The Santiago Network was established in 2019 under the Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts (WIM) to address the growing impacts of loss and damage in developing countries. To catalyze the technical assistance of relevant organizations, bodies, networks and experts (OBNEs) for the implementation of relevant approaches for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change at the local, national and regional levels in developing countries.

Our services

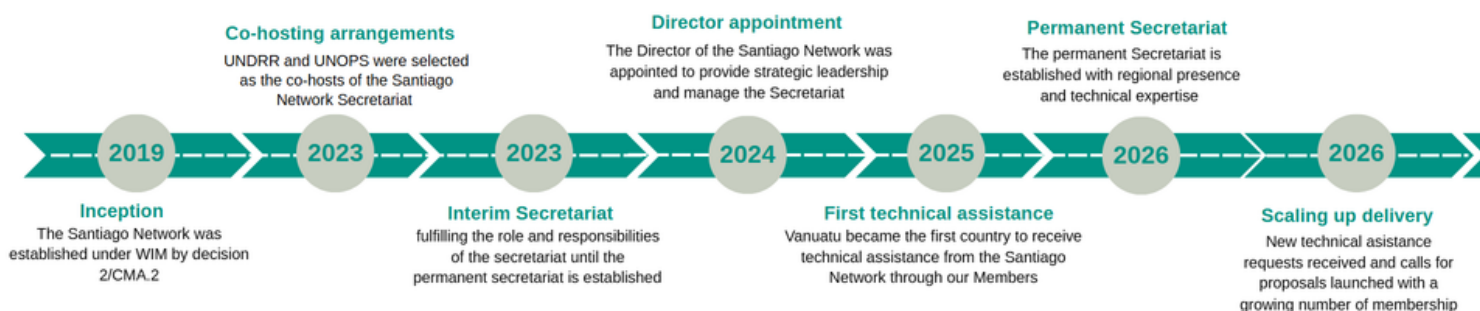
Technical assistance
