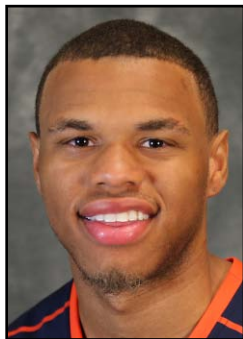

HEAD COACH TONY BENNETT

The 2014 and 2015 ACC Coach of the Year, Tony Bennett is in his sixth year as the head men's basketball coach at the University of Virginia. Bennett came to Charlottesville after spending the previous three seasons as the head coach at Washington State, where he was the consensus 2007 National Coach of the Year.

Under Bennett's direction, UVA's record has improved each season and the Cavaliers have compiled an overall record of 135-63. The 2014-15 season has seen the Cavaliers continue a two-year run of success that has produced back-to-back outright ACC regular-season titles, the 2014 ACC Tournament title and a No. 2 ranking in the Associated Press poll for seven weeks this season, Virginia's highest ranking since 1982-83. Virginia enters the NCAA Tournament with 29 wins, one shy of the school-record 30 wins set in 1981-82 and matched last season when Bennett guided the Cavaliers to a 30-7 mark and their first NCAA Sweet 16 appearance since 1995.

Bennett has been honored as the ACC Coach of the Year by both the media and his peers in each of the past two seasons as the Cavaliers became the first ACC school to win 16 conference games in consecutive years. This year he was also honored as the U.S. Basketball Writers Association District 3 Coach of the Year for the third time in six seasons in Charlottesville, and the fourth district honor in his nine years as a head coach.

With a career record of 204-96, Bennett became the 15th coach in NCAA Division I history to reach the 200 career-win mark in fewer than nine seasons on Feb. 22, 2015 as the Cavaliers downed Florida State, 51-41. He is the only current Division I coach to have defeated all five of the active Hall of Fame coaches (Jim Boeheim, Larry Brown, Mike Krzyzewski, Rick Pitino and Roy Williams) during his career.

With two wins this week in Charlotte, Virginia will have increased its win total in each of Bennett's six seasons. The Cavaliers would be the only team in the nation to accomplish the feat and become the first power conference school to increase its win total in six consecutive seasons since Seton Hall from 1983-89 at the start of the Big East Conference.

Virginia has reached the postseason in each of the past four seasons. In 2012-13, the Cavaliers advanced to the NIT quarterfinals. In 2011-12, Bennett led Virginia to a 22-10 record and its first NCAA Tournament berth in five seasons. The 2012 USBWA District 3 Coach of the Year, Bennett guided the Cavaliers to their first winning season in the ACC (9-7) since 2006-07 and their most regular-season wins (22) since 1982-83.

Bennett's second Virginia team in 2010-11 compiled a 16-15 record (7-9 in ACC regular-season games). It was UVA's first winning season since 2007-08 as Virginia finished tied for seventh in the ACC regular-season standings after being picked to finish 11th in the preseason by the media. Bennett won his 100th game as a head coach during the 2010-11 season when the Cavaliers defeated Maryland 74-60 in College Park, Md. Bennett's first Virginia team finished the 2009-10 season with an overall record of 15-16, an improvement of five wins over the previous season (10-18 in 2008-09). The 15 wins included three victories over nationally-ranked opponents.

A hallmark of Bennett's teams has been defense, as his squads have ranked in the top five nationally in scoring defense in six of his nine seasons as a head coach. The 2014-15 Cavaliers lead the nation by allowing 50.8 points per game, the third best defensive average in the shot clock era. They became the first school in 18 years to hold three opponents under 30 points in a game this season.

Bennett was introduced as the head coach of the Virginia men's basketball program on April 1, 2009.

In three seasons at Washington State, Bennett led the Cougars to a 69-33 record, including a 32-22 mark in the Pac-10. Washington State's 69 wins over those three seasons are the most over any three-year period in school history. He led the Cougars to the 2007 and 2008 NCAA Tournaments, the only time WSU has made consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.

In his first season as a head coach in 2006-07, Bennett took a Washington State squad projected to finish last in the Pac-10 prior to the season and led it to 26 wins (26-8 record), matching the school record, and a second-place finish in the conference with a 13-5 mark. That year, the Cougars made their first NCAA Tournament appearance in 13 years, defeating Oral Roberts in the first round before suffering a double-overtime loss to Vanderbilt in the second round.

For his work in 2006-07, Bennett became the most decorated Pac-10 coach in a single season. He was named National Coach of the Year by nine organizations, including the Associated Press, The Sporting News and the U.S. Basketball Writers Association. In addition, Bennett was the Pac-10 Coach of the Year, the United States Basketball Writers Association District 9 Coach of the Year and the National Association of Basketball Coaches District 14 Coach of the Year.

In 2007-08, Bennett's Cougars were ranked in the AP preseason poll (10th) for the first time in school history and were ranked a school-record No. 4 during the season. The Cougars finished with a 26-9 record, once again tying the school record for wins, and had an 11-7 mark in the



Pac-10. Washington State advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Sweet 16 for the first time in school history, defeating Winthrop and Notre Dame in the first two rounds of the tournament. The Cougars fell to top-seeded North Carolina in the NCAA regional semifinal in Charlotte, N.C.

In 2008-09, Bennett led the Cougars to their third consecutive postseason appearance. Washington State posted a 17-16 record and participated in the National Invitation Tournament. The Cougars defeated NCAA Tournament teams Arizona, Arizona State (twice), Mississippi State, and UCLA during the season. The road victory at UCLA was just the second for the Cougars at Pauley Pavilion in 53 years.

Bennett's teams have not only been successful on the court, but also in the classroom. Virginia's Jerome Meyinsse received the ACC's Skip Prosser Award in 2010 as the conference's top men's basketball student-athlete, and Meyinsse and Will Sherrill were named to the 2010 ACC All-Academic Men's Basketball Team. Sherrill was named to the ACC All-Academic Basketball Team for the second consecutive year in 2011 and Will Regan was also named to the team. Four Washington State players were named to the 2009 Pac-10 All-Academic First Team, while a school-record five players were honored as Pac-10 All-Academic selections the previous year. The conference's Scholar Athlete of the Year for men's basketball in 2008 and 2009 were members of the Washington State program.



Before taking over as the head coach at Washington State, Bennett was on the staff of his father, Dick, for three seasons in Pullman, the last two as associate head coach. The previous four years Bennett was at Wisconsin, serving on the staffs of his father, Brad Soderberg and current Badger head coach Bo Ryan. While Bennett was at Wisconsin the Badgers participated in the NCAA Tournament all four years, reaching the 2000 Final Four and the Sweet 16 in 2003. Wisconsin also earned a share of the Big Ten title in 2002 and 2003. Bennett was instrumental in the recruitment of Devin Harris, the fifth overall pick in the 2004 NBA Draft, to Wisconsin.

Bennett served as an assistant coach for the gold-medal winning USA, which included Virginia's Mike Tobey, at the 2013 FIBA U19 World Championship in Prague, Czech Republic. In the summer of 2011, Bennett was a court coach for the USA Basketball Men's World University Games National Team training camp at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Bennett played for his father at Green Bay from 1989-92. He graduated from Green Bay in 1992 and finished his career as the Mid-Continent Conference's all-time leader in career points (2,285) and assists (601). His 49.7 career 3-point field goal percentage is still an NCAA record. Bennett helped the Phoenix to an 87-34 record during his collegiate career, including one NCAA Tournament and two NIT appearances. He was twice named MCC Player of the Year, was the 1992 Frances Pomeroy Naismith Award winner (best senior player under six-feet tall) and was the 1992 GTE Academic All-American of the Year. Bennett was the 35th overall selection in the 1992 NBA Draft by the Charlotte Hornets and played with the team for three seasons.

In August of 2011 Bennett was named one of the Summit League's (formerly the Mid-Continent Conference) Top 30 Distinguished Contributors for the league's first 30 years at the Division I level.

Bennett and his wife, Laurel, have two children - a daughter, Anna, and a son, Eli.

FOR OPENERS

- No. 2 seed Virginia plays No. 15 seed Belmont (22-10) in the second round of the NCAA Tournament on Friday, March 20 at approximately 3:10 p.m. UVA earned an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament, while Belmont earned the Ohio Valley Conference's automatic bid.
- The ACC regular-season champion Cavaliers are making their 19th NCAA Tournament appearance.

- The Cavaliers rank No. 1 nationally in scoring defense at 50.8 ppg, which is the third lowest average in the shot clock era (since 1986).
- Belmont guard Taylor Barnette played for Virginia during the 2012-13 season and averaged 2.6 points in 26 games. Barnette's sister, Sarah Beth, is a senior on the Virginia women's basketball team.

A WIN VS. BELMONT WOULD...

- Give Virginia its second consecutive NCAA round of 32 appearance and 12th in school history.
- Give UVA a school-record tying 30 wins (1982 and 2014).
- Give UVA 83 wins during a three-year span, its most since winning 88 games from 1981-83.
- Give UVA a combined 14 road/neutral wins, its most since 15 in 2014.
- Give UVA a 25-18 record in the NCAA Tournament.

ALL-TIME IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Virginia is 24-18 all-time in 18 NCAA Tournament appearances.
- UVA reached the NCAA Final Four in 1981 and 1984.
- UVA is making back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances for the first time since 1994-95.
- The Cavaliers reached their eighth NCAA Regional semifinal appearance last season and lost 61-59 to Michigan State.

ALL-TIME VS. BELMONT

- Virginia and Belmont are meeting for the first time in the NCAA Tournament and second time overall.
- Virginia is 1-0 all-time vs. Belmont in a series that dates back to the 1999-2000 season.
- UVA and Belmont have met one previous time, a 94-74 Cavalier victory at University Hall in Charlottesville on Dec. 28, 1999.

LAST TIME VS. BELMONT

- Chris Williams led four Cavaliers in double figures with 20 points as Virginia posted the 94-74 win over the Bruins during the 1999-2000 season.
- Virginia shot 54.1 percent from the floor and made 11 3-pointers.
- B.J. Proffitt led the Bruins with 17 points.

'HOOS IN CHARLOTTE

- Virginia is 11-16 all-time in Charlotte (3-2 vs. Davidson, 7-13 in the ACC Tournament, 1-1 in the NCAA Tournament).
- The Cavaliers are 1-1 at Time Warner Cable Arena, losing to Georgia Tech 94-76 in the first round of the 2008 ACC Tournament and defeating Davidson 70-57 in 2013-14.
- The Cavaliers made their first NCAA Tournament appearance in Charlotte in 1976, losing to DePaul 69-60 in the first round.
- Virginia also defeated Villanova 54-50 in Charlotte during the second round of the 1981 NCAA Tournament.
- The Cavaliers reached the ACC Tournament final in Charlotte in 1990 and 1994.

TONY BENNETT IN CHARLOTTE

- Virginia head coach Tony Bennett played three seasons in the NBA with the Charlotte Hornets (1992-95), averaging points and 2.0 assists in 152 career games.
- Bennett met his wife, Laurel, in Charlotte.
- While at Washington State, Bennett led the Cougars to a 2008 NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in Charlotte, falling to top-seeded North Carolina, 68-47.
- Virginia has played at Time Warner Cable Arena once in the Bennett era, downing Davidson 70-57 last season.

CAVALIERS AGAINST THE FIELD OF 68

- Virginia went 9-3 against NCAA Tournament teams.
- The Cavaliers' five true road wins over NCAA Tournament teams are tied for most in the nation (Duke).
- UVA is one of five schools (Georgetown, Gonzaga, Kentucky and West Virginia) to not suffer a loss this season to a non-NCAA Tournament team.
- UVA has wins over three automatic qualifiers (Harvard, Notre Dame and VCU).

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

- Virginia is 14-2 away from home, including a 3-1 neutral-site mark.
- The Cavaliers defeated La Salle and Rutgers at the Barclays Center Classic, and beat Florida State before losing to North Carolina in the ACC Tournament at Greensboro Coliseum.
- UVa won a school-record 11 true road games, breaking the school record of 10 set in 1981 and 1982.
- Virginia has an ACC-leading 15 road wins over the past two seasons.

ALL-TIME AGAINST THE OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE

- Virginia is 3-1 all-time against current Ohio Valley Conference members (1-0 vs. Belmont, 1-0 vs. UT Martin, 1-0 vs. Tennessee State and 0-1 vs. Eastern Kentucky).
- UVa posted a 79-36 win over Tennessee State during the 2014-15 regular season.
- Virginia has not played Austin Peay, Eastern Illinois, Jacksonville State, Morehead State, Murray State, SIUE, Southeast Missouri and Tennessee Tech.

UVA RANKED NO. 6 IN THE LATEST NATIONAL POLLS

- UVa is ranked No. 6 in the latest AP and USA Today coaches' polls.
- UVa's No. 6 ranking is its lowest since a No. 6 ranking on Dec. 15, 2014.
- The Cavaliers have been ranked in the top 10 for the first 20 weeks of the season for the first time since 1982-83.
- The Cavaliers achieved their first No. 2 ranking this season for the first time since March 8, 1983.
- UVa is one of three teams (Duke and Arizona) that have been ranked in the top 10 for 22 straight weeks dating back to last season.

VIRGINIA HEAD COACH TONY BENNETT

- Sixth-year head coach Tony Bennett sports a 135-63 mark at Virginia and 204-96 mark in nine seasons overall.
- Bennett was named 2015 ACC and USBWA All-District 3 Coach of the Year after leading Virginia to its second consecutive ACC regular-season title.
- He was named 2014 ACC Coach of the Year after guiding the Cavaliers to their first ACC Tournament championship since 1976.
- In 2013-14, he guided UVa to its first ACC regular season and tournament championship in the same season for the first time in school history.
- Bennett has guided the Cavaliers to four consecutive postseason tournaments (NCAA in 2012, 2014 and 2015, and NIT in 2013).
- Bennett has increased UVa's win total in each of the last five seasons (15 in 2009-10, 16 in 2010-11, 22 in 2011-12, 23 in 2013-13 and 30 in 2013-14).
- Bennett-coached teams are 75-3 when holding opponents to fewer than 50 points during his nine-year coaching career.
- Bennett-coached teams have finished in the top five nationally in scoring defense in five of eight seasons (first in 2008-09 and 2013-14, second in 2007-08 and 2011-12, and fifth in 2012-13).
- Bennett is one of 24 Division I head coaches who played in the NBA.
- Bennett is the only active coach to have wins over the five active Hall of Fame coaches (Jim Boeheim, Larry Brown, Mike Krzyzewski, Rick Pitino, Roy Williams).
- Bennett became the 15th coach in NCAA Division I history to reach the 200 career-win mark in nine seasons or less on Feb. 22, 2015.

EMBRACE THE PACE

- Virginia is averaging 65.3 points and yielding a nation-leading and school-record (modern era) 50.8 points (third best defensive average in shot clock era).
- UVa has shot 46.3 percent from the field and 36.1 percent from 3-point range, while limiting its opponents to 36.1 percent from the field (3rd nationally) and 30.3 percent from 3-point range.
- As of March 16, the Cavaliers rank in the top five nationally in seven defensive categories: points per game (1st), points per possession (2nd), rebounds per game (2nd), true shooting percentage (2nd), field goal percentage (3rd), effective shooting percentage (3rd) and possessions per 40 minutes (3rd).
- As of March 16, the Cavaliers rank in the top 22 nationally in three offensive categories: defensive rebound percentage (6th), rebound percentage (12th) and assist-to-turnover ratio (22nd).
- UVa has limited its opponents to 87 fast break points (2.7 per game), and allowed a season-high 14 in its loss to Duke.

THE DEFENSE NEVER RESTS

- Virginia has held its opponents scoreless for five or more minutes 26 times.
- Virginia held Louisville scoreless for 12:06, Tennessee State scoreless for 10:23 and Cleveland State scoreless for 10:03 this season.
- Virginia has also limited its opponents without a field goal for eight or more minutes 11 times, highlighted by Harvard for 19:53 on Dec. 21.

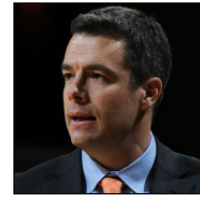

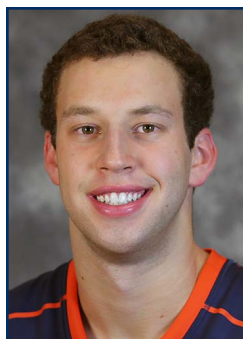

MALCOLM BROGDON, A VIRGINIA STAR, IS PURSUING MASTER'S AHEAD OF N.B.A.

Amid the academic scandals at Syracuse, North Carolina and elsewhere around the N.C.A.A., maybe it just seems unusual these days to find athletes who also happen to be high-achieving students. But consider Malcolm Brogdon, the redshirt junior guard who helped lead Virginia to the Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season title and a top-five ranking for much of this season — all while he was working on a master's degree in public policy.

Brogdon has said no to both Harvard and the N.B.A.

"He's unique," said Virginia Coach Tony Bennett, who can thank Brogdon for both of those decisions.

Brogdon has been one of the keys to restoring Virginia to a place among the A.C.C.'s top programs and inserting the Cavaliers into the national title conversation. Despite having lost to North Carolina in the semifinals of the A.C.C. tournament, Virginia (29-3) enters the N.C.A.A. tournament as the No. 2 seed in the East Region. The Cavaliers open against 15th-seeded Belmont (22-10) on Friday night.

Brogdon averages 13.9 points per game to lead the Cavaliers while embracing the emphasis on defense that defines Virginia under Bennett.

"He's poised," Bennett said. "He just stays steady. I think that his demeanor shows that. He's wise beyond his years. That maturity level — you look at him, this is a mature young man in every way.

"I think his leadership has probably been the thing that has really sets him apart this year even more than last year."

Fans saw that on Friday night, when the Cavaliers were about to crash out of the A.C.C. tournament with a double-digit embarrassment against the Tar Heels. Brogdon scored a career-high 25 points, including 22 in the second half, nearly leading Virginia to a comeback victory.

"He's first-team all-A.C.C. for a reason," his teammate Justin Anderson said after the game. "He's been doing this all year — just putting the team on his back and willing us. For the second half of the season, he's just stepped up, stepped his game up."

Indeed, Brogdon has improved his game enough to be mentioned as a potential second-round pick on some N.B.A. mock drafts. But he is not going anywhere. Brogdon, whose mother is a psychology professor at Morehouse College and whose father is a lawyer and a mediator, chose Virginia over Harvard out of high school. And he has already decided to return next season even if he has an N.B.A. future.

He said he was focused on earning his master's degree. Besides, there is still work to be done in building Virginia into a program that can be mentioned alongside Duke and North Carolina in the A.C.C. every year.

Asked whether the Cavaliers were there yet, Brogdon said: "I'm not sure about that. I think we are a team that can always be competitive due to our style of play, the type of defense we play. And I think over the years Virginia will continue to get stronger and stronger with Coach Bennett as the coach and him getting better and better talent. I think that's how it will work."

It is already happening. Bennett said his team's improved performance had helped him sell his program to more talented recruits. Although his defense-first style depends on players staying long enough to learn his system thoroughly, he said he would consider one-and-done, top-level talent. And now some of those elite players might consider a program like Virginia, too.

"Would I take a one-and-done?" Bennett said. "If there was one that was interesting in coming, sure, but I wouldn't build a whole team full of them."

By the time Brogdon leaves Virginia for his shot at the N.B.A., he might wind up helping the Cavaliers win not only titles but also the kind of recruits who define premier programs like Duke. In the process, however, it may become harder for student-athletes like him to have a chance to play substantial roles at programs like Virginia.

"I think it could," he said. "But I also think Coach Bennett is a guy that loves guys that stay in the program and that he can see mature and he can really develop. I think that's what the system thrives on. I think that's what will make it a very good competitive program down the road, is getting that.

"One-and-dones would be great, but guys that stay and mature, who work their way up, are also great."

BENNETT BUILDS VIRGINIA BASKETBALL ON PILLARS OF FAITH

Tony Bennett had just become Virginia's men's basketball coach in 2009 when he visited guard Jontel Evans at his Hampton, Va., home and laid out his blueprint for the program. Evans had committed to Virginia's previous coaching staff, so Bennett now had to re-recruit him.

His eyes lit up when he told Evans about the defense the Cavaliers would play. Evans said Bennett talked about recruiting under-the-radar players and developing them. The Cavaliers wouldn't win because they were the most talented, but because they played as a team.

Bennett said one more thing to Evans as he was in the doorway and about to leave: "Live by faith, and not by sight."

"Me and my mother looked at each other, and I was just like, 'That's really kind of deep, I've never heard it before,'" Evans said. "That's what sold me. After that, I was like, 'I want to play for this guy.'"

Bennett didn't take shortcuts as he guided the Cavaliers to the top of college basketball, and he's stayed true to his system as he tries to keep them there. He prefers blue-collar players over blue-chip recruits, with a style of play to match. The lack of flash has worked: The Cavaliers (29-3) have won consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference regular season titles. When the NCAA tournament field was announced Sunday, they were given the No. 2 seed in the East Region, and will play Belmont in Charlotte on Friday.

"There's a reference in the Bible that if you're faithful to the little things, then there'll be more, and you'll be faithful with more," Bennett said, alluding to Luke 16:10. "I think it's really that mind-set of when it wasn't going so well, were the young men in our program and were we as a coaching staff staying faithful and staying true to what we thought would give us success, even when you didn't see it?"

"It was just being faithful to the things that matter to our program. . . . When you're fortunate enough — and some of it's validated when you have some success — and things start happening, it's still the same mind-set. Will you still be faithful to the things that have gotten you there? It doesn't change."

'A house divided cannot stand'

Had Bennett been less experienced by the time he arrived at Virginia, he said he might have tried to recruit more junior college players when the wins didn't come quickly. Maybe he would've changed his deliberately slower style of play when it was criticized for being boring.

But Bennett had played for his father, Dick Bennett, at Wisconsin-Green Bay and witnessed the same system work there and again later at a power-conference school, Wisconsin. When Tony Bennett got his first head coaching job, at Washington State, that system resulted in the most wins over any three-year period in program history. He figured patience would eventually produce the same results at Virginia even after the Cavaliers missed the NCAA tournament in his first two seasons.

"When you come in and you're trying to establish a new program and a new system, you have to get the right kind of guys, but then it's not quick-fix stuff," Bennett said. "There's kind of a process you have to go through, and you can't short cut certain things. If you try to, it may give you a little bit of a spike or a blip on the radar, but it usually ends up hurting you."

Some teams get those instant results by recruiting stars or "one-and-done" players who leave school for the NBA after one college season, but Bennett would've struggled luring a player of that caliber to Charlottesville early in his tenure. When he approached Ritchie McKay about joining his staff as associate head coach at Virginia, Bennett had a different vision, telling McKay he wanted to build a program that could compete at the highest level with high-character players.

Bennett put the program's biblically-derived five pillars — humility, passion, unity, servant-hood and thankfulness — on the wall of the locker room. The pillars were a creation of Dick Bennett, who once told McKay, a longtime friend, that he would "recruit to the pillars, hire from the pillars, make decisions and try to model his life after the pillars," McKay said. Virginia players said the pillars are discussed and applied for basketball every day.

Bennett's vision hit a speed bump when four of the six members of his first six-man recruiting class transferred. The Cavaliers were 31-31 after Bennett's first two seasons, and Evans remembers Bennett telling the team that "a house divided cannot stand," a reference to Mark 3:25, as a way to stress the importance of uniting.

"You've got to get a group of guys you can lose with first before you win," Bennett said. "You're going to go through tough losses, and it's going to be hard, so you want the guys that will stay together and stay with it when it's rocky and there's some hard things. You learn from all that, and then as they mature, boy, there's a chance for you to turn it around and taste success."

'Run in such a way'

It's not that Virginia didn't want McDonald's all-Americans, if the staff thought they were good fits for the program. The coaching staff recruited James Michael McAdoo and Justin Jackson in years past, but both ultimately chose North Carolina.

Kentucky has a whopping nine McDonald's all-Americans, and Duke has eight. Virginia has been ranked alongside them in the top five of the Associated Press poll for most of the season. Since the start of last year, Virginia has won 50 of 56 games, with only five losses in ACC play. Unlike Kentucky and Duke, the Cavaliers will return the bulk of their starting lineup next season because their players are unlikely to leave early for the NBA.

"Some of the guys may have chips on their shoulder from that, not being a McDonald's all-American and things of that nature," forward Anthony Gill said. "All we want to do is go out there and be the best U-Va. team we can be regardless of who we have on this team."

McKay said he doesn't look at prospects' national rankings when recruiting, but rather he evaluates them based on whether they would be a good fit for Bennett's system, from an athletic standpoint and a willingness to be coached. Prioritizing defense is ingrained in early conversations with recruits.

Bennett can be turned off by a highly rated player if he senses entitlement. While some coaches promise playing time during the recruiting process, Bennett instead paints a bleak picture, as he only guarantees players an opportunity to earn minutes and candidly outlines their role on the team. Bennett said he looks for "blue-collar" players because the Cavaliers are that kind of program.

"We're not a team that can go out and just get one and done like Kentucky," Bennett said. "Even if you can get those, it doesn't mean I wouldn't take one, but you better be able to back it up with another one and another one because all of those things create gaps in your program."

Gill said Bennett frequently references 1 Corinthians 9:24: "Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize."

Gill said the Cavaliers have embraced that verse from a basketball standpoint, doing what's necessary for the prize at the end of the season. But for Bennett, it's an ongoing marathon.

"If we were fortunate enough to keep having success and all of a sudden we changed totally the kind of young men we brought in or went in a different direction, that would be a big mistake," he said. "Maybe we'll get more and more fortunate and find talented guys who have all of those attributes and are willing to keep building it, but it should definitely not change as long as I'm at the helm."

MARCH MADNESS STARTS IN CHARLOTTE FOR 'HOOS

On the list of UVA men's basketball coach Tony Bennett's favorite places, Charlotte, N.C., ranks at or near the top. He spent three seasons there with the NBA's Hornets in the '90s, and during his time in the Queen City he met his wife, Laurel, at a local church.

"It's a great city," Bennett said, and he's delighted to be heading back to Charlotte this week.

The NCAA tournament field was announced Sunday night, and Virginia received the No. 2 seed in the East Region. UVA (29-3) will face No. 15 seed Belmont (22-10) in a second-round game Friday at Time Warner Cable Arena in downtown Charlotte. The winner will meet No. 7 seed Michigan State (23-11) or No. 10 seed Georgia (21-10) on Sunday.

Michigan State, of course, knocked off Virginia in the Sweet Sixteen of last year's NCAA tournament.

The Cavaliers' tourney opener Friday will start about 30 minutes after the conclusion of the 12:40 p.m. game between Michigan State and Georgia. UVA is making back-to-back appearances in the NCAA tournament for the first time since 1994 and '95.

"It's an exciting time," Bennett said, "there's no question. As a player, I've been through it. I've been on the other end when we didn't get selected. As a coach, I've been there too.

"We knew we were in, so that was a good feeling. It was just a matter of where and what seed we'd get."

Belmont's starters include redshirt sophomore guard Taylor Barnette, who began his college career at UVA and whose sister, Sarah Beth, is a senior forward on the Virginia women's basketball team.

Barnette's off-balance 3-pointer as time expired in the Ohio Valley Conference championship game March 7 sent Belmont to the NCAA tournament. Barnette (83 for 208) is one of three Bruins to have attempted at least 145 shots from 3-point range this season.

"They're challenging," Bennett said, "because of the way they play, the way they move the ball, the way they stretch you, the way they shoot, and the soundness they play with. Certainly a dangerous team."

This is Belmont's 29th season under Rick Byrd, whose record is 619-311 at the Nashville, Tenn., school.

"Very good team," Bennett said. "Very good coach."

In last year's NCAA tournament, the Wahoos spent the opening weekend in Raleigh, N.C., at PNC Arena, which their fans made seem like John Paul Jones Arena South at times. Bennett is hoping for a similar atmosphere in Charlotte, "where hopefully a lot of UVA fans can show up and support us when we play on Friday," he said.

The 'Hoos watched last year's selection show in Danville, at Kickback Jack's, the sports bar where they stopped on their way back to Charlottesville from Greensboro, N.C.

A few hours earlier, at the Greensboro Coliseum, the Cavaliers had won the ACC tournament for the first time since 1976, and there was unbridled joy in their private room at Kickback Jack's when they learned they'd been awarded a No. 1 seed in the NCAAs.

With JPJ unavailable Sunday night because of a Fleetwood Mac concert, the 'Hoos watched the selection show in a large classroom at UVA's Darden School of Business. The team's reaction was more restrained this year. Around 6:15 p.m., CBS unveiled Virginia as the East Region's No. 2 seed, and players and coaches and their family members remained seated as they applauded.

"A little less probably joyous celebration from a year before, just because of the circumstances," Bennett told reporters later on a teleconference, "but nonetheless a celebration."

On the eve of the ACC tournament, most bracketologists projected Virginia, which won the conference's regular-season title outright, as a No. 1 seed in the NCAAs. But the Cavaliers, after defeating Florida State in the quarterfinals, lost Friday night to North Carolina, and that setback hurt their stock with the NCAA selection committee.

The No. 1 seeds went to Kentucky (Midwest), Duke (South), Villanova (East) and Wisconsin (West), which rallied to beat Michigan State in the Big Ten championship game Sunday. Many Virginia fans were irate over what they perceived as a snub, but Bennett expressed no outrage about the selection committee's choices.

"Wisconsin is a terrific team," he said. "There were a number of teams that probably could have gotten a 1 seed."

Anyway, Bennett noted, a high seed is no guarantee of success in the NCAA tournament. The Cavaliers' challenge now, Bennett said, is to "show up and do our work," and redshirt junior Anthony Gill agreed.

Virginia's seed "really doesn't matter," said Gill, a 6-8 forward who graduated from Charlotte Christian School. "We're blessed regardless of what the situation is.

"In some ways it could work out even more in our favor than if we were the No. 1 seed. But I think that we're just going to go out and play our hardest, and we're going to put the best UVA basketball team on the court that we can."

With its ability to spread the floor, as Davidson did at JPJ in late December, Belmont figures to pose a stern test for the 'Hoos. Then, if they get past the Bruins, Michigan State and its heralded coach, Tom Izzo, may well stand between the Cavaliers and another trip to the Sweet Sixteen.

Still, Bennett said, "You can't get so caught up [in your opponents]. You have to know as much as you can about the teams you're playing, matchups, all that stuff. But it comes down to the quality of basketball that you can play, and that's been kind of our philosophy all season long -- controlling what you can control."

The Cavaliers' losses were to nationally ranked opponents -- Duke, Louisville and UNC -- by a total of 12 points. Moreover, only one of those games was played in Charlottesville. But Virginia has dropped two of its past three games and has yet to fully integrate junior swingman Justin Anderson back into the lineup. And so critics have questioned UVA's ability to make a deep run in the NCAA tournament.

Anderson, a second-team All-ACC selection, missed the final eight games of the regular season, the first seven because of a fractured finger, the last one after having an appendectomy March 5.

Asked if the Cavaliers have something to prove in the NCAA tournament, Gill said, "I think we just gotta prove it to ourselves. We're tired of everybody saying, 'You're not this, you're not that.'"

"Let's go out and prove them wrong, UVA. Let's show them we can do it, and let's show ourselves we can do it. I think these last couple games we've been having lapses that aren't the typical UVA basketball that we play, and I think that we have to get better at that."

Anderson returned for Virginia's two games at the ACC tournament last week, but he failed to score in Greensboro and looked out of sync offensively at times. But he wasn't cleared for full participation in practice until two days before the team left for Greensboro, and the Cavaliers expect the extra work Anderson will get this week to pay dividends.

"His emotions have not changed," Gill said. "He's the same person on the court. He's just trying to get his feel back for the game. So I think this next week of practice will really help him out a lot. He's continued to keep working, and I think good things will happen for him."

JUSTIN ANDERSON OF VIRGINIA FALLS, BUT IT'S HARD TO KEEP HIM DOWN

This wasn't exactly the way Justin Anderson envisioned returning to the Virginia Cavaliers after a monthlong layoff with injuries.

In the waning minutes of Friday night's Atlantic Coast Conference basketball tournament semi-final, his team had fought back from a 13-point deficit against No. 19 North Carolina and was close to tying the game, or going ahead. Anderson was open when he caught the ball behind the 3-point line and aimed.

At one point earlier in the season, before Anderson broke his left pinkie, then weeks later needed an emergency appendectomy, the shot would have met nothing but net. His basket might have led the Cavaliers to their second straight A.C.C. tournament final, and perhaps their second straight title. That was the way he had envisioned things unfolding at this tournament, where he rejoined the team after 32 days away from it.

But now, in only his second game since early February, his shot met nothing but — air. As in air ball. Anderson didn't come close to making the shot that once was nearly a given for him, the highflying swingman and the team's leading scorer.

"I'm not blaming the tape on my finger, or my injuries, or anything, because I don't like to make excuses," he said afterward. "I wanted to win for my teammates so bad. Man, I just wanted to will the team to win, but it didn't happen."

What did happen was that the No. 3 Cavaliers came out sluggish and suffered their second defeat in the past three games, falling to North Carolina, 71-67. Because of those recent losses, there's a chance that Virginia also won't be a No. 1 seed in the N.C.A.A. tournament.

Virginia, a team that is usually well rounded and without a steady star scorer dominating the game, needed guard Malcolm Brogdon to score 18 points in the last eight and a half minutes to even have a chance against North Carolina.

And that wasn't enough.

But the Cavaliers aren't crushed — and they shouldn't be — because it's hard to keep them down, just as Anderson is hard to keep down.

Anderson, a 6-foot-6 junior, bounced back from his appendectomy in less than a week, shooting and jogging two days after entering the hospital last week.

"I think the only time I saw him down, ever, was a day after the surgery, but that's only because he was on a whole bunch of drugs," forward Anthony Gill said, referring to Anderson's painkillers. Gill laughed, but he was serious.

Now the Cavaliers have to take Anderson's lead, and there's a good chance that they will.

Just look at how they reacted after Anderson broke his left pinkie last month. They didn't falter; they just kept winning.

The proof of their resiliency is that Virginia was 7-1 without Anderson, in a tough conference. The Cavaliers remained mostly at No. 2 or No. 3, tucked just behind unbeaten Kentucky. Lesser squads might have unraveled after losing their top scorer.

For Virginia, it was nothing more than a hiccup in the season, just as the team hopes its recent losses, which dropped them to 29-3, are just hiccups.

This is how Bennett, the son of a coach who knew his way around the N.C.A.A. tournament, has planned it.

"You show up as a freshman knowing that you're not going to be the guy, because Coach makes it clear that no one is going to be the guy," the junior center Mike Tobey said. "We're all considered equal. That's one big reason why this team works."

But it's not a perfect plan, and can't be when so many parts make up the machine, which is why the team faltered on Friday. For a team to have no star, every player must contribute, at least a little. And of course, Anderson can't shoot air balls when his team needs him the most. He knows that, and will probably keep thinking about that, especially when watching the conference final on Saturday.

"That's going to be painful watching the game, more painful than anything I've been through recently," he said.

He'll get over it. As will his team. While Virginia might not be flashy, it is steady and old-school, and has the patience to right its ship.

After what Anderson has been through in the past month or so, he's not about to complain much about hardships, like losing to North Carolina. He got a glimpse of much worse in the hospital last week while walking the hallways.

"I saw a lot of people who were more unfortunate than me," he said. "So I thought: Oh, well, you mess up your finger; you move on. You need surgery on your appendix; you move on. That's life. It's not perfect."

A great lesson in perspective. If he ever forgets it this month, as the team faces much tougher tests than it did on Friday, he has three tiny scars on his belly and another on his pinkie to remind him.

ANOTHER POSTSEASON MEMORY FOR UVA'S EVAN NOLTE

Ah, yes. We remember this fella.

The postseason's here, which means Evan Nolte is going to start knocking down big shots again. Now, granted, Nolte's performance in UVA's 58-44 victory over Florida State wasn't completely stunning. Stunning would be what Nolte did in the first round of the 2014 NCAA tournament against Coastal Carolina, when a guy averaging 2.9 points a game hopped off the bench and hit two huge 3-pointers to ward off a nerve-jangling upset bid.

This time, Nolte was in the starting lineup, just as he had been in the final eight regular-season games. We've seen plenty of Nolte recently. The junior guard has averaged 30.8 minutes per outing since Feb. 16, as he's filled in for the injured Justin Anderson.

But his output on Thursday was still uncommon, and it was still enormous for the Cavaliers. Nolte tied for the team lead with 11 points against FSU. He was the only UVA player to make a 3-pointer. He connected on three of them, including a deep one with 8:15 remaining that might have been the most important shot of the game.

"He hit the one we really needed," coach Tony Bennett said. "Different guys, different times. I've been saying Evan has been so steady for us and it hasn't always showed statistically. Well, today it showed, with him stretching the defense and making some good plays."

The point total represented a season high for Nolte, who began the year as a backup post player and is ending it as a starting guard — at least until Anderson is ready to make a full return. Anderson, wearing a wrap on his hand, showed predictable rust in his 12-minute return to action after a 32-day absence. The most important aim for the Cavaliers in this tournament (other than trying to win it for a second straight year) is easing Anderson back into form for what they hope will be a deep run in the NCAAs.

But it's comforting to know Nolte has performances like this in his arsenal. Despite their brilliant start Thursday, the Cavaliers got bogged down offensively in the second half and really needed the threat that Nolte provided.

"I was just trying to get in there and shoot it with confidence," Nolte said. "When you have as talented of guys as we have, it opens up people on the floor. I got open shots, and I tried to shoot it with confidence and shoot in rhythm."

He's been doing that a lot lately. With an increased focus on putting arc on his long-range shots, Nolte has gone 10 for 19 from beyond the arc in his past five games.

"At the beginning, when I started to fill in for Justin, I think there was a little pressure," Nolte said. "No matter how much you want to say it doesn't affect you, something's in your head. . . . The last couple games I've been shooting it a lot better than the first couple."

Of course, there's also the little matter of his postseason history. Nolte smiled when asked about that on Thursday, noting that the postgame atmosphere — open locker room, reporters with cameras and tape recorders swarming — reminded him a bit of that Coastal Carolina game last year.

"It feels like that," he said. "But no, I really feel like whenever you get a chance, just try your best in that moment. Last year it was the NCAA tournament, and this year I've been playing a lot more steadily. It's really just trying to contribute, trying to provide whatever the team needs at that moment."

He did that on Thursday. And for the Cavaliers, it's reassuring to know if they need him to do it again, he will be ready.

BENNETT SAYS EXPERIENCE, PREPARATION HAS U.VA. READY FOR POSTSEASON

Less than 20 minutes after Virginia's 59-57 loss at Louisville on Saturday, Malcolm Brogdon had mentally pressed the delete button on the regular season. He was ready to focus on the postseason.

It was an approach that worked last season after the Cavaliers lost their final regular-season game 75-69 at Maryland. Why not have the same mindset as Atlantic Coast Conference tournament top-seed U.Va. preps for its latest postseason foray?

U.Va. (28-2, 16-2 ACC) is no longer the upstart program that found its stride last season heading into conference play and rode a wave of momentum to its first ACC tournament championship since 1976, its first outright ACC regular-season title since '81 and its first appearance in the NCAA tournament regional semifinals since '95.

This season, U.Va.'s rise to the top of the conference was less of a shock, but the formula remains the same as the Cavaliers seek more postseason glory after a second straight outright ACC regular-season crown.

"We've got to erase everything," said Brogdon, who will lead U.Va. on Thursday in an ACC tournament quarterfinal game against No. 9 seed Florida State (17-15). "That loss (at Louisville) we've got to erase, winning the regular season outright we've got to erase. It's a new season and a new mentality. Everything is wiped to 0-0."

U.Va. is well-versed at putting potentially negative distractions in the past this season. It remains to be seen if U.Va. will play against FSU with guard Justin Anderson, who is recovering from a fractured finger and an appendectomy, but the Cavaliers have proven to be a resilient bunch capable of winning without their second-leading scorer.

"We'll take whatever we can get from him right now," said point guard London Perrantes of what U.Va. can expect from Anderson when he returns.

"I feel like we're playing well. We had a little stumble at Louisville, but I feel like we're coming together at the right time. We definitely have to learn from our mistakes, but I feel like it's very similar to last year's team."

Prior to the Louisville loss, U.Va. had won seven consecutive games without Anderson (13.4 points per game). Though U.Va. didn't have to deal with serious injuries last season, it's questionable whether the Cavaliers would've been equipped to handle the loss of one of their two leading scorers — Brogdon (12.7 points per game last season) or Joe Harris (12 points).

U.Va. coach Tony Bennett has witnessed how his team matured and compensated for the losses of Harris and defensively dynamic forward Akil Mitchell after last season.

With Brogdon (team-high 13.7 points per game this season out of the backcourt), Perrantes, Anderson (when healthy), guard Evan Nolte and forwards Darion Atkins and Anthony Gill, along with consistently productive play off the bench from center Mike Tobey, redshirt freshman guard Devon Hall, freshman forward Isaiah Wilkins and freshman guard Marial Shayok, U.Va. has a legitimately 10-deep roster — a rarity in college basketball.

"Believe it or not, this is a more experienced team (this season), though we only have the one senior in Darion," Bennett said. "It's been unique this year. It's been different guys at different times. Obviously, Joe (Harris) had an unbelievable year (last year) and the steadiness of Malcolm, but a different guy at a different time has stepped up (this season). Sometimes we've had to score inside to win games, sometimes it's been the outside guys."

"I think we've got a little more depth when we're healthy. Last year, not that we came out of nowhere, I guess in a way we did, but this year they started at a pretty high spot and they've stayed pretty steady. That's a challenge. Having to go clinch (the conference regular-season title) on the road, I just think there's some little differences that were unique and good for us, but I like how they've maintained a pretty high level from start to finish when it was expected of them."

U.Va.'s experience has manifested itself in even better results than last season in Bennett's "pack-line" defense. Last season, U.Va. held opponents to 55.7 points per game and 38.8 percent on shot attempts from the floor. This season, U.Va. heads into the postseason giving up a national-best 50.3 points per game and 35.7 percent shooting from the floor.

In the last three seasons, U.Va.'s defensive efficiency has been at a consistently high level, and it's gotten better every season. Two seasons ago, U.Va. surrendered 91.7 points per 100 possessions. Last season, U.Va. gave up 90.1 points per 100 possessions. This season, after losing Harris and Mitchell and only having Anderson for about half the ACC slate, U.Va. has given up just 85.3 points per 100 possessions.

"We've got guys who have played from day one, and that experience in what we do, you just get better over time," U.Va. assistant coach Jason Williford said. "Marial will be much better this time next year."

While U.Va.'s defense garners most of the attention, with Atkins and Brogdon earning ACC defensive player of the year honors from the media and coaches, respectively, the Cavaliers have arguably been sharper this season on offense than last season, too. U.Va.'s scoring is slightly down (66.2 points per game last season, 65.5 this season), but it's shooting a little better (45.5 percent from the floor last season, 46.3 this season).

Beginning with Thursday's game against FSU, which U.Va. defeated 51-41 on Feb. 22 in Charlottesville, the Cavaliers will be looking to become the first team to win ACC outright regular-season titles and conference tournament championships in back-to-back seasons since Duke did it in 1999 and 2000. Duke went on to finish in the Sweet 16 in the 2000 season.

U.Va. isn't getting too far ahead of itself in terms of NCAA tournament thoughts, but the ACC goals are within sight.

"That's what we came here for," Perrantes said. "We came here to change the program."

ANTHONY GILL HAS BOOSTED CAVALIERS ON THE COURT, KEPT THEM LOOSE OFF IT

Anthony Gill's Virginia teammates have given up retaliating for his many pranks. Gill has rubbed Vaseline on point guard London Perrantes's doorknob. He has put lotion in guard Devon Hall's bed. He stretches clear tape across doorways to trip up his unsuspecting roommates.

"He just keeps going, so you've just got to try and stop it right then and there," Perrantes said.

Gill is the Cavaliers' biggest practical joker, a title he has embraced because he wants his teammates to remember they can still have fun when basketball gets stressful. As lighthearted as the forward is off the court, his aggressive style of play has boosted the Cavaliers through the second half of conference play, when standout wing Justin Anderson has been injured.

With Anderson's timetable for return uncertain after an appendectomy, Gill's improved offensive production will be significant for the Cavaliers in the ACC tournament. The second-ranked Cavaliers, the regular season league champions, will play in the quarterfinals Thursday at noon against Florida State.

Since Anderson has been sidelined, Gill has averaged 13.3 points, second to guard Malcolm Brogdon (13.6). Without Anderson, Virginia's three-point shooting percentage has dropped, but Gill's assertive presence in the paint has often sparked the offense.

"The game that I play is a lot more physical than a lot of players," said Gill, a 6-foot-8 junior. "I think I lead the nation in getting hit in the face."

As a freshman at South Carolina, Gill was part of a zone defense that allowed 65 points per game. (This season the Cavaliers are giving up 50.3.) Transferring to Virginia with its stingy man-to-man scheme was a challenging adjustment, and Gill said he was a defensive liability at times.

"I kind of went from playing barely any defense to throwing me in the fire and I had to play a whole bunch of defense," Gill said.

Virginia Coach Tony Bennett said Gill was a "hard, rugged" player last season, too, but he's become a better defender and recently was named to the coaches' all-ACC defensive team.

Though offense always has been Gill's strength, he averaged 8.3 points through the first 10 conference games, below his nonconference average of 13.2. Gill wasn't alarmed by the mild slump and didn't change anything about his approach.

He leads the team in rebounding with 6.7 per game, and he's sixth in the league with 89 offensive rebounds. So when the Cavaliers placed a higher emphasis on points in the paint after Anderson got injured, Gill naturally shined.

"I've continued to have the same amount of aggression I've had all year," Gill said. "I think the positions I'm being put in now are allowing me to really score the ball. Offensive rebounding is one of my strengths, and I really got back to doing that at a higher rate, and I think that allows me to score a lot more points."

In the apartment Gill shares with five other Virginia players, he isn't feared for his aggression, but for his threat of mischief. Senior forward Darion Atkins tries to keep his bedroom door locked, but Gill has found a way to pick it.

"No one is really safe in the apartment," Atkins said. "He'll come in while we're sleeping and pour water on us or put stuff in our ears. It's pretty uncomfortable."

Players could've been distressed after Perrantes broke his nose and suffered a mild concussion against Florida State, but Gill joked about it. He said Perrantes looked "ugly as usual" and was the uglier version of himself. Gill frequently stands behind reporters and makes funny faces while his teammates are conducting postgame interviews.

He once tried to convince a reporter he did magic tricks when he actually doesn't.

Gill said he's at his best when he feels free, and his playful nature has helped. With the pressure ramping up for the third-ranked Cavaliers in the postseason, he already has taken on a bigger on-court responsibility and is happy to keep teammates loose off it.

"I just like to keep the guys on their toes," Gill said. "I'm always thinking constantly, how can I make these guys' lives a little easier or make them laugh a little bit? That's my whole goal, just to make them laugh. That's what I'm trying to do, make them realize that sometimes this game of basketball can get overwhelming and we need to remind ourselves that it's not all about basketball."

KENTUCKY, VIRGINIA CONFIRM WINNING A TITLE MEANS SHARING BURDEN

In a dim arena tunnel, with his hood pulled tight around his head and a small bandage on the bridge of his recently broken nose, London Perrantes considered the implausibility of Virginia losing the game it had just lost.

The No. 2 team in the nation absorbed body blow after body blow from Louisville. It waded through the venomous froth of 22,788 charged-up fans. It put itself in position to win with one defensive stop, which is more or less the fundamental tenet of Tony Bennett's program, a principle probably chiseled into a stone tablet somewhere. On that one possession, the Cavaliers wedged their hosts into a corner, clamping down on every suitable option. Finally, the ball squirted over to Mangok Mathiang, a player who had made exactly one field goal since Jan. 31; a player who was, in the words of his coach, "the 64th option" on the sequence.

"When I saw the ball getting bounced to him, I was like, all right, let's make him shoot the ball and see what happens from there," Perrantes said. "And you all saw what happened."

The shot went down, against all reason. A nine-game Virginia win streak skidded into a 59-57 loss. Everyone was properly glum about it. But if we cast aside that melancholy for a second, if we properly categorize Saturday's improbable moment of Mangok, we find it to be as much a credit to the Cavaliers as anything: An unshakable, unrelenting club, once again without one of its top players, was going to win another game. It took an act of supreme benevolence or mischief from the basketball gods to ensure that Virginia did not.

There was no revelation at the KFC Yum! Center, nor was there in Rupp Arena earlier in the afternoon. On Saturday, separated by 70 miles of snow-lined Bluegrass State highway, the top-ranked basketball teams in the country played games. In-person viewings confirmed that Kentucky and Virginia are bloodless, unyielding outfits that seem more prone to lose by accident than by merit. The Wildcats came out of the day unblemished, historically 31-0. The Cavaliers emerged undamaged. And they entered the postseason brandishing selflessness like a broadsword. The best teams in the country this season—and yes, Wisconsin, we will get to you Sunday—view a championship run as a shared burden.

By now, John Calipari's impeccable ability to answer questions he is not asked is supremely entertaining. And after his team beat Florida 67-50 to clinch that 31-0 regular season, the Kentucky coach created so many straw-men doubters and cynics, it was a wonder there was any space in the interview area for the hangers-on lining the walls. (Perhaps this is why Ashley Judd was relegated to a seat on the floor.) But it was nearly impossible to argue with Calipari when he assessed the greater meaning of this season.

"It's not winning every game," he said. "It's that they shared. Instead of me, me, me, it's us, us, us. When you do that, we all benefit. That's how it's supposed to work – we do this together, everyone benefits."

It's calculated, like everything Calipari says. That doesn't make it less true.

Carve up Kentucky's methods of talent acquisition all you want. How a flotilla of five-star recruits and future lottery picks has subjugated agendas and egos has been nothing shy of incredible. Especially considering that, only last year, with only slightly less marquee talent, it was a daily battle just to achieve the same result. "It was so hard," center Willie Cauley-Stein said the day before the Florida game, "to get people to play hard all the time."

Meanwhile, in the game that made Kentucky the first major-conference team to finish a regular season unbeaten since Indiana in 1975-76, no one logged more than 28 minutes. No one took more than 12 shots. Karl-Anthony Towns collected 13 points, nine rebounds, six blocks and three assists in 27 minutes. Were Towns producing at that level, any other coach in America who gave his minutes to another player might be fired on the spot for gross dereliction of duty.

In Lexington, that's another Saturday. Seven Wildcats have usage percentages between 17.9 and 24.4. To say nothing of the motivation required to be most efficient defensive team in the nation (85.1 points per 100 possessions, per kenpom.com). "A lot of teams, if they had these players, wouldn't be able to say they share the ball," forward Trey Lyles said. "But we have a lot of great guys on the team that share with one another. That's what makes us good."

There is nothing as remarkable about Virginia's egalitarian approach, if only because it is bedrock for what Bennett built. If there is a focus on the individual for the Cavaliers, it is a bit more literal than philosophical: Everyone is waiting upon the return of forward Justin Anderson, the team's second-leading scorer at 13.4 points per game, out since Jan. 31 first with a broken finger and now an appendectomy that took place this past Thursday. Bennett couldn't handicap when the junior will be next available, other than to say "hopefully sooner than later."

It is a commentary on his team's resolve and interdependence that it didn't matter until Saturday. Virginia hadn't lost a game after Anderson was sidelined. It didn't let slip a grip on a No. 1 seed. Anderson was perhaps only noticeable in his absence when Virginia threw a long, last-gasp inbound pass out of bounds with 2.7 seconds left; in normal circumstances, Anderson is the triggerman for that play.

There has been no discernible issue replacing Anderson, leading scorer Malcolm Brogdon said, because there is an active mission to dissolve the line between starter and role player. "We give people that come off the bench a lot of confidence," Brogdon said. "We make them feel like they're a part of the starting lineup."

"It's not just Justin, it's not just Malcolm (Brogdon)," Perrantes said. "We have a bunch of other guys that play really well and score really well. We definitely could have used him tonight, obviously, we could have used him this whole season. We'll be glad when he gets back. But we should have won that game. There's no question."

Had Virginia not been felled by Mathiang's second successful field goal attempt since mid-winter, the concern over operating without Anderson in the postseason would have been dulled. Miracle shot or no miracle shot, the Cavaliers have a hazier outlook than the team that finished a perfect season hours before, just up the road.

Winning a championship will require individual talent, so there is a premium on a return of a player of Anderson's caliber.

But as Kentucky and Virginia have demonstrated all year, and showed again on the final weekend of the regular season, individual talent is one thing. Ability without agenda can really be something else.

NO. 2 VIRGINIA ISN'T OUT TO IMPRESS - IT'S OUT TO WIN

On Monday night, Tony Bennett's No. 2 Virginia Cavaliers beat the Syracuse Orange 59-47 to win the school's second-straight ACC regular season title. In doing so, UVA became the first non-Carolinas school to do so. It's a remarkable feat, but just don't tell that to the team. They're interested in more.

"We haven't talked about [the record] as a staff or a program, but I've seen it," Cavaliers associate head coach Ritchie McKay told TSN.ca. "I think it was on the Bottom Line of the ESPN ticker, so my guess is that most of our guys are aware of it, but it wasn't one of the goals we set out for at the beginning of the year. It certainly speaks to the quality of the players that we have and what they've achieved over the past couple of years."

What they've achieved is the production of a fundamentally sound, well-oiled basketball machine. The team's NCAA Tournament run ended in the Sweet 16 a year ago with a 61-59 loss to Michigan State. Thinking about that loss and the echelon of play the team was able to achieve last season has helped form the vision of this year's edition.

"Coach Bennett is a dire competitor," said McKay. "He's always pursuing excellence. I think, really, the message [this season] was, let's build on last year and see if we can't get back to the stage that we finished at, that was the Sweet Sixteen and we fell to Michigan State. We felt like we were playing at a very high level and that was a really fun game to be a part of. That was a battle. I think we'd like to see if we can continue to go ahead this season and continue to try to play at the highest level, so I think we're on course for that."

The Cavaliers, 28-1, play a smothering style of defence and utilize a possession-based offence that slows down the tempo on both ends. There are not a lot of high-scoring games when the team affectionately called the 'Hoos by fans are playing. If you can appreciate a comprehensive game plan executed to perfection, then you can't help but be impressed by Bennett's team. If you're looking for something a little bit flashier, then maybe Virginia basketball isn't for you. Still, McKay isn't concerned with the perception that his team's game isn't exactly aesthetically pleasing.

"It's different when there's a perception or perspective from someone on the outside, who turns on the TV and watches us play," McKay explained. "I can tell you that, if I was a guard and I knew what our system was like under Tony Bennett, I would want to come here in a heartbeat because our guards have such great freedom. I mean there's really not a shot that they can't take. We've just chosen to get a great shot for the betterment of our team. I think, defensively, we try to battle you. We really work hard to see if we can't impose our defensive will on you and that, consequently, drives the tempo down because it'll take a minute or two to score on us in some games."

With the play of its guards so critical to Virginia's success, the team has spent the last month without its second-leading scorer and, arguably, its most influential player in Justin Anderson. Anderson, a projected first-round pick in June's NBA Draft, fractured his finger in a 52-47 win over Louisville on February 7. Averaging 13.4 points, 4.3 boards and 2.0 assists in 29.4 minutes a night, Anderson's injury forced the 'Hoos to utilize team depth to weather the storm with the 21-year-old sidelined, going 7-0 over that time.

"It's a program for us, not just an individual player," McKay explained of the team's philosophy. "Justin's had a phenomenal season and we're a better team with Justin Anderson than without him. When you have a player like (junior forward) Evan Nolte or a youngster like (freshman guard and Ottawa native) Marial Shayok or (freshman guard) Devon Hall, we feel like we can at least get a guy to step into that role and add value in his own way."

By virtue of finishing on top of the conference, Virginia will enter the ACC Tournament as its top seed and receives a bye into the quarter-final stage. McKay believes that the calibre of opposition is such that looking past the team's first game would be folly and is well aware of the threat presented by lower-ranked opposition.

"I think that there are some teams that have been playing [particularly] well, but it's the ACC," explained McKay. "NC State, they're a team that can beat anyone on any court at any time. We have such a great level of respect for Clemson and the job that Brad [Bronwell] does there. There's four Hall of Fame coaches in this league (Duke's Mike Krzyzewski, Jim Boeheim of

Syracuse, UNC's Roy Williams and Rick Pitino of Louisville) and a future one in Coach Bennett – I might be a little bit biased – so I don't know if there's anyone that would surprise me, but maybe if a really low seed ended up winning four days. I don't know if that would happen in our league because of the strength of our conference at the top. But like every tournament, there will be some upsets and some eyebrows raised."

The team knows well that another decent showing in the ACC Tournament – winning the whole thing probably isn't necessary – will result in another top seeding for March Madness, but McKay and the rest of the 'Hoos will cross that bridge when they get there and remain focused on Saturday night's regular season finale and a date with No. 16 Louisville in Kentucky.

"We don't talk about that stuff," McKay said of a potential No. 1 seed. "We just try to focus on our next opponent, ourselves and trying to get better, trying to pursue higher levels of play. We didn't talk about it last year and we ended up the No. 1 seed. I think everyone was excited because it came off of a regular season and an ACC Tournament championship. So I think what we're looking at next is a very good Louisville team – when they play in the KFC Yum! Centre, they're really good – and after that, the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament."

The Cavaliers believe they have the personnel and the tools to improve on last year's Tournament appearance, but that would only be part of what McKay would consider as success for his players.

"I think we're about so much other than just winning," McKay explained. "We feel like our players are growing as young men, as students and I think, athletically, we're promoting their own improvements for their own individual goals, but I think all of us want to win as a team and see how far we can get. It's unspoken, but obviously, we'd love to play [in the Sweet 16] again and have another crack it, but I think we'll just take the next day as it comes. That's kinda what we do and we'll see success if everyone's level [of it] is satisfied."

The chance for Virginia to reach that level begins on March 12.

UVA'S SECOND STRAIGHT TITLE MAY BE BIGGER ACCOMPLISHMENT

Few people were talking back-to-back championships when Virginia finished atop the ACC regular-season standings in 2014.

And, the Cavaliers' lead this season seemed tenuous at best when junior Justin Anderson suffered a fractured finger Feb. 7 against visiting Louisville.

Anderson may be available when second-ranked UVa (28-1, 16-1) travels to Louisville for Saturday's 6:30 p.m. regular-season finale, but his teammates made sure that his absence didn't cripple them.

Nor did they collapse following the departure of Joe Harris and Akil Mitchell, headliners for the Cavaliers' 2013-14 team, which won the ACC regular-season and tournament championships. "Every time you reach a milestone, it's different, even if you've accomplished it before," said fourth-year junior Malcolm Brogdon following a 59-47 victory Monday night at Syracuse.

"We lost players. The ACC's gotten stronger. I think it's [the regular-season championship] more of an accomplishment this year."

However, there have been numerous similarities. The Cavaliers were a preseason choice for fourth place last year and they were picked fourth again this year.

Virginia clinched the 2013-14 regular-season championship against Syracuse, a 75-56 victim in Charlottesville. This year, Syracuse was the home team and had the support of a Carrier Dome crowd of 25,338.

Those numbers had dwindled appreciably by game's end, as Virginia overcame an 11-point first-half deficit to lead by as many as 17.

So many doors were opened to accommodate Syracuse fans leaving before game's end that a cozy environment turned downright chilly.

"They clearly are the second-best team in the country [behind Kentucky] from what I've seen," veteran Syracuse coach Jim Boehiem said.

"I think they are tremendously well-coached. They've got tremendous physical strength. The players are underrated; they are much better players than people might think.

"When they get Anderson back, they can play. I mean, they can beat anyone without him but I hope he is able to come back."

UVa junior Anthony Gill was 8-of-11 from the field and finished with a game-high 17 points, followed by Brogdon, London Perrantes and reserve Mike Tobey with 10.

Perrantes also had a career-high 10 assists to become the first UVa player since Sean Singletary in 2008 to register a double-double in points and assists.

Perrantes had suffered a broken nose and mild concussion eight days earlier and did not dress for UVa's game at Wake Forest.

"It's my face," said Perrantes, who also matched a career high with three steals. "I have nothing wrong with my feet, my legs, my arms.

"It's nothing bad, but it definitely hurt. I don't want to go through that again."

Tobey had scored in double figures only once in the previous four games and had played a season-low four minutes Saturday in a 69-57 victory over Virginia Tech.

He had two dunks Monday, one coming off an alley-oop from Perrantes.

"I think I got a whole three inches off the ground," Tobey said.

Tobey pointed out that UVa's defense deserved credit for keeping the Cavaliers in the game when they had 10 turnovers in the opening 10½ minutes.

"It held us in there till our offense got on track," said Bennett, also noting the Cavaliers' 42-20 rebounding advantage, including 16 offensive rebounds.

"Our best offense for a while was just throwing it up there and going after the rebound."

Until Monday, Duke still had a shot at the No. 1 seed for the ACC Tournament, although the Cavaliers had clinched a share of the regular-season title by beating the Hokies over the weekend.

"That was significant," Bennett said. "I'm telling you, that was a big deal for us. The message from Day 1 has been to max out in this conference season to prepare us for what's next."

WHY UVA BASKETBALL IS SO IMPRESSIVE (AND NOT BORING)

Despite being a clear No. 2 in the rankings for the better part of two months and playing a swarming defense that big-time college basketball has rarely seen, Virginia can't get any respect. Every discussion about the Hoos' 28-1 record starts with a "yeah, but" and few seem to appreciate just how dominant the team has been in the ACC over the past two years.

If Duke had been doing what UVA's done over the past 15 months, ESPN would have created a separate channel dedicated to Mike Krzyzewski: ESPNK.

But don't fall into that trap. Virginia basketball is the real deal and here are nine reasons why.

1. Over the past 14 months, they've been the most dominant team in college basketball.

Since January 1, 2014, Virginia has gone 49-4, tied for the best in the NCAA over that period with Wichita State. But Virginia, of course, plays in the far-tougher ACC. Each of those losses came in a tight or meaningless game too: UVA lost by four at Duke; in overtime at Maryland (during a meaningless game after the team had clinched the ACC title); by two to Michigan St in the Sweet 16; and to Duke this year by six.

Prior to that run, the Hoos started 2014 on an unspectacular 9-4 run that included losses to Green Bay and Tennessee. People knew Tony Bennett's system would eventually start working, but it went into a surprising overdrive after last New Year's.

2. The ultra-rare double-up. (Twice.)

Entering this season, only one team in ACC history had doubled-up another ACC team in a game, and that happened way back in 1954. UVA has done it twice this year (57-28 over Georgia Tech and 70-34 over Wake Forest).

Let that one sink in.

3. Tony Bennett is doing Krzyzewskish things.

The Hoos went 19-2 last year in the ACC and are 16-1 this year.

That's 35-3 over two years!

In the ACC!

Mike Krzyzewski has pulled that feat once, doing it a little better (of course, his roster was packed with All-Americans and lottery picks): His dominant 1998-2000 teams combined to go 54-3 in the ACC (tournament included). But to put UVA's current run in perspective, the last time Coach K made it through an ACC season with less than three losses was 2006. Not to knock Duke though; they're the gold standard. We give these stats as proof that UVA isn't some fluke coasting by because of an unbalanced schedule.

4. The Hoos hold teams to under 30 points!

UVA has held three teams under 30 points this year and it wasn't against those scrub squads the big boys play in November/December. Two of those teams were from power conferences — Rutgers (26 points) and Georgia Tech (28) — while the other — Harvard (27) — could make the tournament. I've seen second-grade rec-league games with more scoring.

5. Slow, then quick, improvement.

Tony Bennett has been there for six years. His record has improved every year — 15-16, 16-15, 22-10, 23-12, 30-7 and 28-1 (assuming they get to 30+ wins this year, which is a good bet).

6. They've survived injury.

They haven't lost since Justin Anderson, their most dynamic offensive player, went out with a hand injury. Not that there wasn't at least one close call:

7. Defense, defense, defense.

UVA turns off a lot of people because it plays a slow, deliberate offense with a concentration of defense. How could this turn off a basketball fan? Only one answer jumps out: We don't like what's different. This isn't the NBA, when good defense can involve just getting back to the other side of the court and great defense is usually one-on-one based. The most radical we want in college defense is Jim Boeheim's 2-3 zone or something flashy, like Nolan Richardson's "40 minutes of hell." The subtlety of UVA's defense doesn't belie its tenacity.

Virginia plays a ferocious pack-line defense that harasses the ball-carrier beyond the three-point line, then limits the movement of other plays on the court. They double-team so quickly opponents immediately panic. At times, it looks like UVA is playing six to five. They smother. (Here's a great breakdown.) Why is that a bad thing? It's more exciting than what 99% of NCAA teams do offensively. Watching good defense is watching good basketball.

8. They're blue collar, not blue chip.

In the world of one-and-dones and John Calipari, UVA harkens back to the good ol' days of college basketball. There are no one and dones. There are no McDonald's All-Americans and no top NBA prospects. They're as blue collar as a team playing in a state-of-the-art \$131 million arena can be. UVA is what's right with college basketball.

9. They're the embodiment of ABCD.

Everyone in ACC country knows what those four letters mean: Anybody But Carolina, Duke. And in winning back-to-back regular-season titles, UVA becomes the first team in 40 years not named Duke or UNC to pull off the feat.

In a few weeks, when everybody is filling out their NCAA brackets, UVA is going to be the vogue upset pick. Disrespect away, my friends. UVA is for real. For real.

PATIENCE PAYS FOR VIRGINIA'S ATKINS

As Darion Atkins completed the final home game of his college career Saturday, the Virginia senior forward exited the court at John Paul Jones Arena to a rousing ovation from the John Paul Jones Arena crowd and a hearty hug from coach Tony Bennett.

It was a scene Atkins couldn't have imagined last season, when he contemplated transferring after a lack of playing time in a frustrating junior campaign.

Atkins had just recorded 16 points, six rebounds, three assists, two blocks and two steals in the No. 2 Cavaliers' 69-57 victory over rival Virginia Tech.

He's a key reason the Cavaliers (27-1, 15-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) can wrap up a second straight ACC regular-season title outright with a win at Syracuse tonight.

After the Virginia Tech game, Atkins took time to reflect on the struggles of the 2013-14 season, which was one of the best for the team in school history, but was challenging for the 6-foot-8 Clinton, Md., native.

Atkins started three games last season, beginning with a win over Northern Iowa on Dec. 21, 2013. But after he started for the final time in a 35-point shellacking to Tennessee nine days later, his playing time plummeted and so did his mood.

"I didn't really know what was going to happen or where I saw myself going," Atkins said. "I had so many negative outlets in my ear trying to talk to me but all I did was listen to coach Bennett, my coaches and my teammates and I stayed true to them."

It wasn't easy. Atkins said he had to rely on his faith to get him through. He watched sophomore center Mike Tobey start ahead of him. He played just one minute in the Cavaliers' victory over Duke in the ACC tournament championship game.

He went on to play a total of 10 minutes in Virginia's three NCAA tournament contests. He voiced frustration over his role to reporters prior to a win over Memphis in the NCAA tournament's third round. Atkins wondered if he would return to Virginia for his senior season.

"[Transferring] crossed my mind, but it was not something that was final like, 'I'm going to leave,' because I'm not the type of person to back down from anyone coming in or adversity or anything like that," Atkins said. "So I just had faith in God and in myself."

Atkins said he leaned on teammates Akil Mitchell, Justin Anderson and even Tobey for encouragement.

He knew that after Mitchell's graduation, his role likely would increase. There was little doubt that Anthony Gill, a key reserve a year ago, would enter the starting lineup at the power forward spot. It appeared Tobey had the inside track to the fifth starting position but Atkins has seized the opportunity.

After seeing his minutes per game drop from 15.7 as a sophomore to 10.4 last year, Atkins has started 21 of the 27 games he's played in this season. (He missed a win over VCU with a sore back).

He's fourth on the team with 7.6 points per game. He's second with 5.8 rebounds and he leads the Cavaliers in blocks (30) and steals (22).

"Three years ago, I wasn't doing anything like this," Atkins said. "I wasn't contributing on the offensive end. Coach really didn't have the trust in me to come out and do the things that I'm doing now. I had ups and downs a lot."

Atkins is a candidate for ACC defensive player of the year honors as he's effectively replaced Mitchell's ability to defend, particularly on ball screens. Gill said Atkins is the defense's anchor and a motivating force in practice because "we have to make sure we're up to par with Darion."

"He's really embraced that defensive stopper [role] to blow up ball screens, block shots, bother," Bennett added. "I just thought he causes a little of an issue for the opposing team if they're

going to put him in a lot of ball screens because he just makes people go back out to half court and then it lets our defense reset.

"He's bought in and I'm so proud of him because his story is a real good story."

Atkins' scoring total against the Hokies was one shy of his career high of 17, set against Morgan State his sophomore season.

But the Virginia Tech performance was undoubtedly more memorable. The day began when he was presented his No. 5 jersey enclosed in a glass frame. It ended with two dunks in the final minute. Atkins was called for a technical after the first dunk for pulling up on the rim. Bennett became angry at the call because he thought it would spoil a memorable moment for his lone scholarship senior. But Atkins said the technical was well-deserved and worth it.

"We don't like Tech and I was glad I got a tech," Atkins said. "It was a spicy ending."

But it's not the end of the road for Atkins. The Cavaliers have two regular-season games remaining before the ACC tournament and then the NCAA tournament. Atkins said his aim is to receive another embrace from Bennett after capturing titles in those events.

"I'm not saying he didn't want to play more or couldn't play more early on but to experience what he's gotten to experience in this last year I'd think he'd say some of the hardship was worth it," Bennett said. "To be in this spot and obviously there's more to go but that means a lot to me. That's a lot of the reason you coach, to see those stories happen."

BENNETT RECOGNIZES JUST HOW SPECIAL THIS TEAM IS

Seldom does Tony Bennett stop and smell the roses. Saturday night was one of those rare times when the Virginia coach paused to consider what his basketball team had just accomplished.

UVa had beaten rival Virginia Tech for the seventh straight time, allowing the Cavaliers to match the program's best start in school history at 27-1. Monday night at the Carrier Dome in frozen Syracuse, Virginia could surpass that mark.

By no means should anyone mistake Bennett's recognition of the deed as being satisfied. If you know Bennett, you know that he won't be satisfied until his team wins it all. Even then, he'll want to do it again.

Still, Saturday was somewhat historic and it was healthy for Virginia to enjoy the moment.

"I'm thankful for sure," Bennett said of the hot start that has kept his team at No. 2 in the nation for the bulk of the ACC season.

After beating the Hokies, Bennett, who is always looking for ways to inspire and motivate his team, read the players a quote in the locker room. He thought about reading it before the game, but decided afterward would be better timing. The quote was sent to him by a coaching friend, Steve Larsen, who used the John Wooden quote as part of his own philosophy.

"When I read the quote, I thought to myself, 'This [quote] is these guys.' The quote says, 'It's amazing what can be accomplished when no one cares who gets the credit,'" Bennett said.

"If that doesn't embody these guys, in terms of their ability to play for each other, to be unselfish, to do the dirty work, and then to see what they've accomplished, then nothing does," Bennett added.

Certainly that was Wooden's philosophy and it led the "Wizard of Westwood's" UCLA squads to an amazing 11 NCAA championships.

The win over Virginia Tech, the Cavaliers' ninth in the last 10 games against the Hokies, also allowed UVa to capture no less than a share of the ACC regular-season title with two games to play (Monday at Syracuse and at Louisville on Saturday).

"We had our sights on trying to at least be good in the conference season and to see if we could [win the regular season title] again," Bennett said. "We at least got a piece of that. We've got a couple more games to try to get something outright."

The Virginia coach also pointed out that he was glad his team wasn't afraid to go get that title.

In order to do so, a lot of people made strong contributions and Bennett pointed them out Saturday, everyone from his coaching staff to strength and conditioning coach Mike Curtis, to the "Green Machine," which is the team's scout team that works hard without much recognition.

One of the most important people that also goes unrecognized most of the time is Ethan Saliba, the team's head athletic trainer, who has worked medical miracles on Cavaliers over the years. Saliba, who came up under Joe Gieck, has always been special to the program along with the late Dr. Frank McCue.

Collectively, those guys have kind of been to Virginia what Mickey Goldmill was to Rocky Balboa in all those Rocky movies. Goldmill was the crusty old boxing trainer that would coach, inspire and put Rocky back together again.

After UVa point guard London Perrantes broke his nose for the second time in a week on Saturday, I wondered if Saliba might have borrowed Mickey's line when Perrantes complained that his nose was broken. Mickey would have said, "Anything's an improvement."

Just kidding. Perrantes is a fine looking kid, but then again, so was Rocky.

Perrantes, who grew up in Wooden's Los Angeles, said that the quote did sum up what Virginia's basketball team is all about.

"That's just the character of our team, even off the court," the sophomore guard said. "Anybody needs some help; we're all there to help. The chemistry off the court also helps on the court. To have that mentality is huge for us and I think it helps us win."

Junior guard Malcolm Brogdon agreed.

"Our way is together and our way is humble, but hungry," Brogdon said.

Another junior forward, Anthony Gill, said the Wooden quote perfectly described the Cavaliers.

"This group of guys is special," Gill said. "I think we had the same thing last year as far as the chemistry, so we're blessed to have this opportunity. We love each other, not just on the court. We're brothers. There's not one weak link on this team and we understand that in order for us to be successful, that everyone has to be bought in."

The fact that Virginia has reached 27-1 for only the second time in more than 100 years of Wahoo basketball is significant, but Gill said the team won't think about it until this season is over.

"We have a lot of season left," Gill said. "After the season, we'll really take a look at it and say, 'Wow, we did something special,' like we did last year."

Bennett hosted a pool party at his house for the team and that's when the Cavaliers stopped to take it all in, the 30-7 record, the ACC regular season and ACC Tournament championship, and a Sweet Sixteen appearance.

"That's when it really hit us that we did something special," Gill said. "After the season is the time to look back. Don't start looking now or you'll lose everything you've done."

SHORT-HANDED 'HOOS PULL TOGETHER AT JPJ

On the night he earned his 200th victory as a head coach, Tony Bennett lost starting point guard London Perrantes to a broken nose about five minutes into the second half at John Paul Jones Arena.

Another starter, guard Malcolm Brogdon, missed about two minutes while getting three stitches on his forehead after a violent collision with Perrantes. Yet another starter, swingman Justin Anderson, was already on the bench in street clothes, recovering from a Feb. 8 operation to repair a fractured finger.

None of that derailed UVA (25-1 overall, 13-1 ACC) as it matched the best 26-game start in program history.

"I thought our guys just found a way, and that's what we had to do," Bennett said after second-ranked Virginia defeated Florida State 51-41 in a fiercely contested game before a near-capacity crowd of 14,076.

"When London went out and Malcolm for a little bit, we just challenged them: Just dig down deep."

The Wahoos made only 1 of 11 attempts from 3-point range Sunday, and Perrantes' trey was the only shot outside the paint they hit all game. Compounding the Cavaliers' offensive woes were their struggles at the line, where they made only 14 of 27 shots.

None of that kept the 'Hoos from clinching one of the top four seeds in next month's ACC tournament. Against Virginia's relentless man-to-man defense, the Seminoles (15-13, 7-8) finished with fewer than 54 points for the first time this season and shot only 32.6 percent from the floor. UVA held the 'Noles without a field goal for the final 10:33.

"Of course we won it with our defense," said Bennett, whose record in six seasons at Virginia is 131-61. "We didn't win it with our free-throw shooting or our other stuff. But there were enough stops, and it was what we had to do, and I really liked how the guys responded defensively in a tough situation, and the crowd was once again special."

The Cavaliers' fans, in full voice for most of the game, fell silent at the 14:39 mark of the second half, a moment after Brogdon and Perrantes collided on defense. Perrantes fell to the court, where he lay as blood poured from his nose and onto his jersey.

"I just remember hitting heads," Brogdon said. "I was trying to avoid him, and I'm sure he was trying to avoid me, but it was happening too fast. I felt bad, knowing that his nose was broken, because I knew he got the worst end of the deal, for sure."

His forehead bleeding, Brogdon left the court to get stitches while head athletic trainer Ethan Saliba attended to Perrantes, still on the floor. After Perrantes was at last helped to his feet, Saliba walked with him into the tunnel.

"I knew after they collided that it was going to be bad," Virginia senior Darion Atkins said. "So I was just hoping and praying it wasn't going to be too bad. Thank God, Malcolm was able to come back out, and hopefully we get London back on the court pretty soon."

Into the game, with UVa leading 31-28, came two reserve guards, redshirt freshman Devon Hall and freshman Marial Shayok.

"We both knew that we had to step up," Shayok said. "That's what Coach has been emphasizing all year, next man up, so we both came in prepared."

Hall said: "You never know what's going to happen. It was just a matter of us being ready and being able to step up and make plays."

With its starting backcourt out of the game, UVa looked inside, and Atkins delivered, scoring on back-to-back possessions to push the lead to 35-30. The 6-8 senior, whose putback dunk had sent Virginia into halftime with a 22-21 lead, finished with 11 points and a career-high four steals.

"I thought Atkins made two big baskets," Florida State coach Leonard Hamilton said. "Had he missed those, then things might have been different, but since he had the experience and made them they were able to get some points."

At the 12:59 mark, Brogdon, a bandage on the right side of his forehead, re-entered the game to a thunderous ovation from the crowd.

"I figured he would be back," Virginia big man Anthony Gill said, smiling. "He's got a big head, and it's very muscular, so I figured he would be back."

Brogdon's return buoyed the Cavaliers, but FSU refused to wilt. A 3-pointer by 6-4 freshman Xavier Rathan-Mayes pulled the 'Noles to 35-33, and they went ahead 37-36 on a jump hook by 6-9 sophomore Jarquez Smith with 10:32 left. But the left-handed Hall answered with a right-handed reverse layup on the next possession, and the 'Hoos never trailed again.

Those were the only points for Hall, who also had an assist and a turnover before returning to the bench with 6:47 left. Shayok finished with seven points, a career-best six rebounds and one steal, along with three turnovers, in his 24 minutes.

"I thought he had a stretch defensively where he just deflected balls, got steals, used his length, and that was really important for us," Bennett said of Shayok.

"I liked his aggressiveness, and he went up and snatched some rebounds when we needed it." In the final seven minutes, Virginia did not lead by more than five points until the 3:03 mark, when Brogdon spun free for a layup that made it 45-39. With 2:10 remaining, Gill hit two free throws to stretch UVa's lead to 47-41.

Brogdon and Shayok then provided the coup de grace. After yet another missed 3-pointer by the 'Noles, who were 4 for 19 from beyond the arc, Brogdon corralled the rebound and spotted Shayok alone across midcourt. One outlet pass later, Shayok drove in for an emphatic dunk that made it 49-41 with 75 seconds to play.

"I'm not a guy that takes chances like that, especially at the end of the game when it's close, but I saw him wide open," Brogdon said. "I was like, 'I have to, and it's Marial, he's playing well. I've got to get him the ball.' So I threw it up to him."

Perrantes, a 6-2 sophomore, watched the final minutes from the bench. With 6:47 left, he'd come back through the tunnel, wearing jersey No. 43 instead of his customary No. 32 and holding gauze to his nose.

His status for Wednesday night, when Virginia plays at Wake Forest, isn't clear, but his teammates proved Sunday that they could pull through without Perrantes, a two-year starter.

"It was a blue-collar affair, as we like to say," Bennett said. "It was really a hard-fought game, and I know it wasn't pretty, but you just had to do what you had to do, and the guys really rallied when they needed to."

The Seminoles' roster is loaded with tall, long-armed players, and their defense bothered Virginia. The Cavaliers, led by Atkins and Gill (13 points, nine rebounds, two steals), were effective inside, but they have not scored more than 61 points in a game since Anderson (13.4 ppg) broke his finger against Louisville.

It's not for lack of work in practice, but his team is "not shooting it well," Bennett acknowledged. "It's just where we're at right now, and we just had to rest on our defense, and obviously we're going to have keep probably getting better on that side of the ball, but I'm thankful for how the guys fought and came out with one with their defense. You can look at our offense, and we did struggle, but you can't take it away from our guys defensively."

Defensive gems have become the norm for the Cavaliers under Bennett, who came to Charlottesville in the spring of 2009 after three seasons as head coach at Washington State, where he compiled a 69-33 record.

At Virginia, he took over a team that won only 10 games in 2008-09. Under Bennett, the 'Hoos finished 15-16 in 2009-10, 16-15 in 2010-11, 22-10 in 2011-12, 23-12 in 2012-13, and 30-7 last season, when they swept the ACC titles and advanced to the NCAA tournament's Sweet Sixteen. Now, with four regular-season games and postseason play still to come, UVa has recorded at least 13 ACC victories in back-to-back seasons for the first time in program history.

"It's taken me probably longer than it should have," Bennett said of reaching the 200-win mark, "but we're in a good place this year, and we'll keep plugging."

VIRGINIA NEED NOT APOLOGIZE FOR PACE, DEFENSIVE EXCELLENCE

Syracuse was the toast of college basketball a year ago. Jim Boeheim's Orange was 25-0, ranked No. 1 and applauded for a style rooted in a stifling 2-3 zone defense.

Today, Virginia is portrayed by some of the same oracles as the game's scourge. Tony Bennett's Cavaliers are 24-1, ranked No. 2 and vilified for an approach based on an overpowering man-to-man defense.

Talk about illogical and tortured.

Now if you find Virginia games dull, stagnant or even sleep-inducing, cool by me. Tastes vary. I like "The Big Bang Theory," triple-option football and hummus on raw broccoli, but don't expect you to concur.

Maybe its generational, cultural or just plain whimsy. Doesn't matter. Different strokes, agree to disagree and all that other kumbaya stuff.

But to suggest the Cavaliers are an aesthetic affront? A barrier to broadening the game's popularity?

Well, that's where you lose me.

College basketball isn't the bucket-a-minute NBA and shouldn't aspire to be. Most important, Virginia is not the lone successful team whose games are low-scoring and slow-paced.

So if you want to echo Jay Bilas' rants about the college game's overall decline in scoring and downshift in tempo, that's a more overarching, philosophical debate for another day. But to single out Bennett's bunch, in large measure because of its historically effective defense, borders on shallow and disingenuous.

The trigger for the latest anti-Virginia sentiments was Monday's 61-49 victory over Pittsburgh. The Cavaliers led 25-15 at intermission, an extreme first half that defined the phrase "rock fight."

But the final score and shooting percentages — Virginia shot 42.6 percent, Pitt 38.6 — were hardly out of line, especially for conference play. After all, top-ranked and undefeated Kentucky bested Tennessee 66-48 Tuesday night — the shooting accuracies were 41.5 and 37.5 percent, respectively — and best I can tell, the result prompted no hue and cry.

More on the U.Va.-Kentucky dynamic in a moment, but first, let's compare Syracuse '14 to Virginia '15.

Boeheim has long been celebrated for his team's zone defense, and why not? Dude's a Hall of Famer, trails only Duke's Mike Krzyzewski in career Division I victories and won the 2003 national championship.

By any measure, these Cavaliers defend better than last season's Orange. They rank higher in defensive efficiency, limit opponents to fewer points per game and possession, and harass them into lower shooting percentages, overall and from beyond the 3-point arc.

This Virginia does with what Bennett calls the pack-line, a defense that pressures the ball half-court, clogs the area inside the arc and relies on length and athleticism to close out on 3-point shooters.

It is not complicated — nor is Boeheim's 2-3 — but requires discipline and extended concentration that are more learned than natural.

The Cavaliers' proficiency is such that opponents struggle to create open shots, with many possessions ending with a hurried, contested jumper as the 35-second shot clock ticks inside 10. The result, of course, is a slower pace and fewer points.

Is that Virginia's fault? Should Bennett alter a strategy that last year propelled Virginia to regular-season and tournament ACC championships and the NCAA Sweet 16? Should he and his team apologize for holding Rutgers, Harvard and Georgia Tech this season to fewer than 30 points?

Consider those rhetorical and let's move on.

The Cavaliers' critics also lament Bennett's deliberate offense, which is capable of, but does not force, transition and usually probes the paint first in search of a room-and-rhythm shot. If that's not acrobatic, frenzied or entertaining enough, your loss. Perhaps you'd prefer the NBA All-Star Game or "The Matrix" trilogy.

Truth is, Virginia this season is shooting better, overall and from three, than Syracuse did last year in opening 25-0. The Orange averaged a scant 1.6 more points (68.0 to 66.4), and their tempo stats, as tracked by Ken Pomeroy, virtually mirror the Cavaliers' this year.

For example, Virginia ranks 350th among 351 teams in possessions per game at 58.1 — only American University is slower — and averages 21.0 seconds per offensive possession. Syracuse ranked 343rd, with 61.3 possessions and 18.5 seconds.

In short, the outrage directed at the Cavaliers is over 1.6 points, 3.2 possessions and 2.5 seconds? Really?

Remember Butler in 2010, the Brad Stevens-coached, Gordon Hayward-led underdogs that charmed fans everywhere and darn near beat Duke in the national championship game? Those Bulldogs ranked 291st in tempo, averaged 64.1 possessions and 68.7 points, and shot 44.2 percent from the field.

All Virginia-like numbers.

Now let's move to this season, when the Cavaliers average about 14 points a game less than ACC-leading Duke (80.3). But what about Kentucky and another possible No. 1 NCAA tournament seed, the Big Ten's Wisconsin, where Bennett served as an assistant coach under his father, Dick?

The Wildcats and Badgers both average about seven points more than U.Va., significant but not alarming. Kentucky ranks 286th in pace, Wisconsin 343rd.

Moreover, before losing No. 2 scorer Justin Anderson to a broken finger earlier this month, Virginia was averaging 68.3 points, ranked ahead of Kentucky in offensive efficiency — Wisconsin is No. 1 — and had just scored 75 at North Carolina.

The Wildcats and Cavaliers rank 1-2 in defensive efficiency, and their respective ratings are among the top three Pomeroy has compiled since diving into analytics in 2002. The best points-allowed-per-100-possession in Pomeroy's database:

If I've inundated you and/or confused the issue with numbers, my apologies. At its heart, this is about the proverbial eye test.

Rick Pitino is basketball royalty and hails from its Mecca, New York City. He's guided Kentucky and Louisville to national titles, and coached the NBA's Knicks and Celtics.

Well, after his maiden voyage to Charlottesville earlier this month, when his Cardinals lost to Virginia 52-47, Pitino was smitten. He raved about the Cavaliers and John Paul Jones Arena, applauded their fans for cheering defense and compared Virginia's home-court advantage to Kansas' at venerable Allen Field House.

Understand that Pitino made these remarks unsolicited, not while answering some softball question from a hometown scribe.

I'm fortunate to see Virginia, in-person, regularly. But you don't need a ticket or press pass to appreciate how the Cavaliers share the ball and disrupt opponents, and how their fans respond.

Malcolm Brogdon's abilities to create space off the dribble and defend on the ball are subtle and brilliant — my buddy Carl is an NBA connoisseur and can't get enough of Brogdon on TV. London Perrantes' point-guard instincts are top-shelf and mixed with an attitude from his native L.A. Darion Atkins is a natural shot-blocker — his volleyball spike of a Sheldon Jeter drive Monday kick-started a fast break that Perrantes finished with a layup — and Anthony Gill exudes power inside.

Oh, and Anderson is among the nation's most dynamic talents, a clutch shooter whether rising for a jumper from beyond the arc or to emphatically dunk a Perrantes lob.

That, my friends, is entertainment.

SHAYOK GETS NEEDED BOOST AGAINST PITTSBURGH

Breaking through the infamous freshman wall probably requires more than just hitting a couple of shots, but Marial Shayok's performance on Monday night may have been a good start.

While the Virginia freshman didn't go "Super Marial" in the 61-49 win over Pittsburgh, he may have gotten a little bit of his mojo back.

Shayok had six points on 2 of 2 shooting, plus four rebounds, an assist and no turnovers in 21 minutes off the bench.

In his previous six games, Shayok had gone scoreless on 0 of 12 shooting.

"I just tried not to think too much," said Shayok, when asked about his performance. "I feel like I've been thinking too much lately.

"[I tried to] just play hard and stay aggressive."

Shayok's bucket in the first half was impressive. He got stuck with the ball at the end of the shot clock and had to make something happen, which he did — driving hard to the basket and finishing in traffic with his left hand.

"The play we ran didn't necessarily go as smoothly as we wanted," Shayok said. "I just put my head down and went to the hole."

In the second half, on the possession after Darion Atkins' big block, Shayok hit a 3-pointer from the wing to push Virginia's lead from eight to 11 points with just over four minutes remaining.

"As soon as he hit that 3, he looked over at Justin [Anderson] and Justin said, 'Are you back?' He was like, 'Yeah man, I'm back,'" said Atkins. "I'm glad he hit that shot because that's a booster for him. Hopefully he can keep being aggressive on the offensive end."

After the game, Shayok seemed in better spirits than he had been in.

"Not even just that I scored," he said, "but I started playing with a more positive attitude. That was just big for me. I always play better when I'm feeling good, regardless of if I'm scoring or not."

Shayok added: "I just had been thinking too much and I guess that frustration got to me. I shouldn't have let that happen, but it is what it is."

Before the game, Virginia coach Tony Bennett said he challenged his young bench players, Shayok included, to step up their games and to "grow up."

"I just said, 'Now is the time,'" Bennett said. "I said, 'Forget about if you're in there or not in there, if you make mistakes — just get out there and fight. Battle and be all about that and nothing else..."

"[Shayok] really played and he battled, and he hit a big 3 and made some good stops."

With Anderson projected to be out of the lineup for at least another few weeks, Virginia hopes Shayok's performance was a sign of things to come.

"For sure," said Virginia junior Malcolm Brogdon. "I think that anybody who can gain confidence out of the guards is going to help us in the future so much.

"To see him come out and play as well as he did, it's really good for us."

BROGDON HELPING PUT CAVALIER BASKETBALL BACK ON THE MAP

About this time last year, Joe Harris would frequently mention about how proud he was to be part of the team that helped turn Virginia's basketball program around, restored it to its glory days.

Harris didn't take the accomplishments lightly. He had studied the Cavaliers' hoops history and realized how much UVA's success meant to Wahoo alumni and to fans who followed the program.

Perhaps former Virginia coach Dave Leitao said it best when he talked about how the program had been irrelevant since the mid-90s as far as the college basketball world was concerned. It became even more irrelevant during Leitao's short era.

With the Cavaliers' 61-49 home win over visiting Pittsburgh on a snowy Monday night in Charlottesville, Harris, who now plays for the NBA's Cleveland Cavaliers, would have been proud.

Coach Tony Bennett's team improved to 24-1. Only the Ralph Sampson-led 1981-82 Cavaliers got off to a better start, going 27-1. The win over Pitt gave UVA a dozen ACC wins in back-to-back seasons for the first time since the '81-'82 team and the '82-'83 squads of Terry Holland.

Ranked No. 2 in the nation, behind only unbeaten Kentucky, Virginia has now won at least 13 home games over four consecutive seasons for the first time in program history.

While Harris and former teammate Akil Mitchell are beaming over UVA's continued success (they were both in attendance for Saturday's win over Wake Forest), for present Cavaliers star Malcolm Brogdon, it's just not enough.

"I think we're still in the process of turning this program around," Brogdon said after UVA's sixth consecutive win over Pitt. "I don't think it has been fully turned around. I don't even think that next year after I leave, that it will be fully turned around. I think it's a process that we have to keep establishing here."

Don't get Brogdon wrong. He realizes what last year's team, led by then-seniors Harris and Mitchell, accomplished. The UVA junior guard believes it takes time for a program to be considered one of the ACC's elite.

"I'm totally enjoying and thrilled with what we've been able to accomplish while I've been here," Brogdon said. "I'm excited to see what we accomplish after I leave and after my teammates leave."

With five regular season games to play, in addition to the postseason, Bennett's last four teams have compiled 99 wins, the second-most in program history to Holland's four-year stretch of 112 victories from 1980 through 1983.

Also consider that Bennett's last two squads have won 28 of their last 31 ACC games, with more to play this season.

And, get this. The Cavaliers are losing only one player from the mix, senior Darion Atkins, if things go as planned.

Atkins certainly has made his presence known on the team, giving the Cavaliers a spark over Pittsburgh with a dramatic blocked shot (one of his four blocks on the night), along with nine points and six rebounds.

Still, it was Brogdon who stole the show with a team-high 18 points, including a game-changing slam dunk that brought the 13,953 fans to their feet.

With Pitt fighting back to within reach of a potential upset, Brogdon emphatically closed the door with a thunderous dunk at the 2:59 mark that gave UVA a 47-37 cushion that it never relinquished. Down the final three-minute stretch, Brogdon was clutch at the free throw line, going 6-for-6 to squash any hopes of a Panther comeback.

Among those six free throws, Brogdon cracked the career 1,000-point plateau, making him the 45th Cavalier to reach that number. He now has 1,003 points.

He received yet another standing ovation from the crowd that braved a snowstorm to support the team.

"It means a lot . . . it's humbling," Brogdon said about cracking the 1,000-point list. "I remember Joe [Harris] getting it and previous players, like Mike Scott. It's a moment that I will have to say thank you to all the people who helped me along the way. It's not just me, it's my family, my coaches, my teammates that have helped. It's a moment of gratitude."

Bennett teased his leading scorer afterward, reminding Brogdon that NFL quarterbacks always buy their linemen Rolexes for helping them reach impressive career numbers.

"So, [Malcolm] should go buy his big guys a Tag Heuer," Bennett joked. "[UVA's big men] set so many good screens to get [Malcolm] open."

Brogdon got a good chuckle out of his coach's suggestion, but agreed that he can't express enough attitude to the Cavaliers' front line.

"For sure, the bigs," Brogdon said. "Darion, Mike Tobey, Anthony Gill, they get me open, they get me those shots."

All kidding aside, Bennett told Brogdon after the game how proud he is of the product of Atlanta, then told media what a complete player Brogdon was, how steady, how tough he has been.

Not only does Brogdon lead the team in scoring, he most always guards the opposing team's best perimeter player.

"In always, Malcolm is an ambassador for the university and this program," Bennett said.

That seems to be a universal opinion.

Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski said a few weeks ago that Malcolm Brogdon isn't a good player, but that Brogdon is a great player.

Maybe Virginia hasn't completely turned itself around quite yet, although the numbers suggest that the Cavaliers are within striking distance of the program's glory days, which included two Final Fours during the Holland era.

Maybe it will require more consecutive seasons, a trip or two to the big one, weeks if not months of occupying the nation's No. 1 perch as Sampson & Co., accomplished.

For now, Wahoo fans will take it and enjoy it because nowadays Virginia basketball is relevant.

EXPERIENCED CAVALIERS STILL CAPABLE OF SURPRISING THEIR COACH

All the chatter of flips Wednesday was like an Olympics gymnastics or diving competition. I half expected to hear about degree-of-difficulty and some rogue Russian judge hosing an American out of a gold medal.

So amid the football signing day cacophony, a basketball respite courtesy of coach Tony Bennett and his third-ranked Virginia Cavaliers.

The irony here is that Bennett is as fond of attention as he is zone defense. He couldn't escape Wednesday's 20-minute couch session with reporters fast enough, and he granted ESPN's College GameDay minimal access last week — the worldwide leader was in Charlottesville for U.Va.-Duke, and the lone player from either team who appeared on the show was Blue Devils freshman Jahliil Okafor.

Not that Bennett is rude or lacks insight. Anything but. It's just that he is completely consumed by the task at hand.

In short, Bennett lives in what he calls "the moment," and heaven help those who expect or ask him to lose that laser focus.

That said, Bennett pleasantly reviewed Monday's victory at No. 12 North Carolina and previewed Saturday's home clash against No. 9 Louisville (19-3, 7-2 ACC).

Most impressive to Bennett at the Dean Dome was how "our guys played for one another." That selflessness was evident on the stat sheet — four Cavaliers scored from 13-to-17 points — and in the numbers Bennett's staff charts regarding shot quality.

Most striking to me is how this veteran team, 21 games into a season, retains the capability to surprise fans, media and opponents.

"And sometimes the coaches, too," Bennett said with a laugh. "That has been a key. It just seems like different guys at different times, even doing different things, within themselves. . . ."

"That's a real important aspect for a team to continue to play at a high level: You can't just be one-dimensional. There has to be balance. You looked at that stat sheet against North Carolina and it was really good in terms of assists, turnovers, the balanced scoring, inside/outside. That's what you aspire to, certainly, and I think it showed in that game."

Indeed, Justin Anderson passed for seven assists, three more than any other contest this season. London Perrantes attempted 10 shots, his most ever in a regulation game — he took 11 in a double-overtime victory at Miami. At Notre Dame, Darion Atkins suddenly became an offensive force, scoring 14 points on 7-of-11 shooting.

And that's a strength of Bennett and his staff: They convince players such as Anderson, Perrantes and Malcolm Brogdon — Joe Harris last season is another example — to muffle their considerable skills for the sake of team.

"Teams can go on a run against them and they don't falter," North Carolina point guard Marcus Paige said Monday. "They run their stuff, they trust their stuff, and they buy into what their coach is telling them, and that's why they're successful. They're not the most talented team in our league, top to bottom. They buy into what Coach Bennett preaches to them, and it works when you really do that. . . ."

"We're trying to figure out how to do that. Like I said, we have talent, we have pieces. . . . When you have five guys committed to helping each other on the floor, working together, setting good screens to get the right guys the ball, that's success. And when you have talent, it elevates it to another level."

The Cavaliers (20-1, 8-1) couldn't ask for a better recruiting endorsement, and fans couldn't ask for a more enticing defensive matchup than Saturday's. Virginia ranks third nationally in defensive efficiency, Louisville sixth, but the approaches couldn't be more different.

Rick Pitino's Cardinals press for 94 feet, while the Cavaliers rely on their halfcourt approach. Virginia shredded VCU's press for 68.3 percent shooting in December, but Louisville has better athletes.

"It's as good of a defensive team as I've seen in quite a while," Bennett said.

Bennett has coached teams on the fringe of NCAA tournament contention and others, like this one, assured of a bid. I asked if the latter afforded him the flexibility to experiment with a lineup combination or an offensive set that might serve the team well in March.

I might as well have asked him to wear a Pitino-like white suit Saturday.

"This is about the moment," Bennett said. "It doesn't work like that for me, and it doesn't work that way for our guys. If it starts getting that way, it's tough. . . . We're midway through the ACC season, we've got one of the best defensive teams I've seen coming in here. Revel in that challenge, get as ready as you can, and then we'll go on to the next. That's really the way it works, for me at least, and I know our players and our program."

PERRANTES MAKES A STATEMENT ON TOBACCO ROAD

London Perrantes and his California cool is normally a chatterbox before games, so when Virginia's sophomore point guard was quiet pre-game on Monday night, teammate Justin Anderson was a little concerned.

"[Perrantes] was locked in on one hand, but on the other hand you could still see the frustration from that last game," said Anderson, not exactly the silent type himself.

Finally, Anderson couldn't take it any longer.

"I said, 'London, can you talk to me? I'm not used to you not talking this much,'" Anderson said.

Perrantes had the perfect comeback for his mood.

"He told me, 'Justin, I'll talk to you after we get this win,'" Anderson shared after third-ranked Virginia's 75-64 bounce back win at No. 12 North Carolina.

If there was any hangover from the Cavaliers' 69-63 home loss to Duke on Saturday night, UVA's first setback of the season, it didn't show at the Dean Dome. Virginia, now 20-1, shot 50 percent or better from the field in both halves and returned to the type of blue-collar defense that Coach Tony Bennett relentlessly pounds into their young skulls.

After watching Duke exploit UVA's defense against transition, followed by a late-game lapse in defending the 3 in the loss, the Cavaliers returned to form. UNC, which prefers to play at a greyhound pace, managed only one fast-break bucket and connected on four shots behind the arc.

Perrantes?

After remaining content to just distribute the basketball and to not commit turnovers, the L.A. guard unleashed what was, for him, an offensive explosion on the unsuspecting Tar Heels.

Perrantes finished the game with 15 points, only his second double-figures performance of the season (he had a career-high 26 at Miami in double overtime), on 6-for-10 shooting, including a late-game 3-point dagger.

Clocking a team-high 37 minutes, Perrantes dished out six assists, recorded two steals and turned it over only twice.

When the low-profile guard ups his game to Monday night's magnitude, it has a profound effect on Virginia's overall style of play.

"London takes our team to another level offensively when he plays like that," said teammate Malcolm Brogdon, who finished with a game-high 17 points. "When he can be aggressive, but still facilitate like he did, he's phenomenal. He's one of the best point guards in the country."

It's almost like Bennett and Perrantes' teammates have to prod him to shoot the ball. He's content on giving the ball to his teammates in the right place that gives them the best chance to score. He's not worried about personally lighting up the scoreboard.

When probed about his reluctance to put up shots, Perrantes explained that he didn't feel the need to launch up the rock early in the season against cupcake opponents. However, when the Cavaliers reached the meat of their schedule, he's a little more comfortable putting it up.

"Whenever it comes, it comes and I guess it's coming now," Perrantes said with a hint of a grin. Over the first 20 games, he averaged only 4.5 field goal attempts, but fired 10 times against the Tar Heels.

"You definitely have to prod him to shoot," Brogdon said. "You have to tell him, 'London, you have to shoot the ball.' Tonight, he was aggressive. We were playing a very tough team in a very tough environment and he stepped up and played a very good game."

Turns out that Bennett did have a little talk with his point guard after the Duke loss and told him that he needed to be more aggressive and take more shots.

"Toward the end of the Duke game, I made some shots, but I wasn't aggressive," Perrantes confessed. "Tonight, I took what the defense gave me and made some mid-range jumpers and hit the one 3-pointer toward the end. I guess me shooting like that just opens up everything for my teammates."

Offense from the point guard prevents defenses from sagging back on Virginia's bigs, while at the same time providing another scoring threat, making the Cavaliers more difficult to defend against.

Bennett said he was never worried about Perrantes forcing shots, but was more concerned with the point guard taking more.

"London taking 10 shots and just being aggressive in the lane with his six assists, that just adds another dimension to us," Bennett said. "And we needed all of it for sure. I liked his approach."

Certainly Perrantes needs to remain on his hot streak when another power comes to Charlottesville on Saturday and Louisville comes to town.

The bet is, Anderson won't have to ask Perrantes to talk to him before that game.

VIRGINIA DISPLAYS BLUE-COLLAR ATTITUDE, NOT WARDROBE, AGAINST UNC

Tony Bennett insisted his team think about the blue-collar nature of University of Virginia basketball.

That makes sense. When you think of Virginia, you think blue collar — on an oxford-cloth shirt with an orange and blue striped tie and khaki pants.

Wait.

Bennett wasn't talking about fashion. He was talking about his team's style of play.

He wanted the Cavaliers to return to the blue-collar attitude that led the Cavaliers to victories in their first 19 games, a streak that stopped against Duke in Game 20 Saturday night.

Bennett emphasized his point in the blue-collar — attitude, not fashion — practice he put his team through Sunday. His players were stunned and wounded after the Duke loss, fully aware it was a game they should have won.

And with the North Carolina Tar Heels on the schedule Monday night, Bennett wanted to make sure his team snapped out of its funk and would bring a few thunder dunks into the Dean Dome.

Justin Anderson provided a thunderous dunk, as well as 16 points and seven assists. And teammate Anthony Gill was the epitome of the blue-collar attitude Bennett insists his team adopt and practice.

Gill had 13 points, seven rebounds and absorbed a thunderous charge from Kennedy Meeks, North Carolina's 6-foot-9, 270-pound sophomore forward.

"My team needed a stop, and I was just thinking, 'Give up my body,'" Gill said. "I haven't gotten a charge in a long time, so I had to give it up right there.

"Justin said, 'That's a big boy. I'm glad you did that.'"

Kennedy started laughing. "It was pretty cool. Pretty much my whole body was hurting. But I feel great now."

As well he should have. Virginia, ranked third in the AP poll, came back from what might have been a devastating loss to many other teams and ground the Tar Heels into the Dean Dome floor in a 75-64 victory.

The Cavaliers were efficient on offense (51.8 percent shooting and four players in double figures) and determined on defense (UNC had just two points off fast breaks).

This was not a game Virginia had to win. Its postseason hopes were not pinned on beating North Carolina.

But make no mistake, this was a game the Cavaliers needed to win. They needed to prove to themselves they could absorb that blow to their egos from Duke and come back on the road and beat one of the top-ranked teams in the nation.

Bennett cares not a whit about proving anything to the rest of the country or anyone who votes in the national polls.

But he cares greatly about how his team plays.

He doesn't believe in pretty. He believes in toughness. He doesn't believe in finesse. He believes in fundamentals.

Bennett displayed the importance of this game with his actions during the game. He was more animated than he has been all season.

He was not just on his feet on the sidelines, he was on the court, during the action, exhorting his players and letting the officials know when he disagreed with their calls.

Who knew the cool, calm and collected Bennett could display such behavior?

"I think you guys should come to practice some time," Gill said.

Such invitations are rare, as rare as a Virginia loss this season.

Bennett wanted his team to bounce back Monday night because it is in the midst of its most challenging trio of games so far this season. Saturday, Louisville, ranked ninth in the latest AP poll, comes to Charlottesville.

That's why Bennett wanted to see the blue-collar effort he believes in so strongly.

And that means, Gill said, "Going out there and giving it your all, playing tough, hard-nosed basketball. It's kind of like playground ball, but we have a lot of rules and structure."

Virginia's structure returned Monday night. Bennett has no plans to see it disappear again this season.

DARION ATKINS, MIKE TOBEY PUSHING EACH OTHER THROUGH CHALLENGING STRETCH

Virginia center Mike Tobey tried to keep a straight face when he said he boxes with forward Darion Atkins in practice, but then a grin appeared as he said, "Just kidding."

Ask Atkins, and it doesn't sound so light-hearted.

"I've definitely banged him around, threw him around and hit him a few times," Atkins said. "Got in his grill and cursed him out once or twice just to make him stronger because that helps him a lot. Once he gets that physicality, he's going to be a beast."

The sparring in practice has been good for both of the big men, whom Coach Tony Bennett goes to depending on the matchup and sometimes plays at the same time. Their play in the next two games will be especially significant against teams with elite post players.

Tobey and Atkins performed admirably in a 69-63 loss against Duke on Saturday. They held star freshman center Jahliil Okafor to 10 points and nine rebounds after he entered the game as the ACC's leading scorer. Next up is North Carolina on Monday in Chapel Hill, N.C.

There, Tobey and Atkins will have to contain Kennedy Meeks (12.8 points and 8.1 rebounds per game) and Brice Johnson (11.8 points and 8.0 rebounds). Five days later, Louisville will present another challenge with Montrezl Harrell (15.2 points and 9.2 rebounds).

Tobey and Atkins are competing for playing time, as is natural, but they're also challenging each other to improve, both trying to be the better defender or the better rebounder.

Their stat lines are similar. Atkins, who is 6 feet 8, is averaging 21.5 minutes. Tobey, who is 7 feet, averages 18.5.

Tobey's scoring average (7.6 points) is slightly higher than Atkins's (7.2), but Atkins has been the better rebounder, averaging 6.3 rebounds to Tobey's 5.6.

"We use each other a lot," Atkins said. "We try to keep each other uplifted because you know how it is, playing for minutes and stuff like that. We never get down on one another. We always keep each other uplifted, and in practice we go at it relentlessly. We always encourage each other, and we always want to see the other succeed on the floor."

Tobey started more often in nonconference play while Atkins recovered from an injury, but Atkins has started every conference game but one. Against a team that relies heavily on interior play, like Georgia Tech, both started, and Bennett has said he considers Tobey, Atkins and Anthony Gill all starters even though all three don't start every game.

Atkins was the leading scorer in a win over Notre Dame with 14 points, and he helped the Cavaliers stave off Virginia Tech with nine points and four rebounds. Against Duke, he had nine points and four rebounds while staying out of foul trouble despite defending Okafor most of the game.

And with things going well for Atkins a year after he felt frustrated when his playing time dwindled in the postseason, he has taken it upon himself to help Tobey become more aggressive. While Atkins doesn't shy away from getting heated with Tobey in practice, he said Tobey hasn't pushed him around or cursed him out yet, but he hopes it will happen soon.

In conference play, Tobey's numbers have dipped to 6.1 points and 3.3 rebounds per game, while Atkins has averaged 7.7 points and 7.3 rebounds.

"It's going to come for him," Gill said of Tobey. "When he's ready for it, I think he'll step up and really be a physical player that we need."

Bennett stressed the importance of rebounding when the Cavaliers play against "elite" big men, like the ones they will see in the next two games.

"The higher the level the game, the more the play on the glass becomes significant," he said. When Duke took the lead in the last five minutes of Saturday's game, the Blue Devils grabbed five rebounds, and Okafor finished with as many rebounds as Tobey and Atkins combined.

Bennett said the healthy competition among the players has been a strength this season. It has created depth, so while some players have struggled at times, others have shined in those moments. Atkins said when practices get too fiery, Bennett is good at diffusing them.

When Tobey started coming off the bench as Atkins established himself as a mainstay in the starting lineup, junior guard Justin Anderson talked to him about the ACC's sixth man of the year award, which Anderson won last year, as a way to keep Tobey encouraged about his predicament. Tobey assured Anderson that as long as the Cavaliers were winning, he was happy to take on any role.

That's not to say he's done competing with Atkins.

"I've gotten a lot stronger this year," Tobey said. "I'm just trying to play tougher and just more forceful inside."

VIRGINIA COACH TONY BENNETT'S APPROACH DOESN'T CHANGE

Thousands of Virginia fans will descend on Charlottesville this weekend for the highly anticipated showdown between No. 2 U.Va. and No. 4 Duke.

Asked about the hoopla earlier this week, Cavaliers coach Tony Bennett thanked a different group, those who found their way to John Paul Jones Arena during Bennett's first seasons, when victories were less frequent.

"Even when it wasn't going so well, and we were trying to build it, those that came and supported us — you don't know how much that means to me, our staff and our players," Bennett said.

This is Bennett's sixth season, and the current team's success has been cause for celebration for all who have played under him in orange and blue. One former player, Midlothian native Doug Browman, texted Bennett last month.

He told Bennett that he appreciated how the current players were remaining humble even as they built their undefeated record — humility is one of the "Five Pillars" Bennett teaches, along with passion, unity, servanthood and thankfulness.

"As a coach, you want the young men that you coach to have those things left in them or coming out of them," Bennett said of the text. "That brightened my day, that those guys remember our pillars, what matters to this program of humility and trying to keep imposing our will on people and keep knocking."

Bennett doesn't have a pillar for national television attention, which explains why he can be a bit withdrawn when questioned on the topic.

Saturday will mark the first time ESPN's popular "College GameDay" program has visited Virginia, and tickets to the game against Duke are going for several hundred dollars on the resale market.

On Monday, a group of local TV reporters kept questioning Bennett about the event, hoping to elicit a trace of excitement.

"I'm certainly glad all the people of Charlottesville can experience it," Bennett said, adding, "It's a little bit irrelevant to the game itself."

When the conversation turned to a different topic, the "Infiniti Coaches' Challenge" for charity, Bennett brightened, and answered at great length.

Bennett is soliciting online votes, which turn into donations that benefit his chosen charity, the Boys and Girls Club in the Charlottesville area.

"The stats show that when there's a consistent role model in a young person's life, that there is positive change in their outlook," Bennett said. "I've been so blessed to have people in my life that have made a significant difference ... to be able to reach out into the community and be able to get help for that, that's change. When people (volunteer), and we can support that, that's how real change occurs."

While Bennett's causes haven't changed, the volume on his megaphone has.

The Cavaliers have gone from playing games that are only available by computer broadcast to being nationally televised almost every time they take the court.

In the process, his Pack-Line defense has been lauded, though it wasn't always that way. In 2009 and 2010, Bennett's teams didn't have the right mix to run the schemes, which produced boring games that often ended with losses.

Bennett said his ability to keep the faith in those times has allowed him to stick with what's worked now that he's attracting NBA-bound talent.

Bennett cited a Bible chapter, Matthew 25, a parable about being faithful whether entrusted with a little or a lot.

"It's that mindset that when it wasn't going so well, were the young men and us as coaches, were we faithful and staying true to what we thought would give us success, even when we didn't see it?" Bennett said.

"Then when you're fortunate enough, some of it is validated, and you have more success, or things start happening, and it's still the same mindset — will you be faithful to the things that got you there? It doesn't change. Nothing changes. All of a sudden you don't become someone you're not. That would be fool's gold. That would be a big mistake.

"You mentioned 'College GameDay.' That stuff's fine, it just can't distract you. It's nice for the fans and it's nice for everybody, and there are some things you can enjoy about it, but it's still that idea of, 'Will we be faithful to what has gotten us to this point?'"

The approach has produced results thus far, something Bennett's current team and past players can celebrate together, as the current group reaps the rewards of six years of work in Charlottesville.

BROGDON USES GAME, MIND FOR VIRGINIA

A 13-year-old Malcolm Brogdon stood outside the YMCA, arms folded across his chest. His older brother John, 15, sulked next to him, an angry grimace on his face. Their mother, Jann Adams, drove up a few minutes later.

"What happened?" she asked.

"I beat him," Malcolm said.

"He cheated," John said.

Both admitted they'd been kicked out of the Y after their one-on-one game had gotten too heated.

"Go back inside and apologize before we go home," Jann said, watching as her boys trudged through the doors.

This past December, the brothers -- now best friends -- returned to the Y for a pickup game. The manager remembered them, and all three laughed at the memory of the only time the brothers came to blows on the court.

Ever since he started playing soccer as a young boy, Malcolm had been extremely competitive. His relentless drive was unceasing, whether he arrived hours before a practice or devoted his evenings to homework. Despite all of his work, he's often been overlooked, a reality he turns into motivation.

Now, his determination and focus are reasons that No. 2 Virginia is off to its best start since the 1980-81 season. Brogdon, a redshirt junior guard, isn't a flashy, headline-grabbing player. But he's one of the Cavaliers' most complete team members, averaging 13.3 points a game for one of the nation's two remaining unbeaten.

Malcolm, John and their older brother, Gino (an attorney in Atlanta), grew up in the Atlanta area with Jann, an associate professor of psychology at Morehouse College. Their parents divorced when the boys were young; their father, Mitchell, is a mediator in the Atlanta area.

John fell in love with basketball as a boy and Malcolm soon followed suit.

"My older brother was always in the gym and I saw how hard he worked," Malcolm said. "Around middle school, I was in there with him and I started to love it. But it wasn't like I had a basketball in my hand at age 2."

As an adolescent, Malcolm preferred soccer. But in eighth grade, he had to pick a sport to focus on. He chose basketball and had a tryout for an AAU team.

Jann emphasized the importance of academics, telling her sons they could play sports as long as they maintained at least a B average. Anything lower and sports would be cut.

Malcolm spent his ninth-grade year at Woodward Academy before transferring to Fayette County for 10th grade. Before his junior year, he transferred again, this time to Greater Atlanta Christian School, a strong athletic and academic institution.

Playing his junior and senior years at GAC, Malcolm, a combo guard, helped lead the team to two state championships. He worked relentlessly on every aspect of his game.

"He was usually the first and last one on the floor," GAC head coach Eddie Martin said. "There were plenty of times where we'd have to say, 'Malcolm, we're going to dinner, it's time to go home.' He was mature beyond his years -- he worked on his shot, but also on ballhandling, footwork -- a lot of things you don't see from high school kids."

Despite his solid play, Brogdon was criticized for not being flashy enough, dunking or blocking shots. But looking at the box scores, he'd often lead the team in scoring, rebounding and assists.

"That was my motivation," Brogdon said. "People would downplay how good I was, or my athleticism would be the knock, and that added fuel to the fire."

The summer before his senior year, Malcolm played his final AAU season with the Georgia Stars. He played well in the Nike Peach Jam Tournament, which is where Virginia coach Tony Bennett first saw him.

"I always look for completeness in guards and I saw a really good, physical guard," Bennett said. "He was driving hard, banging outside 3s; I saw a lot of things at a high level in a very good setting."

After the Peach Jam, Brogdon, who'd already fielded offers from 20-30 mid-majors, received offers from a dozen Division I schools, including Virginia. He narrowed the list to six: Notre Dame, Vanderbilt, Harvard, UVa, Minnesota and Clemson.

Ivy pedigree ran in the family: One of his aunts attended Harvard Law School, another attended Wharton, and a cousin had enrolled at Brown. Malcolm's grandmother pushed for Harvard, but as soon as he met Bennett, Brogdon felt pulled to Charlottesville, Virginia.

"Me and Coach Bennett hit it off from the beginning," Brogdon said. "We both had a Christian background and shared a lot of the same perspectives. He was open and honest. He didn't promise me anything but told me I'd have to work for everything. And if I worked and improved, I'd have the opportunity to showcase my talent. I really valued that. That, along with the balance of the academics and all the good things I'd heard about UVa and playing in the ACC, really influenced me."

He and Jann traveled to Charlottesville, his only official school visit. They watched practice, ate at a campus sandwich shop and left the next morning. By the time they arrived home, Malcolm had made his decision. He called Bennett to tell him he was coming to Virginia.

During his freshman season, Brogdon played in 28 games, averaging 6.7 points and 2.8 rebounds. Four games before the season's end, his left foot began to hurt. With Jann beside him, he visited the doctor and had X-rays taken. The prognosis? He'd essentially broken his foot. Doctors would need to insert pins to stabilize and rebuild it. He was done for the season.

"That was the only time in college I've cried," Brogdon said. "Because I knew we'd be going to the tournament and I wanted to help my team. And I didn't know how much this would affect my future."

For the first month after his surgery, he struggled. But then he decided to view the injury as a blessing. He'd wake up every day at 6:30 a.m., grab his crutches and go to rehab, working with team strength and conditioning coach Mike Curtis. He ran in the swimming pool, lifted weights and began a recovery process that took more than five months.

"Going through something like that totally changes your perspective," Brogdon said. "It's humbling and shows you that you can be a big, D-I athlete but in the flick of a moment you can be taken down. It made me realize that basketball is just a game; there's also other things in life that you should put your focus toward."

"I'd honestly say the injury was a blessing," said his brother John. "I think half of the reason his career is going well is because he could take that time to watch and think, 'OK, this is how it feels.' He's a great team player because he's seen it from the sidelines."

Brogdon redshirted the next season. He switched focus academically, enrolling in UVa's Batten School of Leadership and Public Policy, a rigorous two-year program for upperclassmen. He finished one year before deciding this past summer to apply for Batten's accelerated master's program.

His peers warned him that the workload was too intense, that few athletes -- especially D-I basketball players -- choose to enroll.

"But I respond well to doubt," Brogdon said. "I looked at it as a challenge, something that could better me for my future after basketball."

He's now in the first year of the master's program and is on track to finish by the end of next season. To complete his undergraduate degree, he had to switch majors and tack on extra classes. He'll graduate with his undergraduate degree in history this spring.

"I've honestly never met anyone so academically driven," said Paul Jespersen, a close friend and former UVa teammate now playing for the University of Northern Iowa. "I've been around people who are focused, but Malcolm is on a different level."

That determination carries over to the court. By the time he returned for the start of last season, Brogdon had worked on every aspect of his game. While Joe Harris and Akil Mitchell received most of the attention, Brogdon finished the ACC regular season leading the Cavaliers in scoring, steals and free throw percentage, and was second in rebounding and 3-point field goal percentage. He was the only Virginia player to reach double figures in scoring in all 18 ACC contests and was named to the coaches' All-ACC first team.

Still, this past summer, Brogdon wanted to improve specific aspects of his game. He focused on shooting, particularly further-range 3-pointers, not letting himself leave the court until he'd made at least 500 shots. He also worked on fine-tuning his handle, passing and a variety of finishes that would allow him to go up against bigger players. He forged strong relationships with his teammates through lunches and fun outings, particularly with the underclassmen, describing his belief that a close-knit group off the court would lead to success on it.

This season, he's usually given the toughest defensive assignment and has held dominant scorers to single digits. He's also scored in double figures in 14 of 19 games, and Ken Pomeroy has him ranked as the nation's seventh-best player this season in his player rankings. He's not a fiery personality but has let himself go for the occasional flashy play.

"He's worked to tighten up his shot and be as good of a defender as he can," Bennett said. "He's very complete. Where I've seen his biggest step is leadership -- he's very vocal and has a strong ability in practice to demand effort from his teammates."

Brogdon arrives early for practice every day, forcing himself to make 10 to 20 of whatever shots he missed in the previous game. He typically stays after practice to work on free throws and jump shots or watch film.

"Malcolm is a guy who was overlooked in high school, AAU, and people never appreciated him for the intangibles he brings: the work ethic, the standard he sets in getting in extra work all the time," Cavaliers guard Justin Anderson said. "He definitely brings that leadership and shows every day why he wants to be a great player."

Brogdon hopes to play in the NBA; should that happen, he has specific ideas of how he wants to utilize his paychecks: by starting his own non-profit that focuses on sustainability, clean water and resources in underdeveloped countries.

For now, he's focused on his role in Virginia's undefeated season.

"When you're getting opportunity and playing well, that's all you can ask for," Brogdon said. "I don't play for the attention; I work on my skills every day so I can go out and play my role to the fullest to help the team win. That's my No. 1 goal when I step on the court."

VIRGINIA'S PASSION FOR DEFENSE IS TEAM'S BIGGEST ASSET

What I learned this week is the most impressive "deflation" in sports of the past seven days had nothing to do with the New England Patriots.

Rather, it was watching the No. 2 Virginia Cavaliers suck the air out of another opponent in their 57-28 win over visiting Georgia Tech on Thursday night, improving to 18-0.

It was the fewest amount of points allowed in an ACC regular-season game and the lowest point total by a team in an ACC game in the shot clock era.

The most impressive thing, however, was that this wasn't a "one night only" act.

For the third time this season, the Cavaliers held an opponent to fewer than 30 points. And with the Yellow Jackets' 16 points in the first and 12 in the second, it marked the 13th and 14th times this season Virginia has held an opponent to fewer than 20 points in a half.

"If you can make them come up empty a few times in a row and you can go on the offensive side and get them chasing you, that can do a lot for you," coach Tony Bennett said after the Cavaliers held Georgia Tech scoreless for a seven-minute span of the first half, the 14th time this season they've shut out a team for at least six minutes. "We've shown the ability to embrace the possession. We are not going to give in and we are not going to give them an easy look. Everything is going to be contested."

Bennett's Pack-Line defense is college basketball's boa constrictor. It lets its prey up the court, watches it settle in, and then slowly suffocates it in a panic as the shot clock winds down.

Where in most arenas, fast breaks and high-flying dunks send a crowd into a frenzy, it's the counting down of a shot clock that now stirs up a John Paul Jones Arena crowd.

The cumulative toll: Virginia hasn't allowed the past 42 opponents to shoot above 50 percent.

Bennett's starters, as well as the bench, are tactical.

Indeed, there are the names of Malcolm Brogdon, London Perrantes and Justin Anderson, recently named to the Wooden Award watch list. But no one man acts alone.

Their selflessness is their greatest asset, collectively, following Bennett's five pillars: humility, passion, unity, servanthood and thankfulness.

The "humility" and "servanthood" have led to an 18-0 record.

Their "unity" will serve them well starting today in front of a sold-out crowd at Virginia Tech, followed by matchups vs. Duke, at North Carolina, and then at home against Louisville in the next 10 days.

U.Va.'s "passion" for defense is what will make the Cavs even more dangerous down the stretch.

Certainly, that won't bring any "thankfulness" to future opponents.

WILKINS' ROLE CONTINUES TO GROW FOR CAVALIERS

Isaiah Wilkins came to Virginia with few expectations as a wide-eyed freshman from the Atlanta suburbs.

Tony Bennett told Wilkins there were more experienced guys ahead of him on a deep Cavaliers roster, so that whatever court time the rookie might get would be a bonus.

Eighteen games into the season, it looks like Wilkins is a bonus.

During Thursday night's 57-28 mauling of visiting Georgia Tech, a game in which Virginia held the Yellow Jackets to the lowest point total in an ACC regular season game EVER, Wilkins continued his role as a key reserve. As junior Evan Nolte's role seems to have diminished over the last four games, Wilkins' appears to have grown.

The 6-foot-7, 224-pound forward from Greater Atlanta Christian, the school that also produced Cavalier standout Malcolm Brogdon, began to come on at Notre Dame on Jan. 10. Since then, he has gained more playing time.

After not playing against Davidson, at Miami or against N.C. State, Wilkins clocked 14 minutes at Notre Dame, 11 against Clemson, 13 at Boston College and another 13 against his hometown Georgia Tech. Nolte picked up but six minutes against the Jackets, mostly after the nation's No. 2 team had secured its 18th win in as many games.

Could it be that Wilkins and fellow freshman Marial Shayok are going to play important roles for the Cavaliers the rest of the ACC regular season and postseason play?

"Isaiah has so much energy," Bennett said after watching the Cavaliers hold Georgia Tech to that program's lowest point total since 1948 (29 vs. Tulane). "He's so mobile and active. He's been practicing well, so we made [the decision to increase playing time] at Notre Dame. It seems when he's out there, positive things are happening."

All sorts of good things because Wilkins gets it. He understands the flow of the offense, but mostly he understands Bennett's "pack line" defense, which is driving the rest of the ACC crazy. Wilkins, the stepson of NBA Hall of Famer Dominique Wilkins, knew all about Virginia's defense before he ever stepped foot in Charlottesville. He was a freshman at Greater Atlanta Christian when Brogdon was a senior.

"Malcolm was Big Man on Campus," Wilkins smiled. "He didn't know me, but I knew him." Brogdon found that proclamation amusing.

"Isaiah wasn't on the varsity but I knew him," Brogdon chuckled. "He got better once I left and then he took over."

Somewhere along the way, Brogdon told Wilkins that he would love playing at Virginia and told him about the emphasis on defense.

"Malcolm definitely influenced my decision to come to Virginia," Wilkins said. "Coming from the same high school program makes it so much easier, knowing somebody at college. Also to see Malcolm's progression over the years is something to look forward to for myself."

Brogdon also explained that Bennett really cares about his players.

"Malcolm also told me that we're going to push to be the best defensive team that we can be," Wilkins said.

Seems as if Virginia can check that off the list. The Cavaliers rank in the top five in 12 national defensive categories and likely improved their numbers by handcuffing the Yellow Jackets on Thursday night. Tech scored 12 points in the second half, four of those in the last three minutes.

Wilkins made the most of his 13 minutes, connecting on two of three shots for five points and naturally playing solid defense. One of those shots was his second 3-pointer of the season, which surprised Bennett and surprised Wilkins as well.

"I didn't know where I was on the floor," said the rookie who is now 2-for-2 from the Bonusphere on the season. "I was open and just let it go."

Maybe that's due to his growing confidence from better performances in practice, which has led to more time on the floor.

"You hit a shot in a game and you feel pretty good," Wilkins said. "You get a stop on defense and it's like, 'Ok, I'm in the groove now.' After a while, it just becomes routine or second nature."

He's worked hard with assistant coach Ron Sanchez in putting up extra shots in practice so he can be ready when thrust into a game, expecting to hit open shots.

"I know my role and I'm just trying to do the best I can every day," Wilkins said.

That role includes bringing instant energy off the bench, particularly on the defensive end, where he adjusts to ball screens and guarding opposing forwards who can play away from the basket.

"Isaiah is very continuous," Bennett said. "He's really a good offensive rebounder. He's always around it. He just goes, goes, goes. And, he's given us a boost offensively."

Bennett kept raving about the rookie before he was cut off by another question.

"I guess that means for me to shut up," Bennett joked. But by then, he had clearly made his point that Wilkins has made huge strides in a short span.

Brogdon, who mentors his hometown guy, has observed Wilkins' confidence grow and believes the Georgian will continue to get better as the season progresses.

"I don't think people talk about it enough, but he's a very poised, mature guy, and very skilled," said Brogdon, who led Virginia with 13 points (6-for-8 shooting). He's a team guy, always willing to make the extra pass, but also knocks down the open shot.

"Isaiah is going to help us a lot the rest of the season," Brogdon said.

Bennett has to be pleased with Wilkins' progress. He mentioned that while he loves to play guys equally, it's difficult. It had been Nolte, but now it's Wilkins.

"It's good to have those options," Bennett said.

VIRGINIA FUNDAMENTALLY SOUND, BUT THESE CAVS AIN'T BORING

May I submit a name for your consideration?

Tony Bennett, head coach of the 18-0, second-ranked, ACC-leading Virginia Cavaliers, for national coach of the year.

Look, I can hear your groaning already: But Virginia is everything that ails college basketball! They're no fun, you say. They're the most boring good team in college basketball, you say. And if the way you rate "fun" is by how many times a team gets up and down the court over the course of a game, you're right, because Virginia's tempo ranks 348th out of the 351 teams in college basketball.

Begrudgingly, you may say they are "fundamentally sound," which is the most backhanded compliment in college hoops.

And sure, the stats where this team ranks highest nationally are the stats that define "boring." Virginia with its choking pack-line defense allows fewer points than any other team in the nation; after limiting Georgia Tech to only 28 points in a Thursday night blowout, Virginia's opponents are now averaging fewer than 50 points per game. Only 10.5 percent of Virginia's shots come in transition, according to Hoop-Math.com, the lowest percentage in the country; but teams shoot a meager 40.5 percent at the rim against Virginia, the top rate in the nation.

And if there was a stat kept for forcing opponents into shot-clock violations, Virginia would lead that category, too.

But let me take the focus off the boring parts of Virginia -- after two seasons of seeing them strangle ACC opponents, it's become a tired, lazy cliché -- and focus on a different part of Virginia.

Do not think of them as boring. Think of Bennett's young men as a group that brings a slow and subtle beauty to college basketball. There is ugly basketball out there in the college ranks, to be sure, but Virginia is the furthest thing from ugly. Slow, yes, but definitely not ugly. The Cavaliers are the best representation of Coach K's metaphor for perfectly executed basketball: Five fingers making one fist. Five players who are so perfectly attuned to each other that they're operating as one.

None of these Virginia players were McDonald's All-Americans in high school, by the way.

Kentucky, the only other still-undefeated team in America, has nine.

"Just a bunch of underrated, hungry guys," junior small forward Justin Anderson told me when I asked him what makes this team click so well together. "We don't have any guys coming out who are highly regarded. Nobody who feels like they're above the team. We're just a bunch of guys who know that we can't do it without each other, and we've bought into that."

I have to be honest: Going into this season, I thought Virginia was going to take a step backward. Not a huge step, mind you; I still thought the Cavs would be in the top 25. But I never imagined, after losing Akil Mitchell and Joe Harris, that this team would be even better than last season's ACC-winning squad.

But they are. It's a team dominated by juniors, guys who've grown accustomed to Bennett's hard-nosed, play-every-possession-like-it's-your-last style.

Anderson is this team's leading scorer at nearly 15 points per game, hitting more than half his 3-point attempts on the season, and he's the only Cavalier projected as a future NBA first-round pick. But he's not this team's star. This team's star is the system, and a bunch of players who -- cliché alert! -- buy into team accomplishments over individual accomplishments.

Virginia's greatest strength is its pack-line defense that limits points in the paint. It must be said, though, that they've yet to face an elite big man like Duke's Jahlil Okafor, who comes to town on for a titanic matchup the day before the Super Bowl. After Duke, the gauntlet continues: At North Carolina, Louisville at home, then at N.C. State. I'm not quite ready to say the nation's second-ranked team in late January will be the nation's second-ranked team in late February.

Get through those games unscathed, and get back to me.

But I am ready to say that this team is the perfect representation of basketball's new obsession with efficiency. On offense and defense, this team makes the most of every possession, ranking fourth nationally in offensive efficiency and third in defensive efficiency.

"It's just the ability to embrace the possession," Bennett said. "We're not going to give in. We're not going to give them an easy look. Everything's gotta be contested. Just possession by possession, don't yield, nothing easy."

The offensive efficiency of this team -- better than Kentucky, better than Duke -- might be surprising, since this team is supposedly so boring.

I asked Bennett what makes this group work so well together on offense.

"There's balance," he said. "It can be different guys at different times. There's depth. At times we can go inside with Anthony (Gill), Mike (Tobey) or Darion (Atkins). On the perimeter there's some completeness with the guards. We're not the greatest three-point shooting team, but we're capable."

"When we're playing well there's good balance and depth," he continued. "A variety of ways to score. You can't just lock down on one guy and think, 'Well, we got them.' When we're right, we're sharing the ball and we're moving the ball and we're even more effective."

Words like these -- "balance" and "sharing" and "efficient" -- are, I suppose, a bit boring. That said, it didn't feel boring in Charlottesville on Thursday night. Anderson hit his only 3 of the night with a defender absolutely in his mug, and had a monster dunk, as well. The crowd went bonkers for both. Malcolm Brogdon had one of the prettiest up-and-under reverse layups I've seen. And Tobey might have the nation's prettiest hook shot.

It's obvious this fan base has bought into the Tony Bennett System as much as his players. I swear to you, the loudest this crowd got all night might have been on a handful of shot-clock violations Virginia forced its opponent into. The fans know the biggest strength of this team is just throttling its opponents into submission.

So yes, Bennett and his team could be painted as boring. They can also be painted as patient, and connected, and smart, and tough, and defensively unbreakable, and, yes, even fun.

"As long as you're winning games, you're having fun," Brogdon said when I asked if Virginia-style basketball is fun. "And we're winning right now. It's a lot of fun, winning games and doing it together."

THE CAVALIER WAY

Then-Washington State basketball coach Tony Bennett was looking into the Virginia job in 2009, when he called then-Liberty University head coach Ritchie McKay.

"I knew there might be something there because Tony never asks about a job," recalled McKay, who had known Bennett for about 13 years to that point. "I told him I thought it was a good job though I wasn't sure about the talent. [McKay's Flames had beaten Virginia in 2008]. I told him the facility is unbelievable and Charlottesville is a really neat city."

Bennett was drawn to the job. It had been a while, but others had succeeded in big ways at Virginia, and the ACC will always attract great coaches. Bennett was announced as the Cavaliers' head coach in March of 2009, and during the press conference, he mentioned McKay, a family friend.

McKay had just sparked the Flames to 23 wins, and was the man who recruited Seth Curry to Liberty and the Big South Conference, before the younger Curry transferred to Duke and the ACC, after McKay left. McKay joined his friend in Charlottesville after Bennett invited McKay and his wife, Julie, to visit him and his wife Laurel, and discuss what Bennett had in mind.

No coincidence Bennett involved wives and family. Basketball is a business, but done the Bennett-way, it's a family matter, too.

"He's a very convincing, persuasive individual," said McKay of his friend he calls "Tone."

Those traits might explain how Bennett has guided Virginia to a 17-0 mark so far this season and the No. 2 ranking in the land behind only the Lexington, Kentucky Basketball Trade School.

The Cavaliers have gone about things in a whole different manner. There aren't any McDonalds' All-Americans on the roster and NBA scouts aren't knocking down the John Paul Jones Center doors to drool over this team's athleticism.

Bennett doesn't even use the term "athleticism." He talks about "physicality," which sounds more like something you work toward than something with which you are blessed. That nomenclature better fits Bennett and his burgeoning program.

Bennett has improved the Cavaliers each season since he took over in 2009-10. Virginia was 15-16 that first year, and not looking for quick fixes. Bennett wanted to build a solid foundation first. Virginia was 16-15 in 2010-11, then 22-10 in 2011-12, and reached the NCAA tournament second round. The Cavs were 23-12 the following season but fell back to the NIT, when valuable Malcolm Brogdon missed the entire season after foot surgery.

Brogdon was back on solid footing last year, and for the first time, Bennett had all the pieces. Virginia finished 30-7, won its first ACC Tournament since 1976, tied the school record for victories and reached the Sweet Sixteen. Last summer, Bennett signed a seven-year contract extension that will keep him in Charlottesville through 2020-21.

The new deal bumped his salary from \$1.7 million to \$1.924 million, still below market value among big-time college coaches, but Bennett wanted it that way. He instead sought raises for McKay and the rest of his staff, and turned his attention to the next step in what he calls "the process."

"I love coaching at the University of Virginia, and living in Charlottesville," he said. "The community has been wonderful to my family. I feel we are building something special here."

CHANNELING GREEN BAY COACHES

Bennett's father, Dick, coached college basketball for 28 years, won 489 games at NAIA Wisconsin-Stevens Point, then Wisconsin-Green Bay, Wisconsin, where he took the Badgers to the Final Four in 2000, and Washington State, where he started a building job that his son took over, taking the Cougars to three straight postseason tournament appearances.

The elder Bennett is credited with creating the "Pack Line" defensive concepts to which his son not only adheres but which has disciples at all levels of basketball. His daughter, Kathi, who

coaches at Northern Illinois, is another defensive devotee, and so is Pat Riley, who used the defense in New York back when the Knicks could play.

Count McKay among those disciples, too. He used it in his 12 years as a head coach at five schools. In fact, his passion for the principles are what made him an "adopted part of the Bennett family."

McKay was an assistant at Bradley for Jim Molinari in the early '90s when Molinari asked him to study rival Wisconsin-Green Bay's tenacious defense. "I started watching VHS tapes of Wisconsin-Green Bay and I got a great affinity for not only the system but this No. 25 kid that was running around and getting buckets," McKay of his first exposure to both Bennetts.

What he saw on tape, without digging deeper to learn there are concepts of behavior on and off the court that also figure in, was pack line defense. In a nutshell, the pack line pressures the ball out of a man-to-man concept, man on ball while the rest of the defense helps, "packed" inside an imaginary line, usually one or two steps inside the 3-point arc. It's simple, but it takes smart, committed players to make it work. When it does, it's like trying to score from inside a nutshell.

This year, the Cavaliers are second in the nation, yielding just 50.6 points per game. Opponents are shooting 34.1 percent (third nationally) and 31 percent from 3-point range. Virginia entered the week ranked in the top five in the country in 12 defensive categories and have held 41 straight foes to less than 50 percent shooting. In 17 games, Cavalier opponents have 26 fast break points.

McKay is not just a member of the pack line club, he helps preside over teaching it at its highest form, and he learned straight from the master, just like Tony Bennett did.

When McKay's brother, Orlando, a wide receiver from the University of Washington, was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in 1992, McKay planned to drive to Seattle to visit. On a lark, he called Dick Bennett to see if he could spend 15 minutes talking basketball with Bennett in Pullman.

They spent an hour and 45 minutes talking.

"His humility struck me, the simplicity of his system, yet the intention of what he wanted his program to look like, I decided if I was ever a head coach this was the system I was going to run," said McKay. "These were the pillars I was going to build my program with. Three years later I was a head coach and I called him all the time."

Those "pillars"—five basic principle about team—are on the University of Virginia Basketball website. Basically, they are (1) Humility, (2) Passion, (3) Unity, (4) Servanthood, "make teammates better," and (5) Thankfulness.

Those were Dick Bennett's tenets, and they fit hand-in-hand with the stingy pack line team defense. "That's what my father ingrained in me," said Tony Bennett as he talked about the expectations he has created around his program.

"I think when you start worrying about the end results, that's a huge mistake. You just control what you can control and you fall in love with the process."

Bennett starts rattling off coaches who have told him the same thing. He has had former Cavaliers Terry Holland and Rick Carlisle speak to the team, and it's a central theme for Virginia basketball these days.

"We've improved every year since I've been here, and I think that striving for more, absolutely if you're wired right, makes you hungrier for more," Bennett said. "Every sports psychologist, every coach will tell you. It always gets back to the process. That's Vince Lombardi."

Now there's a coach that knew something about "physicality," about defense and about a process toward building something special. And while Bennett rarely shows Lombardiesque fire on the sideline, even the kind of manic passion that caused his father to step away from the game twice, Tony Bennett has the same fire in his belly.

He has just repackaged it, buying into the family philosophy built around humility, passion, unity, servanthood and thankfulness. Case in point—Bennett is now turning down all inter-

views that turn the spotlight on him rather than his team. He uses that calm demeanor on the sideline to keep the Cavaliers on an even keel. But don't think for a minute he's not fully invested and pushing his players to greatness.

It's the same kind of intensity that turned the 6-0 guard, blessed with neither size nor quickness, into a guy that lasted three years in the NBA with the Charlotte Hornets, from 1992-95.

"He is one of the top coaches in America, especially on the defensive end," said McKay. "So every night we have a chance because of how good Tony Bennett is as a coach."

HERE'S THE SECRET

Bennett loves to tell the story about something his point guard, London Perrantes said last year after Justin Anderson was voted the ACC Sixth Man of the Year.

Perrantes was a freshman at the time and he already got it in regard to Bennett's UVA Way.

Bennett recalled this quip: "Hey Justin, if you're the Sixth Man of the Year, I want to congratulate Anthony Gill on the Seventh Man of the Year Award."

Anderson and Gill are both starters this year, first and third on the team, respectively, in scoring, Anderson averaging 14.5 points and shooting 50.6 percent from the field, Gill chipping in 11.7 on 57.9 percent. Brogdon is second, averaging 13.6, and a comparative slacker, the only one among the team's top five scorers shooting below 50 percent (45.8), but he's arguably the team's best player.

The youthful coach—he's just 45—loves the challenge of building a new team each season, playing to new strengths and personalities and finding ways to get the best out of the group, collectively and individually. He also loves that once you've started something, there's a DNA teams in a program can pass along.

Last year, Bennett said, it was seniors Joe Harris and Akil Mitchell, who set the table so the whole team could feast. "It started at the top with the players, with Akil and Joe, two senior leaders and how unselfish they were," said Bennett. "They understood as the team's success goes, that will help them individually. They wanted us to win so badly they were willing to do whatever it took."

McKay recalled a tidbit he told Tony when he got that faithful call from Pullman in 2009. It was about the culture at Thomas Jefferson's university. "I told him I thought the fit would be good because he would probably attract a really conscientious student, and sometimes that's something that would translate to having a conscientious player, which I knew he'd like to coach."

Good call, Ritchie.

Before this season, the last time the Cavaliers were ranked No. 2 in the nation, a certain 7-4 gentleman named Sampson was walking The Lawn on campus in 1983. Ralph led Virginia to a 23-0 start in 1980-81, the last time the Cavaliers started this fast.

"We talk about the discipline required to be a high level team," said Bennett. "And really the desire, competitiveness and unselfishness. Certain teams have to play certain ways and our common theme is playing for each other."

Ten players are averaging at least 10 minutes a game for Bennett, and the Cavaliers are even deeper than that. He considers his perimeter players interchangeable, ditto the power forward and center, and that creates endless opportunities to match up defensively or exploit a mismatch on the offensive end.

The creative Perrantes is the only player in the rotation shorter than 6-5, and while he's the de facto point guard, don't tell Brogdon, who is averaging 2.7 assists as a hybrid jack-of-all trades.

The 6-6 Anderson has become an inside-outside dynamo, and Gill, Darion Atkins and Mike Tobey provide a great rotation up front. Atkins and Tobey, neither elite prospects according to recruiting services, are typical of the way Bennett has built.

Bennett stresses player development, and acclaimed strength and conditioning coach Mike Curtis is a big part of the equation. Bennett and his staff make the Cavaliers better, and Curtis

makes them bigger, to the point now, where Virginia can go toe-to-toe with any team in the country.

"We can take a guy that's maybe not rated to play at a high level in the ACC, but has potential and fortitude, and we've been good with that kind of player," added McKay. "Those are guys that aren't necessarily looking for instant gratification. They want to work and get better."

"It's our identity that made us successful," said Bennett. "It's our competitiveness and unselfishness that has set us apart when we have played our best basketball."

And perhaps the Cavaliers have achieved—and will continue to achieve—not just because their coach preaches those principles but because he lives them, as well.

PACK-LINE PROGENY: HOW TONY BENNETT USED HIS FATHER'S SYSTEM TO TURN VIRGINIA INTO AN UNDEFEATED DEFENSIVE POWERHOUSE

It's now been more than 30 years since the University of Virginia last made a Final Four run. Led by Ralph Sampson, the Cavaliers made the national semifinals in 1981, and then they returned in 1984, a year after their star center had turned pro. Right about the same time, Dick Bennett was braving the cold winters in northern Wisconsin and turning a Division III program at the University of Wisconsin—Stevens Point into a national powerhouse. At the root of his teams' success was the defensive scheme Bennett refers to as "the pack line."

Three decades later, Dick's son, Tony, has brought the pack line to Charlottesville, and his undefeated Cavaliers look poised to end the program's Final Four drought. Virginia is ranked second in both the AP and USA Today polls, behind only a Kentucky team that dominates the nation's spotlight. It's a little bit ironic that these two schools — the only remaining unbeaten — sit side-by-side in the rankings, as they couldn't have less in common. The Wildcats boast an embarrassing collection of talent, with former McDonald's All Americans and future NBA lottery picks dotting their roster left and right. The Cavaliers, while certainly not bereft of skilled personnel, don't have nearly the starpower.

Since Tony took over the floundering program in 2009, the Cavaliers have grown into a nationally respected defensive powerhouse. After taking a couple of seasons to instill his principles, Tony's teams have sported a top-six defense in three of the past four years, per Kenpom.com's Adjusted Defensive Efficiency metric.¹ This year it ranks third, trailing only Kentucky and San Diego State. And it's all thanks to the pack line.

When it comes to man-to-man defense, most teams fall under one of two overarching classifications: "deny" team or "gap" team. A "deny" team expands its defense to play in the passing lanes, attempting to limit ball movement and force turnovers with intense pressure.² A "gap" defense does the exact opposite. Instead of expanding out, it stays condensed, clogging potential driving lanes with help defenders and attempting to create a force field around the paint. The pack line — created by Dick and refined by Tony — is the archetypal "gap" defense.

The system's name comes from an actual line taped on the floor during practice to show players how far to defend.

Although we often associate great defense with moments of individual brilliance — a feisty defender locking up an opposing ball handler until he forces up a tough shot — the real hallmark of a great defense is how well it recovers when breached at the point of attack. "Deny" teams put themselves at greater risk, because once their initial pressure is beaten, help defenders face long, rushed recoveries since the structure of the defense is already stretched so thin. Offenses that can break this pressure will feast on easy hoops.

Dick cultivated his pack-line principles to eliminate these chaotic (and often nonexistent) help situations by having help in place before it's needed. The line the Bennetts use to teach their system is both literal and metaphorical — no player is to stray from the pack at the expense of the collective unit.

"It's more of a team system," Tony says. "You have to rely on people being in the help position, in the gaps."

What's most unique about the system is that the pack line forces players to influence ball handlers toward the middle of the floor, which is typically considered to be the most vulnerable part of a defense. But with the pack line, the middle is where the help is.

Everything that Tony's Virginia team does defensively stems from this concept of middle help, including its pick-and-roll defense. While it's become more popular to "down," forcing pick-and-roll ball handlers toward the sideline or baseline, Tony's teams, per the system's rules, still allow them to head toward the middle of the floor. Doing otherwise would compromise the integrity of the defense, even if strategies like "downing" screens on the ball may be more effective in a vacuum.

"What you do has to fit. So many NBA teams, they 'ice' or they 'down' the side ball screen — college teams, too — but they do that because they play to the sideline and have their help all down there," Tony says. "But the way you play the post should match how you play on the perimeter. Your footwork, your positioning, it all has to fit together, and it sets you up to be more successful."

Because of this system-wide cohesion, teams that play Virginia essentially run into a mirage-like force field designed to both invite and then shield the ball from the paint. Just ask Harvard, which could muster only 27 points (yes, in a full game) against the Cavaliers in late December. The Virginia coach is quick to point out that the pack line isn't some magical system concocted while watching his father conduct experiments in their secret basketball laboratory: "We're not doing anything earth-shattering," he says. Tony also notes that he isn't pulling some Norman Dale-type routine and withholding basketballs from practices in order to drill defense like a crazed martinet. He estimates that he splits defensive and offensive work about 55/45 during regular practices.

"There's more of a balance than people think," he says. "I learned from my time in the NBA — and watching the game in general — that you need to be good on both ends of the floor."

And with that offense approaching its already tremendous defense, this Virginia team has been unstoppable. If that equilibrium continues, chances are we'll be saying the same thing come early April.

PATIENCE, PRACTICE PROPELLED JUSTIN ANDERSON TO STARRING ROLE AT UVA

Justin Anderson vividly remembers that first dunk: He and his father meandered into an auxiliary gym at Washington and Lee University, during a trip to the school to watch Anderson's older brother, Edward, play for the University of Mary Washington. Anderson and his father began shooting around. At some point, Edward Sr., directed his younger son to get up and flush it through the rim. So Anderson flushed it. He was in fifth grade, when dunking is generally reserved for chicken nuggets and swimming pools.

"It was so cool," Anderson says now. "The thing is, I tried to go back and show my friends and I kept missing."

He's laughing at the memory as he lingers outside a locker room at Notre Dame's Purcell Pavilion, a fully formed 6-foot-6, 230-pound 21-year-old having led one of the country's best basketball teams to another win. Had you seen Anderson in that long-ago moment in a Division III gym, you might have expected so much. You would be getting it now: Anderson, a junior, is by at least one measure the most important player for No. 2 Virginia (16-0). He's a linebacker gliding from spot to spot, the efficient leading scorer for a balanced crew, a propulsive athlete whose improved jumper now makes him infuriating to prepare for.

But Anderson's path from that gym to here hasn't been smooth. He became a nationally prominent eighth-grader who labored early at powerhouse Montrose (Md.) Christian School before finishing as a consensus top-50 recruit. He flipped his college choice from Maryland to Virginia after Terrapins coach Gary Williams retired in 2011 and then scuffled as a role player for two seasons with the Cavaliers. It took a summertime epiphany while training in the Chicago suburbs, coupled with more opportunity in Charlottesville, for his production to match his potential.

"You can't just expect things to just be given to you," Anderson says. "When I was younger, I think everything was given to me because I was so athletic. People started to tell me how good I was, and I think I started to listen to it. I never worked hard. I maybe got some shots up, played a little pickup basketball. It's much more than that. You have to make sure you put your work in. You have to make sure you value the little things. There were a lot of life lessons. I could talk about that for days."

He has a plane to catch, so he can't, but the results are clear: Career-high rates in points (14.9), rebounds (4.6) and minutes (29.2) per game, plus field goal percentage (53.3) and three-point accuracy (55.7). Anderson's Win Shares total of 3.5 -- an estimate of victories contributed by his offensive and defensive production -- leads Virginia, topping even All-ACC teammate Malcolm Brogdon (2.6).

"He's a main guy now," Notre Dame coach Mike Brey says of Anderson. "He has a confidence and swagger about him. When you have that size, strength and an ability to shoot like that, it's a really tough matchup for anybody in this league, dealing with him."

Anderson hadn't been an afterthought -- he had 22 starts in his first two years and ACC media named him the league's sixth man of the year in 2013-14 -- but he wasn't a priority for opponents, either. His recruiting pedigree did not translate to instant collegiate consistency. His uncommon athleticism didn't excuse him from having to earn coach Tony Bennett's trust, especially on the defensive end. There were bursts of production along the way, like Anderson averaging a team-high 19 points per game in a three-game 2013 NIT run. Still, what Anderson might do was of limited value, especially compared with what veterans like shooting guard Joe Harris actually did.

Bennett expected Anderson to play like an upperclassman this season. The coach told his talented guard he didn't expect perfection. He also didn't expect excuses. Seize the chance you have, Bennett told Anderson, by acting like you should in all phases. "I always keep challenging him: 'Be sound and tough, be sound and tough,'" Bennett says. "You just do it the way you have to do it. You don't have to be Joe Harris, (just) because Joe Harris left. Understand how you help this team. I like the maturity I've seen."

Over the summer, Anderson flew to the Chicago area to visit his cousin, Jermon Bushrod, a tackle for the Bears. Bushrod ferried Anderson to TC Boost, a training facility in Northbrook, Ill. There, Anderson continued Virginia's offseason conditioning plan while augmenting it with speed and agility drills aimed at honing his footwork and explosiveness. Anderson also observed how Bushrod lived, and recalibrated his own habits. The NFL veteran awoke early and fueled his body with a healthy breakfast, for example, while Anderson often was like many other college kids who steal an extra hour or two of sleep at the expense of the first meal of the day. "He approaches it as work," Anderson says of his cousin. "I tried to translate that attitude to college basketball -- I want to go to practice as if it's work."

A tune-up of Anderson's basketball mechanics, though, drove his third-year breakthrough. During Anderson's visit, one of TC Boost's owners, Tommy Christian, placed a call to a local basketball

trainer, Steve Pratt. The owner of Full Package Basketball, Pratt counts Elton Brand, Brad Miller and Thabo Sefolosha among his past clients. He uses biomechanics to examine a player's shooting form and then to refine it. Christian asked Pratt if he could work with Anderson. Pratt agreed, and that began a crash-course in which Anderson refashioned the jumper that has driven his offensive surge.

Pratt surmised Anderson had too much negative movement in his shot; Anderson pulled the ball back toward his shoulder instead of keeping it over his elbow at a 90-degree angle. (Picture Anderson's arm in a "V" pre-shot, when it ideally should be an "L.") Anderson was strong enough to manage that negative movement, but eliminating it would be a positive. "It was a little too slow and a little herky-jerky," Pratt says of Anderson's shot. "We wanted to synchronize it." Pratt also examined Anderson's balance and coached the player to get his "chest on the rim" -- essentially to land with his chest over his toes after a shot. "It was a lot of technical work that I've never seen before in my basketball career," Anderson says. "It was very taxing on the mind, rather than the body."

To implement the changes, Anderson did form shooting -- standing still and concentrating on his motion -- all the way back to 25 or 28 feet. He did Pratt's "Dirk Nowitzki Drill," in which a player sets his feet in shooting position, squats so that his posterior touches his heels and then raises up into a shot legs-first. It is initially executed slowly, so a player can mentally organize his movements before increasing to game speed.

"It forces you to get your legs into your release," Pratt says. "A guy like Justin, who is so strong in his upper body, he didn't have to use his legs. He could just shoot with his arms. But just shooting with your arms, you can be a little inconsistent."

Before Anderson returned to campus, Pratt told him: You are responsible for your shot. He counseled Anderson to work the shooting stations at Virginia's basketball camp and to remain diligent on his mechanics. Anderson appears to have followed through. "I would say it deserves a lot of the credit for why I've taken my game to the next level," he says. His career-best shooting percentages support that assessment. As does this: Anderson has spent 32.2 percent of his offensive plays in spot-up scenarios, according to Synergy Sports data, and he's averaging a striking 1.712 points per possession in those circumstances. More specifically, he's at 1.791 PPP on no-dribble jumpers out of those spot-up plays.

It has helped expand the best offense of Bennett's tenure, an egalitarian attack that doesn't offer defenses many easy answers. Virginia ranks third in adjusted offensive efficiency as of Wednesday, per kenpom.com. Five Virginia players have usage rates between 21.3 and 25.0 percent. Five regulars have effective shooting percentages exceeding 54 percent, with a sixth, Brogdon, checking in at 51 percent. Anderson's enhanced range and efficiency add another stress point for opposing defenses while alleviating pressure on teammates; no one can slough off him anymore.

"With Justin improving his shooting, he becomes a whole different weapon," said Clemson coach Brad Brownell, before Anderson scored 15 points in Virginia's 65-42 win over the Tigers on Tuesday. "He's certainly as athletic as anybody in the ACC. Now when he's able to rise up from 22 feet and shoot it in, it extends your defense, it opens things up in the interior for other players, and it creates spacing problems for you defensively."

Bennett, meanwhile, is as encouraged by what Anderson isn't doing. The improved shot merits attention, but Virginia's coach sees Anderson passing up opportunities to search for better ones. He also likes Anderson's effort output in rebounding and in the team's asphyxiating pack-line defense. "He's taken steps in every area," Bennett says. "It's like (the line from) *What About Bob?* -- 'Baby steps, baby steps.' His incremental improvements in a lot of areas are significant."

When Anderson was a nationally ranked eighth-grade prospect he remembers everyone showing him articles he'd already seen and even teachers excitedly talking to him about it. "It was always in my face," Anderson says. It did him no good. So he had to wait at Montrose Christian, coming off the bench early in his time at a school that produced NBA talent like Kevin Durant, Greivis Vasquez and Terrence Ross. He had to wait at Virginia, mastering structured systems while in a supporting role to trusted veterans.

"Patience," Anderson says, "was definitely something I had to make sure I stayed aware of."

Anderson took heed of the little things and has become, arguably, the best player on a team with legitimate aspirations of a run to Indianapolis in April. That first, fifth-grade dunk at a tiny liberal arts school seems like such distant history, given the occasional detours between there and here. But sometimes the best directions are to take the long way.

TONY BENNETT'S BUILT A CONTENDER AT VIRGINIA IN AN UNCONVENTIONAL WAY

Tony Bennett loves to watch movies and quote movies. So it was no surprise, during a phone conversation, when the Virginia coach went straight from talking about his team into discussing a scene from a sports classic while making a larger point about the Cavs.

"I don't know if you remember the end of Rocky III," Bennett said, at which point I assured him I absolutely remember the end of Rocky III, if only because I once had a dog -- Mickey Goldmill Parrish -- named after Rocky Balboa's initial trainer.

(I was raised on those Rocky films!)

"OK," Bennett said. "So Apollo trains Rocky in that movie, and he keeps telling Rocky that he wants a favor at the end. So they end up in this little gym at the end, and Apollo wants a rematch because he couldn't live with [the loss to Rocky at the end of the previous film]. And then Apollo says to Rocky, he says, 'You fight great ... but I'm a great fighter.' And it's a little like that for us. We don't look at ourselves as this great team. We look at ourselves as a team that, when things are right, we can play at an excellent level."

In other words, Virginia is more of a developed winner than a naturally gifted champion, more Rocky than Apollo. The Cavaliers might not be a great team in the traditional sense. But they have the ability to play great. And they do way more often than not.

The second team listed (Duke) has eight former top-50 247Sports recruits, nine McDonald's All-Americans and three of the top 20 NBA prospects in the world, according to DraftExpress.com. So it's also simple to see why the Blue Devils are great.

And then there's Virginia.

Number of former top-50 recruits: Zero

Number of McDonald's All-Americans: Zero

Number of projected future first-round picks: Zero

"We don't have quite the individual talent," Bennett acknowledged. "But we have some sneaky-good players, and I think people are starting to recognize that."

If not, they better.

Because while folks debate whether Kentucky can enter Selection Sunday with a perfect record, here's something that's gone mostly unnoticed: KenPom currently projects Virginia, just like UK, to be a favorite in every remaining game on its schedule.

That doesn't mean UVA will go undefeated, of course. But it does mean Virginia is the only undefeated team besides Kentucky that KenPom doesn't believe should ever be an underdog. And it also means Virginia is statistically more likely to win the ACC than Duke.

If it happens, that'll be back-to-back ACC titles. And it doesn't matter much that two of the top five players from last season's team -- namely Joe Harris and Akil Mitchell -- are no longer around. Virginia is, through 12 games, significantly better offensively and slightly better defensively than last season, according to efficiency numbers posted at KenPom.

So what in the world is going on here?

In a league with four Hall of Fame coaches and five of the past 12 national champs, how did Tony Bennett build an ACC power at a school that hadn't been to a single Sweet Sixteen since 1995 before he took Virginia to the Sweet Sixteen last season? And, more to the point, how'd he do it without a collection of top-50 prospects and preordained pros?

"We've built through experience," Bennett said. "There's a level of simplicity to it."

Still, it's hardly a simple thing to do.

And, either way, what's funny is how Bennett rejects all of this on principle, specifically the idea that he's built a power comparable to Duke, UNC and Syracuse, you know, all those schools he beat last season en route to Virginia's first outright ACC title since 1981. In fact, Bennett genuinely doesn't even view his team as one of the nation's best this season even though every reputable measuring device suggests the Cavaliers are terrific.

"I think college basketball is interesting this year," he said. "I think you have three or maybe four or maybe five elite teams, and I don't even put us in that group; I really don't. But I do think there are three or maybe four or maybe five elite teams, and then there's a group of teams that are next that have the ability to play excellent basketball."

And that's where Bennett places his Cavaliers -- in that next group.

In other words, Kentucky is a great fighter. And Duke is a great fighter.

They are Apollo Creed.

But Virginia? Virginia is more Rocky Balboa.

Virginia isn't a great fighter, per se. But Virginia undeniably has the ability to fight great. And, no matter how you label it or spin it or whatever, the Cavaliers have been fighting great consistently for well over a year now, and in two totally different seasons.

Their next so-called bout is Saturday's ACC opener at Miami.

As Apollo once said, Ding ... Ding.

AT MOM'S URGING, DARION ATKINS RESISTED THE URGE TO GIVE UP

Minnette Atkins knew well before her son, Virginia forward Darion Atkins, would pick up the phone to vent that he wasn't having fun last year.

She would look across the court at John Paul Jones Arena and study his facial expressions. She noticed when Atkins would linger outside the huddle or sulk at the end of the bench, disappointed after being yanked from a game. She kept telling Darion to be patient, that "it's just not your season."

But at one point last winter, Minnette Atkins felt compelled to call Coach Tony Bennett with a simple request: "I just want Darion to go back to being happy."

Darion Atkins called the entire experience "one big headache." But in retrospect, now that Bennett considers him the "defensive anchor" for No. 6 Virginia (9-0) this season, he's glad he took his mother's advice.

Atkins is expected to return from an injury to his ribs and lower back, suffered in a fall during Virginia's win at Maryland on Dec. 3, when the Cavaliers take on Cleveland State on Thursday night after a 12-day exam break. But his continued presence on the roster is also a testament to perseverance in an era when transfers have reached record levels and instant gratification is the norm in college basketball.

"If I handled it completely the wrong way, I wouldn't be the person that I am today," Atkins said this week. "I'm just not the type of guy to run from adversity. I just stuck it out [to] be that guy that the coaches could rely on to be loyal."

Atkins learned loyalty growing up as a fraternal twin in Clinton. Minnette Atkins said Darion and Darius had to go to different schools beginning in the fifth grade. Darius would daydream in class and developed a love for dance. Darion seemed to be fighting constantly, defending Darius against the taunts of classmates.

Darion ended up starring on the basketball court at Landon. Darius moved on to the Duke Ellington School of the Arts and is studying at the Joffrey Ballet School in New York.

"They're different almost as night and day," said Minnette Atkins, who works as a legal assistant in downtown Washington. "But they both fly high because Darius can leap just as high or higher than Darion when he's dancing."

That athleticism should pay dividends this winter for Bennett, who is relying on Atkins's shot-blocking ability to offset the void left by former Virginia defensive stalwart Akil Mitchell.

In the first eight games this season, Atkins filled up the stat sheet and assumed a spot in the starting lineup, prior to his injury. The lone senior on this year's roster, he is averaging 6.1 points, 5.9 rebounds, 1.4 blocks and 1.1 steals entering Thursday.

Atkins seemed to be on the verge of such productivity two years ago, but a shin injury derailed his sophomore season. Last year, he averaged just 5.4 minutes per appearance during Virginia's final eight games, including the program's run through the ACC and NCAA tournaments.

Bennett knew all along Atkins's frustration was simply because "he's always wanted to play, and it's sometimes hard for guys when the time isn't there." Bennett noted this week that focusing on defense and rebounding would likely present Atkins the best chance to play professionally in the future.

But embracing a role in which few offensive plays are called for him remains a challenge for Atkins, who sometimes must fight the urge to "force it a little bit offensively because so many guys want to get certain shots this year and they want to get certain guys going."

"I guess they just didn't see that being my role here, so I just do whatever I can to stay on the court," Atkins added. "It wasn't really hard to, I guess, swallow my ego, but I just see it as if my team wins, we'll all be taken care of. . . . I just want to be remembered as the guy who capitalized on his opportunities and played really good defense, tried to rebound really well and was

a humble guy and was really patient and waited his turn to try to help his team win as many games as he could."

Count Minnette Atkins among those glad to hear such words coming from her son's mouth again.

"He's doing what he loves to do, and to see him as happy as he is, to see him smile and just be back to his little joking self," she said, "it is truly a blessing for me."

NO FLASH, JUST VIRGINIA BASKETBALL

If you're looking for caveats, they weren't hard to find. There was Dez Wells, arguably Maryland's best player, in plainclothes on the bench, stuck in Week 1 of his fractured wrist's scheduled four-week heal. Next to him was Evan Smotrycz, the Terps' sharpshooting 6-foot-9 wing, still waiting for the foot that doctors surgically repaired in October -- which Smotrycz tweaked again Sunday after 30 minutes of combined play in 2014-15 -- to get right.

The young, banged-up team that greeted Virginia didn't look or feel like the same one that knocked off No. 13 Iowa State in Kansas City eight days ago. Maybe, in hindsight, that result had less to do with Maryland's brilliance than with the Cyclones' weirdly dreadful shooting. Either way, the Wells-less team that did show up Wednesday night didn't play well on either side of the floor, even by marginally reduced expectations.

These things are worth mentioning. But none of them can entirely explain away what Virginia managed Wednesday night, in front of 15,371 raucous Terrapins, in a game plagued by overexuberant officiating: It led in every single second of a 76-65 win.

No early small-sample-size deficits. No under-eight-timeout swoons. No panicked second-half collapses. From tipoff to the final buzzer, with the ruthless consistency of gravity, Tony Bennett's team pulled Maryland apart.

"It's nothing flashy," Bennett said. "But it's our way."

A year after a comprehensive sweep of the ACC regular season and tournament titles, that aforementioned way again has the Cavaliers looking like one of the nation's best. The group that ground the ACC into dust last season is only partially intact; seniors Joe Harris and Akil Mitchell were major losses in every possible sense of the term.

But the Hoos entered College Park still doing all of the things that made them so potent last season. Only one team (Wake Forest) grabs a higher percentage of available defensive rebounds. Only Kentucky and Texas have forced opponents into less accurate shooting inside the arc. Only two teams -- Louisville or Kentucky -- have granted their foes fewer points per possession.

Those numbers may vary slightly in the days and weeks to come, but whatever the details, the general indications are resounding: Virginia's pack-line defense still forces opponents into tough shots. It still rebounds the vast majority of those misses. And it still makes opponents spend brutal periods -- 20 seconds, on average -- defending on the opposite end.

"Our chance to be good is for us to be as close to great defensively as we can and as solid and sound offensively as we can," Bennett said.

For the first eight minutes Wednesday night, Virginia's defense was all of that and more. It closed on every screen Maryland set with precise help -- enough to turn the Terps' star freshman, Melo Trimble, away from the rim, but not enough to give open teammates to find.

Maryland eventually massaged ways to score, thanks mostly to tight officiating -- the Terps shot 36 free throws and 40 field goals. But by the time things degenerated into bonus-foul trade-offs, the outcome was mostly decided.

"It was a physical game, and a tough game, but we fought through it," Anthony Gill said. "We just relied on who we are. We made them work on defense. We made them work on offense.

"Rankings don't matter, but knowing we can go into a type of game like this, against a talented team, it helps our confidence a lot," Gill said.

At this point, one wouldn't assume Virginia is in any need of confidence. But it can't hurt, either, not with what's on deck Saturday. That's when Gill and Co. travel to Richmond to take on VCU.

"It might be crazier at VCU," Malcolm Brogdon said. "They might have an even bigger chip on their shoulder [than Maryland has] against us."

Environment aside, Brogdon is right: The Siegel Center will be crazy. The Rams' style presents an entirely different challenge for UVa. The Cavaliers are at their best when the game is slow and

grinding and almost ponderous; the Rams succeed because their frenetic pace doesn't allow a moment to think.

"[Maryland is] young, and they had some injuries, so I understand they're not at full strength," Bennett said. "And they missed some shots and helped us out. But that's always what it's about, is the ability to be composed in these kinds of settings."

Last November, VCU stole a 59-56 win at UVa, back before anyone realized just how good the Cavaliers would be. After 2013-14, and this season's 8-0 start, and especially Wednesday night's businesslike dismantling in the Xfinity Center, there can be no mistake. Caveats and all.

STITH, JONES BRING BACK MEMORIES FOR UVA HOOPS FANS

For the waning minutes of Virginia's 79-36 blowout of Tennessee State on Tuesday night, it was déjà vu all over again.

The sons of two Cavalier legends took the court a couple of decades removed from their fathers' glorious days in the Orange and Blue.

B.J. Stith, the son of UVA's all-time leading scorer, Bryant Stith, and Jeff Jones, the son of former Wahoo point guard and head coach by the same name, came in for a little mop-up duty as eighth-ranked Virginia rolled to its fifth win in as many games.

Didn't matter that the outcome had already been decided. The 12,056 fans who showed up for a little pre-Thanksgiving entertainment knew the history, appreciated the legacy and cheered the names, which are household in Wahoo Nation.

Both of 'em scored, Stith going 2-for-4 from the field, garnering four points and an assist in 12 minutes. Jones was 1-for-2 in his four minutes.

For Stith, a freshman, it was a glorious night because he scored his first basket as a Cavalier on a feed from Evan Nolte.

"It was great for a split second," Stith chuckled. "Then I realized I had to get back to the Pack Line."

He said he would text his dad, but noted that his father probably already knew. So would Jones' pop.

You see, the elder Jones and Stith are together again. Jones is head coach at Old Dominion University and Stith is his assistant coach. They're presently with their team at a holiday event in the Caribbean.

While the statistical contributions might be small from those two famous offspring, it was not lost on Virginia coach Tony Bennett what it means to have them in his program and how the fans feel when the two come off the bench.

"Being a coach's son, I understand the success of when Coach Jones was here and that Bryant Stith was one of the greatest players to ever play here," Bennett said. "To hear the crowd appreciate them, that's respect for their dads. That's pretty cool. And when you walk the halls [of John Paul Jones Arena] and look at some of those things, you see what they've meant to the program as a coach and a player and that's very special."

While Jones is a walk-on sophomore from nearby St. Anne's-Belfield, and his mom, Lisa, still lives in Charlottesville, Stith is a newcomer. The 6-5, 205 rookie came to UVA from Lawrenceville, via Oak Hill Academy.

There was never a doubt in Stith's mind that he would be a Cavalier. It was almost pre-destined.

"From the minute I met Coach Bennett (Stith's sophomore year in high school) I knew I was coming here," said Broderick Jamal (B.J.) Stith. "It was my dream school and it's still my dream school. I love it here and wouldn't trade this for the world."

While his playing time has been somewhat limited being the last man in the rotation, Stith said he's not frustrated, but eager to help the team in any way he can.

He realizes that when he checks into a game, fans are cheering both for him and the family name.

"It's most definitely cool and I love it," B.J. said. "That's why I came here. I love the atmosphere. I love the fans. I try not to let that get into my head too much."

With so much depth on this basketball team, Bennett often spends time studying each player when he evaluates practice sessions. He appreciates the efforts that guys like Stith and Jones make in those workouts.

"Sometimes I'll put some of our young guys over on the scout team," said Bennett, picking up a tip from Wisconsin coach Bo Ryan. "I thought that was really good because it lets them be real aggressive. Sometimes guys that are young and aren't getting as many minutes, play so cautious and so conservative in practice and I don't think that's right for those guys."

Bennett pulled Stith aside and told him to be very aggressive in practice, to explore his game and to not worry about missing shots or making turnovers.

Stith has taken that to heart. He loves the challenge and has been able to relax and play his game. As a result, he has become a more confident player.

After all, Stith has a nice looking shot and Bennett said one never knows when he may have to call on someone like the freshman.

Meanwhile, some media who covered both sets of Stiths and Joneses were kidding B.J. that he's part of the highest-scoring, father-son combinations in Virginia basketball history.

The younger Stith couldn't contain his amusement.

"If I am part of it, it's all because of my dad," B.J. laughed.

Well, so far.

He's only trailing his dad by 2,512 points.

A NEW YEAR, A NEW IDENTITY FOR THE VIRGINIA MEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM

Virginia coach Tony Bennett sat on a dais inside the Virginia practice gym on Wednesday and laughed at himself.

Bennett, not usually a fan of giving opening statements to the media — he prefers to just go right to questions — had just spoken for over two minutes.

"That might be the longest opening statement I've ever made during my time here," said Bennett, smiling. "You shouldn't have any more questions. That should have just satisfied everything right there."

Not quite.

Last year at this time, everyone was wondering who was going to be the team's starting point guard. Freshmen London Perrantes and Devon Hall were vying for minutes with Teven Jones and Bennett was also tinkering with Malcolm Brogdon at the position.

Everyone knows how that one turned out.

Perrantes was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team. His ability to solidify the point was one of the main reasons Virginia was able to have one of its best seasons ever.

But last year was last year.

"The biggest message that I've given our team, and I think it's really important, is that, first of all, nobody can take away what happened last year — it was obviously a fun year, a terrific year," Bennett said. "But I think a big mistake would be to try and compare ourselves or ourselves to last year's team."

That may be easier said than done when you consider that Virginia is ranked eighth in the USA Today Preseason Coaches poll. It's obvious that most people expect this year's team to be every bit as successful, perhaps more so.

That's what winning your first ACC Tournament since 1976 will do.

But Bennett has told his players that this is a different team than the one that partied on the floor of the Greensboro Coliseum, one that needs to find its own identity.

This year, the rotation questions appear to have more clear-cut solutions than the ones last year.

Juniors Justin Anderson and Anthony Gill will likely slide into the starting roles once occupied by Joe Harris and Akil Mitchell. Anderson, the reigning ACC Sixth Man of the Year, and Gill, the team's most productive interior threat, often played starters minutes last season. Their ascension doesn't seem nearly as steep as Perrantes' did.

A more pressing question will be at the center position. Junior Mike Tobey, who may have the most potential of anybody on the roster, will be looking to put an up-and-down season behind him.

Tobey's bugaboo has been an inability to finish strong around the basket. Now listed at 7-feet — up an inch from last season — Tobey needs to play like it.

"The offseason focus was for me to get a lot stronger, which helps you finish around the rim better and all the things that come with that," Tobey said. "I do have to do a better job of finishing. I remember a couple games specifically where I didn't finish as well as I should have — like the Duke game at Duke. I think just being stronger is going to help me a lot."

If Tobey isn't up to the task, Bennett could very well go with senior Darion Atkins in what would be more of a small-ball lineup. Atkins, though, has been, at times, an enigma in his own right. Skill-wise, he probably possesses just as much talent as Mitchell ever did. It's just been a matter of playing within himself and the team's system — and bringing the same consistent motor that Mitchell did.

The most intrigue with the rotation figures to be at the back end — players seven, eight and nine.

Last season, Bennett used the early portion of the season to determine that Perrantes was the best fit at point guard and that Gill deserved the lion's share of the big-man minutes off the bench over the likes of Atkins and Evan Nolte.

This time around, he figures to do similar experimenting before settling on a rotation by the start of league play in January.

Hall has gotten rave reviews for his offseason work, with strength and conditioning coach Mike Curtis saying he made the greatest strides of anybody. How that translates onto the court will be something to watch. At this point, it appears the Virginia Beach native has a leg up on freshmen guards B.J. Stith and Marial Shayok.

Nolte, meanwhile, who was on the fringe of last year's rotation, is competing for minutes at multiple positions.

Freshmen Jack Salt and Isaiah Wilkins are also in the mix.

"It just depends — foul trouble, injuries — all those things come into play," said Bennett, when asked about his rotation. "We do have some quality depth."

"Our freshmen, all of them at times...they've shown flashes where you think, 'Boy, I think they can help us,' Then there are those times that they're spinning a little bit...I think there's going to be an opportunity, assuming we stay healthy because we do have some experience, for a couple of them to step in there. Perhaps one on the interior and one or two on the perimeter. It just depends."

Gill said the competition during practice has been fun.

"The freshmen have been going out there and trying to show Coach Bennett what they can do," he said. "He knows what the upperclassmen can do, what we're capable of. He's trying to get a feel for the freshmen, and they're doing a great job of showing him."

Bennett said he should have a much better idea about his rotation following the team's upcoming closed-door scrimmages against Marquette and Georgetown, and that no players, regardless of their experience, can just "walk into spots."

"I remind them all the time — you got to earn everything you get," Bennett said. "That's what made our team good last year is that guys really competed hard for opportunities and understood their roles."
