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ACC Has Two Top Four Teams in AP Preseason Poll For First Time When Clemson (2) and Florida State (4) were ranked in the Top Four of the 2016 Associated Press Preseason College Football poll on August 21, it marked the first time the ACC has had two teams in the Top Four (or Five) of AP's first college football poll of the year. The ACC came close in 2004, when Florida State was ranked 5th and Miami 6th.

ACC Only Conference With Two in Top Four in Coaches Poll

The Atlantic Coast Conference is the only league in the nation to have two teams ranked in the Top Four of the preseason Coaches Top 25 rankings. Clemson was ranked second nationally, while Florida State was pegged fourth in the initial 2016 Amway Coaches poll. In all, four ACC teams were ranked with No. 20 North Carolina and No. 23 Louisville joining the Tigers and Seminoles.

Watson Chosen as the No. 1 Player in College Football by ESPN

Clemson QB Deshaun Watson was ranked the top player in college football by ESPN.com writers and editors in its preseason player rankings. Watson, a consensus All-America in 2015 who finished third in the Heisman balloting, returns for his junior season with the Tigers. He leads 21 ACC players on the CFB Top 100, including Florida State RB Dalvin Cook, who was ranked fourth nationally.

Clemson's Watson, Miami's Kaaya Named Top College QBs by NFL.com

The NFL.com ranks ACC quarterbacks as the best in the nation. Clemson's Deshaun Watson and Miami's Brad Kaaya were ranked one-two in the top five college quarterbacks listed by NFL.com. In fact, the top three QBs listed were originally recruited to ACC schools as Chad Kelly of Ole Miss, the No. 3 choice, began his career at Clemson.

Clemson's Watson, Pitt's Conner Are First Pair of Returning ACC Football Players of the Year in History

Clemson's Deshaun Watson and Pitt's James Conner will make history this fall as, for the first time, the ACC returns two players who were each named Player of the Year in Football. Watson captured the 2015 award, while Conner was named the 2014 ACC Football Player of the Year.

ACC teams Open 2016 With 13 Games Over Five Days Led by Boston College and Georgia Tech in Dublin, Ireland No. 4 Florida State Faces No. 11 Ole Miss on Labor Day Monday Night

In this, its 64th season of college football, two Atlantic Coast Conference teams will face off in an ACC game beyond the United States for only the third time in its history, when **Boston College** hosts **Georgia Tech** (7:30 am; ESPN) in the Aer Lingus Kickoff Classic at Aviva Stadium in Dublin, Ireland. Previously, Tokyo, Japan, hosted ACC football clashes when Wake Forest met Clemson in 1982 and Duke played the Tigers in 1991.

In all, **ACC teams** will open 2016 with 13 games spread over five days...three games on Thursday, one on Friday, eight on Saturday and one

on Labor Day Monday Night.

Four ACC teams are ranked this week in the preseason polls for both AP and the Amway Coaches. **Clemson** and **Florida State** are ranked second and fourth, respectively in each poll. **Louisville** is ranked 19th in AP and 23rd by the Coaches, while **North Carolina** is 20th in the Coaches poll and 22nd in AP.

stop for the Tour will be next Friday at **Syracuse** for the Syracuse-Colgate football game. Former Cuse QB Marvin Graves will be the honored legend. The travelling exhibit, a 53-foot festively-wrapped truck, will include ACC, Lumber Liquidators and Capital One Orange Bowl info and displays, interactive games and a chance for fans to win a trip to the 2016 Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship in Charlotte, Dec. 3.

Four ACC teams will play in season-opening games at neutral sites, in addition to **Boston College-Georgia Tech** game in Dublin in the Aer Lingus College Football Classic, 22nd-ranked **North Carolina** will face 18th-ranked **Georgia** Saturday in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game (5:30 p.m., ESPN) in Atlanta at the Georgia Dome and 4th-ranked Florida State will face 11th-ranked **Ole Miss** (8 p.m., ESPN) in the Camping World Kickoff at Camping World Stadium in Orlando on Labor Day Monday night.

North Carolina and **Georgia** are meeting for the first time since 1971, when the opposing coaches were the legendary brother tandem of Vince and **Bill Dooley**. Former Tar Heel head coach **Bill Dooley**, who rebuilt the UNC football program (1967-77) and also coached at Wake Forest (1987-92), passed away earlier this month at the age of 82 at his home in Wilmington, N.C. Dooley still is fourth on the ACC career wins list behind Bobby Bowden, George Welsh and Frank Beamer. His win total does not include 64 victories he posted in nine seasons at Virginia Tech, which, at the time, was not a member of the ACC.

Four head coaches will be making their debuts in the ACC this week, the most for the league since 2007. **Dino Babers** will lead the Orange for the first time against Colgate on Friday night in the Carrier Dome in **Syracuse** (7 p.m., ACC Network Extra). The rest will all debut on Saturday as **Justin Fuente** leads **Virginia Tech** against Liberty at Lane Stadium in Blacksburg, Va. (12:30 pm, ACC Network); **Bronco Mendenhall** leads **Virginia** against Richmond at Scott Stadium in Charlottesville, Va. (3:30 pm, ACC Network Extra) and **Mark Richt** will lead **Miami** against Florida A&M at newly-named Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens (6 pm, ACC Network Extra).

Two sets of Tigers will face each other on Saturday, when

2nd-ranked **Clemson** travels to face unranked Auburn at Jordan-Hare Stadium in **Auburn** (9 pm, ESPN). Clemson, led by coach **Dabo Swinney** and QB **Deshawn Watson**, will be facing a talented Auburn team coached by **Gus Malzahn**. Clemson played for the national championship in its last game and has won 17 of its last 18 contests, while Auburn played for the 2013 national title in January of 2014 against Florida State. The two teams last met in Auburn in 2010.

Pitt RB James Conner will make his 2016 debut Saturday, for coach **Pat Narduzzi's** Panthers when they host Villanova at Heinz Field in Pittsburgh (1:30 pm, ACC Network Extra). Conner, the 2014 ACC Football Player of the Year, missed almost all of last year recovering from a knee injury suffered in Pitt's first game of the 2015 season and spent the offseason recovering from Hodgkins Lymphoma, which was diagnosed last fall. In 2014, Conner rushed for 1,765 yards, the third-highest total in ACC history, and an ACC-record 26 touchdowns.

Next Thursday night, three ACC teams will open the 2016 season when 19th-ranked **Louisville**, coached by **Bobby Petrino**, hosts Charlotte at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium in Louisville, Ky. (7 pm, Regional Sports Networks); **Wake Forest**, coached by **Dave Clawson**, hosts Tulane of the American Athletic Conference, at BB&T Field in Winston-Salem, N.C. (7 pm, ACC Network Extra) and **NC State**, coached by **Dave Doeren**, host William & Mary, coached by legendary **Jimmye Laycock** at Carter-Finley Stadium in Raleigh, N.C. (7:30 pm, ACC Network Extra). Laycock has won 238 games in 36 years as the head coach of the Tribe.

Duke will open the 2016 season in its newly-renovated Brooks Field at Wallace Wade Stadium, which features the new Blue Devil Tower, hosting North Carolina Central (6 p.m., ACC Network Extra). Coached by **David Cutcliffe**, the Blue Devils join Miami as ACC teams enjoying their new upgraded surroundings as the Hurricanes will be playing in Hard Rock Stadium, which just completed its second phase of renovations.

Two ACC teams will face nationally-ranked opponents this weekend when No. 4 **Florida State** faces No. 11 Mississippi in Orlando, and No. 22 **North Carolina** meets No. 18 Georgia in Atlanta. They are two of 13 games ACC teams will face against opponents ranked in this week's AP Top 25.

ACC Network Extra

An ACC record 331 Olympic sporting events will be streamed live this fall by ACC Network Extra, a dedicated digital channel for ACC sports that made its debut on August 19. The coverage marks the initial phase

of the full ACC Network announced July 21 by ESPN and the Atlantic Coast Conference. Live streaming of Olympic sports will increase annually, culminating with 1,300 total ACC events when the linear network launches in 2019.

“We’ve looked forward to the launch of ACC Network Extra with excitement and anticipation since last month’s announcement,” said ACC Commissioner John Swofford. “ACC Olympic sports have a record of unparalleled success, and it was important to both ESPN and our league to create a model in which each of the ACC’s 27 sponsored sports would be carried live to fans in some manner.”

The 2016 Fall Olympic sports schedule includes 354 total events involving ACC schools, with ESPNU scheduled to carry six contests and the Regional Sports Network an additional 17. Every conference Fall Olympic sport championship will be shown live on either a linear platform or ACC Network Extra, beginning with the ACC Cross Country Championships on Oct. 28.

The events covered by ACC Network Extra will be immediately available to users who have access to WatchESPN and the ESPN app. More than 600 total Olympic sporting events – encompassing the Fall, Winter and Spring seasons – will be carried exclusively by ACC Network Extra during the 2016-17 academic year.

.870- The field goal percentage in 2015 for North Carolina junior **PK Nick Weiler**. Weiler, who made 20 of 23 attempts, led the ACC and ranked 9th nationally.

1 - Louisville **OLB Devonte Fields** led the nation in tackles for loss per game in 2015. Fields had 22.5 TFLs in just 13 games, an average of 1.73 per game.

1.70 - The average number of field goals per game for Miami **PK Michael Badgley**. Badgley, who led the nation in field goals per game in 2015, has averaged 1.70 three-pointers per game for his career and ranks fourth nationally among all active returnees.

5 - With the addition of **Mark Richt** (Miami) and **Bronco Mendenhall** (Virginia) to the ACC roster of head coaches, the league now has five coaches who are ranked among the Top 15, and six among the Top 20 active coaches in winning percentage in the FBS with a minimum of five years as a head coach. Florida State's **Jimbo Fisher** ranks second overall with an .829 mark, followed by **Richt** of Miami (8th, .740); **Dabo Swinney** of Clemson (10th, .735); **Bobby Petrino** of Louisville (12th, .719); **Mendenhall** of Virginia (15th, .697) and **Paul Johnson** of Georgia Tech (20th, .669).

6 - Duke junior **S DeVon Edwards** has returned six kickoffs for touchdowns during his career, including three in 2015. Edwards is one shy of the ACC record of seven, which is also the NCAA FBS mark, set by Clemson's C.J. Spiller.

7 - The number of career punt returns for touchdowns by North Carolina senior **Ryan Switzer**. Switzer, who had returns of 85 yards vs. Illinois and 78 yards against Miami in 2015, broke the ACC career mark for punt returns for scores and is one shy of the NCAA mark held jointly by Wes Welker of Texas Tech (2000-03) and Antonio Perkins of Oklahoma (2001-04).

8 - The number of returning **ACC players** who have topped the 1,000-yard rushing mark for a season. That is the most in league history, bettering the previous high of five set in 2009 and 2014. Seven topped the 1,000-yard mark in 2015 led by Florida State's **Dalvin Cook** (1,691) and including

Clemson's **Wayne Gallman** (1,527), North Carolina's **Elijah Hood** (1,463), Pitt's **Qadree Ollison** (1,121), Clemson's **Deshaun Watson** (1,105), Virginia Tech's **Travon McMillian** (1,042) and Miami's **Joe Yearby** (1,002). Pitt's **James Conner** ran for 1,765 yards in 2014.

9.92 - The average number of tackles for Virginia **S Quin Blanding** in his first two seasons for the Cavaliers. Blanding ranks 2nd nationally among all returning players in career tackles per game.

13 - This year **ACC teams** will play 13 games against non-conference opponents ranked in the AP Preseason Top 25, including a pair of neutral site games this weekend when No. 22 North Carolina meets No. 18 Georgia in Atlanta at the Georgia Dome next Saturday in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game and No. 4 Florida State faces No. 11 Ole Miss on Labor Day Monday night in the Camping World Kickoff in Orlando.

21 - The number of ACC players who were voted among the Top 100 collegiate players nationally by ESPN.com's writers and editors. Clemson **QB Deshaun Watson** was ranked first, while FSU **RB Dalvin Cook** was ranked fourth nationally. Clemson and Florida State led each with six players chosen. Louisville, North Carolina and Pitt each had two, while Miami, Virginia and Virginia Tech had one apiece.

27 - The number of field goals in 2015 for Clemson redshirt freshman **Greg Huegel**. Huegel made 27 of 32 attempts, tying three former Florida State kickers in Sebastian Janikowski (1998), Gary Cismesia (2007) and Roberto Aguayo (2014), for the most three-pointers in a season in league history.

27 - Also the number of wins for Duke the past three seasons under head coach **David Cutcliffe**, the most of any three-year span in school history.

28.6 - The career kickoff return average for Boston College's **Michael Walker**. Walker ranks third among all career returnees nationally, having returned 24 kickoffs for 686 yards as a freshman in 2015.

36.81 - The average number of points per game for North Carolina in four seasons under **Larry Fedora** with 1,914 points in

52 games. In the school's 27 previous seasons, UNC averaged just 24.03 points per game. Fedora-guided offenses have recorded the four highest single-season point totals for UNC since 1931.

100 - Louisville's 27-21 win over Texas A&M in the 2015 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl was the 100th career victory for Louisville head coach **Bobby Petrino**. Petrino has a 100-39 (.719) record for 11 seasons as a head coach, including a 58-18 (.763) mark in two stints and six years at Louisville.

107.96 - The average number of yards rushing per game for Florida State sophomore **Dalvin Cook**. That average is slightly better than the ACC career record of 107.89 set by North Carolina's Giovani Bernard (2011-12) and ranks 8th among returning active runners in the FBS.

168 - The number of career wins for Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** in his 18-year head coaching career at Georgia Southern, Navy and Georgia Tech. Johnson now ranks fifth among all active FBS head coaches in career victories. Five ACC coaches begin 2016 ranked in the Top 25, including Miami's **Mark Richt** (10th), Louisville's **Bobby Petrino** (21st), Virginia's **Bronco Mendenhall** (22nd) and Wake Forest's **Dave Clawson** (24th).

169 - In less than two full seasons, Clemson sophomore **WR Artavis Scott** has made 169 catches, making him the leading career receiver in the ACC this year. His 169 receptions are the most for an ACC receiver as a freshmen and sophomore, topping the mark of 163 set by Pitt's Tyler Boyd in 2013-14.

226 - When Louisville true freshman **QB Lamar Jackson** rushed for 226 yards against Texas A&M in the 2015 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl, he broke the ACC single-game record for rushing yards by a quarterback. The previous mark of 220 yards, was set by Clemson's Woodrow Dantzler against Virginia in 2000. Jackson, who also rushed for 186 yards against Kentucky and 184 against Samford, recorded three of the top five rushing days by a QB in league history in his rookie season.

Mendenhall's next victory will be his 100th as a collegiate head coach ... The game against the Spiders renews an in-state rivalry that was first played in 1893 ... Richmond head coach and Wake Forest graduate Danny Rocco spent five seasons at Virginia as assistant head coach and linebackers coach under Al Groh ... The Cavaliers have won 10 straight in the series, with Richmond's two wins coming in 1943 and 1946 ... Rocco was named CAA Coach of the Year for the 2015 season, which saw the Spiders post a 10-4 record and reach the FCS national semifinals.

Ones to watch: Richmond senior DB David Jones set a program record and tied for the lead among FCS players with nine interceptions last season. The 2016 CAA Preseason Defensive Player of the Year, Jones also recorded 97 tackles, the second-most on the team and knocked down 12 passes ... Virginia S Quin Blanding earned second-team All-America honors last season and has averaged 9.92 tackles per game through his first two collegiate seasons.

Ones to watch: North Carolina junior RB Elijah Hood returns as a leader in the Tar Heels' high-powered offense after rushing for 1,463 yards and 17 touchdowns last season. Hood ranked eighth nationally with 6.68 yards per carry ... Georgia junior RB Nick Chubb, working his way back into top form following a knee injury last season, has carried the ball 311 times for 2,294 yards and 21 touchdowns in his first 19 college games.

The Hurricanes are set to play three home games against in-state opponents in a span of just over five weeks, with Florida Atlantic set to visit next week and ACC rival Florida State scheduled at Hard Rock Stadium on October 8.

Ones to watch: FAMU DB Jacques Bryant is set for his senior season after sharing the team lead in tackles last season (75) while picking off one pass, breaking up five others and forcing one fumble ... Miami senior WR Stacy Coley ranks third among ACC returning players with 3,056 career all-purpose yards. Coley earned second-team All-ACC honors last season after making 47 catches for 689 yards and four touchdowns.

Clemson, Florida State Make ACC AP Poll History

Tigers, Seminoles Become First Pair of ACC Teams Ranked in Top Five of the AP Preseason Poll

When Clemson was ranked second and Florida State was ranked fourth in the 2016 Associated Press College Football rankings that were released on Aug. 21, it marked the first time the ACC has had two teams ranked in the Top Five (or Top Four) of the AP Preseason poll. The Conference came close in 2004, when Florida State was ranked fifth nationally and Miami was rated sixth, but the league previously has never had a pair

of Top Five teams in the AP's first poll of the college football season. The league has had a pair of Top 10 teams in the AP Preseason Poll on six occasions, beginning with its first year of existence in 1953 when Maryland was ranked ninth and Duke 10th. The ACC also had two top 10 teams in 1991 (Georgia Tech (8) and Clemson (9)), 1997 (Florida State (3), North Carolina (7)), 2001 (Florida State (6), Georgia Tech (10)), 2004 and 2005 (Virginia Tech (8), Miami (9))

ACC's Labor Day Monday TV Ratings Success for ESPN

Throughout its 11-game history, the ACC's Labor Day Monday night appearance on ABC and ESPN, has been a ratings success. The 11 games have averaged a 5.1 rating. Last year's Ohio State-Virginia Tech game drew a 6.0 rating and had the most viewers in the history of the Monday College Football package with 10,584,991.

The 2010 Virginia Tech-Boise State telecast garnered a 7.3 rating and was seen by more households, at the time, than any ESPN college football telecast in history. The 7.3 rating was the highest Monday night rating (without the full-circle additions) and tied for the second-highest rated regular season college football telecast on ESPN since 1994.

The initial regular season Miami-FSU matchup in 2004 featured a 5.9 rating on ABC. One year later, the network enjoyed a 6.5 mark. In 2006, in the rivalries' first appearance on ESPN, the cable network put the broadcast on all of its channels--named a "Full Circle telecast"--thus creating a 7.6 cumulative rating. Eight of the 11 games have been nailbiters as well as the average margin of victory in those eight games has been just 4.5 points with two of the games going into overtime.

Collaborative Instant Replay

NCAA Football Rules require that all instant replay equipment and personnel be located in the stadium. For the 2016 season, the Football Rules Committee has approved a one-year experimental exception which allows conferences to use a “collaborative” process for instant replay. Under this exception, personnel in a location away from the stadium may assist the replay official at the stadium in making replay decisions.

The ACC has approved the implementation and use of a collaborative replay system for the 2016 season. Under this system, replay officials located in the Conference’s Game Day Operations Center (GDOC) in Greensboro will have the ability to view exactly what the in-stadium replay officials are viewing in real time. The replay officials in the GDOC will also be able to participate in the communication between the referee and the in-stadium replay official.

In order to implement this process, technology enhancements and upgrades are taking place this summer, both at the ACC GDOC and at all of the ACC’s stadiums. This will allow the replay officials in the GDOC and the in-stadium replay officials to simultaneously view the same camera angles of a play under review, and to communicate with one another, and with the referee.

The expected benefits of this collaborative process are greater consistency and accuracy in replay decisions

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHO WILL BE THE REPLAY OFFICIALS LOCATED IN THE GDOC?

ANSWER: They will be experienced replay officials who have consistently performed at a high level as in-stadium replay officials.

Q: HOW MANY REPLAY OFFICIALS WILL BE IN THE GDOC ON GAME DAYS?

A: There will be from one to three officials, depending on the number of games.

Q: WHAT WILL BE THEIR ROLE IN THE REPLAY PROCESS?

A: Their role will be to assist the in-stadium replay officials in the replay decision-making process, to ensure that the decisions being made are in accordance with the replay rules and are consistent with the replay philosophies established nationwide.

Q: TO WHAT VIDEO WILL THE OFFICIALS IN THE GDOC HAVE ACCESS?

A: They will have access to the same video that the in-stadium replay officials are provided, at the same time.

Q: WILL THE OFFICIALS IN THE GDOC BE ABLE TO COMMUNICATE WITH THE IN-STADIUM REPLAY OFFICIALS?

A: Yes, they will be able to speak with the in-stadium replay officials, and they will also have the capability to be involved in the communication with the referee during the replay process.

Q: DO THE ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE IN-STADIUM REPLAY OFFICIALS CHANGE AS A RESULT OF THIS NEW PROCESS?

A: No, the in-stadium replay officials will operate exactly as they have done in past seasons.

Q: DOES THIS NEW PROCESS CHANGE THE TYPES OF PLAYS THAT ARE REVIEWABLE?

A: No, having this new system neither adds to nor deletes from the list of reviewable plays.

Q: DOES THIS NEW PROCESS CHANGE THE REPLAY STANDARD OF REVIEW?

A: No, in order to reverse an on-field ruling, there still must be indisputable video evidence that the ruling on the field was incorrect.

Q: IN WHAT GAMES WILL THIS NEW SYSTEM BE USED?

A: The collaborative replay system will be used in all games played at ACC stadiums and at Notre Dame.

Four ACC Coaches In Top 15 in Wins Per Season



With the addition of **Mark Richt** and **Bronco Mendenhall** to the ACC, the league now features five of the top 11 coaches nationally in wins per season. Led by Florida State's **Jimbo Fisher**, who has averaged 11.33 wins during his first six seasons as a head coach, four other ACC coaches rank among the nation's top 11 coaches in wins per season with a minimum of five seasons as a head coach.



Miami's **Richt** is fifth (9.67), followed by Clemson's **Dabo Swinney** (7th), Louisville's **Bobby Petrino** (10th) and Virginia's **Bronco Mendenhall** is 11th.

Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** is not far behind, averaging 8.84 wins a year, which puts him in 14th place. **Beamer**, the winningest active FBS head coach, retired after the Camping World Independence Bowl.

Pitt senior tailback **James Conner**, who spent the 2015 season and offseason recovering from a knee injury and Hodgkins Lymphoma, recorded the third-best single-season rushing total in 2014, rushing for 1,765 yards and an ACC-record 26 touchdowns. The 2014 ACC Football Player of the Year, Conner is averaging 101.6 yards per game in his career, which would be seventh-best in ACC history. He also has 36 career touchdowns, putting him in 20th place on the all-time ACC list, 16 behind Wali Lundy of Virginia's ACC record 52TDs and 13 behind Ted Brown's ACC rushing TD standard.

Preseason Predictions; All-ACC

ACC Football Kickoff Media Tabs Clemson to Repeat For ACC Football Title

GREENSBORO, N.C.—Clemson is the preseason favorite to repeat as Atlantic Coast Conference football champion, according to a poll of 191 media members in attendance at the 2016 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte.

The Tigers, who posted a 14-1 overall record last season and reached the College Football Playoff national title game, are also picked to again capture the Atlantic Division, while North Carolina is favored to repeat as the Coastal Division winner.

Clemson junior quarterback Deshaun Watson was the overwhelming choice to repeat as ACC Player of the Year after his record-setting 2015 campaign. Watson was also the media's preseason selection as conference player of the year last season.

The Tigers were picked the likely 2016 ACC champions on 144 ballots, followed by Florida State with 39 votes and North Carolina with seven. One voter chose Louisville.

In the Atlantic Division preseason voting, Clemson received 148 first-place votes and finished with 1,293 total points. Florida State received 42 first-place votes and placed second with 1,176 points, while Louisville had one first-place vote and was third in the voting with 961 points.

NC State (704 total points) was tabbed for a fourth-place Atlantic Division finish, followed by Boston College (441), Syracuse (426) and Wake Forest (347).

North Carolina was selected the likely Coastal winner by 121 voters and finished with 1,238 total points, followed by Miami with 50 first-place votes and 1,108 points. Pitt received 14 first-place votes and was third in the balloting with 859 points.

Virginia Tech (three first-place votes) placed fourth with 697 points, followed by Duke (597), Georgia Tech (588) and Virginia (261). Two voters chose Duke to claim the Coastal Division, while one gave Georgia Tech the nod.

Preseason Favorite Clemson Has 10 Selected to the 2016 All-ACC Preseason Football Team

GREENSBORO, N.C.—Defending league champion Clemson leads all schools with 10 selections to the 2016 All-Atlantic Coast Conference Preseason Football Team announced on Wednesday. The team was selected by a vote of 191 media members who were credentialed for the 2016 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte.

Clemson junior quarterback Deshaun Watson, who was voted to repeat as ACC Preseason Player of the Year by the Kickoff media, is joined on the All-ACC offensive preseason team by Tiger wide receiver Artavis Scott, tight end Jordan Leggett, offensive tackle Mitch Hyatt, offensive guard Tyrone Crowder, center Jay Guillermo and placekicker Greg Huegel. Defensive tackle Carlos Watkins, linebacker Ben Boulware and cornerback Cordrea Tankersley are Clemson's defensive selections.

Florida State placed five student-athletes on the 2016 All-ACC preseason team, while Louisville and North Carolina each had three selected.

Watson, who in 2015 became the first player in FBS history to pass for 4,000 yards and rush for 1,000 more, is joined in the preseason All-ACC backfield by Florida State junior Dalvin Cook and North Carolina junior Elijah Hood.

FSU's Cook was the 2015 recipient of the Jim Brown Award – given to the nation's top running back by the Touchdown Club of Columbus – after setting school single-season records for rushing yards (1,691) and all-purpose yards (1,935). UNC's Hood rushed for 1,463 yards and 17 touchdowns as a sophomore last season. His single-season rushing total was the second-highest ever by a Tar Heel.

Clemson's Scott is joined on the preseason All-ACC wide receiving corps by fellow juniors Isaiah Ford of Virginia Tech and Travis Rudolph of Florida State. The trio combined for 227 catches, 2,981 yards and 24 touchdowns in 2015.

Preseason All-ACC tight end recognition goes to Clemson's Leggett, who was a John Mackey Award finalist last season with 40 catches for 525 yards and eight

touchdowns. He is joined on the offensive line by Florida State's Roderick Johnson and Clemson teammate Hyatt at tackle. Clemson's Tyrone Crowder and Pitt's Dorian Johnson man the offensive guard spots, while the Tigers' Guillermo was selected at the center position.

Florida State senior DeMarcus Walker and Pitt red-shirt senior Ejuan Price were the choices at defensive end, while Clemson's Watkins and Louisville's DeAngelo Brown received nods at defensive tackle. Price led the ACC and ranked eighth nationally with 0.88 quarterback sacks per game (11.5 total) last season.

Clemson's Boulware and the Louisville senior duo of Keith Kelsey and Devonte Fields fill the linebacker slots. Fields led the NCAA last season in tackles for loss per game (1.73), and Kelsey ranked among the ACC leaders in total tackles with 107.

The secondary features a pair of senior cornerbacks in Clemson's Tankersley and North Carolina Des Lawrence. Florida State safety Derwin James is joined at safety by Virginia junior Quin Blanding, the 2014 ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year. Tankersley's five interceptions last season tied for second in the conference, and Blanding ranked second in tackles per game with 9.6.

The special teams include Clemson's Huegel, a red-shirt sophomore. Miami senior Justin Vogel earned the spot at punter, while North Carolina senior Ryan Switzer is a repeat choice as return specialist. Switzer enters his final season with an ACC-record seven punt returns for touchdowns and is one shy of the NCAA mark.

Watson led the overall voting, being chosen by 188 of the 191 media members casting ballots. Florida State's Cook was named by 184 voters, and the Seminoles' Johnson was named on 153 ballots.

Watson, Scott, Roderick Johnson, Blanding and Switzer are repeat selections from the 2015 All-ACC preseason team.

ACC Divisional Tiebreaker

If more than one team in the same division is tied for the best winning percentage in its Conference games, the procedures listed below will be followed to determine the division's representative in the ACC Championship Game:

Two-Team Tie:

1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
2. Win percentage of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall win percentage. (Divisional and non-divisional) and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken from first-to-last using the league's tiebreaking procedures.
4. Overall win percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
5. Combined win percentage vs. all non-divisional opponents.
6. Win percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based on their order of finish (overall conference win percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based upon their divisional order of finish.
7. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw.(as administered by the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee.)

Three-Team (or More) Team Tie:

(Once a team is eliminated from the tie, the tie-breaker procedures restart for the remaining teams. If the three (or more) team tie can be reduced to two teams, the two-team tiebreaker format will then be applied.)

1. Combined head-to-head win percentage among the tied teams.
2. Win percentage of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference win percentage, and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken first to last, using the league's tie-breaker policies.
4. Combined win percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
5. Overall win percentage versus non-divisional opponents.
6. Win percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish (overall win percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional opponents based upon their divisional order of finish.
7. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

The College Football Playoff begins its third year of operation after two highly-acclaimed years of operation season. The Playoff features the top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and a national championship game played in a different city each year. Each semifinal is played during the New Year's holiday with the National Championship Game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

The College Football Playoff selection committee chooses the four teams for the playoff based on their performance during the regular season, including, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams are seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game. The selection committee announces its rankings each week on Tuesdays beginning this year on Nov. 1. The final rankings will be announced on Sunday, Dec. 4.

The semifinals rotate among six different bowls: the Chick-fil-A Peach, Goodyear Cotton, Fiesta and Capital One Orange Bowls; the Rose Bowl presented by Northwestern Mutual and the Allstate Sugar Bowl. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.

ACC Bowl Quick Selection Order

(The ACC is in the third year of six-year contracts with its current bowl partners. The current College Football Playoff format is a 12-year agreement)

College Football Playoff (four teams)

If the ACC Champion is not in one of the semifinal games this year, it will appear the Capital One Orange Bowl. There is no limit on how many teams the College Football Playoff may choose from a particular conference. There is also a possibility an ACC team could be chosen for a berth in one of the New Year's Six Bowls if it is ranked high enough. This year only one at-large spot is open in a New Year's Six Bowl, that would be in the Goodyear Cotton Bowl.

Capital One Orange Bowl

The ACC champion, if not in the College Football Playoff, will appear this year in the Capital One Orange Bowl. The opponent will be the highest-ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten or Notre Dame. If the ACC champion is selected for the College Football Playoff, then the next highest ranked ACC team will serve as the host team in the Capital One Orange Bowl.

Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl

In a year in which the Capital One Orange Bowl will not host the national semifinals, and the ACC opponent in the Orange Bowl is a team from the Big Ten, then the ACC will have a team selected to the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl prior to the selection for the Russell Athletic Bowl.

Russell Athletic Bowl

Has first pick of ACC teams in 2016 after the College Football Playoff, the Capital One Orange Bowl, the Host Bowls (if applicable) and the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl (only should the ACC Orange Bowl opponent be a team from the Big Ten).

The One-Win Rule Applies Only to Notre Dame

The ACC's bowl selection will no longer be bound by the rigidity of a "one-win rule" but will have a general list of criteria to emphasize regionality and quality matchups on the field. A one-win rule does apply to Notre Dame's participation in the ACC Bowl structure. Notre Dame is eligible for ACC Bowl selection beginning with the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl and continuing through the league's bowl selections. However, Notre Dame must be within one win of the ACC available team which has the best overall record, in order to be chosen. In other words, if an ACC team was 9-3, a 7-5 Notre Dame team could not be chosen in its place. Notre Dame would have to be 8-4 to be chosen over a 9-3 league team.

ACC Bowl Expenses And Revenue

The Atlantic Coast Conference shares all bowl revenues. Each school is provided an initial expense allotment. The Conference will share in the cost of unsold tickets for participating bowl institutions. After all bowl expense allotments and ticket reimbursements are subtracted from the total bowl revenue, the remaining revenue is distributed evenly among ACC schools.

The ACC In Overtime

The ACC & Overtime

When Duke ended regulation tied with Indiana at 41-41 in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl on December 26, 2015, they played the 77th game featuring an ACC team that has had to go to extra sessions. Of the 77 overtime contests, a large portion of them--31--have been played in September. Games have gone into overtime for ACC teams a total of 20 times in November, while 14 have been played in October, three in August, seven in December and two in January (2006 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2012 Allstate Sugar Bowl). Of the 77 overtime contests, 38 have been ACC games while 39 nonconference games have gone into overtime. The home team has a 41-26 advantage in the 67 games played on campus. The team which wins the toss has a 41-36 record. Fifty-six of the games were decided in the first overtime with 14 games in double overtime, six in triple overtime and one in four overtimes.
