FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- UVa is 19-18 all-time in the ACC Championship and 13-10 all-time in the semifinal round.
- UVa is not ranked in the USILA coaches poll for the third week in a row and only the seventh week all-time since the USILA coaches poll began in 1973. Three weeks in 1987 and one week in 2004 are the other times.
- Fr. Tanner Scales leads the nation's freshmen with 22 caused turnovers & Jr. Scott McWilliams is No. 2 in the nation with 35 caused turnovers.
- UVa's roster of 41 is made up 58.5% Fr. & Soph. (24), juniors are responsible for 54.7% of team scoring and the sophs & juniors together make up 76.8% of UVa's scoring in 2013.
- Mark Cockerton has 42 goals (leads nation) through his first 12 games played. Chris Bocklet, UVa's last player to amass over 50 goals had 33 goals through 12 games played.

GAME OVERVIEW

The Virginia Cavaliers (6-7) are seeded No. 4 in the 2013 ACC Championship and face the top-seeded Maryland Terrapins (9-2) on Friday in the first semifinal game of the tournament. Virginia is receiving votes this week in the USILA coaches poll, while Maryland is ranked No. 2 in this week's Nike/Inside Lacrosse media poll and No. 3 in the USILA coaches poll. Faceoff is scheduled for 5 p.m.

THE SERIES VS. THE TERRAPINS

2013 marked the 65th-straight season the Cavaliers and the Terrapins have clashed in a series that began in 1926. Friday marks the 14th time UVa and Maryland have met in the ACC Tournament and 10th time in the semifinal round. UVa holds a 7-6 record over the Terrapins in the ACC Championship, while Maryland holds the all-time series advantage with a 46-43 mark. However, Virginia has won 11 of the last 14 meetings, including the 2011 NCAA title game, 9-7, at M&T Bank Stadium. Maryland head coach John Tillman is in his third season after a successful three-year run at Harvard and returns 38 letterwinners and five starters off last season's national runner-up squad.

Widely regarded as one of the best teachers, motivators and tacticians in the game, Dom Starsia is in his 21st season at the helm of the Virginia men's lacrosse program.

Under Starsia's guidance, his Cavalier squads have won four NCAA titles and reached the final four 13 times. He has won more games than any coach in Atlantic Coast Conference and Virginia history, sporting a 246-83 (.748) record since coming to Charlottesville in 1993. In 21 seasons with Virginia, Starsia has coached 329 games, fittingly his 300th game at Virginia was the 2011 NCAA title game against Maryland at Baltimore's M&T Bank Stadium.

HALL OF FAMER STARSIA TOPS NCAA DI WINS LIST

- Virginia head coach Dom Starsia is one of the most accomplished coaches in the history of the college game coaching at Brown (1983-92) and Virginia (1993-present)
- He passed Jack Emmer for most career wins by a head coach while coaching at a NCAA Division I school with UVa's quarterfinal win over Cornell in 2011
- He becomes the second UVa head coach to hold the record as Jim Adams retired with 284 career victories after the 1992 season, giving way to Starsia to take the Cavalier program over in 1993 - Adams retired as the record holder
- He was inducted into the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November 2008
- He has led UVa to four national championships ('99, '03, '06, '11)
- His teams have made 24 NCAA Tournament appearances, the most by any Division I coach in history
- His Cavalier squads have advanced to the final four 13 times
- One of four coaches in college lacrosse history to win 100+ games at two schools (along with Jack Emmer, Dave Urlick and John Danowski joining the group this season)
- Only Division I coach to win 200+ games at one Division I school while winning 100+ at another Division I institution
- He is a three-time national coach of the year ('85, '91, '11)
- ACC Coach of the Year a record eight times

THE SERIES VS. MARYLAND

- Maryland leads the all-time series by a 46-43 margin in a rivalry that goes all the way back to 1926, the second year of the Virginia program
- The teams have met at least once every season since 1950, making this the second-longest current series of any Virginia opponent (behind Johns Hopkins, 1948)
- While Maryland owns the overall series advantage, of late UVa has won 11 of the last 14 meetings
- Since Dom Starsia took over the head coaching UVa duties in 1993 - UVa owns a 24-13 mark over Maryland
- Virginia's 10-9 victory during the Terps' trip to Charlottesville (2009) in seven overtimes against Maryland served as the longest game in the history of collegiate lacrosse at the time
- The contest still ranks as the longest in NCAA DI lacrosse history - NCAA DII member Queens University of Charlotte defeated Pfeiffer with 18 seconds left in the seventh overtime on March 26, 2011 to break the UVa and Maryland mark for collegiate mark
- Maryland has had remarkable success in games played in Charlottesville, winning 18-of-38 games throughout the long history of the rivalry
- Virginia, however, has had the better of it at Klöckner Stadium by taking 10 of the 13 games played there, including four of the last five
- Virginia is 9-16 against Maryland at home in games not played at Köckner Stadium - including a majority played inside Scott Stadium
- Maryland holds a 23-17 advantage in the series while playing at home, but since the Dom Starsia era began at UVa in 1993 the series is in UVa's advantage 6-4 in regular season games held in College Park, Md.
- UVa is 7-4 at neutral sites against Maryland, including 3-1 at M&T Bank Stadium
- UVa has won the last three times they have faced Maryland in Byrd Stadium, two games coming in 2010 - a regular season matchup and in the ACC Championship game and again in 2012
- Maryland broke through at Klöckner Stadium in March, winning 9-7, ironically the same scored UVa topped the Terrapins in the 2011 NCAA title game - UVa had won four in a row over Maryland at Klöckner Stadium
- Friday is the first ACC Championship meeting between UVa and Maryland since the 2010 final, a UVa triumph in College Park, 10-6

GUNNING FOR ACC TITLE

- Virginia has won six ACC Tournament championships (1997, 1999, 2000, 2003, 2006, 2010)
- Prior to the ACC establishing a tournament in 1989 to determine the league champion, Virginia won 11 ACC titles (1962, 1964, 1969, 1970, 1971, 1975, 1980, 1983, 1984, 1985 and 1986)
- From 1989-2013, Virginia has won 13 regular-season titles (1990, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997, 1999, 2000, 2002, 2003, 2006, 2010 and 2012), more than any other ACC School
- This is the first season UVa and Maryland have met in the ACC Championship since the 2010 final, a 10-6 triumph for the Cavaliers and their most recent ACC Tournament title

UVA HALTS HISTORICAL DROUGHT

- Virginia snapped its six-game losing streak on Saturday against Bellarmine
- In Dom Starsia's tenure at UVa, the Cavaliers have never had a losing streak of more than four games until this season
- It was the first six-game losing streak since a span between the 1965-66 seasons and the first six-game losing streak in the same season since the 1939 team went 0-8
- This recent drought is the first time UVa had lost six in a row since men's lacrosse became an NCAA Championship sport in 1971
- UVa last lost six games in a row when the Cavaliers opened the 1966 season with five-straight losses, a streak that started at the end of the 1965 season
- UVa's biggest drought was an 18-game losing streak that spanned the 1939, 1941, 1942 and 1947 seasons - there was a break of fielding a team during that span due to WWII
- UVa also owned a 16-game losing streak that spanned the 1927, 1928, 1929 and 1930 seasons

VIRGINIA NOT IN THE POLLS IS A RARE EXPERIENCE

- For the third week in a row Virginia is not ranked in either the USILA coaches or Nike/Inside Lacrosse media polls
- There have been 226 USILA coaches polls released since the inception of the poll in 1973, Virginia has been ranked in all but seven of them - a rate of 96.9 percent (219-of-226) of the USILA's weekly polls over the past 41 seasons have featured Virginia in the Top 20
- Virginia was not ranked for three weeks in 1987, one week in 2004 and three weeks this season

DEFENDING IN A QUARTER'S FINAL SECONDS

- Despite playing very well for long stretches on defense, an Achilles' heel for UVa this season is allowing goals in the final seconds of quarters
- Fourteen times this season UVa has allowed a goal in the final 30 seconds of a period and 13 of those goals came in the final 16 second of a period
- There have been 52 regulation periods in the UVa season this year - meaning that 25.0 percent of periods this year saw UVa yield a goal in final 16 seconds & 26.9 percent of periods UVa has yielded a goal in the final 30 seconds of the frame
- During UVa's recent six-game losing streak, the Cavaliers have given up a goal in the final seconds in every game but the Duke game - the Ohio State game saw the first three periods end with Buckeye goals
- UVa is 4-6 when allowing last second goals in a quarter and 2-1 when the Cavaliers don't yield any last second goals

VIRGINIA IS A GROUND BALL MACHINE

- According to UVa head coach Dom Starsia - "If there's any single statistic that speaks to your effort overall, then it's that one (ground balls)."
- Currently UVa leads the nation in ground balls at 40.77 per game
- Since the NCAA started including ground balls per game in their national rankings in 2009, UVa has never finished a season lower than No. 3 in ground balls per game
- UVa is the only school in the nation to finish in the Top-5 nationally in ground balls per game over the last five seasons
- Five other schools can only boast finishing in the Top-5 twice during the same span (Duke, Georgetown, Jacksonville, North Carolina, Robert Morris)
- Below is how UVa has fared over the last five seasons in ground balls:

THE UVa DEFENSE IS SCORING POINTS - LEADS THE NATION

- Virginia's starting close defense of Greg Danseglio, Harry Prevas and Scott McWilliams have scored a combined 11 points so far this season to lead the nation in defensive scoring
- The combination of long pole stick skills by the trio, the new rules that eliminate the horn and encourage fast starts, and the fact UVa opponents are clearing at a .838 clip are factors in the increase of UVa scoring from its close defense.
- Scott McWilliams has one goal and four assists, Greg Danseglio has two goals and three assists and Harry Prevas has one assist. Here is how UVa stacks up against other close defenses in the nation:

CAN'T SCORE UNLESS YOU CLEAR THE BALL

- Virginia registered a .907 percent success rate on clears in 2012, giving the Cavaliers three seasons in a row clearing the ball above .900 percent
- No other team in the nation boasts such a streak
- UVa cleared at a .900 rate in 2011 and a .922 rate in 2010
- During that time UVa twice ranked No. 3 in the nation in scoring offense, scoring 13.44 goals per game in 2010 and 12.56 goals per game in 2011. UVa ranked No. 11 in 2012 with 11.5 goals per game
- According to research in collaboration with all NCAA DI men's lacrosse SIDs, only eight teams have cleared at over .900 in a season, three times its been done by UVa, dating back to 1971 - the first year lacrosse was an NCAA Championship sport
- UVa records on clearing date back to 1971 - some schools like Syracuse (1983), only go back to a certain year in regards to clearing stats. Below is the current list of all-time .900+ clearing schools in a season:

CLEARING - THE CHRIS LAPIERRE FACTOR - DEBATE

- While no team boasts a streak of three seasons in a row of clearing the ball at a .900 percent clip - the current three-year streak for UVa are also the only three years in Dom Starsia's 20 seasons at Virginia where the Cavaliers have had a season with a .900 percent or better clearing rate
- The streak coincidentally started with the matriculation at Virginia of M Chris LaPierre. The senior has been a one-man clear for the Cavaliers and arguably the nation's top defensive midfielder over the past three seasons. Begs the question with UVa's current success clearing the ball - is it a coincidence, or is it the Chris LaPierre factor?
- The 2010, 2011 and 2012 seasons also happen to be the only seasons a UVa team has cleared the ball at .900 or better since lacrosse became an NCAA Championship sport in 1971
- The LaPierre Factor becomes a debate because of his limited play in 2013 due to injury and yet the Cavaliers are clearing at a .922 rate through 13 games

MATT WHITE SCORING STREAK

- Senior Matt White has scored at least one goal in his 26 of his last 36 games, tallying a total of 47 goals and 72 points
- During the span, White is shooting 34.1 percent (47-of-138) and he is shooting 63.5 percent (47-of-74) when his attempts are on goal
- White has been a hybrid lacrosse player of sorts, seeing time on attack and midfield since the end of his sophomore season, sometimes rotating between positions during the same game
- During the streak Matt White scored his 100th career point at Stony Brook (Feb. 23). He now has 121 career points on 74 career goals and 47 career assists

VIRGINIA IN OVERTIME UNDER DOM STARSIA

- Virginia played in its 37th overtime game since Dom Starsia took over the program in 1993
- UVa is 21-16 all-time in overtime under Dom Starsia. Seven of those losses came in NCAA Tournament action. UVa is 3-7 in OT games in the NCAA Tournament under Starsia
- Since the start of the 2007 season, UVa is 11-4 in overtime games under Starsia
- The four losses since 2007 came at Duke (2007), Syracuse in the NCAA semifinal in 2008, Johns Hopkins (2012) in a regular season matchup and recently this season at Syracuse (2013). The Hopkins game in 2012 was the only OT loss since 2007 at Klöckner Stadium
- Virginia is 12-2 all-time in OT games at Klöckner Stadium, which doubles as the record under Starsia
- The first loss was the 2000 meeting with Syracuse and the second was the 2012 Hopkins game
- Starsia is 12-3 all-time at home in OT games while at UVa - the 1998 Syracuse game was played at the Field Hockey Turf Field, resulting in a loss

CHRIS LAPIERRE SHUT DOWN FOR REST OF THE 2013 SEASON

- On March 20 Chris LaPierre was shut down for the remainder of the season with a lower extremity injury
- It is expected that the paperwork necessary to request a medical hardship enabling LaPierre to retain a year of eligibility will be filed. Per NCAA rules, such paperwork cannot be filed until the conclusion of the men's lacrosse season
- LaPierre appeared in three games this season and last played on March 5 vs. Vermont
- At the time of LaPierre being shut down on March 20, he was No. 6 in the nation among active players in career ground balls with 209
- LaPierre currently ranks No. 34 at UVa in career ground balls - He averages 3.9 ground balls per game for his career and in a full 2014 can position himself to finish career in the Top-5 all-time at UVa (271+)

DAN MARINIO MAKES COLLEGIATE DEBUT IN CAGE FOR CAVALIERS

- Dan Marino became only the sixth first-year at UVa to start a season-opening game in the cage since lacrosse became an NCAA Championship sport in 1971.
- The other Cavalier rookies to start in goal at UVa are Scott Howe (1972), Brian Gregory (1979), Derek Kenney (1999), Tillman Johnson (2001) and Adam Ghitelman (2008)
- Marino made 15 saves against Drexel in his debut, setting a UVa record for most saves by a UVa freshman goalie making his first career start
- The 15 saves are also the third-most by any UVa goalie making his first career start

- He scored again at Stony Brook, Syracuse, vs. Johns Hopkins and vs. Bellarmine
- Streep now owns 111 career points, courtesy of 82 goals and 29 assists

SENIOR CLASS BRINGING HOME THE WINS

- This year's senior class has amassed a 47-18 overall record for a .723 winning percentage
- This year's senior class is 25-9 at home, 12-6 on the road and 10-3 at neutral sites since the start of the 2010 season

INVINCIBLE UNDER THE KLÖCKNER LIGHTS

- Virginia has lost only five night games at Klöckner Stadium
- Overall UVa is 29-5 when playing under the lights at Klöckner Stadium
- Overall the Cavaliers had 21-consecutive night wins since moving to Klöckner in 1993
- UVa fell to Duke in 2008, the first night loss - a game that started at 6 p.m. in April daylight shadows
- Virginia dropped its second overall game under the Klöckner Stadium lights ironically also to Duke on April 17, 2010
- UVa dropped back-to-back night games at Klöckner Stadium for the first time with losses to Duke on April 13, 2012 and North Carolina in the ACC Tournament a week later on April 20, 2012
- Originally scheduled for 1 p.m. on March 9, 2013, the fifth loss came to Cornell after field conditions due to snow in the Charlottesville area pushed game back to an evening start

VIRGINIA WELCOMES TWO TRANSFERS TO ROSTER

- Senior A/M Charlie Streep looks to make his first appearance in a collegiate lacrosse game since May 15, 2011 when he was a junior at Bucknell
- Coincidentally that game was against Virginia at Klöckner Stadium in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Streep scored three goals and almost led the Bison to an upset of the eventual NCAA champions. UVa completed the epic finish in OT, 13-12
- After an ACL tear in the fall of 2011 kept Streep out of his senior campaign, upon his 2012 graduation from Bucknell he transferred to UVa and is taking graduate courses at UVa's Curry School
- Streep brought 104 career points from Bucknell (76 goals & 28 assists) to UVa's Grounds
- Also new to the roster is GK Matt Robertson who spent the 2011 season at Colgate
- Robertson appeared in two games in 2011, making one save and allowing one goal
- A UVa student in 2012, he did not play lacrosse
- Robertson walked on to the UVa team in the fall of 2012

DOM (INATION) OF THE USILA POLLS

- Since Dom Starsia took over as head coach of the Virginia program in 1993, there have been 226 USILA coaches polls, including this week's poll
- Of those 226 polls, Virginia has been ranked No. 1 in 55 of them
- Which means that over the past 20 seasons under Dom Starsia and entering 2013, Virginia has been ranked No. 1 in the nation 24.3 percent of the time
- The two programs closest to UVa's dominance are Syracuse at 46 weeks and Johns Hopkins at 41 weeks
- The USILA coaches poll is the oldest lacrosse poll and was established in 1973

LAXERS THAT HAVE LETTERED IN FOOTBALL

- Freshman Thompson Brown received a football letter at UVa in 2011 as a first-year and he retired from football and joined the lacrosse program during the fall of 2012
- Brown is only the fourth lacrosse player under Dom Starsia that gained at least one letter playing football at Virginia
- The other three are: *years lettered in parenthesis*
Andrew Dausch (FB: 1991-92-93-94; LAX: 1993-94-95)
Pat Kerney (FB: 1995-96-97-98; LAX: 1996)
Brian Pomper (FB: 2012; LAX: 2009-10)
- Former lacrosse letterwinners under Dom Starsia that also appeared on a UVa football roster at one time or another are as follows: Ned Bowen, Ryan Curtis, Steve Holmes and Matt Kelly

2013 CAPTAIN NAMED

- Midfielder Chris LaPierre has been selected as UVa's lone captain for the season
- LaPierre is the first lone captain at UVa since 1981 when Starsia's predecessor, Jim Adams, named Steve Kraus captain
- LaPierre becomes the 34th solo captain in UVa's men's lacrosse history dating back to the 1925 season
- LaPierre is only the sixth solo captain at UVa since 1968

CAVALIERS IN MIDWEEK GAMES

- Virginia has a 32-game winning streak going back to 2001 in regular-season mid-week games
- Virginia has three midweek games scheduled in 2013
- The last time the Cavaliers lost a midweek contest was an 11-8 loss to Notre Dame on March 14, 2001 (a Wednesday)
- Under head coach Dom Starsia, Virginia is 51-2 (.962) in mid-week games since 1993
- After losing his first mid-week game (9-6 to Princeton in 1993), the Cavaliers rattled off 22 wins in a row before that loss to Notre Dame 12 years ago

VIRGINIA IN THE POLLS

- Virginia has been ranked in the top five of the USILA Coaches poll 276 weeks
- UVa has been ranked in the Top 10 in 383 polls
- The USILA Poll began in 1973

GREEN GRASS OF KLÖCKNER BODES WELL

- This year's senior class has compiled an 23-8 record at Klöckner Stadium during their careers
- Their only losses at Klöckner were to Duke in 2010 & 2012, as well as setbacks in 2012 to Johns Hopkins and North Carolina in the ACC Tournament
- The last four losses have all come this season: The fifth loss came vs. Cornell, in a 12-11 thriller, the sixth loss also came this season vs. Ohio State, 11-10 and the seventh was to Maryland this season, 9-7 - and eighth was vs UNC, 10-7
- Overall Virginia is 112-23 (.829) all-time at Klöckner (since 1993), including 11-1 in the NCAA Championship
- Three scheduled home games are not included in record for the 2013 seniors - 2010 Stony Brook game played at UHall Turf Field and 2011 Maryland game played at Scott Stadium - 2013 Mount St. Mary's game played at UHall Turf Field

HONORING CHRIS SANDERSON - 22

- Former UVa goalie Chris Sanderson, a letterwinner from 1995-98, lost his battle with brain cancer this past June
- UVa is honoring Chris this season with decals on the back of all game helmets with Sanderson's No. 22 on it
- Sanderson was the starting goalie on Team Canada's 2006 FIL World Championship team and battled cancer since 2008 - he also played in the 2010 World Championships and was Lacrosse Magazine's 2010 Comeback Player of the Year
- Sanderson played briefly in the MLL in 2010 for the Toronto Nationals and spent four seasons in the NLL - he currently ranks No. 5 at UVa with 495 career saves

VIRGINIA ALUMNI IN MAJOR LEAGUE LACROSSE

- Virginia seniors Chris LaPierre and Matt White were selected in the 2013 MLL Draft. LaPierre was the No. 2 overall selection to Hamilton and White went in the fourth round (28th overall) to Charlotte

- 1994 and 2010 were the best seasons under Starsia as each team had 10 different players have at least 10 goals
- 2001 and 2004 are tied for the lowest total in a year at 5 different players -
- UVa had seven different double digit goal scorers in 2012
- Under Starsia, UVa has averaged 4.05 different players a year with at least 10 assists
- In 2012 UVa only had three players (Stanwick, Briggs, White) with at least 10 assists
- There were four other Cavaliers with at least five assists
- Currently six Cavaliers have double digits in goals and three do so in assists

Eleven seconds into the first overtime period, Virginia's Matt White scored his second career overtime goal off a feed from Nick O'Reilly to give the Cavalier men's lacrosse team (1-0) a 13-12 win over Drexel (0-1) on a blustery afternoon at Klöckner Stadium. White's other overtime goal came against Bucknell in the 2011 NCAA Tournament. The win gives UVa its sixth consecutive season-opening win over the Dragons.

While White scored the game-winner inside the left post, it was set up by an unsettled situation off the faceoff that opened the overtime period. Drexel's Deven Thomas beat Mick Parks on the draw, pulling the ball back toward the Dragons' goal. UVa's Rob Emery beat all players to the ball to set up a transition. Emery found O'Reilly, who quickly found White for the score.

The game started heavily in Virginia's favor. The Cavaliers scored twice before Drexel even shot the ball. Twenty-one seconds into the game Emery scored unassisted, followed by an O'Reilly unassisted goal at 12:25. UVa concluded its 3-0 run with another score by O'Reilly at 4:10 in the first quarter.

Drexel streaked on a 5-1 run, entering the intermission with a 5-4 advantage. Five different Dragons scored and Ben McIntosh capped the run with his goal with eight seconds left in the first half.

The scoring in the second half was slow to start. Until Matt Cockerton grabbed a carom off Drexel goalie Will Gabrielson and deposited at 8:54, no ball ripped nylon in the second half. Cockerton's goal tied the game at 5-5. Pat Harbeson followed up with a goal about a minute later to give UVa a 6-5 lead, but was flagged after the goal for unsportsmanlike conduct. The penalty was a full-time served penalty with no ensuing faceoff. Andrew Vivian quickly tied the game as a result, 6-6, with 7:42 left.

Vivian's goal was part of a 3-1 Drexel run that gave the Dragons an 8-7 lead with 2:00 minutes to play in the third quarter. Virginia responded with a 4-1 run of its own that included goals by Bobby Hill, Parks and White. Owen Van Arsdale added a man-down score of his own, the first UVa man-down score since the 2011 season. White's third goal of the game capped the run with 5:15 left to play, as UVa held a narrow 11-9 lead.

Drexel scored the next two via Aaron Prosser and Frank Fusco, tying the game, 11-11, with 1:23 left to play.

Thomas won the ensuing faceoff, but Scott McWilliams stripped Garrett McIntosh, giving UVa the ball back. Charlie Streep scored his first career Virginia goal with 49 seconds left, giving UVa the narrow 12-11 lead.

Drexel won the next faceoff and Robert Chrch's shot was blocked out front, Belka beat UVa goalie Dan Marino to the ball in front of the crease, quickly depositing the ball in the goal with eight second remaining, setting up the winner-take-all scenario.

True to form of the Virginia-Syracuse series, it took overtime to decide the 29th all-time meeting, as the No. 6 Cavaliers (4-1) lost for the first time this season, falling inside the Carrier Dome to the No. 18 Orange (2-1), 9-8.

Mick Parks won the faceoff to start the overtime period, his 16th win in 21 attempts on the night. Matt White attempted a shot, but the shot was saved by Syracuse goalie Bobby Wardwell, starting the Orange offensive possession.

After a timeout, Dylan Donahue found Kevin Rice who slipped the ball past UVa goalie Dan Marino with 1:00 left in the first

The Catamounts started the second half scoring at 8:49 when Graham Horvath scored on an A.J. Masson helper. Van Arsdale and Greg Coholan scored back-to-back goals to tie the game, 7-7, ending the third quarter scoring. Van Arsdale also assisted Coholan's goal.

Horvath and Yager wasted no time in the fourth quarter, giving Vermont a 9-7 lead with 12:04 to play. Patrick Clark assisted both goals.

Virginia came roaring back, scoring three goals in a row to take a 10-9 lead, its first since the 3:44 mark in the first quarter. Ryan Tucker scored on an Emery pass, followed by a James Pannell goal via a Charlie Streep dime. Emery found Tucker again to cap the run at 5:26.

Nick O'Reilly had four goals and one assist, but it wasn't enough as the No. 9 Virginia Cavaliers (5-3) dropped a Saturday afternoon meeting with the No. 12 Ohio State Buckeyes (5-1) inside Klöckner Stadium, 11-10. UVa's three losses this season are by a combined three goals and each opponents' game-winning goal has all come in either overtime, or in the final 1:31 of regulation.

The game's first three quarters were separated from the games final 15 minutes by a lightning delay that lasted one hour and 43 minutes. Mark Cockerton scored six goals and Matt White tallied four, but it wasn't enough as the No. 7 Duke Blue Devils (10-4, 2-1 ACC) used a 7-0 run in the fourth quarter to dispatch of the Virginia Cavaliers (5-7, 0-3 ACC) on Friday night, 19-16, in front of 3,072 fans at Koskinen Stadium. Virginia is in the midst of a six-game losing streak, the first time the Cavaliers have lost six games in a row in the same season since 1939. Mark Cockerton scored four goals and Rob Emery added three tallies of his own, as the Virginia Cavaliers (6-7) halted their six-game losing streak, 12-7, over the Bellarmine Knights (7-5) at Klöckner Stadium.

Tyler German set the table for Virginia winning 14-of-21 faceoffs for the Cavaliers in place of Mick Parks, who missed the game while attending a funeral in Illinois. German was 6-of-6 in the third quarter, a crucial stretch in the game where Virginia extended a one-goal halftime lead into a three-goal advantage, 8-5.

Cockerton started things for the Cavaliers with a goal at the 9:42 mark to give UVa the early 1-0 lead. Bellarmine answered back scoring at 6:28 on a Ryan Scinta goal and again with five seconds left on an unassisted goal by Karsen Leung. Bellarmine ended the first period with a 2-1 advantage, its only lead of the game.

Virginia outscored Bellarmine 3-1 in the second frame to enter intermission with a 4-3 lead. Bobby Hill started things with a goal on a Nick O'Reilly pass with 11:00 on the clock. Emery found nylon the other two times in the period for UVa, including capping the game's first half scoring with 35 seconds left.

The third quarter was silent until the 6:37 marker when Bellarmine's Michael Ward scored to tie the game, 4-4. Virginia answered back with goals by Owen Van Arsdale and Cockerton, giving UVa the 6-4 lead. Ward scored again at 2:59 to cut the Knights' deficit back down to one goal, 6-5. Cockerton ripped a goal from about 15-yards and then Emery dodged off a swim move through two defenders to cap the third quarter scoring with three seconds left.

Virginia entered the final stanza with a three-goal lead, 8-5, but Bellarmine got to within two goals, 8-6, when Cameron Gardner scored with 13:36. The Knights never got closer as UVa reeled off four goals in a row by Cockerton, Van Arsdale, James Pannell and Charlie Streep. After Streep scored with 4:29 left, UVa held a 12-6 advantage and then proceeded to empty its bench. Luke Acton of Bellarmine scored with 1:21 to finish the game's scoring, as UVa held onto the 12-7 triumph.
