2025 ACC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME IN CHARLOTTE

- The top two teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference Duke and No. 17 Virginia will face off in the 2025 ACC Football Championship Game on Saturday, December 6, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- With the 8 p.m. ET start on ABC, the 2025 ACC Football Championship Game marks the 16th time in the last 17 years that the game will be held in primetime.
- Led by transfer quarterback Chandler Morris and defensive lineman Mitchell Melton, Virginia returns to the ACC Championship Game for the first time since 2019 after closing the regular season 10-2 overall and 7-1 in conference play.
- The Cavaliers recorded their second 10-win season in program history—the first since 1989—and matched the 1995 team with a program-record seven conference victories.
- Virginia has excelled both home and away, earning four Power 4 road wins, delivering five blowout wins of more than 14 points and showing resilience throughout the season with three overtime victories.
- Duke returns to the ACC Football Championship Game for the first time since 2013, capping a strong regular season with a 7-5 overall record and a 6-2 mark in conference play under second-year head coach Manny Diaz.
- The Blue Devils feature a high-powered attack led by transfer quarterback Darian Mensah, who has guided the offense to 30 or more points in eight games, including at least 45 points in five of Duke's seven victories. Mensah ranks among the nation's top 10 in passing yards, passing yards per game, passing touchdowns and completions per game.
- Defensively, Duke has relied on a seasoned and disciplined core throughout the season, anchored by veterans Chandler Rivers, Tre Freeman, Vincent Anthony Jr., Wesley Williams, Luke Mergott and Caleb Weaver.
- With the 12-team College Football Playoff in its second year, the stakes have never been higher. The ACC Champion has earned a Playoff spot or National Championship Game bid in nine of the last 12 seasons, while last year's two championship game participating teams - Clemson and SMU - both made the CFP, making the ACC one of only three multi-bid leagues.

- This year marks the 21st ACC Football Championship Game in the conference's history, with the inaugural game taking place in 2005.
- Both Duke and Virginia are playing in only their second ACC Football Championship Game in program history.

- Virginia arrives with the same mission: claim the program's first win in the ACC Football Championship Game and secure its third ACC Football Championship (1989, 1995).
- These two programs share a special chapter in conference history — Duke and Virginia were cochampions in 1989, each finishing 6-1 in ACC play.

2025 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME HISTORY

- The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, and 2020).
- 14 different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with 10 appearances, followed by Virginia Tech and Florida State with six each.
- Since the first ACC Football Championship Game in 2005, Clemson has won the most championship games with eight. Florida State has won five title games, while Virginia Tech has won three championship games.

■ The winner of the conference championship game has gone on to play in the National Championship Game or compete in the College Football Playoff in nine of the last 12 seasons, including two teams in both 2020 and 2024.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME IN CHARLOTTE

- In 2018, the ACC, Charlotte Sports Foundation and Carolina Panthers announced a 10-year agreement to keep the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game is played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.
- Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has hosted 14 of the last 15 ACC Football Championship Games. The ACC, Carolina Panthers, and the Charlotte Sports Foundation have an agreement to keep the championship game in Charlotte through the 2030 season.
- Not including the 2020 game, which had limited attendance due to the pandemic, ACC Football Championship Games played at Bank of America Stadium have had an average attendance of nearly 70,000 fans. The game's attendance record is 74,514, set in the 2015 contest between Clemson and North Carolina, which also established a record for Bank of America Stadium at the time.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME IN ABC PRIMETIME

- The 2025 ACC Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. ET on Saturday, December 6, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina, on ABC. The league's football championship game will showcase the top two teams based on regular-season conference winning percentage.
- The 8 p.m. ET kickoff marks the 16th time in the last 17 years that the game will be held in primetime.

THREE TEAMS RANKED IN LATEST AP TOP 25 POLL

- The ACC has three teams in the most recent Associated Press Top 25 Poll (November 30): Miami (No. 12), Virginia (No. 16), and Georgia Tech (No. 24).
- Miami has been ranked all season in the AP Top 25 Poll, marking 32 consecutive weeks dating back to 2023. The Hurricanes spent seven consecutive weeks in the top 5, reaching as high as No. 2 multiple times.
- Virginia has appeared in each of the last 10 polls this season, entering the top 25 on September 28 and climbing as high as No. 12 on November 2.
- Georgia Tech first entered the AP Top 25 Poll on September 14 and has remained ranked for 12 consecutive weeks, reaching a season-high of No. 7 on October 19.
- Additionally, SMU (8), Louisville (3) and Pitt (1) received votes in the latest poll.

THREE TEAMS RANKED IN MOST RECENT COACHES POLL

- Three ACC teams appear in the latest US LBM Coaches Poll Top 25 (November 30): Miami (No. 13), Virginia (No. 16), and Georgia Tech (No. 23).
- Miami has been ranked in the Coaches Poll all season, reaching as high as No. 2 in Week 7 (October 12).
- Virginia has been ranked in each of the last 10 polls after entering the top 25 at No. 24 in Week 5 (September 28).
- Georgia Tech has been ranked since Week 3 (September 14), climbing as high as No. 7 in Week 8 (October 19).
- Additionally, SMU (28), Pitt (15) and Louisville (6) received votes.

THE ACC IS THE DEEPEST P4 CONFERENCE IN THE NATION

- The ACC has proven it is the deepest Power 4 conference this season:
 - 6 teams at 2 losses or fewer in conference play, the second-most among all FBS conferences.
 - 7 conference games have gone into overtime, the most by any conference since 2000.
- The ACC has the strongest non-conference strength of schedule among all Power 4 conferences:
 - Played 26 total P4 and Notre Dame non-conference games, the most among all FBS conferences: ACC -26; SEC - 18; Big 12 - 14; Big Ten - 12.
- The ACC has won a share of high-profile games this
 - 6 different ACC teams have defeated an AP Top 10 opponent this season.
- 9 different ACC teams have defeated a Top 15 opponent.
- 11 different ACC teams have defeated an AP Top 25 opponent. (at time of the game)

WHO, WHAT, WHEN, WHERE AND HOW?

- Georgia Tech was the first to secure a bowl berth, defeating Virginia Tech 35-20 on Oct. 11 (Week 7).
- Virginia followed, earning eligibility with a 22-20 win over Washington State on Oct. 18 (Week 8).
- In Week 9 (Oct. 25), Pitt (53-34 vs. NC State), Miami (42-7 vs. Stanford), and Louisville (38-24 vs. Boston College) all reached six wins.
- Week 10 (Nov. 1) saw SMU become the sixth team eligible after an overtime win over then-No. 10 Miami, 26-20.
- In Week 11 (Nov. 8), California upset No. 15 Louisville 26-20 (OT), and Wake Forest defeated No. 14 Virginia 16-9, both clinching bowl eligibility with Top-15 victories.
- In Week 13, Duke became bowl eligible with a 32-25 win over North Carolina. NC State kept its bowl streak alive with a 21-11 victory over Florida State, while Clemson reached bowl eligibility for the 27th consecutive year with a dominant 45-10 win over Furman.

■ The ACC played 26 games against peer Power 4 conference opponents and Notre Dame in 2025, the most of any conference by at least eight games.

ACC AVAILABILITY REPORTING

- The ACC announced on July 22, 2025, two new policies to enhance the safety and well-being of ACC student-athletes in the 2025-26 academic year.
- (1) Institutional event security plans will limit access to the competition area in football and men's and women's basketball
- (2) the availability status of student-athletes will be reported before each conference game in football, baseball, men's and women's basketball.
- Before each conference game, a team will disclose any student-athlete whose availability for the upcoming game is in question. A student-athlete can be listed on the Availability Report if their status is uncertain for any reason (e.g., injury or illness, academic or other eligibility issue, personal or family matter, etc.); however, only the status and not the specific reason will be publicly reported.
- In football, a report will be submitted two days before each Conference game (e.g., Thursday before a Saturday game) with an update on the day before the game and on game day.
- For each report submitted before game day, studentathletes will be designated as Available, Probable, Questionable, or Out for the upcoming game. Game Day Reports will be submitted two hours before each game. For this report, student-athletes will be designated as Available, Game Time Decision, or Out.
- All availability reports and the full conference policy will be available to the public and media on the ACC's website www.theACC.com.

* This policy is intended to help protect student-athletes and staff members from outside entities seeking to obtain inside information about availability and participation, including but not limited to injuries. It will also reinforce to athletes and staff the sensitivity of such information.

Statement from ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips, Ph.D., on the Future ACC Football Scheduling Model

"We have been incredibly intentional throughout our discussions on ACC Football, including the future of our conference schedule. Today, the Athletic Directors of the 17 football-playing institutions overwhelmingly supported a regular season schedule that includes nine conference games and a minimum of 10 games each year against Power 4 opponents. This positions the ACC as one of only two leagues committed to having every team annually play a minimum of 10 games against Power 4 teams. There will be additional discussions and more details to be determined, but today's decision showcases the commitment and leadership of our ADs in balancing what is best for strengthening the conference and their respective programs. As specified in the Conference constitution, the model will be presented to the Faculty Athletics Representatives for formal adoption."

- The average margin of victory in conference games this season in the ACC is 14.5. That is the second-smallest margin among all Power 4 conferences. (Stats Perform)
- The ACC has had seven conference games this season that have gone to overtime, the most among all FBS conferences. That is tied for the most by any FBS conference in a single campaign all-time, along with the Pac-10 in 2000. (Stats Perform)

HISTORICALLY ACC GAMES COME DOWN TO THE WIRE

- From 2021–24, 107 of 236 ACC conference games (45.3%) were decided by eight points or fewer.
- In 2024 alone, 34 of 68 league games (50%) were onepossession outcomes.
- This season, 25 of 68 ACC games were decided by one score or less (8 points or fewer). That is the lowest percentage of close games in the last five years.

ROAD WARRIORS: ACC TEAMS EXCEL AWAY FROM HOME

- ACC road teams have posted a 35-33 record in conference contests
- The momentum began in Week 5, when visiting teams won five of six matchups, and carried into Week 6 with road squads taking five of seven games.
- The trend continued in Week 8, as road teams claimed four of six league contests.

ESPN'S COLLEGE GAMEDAY SHOWS OUT AT PITT

- On Saturday, November 15, the iconic college football pregame show, *College GameDay Built by The Home Depot*, broadcasted live from the North Shore of Pittsburgh ahead of the No. 24 Pitt Panthers' Week 12 matchup with No. 10 Notre Dame at Acrisure Stadium.
- This marked *College GameDay*'s first visit to Pittsburgh since Thursday, September 1, 2022, when the Panthers defeated West Virginia, 38–31, in the Backyard Brawl.
- Prior to that, the show last appeared at a Pitt home game on a Saturday when the Panthers hosted Notre Dame on September 3, 2005.
- Overall, this marked the the fourth time Pittsburgh has hosted the broadcast and the third time on a Saturday.
- This was also the second time *College GameDay* had traveled to an ACC campus this year after broadcasting live from Coral Gables, Florida, in Week 4 as the then-No. 4 Miami Hurricanes knocked off in-state rival Florida. 26-7.

ALL EYES ON CORAL GABLES, CANES IN WEEK 4

- The spotlight returned to Coral Gables in Week 4 ,as ESPN's College GameDay Built by The Home Depot went live from the University of Miami as the undefeated Hurricanes hosted the Florida Gators in a primetime Sunshine State showdown on Saturday, September 20, at 7:30 p.m. ET on ABC.
- It marked the 26th time that Miami has played in a game featured on *GameDay* and the ninth time as the host site. It was also the fourth Miami–Florida matchup selected for *GameDay*, joining the high-profile meetings in 2002, 2008 and 2019, and just the first in Coral Gables.
- The Hurricanes welcomed *GameDay* back to Coral Gables for the first time since September 26, 2020, when then-No. 12 Miami hosted Florida State.
- In addition to ESPN's presence, the ACC Network's ACC Huddle was also live from Coral Gables, adding to the atmosphere surrounding the rivalry showdown between Miami and Florida.

ACC OWNED LABOR DAY ONCE AGAIN

- The ACC was the only league to compete across five days Thursday through Monday, August 28 through September 1 during Week 1 of the 2025 season.
- This marked the sixth time this has happened for the ACC in the regular season since 2017 (2017, 2018, 2021, 2022, 2023). No other FBS conference has done so even once over that same period. (Stats Perform)
- The ACC once again anchored Labor Day Weekend with the lone game on Labor Day as North Carolina played host to TCU in Bill Belichick's collegiate coaching debut.
- It marked the 16th consecutive Labor Day game for the ACC (excluding the 2020 COVID season), and the 19th time since the tradition began with Florida State versus Miami in 2005.

ACC X NFL

- No conference blends college football and NFL experience quite like the ACC in 2025, with three former NFL head coaches now leading programs: Bill O'Brien (Boston College), Bill Belichick (North Carolina), and Frank Reich (Stanford), the most of any conference.
- Belichick (six Super Bowl wins) and Reich (one) are the only two college football head coaches who have also won a Super Bowl as either a head coach or coordinator in the NFL.
- Several ACC programs also feature General Managers with deep NFL ties, including Ron Rivera (Cal), John Garrett (Duke), Michael Lombardi (North Carolina) and Andrew Luck (Stanford), along with a growing number of former NFL stars contributing across coaching staffs and player development roles.

ACC CONTINUES PARTNERSHIP WITH COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF FOUNDATION

- The ACC announced its plans to partner with the College Football Playoff Foundation (CFPF) again as part of this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week (September 13-20). The initiatives include support for this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week, Big Day for Teachers and the distribution of grant funds to support teachers in Charlotte.
- For the third straight year, the ACC will partner with a local Charlotte Mecklenburg School (CMS) to remodel a space that will directly benefit the school's students on a daily basis. In 2024, the conference worked with members of the Statesville Road Elementary administration, teachers and staff who were the recipients of a \$50,000 Extra Yard makeover. Additional details on this year's makeover will be announced in the future, as this will be the first year the conference will undertake two classroom makeovers.
- Since the inception of the ACC and CFP Foundation's partnership, over \$1.5 million has been given to support teachers in the ACC footprint.

CLEMSON PICKED AS PRESEASON FAVORITE IN 2025 ACC FOOTBALL MEDIA POLL

- Defending ACC Champion Clemson has been selected as the preseason favorite to win the 2025 Atlantic Coast Conference football title, following a vote of more than 180 media members credentialed for the 2025 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- The Tigers are coming off a strong 2024 campaign in which they posted a 10–4 overall record, went 7–1 in conference play, and captured the ACC Championship title. Clemson also made its seventh College Football Playoff appearance and finished the season ranked No. 11 in the final AFCA Coaches Poll and No. 14 in the AP Poll.
- In the media voting, Clemson was picked to repeat as ACC Champion on 167 ballots.
- Miami received seven first-place votes, followed by Florida State with four, while SMU and Georgia Tech each garnered two. Virginia Tech received one first-place vote.
- Clemson led all teams with 3,083 points, while Miami (2,679) and SMU (2,612) were second and third, respectively. Georgia Tech (2,397) was picked fourth, while Louisville (2,370) came in fifth.
- Duke (1,973) was picked to finish sixth in the preseason predictions, ahead of Florida State (1,920) in seventh, North Carolina (1,611) in eighth, Pitt (1,571) in ninth, NC State (1,505) in 10th, Virginia Tech (1,412) in 11th and Syracuse (1,381) in 12th.
- Rounding out the preseason poll were Boston College (953) in 13th, Virginia (871) in 14th, California (659) in 15th, Wake Forest (576) in 16th and Stanford (426) in 17th.

- Clemson senior quarterback Cade Klubnik was voted the 2025 ACC Preseason Player of the Year, receiving 146 votes.
- Klubnik is coming off a breakout 2024 season, leading the Tigers to an ACC title and a College Football Playoff berth. He accounted for 43 total touchdowns, completing 308-of-486 passes for 3,639 yards and 36 touchdowns, while rushing for 463 yards and seven scores. He ranked in the top 20 nationally in five major categories, including third in both passing touchdowns (36) and total touchdowns (43). His 21 passing touchdowns of 20-plus yards were the most in the FBS.

- For the 2025 season, audiences watching ACC officiated matchups on Friday night on either ESPN/ ESPN2 or ACC Network and ACC Network's primetime Saturday games will hear the real-time discussions among the Referee, instant replay official in the stadium, and the ACC's Collaborative Instant Replay Official located in the ACC's Game Day Operations Center in Charlotte.
- While the ACC began sharing Game Day Operations Center video with ESPN in 2023, sharing audio of the replay discussions represents a significant next step in transparency. Last season, the ACC conducted a limited experiment, allowing ESPN officiating analyst Matt Austin to listen to replay conversations during a November 21 Thursday night game between NC State and Georgia

NEW HEAD COACHES IN 2025

- After over two decades of dominance in the NFL, Bill Belichick was hired for his first-ever college head coaching job at North Carolina in December 2024. Widely considered one of the greatest coaches in football history, Belichick won six Super Bowls and 17 division titles over his time in the NFL, which also includes 333 career wins to make him the second-winningest head coach in NFL history, behind only Don Shula, who holds the all-time record with 347 total wins.
- Frank Reich was named Stanford's interim head football coach on March 31. The 36th head coach in program history, Reich is one of the sport's most well-respected offensive minds thanks to over 30 years in professional football, combining a 14-year playing career as an NFL quarterback with 18 seasons in various coaching roles. Reich was a member of six Super Bowl teams overall, four as a player with the Buffalo Bills (1991-94), and twice as a coach. Reich's six-year head coaching tenure included five seasons with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-22) before his final stop at the helm of the Carolina Panthers (2023).
- Jake Dickert was named the head coach at Wake Forest in December 2024, following the resignation of longtime head coach Dave Clawson. Dickert took over Washington State as interim head coach in 2021 and earned the permanent role, leading the Cougars for four years from 2021-24. In four seasons, Dickert compiled a 23-20 record (.534) and led the Cougars to three bowl games. The 2024 season proved to be his best work, going 8-4 in the regular season.

MONTGOMERY NAMED INTERIM HC AT VIRGINIA TECH

- Philip Montgomery is now the Interim Head Coach for the Virginia Tech Football program, taking over after head coach Brent Pry was fired following a 0-3 start to the 2025 season on September 14. Montgomery, who was Virginia Tech's offensive coordinator, will lead the team for the remainder of the current season.
- From 2015–22, Montgomery was the head coach at Tulsa, compiling a 43-53 record over eight seasons. His second year proved to be his best, as the Golden Hurricane finished 10-3, while the pandemic-shortened 2020 campaign also saw Tulsa capture an American Athletic Conference title.

FIRST ACC WINS AS HEAD COACH

- Wake Forest's Jake Dickert earned his first win as an ACC head coach in his debut, a 10–9 victory over Kennesaw State on August 29.
- North Carolina's Bill Belichick earned his first collegiate victory as head coach on September 6 with a convincing 20–3 win at Charlotte, marking the former six-time Super Bowl champion's inaugural win in college football and in the ACC.
- Stanford's Frank Reich picked up his first collegiate win as a head coach in the Cardinal's 30-20 win over Boston College in the two teams' season opener on September 13
- Virginia Tech interim head coach Philip Montgomery picked up his first win as an ACC head coach with the Hokies' 38-6 win over Wofford on September 20.

TRIO OF ACC HEAD COACHES NAMED TO 2025 PAUL "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award Watch UST

■ Three ACC head coaches earned spots on the American Heart Association's 2025 Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award Watch List: Mario Cristobal (Miami), Tony Elliott (Virginia), and Brent Key (Georgia Tech).

FOUR ACC HEAD COACHES NAMED TO 2025 DODD TROPHY MIDSEASON WATCH LIST

■ Four ACC head coaches were recognized on the 2025 Dodd Trophy Midseason Watch List, presented by PNC Bank: Jeff Brohm (Louisville), Mario Cristobal (Miami), and Tony Elliott (Virginia), and Brent Key (Georgia Tech).

FOUR ACC COACHES NAMED SEMIFINALISTS FOR THE GEORGE MUNGER AWARD

■ Four ACC head coaches were named as semifinalists for the 2025 George Munger Award: Jake Dickert (Wake Forest), Tony Elliott (Virginia), Brent Key (Georgia Tech) and Pat Narduzzi (Pitt).

GT'S KEY HAS THE KEY VERSUS RANKED ACC FOES

■ Since Brent Key's first game as Georgia Tech's head coach (October 1, 2022), the Yellow Jackets have beaten seven (7-1) AP-ranked opponents as an unranked team, the most by any FBS team in that span.

NARDUZZI EARNS WEEKLY AWARD FOR WEEK 13

■ Pitt head coach Pat Narduzzi has named the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Week following the Panthers' upset road victory over ranked Georgia Tech, 42-28. It marked the Panthers' second road win over a ranked opponent this season (No. 25 Florida State), their most in a single season during the Narduzzi era. It also capped off Pitt's ACC road slate with a perfect 4-0 record.

DOEREN PICKS UP WEEKLY AWARDS IN WEEK 10

■ NC State head coach Dave Doeren picked up the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week honor and the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Week award for Week 10 after guiding NC State to a 48-36 win over No. 8 Georgia Tech on Saturday night at Carter-Finley Stadium. The victory marked the Wolfpack's highest-ranked win since 2012 and handed the Yellow Jackets their first loss of the season.

BROHM GARNERS WEEKLY AWARDS IN WEEK 8

■ Louisville head coach Jeff Brohm was tabbed the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week and the Bear Bryant Awards Coach of the Week for Week 8, as the Cardinals defeated No. 2 Miami, 24-21, in Miami Gardens, Florida. The victory marked Louisville's first road win against an AP top-2 opponent in program history and matched the highest-ranked opponent the Cardinals have ever defeated.

HOOS' ELLIOTT EARNS TWO WEEKLY AWARDS IN WEEK 5

■ Virginia head coach Tony Elliott was named the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week and the Bear Bryant Awards Coach of the Week for Week 5 on September 29. The Cavaliers beat No. 8 Florida State, 46-38, in double overtime before a sold-out Scott Stadium. The victory marked Virginia's first home win over a top-10 team since 2005.

CUSE'S BROWN EARNS WEEKLY AWARD IN WEEK 4

■ Syracuse head football coach Fran Brown was named the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Week on September 23, following his team's significant 34-21 road victory over Clemson. It was the team's first victory in Death Valley and ended a five-game losing streak to the Tigers.

FSU'S NORVELL EARNS WEEKLY HONORS IN WEEK 1

■ Following the Seminoles' 31–17 win over No. 8 Alabama (Aug. 30), Florida State head coach Mike Norvell was named both the Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Week and the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week for Week 1.

DABO REACHES ANOTHER ACC COACHING MILESTONE

■ In Clemson's season opener vs. No. 9 LSU (Aug. 30), head coach Dabo Swinney coached his 228th game, surpassing Bobby Bowden (227 at Florida State) for the most games coached by a head coach during ACC membership.

VIRGINIA TECH HIRES JAMES FRANKLIN AS NEXT HC

- Signaling a new era for Virginia Tech Football, James Franklin was announced as the next head coach of the Hokies on November 17.
- Franklin brings more than 30 years of coaching experience at the collegiate level, most recently serving as head coach at Penn State. Franklin's career head coaching record is 128-60 and he is one of three active FBS coaches with a 68-plus winning percentage and 14-plus years of head coaching experience. His 104 wins in his 12 seasons as head coach at Penn State are the second most wins in school history.
- During his tenure in State College, Franklin revived the Nittany Lions into a consistent force. Under Franklin's direction. Penn State finished in the top 12 of the final College Football Playoff rankings in seven of the last nine seasons, earned berths in seven New Year's Six bowl games with four wins, and won the 2016 Big Ten Championship.
- Prior to Penn State. Vanderbilt University experienced a record-setting transformation on the gridiron under Franklin's leadership from 2011 through 2013. In three seasons at the helm, Coach Franklin became the first Vanderbilt coach to guide the team to bowl games in each of his first three campaigns.

STANFORD HIRES TAVITA PRITCHARD TO LEAD TEAM

- Tavita Pritchard has been named Stanford's Bradford M. Freeman Director of Football as announced on November 28 by General Manager Andrew Luck.
- The 37th head coach in program history, Pritchard, a 2009 graduate of Stanford, was most recently the quarterbacks coach of the Washington Commanders.
- Pritchard just completed his third season as quarterbacks coach of the Commanders, having mentored Jayden Daniels, Jacoby Brissett, Sam Howell and Marcus Mariota. During his tenure with Washington, Pritchard played a major role in developing the Commanders' offense, highlighted by an appearance in the 2024 NFC Championship Game. Pritchard returns to The Farm in the spirit of Stanford's rich legacy of NFL coaching talent, including Bill Walsh, Denny Green, Jim Harbaugh, David Shaw and Vic Fangio.
- Following his graduation and playing career at Stanford, Pritchard began a lengthy coaching career with the Cardinal, serving in a variety of roles during a stretch that featured 10 consecutive bowl games, nine straight Big Game victories and appearances in three Rose Bowls (2013-14, 2016), Fiesta Bowl (2012) and Orange Bowl (2011). After joining the staff as a graduate assistant in 2010, Pritchard served as defensive assistant (2011-12) and running backs coach (2013).
- Pritchard was promoted to the role of quarterbacks/wide receivers coach in 2014-17, coaching quarterback Kevin Hogan as the Cardinal ended the season with dominant victories over USC in the Pac-12 Championship Game and Iowa in the Rose Bowl. From 2018-22, Pritchard was elevated to serve as the Andrew Luck Director of Offense and Kevin M. Hogan Quarterbacks Coach.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

OVERVIEW

The College Football Playoff (CFP) is a postseason event to determine college football's national champion on the field, while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

RANKINGS

The selection committee ranks the schools based on the members' evaluation of their performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, and comparison of results against common opponents.

THE BRACKET

The format of the College Football Playoff is built on a 12-team bracket. The 12 participating schools are the five conference champions ranked highest by the CFP selection committee, plus the next seven highest-ranked teams. The four highest-ranked schools will be seeded 1-4 and will receive a first-round bye. The remaining teams, including the fifth conference champion, will be seeded 5-12 based on their final ranking.

TRADITION

The New Year's holiday period and bowl games belong to college football. This season following the CFP First Round games on campus, the four Playoff Quarterfinal games will be played in the Cotton Bowl Classic, Orange Bowl, Rose Bowl Game and Sugar Bowl. The following week, the Fiesta Bowl and Peach Bowl will host the Playoff Semifinals.

CHAMPIONSHIP MONDAY

The two teams that win the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night.

UNIVERSAL ACCESS

Every Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team has equal access to the College Football Playoff based on its performance during the regular season. No team automatically qualifies.

GOVERNANCE

University presidents and chancellors from all 10 FBS conferences and Notre Dame serve as the board of managers and govern the administrative operations, with commissioners and Notre Dame athletics director (the Management Committee) managing the event. A small staff in the CFP office in Irving, Texas, carries out the day-to-day responsibilities.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

A talented group of 13 high-integrity individuals with experience as coaches, student-athletes, college administrators and journalists, along with sitting athletics directors, comprise the selection committee. Members of the committee are Chris Ault, Troy Dannen, Mark Dantonio, Jeff Long, Ivan Maisel, Chris Massaro, Randall McDaniel, Mack Rhoades (chair), Mike Riley, David Sayler, Wesley Walls, Carla Williams and Hunter Yurachek.

Rank the top 25 teams, assign the schools to the 12-team playoff bracket and assign the Playoff Quarterfinal and Playoff Semifinal bowl sites.

ACC TIEBREAKER POLICY

The Atlantic Coast Conference Football Champion will be decided by a game between the top two (2) post-season eligible teams. The two teams with the highest percentage of wins during all regular-season Conference competition shall play in the Championship Game. If three (3) or more such teams are tied with the highest percentage of wins or two (2) or more teams are tied with the second highest percentage of wins, the following tiebreaker procedure shall be administered to determine the representative(s) in the Championship Game. The team with the highest win percentage, either outright or after application of the tiebreaker, shall be declared the home team for the Championship Game.

Two-Team Tie

- a. Head-to-head competition between the two tied
- b. Win-percentage against all common opponents.
- c. Win-percentage against common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
- d. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- e. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular-season games.
- f. The participant shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

Three (or More) Team Tie

The three (or more) team tiebreaker procedure will be used to either (a) identify one championship game participant, (b) identify both championship game participants, or (c) eliminate team(s) from the tie. If the administration of the three (or more) team tiebreaker results in the elimination of team(s) from the tie, teams remain tied, and both championship game participants have not been determined, the tiebreaker procedure will restart for remaining tied teams.

- a. Combined head-to-head win-percentage among the tied teams if all tied teams are common opponents.
- b. If all tied teams are not common opponents, the tied team that defeated each of the other tied teams.
- i. If all tied teams are not common opponents and no tied team defeated each of the other tied teams, but a tied team lost to each of the other tied teams, such team shall be eliminated and removed from the tie.
 - c. Win-percentage against all common opponents.
- d. Win-percentage against common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
 - e. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- f. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
- g. The participant shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

Conference games against otherwise post-season ineligible teams will always be counted in the league standings and in application of the tie-breaker procedure.

NATIONAL SUCCESS

National Championships

- This year, the ACC has already won one NCAA National Championship, as the NC State Women's Cross Country team won the 2025 NCAA Division I Women's Cross Country Championship on November 22.
- The ACC won six NCAA National Championships in 2024-25 in ACC-sponsored sports. In addition, Stanford won the NCAA Women's Water Polo Championship.
 - · North Carolina won the 2024 NCAA Women's Soccer Championship.
 - · Virginia won the 2024-25 NCAA Women's Swimming & Diving Championship.
 - · Notre Dame won the 2025 NCAA Fencing Championship.
 - · Wake Forest won the 2025 NCAA Men's Tennis Championship.
 - · North Carolina won the 2025 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship.
 - · Stanford won the 2025 NCAA Women's Rowing Championship.
- The ACC has won a combined 30 NCAA titles over the last four plus academic years, the most by any conference in their respective league-sponsored sports.
 - ACC has won one national title already in 2025-26, as NC State won the NCAA Division I Women's Cross Country Championship in November.
 - · ACC won six or more national titles in each of the last four years, marking the best run in ACC history.
 - In 2022-23, the ACC won the most NCAA championships of any conference with a league-record nine.
- Over the last four years, an ACC team has had to beat another ACC team in either the NCAA semifinals or championship game 17 times.
 - In 2024-25, the ACC had multiple teams in the final four of several NCAA Championships:
 - · Women's Soccer: 4 of the final 4 teams; both teams in the championship.
 - · Volleyball: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - · Women's Lacrosse: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - · Men's Golf: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - · Women's Golf: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - · Women's Swimming & Diving: Top 2 teams in the team standings.
- ACC student-athletes won 32 individual NCAA Titles in 2024-25.

LEARFIELD Directors' Cup Standings

- Six ACC schools were ranked among the top 25, including three in the top 10, in the final Division I LEARFIELD College Directors' Cup standings following the 2024-25 academic year. All 18 ACC programs finished in the top 75 of the final standings.
- This marks the 23rd consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final LEARFIELD Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina and Virginia have ranked among the top 30 nationally in each of the 31 years the Directors' Cup has been conducted.
- The ACC was one of only two conferences with every school among the final top 75 this year. This marks just the second time in the last decade in which every ACC team finished in the top 75 (2020-21 was the other occurrence).

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC conducted its fourth annual Health and Safety Summit in May 2025, this time in Charlotte, North Carolina, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the second annual ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, North Carolina, in June 2025. The trek included 30 student-athletes across the league meeting with representatives and listening to panel discussions from five different categories including sports, real estate, finance/banking, consulting and government.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

ACC Student-Athletes Excel Once Again in NCAA APR Report

- Atlantic Coast Conference teams continue to demonstrate strong academic performance, as reflected in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) data released by the NCAA in May.
- Overall, the ACC average APR is 991, seven points above the NCAA Division I national average. Every team among the ACC's 28 sponsored sports exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930, while 114 ACC teams recorded a perfect score of 1000, including at least one team from each of the 18 member institutions. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930.

ACC Makes Another Strong Showing in NCAA Graduation Success Rates

• The Atlantic Coast Conference's collective high level of academic success is again reflected by the NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) report released in November 2025. The ACC's average graduation rate of 94 percent is four points higher than this year's national average of 90 percent.

ACC Again Leads the Way in U.S. News & World Report "Best Colleges" Rankings

- For the 19th consecutive year, the Atlantic Coast Conference leads the way nationally among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report on September 23, 2025.
 - The ACC once again boasts the best average ranking among all FBS conferences, with an impressive 50.7 average, outpacing its peers for the 19th year in a row.
 - Two ACC institutions rank among the nation's top 10, making it the only FBS conference with multiple universities in the top 10.
 - Four ACC schools landed in the top 25, more than any other FBS conference.
 - · Six ACC schools are ranked in the top 30, leading all FBS conferences.
 - · A record 16 ACC schools are ranked among the top 75, the most of any FBS conference
 - 11 of the 18 ACC institutions either maintained or improved their position from last

FOOTRALL SUCCESS

The ACC has solidified its reputation as a powerhouse in college football over the last decade, producing elite teams, top-tier coaching talent and Heisman-caliber athletes.

Elite Presence on the National Stage

• In eight of the past 12 seasons, the ACC has been represented in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game—an elite streak that began with Florida State's thrilling 34-31 win over Auburn in the final BCS title game in January 2014 (2013 season).

Four CFP Teams, One Conference

- The ACC is one of the few conferences to have sent four different programs to the College Football Playoff:
 - Clemson (2015-2020, 2024)
 - Florida State (2014)
 - Notre Dame (2020, as a full ACC member during the pandemic season)
 - SMU (2024)

Playoff Success That Stands Out

• With six all-time College Football Playoff victories, the ACC ranks third nationally behind only the SEC (18) and Big Ten (11).

Unmatched Depth in Bowl Season

• The 2024 season saw a league-record 13 ACC teams earn bowl eligibility, tying for the most among all Power 4 conferences. This marks the 24th consecutive year the ACC has secured six or more bowl bids, excluding the unique 2020 season. The league has sent 10 teams or more to the postseason in seven of the last 11 years, and since 2014, ranks second among all conferences with 105 total postseason appearances.

Top Coaching Talent Across the Board

- Seven active ACC head coaches currently rank among the top 60 in the FBS in career winning percentage (at least one full season of coaching):
 - Dabo Swinney (Clemson)
 - Fran Brown (Syracuse)
 - Rhett Lashlee (SMU)
 - Mike Norvell (Florida State)
 - Jeff Brohm (Louisville)
 - Dave Doeren (NC State)
 - Manny Diaz (Duke)

Heisman Pedigree

- Over the last 12 years, eight ACC players have finished in the top five of the Heisman Trophy voting a total of 10 times, including two winners:
 - Jameis Winston, Florida State 2013 winner
 - Lamar Jackson, Louisville 2016 winner, third in 2017
 - Deshaun Watson, Clemson 2nd in 2016, 3rd in 2015
 - Trevor Lawrence, Clemson 2nd in 2020

 - Andre Williams, Boston College 5th in 2013
 - Jordan Travis, Florida State 5th in 2023
 - Cameron Ward. Miami 4th in 2024

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SUCCESS

Expanding the Field of Contenders

- With SMU making its first appearance in 2024, 14 different programs have now competed in the ACC Football Championship Game since it began in 2005—highlighting the league's depth and competitive balance.
- Clemson leads all schools with 10 appearances, followed by Virginia Tech and Florida State, each with six.

Champions Across the Conference

- Since the inaugural title game in 2005, six different schools have claimed the ACC Championship:
 - Clemson: 9 titles (most in league history)
 - Florida State: 5 titles, including the 2023 crown
 - Virginia Tech: 3 titles
 - Georgia Tech, Wake Forest, and Pitt: 1 title each

A Proven Draw in Charlotte

• The ACC Championship Game has been a major event in Charlotte, selling out five times at Bank of America Stadium—in 2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, and 2020—demonstrating the passion of ACC fans and the game's regional appeal.

Charlotte: The Long-Term Home of ACC Championship Football

• In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation solidified a 10-year partnership to keep the title game in Charlotte through 2030. The game will continue to be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday of December, maintaining one of college football's premier championship traditions.

ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

Another Impressive Draft Class

• The ACC saw 42 players selected in the 2025 NFL Draft, representing 15 different institutions across the conference. This ties the league's highest single-draft total since 2021 (not including Notre Dame's nine picks that year).

Consistent Pipeline to the Pros

• Since the 2000 NFL Draft, the ACC has produced 853 total draft picks, including 122 first-round selections—ranking third among all conferences in both categories.

Top-Three in Recent Draft Production

• Over the last 12 drafts (2013–2025), the ACC has had 469 players selected, the thirdmost of any conference during that span. Notably, the ACC has seen 40 or more players drafted in three of the last five years.

No. 1 Overall Picks: A Legacy of Excellence

- Current ACC programs have produced 17 No. 1 overall picks in the history of the NFL Draft. Most recently, Miami quarterback Cameron Ward was selected first overall by the Tennessee Titans in the 2025 NFL Draft. Several ACC schools have contributed multiple top picks over the years:
- Stanford: 4 (Bobby Garrett 1954, Jim Plunkett 1971, John Elway 1983, Andrew Luck 2012)
- Miami: 3 (Vinny Testaverde 1987, Russell Maryland 1991, Cameron Ward 2025)
 Cal: 2 (Steve Bartkowski 1975, Jared Goff 2016)
- Virginia Tech: 2 (Bruce Smith 1985, Michael Vick 2001)
- Clemson: 1 (Trevor Lawrence 2021)
- Florida State: 1 (Jameis Winston 2015)
 NC State: 1 (Mario Williams 2006)
- SMU: 1 (Kyle Rote 1951)
- Syracuse: 1 (Ernie Davis 1962)
- Virginia: 1 (Bill Dudley 1942)

Additionally, NC State's Roman Gabriel was selected No. 2 overall in the 1962 NFL Draft but was the No. 1 overall pick in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.
