Series Notes: Alabama and Kentucky will meet for the 42nd time in series history and the first time in Lexington since 2013 when the cross-divisional foes kick off on Saturday morning. The Crimson Tide holds a 38-2-1 all-time advantage including a 15-2 mark in Lexington. The Tide is currently riding a seven-game winning streak against the Cats dating back to 2003. Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 8-0 for his career against UK, including a perfect 5-0 mark while with the Tide. Kentucky head coach Mark Stoops is 0-3 against Alabama.

EARLY BIRD GETS THE WIN: Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, Alabama has played in 27 games that kicked off at 11:30 a.m. CT or earlier. The Crimson Tide is a perfect 27-0 in those matchups. Saturday's contest with Kentucky will be the second early bird kickoff in 2023 with the Tide having downed Arkansas earlier this season in Tuscaloosa. Alabama is also confirmed for a Nov. 18 morning matchup with Chattanooga which is set for an 11 a.m. start.

UNRANKED, NO PROBLEM UNDER SABAN: With its 24-21 win over Arkansas on Oct. 14, Alabama has won 17 straight against unranked opponents and improved to 121-4 (.968) against unranked opponents under head coach Nick Saban. Included in that record was a streak of 100 consecutive wins over unranked teams, which ranks as the longest streak in FBS history. The streak began with a win over Colorado on Dec. 30, 2007 in the Independence Bowl and ended at Texas A&M in 2021. The previous record was 72 games, shared by Miami (Fla.) (1984-95) and Florida (1989-2000).

ALABAMA vs. THE EAST UNDER SABAN: Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in Tuscaloosa, the Crimson Tide owns a 46-5 (.902) record against SEC Eastern Division opponents. That record includes an 8-1 (.889) mark in the SEC Championship Game and a 1-1 record in the College Football Playoff National Championship. The only three regular-season losses to Eastern Division foes under Saban are against then-No. 22 Georgia on Sept. 22, 2007, followed by a loss at then-No. 19 South Carolina on Oct. 9, 2010 and finally a last-second loss at then-No. 6 Tennessee on Oct. 15, 2022.

SABAN'S ROAD RECORD: Head coach Nick Saban owns an 88-35-1 (.714) record in road games across his four career stops, including a 60-12 (.833) mark while at Alabama. Saban has notched eight perfect road records with the Crimson Tide (2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2020) and has lost more than one game on the road in only three seasons (2007, 2010, 2022).

SEC ROAD GAMES FOR SABAN: Head coach Nick Saban owns a 68-19 (.782) mark in SEC road games across his time at LSU and Alabama, including a 56-11 (.836) record with the Crimson Tide. Saban has notched nine perfect SEC road seasons (2003, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2020).

CLIMBING TO 202: Nick Saban has recorded 202 total victories as the head coach at Alabama following last Saturday's win over then-No. 14/13/13 LSU. The victory over the Tigers moved him past Vince Dooley (Georgia) for the second-most wins at one school in Southeastern Conference history. The conference's all-time leader for victories at the same school is Paul W. "Bear" Bryant with 224 while with the Crimson Tide. The NCAA's all-time leader for Division I wins at the same school is Joe Paterno with 409 at Penn State.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL: Alabama's No. 8 ranking in the Week 11 release of the Associated Press Poll marked the 256th consecutive week that the Crimson Tide has appeared in the poll. That streak is the longest active streak in college football. The 256 weeks more than doubles second-place Georgia with the Bulldogs appearing in the poll for 109 consecutive weeks. Alabama's 256 straight weeks tops the Crimson Tide's previous program-long streak of 105 consecutive weeks under head coach Gene Stallings in the mid-1990s.

ALABAMA vs. THE AP: Entering this weekend's contest in Lexington, Alabama has faced the eighth-toughest schedule according to ESPN.com. The Crimson Tide is one of seven teams nationally to have faced four opponents ranked in the current Associated Press Top 25 and is the only team in the country with three wins against teams in the current AP Poll. The Tide is also one of just three teams with three wins against opponents ranked in the AP Top 25 at the time of the game, including against then-No. 15 Ole Miss, then-No. 17 Tennessee and then-No. 13 LSU.

ALABAMA IN THE AP SINCE 2008: Alabama began the 2008 season at No. 24 in the Associated Press Preseason Poll. The Crimson Tide opened the year with a dominant 34-10 win over then-No. 9 Clemson in Atlanta, and since that win over the Tigers, UA has not been ranked lower than No. 17 in 255 polls that have followed. According to the College Poll Archive, the Tide is the only team to be represented on all 256 editions of the poll from the start of the 2008 season to the current week. The next closest team is Ohio State with 241 appearances followed by Oklahoma at 232. Alabama has spent 94.9 percent of the 15-plus years ranked in the top 10. A whopping 82.8 percent of that time Alabama has been ranked in the top five. The Crimson Tide has also been ranked No. 1 a total of 109 times since 2008. Only 13 other teams have earned the No. 1 ranking over that time, with the second-most appearances coming from Georgia at 34 and Clemson in third at 23.

38 OF 56: The Nov. 7 release of the College Football Playoff Rankings had the Crimson Tide as the No. 8 team. Alabama has made 38 total appearances in the top four of the 56-week, all-time selection committee rankings. Of those 38 top-four appearances, UA has been No. 1 a total of 24 times. Only six other teams have been ranked No. 1, with the Tide doubling the 12 appearances at No. 1 by second-place Georgia. Clemson is third with eight appearances atop the poll, while Ohio State ranks fourth with five. LSU and Mississippi State are tied for fifth with three appearances apiece at No. 1 while Tennessee is the only other team to appear atop the CFP rankings in their history with one week during the 2022 campaign.

ALABAMA HAS THE MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 195 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. That total is 19 more than second-place Ohio State, who has totaled 176 wins over that stretch.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in 181 of 187 regular season games that have had national championship implications. The final three games of the 2010 campaign and the final three weeks of the 2022 schedule marked the only six regular season contests without direct national championship implications over the last 15 seasons.

NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SABAN ERA: Alabama recorded its 92nd non-offensive touchdown of the Nick Saban era and second this season with Jihaad Campbell's 24-yard scoop and score against then-No. 17/15 Tennessee on Oct. 21. Campbell's touchdown followed Chris Braswell's 28-yard interception return at Mississippi State on Sept. 30 earlier this year. Since Saban's arrival in 2007, no team in college football has totaled more non-offensive scores than the Crimson Tide. During Saban's tenure, Alabama recorded a single-season record 15 in 2016, which led the Football Bowl Subdivision and was the most in a season by any FBS team in the last 20 years. The Tide also scored a non-offensive touchdown in 10 straight games dating from the CFP Semifinal against Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015 to the Texas A&M game on Oct. 22, 2016 for 14 non-offensive scores in that span – four interceptions, four punt returns, five fumble recoveries and a kickoff return.

MIDSEASON ALL-AMERICANS: Numerous outlets released their midseason All-America lists during the week of Oct. 16-20 with the Crimson Tide well-represented. The Associated Press named Kool-Aid McKinstry, Will Reichard and Dallas Turner to their first teams. The trio was also named to CBS Sports' All-America squad while ESPN.com tabbed Reichard, Turner and Terrion Arnold to their team. Reichard and Turner were a part of the midseason lists from both The Athletic and USA Today while Turner and McKinstry were recognized by The Sporting News.

ALABAMA IN THE CFP POLL

The College Football Playoff was introduced during the 2014 season with the first ever rankings being released on Oct. 28, 2014. The selection committee members meet weekly on Mondays and Tuesdays to produce rankings. The committee's rankings are announced on ESPN each Tuesday evening for the final six weeks of the season. Alabama holds the record for the most games played (13) and wins (9) in the history of the CFP. The Crimson Tide is also the only team to have appeared in seven of the eight College Football Playoffs. Alabama has gone 6-1 in CFP Semifinal matchups and owns a 3-3 mark in CFP National Championship Games, claiming titles in 2015, 2017 and 2020.

ALABAMA IN THE AP RANKINGS

Alabama has been ranked in 868 of the 1,228 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 537-137-8 (.793) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 178-25 (.877) mark under head coach Nick Saban. Alabama is also ranked in the AP poll for the 256th consecutive week, topping its previous streak of 105 consecutive polls from 1991-97 under head coach Gene Stallings. The 256 consecutive weeks is the second-longest stretch by any program in the poll's history, trailing only Nebraska's all-time mark of 348 consecutive weeks. Alabama has started nine seasons at No. 1 (2022, 2021, 2018, 2017, 2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

MILROE NAMED TO DAVEY O'BRIEN QB CLASS OF '23: Redshirt sophomore quarterback Jalen Milroe was named to the Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2023, the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award announced on Oct. 31. Milroe is one of 35 quarterbacks on the award's initial list. Semifinalists for the O'Brien will be announced on Nov. 14 with finalists named on Nov. 28. The 2023 winner of the Davey O'Brien will be recognized at the Home Depot College Football Awards on Friday, Dec. 8. Alabama has had two O'Brien winners in program history, first with Mac Jones in 2020 followed a year later by Bryce Young.

McKINSTRY EARNS THORPE SEMIFINALIST RECOGNITION: Kool-Aid McKinstry was selected as one of 15 semifinalists for Paycom Jim Thorpe Award on Oct. 31, the Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame announced on Oct. 31. The Thorpe is presented each year to college football's top defensive back. Three finalists will be named live on ESPN on Nov. 28 with the 2023 winner of the Thorpe Award announced as part of the Home Depot College Football Awards on Dec. 8. Alabama has had two winners in its history, first with Antonio Langham in 1993 and most recently Minkah Fitzpatrick in 2017.

DOWNS NAMED ALEXANDER AWARD SEMIFINALIST: Caleb Downs was selected as one of 14 semifinalists for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award on Nov. 1, the Maxwell Football Club announced. The Alexander is presented to the outstanding freshman player in college football. Finalists for the award will be named on Nov. 29 with the winner announced on Dec. 27. Alabama's lone winner of the Alexander was Will Anderson Jr. in 2020 following his standout rookie campaign.

TURNER SELECTED AS LOMBARDI SEMIFINALIST: Dallas Turner was named one of 12 semifinalists for the Lombardi Award, the Rotary Club of Houston announced on Nov. 1. The Lombardi is awarded each year to the college football offensive or defensive lineman who exemplifies the character and discipline of NFL Hall of Famer Vince Lombardi in addition to outstanding performance and ability. A group of four finalists will be named on Nov. 15 with the 2023 Lombardi Award winner being announced at a banquet in Houston in mid-December. Alabama has had three Lombardi Award winners in its history, including Cornelius Bennett (1986), Jonathan Allen (2016) and Will Anderson Jr. (2022).

BUTKUS SEMIFINALIST - DEONTAE LAWSON: Deontae Lawson was named a semifinalist for the Butkus Award, the Butkus Foundation announced on Nov. 6. The Butkus is given annually to the nation's top linebacker at the collegiate and high school levels. The 2023 winner of the Butkus Award will be announced on or before Dec. 7. The Crimson Tide has seen four players take home Butkus honors, including Derrick Thomas (1988), Rolando McClain (2009), C.J. Mosley (2013) and Reuben Foster (2016).

REICHARD NAMED GROZA SEMIFINALIST: Will Reichard was selected as one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza Collegiate Placekicker Award, the Palm Beach Sports Commission announced on Nov. 9. The Groza is given each year to college football's top placekicker. Finalists for the Groza will be named on Nov. 28 with the winner being announced live on ESPN as part of the Home Depot College Football Awards on Dec. 4. Alabama has never had a Groza Award winner in its storied history.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

FIRST-YEAR STARTERS UNDER SABAN: With the exit of two-year starter and 2021 Heisman Trophy winner Bryce Young, the Crimson Tide was tasked with finding a new starting quarterback. Under head coach Nick Saban, a total of eight quarterbacks have maintained their starting role for 10-plus games of a season in which they were named QB1. The list of eight includes: Bryce Young (2021), Mac Jones (2020), Tua Tagovailoa (2018), Jalen Hurts (2016), Jake Coker (2015), Blake Sims (2014), AJ McCarron (2011) and Greg McElroy (2009). All but McCarron won an SEC Championship in their first season while the upperclassmen (redshirt sophomore or above) won four national titles - Jones (redshirt junior), Coker (senior), McCarron (redshirt sophomore) and McElroy (junior).

RUNNING THE BALL vs. THE TIGERS: Alabama relied on its ground game in last weekend's 42-28 win over then-No. 14/13/13 LSU. The Crimson Tide backs racked up a season-high 288 rushing yards on 46 carries to average 6.3 yards per tote with six touchdowns. The 288 rushing yards and 6.3 average were the highest totals in a single game since Oct. 1 of last season at Arkansas when the Tide accumulated 317 yards on 42 carries for a 7.5 yards per carry mark. Alabama's six rushing scores were the most in a single game since Dec. 12, 2020, when the Tide had six against the Razorbacks in Fayetteville.

MILROE SHINES IN PRIMETIME: Jalen Milroe put together perhaps his best performance to date when the Crimson Tide quarterback showed out against then-No. 14/13/13 LSU last weekend. Milroe finished 15-of-23 passing for 219 yards while adding an impressive 155 yards and four touchdowns on 20 carries. The redshirt sophomore set the Alabama single-game record for touchdowns by a quarterback and tied for the second-most rushing scores by any player in UA single-game history. His four rushing touchdowns were the most since Brian Robinson Jr. had four against Ole Miss on Oct. 2, 2021. Milroe's 155 yards were also the fifth-most in a single game by a Tide quarterback and the most since Jalen Hurts had 154 against Fresno State on Sept. 9, 2017. Hurts had 10 rushes and two scores in the matchup with the Bulldogs.

SECOND CHANCE: Quarterback Jalen Milroe has responded in a big way the last six weeks since losing his starting job for the USF game. The redshirt sophomore has led Alabama to six straight SEC victories, including a pair on the road at Mississippi State and at Texas A&M and three top-25 victories. Since his return to the lineup, Milroe is averaging 231.2 passing yards per game (1,387 total) while completing 66.4 percent (87-131) of his passes and accounting for 15 total touchdowns (eight passing).

THROWING THE BOMB: In eight starts this season, Jalen Milroe has completed 114-of-176 passes for 1,836 yards. Milroe leads the SEC and ranks third in the country with a 16.11 yards per completion mark while averaging 10.43 yards per pass attempt, good for second in both the conference and nationally. Overall, the redshirt sophomore owns a 171.1 passing efficiency mark that is second among the league's signal-callers and ranks him eighth in Division I.

HOME RUN HITTER: Jalen Milroe enters this weekend's contest with 13 passing touchdowns on the season. All but one of those scores have been from at least 15 yards out with six scores from 40-plus yards, including a season-long 79-yarder against Arkansas on Oct. 14. Milroe is averaging 38.1 yards on his touchdown strikes.

CONVERTING IN THE RED: Alabama is 26-for-28 (92.9 percent) on scoring opportunities inside the red zone this season to rank 14th nationally and fourth in the SEC. The Crimson Tide has recorded 18 touchdowns, 15 of which have come on the ground and three through the air, with Will Reichard contributing eight field goals.

SCORING AFTER HALF: Alabama's offense has come out of the halftime break on fire this season. The Crimson Tide has totaled 93 of its 287 points (32.4 percent) in the third quarter of games, its highest point total in any quarter in 2023. The offensive output pairs with a Tide defense that has allowed just 31 points in the third quarter, its fewest of any quarter, and only 63 total points in the second half of games.

500+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama has recorded 500-plus yards of total offense 56 times in the last 122 games (dating to the start of the 2015 season), including the Nov. 4 matchup against then-No. 14/13/13 LSU. Alabama's offense recorded 500-plus yards seven times in both 2022 and 2021, eight times in 2020 and nine times in 2019, with the 2018 roster setting the Alabama single-season record with 500-or-more yards in 12 of the 15 total games.

400+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama has gained 400-plus yards of total offense in 63 of its last 78 games, dating back to the start of the 2018 season. In the 15 instances where the offense did not go over 400 yards Alabama is 13-2.

40-OR-MORE SINCE 2018: Alabama has scored 40-or-more points in 50 of the last 78 games. Fifty leads the nation for the most total games of 40-plus points since the start of the 2018 season. Ohio State has the second-most instances of scoring 40-or-more points over that stretch at 44, while Oklahoma is third with 37.

OPENING DRIVE TOUCHDOWNS: The Crimson Tide has won 51 of its last 52 games when scoring a touchdown on the first offensive possession of the game. The most recent instance came on opening weekend against Middle Tennessee when Jalen Milroe scrambled for six from 21-yards out. Alabama's lone loss when scoring a touchdown on the opening drive during that stretch came at Texas A&M on Oct. 9, 2021.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Alabama extended its school record for consecutive games with a score to 305 thanks to Jalen Milroe's 23-yard rushing touchdown in the opening quarter of the Nov. 4 contest with then-No. 14/13/13 LSU. The Tide was last held off the scoreboard in a 9-0 loss to Auburn on Nov. 18, 2000. Alabama owns a 246-59 (.807) record over the course of the current streak.

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches' rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 33 seasons (1991-present) with U.S. LBM coming on the title sponsor of the poll at the start of the 2023 season. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020 seasons. The Tide has compiled four UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and seven USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020) coaches poll national titles.

BALL PROTECTION: In the last 216 games (dating back to the start of the 2008 season), Alabama has turned the ball over only 230 times (123 fumbles, 107 interceptions) for an average of 1.07 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 212 times in 203 games (1.04/game). The 212 turnovers since 2009 includes 87 interceptions in 5,431 attempts (one interception every 62.4 attempts) by UA starting quarterbacks and 32 lost fumbles in 5,359 carries (one fumble lost every 167.5 carries) by the Tide's top two running backs.

McCLELLAN FINDING THE HARD YARDS: Jase McClellan has done the dirty work for the Alabama ground game during the 2023 season. According to Pro Football Focus, the senior ranks 19th nationally in missed tackles forced after a rush with 38 across his team-high 136 carries this season. He has gained 67.6 percent of his rushing yards (427 of 632 yards) after contact this season while averaging 3.14 yards after contact per carry.

BIG PLAY BURTON: Jermaine Burton has emerged as a big-play threat for the Crimson Tide this season. The senior leads UA with 537 yards and five touchdowns on 26 receptions. A total of 15 of his receptions have converted a first down while Burton averages 20.7 yards per reception to lead the SEC and rank ninth nationally in that category.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

LIMITING THE POINTS: Alabama's defense has held its opponents to a combined 160 points on the season, 34 of which came against then-No. 11/10 Texas. Despite the matchup with the Longhorns, the Tide defense is averaging just 17.8 points allowed per game, a total that ranks 18th nationally and second in the SEC.

ADJUSTING AT THE BREAK: The Crimson Tide defense has allowed just 63 points in the second half of games this season, including 31 in the third quarter and 32 in the fourth. Teams are averaging just 7.0 points in the second half against UA, with the defense allowing a touchdown or less in seven contests. Below is a look at how teams have fared against Alabama coming out of the halftime break.

PICK PARADE: The Crimson Tide has totaled eight interceptions to start the 2023 campaign and has recorded at least one interception in six of nine total contests this season. For comparison, the Crimson Tide finished with seven total picks across 13 games a season ago.

GETTING IN THE BACKFIELD: The Tide defense has gotten in opponents' backfields with regularity this season. Through nine games, Alabama has accumulated 58.0 tackles for loss (-270 yards) and 29.0 sacks (-203 yards). The Tide is averaging 6.4 tackles for loss per game to rank 30th nationally and is 11th in the country with a 3.2 sacks per game average.

GETTING IN THE BACKFIELD - MORE RECENTLY: In the last six of the last seven contests dating back to the USF matchup, Alabama's defense has finished with at least 6.0 TFLs and 3.0 sacks-or-better each game. Below is a look at how the defense has fared since the Tampa trip.

KEEPING THE GROUND GAME IN-CHECK: The Crimson Tide defense limited Texas A&M to only 67 yards rushing in their Oct. 7 matchup. Entering this weekend's contest with Kentucky, Alabama's defensive unit has held 20 of its last 37 opponents (dating back to the 2021 season) to less than 100 yards rushing. UA has also limited 10 of the last 22 opponents to 80 yards or less dating back to the start of the 2022 campaign, including three times in 2023.

TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS: Alabama has forced at least one turnover in 108 of the last 122 contests (dating back to the start of the 2015 season). During the current run, Alabama has forced 187 turnovers (121 interceptions, 66 fumbles) and returned 42 of those miscues for touchdowns.

SHUTOUTS SINCE 2007: Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, Alabama has recorded 26 shutouts, including 12 in Southeastern Conference play. With its 34-0 win over Austin Peay on Nov. 19 last year, the Crimson Tide defense has 12 more shutouts than its nearest competitor over that span. Ranking second in shutouts during that time is Ohio State with 14.

10 POINTS OR LESS: Alabama's trademark has been its defense ever since head coach Nick Saban's arrival on campus. Since that first season in Tuscaloosa, Saban-coached defenses have held the Crimson Tide's opponents to 10 points or less on 105 occasions. Dating back to the start of the 2015 season, UA's defense has limited the opposition to 10 or fewer points 49 times across 122 total contests.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no team has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama has surrendered only 356 touchdowns over the last 203 games. That is 53 fewer than second-place Iowa (409).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama's defense has been a force in the run game since head coach Nick Saban's arrival on campus. More recently, the Tide has given up just 86 rushing scores in the last 122 games (dating to the start of the 2015 season). Overall since Saban arrived in 2007, UA has allowed the fewest rushing touchdowns in the nation at 142, a total that is 31 fewer than second-place Iowa.

RUSHING DEFENSE: UA has surrendered only 35 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that is the fewest in the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed 30 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game.

TURNER OFF THE EDGE: Through nine games, Dallas Turner has accumulated 38 total tackles, including a team-high 10.5 for loss (-69 yards) and seven sacks (-55 yards). Turner's seven sacks are tied for second in the SEC and ninth nationally while his 0.78 sacks per game average is second in the conference and ranks 14th in Division I. He is also tied for second in the conference and 11th nationally in total tackles for loss. Turner is on-pace for 14.5 tackles for loss and 9.5 sacks in the regular season. For comparison, Will Anderson Jr. finished with 17 tackles for loss and 10 sacks in 2022 when he swept the national defensive player of the year awards.

BRAS ON THE OTHER SIDE: Chris Braswell has paired with Dallas Turner to make things difficult on opposing offenses. The senior linebacker has accumulated 34 total tackles, including nine for loss (-42 yards) and 6.5 sacks (-38 yards) to rank second on UA, just behind Turner in both categories. Braswell's sack total is third in the SEC while he ranks in the league's top-10 for TFLs.

OUTSIDE LBs WREACKING HAVOC: Alabama outside linebacker Dallas Turner is playing the best football of his career. In addition to his tackle for loss and sack totals, he is 13th in total pressures according to Pro Football Focus with 38, including eight sacks, eight quarterback hits and 22 hurries. Turner has graded out at 10th nationally in pass-rush grade (86.3) and owns a PRP (combines sacks, hits and hurries relative to how many times a player rushes the passer) of 11.7 that is sixth among all Division I defenders. Fellow outside linebacker Chris Braswell is close behind in PRP, ranking 10th nationally at 11.0.

BAMA CORNERS LOCKING IT DOWN: Alabama cornerbacks Kool-Aid McKinstry and Terrion Arnold are two of the top-graded defensive backs according to Pro Football Focus. Among players who have been in coverage on 80 percent of their snaps in 2023, McKinstry has graded out at third nationally with Arnold close behind in 13th. Kool-Aid has been targeted just 31 times in nine games, allowing 139 total yards receiving and ranks 10th in forced incompletions at eight. Arnold is sixth nationally in forced incompletions (9) with a 69.0 NFL passer rating on his targets, ranking 16th nationally.

TIDE SAFETIES SHOWING OUT: Alabama safeties Caleb Downs, Malachi Moore and Jaylen Key are also among the highest rated defensive backs in the country. Downs ranks sixth nationally in coverage grade with three forced incompletions and two picks. Moore has added 37 stops with four tackles for loss and one interception. Jaylen Key has surrendered just a 53.4 NFL passer rating against that ranks ninth nationally among players with 80 percent of their snaps in coverage.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

ALL-TIME POINTS LEADER: Will Reichard is quickly approaching the NCAA's all-time career points mark. Now in his graduate year, Reichard has accumulated 502 total points to rank third in NCAA history and atop the kicking points list. The all-time NCAA record of 530 is held by quarterback Keenan Reynolds of Navy from 2012-15. Below is a look at where Reichard currently sits.

SEC POINTS LEADER - WILL REICHARD: With his PAT make following the Crimson Tide's first touchdown against Arkansas on Oct. 14, Will Reichard became the Southeastern Conference's career points leader. Reichard entered the matchup with the Razorbacks tied at 480 points with former Auburn kicker Daniel Carlson for the league's all-time mark.

MOVING UP THE CAREER FIELD GOALS LIST: Placekicker Will Reichard ranks third on the Alabama career list for field goals with 77. Below is a look at where Reichard ranks entering this weekend.

PATs FOR REICHARD: Will Reichard owns the Crimson Tide's career record for made PATs. Entering this weekend's contest, Reichard has made 271-of-273 career PATs. The senior recorded nine PATs against ULM on Sept. 17 of last season to move past the former record of 186 (188 attempts) by Adam Griffith from 2013-16.

50-PLUS FOR REICHARD: A 50-yard field goal from Will Reichard midway through the fourth quarter against then-No. 17/15 Tennessee represented his second from 50-plus this season. The three-point make was also the seventh for Reichard from 50 yards or better during his career to tie him with Van Tiffin (1983-86) for the Alabama all-time mark. Tiffin used a kicking tee for the entirety of his career.

BIG LEG BURNIP: James Burnip has shined in year three with the Tide. He has accumulated 1,785 yards on 37 punts to average 48.2 yards per boot. Burnip's 48.2 mark is third in the SEC and fifth nationally. The Aussie has boomed 16 punts of 50-plus yards this season, including a career-long 67-yarder at Mississippi State on Sept. 30. The punt against the Bulldogs was Burnip's fourth of 60-plus this season to go with his 61-yarder against then-No. 11/10 Texas on Sept. 9, a 60-yarder one week later at USF and a 63-yarder at Texas A&M on Oct. 7. Burnip's 67-yarder in Starkville was the longest punt for the Crimson Tide since JK Scott's 73-yard kick against Ohio State in the 2014 CFP Semifinal at the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-KENTUCKY SERIES: Alabama and Kentucky will meet for the 42nd time in series history and first time in Lexington since 2013 when the two teams square off on Saturday morning. The Crimson Tide holds a 38-2-1 all-time advantage in the series and has won seven straight against the Wildcats. The two teams first met on Nov. 17, 1917, with Thomas Kelley's Crimson Tide squad posting a 27-0 win in Lexington. UA and UK then met every year from 1922-47, with the exception of 1943 due to World War II. Since that 1947 season, the Tide and Wildcats have met just 15 times with Alabama holding a 14-1 advantage over that stretch. The Alabama-Kentucky series has been played at five different sites, including Birmingham, Lexington, Louisville, Montgomery and Tuscaloosa.

GENERAL NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama’s success on the field over the past 16 seasons under Nick Saban has coincided with the Tide’s success in the classroom. The 2023 squad is no exception as the Crimson Tide entered the season with 11 student-athletes who already had their degrees in-hand and are wearing an SEC Graduate patch on their jersey. The list of graduates includes Chris Braswell, James Burnip, Darrian Dalcourt, Justin Eboigbe, Terrence Ferguson II, Jaylen Key, Jase McClellan, Seth McLaughlin, Malachi Moore, Will Reichard and Roydell Williams. Since Saban’s arrival in 2007, Alabama football has seen a total of 642 degrees earned, including 100 master’s.

CHAMPIONS IN THE CLASSROOM: Alabama’s achievements in the classroom have been most impressive during national title seasons. Those six squads (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020) included 139 student-athletes who had earned their degrees prior to game time.

APR SUCCESS: According to the most recent Academic Progress Rate (APR) numbers that were announced by the NCAA last May, figures that cover the four-year period extending from the 2018-19 through 2021-22 school years, the Crimson Tide continued to score well above the national cutoff standard. The football program’s total average of 995 was tied for the best among all Southeastern Conference schools and bettered the national average for football by more than 25 points. In total, the football program was one of 15 University of Alabama sports to score a 995 or better.

RETURNING HOME: Each year during head coach Nick Saban’s tenure at least one Alabama player leaves campus early to declare for the NFL Draft. The Tide staff has made it a point to stay connected with guys who begin their pro careers but have yet to graduate in hopes of one day helping them earn a degree. UA’s academics staff has succeeded in that task for a total of 15 players that have returned from pro careers to earn their first or second degree. The list of 15 includes: Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, Terrence Cody, Landon Collins, Glen Coffee, Amari Cooper, Ronnie Harrison, Derrick Henry, Marlon Humphrey, Nico Johnson, Rolando McClain, Dee Milliner, Bo Scarbrough, Vinnie Sunseri, Tua Tagovailoa and Chance Warmack (master’s). Additionally, Jimmy Johns returned to the Capstone to receive his degree in May 2023.

McLAUGHLIN NAMED CAMPBELL SEMIFINALIST: Alabama center Seth McLaughlin was selected as a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, the National Football Foundation announced on Sept. 27. The Campbell recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership. The NFF will announce 12-14 finalists on Oct. 25 with the winner being announced at the 65th NFF Annual Awards Dinner in Las Vegas on Dec. 5.

NEW HIRES: Saban’s 2023 coaching staff features three new hires including Robert Bala (inside linebackers), Tommy Rees (offensive coordinator/quarterbacks) and Kevin Steele (defensive coordinator).

ALABAMA’S TV RECORD: Alabama’s matchup with then-No. 14/13/13 LSU on CBS last weekend was the Crimson Tide’s 481st televised game. Alabama has compiled a 336-141-4 (.703) all-time record in televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed-circuit telecasts).

200 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 214 GAMES: Alabama’s win over then-No. 14/13/13 LSU last weekend was the Tide’s 200th nationally televised game since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of 2014.

174-9 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama is 174-9 (.951) when leading at the half. UA is also 157-4 (.975) when leading by seven or more points at the break during the Saban era. The Crimson Tide has held the lead at the half in 92 of its last 122 games (dating back to the start of the 2015 season).

MOST WINS BY ACTIVE HEAD COACH: Alabama head coach Nick Saban’s 288 career wins are the most career victories by an active FBS head coach. Saban ranks just ahead of North Carolina’s Mack Brown, who has 281, with LSU’s Brian Kelly close behind in third, collecting 279 career wins across his stops.

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban’s 154 conference wins (including SEC championship games) are second on the SEC career conference wins list. Saban is also first in league history for SEC regular season winning percentage at .832 (154-31) with the next closest being Georgia head coach Kirby Smart at .826 (57-12). Additionally, Saban is second on the league’s career wins list at 246 victories.

TOUGH TO GET SABAN’S TIDE TWICE: During his tenure at Alabama, head coach Nick Saban has suffered 28 total losses. Of those 28 losses, the Crimson Tide and Saban have had the opportunity to face the team that beat them at a later date on 24 occasions. In those 24 rematches, Alabama owns a 22-2 mark when avenging its previous loss. The only two times the Crimson Tide has fallen in back-to-back games against the same opponent is LSU (2010-11) and Ole Miss (2014-15). The Crimson Tide has not yet had the opportunity to bounce back from losses against Utah (2009), Clemson (2018), Georgia (2021) and Texas (2023).

SABAN LEADS IN WINS vs. TOP-FIVE TEAMS: Alabama's 27-6 win over No. 4 Cincinnati in the 2021 College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic on Dec. 31 was Nick Saban's 29th career victory against a team ranked in the top five of the Associated Press Top 25 Poll, the most in college football history. Saban's 29-15 career record in top-five contests gives him a .659 winning percentage, which is also college football's best. Following Saban on the all-time victory list are Bobby Bowden (18/.378 winning percentage), Barry Switzer (15/.516), Woody Hayes (15/.516), Steve Spurrier (15/.429) and Lou Holtz (15/.419).

AGAINST THE TOP 10: Alabama owns an 84-79-1 (.515) all-time record against teams ranked in the top-10 of the Associated Press poll. Since the start of the 2008 season, the Crimson Tide has posted a 35-13 (.729) overall record against top-10 teams, including a 20-7 (.741) mark versus the top 10 since the inception of the College Football Playoff. In Saban's six national championship seasons at Alabama, his teams have gone 18-2 (.900) against top-10 opponents.

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 79-21 (.790) against the Associated Press Top 25 since the start of 2008. That record includes a 3-1 record in 2023 with wins against then-No. 15 Ole Miss on Sept. 23, then-No. 17 Tennessee on Oct. 21 and most recently against then-No. 13 LSU.

SABAN vs. AP TOP 25 OPPOSITION: The Crimson Tide's 42-28 win over then-No. 13 LSU on Nov. 4 was Nick Saban's 103rd career win, and 81st at Alabama, against the Associated Press Top 25. Saban moved past Joe Paterno (86) for the most career wins against the AP Top 25 when he defeated then-No. 22 Auburn on Nov. 28, 2020. The late Florida State legend Bobby Bowden ranks third all-time (82), while Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant is fourth (66). Former Duke, Florida and South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier is fifth (64). Saban's winning percentage against AP ranked teams (103-47, .687) tops Bryant (.592), Bowden (.557), Spurrier (.529) and Paterno (.512).

DOMINATING THE AP TOP 25: Alabama's 45-20 win over then-No. 11 Kansas State in the Allstate Sugar Bowl to close out the 2022 campaign was head coach Nick Saban's 23rd career win by 25-plus points against a ranked opponent. Saban is the all-time leader for the most wins by 25-plus points in the Associated Press Poll Era (since 1936), sitting just ahead of Bobby Bowden's previous record of 20. Saban is also the NCAA record holder with 25 career wins of 20-plus points against AP top-15 opponents, including the win over the Wildcats. A total of 22 of Saban's career 20-plus point wins against AP top-15 opponents have come while at UA.

50-PLUS vs. RANKED OPPONENTS: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama has posted 50-plus points against Associated Press Top 25 teams on seven occasions. The most recent instance came on Jan. 11, 2021 at the College Football Playoff National Championship Game when the Crimson Tide defeated then-No. 3/3/3 Ohio State, 52-24. Below is a look at Saban's 50-plus point games vs. ranked teams.

SABAN AT No. 1: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has coached the most games as the Associated Press Poll's No. 1 team among active head coaches. Following last season's Oct. 8 victory over Texas A&M, Saban has coached 98 games as the nation's top-ranked team, which is 71 more games than Kirby Smart's 27. Close behind Smart is Dabo Swinney at 21.

MORE THAN A DECADE AT No. 1: With Alabama's Aug. 15 preseason ranking at No. 1 in 2022, the Crimson Tide has been ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll at least once each season since 2008. The 15-year streak is the longest by any program and coach in the history of the AP rankings. The previous long streak by any one team was seven seasons by Miami (Fla.) from 1986-92. The previous streak by one coach is six straight seasons, which was accomplished by Frank Leahy at Notre Dame in 1943 and continued from 1946-50 following an absence while Leahy served in the Navy.

SIX RINGS IN 12 SEASONS: The Crimson Tide's win in the 2021 College Football Playoff National Championship Game helped Alabama claim its sixth national title in 12 seasons, making UA the first team in the Associated Press Poll Era (since 1936) to win six championships over a 12-season span. The only other team in college football history to win six titles in a quarter of a century or less was also Alabama, coming across a 19-season stretch from 1961-79.

SIGN WITH THE TIDE, LEAVE WITH A RING: Since Nick Saban's arrival at Alabama in 2007, members of each one of his recruiting classes have won at least one national championship. The 2009 class tops the list with three to their name while the 2008, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015 and 2017 classes each achieved two national titles during their time in Tuscaloosa. The 2007, 2013, 2016, 2018, 2019 and 2020 classes can each claim one national title with the latter group still having time to add to that number.

BAMA IN THE NFL

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: As of the 2023 NFL Draft, Alabama has had more draft picks over the last 15 drafts (123) than any other program in the nation. The list of 123 features 12 Super Bowl champions, 27 Pro Bowl selections, 14 First Team All-Pro members and one Offensive Rookie of the Year.

2023 NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw 10 former players selected in the 2023 NFL Draft, including three first-round picks in quarterback Bryce Young (No. 1, Carolina Panthers), linebacker Will Anderson Jr. (Houston Texans) and running back Jahmyr Gibbs (No. 12, Detroit Lions). Defensive back Brian Branch (Lions) went early in the second round while four former Tide standouts went in the third round - Tyler Steen (Philadelphia Eagles), Byron Young (Las Vegas Raiders), Jordan Battle (Cincinnati Bengals) and Cameron Latu (San Francisco 49ers). Henry To'oTo'o was next up, going in the fifth round (Texans) with DeMarcco Hellams (Atlanta Falcons) rounding out the group following his seventh-round selection.

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban has produced the most first rounders of any NCAA Division I head coach with 49 players chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 44 while at Alabama. The Crimson Tide's three first-round selections in the 2023 NFL Draft extended Saban's all-time mark, producing 16 more first-rounders than second-place Joe Paterno (33).

QUICK HITS ON ALABAMA'S NFL DRAFT SUCCESS: Below is a look at some of Alabama's recent success in the NFL Draft.

- Over the last 15 NFL Drafts, Alabama has produced 123 total picks which is more than any other program in the nation. Of those 123, an impressive 44 (35.8 percent) have been first-rounders.
- Since 2000, the Crimson Tide has produced an NCAA-leading 46 first-rounders, a number that is nine better than the next closest school in Ohio State (37).
- Since 2010, Alabama has had an NCAA-best 43 players selected in the first round, a number that nearly doubles the next closest school in OSU (24).
- In 2023, Bryce Young became the only Alabama player in program history to be selected first overall in the Common Draft Era (since 1967). Young is also the only player to go 1-1 during head coach Nick Saban's career.

- Will Anderson Jr.'s third overall selection matched Marcell Dareus (2011) and Quinnen Williams (2019) for the highest defender taken during Saban's tenure in Tuscaloosa.
- With Young at No. 1 and Anderson Jr. at No. 3, UA produced the first offensive and defensive player taken in the 2023 NFL Draft.
- Jahmyr Gibbs went 12th overall to the Detroit Lions, making him the second-highest running back selected during Saban's tenure. He trailed only Trent Richardson, who went No. 3 overall to the Cleveland Browns in the 2012 Draft.
- With the selection of Young in the 2023 NFL Draft, Alabama has had at least one player selected in the first round of 15 straight drafts (2009-present) to set the new NCAA record. The Crimson Tide was previously tied with Miami (1995-2008), who owned the old mark of 14 consecutive first-rounders
- Alabama has produced multiple first round picks in 12 of the last 15 NFL Drafts with single first-round selections in 2009, 2015 and 2016.
- With Jameson Williams' selection in the 2022 NFL Draft, Alabama became the just the second college program to produce a first-rounder at wideout in a three-year stretch. Tennessee also accomplished the feat from 1982-84.
- After the 2021 NFL Draft, Alabama became the first school in the modern draft era to have four wide receivers drafted in the first round in a two-year span (2020 – Henry Ruggs III, Jerry Jeudy; 2021 – DeVonta Smith, Jaylen Waddle).
- Also in 2021, Alabama became one of just two schools (Oklahoma) to have quarterbacks selected in the first round in back-to-back years (2020 –Tua Tagovailoa; 2021 – Mac Jones).
- With the first-round selection of Tagovailoa in the 2020 NFL Draft, Saban has produced at least one first-rounder at every starting position on offense and defense during his illustrious collegiate head coaching career.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE NFL: Alabama entered Week 1 of the 2023-24 NFL season with 58 players on active 53-man rosters, the most of any college. In total, the Crimson Tide currently has 74 players on an NFL roster (including reserve/practice squad) and is represented on 26 of the league's 32 teams. Below is a look at where former Crimson Tide standouts are currently playing.

LEADERS IN THE LEAGUE: Every year, the National Football League allows each of its 32 teams to name up to eight team captains. The start of the 2023-24 season featured 13 former Crimson Tide players who were selected as one of the permanent captains for their respective squad. The list of captains to start the year included Jonathan Allen (Commanders), Derrick Henry (Titans), Jalen Hurts (Eagles), Eddie Jackson (Bears), Kareem Jackson (Broncos), Josh Jacobs (Raiders), Mac Jones (Patriots), Ryan Kelly (Colts), Xavier McKinney (Giants), C.J. Mosley (Jets), DeVonta Smith (Eagles), Tua Tagovailoa (Dolphins) and Bryce Young (Panthers). The Baltimore Ravens do not name team captains, per head coach John Harbaugh's rules, while the Dallas Cowboys name team captains on a game-by-game basis.

70 IN A SEASON: A total of 70 former Crimson Tide players appeared in a game and played at least one snap during the 2022-23 NFL regular season. Alabama became the first program to have 70 former players see game action in any regular season in NFL history. Reggie Ragland earned snaps in the Cleveland Browns' Week 15 matchup with the Baltimore Ravens to push the total to 70. The number of former Tide players to play in an NFL regular-season contest has now increased each year for six consecutive seasons starting with 38 in 2016. The 2017 season saw 44 former players earn game action, breaking Alabama's previous record of 40 in 1987, and was followed by 52 in 2018. The total moved to 62 in 2019, followed by 64 in 2020 and 68 in 2021.

• Saban has compiled a 293-70-1 (.806) record as a college head coach. He has claimed seven national championships – six at Alabama – 11 conference championships and 23 of his teams will have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff Semifinals in seven of the last nine seasons including six of the last eight CFP National Championship Games.

• Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships, the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships and the only coach to win three CFP National Championships. He has won seven titles in his last 17 years coaching college football, most recently capturing the CFP National Championship following the 2020 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years (2009, 2011-12). His title in 2020 moved him past Paul “Bear” Bryant for the most national championships in the poll era with seven.

• In 2009, Saban produced Alabama’s first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. Saban made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He took down Clemson, 45-40, to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game and took home his sixth national championship - and fifth at Alabama - in 2017 with a 26-23 overtime win over Georgia in the 2018 CFP National Championship Game. Saban’s most recent title came in dominating fashion as the Crimson Tide defeated Ohio State, 52-24, in the 2021 CFP National Championship Game in Miami Gardens, Fla.

• In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team’s response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

• A five-season run at LSU (2000-04) produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships and three SEC West Division championships. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban’s guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. “Bear” Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America.

• Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans’ defensive coordinator/secondary coach. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach, including four postseason appearances. In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season.

• Saban’s first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points) and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

• A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor’s degree in business. He earned a master’s degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and one grandson, James.

• At Michigan State, the Sabans started the Nick’s Kids Foundation, which they have continued in Tuscaloosa, a vibrant example of their continuing concern for disadvantaged children. Since Nick and Terry arrived in Tuscaloosa, over \$12 million has been distributed to students, teachers and children’s causes at over 150 charities through the Nick’s Kids Foundation.

• Personally, Nick and Terry have given over \$1 million to their First Generation Scholarship at The University of Alabama. The Sabans also contributed \$1 million to The Crimson Standard, Alabama’s 10-year, \$600 million capital campaign. Most recently, the Sabans announced plans for The Saban Center in Tuscaloosa, a learning and discovery center on the Black Warrior River that brings together the Children’s Hands-On Museum and the Tuscaloosa Children’s Theater. The Sabans made a personal gift of \$1 million to the project and the Nick’s Kids Foundation contributed another \$2 million.
