UK DEFENSE HAS ALLOWED FEWER THAN 26 POINTS PER GAME AND 162 RUSHING YARDS PER GAME IN SEVEN STRAIGHT SEASONS

MARK STOOPS HOLDS SCHOOL RECORDS FOR WINS (72) AND BOWL APPEARANCES (7)

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky plays at Vanderbilt, its last league game of the season, on Saturday, Nov. 22 at 3:30 p.m. Eastern time (2:30 p.m. Central time in Nashville).
 - The teams have split the past four meetings with the road team winning all four games.
- Kentucky is coming off a win over Tennessee Tech, 42-10, last Saturday.
 - UK scored six touchdowns on the eight possessions played with QB Cutter Boley.
 - UK has scored at least 38 points in consecutive games for the first time since 2021.
 - UK has allowed 10 or fewer points in three straight games, the first time that has been accomplished since 2018.
 - UK has held three straight opponents to 143 or fewer passing yards for the first time since 2019.
- Kentucky allowed only three points at Auburn and seven against Florida, the first time in five years that it has limited consecutive SEC opponents to seven points or less.
 - Also at Auburn, Kentucky's defense totaled 12 tackles for loss (-63 yards), seven quarterback sacks (-49), one interception, four pass breakups and nine QB hurries.
 - Also against Florida, Kentucky's defense generated four turnovers, most in a game since 2020, while adding seven TFL, four pass breakups and four quarterback hurries.
- QB **Cutter Boley** has brought a recent spark to the passing game. In his last six games, Boley has completed 136-188-6 for 1,378 yards and 11 touchdowns receiving, adding two touchdowns rushing. His pass completion percentage in those six games is 72.3 percent.
 - He is the first UK QB with a completion percentage of at least 74.0 percent in four games (min. 20 attempts) in one season (vs. Texas, vs. Tennessee, vs. Florida, vs. Tennessee Tech) since Tim Couch in 1998.
 - Boley has been named the SEC Freshman of the Week for three straight weeks.
- Over those six games, UK has had receiving by committee with nine wide receivers, three tight ends and three running backs all making contributions.
 - WR **Kendrick Law** has led the charge with 47 catches for 519 yards and three touchdowns.
- UK's rushing is led by a "2-3" punch - RBs **Donte Dowdell** (jersey #2) and **Seth McGowan** (#3).
 - In our league game, Dowdell rushed for 104 yards on only seven carries against Florida, highlighted by a 65-yard touchdown jaunt.
 - McGowan, is tied for third in the SEC and 13th in the nation in TDs rushing (12) and sixth in the SEC in rushing yardage (77.0 yards per game).
- UK has one of the most experienced offensive lines in FBS, with 166 career starts between them prior to the start of the season, which ranked as the third-most in FBS. UK has started the same five linemen in every game this season.
- DB **Ty Bryant** has three interceptions, which is tied for the SEC lead and 29th in the nation. He also leads the team in tackles with 56 stops.
- Mark Stoops is the SEC's longest-tenured coach, currently in his 13th season at the helm of the Wildcats in 2025. He also is UK's all-time winningest head coach with 72 wins.
- Kentucky had the nation's fifth-toughest schedule at the start of 2025, according to USA Today, and currently is 13th-most difficult according to the Sagarin computer ratings.
 - Going into Week 13, UK has five opponents ranked in the current Associated Press Top 25 poll, including (4) Georgia, (5) Ole Miss, (12) Vanderbilt, (17) Texas and (20) Tennessee. In addition, Tennessee Tech was fifth in last week's FCS poll.

THE SERIES

- Kentucky leads Vanderbilt in the all-time series, 48-44-4.
 - Kentucky trails the all-time series in Nashville, 27-22-2.
- The teams have split the past four meetings with the road team winning all four contests.
 - The Commodores won, 20-17, in the last meeting last season in Lexington.
- Six of the past 10 meetings have been decided by a touchdown or less.
- The Commodores' eight victories this season entering the contest are the most they have ever had when playing Kentucky. The previous high had been five wins.

THE CONNECTIONS

- Kentucky has five players from the state of Tennessee on its roster: S Martels Carter Jr. (Chattanooga), RB James Dalrymple (Clarksville), DL Kalen Edwards (Dyersburg), LB Kris Thompson (Nashville), OLB Steven Soles Jr. (Powell).
- Vanderbilt has one player from the state of Kentucky on its roster: K Mason Rohmiller (Fort Mitchell).
- Kentucky offensive lineman Shiyazh Pete was teammates with Vanderbilt QB Diego Pavia, TE Eli Stowers, QB Blaze Berlowitz, S Makhilyn Young and WR Trent Hudson while at New Mexico State.
 - Pete also has a connection with the following coaches now at Vanderbilt - offensive coordinator Tim Beck, chief consultant to the head coach/senior offensive advisory Jerry Kill, safeties coach Melvin Rice, run game coordinator Ghaali Muhammad-Lankford and quarterbacks coach Garrett Altman.

KENTUCKY IN THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Wildcats have a 191-418-12 (.314) all-time record in Southeastern Conference games.
 - UK head coach Mark Stoops has a 33-67 (.330) all-time record in SEC games.

TOUGH SCHEDULE

- Kentucky had the nation's fifth-toughest schedule at the start of 2025, according to USA Today, and currently is 13th according to the Sagarin computer ratings.
- Going into Week 13, UK is set to play five teams ranked in the current Associated Press Top 25 poll, including No. 4 Georgia, No. 5 Ole Miss, No. 12 Vanderbilt, No. 17 Texas and No. 20 Tennessee. In addition, Tennessee Tech is undefeated and ranked fifth in last week's FCS poll (this week's poll not available at the time of this writing).

WILDCATS AGAINST RANKED TEAMS

- Vanderbilt is UK's fifth ranked opponent this season.
 - Kentucky lost to No. 20/14 Ole Miss, 30-23, on Sept. 6 at home, No. 12/10 Georgia, 35-14, on Oct. 4 on the road, No. 21/17 Texas on Oct. 18 at home and No. 17/17 Tennessee, 56-34, on Oct. 25 at home.
- The Wildcats are 1-0 all-time vs. a ranked Vanderbilt team. The win came in 1947 when UK defeated the 10th-ranked Commodores, 14-0, in Nashville on Oct. 18.
- Kentucky is looking for its first win over a ranked foe since upsetting No. 6 Ole Miss last season (Sept. 28, 2024) in Oxford, Miss.
 - Kentucky's last win over a ranked team at home was over No. 22 Florida, 33-14, in 2023.
- Kentucky has played 279 ranked teams in the Associated Press poll in its history, holding a 51-221-5 record in those games. (The on-field record is 53-221-5 after two wins were vacated by NCAA from 2021).
- The Wildcats are 9-16 on-field against their last 25 ranked AP-ranked teams, dating back to a win over NC State in the 2020 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl.
 - Since 2018, the Cats are 12-22 on-field against AP-ranked teams.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

CUTTER LOOSE

- Cutter Boley, Bluegrass native and redshirt freshman, has been starting QB1 for the team since Eastern Michigan on Sept. 20. In eight games and seven starts this season, he has completed 159-of-231 passes for 1,780 yards and 13 touchdowns. The rookie also has two rushing TDs.
 - He has five games with 225 yards or more on the season.
 - Has five games with two or more touchdowns (receiving or rushing) on the season.
- In his last six games since playing South Carolina on Sept. 27, Boley has completed 136-188-6 for 1,378 yards and 11 touchdowns, adding two touchdowns rushing. His pass completion percentage in those six games is 72.3 percent.
 - He became the first UK QB with a completion percentage of at least 74.0 percent in four games (min. 20 attempts) in one season (vs. Texas, vs. Tennessee, vs. Florida, vs. Tennessee Tech) since Tim Couch in 1998.
 - He became the first freshman UK QB with a touchdown pass in four straight games since Jared Lorenzen in 2000 (vs. Tennessee, at Auburn, vs. Florida, vs. Tenn. Tech).
- Boley is fourth in the SEC and 16th nationally in completion percentage (68.8).
 - TRACK THIS:** He is on pace to shatter Jared Lorenzen's school record for a freshman and currently is second on the school's single-season mark (min. 100 completions) behind Tim Couch's 72.3 in 1998.
- He is a three-time SEC Freshman of the Week (at Auburn, vs. Florida and vs. Tennessee Tech).

AT #12/10 GEORGIA

- Completed 25 passes of a career-high 41 attempts for 225 yards and two touchdowns.
 - Had the most passing yards (225) and passing completions (25) by a UK freshman QB in an SEC road game since Jalen Whitlow at Tennessee on Nov. 24, 2012 (225 yards on 29 completions).
 - Had the most touchdown passes by a UK freshman QB in an SEC game road game (2) since Morgan Newton at Georgia on Nov. 21, 2009 (3).
 - First UK QB to pass for at least 200 yards against Georgia in Athens since Andre' Woodson on Nov. 17, 2007 (268 yards).

VS. #21/17 TEXAS

- Completed a career-best, 31-of-39 pass attempts for a then-career-best 258 yards.
 - Added a career-best 14 rushes for a career-best 45 yards and the first touchdown rushing of his career.
 - His 16-yard TD run was the longest for a UK QB since Will Levis at Louisville in 2021
 - On non-sack plays, he ran 11 times for 69 yards.
 - His 31 completions are the most for a UK freshman quarterback since Jared Lorenzen in 2000
 - His 258 yards passing were the most for a UK freshman since Maxwell Smith threw for 283 against Ole Miss in 2011, which Boley reset that career high in the following game
 - His 79.4 percent completion percentage is also the best single-game percentage for a freshman quarterback with 30 attempts.
 - His 79.4 percentage is the best for any UK quarterback since Dusty Bonner completed 85 percent (34-of-40) against Connecticut in 1999.
 - Became the first UK quarterback with at least 250 yards passing and 45 yards rushing since Will Levis against Tennessee in 2021.

VS. #17/17 TENNESSEE

- Completed 26-of-35 pass attempts for a career-best 330 yards and a career-best five touchdowns.
 - His five touchdown passes are a UK freshman record. The previous record was three by



Morgan Newton (2009) and Jared Lorenzen (2000).

- His five TD passes also are the most since Andre' Woodson threw for six TDs against Tennessee in 2007.
- His 330 passing yards are the most for a UK freshman since Jared Lorenzen threw for 385 yards against Vanderbilt in 2000.
- Became the first UK quarterback with two touchdown passes of at least 56 yards in the same game since Will Levis against Northern Illinois on Sept. 24, 2022.
 - It marked the first time two touchdown passes of at least 56 yards against a league foe since Patrick Towles vs. Mississippi State in 2014.
- Became the first UK quarterback to complete at least 74.3 percent of his passes (min. 30 attempts) in consecutive games since Dusty Bonner in 1999.
- Became the first UK quarterback with at least 26 completions in consecutive games since 2015 (Patrick Towles) and consecutive conference games since 2010 (Mike Hartline).

AT AUBURN

- Became the first UK freshman quarterback to win an SEC road game since Morgan Newton at Georgia in 2009.

VS. FLORIDA

- Completed 18-of-23 for 168 yards and two touchdowns
 - His completion percentage of 78.3 percent was the best for a UK quarterback vs. Florida since Bill Ransdell completed 86.9 percent against the Gators (20-of-23) in 1986.
- First UK QB to start in a win over Florida as a freshman since Terry Henry on Nov. 17, 1979.

VS. TENNESSEE TECH

- Completed 18-of-21 for 236 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions.
 - His completion percentage of 85.7 percent marked the best for a UK quarterback (min. 20 attempts) since Bill Ransdell completed 86.9 percent (20-of-23) vs. Florida on Nov. 15, 1986.
 - Had 36 non-sack rushing yards, including a 30-yard touchdown scramble in the first quarter.
 - He became the first Wildcat quarterback with a 45-yard passing touchdown and a 30-yard rushing TD in the same game since Pookie Jones vs. Kent State on Sept. 4, 1993.
 - The 30-yard TD run marked the longest for a UK quarterback since Terry Wilson had a 32-yard score vs. Vanderbilt on Nov. 14, 2020.
 - First UK quarterback with multiple games with a rushing and passing TD in the same game since Will Levis in 2022.
 - Completed his first eight passes of the game before an incompleteness in the second quarter.

RECONSTRUCTED OFFENSIVE LINE

- The reconstruction of the Big Blue Wall had a significant focus on size, depth - and maybe most important - experience during the offseason. UK now has a group that - prior to the season opener - featured the third-most collegiate starts in the nation and more than 200 career games played.
 - Included in that group is transfer lineman and 2025 Preseason Coaches All-Southeastern Conference Third Teamer Josh Braun has played 60 career games (10 at Kentucky, 26 at Florida and 24 at Arkansas) with 42 career starts (10 at Kentucky, eight at Florida and 24 at Arkansas).
 - Going into Week 13, Braun ranks 16th amongst FBS players in career games played.
- Kentucky has started the same lineup in all 10 games this season, including LT Shiyazh Pete, LG Josh Bruan, C Jager Burton, RG Jalen Farmer and RT Alex Wollschlaeger.
- Farmer was named SEC Co-Offensive Lineman of the Week for his performance in the win at

Auburn. Farmer graded at a team-high 81 percent. He played all 64 plays and did not miss a single assignment as UK controlled the ball for 31:46 time of possession against an Auburn defense that entered the game fifth nationally in rushing defense, 21st in scoring defense and 29th in total defense. he had no penalties, did not allow a sack or pressure and had seven blocks at the point of attack.

- FUN FACT: While offensive lines don't get much of the limelight, the Big Blue Wall is a fairly popular group, from Jager Burton spearheading a tornado relief drive that filled more than two semi-trucks full of goods for those affected this summer in Eastern Kentucky to Shiyazh Pete's unique perspective on his Navajo roots.

The representation of Native American players in college football is limited but growing, with five notable players proudly carrying their tribal heritage onto the national stage, including Kentucky's Shiyazh Pete. Here are the other Native American players and their tribes:

FUN FACT: During preseason media day, Pete referred to the offensive line, which consists of three new starters, as "Beasts of No Nation," a quote that resonated with fans across the Bluegrass state.

"BIG BACKS" LED THEIR TEAMS IN RUSHING LAST SEASON

- The running room features two veteran "big backs" plucked from the transfer portal in Seth McGowan (New Mexico State) and Dante Dowdell (Nebraska). It also includes a redshirt freshman Jason Patterson, who gained valuable experience through just four games in 2024. McGowan and Dowdell led their teams in rushing last season, while Patterson showed plenty of promise. McGowan led New Mexico State with 153 carries, 823 yards and three touchdowns rushing - also added three touchdowns receiving - though 12 games and 11 starts. Dowdell paced Nebraska in rushing with 143 carries, 614 rushing yards and 12 touchdowns through 12 games and seven starts. Patterson was limited to four games in order to retain his redshirt but showed plenty of ability by running for 111 yards and averaging 5.6 per carry.



2-3 PUNCH

- No. 2 Dante Dowdell and No. 3 Seth McGowan are the bell cows of the ground game.
- Going into Week 13, **McGowan** ranks third in the SEC and 13th in the nation in TDs rushing (12) and sixth in the SEC and 46th in the nation in rushing yards per game (77.0).
 - He became the first UK player with at least 75 yards rushing and a touchdown rushing in each of the first four games of the season since George Adams in 1984.
 - He became the first UK player with at least seven touchdowns rushing through four games since Benny Snell in 2018 (also seven).
 - He also became the first UK player with six touchdowns rushing in the first three games of the season since at least 1984.
 - He became the first UK player with two games of three TDs rushing in the same season (vs. Eastern Michigan, vs. Tennessee Tech) since Benny Snell in 2017.
 - His trio of TDs rushing against Tech were all in the first half, becoming the first UK player with three TDs rushing in the first half since Will Levis at Louisville in 2021.
- Dowdell** recently surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for his college career, including his time at Oregon and Nebraska, and now has 1,232 rushing yards as a collegian going into Week 13.
 - Dowdell is the first UK player to have two rushing touchdowns in a single season of 50 or more yards since Ray Davis in 2023 (75 and 55 yards) and the first with multiple 60+ yard rushing scores since Chris Rodriguez in 2020 (79 and 74 yards).
 - He shined in the season opener against Toledo on Aug. 30, recording 14 carries for a career-best 129 yards and a career-long, 79-yard touchdown, which, until Week 9, was the longest run by a SEC player this season. He added a 65-yard scoring run vs. Florida.
 - It was the most rushing yards for a UK player in the season opener since Stanley "Boom" Williams jetted for 135 yards against Louisiana Lafayette in 2015.
 - He had another century game against Florida on Nov. 8 when he ran for 104 yards on only seven carries, highlighted by a 65-yard touchdown jaunt.
 - FUN FACT:** In meetings with the television announcers prior to the season opener, linebacker Alex Afari Jr. was asked to talk about the UK transfer running backs. Afari quipped, "Dowdell runs like he's mad at the ground."

IN THE TRENCHES

- UK began the season with at least 170 yards rushing and two touchdowns rushing in each of the first three games, the first time that's happened since 2010.

TIGHT END TIME IN THE BLUEGRASS

- Kentucky has a couple of solid dudes at tight end in senior Josh Kattus and sophomore Willie Rodriguez, and while they're not new to the team, they add a fresh look to the team's offense in 2025.
 - Kattus and Rodriguez are fourth and third on the team in yards receiving, respectively.
 - Kattus and Rodriguez have each set new single-season highs in both receptions and yards.
- FUN FACT:** Kattus and Rodriguez are roommates with redshirt freshman quarterback Cutter Boley.

WIDE NET OF WIDE RECEIVERS

- The growth of the Kentucky passing game has been mirrored by the progress made the Wildcat wide receivers.
 - Eight different wideouts have caught passes over the last three weeks (at Auburn, vs. Florida, vs. Tennessee Tech).
 - Going into Week 13, Kendrick Law leads the group with 47 catches for 519 yards and three touchdowns. Twenty-three of his 47 catches have come in the last three games, including the game-winning touchdown at Auburn on Nov. 1 and a career-high 11 against Tennessee Tech on Nov. 15.
 - FUN FACT:** Law caught all 11 of his targets against Tech. He became the first UK player with 11 receptions in a game since Wan'Dale Robinson caught 13 against Tennessee on Nov. 6, 2021.

- Father, Mike, was a four-year letter winner as an offensive tackle for Army West Point's football team (1986-89), and mother, Karen, was a four-year starter for Army West Point's basketball team from 1985-89, playing 112 games ... She ranks fourth in school history in career rebounds (863) and career rebounding average (7.7)

DB • TY BRYANT

- Father, Cisco, played at Kentucky for Coach Jerry Claiborne from 1983-85 ... Cisco was a big-play performer at wide receiver, with 29 career catches for 482 yards (16.6 yards per catch) and six touchdowns

OL • JAGER BURTON

- Dad, Jeff, played football at Morehead State

QB • ZACH CALZADA

- Dad, Hector, was an All-American swimmer at Tulane
- Sister, Carolyn, played three seasons of soccer at Texas A&M and was a three-time All-SEC selection ... Currently a graduate transfer at Notre Dame
- Paternal grandparents are originally from Cuba

- J.J. Hester also has warmed to the task recently, as all five of his receptions this season -- including three touchdowns -- have come in the last four games.
- Hardley Gilmore IV, a transfer from Nebraska, is the team's second-leading receiver in receptions and yards with 21 catches for 232 yards.
 - **FUN FACT:** Gilmore did not actually play for Nebraska, he played for Kentucky last season. However, he did enter the transfer portal and signed with the Cornhuskers in the offseason, following former UK wide receivers coach Dakiel Shorts. He made his return back to the Bluegrass in April. In an interview with the Lexington Herald Leader, Hardley said, "I'm where I'm supposed to be.... I'm comfortable here.... It's just genuine love here....There isn't anybody like Coach Stoops to me."

NEW KIDS, BIG PLAYS

- Look out for a couple of freshmen who have come on midseason.
- **Cam Miller** played in his first game at No. 12/10 Georgia on Oct. 4, and while he only played the fourth quarter of that game, he finished with three catches – on three total targets – for 41 yards.
 - He earned his first start in the following game against No. 21/17 Texas on Oct. 18.
 - In his fourth game of the season at Auburn on Nov. 1, he made the play of the game. Following an Auburn interception late in the game, he caused a fumble during the return and Henry Boyer made the recovery.
- **DJ Miller** played in his first game against No. 21/17 Texas on Oct. 18 and caught two passes for 13 yards. He followed that up with a record night against No. 17/17 Tennessee on Oct. 25:
 - He had five catches on all five of his targets for a team-best and career-best 120 yards and two touchdowns.
 - He had a career-long, 56-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter, the first of his college career, followed by a 28-yarder in the third quarter.
 - He tied the school record – with seven others – for most touchdown pass receptions by a freshman in a game with two, becoming the first since Dane Key and Barion Brown both did so in 2022.
 - He also is just the seventh freshman in school history with a 100-yard receiving game and just the eighth such performance.

OBEY THE LAW

- Kendrick Law is separating himself game-by-game, more than doubling the amount of receptions of the next player with a team-high 47 catches for a team-high 519 yards and three touchdowns.
 - Going in to Week 13, he has had a TD reception in three of his last six games, including against Tennessee and at Auburn, marking the first time in his career with a TD reception in consecutive games.
- At No. 12/10 Georgia on Oct. 4, he led the team on a career-high-tying six passes for a then-career high 64 yards and a touchdown.
 - The five-yard TD reception marked his first score at Kentucky and the second score of his career.
 - He also had a season-long, 38-yard reception to set up UK for its first touchdown of the game, which also was one yard shy of his career long, a 39-yard reception against Auburn in 2022.
- Then, against No. 21/17 Texas on Oct. 18, on the first play of overtime, he had a 22-yard reception that was UK's longest gain of the game.
- In his next appearance against No. 17/17 Tennessee on Oct. 25, he had two catches for a career-high 103 yards and one touchdown.
 - Included was a career-long, 71-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter. It was the program's longest since Gavin Wimsatt's connection to Ja'Mori Maclin against Louisville in 2024 (83 yards).
- In Kentucky's 10-3 win at Auburn on Nov. 1, Law scored the game's only touchdown. From the Auburn 13-yard line, he caught a pass in the right flat, breaking two tackles and avoiding



two tacklers while serpentineing his way to the end zone.

- Then, on Kentucky's senior day against Tennessee Tech on Nov. 15, he had career highs with 11 receptions for 124 yards.
 - He became the first UK player with 11 receptions in a game since Wan'Dale Robinson caught 13 against Tennessee on Nov. 6, 2021.
 - **FUN FACT:** He also had a 40-yard kickoff return, Kentucky's longest of the season, and drew a personal foul penalty. The return and penalty set up UK's quick 45-yard TD drive at the end of the first half.

J-MAC IS BACK

- Ja'Mori Maclin, who prior to the season opener had 87 career receptions for 1,702 career yards and 17 career scores, recorded 13 catches for 313 yards and four scores last season at Kentucky. However, seven of his 13 catches came in the final four games, while three catches for 121 yards and two touchdowns came in the season finale against Louisville.
 - Not included in his four TDs, he also caught a two-point conversion pass following his own TD at Tennessee.
 - **FUN FACT:** Maclin desires to have an impact on younger players - both on and off the field. He has been using TikTok and YouTube to post free workouts / drills / technical tips, while also slipping in life wisdoms, too.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

FOUR YEARS OF CONTINUITY

- The Wildcats' defensive coaches have been together for at least four years:
 - Brad White (defensive coordinator) - Eighth season at UK
 - Chris Collins (co-defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach) - Fifth season
 - Frank Buffano (safeties coach) - Sixth season
 - Anwar Stewart (defensive line coach) - Sixth season
 - Mike Stoops (inside linebackers coach) - Fourth season

LIMITING THE LONGHORNS

- Kentucky's defense held No. 21/17 Texas to 179 total yards of offense on Oct. 18.
 - The last time UK held an SEC opponent to 179 yards or less was against Vanderbilt (139 yards) in 2014.
- Kentucky limited No. 21/17 Texas to eight first downs, the fewest against an SEC opponent since also holding Vanderbilt to eight in 2014.
- This was the fewest total yards allowed and fewest first downs allowed against a ranked opponent since the 1976 Peach Bowl against North Carolina (108 yards, five first downs).
- UK has allowed 16 points or less against an Associated Press ranked opponent in seven of the last eight seasons.

AUBURN ACCOLADES

- Kentucky's defense totaled 12 tackles for loss (-63 yards), including seven quarterback sacks (-49), adding one interception, four pass breakups and nine QB hurries in a triumph at Auburn on Nov. 1. The seven sacks were the most since logging eight against Clemson in the 2023 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl.
- The Wildcats defeated the Tigers, 10-3.
 - Those three points are the fewest the Tigers have scored in a home game in 13 years, since being shutout by Georgia in 2012.
 - It also is the fewest Kentucky ever allowed in a game at Auburn.
- UK's three points and 241 total yards allowed are the fewest against an SEC opponent since allowing three points and 218 total yards at Mississippi State in 2023.
- Kentucky made two fourth-down stops in the game, including the final play of the game.
 - UK now has 11 defensive turnovers on downs this season.

- UK entered the game tied for second in the SEC with nine fourth-down stops.

GATOR BITES

- Kentucky allowed Auburn three points and Florida seven points, marking the first time it has allowed seven points or less against a league opponent in consecutive weeks since Oct. 10 and 17, 2020, against Mississippi State and Tennessee.
 - It marked the first time UK gave up 247 yards or less to consecutive SEC opponents since 1999 at South Carolina and against LSU.
- The Kentucky-Florida matchup was the first time that UK gave up 247 yards or less to three SEC opponents in the same season since at least 1984.
 - The game marked the first time UK has allowed 16 points or less to three SEC opponents since 2020.
- The Week 11 game marked the fewest points allowed by Kentucky against Florida (7) since Nov. 15, 1986 (3).
 - UK also generated four turnovers, the first time doing so since getting four against South Carolina in 2020.
 - UK intercepted three passes, the first time since the Vanderbilt game in 2023.
 - In the second quarter, UK forced and recovered a fumble, its first defensive fumble recovery of the season.
 - UK made two fourth-down stops in the game. UK entered the game tied for second in the SEC with 11 fourth-down stops.

TECH-NICALLY SPEAKING

- Kentucky allowed 10 points and 264 yards total offense in the win over FCS No. 5-ranked Tennessee Tech.
 - Tech entered the game leading the FCS in scoring (45.2 points per game) and 13th in total offense (450.9 yards per game).
- It marked the third-straight game UK has allowed 10 points or less, first time that has been accomplished since 2018.
- It marked the third-straight game UK has allowed 143 or fewer passing yards for the first time since 2019.

GOOD TO SEE YOU BACK!

- **Tavion Gadson** was named one of 52 players considered for the 2025 Comeback Player of the Year Award Watch List, announced by the College Sports Communicators (CSC) in association with The Associated Press (AP) and the Fiesta Bowl Organization.
- Gadson, a sophomore, has been very patient since stepping foot in Lexington as a freshman two years ago. He played just four games as a freshman in 2023, with the goal to redshirt, then he suffered a knee injury in Spring 2024. It kept him out for majority of last season, playing limited snaps in just two games in 2024.
 - Gadson has set / tied his career high in total tackles three times this season, with four at South Carolina, at Georgia and against Texas. He also has had two sacks this season, including at Carolina and at Auburn.



MILESTONES BY THE WILDCATS

- **Coach Mark Stoops** has the most on-field victories (82) in Kentucky history, SEC victories (38), home victories (57) and victories against ranked opponents (14).
- Senior **WR Ja'Mori Maclin** has 1,786 receiving yards in his career ... Needs 214 to reach 2,000 for his collegiate career.
- Senior transfer **QB Zach Calzada** has thrown for 8,941 passing yards in his career. He needs 59 yards to reach 9,000 for his collegiate career.
- Senior transfer **RB Seth McGowan** has 1,886 career rushing yards. He needs 114 more to reach 2,000 for his collegiate career.
- Senior **LB Alex Afari Jr.** has 25.5 career tackles for loss. He needs 4.5 TFL to reach 30 and enter UK's career top 10 list.
- Senior **DB Jordan Lovett** has nine career interceptions. He needs one more to break into UK's top 10 list. With two INT this season he has become the first player in school history with two or more INT in four consecutive seasons.

BRAD'S BENCHMARKS

- Brad White is in his seventh season as the defensive coordinator, and his eighth season overall at Kentucky, since Mark Stoops plucked him from the NFL in 2018. He became defensive coordinator in 2019, and UK has steadily become more stout on that side of the ball.
 - Other programs have taken notice, too, as White has turned down other coaching opportunities in that time.
- Kentucky's defense has remained constant under White, and that is evident by the benchmarks he continues to reach year-in and year-out.
 - Kentucky has allowed seven points or fewer in consecutive league games with Auburn (3) and Florida (7) - totaling 10 points - for the first time since Oct. 10 and 17, 2020, against Mississippi State and Tennessee.
 - It marked the first time UK gave up 247 yards or less to consecutive SEC opponents since 1999 at South Carolina and against LSU.
 - The UK defense has held opponents to 30 points or fewer in 64-of-83 games - 77.1 percent - with White as the defensive coordinator (2019-present).
 - The UK defense has held opponents to 24 points or fewer in 34 of the last 50 games - 68.0 percent - since November 2021.
 - For the first time since 1983-89, UK has allowed 26 points or fewer per game in seven straight seasons (2018-24).
 - For the first time since 1946-54, UK has yielded fewer than 162 rushing yards per game for seven straight seasons (2018-24).

HOMETOWN KID

- Ty Bryant, junior safety from right here in Lexington, is tied as the league leader in interceptions per game with three going into Week 13.
 - He had two interceptions on back-to-back drives against Ole Miss on Sept. 6, each of which set up a Kentucky score.
 - He became the first Wildcat with two interceptions in an SEC home game since Anthony Wajda against LSU in 1999.
 - The performance against Ole Miss earned him honorable mention for the Thorpe Award National Defensive Back of the Week.
 - He added a third INT against Florida on Nov. 8.
- Bryant also has been an active tackler, as he leads the team in tackles in 56 going into Week 13.

TACKLE TERROR

- Going into Week 13, and despite missing the game against Tennessee Tech in Week 12, senior linebacker Alex Afari Jr. leads the team in tackles for loss with six. He has 50 total tackles, third on the team.
 - He has had a trio of 10-tackle games in his last 10 games, a stretch that dates back to the end of last season.
- Afari turned in a dominant performance in the recent win at Auburn on Nov. 1, tying career highs with 2.5 tackles for loss (-13), 1.5 quarterback sacks (-11), three QB hurries and a pass breakup. He totaled six tackles.
- Afari had nine straight games with a tackle for loss prior to Eastern Michigan on Sept. 13, which tied the second-longest streak in program history and one short of the school record.
- **FUN FACT:** A native of Italy, Afari's family moved to Ghana, then moved to the United States when he was eight-years-old. A friend asked him to play youth league football and he agreed - thinking he was going to play soccer. American football was initially a total mystery, but he stuck with the sport, and the rest is history.

STEVEN "SACK 'EM" SOLES JR.

- Steven Soles Jr., sophomore linebacker, leads the team with 3.5 sacks and also has three QB hurries and two pass breakups in 2025.
- In the season opener against Toledo on Aug. 30, Soles had a career-high two sacks (-20 yards), causing a fumble on both plays. He had another strong pass rush that drew a hands-to-the-face penalty, nullifying a completion for a first down and forcing a punt.
 - He is the first player to have two sacks in a game since Octavious Oxendine had two at Ole Miss on Sept. 28, 2024.
 - His two caused fumbles are tied for fourth in the SEC in that category.
- He collected his third sack of the season against No. 21/17 Texas on Oct. 18, followed by a half-sack at Auburn on Nov. 1.

YOU GOTTA LOVETT

- UK head coach Mark Stoops announced Monday, Nov. 10 that Jordan Lovett, senior defensive back, would be out for the season after suffering a leg injury against Florida on Nov. 8.
- He notched his first interception of the season at No. 12/10 Georgia on Oct. 4, returning the pick 20 yards, and his second interception of the season at Auburn on Nov. 1, which was a game-sealing pick on the final play of the game.
 - He concluded the season with nine interceptions on his career.
 - He became the first player in school history to have at least two interceptions in four consecutive seasons.
- The Wildcat only needed one more interception to reach UK's all-time top-10 list before his injury.

AN APPETITE FOR TURNOVERS

- Kentucky came up with four turnovers against Florida on Nov. 8, including three interceptions and a fumble recovery. The four TOs were the most since an equal number against South Carolina in 2020.
- Kentucky's defense intercepted the ball on the opponents' first possession in two games in 2025.
 - **FUN FACT:** In six of 10 games this season, UK has allowed fewer than 20 yards of offense on opponents' opening drives.
- The Wildcats have forced 14 turnovers on downs so this season, tied for second in the SEC.
- The Wildcats have forced a turnover in 16 of their last 19 games.

PICK SIX

- UK has had 11 interceptions returned for touchdowns since 2020, including two each in two different games.
- UK has had at least one interception returned for touchdown in each of the last five seasons (2020-24).



- It marked the first time UK has assembled five straight seasons with a pick six since 1968-72.
- An interception return for TD this season would give UK six straight seasons with a pick six, setting the school record for consecutive seasons.

STOPPING THE RUN

- Kentucky has held 14 of its last 36 opponents - 40 percent - to less than 100 yards rushing, dating back to the final game of 2022.
 - Against Toledo in Week 1, the Wildcats held the Rockets to 59 net rushing yards. The Wildcats have held their opponents to under 100 yards rushing in each of their last three straight season openers (2023-25).
 - Against No. 21/17 Texas in Week 8, the Wildcats held the Longhorns to 47 net rushing yards, a team that came into the game averaging 166.5 yards per game.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

AIDAN LAROS: BOOMING PUNTS AND "ZERO TOUGHNESS"?

- Aidan Laros (pronounced luh-ROSS), starting punter, was named to the 2025 Preseason Coaches All-Southeastern Conference Third Team after handling kickoffs and also was the primary punter in the last nine games last season.
- Going into Week 13, Laros, who is on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award, is ranked sixth in the league and 35th in the nation in punting with a 44.3 yard average.
 - In a recent appearance at No. 12/10 Georgia on Oct. 4, he punted five times for a 47.0-yard average. He had a long of 55 yards, two punts of 50+ yards and two inside the 20-yard line.
 - Also in a recent appearance at Auburn on Nov. 1, he played a dominant role in the field position battle. He punted six times for a 44.8-yard average, with all six punts finishing inside the Auburn 20-yard line. The Tigers had an average starting field position at their own 10-yard line. He also had a season-long, 57-yard punt. He also kicked off three times, with Auburn's average starting field position being its own 16-yard line.
 - Laros' performance prompted Eric Crawford of WDRB TV to write, "Aidan Laros didn't so much punt the ball as deliver precision-guided gut-punches – six times planting the Tigers inside their own 20, an average starting position somewhere between 'hopeless' and 'the abyss.'"
- He's become known for his "zero toughness" rating on EA Sports' College Football 26, which he humbly and comically calls an obvious mistake. He's undoubtedly the first rugby player in history to have a zero toughness rating (see below).
 - **FUN FACT:** Aidan played rugby growing up in South Africa. Also, his father, Adrian, played 14 seasons of Division I rugby in South Africa and three seasons of professional rugby in France.

 - Mark Stoops has said he would be willing to try Kauwe from as long as 60 yards.

GENERAL NOTES

ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Josh Kattus, a senior tight end, was one of 11 members named to the 2025 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team, it was announced Sept. 16, which makes him an eligible semifinalist for the 2025 Allstate Wuerffel Trophy.
 - Kattus is the second straight Wildcat to be named to the prestigious team and the eighth under Stoops.
- Earlier this season, Kattus spearheaded a shoe drive that benefited Camp Horsin' Around, a local nonprofit that enriches the lives of children whose health is compromised or who have special needs by collaborating with organized groups to provide an outdoor camp adventure.
- For the past two years, he has volunteered to participate in the "Dancing with the Lexington Stars" event. In 2024, he helped raise more than \$34K for the Lexington Rotary Club Endowment Fund and Surgery on Sunday. In 2025, he helped raise close to \$11K for Baby Health Services and the Rotary Club of Lexington's scholarship and service initiatives.
- He also is a weekly volunteer at the Kentucky Children's Hospital, specifically at the DanceBlue Kentucky Children's Hospital Hematology Oncology Clinic, where he visits with sick children, plays games or just hangs out.

NONCONFERENCE COMPETITION

- The Wildcats have won 22 of their last 23 nonconference games in the **regular season**.
 - Kentucky had won 19 straight nonconference games in the **regular season**, a stretch that was second in the nation behind Georgia, before falling to Louisville on Nov. 30, 2024.



- Kentucky has won 25 of its last 28 nonconference games.
 - That stretch featured 16 straight nonconference wins, which was the longest active streak in FBS at the time, including four straight bowl wins. The streak began in the season opener on Sept. 1, 2018 and ended in the Music City Bowl game on Dec. 31, 2022.

HOME SWEET HOME

- In 2025, UK is in its 53rd season playing at Kroger Field, which was formerly named Commonwealth Stadium (1973-2016).
 - The Cats are 187-151-4 (.553) all-time in the stadium, including 51-36 (.586) under Mark Stoops. (Those marks do not include five home wins vacated by the NCAA in 2021).

SUPER SENIORS

Kentucky has six “Super Seniors” who return for their final year of eligibility in 2025.

- WR J.J. Hester - Transferred to Kentucky in 2025 after three seasons at Oklahoma (2022-24) and two at Missouri (2020-2021).
- K Zach Schreiner - Received an extra year of eligibility after playing two seasons at Sacramento State and two seasons at American River College.
- OL Alex Wollschlaeger - Transferred to Kentucky in 2025 after five seasons at Bowling Green State (2020-24).

COACHING CHANGES

- Kentucky welcomes a pair of new coaches to its on-field coaching staff, including La'Damian Washington (wide receivers) and Derek Shay (tight ends).
- Washington, a former National Football League and Canadian Football League receiver, opens his first season in Lexington with a strong resume that includes both playing and coaching in the Southeastern Conference.
 - Washington starred at Missouri from 2009-2013, helping lead the Tigers to four bowl games. He returned for one year as the school's Director of Player Development in 2020. He then spent time at Southern University and Oklahoma as a wide receivers coach before moving to South Florida the past two seasons, which both ended in bowl appearances.
- Shay played at both Western and Eastern Illinois before beginning his coaching career as a student assistant in 2011.
 - One of Shay's early stops included prep powerhouse IMG Academy, where he was the Co-Offensive Coordinator and Offensive Line Coach. He guided six All-American linemen while there and 10 who signed Division I.
 - Shay's collegiate coaching experience includes stops at McNeese State, LSU, Missouri and Marshall before spending the 2024 season as a senior offensive analyst and run game specialist at Kentucky.

WILDCATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

- Two players were drafted in 2025, giving head coach Mark Stoops a total of 30 drafted players since his arrival in 2013.
 - Twenty-six of those 30 selections have come in the last seven drafts (2019-25).



- Eighteen of those 30 selections were defensive players.
- 26 of the 28 players in previous drafts (not including 2025) have played at least one season in the league
- The 2025 NFL Draft marked the seventh straight year UK had at least one player drafted in the first three rounds.
- UK has had at least two players drafted in seven consecutive drafts, the first time that has happened since the 1984-91 drafts.
- With DB Maxwell Hairston being selected 30th overall by the Buffalo Bills, UK has had four first-round draft choices under Stoops. They include Alvin “Bud” Dupree (2015), Josh Hines-Allen (2019), Jamin Davis (2021) and Hairston.

DID YOU KNOW?

- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager Tom Kalinowski enters his 48th season in that role in 2025. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, now marking his 52nd year working with UK football in 2024.
 - He has worked more than 500 consecutive games. In honor of his 50th season in 2023, Kalinowski was named an honorary captain for the home finale against Alabama.
- UK is one of only 11 schools that have won an NCAA men’s basketball championship, while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only eight universities in the United States with the full complement of liberal arts, engineering, professional, agricultural and medical colleges and disciplines on one contiguous campus.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.

JACOB TAMME NAMED SEC LEGEND

- Former University of Kentucky football tight end Jacob Tamme has been named to the 2025 Southeastern Conference Football Legends class presented by T-Mobile.
- Tamme was a standout tight end at the University of Kentucky, earning All-America as a senior and All-SEC as a junior and senior. He finished his college career with 133 receptions, 1,417 yards, and 11 touchdowns—ranking first in UK history and second in SEC history for catches by a tight end. Tamme helped lead Kentucky to wins over Clemson, Florida State, and No. 1 LSU. He was recognized for his leadership with the Bobby Bowden Award and named UK’s Most Inspirational Player. A top student, he was an Academic All-American and SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Tamme played nine NFL seasons (2008–2016), appearing in the Super Bowl with the Colts, Broncos, and Falcons. Off the field, he co-founded the “Swings for Soldiers Classic,” supporting injured veterans, runs Tamme Valley Farm, and works in wealth management. He also serves on the Board of Governors for Champions Blue, the new management model for UK Athletics.
- The class will be honored at the 2025 SEC Football “Weekend of Champions” December 5-6 in Atlanta, highlighted by the annual SEC Legends Celebration presented by T-Mobile on Friday, December 5 at the College Football Hall of Fame. The group will also be recognized prior to the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be held at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Saturday, December 6.

KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 338 games within the friendly confines of newly named Kroger Field. **UK has a 187-151-4 record (.547), 51-36 (.586) under Mark Stoops.**
- 2024 marks the 52nd season at the facility.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 60,261 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 17 of the last 19 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years. *Note: Kroger Field capacity was limited to 12,000 fans per game in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions
- The stadium footprint is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-- begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-of-the-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as home-team facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

NEW LIGHTING, RIBBON BOARDS

In 2024, Kroger Field featured brand new lighting and ribbon boards. The LED lighting system will include the ability to do light shows during timeouts and breaks in play similar to those at games in Rupp Arena and Kentucky Proud Park. The new ribbon boards have greater functionality, featuring sharper visual resolution than the previous set and expanded capability for display of video and graphics.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Seating Capacity: 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites

Playing Field: UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Ole Miss, Mississippi State and Missouri. The end zones and team sideline areas feature a checkerboard pattern in alternating shades of blue. It was designed to mimic the pattern of Secretariat's silks, which has been part of the football uniforms for five seasons. The school's

new interlocking "UK" logo is positioned in the center of the field.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage.

Sound System: Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. Therefore, the Cat Walk was moved to Talbott Todd Way. The Cat Walk typically begins outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, and the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House. It was dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65) who passed away from ALS in August of 2017 and was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team walks to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

Individually, Stoops' players have won All-America accolades, along with honors such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Jason Witten Man of the Year, Pop Warner Award, Freddie Solomon Spirit Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

Kentucky's football team has fared well academically under Stoops, as each year UK's football score in the NCAA Academic Progress Rate has been well above the benchmark of 930.

Off the field, Stoops is a staunch supporter of the Kentucky Children's Hospital, helping raise more than \$500,000 annually for the kids. He was named the Honorary Coach of the 2022 AFCA Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last nine seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, inheriting a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final USA Today coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

Stoops followed with the Covid-shortened 2020 season that was capped by a Gator Bowl win over No. 23 North Carolina State.

More winning seasons and bowl appearances have followed, giving Stoops the school records in both categories, and prompting ESPN analyst Tom Luginbill to call Stoops "the best program builder in all of college football."

The longest-termed coach in Kentucky history and having the longest term of any current coach in the Southeastern Conference, Mark Stoops looks to add to his legacy of success entering his 13th season with the Wildcats in 2025.

Stoops holds school records for wins (72), home wins (51), SEC wins (33) and wins over ranked opponents (12). Last season's victory at No. 6 Ole Miss was fifth straight season that his Wildcats had knocked off a ranked opponent, yet another school record.

In addition to the records listed above, a partial accounting of Stoops' exploits features:

- **Seven bowl appearances**
- **A school-record, 16-game win streak against nonconference competition (2018-22), which was the nation's longest active streak at the time.**
- **First top-10 ranking in each the Associated Press poll and the coaches' poll since 2007 (Sept. 11, 2022)**
- **First consecutive top-10 rankings in each poll since 1977 (Sept. 18, 2022)**
- **First home win over Florida since 1986, also marking the first win over an Associated Press top 10-ranked opponent since 2010 (2021)**



How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there’s been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops’ teams is a reflection of the coach’s rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation’s best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation’s top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13.

Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year. The Seminoles’ prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops’ defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense

(275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops’ arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops’ three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark’s time there, Arizona’s records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and

107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation’s top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State. Mark and Mike have reunited in Lexington, as Mike joined the UK staff in 2022 as inside linebackers coach.

Prior to Arizona, Mark Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops’ 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft – seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the ‘97

STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

Now in his 13th season at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky’s 13 classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK’s recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.

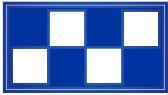

Dante Dowdell rushed for 129 yards and a touchdown as Kentucky topped Toledo 24-16 at Kroger Field in the season opener.

Kentucky got 78 rushing yards from Seth McGowan. The Cats rushed for 252 total yards in the game.

Quarterback Zach Calzada and the UK passing game had their moments in the game. Calzada connected on 10 of 23 through the air for 85 yards. Josh Kattus caught a career-high three passes for 43 yards for the Cats.

The UK defense held Toledo in check for most of the afternoon.

The Cats held the Rockets to just 59 yards on the ground. Senior linebacker Alex Afari led the defense with a career-high 13 tackles, including a sack and two tackles for loss. Davern Rayner and Ty Bryant each had six tackles for UK, while sophomore linebacker Steven Soles had two sacks for the Cats.

Kentucky received the opening kickoff and the Cats were able to make a first down when Calzada connected with Ja'Mori Maclin for an 11-yard gain. UK appeared to have another first down but Calzada's pass to JJ Hester was ruled incomplete after video review and the Cats were forced to punt.

Toledo took over at its own 10 yard line and on the second play of the possession, JQ Hardaway intercepted a Tucker Gleason pass and the Cats took over at the Toledo 29.

UK would turn to the ground game on the ensuing drive, which ended with a one-yard touchdown rush by Calzada. Jacob Kauwe added the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 6:27 remaining in the first quarter.

The UK defense held Toledo in check again on the next drive and the Rockets were forced to punt. Kentucky took over at its own 43 yard line with 4:02 left in the first period.

Kentucky would give the ball back on the third play of the next possession when Calzada was intercepted by Toledo's Nasir Bowles at the Toledo 46 yard line. The Rockets would drive deep into UK territory as the first quarter ended with the Cats leading 7-0.

The Rockets would get inside the UK five yard line, but on fourth and two, Afari stopped Gleason short of a first down and the Cats took over at their own three with 13:13 left in the half.

On the first play of the ensuing drive, Calzada was sacked in the end zone for a safety, making the score 7-2.

After the UK free kick, Toledo took over at its own 23 yard line. However, the Rockets were unable to do anything with the possession and were forced to punt. Kentucky took over at its own 47 with 11:25 left in the half.

On the second play of the next drive, Calzada hit tight end Willie Rodriguez for a big gain, but Rodriguez fumbled and Toledo recovered at its own 27. The Rockets would make one first down but the UK defense stopped Toledo on fourth and one near midfield and the Cats took over with 7:28 left in the half.

Kentucky got into Toledo territory but the drive stalled and the Cats settled for a 45-yard field goal from Kauwe, taking a 10-2 lead with 2:04 left in the half.

The Rockets made one first down before punting the ball back to the Cats with 1:07 left in the half. UK punted it back to Toledo and after one play, the half expired with Kentucky leading 10-2.

Toledo got the ball at the beginning of the third quarter, but the UK defense forced a three-and-out and the Rockets punted. Kentucky took over at its own 12 yard line.

Kentucky moved the ball into Toledo territory when Calzada connected with Kattus for 18 yards. However, the drive stalled and the Cats were forced to punt. Toledo took over at its own seven with 10:03 left in the third quarter.

After getting one first down, Toledo punted again and UK took over at its own 38 yard line with 8:21 left in the third quarter. The teams would then exchange punts before Kentucky was able to move the ball near the end of the quarter. Calzada and Kattus connected again, this time for 12 yards, followed by a 16-yard rush from Dante Dowdell got the Cats to the Toledo 35. UK was threatening as the quarter ended with the Cats leading 10-2.

On the sixth play of the fourth quarter, UK's Seth McGowan rushed for a six-yard touchdown to cap a 12-play, 76-yard drive. Kauwe added the extra point and UK led 17-2 with 12:30 left in the game.

Toledo answered with its first scoring drive of the game. The Rockets went 69 yards in seven plays, capped by a nine-yard touchdown run from Gleason. Dylan Cunanan added the point after and UK's lead was cut to 17-9 with 9:38 to play.

On the first play of the next drive, Dowdell broke loose on the right and scampered 79 yards for a touchdown. Kauwe added the PAT and Kentucky led 24-9 with 9:22 remaining.

Toledo was able to add a late touchdown, but Kentucky recovered an onside kick and ran out the clock to preserve the victory.

Seth McGowan rushed 15 times for 93 yards and two touchdowns, but Kentucky fell to No. 20/14 Ole Miss 30-23 at Kroger Field.

Zach Calzada was 15 of 30 through the air for 149 yards before leaving the game with an injury in the fourth quarter. Kendrick Law caught six passes for 44 yards, while Ja'Mori Maclin caught two passes for 56 yards.

Linebacker Alex Afari and safety Ty Bryant each had 10 tackles to lead Kentucky. Bryant added two interceptions in the game.

Ole Miss had the first possession of the game and, after making one first down, the Rebels were forced to punt. Kentucky took over at its own 35 yard line.

The Cats were unable to do anything with the possession and punted it back to the Rebels. Ole Miss took over at its own 36 with 11:26 still remaining in the first quarter.

Ole Miss was able to gain some traction on its next drive. The Rebels drove into UK territory but the drive stalled and a 51-yard field goal attempt by Lucas Carnerio hit the left upright and landed in the end zone, and the game remained scoreless.

Kentucky went three-and-out and punted it back to Ole Miss, which started its drive from its own 18 yards line. The Rebels would get one first down, but, on the fourth play of the drive, Bryant intercepted an Austin Simmons pass and returned it to the Ole Miss 31 yard line.

The Cats would get a pair of first downs and would get inside the Ole Miss 10 yard line. On second and goal, UK running back McGowan rushed up the middle for a nine-yard touchdown, giving the Cats the first points of the game. Jacob Kauwe added the PAT and UK led 7-0 with 1:55 left in the first quarter.

On the ensuing possession, Bryant again intercepted Simmons and returned it to the Ole Miss 32. On the first play of the drive, the Rebels were flagged for a facemask and the Cats were in the red zone. The first quarter would end with UK leading 7-0.

The UK drive would stall and Kauwe would make a 33-yard field goal to give Kentucky a 10-0 lead with 14:17 left in the first half.

Ole Miss would respond on its next drive. The Rebels covered 75 yards in just six plays, culminating with a one-yard touchdown run from Kewan Lacy. Carnerio added the point after and UK's lead was cut to 10-7 with 12:25 left in the half.

After a Kentucky three-and-out, Ole Miss took over at its own 30 yard line and the Rebels marched down the field to take their first lead of the game. The eight-play, 70-yard drive ended with a Damien Taylor one-yard touchdown run. Carnerio added the PAT and Ole Miss led 14-10 with 8:24 left in the half.

Kentucky would respond on the ensuing drive. The Cats drove into the red zone but the drive stalled. Kauwe would convert a 31-yard field goal and Ole Miss led 14-13 with 4:31 left in the half.

The Rebels would add a field goal and took a 17-13 lead into the half.

The first three drives of the third quarter ended in punts. Ole Miss broke that streak on the fourth drive of the half, their second, when Carnerio made a 28-yard field goal to give the Rebels a 20-13 lead with 8:48 to play in the third quarter.

Kentucky responded with a drive that tied the game. The Cats drove 75 yards in just six plays, with a Calzada completion to Ja'Mori Maclin covering 44 of those yards. McGowan would score on a nine-yard touchdown run around the left end. Kauwe added the PAT and the game was tied 20-20 with 5:38 left in the third quarter.

Ole Miss answered right back with a scoring drive. The Rebels went 75 yards in eight plays, culminating with a seven-yard touchdown run by Simmons. Carnerio added the extra points and Ole Miss led 27-20 with 2:20 left in the third quarter.

The Cats would punt on their next possession and Ole Miss took over at its own 18 near the end of the third quarter, which would end with the Rebels leading 27-20.

Early in the fourth quarter, Ole Miss was forced to punt and UK took over at its own 36 with 14:13 left in the game.

Kentucky would drive into the red zone on the next drive, but the Cats came up empty and Ole Miss took over, but the Rebels were forced to punt.

Seth McGowan carried 18 times for 104 yards and three touchdowns as Kentucky cruised past Eastern Michigan 48-23 at Kroger Field.

Jason Patterson had 13 carries for 80 yards and a touchdown. As a team, UK ran for 252 yards.

Redshirt freshman Cutter Boley got the start at quarterback and he made the most of his opportunity. Boley connected on 12 of 21 through the air for 240 yards and two touchdowns. The completions and yards were both career highs and the touchdown passes tied the two that

Boley threw against Murray State last season.

Josh Kattus led UK with three receptions and 61 yards receiving. Kattus was on the other end of one of Boley's touchdown passes.

Jordan Lovett led Kentucky with eight tackles, while JQ Hardaway had six.

Eastern Michigan got the game's first possession, but Noah Kim's pass was intercepted by Daveren Rayner, who returned it to the EMU 10 yard line. Two plays later, McGowan scored on a four-yard touchdown run. Jacob Kauwe added the point after and UK led 7-0.

EMU would have more success on its next drive. The Eagles drove into UK territory but on fourth and two from the 22, the UK defense stopped Tavierre Dunlap short of the line to get, and the Cats took over at their own 21 with 10:41 still to play in the first quarter.

Kentucky (2-1) would get a first down via run before moving into EMU territory on a 23-yard pass play from Boley to tight end Kattus. Later in the drive, Boley hit tight end Willie Rodriguez for a 25-yard gain, getting the Cats to the EMU 24. After a personal foul penalty on the Eagles, McGowan scored his second touchdown of the game, this time on a 12-yard run, to extend the lead. Kauwe added the PAT and UK led 14-0 with 5:32 left in the first period.

On the next drive, the Eagles again drove into UK territory, and this time, their drive ended with points. A 38-yard field goal by Rudy Kessinger cut the UK lead to 14-3 with 2:20 left in the first.

Kentucky would punt on its next possession and EMU took over with 32 seconds remaining in the period, which would end with UK leading 14-3.

Eastern Michigan would punt early in the second quarter and a 25-yard punt return by Ty Bryant got the Cats to their own 46 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, Kendrick Law rushed for 16 yards, getting the Cats into EMU territory. Two plays later, Boley connected with Hardley Gilmore for a 32-yard completion, getting UK to the EMU three yard line. Two plays later, Boley found Rodriguez for a three-yard touchdown. Kauwe made the point after and UK led 21-3 with 10:18 remaining in the half.

The Eagles would respond with another scoring drive. EMU used 10 plays to cover 56 yards, ending with a 37-yard field goal from Kessinger, which cut the UK lead to 21-6 with 5:19 left in the first half.

On the first play of the ensuing drive, Boley connected with Kattus for a 34-yard completion, getting the Cats to the EMU 41. McGowan then rushed for 17 and four yards and, two plays later, Boley found Kattus wide open for a four-yard touchdown. Kauwe added another point after and Kentucky led 28-6 with 1:55 left in the half.

EMU would answer by scoring its first touchdown of the game. Kim found Terry Lockett streaking down the right sideline in what resulted in a 64-yard touchdown. Kessinger added the PAT and the UK lead was cut to 28-13 with 1:36 left in the half.

Kentucky would be forced to punt and EMU got the ball back late in the half. The Eagles drove into UK territory and Kessinger converted a 50-yard field goal with three seconds left in the half, cutting the UK lead to 28-16. That would be the halftime score.

The Cats had the first possession of the third quarter. UK would make one first down but would punt and EMU took over at its own 20 with 12:40 to play in the third quarter. UK would return the favor, forcing Eastern Michigan to punt. The Cats took over at their own 37 with 10:51 left in the third quarter.

Kentucky used the ground game to get into EMU territory but the drive stalled and UK settled for a 51-yard field goal from Kauwe, extending the lead to 31-16 with 8:13 left in the third quarter.

The UK defense stopped Eastern Michigan on its next possession and the Eagles lined up to punt. However, it was a fake and the UK special teams were ready, stopping EMU short of the line to gain. UK took over at the EMU 27. On the fourth play

of the ensuing drive, McGowan scored again, this time on an eight-yard rush. Kauwe added the PAT and UK extended its lead to 38-16 with 5:15 left in the period.

EMU would make a pair of first downs on its next drive, but the UK defense came up with a stop on a fourth-and-four play and the Cats took over at their own 43.

On the first play of the next drive, Boley found Ja'Mori Maclin for a 36 yard completion. The quarter would end with Kentucky on the doorstep of adding to its lead, which stood at 38-16 through three quarters.

Early in the fourth quarter, the UK drive stalled inside the EMU five yard line. Kentucky settled for a 24-yard Kauwe field goal, which extended the lead to 41-16 with 13:16 remaining.

Kentucky added another touchdown in the first quarter, when Jason Patterson scored on a six-yard run, marking his first career touchdown. Kauwe added another point after and UK led 48-16 with 4:46 to play.

Eastern Michigan added a touchdown late to provide the final margin.

Seth McGowan rushed for 112 yards and a touchdown, but Kentucky lost at South Carolina 35-13.

Cutter Boley, making his first start against a Southeastern Conference opponent, was 10 of 19 through the air for 124 yards. Kendrick Law caught five passes for 41 yards.

Daveren Rayner led the Cats with seven tackles, while Jordan Lovett had six.

Kentucky got the game's first possession and on the second play from scrimmage, a Boley pass to Kendrick Law produced an 11-yard gain and a first down. Two plays later, McGowan went around left end for 17 yards and another first down. The Cats would get another first down and would get into the red zone. On the next play, McGowan rushed up the middle and shook loose for a 20-yard touchdown, his seventh of the season. Jacob Kauwe added the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 11:27 left in the first quarter.

South Carolina would respond with a scoring drive of its own. The Gamecocks went 75 yards in 12 plays and scored on a 12-yard Rahsul Faison touchdown rush. William Joyce added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 5:48 remaining in the first quarter.

Kentucky's next possession appeared to be going nowhere until Boley hit tight end Willie Rodriguez down the right sideline for a 54-yard gain, getting UK to the South Carolina 23. The Cats would get inside the 10 yard line, but the drive stalled and Kentucky settled for a 27-yard Kauwe field goal, taking a 10-7 lead with 58 seconds left in the quarter.

Early in the second quarter, the Gamecocks were forced to punt. A 16-yard punt gave the Cats good field position as they took over at their own 38.

The Cats crossed midfield but on a third down play, Boley was sacked by Dylan Stewart and the ball came loose. South Carolina's Jatus Geer scooped it up and scampered 40 yards for a touchdown. Joyce added the PAT and South Carolina grabbed a 14-10 lead with 11:28 left in the half.

On the second play of UK's next possession, Boley was intercepted by South Carolina's Gerald Kilgore, who returned it 45 yards for a touchdown. Joyce made another point after and the Gamecocks led 21-10 with 10:43 remaining in the half.

Kentucky started its next drive on its own 46 yard line after a penalty on the kickoff return. UK crossed midfield again, but on fourth and three, Boley's pass intended for Fred Farrier was out of bounds and the Cats turned it over on downs.

South Carolina would drive into UK territory on its next drive, but a big third-down sack by Mi'Quise Humphrey-Grace forced the Gamecocks into a punting situation. The punt was a good one and the Cats took over at their own five yard line with 4:55 remaining in the half.

The Cats would make one first down on the ensuing drive but on third and 13, Boley was intercepted by South Carolina's Brandon Cisse and the Gamecocks took over at the UK 43 with 2:05 to play in the half.

South Carolina would cover the 43 yards in five plays, ending with a Faison six-yard touchdown run and a Joyce PAT that made it 28-10 Gamecocks with 1:07 left in the half. That would be the halftime score.

The Gamecocks got the first possession of the third quarter. They would get one first down but would punt the ball away and Kentucky took over at its own 20.

Kentucky would get three first downs on its next possession, eventually getting across midfield. However, the Cats would punt and the Gamecocks took over at their own 20 with 8:12 remaining in the third quarter.

The Gamecocks made one first down on their next drive but the UK defense appeared to stop South Carolina. On fourth and 12, the Gamecocks faked a punt and appeared to make a first down. However, after review, the call was overturned and the Cats took over at the South Carolina 39 yard line.

Kentucky was able to turn the good field position into points. After making one first down, the drive stalled, but Kauwe nailed a 42-yard field goal to cut the deficit to 28-13 with 34 seconds left in the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter, South Carolina went on an eight-play, 84-yard drive, ending with a one-yard touchdown run by Matt Fuller. Joyce added the PAT and the Gamecocks took a 35-13 lead with 12:14 to play.

Quarterback Cutter Boley was 25 of 41 through the air for 207 yards and two touchdowns, but Kentucky lost at No. 12 Georgia 35-14 in Athens.

Kendrick Law caught six passes for 64 yards and a touchdown, while freshman Cam Miller caught three balls for 41 yards.

Kentucky (2-3, 0-3 Southeastern Conference) got 11 tackles from JQ Hardaway and seven from Ty Bryant.

Georgia (4-1, 2-1) got the game's first possession and the Bulldogs made the most of it. Georgia went 75 yards in 12 plays, ending with a Gunner Stockton touchdown rush from seven yards out. Peyton Woodring added the extra point and the Bulldogs led 7-0 with 8:51 left in the first quarter.

Kentucky was able to get a first down on its first possession on a pair of rushes by McGowan. However, the Cats were forced to punt and Aidan Laros boomed one 55 yards, pinning the Bulldogs inside their own five.

The Bulldogs started on their own four yard line, but they were able to get out of trouble quickly. In fact, Georgia would march 96 yards in 13 plays, ending with a six-yard touchdown run by Stockton. Woodring made the PAT and Georgia led 14-0 near the end of the first quarter.

The Cats got a big play when Boley hit Kendrick Law for a 38-yard gain, getting UK into Georgia territory. On the second play of the second quarter, Boley hit Josh Kattus over the middle and the tight end took it to the house for a 29-yard touchdown. Jacob Kauwe added the point after and UK cut the Georgia lead to 14-7 with 14:21 left in the half.

Georgia was moving the ball on its next drive before Jordan Lovett intercepted Stockton and returned it to the UK 28 yard line. However, the Cats were unable to do anything with the possession and would punt. Georgia took over at its own 19 with 11:09 left in the half.

The Bulldogs would be unable to do anything with the ensuing possession and punted it away, pinning Kentucky at its own one yard line. UK would punt the ball back and Georgia took over at the UK 40.

Georgia would take advantage of the good field position. The Bulldogs covered the 40 yards in six plays, ending with a three-yard touchdown run by Dillon Bell. Woodring added the PAT and Georgia led 21-7 with 2:45 left in the half.

Kentucky drove down the field, getting into the red zone just before the end of the half. Kauwe came on for a field goal, but it missed wide left and the half ended with Georgia leading 21-7.

In the third quarter, Kentucky got the ball first. On the fourth play of the drive, McGowan fumbled and Georgia recovered, taking over in UK territory. The Bulldogs took advantage again, covering 38 yards in five plays, ending with a three-yard touchdown run by Bell. Woodring made the PAT and Georgia led 28-7. The Bulldogs added another score and led 35-7 after three quarters.

In the fourth quarter, the Bulldogs appeared to be ready to add to the lead. But on a fourth down play inside the red zone, the UK defense stopped Georgia and took over on downs.

The Cats took that possession and compiled a 20-play, 79-yard drive. However, the drive ended with an interception on fourth down, and the Cats came away with no points.

After UK's Grant Grayton intercepted a pass, the Cats were able to mount a scoring drive. Boley found Law for a five-yard touchdown pass. The Kauwe extra point made it 35-14, which would be the final score.

Cutter Boley connected on 31 of 38 through the air for 258 yards and also rushed for 45 yards and a touchdown, but Kentucky fell to No. 21 Texas 16-13, in overtime, at Kroger Field.

Kentucky (2-4, 0-4 Southeastern Conference) dominated the game statistically. UK had 395 yards of total offense to just 179 for Texas. UK rushed for 137 compared to just 47 for the Longhorns.

Texas (5-2, 2-1) got a pair of punt returns that led to very good field position and, on both occasions, the 'Horns

took advantage.

Kentucky got the game's first possession and the Cats were able to move the ball on the stout Texas defense. Boley completed four of his first five passes as UK marched into UT territory. The Cats got into the red zone but on a fourth-and-one from the Texas 16 yard line, Dante Dowdell was stopped short of the line to gain and the Longhorns took over with 9:21 left in the first quarter.

Texas would get one first down on its first possession, but the Longhorns punted the ball back to the Cats, who took over at their own 32 yard line with 7:10 left in the period. However, Kentucky went three-and-out and punted it back to Texas, which took over at its own 13 with 6:13 remaining in the quarter.

The Longhorns made a pair of first downs on their next drive, but were unable to cross midfield before having to punt it back to the Cats, who took over at their own 19 yard line with 3:45 to play in the quarter. The game would be scoreless after one period.

As the second quarter got underway, the Cats were able to cross midfield but would be forced to punt again. Texas would take over at its own 20 with 12:39 left in the half.

Texas would drive into UK territory on its next possession, but again the Longhorns would be forced to punt. Kentucky took over on its own nine yard line with 9:04 left in the half.

The Cats went three-and-out and punted it back to Texas. The Longhorns got a 45-yard punt return from Ryan Niblett at UT took over at the UK five yard line. Three plays later, Texas got on the board when Quentrevion Wisner fumbled into the end zone and the ball was recovered by UT's DJ Campbell. Mason Shipley added the point after and the Longhorns led 7-0 with 6:22 left in the half.

Kentucky would make a pair of first downs on its next drive before a Boley pass was intercepted by Texas' Trey Moore at the UK 49. The Longhorns were unable to turn the good field position into points, and punted it back to the Cats, who took over at their own 10 yard line with 1:07 left in the half.

The Cats attempted to make the most of the final possession of the half. Boley connected on three passes in a row to get Kentucky across midfield with 23 seconds left in the half. With 13 seconds to play, Jacob Kauwe attempted a 53-yard field goal, but it missed left. Texas would take a knee and would take a 7-0 lead into the half.

Texas took the ball to start the second half but the UK defense forced a three-and-out and a subsequent punt. The Cats took over at their own 19 yard line.

Kentucky put together a solid drive, using both the air and ground attack to cover 53 yards in 15 plays. Kauwe converted a 46-yard field goal to cut the Texas lead to 7-3 with 4:09 left in the third quarter.

Texas would respond with a scoring drive of its own. The Longhorns went 40 yards in six plays, ending with a 53-yard field goal by Shipley, making it 10-3 Texas with 2:05 left in the half.

Kentucky went three-and-out and punted it back to Texas with just 32 seconds left in the third quarter. The Longhorns would lead 10-3 after three periods.

The first play of the fourth quarter was a Texas punt that UK's Ty Bryant returned to the UK 44 yard line. The Cats would respond with a Boley pass to Josh Kattus for 11 yards and an 11-yard rush from Jason Patterson. A pass interference penalty got UK into the red zone and then Boley scrambled for a 16-yard touchdown. Kauwe added the PAT and the game was tied 10-10 with 12:04 left in the game.

The UK defense forced another three-and-out on the next Texas possession. The Longhorns punted and UK took over at its own 14 with 10:47 to play. Kentucky would make one first down before punting it back to Texas, which took over at its own 24 yard line. UK returned the favor and punted it back to the Longhorns, who got another big return from Niblett, who took it to the UK 42 with 2:36 left.

Texas got one first down and got to the UK 21 yard line before the Cats' defense stopped the drive. Shipley came on and made a 39-yard field goal to give the Longhorns a 13-10 lead.

Kentucky was not done. The Cats got the ball back with 51 seconds remaining and navigated down the field, covering 46 yards in seven plays. With nine seconds remaining, Kauwe made a 45-yard field goal to tie the game at 13-13. Texas would take a knee on their next possession and the game would go to overtime.

On the first play of overtime, Boley connected with Kendrick Law for a 22-yard completion, getting the Cats to the three. However, UK ran four and did not get in, and Texas got their opportunity.

The UK defense stood tall, keeping Texas at bay in overtime. However, on fourth down, Shipley came on and made a 45-yard field goal to win it for the Longhorns.

Redshirt freshman Cutter Boley had a huge game, but Kentucky fell to No. 17 Tennessee 56-34 at Kroger Field.

Boley hit on 26 of 35 through the air for a career-high 330 yards and a career-high five touchdowns. The five touchdowns set a Kentucky freshman record for touchdown passes in a game.

Kentucky (2-5, 0-5 Southeastern Conference) had a pair of players with 100-yard receiving games for the first time since 2022. DJ Miller caught five passes for 120 yards and two touchdowns, while teammate Kendrick Law caught

two passes for 10 yards and a score.

UT (6-2, 3-2) got the first possession of the game and the Vols quickly got across midfield. Two plays later, Tennessee scored on a 35-yard touchdown pass from Joey Aguilar to Chris Brazzell. The PAT by Max Gilbert was good and the Vols led 7-0.

Kentucky's first possession saw the Cats get a first down on a pair of Boley scrambles, but UK would be forced to punt and the Vols took over at their own 17 yard line with 11:32 left in the first period.

The Kentucky defense would stand tall on the next drive, forcing a three-and-out when Davenport Rayner sacked Aguilar for an 11-yard loss. Tennessee punted and UK took over at its own 46.

On Kentucky's ensuing possession, the Cats faced a third-and-10 near midfield when Boley was intercepted by Edrees Farooq, who returned it 45 yards for a touchdown. Gilbert added the point after and the Vols led 14-0 with 6:56 left in the first quarter.

The Cats would strike back with a scoring drive of their own. On the second play of the possession, Boley hit Law in the flat, and the speedster turned the corner and outran the Tennessee defense for a touchdown. Jacob Kauwe added the extra point and UK cut the Tennessee lead to 14-7 with 6:19 left in the first period.

The teams would exchange punts before Tennessee struck again. The Vols covered 72 yards in just five plays, ending with a one-yard touchdown rush by Star Thomas. Gilbert added another PAT and the Vols led 21-7 with 1:49 left in the first.

On Kentucky's next possession, Hardley Gilmore IV caught a pass, but fumbled and a mad scramble ensued. In the end, Tennessee recovered inside the UK red zone. The quarter would expire with the Vols holding a 21-7 lead.

On the third play of the second quarter, DeSean Bishop scored on a one-yard touchdown rush. Gilbert added the PAT and Tennessee led 28-7.

Kentucky would strike back on its next possession with another big pass play. The Cats covered 75 yards in just three plays, ending with a 56-yard touchdown strike from Boley to Miller. Kauwe added the point after and UK cut the deficit to 28-14 with 12:39 left in the half.

The Vols would punt on their next possession and the Cats took over at their own four yard line with 10:12 left in the half. From there, UK would go on a very long drive, covering 96 yards in 16 plays, ending with a three-yard touchdown pass from Boley to JJ Hester. Kauwe added the point after and UK cut the deficit to 28-21 with 1:37 left in the half.

Tennessee made the most of the remaining time. The Vols marched 75 yards in 10 quick plays, culminating with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Aguilar to Ethan Davis. Gilbert made another PAT and the Vols led 35-21 with five seconds left in the half. That would be the halftime score.

Kentucky got the first possession of the third quarter. The Cats were able to move into Tennessee territory on a 32-yard completion from Boley to Law. However, the drive stalled and the Cats punted it back to the Vols, who took over at their own 30.

The Vols needed just two plays to cover the 70 yards. Aguilar connected with Mike Matthews for a 62-yard touchdown pass. Gilbert added the PAT and Tennessee led 42-21.

On the ensuing drive, Kentucky was again able to march into Tennessee territory. However, the drive stalled and Kauwe's 55-yard field goal came up just short. The Vols would score on the following drive to extend the lead to 49-21.

Kentucky would respond with a scoring drive of its own. UK went 75 yards in 10 plays, culminating with a 28-yard touchdown pass from Boley to Miller. UK went for two, but was unsuccessful, leaving the score at 49-27. That would be the score after three quarters.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Vols extended their lead to 56-27. The Cats would score again, on Boley's fifth touchdown of the night. The freshman connected with Hester for a second time, this one a seven-yard score. Kauwe's PAT made it 56-34.

KENTUCKY 10, AUBURN 3

Quarterback Cutter Boley connected on 18 of 29 through the air with a touchdown and the Kentucky defense played a huge game as the Cats beat Auburn 10-3 at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Kentucky (3-5, 1-5 Southeastern Conference) allowed just 241 yards of total offense in the game and held an SEC opponent without a touchdown for the first time since a 24-3 win over Mississippi State on Nov. 4, 2023.

The Cats had seven sacks in the game, including 1.5 each from Alex Afari and Khalil Saunders. Kentucky had 12

tackles for loss in the game.

Each team punted on their first possessions of the game, with Auburn making one first down and Kentucky none. Auburn's second time with the football produced a pair of first downs, but ended with another punt.

Kentucky took over at its own 17 yard line and the Cats would get a first down on an 18-yard completion from Boley to Kendrick Law. However, UK would be forced to punt again and Auburn took over at its own 12 yard line.

The Tigers would punt again on their third possession and the Cats took over at their own 26. Boley would scramble for a first down on the final play of the first quarter, and the Cats were near midfield.

On the first play of the second quarter, Law rushed for 10 yards, getting Kentucky into Auburn territory. A Seth McGowan 18-yard run got the Cats another first down. However, the drive stalled at that point and freshman kicker Jacob Kauwe came on and converted a 48-yard field goal to give Kentucky a 3-0 lead.

The momentum stayed on Kentucky's side as the UK defense forced a three-and-out and another Auburn punt. The Cats would take over at their own 29 with 10:12 left in the first half. UK would make a pair of first downs, but would have to punt it back to the Tigers, who took over at their own 12 with 4:51 left in the half.

The Tigers had their best possession of the first half, to that point, on the ensuing drive. Auburn crossed midfield. However, on fourth and six, Auburn went for it and Saunders came up with a sack. UK took over at the Auburn 49 with 1:44 left in the half.

Kentucky would give the ball back to Auburn when Boley was intercepted by Elijah Melendez, who returned it to the UK 35 with 1:00 left in the half. The Tigers would get into the UK red zone, but the UK defense held and Auburn settled for a 27-yard field goal from Alex McPherson, tying the game at 3-3. That would be the halftime score.

The Cats got the first possession of the second half and UK made the most of the opportunity. Twice on third down plays, Boley connected with Fred Farrier, first for 13 yards and later for 32, getting UK into the Auburn red zone. Two plays later, Boley found Law for a 13-yard touchdown, the first of the night for either team. Kauwe added the PAT and Kentucky led 10-3 with 9:27 left in the third quarter.

Auburn made three first downs on its first drive of the second half. However, the drive stalled and when Saunders registered another sack on the night, the Tigers were forced to punt. UK took over at their own nine yard line with 3:12 left in the third quarter.

The Cats would get a pair of first downs as the third quarter expired with UK holding a 10-3 lead. Early in the fourth quarter, the Cats crossed midfield but were eventually forced to punt. Auburn took over at its own eight yard line with 11:56 remaining.

Auburn switched quarterbacks, going with Jackson Arnold in place of Ashton Daniels, and the Tigers were able to make a pair of first downs. However, the UK defense stood tall yet again and forced an Auburn punt. The Cats took over at their own 16 with 8:59 to play.

Kentucky would get two first downs and got near midfield before being forced to punt. Auburn took over at its own 12 yard line with 5:18 remaining.

The UK defense again came up huge, forcing a three-and-out capped by a sixth quarterback sack. The Tigers punted it back to the Cats, who took over at their own 38 with 3:56 to play.

UK appeared to be ready to milk the clock to put the game away. However, Boley was intercepted by Auburn's AnQuan Fegans. During the interception return, UK wide receiver Cam Miller stripped the ball away from Fegans and UK's Henry Boyer recovered.

From there, the Cats would be forced to punt again, and the Tigers took over at their own nine yard line with 2:09 remaining. Auburn would drive into UK territory but on the final play of the game, Daniels was intercepted by UK's Jordan Lovett to seal the victory.

Quarterback Cutter Boley connected on 18 of 23 through the air for 168 yards and two touchdowns, and the Kentucky defense came up big for the second straight game as the Cats pounded Florida 38-7 at Kroger Field.

Kentucky (4-5, 2-5 Southeastern Conference) ran for 233 yards in the game. Dante Dowdell carried seven times for 104 yards and a touchdown, while Seth McGowan rushed 22 times for 92 yards and a pair of scores.

The UK defense was stellar again in Saturday's game, allowing just seven points, only 247 yards and forcing four

Florida turnovers. This comes one week after the UK defense allowed just three points in a win at Auburn.

Florida (3-6, 2-4) had the game's first possession and the Gators would make a pair of first downs, crossing midfield and into Kentucky territory. But on a third and 12 from the UK 44, Gators' quarterback DJ Lagway was intercepted by UK's Ty Bryant, who returned it to the Kentucky 49 yard line.

The Cats converted a third and three when Boley found Hardley Gilmore IV for an eight-yard completion. On a third and 11, Boley found DJ Miller for a 14-yard gain and another first down. But from there, the drive stalled. Kentucky would get a 39-yard field goal from Jacob Kauwe to take a 3-0 lead with 6:42 left in the first quarter.

Florida would get two first downs on its next drive, but the Gators would be forced to punt. However, Ja'Mori Maclin muffed the punt and Florida recovered at the UK 13 yard line. Three plays later, Lagway connected with Jaden Baugh for a 10-yard touchdown. Trey Smack would add the extra point and Florida led 7-3 with 1:12 left in the first period.

On the first play of the second quarter, Boley connected with tight end Willie Rodriguez for a first down. Using an up-tempo attack, the Cats quickly moved into Florida territory. The drive would end when Boley connected with JJ Hester for a 29-yard touchdown pass, giving the lead back to the Cats. Kauwe added the PAT and Kentucky led 10-7 with 12:39 left in the half.

The Gators would make two first downs on its next drive, but as they neared midfield, the UK defense forced another turnover. KD Daniels rushed up the middle, but UK's Lorenzo Cowan forced a fumble and Cam Dooley recovered, give the Cats the ball on their own 41 yard line.

Kentucky would convert a fourth and one on a four-yard rush by Seth McGowan. On a third and three, Boley connected with Kendrick Law for a 12-yard gain and another first down. The Cats faced a fourth and two from the Florida 18, and Law rushed around right end for a three-yard gain and a first down. On the next play, Boley hit Jason Patterson for a 15-yard touchdown to extend the lead. Kauwe added the PAT and the Cats led 17-7 with 3:32 remaining in the half.

The momentum stayed on Kentucky's side when the UK defense forced a three-and-out on the next Florida drive. The Gators punted and the Cats took over at their own 46 yard line with 2:38 left in the half.

The Cats would waste no time getting into scoring position. On the third play of the drive, Boley found Law for a 25-yard completion. On the next play, Boley connected with Maclin for a gain of 17 yards to the Florida two yard line. On the next play, McGowan rushed for a touchdown, his eighth rushing touchdown of the season. Kauwe added another extra point and UK led 24-7 with 1:26 remaining in the half.

Florida would try to add points before the end of the half, but UK's Quay'sheed Scott picked off the Lagway pass and returned it 55 yards, to the Florida 19 yard line with 35 seconds left in the half. It appeared that UK would add points, but Boley fumbled and the Gators recovered with 22 seconds left in the half.

The teams would trade interceptions late in the half, which ended with Kentucky leading 24-7.

Kentucky got the ball to start the third quarter. The Cats would make a first down on a Boley scramble for 14 yards and another when Boley connected with Fred Farrier for a 13-yard gain that got UK into Florida territory. From there, the Cats went to the ground, using both McGowan and Dante Dowdell to get into the red zone. The seventh consecutive rushing play was a five-yard touchdown rush by McGowan, ending the 13-play, 75-yard scoring drive. Kauwe added the point after and Kentucky led 31-7 with 7:34 left in the third quarter.

Florida made a chance at quarterback to start the second half. Tramell Jones came on to relieve Lagway. Jones would lead the Gators across midfield, but a Daveren Rayner sack halted the once-promising drive and Florida would punt.

Kentucky took over at its own 12 yard line with 32 seconds left in the half. The Cats would lead 31-7 after three periods.

As the fourth quarter began, Kentucky continued to run the ball effectively. On first down from the UK 35 yard line, Dowdell busted through the middle, turned on the jets and raced 65 yards for a touchdown. Kauwe made another PAT and Kentucky led 38-7 with 12:16 to play.

On Florida's next possession, the Gators would make a pair of first downs. But on fourth and six from the UK 49, Jones' pass was overthrown and the Cats took over with 9:29 remaining.

Seth McGowan rushed for 72 yards and three touchdowns as Kentucky cruised past Tennessee Tech 42-10 at Kroger Field.

Quarterback Cutter Boley was efficient, completing 18 of 21 through the air for 236 yards and a touchdown. Kendrick Law was the primary target for Boley, catching a career-high 11 passes for a career-high 124 yards.

Kentucky (5-5) got five tackles apiece from Ty Bryant, Grant Godfrey and Daveren Rayner.

The Kentucky defense forced a three-and-out on the first TTU possession. After a punt, the Cats took over at their own 12 yard line.

On UK's first possession, the Cats went to the ground game early, with Seth McGowan picking up 23 yards on five carries. Kentucky would cross midfield and that's when Boley found Kendrick Law for a 43-yard completion that got the Cats to the TTU six yard line. Two plays later, McGowan scored on a one-yard run. Jacob Kauwe added the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 6:55 left in the first quarter.

The Golden Eagles went three-and-out on their second possession as well and a 30-yard punt set the Cats up at their own 41. Kentucky would take advantage of the good field position, covering 59 yards in six plays, ending with a 30-yard touchdown rush from Boley. Kauwe added the point after and Kentucky led 14-0. That would be score after one quarter.

Tennessee Tech would put together a solid drive on its next possession. The Golden Eagles would get three first downs and would get into UK territory. However a 32-yard field goal by Dom LeBlanc missed wide left, and the score remained 14-0.

The Cats were unable to do anything with the ensuing possession and punted the ball back to the Golden Eagles, who took over at their own 20 with 9:36 left in the half.

On the third play of the TTU drive, quarterback Kekoa Visperas was intercepted by UK's Cam Dooley, giving the Cats the ball at their own 49. Kentucky would take advantage of the good field position. UK went 51 yards in nine plays, mostly on the ground, and McGowan found pay dirt again on a four-yard touchdown run. Kauwe added the point after and UK led 21-0 with 3:46 left in the half.

Tennessee Tech would get on the board on its next drive. The Golden Eagles went 65 yards in nine plays, ending when Visperas found Brian Courtney for an eight-yard touchdown pass. LeBlanc added the point after and UK's lead was cut to 21-7 with 1:18 left in the half.

The Cats were not done with the half. Kendrick Law returned the kickoff 40 yards and a personal foul penalty set the Cats up at the TTU 45. A 19-yard completion to Law, followed by a 20-yard connection with Ja'Mori Maclin set Kentucky up to score late. Two plays later, McGowan scored again, this time from one yard out, to extend the lead. Kauwe's PAT made it 28-7 with 19 seconds left in the half. That would be the halftime score.

Kentucky had the ball to begin the third quarter, but the Cats went three-and-out and punted the ball back to TTU, who took over at their own 39.

Tennessee Tech had a solid drive, covering 40 yards in eight drives. However, the UK defense stopped the Golden Eagles and forced a field goal. LeBlanc was good from 38 yards out and the UK lead was cut to 28-10 with 9:15 left in the third quarter.

The Cats' ensuing drive was methodical, as UK went to the ground with McGowan and Dante Dowdell. However, Boley was sacked for a loss of 12 and it appeared that the drive would stall. However, on the next play, Boley found Hardley Gilmore IV across the middle and Gilmore did the rest, taking it to the house for a 45-yard touchdown reception. Kauwe added the point after and Kentucky led 35-10 with 2:24 left in the third quarter. That would be the score through three periods.

As the fourth quarter began, TTU drove into UK territory, getting to the UK 26. However, on fourth and six, the UK defense forced an incompletion and the Golden Eagles turned the ball over on downs with 13:07 left in the game.

Kentucky would waste little time, covering 74 yards in just five plays, ending with a 19-yard touchdown run by Dowdell. Zach Schreiner added the PAT and Kentucky led 42-10 with 10:37 remaining.

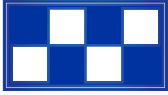
