TEMPE, Ariz. – Sixteen of the top Division I men's tennis teams will meet up in Charlottesville, Virginia, to compete for the 2017 Intercollegiate Tennis Association National Men's Team Indoor Championship. Two-time defending NCAA National Champion, the University of Virginia, will serve as the event host, with all competition over the four-day event (Feb. 17-20) scheduled to take place at Boar's Head Sports Club. The ITA Division I National Men's Team Indoor Championship dates back to 1973. Stanford owns the most #ITAIndoors titles with 12, followed by UCLA with seven and the host Cavaliers with five championships. North Carolina claimed its first ITA National Indoors title in 2016, topping the host Cavaliers in 4-2 in the final.



TEMPE, Ariz. – Brian Hainline, M.D., alumnus of the University of Notre Dame Class of 1978 and the University of Chicago Pritzker School of Medicine, received the highest honor bestowed by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association when he was presented with the 2016 ITA David A Benjamin Achievement Award on Saturday, September 10, 2016, at the International Tennis Hall of Fame's Board of Governors Meeting at the Grand Hyatt Hotel in New York. The ceremony was hosted by the ITHF and presented by Rolex Watch, U.S.A.



Stan Smith, President of the ITHF, presented the award along with David A Benjamin, retired ITA Chairman of the Board, Timothy Russell, ITA Chief Executive Officer, and Mounia Mechbal, Vice President of Communications, Rolex Watch U.S.A., who presented a distinctive, personally engraved, Rolex timepiece to Hainline. In addition to this special gift, Hainline and a guest were invited to watch a session of the 2016 US Open from the President's Box, courtesy of the USTA, and were also recognized during the ITHF's Legends Ball on Friday evening.

"The selection of Brian Hainline as the 2016 recipient of the ITA David A Benjamin Achievement Award laureate speaks not only to Brian's extraordinary career in the field of medicine, but also to the larger vision that the ITA serves college tennis and returns the leaders of tomorrow," said Russell. "We are honored to recognize Brian for all of his efforts, and hope that his story is one that will inspire current and future generations."

Now in its 23rd year, the ITA David A Benjamin Achievement Award pays tribute each year to past participants in the world of varsity tennis who have achieved excellence in their chosen careers. The spirit of the award honors both professional success and contributions to society, made either as a direct result of a career, or through humanitarian efforts. In 2015, Margie and Stan Smith endowed the ITA Achievement Award in honor of Benjamin.

"On behalf of the ITA, we are proud to partner with the International Tennis Hall of Fame and Rolex Watch U.S.A. to recognize Brian Hainline as the 2016 ITA David A Benjamin Achievement Award laureate," said Benjamin. "And we would also like to thank once again Margie and Stan Smith, for their generous endowment donation for this most special award."



Brian Hainline, M.D. is the NCAA's first Chief Medical Officer. He holds academic appointments as clinical professor of neurology at both New York University School of Medicine and Indiana University School of Medicine, and was formerly a practicing physician, and the Chief Medical Officer for the USTA and US Open.

Hainline earned his Bachelor's degree from the University of Notre Dame, where he was the No. 1 singles and doubles player his senior year. He majored in philosophy within a pre-professional program, taking all of the necessary pre-med courses, and graduated Phi Beta Kappa. He then went on to earn his medical degree at the University of Chicago Pritzker School of Medicine.

During an interview for his dream job as neurology resident with Drs. Fred Plum and Jerome Posner of The New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center, Hainline was asked how he had managed to play college tennis while studying both philosophy and pre-med. His reply was that while he didn't have the extensive background in research that the other residency candidates had, tennis had taught him discipline, the drive for excellence, and character development that comes from the journey of successes and failures. That tennis response was the key serve in getting the job.

As the NCAA's first chief medical officer, Hainline oversees all student-athlete health and safety initiatives and coordinates with the NCAA's main sports medicine panel, the Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports, and is assigned the task of running the NCAA Sport Science Institute – a national center of excellence that functions as a resource to provide safety, health and medical expertise and research for physicians, athletic trainers, and all stakeholders in sport. Hainline sees his position as, "being devoted to doing everything possible to promote and develop the health, safety and well-being of all student-athletes."

According to NCAA President, Mark Emmert at Hainline's hiring, "The NCAA was founded on the commitment to protect and enhance the health and well-being of student-athletes and Dr. Hainline will elevate that commitment for the Association."

Dedicated to raising the standard of care for athletes, Hainline has given lectures around the world, authored or edited seven books and numerous academic papers and chapters, is a Fellow of the American College of Sports Medicine and the American Academy of Neurology and a member of The Society for Tennis Medicine and Science.

Hainline served as Chief Medical Officer for the U.S. Open Tennis Championships from 1992 to 2007 and was appointed the first Chief Medical Officer of the USTA in 2008. Prior to his appointment, Brian had been a long-time committed volunteer to the game of tennis, serving as a USTA board member, a founding member of the USTA Sport Science Committee, chair of the USTA Pro Council, and a member and chair of the ITF Sport Science and Medicine Commission, which provides guidance to 202 Olympic countries. As member of the ITF Wheelchair Tennis Medical Commission he wrote the rules of eligibility for international wheelchair competition.

Hainline is a founding member of the Tennis Anti-Doping Program Review Board for the ATP, ITF and WTA Tour. According to David Brewer, Chief Professional Tennis Officer & US Open Tournament Director, "Brian was central to the initial effort to establish the tennis anti-doping code. He did the heavy lifting – research and writing – that put tennis ahead of the curve in establishing a systematic approach to this issue."

In addition to volunteering in the world of tennis, Brian has been teaching religion to pre-teens for more than two decades. "Whether I'm practicing neuroscience, teaching religion or developing policies and procedures for sport, unifying theme is to help people become aware of how they can take steps to improve their level of self-care, sense of awareness and well-being, and then to give back to life."

In addition to those already mentioned, Hainline has served, and continues to serve, on numerous sports medicine appointments, some of which include, Pop Warner Football Medical Research Subcommittee, National Council on Youth Sports Safety, and the WTA Player Development Advisory Panel.

In 2001, The International Tennis Hall of Fame honored Hainline with the Tennis Educational Merit Award, presented to those who have made notable contributions in the tennis education field at the national level and have demonstrated leadership and creative skills in such areas as instruction, writing, organization and promotion of the game of tennis. In 2004 he received the Irving Glick Award of Excellence from the WTA Tour at the US Open Tennis Championships, recognizing sports medicine contributions by a tournament physician that are outstanding and exemplary. Hainline was inducted into the USTA Eastern Tennis Hall of Fame in 2011 and in 2013 was bestowed the ITF Award for Service to the Game.

Brian is married to Pascale and they have three children, Clotilde, Arthur and Juliette, and one grandchild, Sophie. In his free time, Brian loves to play tennis and also enjoys writing poetry and playing the piano. THE UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA

In 1819 Thomas Jefferson fulfilled his lifelong ambition to create a new and better institution of higher learning. The University of Virginia would prepare America's future leaders to protect their young democracy. It would facilitate open exchange between students and professors, unlock the potential of the nation's best and brightest minds, and encourage students and faculty to advance knowledge and break traditional boundaries.

Indeed, Jefferson's Academical Village gave physical shape to his ideals-ideals that would alter the course of higher education in America and the world.

Nearly 200 years later the University continues this endless pursuit of better. As one of the top three U.S. public universities, we are committed to developing the full potential of talented students from all walks of life. Our enduring legacy of honor and student self-governance prepares tomorrow's leaders for the challenges they are sure to face. Our health system advances scientific discovery while providing first-rate patient care. And our rich academic resources—paired with our focus on cross-disciplinary collaboration—further what Jefferson described as "the illimitable freedom of the human mind."

UVA is regarded as one of the most beautiful and prestigious universities in the world. In 1987, UNESCO named the University (in conjunction with Monticello) a World Heritage Site. This rare distinction has been bestowed upon only the world's most culturally significant landmarks. As a proud recipient of this honor, UVA sits alongside such renowned global sites as the Acropolis, the Galapagos Islands and the Pyramids of Giza. The University is one of only two such sites still being used for its original purpose. UVA was also recently rated the "most beautiful campusin America" by Best College Reviews.

While we're proud of our past, we're focused on our future.

As a leading research university, UVA is bringing a wealth of innovations to the world. Our students and faculty have discovered new connections between the nervous system and the immune system, revolutionizing the study of both. Currently, UVA features 12 schools with close to 22,000 students.





The University of Virginia athletics program is a shining example of how one of the nation's top academic institutions has combined high academic achievement and successful athletic teams on the national scene.

In 2016, Virginia won the NCAA men's tennis championship, the rowing team placed third nationally and the women's swimming program finished fifth. Men's basketball made its first NCAA Elite Eight appearance since 1995 and the men's track and field team placed seventh at the NCAA Outdoor Championships and tied for eighth at the indoor championships. Women's golf, women's tennis, women's soccer and field hockey also advanced to the quarterfinals at their respective NCAA championships.

UVA captured four Atlantic Coast Conference championships and its 73 conference titles since the spring of 2002 are the most of any ACC school during that time. In 2015-16, UVA won ACC championships in women's golf (second consecutive), rowing (seventh consecutive and 16th in 17 years), women's cross country (first since 1982) and women's swimming and diving (ninth consecutive).

Individually, Leah Smith (Pittsburgh, Pa.) defended her NCAA swimming titles in the 500 Free and 1,650 Free and won a gold and bronze medal at the Rio Olympics. Danielle Collins (St. Petersburg, Fla.) won her second NCAA women's tennis championship. Henry Wynne (Westport, Conn.) won the mile at the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships and Filip Mihaljevic (Livno, Bosnia and Herzegovina) captured the NCAA title in the men's shot put at the outdoor championships. Brian Boland (men's tennis) was named ITA National Coach of the Year, while Augie Busch (women's swimming), Todd Morgan (women's cross country), Kim Lewellen (women's golf) and Steve Swanson (women's soccer) earned ACC Coach of the Year honors.

2016-17 Highlights

- Senior Lauren Fuller (volleyball) was the first Cavalier since 2007 to earn All-America recognition when she was named 2015 AVCA Honorable Mention All-America.
- Danielle Collins (women's tennis) was named ITA National Player of the Year, Honda Sport Award winner and ITA National Senior Player of the Year.
- Lauren Coughlin won the ACC women's golf individual championship.
- Men's golfer Derek Bard competed in the Masters and U.S. Open Championship.
- Wrestler George DiCamillo claimed his third ACC Championship at 133 pounds, becoming only the seventh UVA wrestler to win three ACC Championships.
