FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Saturday's game serves as UVa's sixth all-time contest against a school from the state of Indiana. The Cavaliers own a 3-2 record against the state. Indiana (2-0), Purdue (1-1) and Notre Dame (0-1).
- Punter Alec Vozenilek's 77-yard punt against Pitt is the longest in the ACC this season, the fourth-longest in the NCAA this season and the fourth-longest in UVa history.
- UVa's defense is No. 1 in the nation in three-and-outs with 8.5 per game and is No. 5 in the nation in third down defense, allowing a 23.9 percent success rate by opponents.
- UVa is No. 4 in the nation in team passing efficiency defense (82.84).
- Brent Urban is No. 24 in the nation in passes defended per game (1.5) & leads all defensive linemen. Urban is tied for the national lead in passes defended by a non-defensive back (Terrance Bullitt - LB - Texas Tech).

VIRGINIA AND BALL STATE SQUARE OFF FOR THE FIRST TIME

- Virginia and Ball State will play for the first time in football on Saturday.
- Ball State, located in Muncie, Ind., is located 62 miles northwest of Indianapolis.
- The Cardinals are playing in the commonwealth of Virginia for second time in program history and for the first time since a 1975 victory at Richmond (25-14).
- Saturday's game will be Ball State's fifth all-time game against a team from the commonwealth of Virginia. Ball State has played James Madison (1997), Liberty (2010) and Richmond (1974, 1975).

VIRGINIA VS. THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

- Virginia is 10-1-1 all-time against teams that currently represent the Mid-American Conference.
- UVa is 2-0 vs. Akron, 2-0 against Buffalo, 1-0 against Central Michigan, 1-0 against Eastern Michigan, 1-0-1 against Miami (Ohio), 1-0 against Ohio and 2-1 against Western Michigan.
- The Cavaliers have never faced the MAC's Bowling Green, Kent State, Northern Illinois or Toledo.
- Virginia is scheduled to host Kent State on Sept. 27, 2014.

VIRGINIA STEPS OUT OF ACC PLAY

- Virginia will play its final non-conference game this weekend; UVa is 2-1 thus far in non-league play.
- UVa has won its last six October non-conference games.
- Five of those wins came in Charlottesville; the lone road contest was a victory at Middle Tennessee in 2007.
- The Cavaliers' last loss out of conference in October was Oct. 7, 2006, a 31-21 defeat at East Carolina.
- Virginia last played a non-conference game in October in 2011 when the Cavaliers beat Idaho, 21-20, in overtime.

UVa'S DEFENSE PERFORMING AT A HIGH LEVEL

- Virginia's defense has produced back-to-back efforts that resulted in limiting VMI (79) and Pitt (199) to less than 200 yards of total offense. UVa hasn't accomplished that feat in back-to-back weeks since 1972.
- When the feat was last done in 1972, UVa held Vanderbilt to 188 total yards and VMI to 122 total yards.
- The Cavaliers are allowing only 139.0 yards per game over the last two games, including 49 total rushing yards (24.5 yards per game).
- UVa's defense leads the nation with 8.5 three-and-outs per game. Its third-down defense ranks No. 5 nationally, allowing a .239 success rate by opponents.
- UVa is No. 8 nationally in passing yards allowed (152.8) and No. 4 in team passing efficiency defense (82.84).
- The Cavaliers are ranked No. 16 nationally in total defense (332.7). Excluding the Oregon game, UVa is allowing its opponents an average of 213.3 total yards per game and 2.97 yards per play.
- UVa is No. 10 nationally in sacks with 3.25 per game.
- UVa has registered at least three sacks in three of its four games.
- Virginia had seven sacks at Pitt, the most in a game by UVa since registering nine against Duke in 2006.
- DT Brent Urban had four tackles for a loss at Pitt, the most by a Cavalier since Chris Long had five at Maryland in 2007. The 4.0 tackles for a loss is tied for second-most in the nation this year.
- Urban is No. 1 in the nation among defensive linemen with 1.5 pass breakups per game. His mark is tied for No. 23 overall and tied with Texas Tech's Terrance Bullitt (LB) for the most by a non-defensive back.
- Freshman OLB Max Valles made his first career start at Pitt and in his second career game collected 2.5 sacks.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

On each Monday during the football season, the UVA Athletics Media Relations office will conduct a weekly football press conference, attended by head coach Mike London and selected student-athletes. London will field questions beginning at 3 p.m. and student-athletes will begin interviews at 3:30 p.m. Snacks will be served.

Quotes from the Monday press conference will be posted on VirginiaSports.com Monday afternoon.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Players are available for interviews each Monday, depending on class schedules. If you have specific player interview requests, they should be directed to Vincent Briedis in the UVA Athletics Media Relations office by Noon Sunday.

Requested defensive players and defensive coaches will be available for telephone interviews Tuesday, while offensive players and offensive coaches will be available Wednesday.

No player or coach interviews will be arranged after Wednesday during game week.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Coach London will hold his postgame press conference in the media room, while requested players and assistant coaches will be brought to the media room to meet with media representatives after London. UVA athletics media relations personnel will take player requests during the fourth quarter of each game.

Virginia's locker room is closed to media following games, both at home and on the road.

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

ACC INJURY GUIDELINES

On each Monday during the season, ACC schools will announce any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

BALL STATE CONNECTIONS WITH VIRGINIA

- Ball State defensive line coach Chad Wilt has enjoyed two stints at UVA. Wilt was first a graduate assistant for the Cavaliers in 2004 and 2005 during UVA's MPC Computers Bowl and Music City Bowl teams.
- After three successful seasons at Liberty (2006-08), Wilt returned to Grounds as Al Groh's defensive line coach for the 2009 season. During 2009 Wilt helped mentor current NFL players Nate Collins (Bears) and Matt Conrath (Rams). Collins was a first-team All-ACC honoree during his lone season under Wilt.
- Current UVA offensive line coach Scott Wachenheim coached with Wilt for three seasons at Liberty on then-coach Danny Rocco's staff. Wachenheim was the offensive coordinator and Wilt was the special teams coordinator.
- Four other members of Ball State's coaching staff have also spent time in the commonwealth of Virginia. Head coach Pete Lembo was an assistant for one season at Hampden-Sydney. Jay Bateman (DC/ILB) has spent time at Hampden-Sydney and Richmond. Justin Lustig (ST/RB) has spent time at Christopher Newport and Shannon Morrison (DBs) also coached at Hampden-Sydney.

- Five Cavaliers made their first career starts against BYU on Aug. 31.

UVA BOASTS THREE FORMER FBS/FCS HEAD COACHES ON MIKE LONDON'S STAFF

- There are 18 FBS schools with at least one Canadian.

FIVE STUDENT ASSISTANTS HELP STAFF, INCLUDING JACOB RAINEY

- Virginia has five student assistants currently on staff.
- Pablo Alvarez, Adam Caplinger and Tim Cwlna will not play due to medical reasons in 2013.
- Due to offseason surgery, Sean Cascarano is currently not participating and also helping out as a student assistant.
- Also on that list of student assistants is Jacob Rainey, a freshman who will assist offensive coordinator Steve Fairchild with the quarterbacks.
- Jacob Rainey, a quarterback from Woodberry Forest in Virginia, had his right leg amputated after a freak injury in a scrimmage in 2011.
- Rainey suffered a dislocated right knee, but while he was hospitalized the news got far worse. An artery in his lower right leg had been severed, cutting off circulation. Over the next week, Rainey underwent four surgeries as doctors tried to save his leg. They were unsuccessful.
- A week after Rainey was tackled on a routine play, doctors amputated his right leg above the knee.
- As word of Rainey's ordeal spread, he was inundated with letters and gifts from well-wishers, including Alabama football coach Nick Saban, Green Bay Packers linebacker Clay Matthews and current New England Patriot Tim Tebow, who was quarterback for the Denver Broncos at the time.
- Tebow reached out to Rainey and wanted to meet in person. On Dec. 24, Rainey, along with his father and older brother, attended the Broncos' game in Buffalo as Tebow's guests.
- Rainey's experience and inspiring story was documented an episode of ESPN's series E:60.
- The Woodberry Forest quarterback returned to the field in 2012 and played with a prosthetic leg, throwing two touchdowns on nine passes.

SEASON CAPTAINS FOR 2013

- Seniors Luke Bowanko, Jake Snyder and Rijo Walker have been selected by their peers as captains of the 2013 football season.

NOTING THE UVA SCHEDULE

- UVa has eight home games on the schedule for the first time in program history.
- UVa played one of the toughest opening two weeks in FBS football, hosting BYU and No. 2 Oregon.
- According to Phil Steele, UVa's overall schedule entering 2013 is No. 27 in the nation for toughest and No. 2 in the ACC, behind only Pitt (24).

FIVE CAVALIERS COMPETING AS POST GRADUATE STUDENTS

- There are five Cavaliers that are graduate students at UVa this fall.
- (OG/C) Luke Bowanko, (FB) Billy Sckrobacz, (WR) Tim Smith, (DE) Jake Snyder and (PK) R.C. Willenbrock already hold their undergraduate degrees.
- Bowanko, Sckrobacz, Smith and Snyder all walked "The Lawn" May 2013 as graduates of UVa.
- Willenbrock earned his undergraduate degree in 2013 at Dartmouth and came to UVa for graduate school.

YOUTH AT THE QUARTERBACK POSITION

- Virginia is one of four FBS programs in the country that entered the 2013 season without any quarterbacks on its roster that played at all in 2012. Starter David Watford and backups Greyson Lambert and Matt Johns all redshirted in 2012, while the other two quarterbacks on the roster, Brendon Marshall and Andrew Mackay, are true freshman.

HAMM AND PARKS HAVE CAREER DAYS VS. VMI

- True freshman walk-on Daniel Hamm (136) and junior Kevin Parks (135) became the 28th rushing duo in UVa history to each rush for at least 100 yards in a game when the pair did so against VMI.
- Parks set a career-high with 204 all-purpose yards (69 receiving).
- While both players recorded career highs rushing, it was Hamm who stole the show. His 136 rushing yards broke Parks' (114) previous UVa record for rushing yards in a collegiate debut. Parks set his standard as a redshirt freshman against William & Mary in 2011.
- The VMI game was the first time Virginia had two players eclipse the 100-yard barrier since 2005 vs. Temple (Jason Snelling and Wali Lundy).
- The VMI game was also the first time UVa had a pair of running backs each score two rushing touchdowns in a game since 2005 vs. Temple (Jason Snelling and Wali Lundy).

TIGHT ENDS WERE WORK HORSES AGAINST OREGON

- Virginia's tight ends had 12 of the team's 31 receptions in the Cavaliers' loss to Oregon.
- Jake McGee (8) and Zachary Swanson (4) had career highs in the game.
- Rob Burns, who also sees significant reps at the position, did not have a catch.
- None of the three players started their careers at UVa as a tight end. Burns was at defensive end, Swanson at fullback and McGee was a quarterback.

"SMOKE SIGNALS" - UVA'S FIRST FIVE-STAR RECRUIT SINCE 2005

- Virginia freshman running back Taquan Mizzell is UVa's first five-star recruit since 2005 when offensive guard and current Jacksonville Jaguar Eugene Monroe came to Virginia.
- Mizzell elusiveness at Virginia Beach's Bayside High School earned him the nickname "Smoke" en route to being named a *Parade* All-American.
- Smoke played in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl in 2013, returning a kickoff 72 yards to set up the game-winning score as the East beat the West, 15-8.
- Smoke made his debut against BYU and received the game's opening kickoff and returned it 25 yards for his first collegiate stats.
- Smoke missed the VMI and Pitt games with a lower extremity injury.

PARKS REGISTERS ONE OF THE BEST FROSH. & SOPH. COMBINED RUSHING SEASONS IN PROGRAM HISTORY

- Junior Kevin Parks is in his first season as the starting running back for UVa, entering 2013 with two career starts to his credit.
- Parks rushed for 1,443 yards during his first two seasons at UVa.
- Of all the stellar running backs to walk the Grounds at UVa, only Wali Lundy (1,755) rushed for more combined yards than Kevin Parks through their freshman and sophomore seasons at Virginia.
- Parks also is No. 4 among UVa running backs with 35 career receptions through their first two seasons in the program.
- With 1,737 career rushing yards, Parks is No. 16 among active FBS players who are not seniors and No. 44 among all the nation's running backs.

JENNINGS ENTERS 2013 WITH BEST TWO-YEAR RECEIVING TOTALS

- Junior WR Darius Jennings had a solid first two seasons on Grounds.
- Jennings entered 2013 with 68 receptions, the most by a UVa wide receiver after his first two seasons. Herman Moore (60), Kevin Ogletree (59) and Billy McMullen (58) are the closest to Jennings' mark.
- TE Heath Miller had 103 receptions his first two years, for the best overall UVa output.

MORGAN MOSES WITH OVER 30 CAREER STARTS

- UVa senior offensive tackle Morgan Moses was one of 70 FBS players with at least 30 career starts entering 2013.
- Moses leads the team with 35 career starts having started the last seven games of his true freshman season in 2010, all 13 in 2011 and 11 of 12 in 2012, missing one start due to injury.
- Moses made his first career start at left tackle against BYU in the season opener.

NOURISH THE BEARD

- Virginia preseason All-American Morgan Moses has been growing his beard since he first enrolled at Virginia in 2010.
- The beard has taken on a life of its own and now has its own Twitter account, @NourishTheBeard.
- The account had over 300 followers in less than three days.
- In other social media news, Moses' defensive counterpart at ACC Kickoff was Jake Snyder and he was talked into joining Twitter at the event. Now he is tied for fewest Tweets in the world by someone who has Tweeted once. His handle, @JakeSnyder90 has over 200 followers.

- Smith missed the final 10 games of the 2010 season with a foot injury and only registered three receptions for 28 yards before being granted a medical hardship.
- Smith graduated from UVa in May and is currently enrolled in Virginia's professional development program.

REMEMBER THE TITANS

- UVa's Jay Whitmire has started the first four games of the season at right tackle and he is scheduled to start at right guard against Ball State.
- Whitmire entered the season with one career start, which came in the 2012 Wake Forest game at right tackle when Morgan Moses missed the start with an injury.
- Whitmire graduated from T.C. Williams High School in Alexandria, Va., the same school made famous in Disney film, "Remember the Titans."
- There is a tragic connection between UVa and Charlottesville with one of the real life individuals from the famous Titans story.
- Gerry Bertier, the defensive lineman who was paralyzed from the waist down in an automobile accident, passed away at the University of Virginia hospital due to injuries suffered from a second accident, when his car was struck by a drunk driver on March 20, 1981 on Route 20 in Charlottesville. Bertier was 27.

JAKE MCGEE AND RUSSELL WILSON

- TE Jake McGee and current Seattle Seahawks' starting quarterback Russell Wilson both are graduates of Richmond's Collegiate School.
- When Wilson graduated and left to play for current UVa associate head coach of offensive and tight ends coach Tom O'Brien at NC State, McGee was the quarterback that replaced Wilson at Collegiate for the 2007 season.
- McGee came to Virginia in 2010 as a quarterback and was issued No. 14. He switched to tight end the first week of preseason camp.

TIGHT ENDS CONTINUE TO PRODUCE

- Virginia has been strong at tight end over the last decade, and that continues with Jake McGee and Zachary Swanson.
- McGee had one of the more successful offensive seasons for a tight end in recent memory, hauling in 28 receptions for 374 yards and five touchdowns in 2012.
- McGee's five touchdowns in 2012 tied for the the fifth-most all-time by a UVa tight end in a season.
- Only Heath Miller (2002 & 2003), Bruce McGonnigal (1989) and Ed Carrington (1965) own more touchdowns in a season by a tight end than McGee's 2012 total.
- Swanson moves back to tight end after being the nation's tallest fullback in 2012.
- Rob Burns moved in 2012 from defensive end to tight end and should see time in 2013.
- Zachary Swanson was injured in the VMI game and missed the Pitt contest.
- UVa TEs have caught 601 passes for 6,388 yards and 53 TDs since 2001, by far the best figures in the ACC in that span.

DEFENSE SHUTS DOWN VMI

- UVa limited VMI to only 79 yards of total offense, the fewest yards allowed since Akron managed 84 in a 2004 meeting.
- Virginia held its opponent to fewer than five first downs for the first time since 1979 (3 vs. VMI).
- Virginia held its opponent under 100 yards passing for the first time since 2011 (24, Georgia Tech).
- Virginia held its opponent under 100 yards rushing for the first time since 2012 (19, NC State).
- UVa forced VMI into 11 three-and-outs and the Keydets were only 1-of-16 on third downs. The lone third down conversion was on a third-and-one situation.

UVA LEADS THE NATION IN THREE & OUTS

- UVa is currently No. 1 in the nation as a defense forcing three and outs, posting a 8.50 three and out average per game.
- UVa's opponents have gone three and out 34 times over four games; 52.3 percent of UVa's opponents drives ended in a three and out.
- Six other members of the ACC register high on the list, followed by No. 3 Syracuse (7.00), No. 7 Maryland (6.5), No. 9 Clemson (6.25), No. 12 Virginia Tech (6.00), No. 21 Wake Forest (5.20), No. 28 Georgia Tech (4.33) and No. 29 Florida State (4.25).
- UVa's first week opponent BYU is tied for No. 5 with 6.67 three and outs per game.

DEFENSE HOLDING THE LINE ON THIRD AND FOURTH DOWN

- UVa's defense has held strong on third and fourth downs this season.
- UVa's opponents are 16-67 (.239) on third downs.
- Pitt was 5-of-18 and VMI was 1-of-16 on third downs.
- BYU was 7-of-23 and Oregon was 3-of-10 on third downs.
- UVa currently ranks No. 5 in the nation on third down defense.
- BYU was 1-of-2 on fourth downs, Oregon was 0-of-2 and VMI was 0-1. UVa ranks No. 16 in the nation in fourth down defense.
- The only fourth down conversion UVa allowed was on the final play of the BYU game when the Cougars completed a desperation heave against the Cavaliers' prevent defense.

ANTHONY HARRIS - WALTER CAMP NATIONAL DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- The Walter Camp Football Foundation announced its first 2013 Football Bowl Subdivision National Offensive and Defensive Players of the Week, presented by Generation UCAN. Virginia junior strong safety Anthony Harris was selected as the national defensive player of the week on Sept. 1 for his play versus BYU.
- Harris posted 11 tackles, including three solo stops, recorded one quarterback sack, blocked a punt and intercepted a pass in UVa's season-opening 19-16 victory against BYU. Harris' blocked punt in the third quarter set up Virginia's first touchdown.
- With UVa trailing 16-12 and three minutes left to play, Harris picked off a third-down BYU pass, returned it 10 yards and then pitched the ball to linebacker Henry Coley, who ran another 23 yards. Virginia scored the winning touchdown on the next play.
- Harris also was awarded a "Helmet Sticker" by ESPN's Lou Holtz.

UVA DEFENSE SLOWS DOWN BYU OFFENSE

- Despite the Cougars running 93 offensive plays, the UVa defense was able to limit BYU's up-tempo offense.
- BYU accumulated 362 yards on offense for a 3.9 yards per play average, however 52 of the those 362 yards came on the game's final play.
- The previous 92 BYU offensive plays, the UVa defense limited the Cougars to 3.4 yards per play.
- BYU sustained only one double-digit drive, an 11-play, 92-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter.
- Virginia forced BYU into six three-and-outs and on the game's first fourth-down attempt, UVa's defense forced BYU to turnover on downs with 1:28 left in the game.
- In comparison, a week later BYU amassed 679 total yards on 99 offensive plays in a 40-21 triumph over then-No. 15 Texas. BYU averaged 6.9 yards per play, more than double the 3.4 yards per play BYU averaged against UVa, not counting the game's final desperation heave.

UVA GETS 3 SACKS AND INT IN OPENER

- UVa's defense collected three sacks and one INT in the opener against BYU.
- In 2012, UVa didn't register a sack until the second game of the season and didn't get its third sack until the third quarter of the third game.
- UVa didn't force any turnovers, let alone an INT, until the fourth game of the 2012 season at TCU where the Cavaliers got an INT and recovered a fumble.

NICHOLSON ANCHORS DEFENSIVE SECONDARY

- Junior CB Demetrious Nicholson is now the veteran of the Virginia defense, starting all 29 of Virginia's games since he stepped foot on Grounds prior to the 2011 season.
- Of the 1,986 defensive plays Virginia has lined up for since the opening game of the 2011 season, Nicholson has played 1,916 of those plays, meaning since Sept. 3, 2011 he has played 96.48 percent of UVa's defensive plays.
- In 2011 Nicholson became the first freshman to start the season-opener at the cornerback position since Kevin Cook in 1986, when the Cavaliers faced South Carolina in Scott Stadium.

COLEY AND MOORE SPEND SUMMER IN AFRICA

- Linebackers Henry Coley and Kwontie Moore took a summer class at Virginia that took them to South Africa in July.
- Coley and Moore paid attention to the social, economic and environmental aspects in and throughout different regions of South Africa.
- From rural regions to industrial ones, the class conversed, ate, slept and fellowshiped with locals all over the region in order to fully immerse themselves in the culture.
- The trip included two students from South Africa, 11 UVa students and one Ohio State student.
- The group visited schools, villages and took part in intellectual sharing between the groups.
- Coley and Moore were able to do some sightseeing and visit some historical landmarks, museums and Kruger National Park.

UVa HAS NO SENIORS STARTERS IN SECONDARY

- UVa has zero seniors in its starting secondary for the second year in a row after having three senior starters in 2011.
- UVa in 2012 was one of three other schools (Florida State, LSU and North Texas) in the nation that also lacked a senior in their secondary.
- UVa in 2013 has one senior on its roster that plays in the secondary - captain and free safety Rijo Walker is the backup to junior Brandon Phelps.

UVa CLOSED 2012 RANKED IN THREE & OUTS

- UVa closed out 2012 No. 15 in the nation as a defense forcing three and outs, posting a 4.58 three and out average per game.
- UVa's opponents went three and out 55 times over 12 games; 33.5 percent of UVa's opponents drives ended in a three and out.
- UVa was No. 3 in the ACC as Florida State led the nation at 47.3 percent of drives ending in a three and out.
- Former NC State assistant head coach for defense and current UVa defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta helped the Wolfpack (5.08 per game) tie for No. 8 and Clemson (4.00 per game) was No. 20, rounding out the ACC in the top 20.

TENUTA GIVING UVa'S DEFENSE AN AGGRESSIVE MAKEOVER IN 2013

- Virginia's new associate head coach for defense and defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta is a UVa alum and looking to bring an aggressive makeover to the Cavaliers.
- UVa over the past five seasons has the sixth-worst turnover margin in the nation. In 2012 UVa recorded only four interceptions, the fewest by a Virginia Cavalier team since the birth of the forward pass.
- Tenuta said prior to the season that "we want to create problems for the front five and never let the quarterback set his feet in the passing game."
- UVa over the past few seasons have been near the bottom nationally in turnover margin and sacks per game - Tenuta wants to change that.
- Tenuta enters his 33rd season of collegiate coaching and his 17th as a defensive coordinator. He has had stops in the ACC, Big Ten, Big 12 and at Notre Dame and looks to create turnovers and sack numbers that have declined in recent years at UVa.

REPLACING GREER AND REYNOLDS

- Virginia entered 2013 having to replace linebackers Steve Greer and La'Roy Reynolds who amassed 626 career tackles between them from 2009-12. Greer concluded his career No. 6 all-time at UVa with 376 career tackles.
- Greer's 376 career tackles are 237 more than the combined career numbers of all linebackers still in the UVa program. Daquan Romero (57), Henry Coley (44), D.J. Hill (15), Demeitre Brim (8) and Kwontie Moore (4) combined had only 139 career tackles entering 2013.
- Greer and Reynolds' 626 career tackles is almost equal to the 629 combined career tackles of every other returning Cavalier that started a game on defense in 2012.
- Greer's 376 tackles led all ACC active players at the conclusion of the 2012 season and was No. 7 among all active FBS players. Only Notre Dame's Manti Te'o had more career tackles among active BCS conference players at the time.
- Reynolds missed 2.5 games with a hand injury and still amassed 90 tackles in 10 games. Reynolds is now a

- Junior long snappers Matt Fortin and Blake Blaze were both bestowed the honor of residing in a room on The Lawn at UVa.
- Only 54 students enjoy the annual privilege of residing in one of the University's original buildings.
- Blaze is located three doors down from Fortin.
- Notable Lawn residents include former UVa men's basketball All-American Ralph Sampson, as well as Katie Couric and Tina Fey.

UVA PUNTS 13 TIMES VS. BYU AND WINS

- UVa punted 13 times against BYU and won, which is the first time this century that an FBS team has punted 13 times and still won the football game.
- UVa's 13 punts by Alec Vozenilek are tied for the eighth-most punts in a game by UVa. It also happened in 1937 against Maryland, 1940 against North Carolina and 1931 against Virginia Tech.
- The 13 punts are the most by a UVa team since they punted 15 times against South Carolina in 1972.

NEW PRIMARY PLACEKICKER FOR UVA

- For the third season in a row, UVa entered the year with a different placekicker atop of the depth chart.
- Robert Randolph concluded his four-year career in 2011 and he was followed by Drew Jarrett in 2012.
- Heading into the 2013 camp, Ian Frye was slated to take the primary placekicking duties for the Cavaliers.
- Also in the mix to replace Jarrett is redshirt freshman Dylan Sims and fifth-year transfer R.C. Willenbrock, who graduated from Dartmouth in May. Willenbrock played in one game for the Big Green in 2009 and missed the 2010 and 2011 seasons with an injury. Willenbrock also played in nine games for the Dartmouth men's lacrosse team from 2010-12.
- Willenbrock built his own computer at the age of 13.
- Frye has the most experience as the primary kickoff specialist for UVa in 2012. He was 3-of-5 on field goals with a long of 30 yards in 2012. Frye kicked off 48 times with 22 touchbacks. He averaged 62.0 yards per kickoff.

DID YOU KNOW?

- UVa WR Tim Smith is cousins with MLB stars B.J. and Justin Upton of the Atlanta Braves. Smith's father, Timothy Smith, Sr., is first cousins with B.J. and Justin's father, Manny Upton.
- UVa quarterback David Watford and current wide receivers coach Marques Hagans are first cousins and both were quarterbacks at Hampton High before enrolling at UVa.
- UVa's oldest living football alum, Dr. John Risher, turned 103 years old this year; he also works in the press box on the UVa stats crew on game day. (More on page 14).
- Paul Wisman also works in the press box on the UVa stats crew staff and has done so since 1956. His 58 straight years of work in the press box is the longest current streak in the nation (More on page 14).
- Current UVa offensive line coach Scott Wachenheim was the offensive coordinator at Liberty (2006-08) when UVa WR Dominique Terrell's older brother, Zach, was a standout All-Big South running back and slot receiver for the Flames.
- 2013 marks the first time in program history UVa has had eight home games on the schedule and is the sixth season in a row that UVa has had at least seven home games on the schedule.
- CB Demetrious Nicholson has been growing his signature dread locks since the summer of 2005, just before he entered the sixth grade.
- Redshirt freshman Kyle Dockins also has been growing his dread locks since the sixth grade, dating back to 2006.
- Redshirt freshman CB Kelvin Rainey has two brothers who have played FBS football. His older brother Johnathan played at New Mexico (2008-11), while his other older brother Derrick is a senior this year at Arizona.
- Redshirt freshman Israel Vaughan's older brother, Joshua, is a member of the Atlanta Falcons, played for Mike London at Richmond and was a member of its 2008 FCS National Championship team.
- Air Force Academy graduate and UVa assistant coach Scott Wachenheim was awarded his bachelor's degree by then-President Ronald Reagan.
- Graduate assistant Jacob Hodges served as a team manager for two years (2008, 2009) and then was a three-year letterwinner as UVa's holder (2010-12).
- CB DreQuan Hoskey, DE Trent Corney and RB Khalek Shepherd all were members of the UVa track & field team in 2013.
- Hoskey also ran track at Virginia in 2010 and competed at the ACC and NCAA Championships.
- Freshman Daniel Hamm came to UVa to run track. He also walked on to the football team as a tailback.
- Redshirt freshman CB C.J. Moore is the nephew of Gail Devers, three-time Olympic champion in track & field.
- Sophomore Trent Corney's older brother, Taylor, won the Bronze at the 2009 Pan American Junior Championships in the Decathlon. Taylor has also been ranked in the Top 10 in the world in the Decathlon.

WATFORD THE LONE EXPERIENCED QB ENTERING 2013

- David Watford was the only UVa quarterback to have taken a collegiate snap entering the 2013 season.
- It marked the first time UVa has only one QB with college experience since 2010, when Marc Verica was the lone returning Cavalier to have taken a snap.
- Since 1951 there have been just nine other instances where Virginia entered a season with only one QB with prior experience.

DAVID WATFORD MAKES FIRST CAREER START AGAINST BYU

- UVa head coach Mike London announced during a teleconference on Aug. 12 that David Watford would be the starting quarterback.
- Against BYU Watford became the fourth different QB to start a game during the Mike London era at Virginia.
- Of London's 39 games at UVa, 12 have been started by Marc Verica, 21 by Michael Rocco, four by Phillip Sims and two by David Watford.
- Watford is the seventh different UVa QB to start a game since the start of the 2007 season. Included in that group was two games started by Vic Hall and two by Peter Lalich. The other 74 games over the span of six seasons have been started by Jameel Sewell (23), Marc Verica (22), Michael Rocco (21), Phillip Sims (4) and David Watford (4).

WATFORD AND UVA QUARTERBACKS ARE THIRD MOST INEXPERIENCED CORPS IN THE NATION

- David Watford and his fellow quarterbacks trail only Florida State and Minnesota in regards to inexperience.
- FSU quarterbacks have played in a combined four games and have no upperclassmen in its corps.
- Minnesota's starting quarterback is a redshirt sophomore who started seven games last season, the only games the Gophers quarterback corps have played in. They also have zero upperclassmen.
- Watford, who appeared in 10 games off the bench for Virginia in 2011, is a sophomore and every other quarterback at UVa are freshmen, two redshirted in 2012 with Watford. UVa also has zero upperclassmen in its quarterback corps.

WITH WATFORD ITS ALL IN THE FAMILY

- David Watford and current UVa wide receivers coach Marques Hagans are first cousins.
- Both played quarterback at Hampton High School in Hampton, Va., and Watford followed his older cousin to UVa to play quarterback.
- Hagans was the starting quarterback at UVa from 2004-05. He was wide receiver and kick returner in 2002 and 2003 when he was the back up quarterback to Matt Schaub.
- Other notable quarterbacks from the Hampton HS football family are Ronald Curry and Tyrod Taylor.

WATFORD OWNS OVERTIME WIN FOR VIRGINIA

- David Watford led UVa to an overtime victory over Idaho in 2011.
- Coming off the bench as a true freshman, Watford completed a 27-yard pass to fellow true freshman Dominique Terrell for what ended up as the game-winning touchdown.
- The Virginia defense deflected a two-point attempt afterwards to solidify the overtime victory, 21-20.
- Watford ended the Idaho game 10-of-20 for 95 yards and the touchdown.

A LOOK BACK AT COLLEGE FOOTBALL HISTORY ON THE GROUNDS OF UVA AS THE COLONNADES AT LAMBETH FIELD CELEBRATE 100 YEARS

- The colonnades at Lambeth Field turn 100 in 2013. The playing surface at Lambeth Field hosted Virginia football from 1902 until Scott Stadium opened up in the midst of the 1931 season on Oct. 15, 1931.
- Lambeth Field is the location where the American game of football that we know today, played from youth league all the way up to the NFL, was first played.
- It all started in 1909 with the death of UVA's Archer Christian.
- Christian died in 1909 as a result of injuries sustained in a football game at Georgetown on Nov. 13, 1909. Christian's death highlighted 29 football related deaths during the 1909 season. Papers from all over the country carried the front-page headline of Christian's death.
- Former UVA President Edwin A. Alderman and the father of UV athletics, William Lambeth, went to New York City to meet with other presidents and administrators from other big time universities to discuss how they could make the game of football safer.
- At the time there was legislation happening in Washington to make it illegal to play the game of football in America.
- A new rules committee that was appointed from that meeting in New York City included Lambeth and the father of American football, Walter Camp.
- Lambeth noted to the committee, which met almost on a monthly basis, that the two deaths he had seen personally were due to exhaustion. At the time there were no substitutions, if you came out you could no longer return. The original game had a lot of pulling and pushing. Players were not considered down until they really couldn't move under the pile. Lambeth suggested that the game be split into four quarters, totaling 15 minutes a piece and that players could substitute back in. Walter Camp's notes from the committee meetings credit Lambeth, in the margins, with these changes.
- The committee asked Lambeth to take the new rules back to the University of Virginia and experiment with them during the spring of 1910.
- On the Grounds of the University of Virginia, under the watchful eye of William Lambeth, a new version of American football, divided into four quarters was played for the first time in history.
- Other notable rules that were played for the first time that spring at Lambeth Field were: seven men required on the line at the time of the snap, players could no longer push or pull the ball carrier and the forward pass could now be made across the line of scrimmage.
- Virginia football returned to its roots at Lambeth Field in 2013 camp, taking part in two scrimmages on the hallowed ground.

WISEMAN AND RISHER HAVE BOTH WORKED ON UVA'S FOOTBALL STAT CREW FOR 50+ YEARS

- Paul Wiseman and Dr. John Risher have each worked on the stats crew at Scott Stadium for over 50 years.
- Wiseman enters his 58th consecutive season on the UVA stat crew, which is tied with Toledo's Chet Sullwold for the longest active streak in FBS football. Both men started in 1956.
- Risher began in 1963 and enters his 51st season in a row.
- Risher used to be Wiseman's primary care physician in Lynchburg before retiring. When Risher found out what Wiseman did with UVA, he hounded him to plug him in with the stats crew too.
- Risher is UVA's oldest living football alum. He turned 103 on May 13 of this year. He golfed nine holes on his 100th birthday in 2010.
- Wiseman has missed only one home game at Scott Stadium since he started working on the stat crew and that was the 2011 season-opening game against William & Mary.
- The William & Mary game in 2011 is the only home game Wiseman has missed for that matter at Scott Stadium since 1946.
- In April 2013, both Risher and Wiseman were recipients of this year's "Order of the Crossed Sabre" award, which goes annually to someone who has contributed greatly to Virginia football.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 428 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 246-174-12.

As Mike London prepares for his fourth season as the head football coach at Virginia, the makeup of the Cavalier program continues to change and improve.

London will enter the 2013 season with a lot of new looks. His coaching staff underwent a major overhaul following a 4-8 finish in 2012 and now features five new faces sporting a significant amount of major college coaching experience. London's fourth edition of UVa football will feature new coordinators on offense, defense, special teams and for recruiting.

The Virginia football program took on a dramatic new look in March when the George Welsh Indoor Practice Facility opened behind the McCue Center. The facility, that features a full field and end zones, allows the Cavaliers to practice and train without disruption from inclement weather. As part of the project, the team's primary practice field received a new FieldTurf playing surface.

Topping off the off-season was another top-30 recruiting class that featured the first five-star signee in London's tenure at Virginia.

With all of those changes, there is still one constant in the Virginia program - London's desire to build a program that competes for championships. While the results from the 2012 campaign were not satisfactory for London, the team featured a number of young players who displayed the ability to turn the fortunes of the Cavaliers like they experienced in 2011.

That season the Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games that the team won in the final seconds. Along the way the Cavaliers became the first college football program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season on the way to UVa being ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. He was also selected by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to receive its 2011 Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award. A total of five Cavalier players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrious Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

In the spring of 2013 OT Oday Aboushi was selected by the New York Jets to mark the 30th consecutive season a UVa player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

Since taking over the Virginia program London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches. He has made dozens of appearances, spoke at clinics and been readily available to the media. He did not just wait for constituents to come to Virginia, he actively took the Cavalier program to the public.

London embraced a groundbreaking 18-episode television production entitled "The Building of a Program" that gave an all-access look at UVa football. He has had the team hold spring practices and coaches clinics across the state, including in Virginia Beach to build support and interest in one of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

He quickly defined the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

The results of his actions were tangible. In his first spring semester at UVa the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years and student-athletes were heavily involved in community service projects and outreach programs.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program on the field. Success has been a big part of the Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/ American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year from both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texas. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November of 1984 to July of 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and

played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina, are the parents of four children - Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. He has three older children, Michael, Jr., Brandon and Kristen through a previous marriage. The 51-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants practice squad. Brandon since 2010 has been with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.
