Series History: UVA leads 25-16-10

### QUICK KICKS

- The Cavaliers moved to No. 25 in the latest United Soccer Coaches rankings following last week's loss at No. 4 North Carolina making it six straight weeks in the top 25 for the Hoos this season
- UVA moved up two spots in the RPI and are ranked No. 22 heading into Thursday's game at Duke
- The Hoos play a challenging slate with six teams currently in the RPI top 25 on the schedule - 5 in the top 11 - and four of those are road games: at UNC (1), at FSU (8), at PSU (9) at Duke (11)
- Virginia has found ways to bounce back from a loss under Steve Swanson with the Hoos only falling in consecutive games 11 times in 25 years with Swanson at the helm of the program
- Only twice in 25 years under Swanson have the Hoos dropped three consecutive games with the other coming in the 2003 season
- **Yuna McCormack** brought home a bronze medal after playing with the US U20 Women's Youth National Team in the FIFA U20 Women's World Cup in Colombia over the last few weeks
- McCormack returned to the pitch for the Hoos at UNC - her first game since the opening week - and scored her first goal of the season to give the Hoos a 2-1 lead at the time over the Tar Heels
- **Maggie Cagle** hit the game-winning goal at VCU for her 17th career goal and eighth game winner. She ranks second in the ACC and 19th nationally in game-winning goals this season.
- **Cagle** has been efficient as the UVA goal leader with six goals out of 10 shots on frame this season
- Twelve different Hoos have found the net this season as the Virginia offense has been spreading the ball around in 2024 and 10 different players have assisted on those goals
- **Alexis Theoret** has been a key cog in the ball distribution with a team-leading five assists to date

### THE SERIES WITH DUKE

- Virginia and Duke have faced each other 51 times and the Cavaliers lead the all-time series with Duke 25-16-10
- Last season the teams played to a scoreless draw as injury depleted squads battled it out in Charlottesville
- Virginia leads 11-5-5 in games played on the road and 10-5-5 in games played at Koskinen Stadium
- It's been a tight series over the last 10 matches dating back to 2017 with UVA leading 4-3-3 in those 10 meetings

### HOOS PICKED TO FINISH SIXTH IN 2024 ACC PRESEASON POLL

- The Cavaliers were picked to finish sixth in the ACC in a preseason vote of the league's coaches
- Virginia received 177 points and finished just ahead of Duke in the preseason poll
- Four of the top five picks advanced to the Elite Eight or further at the NCAA Championships with three in the College Cup

### CAGLE, GODFREY NAMED PRESEASON ALL-ACC HONOREE

- Junior **Maggie Cagle** and graduate **Lia Godfrey** were named to the preseason All-ACC team in a vote of the league's coaches
- Cagle is a two-time All-ACC selection, while Godfrey is a three-time All-ACC selection and three-time All-American
- Cagle tallied the most assists by a freshman in her debut campaign with 12 in the 2022 season
- Godfrey was also named ACC Freshman of the Year following her debut season

### HOOS BACK FOR THE CAVALIERS

- UVA returns 22 players from last year's squad that posted an 8-3-6 record and was hit hard by injuries from the season onset
- Among those returning are All-ACC selection Maggie Cagle and All-Freshman selection Yuna McCormack
- The Hoos return a stout defensive group with Samar Guidry, Laney Rouse and Chloe Japic along the back line
- The Cavaliers return a bulk of the offense with 28-of-33 goals accounted for last season back on for the 2024 campaign

### VIRGINIA WELCOMES ANOTHER HIGHLY-RANKED RECRUITING CLASS TO GROUNDS

- UVA welcomed the 14th-ranked recruiting class to Grounds for this season with a group of four signees in the freshman class
- All four are ranked in the IMG Top 200 and includes top 25 recruit in forward Sophia Bradley
- Midfielder Sarah Flammia (114), midfielder Kira Waller (122) and forward/midfielder Annamarie Williams (193) round out the class

### HOOS ADD TRIO OF TRANSFERS WITH KELLEY, MITTERMAIR AND SOMMERS

- Virginia also added depth with three graduate transfers for the 2024 season
- Defender Moira Kelley joined the Cavaliers after a four-year career on the back line at Kansas with 64 starts and 18 shutouts
- Forward/midfielder Linda Mittermair came to the Hoos from Austria with experience in Austria's first league and national team
- Goalkeeper Ellie Sommers played three years at Pepperdine and last season at LMU before joining the Hoos

### INJURY BUG BITES HOOS EARLY AND HARD IN 2023, HOOS SEE RETURNS TO LINEUP FOR 2024

- The injury bug bit UVA early with captain Emma Dawson and three-time All-America Lia Godfrey injured prior to the 2023 season
- In addition to the loss of the midfielders, starting defender Laney Rouse had her season end with injury in the opener vs. Nevada
- The Hoos were without midfielder Brianna Jablonowski due to injury in the fourth game of the season at George Mason
- UVA also lost midfielder Jill Flammia for one game - the ACC opener - after an injury in the second half against Iowa
- The Cavaliers lost midfielder Laughlin Ryan to injury against NC State and the midfielder missed the Virginia Tech match.

**GALVN NAMED ACC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK FOR WEEK ONE**

- Tatum Galvin earned her first weekly honor from the ACC after the opening week of play
- Galvin helped the Cavaliers post a pair of shutouts and limited opponents to three shots on goal
- She logged more than 80 minutes in both games as she helped anchor the back line against Towson and Northwestern

**CAGLE, SAFRADIN EARN ACC WEEKLY HONORS AFTER WEEK TWO OF PLAY**

- Forward Maggie Cagle and goalkeeper Victoria Safradin each earned ACC Weekly honors in week two of the season
- Cagle hit a pair of goals in a second-half rally at No. 3 Penn State as the Cavaliers won the game 2-1
- Safradin made a career-high six saves on a career-high 20 shots faced to help the Hoos in the rally over the Nittany Lions
- Four of Safradin's six saves came in the final 24 minutes to preserve the win for Virginia

**CAGLE'S STRIKES LIFT HOOS TO VICTORY AT NO. 3 PENN STATE**

- Maggie Cagle came up with a pair of big strikes 12 minutes apart to help the Hoos win at No. 3 Penn State
- Trailing 1-0 at halftime, Cagle struck in the 54th minute off a ball headed down to her in the box from Meredith McDermott
- She then converted a penalty kick in the 66th minute after McDermott was taken down from behind in the box
- The rally was the first comeback win for the Hoos since coming back at then No. 21 Penn State in the 2022 Sweet 16

**RYAN THRIVING EARLY IN 2024 CAMPAIGN**

- Laughlin Ryan thrived early in the 2024 campaign after seeing the pitch for the first time in 2023 due to three ACL injuries
- Ryan scored the season's opening goal with the game winner against Towson for her first collegiate goal
- She then tallied a career-high with four points as she scored a goal and provided two assists in the win over Utah Valley

**CAVALIERS RESPOND WELL AFTER A LOSS UNDER SWANSON**

- Responding after a loss has been a trend for the Cavaliers throughout Steve Swanson's tenure at UVA
- Throughout the 25 seasons under Swanson, Virginia holds a 64-11-15 record in matches following a loss
- The number does not include season-ending losses where the next match would be part of a new season
- The three-game stretch of losses this season is the first since the 2003 campaign and only second under Swanson

**THE HOOS IN OVERTIME IN THE SWANSON ERA**

- The Hoos won't be going to overtime until postseason play due to changes in rules, but UVA is no stranger to OT
- Virginia has gone to extra time in 89 matches during the Steve Swanson era with a 24-13-53 record in those matches
- In those 53 draws, 15 have come in the postseason with the Cavaliers surviving shootouts in five of those 15 matches
- UVA played its first overtime game of the 2022 season in the third round with a 3-2 win at No. 2 seed Penn State and followed it up with an overtime match at No. 1 UCLA in the Elite Eight

**HOOS CONTINUE STRONG PRESENCE IN PROFESSIONAL RANKS ON NWSL ROSTERS**

- UVA has a strong presence in professional soccer in the U.S. with 18 players with NWSL teams this season.
- Becky Sauerbrunn continues her NWSL career with the Portland Thorns and the Thorns added 2023 first-round pick Alexa Spaanstra in a trade with Kansas City this week
- Houston has 2022 first-round pick Diana Ordoñez and 2020 first-round pick Courtney Petersen in the clubhouse.
- Orlando has Morgan Gautrat who was the first overall pick of the 2015 Draft and two-time MAC Hermann Trophy winner
- Danielle Colaprico, Makenzy Doniak and Kristen McNabb play for San Diego, while Veronica Latsko, Phoebe McClernon and Laurel Ivory are with Seattle Reign.
- Megan Reid was continues her stay in Los Angeles as she is in her third straight season with Angel City FC.
- 2023 first-round pick Haley Hopkins plays for NC Courage along with 2024 draft pick Talia Staude
- Sinead Farrelly recently retired from Gotham FC, but Taryn Torres continues her career with the NY/NJ Club as does Emily Sonnett who joined the club prior to this season
- Brittany Ratcliffe is in her first season with the Washington Spirit after stints at Boston, Utah and North Carolina
- Virginia is one of only three schools to have a player taken in every NWSL Draft

**HOOS KICK OFF INAUGURAL USL SUPER LEAGUE SEASON**

- UVA has a presence in the USL Super League that launched its inaugural season on August 17
- Defender Sarah Clark competes for the Spokane Zephyr FC, while Claire Constant plays for DC Power FC
- Ashlyn Serepca, a 2021 graduate, debuted with the Carolina Ascent FC in the opening weekend
- Samantha Rosette, a 2019 graduate, holds down a spot with Brooklyn FC and is serving as team captain this season

**HOOS EARN UNITED SOCCER COACHES TEAM ACADEMIC AWARD FOR 15TH CONSECUTIVE YEAR**

- The Cavaliers were named a recipient of the Team Academic Award by the United Soccer Coaches for the 2023-24 year
- It marks the 15th consecutive season for the Hoos to receive the award from the coaches organization
- Teams must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 to be named as a recipient of the award each season

### HOOS SET SCORING STANDARD NATIONALLY SINCE 2011

- Virginia has had a high-powered offense under head coach Steve Swanson, but especially since 2011
- Over the past 14 seasons, UVA leads the nation as one of four teams to score 700 goals in that span
- Three ACC teams lead the way with UVA, Stanford and Virginia scoring the most goals in that time
- Virginia led the nation in goals scored in 2014 with 88 goals on the way to an NCAA runner-up finish
- UVA also led the nation in goals scored with 78 goals scored throughout the 2013 campaign

### SWANSON HITS THE 400 CAREER COACHING WIN MILESTONE TO PUT HIM AMONG ELITE COMPANY

- UVA head coach Steve Swanson hit a rare milestone vs. NC State (10/25/18), hitting the 400 career win mark
- As a head coach, Swanson holds a 483-174-73 record through stops at Dartmouth, Stanford and Virginia
- Currently only a handful of D1 coaches have hit the 400-win milestone with nine of them currently active
- The list gained a coach when Merrimack College transitioned to D1 status
- Swanson is one of only 10 coaches who has recorded 400+ wins all at a D1 institution
- In his coaching career, he has taken all three teams to league titles and the NCAA Tournament

## HEAD COACH STEVE SWANSON

Through 34 seasons as a head coach, including the last 24 years at the helm of Virginia's program, Swanson has established himself as one of the elite coaches in collegiate soccer, and certainly one of the most respected. Swanson has led his teams to six conference championships, 28 NCAA Tournament appearances and 32 consecutive winning seasons during his 34-year career. He also has accumulated 483 career wins as a head coach making him one of a small group of NCAA Division I women's soccer coaches to hit the 400-win milestone.

In his time as Virginia's head coach, he has compiled a 379-111-62 record and coached 12 ACC Player of the Year selections, four ACC Freshman of the Year selections and been named the ACC Coach of the Year three times. He also coached back-to-back MAC Hermann Trophy winner, Morgan Brian. In all, he has coached 22 Virginia players to All-America honors in his time at the helm of the program.

The last decade will be one Swanson will never forget because of the successes experienced on the pitch as both a collegiate coach and with the US Women's National Team – including winning a pair of World Cup Championships and taking the Cavaliers to the College Cup three times.

The 2023 season saw Swanson coach his team to the program's 37th consecutive winning season and 24th under his leadership. Talia Staude became the 22nd Virginia player drafted by the NWSL when she was selected by the North Carolina Courage with the 24th overall pick.

In 2022, Virginia advanced to the Elite Eight for an overtime showdown with eventual NCAA Champion and top-seeded UCLA. It was the 17th time in the last 18 seasons the Hoos advanced to at least the Round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament. The Cavaliers posted a pair of road wins over top-five programs – including a second-half rally for a 3-2 win at No. 2 North Carolina. Lia Godfrey earned All-America honors for the third straight season and was a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy. Haley Hopkins and Alexa Spaanstra were both first-round picks in the NWSL Draft.

In the fall of 2021, the Cavaliers claimed the ACC regular-season for the third time and advanced to the Round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament. He coached Diana Ordoñez to ACC Offensive Player of the Year honors and she was a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy in addition to earning All-America honors along with Lia Godfrey.

In the 2020-21 season, Swanson led the Cavaliers to the semifinals at the College Cup with Virginia storming through the NCAA Tournament and posting four consecutive shutouts before falling in a penalty kick shootout in the semifinals. Godfrey was named an All-America selection and the ACC Freshman of the Year.

He appeared on the international stage as an assistant coach with the US Women's National Team, helping the United States claim back-to-back World Cup Championships in the summers of 2015 and 2019 and an Olympic appearance in the Games in Brazil in the summer of 2016.

In the summer of 2015, Swanson served as an assistant coach for the United States as the Americans triumphed over Japan to win its third World Cup while he was watching two of his former UVA standout players, Morgan Brian (Class of 2015) and Becky Sauerbrunn (Class of 2007), play the entire 90 minutes of the final.

That fall, he led Virginia to the ACC regular-season title and coached both the ACC Offensive Player of the Year in Makenzy Doniak and the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in Emily Sonnett. Sonnett was also named the ESPNW National Player of the Year. She, Doniak and Brittany Ratcliffe all were drafted in the NWSL with Sonnett taken first overall, marking the second consecutive season for a Cavalier player to be the top pick in the draft. Swanson was also named ACC Coach of the Year for the second time.

In 2014, the Cavaliers made their second-consecutive College Cup appearance and their first-ever College Cup Final. UVA (23-3-0, 9-1-0 ACC) advanced to the ACC final and, for the second-straight season, Brian was honored with the Hermann Trophy as the nation's best collegiate player.

During his tenure as head coach of the Virginia women's soccer team, Swanson has had a dramatic impact on the program since he replaced former United States National Team Head Coach April Heinrichs in the spring of 2000.

Swanson's track record of success, not only on the collegiate level but also at the international level, was evident in 2012. That year he won a pair of championships, leading Virginia to its second ACC title and guiding the United States to the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup Championship in Japan. For those feats, he was one of ten coaches named to the shortlist for FIFA Women's World Coach of the Year.

Swanson came to Virginia after two highly successful stops at Stanford and Dartmouth. At Dartmouth, Swanson guided the Big Green to national prominence. He did an equally impressive job at Stanford, helping maintain the program's standing as one of the premier teams in the country while leading the Cardinal to two Pac-10 titles in four seasons. In 2004, he led Virginia to the first ACC Championship in school history, making him the only coach in Division I history to win titles in three different conferences. He has since become the only coach in history to win multiple conference championships in three different conferences. Swanson also enjoyed success as a player in college and as a professional.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Swanson has been associated with the United States youth national teams for more than a decade. He was the head coach of the U-20 Women's National Team from 2011-12, leading the team to a World Cup championship. In December 2013, Swanson was named the head coach of the United States U-23 National Team. It is the fourth different age group he has led for the US Soccer Federation.

- Four members of the Virginia women's soccer team represented the U.S. at the 2018 U20 Women's World Cup in France
- Zoe Morse, Laurel Ivory, Taryn Torres and Alexa Spaanstra all earned spots on the U20 roster in '18
- Ivory started all three games of pool play for the U.S. team that went 1-1-1 vs. Japan, Paraguay and Spain

- Former head coach Lauren Gregg was head coach of the USWNT from 1997-2000
- Former head coach April Heinrichs coached the USWNT from 2000-2004 and played on the first Women's World Cup Championship team in 1991



YUNA MCCORMACK

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

- Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.
- First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process. This tends to be used less in athletic eligibility references.
- Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

### UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES

- Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."
- Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.
- Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.

### THE CAVALIER MASCOT

- The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

### UNIVERSITY COLORS: ORANGE AND BLUE

- Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.
- One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

### WAHOOWA

- The origin of "Wah-hoo-wah" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.
- Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."
