

Hall of Fame Coach Enters 22nd Season at the Helm of Cavaliers

Widely regarded as one of the best teachers, motivators and tacticians in the game, Dom Starsia is in his 22nd season at the helm of the Virginia men's lacrosse program.

Under Starsia's guidance, his Cavalier squads have won four NCAA titles and reached the final four 13 times. He has won more games than any coach in Atlantic Coast Conference and Virginia history, sporting a 247-84 (.746) record since coming to Charlottesville in 1993. In 21 seasons with Virginia, Starsia has coached 331 games, fittingly his 300th game at Virginia was the 2011 NCAA title game against Maryland at Baltimore's M&T Bank Stadium.

Starsia's overall record, including 10 seasons at Brown, is 348-130 (.728) in 31 years. His 348 wins are the most all-time by a coach at a Division I school, passing legendary coach Jack Emmer (326). The record-breaking triumph was an impressive 13-9 victory over No. 2 seed Cornell in the 2011 NCAA quarterfinal round. The victory was part of UVa's improbable run to the program's fifth NCAA title.

UVa failed to make the NCAA Tournament in 2013 for only the second time under Starsia's watch, finishing 7-8 and losing to North Carolina in the ACC Championship game. Playing one of the toughest schedules in the nation, Starsia's young team lost seven of its eight games by three goals or less, including three losses coming in the final minute of regulation or overtime. The Cavaliers led the nation in ground balls with 39.93 per game and have never finished lower than No. 3 since the NCAA started tracking the stat in 2009. Junior Mark Cockerton finished No. 2 in the nation with 3.5 goals per game.

The 2012 season saw the graduation of Steele Stanwick. Under Starsia, Stanwick was a two-time first-team All-American, a Tewaaraton Trophy winner and set the program record for most career points with 269. Stanwick's 269 career points upon graduation placed the attackman No. 18 all-time in NCAA history.

Starsia's program in 2011 became the first five-loss team and lowest national seed (No. 7) to win an NCAA title. UVa's efforts helped garner Starsia an ESPY nomination for Best Coach and a waltz down the red carpet at Los Angeles' Nokia Theatre in July 2011. Starsia was going up in his category against the likes of UConn's Jim Calhoun, Dallas Mavericks' Rick Carlisle, Auburn's Gene Chizik and Green Bay Packers' Mike McCarthy. Carlisle, ironically a UVa graduate, took home the award.

The USILA bestowed its top honor on Starsia in 2011, naming him the 2011 F. Morris Touchstone Division I Head Coach of the Year. Starsia became the first Virginia head coach to win the award, an honor which was first presented in 1958. The accolade is Starsia's third career F. Morris Touchstone Award, previously winning at Brown in 1985 and 1991. Starsia is now in a four-way tie for the most times being awarded in the history of the USILA honor. Richard M. Moran (Cornell), Robert Scott (Johns Hopkins) and Tony Seaman (Pennsylvania/Towson) share the honor with Starsia with three career F. Morris Touchstone Awards apiece. Only Starsia is an active head coach.

No one would have figured an NCAA title in 2011 was improbable for Virginia when the Cavaliers were ranked No. 1 in the USILA coaches preseason poll and No. 2 in

the Nike/Inside Lacrosse preseason media poll. They still may not have figured it was out of the realm of possibility through the first eight games of the season when UVa was ranked No. 2 with a 7-1 record. Then Virginia hit a skid, losing 4-of-5 games and losing defensive stalwart Matt Lovejoy to season ending shoulder surgery to compound other personnel changes.

After reinventing its offensive and defensive approach on the fly, UVa entered the regular season finale against No. 13 Penn with an 8-5 record and the threat of losing an NCAA first round hosting bid. Heading on the road for the first time in program history for a first round NCAA game all of a sudden became a strong possibility. UVa closed out the regular season with an impressive 11-2 victory over the Quakers, starting an impressive five game stretch where the Cavaliers played their best lacrosse of the season. Matt White's overtime goal against Bucknell in the NCAA first round capped a UVa comeback that saw the Cavaliers trail by as many as four goals in the second half and by two with two minutes left in regulation. 2011 Tewaaraton Trophy winner Steele Stanwick had 21 points in the NCAA Tournament to lead the Cavaliers, while Colin Briggs' five goals in the title game against Maryland earned the midfielder Most Outstanding Player honors of the NCAA Championship.

"The fact that we are here right now is a credit to the team and my family and the people at Virginia," said Starsia after winning his fourth title with the Cavaliers. "We had to reconfigure ourselves midway through the season - they had to decide that it was important enough to pick themselves up and get going again. The game today epitomized the kind of season that we've had - that we have started out well - put some goals in the second quarter when we got ahead a little

bit and gave us some confidence going into the locker room. I am very proud of these guys and what they have done."

The 2011 title is just another bolded bullet point on an already impressive resume. Starsia is one of only three coaches in the history of the sport to win 100-plus games at two different schools. In addition to his 240 UVa wins, he won 101 games at Brown from 1983-92. Jack Emmer won 100-plus games at both Washington & Lee and Army, while Dave Urick topped the century mark at Hobart and Georgetown.


In fitting recognition of his coaching success, Starsia was inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November 2008, one of only four active Division I coaches so honored.

"The wins and losses are fickle at best," Starsia said during his induction speech. "It's the relationships that stand the test of time. Coaching has never been a career choice. It's my life. During my interview [with UVa], I was asked to describe myself. I didn't know how to respond. I said, 'honest, and I'll work hard.' And it's really never been more than that."

During his coaching tenure, Virginia has featured 125 All-Americans (30 first-team, 31 second-team, 25 third-team and 39 honorable mention choices), 71 All-ACC selections, eight ACC Rookies of the Year and seven ACC Players of the Year. In addition, UVa has produced five NCAA Championship MVPs (Michael Watson in 1996, Conor Gill in 1999, Tillman Johnson in 2003, Matt Ward in 2006 and Colin Briggs in 2011) and 37 All-NCAA Tournament selections, all since 1994.

Starsia's program never wavers from the emphasis on sportsmanship. Following the national championship season

of 2003, the program received the Jim Adams Award, the national lacrosse award for sportsmanship. The next year the team slipped to a 5-8 record but still received the Atlantic Coast Conference's Sportsmanship Award in the first year it was presented. The program then won the league's sportsmanship award for three years afterward.

"Sportsmanship remains a priority for us, and the fact that we have been able to win these awards in all different kinds of seasons, I think speaks a lot about the ideals that

are important in this program," said Starsia.

Excellence in Starsia's program isn't only defined by what happens on the field. His teams excel in the classroom as well. Fifteen Cavaliers have been named Scholar All-Americans under his tutelage, including at least one in five of the last six seasons. Ben Rubeor earned All-America recognition for his athletic excellence as well as his academic prowess as a junior (2007) and senior (2008). In 2008 five of the seven Cavaliers who were named All-Americans posted GPAs above 3.0. Danny Glading (2009) and Ken Clausen (2010) concluded their All-American seasons on the field as Scholar All-Americans as well.

The fall of 2009 brought national attention to his program's humanitarian efforts, highlighted by senior Max Pomper being honored with the IMLCA Boston Market Humanitarian Award for his efforts in raising nearly \$10,000 for UVa's HELP crisis hotline through a flag football tournament initiated in remembering fallen teammate Will Barrow. Clausen gained national attention with his "Lacrosse Mustache Madness" initiative, a nation-wide effort that raised nearly \$33,000 in November 2009 for prostate cancer research and awareness. Both efforts more than tripled their fundraising efforts by year four in the fall of 2012. Clausen's Mustache Madness moved its fundraising efforts to help the HEADstrong Foundation and fighting various blood cancers.

Under Starsia's direction, the Cavaliers have enjoyed a remarkable era of success that is rivaled by few programs. In addition to winning four NCAA championships, UVa has reached the title game two other times, the semifinals seven more times and the quarterfinals three times under Starsia. Overall, Virginia has advanced to the Final Four 13 times in Starsia's 20 seasons at the helm.

Virginia's 2006 squad will go down as one of the greatest in the sport's history. Starsia led the men in orange and blue to an unprecedented 17-0 record en route to the program's third national championship in eight years. The team was dominant throughout the season, winning by an average of more than eight goals per game. The offense led the country in scoring (15.28), while the defense ranked 10th, allowing fewer than eight goals per game. Eight Cavaliers were named All-America, the most in program history, and senior Matt Ward received the Tewaaraton Trophy as the best player in the nation.

The Cavaliers won their second national championship under Starsia in 2003 when they capped an exciting fourgame title run with a 9-7 victory over top-ranked Johns Hopkins in the NCAA finals. The Cavaliers closed the season with a 10-game winning streak to win both the ACC and NCAA championships and finished with a 15-2 overall record.

In 1999, Starsia guided the program to its first national championship in 27 years with a thrilling 12-10 victory over Syracuse in the NCAA title game. Virginia concluded that historic campaign with a 13-3 record. The Cavaliers

also won their second ACC Tournament crown in three years with an 8-7 come-from-behind victory over top-seeded Duke.

The list of exceptional athletes to play for him reads like a "Who's Who" of the lacrosse world. Steele Stanwick (2011), Matt Ward (2006) and Chris Rotelli (2003) capped their national championship seasons by winning the Tewaaraton Trophy as the top player in the nation, giving UVa the most first-time winners of the award.

Ward was also named the USILA Player of the Year in 2006, one of three Cavaliers to win national honors that season; Michael Culver was named the Defenseman of the Year, while Kyle Dixon was selected the Midfielder of the Year.

Tillman Johnson became the only player in the program's history to win two USILA national awards in one season. He turned in two electric performances in the 2003 Final Four and was named the Player of the Year and Goalie of the Year.

Two icons of the sport-Jay Jalbert and Conor Gill-won a national championship at UVa in 1999, before going on to continued success at the professional level. Jalbert was the MVP of Major League Lacrosse in 2003, while Gill was named the league's MVP in 2004. Matt Poskay won a title with UVa in 2006 and was named the MLL's MVP in 2010.

Virginia claimed two national award winners in the same season for the first time ever in 1996 when Doug Knight was named Player of the Year and Michael Watson was chosen Attackman of the Year. Two more Cavaliers received USILA national awards in 1999 as Ryan Curtis was selected Defenseman of the Year and Jalbert was named Midfielder of the Year.

A native of Valley Stream, N.Y., Starsia came to UVa from his alma mater, Brown University, where he distinguished himself as an outstanding coach and athlete.

Starsia became Brown's head lacrosse coach in 1982 and compiled a 10-year record of 101-46, while establishing himself as one of the top young coaches in the game. His teams boasted the best Ivy League record and the best overall record for any Ivy League school over that 10-year span. While at Brown-where he remains second on the school's list for most wins-he developed five first-team All-Americans, 20 Ivy League first-team players, four Ivy League Players of the Year, and three Ivy League Rookies of the Year.

He took the Bears to the NCAA playoffs in five of his last six years, including the last three. The Bears won two Ivy League titles (1985 and 1991) and advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals three consecutive seasons (1990-92). Starsia led them to their finest season in 1991 with their first-ever undefeated regular season (13-0). They also won the Ivy League title and the New England Championship, and finished with a No. 2 national ranking. Starsia received his first two Morris Touchstone Award as the Division I Coach of the Year in 1985 and 1991 while at Brown.

An outstanding high school football player, Starsia had never seen a lacrosse game before entering Brown as a student in 1970. Showing natural talent for the game, however, he became one of the best defensemen in school history. He was a third-team All-American in 1973 and 1974, earning first-team All-Ivy and All-New England

both years. He captained the Bears in 1974 and played in one NCAA playoff game as well as the annual North-South game.

Starsia also captained the freshman football team and played wide receiver on the varsity for two seasons. He was inducted into the Brown University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1981 and the New England Lacrosse Hall of Fame (Newton, Mass.) in 1996. He received the Frank Lanning Award for lifetime achievement of overall contribution to the Rhode Island sports community from the Rhode Island Organization of Sportswriters and Sportscasters in 1992. In 2000, Starsia was chosen one of Brown's "Top 100 Athletes of the Twentieth Century" and to the Brown men's lacrosse "Team of the Millennium."

Starsia earned his bachelor's degree in American Civilization in 1974. Upon graduation, he joined the Brown athletic staff as a full-time assistant to the legendary men's soccer and lacrosse coach Cliff Stevenson. Starsia coached the women's soccer team from 1974 to 1976 and succeeded Stevenson as head lacrosse coach in 1982.

He was a standout club player following his playing days at Brown and was named Club Defenseman of the Year in 1979 and club All-American in 1977, 1978, 1979 and 1980.

Starsia is also active in the lacrosse community on a national level. He currently serves on the NCAA Championship advisory committee, the USILA All-American selection committee, the Tewaaraton Trophy selection committee, as well as the ACC Sportsmanship Committee and received the Howdy Myers Man of the Year Award in 2006.

He has been the president of the Men's Council of U.S. Lacrosse and a member of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Executive Committee. He has coached in the North-South game twice; a North win in 1990 and a South win in 2005.

Starsia was inducted into the Central Virginia chapter of the US Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 2003 and is a charter member of Brown University's Advisory Council on Athletics.

Marc Van Arsdale is in his 13th year as the top assistant coach on Dom Starsia's staff and his eighth as associate head coach.

One of the outstanding teachers in the college game, he is heavily involved in all aspects of the program and serves as the team's offensive coordinator. A master offensive tactician, Van Arsdale has overseen some of the most potent offenses in school history.

Under Van Arsdale's guidence in 2013 attackman Mark Cockerton finished No. 2

Under Van Arsdales guidence in 2013 attackman Mark Cockerton finished No. 2 in the nation with 3.5 goals per game, while attackman Nick O'Reilly was No. 6 in the nation with 2.53 assists per game.

The 2012 season saw All-American Steele Stanwick lead the nation in assists per game (3.19) and finish No. 2 in points per game (5.0) under Van Arsdale's offensive tutelage. Stanwick graduated as a two-time first-team All-American, a Tewaaraton Trophy winner and set the program record for most career points with 269. Stanwick's 269 career points upon graduation placed the attackman No. 18 all-time in NCAA history.

In 2011 Virginia ranked No. 3 in scoring with average of 12.56 goals per game, 6.94 assists per game and 19.50 points per game. Stanwick won the Tewaaraton Trophy after scoring 21 points (9 g, 12 a) in the NCAA Tournament, leading UVa to the title. Stanwick finished the season No. 3 in the nation with 2.24 assists per game and No. 4 in

In 2010 Virginia ranked No. 3 in scoring with an average of 13.44 goals per game.

In 2010 Virginia ranked No. 3 in scoring with an average of 13.44 goals per game, 8.17 assists per game and 21.61 points per game. Chris Bocklet burst onto the scene as the sophomore scored 53 goals, second-most in a season all-time by a Cavalier. Bocklet became the first UVa player to amass the 50-goal plateau since Doug Knight set the single-season record with 56 scores in 1996. The balanced scoring attack in 2010 saw 10 Cavaliers reach double figures in goals scored.

In 2009 Virginia ranked first in scoring with an average of 13.0 goals per game, 7.83 assists per game and 20.83 points per game. Garrett Billings led the team with 38 goals as all three starting attackmen scored at least 30 goals for the second straight season and only the third time in school history. Joining him in the scoring parade was Steele Stanwick (36) and Danny Glading (32). UVa also boasted a top-notch scoring midfield behind first team All-American Shamel Bratton (31) and third team All-American Brian Carrell (30)

Carroll (29).

Billings (36) and Glading (30) were also part of the 2008 starting attack trio that reached the 30-goal plateau, spearheaded by Ben Rubeor's team-leading 38 scores. Carroll chipped in 28 goals and his first third team All-American nod.

Virginia rolled to an undefeated national championship seven years ago with one of the most explosive offenses in recent memory. The Cavaliers led the nation in scoring with an average of 15.82 goals per game, the most by a Division I team since the 1997 UVa squad averaged more than 18 goals per game. Their 269 goals were the most by a D-I team since UVa tallied 275 times in 1996.

Under Van Aradle's guidance that season. Matt Ward was named the USH A Player.

Under Van Arsdale's guidance that season, Matt Ward was named the USILA Player of the Year and was awarded the Tewaaraton Trophy as the nation's top player, while Kyle Dixon was named the USILA Midfielder of the Year. Van Arsdale himself was recognized as the Division I Assistant Coach of the Year following the season.

The Cavaliers have ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring in six of the last seven seasons, including the last four. In addition, Virginia featured the ACC leader in goals, assists and points in 2002, '03 and '06.

Van Arsdale returned to Charlottesville following a five-year stint (1997-2001) as the head coach at Pennsylvania, where he led the Quakers to a 27-39 overall record. During his first year, he coached Penn to its first .500 season (6-6) of the '90s. Following the 2000 season, he was selected to coach the South All-Stars in the Collegiate North-South

Senior All-Star game.

"It would be difficult for me to describe adequately how fortunate we are to have Marc on our staff," said Starsia. "He has been a great influence on my own development, on and off the field. Everyone associated with the Virginia lacrosse program benefits from

his experience and leadership. There are two head coaches on this staff."

his experience and leadership. There are two head coaches on this staft."

Prior to taking over the program at Penn, Van Arsdale spent six years as an assistant coach at UVa, first under former head coach Jim Adams (1991-92) and later as a member of Starsia's first staff (1993-96). The Cavaliers reached the NCAA Championships five times in that six-year span, advancing to the national championship game in 1994 and 1996, and to the national semifinals in 1995.

During his first stint at UVa, Van Arsdale was instrumental in recruiting and developing some of the most talented offensive players to ever wear the orange and blue, including David Curry, Doug Knight, Kevin Pehlke, Tucker Radebaugh, Greg Traynor, Michael Watson and Tim Whitelev.

Watson and Tim Whiteley.

The native of Geneva, N.Y., is a 1985 magna cum laude graduate of Hobart College, where he excelled both academically and athletically. He played on four Division III championship teams, earning first-team All-America and National Division III Attack-

man of the Year honors as a senior.

Chosen the Most Valuable Player in the D-III championship game in 1983 and 1985, Van Arsdale led the Statesmen in scoring his last two seasons and played in the North-South game his senior year. He finished his collegiate career among the school's top-10

all-time leaders for assists, goals and scoring.

Van Arsdale received an NCAA postgraduate scholarship in 1985 after being named to the Dean's List all four years at Hobart. He was also chosen a Presidential Scholar and was elected a member of the Phi Beta Kappa honor society.

The 49-year-old Van Arsdale began his coaching career as an assistant men's lacrosse coach at Nazareth College in 1986. From 1987-90, he served as an assistant at his alma mater, Hobart, helping guide the Statesmen to four consecutive Division III national

championships.

He was inducted into the Hobart College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001, along with his brother Guy (Hobart class of 1983) and father William (athletic benefactor). He is also a member of the Geneva Sports Hall of Fame and Western New York Lacrosse Hall of Fame. Van Arsdale also was inducted into the Virginia Lacrosse Hall of Fame on March

In addition to his extensive coaching experience, Van Arsdale has served on the USILA All-American Selection Committee and the advisory committee for team selections to the NCAA Championship.

Van Arsdale's son Owen, is a junior on the 2014 UVa men's lacrosse team after a stellar

local prep career at St. Anne's-Belfield. Van Arsdale's wife, the former Karen Salemo, was an All-American women's lacrosse player at William Smith.

Joe Starsia joined his father's staff in September 2013 after two successful seasons as an assistant coach at Colgate.

"I am excited for our program that one of the bright, young lights in our profession will be bringing his passion and expertise to Charlottesville," Dom Starsia said. "Joe has had some excellent mentors in his coaching journey and in three of the past four seasons, his teams have experienced the greatest success in their program's history. He will go to work immediately at the defensive end of the field but will be involved in all aspects of the program here at Virginia."

Starsia's two-year stint at Colgate was highly successful. The Raiders made one NCAA appearance and Peter Baum won the 2012 Tewaaraton Trophy. While at Colgate, Starsia was the team's coordinator for defense and recruiting.

Colgate finished the 2012 season with a program-best 14 wins and the Red Raiders' highest national ranking at No. 8 in the final Nike/Inside Lacrosse Media Poll after advancing to the NCAA quarterfinals. The team also set a total of 29 individual and team records including 13 program records, 15 Patriot League records and one NCAA single-season record.

Starsia joined the Colgate staff from NCAA DIII Dickinson College, where he served as an assistant coach. He helped lead the Red Devils to back-to-back historic seasons, posting a school-record 17 wins in 2011. The team advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals that season before falling to eventual national champion Salisbury. Dickinson posted a school-best 15-3 record in 2010, and went on to better that mark with the 17-2 campaign in 2011. He also mentored one of his defensemen, John Haire, to All-America honors in both 2010 and 2011.

Prior to coaching at Dickinson, Starsia was a standout defenseman and assistant coach at Lynchburg College. As a player, Starsia and the Hornets won two Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) titles and made three NCAA Tournament appearances. He graduated with a degree in sport management and a minor in English in 2006, and earned a master's of education with an emphasis in educational leadership from Lynchburg College in 2008.

He made the Dean's List in 2004, 2005 and 2006 while also garnering Academic All-ODAC honors each of those years. He was honored by his teammates with the David Zimmer Team Spirit Award in 2003, 2005 and 2006.

During his coaching tenure, Lynchburg advanced to the ODAC final twice, winning the championship in 2008 and finishing second in 2007. He was involved in all aspects of the program, which has a strong tradition in the sport of men's lacrosse.

Starsia and his wife, Pam, currently reside in Charlottesville. The couple welcomed their first child in October, a son, Dominic.







2013 SEASON IN REVIEW

Game 1 Virginia 13, Drexel 12 - OT Feb. 16 • Charlottesville, Va.

Eleven seconds into the first overtime period, Virginia's Matt White scored his second career overtime goal off a feed from Nick O'Reilly to give the Cavalier men's lacrosse team (1-0) a 13-12 win over Drexel (0-1) on a blustery afternoon at Klöckner Stadium. White's other overtime goal came against Bucknell in the 2011 NCAA Tournament. The win gives UVa its sixth consecutive season-opening win over the Dragons.

While White scored the gamewinner inside the left post, it was set up by an unsettled situation off the faceoff that opened the overtime period. Drexel's Deven Thomas beat Mick Parks on the draw, pulling the ball back toward the Dragons' goal. UVa's Rob Emery beat all players to the ball to set up a transition. Emery found O'Reilly, who quickly found White for the score.

The game started heavily in Virginia's favor. The Cavaliers scored twice before Drexel even shot the ball. Twenty-one seconds into the game Emery scored unassisted, followed by an O'Reilly unassisted goal at 12:25. UVa concluded its 3-0 run with another score by O'Reilly at 4:10 in the first quarter.

Drexel streaked on a 5-1 run, entering the intermission with a 5-4 advantage. Five different Dragons scored and Ben McIntosh capped the run with his goal with eight seconds left in the first half.

The scoring in the second half was slow to start. Until Matt Cockerton grabbed a carom off Drexel goalie Will Gabrieslson and deposited at 8:54, no ball ripped nylon in the second half. Cockerton's goal tied the game at 5-5. Pat Harbeson followed up with a goal about a minute later to give UVa a 6-5 lead, but was flagged after the goal for unsportsmanlike conduct. The penalty was a full-time served penalty with no ensuing faceoff. Andrew Vivian quickly tied the game as a result, 6-6, with 7:42 left.

Vivian's goal was part of a 3-1 Drexel run that gave the Dragons an 8-7 lead with 2:00 minutes to play in the third quarter. Virginia responded with a 4-1 run of its own that included goals by Bobby Hill, Parks and White. Owen Van Arsdale added a man-down score of his own, the first UVa mandown score since the 2011 season. White's third goal of the game capped the run with 5:15 left to play, as UVa held a narrow 11-9 lead.

Drexel scored the next two via Aaron Prosser and Frank Fusco, tying the game, 11-11, with 1:23 left to play.

Thomas won the ensuing faceoff, but Scott McWilliams stripped Garrett

McIntosh, giving UVa the ball back. Charlie Streep scored his first career Virginia goal with 49 seconds left, giving UVa the narrow 12-11 lead.

Drexel won the next faceoff and Robert Chruch's shot was blocked out front, Belka beat UVa goalie Dan Marino to the ball in front of the crease, quickly depositing the ball in the goal with eight second remaining, setting up the winner-take-all scenario.

Mark Cockerton scored a careerhigh six goals and the Virginia Cavaliers (2-0) cruised to an 18-4 triumph over the visiting VMI Keydets (0-3) at Klöckner Stadium. The win is UVa's 30th-straight midweek win, dating back to 2001.

VMI started the scoring after Bernie Mowbray scored a man-up goal at 13:07, via an Eric Groleau pass. UVa was man-down after Tanner Ottenbreit was charged with tripping.

After the early VMI goal, it was all Virginia. The Cavaliers held the Keydets scoreless for the next 44:08. When VMI scored its next goal at 13:59 in the fourth quarter, UVa had already reeled off 15-straight goals, including Cockerton's six.

Nick O'Reilly and Cockerton took turns scoring the first four goals, finishing the early spurt with two apiece. Then Rob Emery and Cockerton traded goals twice to take the 8-1 advantage. After another Cockerton goal, Owen Van Arsdale scored twice to conclude the first half scoring. UVa entered the intermission with an 11-1 lead.

UVa scored four goals, while VMI tallied zero in the third quarter. In mop up time in the final stanza, the Keydets hit the nylon three times. UVa tallied three goals as well in the fourth quarter, including the game's final two goals to cap off the victory.

O'Reilly added three goals and one assist, while James Pannell led UVa with three helpers. Nine Cavaliers scored goals against VMI, including the first career goals by Matt Florence and Greg Coholan.

Virginia won the shots battle (64-25), ground balls (57-43), faceoffs (14-12) and had 20 fewer turnovers (12-32). VMI goalie Matt Lindemann had 24 saves.

Mark Cockerton scored five goals and the No. 6 Virginia Cavaliers (3-0) outlasted the Stony Brook Seawolves (1-2) at Kenneth P. LaValle Stadium. Virginia held a narrow one-goal lead going into the intermission, 6-5, but the Cavalier defense clamped and limited Stony Brook to only four shots in the second half.

Cockerton started the game's scoring with his unassisted goal at 13:14. The Cavaliers held the 1-0 advantage until Mike Andreassi found nylon on the pass from Jeff Tundo with 5:56 left in the first period.

James Pannell scored his first collegiate goal on a streaking pass from Owen Van Arsdale 28 seconds into the fourth period. White scored a goal unassisted, followed by Cockerton's fifth of the game. White and Pannell finished out the scoring as UVa clinched the road victory.

Virginia won the battles in shots (55-16), ground balls (41-28), faceoffs (16-7) and had fewer turnovers (12-24). The UVa transition game held Stony Brook to only

In severe to moderate rainy conditions, the No. 6 Virginia Cavaliers (4-0) used six goals from Mark Cockerton, and five points from Rob Emery and Nick O'Reilly to grab an 18-11 triumph over the Mount

St. Mary's Mountaineers (2-2), at the UHall Turf Field. The game was moved from Klöckner Stadium two hours prior to faceoff because of heavy rains in the Charlottesville area submerged Klöckner's grass surface.

True to form of the Virginia-Syracuse series, it took overtime to decide the 29th all-time meeting, as the No. 6 Cavaliers (4-1) lost for the first time this season, falling inside the Carrier Dome to the No. 18 Orange

Mick Parks won the faceoff to start the overtime period, his 16th win in 21 attempts on the night. Matt Whiteattempted a shot, but the shot was saved by Syracuse goalie Bobby Wardwell, starting the Orange offensive possession.

After a timeout, Dylan Donahue found Kevin Rice who slipped the ball past UVa goalie Dan Marinowith 1:00 left in the first overtime. The shot threaded the needle to send Syracuse to the thrilling win. It's the first overtime loss for Virginia since falling to Johns Hopkins at Klöckner Stadium last season.

Mark Cockerton scored six goals and Matt White tallied four, but it wasn't enough as the No. 7 Duke Blue Devils (10-4, 2-1 ACC) used a 7-0 run in the fourth quarter to dispatch of the Virginia Cavaliers (5-7, 0-3 ACC) on Friday night, 19-16, in front of 3,072 fans at Koskinen Stadium. The game began as a defensive juggernaut as Cockerton's goal 59 seconds into the contest was the only score by either team in the opening stanza. Maryland finally broke through at the 13:50 mark in the second quarter on a Mike Chanenchuk unassisted goal after the Terrapins did not find nylon in the game's first 16:10.

The game's only tie was short-lived, as UVa scored 35 seconds later when Ryan Tucker found Cockerton for the junior's second goal. Shortly after, UVa took the lead and never relinquished it when Greg Coholan ripped a goal on a White pass for the Cavaliers' only extraman opportunity.

Maryland cut UVa's lead to one goal, 3-2, when John Haus scored unassisted at 6:27. Virginia closed out the half on a two-goal run via a Rob Emery tally and Cockerton's third goal of the game on a Nick O'Reilly pass, sending UVa into the intermission with a 5-2 lead. The goal gave Cockerton his 12th career hat trick, his eighth of the season and his fourth in a row.

The Virginia defense limited Maryland to only eight first half shots as the Terrapins committed eight first half

Maryland started the second half on a 3-1 spurt to pull within one goal, 6-5. The second and third goals of the run came in extra-man fashion when UVa was stuck with two players in a fulltime served penalty. Scott McWilliams was tagged with a slash, but it became a full-time served penalty when UVa's Pat Harbeson and Maryland's John Haus were simultaneously charged with matching full-time served unsportsmanlike conduct fouls. Official rules state that McWilliams slash also must be a full-time served foul because it happened at the same time.

With a thin 6-5 lead, UVa reeled off seven goals in a row to take a commanding 13-5 lead. O'Reilly tallied two goals and assisted one more during the run, while White scored twice and assisted two more. Charlie Streep and Emery also scored, while Cockerton stamped the run on an open-net with 2:53 left in the game. Owen Blye scored with 24 seconds left to finish the game's

scoring.

Nick O'Reilly and Matt White had ACC Men's Lacrosse Tournament record-breaking performances, but it wasn't enough as the No. 1 North Carolina Tar Heels outlasted the Virginia Cavaliers for the 2013 ACC title, 16-13, at Kenan Stadium.

White scored a career-high seven goals against the Tar Heels, tying a tournament record for a game and his 10 goals scored for the weekend is an ACC record for its tournament.

The game became a shootout quickly after Ryan Creighton started the game's scoring with a goal on a pass from Holman at 13:13. Cockerton quickly deposited two goals 38 seconds apart from each other to give UVa its first lead of the game, 2-1, with 12:07 on the first quarter clock.

Jimmy Bitter scored back-to-back goals at 11:59 and 9:59 to give the Tar Heels the 3-2 advantage. UVa went on a 3-0 run, taking a 5-3 lead. Greg Coholan began the run unassisted at 8:48 and then O'Reilly assisted goals to White and Ryan Tucker. The spurt ended on Tucker's goal with 30 seconds left in the first period.

Keenan won the ensuing faceoff for UNC and UVa's Rhody Heller made a tough save down low on a Tutton shot with three seconds left, but the carom bounced toward Emala on the crease who scored with two seconds on the clock, ending the first quarter scoring and cutting UVa's lead to 5-4. The goal marked the 16th time during the season that UVa gave up a goal with 30 seconds or less on the clock in a regulation period.

Emala's goal was the first in a 9-2 UNC run that proved to be the difference in the game, including a Tutton goal with four seconds on the clock that ended the second quarter scoring. Tutton's goal was the 17th time an opponent scored with less than 30 seconds in a regulation period against UVa and the 15th time with less than

16 seconds.

White ended the UNC run with back-to-back goals with 9:44 and 7:39 left in the third quarter, bringing UVa back to within three goals, 13-10. Tutton scored again at 6:32 to make it 14-10, before White scored two more times to cut UVa's deficit down to two goals, 14-12 with 8:45 left in the game.

Emala and Keenan scored five seconds apart at 5:38 and 5:33 to put the stamp on North Carolina's first ACC title since 1996. Cockerton deposited the game's final goal with 1:39 left for his 13th career hat trick, ninth of the season and fifth in a row.

ADMINISTRATION



TERESA A. SULLIVAN University President

Teresa Å. Sullivan is the University of Virginia's eighth president. Since taking

office

in 2010, she has led UVa through a period of significant progress. In fall 2012, she launched a strategic planning effort to provide a road-map for the University's future, while gathering input from 10,000 alumni, parents, students, faculty, staff, and others. President Sullivan developed a new financial model for the University to ensure stability and transparency and to spur innovation in a period of significant financial pressure in higher education.

President Sullivan has assembled a highly effective leadership team, led by executive vice president and provost John Simon, executive vice president and chief operating officer Pat Hogan, senior vice president for university advancement Bob Sweeney, and a group of experienced deans, vice presidents, and staff. Working with her team, President Sullivan has prepared UVa to tackle the serious challenges in higher education related to cost-containment, affordability, faculty compensation, and the emergence of online education. UVa now has ongoing efforts, at both the unit and the pan-University levels, to reduce costs, improve processes, and enhance efficiency, while protecting the quality of the academic enterprise. In 2013, President Sullivan proposed a plan to aggressively improve faculty compensation after many years of stagnation in faculty salaries. Under her leadership, faculty and staff have been encouraged to experiment strategically with new technologies, such as massive open online courses, or MOOCs. President Sullivan also provided seed funding to allow professors to experiment with "hybrid" courses that combine the traditional classroom experience with technology-enhanced

In spring 2013, President Sullivan led the University to completion of its \$3-billion capital campaign, and quickly announced plans to raise \$400 million to support three strategic priorities: retaining and recruiting top faculty, restoring the University's Jeffersonian

Grounds, and providing needy students with scholarships.

President Sullivan is a respected scholar in labor force demography. The author or coauthor of six books and many scholarly articles, her most recent research has focused on measuring productivity in higher education.

President Sullivan is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. She serves as Vice Chair of the Council of Presidents for the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, and as a member of the Advisory Board for the Northern Virginia Technology Council, the trade association of the technology industry in Northern Virginia. She serves as the Association of American Universities (AAU) representative on the American Council on Education (ACE) Board of Directors, and as a member of the Higher Education Advisory Committee that provides guidance for implementation of the Virginia Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2011. In 2013, the Governor appointed her to the Innovation and Entrepreneurship Investment Authority.

President Sullivan came to UVa from the University of Michigan, where she was provost and executive vice president for academic affairs. Prior to her work at Michigan, Ms. Sullivan was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas System, a position she held from 2002 until May 2006. She served as faculty member at the University of Texas at Austin from

1981 to 2006.

She is a graduate of Michigan State University's James Madison College, and earned her doctoral degree in sociology from the University of Chicago. She is married to Douglas Laycock, the Robert E. Scott Distinguished Professor of Law at UVa. They have two adult sons.

President Sullivan is a passionate fan of UVa athletics, and regularly attends sports events on and off

Grounds.



CRAIG LITTLEPAGE Director of Athletics

Committed to preserving and building on UVa's longstanding tradition of

academic and athletic excellence, Craig Littlepage is in his 13th year as Virginia's Athletics Director. Littlepage's appointment as athletics director was announced in August of 2001.

Littlepage served as Virginia's interim athletics director from June 1, 2001, until his permanent appointment to the position. He had also served as the University's interim athletics director from December of 1994 until July of 1995.

The first African-American athletics director in Atlantic Coast Conference history, Littlepage was named the Black Coaches Association's "Athletics Administrator of the Year" in 2003 and 2006. He was also listed on Sports Illustrated's list of the 101 most influential minorities in sports in 2003 and 2004. In March 2005, Littlepage was named one of Black Enterprise magazine's "Most Powerful African-Americans in Sports."

Littlepage has been a member of UVa's athletics administration since 1990 when he was appointed an assistant athletics director, a position he held from 1990-1991. He then spent four years as the associate director of athletics for programs and six years (1995-2001) as senior associate director of athletics, managing all aspects of the athletics department's day-to-day operations.

Littlepage leads a comprehensive 25-sport athletics program that routinely competes for championships and national rankings in many sports. At the same time, Cavalier studentathletes who exhaust their eligibility at Virginia graduate at a rate comparable to the student body as a whole. Annually, UVa student-athletes rank among the top Division I-A public universities in the country in graduation

rates.

He has outlined a number of ambitious 10-year goals for the department to achieve by 2022: graduate 100 percent of its student-athletes; win 12 national championships and 70 conference titles; fully endow all scholarships and provide the operational support

required to meet all other stated goals; build and maintain high-quality facilities; annually recruit the best studentathletes in the country (based on how coaches rate their top prospects); and fully comply with Title IX.

Such goals reflect Littlepage's vision of "uncompromised excellence in intercollegiate athletics" as well as the department's overall mission to "enhance and support the intellectual purpose of the University and its exemplary academic standards and traditions.'

Virginia's first NCAA championship in men's tennis capped another successful athletics season in which teams or individuals from 19 of the Cavaliers' 25 intercollegiate athletics programs advanced to NCAA postseason competition in 2012-13. The Cavaliers finished 20th in the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings, their seventh consecutive top-20 finish including a school high of No. 3 in 2010.

Other team highlights from 2012-13 included the rowing team's fifthplace national finish, baseball's fourth NCAA Super Regional appearance in the last five years and the men's tennis team winning the ITA National Team Indoor Championship for the fifth time in the past six years. Jarmere Jenkins and Mac Styslinger became the third men's tennis duo in the past five years to win the NCAA Doubles Championship.

Virginia has won eight team NCAA Championships and 13 individual NCAA Championships in the last 11 years. The Cavaliers have also won 56 ACC Championships in that time frame, more than any other conference school. UVa claimed a league-leading five ACC championships in 2012-13 and has led the ACC in league championships in five of the

last six athletics seasons.

Great progress has also been made in the area of athletics facility improvements during Littlepage's watch, including the additions of the George Welsh Indoor Practice Facility (2013) and John Paul Jones Arena (2006).

Littlepage has held many leadership roles within the NCAA, ACC, the University-at-large and professional organizations. He is currently a member of the John McLendon Foundation Steering Committee and served on the Executive Committee of the National

Association of Collegiate Athletics Directors (NACDA) from 2006-10.

In February 2002, he was appointed to the 10-member Division I Men's Basketball Committee by the NCAA Championship/Competition Cabinet and served a five-year term which was completed Aug. 31, 2007. In 2005-06, Littlepage served as the chair of the Men's Division I Basketball Committee and administered its selec-

tion process.

Littlepage previously was a member of the NCAA Division I Infractions Committee and the NCAA Academics, Eligibility and Compliance Cabinet, serving on the Recruiting and Student-Athlete Reinstatement Subcommittees. He chaired the Reinstatement Subcommittee in 1999-2000. He also served the NCAA on committees that studied sports wagering, postgame crowd control, basketball issues, and the College Basketball Partnership. He has participated as a presenter and mentor to the NCAA's Ethnic Minority Male Institute and the Black Coaches and Administrator Association. Littlepage has chaired the ACC Women's Basketball Committee, ACC Committee on Awards, ACC Student-Athlete Welfare Committee, the ACC Men's and Women's Swimming/ Diving Committees and the ACC Men's Soccer Committee.

He is a member of the Associate Faculty for the University's Center for Alcohol and Substance Education, and participates in various alcohol and drug prevention/education conferences. Littlepage also has been active in the local community, having served on the Board of Directors for the Charlottesville Ronald McDonald House and serving as a Trustee with the Mount Zion Baptist Church and the St. Anne's-Belfield School. Before beginning his career in athletics administration, Littlepage served two stints as an assistant coach with the Cavalier men's basketball program, from 1976-82 and from 1988-90.

Littlepage held head coaching positions at Pennsylvania (1982-85) and at Rutgers (1985-88) before returning to Virginia. While he was at Penn, the Quakers won the Ivy League championship and participated in the 1985 NCAA Tournament. Littlepage was an assistant basketball coach at Villanova for two years and at Yale for one year before joining the UVa basketball program as an assistant coach in 1976.

The LaMott, Pa., native earned his bachelor's degree in economics from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania in 1973. He was a member of three Ivy League basketball championship teams at Penn and was instrumental in the Quakers' drive to three consecutive NCAA Eastern Regional playoff appearances.

Littlepage and his wife Margaret have three children, two daughters Erica (27) and Erin (22), and a son

Murray (24).

JON OLIVER Executive Associate Athletics Director

Jon Oliver is in his 13th year at Virginia. His primary

responsibility is oversight of the day-today operations of the athletics department.

Oliver is the administrative liaison for football, men's basketball and men's tennis and he has senior staff administrative oversight responsibilities for Academic Affairs, Equipment Room Operations, Human Resources, Facilities and Game Operations, Lifeskills, Marketing and Promotions,

Sports Medicine, Sports Nutrition, Sports Psychology, Strength and Conditioning and Video Services. Oliver also serves as the Department's representative on all major facility projects.

Before coming to UVa, Oliver spent the previous six years involved in various aspects of athletic administration at Washington State University. Oliver ended his tenure at WSU as the associate athletics director for external affairs and prior to that served as the associate athletics director for finance and facilities development, the assistant athletics director for business and compliance and the director of compliance.

Oliver earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Boise State in 1994 and his law degree from the Idaho School of Law in 1997.

Oliver is a former member of the University of Idaho Law School Advisory Board and served on the NCAA's Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee.

He is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the Black Coaches & Administrators (BCA).

He and his wife, November, have a son, Dante, and two daughters, Ariana and Mia.



JANE MILLER Senior Associate Athletics Director for Programs/Senior Woman Administrator

A 30-year veteran of the Virginia athletics department, Jane Miller has served as the senior associate director of athletics for programs since 2001. Previously,

Miller was the associate athletics director for programs/senior women's administrator.

Miller serves on the University Calendar Committee, Admissions Committee and Judicial Review Board. She is the Chair of the ACC Women's Lacrosse Committee and is a member of the ACC Women's Basketball, Baseball and Men's Lacrosse Committee.

Recently Miller was elected Chair of the NCAA Division I Championship/ Sports Management Cabinet and Chair of the National Women's Lacrosse Hall of Fame Committee (women's division).

Head coach of the UVa women's lacrosse team for 12 seasons, Miller resigned her coaching duties in 1995 for a full-time administrative role. She retired as the winningest coach in UVa women's lacrosse history, compiling a record of 145-44, including two national championships and six Final Four appearances. She was elected to the Virginia chapter of the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 1996, the New England chapter of the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 2000 and the U.S. Lacrosse National Hall of Fame and Oliver Ames High School Hall of Fame in 2003.

DIRK KATSTRA Executive Director of the Virginia Athletics Foundation/Senior Associate Athletics Director

Dirk Katstra is in his 18th year as executive director of the Virginia Athletics Foundation. In July of 2013 he was named senior associate athletics director and took on the role as the sport administrator for men's and women's swimming and diving.

In June 2004, Katstra was named Fundraiser of the Year by the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD) in recognition of his outstanding leadership and success in fundraising on behalf of Virginia athletics. In June 2012, he was named to the executive committee of NAADD for a your-year term.

The annual campaign supports student athletes in all 25 sports programs in the form of scholarships, summer school, academic affairs and operational costs. The foundation is also responsible for all fund raising efforts for endowments for scholarships and operating costs. In addition, the foundation is responsible for supporting all fund raising efforts in the area of capital projects, including the new

track and field facility, the recent \$4 million expansion to Davenport Field and the John Paul Jones Arena, UVa's \$129 million basketball arena and special events center, which opened in July 2006. He recently spearheaded the fund raising efforts for the \$13 million indoor football practice facility scheduled that was completed in 2013.

Katstra previously served the athletics department as the associate director for external affairs, overseeing the longrange planning and daily operations for media relations, sports publications, and the ticket office. From 1992 to 1996, Katstra served as director of annual giving for the Foundation.

A native of Stilwell, Kan., Katstra is a 1991 graduate of UVa with a degree in sport management. A member of the Cavalier basketball team from 1987 to 1991, Katstra played on three NCAA Tournament teams and was a senior captain on the 1990-91 squad.

STEVE PRITZKER Associate Athletics Director for Business Operations

Steve Pritzker is in his first year as the associate athlet-

ics director for business operations and the chief financial officer (CFO) for the University of Virginia athletics department.

In addition to supervising the business operations staff and the manager of information systems, Pritzker serves as the financial adviser to the athletics department staff and coordinates the implementation and management of the department's operating budget. He serves as the department's primary liaison to the University's audit, budget, financial administration and procurement offices.

Pritzker returns to Virginia after one season as the head rowing coach at Iowa. He spent the previous nine years as a member of Virginia's coaching staff, from 2004 to 2012. After volunteering with the rowing team during the 2004 season, while earning his master's degree in business administration, Pritzker assumed full-time coaching responsibilities in the fall of 2004. In 2007 he was promoted to associate head coach. While at Virginia, Pritzker helped guide the Cavaliers to NCAA team championships in 2010 and 2012, along with runner-up finishes in 2005 and 2007. Virginia won eight ACC titles in his nine seasons.

While working with the Cavaliers' rowing program, Pritzker also worked with Oliver on finance and budgeting matters, including forecasting and achieving financial efficiencies. He worked directly with different units within the athletics department on budget management. He also developed risk analyses for long-term budget planning.

Pritzker's business background includes a two-year stint with Credit Suisse First Boston in New York City as a sales analyst where he conducted research and financial analysis for major institutional clients. He also worked for two years for Kingdon Capital Management as an associate. He developed proprietary valuation models to evaluate investments and advised portfolio managers.

Valerie Richardson is in her sixth year as associate

Admission to the press box is by official credential only and is strictly limited to members of the working press, radio and television personnel. Please allow ample time for the mailing of credentials or they will be left at the Will Call window at Klöckner Stadium.

Special requests should be made in advance. Parking is always available on an unreserved basis at University Hall. Normal pregame and postgame information is supplied.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Requests for photo passes must be made in advance through the Athletics Media Relations Office. Photographers must observe the field markings for lacrosse. No tri-pod equipment may be used on the field level, for the safety of the players and photographers.

RADIO

Broadcasts are made from the radio broadcast facilities in Klöckner Stadium. There is one courtesy line available for use by visiting radio crews. Adequate space is available for the visiting team needs. Arrangement for broadcasts must be validated in advance through the UVa Athletics Media Relations Office.

TELEVISION

All requests for televising games must be made in advance through the UVa Sports Promotions Office. Television rights are subject to restrictions set forth by the Atlantic Coast Conference and the University of Virginia. Permission must be obtained in advance to videotape the games for any purpose.

INTERVIEWS

All requests for interviews with coaches and players should be made through Vincent Briedis in the Athletics Media Relations Office. Postgame interviews are conducted at field level following the postgame handshake.
