VIRGINIA VS WINTHROP

- This is the first-ever meeting between the two teams
- This is the first time Virginia has ever played a Big South school.
- The Cavaliers are 4-0 against current-Big South-member Longwood, but the last meeting between the two was 1980. Longwood joined the Big South in 2012.

WINTHROP NOTES

- This is Winthrop's first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance in the program's third year of competition
- Winthrop won the Big South Tournament and the automatic bid with a 13-8 victory over Liberty on Sunday
- Junior Shannon Gallagher was named the tournament MVP and was joined on the All-Tournament Team by sophomore Paige Jenkins and freshmen Katie Clark and Kristen Shriver.
- The Eagles also won the Big South regular-season championship, finishing 6-1 in league play
- Winthrop earned 10 Big South lacrosse honors including Attacking Player of the Year (Jenna Kasmarik), Freshman of the Year (goalie Alaina Girani) and Coach of the Year (John Sung) was voted the conference Coach of the Year.
- Kasmarik and Girani were both also named to the All-Conference First Team and were joined by junior Shannon Gallagher. Freshman Katherine Judge, junior Hayley Krause and senior Alyssa Blevins were all named to the All-Conference Second Team and junior Logan McCarthy was voted to the Big South All-Academic Team.
- Kasmarik leads the nation, averaging 4.05 goals per game
- Winthrop as a team is fourth in the nation in scoring, averaging 15.4 goals per game, and is also fourth in caused turnovers, averaging 10.35 per game
- Winthrop's defense is 10th in the nation, allowing 7.6 goals per game
- Girani is seventh in the nation with a 49.1 save percentage

VIRGINIA IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- This is Virginia's 20th-consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament and head coach Julie Myer's 20th-consecutive NCAA bid
- This is Virginia's 28th overall appearance in the tournament
- Virginia is 33-24 in the NCAA Tournament with 14 semifinal appearances, eight trips to the National Championship game and three NCAA Titles (1991, 1993, 2004).

HOOS HOT

- Casey Bocklet scored a career-high six goals against Virginia Tech
- Bocklet had scored at least one goal in every game this season except Harvard until the ACC Tournament game against Notre Dame
- Bocklet did have two assists against the Irish, pushing her consecutive-points streak to 36 consecutive games
- Liza Blue scored four goals with an assist against VT, her fourth four-goal game of the year
- After not scoring a goal in the opener against Northwestern, Blue had scored in 15 straight games before going scoreless against Notre Dame
- Blue had contributed points in 42 consecutive games, a streak that dated back to the 2013 season, before having that streak snapped in the Notre Dame game
- Kelly Boyd scored a hat trick against Notre Dame, accounting for half of UVa's goals
- Every single Virginia player except one picked up at least one ground ball against Notre Dame
- Virginia is 8-2 in its last 10 games, including wins over then-No. 4 Duke (13-10) and then-No. 2 Boston College (15-13). Both of its losses have been to Notre Dame

ACC RANKINGS

- Courtney Swan leads the ACC, averaging 1.88 assists per game
- Swan is 11th in the nation with 32 assists
- Swan is fourth in the ACC and 15th in the nation, averaging 4.47 draw controls per game
- Swan is 10th in the ACC, averaging 3.59 points per game
- Casey Bocklet is second in the ACC, averaging 1.65 assists per game
- Bocklet is fifth in the ACC, averaging 3.88 points per game
- Bocklet is 21st in the nation with 28 assists
- Liza Blue is 11th in the ACC, averaging 2.41 goals per game
- Rachel Vander Kolk leads the ACC in saves per game (7.82)

RECORD WATCH AND MILESTONES

- Liza Blue moved into the top-10 career list in goals scored in the Navy game
- Blue is currently ranked in ninth place on the UVA career goals list with 133 goals and needs two goals to tie Brittany Kalkstein (2007-10) in eighth place and five goals to tie Kate Breslin (2004-07) in seventh place
- Blue has 128 career draw controls, ranking seventh on the career draws list. She needs three to tie Caitlin Banks (2001-04) in sixth place.
- Courtney Swan's 263 career draws currently ranks second in the Cavalier record book. She is 24 draws shy of tying Brittany Kalkstein (2007-10) for the top total in career history
- Swan has 72 career assists, which ranks in ninth place on the career list.
- Swan has 182 career points, needing 11 points to move into the program's top-10
- Casey Bocklet has 192 career points. She needs one point to tie Caitlin Banks (2001-04) and Josie Owen (2008-12) in ninth place on Virginia career points list
- Bocklet has 76 career assists, tying her for 7th place on the Virginia career list. She needs two assists to tie Blair Weymouth (2006-09) in sixth place

RANKINGS

- Virginia is currently No. 8 in both the IWLCA Coaches' Poll and the media poll
- The Cavaliers have been ranked in the top-10 in both polls all season long
- Virginia has been ranked as high as No. 4 in the IWLCA poll this season, the highest in-season ranking for the Cavaliers since the 2010 season,
- Virginia finished the 2014 season with a final ranking of No. 4, but its highest in-season ranking was No. 6 that year
- Virginia has spent four weeks ranked in the top-five this season

VIS UNRANKED OPPONENTS

- Since 2007, Virginia has only lost four times to unranked opponents, going 54-4 in that span against teams not ranked in the IWLCA Top-20
- One of those losses came last season when Virginia fell 15-13 at then-unranked Princeton.

SENIOR DAY

- Before the Virginia Tech game, the seven members of the senior class were honored in a pregame ceremony
- Over the last four, or in one case five years, these Cavaliers have helped Virginia make three trips to the NCAA Tournament, including leading Virginia back to the Final Four last season, and a probable return to the tournament this season. These seniors have helped elevate the team to its highest in-season ranking in the last five years, reaching No. 4 in the IWLCA polls after knocking off three undefeated teams this season.
- Collectively, these players have totaled over 600 points in their careers, scoring 419 goals with 197 assists. Three of them will be leaving their names in the Virginia career records list in the points, goals, assists and/or draw control categories. Four of them have earned All-America honors, one of them has started every single game since her freshman season. And one, Courtney Swan, has earned two prestigious academic honors, being named the Elite 89 Award winner at last season's NCAA Championship Weekend banquet, an award presented to the student-athlete with the highest GPA among all players in the championship games, as well as earning an ACC Postgraduate Scholarship this season.

SNAPPED SIX-GAME WIN STREAK

- Virginia had won six-straight games, its longest win streak since winning seven games in a row during the 2010 season, before falling to Notre Dame on Saturday
- Of those six victories, four were over ranked teams, three against top-10 teams and two against top-five teams

ONE-GOAL GAMES

- The Cavaliers have played five one-goal games this season, going 1-4 in those games
- Virginia earned a 16-15 road win at No. 9 Penn State
- The Cavaliers fell 13-12 in overtime to No. 16 Loyola and dropped regulation contests at No. 3 Syracuse and in the season-opening neutral-site game against No. 5 Northwestern. The Cavaliers fell 7-6 to Notre Dame in the opening round of the ACC Tournament

OPENING STRETCH

- The Cavaliers played five of their first six games on the road
- UVa played four top-10 opponents, all on the road, in its first six games, going 1-3
- The Cavaliers "home" opener against Harvard was relocated to Turf Field because of snow
- Virginia's first game at Klöckner Stadium was the 13-12 overtime loss to Loyola

100 CAREER GOALS

- Liza Blue scored her 100th career goal and won her 100th career draw control at Penn State
- Courtney Swan scored the 100th goal of her career against Duke
- Casey Bocklet scored the 100th goal of her career at Boston College

DEBUTS

- Freshman goalie Rachel Vander Kolk made her debut at Northwestern, logging five saves
- Freshman midfielder Meghan Heick also made her debut at Northwestern and was in the starting lineup for the first two games of the year
- Heick scored her first career goal at JMU
- Freshman midfielder Kasey Behr made her collegiate debut against Richmond, coming off the bench to score a goal, pick up a ground ball and win two draw controls
- Freshman midfielder Lilly DiNardo made her collegiate debut in the Harvard game
- Four Cavaliers made their Virginia debut at William & Mary. Freshmen Daniela Kelly, Jacqueline Wasilko and Ana Hagerup made their collegiate debuts in the game while Katherine Rueger, a transfer from Davidson, made her UVa debut
- Rueger picked up a ground ball and Hagerup took a shot in the W&M game

CAVALIERS VS RANKED OPPONENTS

- Virginia is 5-5 this season against ranked teams, 3-3 against top-10 teams and 2-2 against teams ranked 11-20
- Five of Virginia's first eight games were against top-10 opponents
- Eight of UVa's first 10 games were against top-20 opponents
- The game against BC was the second time this season UVa has taken on a team ranked second in the nation, falling to UNC when it was ranked No. 2
- The BC win was the second time in two weeks that Virginia took down a previously-undefeated team. Duke was 9-0, 3-0 ACC before coming to Charlottesville the Saturday before UVa defeated 10-0 BC in Newton

2014 NCAA TOURNAMENT

- This season Virginia has already played all three teams they faced during the 2014 NCAA Tournament, falling 13-12 in overtime to second-round opponent Princeton, falling 10-7 at North Carolina (last year's quarterfinal opponent) and 14-13 at Syracuse (last year's semifinal opponent).
- Virginia was one of six teams last season to earn a first-round bye, facing the Tigers in the 2nd round

ACC POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

- Courtney Swan has been announced as one of 53 recipients of the prestigious Weaver-James-Corrigan Award.
- These ACC postgraduate scholarships are awarded to selected student-athletes who intend to pursue a graduate degree following completion of their undergraduate requirements. Each recipient will receive \$5,000 toward his or her graduate education. Those honored have performed with distinction in both the classroom and their respective sport, while demonstrating exemplary conduct in the community. An additional eight student-athletes who plan to enter a professional career in their chosen sport were named honorary recipients.

TEWAARATON WATCH LIST

- Casey Bocklet and Courtney Swan are among the 25 nominees for the Tewaaraton Award, as announced on April 23
- Five men's and five women's finalists will be selected from these groups of 25
- The finalists will be announced on Thursday, May 7, and invited to the 15th annual Tewaaraton Award Ceremony will be held Thursday, May 28 in Washington, D.C., at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of the American Indian.

TEWAARATON WATCH LIST

- Casey Bocklet, Courtney Swan and Morgan Stephens were all named to the initial 50-player Tewaaraton Award Watch List.
- Liza Blue was one of five players added in the second round of midseason additions on April 9

'HOOS IN THE NATIONAL RANKINGS

- Virginia is one of five programs in the NCAA to be ranked at least once in every year of the IWLCA Coaches Poll. The poll was created in 1988, with Dartmouth, Maryland, Penn State and Princeton joining Virginia as the only programs to be nationally ranked every year.
- Of those five programs, Virginia is the only program to be ranked in every week of the IWLCA coaches poll, a span of 281-straight polls.
- Of those 281 polls, the Cavaliers have been ranked among the top-10 in the nation on 243 occasions, the second-most among all NCAA programs.
- The Cavaliers have spent 15 weeks ranked No. 1, including the entire 1993 season, en route to the program's second national championship.

- Bocklet had seven points on four goals with three assists in the win over Louisville
- It was her third ACC Player of the Week honor in the last four weeks

- Casey Bocklet was named the ACC Offensive Player of the Week and Rachel Vander Kolk was named the ACC Defensive Players of the Week (March 31)
- Bocklet, who was named the Co-Offensive Player of the Week the previous week, recorded a hat trick and added two assists against the previously unbeaten Eagles. She scored two of Virginia's first three goals at Boston College, setting the foundation for the Cavaliers' 6-0 run to start the game. In a 16-6 win at William & Mary, Bocklet recorded a career-high eight points on five goals and three assists. She has posted at least five points in each of Virginia's last three victories.
- Vander Kolk made an ACC single-game season-high 18 saves in Virginia's upset win at No. 2 Boston College and totaled 27 for the week after making nine in the 16-6 win at William & Mary. The freshman goalkeeper faced 41 shots by the Eagles, including five in the final two minutes of the game with Virginia leading 15-13. During that period, Vander Kolk came up with three saves and a ground ball after Cavalier teammate Wyatt Whitley caused a turnover in front of the net in the final 20 seconds of the game.
- It was the second career honor for Bocklet and the first for Vander Kolk

IL NATIONAL ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

- Rachel Vander Kolk was named Inside Lacrosse's Co-National Rookie of the Week (March 31), the second time she earned this honor
- "For the Cavaliers, it was rookie Rachel Vander Kolk who made the ultimate difference in Virginia's victory over then-undefeated Boston College on Saturday. Squaring off against some of the nation's most prolific scorers, Vander Kolk made 18 saves to lift her team over its second ranked opponent in just eight days. The Severna Park (Md.) native has started in every game for UVA this season, and boasts a .413 save percentage."

ACC CO-PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- Casey Bocklet was named the ACC Co-Player of the Week (March 24)
- Bocklet helped lead Virginia to a pair of wins over ranked teams, including a road win at No. 12 JMU and upsetting previously-undefeated Duke at Klockner Stadium

- Against JMU, Bocklet had one goal with three assists

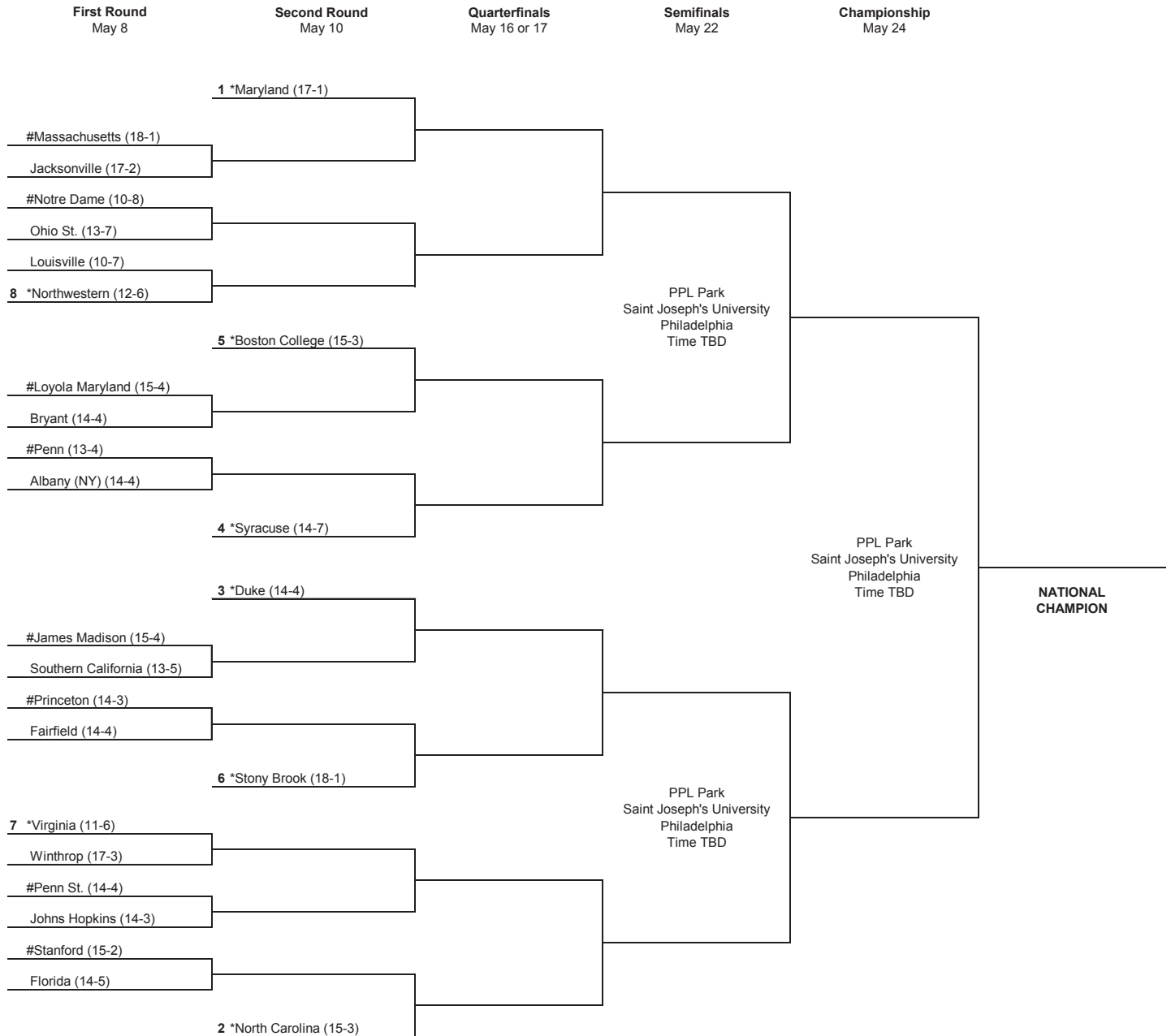
