points scored (78) and total touchdowns (13). He has produced four games this season with 100+ all-purpose yards.
- He has a touchdown in each of Kentucky's first seven games of the season.
 - He became the only player in program history to score a touchdown in the **first seven** games of the season (with single-game statistics available to the 1940s).
 - He is the first player in program history to score a touchdown in **seven straight** games since Benny Snell Jr. tallied the last six games of 2017 and first game of 2018.
 - He is the first player in program history to score a touchdown in seven straight games **within the same season** since Randall Cobb in 2009.
- Through Week 8, which includes a bye week for the Wildcats, he has the fourth-most career yards rushing among active players in the FBS (3,278).

A RUSHER & A RECEIVER

- Just before conference action began, Ray Davis had one of the better performances of his career and in program history.
 - In Week 3 against Akron on Sept. 16, he led Kentucky in yards rushing (72) **and** yards receiving (97). He had seven carries for 72 yards rushing, including a career-long, 55-yard run for a touchdown. He also had three receptions for a career-best 97 yards receiving, including a career-long, 58-yard reception for a touchdown.
 - With single-game records available since the 1940s, he became the first UK player in program history to have both a rushing and receiving touchdown of at least 50 yards in the same game.

RAY DAVIS CREDITS THE "BIG BLUE WALL" IN FLORIDA WIN

- Ray Davis had 26 carries for a career-high 280 yards rushing and a career-best three touchdowns rushing, while also adding a nine-yard touchdown reception, in Kentucky's third straight win against Florida on Sept. 30.
 - His 280 yards rushing were the third most in a game in program history.
 - His 280 yards were the second most of any Florida opponent all time.
 - He became the ninth player in UK history to eclipse 200 yards rushing in a game, while it marked the 13th instance in program history.
 - His four touchdowns tied the school record for the most total touchdowns in a game. He became the 13th player in UK history to have four touchdowns in a game, while it marked the 15th instance in program history.
 - It was his second game this season to have a rushing and receiving touchdown.
 - On his second touchdown, he had a career-long, 75-yard scoring dash.
- In his postgame interview, Davis said, "I didn't make history, our O-Line made history. We ran for over 300 yards (as a team). As a collective unit, we made history."

THE RUNNING BACK ROOM

- For the past few years, there has been little doubt as to who would be the featured running back at Kentucky, from Stanley "Boom" Williams to Benny Snell to Chris Rodriguez Jr. However, prior to the start of this season, there was no clear starter to Big Blue Nation. Instead, numerous exciting prospects that are all expected to play a part in 2023.
 - Ray Davis**, a senior transfer from Vanderbilt, already had success at Kroger Field before arriving to UK, when he rushed 129 yards and earned one touchdown there, helping Vanderbilt defeat Kentucky in 2022. He led the Commodores in rushing with 1,042 yards on 232 carries and five touchdowns last season, producing five 100-plus yard games.
 - Ramon Jefferson**, who is in his seventh year of college football, returned for an additional season after suffering an injury to the knee in 2022. He amassed 2,954 yards rushing in his career before the season began, and prior to last season in 2022, was ranked fifth on the Division I active career rushing yards list.
 - JuTahn McClain**, a senior, has gotten better with each season in the Bluegrass, including his most productive season yet in 2022. Then, he was the second leading rusher for Kentucky, racking up 278 yards on 59 attempts.
 - La'Veil Wright**, a sophomore, is young but provides great size at 6-foot, 214 pounds, and is growing in experience after seeing action in all 13 games in 2022, rushing 120 yards on 39 carries.
 - Demie Sumo-Karngbaye**, a junior transfer from NC State, already has a connection with quarterback Devin Leary in Raleigh. Last season, he was the Wolfpack's second leading rusher thanks to 305 yards on 55 carries and three touchdowns.

TRIPLE THREAT

- The Wildcats returned one of the most exciting wide receiver corps in the Southeastern Conference in sophomores Barion Brown and Dane Key and redshirt fifth year Tayvion Robinson.
 - In 2022, all three of those guys were new to the program, but you wouldn't guess it, as the trio combined for 127 catches for 1,644 yards and 13 touchdowns.

BUT WAIT, THERE'S MORE!

- Barion Brown also returned as one of the nation's leaders in kickoff returns.
 - In 2022, he concluded the regular season ranked 31st in the nation and fifth in the Southeastern Conference in kickoff return average at 28.3 yards per runback. He was also ranked 13th in the SEC in all-purpose yards per game (88.17).
 - The rookie was also the only player in the nation with two 80-plus yard kickoff returns (vs. Miami (Ohio), at then-No. 14/11 Ole Miss).
 - He made a stunning debut against Miami (Ohio) on Sept. 3, 2022, taking the opening kick of the second half back 100 yards for a touchdown in the season opener. Brown took the kick, sliced to his left, found open space and then outran everyone down the visiting sideline.
 - It was the first Kentucky kickoff return for a score since Derrick Locke went to the house vs. Louisville (100 yards) in September 2009.
 - Brown was named the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts.
- Well... he did it again. In the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2, Brown took a kickoff return 99 yards back for a touchdown.
 - He became the fourth player in school history with multiple career kickoff return touchdowns, and he became the third player in school history with a kickoff return touchdown in consecutive seasons.
- Through Week 8 in 2023, Brown is averaging 30.6 yards per kickoff return. He would be ranked fourth in the nation in that category, but does not have enough returns to officially qualify.

WHAT CAN BROWN DO FOR YOU?

- You already know about wide receiver Barion Brown, but be on the lookout for wide receiver Anthony Brown-Stephens.
- The freshman from Springfield, Ohio, received some preseason praise from the coaching staff after fall camp, and it has nothing to do with his famous uncle John Legend.
 - "He's everything everybody thought of him. He's poised, he's a good route-runner, he's smart. He takes coaching." - Tayvion Robinson



- “He really took a jump, from the spring, to the summer, to now. Anything you tell AB to do, he’s doing it 110%.” - Scott Woodward
- “I thought he’s handled this go-around extremely well, in terms of being somebody we can count on to go play, somebody we can be able to push the ball down the field to. Diligent worker, smart kid. Bright future ahead of him.” - Liam Coen
- He has played in each game this season, recording three receptions and a touchdown thus far. His lone touchdown came in his seventh game of 2023, thanks to a 4-yard reception against RV/No. 25 Missouri on Oct. 14.
 - He also had a 64-yard touchdown reception against Akron on Sept. 16, but it was called back because of a holding penalty.

HERE'S TO YOU, MR. ROBINSON

- Tayvion Robinson, a redshirt fifth year, returned to Kentucky for a second season in Lexington in 2023. Last season, he finished second on the team in catches (40) and third on the team in yards receiving (497) and touchdowns receiving (3).
 - Before Kentucky, he spent three seasons at Virginia Tech (2019-21), recording 113 catches for 1,555 yards and eight touchdowns. He also averaged 11.4 yards on punt returns, including a 60-yard touchdown jaunt.
- Despite missing two games in the back half of the schedule due to injury last season in 2022, Robinson had numerous standout performances that revealed his potential here.
 - He began last season with at least six receptions in three of the first four games in 2022. That includes making a career-high seven catches for a career-high 147 yards and a career-high two touchdowns in Kentucky’s triumph over Northern Illinois on Sept. 24. In the game, he had a 69-yard catch-and-run in the second quarter, which was the longest play of his college career and his first touchdown in Blue and White.
- Through Week 8 in 2023, he is tied for the team lead in receptions (23) and leads the wideouts in yards receiving (338) and touchdowns receiving (3).
- Robinson is currently ranked high on numerous active career leader lists:
 - Tied for the 15th-most career receiving yards among active players in the FBS (2,390).
 - Tied for the 18th-most career receptions among active players in the FBS (176).
 - The 24th-most career all-purpose yards among active players in the FBS (3,386).
 - The 28th-most career receiving yards per game among active players in the FBS (44.3).

BRICK-BY-BRICK

- The Big Blue Wall, who was recently named to the **Joe Moore Midseason Honor Roll** on Oct. 17, went under construction in the offseason, and players have referenced its rebuild as a brick-by-brick process.
- The Wildcats brought in veteran transfers Tanner Bowles (*Alabama*), Courtland Ford (*Southern California*), Marques Cox (*Northern Illinois*), Dylan Ray (*West Virginia*) and Ben Christman (*Ohio State*), who is out for the season after suffering an injury in fall camp.
- Those transfers, combined with veterans such as Jager Burton, Eli Cox, Kenneth Horsey and Jeremy Flax, UK had one of the most experienced lines in the nation entering the season, ranking in the top 25 in career games played and the top 15 in career games started.
- Wildcat O-Linemen have received awards following two games this season:
 - Eli Cox was named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week after the win over ECU.
 - Jeremy Flax was named Outland Trophy National Player of the Week and SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week after the win over Florida.

START ME UP

- Kentucky benefited from fast starts in three of its four Southeastern Conference games, outscoring Vanderbilt, Florida and Missouri, 51-0, in the first quarter, allowing UK to play from ahead instead of the unenviable task of trying to mount a comeback in the rugged league.
 - On the road at Vanderbilt on Sept. 23, the Cats mounted a 21-0 edge out of the gate, which tied a school record for most points in the first quarter, then followed that up with 16 unanswered points in the first quarter against then-No. 22/23 Florida on Sept. 30.

MILESTONES REACHED IN 2023

- **Coach Mark Stoops** has the most victories (71) in Kentucky history, most SEC victories (34), most home victories (50) and most victories against ranked opponents (12).
- Senior **QB Devin Leary** surpassed 8,000 career passing yards against Georgia on Oct. 7.
 - He has thrown for 8,064 passing yards in his career.
- Senior RB **Ray Davis** rushed for 280 yards against Florida on Sept. 30 to surpass 3,000 for his career, making him one of only four active FBS players to accomplish that feat.
 - He has rushed for 3,150 yards in his career.
- Senior **RB Ramon Jefferson** needs 10 rushing yards to reach 3,000 for his career.
 - He has rushed for 2,990 in his career.
- Sophomore **CB Maxwell Hairston** returned two interceptions for touchdowns at Vanderbilt on Sept. 23, becoming the only player in school history to have two INT returns for TD in same game. He also tied the SEC single-game record.
- Junior **LB Trevin Wallace** reached 100 total tackles for his career against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 9.
 - He has 117 tackles in his career.

- Kentucky has scored on its opening drive in five of seven games this season.

A HOT OFFENSIVE START TO THE SEASON

- Kentucky scored at least 28 points in its first five games of 2023, which marked the first time it scored at least as many through its first five games since 2007.
- The Wildcats scored at least 26 points in each of their first four games for three consecutive seasons for the first time in school history.
- UK won its first five games of the season by at least 11 points for the first time since 2018.
- Kentucky tied the school record for the most points scored in the first quarter in program history with its 21 points in its Southeastern Conference opener at Vanderbilt on Sept. 23.
 - It marked the eighth instance in program history and the first since 2016 against Southern Mississippi.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

WHITE-OUT

- Brad White is in his fifth season as the defensive coordinator, and his sixth season overall at Kentucky, since Mark Stoops plucked him from the NFL in 2018. He became defensive coordinator in 2019 and UK has steadily become more stout on that side of the ball.
 - Other programs have taken notice, too, as White has turned down several other coaching opportunities in that time.
- Kentucky's defense has remained constant under White, even through the start of 2023, and that is evident by the benchmarks he continues to reach year-in and year-out.
 - The UK defense has held opponents to 30 points or fewer in 48 of 57 games with White as the defensive coordinator (2019-present).
 - The UK defense has held opponents to 24 points or fewer in 20 of the last 24 games.
 - Kentucky allowed 28 points or less in its first five games of the season, for three straight seasons, for the first time since 1960-62.
 - This is the second season in a row that UK has held its first three opponents to 17 points or fewer, which marks the first time UK has done that since 1949-50.
 - UK allowed 26 or fewer points per game in four straight seasons (2019-22), the first time that had been accomplished since 1986-89.
 - For the first time since 1959-62 it has yielded 160 rushing yards or fewer per game for four straight seasons (2019-22).

RUSHING DEFENSE

- Kentucky is currently ranked 13th in the nation and second in the Southeastern Conference in rushing defense, allowing opponents to just 95.7 yards per game in 2023.



- The Wildcats held each of their first five opponents of the season to under 100 yards rushing for the first time in program history, based on game-by-game stats available since the 1940s.
- The Wildcats have held six of their last eight opponents to less than 100 yards rushing, a streak dating back to the final game of 2022.

AN APPETITE FOR TURNOVERS

- UK has forced 11 turnovers in the first seven games, the most in its first seven games since 2017 (13).
- UK has forced at least one turnover in each of the first six games for the first time since 2014.
- UK has forced a turnover in 11 consecutive regular-season games for the first time since a 15-game stretch in the regular seasons of 2007-08.

NATION'S LEADER IN DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS

- Kentucky has three defensive touchdowns this season, tied with five others for the second most in the nation.
 - UK got a 69-yard fumble return TD by Jalen Geiger in the opener against Ball State on Sept. 2 and then Maxwell Hairston tallied two pick-sixes (29 and 54 yards) at Vanderbilt on Sept. 23.

TO THE HOUSE

- Kentucky has shown a penchant for delivering pick-6s in recent seasons. In fact, UK is ranked tied-for-third amongst FBS teams in interception returns for touchdown since the beginning of 2020, including two each in two different games.

MAXWELL HAIRSTON TIED THE SEC RECORD

- The Wildcats had two interception returns for touchdowns in their Southeastern Conference opener at Vanderbilt on Sept. 24, **both by Maxwell Hairston**.
 - It marked UK's first pick-six since Keidron Smith at Florida on Sept. 10, 2022.
 - It marked UK's first pair of pick-sixes, and first pair of defensive touchdowns, in the same game since Kelvin Joseph and Jamin Davis both had pick-sixes in 2020 at Tennessee.
 - He is the first UK player ever to have two pick-sixes in one game.
 - He tied the SEC record for interception touchdowns in a game, becoming just the sixth player in league history to have two pick-sixes in one game.
 - UK has had at least one pick-six in the last four seasons.
- The two interceptions marked Hairston's second and third of this season and of his career, while the touchdowns are the first and second of his college career.
 - Through Week 6, he is one of just three players in the nation this season with two interception touchdowns.
 - From a career perspective, he is currently tied for fourth among active players in the FBS with his two interceptions returned for touchdowns.

MAX-WELL DONE

- Maxwell Hairston, who was recently received AP Midseason All-America Second Team praise, intercepted the fifth pass of the season and fifth of his career against RV/No. 25 Missouri on Oct. 14.
 - He is tied with two other players for the nation's leader with five interceptions.
 - He now has four interceptions in four Southeastern Conference games this season.

- Even more impressively, he is tied with D'Eryk Jackson as the team leaders in tackles in 2023 (44).
- He has totaled 131 interception return yards this season, the most since Greg Long had 176 return yards in 1981.

SCOOP-AND-SCORE

- It was a special season opener for defensive back Jalen Geiger, whose season was cut short last season after suffering a knee injury at Florida on Sept. 10, 2022, which required surgery.
- Big Blue Nation welcomed him back to the field in the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2, even more so after he scored his second defensive touchdown of his career.
 - Geiger recovered a fumble at the UK 31 in the second quarter and ran it 69 yards for a touchdown.
 - It marked the first defensive touchdown in a season opener for UK since Sept. 2, 2017 at Southern Miss and it marked the longest fumble returned for a touchdown since CJ Johnson against Tennessee on Oct. 31, 2015 (77 yards).

DON'T HIT THE WALL-ACE

- Trevin Wallace, a junior inside linebacker who is on the 2023 Butkus Award Watch List, is currently 11th in the Southeastern Conference in sacks (.58 per game).
 - He is second on the team in tackles (31).
- He had his first interception of the season and the third interception of his career against Florida on Sept. 30, returning the ball 21 yards, which set up UK for its first touchdown of the game.
- Wallace earned the second SEC Player of the Week honor in his career after the season opener against Ball State on Sept. 2, thanks to his career-high tying 12 tackles.
 - He made the initial tackle on a play that became a Ball State fumble that UK returned 69 yards for a touchdown.
- The team captain eclipsed 100 total tackles in his career after making seven against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 9.
 - He currently has 117 total tackles in his career going into Week 9.

J.J. WEAVER NAMED JASON WITTEN COLLEGIATE MAN OF THE YEAR AWARD SEMIFINALIST

- J.J. Weaver, a senior outside linebacker, was named one of 20 semifinalists for the seventh annual Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year award on Oct. 18.
- Weaver, who was born with polydactyly, a condition in which a person or animal has more than five fingers or toes on one, or on each, hand or foot, has had to face many obstacles in his lifetime. With six fingers on his right hand, he was bullied and ridiculed in grade school for being different. But that obstacle was nothing compared to what he was about to face during his collegiate years.
- From July 2020 to August 2021, Weaver lost his father to homicide, sustained a season-ending knee injury and then lost his beloved high school football coach to cancer.
- Inspired by the help he received, J.J. has become an outspoken advocate for mental health and counseling. This fall, with help from the Kentucky Center for Grieving Children and Families, he started a peer-led grief counseling group on UK's campus, the first of its kind.
- Also, Weaver's non-profit organization, "The Perfect Fit," which he started in high school, has organized several community service projects, including one this summer, "The Perfect Fit Bike Drive." Weaver and his family donated 111 free bicycles for kids in his hometown of Louisville.

LEADERSHIP ON THE DEFENSE

- Despite losing seven of the top players on the defense from 2022, still numerous names returned this season that are primed to bring a unique level of leadership.
 - "It's huge when the older guys take charge because when they do, it shows you that they have assumed ownership. They don't just rely on the coaches to make all the corrections because at that point, they have passed along the ownership to the coaches (that means players think) 'I only worry about myself.'" - Brad White



- The top two leaders in tackles from last season returned in 2023, including middle linebacker D'Eryk Jackson (67 tackles) and free safety Jordan Lovett (62 tackles). Outside linebacker J.J. Weaver, who was the sack leader last season, also is back after deciding not to pursue the 2023 NFL Draft. Inside linebacker Trevin Wallace, who had 54 tackles last season, returned to the Bluegrass, while defensive linemen, both young and old, Deone Walker and Octavious Oxendine are expected to be leaders on this year's defense.
 - "The old guys help correct old guys. Old guys have to correct young guys, then they ask good, quality questions of the coaching staff. Practice would be really hard and dull if the coaches were the only ones coaching." - Brad White

LOOKIN' BACK

- Kentucky brought in a senior transfer from Georgia Southern to help bring consistency to the program's kicking game, Alex Raynor.
- He shined in his Kentucky debut against Ball State on Sept. 2, connecting on all three of his field goal attempts, all of which were more than 40 yards, and on all five of his extra point attempts.
 - Raynor became the first Kentucky player with three made field goals in their UK debut since Taylor Begley against Louisville on Sept. 1, 2002.
- For the season, he is 6-of-6 on field goals and 27-of-28 on extra points.
 - He earned a career-long, 50-yard field goal against Florida on Sept. 30.
- The Wildcat has made his last 12 field goals, a streak dating back to Nov. 5, 2022 during his time at Georgia Southern.

- The Wildcats are in their 133rd football season in 2023.
- The Wildcats are celebrating their 50th anniversary of the opening of Kroger Field this season, which was formerly named Commonwealth Stadium (1973-2016).
 - The Cats are 186-142-4 (.567) all-time in Kroger Field, including 50-26 (.658) under Mark Stoops.
 - The Cats have won 17 of their past 22 games at Kroger Field.
 - The Cats are 17-5 in their last 22 home night games, including 1-1 in 2023.
- UK was picked to finish fourth in the SEC Eastern Division in a 2023 SEC Preseason Media Poll, behind defending national champion Georgia, then Tennessee and South Carolina.

- Three Wildcats were named to the 2023 Preseason Media Days All-SEC Teams, including sophomore Deone Walker (Second Team Defense), graduate students Eli Cox (Third Team Offense) and J.J. Weaver (Third Team Defense).
- The Wildcats have won their last 19 straight nonconference games in the **regular season**.
 - That streak is second in the nation behind Georgia (23).
- UK head coach Mark Stoops is in his 11th year at the helm of the program in 2023, the longest in program history, which was an accomplishment he set last season. He also is the second-longest tenured active head coach in the SEC, behind Alabama's Nick Saban, and he is the eighth-longest nationally.
 - In that time, Stoops has accumulated a 71-61 overall record.
 - Stoops became the winningest head coach in program history last season after No. 20/20 Kentucky upset No. 12/19 Florida in Gainesville, 26-16, on Sept. 10, 2022. Stoops passed former UK head coach Bear Bryant (1946-53), who set the previous record at 60.
 - Stoops began his tenure in Lexington 12-26 (.316) (2013 - through first two games of 2016). He has since gone 59-35 (.627) (2016 - present).
 - Stoops has guided UK to three second-place SEC East finishes in the last eight seasons, which are the program's only second-place SEC East finishes in program history.
- The Wildcats returned 36 letterwinners, including 13 offensive and defensive starters, in 2023. The Cats also bolstered the roster with the addition of 16 newcomers from the transfer portal.
 - The offensive starters who returned include wide receivers Dane Key and Tayvion Robinson, offensive linemen Jager Burton, Kenneth Horsey, Eli Cox and Jeremy Flax, and tight ends Brenden Bates and Jordan Dingle.
 - The defensive starters who returned include linemen Deone Walker and Tre'vonn Rybka, inside linebacker D'Eryk Jackson, outside linebacker J.J. Weaver, and defensive back Jordan Lovett.
 - The specialty starters who returned include punter Wilson Berry and kickoff man Chance Poore.
- Other updates that occurred during the offseason include the renovation of Nutter Field House, with the help of a lead donation from Brett and Billie Jo Setzer, allowed the playing surface inside the facility to be named Rich and Karen Brooks Field, and a the new turf at Kroger Field.
- In 2022, UK earned a 7-6 record overall and a 3-5 record in the conference, reaching its school-record seventh consecutive bowl game (TransPerfect Music City Bowl).
 - It marked the sixth time in the last seven seasons that UK won at least seven games, with the lone exception being the COVID-shortened season in 2020.
 - In 2022, Kentucky concluded its regular season with a win over in-state rival Louisville, 26-13, which marked the Cats' fourth-straight win over the Cards. It was also the Cats' fifth-straight triumph in the regular-season finale, which marked the first time in program history that has been accomplished.
- Former quarterback Will Levis was selected No. 33 overall in the 2023 NFL Draft, marking the fifth straight season Kentucky has had one or more players selected in the first three rounds.

KENTUCKY PILED UP AWARDS AFTER DEFEATING FLORIDA

- The awards piled up for Kentucky after defeating then-No. 22/23 Florida on Sept. 30.
 - Running back Ray Davis earned the SEC Co-Offensive Player of the Week, the Doak Walker National Player of Week, the Maxwell Trophy National Player of Week, the Shrine Bowl Breakout Offense Player of Week and CFPA National Performer of Week Honorable Mention.
 - Right tackle Jeremy Flax was named the SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week and the Outland Trophy National Player of the Week.
 - Head coach Mark Stoops was named the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week.



NONCONFERENCE COMPETITION

- Kentucky has won 23 of its last 24 nonconference games.
 - That stretch featured 20 straight nonconference wins, including four straight bowl wins. The streak began in the season opener on Sept. 1, 2018 and ended in the Music City Bowl game on Dec. 32, 2022. It was the longest active streak in FBS at the time.
- The Wildcats have won their last 19 straight nonconference games in the **regular season**.
 - That streak is second in the nation behind Georgia (23).
- UK has won 17 straight nonconference games at Kroger Field and has finished nonconference home games for the 2023 season.

PORTAL PICKUPS

CATS IN THE NATIONAL POLLS

- Kentucky was ranked for two straight weeks, Week 6 and Week 7, in both the Associated Press Poll and the AFCA Coaches Poll, before dropping out after its loss to RV/No. 25 Missouri on Oct. 14.
- The Wildcats began the season receiving votes in both polls and remained there through Week 5. It marked the second consecutive season UK has been ranked or receiving votes in the preseason edition of both major polls.
- Three of UK's remaining opponents are ranked in the AP Top 25 in Week 7 (Alabama, Louisville and Tennessee).
- Just last season, for the first time in program history, UK was ranked in both preseason polls, checking in at No. 20 in the AP poll and No. 21 in the coaches poll.
- The Wildcats wound up being ranked for the first nine AP polls in 2022. That stretch included three straight weeks being ranked in the AP Top 10.
- Between the 2021 and 2022 seasons, Kentucky was ranked in one or both of the major polls for 12 straight weeks.
- It marked the second longest streak in program history, only behind the 21 weeks UK spent in one or both of the major polls between 1949 and 1951.

SIMPLY STOOPS-ENDOUS

UK head coach Mark Stoops has proven to be an excellent hire, turning around a struggling program and making him the first UK coach to lead the program to a seventh consecutive bowl appearance in 2023. He also has erased numerous of the long-standing hurdles and streaks in the program's history. A partial accounting of Stoops' achievements features:

- 45 wins since 2018, which is the fifth-most in the SEC and is 18th among Power Five programs
- Winning the regular-season finale five years in a row for the first time in school history (2018-22)
- First top-10 ranking in each the Associated Press poll and the coaches' poll since 2007 (Sept. 11, 2022)
- First consecutive top-10 rankings in each poll since 1977 (Sept. 18, 2022)
- His 61st coaching victory win, breaking the school record held by Paul "Bear" Bryant (Sept. 10, 2022)
- First home win over Florida since 1986, also marking the first win over an Associated Press top 10-ranked opponent since 2010 (2021)
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2020)
- First New Year's Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018 season)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)
- Stoops began his tenure in Lexington 12-26 (.316) (2013 - through first two games of 2016). He has since gone 59-35 (.627) (2016 - present). Overall, Stoops is now 71-61 at Kentucky, surpassing Paul "Bear" Bryant's 60 victories to set a school record.
- Off the field, Stoops is a staunch supporter of the Kentucky Children's Hospital, helping raise more than \$500,000 annually for the kids. He was named the Honorary Coach of the 2022 AFCA Good Works Team.
- Kentucky's football team has fared well academically under Stoops, as each year UK's football score in the NCAA Academic Progress Rate has been well above the benchmark of 930.

COACHING CHANGES

- Jay Boulware** was named the running backs coach and special teams coordinator on Dec. 12, 2022. He brings more than 25 years of coaching experience to Lexington after most recently serving as an offensive intern in the National Football League for the Pittsburgh Steelers, working specifically with the running backs, including UK's all-time leading rusher Benny Snell Jr. Before the Steelers, he served as the associate head coach for special teams and tight ends coach at Texas, his alma mater.
- Liam Coen** returned as Kentucky's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Jan. 10. He previously served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Kentucky in 2021 before spending 2022 as the offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams.
- Stoops also announced during the offseason the hiring of quality control coach for special teams **Mike Priefer Jr.** Priefer's name might be familiar to National Football League aficionados as his father Mike Priefer has almost two decades of pro coaching experience, including the last four as the special teams coordinator for the Cleveland Browns. His grandfather, Chuck Priefer, was a longtime college and NFL coach, including a special teams coach with the San Diego Chargers and Detroit Lions.

TWO WILDCATS WIN SUPER BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP WITH KANSAS CITY CHIEFS

- Two Kentucky Wildcats, defensive lineman Phil Hoskins and offensive lineman Darian Kinnard, earned a Super Bowl ring as the Kansas City Chiefs defeated the Philadelphia Eagles in 2022.



- Kinnard was on the 53-man roster, while Hoskins was on the practice squad throughout the playoff run.
- Kinnard, who played at Kentucky from 2018-21, was in his rookie season with the Chiefs in 2022-23.
 - During his Wildcat career, the Knoxville, Tennessee, native, played in 46 career games with 39 consecutive starts. He was an essential component for the “Big Blue Wall” which has been under consideration for the Joe Moore Award, given to the nation’s top offensive line, four of the last five seasons, including finalists in 2021.
- Hoskins played at Kentucky from 2017-20 and was in his second season in the NFL.
 - The Toledo, Ohio, native played one season with the Carolina Panthers after being drafted in the seventh round by as the 232nd overall pick in the 2021 National Football League Draft. He was picked up by the Chiefs in January of 2023. He saw action in eight games with the Panthers, totaling six tackles and one sack.
- Overall, 16 Wildcats have won a total of 18 Super Bowl championship rings.

WILDCATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

- Kentucky had three selections in the 2023 NFL Draft - Will Levis (2nd Round, Tennessee), Chris Rodriguez Jr. (6th, Washington) and Carrington Valentine (7th, Green Bay). All three have earned a place on opening day NFL rosters.
- In total, 25 players have been drafted under head coach Mark Stoops since 2013, including 14 defensive players in Avery Williamson, Bud Dupree, Za’Darius Smith, Josh Forrest, Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson, Mike Edwards, Jamin Davis, Kelvin Joseph, Quinton Bohanna, Brandin Echols, Josh Paschal and Carrington Valentine.
- Kentucky has totaled four or more players selected in the first five rounds three times in school history, including twice in the last four years under Coach Mark Stoops - 2022, 2019 and 1966.
- Kentucky has had a player selected in the first three rounds in five consecutive drafts.

DID YOU KNOW?

- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** enters his 46th season in that role. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, now marking his 50th year in UK football. He has worked more than 500 consecutive games.
- UK is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men’s basketball championship, while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.

2024 SEC OPPONENTS

- Kentucky’s 2024 SEC opponents include Auburn, Georgia, South Carolina and Vanderbilt at home and Florida, Ole Miss, Tennessee and Texas on the road. The dates will be announced at a later time.

KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 332 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. **UK has a 186-142-4 record (.560), 50-26 (.658) under Mark Stoops.**
- 2023 marks the 51st season at the facility.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 60,261 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 16 of the last 18 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years. *Note: Kroger Field capacity was limited to 12,000 fans per game in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions
- The stadium footprint is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner--begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery

Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Ole Miss, Mississippi State and Missouri. The end zones and team sideline areas feature a checkerboard pattern in alternating shades of blue. It was designed to mimic the pattern of Secretariat's silks, which has been part of the football uniforms for five seasons. The school's new interlocking "UK" logo is positioned in the center of the field.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. Therefore, the Cat Walk was moved to Talbott Todd Way. The Cat Walk typically begins outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, and the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House. It was dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65) who passed away from ALS in August of 2017 and was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team walks to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompa-

The 2022 season marked yet another year of achievement for Coach Mark Stoops and the Kentucky football program.

When the Wildcats took on Iowa in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl in December of 2022, it extended a school-record streak of seven-consecutive bowl games, all under Stoops. Kentucky reached the postseason by posting a 7-5 record, the sixth-consecutive season (not including the Covid-shortened 2020 season) that UK has won at least seven games.

Stoops has personal milestones as well as he enters his 11th season at Kentucky, longest term of any coach in school history. The Wildcats’ victory at Florida in 2022 was Stoops’ 61st win, breaking the school record of 60 held by Paul “Bear” Bryant.

Called “the best program builder in all of college football” a year ago by ESPN analyst Tom Luginbill, Stoops’ success hasn’t come easily.

Inheriting a program that was 2-10 the year before he arrived, Stoops’ rebuilding efforts took time. Two games into the 2016 season his record was 12-26, but the program 59-35 (.627) record since then (2016 - present).

In addition to this season’s achievements, a partial accounting of Stoops’ exploits features:

- Four straight bowl wins – the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2022, the 2020 Gator Bowl, the 2019 Belk Bowl and the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 – first time in school history that UK won four straight bowls
- A school-record 20-game win streak against nonconference competition (2018-22), which was the nation’s longest active streak at the time.
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2020)
- First New Year’s Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)

STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

Now in his 11th season at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's 11 classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Kentucky's Signing Day class for 2022 was UK's highest-rated class in the available history of recruiting rankings. (Note: these rankings are based on UK's 20 signees, 19 high school and one junior college, and did not include four-year college transfers Tashawn Manning and Tayvion Robinson.)

Several of Stoops' players have also won All-America accolades, along with honors such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Jason Witten Man of the Year, Pop Warner Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

Off the field, Stoops has been active in fundraising and events for the UK Children's Hospital and he was named Honorary Coach of the 2022 National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last seven seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, taking over a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final *USA Today* coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also

continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

Stoops followed with the Covid-shortened 2020 season that was capped by a Gator Bowl win over No. 23 North Carolina State.

The momentum continued in 2021 with another 10-win season -- the second under Stoops and only the fourth in school history -- capped by a dramatic come-from-behind win over Iowa in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7

points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year. The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades. During Stoops' three seasons, FSU



went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State. Mark and Mike have reunited in Lexington, as Mike joined the UK staff in 2022 as inside linebackers coach.

Prior to Arizona, Mark Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason

and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.

Before the Steelers, he served as the associate head coach for special teams and tight ends coach at Texas, his alma mater, helping the No. 19 Longhorns finish 7-3 overall and capture the Alamo Bowl title in 2020.

He also spent seven years at Oklahoma, working under then-head coach Bob Stoops from 2013-16 and Lincoln Riley from (2017-19) and had stints at Auburn, Utah, Stanford, Arizona and Northern Illinois.

Boulware was an offensive lineman at Texas before entering the coaching ranks.

Vince Marrow, aka the "Big Dawg," enters his 11th season at Kentucky, currently handling the duties of associate head coach/tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator/NFL liaison.

Marrow's tight ends have been a big factor in UK producing six consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards with at least one 1,000-yard rusher in five of those (Stanley "Boom" Williams -2016; Benny Snell Jr., - 2017, 2018; Lynn Bowden - 2019; Chris Rodriguez Jr. - 2021). Marrow also has been instrumental in UK signing 10 straight top-50 recruiting classes, including the highest-rated class in UK history in 2021.

Marrow had a professional playing career as a member of NFL rosters on five teams, including Buffalo, Carolina, New York Jets, Chicago and San Francisco. After his NFL days ended, Marrow played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 1998, earning all-league honors with 32 receptions for 345 yards. He also played for the Orlando Rage in the XFL in 2001.

He began his collegiate playing career at Youngstown State before transferring to Toledo. Marrow played two seasons at Toledo, earning second-team All-MAC honors in 1991 before being drafted by the Bills in 1992.

KENTUCKY 44, BALL STATE 14

SEPT. 2, 2023 • LEXINGTON, KY. KROGER FIELD (58,286)



Kentucky scored touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams on Saturday, beating Ball State 44-14 in the 2023 season opener at Kroger Field.

Quarterback Devin Leary, making his first start for Kentucky, connected on 18 of 31 passing for 241 yards with a touchdown and an interception. Running back Ray Davis, also wearing blue for the first time on Saturday, rushed for 112 yards and a pair of scores for the Cats.

Kentucky (1-0) had 357 yards of total offense in the game compared to just 295 for Ball State. The Cardinals

actually had more first downs than the Cats (18-16) but the Cats took advantage of both BSU turnovers, converting those into 10 points.

The Cats also got a defensive score on a 69-yard fumble recovery and return by Jalen Geiger, as well as a 99-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by Barion Brown.

Defensively, Trevin Wallace led the Cats with 12 tackles, while Alex Afari, Maxwell Hairston and D'Eryk Jackson each had eight stops.

On the first play from scrimmage, Leary connected with Dane Key over the middle for a 44-yard completion, quickly getting the Cats into BSU territory. But the drive stalled and UK settled for a 41-yard field goal from Alex Raynor, which was good, and Kentucky took an early 3-0 lead.

Ball State went three-and-out on its first drive but the Cardinals' punt pinned the Cats at their own six. Kentucky quickly dug itself out of that hole on a 26-yard run by Davis. But Kentucky was forced to punt, giving the ball back to Ball State with 8:40 still to play in the first quarter.

On the ensuing possession, the Cardinals drove into UK territory for the first time. Ball State would march 73 yards in 13 plays, ending with a one-yard quarterback sneak touchdown run by Layne Hatcher. Jackson Courville added the extra point and Ball State led 7-3 with 1:35 to play in the first.

Kentucky wasted little time getting into the Ball State red zone early in the second period. A 27-yard connection from Leary to Key, followed by a 16-yard completion to Tayvion Robinson, got the Cats to the BSU four yard line. A couple of plays later, Davis scored on a two-yard rush, his first touchdown as a Wildcat, to give UK the lead. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 10-7 with 11:31 to play in the half.

Ball State drove into UK territory on its next possession before the UK defense made a big play. Hatcher completed a pass to Tanner Koziol, who was hit by UK's Afari, resulting in a fumble that Geiger scooped up and took 69 yards for a Kentucky touchdown. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky grabbed a 17-7 advantage with 6:58 left in the half.

The UK defense forced another three-and-out on Ball State's next possession, forcing a Cardinals' punt. Kentucky took over at its own 45 with 4:35 to play in the half.

Kentucky would get into Ball State territory but, on fourth and three from the BSU 33, Leary was intercepted by Ball State's Tyler Potts to end the threat and give the Cardinals the ball back with 1:37 left in the half.

The UK defense would make another big play before the end of the half. BSU's Malcolm Gillie caught a pass from Hatcher but was hit by UK's Hairston, causing a fumble that was recovered by Jordan Lovett, giving Kentucky the ball at the BSU 31 with 1:22 left in the half.

Kentucky could do nothing with the ensuing possession, but the Cats got a 46-yard field goal from Raynor with 1:08 to play in the half to make it 20-7 UK.

Ball State got the ball back but Kentucky used its timeouts wisely and forced a Cardinals' punt. The Cats took over on their own 45 with 31 seconds to play. On the second play of the possession, Leary hit Barion Brown for 26 yards, getting the Cats to the BSU 29 with 17 seconds left in the half. On the final play of the half, Raynor connected on a 46-yard field goal, giving Kentucky a 23-7 lead at the half.

The Cardinals got the ball first in the third quarter. BSU got one first down and drove near midfield before being forced to punt. UK took over at its own 11 with 9:29 remaining in the third quarter.

Kentucky took over and put together an impressive scoring drive. The Cats marched 89 yards in seven plays, culminating when Leary found Key in the back of the end zone for a five-yard touchdown pass. Raynor added the point after and Kentucky led 30-7 with 6:43 left in the third.

Ball State answered with a scoring drive of its own. The Cardinals went 75 yards in 10 plays. The drive ended with a touchdown pass from Kaydin Semonza to Ty Robinson. Courville added the PAT to make it 30-14 with less than a minute to play in the third.

On the ensuing kickoff, Brown fielded the ball on the right hash at the one, went up the middle, and was off to the races, covering 99 yards for a kick return touchdown, the second of his young career. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 37-14 with 28 seconds left in the period. That would be the score after three quarters.

In the fourth quarter, Ball State drove deep into Kentucky territory, eventually getting to the UK one yard line. But on fourth and goal, Semonza tried a quarterback sneak and was stuffed by UK's Keaten Wade and Trevin Wallace, foiling the scoring opportunity and giving the ball back to the Cats with 9:57 left in the game.

Kentucky would add a late score when Davis scampered 30 yards for his second touchdown of the game with just six seconds remaining. Raynor added the PAT to provide the final margin of victory.

KENTUCKY 28, EASTERN KENTUCKY 17

KROGER FIELD (61,876)



Devin Leary threw a career high-tying four touchdown passes, including two to Tayvion Robinson, as Kentucky rallied past Eastern Kentucky 28-17 at Kroger Field.

Leary connected on 24 of 38 through the air for 299 yards and the four scores with an interception. Robinson caught six passes for 136 yards and a pair of scores.

Barion Brown also had a big day for the Cats with 152 yards of all purpose offense and a score. Ray Davis led the Cats with 52 yards rushing on 12 carries. Davis also caught a touchdown pass from Leary.

Andru Phillips and Trevin Wallace led the Cats with seven tackles each, while Jordan Lovett, D'Eryk Jackson and Deone Walker each had five stops.

Kentucky (2-0) got the game's first possession but the Cats were unable to make a first down and were forced to punt. Wilson Berry's kick was blocked by ECU's Cornelius Evans and the Colonels took over on the UK 30 yard line.

The Colonels would take advantage of the short field. After making a first down, ECU got on the board when quarterback Parker McKinney scrambled 14 yards for a touchdown. Patrick Nations added the extra point and Eastern Kentucky led 7-0 with 10:46 left in the first quarter.

On the ensuing possession, Kentucky got three first downs, crossing the 50 into ECU territory. But the drive stalled and, on fourth and nine from the ECU 33, Leary was sacked by the Colonels' Albert Nunes and the Cats turned the ball over on downs with 4:30 to play in the first.

ECU took the ball and got into UK territory before the Kentucky defense forced a punt. The Cats would take over at their own seven yard line with 1:40 remaining in the period. The Colonels would hold a 7-0 lead after one quarter.

Early in the second quarter, Kentucky was forced to punt and ECU took over deep in its own territory. On the second play of the drive, UK linebacker Trevin Wallace hit ECU's Braedon Sloan, causing a fumble that Kentucky's Alex Afari recovered at the ECU 24.

The ECU defense would step up on the drive, as Frank Lee tipped a Leary pass, then intercepted it at the ECU 39. The Colonels took over with 10:39 left in the half.

Again, ECU would get into Kentucky territory, but this drive would be stopped when McKinney's pass over the middle was intercepted by UK's Maxwell Hairston at the UK four yard lin. Kentucky took over with 10:00 left in the half.

Kentucky was able to make a pair of first downs on its next drive, but the Cats would be forced to punt again and ECU took over at its own 13 with 7:17 to play in the half.

ECU took its next possession and again drove into UK territory. But the drive stalled and the Colonels tried a 48-yard field goal. But Nations' kick came up short and the Cats took over at their own 31 with 4:40 to play in the half.

Kentucky would make one first down before being forced to punt again. ECU took over at its own 3 yard line with 3:30 left in the half.

The Colonels punted and Kentucky got a 36-yard return from Barion Brown, giving the Cats the ball at the ECU 24 with 48 seconds left in the half. And the Cats immediately took advantage when Leary hit Tayvion Robinson in the left corner of the end zone for a 24-yard touchdown pass. Alex Raynor added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 42 seconds left in the half.

ECU had the first possession of the second half and the Colonels wasted little time getting into the UK red zone. The Colonels got inside the UK 10 before the Kentucky defense got a stop and forced a 21-yard field goal attempt. Nations would make the kick and the Colonels grabbed a 10-7 lead with 9:41 left in the third quarter.

Kentucky would answer with a scoring drive of its own. UK got a 25-yard pass from Leary to Robinson, followed by a 26-yard run on a reverse from Brown to get inside the ECU 10. Then, on third and goal, Leary connected with Robinson for the duo's second touchdown of the game. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led for the first time, 14-10, with 5:47 left in the third.

On the next possession, ECU would get one first down before being forced to punt. Kentucky would take over at its own 15 yard line with 3:47 to play in the third period. The Cats again would turn to Robinson, this time on a reverse, that the super senior took 56 yards deep into ECU territory. Two plays later, Leary hit

Brown in the corner of the end zone for a touchdown. Raynor added another PAT and Kentucky led 21-10 with 1:47 to play in the third period.

Eastern Kentucky quickly responded. McKinney hit Joshua Carter over the middle for a 39-yard game. McKinney then scrambled for six yards on the final play of the third quarter, getting ECU to the UK 24 yard line. The Colonels would get to the nine and that's when McKinney hit Sloan for a nine-yard touchdown. Nations drilled the PAT and Kentucky's lead was cut to 21-17 with 12:04 to play.

Kentucky responded with an efficient, six-play, 65-yard drive that ended with Leary throwing his fourth touchdown pass of the day, a 24-yard wheel route to Davis, to increase the UK lead. Raynor added another PAT and the Cats led 28-17 with 8:08 to play.

KENTUCKY 35, AKRON 3

SEPT. 16, 2023 • LEXINGTON, KY.
KROGER FIELD (59,456)



Devin Leary passed for 315 yards and three touchdowns and Ray Davis had 169 all-purpose yards as Kentucky blasted Akron 35-3 at Kroger Field.

Leary hit on 16 of 25 passing in the game, connecting on touchdowns to Josh Kattus, Tayvion Robinson and Davis.

Davis rushed for 72 yards on seven carries and caught three passes for 97 yards in the game. Kentucky ended the game with 450 yards of total offense.

On defense, Maxwell Hairston led the Cats with seven tackles, while Trevin Wallace had five, including a pair of sacks.

Kentucky got the ball first and the Cats got off to a very good start. Leary connected with Davis for a 39-yard completion to get UK into Akron territory. A Leary scramble earned the Cats another first down, as did a completion to Barion Brown. The drive would end when Leary connected with Kattus on a six-yard touchdown pass. Alex Raynor would add the extra point and UK grabbed an early 7-0 lead.

The UK defense forced Akron into a three and out on their first drive and the Zips were forced to punt. Kentucky would take over at its own 30 with 9:06 still remaining in the first quarter.

Kentucky would punt on its next possession, but Akron would muff the punt and UK's Zion Childress recovered at the Akron 36 yard line. But the Cats were unable to move the ball and, after a delay of game penalty foiled a potential field goal attempt, UK punted the ball away.

Akron would punt again on its next possession and UK took over at its own 19 with 1:37 to play in the first quarter. The Cats would end the period with a 7-0 lead.

On the second play of the second quarter, Kentucky got a big completion from Leary to Jordan Dingle, covering 59 yards to the Akron 11 yard line. But as Dingle fought for extra yards, Akron's Shammond Cooper forced a fumble that the Zips recovered in the end zone.

Akron would assemble a solid drive on the ensuing possession. The Zips would get inside the UK 30 but Kentucky's defense forced a 47-yard field goal attempt from Noah Perez that came up short and the Cats maintained a 7-0 advantage with 5:39 left in the half.

Kentucky took advantage of the possession, and the Cats would drive deep into Akron territory, getting inside the 10. But a bad snap cost Kentucky 21 yards. However, just before the half, Leary found Robinson in the back of the end zone for a 24-yard touchdown. Raynor added the PAT and the Cats led 14-0 with eight seconds to play in the half. That would be the halftime score.

Akron got possession to start the second half. The Zips would get near midfield and appeared to have converted a fourth and short to keep the drive going. But an ineligible receiver downfield penalty negated the play and the Zips were forced to punt. Kentucky took over at its own 22 with 11:24 to play in the third quarter.

Kentucky appeared to stretch the lead on its next possession when Leary hit Anthony Brown-Stephens for a long touchdown. But the play was called back due to a holding penalty. On the very next play, Leary was intercepted by Akron's Tyson Durant and the Zips took over at the UK 47.

Akron would drive into the UK red zone but on a third and four from the 19, Wallace came up with the sack, forcing Akron into a 36-yard Perez field goal, which was good, and the UK lead was trimmed to 14-3 with 3:27 left in the third period.

The play of the game came on the next UK drive. With Kentucky facing a third and 11, Leary was under pressure and looked like he would be sacked. But at the last minute, he got the ball to Davis, who scampered 58 yards down the left sideline for the touchdown. Raynor added the PAT and the Cats extended the lead to 21-3 with 1:38 to play in the third quarter. That would be the score at the end of the period.

After another Akron punt, Kentucky was able to extend the lead on its next possession. UK needed just three plays to cover 73 yards, the final 55 coming on a Davis touchdown run. Raynor added another PAT and the Cats led 28-3 with 13:47 to play.

Akron would drive into UK territory on its next drive but Perez would miss a 38-yard field goal and the score remained 28-3 with 10:31 to play.

Late in the fourth quarter, Kentucky added to its lead. Demie Sumo-Karngbaye rushed for 42 yards to get the Cats deep into Akron territory. Two plays later, Sumo-Karngbaye scored from six yards out for his first touchdown in a Kentucky uniform. Raynor added the extra point and the Cats led 35-3 with 3:04 remaining.

KENTUCKY 45, VANDERBILT 28

SEPT. 23, 2023 • NASHVILLE, TENN.
FIRSTBANK STADIUM (26,279)



Maxwell Hairston had a pair of interception returns for touchdowns as Kentucky topped Vanderbilt 45-28 at FirstBank Stadium in Nashville in the Southeastern Conference opener for both teams.

Hairston had a 29-yard pick six in the first quarter, then did it again with a 54-yard interception return for a touchdown in the final stanza.

Kentucky (4-0, 1-0 SEC) got 78 yards rushing and a pair of touchdowns from Vanderbilt transfer Ray Davis. Quarterback Devin Leary connected on 15 of 29 through the air for 205 yards and a touchdown, with two interceptions.

Barion Brown caught four passes for 105 yards to lead the Cats in receiving.

Octavian Oxendine led Kentucky with six tackles and Andru Phillips had five for Kentucky.

Vanderbilt (2-3, 0-1) got the opening possession and, after making one first down, the UK defense forced the Commodores to punt.

Kentucky took over on its own 17 yard line and the Cats quickly moved into Vandy territory, aided by a targeting penalty on the 'Dores. Leary connected with both Dane Key and Brown for first downs before JuTahn McClain took a handoff up the middle and scampered 36 yards for the Kentucky touchdown. Alex Raynor added the PAT and the Cats grabbed a 7-0 lead with 9:51 left in the first quarter.

On Vanderbilt's next drive, the 'Dores were facing a second and 20 when quarterback AJ Swann was under pressure from Trevin Wallace and JJ Weaver. Swann tried to hit receiver London Humphreys but UK's Hairston stepped in front and intercepted the pass, then returned it 29 yards for the touchdown. Raynor made the point after and Kentucky led 14-0 with 8:14 still to play in the first.

The Kentucky defense forced a three and out on the next Vanderbilt drive and the 'Dores were forced to punt again. The Cats took over at their own 30 with 6:32 to play in the quarter. On the second play of the drive, Leary tried to connect with Brown on a deep ball but Vandy's John Howse intercepted it and the Commodores took over at their own seven.

Again, Kentucky's defense forced a three and out and a punt. Kentucky took over at its own 31 with 4:00 left in the first period.

On UK's ensuing drive, Leary connected with Brown for 56 yards to get the Cats to the Vandy two yard line. Two plays later, it was Davis with the touchdown rush, expanding the Kentucky lead. Raynor made another extra point and UK led 21-0 with 1:56 left in the first quarter. That would be the score at the end of the quarter.

Early in the second quarter, Vanderbilt was forced to punt again and the Cats took over at their own 11 with 14:45 left in the half. The Cats went three and out and UK punted for the first time in the game. Vandy took over at its own 32 with 12:32 left in the half.

The 'Dores again went three and out and were forced to punt it away. UK took over at its own 16 with 11:18 to play in the half.

Kentucky would put together a long drive with the ensuing possession. The Cats used 13 plays to cover 74 yards, taking 6:25 off the clock. The drive would end with a 27-yard Raynor field goal, increasing the UK lead to 24-0 with 4:53 to play in the half.

Vanderbilt would have its best drive of the first half on the next possession. The 'Dores would get to the UK 23 yard line before the drive stalled. Jacob Borcila would convert a 41-yard field goal to cut the UK lead to 24-3 with 2:51 left in the half.

Kentucky punted on its next possession and Vandy got the ball back at its own 43 yard line with 1:58 left in the half. The 'Dores appeared to score on a touchdown pass but the play was called back due to a holding penalty. However, Vanderbilt would continue to drive and, with 20 seconds left in the half, Sedrick Alexander scored from seven yards out for the first Vandy touchdown of the game. Borcila added the PAT and the UK lead was cut to 24-10. That would be the halftime score.

In the third quarter, the teams exchanged punts on their first possessions. On Kentucky's second possession of the half, Leary was hit and intercepted by Vandy's Jeffrey Ugochukwu and the 'Dores took over at the UK 16. But the Kentucky

defense stood tall and forced Vandy into a 32-yard Borcila field goal, which was good, and the UK lead was 24-13 with 11:25 left in the third quarter.

Kentucky went three and out on its next possession and was forced to punt. Vandy took over in good field position at its own 48 with 9:49 left in the third quarter.

On Vandy's next possession, Swann was intercepted by UK linebacker D'Eryk Jackson, who lateraled the ball to defense back Andru Phillips, who took it back to the Vandy 21 yard line. A penalty moved the ball to the VU 12, where the Cats started their drive. Four plays later, Davis scored on a one-yard rush, his second touchdown of the day, extending the UK lead. Raynor added the extra point and Kentucky grabbed a 31-13 advantage with 6:44 still left in the third.

Vandy got a pair of first downs on its next drive before being forced to punt. Kentucky took over at its own 12 yard line with 2:15 left in the third. Kentucky would lead 31-13 through three quarters.

Early in the fourth quarter, Kentucky was deep in its own territory before Davis broke off a 38-yard run to get UK near midfield. Later in the drive, the Cats got on the board again when Leary connected with Key on a fade pattern in the left corner of the end zone for a 22-yard touchdown. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 38-13 with 10:35 left in the game.

Vanderbilt would respond with a scoring drive of its own. The Commodores covered 66 yards in just seven plays, ending with a two-yard touchdown run by Patrick Smith. The 'Dores went for two, and Swann hit Quincy Skinner to convert, making it 38-21 Kentucky with 8:00 to play.

On its next drive, Kentucky quickly got into Vandy territory when Leary connected with Brown on a 37-yard completion. But the drive stalled and UK punted it away with 5:09 to play.

Vanderbilt was moving the ball on its next possession before Hairston did it again. He intercepted Swann at the UK 46 and took it back 54 yards for his second pick six of the game. Raynor added the PAT and UK led 45-21 with 4:15 to play.

Vandy added a late touchdown to provide the final margin.

KENTUCKY 33, #22/23 FLORIDA 14

SEPT. 30, 2023 • LEXINGTON, KY.
KROGER FIELD (61,699)



Ray Davis rushed for a career-high 280 yards as Kentucky rolled past No. 22/23 Florida 33-14 at Kroger Field.

Davis carried the ball 26 times for 280 yards and three rushing touchdowns. His rushing total was the third highest in UK history, just 19 yards short of Moe Williams' record, set in 1995. Davis also caught a pass for a touchdown. His four touchdowns tied the most in Kentucky school history.

Kentucky (5-0, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) had 329 yards rushing in the game, compared to just 69 for the Gators.

Defending National Defensive Player of the Week Maxwell Hairston continued his big play, leading the Cats with 10 tackles. Alex Afari had nine.

Florida (3-2, 1-1) had the first possession of the game and the Gators went three and out, aided by a sack from UK's D'Eryk Jackson. Florida punted and Kentucky took over at its own 12 yard line.

Kentucky went immediately to the ground with Davis, who carried for 10, 19 and four yards on UK's first three plays from scrimmage. The Cats continued the drive and got inside the Florida 10 yard line before the drive stalled. Alex Raynor came on for a 24-yard field goal, which was good, and UK led 3-0 with 7:13 left in the first quarter. The scoring drive covered 81 yards in 12 plays and took 5:02 off the clock.

On Florida's next drive, the Gators faced a third and five when quarterback Graham Mertz was intercepted by UK's Trevin Wallace, who returned it to the Florida 15, setting up Kentucky in prime field position.

The Cats took advantage of the Florida miscue. Just two plays later, Leary connected with Davis, who made one move then scored on a nine-yard touchdown pass to extend the UK lead. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 10-0 with 5:37 to play in the first quarter.

Florida faced a third and six on its next drive when Mertz connected with Kahleil Jackson for 13 yards Florida's initial first down of the game. The Gators would cross midfield but were eventually forced to punt and UK took over at its own 10 yard line with 57 seconds left in the first.

Kentucky went three and out on the ensuing possession but Florida was flagged for a penalty on UK's punt attempt and the Cats kept possession. And on the very next play, Kentucky cashed in. Davis went up the middle, virtually untouched, and rambled 75 yards for his second touchdown of the game. The PAT was blocked by UK led 16-0 with 23 seconds left in the first.

Florida would be forced to punt again early in the second quarter and UK took over at its own 20 with 12:50 left in the half. The Cats went back to the ground and Davis gained 16 yards on the first play of the drive, then 33 on the following play.

The drive would continue, with Davis eclipsing the 200-yard rushing mark along the way. Davis would score on a three-yard rush to complete the possession, extending the UK lead in the process. Raynor's PAT was good and UK led 23-0 with 8:54 left in the half.

Florida would make one first down on its next drive but the Gators' progress would be stopped by penalties and the Gators were forced to punt. Kentucky took over at its own 20 with 5:01 left in the first half.

The Cats got one first down on their next drive before being forced to punt. Florida took over at its own 25 with 2:49 to play in the half.

The Gators had their best drive of the half with the ensuing possession. Florida would get inside the UK five and the Gators got on the board when Mertz connected with tight end Hayden Hansen for a four-yard touchdown. Trey Smack added the point after and Florida cut the UK lead to 23-7 with 34 seconds left in the half. That would be the halftime score.

Kentucky got the first possession of the second half and the Cats went back to Davis, who ripped off a 31-yard run to get UK deep into Florida territory. After a pass interference penalty got the Cats to the Florida two yard line, Davis scored on a two-yard rush. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 30-7 with 10:54 left in the third quarter.

Florida took the next possession into UK territory. And, on a fourth and three from the UK 43, Mertz somehow got the ball to Trevor Etienne who took it 10 yards for a first down. On the next play, Mertz connected with Ricky Pearsall for a 33-yard

touchdown. Smack added the PAT and the UK lead was cut to 30-14 with 7:17 left in the third quarter.

Kentucky would get one first down on its next drive before being forced to punt. Florida took over at its own 20 with 4:49 left in the third quarter.

The Gators were forced to punt again on the ensuing possession and the Cats took over at their own 25 with 2:41 left in the third quarter. But the Cats went three and out and punted the ball back to Florida, who took over at their own 13 yard line with 1:10 left in the third. The quarter would end with Kentucky leading 30-14.

As the fourth quarter began, Florida drove near midfield. On fourth and four from their own 43, Mertz hit Arlis Boardingham but Afari brought him down short of the line to make and UK took over at the Florida 47 with 11:24 to play.

The Cats went to the ground with Davis again. Rushes of five, nine, two and one got the Cats to the 30 yard line. But the drive stalled and Raynor came on for a 50-yard field goal attempt, which was good, giving UK a 33-14 lead with 7:44 remaining.

Florida took the ensuing possession into UK territory before the Cats got a stop on fourth down to get the ball back with 4:03 to play.

The Cats went back to the ground on the next drive and would eventually get deep into Florida territory. The Cats would run out the clock before scoring.

#1/1 GEORGIA 51, KENTUCKY 13

OCT. 7, 2023 • ATHENS, GA.
SANFORD STADIUM (92,746)



Devin Leary passed for two touchdowns but No. 20 Kentucky lost at top-ranked Georgia 51-13 in Sanford Stadium.

Leary went 10 of 26 through the air for 128 yards and the pair of touchdowns. Ray Davis rushed 15 times for 59 yards and caught two passes for 36 yards and a touchdown in the game.

Kentucky (5-1, 2-1 Southeastern Conference) got 11 tackles from linebacker D'Eryk Jackson and eight tackles and an interception from Maxwell Hairston.

Georgia (6-0, 3-0) had the first possession of the game and the Bulldogs wasted little time getting on the board. Georgia went 75 yards in seven plays, ending with a 40-yard touchdown pass from Carson Beck to Marcus Rosemy-Jacksaint. Peyton Woodring added the PAT and Georgia grabbed a 7-0 lead with 11:26 to play in the first quarter.

Kentucky got a pair of first downs on its first drive and got into Georgia territory before being forced to punt. Georgia took over at its own 18 with 8:06 left in the first. The Bulldogs again marched down the field and Beck connected with Rara Thomas for a 15-yard touchdown, extending the UGA lead. Woodring added the PAT and Georgia led 14-0 with 4:25 left in the first.

The Cats were able to quickly get into Georgia territory on the ensuing possession. Leary connected with Dane Key on a 36-yard completion to cross midfield but a pair of penalties stalled the drive and UK punted it away again. The Bulldogs took over at their own five with 2:01 left in the first. Georgia would lead 14-0 through 15 minutes of play.

Early in the second quarter, the Cats appeared to have Georgia stopped but a personal foul penalty kept the Bulldogs' drive alive. UGA proceeded to drive 95 yards in 13 plays, ending with a Beck to Oscar Delp touchdown pass. Woodring made the PAT and Georgia led 21-0 with 11:03 left in the first half.

Kentucky again moved the ball on its next drive. Leary connected with Davis, then with Key to get the Cats to midfield. UK would face a fourth and three when Leary hit Tayvion Robinson for a first down. Leary then connected with Josh Kattus to get the Cats to the UGA 14. Davis would rush for 10 yards to get to the Georgia four. On the next play, Leary hit Kattus again for a four-yard touchdown. Alex Raynor added the extra point and the Georgia lead was cut to 21-7 with 6:44 left in the half.

Georgia would respond with another scoring drive. This one ended with a Woodring field goal, stretching the lead to 24-7 with 5:15 remaining in the half. The Bulldogs would add another touchdown and a field goal late in the half and would lead 34-7 at the break.

Kentucky got the first possession of the second half but the Cats went three and out. However, on Georgia's next drive, Maxwell Hairston intercepted Beck and returned it to the Georgia 28. Two plays later, Leary connected with Davis for a 26-yard touchdown pass. The Cats went for two, and it failed and Georgia led 34-13. With the touchdown, Davis became the first Kentucky player to ever score a touchdown in each of UK's first six games in a season.

Georgia would add a field goal, then a touchdown and would lead 44-13 after three quarters. The Bulldogs added a score in the fourth quarter to provide the final margin of victory.

Ray Davis rushed for 128 yards and caught a touchdown pass but No. 24/23 Kentucky lost to Missouri 38-21 at Kroger Field.

Kentucky (5-2, 2-2 Southeastern Conference) got two touchdown passes from quarterback Devin Leary. But the UK signal caller also threw a pair of interceptions in the game.

Daveren Rayner, playing in place of the injured Trevin Wallace, led Kentucky with 10 tackles, while D'Eryk Jackson added nine.

Missouri (6-1, 3-1) got the first possession of the game and the UK defense allowed just one yard in the process of forcing a three and out. Missouri punted and Kentucky took over at its own 35 yard line.

Kentucky went immediately to the ground game to move the ball. UK's first five plays were rushes, which got the Cats into the Missouri red zone. The Cats appeared to score on a Leary rush but the play was called back due to a holding penalty. Then, on third and five from the seven, Leary hit Davis for a touchdown. Alex Raynor added the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 8:32 to play in the first quarter.

Missouri made a first down on its next drive but the Tigers were stopped when Maxwell Hairston intercepted MU quarterback Brady Cook at the UK 37 yard line.

The Cats would again roll with the hot hand, Davis, to get into Missouri territory. Kentucky would get into the red zone and then Leary would run up the middle for a 13-yard touchdown, his first rushing score of the season, to extend the UK lead. Raynor added the PAT and Kentucky led 14-0 with 2:09 left in the first quarter.

The Tigers would again go three and out on their next possession, punting it back to the Cats with 58 seconds left in the first quarter. Kentucky would run three plays to end the quarter, which saw the Cats leading 14-0 after one period.

As the second quarter began, Kentucky punted the ball to Missouri, which took over at its own 36 yard line. The Tigers would get a 25-yard scramble from Cook to get to the UK 39 yard line. The drive would stall and Missouri lined up in punt formation. But punter Luke Bauer took the snap and threw the ball to Marquis Johnson down the left side for a 39-yard fake punt touchdown. Harrison Mevis added the extra point and Missouri cut the UK lead to 14-7 with 11:38 left in the half.

Kentucky went three and out on its next possession and the Cats were forced to punt it back to the Tigers. Missouri would take over at its own 36 yard line with 9:39 to play in the half.

Missouri would put together another solid drive and would get into the red zone due to a UK penalty. The Tigers would get to the UK six but the Cats would hold and Mevis would convert a 25-yard field goal to cut the UK lead to 14-10 with 4:44 left in the half.

Kentucky would make one first down on the ensuing drive before Leary was sacked and the Cats were forced to punt. Missouri would get the ball back at its own 39 with 1:40 remaining in the half.

Missouri would take advantage of the extra possession, driving 61 yards in eight plays, culminating with an 18-yard touchdown pass from Cook to Theo Wease. Mevis added the PAT and Missouri led 17-14 with 15 seconds left in the half. That would be the halftime score.

Kentucky got the first possession of the second half but on the initial play from scrimmage, Leary connected with Barion Brown, who fumbled and Missouri recovered. The Tigers could not take full advantage of the field position. However, Missouri did get a 31-yard field goal from Mevis to extend the lead to 20-14 with 11:54 left in the third quarter.

After a Kentucky punt, Missouri started on its own 45 and the Tigers drove into Kentucky territory. But the drive stalled and Mevis attempted a 46-yard field goal, which was blocked by Tre'vonn Rybka and UK took possession.

On the ensuing drive, Kentucky faced a third and 15 when Leary scrambled for 19 yards, and a 10-yard penalty against Missouri took the ball across midfield. After a 13-yard rush by Davis, Leary hit Jordan Dingle for 31 yards, getting the Cats to the Missouri two yard line. Two plays later, Leary hit Anthony Brown-Stephens with a four-yard scoring pass. Raynor added the extra point and Kentucky re-took the

lead, 21-20, with 3:39 left in the third period. That would be the score after three quarters.

On the second play of the fourth quarter, Cook went around right end for a two-yard touchdown to give Missouri the lead 26-21. The Tigers went for two, but the pass failed. However, Kentucky was penalized on the play and Missouri got a second chance and Cody Schrader took it up the middle for the conversion, giving the Tigers a 28-21 lead with 14:14 to play.

Kentucky went three and out with its next possession, then a short punt and a penalty gave Missouri the ball at the UK 34 with 12:04 to play. The Tigers would take advantage of the short field, with Schrader rushing for a 19-yard touchdown. Mevis added the point after and the Tigers led 35-21 with 11:07 to play.

The Cats quickly struck back. Leary connected with Dane Key for 21 yards, then the Tigers were called for pass interference, getting the Cats to the Missouri 20. But later in the drive, Leary was picked off by Missouri's Marcus Clarke and Missouri took over at their own 14 with 9:28 to play.

Missouri would add a late field goal to provide the final margin of victory.

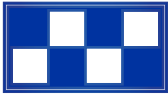

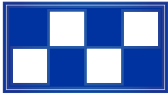
