University Park, Pa., Oct. ---A Penn State team that had hoped to extend Army will launch a comeback drive Saturday against Virginia, at Richmond, in the sixth revival of that city's rapidly-expanding Tobacco Festival.

The kickoff is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. EST.

This meeting, third between the two teams, will cap a week-long celebration which will pit Richmond against The Citadel in a preliminary attraction Friday night.

Virginia, like Penn State, was stunned by week-end developments and gave up two touchdowns to drop its second game in a row, this one to George Washington by a 13-0 count.

Powerful Clemson licked the Cavaliers, 20-7, the previous week

Overwhelmed by Army's power, the Nittany Lions dropped a 35-6 decision to the Cadets after whipping Boston U., 35-0.

Opponents for the first time in 1893, Penn State last year added a 34-7 licking to its earlier 6-0 squeeze to own two wins in two starts against the Virginia foe.

Lion Coach Rip Engle, while disappointed by the Army outcome, feels confident his team will do better as the season progresses. A long session with the film version of last Saturday's game pointed up many mistakes while Engle hopes won't happen again.

"Inexperience is costly against a team of Army's size and speed," Engle said, "and we paid the price. But I don't think these boys are finished. I believe they'll play some good football before the season's over."

Sever Toretti, who scouted Virginia, thinks the Cavaliers are a lot better than they're rated off their first two games. "They have good size along the line," Tor points out, "and there's surprising speed in their backfield."

Toretti counts Iranian-born Jim Bakhitar "a hard runner who's going to give somebody a lot of trouble before he's finished." The Lion scout also expressed great admiration for Bakhitar's devotion to team play.

Physically, the Nittany Lions came out of the Army rout in fairly good shape. Center and co-captain Frank Reich injured his hand and end Ned Finkbeiner banged up a knee but both hope to get ready for Saturday's game. X-ray pictures early in the week will furnish the answer.

Except for halfback Lenny Moore, who gave an outstanding exhibition in defeat, Penn State's offense was ineffective against the Cadets and Coach Engle planned lots of work on both his ground and air game.

"Finding time to do what has to be done will be our big problem this week," Engle said. "There's considerable to be done both offensively and defensively if we hope to show any improvement by Saturday."

The Lion coach, in summarizing the game, said Moore demonstrated against Army that he was "a whole football player.

"He not only played 55 minutes of football, carrying the ball twice in every series, but he intercepted a pass, made at least two touchdown-saving tackles, scored our only touchdown, and otherwise deported himself like the all-American he is."

Only miscue charged against him came late in the game when, tired and worn, he was gang-tackled and gave up the fumble that led to Army's fifth and last touchdown.

PUNTS AND PASSES: Penn State's football party will travel by air, leaving Harrisburg (Pa.) Airport Friday morning and arriving at Richmond in time for a workout....The team will establish headquarters at Cavalier Court, on the outskirts of Richmond, and return home by the aerial route again Saturday night....Penn State's 96-man Blue Band will travel by train on the first of its traditional two trips.... The band members chose the Penn game at Philadelphia October 29 for its other trip....Penn State, which already has announced sell-outs for home games against Navy and Pitt, anticipates capacity crowds at the Virginia game and also at the West Virginia game later in the season....This is the seventh in the series of Tobacco Festival football games at Richmond, and Penn State owns the distinction of being the first Northern entry....Virginia played in two previous Festival games, and won both times.

CONDENSED RULES FOR RECORDING FOOTBALL STATISTICS*

(Issued by the N.C.A.A. Football Rules Committee's Sub-committee on Football Statistics)

(Continued from back of Form 347-A)

SECTION 6—PUNTS.

Article 1: Punts are measured from the line of scrimmage to the point of ultimate advance, if the ball remains in the field of play or goes out of bounds. (Note—"Ultimate advance" is the point where ball goes out of bounds, is downed, or is recovered by the defense to attempt a runback.)

(Note—"Ultimate advance" of the punt shall be construed to include also any distance which a receiver of the punt may retreat toward his own goal before attempting to return up field. This interpretation gives greatest benefit to both the punter and the receiver, since excellence of the punt normally is responsible for retreat by the receiver. Thus "minus yards" should NOT be recorded under "punt returns".)

Article 2: When a punt goes over the goal line (a touchback), distance of the punt is measured from the line of scrimmage to the 20-yard line only, since this is the limit of the punt's value to the kicking team.

Article 3: If a receiver muffs a punt and the ball continues toward his goal line, the punt is measured to the point of recovery or ultimate advance, as defined above. If a receiver muffs a punt and the ball bounds back toward the kicker's goal, the punt is measured to the point of the muff (the point of ultimate advance), and the receiver is credited with a punt return and with the yards from the point of the muff to the point of recovery, regardless of which team recovers the fumble.

Article 4: Punts blocked are included in "times kicked", and the yardage of a partially blocked kick is included in "yards kicked". If the ball travels toward the kicker's goal, and is recovered by the blocking (defending) team, the yardage is treated as a punt return by the player who blocked the kick. If the ball travels toward the kicker's goal and is recovered by the kicking team, the yardage is treated as a kick return by the player who blocked the kick, but the blocking team is charged with a fumble lost.

SECTION 7—KICK RETURNS.

Article 1: Only the number of punts and kickoffs which the receiving team actually attempts to return are included under kick returns. (Exception—Blocked kicks which travel toward the kicker's goal. See Article 4 of Section 6.)

Article 2: The return will be measured from the point where the returning player actually gains control of the ball to the point where the ball is declared dead, or is lost by fumble. There are no "minus yards" under kick returns (see note under Article 1 of Section 6).

Article 3: The return of an attempted field goal, which falls short and is returned by the defending team, is treated as a punt return.

SECTION 8—FREE KICKS.

Free kicks are recorded as kickoffs if made from placement, and as punts if the ball is punted. The receiving player is credited with a kickoff return, or a punt return, respectively.

SECTION 9—GOALS FROM THE FIELD.

Successful goals from the field are measured from the scrimmage line to the goal line, plus ten yards, since the goal posts are ten yards behind the goal line. The distance of such kicks is recorded only under "principal individual plays" on the reverse side of the Summary. The distance of a field goal attempt is not recorded under "punting".

SECTION 10—POINTS AFTER TOUCHDOWNS.

Article 1: A player attempting a try-for-point-after-touchdown by kicking is not charged with an attempt when a bad pass from center, or a fumble by the ball holder, precludes an opportunity to kick. Such an unsuccessful attempt is charged to the "team", rather than to any individual player. However, if the ball is momentarily fumbled and then kicked, an attempt is charged to the individual kicker, regardless of the success or failure of the effort.

Article 2: When a try-for-point-after-touchdown by forward passing is successful, the receiver is both charged with the attempt and credited with the point scored. When such a try is unsuccessful, the passer is charged with the attempt.

SECTION 11—SAFETIES.

No individual credit is recorded for any player on either team when a safety is scored. The team benefitting from the score is credited.

SECTION 12—FUMBLES.

On any play terminated by a fumble, the yards involved to the point of recovery are credited or charged to the player who fumbled, regardless of which team recovers the fumble.

(Approved Ruling—On rushing play, ball carrier of Team A fumbles at the line of scrimmage and the ball travels 5 yards toward Team B goal line, before it is recovered by Team B. Player of Team A who fumbled is credited with rushing gain of 5 yards, and Team A is charged with a fumble lost.)

WILD PASS FROM CENTER.

Any loss resulting from an obvious wild pass from center is charged to "center pass", and not to any individual player.

WAKE FOREST, N. C.---Despite the fact he hasn't drawn any rave notices for his performances this season, tackle Bob Bartholomew, Wake Forest's All-America candidate, is still one of the top linemen in the Atlantic Coast Conference in the opinion of the Deacons' head mentor, Tom Rogers.

"Bob hasn't been as flashy and spectacular as he was during his sophomore year when he was the talk of the conference," Rogers recently explained, "but he has been doing a tremendous job for us in workmanlike fashion."

The Rocky Mount senior, who is closing out his four-year college football career at Wake Forest, was named to several All-America selections last year. He was selected on Williamson's first team and was a second team choice on the NEA pick. In the 1955 pre-season selections he was one of the tackles on Francis Wallace's squad.

Rogers is quick to point out that nobody seems to be taking undue liberties at Bartholomew by aiming plays in his direction. "I don't know of any team we have played this season that has had as great amount of success running plays at Bob's position," the Deacon mentor added.

"We get to see the games over and over by looking at the movies," Rogers said, "and I am satisfied that Bob has been playing as good a brand of ball as he has in any of his previous seasons."

After playing most of the 1954 campaign with a badly damaged knee, Bob was forced to undergo an operation last winter. The operation made it possible for him to play this season, and he spent the entire summer strengthening his knee in preparation for a banner windup to his college career.

While he didn't reveal it, Bob recently remarked that he was bothered by the knee during the early part of the current campaign. "It feels great now," the 218-pound tackle said after the game with William and Mary last week, "and I don't think I will be bothered with it anymore."

Bob, who had a 91 average on his studies last spring, graduates in June and wants to take a fling at pro ball. He'll be at his regular left tackle slot when the Deacs play Virginia at Charlottesville Saturday afternoon and close out the 1955 season against the Blue Devils of Duke at Durham on Nov. 19.

WAKE FOREST, N. C.---"How they have come this far without winning more than one game is beyond me."

It was line coach Taylor Sanford doing the talking as he presented Coach Tom Rogers and other members of the Wake Forest coaching staff the scouting report on Virginia's Cavaliers, whom the Deacons meet at Charlottesville, Va., Saturday afternoon.

Sanford, who has spied on the Cavaliers in their past two games against Vanderbilt and Pittsburgh, said Virginia had a good ball club despite the fact it has won only one game in seven outings.

"It is a nice looking squad with a lot of big boys," Sanford emphasized in his report, "and we will have to play one of our better ball games if we expect to beat them."

The Wake Forest assistant coach went on to point out that the Cavaliers have been up against some mighty tough foes. They have lost to Clemson, George Washington, Penn State, Virginia Tech, Vanderbilt and Pittsburgh. The lone victory was a 20-13 triumph over Virginia Military.

"This Virginia club is due to break out in a touchdown spree one of these days," Sanford opined. "It has speed and power in the backfield and once boys like fullback Jim Bakhtiar and halfback Ralph Kneeland get started they are hard to bring down," he added.

Virginia has the fourth best rushing offense in the ACC with an average of 167.1 yards per game while the Deacs are on the bottom in the eight-school circuit in that department with a 110.7 average.

Bakhtiar, the 198-pound sophomore fullback from Abadan, Iran, is the Cavaliers' leading ball carrier. He has picked up 381 yards in 100 rushes for a 3.8 average, and ranks sixth in the conference.

The loss of senior halfback Herb Hartwell put a severe dent in the Cavaliers' attack in the game with Pittsburgh. Hartwell hurt his knee against Vanderbilt and has been declared out for the remainder of the season. He had a 6.4 rushing average before going on the shelf.

Saturday's game will be the sixth ACC test of the year for the Deacs and their first meeting with the Cavaliers since 1911 when Virginia won by a 29 to 5 score. Following this week's test, Wake Forest will have only one game remaining on the 1955 slate, a Nov. 19 date with Duke in Durham.

WAKE FOREST, N. C.---Assured of their best winning season since 1952, Coach Tom Rogers' Wake Forest College Deacons journey to Charlottesville, Va., Saturday for their first gridiron meeting with Virginia's Cavaliers since 1911.

The 13-7 triumph over William and Mary last week in the final game in Groves Stadium was the fourth for the Deacs this year and the most victories in a single season since the 1952 club won five while losing four and tying one.

In addition to the four wins, this year's club has dropped three tilts and tied one. The three losses were administered by Maryland and West Virginia, two of the three major unbeaten elevens in the nation, and Clemson, beaten only once in seven outings.

Saturday's scrap with the Cavaliers will be the sixth Atlantic Coast Conference encounter of the season for Wake Forest, the lone member in the eight-team ACC to play every other loop foe. The Deacs will carry a 2-2-1 league mark into the fray while Virginia has lost its one loop outing.

"The boys are determined to close out the season with wins over both Virginia and Duke," Coach Rogers said today, "and they know that is a mighty big order. Despite the fact Virginia has won only once in seven starts this year we are looking for one of our toughest battles of the season."

In the only other football game played between the two schools, Virginia posted a 29-5 victory. That was back in 1911, and Saturday's tilt will be the first grid meeting since that time.

However, the two schools have clashed several times in other sports.

The Deacon coaching staff is showing a great deal of concern over the way the team's passing attack has been halted in the past two games against Clemson and William and Mary. The Deacs completed only six of 23 aerials against Clemson and two of 10 against William and Mary.

Halfback Bill Barnes, who needs to catch only five more passes to better the existing ACC record of 29, has snagged only one aerial in the past two games. He was shutout in the game with the Indians, marking the first time this season he has failed to catch a pass.
