# MIKE LONDON

## HEAD COACH

As Mike London prepares for his fourth season as the head football coach at Virginia, the makeup of the Cavalier program continues to change and improve.

London will enter the 2013 season with a lot of new looks. His coaching staff underwent a major overhaul following a 4-8 finish in 2012 and now features five new faces sporting a significant amount of major college coaching experience. London's fourth edition of UVa football will feature new coordinators on offense, defense, special teams and for recruiting.

The Virginia football program took on a dramatic new look in March when the George Welsh Indoor Practice Facility opened behind the McCue Center. The facility, that features a full field and end zones, allows the Cavaliers to practice and train without disruption from inclement weather. As part of the project, the team's primary practice field received a new FieldTurf playing surface.

Topping off the off-season was another top-30 recruiting class that featured the first five-star signee in London's tenure at Virginia.

With all of those changes, there is still one constant in the Virginia program - London's desire to build a program that competes for championships. While the results from the 2012 campaign were not satisfactory for London, the team featured a number of young players who displayed the ability to turn the fortunes of the Cavaliers like they experienced in 2011.

That season the Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games that the team won in the final seconds. Along the way the Cavaliers became the first college football program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season on the way to UVa being ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. He was also selected by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to receive its 2011 Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award. A total of five Cavalier players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrious Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

In the spring of 2013 OT Oday Aboushi was selected by the New York Jets to mark the 30th consecutive season a UVa player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

Since taking over the Virginia program London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches. He has made dozens of appearances, spoke at clinics and been readily available to the media. He did not just wait for constituents to come to Virginia, he actively took the Cavalier program to the public.



London embraced a groundbreaking 18-episode television production entitled "The Building of a Program" that gave an all-access look at UVa football. He has had the team hold spring practices and coaches clinics across the state, including in Virginia Beach to build support and interest in one of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

He quickly defined the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

The results of his actions were tangible. In his first spring semester at UVa the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years and student-athletes were heavily involved in community service projects and outreach programs.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program on the field. Success has been a big part of the Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football

Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/ American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year from both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texas. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November of 1984 to July of 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina, are the parents of four children - Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. He has three older children, Michael, Jr., Brandon and Kristen through a previous marriage. The 51-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl

Champion New York Giants practice squad. Brandon since 2010 has been with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.

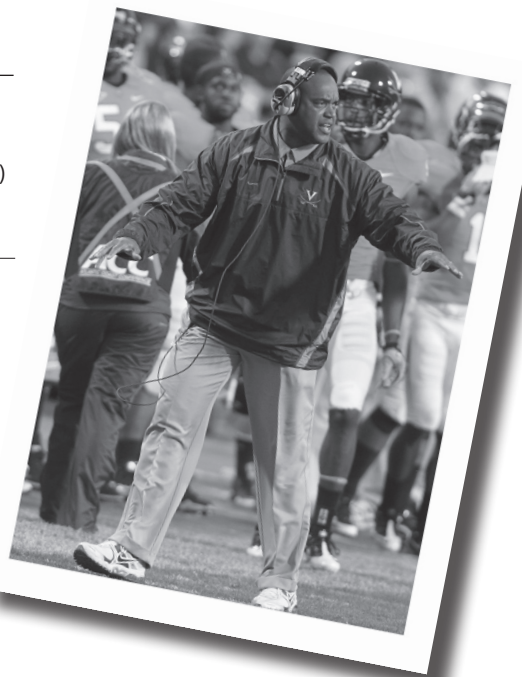

## ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH FOR OFFENSE/TIGHT ENDS

# TOM O'BRIEN

Tom O'Brien is Virginia's associate head coach for offense and the tight ends coach after joining Mike London's coaching staff on Jan. 3, 2013. Entering his 39th season of coaching, O'Brien is enjoying his second stint at UVa after spending 15 seasons on George Welsh's staff from 1982-1996, the final six campaigns as the offensive coordinator.

O'Brien returns to Charlottesville after a 16-year head coaching career that included stops at Boston College and NC State. O'Brien owns a 115-80 career record as a head coach and an 8-2 mark in bowl games. In his 16 years as a head coach, 12 of his teams advanced to bowl games and his .800 winning percentage is the highest all-time in bowl history.

When O'Brien was named NC State's head coach in December of 2006, he took over a program that had posted three straight losing seasons and was coming off a season where the Wolfpack won only three games. By year two in Raleigh, O'Brien took NC State to the Papajohns.com Bowl and then enjoyed a Champs Bowl victory in 2010 over West Virginia (23-7) behind the effort of game MVP and current Seattle Seahawks QB Russell Wilson. O'Brien and NC State followed up in 2011 with a Belk Bowl triumph over Louisville (31-24) behind 264 passings yards and three touchdowns by game MVP Mike Glennon, who was selected in the third round by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

The Glennon selection by the Buccaneers made O'Brien the first coach in ACC history to have back-to-back quarterbacks selected in the first three rounds of the NFL Draft. Russell Wilson, who preceded Glennon on the Wolfpack depth chart at quarterback, was selected in the third round of the 2012 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks. The Glennon and Wilson tandem also made the NC State program the only team in ACC history to have a 3,000-yard passer in four consecutive seasons.

Many players who have enjoyed O'Brien's tutelage have also enjoyed success at the next level. At the conclusion of the 2012 NFL season, 52 former players O'Brien either coached or recruited had made it to the NFL. Also, seven of the last 10 seasons at least one former O'Brien pupil was a member of a Super Bowl Championship squad.

O'Brien got his first opportunity to lead a major college program in December, 1996, when he took over at Boston College. There, he turned around a program that had been wracked by a gambling scandal and instability. After leading the Eagles to back-to-back 4-7 seasons in 1997 and 1998, O'Brien led BC to an 8-4 record in 1999 and the third-best turnaround in the NCAA FBS ranks. He then guided the Eagles to eight consecutive winning seasons and an NCAA-best eight consecutive bowl appearances. He posted nine-win seasons in four of his final five years at Chestnut Hill, posting a 75-45 record and leaving the school with more wins than any coach in Boston College history. Heading into the Eagles' 2006 bowl game, BC ranked as the 18th winningest program of the 21st century (from 2000-06). O'Brien left for NC State before



coaching in BC's bowl game in 2006, the Meineke Car Care Bowl, but his success of reaching postseason play continued for Boston College past his tenure as the Eagles reached 12-straight bowl games before missing out in 2011. UVa head coach Mike London served as the defensive line coach on four of O'Brien's Boston College teams (1997-2000).

Just as impressively, O'Brien's teams were successful in the classroom. The American Football Coaches' Association gave him its 2004 Academic Achievement Award for posting a 100 percent graduation rate. He received honorable mention status seven additional times during his tenure at Boston College. BC was ranked No. 1 in the country by USA Today when that publication re-ordered its 2005 regular-season poll and the final 2005 football Top 25 by APR (Academic Progress Rate) score to measure a combination of athletic and academic success. At the time O'Brien left, BC boasted the highest success rate for football among any ranked team. Success followed O'Brien to NC State as his single year APR score of 990 obliterated the previous program best of 953 from the 2005-06 academic year. It was O'Brien's highest single year score achieved as a head coach.

O'Brien spent seven years under Welsh at the Naval Academy, coaching the team's tackles and tight ends and serving as recruiting coordinator. He was responsible for recruiting All-America and hall of fame running back Napoleon McCallum to the Naval Academy.

In 1982, O'Brien followed Welsh to Virginia, where they turned the Cavaliers into a nationally prominent and successful football power. In O'Brien's first 15 years in Charlottesville, Virginia had winning seasons 12 times, won four bowl games and was ACC co-champions twice. During his tenure, Virginia consistently ranked among the top offensive teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference. In 1996, the Cavaliers scored more than 320 points for an ACC-record eighth consecutive year.

A Cincinnati, Ohio native, O'Brien received a community-minded Jesuit education at St. Xavier High School that helped him earn his appointment to the Naval Academy. At Annapolis, where he was a three-year starter at defensive end, he learned to combine his hard work with discipline and leadership skills, traits that prepared him to become a Marine officer when his football career ended.

After his 1971 graduation from the Naval Academy, he served nine years in the Marines, beginning his football coaching career as an assistant for Navy's plebe (freshman) team, then serving at the Quantico Marine Base in Virginia and tours of duty in California and Japan. He eventually reached the rank of major in the Marine Corps Reserve.

In 1975, O'Brien returned to Navy as a Marine officer assigned to head coach George Welsh's staff. In 1980, he resigned his commission and was hired by Welsh as a full-time assistant coach. But O'Brien didn't accept before he examined all of his available options. To this day, he credits Welsh with allowing him to interview with several major corporations before accepting the coaching position. After examining all of his options, he chose a profession that wasn't for the faint of heart, deciding he'd "rather coach than work for a living."

O'Brien has spent his career influencing his peers and his players. During his 16 years as a head coach, he has mentored 23 assistant coaches - seven of whom have gone on to be collegiate head coaches, including current UVa head coach Mike London and current Miami head coach Al Golden.

He has also been recognized for his valuable contributions to the communities where he has served. He is on the board of directors for the Marine Corps' Toys for Tots Foundation. He received the John F. Kennedy National Award, given to "an outstanding American of Irish descent for distinguished service to God and country" in 2005.

O'Brien is married to the former Jennifer Byrd of San Diego, who is a member of the board of directors for Rostro de Cristo (Face of Christ), a program whose mission is to provide spiritual and educational opportunities for young people from the United States to live out the Gospel of Jesus Christ together with the people of Ecuador. They are the parents of three children: Colleen Frances, a 2002 Boston College graduate who is an associate producer at ESPN; Daniel Patrick, a 2005 BC graduate who is on the Elon football staff; and Bridget Jean, also a 2005 BC graduate who is the Museum Coordinator for the Historic Charleston Foundation.

# JON TENUTA

Jon Tenuta is the associate head coach for the defense and the defensive coordinator. Tenuta joined Mike London's coaching staff on Jan. 3, 2013 after three seasons at NC State. The UVa alum returns to Charlottesville for the first time in a working capacity since being a graduate assistant for the Cavaliers in 1981 and 1982.

Entering his 33rd season of collegiate coaching, Tenuta has a wealth of FBS coaching experience, including being the defensive coordinator at various BCS stops: Kansas State, Ohio State, North Carolina, Georgia Tech, Notre Dame and NC State. Tenuta also served Marshall and SMU as defensive coordinator as well during the 1980s and has served as a defensive coordinator in 16 of his 32 seasons as a collegiate coach.

Most recently at NC State, his defense included David Amerson, who led the nation in 2011 with 13 INTs.

Tenuta has coached in 16 bowl games during his career and served as the interim head coach for Georgia Tech at the 2007 Humanitarian Bowl. After he arrived at Notre Dame, he helped the Irish defense improve in all defensive categories and coached 2012 Heisman Trophy runner-up Manti Te'o to a freshman All-American season.

While at Georgia Tech, 18 Yellow Jacket defenders earned first- or second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference recognition and 18 players from his first four units were either drafted or signed to NFL free-agent contracts. In the six years Tenuta was in Atlanta, his defenses were ranked nationally in total, scoring and rushing defense, including 20th or better against the run the last five years.

In 2001, Tenuta guided the ACC's top-rated defense at North Carolina during his only season in Chapel Hill. Tenuta spent five seasons at Ohio State and he helped develop several All-Americans and first-round NFL draft picks. Ohio State's pass defense was consistently ranked among the nation's best during that span.

In 1989, he was an assistant coach at SMU, where he helped Forrest Gregg rebuild the program. Tenuta also has had stops at Maryland (graduate assistant), Vanderbilt (DBs) and Oklahoma (DBs).

Tenuta has coached more than 30 players who went on to play professional football. A three-year letterwinner as a defensive back at Virginia (1978, '79, '80), he won the team's John Acree Memorial Football Trophy and Kevin Bowie Award. Tenuta graduated with a degree in physical education and health in 1982. He met his wife, Dori (Gamble) while at UVa. Dori played basketball at Virginia, lettering four times between 1978 and 1981. They have three sons: Zach, Matt and Luke. Son Matt is a left-handed pitcher in the Kansas City Royals Organization and in the summer of 2013 was assigned to the Burlington Royals (N.C.) of the Appalachian League.

# STEVE FAIRCHILD

Steve Fairchild joined Mike London's staff on Jan. 30, 2013 as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Fairchild comes to Charlottesville boasting 31 years of coaching experience at both the NFL and collegiate levels, including 16 seasons as an offensive coordinator.

Most recently Fairchild was the senior offensive assistant for the San Diego Chargers after a four-year stint as the head coach at Colorado State, which included the highest-ranked recruiting class in program history and a victory in the 2008 New Mexico Bowl.

At Colorado State, Fairchild also was the offensive coordinator (1997-2000) and quarterbacks coach (1993-96) during the Rams' football rise. From 1993-2000 Colorado State won the Western Athletic Conference three times and the Mountain West Conference twice and was nationally ranked at various times during that span. During Fairchild's four seasons as the offensive coordinator, three Colorado State players were honored as the league's offensive player of the year and the Rams won three bowl games. In 1997, quarterback Moses Moreno was the WAC offensive player of the year and helped Colorado State finish No. 1 in the league in total and scoring offense.

Fairchild has worked with many dynamic players in college football and the NFL. He was a part of San Diego State's high-octane offenses that were highlighted by running back Marshall Faulk and quarterback Dan McGwire. During Fairchild's three seasons at San Diego State from 1990-92, the Aztecs enjoyed three straight top-10 finishes in NCAA scoring and total offense categories. Fairchild's first stint at San Diego State was for the 1986 season as the Aztecs' recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach, working with second-round NFL selection Rob Awalt. Fairchild also owns a stop at New Mexico as the offensive coordinator from 1987-89 where the Lobos ranked No. 8 in NCAA pass offense and No. 29 in total offense in 1989. Under Fairchild's guidance Terance Mathis became the first player to have more than 250 receptions, 4,000 receiving yards and 6,000 yards of total offense.

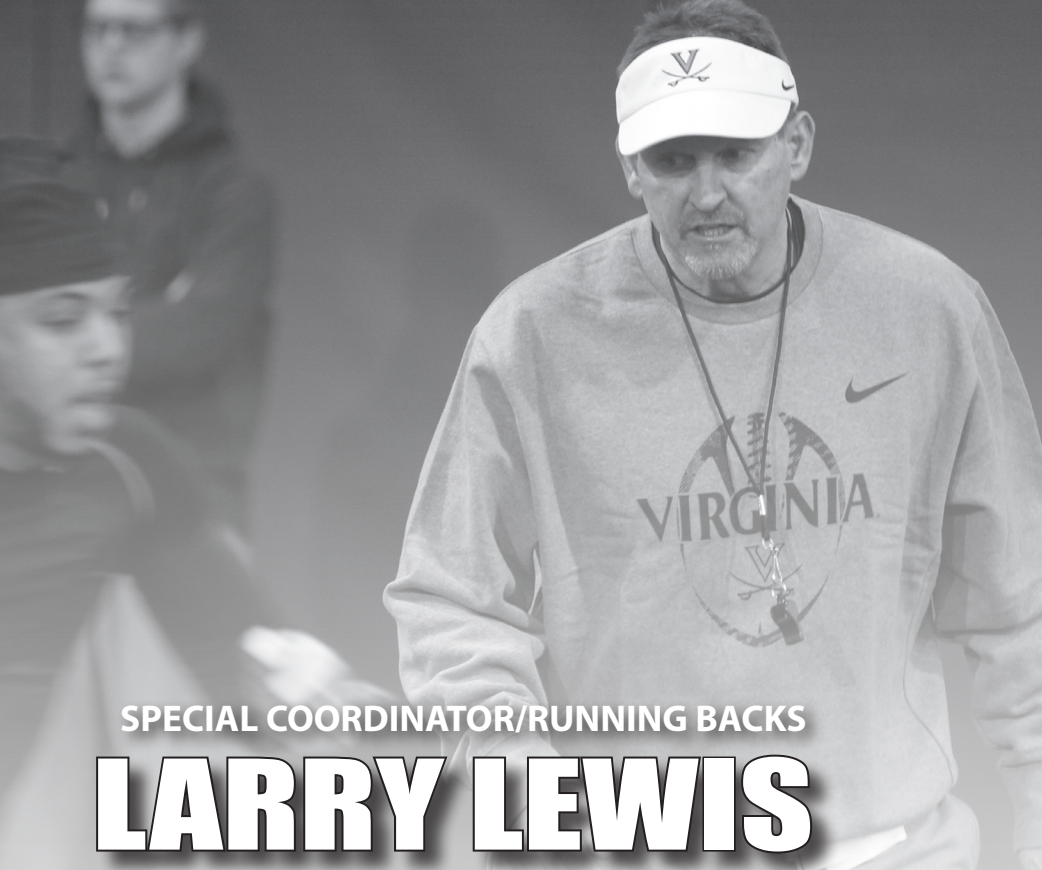
Fairchild spent eight seasons in the NFL. He worked as the offensive coordinator for the Buffalo Bills in 2006 and 2007, as quarterback J.P. Losman posted the 11th-best QB rating in the NFL in 2006 and passed for 3,051 yards. Prior to his stint with the Bills, Fairchild was the offensive coordinator for the St. Louis Rams from 2003-05. Teaming up again with Faulk, Fairchild and the Rams enjoyed three straight top-10 finishes in total offense, including the NFL's second-ranked scoring offense in 2003. Quarterback Marc Bulger was the 2003 Pro Bowl MVP. Fairchild's first NFL stint came in Buffalo in 2001 and 2002 where he was the running backs coach and boasted two Pro Bowl running backs, Larry Centers and Travis Henry. Centers is the NFL career reception and yardage holder for running backs.

Fairchild began his coaching career in 1982 as the offensive coordinator at San Diego Mesa Community College. After two seasons he moved to Ferris State as the offensive coordinator from 1984-85.

Fairchild is a 1981 graduate of Colorado State, where he spent three seasons as a quarterback and earned All-WAC second-team honors behind BYU's Jim McMahon. Fairchild also excelled in the classroom at Colorado State, earning first-team academic all-conference honors, the Merrill Gheen Award for athletic and academic achievement and the NCAA District Athletic Achievement Award. He earned a bachelor of arts in economics from Colorado State and later a master of education from Azusa Pacific in 1983.

The Decatur, Ill., native is married to the former Nancy A. Kolstoe. The couple has two daughters, Lindsey and Jill.

# LARRY LEWIS

Larry Lewis joined Mike London's coaching staff on Jan. 12, 2013 as the special teams coordinator and the running backs coach. Lewis has 32 years of collegiate coaching experience, including an eight-year stint as the head coach at Idaho State. Lewis first started coaching special teams when he was an assistant on Mike Price's Weber State staff in 1981 and became one of the first college coaches to hold the title of special teams coordinator when he took on that role for Price's Washington State teams in the 1990s.

Lewis comes to Virginia after working for Hall of Fame coach Chris Ault at Nevada in 2012. Ault announced his retirement in late December. Lewis served as the Wolfpack's special teams coordinator and running backs coach. Nevada averaged 271 rushing yards per game in 2012, the seventh-best average among FBS programs.

In his one season at Nevada, Lewis coached junior All-America running back Stephon Jefferson, who rushed for 1,883 yards and 24 touchdowns. Both of those totals ranked second among FBS players in 2012. Jefferson was one of 10 semifinalists for the Doak Walker Award, presented to the nation's top running back.

Jefferson's rushing yardage and touchdown totals set Nevada and Mountain West Conference single-season records. He broke Colin Kaepernick's single-season rushing touchdown mark at Nevada.

The Wolfpack's special teams also showed improvement under Lewis. Nevada's Khalid Wooten led the Mountain West Conference and finished fourth in the nation in punt return average at 15.1 yards per return. Brock Kendall was sixth in MWC in kickoff returns at 23.4 yards per runback. Place kicker Allen Hardison converted nine of 10 field goal attempts and made 56 of 57 PATs. Chase Tenpenny averaged 43.3 yards per punt on 46 attempts. Wooten was a second-team all-conference selection, while Hardison earned honorable mention honors.

Lewis coached at Colorado State for four seasons before joining the staff at Nevada. After coaching the Rams' special teams and safeties for three seasons, he was promoted to associate head coach prior to the 2011 campaign and given the responsibility of coaching running backs and fullbacks, in addition to special teams.

At Colorado State in 2011, Lewis guided the Rams to top 25 rankings in punting and kick returns. As the Rams' running backs coach, he tutored Chris Nwoke, who was third in the Mountain West in rushing at nearly 95 yards per game. Lewis also had the No. 19 kick return unit in 2010 and the top punter in the Mountain West in 2008.

Lewis has produced a number of NFL players in his career, perhaps most notably All-Pro defensive end Jared Allen, who was the nation's top defensive player in I-AA (FCS) in 2003 at Idaho State.

As the Bengals' head coach from 1999-2006, Lewis guided Idaho State to a share of the 2002 Big Sky Conference title and the school's first of consecutive eight-win seasons, in 2002 and 2003, in the program's 101-year history. For a stretch from 2001-04, Idaho State was ranked in 22 of 23 national polls. His Bengals' teams produced 13 All-Americans, 127 all-conference selections and 41 academic all-conference awards.

Lewis was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year in 2002, when Idaho State notched its best record in 21 years and captured a share of its first Big Sky title in more than two decades.

That season, the Bengals had 14 first- and second-team all-conference players; they had just one only three years earlier, in 1999. The Bengals closed the year No. 16 in the national polls.

Prior to his tenure at ISU, Lewis spent 10 years at Washington State, where he served as defensive ends coach (1989-94) and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator (1995-98). During that period, WSU experienced unprecedented success and his linemen helped the school post the nation's No. 2 defense against the run in both 1993 and 1994.

The Cougars went to three bowl games, including the Rose Bowl at the end of a 10-1 season in 1997. In that contest, WSU nearly upset eventual national champion Michigan. It was Washington State's first Rose Bowl appearance in 67 years.

From 1981-88, Lewis coached at Weber State, where he began as a part-time assistant. Promoted to full-time status by head coach Mike Price prior to the 1983 season, Lewis coached outside linebackers from 1981-85, then wore two caps as recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach from 1986-88. In 1987, the Wildcats enjoyed what remains the best season in program annals, a 10-3 campaign that saw them advance to the national Division I-AA quarterfinals and capture a share of the Big Sky Conference championship. In 1981, his first year at the school, the 7-4 team snapped a string of 10 losing seasons.

Lewis began coaching after a stellar playing career at Boise State, where he lettered four times. After red-shirting in 1976, he was the team's most improved player as a freshman. As a starter at outside linebacker, he helped the Broncos win the 1980 NCAA Division I-AA national championship, on the heels of a 10-1 season in 1979 and a Big Sky championship in 1977.

During his professional tenure he has coached in the Copper, Alamo, Rose and New Mexico (twice) bowls and in the Division I-AA championships twice.

The 55-year-old Lewis is a native of Vale, Ore. He graduated from Boise State in 1981 with a degree in physical education. He and his wife, Lisa, have a daughter named Hanna.

# CHIP WEST

Chip West enters his fourth season on the Virginia coaching staff in 2013 with the additional title of recruiting coordinator. West, who coaches the Cavalier cornerbacks, took over the new role following the 2012 season and saw Virginia sign a top-30 class in February that featured the first five-star prospect in Mike London's tenure at Virginia. It was the third consecutive top-30 class for the UVA program.

The highly-energetic West has taken advantage of his personal and professional background in the Tidewater area to strongly enhance Virginia's recruiting efforts in that region. West was named the Atlantic Coast Conference's recruiter of the year for 2011 by 247Sports and was one of eight finalists for the organization's national recruiter of the year honor.

As effective as West has been on the recruiting circuit, he has been equally successful as a position coach.

In 2012, sophomore cornerback Demetrious Nicholson was an honorable mention selection to All-ACC media and coaches teams. As a freshman in 2011, he was a second-team freshman All-American.

In 2011, senior cornerback Chase Minnifield earned All-ACC honors for the second straight year while being coached by West. Minnifield ended his career with 13 interceptions.

That same year, Nicholson, the state's high school player of the year in 2010, started all 13 games, recorded two interceptions and finished fourth on the team with 60 tackles.

In 2010 West coached Ras-I Dowling. Despite missing much of the season due to injury, Dowling was a second-round pick by the New England Patriots.

A Hampton, Va., native, West was the assistant head coach, recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach for head coach Bobby Wilder at Old Dominion before joining the Virginia staff. He was responsible for recruiting the Hampton Roads and Tidewater areas for the Monarchs. ODU went 9-2 in 2009 in its first season as a NCAA FCS program.

Prior to joining the staff at Old Dominion, West coached at James Madison for three seasons (2004-2006) overseeing the defensive backs, including free safety Tony LeZotte, a 2005 All-American and Atlantic-10 Defensive Player of the Year, as well as the Atlantic 10 co-rookie of the year as a freshman. The Dukes won the NCAA Division I-AA national championship in 2004, finishing 13-2. In 2006 JMU returned to the FCS playoffs, losing in the first round at Youngstown State.

West coached the defensive backs at Fordham in 2003 when the Rams were 9-3. He served as the wide receivers coach at Colgate for four years and worked as a graduate assistant at West Virginia. Colgate shared the 2002 Patriot League title with Fordham, finishing with a 9-3 overall record and a 6-1 league mark. The Raiders led the Patriot League in 2002 in total offense, averaging 392.5 yards per game, including 215.0 yards per game passing. In 1999 Colgate won the Patriot League title and competed in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

As a graduate assistant at West Virginia for two seasons, West worked with the defense as the Mountaineers participated in the Carquest and Insight.com bowls.

West played football at Kecoughtan High School. He earned his bachelor's degree in computer information systems from Livingstone College, and his master's in physical education from West Virginia while working as a graduate assistant coach. West was an all-CIAA wide receiver at Livingstone.

He and his wife, Patrice, are the parents of five children: Zoe, David, Gwen, Justin and Jada.

# VINCENT BROWN

The 2013 season marks the fourth year for Vincent Brown as a member of the Cavalier coaching staff. It also features a move to coaching the UVA defensive line. The previous three seasons Brown mentored the Virginia linebackers. He continues to serve as the program's assistant special teams coordinator.

Brown is in his second stint at Virginia and is working with London for the third time in his career after previously working with him at Richmond.

Last season, Brown saw senior linebacker Steve Greer earn All-ACC honors after leading the team with 103 total tackles. He finished his career with 357 tackles, the most of any active ACC player during the 2012 season. Fellow linebacker LaRoy Reynolds was third on the team with 75 tackles and ended his career with 235 stops.

Brown's stint coaching for London at Virginia is not his first experience with Cavalier football. He was a graduate assistant at Virginia during the Cavaliers' 2007 season, which culminated with a Gator Bowl berth.

Brown joined London at Richmond in February 2008, where he was the linebackers coach. He coached Richmond's three starting linebackers in 2009 to all-league honors as the Spiders shared the CAA crown.

Brown guided a corps of linebackers during Richmond's 2008 FCS National Championship season that was arguably the most talented in the league, with All-American Eric McBride and all-conference pick Collin McConaghy. McBride posted his second-straight season with 100+ tackles, while sophomore Patrick Weldon emerged as the team's second-leading tackler.

Prior to his start in collegiate coaching, Brown served as an inside linebackers coach for the Dallas Cowboys in 2006. Brown played for the New England Patriots for eight seasons before retiring in 1995. Brown's nickname as a player was "The Undertaker."

He earned NFL All-Pro honors in 1991, 1992 and 1993. During his professional career he recorded 16.5 sacks, had 10 interceptions and scored one touchdown.

Brown's previous coaching experience includes a four-year stint as an assistant coach at Meadowcreek High School near Atlanta. He was also the school's assistant AD for one year.

A native of Atlanta, Brown played at Mississippi Valley State where he earned Kodak All-America honors as a senior in 1987. He was a second team AP All-American as a junior. A three-time all-conference pick, he broke the school's record for career tackles with 570 stops while leading the team in tackles his last three seasons. He graduated with a degree in criminal justice.

After being selected in the second round of the 1988 NFL Draft, Brown went on to start 103 of 123 career games for the Patriots, logging 811 tackles, 16.5 sacks and 10 interceptions.

Brown and his wife Chandra have four children, Dane, Vincent III, Raven and Jorian.

# MARQUES HAGANS

Marques Hagans enters his first season as a full-time coach on Mike London's coaching staff after spending the past two years as a graduate coach, working with the offense. Hagans was named the wide receivers coach on Jan. 3, 2013.

Hagans was a four-year letterwinner at UVa from 2002-05 and currently is No. 7 all-time in passing at UVa with 4,877 passing yards. He finished his career at No. 5, but has since been passed by Jameel Seweel and Marc Verica, the two starting quarterbacks to follow him in Charlottesville. Hagans is No. 5 all-time at UVa in total offense with 5,779 yards and his 2005 season ranks No. 3 all-time with 2,802 total yards. Only his predecessor, Matt Schaub, had better seasons (2002 & 2003) in the UVa annals in regards to total offense.

The St. Louis Rams selected Hagans in the fifth round (144 overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft. He spent three seasons with the Rams before being picked up by the Kansas City Chiefs for the 2009 campaign. Hagans finished the 2009 season with the Washington Redskins and was released in the summer of 2010 after injuring himself in off-season workouts.

Hagans is a native of Hampton, Va., and graduated from Hampton High School after spending two years at neighboring Bethel High School. As a junior at Hampton, Hagans led the Crabbers to the state championship in Group AAA, Division 5 of the Virginia High School League in 1998. Hampton advanced to the state semifinals in Hagans' senior season in 1999.

Hagans graduated with a degree in anthropology from UVa in 2005 and is currently finishing a graduate degree in professional studies.

Hagans resides in Charlottesville with his wife, the former Lauren Swierczek, a former Cavalier women's basketball player. The couple has one son Christopher, Dex.

# ANTHONY POINDEXTER

One of the greatest players in Virginia football history, the 2013 season will be Anthony Poindexter's 10th year at UVa and fifth season on the defensive side of the ball. He coaches the Cavalier safeties.

Poindexter was UVa's running backs coach for five years on Al Groh's staff. He was also the assistant special teams coordinator the last four seasons of the Groh era and was the team's special teams coordinator for London's first three years at UVa.

Last season Poindexter broke in two new players at the safety positions. Both Anthony Harris and Brandon Phelps started all 12 games and finished among the team's top five tacklers. Harris was third for UVa with 87 tackles while Phelps accounted for 48 stops.

In 2011, Poindexter's unit helped hold opponents to a completion percentage of just 53.7 percent, the second lowest mark in the ACC. Rodney McLeod led the team with four interceptions, including three at Maryland. He became the first UVa player to accomplish that feat since Poindexter in 1996. McLeod earned honorable mention All-ACC accolades in 2011.

Under Poindexter in 2009, UVa's defensive backs helped the Cavalier defense rank No. 4 in the ACC and No. 21 in the nation in pass defense. Highlighting the group of defensive backs was second-team All-ACC honoree Ras-I Dowling and Chris Cook, who was chosen in the second round (34th overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings.

In 2008, as the head of the running backs, Poindexter saw senior tailback Cedric Peerman conclude one of the most productive careers in school history. Peerman, who played in the Senior Bowl after earning honorable mention All-ACC honors, finished as the 19th most productive back in UVa history, rushing for 1,749 yards and 15 scores.

Poindexter started his UVa coaching career as a graduate assistant on offense in 2003. He returned to his alma mater the year before as a graduate assistant coach for strength and conditioning.

During the 2007 season, Poindexter helped UVa to become one of the best running attacks in the ACC prior to the loss of Peerman to a season-ending injury after six games. Peerman was averaging 113.2 yards per game after five contests before suffering his foot injury. Mikell Simpson then stepped up for UVa and scored eight TDs for the Cavaliers in the final six games of the season, including a school-record 96-yard scoring play in the 2008 Gator Bowl.

In 2006, Poindexter helped UVa's running game average 122.76 yards per game during the second half of the season, powered by TB Jason Snelling. Snelling led the 'Hoos with 772 yards on 183 carries for seven touchdowns. On special teams he worked with Chris Gould, who expanded his role from punter to placekicker and kickoff specialist. Gould dropped 27 punts inside the 20-yard line to rewrite the school record. He also drove more than 70 percent of his kickoffs into the end zone, resulting in 20 touchdowns.

In 2005, Poindexter guided the Cavaliers to 1,608 yards of rushing and 18 touchdowns, led by senior Wali Lundy's eight touchdowns. Hampered by an injury early in the season, Lundy rebounded to rush for a career-high 113 yards against Temple. In the upset of No. 24 Georgia Tech, Lundy became UVa's all-time career TD leader. He is also only the third player in ACC history to score 50 career touchdowns.

In 2004 Poindexter helped the Cavaliers to the second greatest improvement in rushing average (112.6) in ACC history. UVa's rushing improvement was second best in the nation. The Cavaliers scored a school record 34 rushing touchdowns, led by tailback Wali Lundy's 17 trips to the end zone. All-ACC tailback Alvin Pearman came on late in the season to become the ACC's second-leading rusher. He earned first-team All-ACC honors for the first time after leading the conference with five 100-yard games. Both Lundy and Pearman rank in the top 10 in rushing in school history.

Regarded as one of the fiercest hitters in the game during his collegiate career (1994-98), Poindexter earned first-team All-America honors at safety his junior and senior seasons. He also was chosen the 1998 ACC Defensive Player of the Year and is one of only three players in school history to earn first-team All-ACC recognition three times.

He finished his career with 342 career tackles, the ninth-most in school history and tops among ACC defensive backs. He is tied for fifth in school history with 12 interceptions.

As a freshman, Poindexter helped make perhaps the biggest single defensive play in school history when he and teammate Adrian Burnim stopped Florida State tailback Warrick Dunn inches from the goal line on the game's last play to preserve a 33-28 win over the second-ranked Seminoles. With the victory, Virginia ended FSU's four-year, 29-game conference winning streak since joining the league in 1992.

Unfortunately, Poindexter's senior season ended prematurely when he injured his left knee in the seventh game of the season and later underwent reconstructive surgery. Poindexter was selected by the Baltimore Ravens in the seventh round of the 1999 NFL draft. He spent two seasons with the Ravens before ending his pro career with the Cleveland Browns.

To honor his legacy at UVa, Poindexter's No. 3 jersey was retired on Oct. 10, 2009, prior to Virginia's 47-7 triumph over Indiana at Scott Stadium.

Poindexter earned his degree in anthropology from Virginia in 1999.

Poindexter and his wife, Kimberly, have three children - Morocca, Anthony, Jr. and Chloe.

## OFFENSIVE LINE

# SCOTT WACHENHEIM

The 2013 season will be Scott Wachenheim's fourth year at Virginia and his third season coaching the Cavalier offensive linemen. He coached the tight ends during his first year with the Cavaliers. During his first three years at UVa coaching the offensive line and tight ends, Wachenheim helped Virginia's offense pass for at least 3,000 yards in three consecutive seasons, a first for the program.

In 2012, Wachenheim saw senior offensive tackle Oday Aboushi pick up a number of accolades. He was a first-team All-ACC selection, named the Touchdown Club of Richmond's Offensive Lineman of the Year and featured on the Watch Lists for the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award. On the other side of the line, junior tackle Morgan Moses earned honorable mention All-ACC honors.

In 2011 Wachenheim had the unique experience of having all five players on the offensive line start all 13 games together. That group helped fuel an impressive Cavalier running game. Virginia rushed for 2,107 yards, the highest total since the 2004 campaign. The continuity showed in the passing game as well as UVa finished the year ranked No. 24 in the nation in fewest sacks allowed per game (1.23).

Senior offensive guard Austin Pasztor was named a second-team All-American by the Associated Press and first-team All-ACC, while Aboushi was a second-team All-ACC pick. Wachenheim's players picked up ACC Lineman of the Week honors five times during the season for their performances.

Prior to coming to Virginia, Wachenheim spent the 2009 campaign as the tight ends coach with the Washington Redskins. During his lone season in Washington, Wachenheim helped with the development and emergence of tight end Fred Davis who had 48 receptions for 509 yards and six touchdowns in place of All-Pro Chris Cooley, who was lost with a season-ending injury.

Wachenheim first came to the Commonwealth in 2006 where he spent three seasons (2006-08) as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Liberty in Lynchburg, Va., under former UVa associate head coach Danny Rocco. Prior to the 2007 campaign, Rocco increased Wachenheim's responsibilities, naming him assistant head coach.

As the offensive coordinator at Liberty in 2008, the Flames went 10-2 on the way to a second straight Big South Conference championship, while averaging 33.7 points and 446.7 yards per game. The latter total ranked ninth in the Football Championship Subdivision and marked the second year in a row Liberty led the conference in total offense as they averaged 429.6 yards a game in 2007, while scoring 42.6 points per contest.

Highlighting Wachenheim's offense during his three years at Liberty was three-year starting running back Rashad Jennings, a seventh round selection by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the 2009 NFL Draft. A Walter Payton Award finalist and consensus first-team All-America selection, Jennings set Big South career records for rushing yards (3,633), attempts (633) and touchdowns (42).

Prior to his days with the Flames, Wachenheim spent 12 years as a member of Ken Hatfield's coaching staff at Rice in Houston, Texas. He spent the last five years with the Owls as offensive coordinator.

Wachenheim helped Rice build a dominant ball control offense which ranked among the nation's best during his tenure.

During the 2004 season, Rice led the nation in rushing offense (306.5 yards per game), and the Owls' 2003 squad ranked second in the country, racking up a school record of 3,800 rushing yards. In 2001, Wachenheim's direction enabled Rice to break the school record for points scored (333) and total offense (4,846 yards).

Prior to joining the Rice staff, Wachenheim served as recruiting coordinator, offensive tackles and tight ends coach at Utah State (1992-93). He culminated his tenure at the school with a Big West Conference title and a Las Vegas Bowl victory in 1993.

Wachenheim got his collegiate coaching career started in 1984. After graduating from the Air Force Academy with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, he served as offensive coordinator of the Air Force Academy's junior varsity squad. He then went on to complete his military requirements.

Wachenheim returned to the coaching ranks at Arkansas in 1989-90, helping the Razorbacks to a Southwest Conference championship and a Cotton Bowl invitation. Additionally, Wachenheim earned his master's degree in athletic administration from the school in 1991.

Wachenheim spent the 1991 football season at Colorado under the leadership of head coach Bill McCartney, helping the Buffaloes win the Big 8 Conference championship and earn a berth in the Blockbuster Bowl.

As a player, Wachenheim was a four-year starter (1980-83) on the offensive line at the Air Force Academy. He earned first-team All-Western Athletic Conference and honorable mention All-American honors his senior year. The 1983 Falcons finished with a 10-2 season record, were ranked second in the nation in rushing offense, and were tabbed as the nation's 13th-ranked team overall.

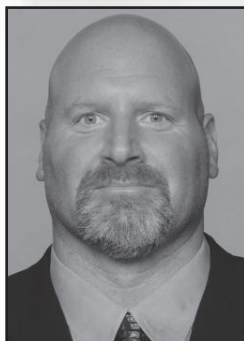

**EVAN MARCUS**  
**DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL TRAINING & PLAYER DEVELOPMENT**

Evan Marcus joined the Virginia football staff prior in 2011 as the program's Director of Football Training and Player Development. Marcus returned to the UVa program after spending the previous four years working in the National Football League. He served as UVa's head strength coach for four football seasons from 2003-06.



For the three years Marcus was the Miami Dolphins' head strength and conditioning coach. Prior to that he served in the same capacity with the Atlanta Falcons during the 2007 season. In those roles he managed the physical development of the team's players, including strength and conditioning, flexibility, nutrition, agility and speed improvement.

Marcus' four years at the NFL level allows him to bring some innovations and new approaches to the Cavalier program. Marcus started in the NFL as the assistant strength coach with the New Orleans Saints from 2000-02. He held assistant strength and conditioning posts on the collegiate level at Arizona State (1991-92), Rutgers (1993), Maryland (1994), Texas (1995-97) and Louisville (1998-99).

Marcus over saw a complete renovation of the strength and training room in the McCue Center during the spring of 2012 that doubled the amount of workstations for student-athletes and incorporated additional resources to facilitate more efficient workout routines. The area also received a complete makeover with new graphics and color schemes.

Marcus is a 1990 graduate of Ithaca College, where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree in exercise science. He lettered three times as an offensive tackle on the school's football team and was a starter on the 1988 NCAA Division III National Championship team. The native of Union, N.J., went on to earn his master's degree in higher education from Arizona State in 1992. Marcus and his wife, Lori, have a son, Jake, and a daughter, Anna.

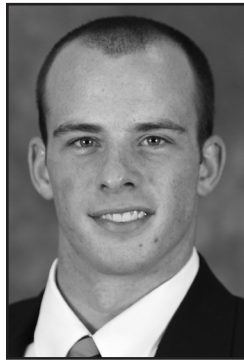
## JACOB HODGES

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Jacob Hodges is in his sixth season with the UVa football program and his first as a graduate assistant. He assists with the defense, primarily with the linebackers. Hodges is a three-year letterwinner for the Cavaliers after serving as the UVa holder from 2010-12. He joined the team in 2010 after spending his first two seasons on Grounds as a student manager for the 2008 and 2009 UVa football teams.

Between 2010 and 2012 Hodges appeared in 37 games and was the holder on every field goal and PAT attempt. He completed his only career collegiate pass on a fake field goal in 2010 against Maryland. Terrence Fells-Danzer took the pass 16 yards for a touchdown. Hodges also made three career rushes for 29 yards on fake field goal attempts. His career-long of 20 yards came on a Thursday night ESPN game at Miami in 2011.

Hodges graduated from Virginia in 2012 with a bachelor degree in history. The Stafford, Va., native is currently working on a masters degree in teaching from the Curry School.



## TOMMY REAMON, JR.

Tommy Reamon, Jr. is in his first season as a graduate assistant football coach at Virginia. He works with the offensive coaching staff and is carrying on a family tradition of coaching. His father, Tommy Reamon Sr., is a long-time high school coach in Newport News. He currently coaches at Landstown High School in Virginia Beach. Among the many former players that played for him was Virginia standout quarterback Aaron Brooks and current NFL quarterback Michael Vick.

Reamon played collegiate football at Old Dominion. He was a member of the school's first-ever recruiting class in 2008. He started his career at quarterback before switching to wide receiver and running back for his junior and senior seasons. During his three years with the Monarchs, ODU produced a 26-7 record and qualified for the NCAA playoffs twice.

Reamon graduated from Old Dominion in 2012 with a degree in recreation and tourism. He worked as a volunteer in the Cavalier football office during the 2012 season.



## JONATHAN LEWIS

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Jonathan Lewis is in his second season with the UVa football program after a five-year career in the NFL. He assists with the defensive line and helps prepare scouting reports for the coaches.

Lewis was a four-year letterwinner at Virginia Tech as a defensive tackle before being selected in the sixth round of the 2006 NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals. He also spent time with the Raiders, Jaguars and Seahawks.

The All-ACC performer appeared in 53 career games for the Hokies, starting 42, and amassing 203 career tackles. A native of Richmond, Va., Lewis was a US Army All-American while at Varina High School.

Lewis graduated from Virginia Tech in 2005 with a degree in residential property management. He and his wife, Tiffany Lewis, were married in 2010.



## MIKE SAINT GERMAIN

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Mike Saint Germain joined the Virginia football staff in the spring of 2012 as a graduate assistant coach. Saint Germain works with the offensive line and tight ends.

The past three years Saint Germain served on the football staff at Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa. He tutored the defensive line all three seasons and was promoted to a full-time position in the summer of 2011. He helped the Diplomats achieve back-to-back winning seasons in 2009 and 2010 and consecutive appearances in ECAC Bowl Games.

Saint Germain earned three varsity letters at Lafayette College, breaking into the starting lineup on the offensive line as a sophomore. That season, he helped clear the way to let the Leopards' amass over 200 yards per game on the ground. As a junior, Saint Germain was the only Leopard to start all 12 games on the offensive line. He earned All-Patriot League first team honors for a team that led the conference with 244.3 passing yards per game.

As a senior, Saint Germain started all 12 of Lafayette's games en route to a Patriot League Championship and NCAA playoff berth. He repeated as an All-Patriot first team and was named an All-ECAC first team choice and a first team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and CollegeSportingNews.com. The Associated Press and Football Gazette named him a third-team All-American.

Saint Germain started his coaching career at Morristown (N.J.) High School in 2007. At Morristown, Saint Germain worked with the Colonials' offensive and defensive lines, as well as tight ends, helping the 2007 team to a 9-2 record and playoff appearance.

A history major, Saint Germain graduated from Lafayette College in 2007. In 2008 he played for the Austin Wranglers in the Arena 2 Football League.
