**Virginia Hosts Penn State; North Carolina and Wake Forest Resume Rivalry
 Duke Travels To No. 25 Stanford; Miami Goes to No. 21 Kansas State
 NC State and Maryland Also Face Tough Non-Conference Road Tests**

The Atlantic Coast Conference, fresh off one of the best non-conference weekends in its history begins Week Two of the 2012 season with Virginia hosting Penn State on national TV, North Carolina and Wake Forest meeting in conference play and Duke and Miami facing nationally ranked foes on the road...The ACC posted a 7-1 record against non-league foes in Week One, which ties for its fourth best weekend record... The ACC was also 7-0 on Saturday which tied its single-day best mark (Sept. 15, 2007) outside of league play...In Charlottesville, Virginia, coached by **Mike London** and led by junior **QB Michael Rocco**, hosts the Nittany Lions under new coach **Bill O'Brien** in a noon game (ABC) at Scott Stadium...O'Brien coached in the ACC for 12 years at Georgia Tech, Maryland and Duke... The Cavaliers opened 2012 with a 43-19 win over Richmond with Rocco throwing for 311 yards...In Winston-Salem, N.C., Wake Forest, coached by **Jim Grobe**, hosts North Carolina in the 105th meeting between the two schools in football at BB&T Stadium (3 pm, RSN)...Led by **QB Bryn Renner**, UNC was impressive in a

season-opening 62-0 win over Elon which was the debut for new head coach **Larry Fedora**...Coach **David Cutcliffe's** Duke Blue Devils travel to Palo Alto, Calif., to face the 25th-ranked Stanford Cardinal (10 p.m., Pac-12 Networks)...Duke got their season off with an impressive start with a 46-26 win over FIU with **QB Sean Renfree** throwing for 290 yards and **WR Conner Vernon** catching 10 passes for 180 yards...Miami, coached by **Al Golden**, also faces a tough test, travelling to Manhattan, Kansas, to face 21st-ranked Kansas State (Fox Regionals, Noon)...The Hurricanes are led by senior **QB Stephen Morris** and opened the year with a 41-32 ACC win over Boston College... Two other ACC teams also face difficult road games...NC State, coached by **Tom O'Brien** and led by **QB Mike Glennon**, travels to Storrs, Conn. to face Connecticut (Big East Network, Noon) at Rentschler Field...Meanwhile Maryland, coached by **Randy Edsall**, will venture to Philadelphia to face Temple (Noon, ESPNU) after opening the year with a 7-6 win over William & Mary...12th-ranked Clemson, com-

ing off its impressive win over 25th-ranked Auburn last week hosts Ball State 12:30 pm, ACC Network)...The Tigers, coached by **Dabo Swinney**, were led by **QB Tajh Boyd** and **RB Andre Ellington** in their win over the Plainsmen...In Tallahassee, Fla., 6th-ranked Florida State hosts Savannah State (ESPN3, 6 pm), a late replacement on its schedule for West Virginia, at Doak Campbell Stadium... Coached by **Jimbo Fisher**, the Seminoles are led by **QB EJ Manuel**...15th-ranked Virginia Tech, coached by **Frank Beamer**, and fresh off a come-from-behind 20-17 overtime win against Georgia Tech on Labor Day Monday Night, will host Austin Peay in a short week game at Lane Stadium (1:30 p.m., ESPN3)... The Yellow Jackets, coached by **Paul Johnson**, will also face a short week, hosting Presbyterian (7 p.m., ESPN3) at Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta...Boston College, coached by **Frank Spaziani**, was impressive in a 41-32 loss to Miami, as **QB Chase Rettig** threw for 441 yards and now hosts Maine Saturday at Alumni Stadium (1 pm; ESPN3) in Chesnut

Former Miami head coach **Jimmy Johnson**, who also coached at Arkansas and went on to professional fame as head of the Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys, will be inducted at the annual National Football Foundation banquet, which will be held Tuesday, December 4 at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City. Johnson's induction brings the total to 16 former players or coaches who have been tabbed for induction into the College Hall of Fame from current Atlantic Coast Conference schools over the last seven years.

Johnson coached five seasons at Miami, leading the Hurricanes to record of 52-9 and a winning percentage .852. His 1987 Miami team captured the school's second National Championship and his 1986 team played for the national title, but lost to Penn State. During his years with the Hurricanes, his teams defeated 19 nationally-ranked teams, 8 teams ranked in the top five and three teams ranked No. 1. His teams played in two Fiesta Bowls, two Orange Bowls and one Sugar Bowl game. During his five years in Miami, his teams were ranked nationally on 55 occasions, including 13 times being ranked No. 1 nationally. Prior to joining the Hurricanes, he served as head coach at Oklahoma State, rebuilding that program and posting a 29-26-2 record. His overall record in college is 81-35-2. Johnson played his collegiate football at Arkansas, where he was a starter on the Razorback's 1964 national championship team. After leaving Miami he enjoyed a successful career in the National Football League as head coach of the Dallas Cowboys and Miami Dolphins. He coached the Cowboys to two Super Bowl Championships. Johnson joins 15 other former players or coaches from current ACC schools who have been

selected for the Hall of Fame since 2006 including:

2012 ACC Football By The Numbers

First - The ACC's 7-0 record against non-conference competition Saturday tied for the best record on a single day for the Conference. The ACC was 7-0 on Sept 15, 2007. The most non-conference wins on a single day for the league is 8 (8-1) set on Sept. 12, 2009.

2 - Maybe for the first time in league history, though we don't have this record, two players from the same high school returned punts for touchdowns on the same day for different ACC teams. North Carolina's **Giovani Bernard** (70 yds) and Florida State's **Rashad Greene** (47 yds) both scampered for TDs on punt returns Saturday and both played their prep football at St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

2 Back-to-Back - When Virginia Tech downed Georgia Tech 20-17 in overtime on Labor Day Monday Night, it marked the second straight overtime appearance for both schools. Virginia Tech ended the 2011 season taking Michigan into overtime in the Allstate Sugar Bowl, while Georgia Tech did the same with Utah in the Hyundai Sun Bowl.

4th - The ACC's 7-1 non-conference record this past weekend ties for the third-best weekend non-conference record in league history and second-most non-conference wins with six of more wins. Only the league's records on Sept. 1, 2009 (8-1), Sept 8, 1979 (6-0) and Sept. 20, 2008 (6-0) were better. The conference also finished 7-1 on the weekend of Sept. 13-15, 2007.

5 - The number of ACC teams selected to the Preseason Top 25 named by **Sports Illustrated**. Florida State (11th), Clemson (14th), Virginia Tech (18th), Georgia Tech (20th) and NC State (25th) all were named to the SI Preseason Top 25.

6 - Six of the ACC's 12 starting quarterbacks hail from Virginia and all six led their teams to bowl games in 2011 including Clemson's **Tajh Boyd** (Hampton, Discover Orange), Virginia Tech's **Logan Thomas** (Lynchburg, Allstate Sugar), Virginia's **Michael Rocco** (Lynchburg, Chick-fil-A), Florida State's **EJ Manuel** (Virginia Beach, Champs Sports), NC State's **Mike Glennon** (Centreville, Belk) and North Carolina's **Bryn Renner** (West Springfield, Advocare V100 Independence).

8 - The jersey number of sophomore Duke wide receiver **Blair Holliday**, who suffered severe head injuries in a summer boating accident. The Blue Devils will wear a decal with the No. 8 on their helmets this fall to honor him.

10 - This year, the ACC welcomes back no fewer than 10 of its 12 starting quarterbacks from the 2011 season. Only Miami, which loses starter Jacory Harris, and Maryland, which lost C.J. Brown to a season-ending injury in pre-season camp, does not return its starting signal-caller. But the Hurricanes will start junior **Stephen Morris** (Miami) who has started five games (4 in 2010, one in 2011).

11 - The number of tackles for Maryland defensive end **Joe Vellano** in the Terrapins' season-opening win over William & Mary. Vellano, who last year became part of the first father-son combination to be named first-team All-ACC football squad selected by ACSMA, also made his first career pass interception in the 7-6 win over the Tribe. Joe's father, Paul, was first-team All-ACC pick at defensive tackle for the Terrapins in 1973 by the Atlantic Coast Sportswriters Association, which was ACSMA's original name.

12 - The number of true freshmen who played their first football games for **Miami** in the Hurricanes' 41-32 win over Boston College including **RB Duke Johnson**, who ran for 135 yards on just seven carries including TD jaunts of 54 and 56 yards; **WR Malcolm Lewis**, who had an 18-yard TD catch; and starting offensive tackle **Ereck Flowers**.

13 - The number of pass receptions for Clemson junior **WR DeAndre "Nuke" Hopkins** in the Tigers win over Auburn. The reception total is a Clemson school record. Hopkins now has 137 career pass receptions to his credit. Hopkins, who ranked 6th in the ACC with 72 catches in 14 games this year (5.1/g), is the first ACC receiver to have 50 or more catches in each of his freshman and sophomore seasons.

14 - The number of teams the ACC will have on July 1, 2013. **Pittsburgh** and **Syracuse** are scheduled to join the ACC on that date with the Panthers joining the Coastal Division and the Orange moving to the Atlantic Division.

38 - Clemson **QB Tajh Boyd** set an ACC single-season record for touchdown responsibility in 2011 with 38 TDR. Boyd threw 33 TD passes and ran for 5 scores. NC State's Philip Rivers originally held the old record with 37 TDR in 2003 that was tied by the Wolfpack's Russell Wilson in 2009.

43 - The number of ACC players selected to the first-ever **Senior Bowl Watch List**. The ACC ranked third nationally among all conferences in players selected to the list as prospective invitees to the Senior Bowl.

60th - This is the 60th year of **Atlantic Coast Conference Football**. The ACC was born on May 8, 1953 in Greensboro, N.C. where the conference office still resides. The league played its first season that fall, and saw its champion Maryland, win the national championship, the first of eight for current ACC schools.

60's - In its 60th year of existence and for the first time in its history **the ACC** had two teams scored 60 or more points on the same day. Seventh-ranked Florida State began its season with a 69-3 win over Murray State, while North Carolina tallied 62 points in defeating Elon (62-0) in the UNC coaching debut of Larry Fedora. Since 1953, ACC schools have topped the 60-point mark a total of 12 times.

66.4 - Florida State quarterback **EJ Manuel** heads into his senior season as one of the most accurate passers in ACC history. Manuel, who only became a full-time starter in 2011, has completed 353 of 532 passes in his career, a completion percentage of .664. Only Virginia's Matt Schaub (.670) and Wake Forest's Riley Skinner (.690) have completed passes at an equal or better rate.

75 - The number of yards for Duke **CB Ross Cockrell** on his return of a blocked FIU field goal for a touchdown in the Blue Devils 46-26 season-opening win. Cockrell's teammate **LB Austin Gamble** blocked the kick to set up a 10-point swing for the Devils that resulted in a commanding 37-14 lead.

100th - This is the 100th year of college football at **Duke**. The Blue Devils actually started playing football in 1888, but did not field teams from 1895 through 1919.

208 - The number of career pass receptions for Duke senior wide receiver **Conner Vernon**. Vernon moved into 4th place on the ACC career list for pass receptions in the Blue Devils' season-opening win over FIU with 10 catches. He trails only Aaron Kelly of Clemson (232), Desmond Clark of Wake Forest (216) and Billy McMullen of Virginia (210) on the ACC career list.

228 - The number of rushing yards for Clemson senior running back **Andre Ellington** in the Tigers' 26-19 win over 25th-ranked (USA Today) Auburn in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game. The yardage total was a career best and marked the 2nd-time Ellington has topped 200 yards in a single game. He had 212 yards in a 56-45 win over Maryland in 2011. It was also the 5th-best effort by an ACC player against a nationally-ranked foe.

252 - Virginia Tech head coach **Frank Beamer** has a total of 252 coaching victories in his career and now leads all active NCAA FBS head coaches. Beamer has moved past Lou Holtz for 8th on the NCAA's career FBS list with 7th-place Tom Osborne (Nebraska) now three wins away at 255. In 2011 alone, Beamer reached the 250 career win milestone as well as the 200-win mark at Tech.

260 - The punt return yardage total for **North Carolina** in its 62-0 dismantling of Elon last Saturday. The yardage is an ACC record, breaking the old mark of 227 yards set by Clemson against Georgia Tech in 1987. The Tigers managed their standard with 11 returns, UNC, which had three players return punts--Giovani Bernard (50.0 avg.), Roy Smith (21.1 avg.) and Erik Highsmith (33 yds on one return)--needed just 9 returns to set their record.

341 - Florida State **PK Dustin Hopkins** has 341 career points, putting him in 3rd place on the ACC career scoring list. Hopkins now only trails Maryland's Nick Novak, who scored 393 points during the 2001-04 seasons, and Florida State's Xavier Beitia who scored 375 points concurrently with Novak.

2012 ACC FB Game Summaries--Week 1

#16/20 Virginia Tech 20, Georgia Tech 17 (OT)

PK Cody Journell booted a 41-yard field goal as time expired in regulation to tie the game and then nailed a 17-yard field goal in overtime to lift Virginia Tech past Georgia Tech in Monday night's season opener. Journell's heroics came after QB Tevin Washington's 10-yard pass to AB Deon Hill with 44 seconds left in regulation had lifted the visiting Yellow Jackets (0-1, 0-1) to a 17-14 lead. The 16th-ranked Hokies (1-0, 1-0) then quickly moved into range for the tying field goal, keyed by QB Logan Thomas' 23-yard pass to SE Corey Fuller on fourth down. Virginia Tech LB Jack Tyler ended the game with 17 tackles, tops among ACC defenders during the opening weekend.

Miami 41, Boston College 32

The visiting Hurricanes rallied from an early 14-0 deficit to defeat the Eagles in Saturday's season-opening ACC game at Chestnut Hill. Freshman RB Duke Johnson scored on runs of 54 and 56 yards and finished with 135 yards rushing to key the Hurricanes (1-0, 1-0). QB Chase Rettig completed 32 of 51 passes for 441 yards and two touchdowns for Boston College (0-1, 0-1).

#14/14 Clemson 26, #-/25 Auburn 19

RB Andre Ellington rushed for 228 yards, while DeAndre Hopkins set a school record with 13 receptions, including the game-winning touchdown with 9:17 to play in the fourth quarter as No. 14 Clemson downed Auburn in Saturday night's Chick-fil-A Classic at Atlanta's Georgia Dome. Clemson rolled up 528 total yards, including 320 on the ground. PK Chandler Catanzaro connected on four field goals for Clemson, connecting from 24, 40, 37 and 18 yards. Catanzaro's final kick came with just over a minute to play and accounted for the final seven-point margin of victory.

#7/7 Florida State 69, Murray State 3

Sophomore RB James Wilder Jr. led the way with 106 rushing yards and two touchdowns and the seventh-ranked Seminoles opened the 2012 season with an impressive victory at home. As a team, FSU rushed for 285 yards and scored seven rushing touchdowns. FSU's seven rushing touchdowns were the most since the team ran for that same number against Maryland in 1992.

Duke 46, FIU 26

A 30-point second quarter put the Blue Devils in firm control as they captured their season opener in convincing fashion Saturday night at Wallace Wade Stadium. The biggest play came on the final play of the first half, when Duke LB Austin Gamble blocked a field goal try for the Panthers and Duke teammate Ross Cockrill raced 75 yards – the longest return of a blocked field goal in school history – for a touchdown and a 37-14 Blue Devil lead at the half. Duke's Sean Renfree threw for 290 yards and two touchdowns, senior WR Conner Vernon had 10 catches for 180 yards and QB Brandon Cornette ran for one TD and threw for another.

Wake Forest 20, Liberty 17

Freshman RB Deandre Martin scored the go-ahead touchdown on a 2-yard run with 13:24 to play, allowing Wake Forest to fend off the determined Flames in Saturday night's season opener. Other big plays for the Demon Deacons included QB Tanner Price's 31 TD pass to WR Michael Campanaro in the second quarter and FS A.J. Marshall's game-tying 39-yard interception return for a TD with 4:16 left in the third quarter.

North Carolina 62, Elon 0

Giovani Bernard scored touchdowns on a 59-yard run, a 7-yard pass from Bryn Renner and a 70-yard punt return as the Tar Heels romped past Elon in Larry Fedora's UNC coaching debut. UNC posted its first shutout win since 1999 while registering its highest point total since blanking Ohio by a 62-0 score in 1995. The Tar Heels also established a new school and ACC record for single-game punt return yards with 260 on nine returns.

Virginia 43, Richmond 19

Quarterback Michael Rocco threw for 311 yards and a touchdown to lead the Cavaliers to the season-opening win in Saturday's in-state rivalry game. WR Darrius Jennings was on the receiving end of Rocco's 51-yard TD pass, while RB Kevin Parks ran for two touchdowns and RB Perry Jones ran for another for Virginia, which defeated Richmond in a season opener for the second time in three years.

Maryland 7, William & Mary 6

Running back Justus Pickett's six-yard scoring run and Brad Craddock's extra point with 9:52 to play capped a 10-play drive and lifted Maryland to a season-opening win over William & Mary. LB Demetrius Hartsfield recorded a game-high 13 tackles and had a 15-yard fumble return to key the Terrapins' stout defensive effort. DL Joe Vellano added 11 tackles for Maryland.

Tennessee 35, NC State 21

Wide receiver Cordarrelle Patterson scored two first-quarter touchdowns - one a 41-yard catch, the second a 67-yard run - to lead the Volunteers past the Wolfpack in Friday night's Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game at Atlanta's Georgia Dome. NC State quarterback Mike Glennon threw for 288 yards and one TD, but suffered four interceptions. Running back Mustafa Greene, seeing his first action since 2010 after missing all of last season due to injury, led the Wolfpack in rushing with 53 yards on 11 carries.

Junior QB **Chase Rettig** registered his first career 400-plus yard passing game in Saturday's 41-32 ACC loss to Miami ... Rettig's 441 yards were the most since Doug Flutie threw for 447 yards against Penn State on Nov. 3, 1984 ... Rettig's effort ranks sixth on BC's single-game record list ... He also tallied career highs in completions (32) and attempts (51) ... Junior PK **Nate Freese** improved to 14-of-14 on field goals from 20-29 yards with a 26-yard second quarter field goal ... The Strongsville, Ohio, native's third field goal from 30 yards made him 14-of-18 from 30-39 yards in his career and gave him his sixth game with three or more field goals ... Junior LB **Kevin Pierre-Louis** recorded his seventh career double-digit tackle game (14) on Saturday ... Junior LB **Steele Divitto** recorded his second career double-digit tackle game (11) ... Junior WR **Alex Amidon** registered his second career 100-yard receiving yard game (149 yards) and set a career high with 10 receptions against the Hurricanes.



Maryland

DL **Joe Vellano**, who led all FBS linemen with 7.8 tackles per game last season, recorded 11 tackles on Saturday in a 7-6 win over William & Mary ... Vellano played his first game in new defensive coordinator **Brian Stewart's** 3-4 scheme ... Vellano also made his first career interception in the second quarter on a tipped pass and recorded two tackles for loss ... LB **Demetrius Hartsfield**, who entered the game as the ACC's career active leader in tackles with 260, recorded a double-digit tackle game by finishing with 13 ... Hartsfield had seven double-digit efforts in nine games last season ... Hartsfield also had a fumble recovery with 1:11 left that sealed the win ... Despite having four players making their first career starts on defense, Maryland held William & Mary to 229 yards of total offense, including just 104 on the ground on 41 rushes (2.5 yards per rush) ... QB **Perry Hills** became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for Maryland since Latrez Harrison in 1999, and the first freshman to start a season-opener since redshirt freshman Calvin McCall on Sept. 2, 1999.



Clemson

12th-ranked Clemson's 26-19 victory over Auburn on Saturday night at Atlanta's Georgia Dome was its first season-opening win away from home since 1985 -- a victory at Virginia Tech on a field goal by David Treadwell on the last play of the game ... Auburn was ranked 25th by USA Today in the preseason poll. Saturday's win marked just the fourth time Clemson has opened the season with a win over a top-25 team, but it is the third time it has happened since the 2005 season ... RB **Andre Ellington** rushed for a career high 228 yards vs. Auburn .. Ellington's previous high was 212 at Maryland last year ... He now has three consecutive games with at least 100 yards on the ground, and his 10 career 100-yard games are the most among active ACC players ... Florida State

For the first time since 2002, Wake Forest played two foreign players in the same game in P **Alex Kinal** (Australia) and DE **Hasan Hazime** (Canada) ... True freshmen **James Ward** (CB) and **Tylor Harris** (NG) both saw time for the Deacons on defense in the Liberty game ... It is the first time since 2010 that head coach **Jim Grobe** has played multiple true freshman in the season opener.

Duke

WR **Conner Vernon** has moved into fourth place on the ACC's all-time chart for pass receptions (208) ... He is the second player in Duke history and seventh player in ACC history to amass 200 career pass receptions ... Vernon has moved into 12th on the ACC's all-time receiving yardage chart with 2,855 yards over four seasons ... Vernon continues to own the longest receiving streak in FBS football (36 games) and is one of only three players nationally with a streak of at least 30 games ... The official attendance for the Blue Devils' 46-26 win over FIU last Saturday night was 31,117, marking the 10th home crowd of 30,000 or more fans in the 28 home games since the arrival of head coach **David Cutcliffe** ... In the 47 home games prior to Cutcliffe's arrival, Duke posted just four crowds of 30,000 or more spectators ... The Blue Devils' 30-point second quarter vs. FIU was the fourth-highest single-quarter scoring output in school history ... The Blue Devils scored at least 40 points for the eighth time under Cutcliffe and improved to 7-1 when reaching the 40-point mark during the Cutcliffe era.



North Carolina

UNC established a new school and ACC record for single-game punt return yards with 260 on nine returns in last Saturday's 62-0 win over Elon ... The previous ACC mark was 227 by Clemson against Georgia Tech in 1987 ... UNC had 14 different receivers catch a pass in the win and no one caught more than three balls ... The shutout was the first for the Tar Heels since a 38-0 win over Duke to close out the 1999 season and the first season-opening shutout since a 45-0 win over Clemson to start the 1996 season ... QB **Bryn Renner** finished 14 of 21 for 236 yards and three touchdowns despite playing in just one series after halftime ... Renner now has 29 career touchdown passes and Saturday was his fifth career game with at least three passing scores ... Renner also registered his first career reception, an 18-yard gain from **Erik Highsmith** in the second quarter ... TB **Giovani Bernard** matched a career high with three touchdowns (one each rushing, receiving and punt return) and finished with 203 all-purpose yards ... Bernard finished with 93 yards rushing on just nine carries and two receptions for 10 yards.



Georgia Tech

OLB **Jeremiah Attaochu** is just eight tackles shy of 100 for his career after making a team-high 10 in Monday night's 20-17 overtime loss at Virginia Tech ... Sophomore RB **Charles Perkins** rushed for five yards against the Hokies to give him exactly 100 career yards ... AB **Orwin Smith** needs 143 kick-return yards to reach the 1,500-yard career mark... QB **Tevin Washington** is 210 yards shy of surpassing the 4,000-yard mark for career total offense ... Washington, who rushed for 63 yards and passed for 96 in the Virginia Tech game, currently ranks among the top 15 in six different career stat categories at Georgia Tech ... DE **Izaan Cross** and Smith both played their 40th career games on Monday night at Virginia Tech ... Despite Monday night's tough loss to the Hokies, the Yellow Jackets still own an impressive 12-5 mark under head coach **Paul Johnson** in games decided by five points or less ... Saturday's game vs. Presbyterian will be the first of four straight home contests for the Yellow Jackets.



Virginia

With Saturday's 43-19 win over visiting Richmond, Mike London became the first Virginia head coach since Rice Warren (1913, 1920-21) to win his first three season openers ... This marks the first time Virginia has won three season openers since the 2003-05 seasons ... With 545 yards of total offense vs. the Spiders, Virginia reached the 500-yard plateau for the third time under London ... QB **Michael Rocco** passed for 311 yards to make him the 16th player in UVa history to reach the 3,000-yard plateau for passing in a career ... LB **Denzel Perryman's** interception return for a touchdown in Saturday's 41-32 win at Boston College was the first for the Hurricanes since Kelvin Cain returned one 59 yards against Bethune-Cookman on Oct. 1, 2011 ... The interception and touchdown were career firsts for the sophomore ... With a second-quarter TD run, RB **Duke Johnson's** became the first Miami true freshman to start and score in a season-opener since Jacory Harris raced 30 yards against Charleston Southern on Aug. 28, 2008 ... Miami is now 57-29-1 all-time in season openers and has won four of the last five ... The Canes improved to 16-12 in road openers ... ACC Players of the Week

Sept. 4, 2012

Clemson's Ellington, Freeman Honored for Performance against 25th-ranked Auburn

GREENSBORO, N.C. – Clemson running back Andre Ellington and center Dalton Freeman headline a list of eight players named as the Atlantic Coast Conference Football Players of the Week, announced by the conference on Tuesday. Ellington rushed for a nation-leading 228 yards and Freeman played every snap at center as the Tigers defeated No. 25 Auburn, 26-19.

Virginia Tech also had two players recognized from its 20-17 Labor Day Monday night overtime win against Georgia Tech. Jack Tyler was named the Linebacker of the Week after tallying a conference-leading 17 tackles, and teammate Cody Journell was named the Specialist of the Week as he connected on a game-tying field goal on the last play of the regulation and the game-winning kick in overtime.

Duke's Conner Vernon, the Receiver of the Week, became the all-time leader in receptions in Blue Devil history. Florida State's Bjoern Werner, the Defensive Lineman of the Week, had four sacks for minus-28 yards in just over one half of play. Wake Forest's A.J. Marshall returned an interception 39 yards for a touchdown in a 20-17 win over Liberty and was named the Defensive Back of the Week. Miami's Duke Johnson rushed for 135 yards and two touchdowns on just seven carries against Boston College in his debut.

OFFENSIVE BACK – Andre Ellington, Clemson, Sr., RB, 5-9, 195, Moncks Corner, S.C.

Ellington gained 228 yards rushing in 25 carries to lead Clemson to a 26-19 victory over 25th ranked Auburn in the season opener in Atlanta. Ellington's total was the most in the nation this weekend, the most by a Clemson running back against an SEC team in history, and the most in a season opener. Ellington had 80 yards rushing in eight carries in the fourth quarter when he set up two scores with long runs. The 228 yards ranks as the fifth-best effort by an ACC back against a ranked opponent. Ellington was named the National Running Back of the Week by College Football Performers and is one of four candidates for the National Player of the Week by ESPN. Voting will take place during this week.

OFFENSIVE LINEMAN – Dalton Freeman, Clemson, Sr., C, 6-5, 285, Pelion, S.C.

Freeman played every snap (87) at center and graded a team best 94 percent in the win over Auburn. Freeman had five knockdown blocks to lead the team in that category as well. The senior directed the Clemson offense from a pace standpoint, as the Tigers ran 87 plays for 528 yards, including 320 rushing yards. It was the most rushing yards in a game for Clemson in three years. Clemson ran for 137 yards in the fourth quarter and many of the key blocks were provided by Freeman.

RECEIVER – Conner Vernon, Duke, Sr., WR, 6-1, 200, Miami, Fla.

In Duke's season-opening 46-26 win over FIU, Vernon caught 10 passes for 180 yards and one 28-yard touchdown. He averaged 18.0 yards per reception with five catches resulting in first downs as he became Duke's all-time leader in pass receptions with 208, eclipsing the previous mark of 207 held by former high school and collegiate teammate Donovan Varner. In the ACC's record book, he moved into fourth place on the career receptions list (208; passed NC State's Jericho Cotchery, Duke's Donovan Varner & FSU's Peter Warrick on the night) and into 12th place on the career receiving yardage chart (2,855; passed GT's Kerry Watkins, Clemson's Aaron Kelly, WF's Desmond Clark & UNC's Hakeem Nicks on the night). Vernon matched a school career record with his fourth game with 10 or more receptions (Roger Boone), and extended streak of consecutive games with at least one reception to 36 games, the nation's longest active streak.

DEFENSIVE LINEMAN – Bjoern Werner, Florida State, Jr., DE, 6-4, 255, Berlin, Germany

Werner turned in one of the top defensive individual performances in Florida State history as the No. 7 Seminoles defeated Murray State 69-3 in Saturday's season-opener. In just over one half of play, Werner registered five solo tackles – all of which came behind the line of scrimmage for minus-30 yards. Four of the tackles were quarterback sacks, accounting for minus-28 yards and matching the most by an FSU player since Alonzo Jackson recorded four at Louisville in 2002. Werner's five tackles for loss came up one shy of the 45-year-old school record set by Dale McCullers against Memphis State in 1967. In addition to his tackles, Werner forced a fumble and broke up a pass. His performance earned him National Defensive Performer and National Defensive Lineman of the Week honors from the College Football Performance Awards, and the national Lott IMPACT Player of the Week.

LINEBACKER – Jack Tyler, Virginia Tech, Jr., LB, 6-1, 236, Oakton, Va.

Tyler had a huge game against Georgia Tech's tough spread option attack, registering a career-high 17 tackles (seven solo) in Virginia Tech's 20-17 overtime win. He also had a tackle for loss as the Hokies held GT to just 288 yards of total offense.

DEFENSIVE BACK – A.J. Marshall, Wake Forest, Jr., CB, 6-0, 190, Durham, N.C.

Marshall was instrumental in Wake Forest's 20-17 win over Liberty. Marshall had six total tackles including two solos and four assists. He led the team with 1.5 tackles for loss and two pass break-ups. His biggest contribution was an interception and 39-yard return for a touchdown late in the third quarter that pulled the Deacons into a 14-14 tie. The interception was the first of his career.

SPECIALIST – Cody Journell, Virginia Tech, Jr., K, 6-0, 195, Ripplemead, Va.

Journell tied the game at the end of regulation with a 41-yard field goal and then won the game for the Hokies in overtime with a 17-yard field goal to help Virginia Tech defeat Georgia Tech, 20-17.

ROOKIE – Duke Johnson, Miami, Fr., RB, 5-9, 188, Miami, Fla.

Johnson was one of two true freshmen (Ereck Flowers, T) to start in Miami's 41-32 win at Boston College as he totaled 135 rushing yards and two touchdowns on seven carries, the most rushing yards by a UM true freshman since Javaris James racked up 148 against Houston in 2006. He scored his career-first touchdown on a 54-yard scamper in the second quarter and added a 56-yard score in the third quarter. Johnson tallied team-high 214 all-purpose yards (135 rush, 10 receiving, 69 kick return).

Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer Becomes NCAA FBS Active Career Leader in Wins

Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer is now the leading active head coach in the NCAA's FBS in career victories with a total of 252 triumphs in his 31-year coaching career. Beamer is currently in 8th place on the all-time career wins list for the FBS, and trails former Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne (255) by three triumphs and former BYU head coach LaVell Edwards (257) by five wins. Georgia Tech head coach Paul Johnson ranks 13th on the active FBS list with 140 career wins and NC State's Tom O'Brien is in 21st place (108). Former Florida State head coach Bobby Bowden, who retired after the 2009 season, finished his career in 2nd place on the all-time list with 389 victories, though the NCAA recognizes only 377 triumphs due to NCAA sanctions. With the NCAA sanctions levied against Penn State, Bowden is now the NCAA FBS all-time leader.

Five Current ACC Head Football Coaches Have UVa Ties

When **Al Golden** joined the ACC as Miami's head coach for the 2011 season, he became the fifth former UVa assistant or graduate assistant coach to be a current head football coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Golden joined Boston College's **Frank Spaziani**, NC State's **Tom O'Brien**, Virginia's **Mike London** and Wake Forest's **Jim Grobe** as current ACC head coaches who have spent time as assistants or graduate assistants for the Cavaliers. Golden spent four seasons (2001-04) at Virginia as defensive coordinator under Al Groh. The Eagles' Spaziani served as an assistant coach at Virginia under then head coach George Welsh for nine seasons (1982-90), the last five as defensive coordinator. O'Brien also served under Welsh at UVa, spending 15 seasons (1982-96) there including the last six as offensive coordinator. London served two terms at UVa under Groh, serving as defensive line coach in 2001-04 and again in 2006-07 as defensive coordinator and defensive line coach. London and Golden also served as assistants to Tom O'Brien at Boston College. Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe, a 1975 Virginia graduate, who just completed his 11th season with the Deacons, lettered two seasons at UVa as a middle guard and linebacker and also spent one year as a graduate assistant coach (1975) under then Virginia head coach Sonny Randle.

Wake Forest's Jim Grobe Latest To Join 100-Win Club

With a dramatic 24-23 win over Duke on Oct. 22, 2011, Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe became the fourth active ACC coach with 100 career wins.

Grobe now has a record of 102-100-1 career mark for 18 seasons, the last 11 with the Deacons. NC State's Tom O'Brien gained 100 career triumphs when NC State defeated 22nd-ranked West Virginia in the 2010 Champs Sports Bowl. O'Brien accumulated 75 wins in a 10-year stay at Boston College. Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer (251), and Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson (140) are the other ACC coaches over the century mark in career triumphs.

North Carolina's Larry Fedora Makes UNC/ACC Coaching Debut

North Carolina made his debut as head coach a successful one, leading the Tar Heels to a 62-0 win over in-state foe Elon last Saturday. Fedora, who led Southern Mississippi to the 2011 Conference USA championship last year, is now the 35th head coach in UNC history and its 11th since joining the ACC in 1953. Fedora compiled a record of 34-19 in four years as head coach at Southern Miss.

NC State's Tom O'Brien Latest To Coach at Multiple ACC Schools

NC State's Tom O'Brien is the fifth coach in Atlantic Coast Conference history to have served as a head coach of two ACC schools. O'Brien coached at Boston College from 1997 through 2006, which included the school's first two seasons (2005-06) of ACC membership. Jim Tatum was the first ACC coach at two schools; he first coached at North Carolina in 1942, then at Maryland from 1947-55 before returning to UNC beginning in 1956 until his death in 1958. Others who have coached at two ACC schools include Bobby Ross (Md, GT), Al Groh (WF, UVa) and Bill Dooley (UNC, WF).



Dooley actually coached at three current ACC schools as he spent nine seasons at Virginia Tech before the Hokies joined the ACC, in between stints at UNC and Wake Forest, winning 162 games in his career. Dooley and Ross are the only coaches in ACC history to be named ACC Coach of the Year at more than one school. Others who have coached at more than one current ACC school, though not necessarily when they were in the ACC, include John Heisman, who coached at both Georgia Tech and Clemson.

Tech's Beamer Becomes 10th FBS Head Coach To Win 200 Games At One School

With a 17-10 win over East Carolina in 2011, Virginia Tech head football coach Frank Beamer accomplished yet another milestone in a career which now spans 32 years as a head coach. The win was Beamer's 200th at his alma mater making him only the 10th head coach in NCAA FBS history to have won 200 games at one school. He became only the second ACC head coach to do so, joining former Florida State head coach Bobby Bowden, Beamer's overall record in 25 seasons at Virginia Tech is 210-98-2 (.681). He is now only the second active FBS head coach with 200 wins at one school with Nevada's Chris Ault (227).

Florida State's Jimbo Fisher Joins Select Company in Second Season

In 2011 Florida State's second-year head coach **Jimbo Fisher** joined some select company in only his second season on the job as the Seminoles head coach. Fisher compiled a 19-8 record (.704) in his first two seasons. His winning percentage ranks him 12th among all ACC head coaches in their second season, ahead of such figures as Clemson's Danny Ford and Georgia Tech's Bobby Ross. The best mark recorded by an ACC head coach in his first two years in the league was by Fisher's predecessor at FSU, Bobby Bowden, who lost just twice in 25 games during the 1992-93 seasons, capturing ACC crowns in both years and the national title in 1993.

Clemson's Memorial Stadium Is Home Sweet Home for Tiger's Dabo Swinney

Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney has enjoyed coaching in the cozy and imposing confines of the Tigers' home field, also known as Death Valley. In his first four seasons as head coach of the Tigers, Swinney's teams have won 12 of the first 14 home ACC games, a winning percentage of .857. That stacks up pretty well with some of the great names in ACC coaching. Swinney's winning percentage ties him with Maryland's Jerry Claiborne for 3rd among ACC head coaches. Another former Tiger coach, Ken Hatfield, has the highest percentage, posting a 12-1-1 mark in four seasons (.893). Legendary Florida State coach Bobby Bowden won more ACC home games than any other coach games with 62 triumphs in his 18 years in the league and his winning percentage of .861, is second-best. Bowden's successor at Florida State, Jimbo Fisher is on a pretty good pace himself, having won six of his first eight ACC home games. Four Clemson coaches rank in the Top 10 including Hatfield (1st), Swinney (tie for 3rd), Danny Ford (7th) and the legendary Frank Howard (tied for 9th).

Harding and his fellow offensive linemen along with strength and conditioning assistant Marcus Johnson, spent nearly two weeks in Ethiopia helping to construct freshwater wells for local communities. The group finished one halfway-completed well and began the drilling process for a second well, ensuring safe drinking water for

Glennons are the third Brother Tandem to Start at Quarterback in the ACC

When NC State's Mike Glennon started all 13 games for the Wolfpack in 2011, leading the team to an 8-5 record and throwing

for 31 touchdowns, he became part of only the third brother tandem to start at quarterback in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Glennon's older brother Sean started at quarterback for Virginia Tech during the 2004-08 seasons and was named MVP of the 2008 ACC Football Championship Game. Together, they have combined to complete 60.4% of their passes for 8,535 yards and 61 touchdowns. They follow in the footsteps of Chris (1972-74) and Matt Kupec (1976-79), who started at quarterback for North Carolina, and Rod (1980-82) and Mike Elkins (1985-88), who started at quarterback for North Carolina and Wake Forest, respectively. The Elkins brothers have the most fraternal passing yards with 10,011. The Glennons, especially if Mike can duplicate his junior season, should pass that sometime this year, along with the Elkins' total of 68 touchdown passes.



Duke's Vernon On Pace to Break ACC Receiving Standards

With 10 catches for 180 yards in his first 2012 game, Duke senior WR Conner Vernon

is within sight of becoming the ACC's all-time leading receiver. Vernon, a 2nd-team All-ACC pick last year who became the first receiver in league history with back-to-back 70-catch seasons, moved from 7th to 4th last weekend on the ACC career reception list with 208 catches, and from 15th to 12th in pass reception yardage with 2,855 yards. He needs 25 receptions and 663 yards to set ACC standards in both categories. One of those he passed last weekend was former teammate Donovan Varner, who ended his career last year with 207 career receptions.

5. Combined record vs. all non-divisional teams.
6. Record versus common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish (divisional and non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division.
7. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the end of regular season game shall be the divisional representative in the ACC Championship Game.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw.

Three-Team (or More) Team Tie

(Once tie has been reduced to two teams, the two-team tiebreaker format is used.)

1. Combined head-to-head record among teams.

3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall (divisional or conference) record, and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken first to last.
4. Overall record for non-divisional teams.

2012 ACC Bowl Selection

Bowl Championship Series

The winner of the Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game will be selected to play in the Bowl Championship Series. Unless the winner of the Dr Pepper ACC



Football Championship Game is ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings and plays in the BCS National Championship Game, then the ACC Champion will serve as the host team of the Discover Orange Bowl in Miami, Fla. This year's Discover BCS National Championship Game will be hosted by the Discover Orange Bowl on Jan. 7 in Miami Gardens, Fla. The BCS may also select a second ACC team, if one is eligible for selection (Won at least nine regular season games and is ranked among

the Top 14 in the final BCS Standings), and there is an At-Large berth available and the team is selected by one of the four BCS Bowl Games—Discover Orange (only if the ACC Champion is in the BCS National Championship Game), Allstate Sugar, Tostitos Fiesta and the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio.

After the BCS selections, then the selection order is:

1. Chick-fil-A Bowl, Atlanta
2. Russell Athletic Bowl, Orlando
3. Hyundai Sun Bowl, El Paso, Tex.
4. Belk Bowl, Charlotte, N.C.
5. Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl, Nashville, Tenn.
6. Advocare V100 Independence Bowl, Shreveport, La.
7. The Military Bowl Presented by Northrop Grumman, Washington, D.C.
8. Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl, San Francisco, Calif.

*If Pac-12 or Navy is unable to fill obligation and ACC has an available team

Conditions:

1. The runner-up of the ACC Championship Game, provided, is guaranteed not to fall further than the Hyundai Sun Bowl. The Sun Bowl will select the ACC Championship Game runner-up in any year that team is available to them.

2. Otherwise, if the bowl does not select the team available with the best Conference record, then it must choose a team that is within one conference win of the team (The "One-Win Rule") with the best conference record (ie. 5-3 to 6-2), The bowl may take a team that has more than a one game difference, only if the team is ranked more than five spaces above the team with the best Conference record in the final BCS Standings.

3. If, after all bowl selections have been made, and the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl has an opening due to the inability of either the Pac-12 Conference or Army to provide a team, and the ACC has an available, eligible team, then the ACC will send a team to the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl

Selection Time Frame

The Bowl Championship Series will announce its selections on the BCS ESPN Selection Show on Sunday, December 2. In conjunction with the BCS selections, each Atlantic Coast Conference affiliated bowl game will make their selections in the order specified above. The ACC, the Bowls and individual schools will announce the selections after all selections are completed on Sunday.

The ACC and The Bowl Championship Series

The Atlantic Coast Conference and the BCS

The Atlantic Coast Conference has been a member of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) since its inception for the 1998 season. ACC Commissioner John Swofford, is the only Commissioner to twice serve as BCS Coordinator, having done so in the 2000 and 2001 seasons and again in the 2008 and 2009 campaigns, as the ACC successfully administered the BCS on two separate occasions. Swofford is also the last Commissioner to serve as BCS Coordinator. In 2009, the BCS group named longtime college administrator Bill Hancock to serve as the first Executive Director of the Bowl Championship Series. Hancock has since assumed most of the duties previously handled by the coordinator. Prior to being named Executive Director, Hancock served four years as the Administrator for the BCS.

BCS Standings

The BCS Standings are composed of three elements that are weighted equally: the USA Today Coaches poll, 2) the Harris poll, and 3) the average of six computer poll rankings. The highest and lowest computer ranking is discarded each week with the computer average based on the remaining four rankings. The BCS Standings are compiled and released by the National Football Foundation eight times during the season, beginning this year on Sunday, October 16 and ending on BCS Selection Sunday, December 4.

Playoff Coming In 2014-15

On June 26, 2012, the BCS Presidential Oversight Committee agreed to launch a four-team playoff beginning with the 2014-15 season. The new format will continue at least 12 years, through the 2025-26 season. The semifinals will be rotated among six bowl games and will be played either New Year's Eve or New Year's Day. The championship game, to be managed by the 11 conferences and rotated among neutral sites every year, will be on a Monday at least six days after the last semifinal game. A selection committee will rank the teams for the playoff.

Heading into its 15th year of determining the National Championship in college football, the **Bowl Championship Series (BCS)** is a five-game arrangement that is designed to match the two top-rated teams and to create competitive match ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The bowl games participating are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the Discover Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio and the Allstate Sugar Bowl. In addition, the BCS National Championship Game is played at one of the bowl sites, this year at Sun Life Stadium in Miami Gardens Fla., on January 7, 2013.

The term "BCS conference" frequently is used incorrectly. Actually, all 11 NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences are "BCS conferences" because the BCS arrangement is managed by the commissioners of the 11 NCAA FBS conferences and the director of athletics at the University of Notre Dame. The conferences are Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, Sun Belt, Pacific-12, the Southeastern and the Western Athletic.

The conference commissioners and the Notre Dame athletics director make decisions regarding all BCS issues, in consultation with an athletics directors advisory group and subject to the approval of a presidential oversight committee whose members represent all 120 NCAA FBS programs.

The BCS games are operated by community-based organizations in each of the host cities. In addition, there are 30 other post-season bowls, which are managed independently by entities in 27 cities around the nation. All bowl games provide meaningful season-ending opportunities for student-athletes.

The BCS is remarkably successful. It maintains and enhances the importance of the regular season and preserves the unique bowl tradition to the benefit of the student-athletes. And it matches the top two teams. Before the creation of the BCS and its predecessors, the Bowl Coalition and Bowl Alliance, the top two teams had met in a bowl game only eight times in the previous 56 seasons. They have met in each of the last 14 seasons by BCS standards, and 11 of the last 14 seasons according to the Associated Press poll. The 2012 regular season

(2013 bowl games) is the third year of the current four-year television agreement with ESPN, which will televise all five BCS games.

Six conferences (ACC, Big East, Big 12, Big Ten, SEC and Pac-12) have earned annual automatic qualification for the 2010-13 seasons by virtue of contracts to host the bowl games, and/or by having met a four-year metric based on competitive results (The ACC champion plays in the Discover Orange Bowl, the Big Ten and Pac-12 champs in the Rose Bowl presented by Vizio, Big 12 in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and SEC in the Allstate Sugar Bowl). Additionally, the highest-ranked champion of Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, Sun Belt or Western Athletic conferences will be guaranteed a slot in a BCS game if that team is

ranked 12th or higher in the final BCS standings, 16th or higher if its ranking is higher than that of a champion from one of the six conferences with automatic qualification. Other teams are eligible to be selected at large by a bowl game if they finish among the top 14.

The champions of the Big Ten and the Pac-12 will play in the Rose Bowl if they do not qualify for the National Championship Game. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl if those teams are not ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings.

Bill Hancock, Executive Director

Longtime athletics administrator Bill Hancock was named the first Executive Director of the Bowl Championship Series on November 17, 2009 and, in doing so, achieved a unique double-double at the upper echelon of intercollegiate athletics. He was the first full-time director of the NCAA Final Four and is now the first executive director of the BCS. Hancock served for 13 years as director of the NCAA's Division I Men's Basketball Championship--the three-week March Madness event that culminates at the Final Four. After a family tragedy, he retired in 2002 and for three years was the tournament's media coordinator on a consulting basis before being named BCS administrator in October of 2005. He is a 1972 journalism graduate of the University of Oklahoma and worked in sports information at his alma mater and also on the staff of the Big Eight Conference before being named director of the Final Four in 1989.

Noting ACC Football

Florida State Selected To Take ACC Football Title For the First Time Since 2005

GREENSBORO, N.C.--Florida State, seeking its first league title since 2005, is the consensus choice to win the Atlantic Division and to defeat Virginia Tech in the 8th Annual Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game according to a poll of media members who attended the 2012 ACC Football Kickoff at the Grandover Resort in Greensboro, N.C.

The balloting marks the second straight year that Florida State has been projected to win the ACC Football Championship, as the Seminoles were tapped by the media to win the 2011 title. Clemson was the actual 2011 ACC Football champion, defeating Virginia Tech 38-10 in the 2011 ACC title game in Charlotte.

Clemson sophomore wide receiver Sammy Watkins (Fort Myers, Fla.), who set ACC single-season freshman records for receptions (82), reception yardage (1,219) and receiving touchdowns (12), was the choice for Preseason Player of the Year. Watkins received 25 votes and nudged out Virginia Tech junior quarterback Logan Thomas (Lynchburg, Va.) who had 21 votes, Florida State senior quarterback EJ Manuel (Virginia Beach, Va.) coming in third with 19 votes and Watkins' junior teammate, quarterback Tajh Boyd (Hampton, Va.), finishing fourth with 18.

The Seminoles of coach Jimbo Fisher, who finished second in the Atlantic last year, received 72 of 95 first-place votes in that portion of the balloting. Sixty of the 95 also said Florida State will prevail in the title game, set for Dec. 1 at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C.

The Hokies, who have captured five of the seven Coastal Division crowns since the ACC went to divisional play in 2005, got 83 votes in the Coastal election. Eighteen electors picked Virginia Tech to garner its fourth ACC football championship in the last six years.

Florida State, Clemson, UNC Headline 2012 All-ACC Preseason Football Team, Each With Four Players Selected

GREENSBORO, N.C.-- Florida State, Clemson and North Carolina led all Atlantic Coast Conference schools each with four players selected to the 2012 Preseason All-ACC Football team in voting conducted by the media at the annual ACC Football Kickoff, which was held July 22-23 at the Grandover Resort in Greensboro. The Preseason All-ACC team was announced July 25.

In all, 19 of the 25 honorees on the team earned first or second-team All-ACC honors last fall, with eight having been selected to the All-ACC first team. Four of the selections are returning first-team or second-team 2012 All-Americans.

One of those returning All-America selections, Clemson wide receiver Sammy Watkins (Fort Myers, Fla.), who was named by the media as the ACC preseason Player of the Year on Monday, was the only unanimous selection on the team, being named on all 68 ballots.

Florida State, tabbed by the media at the ACC Football Kickoff to win its first ACC Football title since 2005, was represented by defensive end Brandon Jenkins (Tallahassee, Fla.), safety Lamaricus Joyner (Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.), placekicker Dustin Hopkins (Houston, Texas) and cornerback Greg Reid (Valdosta, Ga.), who was named as the specialist for his abilities as a punt and kickoff returner.

Clemson, which captured the 2011 ACC Championship and was selected by the media at the Kickoff to finish second to the Seminoles in the Atlantic Division, also had four players selected in Watkins, quarterback Tajh Boyd (Hampton, Va.), center Dalton Freeman (Pelion, S.C.) and running back Andre Ellington (Moncks Corner, S.C.)

North Carolina also had four players chosen preseason All-ACC in running back Giovanni Bernard (Davie, Fla.), offensive tackle James Hurst (Plainfield, Ind.), offensive guard Jonathan Cooper (Wilmington, N.C.) and linebacker Kevin Reddick (New Bern, N.C.).

Virginia Tech, selected by the media to capture its sixth Coastal Division title in eight years, placed three players on the team, all from its defense, in defensive end James Gayle (Hampton, Va.), linebacker Bruce Taylor (Riceboro, Ga.) and cornerback Kyle Fuller (Baltimore, Md.).

Three schools—Maryland, NC State and Virginia—each had two players chosen. Maryland was represented by All-America defensive tackle Joe Vellano (Rexford, N.Y.) and tight end Matt Furstenburg (Flemington, N.J.). NC State saw its All-America cornerback David Amerson (Greensboro, N.C.) and safety Earl Wolff (Raeford, N.C.) chosen to the team, while Virginia had linebacker Steve Greer (Solon, Ohio) and offensive tackle Oday Aboushi (Brooklyn, N.Y.) selected.

Duke, Georgia Tech, Miami and Wake Forest each had one player selected. Duke had wide receiver Conner Vernon (Miami, Fla.); Georgia Tech was represented by offensive guard Omoregie Uzzi (Lithonia, Ga.), and Miami by Dalton Botts (Taft, Calif.).

ACC 2012 Football Championship Game Legends Class

College Hall of Famers Ted Hendricks of Miami and Mike McGee of Duke,

ACC Players of the Year Torry Holt of NC State and Frank Quayle of Virginia Headline 2012 Class

Led by two members of the College Football Hall of Fame in former Miami defensive end Ted Hendricks (Miami Springs, Fla.) and former Duke guard Mike McGee (Elizabeth City, N.C.) and former ACC Players of the Year Frank Quayle (Garden City, N.Y.) of Virginia and Torry Holt (Gibsonville, N.C.) of NC State, the ACC has announced its Class of 2012 Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game Legends.

The Legends will be honored at this year's Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game weekend. They will be honored at the ACC Night of Legends sponsored by the Belk Bowl on Friday, Nov. 30, and on Dec. 1, during ceremonies at Bank of America Stadium for the 8th Annual Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship, which will be nationally televised with either a 7:45 pm (ESPN) or 8 p.m. (ABC) kickoff.

The group of 12 former gridiron standouts from current ACC schools includes three former ACC Football Players of the Year, six consensus first-team All-Americans, seven first-team All-Americans, and 10 players who combined for 84 years in the National Football League. Eleven of the Legends were drafted into the NFL, including eight first- or second-round draft choices.

A total of six of the 12 honorees were members of the ACC's 50th Anniversary team which selected the league's Top 50 players of its first 50 years in 2003.

Two of the honorees, McGee (1960) and Quayle (1969), were also named the winner of the ACC's McKeelin Award which is presented annually to the Conference's top overall athlete.

In all, the collection of players combined for three national championships, six ACC Championships, 10 NFL Super Bowl appearances and nine NFL Super Bowl titles.

Joining this quartet are Boston College offensive guard Bob Hyland (White Plains, N.Y.), the Eagles first lineman to be taken in the first round of the NFL Draft; Clemson tight end Bennie Cunningham (Seneca, S.C.), a consensus first-team All-America for the Tigers in 1974; Florida State linebacker Sam Cowart (Jacksonville, Fla.), a consensus first-team All-America for the Seminoles in 1997; and Georgia Tech safety Ken Swilling (Toccoa, Ga.), a consensus first-team All-America for the Jackets' 1990 National Champion-

ship team.

Completing the ACC Football Legends Class of 2012 are Maryland's Chet "The Jet" Hanulak (Hackensack, N.J.), an All-America running back off the Terrapins' 1953 National Champions; North Carolina's Dre' Bly (Chesapeake, Va.), a two-time consensus first-team All-America and one of the top cover cornerbacks in league history; Virginia Tech defensive back Pierson Prioleau (Alvin, S.C.), an All-America defensive back for the Hokies in the late 1990s and Wake Forest's Ed Stetz (Johnstown, Pa.), two-time All-ACC linebacker and defensive stalwart for the Demon Deacons' 1970 ACC Championship team.

Hendricks (1966-68), known as the "Mad Stork" for his tall (6-7), angular build and his dominating defensive play, started three seasons at defensive end for the Miami Hurricanes under coach Charlie Tate. A three-time All-America for the Hurricanes, he earned consensus, first-team All-America honors in 1967 and 1968, and led Miami to a 20-11-1 record. He ended his collegiate career as Miami's all-time leading tackler with 318 hits in 1968. That year, he was named UPI National Lineman of the Year and finished 5th in the Heisman Trophy balloting. He went on to a spectacular 15-year NFL career as an outside linebacker playing in 215 consecutive games with the Baltimore Colts, Green Bay Packers, Oakland and L.A Raiders. During his time in the NFL, he helped lead his teams to four Super Bowl championships, was an eight-time Pro Bowl selection, four times selected as an All-Pro and five times named second-team All-Pro. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame in 1987 and was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1990. He was named to the NFL's 75th Anniversary All-Time team and to the NFL's All-Decade team of the 1970's. He was inducted into the University of Miami Hall of Fame in 1980, to its Ring of Honor in 1997 and had his jersey number—number 89—retired, also in 1997. His philanthropic foundation—The Ted Hendricks Foundation—with goals aimed at providing assistance to local and national charities through awards, grants and scholarship programs aimed at recreational, health and educational programs for both youth and seniors, also sponsors the Ted Hendricks Award, which is

presented annually to the nation's top defensive end, but which also considers in the selection process academic and community excellence. Originally a native of Guatemala, he grew up in Miami Springs, Fla., and now lives in suburban Chicago, Ill.

McGee (1957-59) was a tenacious two-way guard for the standout Duke teams of the late 1950's under head coach Bill Murray. In 1959, he became the first ACC player to be honored with the Outland Trophy, which is presented annually to the nation's top interior lineman. That year, he was also voted the McKeelin Award, as the ACC's top overall athlete in any sport. He was also named the ACC Football Player of the Year and was a first-team All-America selection by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), Time and Look Magazines. The 14th overall selection of the 1960 NFL Draft, he played three seasons in the National Football League with the St. Louis Cardinals. He then began a career in coaching and served eight seasons (1971-78) as Duke's head coach. His 37 wins for the Blue Devils is the third-most for a coach in Duke football history. After leaving Duke, he began a successful 25-year career in athletics administration serving as director of athletics at Cincinnati (1979-84), Southern California (1984-93) and South Carolina (1993-2005). While at Southern California in 1989, McGee founded the well-regarded Sports Management Institute (SMI) to create a highly-academic, graduate-level business program for athletic administrators. Inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame as a player in 1990, he was later named to the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) Hall of Fame for his administrative skills in 2010. Born in Washington, D.C., he grew up in Elizabeth City, N. C., and now lives in Montrose, Col.

Quayle (1966-68), one of the top running backs in Virginia history, set more than 20 ACC offensive records in his three seasons in Charlottesville including, at the time, the single-season rushing mark of 1,213 yards in 1968. That year, he was named the ACC Football Player of the Year and, as also a standout in lacrosse, the ACC's Athlete of the

Year and winner of the McKeivin Award. His impressive 6.93 per-carry average in 1968 is still the third-best per-carry mark by an ACC back with over 1,000 or more yards in a single season. Quayle led the nation in 1966 in all-purpose yardage and he still holds the ACC all-purpose career per-game record (166.0). Quayle still ranks 16th on the ACC's career rushing yards-per-game list, 10th in ACC career all-purpose yardage (4,981) and is 7th on the Virginia career rushing list with 2,695 yards. A two-time, first-team All-ACC honoree (1967-68), he also earned Honorable Mention All-America honors in lacrosse (1967). He was selected in the 5th round of the 1969 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos and played one season in the NFL. He returned to Charlottesville in 1973 and began an ultra-successful career in real estate. His jersey number—24—is one of just six numbers retired at Virginia. He recently retired after 29 years as the radio football analyst on the Virginia Sports Network. Originally a native of Garden City, N.Y., he currently lives in Charlottesville, Va.

Holt (1995-98), one of the top receivers in ACC history, was named ACC Football Player of the Year in 1998 after setting league single-season records of 88 pass receptions and 1,604 receiving yards in just 11 games. Holt's record of 1,604 receiving yards still stands as the ACC's single-season record and his per-game average for that year (145.8) is still the 8th-best mark in NCAA FBS history. A two-time first-team All-ACC selection for head coach Mike O'Cain, his average of 8.0 receptions per game is an ACC single-season mark and his total of 88 catches that year is still the 2nd-best in league history. In 1997, he set an ACC single-game record for most touchdown catches, making 5 against third-ranked Florida State. A consensus All-America in 1998, he ranks 2nd on the ACC's career receiving yardage list with 3,379 yards. A first-round selection and the 6th overall pick in the 1999 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams, Holt played 11 seasons in the NFL, 10 of those with the Rams. He was named to the Pro Bowl seven times and twice (2003, 2006) was named All-Pro, making 920 catches for 13,382 yards and 74 TDs. He holds NFL records for most consecutive seasons with 1,300 or more yards (6), most consecutive seasons with 90 or more catches (6). While with the Rams, he was a member of two Super Bowl teams, including helping the Rams to the championship of Super Bowl XXXIV in 2000 in which he set NFL Super Bowl rookie re-

ords for most catches (7) and receiving yards (109). A native of Gibsonville, N.C., he currently resides in Raleigh, N.C.

Hyland (1964-66) lettered three consecutive years for Boston College for head coach Jim Miller at center and offensive guard. He helped lead BC to a three-year 16-13 record and earned an invitation to the East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco. Selected in the first round and as the ninth overall pick of the 1967 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers and their legendary coach Vince Lombardi, he became the first Eagle offensive lineman to be drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft. He played 11 years in the National Football League, the first three seasons with Green Bay, and saw action in Super Bowl II. He then played one year for the Chicago Bears (1970), five with the New York Giants (1971-75), returned to Green Bay for one year (1976) before finishing his career with the New England Patriots (1977). He was inducted into the Boston College Varsity Hall of Fame in 1988. A native of White Plains, N.Y., he currently resides in his hometown.

Cunningham (1973-75) was the prototypical tight end for the Clemson football teams of coach Red Parker during the middle 1970s. He lettered three straight years for the Tigers, leading the team in pass receptions in 1973 and 1974. He was named first-team All-ACC in 1974 and 1975. A two-time first-team All-America, he earned consensus All-America honors in 1974. He completed his Clemson career with 64 receptions for 1,044 yards and 17 TDs. The 28th overall selection in the first round of the 1976 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, he played in the NFL for 10 seasons, all with the Steelers. He completed his professional career with 202 receptions for 2,879 yards and 20 touchdowns. In 1984 he was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame. In 2003, Cunningham was the only tight end chosen to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Team in 2003, as one of the Top 50 players in league history. He was also the recipient of Clemson's Frank Howard Award for 1974-75, as the top student-athlete who brought honor to Clemson. A native of Seneca, S.C., he currently resides in Westminster, S.C.

Cowart (1993-97) was a hard-hitting linebacker who played on four ACC Championship teams for coach Bobby Bowden at Florida State and was a key reserve on the Seminoles 1993 National Championship squad. He led FSU in tackles as a junior in 1995 (115) and as a senior in

1997 (116) after sitting out the 1996 season with a knee injury. In 1997, he was named a consensus first-team All-America, was a finalist for both the Butkus Award and the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and was named National Defensive Player of the Year by the Football News. The 1997 Florida State defense set a school record in rushing defense, allowing just 1.5 yards per rush. That year, Cowart was also honored as the winner of the ACC's Brian Piccolo Award for Courage. The 39th selection in the second round of the 1998 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills, Cowart went on to an eight-year NFL career with Buffalo, the New York Jets and the Minnesota Vikings. He started 87 NFL games, playing in 100, and made 715 career tackles. He was named All-Pro and to the Pro Bowl after the 2000 season. He was inducted into the Florida State Hall of Fame in 2011. A native of Jacksonville, Fla., he currently lives in his hometown.

Swilling (1988-91) a hard-hitting safety and one of the leaders of Georgia Tech's 1990 National Championship team, lettered for years for head coach Bobby Ross. A 3rd-team All-America as a sophomore in 1989, he earned consensus first-team All-America honors in 1990 as the Jackets were named national champions by the UPI Coaches poll. A two-time first-team All-ACC selection (1989-1990), he keyed Tech's defense from his free safety position and led the ACC in pass interceptions with five in 1990. He led Tech to a 16-game non-losing streak, including a stretch in the 1989 and 1990 seasons where the Jackets won 18 of 20 games. He completed his career with 13 career interceptions, returning them for 239 yards, including two for touchdowns. The 13 picks are tied for the 5th-best total for a Tech player. As a sophomore in 1989, he became the first ACC player to return an intercepted conversion attempt—a 99-yard return versus Duke—for a two-point defensive conversion. That same year he had interception returns for TDs of 72 and 95 yards. He finished his career with 267 tackles, the second-highest total by a defensive back in Tech history. A seventh-round selection in the 1991 NFL Draft by the Cleveland Browns, he played one season in the NFL with Cleveland. He was named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary team in 2003 and was inducted into the Georgia Tech Sports Hall of Fame

in 2001. A native of Toccoa, Ga., he currently resides in Atlanta.

Hanulak (1951-53), one of the most explosive runners of his era, set an ACC single-season record for highest per-carry rushing average in the league's first season in 1953 that still stands today. Hanulak averaged 9.78 yards per carry (minimum of 65.0 yards per game) that year in leading Maryland to a 10-1 record and the Terps first National Championship (both AP and UPI) in football. Nicknamed "Chet the Jet" for his outstanding speed, Hanulak led the ACC in rushing in 1953 with 753 yards in his only season in the league. He still holds the Terrapin record for career yards per carry (8.13) and ranks 20th on the Terps career rushing list with 1,544 yards. A three-time letterman for Maryland (1951-52-53), he earned second-team All-America (International News Service) and first-team All-ACC honors in 1953. The 24th overall selection in the second round of the 1954 NFL Draft by the Cleveland Browns, he played two seasons in the NFL with Cleveland in 1954 and 1957. A two sport (baseball) standout for the Terps, he was inducted into the Maryland Sports Hall of Fame in 1994. A native of Hackensack, N.J., he currently resides in Salisbury, Md.

Bly (1996-98) is the only player in North Carolina history to be named a three-time, first-team All-America. He was a first-team All-America as a redshirt freshman in 1996 (AP, Walter Camp) and earned consensus All-America honors in 1997 and 1998 for head coaches Mack Brown (1996-97) and Carl Torbush (1998). One of the best cover corners in ACC history, Bly led the nation and set an

ACC single-season record with 11 interceptions in his freshman season of 1996. The record stood until this past season when NC State's David Amerson topped it. He still shares, with Amerson, the ACC mark for most interceptions per game in a season (1.00) and his 20 career interceptions, at the time an ACC record, still ranks second on the ACC career list. A three-time letterman, he helped lead the Tar Heels to a 28-8 mark during his time in Chapel Hill. A three-time first-team All-ACC selection, Bly was the 41st overall selection in the second round of the 1999 NFL draft by the St. Louis Rams. He went on to an 11-year NFL career with St. Louis, Detroit, Denver and San Francisco. While with St. Louis, he helped the Rams to win Super Bowl XXXIV and reach Super Bowl XXXVI. He was twice named to the NFL's Pro Bowl (2003, 2004) and earned All-Pro honors in 2003. In his 11 years in the NFL, he totaled 419 tackles and 43 career interceptions. In 2003, he was named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Football team. A native of Chesapeake, Va., he currently resides in Charlotte, N.C.

Prioleau (1995-98) was one of the leaders of the salty Virginia Tech defenses of the mid-to-late 1990s. He lettered four times for head coach Frank Beamer, helping Tech to a 26-12 four-year record that included four consecutive bowl games. A three-year starter, he totaled 237 career tackles and had two returns for touchdowns. He was named first-team All-Big East in 1997

and earned third-team All-America honors (The Sporting News) that year. As a senior, he led a defense that led the Big East in scoring defense, allowing just 12.9 points per game. A fourth-round selection of the San Francisco 49ers in the 1999 NFL Draft, Prioleau played 12 seasons in the National Football League for San Francisco, Buffalo, Washington, Jacksonville and New Orleans. He was a member of the Saints' championship team in Super Bowl XLIV. Prioleau was also a first cousin of former ACC Legend and Georgia Tech All-America Joe Hamilton. A native of Alvin, S.C., he currently lives in Radford, Va.

Stetz (1969-71) was one of the most productive linebackers in Wake Forest history and, pound-for-pound, one of the most prolific tacklers in ACC lore. Stetz set single-season school records for the Deacons in career tackles (460), single-season tackles (203) and career solo tackles (271), despite a playing weight of just over 200 pounds. When Stetz completed his career in 1971, the 460 tackles were also an ACC career record. The lynchpin of Wake defenses of 1969, 1970 and 1971, he helped the Deacons to their first ACC football title in 1970 for head coach Cal Stoll. He still ranks 16th on the ACC career tackle list and also holds the Wake Forest single-game record for tackles with 29 hits against Clemson in 1971, as well as the season mark for tackles per game of 18.5 in 1971. He was twice named first-team All-ACC in 1970 and 1971 and played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game. A native of Johnstown, Pa., he currently resides in his hometown.

The ACC & Overtime

The Labor Day Monday matchup between Virginia Tech and Georgia Tech marked the 59th game featuring an ACC team that has had to go to extra sessions. Of the 59 overtime contests, a large portion of them--25--have been played in the month of September. Games have gone into overtime for ACC teams a total of 13 times in November, while 12 have been played in October, three in August, four in December and two in January (2006 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2012 Allstate Sugar Bowl). Of the 59 overtime contests, 29 have been ACC games while 30 nonconference games have gone into overtime. The home team has a 34-18 advantage in the 52 games played on campus. The team which wins the toss has a 31-28 record. Forty-six of the games were decided in the first overtime with nine games in double overtime and four in triple overtime.
