Mem Gym: The Home Court Advantage of Virginia Volleyball

- One of the best college volleyball atmospheres in the nation
- Passionate fans can enjoy matches from an arm's length away. UVa played before capacity crowds three times last season
- Fans broke the attendance record twice in 2007
- Mem Gym served as the volleyball team's home court from 1979 to 1998 before a generous gift of more than \$1.5 million from an anonymous donor helped give the home court a facelift
- The team returned to a renovated home court at Memorial Gymnasium in the summer of 2003. Since returning to Mem Gym, the Cavaliers have posted a home record of 52-17
- Mem Gym played host to the 2004 ACC Volleyball Championships
- Won 200th match in Memorial Gymnasium in 3-2 victory over Virginia Tech in the 2008 season finale

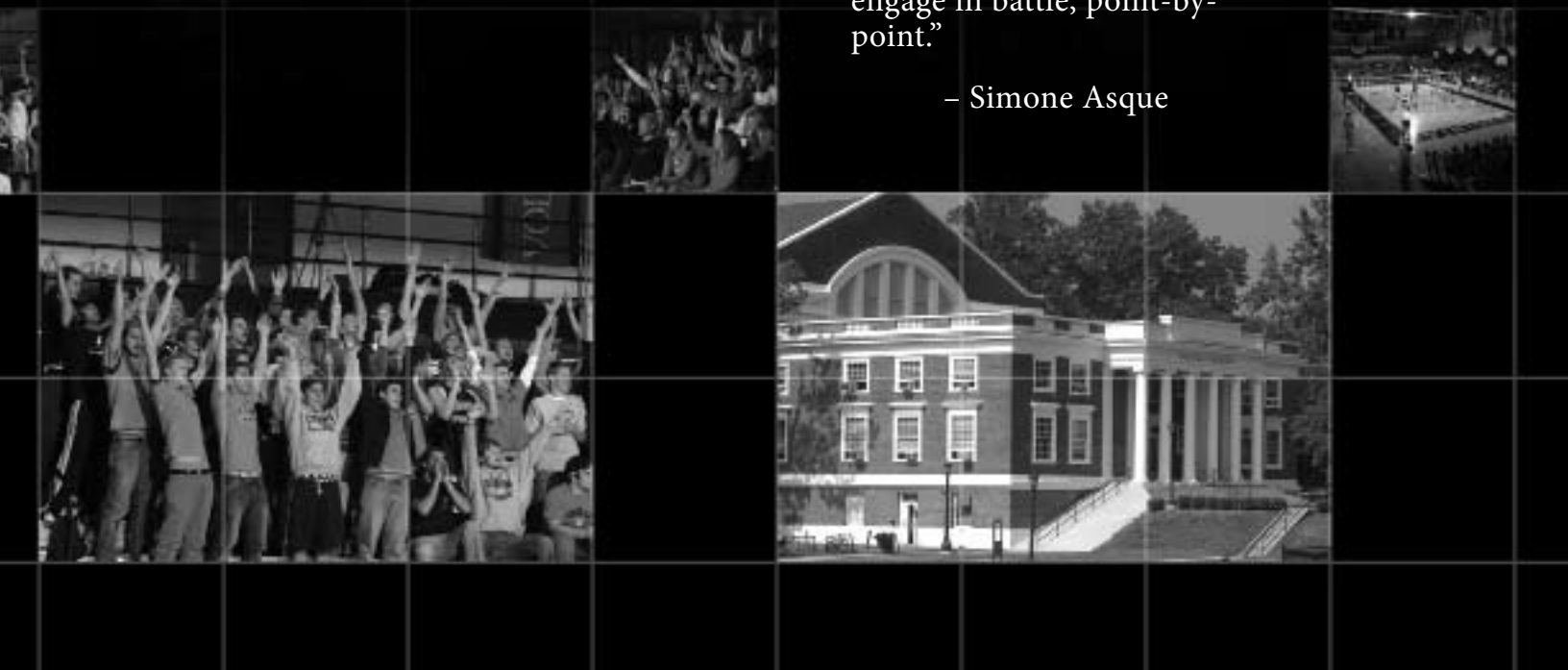

- Virginia athletics has made a commitment to having the best facilities in America. In recent years, the amenities for the Cavalier programs include:
- New state-of-the-art locker room that includes a player lounge and film study area
- Two redesigned weight rooms with the latest equipment
- John Paul Jones Arena, which houses the training table and academic center for all Cavalier student-athletes
- Newly constructed training room for the highest sports medicine care available
- Upgrades to practice and play facilities
- Virginia volleyball received a generous \$1 million gift from former player Amy Mitchell Griffin to exclusively fund operations for the program. The endowment has already helped in providing a facelift for the amenities at Mem Gym for the program

THE ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

- Volleyball made its debut in the ACC in 1980
- The ACC has had six AVCA All-Americans
- The conference has produced 24 Academic All-Americans, eight Region/District Freshman of the Year, and 13 Region/District Coaches of the Year
- A total of 165 student athletes have been selected to the All-Region/District team, while 74 have been honored on the All-Academic Region/District team
- Since the AVCA Coaches Poll was created in 1982, seven ACC schools have been ranked in at least one final poll
- The ACC has sent a team to the NCAA Championship round in three of the last five seasons

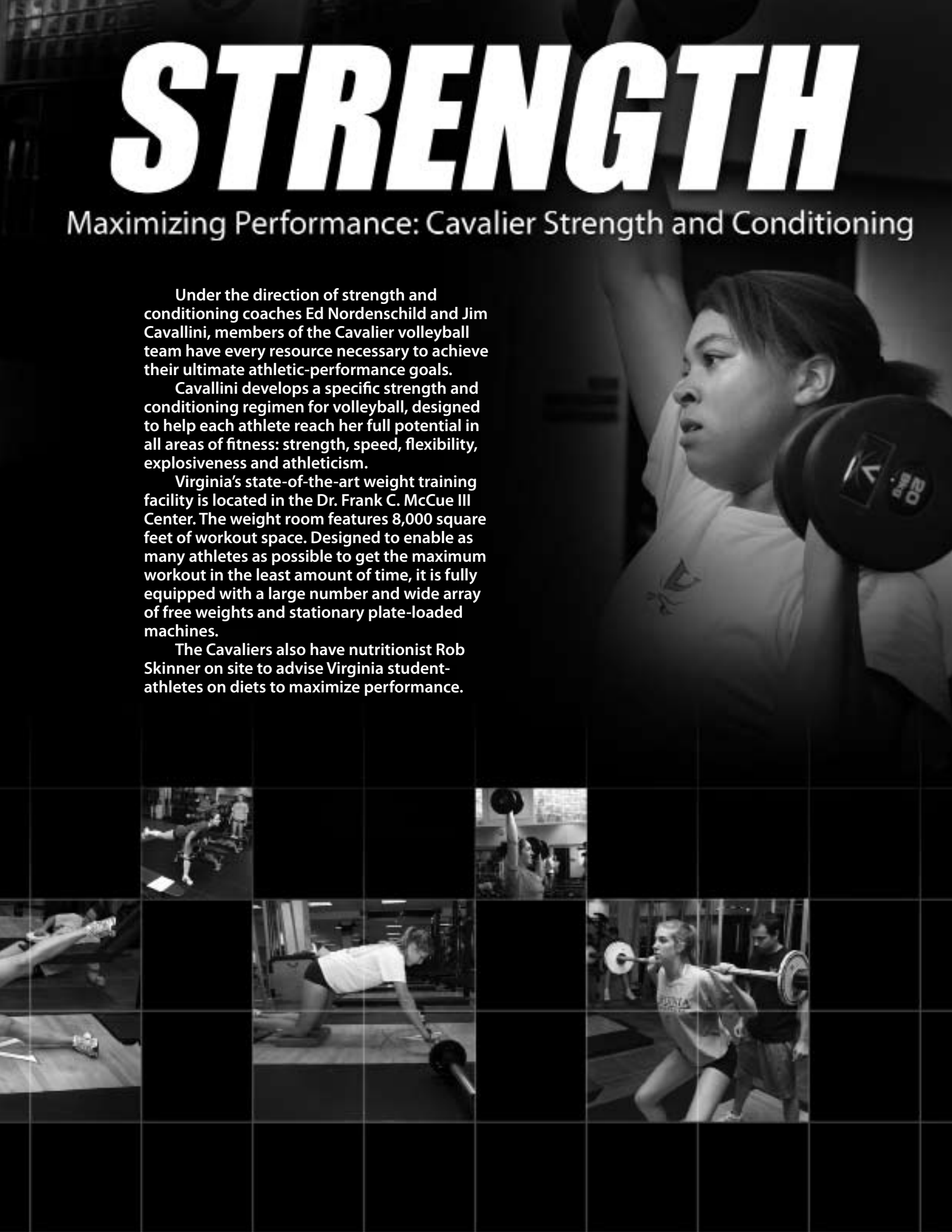
Maximizing Performance: Cavalier Strength and Conditioning

Under the direction of strength and conditioning coaches Ed Nordenschild and Jim Cavallini, members of the Cavalier volleyball team have every resource necessary to achieve their ultimate athletic-performance goals.

Cavallini develops a specific strength and conditioning regimen for volleyball, designed to help each athlete reach her full potential in all areas of fitness: strength, speed, flexibility, explosiveness and athleticism.

Virginia's state-of-the-art weight training facility is located in the Dr. Frank C. McCue III Center. The weight room features 8,000 square feet of workout space. Designed to enable as many athletes as possible to get the maximum workout in the least amount of time, it is fully equipped with a large number and wide array of free weights and stationary plate-loaded machines.

The Cavaliers also have nutritionist Rob Skinner on site to advise Virginia student-athletes on diets to maximize performance.



Preparing 'Hoos for Future Endeavors

- The Virginia volleyball program sees benefits in the classroom from the new academic affairs center in John Paul Jones Area. The 10,000 square-foot area is equipped with a large computer lab, private study rooms and a staff committed to providing the necessary support for academic achievement.
- Academic support begins with guidance for a successful transition to the University of Virginia. Retention programs are established to assist with the social, athletic and academic transition of first-year student-athletes.
- Among the programs established by the Academic Affairs staff are the Proactive Progress Program, study hall, tutoring, mentoring and individualized planning for every student-athlete.
- Virginia offers its diverse student body six undergraduate schools featuring more than 65 majors.
- UVA's scholarship student-athletes graduate at a significantly higher rate than the national Division I average.
- Virginia's 2005 NCAA graduation rate of 79 percent was second among Division IA public institutions.

For a University steeped in tradition and history, one of the great moments that occurs at Virginia is when graduates "Walk the Lawn" as part of Final Exercises. The tradition of the academic procession is more than 100 years old. In 1953, Virginia's graduation ceremonies moved to the current location on the spacious South Lawn. Each year since, tens of thousands of parents, guests, and faculty members watch as the 5,000-plus students proceed down the Lawn in a breathtaking rite of passage for the graduating students.

Another one of UVA's great traditions is "living on the lawn." Fourth-year students that have made significant contributions to student life through leadership, academics and a various range of extracurricular events are selected to live in one of the original student residences on the Lawn. In 2007, Cavalier volleyball standout Sarah Kirkwood was one of the students to receive this prestigious opportunity to live amidst Jeffersonian ideals.

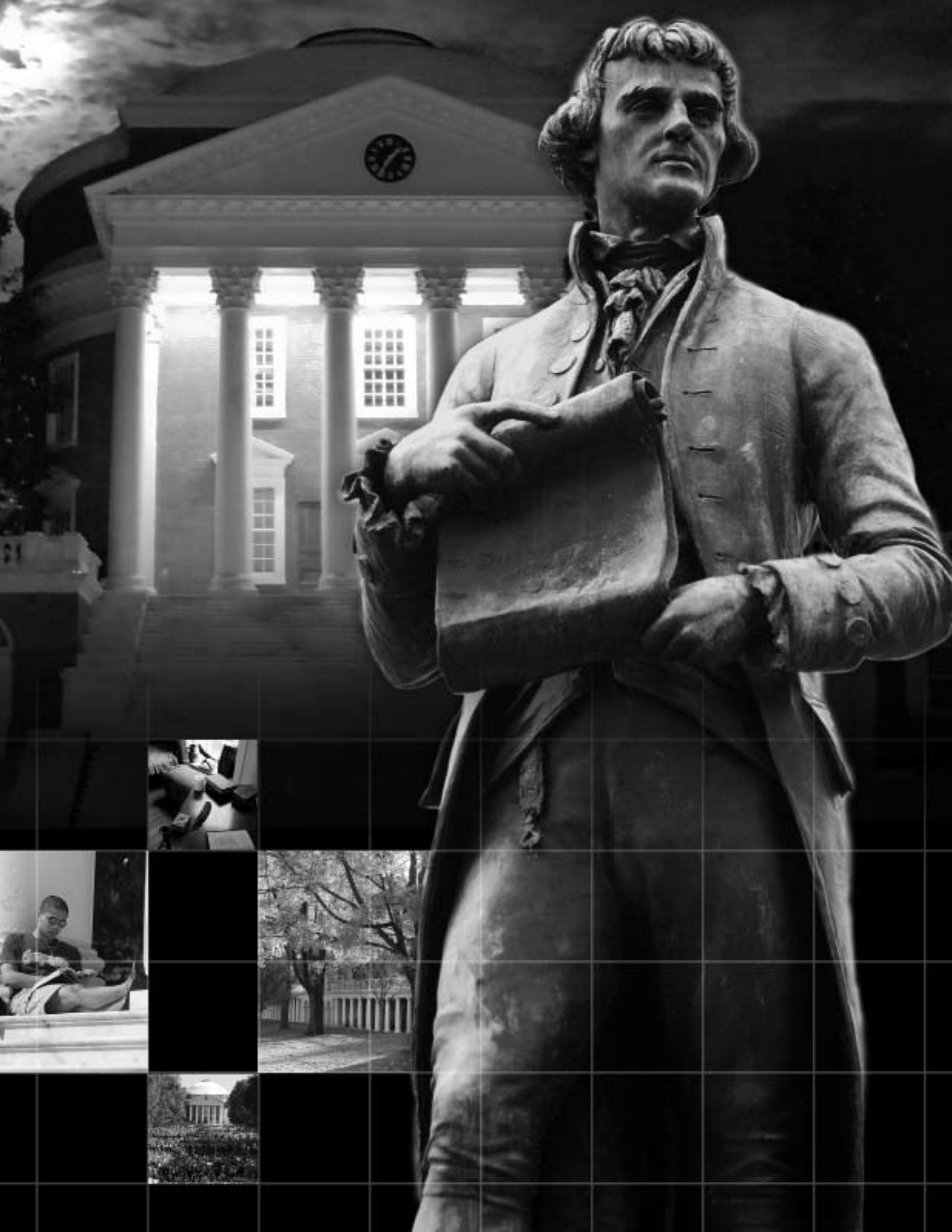
Kirkwood was an ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American and an All-ACC performer for the Cavaliers during her playing career.



Charlottesville is the **ULTIMATE** College Town

- The University of Virginia is located in historic Charlottesville, Va., where the scenic natural beauty of the Blue Ridge Mountains combines with a vibrant college community
- The University's "Corner" district feature restaurants and shops that cater to the UVA community and is a popular area for students. The tree-lined pedestrian walkway known as the Downtown Mall features coffee houses, outdoor cafes, an indoor ice-skating rink, a multiplex theater, pavilion and restaurants that have brought more people to the area for entertainment
- Charlottesville has been rated the No. 1 place to live in the U.S. by *Cities Ranked and Rated*. It is also rated as one of the nation's top cities by *Money Magazine*.
- Charlottesville is located close to several ski resorts and only a few hours from popular beach resort areas. It is also only 120 miles from Washington, D.C.
- Along with the Charlottesville area being home to three former Presidents: Thomas Jefferson, James Madison and James Monroe, the town was listed as one of America's Dozen Distinctive Destinations by the National Trust for Historic Preservation in 2007.
- Among the top groups that have performed in Charlottesville recently are the Rolling Stones and the Dave Matthews Band. U2 is scheduled to perform at UVA's Scott Stadium in October of 2009 and the Dave Matthews Band had two performances at the John Paul Jones Arena in April of 2009

Cavalier **PRIDE** and Wahoo Spirit

Many of the traditions held dear by Cavalier fans and alums originated with the excitement generated by Cavalier athletics teams.

The school colors – orange and blue – were proposed by Allen Potts, a member of the University's first football team in 1888.

The singing of the "Good Old Song" began in the 1890's to welcome back a victorious football team to Charlottesville and is still sung when the Cavaliers score, as well as at numerous other UVA athletic events and University-related functions.

Although the nicknames "Cavaliers," "Wahoos," and "'Hoos" have been used interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, the monikers have arisen under a variety of circumstances. The Cavalier nickname was inspired by a contest to choose a school fight song in the 1920's. While the song – The Cavalier Song – didn't stick, the nickname did.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two schools in the 1890's. Over time, "Wahoos" has come to refer to University students or events relating to them, and has been shortened to the more popular "Hoos" of recent years.

2009 SEASON OUTLOOK

CAVALIERS SEEK BREAKOUT YEAR

OUTSIDE HITTERS

- The outside hitters will be anchored by fourth-year Lauren Dickson. The team leader in kills for the past two seasons, Dickson is once again expected to be a force up front. She knocked down 307 kills to go with 324 digs and served up 37 aces, ranking fifth in the conference last year.
- Second-year Simone Asque should also be an impact player, providing a one-two punch for the Cavaliers from the outside. Asque started 20 matches and tallied 146 kills on the season, earning herself a spot on the ACC All-Freshman Team.
- Second-year Tess Udall will also be in the mix to help add some depth to the outside hitters. Udall, primarily a middle blocker last season, played in nine matches, landing two kills and collecting two blocks.
- From the right side, third-year Kendahl Voelker returns as the team's most efficient attacker. Hitting .221, Voelker landed 217 kills and collected 91 blocks last season.
- "Again, we are looking to Lauren to carry a big load for us as a passer and attacker," Maes said. "She has a well-developed skill set. Lauren has made nice strides in her attacking abilities by expanding her range and improving her efficiency. We expect her to provide consistency, stability and leadership on the court and be a positive difference-maker.
- "Gifted with wonderful athleticism, Simone has packaged it with refined skill. Now that she has a year under her belt, we are expecting a breakout season from her. With increased expectations, her role as one of our primary attackers has become even more prominent. Poise and efficiency will dictate the kind of season and success she will have.
- "Tess had a very productive spring. She is making the transition from middle blocker to outside hitter. That's not easy, because she has to assume a passing role and that requires time and reps, which her previous position didn't offer. Tess has demonstrated an ability to make changes. We feel Tess' versatility and new role will positively impact her and our team.
- "Kendahl is a very physical presence at the net as an attacker and blocker. She brings a lot of heat from the right side and she has improved her blocking techniques. Kendahl has made a concerted effort in minimizing her errors and improving her ball-control in the front row and back row. We look forward to her continued development and expect her to be a factor on the court."





DEFENSIVE SPECIALISTS

- Fourth-year Brittani Rendina returns to lead the squad in defense after starting every match last season at libero. In addition to leading the team in digs, Rendina ranked ninth in the ACC in digs per set, as she dug 516 attacks.
- Also returning to the back row is defensive specialist A.J. Cushman. The third-year played in all 32 matches last season, recording her 500th-career dig in the season finale against Virginia Tech. Also contributing from the end line, Cushman's 32 service aces earned her the 10th spot in the ACC.
- "Our defense is going to be relentless and cohesive," Maes said. "There are two purposes of defense, to stop the other team from scoring and to create offensive opportunities in transition. I feel that we have the type of players who have the mentality and skills to be able to give us one of the best defenses in the country."
- "Both A.J. and Brittani are going to be on the court for us. They are both going to impact the team with their passing and digging abilities. Every time they touch the ball, good things happen. They have an aggressive attack mentality and they want the ball. They are wonderful examples of how hard we have to work to be successful."

SETTERS

- With the loss of two setters from last year's squad, the Cavaliers have to quickly adjust to two new setters. A familiar face, Tara Hester has made the transition from outside hitter to setter, while Rachel Gray, coming off a successful high school career, will be expected to contribute right away.
- "With the loss of two setters from last year's squad, we have to quickly develop, immerse and acclimate our two new setters into our systems," Maes said. "We know both Rachel and Tara will diligently and relentlessly work to give our team every opportunity to be successful offensively."
- "With the lack of depth at this critical position, we addressed the concern by identifying one player on our team who we feel can make a transition to a new position quickly, competently and effectively. That player is Tara. She has a well-rounded skill set and has a good grasp of our systems. With excitement, Tara has assumed this new role and challenge. We look forward to her positive contributions as a setter, but also as an obligate teammate. She's really embraced the culture we've created and is engaged in helping herself and others constantly improve."
- "Rachel will make an immediate impact in our program. She is one of the top setting prospects in the country, evident by her wonderful athleticism and her ability to dynamically distribute the ball with touch and command. She brings to our team a very competitive mentality and a great work ethic. Anyone who has coached Rachel or played with her can attest that her achievements and accomplishments have been an embodiment of what 'blue-collar' truly means – achieving success through the merits of hard work and dependability. She has a cultivating presence on and off the court that our team will embrace."

MIDDLE BLOCKERS

- Third-year Sydney Hill returns after starting all 32 matches for the squad last season. Finishing the year first on the team and fifth in the ACC with 131 total blocks, Hill is expected to anchor the middle blockers this season.
- Alongside Hill will be second-year Hillary Trebels and newcomers Tobi Farrar and Jessica O'Shoney.
- Trebels saw action in 13 matches last season, collecting seven blocks, while Farrar and O'Shoney were two of the top middle blocker prospects in the country.
- Farrar and O'Shoney were the first two recruits of head coach Lee Maes' inaugural recruiting class that was recently ranked No. 15 in the nation. Both are very skilled and athletic players who will add another dimension to the program with their presence and physical abilities.
- "This position is arguably our strongest on the team with the fortune of having great depth and talent," head coach Lee Maes said. "It will be very competitive in determining who will start for us, but we know that will sort itself out."
- "As the veteran of the group, Sydney will have a great opportunity to lead our young corps of middle blockers. She has a nice grasp of our defensive systems and has diligently put in the effort to improve her physical abilities as a blocker and attacker. The key to Sydney's impact and contribution to our team will be for her to stay healthy and impart her experience."
- "Hillary has demonstrated wonderful growth as a player over the past year. It has been evident in her strength and conditioning and her performance on the court. We expect her improvements offensively and defensively to be exponential this season. She has a better understanding of what we want to do from a technical and systemic standpoint. Her development earned her an opportunity to play with the USA Junior National A2 Team this summer at the European Global Challenge. The international competition provided her valuable experience and preparation for this fall."
- "Tobi brings great size to our program. Being 6-3, she will provide a great physical presence as a blocker because of her ability to take away space above the net. Offensively she will be just as effective, as she is able to be a threat in front of the setter and behind off of one foot. She has added versatility to her game this season by mixing it up between the middle and right-side."
- "Jessica is a very dynamic and athletic player. With her abilities and her physical make up, she certainly plays bigger than her size. As a blocker, she's very agile and quick from antenna to antenna and as a hitter, she has the mobility to be able to spread the opposing block because of her speed and athleticism. She has a great jump and a fast arm. We expect her to be an efficient and productive offensive weapon for us."





HEAD COACH **LEE MAES**

Second-Year Coach Looks to Lead Cavaliers to New Heights

Lee Maes is in his second season as the head coach of the Virginia volleyball program. Maes came to Virginia after serving as the head women's assistant coach at Nebraska from 2005-2007. He also had stints with both the men's and women's programs at California and served as the head coach for USA Volleyball's Junior National A2 Program.

In his first season with the Cavaliers, Maes guided the program in its 1,000th contest. He saw Virginia win its 500th match in a victory over Maryland and his Cavaliers won their 200th all-time match in Memorial Gymnasium to close out the season – a 3-2 victory over in-state rival Virginia Tech.

In the meantime, Maes' and his staff worked diligently to bring the nation's finest recruits to Charlottesville. With his inaugural recruiting class, Maes made an immediate mark on the program, bringing in the Cavaliers' first-ever nationally ranked class. The trio of Tobi Farrar, Rachel Gray, and Jessica O'Shoney holds a No. 15 ranking among incoming freshman classes across the nation.

Maes' enthusiasm with the Virginia community is helping the Cavaliers become a player on the national scene. He has brought a wealth of experience to the program and is continuing to incorporate his philosophies and style on the court at Mem Gym.

"I'm passionate about volleyball and what I do," Maes said. "At my core, I'm an educator and a leader. It's reflected in my philosophy of making others around me better and more productive. I'm a 'nuts and bolt' type of person. Attention to detail and excellence will be fundamentally evident in everything we do."

Not only is Maes committed to bringing the best out of the Cavaliers on the court, he plans on helping team members be positive influences in the community and stressing continued success in the classroom.

"My mission is to offer duty and service to the University and its student-athletes with the understanding that I'm obligated to be the kind of role model that will help the student-athletes grow and prosper in a positive manner," Maes said.

During his three-year tenure at Nebraska, working with coach John Cook, the Cornhuskers compiled a 95-5 record, won the NCAA Championship in 2006, reached the NCAA Championship match in 2005 and the NCAA Regional finals in 2007. Nebraska was the Big 12 Conference Champions each of those three years and produced 13 American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-Americans, two national players of the year and a Honda-Broderick Award winner. The program also excelled academically. A total of six players were named Academic All-Americans and one received the NCAA's prestigious Top-Eight Award.

University of Virginia Director of Athletics Craig Littlepage is pleased to bring someone with Maes' experience in to coach the Cavaliers.

"We spent a lot of time talking with experts in the college volleyball community," Littlepage said. "One name was mentioned consistently and prominently in those conversations. That name was Lee Maes. We have confidence Coach Maes will build on a good foundation that's in place. His background in championship-level volleyball will be invaluable. He'll bring energy and enthusiasm to all aspects of UVa volleyball."

Maes was integral in helping recruit back-to-back classes that were rated among the top-five in the nation in his final two seasons at Nebraska, as well.

Cook says that Maes will be a great asset to the Cavalier program.

“Since Lee’s arrival, Nebraska has been on an incredible run over the last three years,” Cook said. “We are thankful for his hard work and effort in helping Nebraska volleyball reach the next level. One of Lee’s long-range goals was to become a head coach, and Virginia presented a great opportunity for him. They are very lucky to have him as their head coach, and it shows the commitment that Virginia is making to become a successful program.”

Before working at Nebraska, Maes was a member of the California women’s volleyball staff from 1998-2005. He served as the associate head coach from 2003-05 and was an assistant coach from 1998-2003. The Golden Bears reached the NCAA Tournament each of his last three seasons, a first for California since the late 1980s. He was involved in all aspects of the program, including on-court training and opponent scouting, and recruited a total of 11 All-Pac-10 Conference performers.

Maes’ first collegiate coaching position was as the head men’s volleyball coach at California from 1997-2000. In his first season, he led Cal to the Northern California Collegiate Volleyball League Conference championship and a national runner-up finish at the NIRSA Collegiate Club National Championship. That season culminated in Maes being honored as coach of the year. His men’s team recorded three straight top-five national finishes (1998-2000), amassing an overall record of 98-27. In 1998, he also served as the interim women’s head coach.

Maes also has extensive background at the national team level. He led the USA Girls’ Junior National A2 Team to a gold medal at both the 2007 European Global Challenge and the 2006 High Performance Championships. In 2004-05, Maes served as an assistant coach for the Women’s National Team staff that earned gold at the 2004 U.S. Open Championships. Maes also served as a coach for the USA Girls’ Youth National Team and the High Performance Team from 1994-2003.

In addition to his work at the national and collegiate levels, Maes directed the Golden Bear girls club volleyball team (Oakland, Calif.) from 1997-2004. As coach of the Forefront 18-1’s team, he developed and sent over 50 prospects on to the collegiate level. In 2003, his Golden Bear team won the 18-Open bronze medal at the Junior Olympic Championships. Maes also had a coaching stint with the Nike Ichiban club (Long Beach, Calif.) from 1993-97, where he helped train and develop current Olympians, Misty May-Treanor and Heather Bown. During that time period, the Nike Ichiban 18’s team won an unprecedented five consecutive Open medals at the Junior Olympic Championships, highlighted by winning the 18-Open National Title in 1996.

Maes began his coaching career as the head girls volleyball coach at Lakewood High School in Lakewood, Calif., from 1989-97. From 1993-97, he simultaneously worked as the head boys varsity coach at Edison High School in Huntington Beach, Calif.

Maes graduated from Long Beach State in 1994 with a bachelor’s degree in journalism and a minor in geography. He is a member of USA Volleyball and the American Volleyball Coaches Association.

Maes’ knows there will be challenges in growing the program, but he feels that he and his staff are in a great place to start on a successful journey towards reaching their goals for the Cavaliers.

“We tend to cite the fact that UVa was and is the ‘Home of Presidents, Scholars and Champions,’” Maes said. “It’s a

slogan our volleyball program works to identify with in regards to our efforts in establishing and providing a package that reflects why UVa is such an attractive draw. The package is filled with academic prestige, athletic excellence, outstanding coaches, cultural diversity, social and vibrant activity, endearing history, wonderful alumni reciprocation, temperate climate, beautiful setting and genuine kinship. It’s the sum of the parts that we believe will attract the finest student-athletes to UVa and be the impetus towards our charge to national prominence.”

Jill Kramer is in her second season as an assistant volleyball coach at the University of Virginia. She came to UVa from the University of Alabama, where she served as an assistant coach for two seasons and as the recruiting coordinator in her final season with the Crimson Tide.

Kramer made an immediate impact on the future of the Cavaliers' program in just her first season at Virginia. Coordinating all recruiting efforts, Kramer helped head coach Lee Maes bring the program its first-ever national ranked recruiting class, posting a No. 15 ranking on prepvolleyball.com.

During her time at Alabama, Kramer helped the Crimson Tide reach the NCAA Tournament for two-consecutive seasons, while tutoring two-time All-American Crystal Hudson. Kramer was instrumental in the Crimson Tide's success and was involved in all aspect of the program including on-court training, opponent scouting and recruiting. As the recruiting coordinator, Kramer brought in the first ranked recruiting class in the history of Tide Volleyball at No. 27 in the prepvolleyball.com poll.

Before Alabama, Kramer spent three seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Texas at San Antonio. The Roadrunners advanced to the Southland Conference tournament in each of her three seasons, and in 2005, the team advanced to the championship match.

While coaching at UTSA, Kramer also worked as co-director for Alamo Volleyball Club and coached the 17 & under team. She oversaw all player and coach development while Alamo grew to 26 teams and over 250 athletes. As a co-director of Alamo, 17 teams qualified for Junior Olympics, six of those teams earned medals and 12 players earned All-American Awards.

Kramer also has experience with USA Volleyball. She began her involvement in 2006 as an assistant to Maes with the USA Junior A-2 training camp and Red team. The team won the gold at the High Performance Championships that year. In 2007, Maes and Kramer teamed-up once again with the USA Junior A-2 team winning the gold medal at the Global Challenge in Pula, Croatia. Most recently, Kramer led the USA Youth A-2 team to a gold medal at the 2009 High Performance Championships. Kramer's USA teams have gone undefeated in her three years of working with the program, boasting a 20-0 record. For the past three years, she has coached at the USA Women's National Team tryouts in Colorado Springs.

Kramer began her coaching career in 1998 as an assistant for the under-16 national team of the Metroplex Volleyball Club, currently Texas Advantage, in Ft. Worth, Texas.

A collegiate volleyball player at Texas Christian University, Kramer, formerly Jill Pape, was a four-year letterwinner and team captain. She was a member during the inaugural season and a part of the first graduating class, as her 1999 senior class was TCU volleyball's first four-year group of players.

Kramer, a native of San Antonio, Texas, completed her bachelor of business administration degree in marketing from TCU in 2000. She married physiotherapist, Willem Kramer of The Netherlands in March of 2002. Willem and Jill have a bull mastiff named Copper.

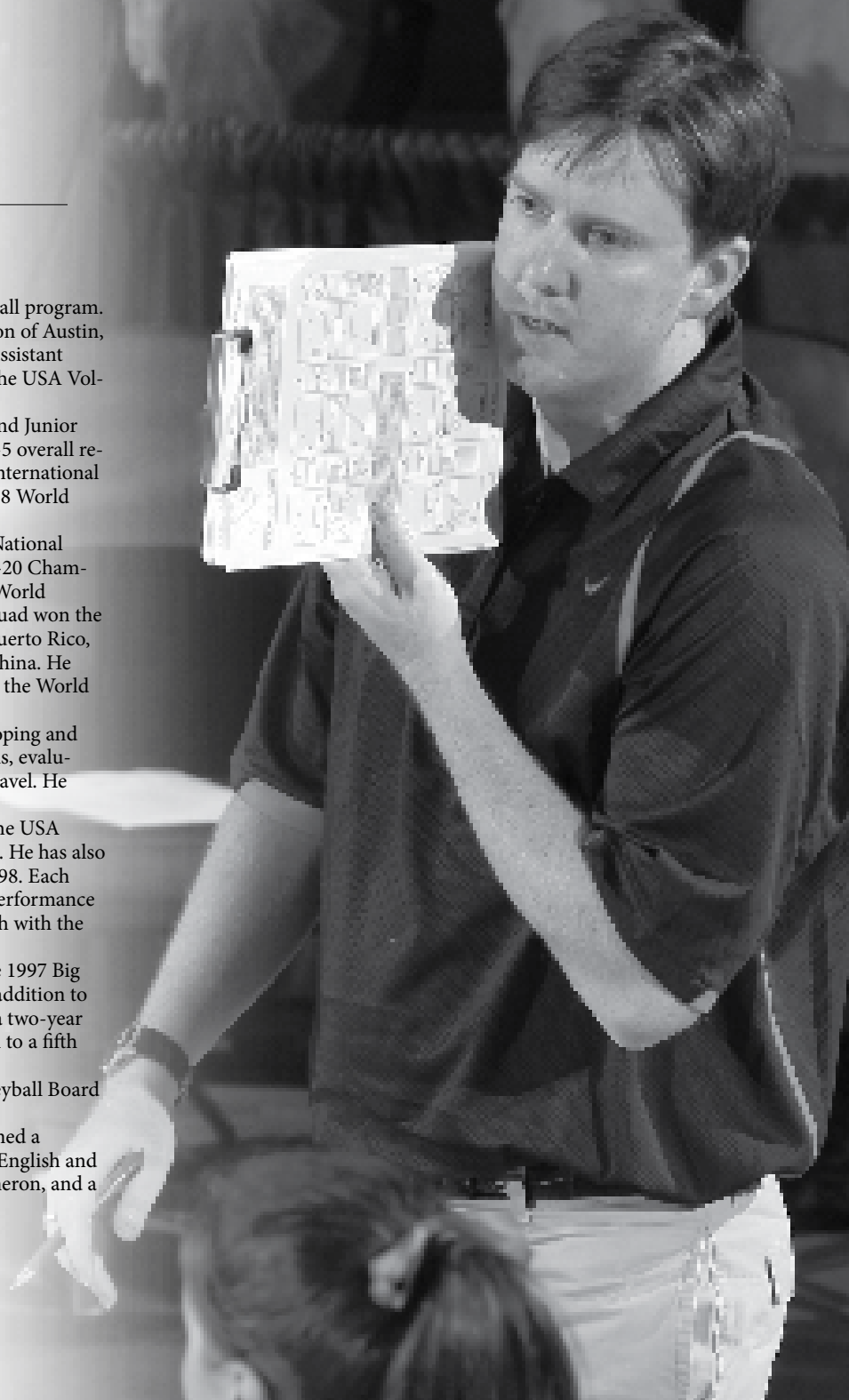

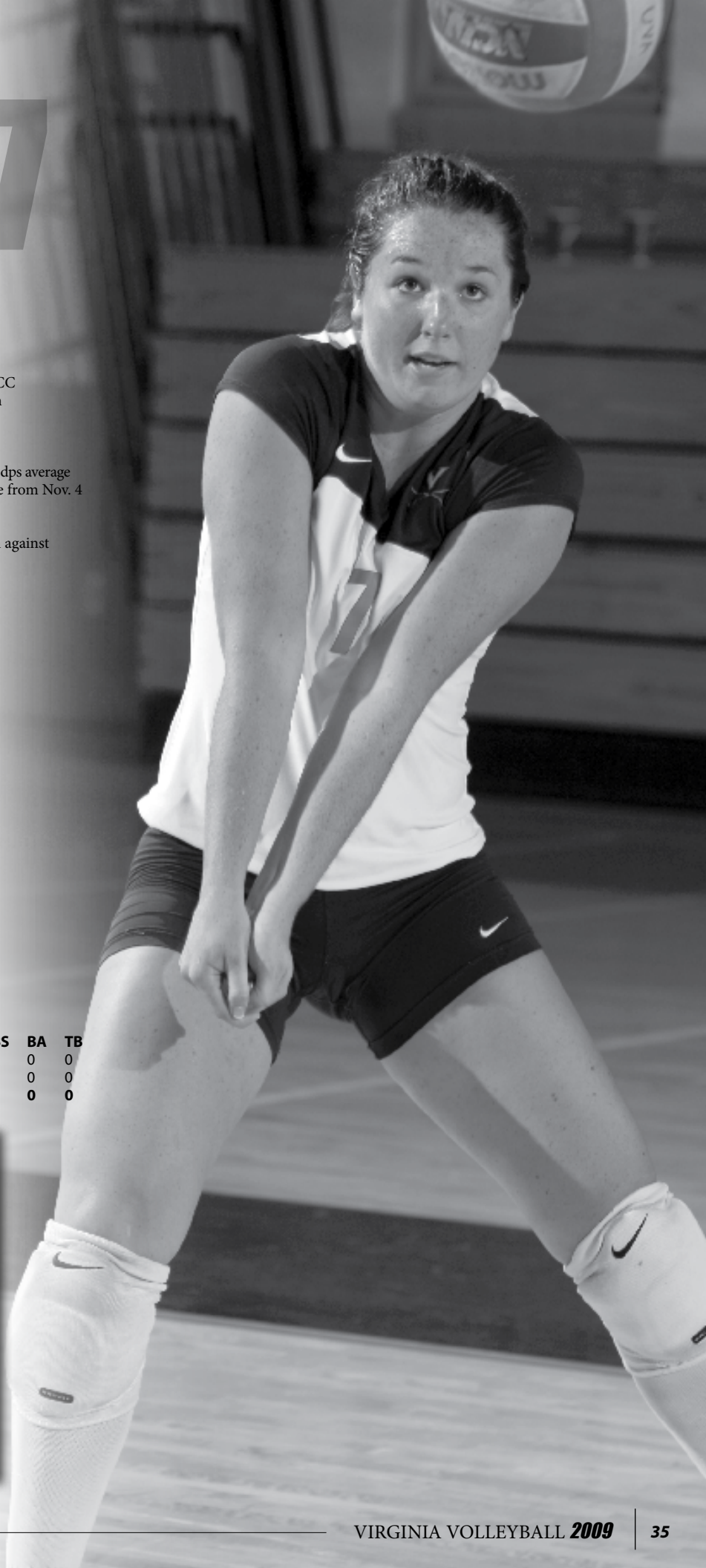

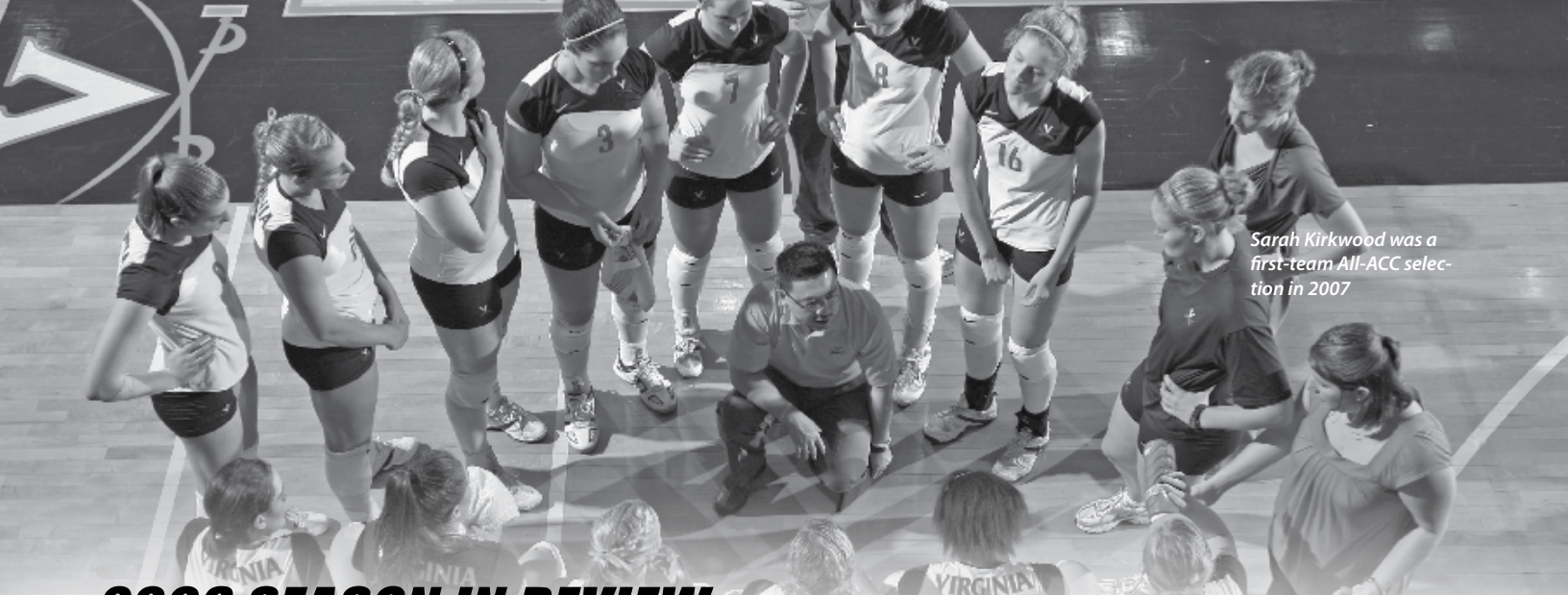

2008 SEASON IN REVIEW

The 2008 Cavaliers finished the season with an overall record of 17-15, including a 9-5 mark at home in Memorial Gymnasium. In head coach Lee Maes' inaugural season, the squad posted its first 3-0 start since 2003, as the Cavaliers won the JMU Days Inn Invitational, sweeping Murray State and New Hampshire and nabbing a decisive 3-1 victory over James Madison.

The team continued its tournament success in the Marriot Jefferson Cup, sweeping the field of VCU, Binghamton and Appalachian State to win the title for the fourth time in the past six seasons.

The Cavaliers also recorded the program's landmark 500th win with a victory over Maryland on Oct. 4 in College Park, Md., and capped off the season defeating in-state rival Virginia Tech, 3-0, to earn the program its 200th victory in Mem Gym.

Individually, Shannon Davis climbed her way onto five career records lists, breaking into the top ten in kills, hitting percentage, blocks solo, block assists and total blocks. Additionally, Marlow Bruneau claimed the number nine spot in school history for career assists with 1271.

In single season efforts, Brittani Rendina and Sydney Hill each made their way onto the all-time top-10 list, with Rendina earning the fifth-best dig mark, at 516, while Hill ranks sixth with 127 block assists.

The duo, in addition to Davis, also had top single match performances throughout the season. Rendina tied the fourth-best single-match performance for digs, collecting 38 against Duke, while Hill and Davis are tied for fifth in the block category. Hill turned away 10 Terrapin attacks on Oct. 4, while Davis blocked 10 at North Carolina on Oct. 10.

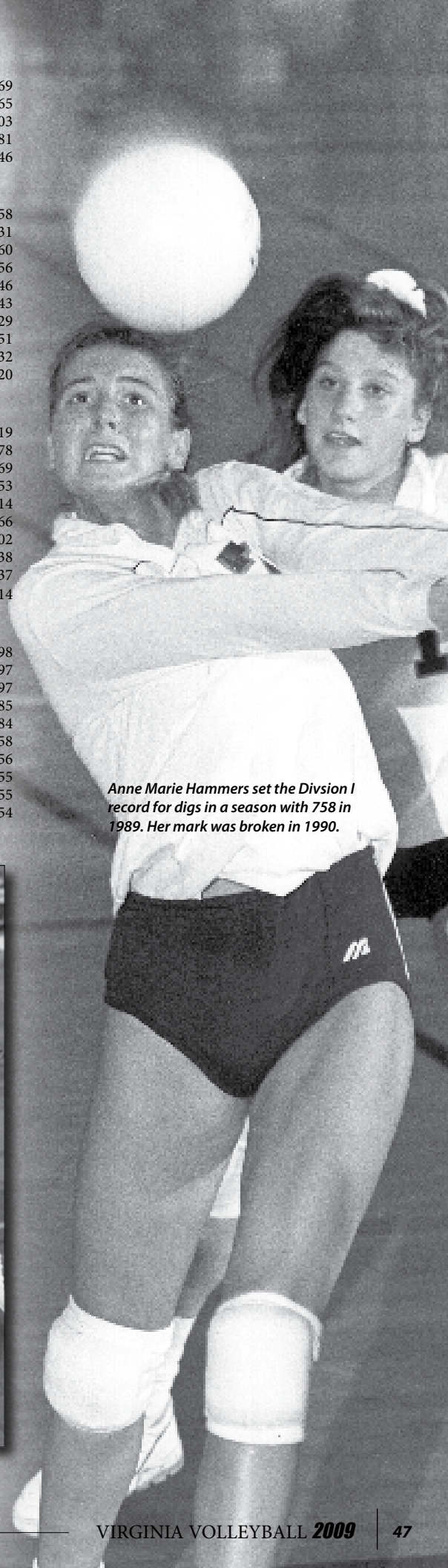

UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA ADMINISTRATION

JOHN T. CASTEEN III President, University of Virginia



Professor of English John Casteen became president of the University of Virginia in August 1990. As president, he has overseen a major restructuring of the University's administrative and governance structures, one of the largest capital funds campaigns ever undertaken, significant improvements in academic programs, and major expansions of the University's physical facilities. In this period, also, the University has been recognized for its leadership in educating minority students, for the quality of its undergraduate teaching, and for its success in refinancing itself following historic reductions in state tax support at the beginning of the decade.

After teaching English at the University of California (Berkeley) and the University of Virginia, Mr.

Casteen became Virginia's secretary of education in 1982. He served until 1985. While secretary, he directed reforms in both secondary and higher education, revamped Virginia's college desegregation efforts, and initiated programs of state support for research. From 1985 to 1990, he was president of the University of Connecticut.

In April 2007, Mr. Casteen was elected chairman of Universitas 21, a global educational consortium. He has been a director of the American Council on Education, a director of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, trustee and chair of the College Entrance Examination Board, commissioner of the Education Commission of the States, member of the Board of Control for the Southern Regional Education Board, commissioner of the New England Board of Higher Education, and chair of the Association of Governing Board's council of presidents. From 1991 to 1993, he chaired the National Board on Oceans and Atmosphere.

In 1997, Casteen completed a term as chair of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) as well as a term as president of SACS. In 2000-2002, he chaired the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA). He recently completed a term as chair of the Association of American Universities (AAU). Mr. Casteen is currently a member of AAU's Institutional Data Committee.

Mr. Casteen's business career has included service as director of Connecticut Bank and Trust Company (CBT) in 1986-1989-CBT was acquired by Fleet Bank, and as a member of CBT's audit and corporate responsibility committees; as a director of the New England Education Loan Marketing Corporation (Nellie Mae) and the successor foundation (1988-1997 and 2000), and as a member of Nellie Mae's executive committee; as a director of Sallie Mae (1999-2004), following the sale of Nellie Mae to SLMA, Inc.; as a director of Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Connecticut, Inc., now a component of Anthem (1989-1990, resigned to move to Virginia), as a member of the audit and medical affairs committees, and as a director of Calico, a wholly owned subsidiary providing employee life insurance services for client corporations; as a director of the College Construction Loan Insurance Association (Connie Lee) and a member of the finance committee (1993-1997)-Connie Lee was acquired by AmBac in 1997; as a director of Allied Concrete Company, Charlottesville (1995-1998); as a director of Jefferson Bankshares, Inc. and Jefferson National Bank and a chair of the executive compensation committee (1990-1997)-JBI was acquired by Wachovia in 1997; a director of the old and new Wachovia Corporation (1997-present), member and chair of its audit and compliance committees, and subsequently member and chair of the audit committee of the new corporation formed by the merger of Wachovia and First Union, currently serves on audit committee. He is a newly elected member of the Board of Trustees of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation and chair of the Jefferson Science Associates, LLC.

Casteen was named the Outstanding Virginian of 1993. The state conference of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) presented its Jackson Davis Award to him in December 1993. In February 1996, he received the doctor honoris causa from the University of Athens in Greece. In 1998, he was named the University of Virginia's outstanding alumnus of the year. In December 1998, he was awarded the Gold Medal of the National Institute of Social Sciences. In November 2002, Mr. Casteen was selected as the inaugural recipient of the Higher Education Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention's Presidents Leadership Group Award. The Virginia Society of the American Institute of Architects selected Mr. Casteen as the recipient of the Architecture Medal for Virginia Service in 2004.

Mr. Casteen writes short fiction as well as essays and papers in medieval literature, bibliography, and public policy. A collection of his short stories received the 1987 Mishima Award for fiction.

Mr. Casteen holds three degrees in English from the University of Virginia (B.A. with high honors in 1965, M.A. in 1966, and Ph.D. in 1970). He served as UVa's dean of admissions from 1975 to 1982. Born and raised in Portsmouth, Va., he is married to Betsy Foote Casteen. They have five children.

CRAIG LITTLEPAGE Athletics Director



Committed to preserving and building on UVa's longstanding tradition of academic and athletic excellence, Craig Littlepage is in his sixth year as Virginia's Athletics Director. He was named to that post by University President John T. Casteen III at a press conference on August 21, 2001.

Before becoming the University's ninth A.D., Littlepage served as interim athletics director beginning June 1, 2001, following the retirement of former athletics director Terry Holland who became a special assistant to Casteen. Littlepage also served as interim athletics director at Virginia from December of 1994 to July of 1995, while a search was conducted to replace former UVa athletics director Jim Copeland.

The first African-American athletics director in Atlantic Coast Conference history, Littlepage was named the Black Coaches Association's "Athletics Administrator of the Year" in 2003 and 2006. He was also listed on Sports Illustrated's list of the 101 most influential minorities in sports in 2003 and 2004. In March of 2005, Littlepage was named one of *Black Enterprise Magazine's* "Most Powerful African-Americans in Sports."

Littlepage has been a member of UVa's athletics administration since 1990. He served six years (1995-2001) as senior associate director of athletics, managing all aspects of the athletics department's day-to-day operations. Before that, he spent four years as associate director of athletics for programs. He originally joined Virginia's athletics administrative staff in 1990 as an assistant athletics director.

The 56-year-old Littlepage presides over a vibrant 25-sport athletics program that regularly vies for state, conference and national titles in many sports. At the same time, Cavalier student-athletes graduate at a rate comparable to the student body as a whole. Annually, UVa student-athletes rank among the top Division I-A public universities in the country in graduation rates.

Five years ago, Littlepage outlined a number of ambitious 10-year goals for the department to be achieved by 2012: graduate 100 percent of its student-athletes; win 12 national championships and 70 conference titles; fully endow all scholarships and provide the operational support required to meet all other stated goals; build and maintain high-quality facilities; annually recruit the best student-athletes in the country (based on how coaches rate their top prospects); and fully comply with Title IX.

Such goals reflect Littlepage's vision of "uncompromised excellence in intercollegiate athletics" as well as the department's overall mission to "enhance and support the intellectual purpose of the University and its exemplary academic standards and traditions."

Littlepage has held many leadership roles within the NCAA, ACC and University-at-large. In February of 2002, he was appointed to the 10-member Division I Men's Basketball Committee by the NCAA Championship/Competition Cabinet and served a five-year term which was completed Aug. 31, 2007. In 2005-06, Littlepage served a one-year stint as the chair of the Men's Division I Basketball Committee and administered a selection process that produced one of the most exciting tournaments in NCAA basketball championship history.

Littlepage previously was a member of the NCAA Division I Infractions Committee and the NCAA Academics, Eligibility and Compliance Cabinet, serving on the Recruiting and Student-Athlete Reinstatement Subcommittees. He chaired the Reinstatement Subcommittee in 1999-2000.

Littlepage is a member of the Associate Faculty for the University's Center for Alcohol and Substance Education, and participates in various alcohol and drug prevention/education conferences. He also served the NCAA on committees that studied sports wagering, postgame crowd control, basketball issues, and the College Basketball Partnership and also participated as a presenter to the NCAA's Ethnic Minority Male Institute. He has previously chaired the ACC Student-Athlete Welfare Committee, the ACC Men's and Women's Swimming/Diving Committees, and the ACC Men's Soccer Committee; and he currently is the chairman of the ACC Women's Basketball Committee, and the ACC Committee on Awards. He also has been active in the local community, having served on the Board of Directors for the Charlottesville Ronald McDonald House and serving as a Trustee with the Mount Zion Baptist Church. He is also on the Board of Trustees at Saint Anne's Belfield School.

Before beginning his career in athletics administration, Littlepage served two stints as an assistant coach with the Cavalier men's basketball program, from 1976 to 1982 and from 1988 to 1990.

Littlepage held head coaching positions at Pennsylvania (1982-85) and at Rutgers (1985-88) before returning to Virginia. While he was at Penn, the Quakers won the Ivy League championship and participated in the 1985 NCAA Tournament. Littlepage was an assistant basketball coach at Villanova for two years and at Yale for one year before joining the UVa basketball program as an assistant coach in 1976. The LaMott, Pa., native earned his Bachelor's degree in Economics from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania in 1973. He was a member of three Ivy League basketball championship teams at Penn and was instrumental in the Quakers' drive to three consecutive NCAA Eastern Regional playoff appearances.

Jon Oliver is in his ninth year at Virginia. His primary responsibility is oversight of the day-to-day operations of the athletics department. Oliver is the administrative liaison for football and men's basketball and he has senior staff administrative oversight responsibilities for Academic Affairs, Equipment Room Operations, Human Resources, Facilities and Game Operations, Lifeskills, Marketing and Promotions, Sports Medicine, Sports Nutrition, Strength and Conditioning and Video Services. Oliver was the athletics department point person for the John Paul Jones Arena project completed in 2006 and serves as the Department's representative on all major facility projects.

Before coming to UVa, Oliver spent the previous six years involved in various aspects of athletic administration at Washington State. Oliver ended his tenure at WSU as the associate athletics director for external affairs and prior to that served as the associate athletics director for finance and facilities development, the assistant athletics director for business and compliance and the director of compliance.

Oliver earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Boise State in 1994 and his law degree from the Idaho School of Law in 1997.

Oliver is a former member of the University of Idaho Law School Advisory Board and served on the NCAA's Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee. He is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the Black Coaches Association. He is a past president of the Idaho Sports Law Association and a former member of the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association.

He and his wife, November, have a son, Dante, and two daughters, Ariana and Mia.



Jane Miller
Senior Associate
Director of Athletics
for Programs

A 26-year veteran of the Virginia athletics department, Jane Miller has served as the senior associate director of athletics for programs since 2001.

Previously, Miller was the associate athletics director for programs/senior women's administrator.

Miller serves on the University Calendar Committee, Admissions Committee and Judicial Review Board. She is a member of the NCAA Division I Championships/Sports Management Cabinet, the Chair of the ACC Women's Lacrosse and Equity Committees, and is a member of the ACC Women's Basket-

ball Committee, Men's Lacrosse Committee and Student-Athlete Welfare Committee.

Head coach of the UVa women's lacrosse team for 12 seasons, Miller resigned her coaching duties in 1995 for a full-time administrative role. She retired as the winningest coach in UVa women's lacrosse history, compiling a record of 145-44, including two national championships and six Final Four appearances. She was elected to the Virginia chapter of the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 1996, the New England chapter of the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 2000 and the U.S. Lacrosse National Hall of Fame and Oliver Ames High School Hall of Fame in 2003.

A native of Easton, Mass., Miller graduated from Northeastern University in 1973 and was elected to her alma mater's Hall of Fame in 1983. She was a three-sport standout at Northeastern in basketball, field hockey and lacrosse.

Miller is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. In May 1999, she received the Woman of Achievement Award from the UVa Women's Faculty and Professional Association and in 2009 she received the President's Award for Exemplary Service to the ACC.

Dirk Katstra is in his 14th year as executive director of the Virginia Athletics Foundation and his sixth year as associate athletics director for external affairs with the athletics department.

In June 2004, Katstra was named Fundraiser of the Year by the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD) in recognition of his outstanding leadership and success in fundraising on behalf of Virginia athletics.

The annual campaign supports student athletes in all 25 sports programs in the form of scholarships, summer school, academic affairs and operational costs. The foundation is also responsible for all fund raising efforts for endowments for scholarships and operating costs. 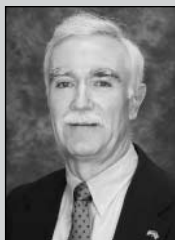
